BRE SAYS YES TO Y.E.S.—AGAIN

nce again, Black Radio Exclusive has joined other companies from all sectors of the music industry in opening its offices to the Youth Entertainment Summer Program. The magazine has provided summer jobs this year for two minority high school students from the Los Angeles area and a third college student, who participated in the program last year. As the midway point approaches (the program ends on September 2nd), the BRE staff concurs that this investment in enchancing future opportunities for young people has proved to be just as gratifying as before.

Coordinated by Karen Kennedy, the innovative Y.E.S. Program was initiated last year by A&M Records and offered 50 jobs in the music industry to minority youth who might never have had such a 'bootstrap' level of exposure to the industry. This year, Warner-Elektra-Atlantic (WEA) and MCA Records have joined the sponsorship fold and increased participation at all levels has expanded the number of job placements to 150.

"It (the Y.E.S. Program) gives students a chance to work in a real-world professional setting and be prepared to go into the industry regardless of their prospective majors," said Carolyn Plummer Riley, BRE's Radio and Retail Research Director. "Working with the students last year, I know that the experience really influenced their thinking about actually pursuing careers in the music industry."

Ramon Azueta, now a sophomore at the University of California/ Irvine ("I'm currently majoring in Information and Computer Science, but considering a switch to Economics," he says) did such an outstanding job last year in the research area that Riley recommended to BRE Publisher Sidney Miller that he be hired again this summer.

"Members of the Y.E.S. program enjoy working with others," said Azueta. "And that's one of the key ingredients in getting the job done. I would recommend the program because it's the first job experience for some and it gives them an idea of what the employment world is like."

Like Azueta, April McNeel came to BRE from Dorsey High School, where she is a senior active in many extracurricular activities. McNeel works under Riley's supervision in tracking radio stations and retail stores, while

assisting in the compilation of charting

"Over the past weeks, I've seen firsthand that there's a lot of business in the music business," McNeel observed. "The accuracy of the research is very important in providing the industry the kind of information it gets from trades like BRE."

For Norma Villa, a senior at Manual Arts High School, her position in the editorial department is a natural extension of her work as editor of her school's paper. "Here you have to be punctual and versatile," she says. Norma knows this only too well; she has to get up at 4 a.m. to get to her BRE post on time. "You just can't rely on other people to do your job for you. You have to take into account that what you do is important and be prepared to meet any new challenge."

Villa is supervised by Hedi Butler, BRE's Consulting Editor, and works on a variety of assignments ranging from maintaining departmental contacts with the industry to actual research and writing.

"This opportunity (working at BRE) has given me a good look at what it's really like to work with professionals," Villa said. "I am thrilled to see the magazine come out every week and know that I'm a part of it.'

Of the 50 students who participated in last year's Y.E.S. Program, five found permanent work in the record industry. In addition to Los Angeles, other cities where record companies, radio stations and record stores have Y.E.S. placements include Atlanta, Chicago, Detroit, New York, San Francisco and Washington,

BRE urges other companies to say 'yes' to Y.E.S. It's one investment with guaranteed dividends for the entire industry.

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



Dionne Warwick Heads Lineup At Minority AIDS Benefit

LOS ANGELES: The Reverend Carl Bean, founder and executive director of The Minority AIDS Project, has announced that a galaxy of stars with Dionne Warwick headlining will be performing at The Shrine Auditorium, Thursday, August 4 at 8:00p.m. According to Rev. Bean, who has been honored for his work in providing a home for homeless AIDS

patients in the black community (Dignity House), the current line-up for the benefit includes Patti LaBelle, Natalie Cole, Cissy Houston, Jennifer Holliday, all of whom will be performing with The Pentacostal Community Choir of Los Angeles. Gospel artists The Reverend James Cleveland and The Caravans are also set for the bill, whose theme will be "Coming Home For Friends," focusing on "the gospel roots of these major performers," says Rev. Bean.

"All proceeds will be going to The Minority AIDS Project in support of our work with those with AIDS, ARC, their family members and significant others," reports Rev. Bean. "This is the first time that a major fundraiser has ever been held for the Black and Latin communities and our aim is to draw

attention to this crisis in the community and to celebrate the lives of those who have passed. The needs of people with AIDS in this community are different from others in the population at large and we are very grateful that black entertainers of such magnitude are lending their support."

Dionne Warwick, who founded her own foundation to expressly impact the work being done in education on AIDS, has played a vital role in the benefit, inviting many of her friends in show business to participate, says Bean.

Tutu Peace Concert Slated

LOS ANGELES: Nobel Peace Prize winning Archbishop from South Africa, Bishop Desmond Tutu, has announced plans for a world peace concert to be broadcast worldwide from the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum on September 10. Mitchell Productions, headed by Michael Mitchell, will act as executive producer of the event; Mitchell produced Live Aid, the largest telecast and fund-raiser in history.

Designed to raise the world's conscience regarding apartheid

in South Africa, the concert has received the endorsement and involvement of record producer giant Quincy Jones. "What future do any of us have anywhere," said Jones, at the May 12 satellite press conference to announce the event, "if our hearts allow the (system of apartheid) to continue."

Funds raised at this nonprofit event will be disbursed by the Bishop Desmond Tutu Group of Foundations.

Lee Bailey Stages Anti-Gang Event

LOS ANGELES: Coca-Cola USA, McDonald's, Baskin-Robbins, LA Gear, and a cavalcade of celebrities will join Lee Bailey Communications, Inc./Radioscope for Summer Fresh '88, an anti-drug/anti-gang event at the Watts/Willowbrook Boys and Girls Club in Los Angeles.

