MUST ENLARGE PLANT.

Bill Posting Plant at East Port, Maine. Can Not Accommodate Business.

The business of the Eastern Bill Posters' Association has increased so rapidly in the last three or four weeks that the management of the bill posters' plant of East Port, Me., find it necessary to enlarge their plant by the addition of two thousand more feet of bill boards in East Port and Callais. James A. Muldoon, of East Port, and J. A. Sennet, of Callais, are in charge of the plant.

PIC RUSSELL'S WILL SUSTAINED.

By consent of all heirs, the will of the late Capt. "Pie" Russell, of the Russell & Morgan Co., was sustained by Judge Caldwell's jury June 16 at Cincinnati. His son, Willis Russell, was not satisfied with the bequest to him of \$1,000 and a one-half share of Florida land. So he sued to set the will aside. His brother George, who was treated in a similar fashion, did not sue. Under the compromise the other heirs purchase from Russell the 114,000 acres of Florida land he inherited under the will. The Russell estate was valued at \$800,000.

CROWDS

Visit Springfield's Summer Theater.

Springfield, O., June 23.—The Fernberg Stock Company had a successful opening at the new Casino, Spring Grove Park. It played to the largest crowd that ever patronized any theater in Springfield. The play house was built by the American Railway Co., which controls the local street railway. Felix Bled is the manager. The Fernberg Company will hold the boards for six weeks, changing the bill every Thursday night. The opening bill was "Red Cross Nurse," and was changed to Hal Reid's "Roanoke." To make performances continuous, specialties were introduced.

REMODELED.

The Standard Theater, Pekin, Ill., Undergoing a Metamorphosis.

Pekin, Ill., June 23.—The Standard Theater, of this city, is being remodeled. The scope of improvements is broad, and will cost between three and four thousand dollars. In the first place, the stage will be enlarged from sixteen to forty feet in height; the width between the fly galleries will be enlarged enough to accommodate any attraction that may desire a date. A new balcony will be put in, and an entirely new scene equipment will be installed. The entire lower floor is to be re-seated with up-to-date plush-covered chairs, and, as a whole, the theater will be a modern house.

ENJOINED.

Supreme Court Forbids Use of School for Opera House.

In the celebrated case of Sugar Brothers versus the City of Monroe (La.), better known as the "Opera House Case," the Supreme Court has handed down findings in favor of the plaintiffs.

The suit was brought to restrain the city of Monroe from using, leasing and operating the city high school building as an opera house.

The decision shared the hearty approval of the citizens, and Mr. Sugar, manager of the Sugar Theater, has received many congratulations.

Henceforth no theatrical performance of any nature can be given in the school building, and managers of companies who have contracts for the coming season will have to seek other places to fill the time in Monroe.

NEW COMIC OPERA

To Be Written Conjointly by Ade and Lorraine.

Geo. Ade and William Lorraine recently signed articles with Henry W. Savage to collaborate on a musical comedy, to be produced by Savage next year. The name of the piece has not as yet been chosen, but much of the book has been sketched by the Chicago humorist, and Lorraine has a few melodies which he thinks are suited to this effort.

Lorraine is engaged at Atlantic City, conducting his musical comedy, "A Trip to Buffalo," which is being produced there under the direction of Charles Salisbury.

Ade is well known as the author of "Fables in Slang," as well as the librettist of "The Sultan of Sulu," which enjoyed a run at the Illinois Theater, Chicago, this spring. Lorraine's "A Trip to Buffalo" was his first plunge into musical comedy.

MINSTREL COMBINATION.

Lew Dockstader and John W. Vogel Have Joined Hands.

John W. Vogel, of Columbus, has formed a combination with Lew Dockstader, the famous minstrel, and the seasons of 1903 and 1904 will see a newly-born Dockstader Minstrel Company on the road, under the very competent management of Mr. Vogel. Both gentlemen are very well known, and the news of their combination will be hailed with delight by every one who loves a minstrel show.

