THE FAINT

Danse Macabre (Saddle Creek)

With *Danse Macabre*, the follow-up to 1999's breakthrough *Blank-Wave Arcade*, The Faint has refined its dark synth-punk sound (equally fit for a funeral procession and American Bandstand) with slicker production, heavier keyboards and delicate cello accompaniment. As the band moves even further away from traditional instrumentation, guitars are now almost completely absent, replaced by an array of keyboard blips and throbs. Alongside the barrage of synth sounds, vocal distortion and cello are used to create a more calculated, fuller sound than on previous efforts. Todd Baechle's vocals are hauntingly affecting and blend ominously into the dour sonic landscape. The Nebraskan quintet has also shifted its lyrical theme to the dark side: while *Arcade* was littered with youthful references to sex and cars, *Danse Macabre* creates a considerably more wicked tone. Tracks like "Let The Poison Spill From Your Throat" and "Posed To Death" highlight the contrast suggested by the album's title — despite lyrics full of morbid imagery, they are immensely catchy and danceable. The Faint continues to push the envelope, creating smart music that refuses to sit quietly in one genre or be pigeonholed. On the cheekily-titled track "Your Retro Career Melted", the group sums up its future with one simple lyric: "The crowd just seemed to multiply." — **Alex Naidus**

The Coast Is Never Clear (Velocette)

On their 1999 sophomore effort *When Your Heartstrings Break*, San Francisco indie darlings Beulah employed no less than 18 guest musicians who plumped up the record with everything from accordion to horns. The result was a lush, luminous pop sound that critics and Elephant 6 followers swooned over. For *The Coast Is Never Clear*, the band's first proper studio recording, the original six-piece trades in the huge supporting cast for an old pre-synthesizer keyboard (to emulate strings). Despite the simplified approach, Beulah's latest is still a richly melodious concoction. Layered vocal harmonies float dreamily above the pleasant din of the songs' full-on instrumentation, and all the gorgeous flourishes are still in place, from the perfect piano tinkling on "What Will You Do When Your Suntan Fades?" to the energized trumpet bursts on "Silver Lining." Psychedelic twee at its best, *Coast* is packed with hummable pop choruses that will have you grinning (and who wouldn't be with song titles like "A Good Man Is Easy to Kill" and "I'll Be Your Lampshade"?). "I heard he wrote you a song, but so what? Some guy wrote 69, and one just ain't enough," frontman Miles Kurosky wittily intones in "Popular Mechanics For Lovers." Like a good love song, Beulah's fresh pop is timeless. — **Stephanie Valera**



CLICK THA SUPAH-LATIN

Square Won (*Underload*)

On his third album, *Square Won*, L.A.'s Click Tha Supah-Latin champions the fundamentals of hip-hop, including the oft-underrated fifth element: the beatbox. Back in the day before rap became part of the pop machine, beatboxers like Doug E. Fresh, Biz Markie and the Fat Boys' Buff were an essential part of the scene. With *Square Won*, Click (an expert vocal percussionist himself) resurrects this art form, and man, is this guy *nice*. Check out his mouth artistry on the unadorned "The Fifth L.E." (under rhymes by Reignman) and the inimitable "Beatbox Break" (capped off by the melodic hook from Salt 'N Pepa's "Push It"). *Square Won* has an old-school vibe (there's not a sample-heavy or electronica-laced track to be found here), as Click himself explains in the title track: "Many got the notion that for MCs to rhyme/ They gotta have loops, chords and phat bass lines... I'll be the first to flip that mic switch on/ Take you back to square one/ Show you all where I'm from." Breakbeats are sprinkled with scratching, touches of piano and flute, and rhymes by Click (who proves he's as capable MCing as he is making music with his mouth on tracks like head-nodders "The Park" and "Get Live") and guests like Derek Strong, Jurassic-5 and others. The family even gets some play — Click's wife and kids are featured on "Family Freestyle" and his son Anthony (a.k.a. Click 44) jumps in on "Square Won" and "Diferente" (the latter of which is dusted by a killer salsa-fied flute). — **Lisa Hageman**

TIGHT BRO'S FROM WAY BACK WHEN

Lend You A Hand (*Kill Rock Stars*)

Way back when is right: The Tight Bro's From Way Back When bring to mind a golden youth, one where kids rocked 'till they dropped from exhaustion, went home with a throbbing migraine and couldn't sleep a wink because their ears were ringing something awful. The amped-up Tight Bro's possess the flamboyant stage antics of Little Richard, the eyeball-popping intensity of Black Flag and the riff-roaring guitarnage of AC/DC. On *Lend You A Hand*, fiery frontman Jared sounds like he's gotta wail like the dickens to exorcise his captive soul, while madmen guitarists Dave and Quitty give the impression that they're the kind of young turks who lay on their backs while they play, writhing all over the sweaty, beer-soaked stage without missing a chord change or flubbing a note. Squalling feedback, minimal production, and a theatrical urgency abound on the feverish *Lend You A Hand*. Big-timers like Buckcherry and Nashville Pussy may have also sprung from the same drinkin', spittin' rock school as the Tight Bro's, but the group shuns the almost gimmicky image (full body tats, leather cowboy hats and firebreathing) of those aforementioned bands, instead opting for straight-up pure rock fury. — **Amy Sciarretto**



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Acetone Leader Dead At 34

Acetone vocalist/bassist Richie Lee was found dead in his Los Angeles home on July 23 of an

apparent suicide. He was 34.

The acclaimed trio — comprised of Lee, guitarist Mark Lightcap and drummer Steve Hadley — formed in 1992 following the demise of the threesome's former surf-rock group, Spinout. Acetone released its 1993 debut, *Cindy*, on Virgin subsidiary Vernon Yard and landed a slot as a supporting act for the Verve. The trio then released the 1994 EP *I Guess I Would* (which included covers of songs by Kris Kristofferson, Jerry Cole and John Prine, among others) and 1996's *If You Only Knew* before being dropped by its label. In 1997, Acetone inked a deal with Neil Young's Vapor Records, where it released a self-titled third album and last year's *York Blvd.*

Lee's family is asking fans and friends to donate to suicide prevention organizations in lieu of flowers. Details can be found at www.vapor-records.com.

