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COUNTRY MUSIC COMES BACK

Country music is again soaring in the record business.

It reached a peak a few years ago when almost everything coming out of Nashville was being covered by pop artists. Several of the nation's top smashes were developed in this manner. But then suddenly the transference of country music into the pop idiom began to decline and with the emergence of rock and roll even country artists took advantage of the new beat to try to achieve hits. The most notable example of the combination of country and rock and roll is, of course, Elvis Presley, who gained national stardom through his records in this medium.

However, today, country artists are attaining nationwide prominence by singing country songs in the accepted country manner. The main difference from the popularity that country music had achieved a few years ago is that now the country artists themselves are making the national hits instead of being limited strictly to the country field. Such examples of this are Sonny James' "Young Love", Johnny Cash's "I Walk The Line", and Marty Robbins' "Singing The Blues" which sold pop along with Guy Mitchell's version.

Another indication of the resurgence of country records is the announcement this week by Columbia Records of the inauguration of a new award, the "Gold Guitar Award", which will be presented to their country artists whose records reach 250,000, the equivalent of a million seller in the pop field. This should help to further publicize country music and the artists who sing it.

The revitalized country field gives the music business one more trend at a time when there is no one dominant trend. Of course, rock and roll is still winging merrily along and calypso is enjoying commercial acceptance and now country again is coming to the forefront. But in general it seems that songs today are being accepted on their merits without regard for particular trends. Under such conditions all types of music have a better chance.

We are happy to see conditions prevailing in the music business where everyone has an opportunity and we are particularly delighted to see that this environment has given country music a new popularity after it had been somewhat neglected for a number of years.

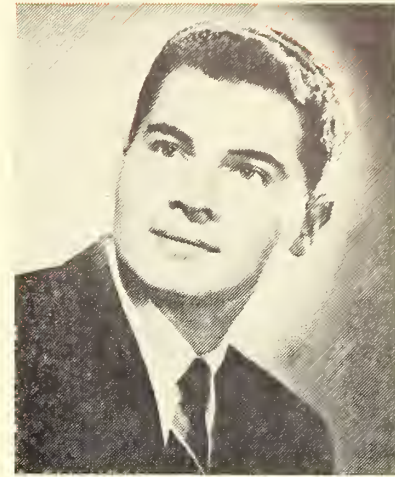

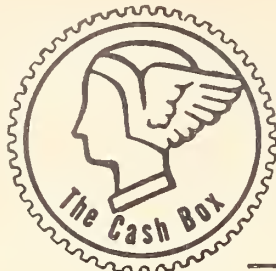

(Decca 30177; 9-30177)

B+ "PASSING BY (Just Passing By)" (2:58) [E. H. Morris ASCAP—Hilliard] Star country warbler Red Foley is in top form on this inspirational ballad aimed at both the pop and country market. Touching, mellow delivery of some pretty material. Jack Pleis and a chorus supply the background. Fans of the "Ozark Jubilee" will find this to their liking.

B "HIS ARMS" (2:50) [Skidmore ASCAP—Altman, Tobias] Another song which beautifully expresses the love of God is presented with sincerity and great depth by the vocalist. Wonderful coupling for those who admire Foley as a Sacred singer.

EYDIE GORME

(ABC-Paramount 9773; 45-9773)

B+ "I'LL COME BACK" (2:54) [Sheldon BMI—Rotfeld, Robbins] A lively jumper playing with the reincarnation theme is handled in spright and pleasant fashion by Eydie. Happy novelty dancers should enjoy.

B "IT'S A PITY TO SAY GOOD-NIGHT" (2:03) [Leeds ASCAP—Reid] Another up-beat romancer with an inviting lilt. Charming cutie on the light side.

PETER FANCIULLO

(Granada 984; 45-984)

C+ "CRAZY LOVE" [—Tuminello] The new Granada label introduces Peter Fanciullo on a smooth love song rendered with warmth and feeling. Inviting side.

C+ "WHEN YOU LOOK AT ME" [Leeds ASCAP—DePaul, Raye] Another soft, sweet love story chanted pleasantly by the songster.

LENY EVERSONG

(Coral 61782; 9-61782)

B+ "JALOUSIE" [Harms ASCAP—Gade, Bloom] A fascinating female song stylist makes a striking debut on Coral with a dynamic interpretation of a great tango standard. The lark's rich, husky voice creates some unique sounds on this great tune. Sensational stuff that'll flip the jockeys. Variety of tempos keeps the side swinging. Exciting throughout.

B "JEZEBEL" [Hill & Range BMI—Shanklin] The imaginative artist lends her refreshing techniques to another great latin favorite on this end. Potent performance with great drive. Both halves will get heavy play.

DOREE POST

(RCA Victor 20/47-6799)

B+ "WHO AM I" (2:35) [Constellation BMI—Post, Post] Doree Post, a gifted newcomer with a fragile, sentimental quality, bows on Victor singing a touching rock and roll ballad that could blossom into a big seller. Lovely melody, lyric and arrangement. Watch this one.

B "ROCK AND ROLL CALYPSO" (2:50) [Constellation BMI—Post, Post] The chirp joins together two of today's most popular musical forms and comes up with a catchy novelty. Strong initial coupling for the lass.