As every lover of black-face fun already knows, George Prinrose has announced his intention of retiring from the stage at the conclusion of the coming season. Prinrose has for some time been minus a singing voice, and only a pair of extraordinary nimble legs have kept him in minstrelsy.

Dockstader, his partner, set about forming plans for his business future, and has finally hooked up with John W. Vogel, the proprietor and manager of Vogel's Minstrels. Mr. Vogel managed the Prinrose & West Show for years, and Dockstader went to him as the man of all others to handle a new company for him.

Unless something happens to upset their plans, it is understood that the season of 1903 and 1904 will see Dockstader's Big City Minstrels, with the largest company ever organized.

Mr. Vogel confirmed these statements recently, stating that the name agreed on for the company, is Lew Dockstader's Big City Minstrels. "While we have not yet settled our plans," he said, "the company will be the largest minstrel organization ever put on the road. The triple Olympian first part will seat upward of eighty-five people alone, and I do not know how many others will make up the company. The old people will count up not less than twenty more, and the consolidated band and orchestra, the stage hands, electricians and business staff will bring the total up to 120. The partnership will be for an indefinite period, beginning with the season of 1903-4, and only the larger cities will be visited."



BOGUS AGENT

Marries Unsuspecting Woman in Atlanta, Ga.

A man calling himself Davenport and representing himself as contracting agent of the Buffalo Bill Wild West Show, was recently married to Gertrude Guillou, "the electric lady," in Atlanta, Ga. A communication from W. W. Cole, representative of Buffalo Bill's Show in New York, states that there is no such person as Davenport connected with the show and that the man who married Miss Guillou is a fraud. The man is no doubt the same who, on numerous occasions, has impersonated an agent of the Barnum & Bailey Shows. The last heard of his operations was in New York last spring, when he bungled the butchers by buying meat from them for the Forepaugh-Sells Show under fraudulent contracts. A year or so ago he fleeced the nubary at Baltimore, Md., for which he was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Evidently upon his release he is again back at the work. He ought to be looked out for.

PERMANENT CIRCUS.

Artistically a Success in Greater New York.

Disregarding the custom to bill strongly in advance or otherwise adopt those advertising methods generally considered indispensable in heralding the advent of a circus, Messrs. Hoyle & Stevens opened on Monday, June 9, and gave their premier performances under a mammoth tent pitched upon that favorite circus location known as Olympia Field, at 135th street and Lenox Avenue, New York City.

The proprietors of this permanent circus have plunked down their hard cash to cover the rental of the lot and all municipal licenses for three months, consequently they are during that period protected from the rivalry of any other circus that might desire to break into New York and pitch its tents in competition.

To those who attended the initial performance and to the many who have witnessed any of the excellent performances which have since been given twice daily, it remains a mystery why the management have refrained from adopting the usual circus methods of giving wide publicity to the superior character of their show. Probably the management rely upon the sterling qualities of the high-class bill they present, believing that its undoubtedly strength and attractiveness will sooner or later become fully known and recognized by the public.

This policy of avoiding all outdoor advertising expenses and lavishly expending on the best acts obtainable the cash equivalent of what is often spent on imposing street parades or pageants, with their attending gorgeous Conestoga wagons and gilded allegorical floats, may appear very creditable, but such a line of action would certainly lead to bankruptcy if adopted by a traveling circus either in this or any other country.

