EDITORIAL

The past several years—the years of television's spectae-ular growth—have been among the most critical in radio's history. The crisis, created largely by the broadcasting evolu-tion caused by video, is far from over. 





This show marked the end of This show marked the end of the current series sponsored by Reichhold and also the final ap-pearance of George Denny as moderator. Next week John Daly takes over for Denny. The pro-gram, a discussion of the State Department's foreign policy, was a lively one. Both Stassen and Sparkman approached the subject with dirnity and a monet for Sparkman approached the subject with dignity and a respect for each other's opinions. If fault must be found with the show, it's only that a half-hour is much too short a time in which to attempt a discussion of foreign policy.

a discussion of foreign policy. From the outset, Denny estab-lished that Congress, and in turn the general public, has a great deal to say about foreign policy via the vote. It was also agreed that the discussion would be lim-ited to the period from 1945 to the present.

Main Issue

Main Issue Main Issue Stassen took the position that our foreign policy is much too soft toward communism. con-fused toward imperialism and just plain bad in the Far East. He advocated a "dynamic" foreign policy—a phrase which he has used often. Sparkman agreed that "we may have been a little slow" in taking a strong stand against "we may have been a little slow" in taking a strong stand against Russian aggressions, but that we are now as firm as possible with-out stirring up a world conflict. He pumped for the administra-tion's containment policy as ef-fected by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and Point Four programs. He also stated that Stassen, as a delegate to the San Francisco conference, had much to do with setting the cur-rent policy.

rent policy. Stassen countered that his hands were tied at San Francisco because of agreements made ear-lier at Yalta, and that Congress, not the administration, has ac-complished the most good in for-eign relations. Stassen touched on a somewhaf tender-point with Sparkman when commenting on the ineffective Voice of America programing. He insisted that this was because VOA was under State Department control, and that it should be a separate agency. agency.

Sparkman claimed that VOA's weakness was a direct result of Congressional refusal to appro-priate sufficient funds. He also said that Congress has the power to set up VOA as an independent agency, but has failed to act.

Sparkman took the administration stand that mili-tary and naval brass. MacArthur, Marshall, Wedemeyer, Hurley and Spruance, all recommended the very actions in China which are now called wrong. He said that hindsight made it easy to now decry the actions taken ear-lier. The discussion degenerated, but only momentarily, into a "yes - it - was - no - it - wasnt" routine, but Denny puHed it out of the rut and moved the debate into the audience question seg-ment. ment.

The for-mula, as is to be expected (be-cause of constant repetition) has been milked of nuch of its enter-tainment value. The cops are all decent upright citizens and the criminals, the evil knaves, never escape. It becomes as simple as the addition of two and two, and

the addition of two and two, and about as interesting. "The New Orleans Story," as this episode was titled, was about a thief who used his wife to pawn his loot. Ultimately, of course, he was caught when she acted as a decoy for the police, after he had batted her around. Of character-ization there was little, except that the erook was a handsome boy who wanted his picture in the papers when he was nabbed. It would be foolish to blame the writer for the limitations of this script when the formula ham-strings his creativeness. The script had some film shots

The script had some film shots integrated which showed the de-tective driving his car while on the chase. The use of film in this limited manner is not enough. Exteriors should be much more functional to the story and to the characters.

characters. It is barely possible that, in some cases, the police do not eatch the criminals. This might be considered material for a script. It is also possible that some thieves might be human, that they are not black-hearted villains, but people who are sick. But generally when packagers get rights to material from the au-thorities they must forsake the greys for the black and white preatment. The question is what price such material, if it does not entertain. The cast was generally excel-

The cast was generally excel-lent. Ralph Stantley was a typi-cal detective; Dennis Harrison, a better-than-average-looking thief, and Madeline Sherwood, an at-tractive, ill-treated wife. The di-rection and production were top grade. grade.

Leg on Big Trophy Leg on Big Trophy ELIZABETH, N. J., April 26.— For the second time in the 12-year history of the America on Wheels chain, the Paterson (N. J.) 

less, judicious for a company to forego a production when illmita-tions make the attempt foolhardy. With the Workshop, "Dream" is somewhat of a tradition, but un-der present circumstances, with hysical and actor limitations, it would have been better not to have done it at all. The real challenge here belongs to an audience, and much credit is due those, who unlike this re-porter, are able to stay to the bitter end. With so much lnept, amateurish inadequacy to choose from, it is difficult to cite any-thing which might be regarded rewarding, unless it would be the costumes, for which no one is given credit. Certainly the playing and the direction are as far removed from Shakespeare as thought possible. Never has there been a Puck like the young lady who plays him in nasty, half-crazed fashion. Never has there been a massoriment of such heavy-handed, unfuny clowns as this group. Never, this reporter is sure, has such light, fulfy material been directed as a dirge. So busy are the players in projecting Shakespearean intona-tions with their inimitable Bronx. Brooklyn, Midwest and what-have-you accents, that all comedy and fantasy are forgotten. It's best that all should be nameless. Even scenically "Dream" is a fiasco. A forest projection is thrown from the rear of the tiny auditorium onto the stage back-drop, and actors within the pro-verted to shade trees or grassy turf. You literally can't tell the actors from the trees. All this reporter is nonethe-less suddened at seeing the Works-shop, which herrotore has been justifably lauded for fine crea-tive work, definitely hit he skids. If the move from the President Theater may be regarded as re-trenchment, however, wouldn't li-be far wiser to reduce the whole program to scale? If the group can no longer afford a silk purse, it would seem judicious to make as much as possible out of their sow's ear. Dennis McDonald.