● With the Calypso trend moving so powerfully it was inevitable that one of those that showed any signs of strength would end up with half a dozen treatments. This is the case with "Marianne". The one that stepped out was the Terry Gilkyson version and immediately five other companies (at review time) issued their own versions. Originally a traditional tune, three of the records released were from lps that had already been on the market. They are the Edmundo Ros version on London, the Sir Lancelot treatment on Fiesta, and the Talbot Brothers etching on Audio Fidelity. New offerings cut in the wake of Gilkyson's "Marianne" are The Lane Brothers on RCA Victor and The Hilltoppers on Dot. The scramble for the big prize promises to be hot and unrelenting. All versions seem certain of grabbing a piece of the pie, but the big hunk of sales looms tremendous as the excitement around the tune grows. By the time this tune has run its course "Marianne" promises to be a pretty popular gal.

The flip side of the Gilkyson etching is "Goodbye Chiquita". The Lane Brothers back with a slow paced lovely, "Sogno D'Oro", that is delivered with warmth and pleasing qualities. Should get some action. The Hilltoppers couple with "You're Wasting Your Time", a swinging middle beat bouncer with a western-blues feeling. Easy to listen to side. However, on all six versions the side to watch is "Marianne", or "Mary Ann".

Draper does a fine job and is assisted in fine style by the Hugo Peretti Orchestra. The flip, "Should I Ever Love Again, is a cover of a current r & b item stirring things up around the country. Comes off well and could get good airplay, but we feel strongly for "Let's Go Calypso".

C+ "TAKE A GAMBLE ON ME" (2:19) [Daywin BMI—Escamilla, White] The Continentals, an obviously experienced group of performers, bow on the Key label with a good rock and roll ballad that should appeal to the younger set.

C+ "MEANWHILE BACK AT THE RANCH" (2:20) [Somerset ASCAP—Gilbert, Klass] Another rhythm rocker aimed at the teenage market. Cute novelty attractively fashioned. Interesting arrangement.

STUART FOSTER

B "AT A SIDEWALK CAFE" (2:56) [Mid BMI—Straining] Stuart Foster, a polished youngster with a wonderful voice, chants a beautiful love song in a Paris setting. Pretty romancer. Touching love story with a happy ending.

C+ "WISH I HAD A GIRL" (2:23) [Mid BMI—Straining] An up-beat lilter with charm is handled in a simple, inviting fashion by the crooner. Cute melody and lyric.

BENNY STRONG

THE FOUR PREPS

B+ "MOONSTRUCK IN MADRID" (2:37) [Criterion A S C A P—Poher] The Four Preps, an extremely polished quartet of youngsters who've been making noise with their waxing "Dreamy Eyes", could break nationally with this wonderful latin-tempo romancer. The boys have an ear-pleasing blend and some strong material to work with. Boys are gonna make the grade. This one may even be their first big side.

B "I CRIED A MILLION TEARS" (2:23) [House of Fortune-Quintet] Here the lads project on a pretty love ballad with a rock and roll flavor. More attractive harmony. The teenagers will soon discover this crew.

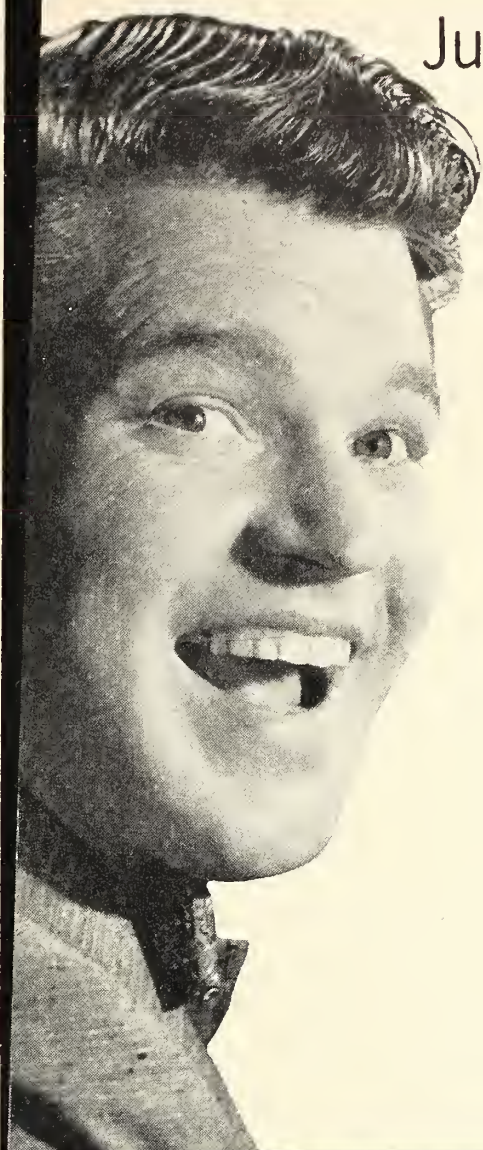

Enjoyable novelty; great for change of pace programming. Could break through.

B "I'M THROUGH WITH LOVE" [Robbins ASCAP—Malneck, Livingston, Kahn] The girls' own style takes the spotlight on this easy-going new shuffle beat rendition of a top drawer oldie. Charming romancer.

MICHAEL HOLLIDAY

B "THE RUNAWAY TRAIN" (2:30) [Shapiro-Bernstein ASCAP—Robinson, Massey] Deep voiced Irish star Michael Holliday debuts on Capitol with a delightful pair of novelties. This half is an attractive new treatment of a 1925 oldie that every youngster has sung in one form or another. Happy side that could be a big kiddie seller. Side has train whistles and a number of other cute gimmicks.