Marvelous 3 Splits Up

Members of Atlanta's glam-pop trio Marvelous 3 are parting ways to pursue other "musically-related opportunities," according to the band's

website. Marvie singer/guitarist Butch Walker cites the "business and politics involved with joining the 'major label society'" as a factor in the split. The band had been signed to Elektra, where it released 1998's *Hey! Album* (which included the hit single "Freak Of The Week") and last year's *ReadySexGo*. Representatives from Elektra stated simply that the band "is not on the label anymore."

Walker, bassist Jayce Fincher and drummer Slug will pursue solo projects, with Walker planning to do some writing and production work for other artists. A live album and DVD entitled *History Of Marvie* are reportedly in the works.

Squint Staff Cut

Squint Entertainment, home to hip-hop group L.A. Symphony and pop band Sixpence None The Richer, has undergone a

recent staffing change.

Translation: everyone who once worked there no longer does.

Squint is owned by Word Entertainment, a corporate partner of Gaylord Entertainment. According to Gaylord vice president of communications Tom Atkinson, Word Records (also under the Word Entertainment umbrella) will handle Squint's administration, while artists signed to

the label will remain on the Squint imprint. Sources at Word said the recent changes would not likely affect any of Squint's ongoing projects.

Online Music Services Raise Eyebrows

According to published reports, the U.S. Department of Justice has started an antitrust investigation of forthcoming music subscription services PressPlay and MusicNet, which are backed by Universal and Sony, and AOL Time Warner and EMI Music Group, respectively. Both services are expected to launch sometime this fall.

In related news, Rep. Rick Boucher of Virginia and Rep. Christopher Cannon of Utah have proposed a bill called the Online Music Competition Act that would require labels to offer the same licensing deals to indie services (like Liquid Audio and Uploader) as it does to label-owned ventures like MusicNet and PressPlay. The proposed bill would allegedly help level the playing field for the independent services.

Just A Bite...

Priority Records has been booted from the roster of parent company EMI Records and will merge with EMI-owned Capitol Records. All of the rap label's artists will migrate to Capitol. • The U.K.'s Reading Festival is coming to the Tweeter Center Amphitheater in Camden, New Jersey on Sept. 8. Scheduled to appear at the one-off, 10-hour-long show are Eminem, Linkin Park and Xzibit. • San Francisco community station KUSF's transmitter has broken, causing the station to go off the air twice in the last three months and cut its power from 3,000 watts to 50. Donations to help ease the cost of fixing the transmitter are being accepted. Those interested in helping can email kusf@usfca.edu for more information.





THE **PUSHERMAN**

As he makes his maiden voyage to the U.S. in support of a new album, brainy drum 'n' bass maverick Tom Jenkinson ponders the challenge of making epic music for the masses. Story □ Enrique Lavin Photo □ Bob Green



Don't bother Tom Jenkinson. The abstract expressionist beatmaker who calls himself Squarepusher believes he doesn't have a second to waste. But at a mere 26 years of age (you'd think he was much older by the way he guards his schedule), the London jazz-jungle artist has plenty of time to produce music. "I feel like I'm going crazy when I'm not making music, because I feel I'm being shut down by the outside world," says the producer-bassist, who's calling from his home in London. For Jenkinson, performing isn't just a burning desire, it's a necessity of life. "I can't describe what I do musically; it just sort of answers the questions for me. I do what I do because if I didn't, I just wouldn't be a person."

Squarepusher's drum 'n' bass-rooted, erratically fractured electronic compositions provide glimpses into the next frontier in both dance music and in armchair listening. Like his Warp labelmates, IDM darlings Aphex Twin and Autechre, Squarepusher plays the limits of what is conceptually considered music. His songs move from a familiar sub-genre (say, drill 'n' bass, or two-step) to cerebral, non-categorical forms, challenging the audiophile with complex, digitally produced structures that intermingle with organic instrumentation. "What I'm trying to do is create a five-second or a 10-minute epic thing to provoke some chain reaction of thought," Jenkinson says over the phone from his home in London. "Maybe it's futile, but what else can I do?"

For his latest effort, *Go Plastic*, Jenkinson is at his mind-expanding best. He lures the listener with the infectious, two-step-styled lead single "My Red Hot Car," then works on your cranium with jackhammer beats in "Greenways Trajectory," only to later reward you with a digital heartbeat, and a broken hip-hop/jazz drum freakout on the more comprehensible "The Exploding Psychology." Despite its headiness, the album proved its accessibility by achieving an unprecedented No. 1 position on CMJ's RPM chart in its debut week at radio.

When he first started out, Jenkinson drew from influences that were as much of the techno world (Carl Craig) as they are from jazz (Charlie Parker and Dizzy Gillespie). Hesitant to give his life story or talk about who he is, Jenkinson admits he's more at home with fringe people — the freaks and fuck-ups who've seen things others wouldn't dare to. "I've always felt more comfortable talking to a tramp than I did with a dude in a suit," says Jenkinson, who is spare with words when discussing his recordings but flows with ideas when he speaks of others. "All that matters is that these people have learned to accept the harshness of their situation, and they do something with it. When it comes down to it, for me, it doesn't matter how I came to be."

A musical clairvoyant by birthright, Jenkinson has known his calling for most of his life, he says, adding that he's a simple product of his parents. His father was an electrical engineer ("radio, clocks and jukebox bits [were always] on the table... fucking mental!"), and his mother was a psychic, a medium. This amalgam of mechanical and metaphysical thought became the natural source Jenkinson drew upon for his art, whether it was visual or musical. "My problem is that I can see too much. My eyes have been pinned too far open," says Jenkinson, who dropped out of London's top art college (whose alumni he terms "fuck-

ing poseur twits!") as soon as he got a record deal. "It's also good, though, because it allows me to go into [artistic ideas] heavily and get a fundamental understanding of things."