"The reason for sponsoring such an event is not just to have a concert, says Bailey, president," but to hopefully attract our youths in a more positive direction. Gangs and drugs have become a national concern, and I believe that one way we can help improve the situation is to show the children that someone cares."

Summer Fresh '88 will feature top-recording stars such as Club Nouveau, Tony! Toni! Tone!, Bobby Brown, The L.A. Dream Team, Troop, Paula Abdul, Kid Flash, Royalty, Rainy Davis, and Vesta Williams. TV & Film stars Tisha Campbell, of "School Daze," and Kimberly Russell, of "Head of the Class" are also slated to appear.

"This combative coalition is the first of many to come," says Diane Blackmon-Bailey, vice president of Lee Bailey Communications, Inc. and coordinator of Summer Fresh '88. A special feature of Summer Fresh '88 will broadcast on Radio-Scope, a syndicated radio program heard in over 100 markets nationwide.

MCA Records, Boston Ventures Acquire Motown

LOS ANGELES: The partnership formed by MCA Records and Boston Ventures Limited Partnership has acquired the recording assets and trademarks of Motown Record Corporation. Berry Gordy and the purchasers of Motown Records' assets have provided an opportunity for continued Black ownership in the new company.

Motown Records, founded by Berry Gordy, launched the recording careers of Stevie Wonder, Lionel Richie, Diana Ross and the Supremes, Smokey Robinson, Michael Jackson, The Temptations, The Four Tops and Marvin Gaye and many others. The historic recordings by these artists are part of the purchase. Motown record product is currently distributed in the United States by MCA Distributing, in Canada by MCA Records Canada, and will continue to be distributed by them under a new ten year agreement.

Motown's Music publishing

division, including Jobete, and Motown's film and TV operations were not included in the transaction.

MCA Records is a wholly owned subsidiary of MCA Inc., a diversified entertainment company. Boston ventures is a Massachusetts-based private investment company which, among other industries, specializes in communications, media and entertainment investments.

Financial terms were not disclosed.

the existing promotional field staff of Janice Burley, Eric Thrasher, and James Cochran and to the sales division, currently manned by Ben Sheets.

While several executives are rumored to be joining either MCA Records or Motown Records Company, L.P., no other appointments had been made at press time.

But our sources have confirmed that Stevie Wonder, who had reportedly held up negotiations because of the terms of his expiring contract, did indeed resign with the company—thereby retaining the superstar roster of Stevie, Lionel Richie and Smokey Robinson.

With the current MCA roster including former Motown artists Gladys Knight and Diana Ross, it has been speculated that they may be crossing over from MCA to resume the family ties. There has been no confirmation of this move, although some label exchanges designed to position artists in the most viable location are anticipated.

Inside the 'New' Motown

HOLLYWOOD, CA: After weeks of speculation following the sale of Motown Records to MCA and Boston Ventures, BRE has learned that the company—now known officially as Motown Records Co., L.P. (Limited Partnership)—has resumed operations at the offi-

ces at 6255 Sunset Boulevard.

According to insiders familiar with the transition period, MCA Senior VP Jheryl Busby is dividing his time between the (MCA) 'black tower' and the penthouse floor of the Sunset building while negotiations regarding his specific role and that of other department heads at Motown L.P. are being finalized. As Shelly Fowler, Busby's longtime assistant, explained,

"We pack our office up each day and take it back and forth."

As reported here, the appointment of Traci Jordan to the post of VP of Artist Development/Video is the only official announcement of new executive staffing. However, Ronnie Jones, VP of Promotion—who will remain with the company along with Miller London and Brenda Boyce—is currently on the road recruiting additions to



ix months ago she was a student studying anthropology on a scholarship at Tufts University in Medford, Massachusetts. Today, 24-year-old Tracy Chapman is being acclaimed as one of the most important new artists to emerge in the record industry in 1988 due to her platinum, self-titled debut LP on Elektra Records.

There's a political perspective and social conscience in Chapman's music that is unusual, but heartening, in this era of corporate ladder climbing and pedal-to-the-metal pursuit of the Yuppie/Buppie Mercedes-driven Dream. The first single from her LP, "Fast Car," is a tale about a young couple who spend time in a homeless shelter on their road toward a more stable future together; the current single, "Talkin' 'Bout A Revolution," is a rallying cry to those who are disenfranchised, including the ones presently entrenched on the welfare lines.

Not typical radio fare, but Chapman feels there's a place for her music on the same playlists that program more traditional R&B/Pop hit-makers. "I think my music can fit very easily. I write songs about political and social issues, but melodically, rhythmically, I think they have a place on Black radio.

"There isn't much similarity between

heard—and my records aren't played much on either Black or CHR radio," she admitted in a telephone interview. "You don't expect to reach everyone...and people either like my music or they don't. But if there are people out there who want to hear it, it should be accessible to them." Managed by Elliot Roberts-who has represented artists such as Bob Dylan and Joni Mitchell—Chapman is gratified to know that her music is reaching a Black audience. "I think they're finding out about me from the Black press, the trades, an interview I did with B.E.T., and mainly just word of mouth. I'm seeing a lot of different types of people in my audiences, and more and more Black people," says Chapman, who has appeared on concert bills with the eclectic pop band 10,000 Maniacs.

Chapman has stated in previous interviews that one of the reasons her music differs from the kind that most typically gets programmed is that she never listened much to the radio when she was growing up in a Black working class neighborhood in Cleveland, Ohio. It was her mother, a gospel and folk singer, who taught her how to play the guitar and sparked her initial interest in music; later, while a college student, Chapman would further hone her craft by playing on the streets of Harvard Square and in small coffeehouses.