It is an acknowledged fact that many old-fashioned circuses like Hengler's or Newson's in English provincial cities or towns like Liverpool or Newcastle-upon-Tyne, with but one tithe of New York's population, have times out of number proved that a clean, well-conducted circus will thrive and prosper for months at one place, and moreover, so far as the writer remembers, very few of such English permanent circuses ever gave a show that could be compared to what Hoyle & Stevens are now quietly and without any ostentation offering New Yorkers. Take their closing act—

namely, Kiralfy's ballet of forty young and shapely girls and three premières dancing to the music of a well-conducted band of thirty professional musicians under August Clause. What would the late lamented P. T. Barnum have done to exploit such an act? Did ever such a strong band play under a circus tent? "Duss and his remarkable band," now commencing to play a season of sixteen weeks at the St. Nicholas Inn, would be discounted before maturity like a doubtful promissory note if a live advertising man was given carte blanche and the wherewithal to go ahead and drive home into the lethargic minds of an indifferent public the fact that here, under a cool, commodious, waterproof tent, 8,000 patrons can be comfortably seated and enabled not only to enjoy the performance of an excellent band and ballet, but also witness the best equestrian and aerial acts incidental to the ring of a high-class circus. All this entertainment is actually given for 10, 20 or 30 cents during each afternoon and for 20, 30 or 50 cents during the evening performance. Great Barnum's Ghost! Just imagine, if you do not believe the statement, that these people have a programme embracing such top-liners as Bob Sibley, Jr., with his better half, Louise the Mohr, as principal equestrians; the Flying Battalions; O. Dale and his six-horse menagerie act; the Wilson acrobats; McGuire's double trapeze act; Prof. Bristol, with his horses and mules, and Ceballos, who on the high wire is unequalled. These specialists, who among other artists are supported with the best comedy acts of John Foster, Kennebe and Higgins, all figure in a programme of forty acts, ant alas and alack, there are hardly two individuals in every thousand of New York amusement patrons, aside from the myriad of youngsters, who have yet been educated to the fact that there is such a thing in town as a circus—good, bad or indifferent.

It remains to be seen whether the management can continue to play this waiting game long enough to turn the trick of public favor and fill half those 8,000 seats by relying solely upon the undoubted quality of the goods they offer, or whether they will make matters more secure by at once adopting the more strenuous aggressiveness of the American advertiser and try and create a call for their hue from the jump-off point, not at the tall-end of the race for the almighty dollar we are all after in this free, enlightened, trust-ridden country.

CIRCUS GOSSIP.

D. F. Lynch visited relatives in Chicago recently.

Sipe has experienced some tough weather in Iowa.

All shows are doing well in the Dakotas this season.

Doe Freeman visited the Wallace Shows at Elkhorn, Ind.

The Teets Bros. got good business through Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky.

The recent rain storms have been general, and all shows have suffered more or less.

Martin Downs, always a great hustler, has developed executive ability of a high order.

E. Dockstader has signed as advertising agent of Bosco's Trained Wild Animal Show.

Wallace lost the night performance in Owosso, Mich. They say it came down in bucketfuls.

A prosperous season is promised W. W. Allen's 10 and 20-cent Shows, which opened in Chicago, June 19.

It is reported that Joe Huston, of the Honch & Huston Show, who has been ill, is much improved in health.

Lola Cody, of the Cody Sisters, with Buckskin Bill's Wild West, was recently called home by the death of her mother.

Jake Teets is still at Bristol, undergoing treatment for his eyes, which are in bad shape. He has not been to the show since April.

Golmar Brothers' and Schuman's Show, which opened May 30, at Baraboo, Wis., reports business excellent and everybody in good health.

The Sells-Downs Shows continue to get great business along the line. The advance is fine, the paper excellent and the performance splendid.

W. E. Sands, manager of No. 1 Car, Buckskin Bill's Show, last week enjoyed the company of his wife, who spent several days on the car.

One of the cars of the Sipe Circus train was wrecked near Ithaca, III., early in the morning of June 10. No serious damage was done, however.

P. P. Craft, press agent of Pawnee Bill's Wild West, writes that business has been phenomenal so far this season, standing room only being the rule.

A heavy wind and rain storm caused a miniature riot in the Sparks' Show at Logan, O., but, though the tent was crowded to the ring bank, no one was seriously injured.

