Talking It Over

Of great interest is the fact that every so often someone in the industry will come along with the statement, "This business owes me nothing."

Just the other day, in a general discussion, one of the younger executives in the field, who has been extremely successful these past few years, reported how he had started in this business with just a few pinballs back in 1934 and that when he looked back on his business picture and his growth in the industry he felt that the business owed him nothing.

In short, as he stated to those present, there did come a time when he loaned \$12,-000.00 to get ahead. This was for a purchase of new equipment in which he had much faith with the result that a route now judged to be worth approximately \$200,000 (cigarette and drink vendors as well as candy machines) resulted from this original \$12,000 loan.

Since then he has been engaged in the automatic music and amusement machine fields. He has been extremely successful in both these branches of the business and is now making amusements his leading division.

Being in the manufacturing division of the business at this time he has been able to look back on his start in the field with calm reflection and came to the decision, which he so stated during the discussion referred to, that, "This business owes me nothing."

This, too, is the case with most of the men engaged in this field who entered it prior to the past war. Most of the men are frank about the fact that the majority of their equipment has paid for itself many times over. They are also honest about the fact that they have earned much more than they could have expected to earn in any other business.

They will also admit that, considering everything, this business owes them nothing for, were they to think back to their start, what they have already earned for their time and effort and energy expended, they realize that the industry is one which assures many times its own investment as earnings.

It is therefore stimulating to listen to the conversations of those men who, being so close to the coin machine business picture, now admit that this is one business, come good or lean times, where they can realize a very fine percentage of profit on their investments.

And as those have been engaged in the field for sometime look back and reminisce over their many years in the business, over what their original investment was and what transpired since that investment was placed into their husinesses, they all come to the realization that the business, regardless of whatever conditions may exist at the time, is still the finest for obtaining a percentage of profits on each dollar invested that is far and above and beyond the conception of anyone not engaged in this field.

A lawyer who is now in the coin machine business stated, "I used to think when I made a deal that got me het'er than 10% return on my investment that I had made the greatest deal in all my career. Since entering the coin machine business I think of much greater percentage without even any thought regarding the size of this profit over the investment being made.

"In my estimation," he concluded, "this is, without any doubt, the grandest business in the world. I'm going deeper into it and seeking for new investments in this industry."

SALES UP

Buying Brisk as Fall Season Gets Under Way. All Divisions of Industry Report Better Business. Look Forward to Outstanding Fall-Winter Season.

Starting with the last week in August there has been a very noticeable sales lift thruout the entire industry. For a while the average buyer was hesitant as to whether he should enter into the Fall-Winter season of 1949-50 full blast or continue cautiously ahead.

But, with the cooler weather which entered the picture as September came into being, buyers cast caution to the winds, and the spurt which had started some weeks before gained momentum to the point where all now look forward to one of the most outstanding seasons.

Also heartening is the fact that all divisions of the field are enjoying brisker business than they have all during the past summer and even in Spring, 1949.

Shuffleboards continue to be among the leaders in the amusement field. It seems that there will be no stopping slaes in this division for sometime to come. The operators who have entered into shuffleboard operations are continuing to place more and still more of the boards. It seems that this division, because of continued promotion and the fact that tournaments are being discussed on a national basis, will continue to get tremendous attention from the trade.

The one development from the shuffleboards, the rebound games, have also begun to gain more adherents. These machines are winning friends among the players as well as the operators, and as new and novel ideas continue to be presented to the industry, there is now no doubt that rebounds are going to make their mark on the sales picture this Fall.

Pinballs continue their steady way onward. With the leading pinball manufacturers presenting some of the finest games they've ever yet built, and with the further fact that pinball has its special following among players everywhere in the nation, the games are sure to continue ahead at the very same steady clip which they are now enjoying and, perhaps, even show greater sales progress for the forthcoming months.