"People compare me to Joan Armatrading, but she's an individual and I'm one, too," observed the singer/songwriter. "I play acoustic guitar and my music puts me closer to the category of folk music." She added that she was "surprised" at the glowing critical acclaim her LP received upon its release by The New York Times, Village Voice and The Los Angeles Times.

"I don't think I've been hyped by the press because what's been written hasn't been superficial. There's been no attempt to make something more exciting than it really is. My record company believes in my music and I've had great individual contacts with people who've responded to the LP," she said. "What I'm most concerned with at this point is continuing to grow as an artist.

It was Chapman's decision, she said, to release "Talkin' 'Bout A Revolution' as the LP's second single: "Everyone had an opinion, but it was my choice. It's an important song. It'll give radio a chance to try something new and radical on the air," she concluded with a laugh.

Talking to Tracy Chapman leaves one with the impression that she is a young woman guietly determined to maintain her selfhood and integrity in an industry that often celebrates flash and fluff over

substance."People have to take me on my own terms," she said. "I won't change to make myself more accessible because it's not about that. I don't want those kind of restrictions. I don't want to make compromises where none are necessary."

As for her message to radio, Chapman was concise and to the point: "It would be good if radio were more supportive because we're in this together. Radio has a responsibility. It has to give audiences choices.

"Play the music," she said simply, "and let the people decide."

ABBEY ROAD/Toledo, OH Manager: Fred Shaheen

"Tracy Chapman is in our Top 5, she's doing really well. It's hard to predict whether she'll pick up more Black fans as she goes along. Right now, she's attracting the young, white kids who're into rock and Bruce Springsteen. That's the audience she has here."

CLEVELAND ONE STOP/Cleveland, OH Manager: Chuck Young

"Tracy's fantastic. She was born in this city, you know. She's in our Top 10, she's the biggest CD we've got. Everybody's ordering her because she's a tremendous artist."

CRAIN'S RECORDS/Los Angeles, CA Manager: Steve Crain

"She's in our Top 30. She's got a mature sound, the same appeal of a Paul Simon. Her music has something to say, but it works commercially, too. She's solid. My Black customers who've seen her 'Fast Car' video come in and ask for the LP."

JIMMY'S RECORDS/Chicago, IL Asst. Manager: Jackie Roberts

"Her 'Fast Car' 45 is moving real good. The LP is moving slow, it's not top-flight yet. She's #26 out of this shop. Those who're into her are into pop, rock. She's different. I like her."

METRO MUSIC/Chicago, IL Manager: Gwen Sutton

"She's selling pretty good here. She does have a Black following, but she attracts mostly white (buyers). She doesn't get a lot of Black radio airplay here. My customers know her from the 'Fast Car' video."

OLSEN'S RECORDS & TAPES/ Washington, D.C. Manager: Eric Geer

"She was #2 last week on our Black report to the trades. Here, her audience is mostly white and female. But she's the hottest thing we've got right now on all formats, especially CDs. About one-third of the sales we get on her are from Black customers. It's due to the video

response, I think. Folk music is not my cup of tea, but I can see why she's popular. As far as female songwriters are concerned, she's filled an important niche in terms of quality and talent."

SIKHULU RECORD SHACK/New York, NY Manager: Sikhulu Shange

"Tracy is great, we can't keep her on the shelves. The LP, the cassette and the CD are all selling well. I didn't think Black audiences would be receptive to her, but they keep coming and they keep asking for her. Ever since she was on 'Freedomfest,' her sales have been up here. She's got her own style and she's here to stay."

WORLD OF RECORDS/Los Angeles, CA Manager: Daira Stewart

"She's done extremely well here. We do tremendous in-store play on Tracy and sales have been great. I couldn't typecast the consumers she attracts; they cover a broad spectrum. It's not true that Blacks don't appreciate her music, they just don't get a chance to hear it on the stations they listen to. We get a lot of Black customers who listen to KTWV ('The Wave'), so they've heard her. To give you an idea: We've stocked her very heavily, but this past weekend we sold every LP, cassette and CD we had.

"Personally, I'm a big fan. She's fabulous."





DI's and MC's from all over the world descended on this year's New Music Seminar. Operating in various capacities ranging from panelist to performer, the world-wide Hip-Hop posse was definitely "in effect," The subject of the Rap music genre cropped up in several of the panel discussions and virtually dominated others. On the live side, the "DJ's/MC's Battle For World Supremacy" featured some awesome talent and some equally awesome theatrics surrounding L.A. Posse member Mikev D's victory over last year's winner Melle Mel. After going one on one in the final segment, judges and audience alike picked Mikey overwhelmingly over the "old school" rapper, yet a furious Melle took it upon himself to declare the true winner...himself! He then walked off with both belts, actually pushing winner Mikey D out of his way. What a way to go out!...there was more crazy shit happenin' when Public Enemy made a surprise appearance at the Ritz, side man super star Flavor Flave was more than a bit peeved when some upstart technician turned his mike off. Show host Daddy O had even more reason to rage...headliners Stetsasonic got bumped because of time constraints. Not one to go out like that, the O-Dad did some throwin' down of his own...this time with the valuable Tiffany trophies that were made for the event. The Milky Way club hosted super cool school artists Jungle Brothers and True Mathematics along with fresh female act Body And Soul. The girls are ready to kick out some wax on the fast rising Delicious Vinyl label. Persistent rumors point toward an upcoming deal with Island/4th & B'way for the L.A. based label. Delicious rapper Young MC rocked a party at the MK Club, busting out his follow up to the wildly successful debut single "I Let 'Em Know." Get ready for a stunning re-mix of that cut backing his second single "Know How," to be released this week...okay, let's get around to some of the fresh new cuts comin' our way...Tommy Boy continues its radical resurgence with the stupid def('scuse me P) jam "Wrath Of My Madness" sung by Latifa and produced by "The 45 King" Mark James. Besides the sweet production, lady Latifa throws down some seriously "with it" lyrics, and a tight syncopated delivery that sounds a bit like a female version of avant labelmates De La Soul (who's cut "Plug Tunin'" is rockin' and shockin' El Lay care of tasteful KDAY PD Lisa Canning). Also on the wax is the down tempo iam called "Princess Of The Posse" which has a slightly deeper island style slant to its chorus section. Dude Dante does it again!...Fresh Records is another hot streaking indie, offering a new single that is just stoopider than stoopid! "Get Retarded" by MC EZ & Troop is a light steppin' down tempo selection with some nicely innovative production and 20% dis lyrics. Equally interesting, the song "Just Rhymin" backs the track in a more up-tempo style. Also from Fresh