Robinsons evidently played a losing stand at Barnesville, O., owing to bad weather. They, however, made good at Wheeling, where they drew immense crowds.

The side show orations of Madam Beale Zern, with Robinson's Big Top, are cleverly worded and delivered. Her appearance and its novelty catches the attention of the otherwise base auditor.

The Buckskin Bill Wild West Show was the scene of a small-sized riot at Maysville,

Ky., June 17. The trouble occurred between the Indians and cowboys, of whom several suffered broken bones, but no more serious accidents.

The F. M. Myers' "Little Giant Shows" report an almost unbroken runaway business all season. The show consists of six wagons and twelve people. Top, 50x80; cook tent, 12x19; horse tent, 20x30, and dressing tent, 12x18.

On account of a quarrel between E. C. Knupp and L. V. Strebig, of the Main advance force, it is rumored that one or the other will be or has been let out. Mr. Main did not want to lose either, but both insisted that one or the other must go.

Buffalo Bill's Wild West is making a tour this season through the extreme West and to the Pacific slope, preparatory to withdrawal from this country for at least one, and, perhaps, two or three years, during which it will revisit the principal cities of Europe.

At Seymour, De Pere, Black Creek and Shiroton, they were compelled to turn people away, as it was the first tent show that had passed through that section for three years. The show will tour Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois this year.

Roster of Teets Bros.' Shows: Devene Family, three in number; Armstrong Family, six in number; W. T. Ogden and Family; Jess Brown and wife; Mrs. Jake Teets' doubles are the hit of the show. Little Edna Ogden and Totte Devene are fine contortionists, and get great receptions everywhere.

Hough & Huston, the Marion (Ind.) showmen, are making a success of their dog and pony show. They are now touring Illinois. A good feature of the show is the acrobatic and contortion work of the Grow family of children. The Wellmans on the tight rope are fine specialists and first-class artists.

A severe wind and rain storm hit the Great Wallace Shows at Sturgis, Mich., just as the performance was about to start. Everything went down except the side show. One of the performers, Miss Julia Gardner, was hit on the head by a pole and badly stunned, but no other injuries are reported.

During the performances of the Reno's Allied Shows, Little Auline and Eddie Reno pass free water to the patrons. The feature takes wonderfully. The shows are still meeting with success. Though they have experienced winds, rain and mud, they have played to good houses and have had no accidents of any kind.

Then comes Wallace, June 30; Ringling, July 14, and Buffalo Bill, July 21. The Elks' fair will be held week of July 23, after which comes the State Fair Aug. 22-30.

The great horse ranch in Wyoming, owned by Buffalo Bill, supplied this spring nearly 200 fine young horses, to replace those destroyed by the railway disaster which overtook the show last season. They are bred between the best type of bronco and fine-blooded eastern strains, and seem to possess all the good qualities of both. Horses spirited in action and tough enough to do the hard work of the arena all summer are of great importance to the Wild West.

Charles Johnson, of Cincinnati, who recently joined Buckskin Bill's Show, was admitted to the Cincinnati Hospital, June 17, suffering from severe laceration of the face and internal injuries, caused by being thrown from a bronco at Vanceburg, Ky. The animal has a record, it is claimed, of killing three men, but Johnson thought he could stick to the saddle. The animal "bucked" him high in the air, and he landed on his face and chest with terrific force.

Capt. W. H. Hatch, an enterprising citizen of Parkersburg, W. Va., is fitting out a floating circus at Pittsburg, which will have a seating capacity for 2,000 people, and it will start on a tour of the Ohio River July 4, making East Liverpool the first stop. N. P. Newman and J. T. Hery, of New Martinsville, W. Va., are the backers, and the company has purchased a number of barges, which will be decked over and inclosed, and on these the ring will be built. The outfit will be electric lighted.