Karen Chandler on Decca does a delightfully lilting job on the beautiful melody. One or all of the above three versions will be a big hit. Joy Lane backs with an infectious quick beat bouncer, "Dum Dum". The Pon Tails couple with a quick beat, Neapolitan flavored, "Que La Bozena". A swinging novelty item with a happy feeling. Karen Chandler sings "It's An International Language" on the flip, an item in the Calypso trend. It's a happy little ditty that, based on the current strength of the Calypso and the effectiveness of the item might in the long run become the favored side.

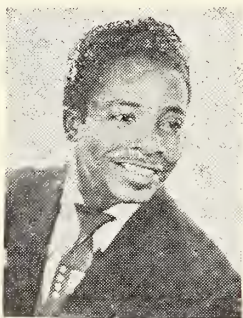

B+ "MOOD INDIGO" (1:35) [Mills ASCAP—Bigard, Mills, Ellington] The 88'er takes a break from the rinky-dink technique as he glides thru a smooth rhythm arrangement of a great Ellington oldie. String assist is heard in a few spots. Powerful coupling for jukes.

B "TROMBONE POLKA" [—Henry] The trombone takes the spotlight on this fun-filled, tune-filled polka penned and presented by Ray Henry. Joyous, resounding polka deck tailor-made for the jukes. Solid item for a house-party, too. One of the most inspiring polkas to come along in quite some time.

C+ "HORSEBACK POLKA" [—Pantaluk] Another joyous dancer with an excellent beat.

BUNNY BISHOP
(Crystalette 705; 45-705)

B "HELPLESS" (1:58) [Melo-Art ASCAP—Raskin, Frontiere] Bunny Bishop, a lark with a heap of talent, takes hold of a beautiful old tune and chants it with new lyrics. Stirring tango beat love song with great depth and meaning. Melody was popular many years ago under the title "Golden Wedding". Could make noise in its new form.

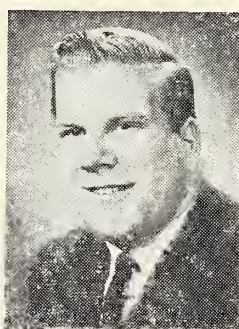

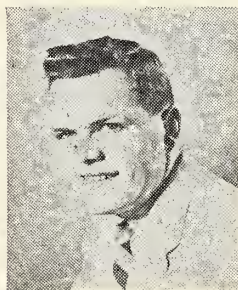

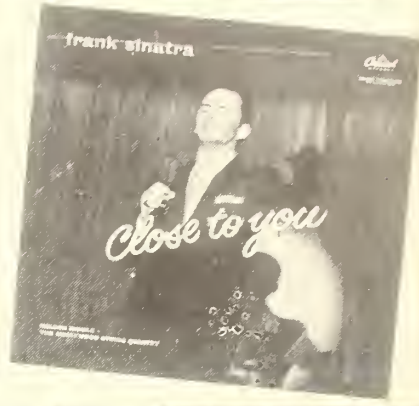

Capitol's First 1957 Album Release Intro's 28 Pkgs.

HOLLYWOOD — Capitol Records kicks off its first album release of 1957 this week with 28 new 12-inch LP's as it continues to merchandise its theory that "new albums are the life blood of the dealer's business."

In promoting its serious music packages, Capitol will feature its "29 All-Time Best Selling Classics" with full-color browser box cards, an extensive advertising schedule in both consumer and trade publications, and introduces full-color innersleeves for the first time in all of the new classical sets. (Last fall the company previewed full-color innersleeves in its new popular albums.)

Pop artists featured in the release are Nat "King" Cole, Jackie Gleason, Yma Sumac, Glen Gray, Dick Haymes, Ray Anthony, Pee Wee Hunt and Joe "Fingers" Carr, Four Freshmen, Joe Bushkin, a new Hawaiian music album presented by Webley Edwards, and a comedy album spotlighting such artists as Andy Griffith, Yogi Yorgesson, Harry Kari, Stan Freberg, and Johnny Standley.

Misty," each newly issued as one complete 12 inch LP album; "Ray Anthony Plays For Dancers in Love"; "Legend Of The Jivaro" with Yma Sumac and native accompaniment; "Sky-light Rhapsody," with Joe Bushkin, his piano and orchestra; "Moondreams" by Dick Haymes with orchestra conducted by Ian Bernard; "Casa Loma In Hi Fi!" featuring Glen Gray and the Casa Loma orchestra; "After Midnight" with Nat "King" Cole and his trio and featuring the solo instruments of Willie and Stuff Smith, Harry Edison, and Juan Tizol; and "4 Freshmen and 5 Trumpets," with orchestra conducted by Dick Reynolds. "Argentine Tangos" featuring the orchestras of Alfredo de Angelis and Osvaldo Fresedo (recorded in Buenos Aires), "German Schlagers," songs by Germany's favorite recording artists (recorded in Cologne); "Ongeltrouwd Man Kamer! (Bachelor Apartment)" with Dolf Van Der Linden, his strings and his orchestra (recorded in Holland); "Italian Popular Songs" by Luciano Virgili and Dino Olivieri's Strings (recorded in Italy); "My Paris" by Andre Colbert and His Golden Violins and the Colbert Chorus (recorded in Paris), and "New York Impressions" by Norrie Paramor, his strings and orchestra (recorded in London).

Promotion of the new popular albums includes an Album Preview package, consisting of two 12-inch LP's containing excerpts from the new pop merchandise, which has been serviced to radio and TV disk jockeys throughout the country for programming use; giant full-color display on all the new pop albums, special full-color winged display cards on Four Freshmen and "Pee Wee" and "Fingers," jumbo three-dimensional display on the new Bushkin album, full-color display on the three new C&W packages, advertising in such publications as Down Beat, Metronome, New Yorker, Saturday Review, and the music industry trade press.