comes well respected MC Just-Ice, who in true Jamaican style toasts "Na Touch Da Just" under the able production wing of BDP's KRS-One. Changing tempos and rhythms and unexpected breakdowns make this cut so fine. Yeah mon! Backside we got "Freedom Of Speech '88" version...

Kool Moe Dee has another major hit with "Let's Go" on Jive/RCA...More Jive (RCA)...The name of the **Wee Papa Girls** crops up again after their initial domestic appearance on the label's recent rap compilation. Distributors are gaining

access to the female duo's wild "acid house" style re-mix of the Euro-smash "Heat It Up" from London's Jive offices. The incessant House groove provides a very refreshing alternative backdrop for rhymers, and one we're sure to hear more about...Speaking of House Music, its Detroit-based counterpart is Techno Music, L.A. indie label Macola (213-469-5821) offers a super hard Techno dance iam called "X-Men" by the Unknown D.J. and D.J. Slip...True Love follows up his nationwide smash with the more aggressive, upbeat jam "I'm Bustin' Out" on the Critque label...Cute female team Finesse & Synguis come again with a debut LP titled "Soul Sisters." The love ballad "I'll Be There" is Pop and Rap with a teen slant..."Paper Thin" is MC Lyte's latest release from First Priority Music. Sparse beats and Lyte's cool attitude make it rock...D.I. Cool offers "The Music Ain't Loud E-Nuf" on Maryland's Creative Funk label using interesting Go-Go beats...Jr. Cas debuts with "Next Plateau" on L.A.'s Posse Galore label. Label owner Tony Converse produces an excellent first release...To whom it may constern, fly female trio J.J. Fadd are now rocking New York airwaves with "Supersonic." 



PERRI: BACK IN FLIGHT



he four sisters from Bakersfield, California—Lori, Carol, Sharon and Darlene—who wowed music critics and fans alike with their much-underrated but highly-acclaimed debut LP, Celebrate!—are back with, The Flight, a sparkling new LP which should establish Perri as one of the most innovative and exciting vocal groups in many years.

•The songs on The Flight

We have a version of The Emotions' 'I Don't Wanna Lose Your Love' which was suggested by our record company; 'Travels Two' is a Pat Metheny piece that we wrote lyrics for and there's a Steely Dan song which we've loved for years, 'Caves Of Altamira.' We have material that covers different themes: 'No Place To Go' is about the homeless, while 'Eternal Life' is a gospeloriented track that was inspired by our roots. And the song 'Fall In Love'—that's a true story about a guy that Lori knew that she wanted to go out with, but he'll never know who he is!"


•Defining Perri's music

"Our music is good music. We call it 'Ga Jaz,' jazz with a touch of pop sung by soulful angels! People think of us as more in the jazz vein because we worked with Pat (Metheny) but this LP has more of a mainstream appeal. We're very particular about the songs we do: we go after the classiest kind of material, songs that allow us to reflect our artistry."

•Working with Anita Baker

"Darlene met Anita one day in a doctor's office and since she was familiar with our first LP, she asked if we'd like to do backgrounds for her on a gig she had at The Beverly Theater in L.A. in December of '86. That went so well that we ended up spending all of '87 out on tour with her. We learned a great deal and it was wonderful exposure for us, appearing on national TV and performing at incredible venues like Radio City Music Hall."

KATHY MATHIS: MUSIC FROM A WOMAN'S PERSPECTIVE



abu Records' Kathy Mathis first came to the attention of record buyers with her LP, Katt Walk, released in 1987. She describes her new LP, A Woman's Touch (produced by hitmakers Thomas McElroy and Denzil Foster) as "really representing growth." The kick-off single, "Men Have To Be Taught" is already grabbing attention.

•"Men Have To Be Taught"

"I'd say my image is more adult than it was before. What I'm singing now is more reflective of me. Obviously, a tune like 'Men Have To Be Taught' says something. Women are really in my corner with that. The guys? Well, 60% agree with what I'm saying while the other 40% are curious!"

•The new album

"I have been in situations in the past where I couldn't relate to my material but this time around, it's different. Thomas (McElroy) and Denzil (Foster) are just beautiful, like magic. We started out on a trial basis—we were checking each other out. I said, 'I don't know about these guys' and they were saying the same thing about me. We did three songs and that went so well, we did the whole LP together."

•A piece of the pie

"At one point in my career, I was very concerned about how I would get a piece of the pie. Now I know I have something to offer. If you get caught up in 'where do I fit in?,' you aren't going to get anywhere. With this LP, I feel it all in my bones that it is going to be a hit. I say that without reservations."

•Away from music

"Well, I'm the only girl in my family—I have eight brothers so I've been playing basketball for years. It's great exercise and although I'm a very soft, sensual person, I'm pretty aggressive on the field. I get a kick out of teaching some of the guys how to play!"