On August 1st next the advertising

Nothing of late years in the way of
amusements has grown and multiplied at
such a great rate as has the traction park.
But a few years since the park as an
institution was comparatively unknown. To-
day there are over five hundred (to be exact
there are 500 listed in this issue of "The
Billboard").

It is not altogether easy to satisfactorily
account for the great vogue they are enjoy-
ing. Of course it is due in part to the sup-
port they obtain from the trolley companies
who are willing to start and help to main-
tain a resort that people will have to ride
to get to. It is also due to the desire of
people to get out in the country during the
country season. But these reasons do not
wholly account for it.

To our nation, the bicycle is largely re-
sponsible for the existence of the great
number of parks, summer gardens and
pleasure resorts. If this be true, and we
think it is, it is another exemplification of
the law of compensation, for no device was
ever more heartily cursed by theatrical folk
than the bicycle when it was at the height
of its reign a few years back. But while
it was cutting off both ends of the theatrical
season, it was also opening the eyes of
city folk to the beauty and charms of the
country. Up to that time many people
knew that these beauties and charms ex-
isted, but they were regarded as inaccessible.
To enjoy them was only possible if
one had a week's time at one's disposal.
The going and coming was a task not to be
lightly undertaken.

The bicycle changed all that. It made a
few hours in the country possible, and that in
turn made the traction park possible. The
bicycle is rapidly passing, but the park is
here to stay. It is a great blessing, too.
People have as great or even greater need
of amusement in the summer as they have
in the winter, and actors and actresses have
just as great need of employment. This
park provides both, and thereby proves a
very useful institution. Its effect on pro-
fessional people will be far reaching. When
an actor finds his art in demand the whole
year round, when he can rely on obtaining
a living from it winter and summer, he is
bound to gain in confidence and stability.
As he advances in his own estimation so
will the profession in the estimation of the
public at large.

The time will come when you will see
theatrical ventures and theatrical folk
quoted in the mercantile agencies and re-
garded as seriously and respected as greatly
as any other business or people following
it. Heretofore, a theatrical man in the
estimation of bankers or financiers was a
person impecunious or of doubtful financial
standing. This impression is fast passing
away now. Very shortly it will have
disappeared altogether. When it does, give
the park that need of credit which it de-
serves. In the meantime, recognize the
worth of the park and the work it is doing.
Consider it carefully and seriously. Then
be a booster.

If you are financially able to revel in idleness in the summer months, good and well. So are many people in mercantile life. Remember, however, how many, many people are not. Consider your less fortunate colleagues. And boast for their sake. In a word, do not speak lightly of the parks or those who play them. As an institution it is even now very useful, and is doing a great work — a greater work than the Actors' Fund, Society Homes, etc., all combined. It is making the actors' profession a solid and stable one on which he can rely for support the year round.

Mr. W. N. Merrick, the subject of this sketch, who is now musical director with the Forepaugh & Sells Bros. Circus, is a native of Zanesville, O. Mr. Merrick entered the circus business with the original Van Amburg Bros. in the early seventies, and has been continuously engaged as musician and leader ever since, without missing a single season. For the past twenty-five years he has been connected with nearly all the circuses and minstrel shows on the road. He was with the old J. H. Haverly when the latter first launched his Mastodon Minstrels, and played with the famous Melntyre and Heath when they first made their debut as concert or "after show" performers, under the white tents.

Ever since the inception of the Sell's branch of the Forepaugh-Sells Shows, Mr. Merrick has been almost continuously connected with them. He is one of the old-time "wagon show" musicians who has not yet lost his usefulness. He has a faculty for collecting and keeping around him the best musical talent in the circus profession, and as a result his music is always of the highest order.

Mr. Merrick was among the first to feature a full military band under canvas, and has introduced many novel ideas into circus band music, his incidental music being nearly all composed and arranged by himself, and very original in conception and execution. It enjoys a peculiar popularity, both among educated musicians and the general public. Indeed, it is seldom that an act is featured that he is not called upon to produce suitable music, and in no instance has he been unequal to the task. Mr. Merrick has composed many very catchy numbers, which he has declined to have published. His latest production, "The Equestrienne March," is now being used for the grand entry with the Forepaugh-Sells Show. It will be published in the near future by the Charles R. Barnes Music Company.