Disk Jockey Council Asks Record Firms For Support

NEW YORK—The Board of Directors of the newly formed National Council Of Disk Jockeys held a meeting at the Park Sheraton Hotel last Sunday night (January 13) with representatives of various record companies at which the diskery execs were informed of the purposes and plans of the Council and were asked to provide it with a basic treasury.

Immediate reaction of the companies was mixed with some present indicating they would go along, others indicating they would have to think about it and still others expressing the opinion privately that the amounts suggested for donations was too large for them.

There were still other fears expressed by record men that if some companies did go along and others didn't the ones who refrained might find their records suffering in play across the country since the Board of Directors now includes some of the top jockeys in the nation and eventual membership is envisioned as including as many disk jockeys as possible.

In order to clear up these points, Murray Kaufman, president of the organization, held a private interview with the editors of The Cash Box last week. He explained that these expressed fears were entirely groundless because just as those who contributed would gain no business benefit from their act, so those who felt they were unable to contribute would certainly suffer no consequences. What Kaufman wanted to make crystal clear was that the Council was not hitting anyone over the head, that it was coming to the industry it was associated with for financing just as is common procedure in all other businesses. Moreover the amounts suggested for con-

tribution, which were made privately to the record company execs, were just that—suggestions. They were not demands in any sense of the word. Kaufman emphasized that a company which felt the cause was worthwhile and wanted to contribute could give as much or as little as it thought it could afford and each contribution would be welcomed no matter what amount it was.

Kaufman said also that this contribution would be to get the organization started. In all likelihood there would never be any further requests of the record companies. This initial amount was what is called "seed money" in charitable organizations, the amount of money necessary to get the organization off the ground. The amount requested was enough to keep the Council going for one year, by which time Kaufman feels permanent financing would be arranged. He also made the point that no one on the Council receives any salary or expense money and that as an incorporated charity, the Council's books are open for public audit.

The future plans of the Council are as yet unformulated. There have been numerous requests for the services of the Council but no subsequent project to the Hungarian relief phase has as yet been decided upon. As president, Kaufman has been making speeches before interested groups explaining the Council's objectives and is scheduled to make several more in the future. It was announced this week also that George Miller, president of the Music Operators of America had asked Kaufman to speak at the MOA Convention in Chicago May 19, 20 and 21 and that Kaufman had accepted.

A Hit Is Born

The contest called for the first baby named "Marianne" in 1957 to receive a Columbia Hi-Fi record player. Mrs. Hall first heard of the offer on Leo's afternoon show so he drove to Concord, N. H. hospital to present it.

RCA Victor To Issue "Aida" As Tribute To Toscanini

NEW YORK—Arturo Toscanini's recording of Verdi's Aida is scheduled for March release by RCA Victor as a memorial to the world famed maestro who died January 16th at his home in Riverdale, New York.

Major portions of the recording were taken from two broadcasts of the opera in 1949 with Toscanini conducting the NBC Symphony Orchestra. Not completely satisfied with some sections of the performances, Toscanini emerged from retirement in 1954 to rerecord these sections. It was the last recording session ever conducted by the maestro.

The cast includes: Herva Nelli, soprano; Eva Gustavson, mezzo soprano; Richard Tucker, tenor; Giuseppe Valdenigo, baritone; Norman Scott, base; Dennis Harbour, base; Virginio Asandri, tenor and Teresa Stich Randall, soprano. The chorus was under the direction of Robert Shaw.

The album originally was scheduled for release on March 25th as a birthday commemorative to Toscanini, who would have been 90 on that date.

Tributes to Toscanini, whose death resulted from a stroke he suffered January 1st, came from all over the world. President Eisenhower, who said: "As man and as musician he gained the admiration of the world. He spoke in the universal language of music but he also spoke in the language of free men everywhere. The music he created and the hatred of tyranny that was his, are part of the legacy of our time."

Toscanini's body was flown to Italy for burial at Milan, beside the graves of his wife, Carla who died in 1951 and his son Giorgio, who died at the age of 8. He is survived by a son, Walter and two daughters, Mrs. Wanda Horowitz and Countess Wally Castelbaron and a granddaughter, Sonia Horowitz.

Nola Leases Steinway Hall

NEW YORK—Inactive for about a year, Steinway Concert Hall this week received promise of new vitality with the signing of a long term lease for the premises by Vincent J. Nola, president of The Penthouse Sound Studios, Inc. and Nola Studios, Inc. Plans are being formulated for an exploitation program that will bring the concert facility back to its former eminence.

Gogi Grant Sues Era Records For \$150,000

HOLLYWOOD — Songstress Gogi Grant has filed suit for termination of her contract with Era Record Company and for \$150,000 damages from the company's owners, Herb Newman and Lou Bedell, her manager, Jack Morton, announced last week.

Miss Grant, who rose to fame on her recordings of "Suddenly There's A Valley" and "Wayward Wind", charged in her complaint that the defendants "betrayed and violated" their fiduciary duty to her by secretly procuring other record companies to make records of songs recorded and popularized by her. The Complaint, filed through attorneys Jerome B. Rosenthal, Samuel P. Norton and Robert G. Rifkind, alleged that the defendants made huge secret profits at Miss Grant's expense and have failed to account to her for all proceeds from her hit records.