JOHNNY MATHIS: WHAT BECOMES A LEGEND MOST



here aren't many around who occupy legendary status in the world of music. Johnny Mathis has earned his through 32 years as a recording giant. With his latest LP Once In A While, the man known as a "singer's singer" plans to expand his audience appeal by working with contemporary producers.

•Working with new producers

"Jay Landers at Columbia originally wanted to use just one producer on this LP but my good friend Dionne Warwick told me she had really enjoyed working with three or four people on her LPs so I insisted that we do the same. Preston Glass, Robert Kraft and the team of Pete Bunetta and Rick Chudacoff

approached the sessions in their own way. They all told me what they had in mind for each song, which made it easy. It was a pleasure working with producers who let me know how much thy music had meant to them. It was very flattering."

•Choosing the songs

"I agreed on all the songs except one! That was 'It Wouldn't Have Made Any Difference,' a subtle, understated song. But I finally did it and I'm very happy with the result. As always, I was very conscious of the lyrics in selecting songs. We have some great material, like 'I'm On The Outside Looking In,' 'Ain't No Woman' and, 'Two Strong Hearts,' my duet with Dionne."

•Making a hit LP

"I make a good living doing concerts but after 30 years. I lost touch with the record buying public. My LPs sell about 250,000 copies each, but that's not enough to get excited about. We wanted to do a record that everyone could get excited about. I still have that competitive fire that makes me want to explore every musical avenue. I'm so pleased about this LP that I'm already working on the next one. The group Take 6 sings one track with me."

•Favorite singers

"I wanted a career like the giants—Nat King Cole, Ella Fitzgerald, Sarah Vaughan, Billy Eckstine, so those are some of my big heroes. Of today's singers, I love Anita Baker, James Ingram, Patti Austin, Michael MacDonald, Michael Franks. Women like Dionne, Aretha, Gladys, Patti LaBelle are incredible."

THE OHIO PLAYERS: EMULATED, BUT NEVER DUPLICATED



he Ohio Players created a musical niche for themselves in the '70s, one that has been emulated and imitated throughout the '80s. The re-formed team—now back together after five years apart—are ready to truly cement their place in Black music history with a new LP (Back), according to "Diamond" Williams and "Sugar" Bonner.

•A new record deal

"We were in New York last year playing at 20/20, the club owned by Ashford & Simpson, and the word got out that we had some demos we were shopping. A lot of people from major companies had expressed strong interest. Then we got a call from this guy, Chip Wilson, from Seattle who said he wanted to sign us without hearing anything! He was forming Track Records at the time so we went to check him out. We were both in formative stages, so everything came together pretty easily. We wanted to be in a situation where we'd get specialized attention. That's exactly what's happening."

"I thank everyone and appreciate those who have taken my sound and used it. If it hadn't occurred, maybe we wouldn't be able to come back the way we have. I only get perturbed when people say I sound like Larry Blackmon! It's great that people like Larry, Michael Cooper and The Bar-Kays care enough about The Ohio Players' style of music to pay us a compliment."

•Their famous LP covers

"Well, they always have drawn attention. Going to the photo sessions—and we've always gone to those—is great at the culmination of a hard day's work! We think of them as displaying beauty and sexuality in a tasteful way."

•The old records

"We still do all the records that went platinum for us like 'Skin Tight,' but one of the songs that gets the most response is 'Heaven Must Be Like This.' You can find those old LPs but you have to really look. Maybe they'll be rereleased now that we're back on the scene."







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CANADIAN REPORT

On The Cultural Boycott of South Africa

by Norman (Otis) Richmond

Most major international stars have heeded the United Nations call for a cultural boycott of South Africa. Ray Charles, Cher, Linda Ronstadt, Johnny Mathis, Rita Coolidge, Susan Anton, and Ann Margret are among the artists remaining on the (United Nations Register of Entertainers, Actors and Others Who Have Performed In Apartheid South Africa).

Eartha Kitt, Shirley Bassey, Boney M, Dolly Parton and Buddy Tate are the latest artists to be pardoned by the United Nations Special Committee Against Apartheid. With the current political situation in South Africa, artists from the Western world are no longer flocking to the land of apartheid.

The most surprising person to heed the United Nations call is the African-American singer and actress Eartha Kitt. Kitt, who made a film in South Africa in January 1987 and did concerts there in the early '70s is singing a different song about her visits. She claimed she would never apologize for her two visits to South Africa. In a letter dated December 1, 1987, Kitt wrote, "...I also agree not to perform in a public concert

in South Africa as long as the apartheid regime exists."

The Special Committee Against Apartheid decided to delete the name of the African-British singer **Shirley Bassey** from the United Nations list. Bassey undertook not to perform in any country practicing segregation on any basis, in

particular in the Republic of South Africa, "Sun City" or any of the other bantustans. She also reaffirmed that a non-segregation clause forms a part of all her performance contracts.

The great African-American jazz saxophonist **Buddy Tate**'s name has also been deleted from the United Nations register. The deletion is effective as of October 1983, the date of the publication of the first register. Tate's name was inadvertently included in the register as a result of incomplete information. He has announced that, "there was no amount of money that could buy (his) appearance at any time or anywhere in South Africa."

The African National Congress of South Africa (ANC), the Organization of African Unity (OAU) and anti-apartheid non-governmental organizations around the world as well as the United Nations uphold the cultural boycott of South Africa.

duct out now such as Masters of Ceremonies, Bomb the Bass, MC Breeze...One thing that I like about working at Island Records is that we cover the gamut of product. We have Reggae, African, Jazz, Rap and contemporary music. We have just signed Gilberto Gill, one of the most prolific Brazilian artists of today.