In support of his new album, Squarepusher will tour the United States throughout August for the first time ever. Earlier in the year, he played at the Lollapalooza-style Coachella music festival in California, followed by

a set at a trendy New York City nightspot. However, his newfound live outlet is something that the time-strapped Jenkinson believes has put him in a quandary. "I like gigs, because for a fraction of time you see people who are really *banging* to what you're doing," says Jenkinson, who is touring with the like-minded, yet danceable Plaid. "On the other hand, you waste however many months that you are on the road, and you can't make any new tracks. So you're shooting yourself one way in order to benefit the other."

As a solution, he plans on bringing a relatively portable 25-unit rack and computer to compose on while he's touring. "I nip out of the studio for an hour to do a gig and get back in to continue working," he confesses. The London-based Warp imprint has released four Squarepusher albums in the States. As if to befuddle both fans and critics, after Squarepusher recorded a critical mini-album of deconstructed drum 'n' bass in 1997 (*Big Loada*), he unleashed his jazz chops and hired live musicians to record *Music Is Rotted One Note* (Nothing), on which he displays an amazing prowess on the fretless bass. In 1999, he released *Selection Sixteen*, which was also distributed by Nothing Records and has sold about 20,000 copies domestically.

Warp opened an office in New York this year in hopes of expanding its reach in North America. Kris Gillespie, Warp's U.S. label manager, says Squarepusher's *Go Plastic* tour is significant in that fans will have a chance to put a face on the artist and his work. Having a foothold in the States may open up licensing opportunities, which are harder to manage if all the label's operations are overseas. "We're happy with the impact that we've had with DJs who report to CMJ and with the response at the clubs," Gillespie notes. "These are good places to start, but there's so much more to Tom. He's not just an electronic artist, he's a phenomenal bass player, and that's one area of his fan base we want to tap into."

For Jenkinson, all marketing and promotion talk is just a waste of his time, even if it contradicts his desire for more people to listen to what he produces. "I can't be asked to sell myself. I don't give a fuck about selling my music," says Jenkinson, who only granted this interview because he believed this writer had a genuine interest in his music. "I reckon more people should hear what I'm doing, because for this area of music it's fucking advanced. If someone doesn't like it, then fuck it. I don't care." **NMR**




BLACK CAT MUSIC

Hands In The Estuary... Torso In The Lake (Lookout!) Interesting things can happen when punk rockers begin to age. Like the Murder City Devils and (International) Noise Conspiracy, Black Cat Music has discovered that urgent and dangerous music could be constructed by slipping

dark, bluesy chords next to a primal sex-like beat. Sounding like the unholy spawn of prime Gun Club, BCM arose from the ashes of several Bay Area punk bands in 1998, honing its chops at the occasional live show and focusing on creating something original. The quartet's wiry debut full-length, *Hands In The Estuary... Torso In The Lake*, is proof that they've been working hard. Slower tunes like "Cipher In the Snow" and "Williamsburg Bridge Song" simmer with a lurking menace, while upbeat rockers "The Chain Snatcher" and "The Princess Dress" rage with an in-your-face intensity that'll knock listeners on their asses. Either way, the band beautifully executes its damaged rock riffage, utilizing vocalist Brady's raspy tenor shout to instill tales of loss and regret with genuine conviction. Dark, swirling, and cool — just like Bay Area rain.

CITIZEN COPE


Citizen Cope (DreamWorks)

Turntablist Clarence Greenwood chalked up numerous writing and production credits for the early '90s alt-soul group Basehead before retiring his title as the group's token white member. His next move? To keep playin' that funky music, white boy — this

time under the solo moniker Citizen Cope. On his major label debut, Greenwood sticks with Basehead's characteristically lazy, hip-hop-on-Nyquil groove, but he's certainly no one-trick pony. In fact, it's nearly impossible to pin Cope down, given his lengthy resume as a multi-instrumentalist and possession of an eclectic style that combines folk, blues, hip-hop, soul and funk. *Citizen Cope* is swimming in unique textures: layers of pensive, world-weary vocals cascade over trippy beats and wah-wah grooves, occasionally recalling G. Love on lounge-style, socio-political nuggets like "If There's Love." Other cuts like "Appetite," which struts along with clicking castanets and blistering piano, and the neo-gospel "Salvation" (complete with fire-and-brimstone organ dirges) reveal Citizen Cope's potential as a peculiar alt-funk treasure.

THE CLEAN

Getaway (Merge)

To say that The Clean started it all for New Zealand's '80s pop movement is an understatement. Hot on the heels of the punk zeitgeist, the trio of Robert Scott, Hamish Kilgour and his brother, David, took the D.I.Y. esthetic and created a delightfully bent brand of

folky, lo-fi pop that not only inspired every New Zealand band that followed, but also put the Flying Nun label on the global indie map. *Getaway*, the on-again, off-again band's fourth proper album, is a skillful but varied affair that will likely cause those unfamiliar with The Clean to compare its distortion-friendly guitar pop to another trio, Yo La Tengo (whose Georgia Hubley and Ira Kaplan stop by to pay their respects here). As The Clean takes turns singing and swapping instruments, it's easy to hear that the group's chemistry is still potent. The nostalgic, aching sound is achieved with less this time, too: while 1996's *Unknown Country* was shockingly lush for the sparse-sounding band,

Getaway is a return to a more stripped-down sound imbued with plenty of strummed guitars and meandering, roughshod weirdness. — Tad Hendrickson

CRAIG DAVID

Born To Do It (Atlantic)

Except for the occasional Seal and Soul II Soul record, American artists have always held a monopoly on all things R&B. But 19-year-old British crooner Craig David, arguably one of the most influential new voices on the international scene, was a bona fide superstar

nearly a year before his chocolate chords ever hit Hot 97's airwaves. Though David originally springs from the U.K.'s thriving two-step scene (Mark Hill of the British garage team Artful Dodger produces most of his material), his wildly successful debut is far from being cutting-edge; in fact, it's one of the slickest, sweetest pieces of ear candy you're likely to hear this year. David's tracks excel thanks to skintight execution and unusually strong sense of musicality, not just pristine production. Cuts like "Fill Me In" and "Can't Be Messing 'Round" flesh out skittish, Timbaland-influenced rhythms with gorgeous, acoustic guitar melodies that would make as strong an impression without all the audio gauze. David doesn't exactly reinvent the wheel here, but we'll be damned if you find a smoother ride on the market. — M. Tye Comer