The Complaint, filed in the Superior Court, also charged that Era Record Company obtained Miss Grant's consent to its contract by fraud and misrepresentations and refused to permit her to record any songs not owned by defendants Newman and Bedell. The Complaint demands \$100,000.00 actual damages and \$50,000.00 punitive damages.

Art Ford Takes Over

NEW YORK—Jerry Marshall, m.c. for WNEW-New York "Make Believe Ballroom" announced this week that he would leave the station after his Saturday, January 19, programs. Art Ford, now with WNEW, will take over Marshall's segments on Monday, January 21.

Said Marshall:

"After fourteen years at WNEW it has become clear that differences of opinion between me and the management of the station with respect to the programming policy of the 'Make Believe Ballroom' have made necessary a severance of my relationship with the station. I view this with a great deal of regret because of my loyalty both to the station and to my listeners. At the same time, I recognize my freedom from the rigorous demand of my present schedule will afford me greater opportunity for future broadcasting activity. I will announce my plans as soon as they are formulated."

"Make Believe Ballroom" has been one of WNEW's most commercially successful properties. It is reported that its revenue from sponsors is so large that the disk jockey assigned to the show is normally assured an income of about \$100,000 annually. Marshall's contract with WNEW still had six months to run but releases from the station made no mention of its disposition.

Ford became famous with the all-night disk show, "Milkman's Matinee", a show WNEW claims changed the listening habits in the metropolitan area and made the broadcasting industry aware of a nighttime audience of major proportions. His successful stint as an afternoon radio personality for the past two years convinced WNEW's management that he was the right man for the Ballroom job.

Other major program changes reported by WNEW are as follows: Bill Kemp returns to the WNEW mike after a while on the Broadway stage and before the television cameras. William B. Williams will take over the slot vacated by Art Ford from 4-5:30 p.m. Williams will continue to broadcast his "William B. Williams Show" from 9-11 across the board. Dick Shepard will take over the 7:35-9 p.m. slot. Shepard's growing popularity after a comparatively short stint with WNEW earned him this additional show.

All the new assignments will take effect Monday, January 21.

Decca Signs Three

NEW YORK—Decca Records this week announced three signings to its artist roster. They are Wingy Manone, famous trumpet player; Ray Lang and his Calypso band; and The Toppers.

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ABC-Paramount Buys Master of "Almost Paradise"

ABC-Paramount's attention was drawn to this disk by its distributor in Detroit, Henry Droz. Droz advised them that the Petty recording had caused much excitement in his area. Droz' outlet, ABC Distributing Co., had disposed of some 10,000 records in the first three days of distribution.

Newton stated that the initial pressing orders to the various AM-PAR factors on "Almost Paradise" far exceeds the press run on any previous orders for the diskery, with the possible exception of the company's current smash, "A Rose and a Baby Ruth," by George Hamilton IV.

MGM Drops Prices of EPs

NEW YORK—In line with EP price reductions announced by several other record companies, MGM this week announced its own new price levels.

Effective January 14 its price schedule will be as follows:

- One-pocket EP's will be reduced from \$1.49 to \$1.29.
- Two-pocket EP's will be reduced from \$2.98 to \$2.49.
- Two-pocket sound track EP's will be reduced from \$3.98 to \$2.98.
- Three-pocket sound track EP's will be reduced from \$4.98 to \$3.98.
- All regular three-pocket EP's will remain at the same price of \$3.98.

In addition, MGM announces that it will retain the 5% dealer return privilege on EP's. While MGM Records did not initiate the reduction in EP prices, they, nevertheless, recognize the fact that distributors and dealers may suffer inventory losses. To be of assistance in this respect MGM will offer a 10% discount on the new low prices of extended play sets up through February 15.



Album Reviews

"AFTER MIDNIGHT"—Nat "King" Cole And His Trio—Capitol W 782 (1-12" LP)

JUST YOU, JUST ME, SWEET LORRAINE, SOMETIMES I'M HAPPY, CARAVAN, IT'S ONLY A PAPER MOON, YOU'RE LOOKING AT ME, LONELY ONE, DON'T LET IT GO TO YOUR HEAD, I KNOW THAT YOU KNOW, BLAME IT ON MY YOUTH, WHEN I GROW TOO OLD TO DREAM, ROUTE 66.

The return of Nat "King" Cole to the Trio format, on this Capitol release, should greatly satisfy those who have longed for the Cole of the jazz school. As a pianist and vocalist, Cole has a smooth and imaginative touch that justifies his stature in the musical world. Aside from Cole's other two musicians (John Collins, guitar, and Lee Young, drums), four soloists (Willie Smith, alto sax; Harry Edison, trumpet; Stuff Smith, violin; and Juan Tizol, trombone) perform warm solo chores. Good bet for pop recognition: "Lonely One." This excellent effort could assume chart proportions soon.

"SONGS BY DOROTHY COLLINS"—With Barney Kessel Trio—Coral CRL 57106 (1-12" LP).

SOMETIMES I'M HAPPY; OUT OF THIS WORLD; YOU TOOK ADVANTAGE OF ME; HERE I AM IN LOVE AGAIN; I SEE YOUR FACE BEFORE ME; THE SKY FELL DOWN; WHEN YOUR LOVER HAS GONE; BUT NOT FOR ME; COME RAIN OR COME SHINE; GUESS I'LL HANG MY TEARS OUT TO DRY; IT NEVER ENTERED MY MIND; THE LADY'S IN LOVE WITH YOU.