One-Balls have always had their followers, but, it took Bally's "Citation" to awaken the entire field all over again and since then the one-ball field has continued to expand. It is now winning more followers and the games are without any doubt the greatest ever presented to the industry. The one-ball market holds a unique position in the field and will continue to do so for this is one division where production of new games are held down to a minimum giving the operators plenty of time to amortize their cost.

Consoles, too, have won more favor of late. This past summer it seemed that the console business was just about over. Then, just as suddenly, consoles came back into favor and are gaining more ground every day. Manufacturers of these units report that the pickup which they are enjoying in business is, to say the least, extremely fine. Consoles have always been favorites of many leading operators. Those who have been able to get going with them in various territories are now buying more of these machines than ever before.

Bells have continued on their merry way enjoying some of the best sales in all their history. It is really remarkable to many in the field to note how bell business has continued climbing upward. Even this past summer, when many felt bells would fade down to a low sales point, surprise after surprise was noticeable as they continued to climb steadily upward in sales action. This Fall they have started off with a zoom that now seems to indicate the bells will again be among the leading sales factors in the field before the year is closed.

Arcade Equipment lost ground, but, not to the extent that some believed would happen. The Exhibit Dale Gun revived much of this field and some of the other products which can be classified in the arcade category also helped to stimulate interest. The arcades themselves proved to be the poorest buyers with ops outside the arcade business the better supporters for this type of equipment.

Automatic Music in all its branches enjoyed its first lift upward as August began to wane. Some of the manufacturers also reported that June, July and August were among their best months. This field gradually climbed back and is today once again beginning to assume the leadership which it held for many years. Tho many new merchandising plans are being presented the fact remains that the music business is going ahead much faster than anyone had expected with some of the largest distributing firms giving more of their time and attention to this division of the business.

Automatic Merchandisers also won much greater attention this year with Fall seasonal pickup already pointing to ever better sales. Cigarette vendors and automatic drink equipment continue leading the field, tho certain specialty machines, such as the women's hose vendors and others in like category have taken on a more important status in the field. The hot coffee, hot soup and other vendors of this type fell somewhat in sales. Multiple unit drink vendors picked up. Cigarette machines, as previously stated, continued their steady way forward with many ops replacing older equipment with the new type vendors: Prices remain high in almost every category and this, it is believed, has had a somewhat dampening effect on greater sales. Much new blood has entered the automatic merchandiser picture. It is believed that this will continue to be the case with the older ops replacing anywhere from 15 to 20 per cent of their machines yearly, but new blood will be the big factor in sales stimulation for the vending machine field.

The above short resume of what is happening in the field as the Fall season of 1949 gets under way gives some idea of what all can look forward to for the balance of the year.



Fresh wax by balladeer Buddy Clark should do well in the boxes, as Clark should do well in the boxes, as Buddy pitches his pipes to warble the refrain of "A Dreamer's Holiday" and "Envy." Top deck is a smooth ballad that has been widely recorded. Vocal work on the side, with a fem group added, is easy to take. The song is a hot one—this rendition should boom juke box play. The coupling has Buddy spooning "Envy," a plug tune that beckons some heavy silver. Buddy once again delivers an excellent vocal on the side, with the Ted Dale ork backing in splendid fashion. Music ops should, by all means, listen in.

"Toot, Toot, Tootsie" (2:28) "I Never See Maggie Alone" (2:55)

ART MOONEY ORCH. (MGM 10548)

Here's a two-sided winner if there ever was one! It's the Art Mooney ork, with a pair of tunes that are sure to catch an avalanche of coin play.

Top deck is the famed Jolson oldie, done up in wonderful vigorous manner, with a rousing choir vocal to top it off. Banjo, accordion and piano solos highlight the side, and add to the winning incentive found here. The the winning incentive found here. The flip shows just as much promise, and should be another Mooney moneymaker. This rendition of "I Never See Maggie Alone," done up in shuffle tempo with loads of banjo seeping thru, is certainly one of the best around. Music ops shouldn't miss this platter—it's sizzling hot!