Mr. Merrick's friends and acquaintances number, almost the entire circus profession, his long career in the business (covering more than a quarter of a century), having brought him into contact with all the greater and lesser lights of the tented area.

OBITUARY.

James Ward, a well-known Irish comedian, passed away recently at Syracuse, N. Y., of pneumonia. Mr. Ward was formerly a Detroiter, and made his debut at the old Germania Hall, in that city. The remains were shipped to Detroit, where a brother and two sisters survive him.

ANIMAL FARM.

Bostock Will Establish One at Manhattan Beach Park.

Cleveland, O., June 14.—Frank C. Bostock's collection of wild and trained animals are in their new quarters at Manhattan Beach Park. New sheds and enclosures were finished last week under the supervision of Mr. Bostock himself. He intends to make his permanent animal farm here, and will devote much time to the breeding and training of wild animals, as they are scarce and in great demand. For this purpose Mr. Bostock has secured agents in South Africa, commissioned to capture wild beasts, with young. They will be shipped to Cleveland. Mr. Bostock says if the young are raised on the farm they will breed there and thus afford a home market for the benefit of showmen.

A RELIC

Is Stage Coach with Great Buffalo and Wild West Show.

The Great Buffalo and Wild West Shows United have secured a Rocky Mountain stage coach that is replete with historical interest. It is to be used in the daily exhibitions of the show, and will, no doubt, make a tremendous hit. Society ladies and prominent newspaper men will be asked to ride in this venerable Concord during the "hold-up" and made race at each performance. Gen. U. S. Grant, General Custer, Leland Stanford, Villard, the railway plunger, and other distinguished citizens in this cradle of the wilderness. It was present at Gold Creek when the golden spike was driven to bind the eastern and western link of the Northern Pacific Railroad in 1883. At one time it ran between Drum Lummon and Butte, two of the most famous camps known to the mining world. It made trips to Walla Walla, Boise, Salt Lake and Arizona. It was the mute witness of several desperate hold-ups, and was once dragged over a precipice by a wild horse in a runaway. Of later years it did service on the Flathead Indian Agency, and was repeatedly attacked by the copper-colored monarchs of the forest and plains.

AERIAL AD. MACHINES

Do Not Suit People of Fort Dodge.

A new kind of advertising, through the medium, called the aerial advertising machine, which is manufactured at Benton Harbor, Mich., was recently tested by some enterprising firms in Ft. Dodge, Ia.

The model was of a windmill shape, and the signs that adorned it were painted upon large blades that were moved about by the wind. The scheme was to place them at the main entrances to the city, where the farm traffic could easily see them, and it was argued that the advertising results were much better than many other mediums, owing to the novelty of the idea in that it created favorable comment for those firms that had their names printed on them. The first heavy wind storm damaged some of them so badly that they were practically useless. All of them frightened horses, and several narrow escapes from serious runaways were experienced by farmers who had to pass by coming to the city. The matter has evidently aroused the ire of the farmers, and at the meeting of the council the following petition was presented, which, owing to the number and importance of the signatures, was given immediate attention by the council.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We, the undersigned, petition your honorable body to condemn and have removed the advertisements known as the aerial advertising machines, made at Benton Harbor, Mich., as they endanger the life of every farmer who has to come to Fort Dodge and drive by one of these machines.

The street commissioner was instructed to take all signs inside of the city limits down at once, and those outside the limits will be turned over to the board of supervisors and a similar action by that body recommended.