DE FACTO

Megatron Shotblast

(Gold Standard Laboratories) We're used to Omar Rodriguez and Cedric Bixler unleashing a more visceral, vehement sound as the guitarist and lead singer, respectively, of the high-energy At The Drive-In. The boys unwind a bit by moonlighting in De Facto, an L.A.-based project that finds the pair replacing punk-addled riffs and piercing vocals with psychedelic dub reverb, drowsy bass, winding guitar solos and Latin-accented percussion. *Megatron Shotblast* can loosely be called a dub album, but it's far removed from a typical ganja groove, as the quartet (rounded out by Ikey Owens and Jeremy Ward) fuse dub, rock, blues and jazz in startlingly innovative ways. Check the way the lazy, Spanish-styled percussion and brash brass of "Fingertrap" erupt into an explosion of intense, almost unintelligible noise, or how the sultry soul coursing through "Cordova" struggles to stay afloat amid the track's ebb and flow of cosmic chaos. This ain't your daddy's dub, for sure, but even fans of innovators like Lee Perry will be able to appreciate the traditional mindset used to orchestrate the album's unusual ambiance. — M. Tye Comer



ESBJORN SVENSSON TRIO (E.S.T.)

Somewhere Else Before

(Columbia-CRG)

Not your father's piano trio, Sweden's E.S.T. will make jazz purists wince as easily as it'll turn on a new generation of sound pioneers to the wonders of tradition, even as it furthers

that tradition's scope. *Somewhere Else Before*, the group's U.S. debut, compiles the best tracks from its two European releases, adding minimalist electronics and jam-oriented compositions to the group's time-worn approach. The result brings to light music tailor-made for jazzbos, chill-out room-heads and techno hippies alike. Svensson's playing combines avant Chick Corea quotes with the pastoral swirls of Bruce Hornsby, while the rhythm section grooves with a light touch and elegant force. But the reason to fall head over heels for *Somewhere Else Before* is its post-production interplay. The way percussive treats sneak into the tension-filled jam of "The Face Of Love" or how "The Wraith" builds from an ambient jazz head-nodding vibe into a cacophonous, left-field dance floor stomper. That this is happening in an unquestionably jazz-ified arena should be a welcome note to all.

Somniloquy (EP)

(Domino-Merge)

Pram's mescaline-doused art-pop resides in the space between dreaming and consciousness. With its last seven albums, the collective has procured a series of soundtracks for those lucid moments where you're aware that you're asleep, but still held captive by the bizarre world of your brain's chemical concoctions. *Somniloquy* bundles the group's singular concepts with the sonic abstract expressions in the recording, which features druggy remixes of past songs. Three new songs ("The Way Of The Mongoose," "Monkey Puzzle" and "Clock Without Hands") could have spilled over from 2000's opiate-pop adventure *Museum Of Imaginary Animals*, urged along by Rosie's soothing, off-key phrasing of existential-surrealist lines like "Once there was a man who wept on discovering/ a life of sleep walking had made him forget/ all of his dreams." ambient-IDM trio Plone take on "Bewitched," while "The Million Dollar Burst" inspires references to Björk's latest minimalist laptop techno underpinnings. What dreams are made of, indeed.



Sharin' In The Groove:

Celebrating The Music of Phish

(Mockingbird Foundation)

As with the Grateful Dead, dismissing Phish based on preconceived notions of jam-bands and hippies has meant foolishly critiquing a book by its cover.

Nothing proves this point like *Sharin' In The Groove*, that rarest of species: a tribute album that does not suck. Yes, some stereotypes are served — Arlo Guthrie, Little Feat, Hot Tuna and Jimmy Buffett all make appearances to keep the old-school, tie-dye demographic satisfied — while a solo Dave Matthews, Project Logic (with John Scofield) and Lake Trout make sure the baby jam-heads get theirs as well. More interesting by far are contributions from the likes of Japan's Boredoms, an Eastern psychedelic tsunami that plays it irreverently cool here; Los Villains, a Los Lobos side project on metallic overdrive; and former Pavement boy Spiral Stairs' Preston School Of Industry, reinventing the jams for a post-punk generation. Such is but the tip of *Groove*'s diversity, showing that Phish's musical underworld is far greater than the sum of its pop culture parts. — Piotr Orlov

SUICIDE MACHINES


Steal This Record

(Hollywood)

The Suicide Machines continue to cram a hell of a lot of bounce per ounce on their fourth album, but this time there's a thick, dark thread running through the band's pop-punk patchwork. Aside from

the reggae-tinged "Stand Up," the Detroit foursome has abandoned its ska sound for one that recalls Refused more than it does Rancid. The title track and "Off the Cuff" are flat out rap-core in some parts, with Jason Navarro's back-with-a-vengeance lyrics following suit ("This is the last time I let the world get the best of me," he snarls on "Bleeding Heart"). "Scars" and "Honor Among Thieves" best incorporate this revitalized edge into the Machines' trademark fist-pumping sing-a-long choruses. Aside from a lamentable cover of R.E.M.'s moldy oldie "It's The End Of The World As We Know It (And I Feel Fine)," *Steal This Record* is an energetic fusion of fast-paced punk and hardcore sludge. Sometimes, it's fun to be angry.—**Matt Greene**

Shadows On The Sun

(Sub Pop)

On its latest release, Zen Guerrilla sends loud greetings and salutations from the bar-blues rock 'n' roll nation. This tireless San-Francisco-by-way-of-Philadelphia quartet has been chugging along for well over a decade now, and its

hybrid of punk, gutter gospel, and blues is still fresher than a Georgia peach plucked right off the branch. While most bands spend their careers making studio records that never quite capture their live firepower, *Shadows On The Sun* is imbued with such coarse, cathartic energy that the album ultimately sounds like a live recording — not an easy task to accomplish. Vocalist Marcus Durant has a helluva soulful voice, and he sings as though his body has been taken over by the omnipotent gods of rock 'n' roll. His vitriolic pipes are an odd yet welcome addition to the crashin' and burnin', riff-happy racket of his bandmates. If James Brown (in his prime, natch) were to slip between the sheets with the MC5, Zen Guerrilla would be the pair's unholy spawn.