"Stompin' At the Savoy" (2:48) "Stardust" (2:47)

JAN GARBER ORCH. (Cap.tol 57-731)

Pair of instrumental oldies with orkster Jan Garber in the drivers seat, setting up with "Stompin' At The Savoy" and "Stardust." Both tunes have long received wide popularity thru the years, and should continue to do so. This rendition, offered in sweet hand style is fair anough as it stands band style is fair enough as it stands. Music operators in the market for betthan average filler material might take a look-see in this direction.

"Careless Love" (2:58)

"Sing Me A Song Of Texas" (2:53) LEE MORSE

(Decca 25383) A platter that is currently receiving wice attention in music circles is this reissue by thrush Lee Morse titled "Careless Love" and "Sing Me A Song Of Texas." Lee's deep-throated warbling of the top deck certainly makes for excellent listening fare, and should be gree'ted with wide favor by music ops and fans alike. The gal's jazz intonation in her tonsils make this side glow. The tune is currently a hot one—this rendition should add to its popularity immensely. On the other end, Lee goes off on the deepend with an ode to Texas. The side hinges on the folk vein a bit, but nevertheless shows Lee's vocal style to perfection. Top deck for the moola. Doll" is a sure-fire bet to win an avalanche of juke box coin. Tempo of the tune is slow, with the lyrics rolling about in the romantic vein. It's a quiet simple ditty, the kind that make you stop and listen at-tentively. The smooth harmony of tentively. The smooth harmony of the group makes for relaxed mo-ments of top drawer listening pleasure. The side is one that is sure to be greeted with much fer-vor on the part of music ops and fans alike. On the other end with "I Want You To Want Me," the vocal team bounce back with still another great bit of music in this soft, romantic ode. Tempo is toned down and easy on the ears throughout the recording. Who'll Be The Next One" will wear white in the phonos—ops should climb aboard the bandwagon!

"If You Ever Fall In Love Again" (2:59)

GUY LOMBARDO ORCH. (Decca 24722)

The smooth melodic strains of the Guy Lombardo ork furnish the back-ground for the fetching echo of this ballad titled "If You Ever Fall In Love Again." Piper Kenny Gardner handles the vocal spot of this tender romantic ode in pleasing manner, to set the stage for some potential coin play. The song is one that should do well with the kids who love to cuddle —this rendition by Guy Lombardo is definitely one of the best around. On the other end with an oldie in "Whistling In The Dark," Gardner comes back once again to turn in another glowing performance. The Lombardo ork, always consistent coin cullers, are sure to earn their fair share of silver with this one.

"Thru A Long And Sleepless Night" (3:06)

Ditty is from the click pic "Come To The Stable" and as such, has garnered a wide audience. Take note of the plush background supplied by the Bob Farnon ork and the George Mitchell choir. On the other end with another production number in "A Thousand Violins," Vera keeps the tempo down and turns in another fine performance with this fetching ballad. We like the top deck-we're sure you will too.

Both sides should be well remembered by veteran ops. The maestro handles the lyrical expression on both sides, with the boys in the band coming thru in great style. Both sides echo brightly and should earn their fair share of juke box coin.

Ditty is rendered in straight vocal style, with the Harold Mooney ork flourishing in the background. The flip is a mellow show tune with good, romantic lyrics heating about the title. Both sides should do well in the boxes.

"Shawl Of Galway Grey" (3:03) 'When The Wind Was Green" (3:06) BOBBY WAYNE (London 509)

Balladeer Bobby Wayne makes his bid for phono fame with his first platter on London, and comes up with a pair of tunes that should notch a a pair of tunes that should hoten a featured spot in many a music operators machine. It's the top deck, "Shawl Of Galway Grey" that we go for. The song is a slow sentimental air, with Bobby purring the glowing lyrics in terrific voice. Bobby's vocal allure on this side should beam a bright spotlight on him in no time at all. The this side should beam a bright spot-light on him in no time at all. The coupling is another plush ditty that bears music ops avid attention. Take note of the wonderful orchestral back-ground on the sides by maestro Ca-marata. Music ops should keep their eyes peeled on Bobby Wayne—the kid is a winner!