Members and their families, advertising agents, opera house managers, etc., living south of Cincinnati, will leave over the Big Four Railway, under the personal supervision of Clarence E. Runey, official representative, leaving Cincinnati (Grand Central Depot), Thursday evening, July 3, on the 8:30 train, arriving in Chicago 7:10 a.m., in time to spend the Fourth in Chicago. While in Chicago, the members will be entertained by the American Posting Service, Lake and Morgan streets. Special rates have been secured at the Briggs House, Fifth and Randolph streets, Chicago, European plan.

The rate will be \$18.00 for the round trip from Cincinnati to Milwaukee, and members have the option of using either rail or boat from Chicago to Milwaukee. CROP REPORTS.

It should be born in mind that the South depends less and less on cotton every year. The crops are annually becoming more diversified. This has a tendency to make the season in Dixie earlier. The berries this year sent a great deal of money south. There was over \$1,000,000 worth shipped from Chattanooga alone. The time is not far distant when a spring season is possible south of Mason & Dixie's line. Much money is being sent south at the present time to move the watermelon crop. This is getting to be quite a factor in business, and grows in importance each succeeding year.

Kansas, Iowa and Illinois, have suffered somewhat from excessive rainfall, but the crops in those States will be as good as usual, other favorable conditions having offset the loss by rain. The Texas crops have lost considerable from drought, which still prevails.

The outlook in other parts of the country is exceptionally bright.

Michigan needs warmer weather to produce as good a crop of grain as it is possible.

The wheat harvest in Indiana will be fair. West Virginia, who already has the foot of woe on her neck, will have a light wheat crop.

INDUSTRIAL REPORT.

The strike in the hard coal country has now continued, for such a length of time that the whole region has been ruined for business of any kind. Advertisers, showmen and theatrical managers will do well to steer clear of it. It can not recover its normal condition for months to come.

West Virginia is also fast getting into bad shape on account of the strike of the soft coal miners. This strike is not general as yet, but is fast spreading, and unless speedily checked, will become serious.

Diavolo, the "Loop-the-Loop" cyclist, will be a feature of the "Jinks" Carnival at Springfield, O., week of July 7.

Charles Dickson leaves "The Defender" to play vaudeville houses.

Boston Music Hall.—The bill this week is "The Runaway Girl." The company is putting out billing matter and doing their own posting, with one-sheets, half and quarter sheets. This is the first billing Music Hall has ever done. I don't think the work is satisfactory to the management. A fight is on, and our snappers are determined that no outsider shall get a showing.

The Grahams are making a big hit at the Palace Theater this week with their splendid illustrated singing act. The bill by the stock company is excellent.

The vaudeville section of the show at Combination Park this week is furnished by Alf Grant, Lyons and Crowley, Russell and Locke and Kathryn Dixie.

This week the attendance at the Medford Bowdern Summer Theater has been quite large, the capacity of the place being fully tested on Tuesday. The bill this week is given by J. W. Gorman's troupe, Alabama Troubadors.

Harry LeClair is making one of the biggest hits of his professional career at the Crescent Gardens, Revere Beach, this week. Others in the bill are the Burke Brothers, Madame Flower, Robinson and Grant, and the Hasted Sisters.

Dancing continues to be a favorite form of amusement. "Skinny's Irish," the delightful slang classic by Eva Williams and Joe Tucker, at Keith's this week, is scoring an even bigger hit than did their new sketch the week previous. It was in reference to her work in this piece that the critic of the New York Sun referred to Miss Williams as "the Queen of the varieties."

The set of chimes for "Dreamwold," the estate of Thomas W. Lawson, at Egypt Station, arrived this week, and will be placed in position at once. It is the first set of chime bells for the South Shore, and will be used, it is proposed, for the first time next Sunday afternoon.

The chimes consist of a full set of ten bells, of the best quality obtainable. Dreamwold employees and other Seabreeze residents, express much gratitude at their arrival.

ONLY TWO.