The popular vehicle for the "Hit Parade" tunes, Dorothy Collins, has cut an impressive LP for Coral. Miss Collins, backed by the sensitive Barney Kessel Trio, is heard in a bill of 12 distinguished ballads. The thrush has a persuasive delivery that often enters the realm of jazz styling. Miss Collins' vast TV following will certainly welcome her in an intimate and refreshing light.

Stylist Kitty White, who in past recordings has confined herself mostly to pop ballads, enters the realm of the folk-song and songs with a folk flavor and comes off engagingly. Miss White delivers the material, that includes a number of haunting melodies ("If I Had A Ribbon Bow"), with warmth and understanding. Pete Rugolo and Hal Mooney have provided Miss White with a number of beautiful arrangements. Miss White's fans can catch her in some rare moments of vocal beauty here.

"WRITTEN ON THE WIND"—"FOUR GIRLS IN TOWN"—The Universal-International Orchestra Conducted by Joseph Gershenson—Decca DL 8424 (1-12" LP).

Decca has coupled the scores of the International Motion Pictures' productions of "Written On The Wind" and "Four Girls In Town." The former, a melodrama, has a score written by the late Victor Young. The title song, "Written On The Wind" is performed by the Four Aces. The Ruby Braff trumpet has taken part in a healthy amount of disk sessions and this release from ABC-Paramount has Braff's expressive jazz artistry in a clean, swinging form. Braff takes on most of the solo licks with some well thought out keyboard work from Dave McKenna. Excellent sound. Package is a dealer showpiece. Solid jazz work throughout.

"THE GEORGE WALLINGTON TRIOS AND SEPTET"—Savoy MG 12081 (1-12" LP).

TWINS; I'LL REMEMBER APRIL; HYACINTH; POLKA DOT; HIGH SCORE; JOY BELL; I DIDN'T KNOW WHAT TIME IT WAS; FINE AND DANDY; KNOCKOUT; IGLOO; FAIRYLAND; RACING.

With keyboard artist George Wallington as the head jazzman here, the disk has 10 sessions featuring trio performances and 2 work outs with a septet. ("Knockout" and "Igloo".) The fleet trio action switches drum work from Max Roach to Charlie Perry on "Fairyland" and "Racing". Included in the septet pressings are Kai Winding (trombone) and Gerry Mulligan (baritone sax). Standards and Wallington originals form the guides for these forceful, brightly arranged performances. Disk has a bevy of name value.

"VERDI AND TOSCANINI"—RCA Victor LM-6041 (2-12" LP).

From the memorable Toscanini broadcasts, Victor has assembled a program devoted to Verdi as performed by Toscanini, the NBC Symphony and various soloists (Jan Peerce, Zinka Milanov and Leonard Warren). One of the works, "Hymn Of The Nations," was taken from a World War II film of the same name, released by the Office Of War Information. The selections include overtures ("La Forza Del Destino," "I Vespri Siciliani" and "Luisa Miller"), the complete third act of "Rigoletto" and scenes from such early Verdi efforts as "I Lombardi" and "Nabucco," written in 1842 and 1843 respectively. With the exception of the "La Forza Del Destino" Overture, all the performances are from the 1940's. The sound holds up fine. Excellent opera coterie attraction.

RAVEL: Daphnis And Chloe (Complete Recording)—Antal Dorati Conducting The Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra—Macalester College Choir Of St. Paul—Ian Morton, Director—Mercury MG 50040 (1-12" LP).

This complete presentation of Ravel's "Daphnis And Chloe" ballet score is also available in a Deluxe Mercury package (50048). Antal Dorati and the Minneapolis Orchestra's beautiful reading of this delicate and sensuous score will undoubtedly win many more friends than it could have under the extra cost of the Deluxe edition.

MOUSSORGSKY: Sorochintsky Fair—Soloists Choir And Orchestra Of The Slovenian National Opera—Samo Hubard, Conducting—Epic SC-6017 (2-12" LP).

Epic has played an important role in bringing to the opera loving public previously unrecorded and complete versions of such noteworthy works as Prokofiev's "Love For Three Oranges" and Charpentier's "Louise." The latest effort in this line is Moussorgsky's comic-opera "Sorochintsky Fair," a work abounding in melodic enchantment and expertly presented by the members of the Slovenian National Opera. The two-disk package has been excellently recorded. Opera enthusiasts must, naturally, turn to Epic for the recorded version of the work. They should do so gladly.

Benny Goodman In Thailand

Zephyr Pacts 15 Movie Stars. Cuts Surprise Album

LOS ANGELES—Geordie Hormel, president of Zephyr Records, announced the pacting of 15 movie luminaries for a star-studded song album.

Rehearsals and recording sessions have been secretly in process for the past seven weeks, Hormel disclosed. None of the performers until now has been known as a singer. The vocalists are Debra Paget, Pat O'Brien, Eva Gabor, Marge and Gower Champion, Mark Stevens, Ida Lupino, Preston Foster, Corinne Calvet, Ricardo Montalban, Margaret O'Brien, Howard Duff, Rita Moreno, Eve Arden and Rory Calhoun.

Hormel said scores of actors were considered for the album before these stars were chosen. "I know," he added, "that both movie and record fans are in for a very pleasant surprise. Some of these people are capable of going into singing careers on their own and all of them are certainly good bets for musical comedy."

Hormel said that Zephyr set up a large budget for orchestrations to insure each star a top showcase performance. The album, to consist of 28 numbers, will be released in a package containing two long-play records. The idea for the album stemmed from Leo Guild, columnist for the *Hollywood Reporter*, who also recruited the talent.