ROSS LEONARD—EVELYN DOWNS TRIO (Mello-Strain 116)

A ditty that should garner some healthy juke box coin is this piece tagged "Violin," offered here by piper Ross Leonard. It's a fetching, tender piece—the type that you want to listen to time and again. Vocal work by Ross is pleasing throughout, with effective background music supplied by the Evelyn Downs Trio. The flip is a straight instrumental version of "Malaguena" that should hold its own on the boxes. "Violin" is the side to ride with—ops should get with it.

"Everything They Said Came True" (2:58)

"Crocodile Tears" (2:46)

EDDY HOWARD (Mercury 5325)

Hotter than a ten dollar pistol with a slew of wax hits, orkster Eddy Howard comes up with still another great recording in this rendition of "Everything They Said Came True." The song is a slow, infectious ballad, the kind that only Eddy can handle to extreme perfection. Eddy's hush-hush vocal style on this side is nothing less than sensational, and should have the many moon-in-June kids sighing deeply to this bit of music. On the other end with a light up-tempo'd tune, Eddy and the trio come back with "Crocodile Tears," a pleasing novelty tune that should do well. We like the top deck—get with it!

"Stumbling" (2:55)

"The Sheik Of Araby" (2:57)

BENNY STRONG ORCH. (Capitol 57-732)

Pair of oldies dressed up in bright style by the Benny Strong ork, and the refrain of "Stumbling" and "The Sheik Of Araby" in the offing for music operators. Top deck is a straight instrumental rendition, with Benny's sweet ork displaying their wares in excellent style. The coupling has the maestro on the vocal, with a band chorus joining in. Both sides should do more than hold their own on the boxes. Music ops take note.

"Strollin" (2:47)

"St. Bernard Waltz" (2:49)

EDDIE GIN MILLER (Rainbow 80077)

The sparkling piano of Eddie "Gin" Miller is shown to fair advantage on these sides titled "Strollin'" and "St. Bernard Waltz." Eddie's player piano antics make for mellow listening pleasure throughout the sides. Top deck has a vocal chorus to wail the lyrics in pleasing style. The flip is a tune that has been around some, and should be fairly well known to music ops. Both sides should do extremely well in the boxes—especially so in those tavern locations.

ED FARLEY

There's no mistaking this tune! It's the well celebrated "The Music Goes 'Round And 'Round," rendered by the fellow that penned the ditty. Maestro Ed Farley and his gang really lend themselves to this tune to come up with a must for

music ops machines. The tune is currently being revived, and this disk has already been received with wide fervor by music fans. It's a rollicking, happy affair, with a vocal chorus wailing the ever-loving wordage. Music ops will remember the sensational success this tune scored years ago—this rendition seems certain of catching on and going like wildfire today. On the other end with an instrumental arrangement of "Ida, Sweet As Apple Cider," the Farley ork bounces back with more great wax to keep the music merry and the platter hot. Farley rates a heavy round of applause for a pair of great recordings. Both sides are done up in royal fashion, with the top deck getting the edge. "The Music Goes 'Round And 'Round" is a winner—latch on!

"Shally-Go-Shee" (2:53)

"Ona The Tarantellona" (2:54)

DENNIS DAY (RCA Victor 20-3548)

● Songstar Dennis Day bounces into the vocal spotlight, with a pair of sides that should keep silver rolling into the boxes. Top deck, titled "Shally-Go-Shee" is a current plug tune that might prove to be a winner. Dennis handles the cute, light-hearted lyrics of this song in glowing vocal tones, with The Rhythmaires and the Charles Dant Ork backing him in splendid fashion. On the other end with a standard Italian folk theme that has always won coin, Dennis turns up with a sock rendition of "Ona The Tarantellona." Mandolin background flavors the side immensely, which should receive heavy play. Wax rates a spot on music ops machines.