The official date for the 29th Annual International Association of Jazz Educators (IAJE) convention is set for Jan. 9–12, 2002 in Long Beach, California. Most everyone who attended the New York City event in 2001 heard rumblings that such was the case, but it's now official. Headquarters for the event will be the Long Beach Convention Center and Hyatt Regency Hotel. Based on previous convention figures, over 7,000 educators, DJs, journalists, industry personnel, musicians and fans from more than 35 countries will be in attendance.

A new wrinkle in next year's event is an award to recognize international artists who have significantly contributed to the evolution of jazz. Presented by the IAJE and European Jazz Festivals Organization, the inaugural award will go to Weather Report leader and solo artist Joseph Zawinul. Making the prize just a little bit sweeter,

the award comes with a \$20,000 honorarium. The award will be presented Jan. 11 at a concert in Zawinul's honor. The WDR German Radio Big Band will be the backing band, and many musicians who've played with Zawinul in the past will be on hand to pay their respects to the keyboardist.

A gala event returning for the 12th year is the Arts American Jazz Masters Awards. Hosted by Dr. Billy Taylor, the 2002 version will see three more jazz masters collect a \$20,000 fellowship. Last year's winners were the late John Lewis — who probably made his last public appearance at that award ceremony — pianist Randy Weston and saxophonist Jackie McLean. This year's event will be held on Jan. 12.

The conference has also expanded its industry track, with more than 30 panels, discussions and workshops devoted to various industry issues. NPR will again hold an all-day

symposium (Jan. 9), with a number of panels directly pertaining to radio issues. Also watch (and listen) for Long Beach-based station KLON to broadcast live from the site.

Q & A



MATTHEW SHIPP

The ever-mercurial Matthew Shipp continues to dazzle jazz fans with an incredible array of projects. While his chamber music-like String Trio album *Expansion, Power, Release* was recently released and is currently charting, Shipp is most eager in discussing his new "beats" album, which he began recording Aug. 9. Also watch for Shipp at the CMJ 2001 Marathon, where he will perform in a duo with longtime collaborator Rob Brown as part of a Thirsty Ear Blue Series showcase; he'll also be the moderator for the jazz panel.

Rumor has it your next album will be an electronic album.

Rumor is only half right. It's a beats album and there will be mixologist or producer, but I am playing acoustic piano. The producer is Chris Flam, who works with all kinds of people, from the people on [New York electronic label] Liquid Sky to A Guy Called Gerald and even recorded one of the Public Enemy albums.

Is this going to be a jazz album?

Yes. I'm using Daniel Carter, William Parker and Guillermo Brown. The beats are just going to be an added timbre. When you bring a tuba for a piece, you're bringing in another element. Your job as a composer is to find another way to use that. Same with the beats.

Are you worried about comparisons, fairly or unfairly, to the Spring Heel Jack project?

It would be unfair because I think that they were drum 'n' bass musicians that wanted to work with [jazz musicians] to

get away from drum 'n' bass. I'm the opposite – I'm a jazz musician who wants the drum 'n' bass patterns.

Is this your big attempt to sell out?

This is my attempt to create a music using some different colors. You can call it whatever you want. I think that DJ culture and free-jazz culture can and should intersect. When jazz is real, it's about the realm of ideas, of movement and sensuality. All those things should be inherent in dance music, especially movement and sensuality. Both types of music are trying to be in the now and modern. I talk to a lot of younger people who come up to me, and I often ask them where they think music is going. The response I've gotten more than any other has been that they believe that free jazz and DJ culture will intersect at some point. I'm not a purist but my esthetic is very pure in what it is. And maybe it is up to the kids to create the perfect intersection. But since people are talking to me about it, I figure that I should put my two cents in.

already impressive enough, MacCombie is also a talented composer.

On a related note, the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra With Wynton Marsalis will embark upon a 46-city, United In Swing tour as part of its 2001-2002 season. Hitting 26 states from Sept. 13, 2001 – May 10, 2002 over the course of three tour legs, this is the orchestra's most extensive U.S. tour to date. The program, which will vary from night to night, will feature pieces from throughout the history of jazz, with an emphasis on the work of John Coltrane and Charles Mingus as well as original compositions. The tour starts at the Hollywood Bowl, where the orchestra will be

joined by the Los Angeles Philharmonic to perform the long-form Wynton Marsalis piece "All Rise."

Something more imminent, and definitely more on the Latin-jazz party tip, is a string of upcoming dates by New Orleans' own **Los Hombres Calientes**. Led by trumpeter Irvin Mayfield and drummer Bill Summers, the combo is doing four dates in the Northeast (Aug. 9-12), two dates in the Midwest (Chicago on Aug. 18 and Flint, Michigan on Aug. 19) as well as a few dates in its hometown and Florida before the end of the year. Go see this slamin', award-winning band and find out what everyone is so excited about.

A musician using non-musical inspiration is sort of a nebulous concept for listeners, and while Dave Douglas's tribute to non-violent activists and musicians makes for interesting written copy, *Witness*'s music still has to stand on its own. 

Demolition (Atlantic)

With all the hype surrounding Judas Priest's first album minus the irreplaceable (until now) Rob Halford on vocals, you might think you were living in London circa the early '80s, when the NWOBHM was at its peak. *Demolition* is Priest's first major label album in years, with Tom "Ripper" Owens on lead vocals. The

album's release also coincides with *Rock Star*, the big studio bankrolled flick based loosely on Owens's Cinderella story and starring Mark Wahlberg. (The American-born Owens fronted a Priest cover band only to be handpicked to replace the idol he was emulating.) So, call it a NWOBHM comeback, except *Demolition* doesn't crumble under the weight of a dated, power metal sound. While *Demolition* retains the classic elements that made Priest one of the giants of the British Steel genre — soaring, siren vocals and Glenn Tipton and K.K. Downing's rolling, cocksure, dual guitar solos — it's Owens's versatile voice that gives the chunky *Demolition* even more oomph. Ultimately, *Demolition* has more in common with Megadeth than it does with Manowar. Get hellbent for leather with "Hell Is Home," "Feed On Me," and "Bloodsuckers."