Bill Hitchcock, Zephyr's music director who has been conducting the session, said he wishes the average singer would put as much time and effort into their work as these stars did. "Our greatest difficulty," he said, "has been in getting so many people to keep the project secret during rehearsal and taping."

Goldner-Kolsky Form New Label—"Roulette Records"

NEW YORK—George Goldner and Joe Kolsky, Ram, Gee and Tico prexies, this week announced the formation of a new label, "Roulette Records."

The new label will be a complete line in itself, issuing records for all fields and will eventually venture in to the LP market.

"The move became necessary," said Goldner, "when due to the influx of new talent that approached us it became necessary to set up a new company through which to record and release their efforts."

The first record has already made its appearance. Goldner and Kolsky outbid several companies for the Triple-D Records: "I'm Sticking with You Baby," by Jim Bowen and have released it on "Roulette." The Roulette offering is a completely new recording. The Rhythm Orchids were brought into New York and the side was re-recorded.

The Roulette line will be distributed throughout the country by the current Gee Records distributors.

Goldner also announced the signing of Joe Derashio as assistant A&R man. Derashio will assist with the sessions on Gee, Rama and Roulette and will also supervise the cutting of jazz dates. He was formerly mu-

sical director for Julius LaRosa and also worked for Norman Granz on the West Coast.

The four labels will now be promotionally represented in the South and Southwest territory by Mal Sundock, former deejay out of the Dallas-Houston area. Sundock will cover 15 states.

Republic Music Sells Master to Glory

NEW YORK—Frank Abramson, Republic Music, this week announced the sale of Willett Records' master of "Always Stay In Love With Me," by the Three J's, to Glory Records.

Phil Rose, Glory Records headman, outbid three other companies in a spirited battle, Abramson revealed.

Republic Music originally bought the song for exploitation and publishing from Willett about one month ago. Several weeks ago it started promotion of the record in several areas and it showed activity in a couple of spots, particularly Pittsburgh. The interest created resulted in the sale to Glory.

Shut-in Sees Presley Thru DJ



SHREVEPORT, LA.—As the result of a KENT disk jockey contest, a 24-year-old polio patient at Shreveport's Confederate Memorial Medical Center, Mrs. Betty Fields, met her favorite singing star, Elvis Presley, when he appeared here on the Louisiana Hayride. Mrs. Fields, who has been confined to an iron lung at Confederate Memorial since 1951, won the visit with Presley by writing a prize-winning letter to the Bob Elliott Show, heard over KENT, 9:00 to 10:30 a.m. and 12:30 to 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The contest was staged by all KENT disk jockeys with each selecting a winner to the question: "Why I would like to go backstage and meet Elvis."

Mrs. Fields is the mother of two children, Susan, age 6, and Ralph, age 5, in California with their grandmother. She was taken, by Elliott in an ambulance, to the State Youth Center where Presley appeared. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis supplied a portable respirator and a nurse, Mrs. Naoma Whittfield, and the police department furnished

an escort that stood by in case of trouble. Mrs. Fields, stricken when she was 19, and completely paralyzed from the neck down, sleeps in an iron lung at night but is able to get by with the aid of a portable respirator during the day. She will be in this condition for the rest of her life. In her prize winning letter to Elliott she wrote: "I would like to meet Elvis Presley because of my desire to meet THE MAN who has the rare talent of bringing so much enjoyment into everyone's life, especially mine."

Bob Elliott has been a disk jockey for the past twelve years and has been active in radio in four states, wrote, produced and directed all radio and television shows for special services in the Army at the fourth largest installation in the United States, for two years. At the time of the great Kansas flood of 1951, Elliott served as a special correspondent for the old Liberty Broadcasting System.