JS: With radio stations concentrating on one form of music such as "New Wave, Soft Touch, Urban Contemp"—does it make it harder to promote a record?

BP. Yes and no, because when you go to make a record (happen) you have to keep in mind these various formats and clearly define in your mind what is going to be your base audience. That makes it difficult. But what makes it good is the fact that 'New' is an offshoot of Jazz. And Quiet Storm enables you to play things that are R&B-oriented and instrumentals, so it does give you different vehicles and ways to maximize your product. Pop radio—which is now "Churban" radio—is playing R&B product a lot earlier than they used to. Consequently, if you are lucky enough

to come out with the right record, you have have an opportunity to get your product to a larger audience then you would have when it was straight R&B and Pop.

JS: Greg, you have always worked at a major label. What's different about working at an independent distributed by a major?

GP: In the past I have always had (access to) a large field force and advertising dollars that made promoting a record a cake walk compared to now. Every piece of product with Island is a priority. Our end results are the same and our desire to get there is the same, but at Island, it takes us just a little bit longer to get there. If I need something done, I don't have to go through ten people for an okay. The president of the company is next door and I can get an immediate yes or no. We cannot beat a large company with economics, so we beat them with service. I think we are a lot closer to the streets, meaning the 'ma-and-pa' retail and the secondary radio stations. These people are in the same boat as we are, in that all of us are trying to grow.

JS: How do you view the secondary radio markets?

GP: With the move of major radio stations to stop reporting and the tightening of their playlists, it's been the smaller stations who have continued their reporting status and have become more important in some cases than the majors. To secure play on the majors you need those numbers from the secondaries. They are our most important starting point. If you don't start you can't finish.

JS: Your relationship with Atlantic Records?

GP: Atlantic, of course, distributes Island and I have a good relationship with Sylvia Rhone and her staff. At the same time, Atlantic does have its own priorities, so what we try to do is get our records to a certain point and at that time Atlantic kicks in and helps us. With Sylvia having taking over, it's like a new company now too. I can't expect them to build our company as well. So I must get records to the point that they are legitimately selling and on the radio and then Atlantic helps take us over the hump.





TECH NOTES

Station Security

I'm not one to think of the negative, but unfortunately violence has become a fact of life in America. With our radio personalities constantly in the spotlight, radio station security is being discussed at more and more staff meetings.

Video Security Systems

Video security has been around for almost 30 years now. Except for low light cameras and better automatic switchers, the equipment is pretty much the same. The most popular lines of CCTV (closed circuit television) systems are Panasonic, RCA, and Ikegami. One word about Ikegami is that it is not as expensive as you think, but more expensive than most. In case you never heard of the company, they make high priced, topof-the-line studio cameras, and the quality carries over into their CCTV equipment. There are less expensive cameras, some selling for as low as \$300. The main difference is resolution and of course various bells and whistles. The bottom line is seeing what's going on in some area of the building, and not doing a network broadcast. Go with what the budget allows.

A good many security cameras come without a lens. Before purchasing the unit make sure you know exactly where it is to be mounted, and how much area you want to cover. Then select the lens that fits your needs.

Of course you need a monitor. You can cut corners here by using a common black and white TV. If you have multiple

cameras there are three ways to go. One is of course having three monitors. The second is to have an automatic switcher that sequentially switches from camera to camera. The third is a device that splits the screen, and displays all three at once. I prefer this method especially if the monitor is in the control room because a TV set flashing from scene to scene can be distracting, and it's cheaper than having three or four separate monitors.

CCTV equipment can be purchased used, but be careful of the condition of the camera pickup tube. You could end up spending as much money as buying a system new.

Automatic Security Doors

One problem with many modern buildings is glass double doors. These doors can be secured by using a overhead roll up security door like the ones you see advertised on TV. It is opened and closed by using a key switch. During the day the door can be rolled up and out of sight. After normal

business hours, a push of a button from the control room rolls it down. I would suggest a small light in the studio to let the jock know when it is open in case the last person out forgets to close the door. Of course if you have a CCTV system this is not necessary.

Controlled Master Keys

I don't like thinking about internal security, but if it is a problem, then a controlled master key system may be in order. With this type of keying system, each employee gets only one key that fits the doors that he or she needs to open. The nice thing is, everyone from the GM on down needs to carry only one key instead of separate keys for every room or closet they have to get into.

I hate using the slogan "Security is everybody's business," but it is and should be openly discussed, and dealt with.

Closing Notes:

The National Association of Broadcasters is asking the Federal Communications Commission not to relax the FM frequency separation standards until they receive a recommendation from receiver manufacturers.

Basically what all this is about is, if the FCC relaxes its frequency separation requirements, then stations would interfere with other stations' signals. The FCC feels that with the state of the art of today's receivers, no harm will be done. The NAB feels that the FCC should check with the manufacturers to find out just how good today's receivers are, and can they separate close signals.

My argument here is what about all the people who do not have new receivers, and cannot afford to buy new receivers? Do their FM radios become obsolete? I say leave the band alone for now. There are more pressing issues to deal with.





An Interview with Greg Peck

During a recent visit to New York, I was the guest of Greg Peck and Island Records for the showcasing of the label's super-talented vocalist Will Downing at the Bottom Line. As everyone who attended the show will readily attest, folks were fighting for seats to see Will.

The concert rocked with one of the most rhythmic bands I've heard—and the the big baritone voice of Will Downing. Downing performed tunes from his Island album almost exclusively. Hearing the songs live had everyone going back to the album for another listen. The new release, "Love Supreme," was met with great enthusiasm.

