This doesn't mean that inflation is being licked. It means that the White House will be adopting a political expedient to head off eritielsm of chaotic regulations. Don't expect wide-seale relaxation, however. Outlook continues for stiff controls on niaterials and construction. A lot of currently scarce metals will start to appear in increased supply by June, according to the Defense Produc. tion Administration, but these won't include major ones weh as copper and aluminum.