TOY HERNANDEZ: BOLDLY TAKING THE BARRIO'S SOUND TO THE NEXT FRONTIER

In the months following Control Machete's last release, *Artillería Pesada, Presente*, hip-hop programming wizard/producer Toy Hernández has kept busy with the band's label, Sones Del Mexside.

Distributed by Universal in Mexico, Sones Del Mexsides released all of the Kool arrow catalog (i.e. the *Spanglish 101* compilation and Brujeria's *Brujerizmo*) and under sub-label Sonideros Nacional, it's signing and releasing local acts as well as Hernández's own, Monterrey-based hip-hop crew Artillería Pesada — which counts on the talents of MCs Sr. Santos and Maigaz

(Flor de Lingo), Babo from hardcore/hip-hop group Cartel De Santa and Javu from Bastardos.

Toy has also kept busy with side projects and Control's recording studio Cuarto De Control, where he co-produced Celso Piña's *Barrio Bravo* album.

"On our first album [*Mucho Barato*], we had experimented a little bit with Colombian ghetto elements (*vallenato* and *cumbia*). This music distanced itself from Mexico's regional norteño music, which is considered very pop here," says Hernández.

Colombian *vallenato* — which is influenced by

Jamaican music — spread like wildfire in Monterrey nearly 20 years ago, with local sound systems (called *sonideros* in Mexico) throwing MC spits over mixed tapes. Piña was among the first to successfully adopt the form and perform it live with a group of musicians.


"He's always had this stoner sound that I've been into," Hernández confesses in an interview from his Monterrey home. "Slow down the cadence, and what you have is something close to reggae or the dub sound."

The discovery was an eye-opener. During the recording of a tribute to Hector Lavoe (which is still in production), he started a dialog with King Chango's

singer/toaster Blanquito Man and found a common ground with the dubbed-out *vallenato*. The two began collaborating in the sound system they formed, Sistema Local, in which Blanquito toasts over live DJ sets. The most accomplished result so far is the duo's collaboration with Piña on *Barrio Bravo*'s raucous, new-school *vallenato* single, "Cumbia Sobre El Río."

"What we're seeking is a more world beat vibe that will bust out in every direction," says Toy, who's working on licensing various tracks for Sistema Local.

In the meantime, the group continues to perform in Mexico.



NONA DELICHAS

Aires De Bocacalle
(Nimboestatic-DLN)

Tijuana alterna-pop quintet Nona Delicias delves into the nether realms of dream music, creating brilliantly evocative soundscapes with chanteuse Cladia Morfin as guide and temptress. *Aires De Bocacalle*'s percolating first single "No Nacimos En Diciembre" already had some college radio airplay earlier this year, and Nona (which has a new deal with the Miami-based DLN distribution company) may finally put its two feet over the border and reach broader audiences. *Aires De Bocacalle*, a long-awaited follow up to the group's 1997 debut (which Nimboestatic reissued this year) is infused with Morfin's breathy vocals and life-affirming lyrics, underpinned by electric violins, gossamer synths, and jangly guitars — all sounds reminiscent of the Sundays and The Cure. The album's nortec-filtered remixes (one even quotes *Dark Side Of The Moon*) of its already trippy music throw it into a pool of psychedelic chemicals for an even spacier sound: the languid, Dali-esque alarm-clocks-dripping-over-a-landscape opening track ("Muni") gets hammered into shape by Terrestre's digital big beats, as minimalist techno programmer Panóptica abducts the sweeping acoustic guitar lullaby of the title track and incorporates a house beat into its central lyrics. Soaring with autumnal color and rare melodicism, Nona Delicias is set to become Tijuana's next big export.

FERMIN MUGURUZA

FM 99.00 Dub Manifest (Piranha) A mix of ska, dub, and hip-hop sung in Basque sounds unlikely, but Fermin Muguruza makes it work, if only because he seems motivated by the spirit of The Clash's angry and raw sound and politically-fueled agenda. Basques have long distanced themselves from the rest of Spain,

and Muguruza makes his separatist case lyrically, while fusing musical elements that might not work together – ska verses give way to the power crunch of the Who's "I Can't Explain" on the chorus of "Ekhi Eder." But, like Manu Chao, the mix 'n' match of styles becomes infectious: "Radical Chic" works in a house bassline under some raga, while "Diru Espanol Zikina" takes a left turn into hip-hop halfway through. Although this has been going strong on N Alternative, FM 99.00 is definitely something for world folks as well.

BAABA MAAL

Senegalese star Baaba Maal is currently on the road in the U.S., touring behind Missing You (Mi Yeevnii). The disc, produced by John Leckie (Radiohead, Stone Roses), is a beautiful acoustic effort recorded outdoors, with insects as much a part of the music as the instruments. We caught up with Maal by phone in England on the eve of his American tour.

You seem to veer between hi-tech and acoustic albums.


It's the two sides of my musical personality. But I go in different directions on different albums. Still, whatever experimentation I

do, I try to keep the traditional base, because this is *me*, my way of singing and writing my songs. Some of the traditional instruments have a lot of meaning for my music and the message I want to sing about.

John Leckie seems an unusual choice for an African album. I wanted to record this in a special way, in the open air, far away from the city, using very sensitive instruments. So it had to be someone who respected instruments. I wanted someone with plenty of experience, who's not very old, but who has experience, and an understanding of how I wanted to record these instruments. And I think John Leckie was a good choice for that.

Will your live set mirror the record?

It's going to largely reflect this album. I tour to promote the album, and some of the songs are going to be just like the album. Some are going to be an interpretation for a big band, but not far away from the recording. We'll mix in some other songs, and some new songs we want to put in the show.



BATIDOS

Olajopé (Six Degrees)

House beats and Latin grooves topped off with Cuban piano and jazz sax. Sure, it's been done, but rarely as inventively as this. DJ Ron Trent hooked up with reedman Jay Rodriguez, and they brought in the superstar talents of Cuban pianist Chucho Valdés and Latin percussionist Eddie Bobé to make up

Batidos. From the opening "Just A Dream" it's apparent that this is music with both soul and brains, as Rodriguez weaves melodic lines around the rhythm. It comes together best on "Tengo Sed," which employs vintage salsa flavors while beating with a strong Afro-Cuban heart, courtesy of Valdés's powerhouse playing. Except for the ambient-sounding "Myths & Realities," Batidos bring the party to your house. All you need is your own dance floor.