Among those in attendance were Sylvia Rhone, Senior VP, Atlantic Records and most of her staff; Jimmy Smith, MD, K104/ Dallas; Atemus Morales, MD, WILD/ Boston; Maxwell SaintClair, PD, WORL; and Paul Robinson, WQTQ.

After the concert I talked with Island's VP/Promotion Greg Peck about the showcase.

JS: Tonight is a culmination of what?

GP: A lot of hard work which has not reached fruition here in the States. Will Downing has done well overseas. He is a gold artist in Europe and we have been struggling with him here. But we felt that if people got a chance to see his performance, they would realize the talent that he has and hopefully that would parlay into some future success. We are committed to him and believe in his project.

JS: Do you feel that you accomplished this tonight with the array of people who attended the showcase?

GP: I think so because everyone enjoyed themselves and seeing is always believing. I think that after they realize the (magnitude) of Will's talent, they will give him a shot.

JS: How is the album doing now?

GP: We have released two singles from the album, the most recent being "Sending Out An S.O.S.," which midcharted and went away. We are going

to release the record which did the best in Europe, "Love Supreme," which will be coming out soon. I think this is the record that will spring the album into the top ten.

JS: What other projects are forthcoming from Island?


GP: We have three new projects on the drawingboard. We are currently in the studio with a group named Tension from Buffalo that I found via Lionel Jobe, manager of Starpoint. I also have an album that Mtume is producing for me on a jazz veteran named Sonny Fortune. Lester Drayton, who was at the show tonight, is nearly finished with his project on which we are covering some of the major R&B tunes. Lester is a trumpet player who was the band leader for Marvin Gaye when he first came out of retirement in the '70s. Incidentally, Will Downing may be singing one or more of the tracks.

PRINCE'S LOVESEXY TOUR: HE'S OVERSEAS MAKING WAVES

Miles Davis saw the show and told the Nouvel Observateur newspaper in France that "...he's the Duke Ellington of the 80's."

Bob Merlis, Vice President, National Publicity Director at his parent record company saw one of the shows and said, "...Here's a presentation that lives up to, and if anything, surpasses any kind of hype a press agent could dream up..."

A reporter for Le Quotidien De Paris paper also saw the show and said, "...Any comparison (of 'his' show) with Michael Jackson's would be ridiculous...Michael who?!"

The "he" is Prince and from the sound of the grapevine, he's letting folks overseas know about the quake in a big way.

The Paisley Park artist, accompanied by the band that backed him in the film "Sign O'the Times," kicked off his "Lovesexy" World Tour on July 8th at the Palais Omnisport in Bercy, France. The capacity crowd was the first to witness the elaborate stage show that costs close to two million dollars.

With a stage set in the round, Prince and his band perform with many different sets and accessories which include a rotating drum kit, a basketball court and a hydraulic bed.

Although material from the LPs Sign O'the Times and Lovesexy is supposed to be emphasized on this tour, this was not entirely the case in Bercy. According to Merlis, Prince covered tunes that spanned his entire career, including jams from the alleged Black Album. The Warner Brothers executive also said that the sets Prince played in France lasted around two and a half hours.

After one of these marathon shows, the performer and his band threw an afterparty on an island, where guests had to be shipped in by boat. From there, Prince and his entourage went to the Bans Douche club in Paris where they proceeded to rock another set for 90 minutes! Featured cuts during this jam

included "6" by Madhouse, "Cold Sweat" and "I'll Take You There," featuring Mavis Staples from The Staples Singers. And if you were in the house, you were taken to wherever *there* was, until 4:00 o'clock in the morning.

Merlis added that what sets this Prince show apart from any other is that it is presented as a play in two or three acts, with good (material from *Lovesexy* and evil (cuts from the *Black Album*) as the reoccurring themes.

Prince and his band stormed through Italy, Belgium and England over the past week and will continue throughout Europe for most of the summer.

The "Lovesexy" tour is scheduled to hit the U.S. some time in September, where he promises to perform in some smaller halls along with his show in the round.

'SPEEDO" AND THE CADILLACS

On December 1, 1955, Mrs. Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus to a white man in Montgomery, Alabama. That same month and year (to be exact, it was December 28), the #3 tune on America's national R&B chart was "Speedo" by the Cadillacs. Many of us will never forget the opening lyric: "Well, now, they often call me Speedo, but my real name is Mr. Earl..."

Thanks to my friend, Ms. Maxine Lewis, executive secretary at WBLS (New York City), who coordinates the Doo-Wop shows at the Apollo Theatre, I was informed that "Speedo" (Earl Carroll) and The Cadillacs would be in Los Angeles for the Late Show on Fox Television. Naturally, I caught the show.

I gotta tell you, folks, the spirit of Earl Carroll was uplifting and very positive. His career is just beginning all over again. A natural talent, his future will be bigger and brighter than yesterday.

Carroll was born and raised in New York City and has been a music industry professional since 1953. Most of the original Cadillacs grew up together. They attended Public School 139 in Manhattan. "In my day, everybody was Doo-Wopping on the street corners," said Carroll. "It was a block-to-block thing...We were inspired by groups like The Five Keys, The Clovers...groups like that. Neighborhood residents encouraged us to keep on singing and thinking about what we were doing as a profession...and we did."

Carroll recalled having a "battle of the groups" once, on 118th Street and 8th Avenue in Harlem. The competition was against young talent such as Ben E. King, The Drifters, The Harptones and Willie Winfield, who sang "Sunday Kind of Love." "Sometimes we would stay up all night just singing and harmonizing,"

Carroll remembered.