The Rest of the Theaters Closed in Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 23.—From this time until the middle of August our people will have but two theaters to supply their amusements, and the chances are that one of these will close after this week. Keith's Theater is still doing a very profitable business with high-grade vaudeville, but that house, like the immortal brook, goes on forever. The only difference in the size of the winter and summer audiences is noticeable at the time of the "summer" shows. During the winter the house is comfortably filled at those hours, but at this season of the year there is only a handful of people present there. A stranger in the city who might attend Keith's at 3 or 8 o'clock daily, might think it was the height of the theatrical season, instead of the time when people are prone to seek the park or river for amusement. A specialty is now being made of comedy bills, and the audiences take kindly to them. The house will not close unless some change of policy is made, which does not at all likely.

At Hashim's Grand Opera House, vaudeville is still continued, but the price of admission is so low that one bad week will most likely make the managers close up.

The long and very successful run of "Lover's Lane," at the Park Theater, ended on Saturday night, when a big audience was present. William Brady made a lot of money out of this run. The Lyceum closed on Saturday night.

GOSSIP.

Fred Beckman, the general agent of the Sipe's Hippituan and Trained Animal Show, was in town for several days this week, making railroad contracts for the balance of the season. He reports that business has been excellent with this show this season, and that if they had not encountered bad weather on a great many of their stands, it would have been a record breaker for shows of this size.

"Moore Brothers' Uncle Tom's Cabin Company are giving performances of that classic on the lots of this city under canvas. Business has been good at night, but they have not made much money, as they have been unable to give matinees. They will remain in town for three more weeks.

John Young, of Young's Pier, at Atlantic City, has won his salt, and can charge as many admissions to the various attractions on his Pier as he pleases. An injunction had been secured against him, preventing him from charging more than one admission to the Pier, and not allowing him to sell anything on the Pier. This has been dissolved, and he will make separate charges for the theater and other special attractions. The same ruling does not apply to the other piers, inasmuch as they are classed under separate heads, and they must not charge more than one admission. This will enable Young to get the cream of the business. Tillipon has been hampered so much by the authorities of Atlantic City that he feels like leaving the town. He was prepared to spend many thousands on the Pier, but was prevented by an injunction. He has Sonsa under contract to open this week, but the seating capacity of the Pier is so small that he will not be able to take in enough to pay for the band. He hopes that some consideration will be shown him before the crowd gets there.

The Steel Pier is doing well with Murphy & Gibson's Minstrels and a big hand. The variety theaters are doing fairly well, but big business will not rule until July. Mehrer's Pavilion will open next week. Guvernantes', Doyle's and the Fortescue are now open. The Empyre is doing a big business with Lafayette.

Frank Uebel is doing an enormous business with his Gipsy Camp. A number of our people went to Reading, Pa., last week to take in the Elks' carnival, and they were delighted with it. One of the novel features of the week was a marriage in a den of lions. The ceremony was performed by a minister who had acquired a national reputation through advertising for a wife. He refused to enter the cage, but stood outside of the bars.

A performance by amateurs was given at the Walnut Street Theater last week. The performance was in the Italian language, and made a hit.

When Keith's Theater on Chestnut street opens in September it will be direct competitor for Mr. Keith's other house on Eighth street. It is rumored that he will make a stock house out of the old theater and play vaudeville at the new one. The new house will be the handsomest in the country, even surpassing the Boston house.

Workmen are now busy on the improvements to the Bread Street Theater. Over \$10,000 will be spent on this house. At most of the other theaters the improvements will consist of a thorough cleaning and an expense of \$20 or \$30.

The parks continue to go good business in this vicinity, but after the first of July, when our people will flock to Atlantic City, their trade will fall off.

WIZARD OF OZ.

A Gorgeous Production That Promises to Make Good in Chicago.

Hutchinson, are the other principals of the company who scored. Too much praise can not be given Julian Mitchell, who in reality is the Wizard whose master hand built up this most elaborate picture show ever presented in Chicago.


