Some Things To Interest Theatergoers

Ralph Kelso's Gossip.

New York, N. Y., April 14. This week is a somewhat busy one at certain of the New York playhouses. The Empire Theater Stock Company started a revival of Oscar Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest," and "The Last Appeal," a new play by Leo Dittrechstein, was produced at Wallack's. At the Irving Place Theater, Adolph von Sonnenthal began his engagement, and is being seen in Lessing's "Nathan der Weise." On Tuesday Marie Wilson plays in the original version of Fuks' "The Two Sisters."

WALLACK'S—"THE LAST APPEAL."

This play, which has been on the road for some time, is new to New York. The author, Leo Dittrechstein, has said that the drama is founded on the tragic romance of Rudolf, crown prince of Austria, and that the characters of the intrigue are similar to those who figured in the sensational outcome of the prince's infatuation. But the denouement of Mr. Dittrechstein's drama is not tragic, for the king, after the lapse of a year, gives public recognition to the marriage, and takes his son's choice to his heart. The play has a succession of dramatic scenes of немантического interest, and the four acts have to do with nothing else than the direct story of the prince's forbidden love for a banker's daughter. The leading roles in the production are played by Katherine Grey and Robert Donett. The play is having a cordial reception, and promises to keep Wallack's box office busy for some time.

EMPIRE—"THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST."

His play is as clean and witty as any thing that its author, Oscar Wilde, ever wrote, not excepting "Lady Windermere's Fan." Charles Richman and Margaret Anglin have excellent parts, and all the members of the company are well provided for. "The Importance of Being Earnest" has just been successfully revived in London. It has two love stories, with all the complications of and incidental to a dramatic love story, interestingly unfolded in the end.

AT OTHER PLAYHOUSES.

Academy of Music: Charles Frohman, being unable to cancel its out-of-town dates, is compelled to announce the last two weeks of "Under Two Flags," with Blanche Bates as cigarette, at this house. It is one of the most popular plays that has been presented at the Academy in many years.

American Melodrama is being offered this week to the patrons of this house, through the medium of Owen Davis' "Through the Breakers."

Bijou: A large sign reading "House Full" usually decorates this small and handsome house, with receipts away ahead of "The Climbers" for the corresponding weeks of last season.

Broadway: Klaw & Erlanger's production of the Drury Lane spectacle, "The Sleeping Beauty and the Beast," was presented for the two hundredth time at this house on Monday, April 14. The receipts of this production have passed the \$500,000 mark.

Fasho—The Great Lafayette and his merry company are filling this house at every performance.

Criterion—"In Barry," with Mrs. Leslie Carter, shows no signs of failing to draw overbearing audiences.

Daiy's "San Tey," with its delightful musical numbers, drollions comedy and picturesque scenes, has returned to Daiy's, and is again pleasing large audiences. The company presenting it includes Minnie Ashby, Marie Celeste, Samuel Collins and Melville Stewart.

Fourteenth Street—Monday last ushered in the ninth week of Joseph Hart and Carrie De Mar at this house, where they have made a success as Grandpa and Polly Bright in "Foxy Grandpa."

Garrison's "Sky Furr" began on Monday its last two weeks at this house. The comedy is drawing fair-sized audiences, but six weeks was the time allotted to it at the Garrison, and that time will be up on April 26, when its dual performance will be given.

Harlem Opera House: "The Way of the World," Clyde Fitch's society comedy, with Miss Elsie He Wolfe as the star, supported by John Mason and Sarah Powell Le Moyne, are seen each night this week at this house.

Herald Square—"Dolly Varden" is booked to run many weeks yet.