They were very young in those days, young and playful. The nickname came to Carroll one night when the singers were leaving a gig in Massachussetts. "While going back to the car," said Carroll, "Bobby Phillips, the ham of the group, started making fun of the shape of my head. He compared it to a torpedo shell on display in front of the armory where we'd played. He said, 'Hey, Speedo, there's your torpedo.' I said 'My name ain't Speedo, it's Mr. Earl.' By the time the group got back down to New York, we had written a song called 'Speedo,'" he said. "And that's the truth!"

The credit went to Esther Navarro, then the group's manager, for writing the song. "She was not a songwriter," said Carroll. "She was a manager. But we were kids and-in those days-we didn't know anything about copywriting or publishing...Yes, I got ripped off, but mine was a drop in the bucket compared to some artists.'

Asked if he was angry, Carroll said, "No, there is no anger. It was a learning experience.'

As teenagers, the group had been introduced by Navarro by a friend, L. Patterson. Navarro took the group to Jerry Blain of Jubilee Records, where they had instant success with "Speedo." They followed that with "Glory," "Down The Road," "Zoom" and, in 1959, "Peek-a-Boo."

In 1961, the Cadillacs recorded for another independent label, Smash Records, and charted "What You Bet?" That same year, however, Earl Carroll left the Cadillacs and replaced Cornell Gunter of the Coasters. With the Coasters, he sang such hits as "Love Potion Number Nine" and others. His stay with that group lasted 18 years.

Now, Carroll works as a janitor at Public School 87 in Manhattan. "It was the parents of the kids in that school who recognized me," he says. "They would say, 'Hey, you're Speedo of the

Word got around and soon the network television news show "20/20" gave Carroll some belated national attention.

Carroll, a very proud man, still works at the school. But soon, Carroll will be featured in a sitcom produced by Paramount Studios. He'll be cast as, guess what (?), a janitor who used to be a great and very famous singer.

Congratulations, "Speedo." We both agree that the name of the game is survive, survive, survive. The rest will take care of itself.

Grover Washington, Stan Getz Headline Second "Jazz At The Bowl" Concert

LOS ANGELES: The second of this year's Jazz at the Bowl concerts will feature the legendary saxophones of Grover Washington, Jr. and Stan Getz

Washington's latest LP, Then and Now, showcases the talents of three generations of Jazzmen—including pianist Herbie Hancock, bassist Ron Carter and drummer Marvin "Smitty" Smith, as well as Russian-born tenor saxman Igor Butman and members of his regular touring band.

Getz, who first grabbed the attention of the music-world-at-large with his 1964 Grammy winner, "The Girl From Ipanema," has played with or led many of the music's greats. In 1986, he was voted into Down Beat Magazine's Hall of Fame.



hen Robin Williams said "Good Morning Vietnam" in his last movie, he awakened movie-goers to the idea that there are broadcast journalists stationed all over the world who wear a uniform for the U.S. Department of Defense.

As Airman Adrian Kronauer, Williams was assigned as a radio deejay to entertain the troops in Vietnam working at Armed Forces Radio & Television Service. It may be a bigscreen story to some, but to journalists in the military it is a hitch.

What Williams did in his box-office smash is showcase some of the hindrances military journalists face in their attempt to provide entertainment. According to the movie story line, there are definite guidelines about what can and should be said on microphones owned by the military.

The Department of Defense claims that the networks and outlets, the largest in the world, are guests in foreign countries even though they are based on military installations and thus must follow a disciplined and regimented format.

Nevertheless, there are hundreds of print and broadcast journalists who work overseas to get the news to servicemembers. Represented by the Navy, Marine Corps, Army, Air Force and Coast Guard they are public affairs specialists who like the infantry, armor medics, clerks and cavalry hold a special skill—that to inform, entertain and educate.

They work on military bases all over the U.S. and overseas in Alaska, Antarctica, Australia, Belgium, Bermuda, Canada, Cuba, Diego Garcia, Germany (8 stations) Greece, Greenland, Iceland, Italy, Japan, Korea (7 stations) Netherlands, Norway, Panama, Philippines, Portugal, Spain, Turkey and Puerto Rico.

On radio they program jazz shows, the Rick Dees' American Music Magazine, Gene Price's Country World, Casey Kasem's Countdown and feature live music shows where they as deejay play and spin his/her's favorite picks.

On television, the broadcaster does the same in presenting a similar lineup of programs American viewers enjoy stateside.

The Ebony-Jet Showcase, Essence, the Today Show are all part of the programming offered by AFRTS.

And to supplement the limited amount of journalists, the military maintains reservists who work part-time at providing support to the "active" journalists.

Here in the states there are three Army Public Affairs Detachments which are considered Command Radio Stations. Based in Los Angeles, California, Rome, Georgia and Queens, New York, these detachments are headquarters to citizen-soldiers who maintain civilian jobs and also play the music, one weekend per month and get a chance to program choice music two weeks out of every year.

As civilians listening to current music here, their tastes are usually much more varied, due to the fact they maintain a choice where the servicemember overseas has to rely on what is sent from AFRTS headquarters in California.

AFRTS makes an attempt at servicing their outlets with the latest in reggae, jazz, gospel, r&b, pop, rock, country, soca and even heavy metal. But radio at AFRTS is like radio anywhere else, it's Bible for Top 40 is Billboard and Cashbox Magazines. Therefore it is rare to hear reggae, soca and other strains which are not frequent on the charts. AFRTS tries to present the widest variety which sometimes mean lots of c&w, rock and little r&b. But they are trying.

The next time you travel to one of the above listed foreign countries and hear an American voice saying "Hello"..." it may be one of the many military journalists welcoming you and your family.
