THE EVENTS AND HAPPENINGS OF THE EASYBEATS IN 1965

After we played the show one night, the fellows and I and Tony and Vince Maloney and a few of the Purple Hearts, set about having some mischief. We all went some mischief. We all went along to the public baths, which were completely in darkness, scaled the walls, and had ourselves a free swim. This happened in nearly every place we played, so we would like to thank the municipal coun cils of all these places for being so helpful at that time

 although they didn't know about it. I remember something funny that happened one night. The same group of us went to some baths about two miles from the hotel where we were staying. We swam for about an hour and on the way back we found a giant frog jumping across the road. None of us were going to catch it with our bare hands, so when we cornered it, Tony took off his jacket and, like a real gladiator, neatly net-I think we all came upon

the same solution as to what to do with the frog. Back we went to the hotel where everything was quiet. Silently we crept into the tour manager's room - he was a fellow by the name of John Jennings. We placed the frog in the bed with the tour manager and stood back to see the results! At first, all was well, then frog started to get a hit hot, and started to jump around under the blankets. Bobby "Blue" Bland

One of the most popular R & B a tists in the U.S. the moment, is Bobby Bland and, with the success of James Brown, Percy Sledge and Wilson Picket on the Australian charts recently, it seems strange indeed that his latest single "GOOD TIME CHARLIE" (CBS 221292) has hardly been played.

Bland was born in 1930, near Memphis. Tennessee When he was 18 he started singing with local bands and Joined up with the "BFALE STREETERS", a group which included B. B. KING and ROSCOE GORDON. Around 1951 he was recorded for the CHESS and MODERN labels by SAM PHILLIPS who later recorded ELVIS PRESLEY on SUN but was free-lancing at the

When he came out of National Service training in when he came out of National Service training in 1954, he was signed by DON ROBY for DUKE RECORDS. DUKE's biggest sellers over the last few years have been Bland and LITTLE JUNIOR PARKER, both of whom have had records released in Australia since the late 505. (Parker was born in Arkansas and joined DUKE in 1954 after recording for SUN and MODERN. He is quite a good vocalist and harp player, but has not had the big sellers Bland has enjoyed.)

DUKE have recorded Bobby and Parker very well—

emphasising their individuality. They have been especi-ally successful with Bland, who often records with a soulful band.

CHRIS MONTEZ

ORTRAIT

one of the "new breed"

As the musical turmoil of the middle 50's and the early 60's begins to subside, a new breed of entertainer is be ginning to emerge as the dominant force in the music

Chris Montez, a darkly handsome young man who is a protege of Heab Alpert. a dedicated exponent of jazz, a Sinatra admirer most of his life and a serious studeni of music during his college days, is one of the leading examples of this

Born and reared in Los ingeles, Chris entered the world of music while still in grade school, when two of his brothers taught him to play the guitar. From that point on Chris was a per-

Following high school graduation Chris enrolled in college as a music major, to study the structure and history of music on an academic level. He received his first taste of show business while still in college With a pleasant voice and consummate musical skills Chris was rapidly "dis-

Unfortunately, Chris's initial exposure as a recording artist was not in an area where he felt most comfortable. Riding the crest of the rock 'n' roll rage, the recording company selected material for Chris which would best capitalise on the fad. Although Chris proved an immediate commercial success in his early recording ventures by racking up a gold record for his "Let's Dance" release, he was not satisfied with his perform-ance. He felt that once rock 'n' roll labelled he would never be able to escape into the area of serious popular music. Chris continued to be a highly successful recording artist the world over, and he became a featured concert attraction on two continents, but his disillus-ionment had reached the serious stage.

Late in 1965 Chris met Herb Alpert for the first time, and, as Chris says, "It was the most important day in my life". Alpert apprecia-ted the young singer's talent. He also understood Chris's frustration at not being able to express himself vocally Alpert immediately signed Chris to a recording con-tract with his A & M Records and set to work with him to find the real sound of Chris Montez and the material appropriate for that sound

'Herb Alpert is a dedicated musician and record producer who will never sanction the release of a recording

solely because it may be commercially practical. Five months of labor with Chris in recording studios fol-lowed, until they were both satisfied with Chris's new The results of the Alpert-

Montez endeavor were re-leased under the title of "Call Me" and became an in-stantareous success. On the heels of this came "The More I See You", which per-manently established the manently established the sound of Chris Montez and which proved to be even more successful than "Call Me". Soon Chris's first album release under the A & M banner, appropriately titled "Chris Montez, The More I See You, Call Me", was released and immed-iately climbed high up on the national charts.

Chris Montez also attri-butes a great deal of his success to his audiences. "I

feel that young people in particular have become more discriminating and more mature in their musi-cal tastes. They are better able to recognise music with quality, regardless of whether it's jazz, pop or rock n' roll. They are no longer interested just in the "hard rock" sound Because my sound is light and gay and falls between rock and pop I have found that people of all ages like it and accept it as legitimate music

Now firmly established as one of the outstanding ex-ponents of the new breed of recording artists, Chris has set his sights on a new goal.
"I will never stop singing: I
just love it too much, but
from the time I was a little boy I wanted to be an actor, and I hope that within the near future I will get the opportunity to make this other dream a reality, too".

JAMES BROWN

The stage sometimes gets very crowded. There is a troupe of dancers. There is a 21-piece orchestra with four drummers, two working and two standing by. There is a male singer and a female singer and someone called Elsie TV Mama, and there is a trio to back up the leader. And there is the leader himself, James Brown, shouting and screaming as he sings, falling to his knees in feigned exhaustion to be pulled erect again by his aides, enfolded at last in a flowing robe and helped off stage to the accompaniment of echoing screams

from his admirers. All this is show, soul music gone downstream to where the money is. But behind the show, in the shouting and screaming, in the laughing and the crying, the

music is as earthy as the red clay of Georgia.

The sound is what makes James Brown and the sound is not easily susceptible of description. Soul music is a derivation of gospel singing and of blues, a throbbing beat and a personal expression. Soul music also, in James Brown's terms, has become

soul music also, in James Brown's terms, has become an exercise in showmanship. "James Brown", the original has said of himself, "Is 75 per cent. businessman and 25 per cent. talent." More simply, he is very good at what he does and he has the show-business acumen to turn his talent into money. He was born to an appreciation of the reward.

"I like opera because it's perfection", he says. 'You' know those opera singers have to be perfect or it's no good, you understand? And I like big bands. I know there are plenty of groups around, I had one myself, but they're limited. I think the Rolling Stones have plenty of soul and I'd say the Beatles are just plain good business men. The Supremes? They're professional but I don't think they're totally involved, if you follow me." Brown's own total involvement began after he quit high school, formed a trio and made an on-and-off living

nigh school, formed a trio and made an on-and-on wing with it. "I mean I had a very, very big family. Not brothers and sisters but a lot of close relatives and I had to help feed them." Certainly, soul music has its roots somewhere in memories of deprivation as well as in echoes of the chapel, in shared misfortunes as well

s shared joys.

His show is run with military precision and Brown is his own logistician. There is a two-ton truck for instruments and gear, an elegantly fitted out bus for the cast and a private Cadillac limousine for Brown himself



James Brown himself has come a long way from Georgia house which rented for \$7 a month. The new house is a three-story building in the St. Alban's sestion of Queens, New York. The initials J.B. are etched into the front lawn and emblazoned on the chimney.