CREAMFIELDS, MEKKA CANCELLED

On Aug. 8, Cream pulled the plug on its East Coast Creamfields event, scheduled to take place on Sept. 1 in Riverhead, Long Island, citing poor projected attendance as the cause for the cancellation. Having sold only 2,300 out of 30,000 tickets at the time of the announcement, Creamfields New York suffered the same fate as the company's Sept. 29 West Coast gig, which was cancelled a week earlier due to difficulties securing a site in either Las

Vegas or Los Angeles. Cream, a nine-year-old U.K. club brand that has had very limited experience working in America, has released no official word as to whether they plan to produce Creamfields events in the U.S. next summer. If that wasn't enough, on Aug. 1, a mere three days before it was scheduled to kick off in Detroit, Mekka Entertainment announced that it was scrapping its entire 2001 summer festival tour. Organizers cited several reasons for the cancellation, with lack

of time being the biggest deterrent. "Everyone on the team has put their hearts into making this happen, but when it came down to it we just didn't give ourselves enough time to put it together," a spokesperson for Mekka said in a statement. Mekka Entertainment, a brand new music/Internet company centered on DJ culture, will continue to develop other parts of its company and intends to produce a traveling festival tour in summer 2002.

Q & A



PERRY FARRELL

The wild-eyed, outspoken frontman of one of the most influential alternative bands in history and the founder of the festival that embodied the camaraderie of alternative America in the '90s, Perry Farrell's legacy in the annals of rock is quite secure. *Song Yet To Be Sung*, his first solo release, is the start of a new chapter for the multi-talented musician. It's an alluring, spiritual convergence of electronic and rock music that sees the full manifestation of Farrell's current fascination with the DJ culture. We caught up him for an intriguing one-on-one.

Most people are still a little surprised that you have such an earnest and ardent zeal for DJ culture. When did the love affair begin for you?

It started to develop around 1994. I didn't take it up immediately though, even though I admired it greatly. I was just intrigued by the sound and started collecting records. I started spinning around 1997; I started to just do it because I was always playing records down at my studio, mixing my voice in with the record and just tripping out on effects and things like that.

How often are you spinning these days?

Well this week, I'm performing at WOMAD and at a Seattle radio station [that] is giving me an hour to mix. I think radio is really a trip. The music that I've really been checking out and falling in love with doesn't really have a place on radio right now. It's been bypassed for a lot of reasons, but its time is overdue. It's going to start happening and it's exciting figuring out where it has started to bleed, where the cracks are, and where we can get in. I look at the sound like life: this music is vital to my life, and without it on the radio, I will ignore the radio. Radio is cracking open and accepting it, but it's not coming with great ease. It's almost like a birth; it's a very hard and painful process.

Everyone credits you with Lollapalooza, but I think the

Exit Festival really forecasted birth of a homegrown, electronic music festival like Wotapolava and Mekka. Of course, both of those failed before they even began.

Why is America having such a hard time getting these events up and running?

Money is a big issue. You wouldn't get involved with this kind of music unless you seriously love it, and mark my words; most of these guys are going to lose their shirts. I don't know if they think that they know that now, but they will after the summer is over. I love electronic music culture, but I love it more when there's more of an organic sense to it; I think the purist festivals are going to burn up from lack of water and earth. They're too much fire. And I think the ones that incorporate the earth, like the WOMAD festival, have a much nicer balance. No one's putting people down for wanting to make money, but it all depends on what they're giving back. You have to have a long-term plan. That's what I like to do; I look so far down that I know what I can do with the money after the event has gone. I look at it as if it has already died. It's like Samurai theory: consider your death daily.

Your album often mentions the "jubilee." Can you explain the concept?

It's a 50-year cycle; every

generation gets to celebrate it, and ours falls on Sept. 18 of this year. The cycle was given to Moses on Mt. Sinai to give to the Israelites, and it still exists today. We have to get our minds into the idea of forgoing debts and celebrating; get into the mindset of partying, but partying with purpose and direction. Hopefully, the end result is that we will have done good work by mending our differences, mending the Earth, and mending ourselves. The "song yet to be sung" refers to the song of jubilee, the one we get to sing as our declaration of liberty and freedom. My album is basically a program for the jubilee, and if you listen to the lyrics, they explain everything. They're as deep as the layers of an onion.

You'll also be going on the road with Jane's Addiction this fall. Will you incorporate some of your new material into the set?

I would like to do one or two songs with Jane's, but I'll be doing club gigs as well. I would like to throw some good after-parties and perform at a couple of those. That's where I see this music; Jane's is a very big, tight-knit operation, but it also provides a setting for beautifully loose-knit wakes. There are going to be a lot of very fun, cool, sexy evenings on this tour.

CEVIN KEY

The Ghost of Each Room (Metropolis)

Since the '90s, Cevin Key has led an array of musical outfits (Doubting Thomas, Tear Garden and, of course, Skinny Puppy) in explorations of maniacal, left-of-center electro-industrial music, but some of his most extreme work has been issued as a solo artist — namely, the eerie, experimental ambient frequencies of 1998's *Music For Cats*. While *The Ghost Of Each Room* is also characterized by Key's penchant for erratic rhythms and haunting textures, it's a more structured assault this time around. Whereas *Cats* drifted aimlessly, high on its own ether, *Ghost* anchors its orchestrations with more pronounced rhythms and melodies, presenting a more straightforward (but equally startling) concoction of tunes. A crew of collaborators, including Frankie Pett, Bill Van Rooy, Justin Bennett, the Legendary Pink Dots and former Skinny Puppy front-man Ogre join Key in this oddball audio adventure.