ROSS LEONARD (Mello-Strain 114)

● More wax by balladeer Ross Leonard, and the set up of "What Makes You Think" and "I Won't Tell A Soul" in the offing for music operators. Top deck, with Ross joined by Dotty MacLean, is a light up-tempo side that makes for fairly pleasant listening. Lyrics weave around the title, with Ross and Dotty splitting vocal honors on the side. The flip switches to a slow tempo, and has Ross taking it solo on a melancholy tune. Both sides can be used by music ops as excellent filler material.

GEORGE SHEARING QUINTET (MGM 10530)

● There's no mistake about this one. Sure to rival the smash success the Shearing Quintet scored with "September In The Rain" is this latest waxing by the group tagged "East Of The Sun." It's the standard that scored so well years ago, offered here in the bright, sharp manner that George and his combo have. Mellow tinkling of the ivories combined with some wonderful vibe work by Marjorie Hyams is the high spot of the disk. On the flip, George offers an original composition in "Conception," and once again turns in a brilliant performance. "East Of The Sun" is the side to ride with.

"Canadian Capers" (2:38)

"It's Better To Conceal Than Reveal" (3:06)

DORIS DAY—DINAH SHORE (Columbia 38595)

Thrush Doris Day offers a cute one in this lyrical rendition of the now standard "Canadian Capers." It's a cute bit of wax that should sit well with Doris' many fans. Tempo is merry throughout, with a male vocal quartet adding to the splendor of the side. On the other end with a light novelty ditty, thrush Dinah Shore joins Doris to render some pleasing music in "It's Better To Conceal Than Reveal." Wax story is wrapped up in the title, with a wonderful Latin tempo seeping thru. The side has plenty of commercial possibilities and merits music ops attention.

"One More Tear" (2:50)

"Camp Meetin" (3:00)

LORRY RAINE (Serenade 500)

Pair of sides that might blossom forth are these done up by chirp Lorry Raine. Top deck, titled "One More Tear" is a light bouncy melody that makes for nice listening. Lorry handles the cute lyrics of the tune in effective fashion, with the Lew Douglas ork rounding out the side admirably. The flip, "Camp Meetin'," has Lorry back again in merry tempo, with a fond hand-clap and chorus vocal highlighting the side. Wax has winning potential—music ops should listen in.

"When The Train Came In" (2:57)

TERESA BREWER

Bright new star on the wax horizon really lays into a pair of sides that sparkle with loads of winning potential. It's chirp Teresa Brewer, loaded to the rafter with the stuff that adds up to top notch juke box play. Top deck, tagged "When The Train Came In" is a mellow up tempo piece, with Teresa handling the lyrics in excellent manner. The gal's jazz intonation, added to the tremendous amount of feeling she injects into her vocal, make this piece grade A wax. The flip has the lass switching to a slow torch tune that should do well. Top deck is hot—grab it.

"Mission Bells And Wishin' Wells" (2:55)

"Wishing Star" (3:08)

RUSS CASE ORCH. (MGM 10528)

Pair of sides that should hold their own in the phonos are these served up by maestro Russ Case. Wax, titled "Mission Bells And Wishin' Wells" and "Wishing Star" is a set of plush sides on the romantic vein. Top deck rolls in medium slow tempo with a fair enough vocal by The Quintones. Stuart Foster spoons the wordage of the flip, and turns in an effective performance. Both sides will make good filler material.

CHUCK FOSTER O. (Vocalion 55035)

• Chuck Foster and his gang step to the mike to offer their rendition of "You're So Understanding" and "That Lucky Old Sun." Both sides have been well recorded and should be fairly well known to music operators. Top deck has a vocal by Millie Coury and the Foster Threesome, who do a fair enough job. The flip has Lee Shearin warbling the strong lyrics of this current pop hit. Ops who haven't as yet caught the songs might listen in.

Ditty rolls along in sprightly tempo and features a set of lyrics that are sure to win wide approval. Vocal work is top drawer stuff from the very start, while a pleasing bounce tempo makes you keep time to the melody. The flip shows just as well, with Doles and the vocal combo back again in shuffle tempo to offer the pleasing refrain to combo back again in shuffle tempo to offer the pleasing refrain to "Choo Choo Bop." Spot piano tinkling, in addition to some wonderful infectious melody makes this side one for ops to get with. The platter is tailor made for the phono trade—ops should latch on!

"Ultra Canal" (2:53) "Two Wing Temple In The Sky" (2:56)

JOHNNY WIGGS and HIS NEW ORLEANS MUSIC (New Orleans 751)

Music tinted in the Dixie vein shows loads of winning potential, with Johnny Wiggs and his gang offering "Ultra Canal" and "Two Wing Temple In The Sky." Both sides should do well, especially so in those locations that feature this brand of music. Top deck whirls in slow tempo and has the group going thru their paces in splendid style. The flip picks up a bit, with a nice horn spot coming thru. We like "Ultra Canal"—we're sure you will too.

"Jealousy" (2:53) "The Sidewalks Of New York" (2:55)

TINY GRIMES' QUINTET (Atlantic 886)

Tiny Grimes and his gang come up with a pair of hot ones in this latest release tagged "Jealousy" and "The Sidewalks Of New York." Don't let the titles of the songs fool you—this rendition by Grimes is really unique. Stop tempo on both sides, added to some great sax and guitar work, make this pair the winners they are. It's the kind of wax that will need no urging—it'll spin night and day on the phonos. The disk rates a featured spot in ops' machines—get with it.

• The vocal styling of thrush Melrose Colbert is shown to excellent advantage on this duo titled "Without A Song" and "Take Me." Wax is not of the typical blues variety, and is especially suited to the quieter location. Music ops should listen in.

Both sides whirl in ultra hot tempo, with a long winded tenor sax solo by Bashful Bubber Brooks. Melody is easy to take and should sit well with the hep jazzophile crowd. Music operators who have room on their machines might take a look-see in this direc-

While the NCMDA voted to defer a plan for substantially increasing the size of the group by constitutional amendment, it left the way open for adding eligible members who qualify under the original requirements. Names of the six additional firms which applied for admittance were withheld pending action by the membership.

withheld pending action by the membership.

Meantime Dave Bond, of Trimount Coin Machine Co., Boston, NCMDA vice president and membership committee chairman, explained the recent action of the association in voting down an expansion plan which would have set an immediate ceiling of fifty members: The group now numbers twenty-six companies.

"A careful analysis of our position

members: The group now numbers twenty-six companies.

"A careful analysis of our position after a full year of operation convinced the members that the reason for our solidarity and strength was in the compactness of the group, identity of purpose and ability to take prompt and decisive action on matters of mutual concern. A blanket increase in membership, while it might not change that situation, could introduce more complexities and additional problems, whereas the introduction of new members individually could serve the dual purpose of offering a strong compact organization to the new members and at the same time recognizing these additional distributor companies as leaders in the field whose membership in NCMDA will be of real value in assisting us to attain the objectives for which NCMDA was founded."

NCMDA has not closed its doors to expansion, Bond emphasized, but simply voted to continue its present policy of proceeding deliberately in achieving its program. This program, he said, includes the greatest possible representation among key distributors, which in turn calls for adding members from time to time.

"It is the method rather than the speed of adding to our membership

"It is the method rather than the speed of adding to our membership which we determined by voting to continue our present membership policy," he added. "New members will be added as usual, on application and approval first of the membership committee and then of the entire roster of NCMDA."