DJ WALLY

The Creepy Crawlies (Quatermass)

DJ Wally, the court jester of experimental hip-hop, makes a valiant return with the three-ring circus that is his latest album, *The Creepy Crawlies*. Compared to his other ventures, this is the New York-based producer's most sprawling and cinematic, drawing upon an array of samples, recurring musical themes and haunting audio collages to create this soundtrack for what could be imagined B-rate horror flick. Always relying on sturdy hip-hop grooves for its underlying structure, the record veers from perversely playful (the stony "Smoke," with its oddly-placed sample from Bill Haley's classic, "Rock Around The Clock") to outright eerie (the slow-mo dub debauchery of "Hybrid Sermon"). BILL JANOVITZ

Up Here (SpinART)

After 15 years of concocting blistering folk-rock gems in Boston's college rock trio Buffalo Tom, Bill Janovitz continues to give a voice to his more introspective side through his desperado solo albums. On *Up Here*, though, it's obvious Janovitz can never completely

separate himself from his group's shambling hooks and gruffly-sung choruses; as BT's singer/songwriter, Janovitz's signature aching vocals are as familiar and dependable as a hotel room air conditioner on a humid August afternoon. Though he has been working on many of these songs since his Buffalo Tom days, Janovitz felt that they were a bit too folky and countrified to do with the band. Hence, we get sparkling slide guitar on "Like You Do" and the heartbreaking duet of "Half A Heart," which pairs Janovitz with the breathy, Victoria Williams-style singing of Chris Toppin — a result that's as stunning as any old-timey Dolly Parton team effort. Paying homage to the simpler things in life — be it a gin and tonic or the comforting hum of the dishwasher — Janovitz proves that exceptional songwriting doesn't have to be complicated. — Jill Goslicky



NICK LOWE

The Convincer (Yep Roc)

The Convincer completes a sort of stylistic trilogy that Nick Lowe's been working on for the last few years. Like his previous albums *The Impossible Bird* and *Dig My Mood*, *The Convincer* takes comfort in the cool, blue light of vintage rock and country and all the soulful spaces in between. The English gent who

helped define new wave pop in the '70s and '80s may have a softer sound now (hey, the guy they once called "The Basher" turned 52 this year!), but his songwriting has rarely been sharper. Where some artists are inspired by new sounds and trends, Lowe seems to have struck a vein of gold in the past, hoping to make music that feels as warm — or as heartbreaking — as the likes of Otis Redding. His 10 original tracks fit seamlessly against the two covers, including Johnny Rivers' "Poor Side Of Town" (which Lowe gracefully saves from schmaltz) and "Only A Fool Breaks His Own Heart," which aptly sums up the album's beautifully bittersweet feel. — Steve Ciabattoni



Kurupt's professional career has had its ups and downs since he shone on two of the classic hip-hop albums of the early '90s (Dr. Dre's *The Chronic* and Snoop Dogg's *Doggystyle*). After the Dogg Pound's (Kurupt and partner Daz Dillinger) *Dogg Food* album

and two previous solo records, Kurupt returns with another "still-stuck-in-G-Funk" journey, making us realize just how much of today's hip-hop sprang from the L.A. of the '90s. *Space Boogie* is a solid record, slim on the production front but packed full of guest stars. Snoop Dogg sounds great on the musically and thematically self-explanatory "Bring Back That G Shit" (with Goldie Loc); Nate Dogg croons on several cuts, including the album's title track; Xzibit, MC Ren and Nate spit gallons of testosterone on "The Hardest Mutha Fuckas;" and Kurupt enlists whiteys Fred Durst ("Lay It On Back") and Everlast ("Kurupation") to milk as much crossover as he can. Add the lead single "It's Over" with a Jay-Z-styled glossy groove and you've got a better-than-decent album, and a good summertime head nod, no doubt.

What's your station's wattage?

1,900 watts

What's the station's motto?

"WQFS, Your Only Alternative."

What do you do to build your station's audience?

We are the best radio station ever, so that helps to build our audience. We also sponsor live shows on campus and people have been seen wearing our T-shirts in such far off places as Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

What was your most successful fundraiser?

We celebrated our 30th anniversary last year. There were dunking booths, a game where people threw eggs at cut-outs of Margaret Thatcher and Ronald Reagan, and former general managers gave speeches about orgies in the master control room.

Who are you most proud of bringing to the station to perform?

Jello Biafra came and talked for FOUR HOURS!

Are you on the air? What kind of show do you do?

I currently have two radio shows. The first is called "The WQFS CD Release Party." Every week I play two CDs that are new to rotation. My other show is a two-hour history of punk rock. The first half-hour is pre-punk up until 1976. The second half-hour is punk rock music from 1976-79. The third is hardcore, post-punk, oi!, and new wave from the 1980s, and the fourth is punk-influenced music from the 1990s up until today.

What's the most fucked-up thing that ever happened to you while you were on-air?

I used to do a show called "Tri-sanity." It was hard to listen to. Sometimes listeners would call us up and tell us that we were "fucking morons," but that only happened like three times. One time a lady wrote us a letter

offering sexual favors if we could tell her the name of a "hardcore house" song that some DJ named Nathan played over two years ago. We wrote "NATHAN" on a piece of paper and mailed it to her.

What's the worst line a promoter ever used on you to get you to play a record?

Sometimes promoters tell me a CD is "good" when in actuality it's not. That's a pretty bad line.

What's the best promo item you've ever received? The worst?

I don't know what the best promo item I have gotten is. The worst would probably be a signed copy of a bad CD. Note to musicians: if your CD is shit, your signature is not going to make it good.

What's the best use for a CD other than for storing music?

Storing computer files?

Does your station still play vinyl?

We still play vinyl. We have some really cool stuff, like the Negative Trend *Mercenaries* EP. I wish we had that Avengers LP. I've never seen that album for anything less than \$50. It's a tragedy that no one has re-released that album, because it's great.

Every station has that one old dude from the local town that's been doing a show since anyone can remember. Who is it at your station and what's their deal?

We have a lot of cool community DJs that have been around for a while. Probably the most eccentric would be Dean. Dean does a North Carolina beach music show. His whole show consists of two hours of beach music played only by North Carolinians.

What's your major?

I am a history major. Last semester, I wrote a 25-page paper on the mutual hatred shared by punk rockers and police in the U.S. in the 1980s. I got a B-.

If you could see anyone live (dead or living), who would it be?