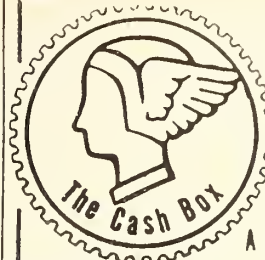

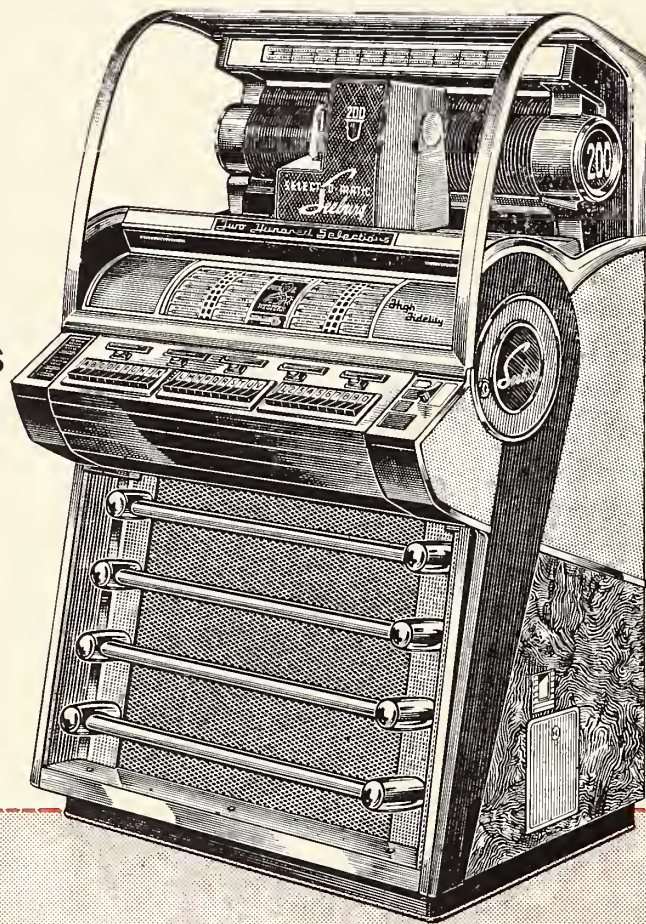

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Here and There

NEW YORK—Over the years, advertising methods and practices have changed to keep up with the times. However, the basic philosophy of successful advertising and promotion is still the same. John Wanamaker, the famous merchant, recently had some excerpts from his writings published. Here are several outlining his thoughts on advertising: He believed in continuous advertising—"I advertise all the time; I never stop advertising." He believed in truthful advertising—"If advertising were believed, and the goods of the value stated, stores would be twice as large and business twice as good." He believed in persistent advertising—"If there's one thing the quitter should let alone, it's advertising." He believed in day-in and day-out advertising—"Remember, it's the fine, steady rain that soaks." He believed that advertising should never be retrenched—"When times are hard and people are not buying is the very time advertising should be the heaviest. You want to get people in to see what you have. You must advertise to do that . . . but I believe in advertising all the time." He believed in aggressive advertising—"Competition will pound us hard, but let's see who can pound the hardest."

NEW YORK—Is dime play plus necessary? We note just one more reason. Prices of gasoline were advanced last week 1¢ a gallon in nearly all the United States east of the Rocky Mountains. The Standard Oil Company (Indiana) will make a similar advance thruout the fifteen Midwestern states in which it markets. The Continental Oil Company, which recently advanced gasoline prices by 1¢ a gallon in Texas and New Mexico, announced a 1¢ increase in Montana effective this week. Industry expects that with Esso Standard and Standard of Indiana upping the price, the price rise is expected to be met by other marketers.

DETROIT, MICH.—Many economists state that 1957 could be the greatest business year of all time. As an indication of what's to come, Ford Motor Company reported that more than a half million 1957 Ford cars have already been built and delivered—totaling more than a billion dollars. This is a new record for the company.

A Letter To An Operator On Why:

"10¢ PLAY PLUS"

George L. Rose, a Wisconsin operator, wrote *The Cash Box* as follows:

"I know the people that manufacture the games and juke boxes are making too much profit. "Reduce the price of the machines and we can stay on 5c play and make a profit."

"Dear Mr. Rose:

"I read your note, regarding the fact that manufacturers should reduce their prices, with very great interest. We, at *The Cash Box*, always like to answer everyone who writes us to the best of our ability.

"There is no doubt, Mr. Rose, that if prices could be reduced back to what they were even ten years ago, there might be a chance that some operators could get along profitably with 5c play.

"Since then, Mr. Rose, and from reading your own daily newspapers, you know how many pay raises have been won by labor. You also know that, as a result of last year's steel strike, this basic raw material of all industries went up \$10 and more per ton. And believe me, Mr. Rose, a ton of steel isn't very much steel.

"Even the U. S. Government passed a law for a \$1 per hour basic minimum wage this last session of the Congress. Living costs have risen accordingly. So has all overhead expense. As labor gets more, prices rise to meet the increases.

"I can only tell you that there are not very many satisfied manufacturers today. At least not as far as profit is concerned. They continued to absorb cost increases of raw materials and components to the point where they just couldn't break even.

"No one, as you realize, can long remain in the business losing money. Now they have to come up in price, because this year all of them are paying more for labor, for raw materials, for components and for everything else. As much as they will try to absorb, they will still be forced to raise prices to remain in business.

"The same is true for every operator. He, too, just like the grocer, druggist, tavern keeper and candlestick maker, has to raise his prices to remain in business. For over 14 years now this

publication has urged 10c play. Many report this has helped tremendously. But now, with the dime worth but 4c in purchasing power as inflation continues, the operator must make a change to see some profit.

"That is why *The Cash Box* once again came to the fore with a plan to help every operator in this nation. He simply must get front money and/or a more equitable commission arrangement.

"The location owner, at the utmost, expends only about 5% of his 50-50 gross intake for overhead expense. All he can charge to this is the use of electric current (when the machine is operating) and, if he so desires, the square foot cost of the space the machine occupies as against the rent he pays per square foot.

"But the operator, in turn, expends more than 40% of his share of the 50-50 gross intake, as overhead expense. Have your accountant check this for you, Mr. Rose. Therefore, the operator actually has to continue in business on 10% of the gross income from his equipment. No business in the U. S. can long continue on this basis.

"Check your grocer. He works on anywhere from 25% to over 100%. Check your druggist. He also works on this basis. Check any of the other businesses in your area and note what a gross they are working on to try and stay on in business.

"How can you, Mr. Rose, remain in business and show a decent return on your investment, on the time and energy you expend, on the entertainment and service you give, on 10% of the gross income?

"I'm very sure, Mr. Rose, that if you will check with any and all other businessmen in your community, including your own location owners, they'd laugh at you if you pointed these FACTS out to them. They would tell you that, 'It just can't be done.'

"And that's when you can get your locations to agree to change to: '10¢ Play Plus Front Money And/Or A More Equitable Commission Basis.'

(Editor's Note: The above letter was written to Mr. Rose. This letter did not include the fact that, were it possible to reduce machines in price to the level of ten years ago, Mr. Rose would find himself surrounded with competition from new part-time operators, as well as from new full time operators who would, as they have done so many, many times in the past, cut commissions and do everything else to obtain locations. This answer, in letter form, simply concerns itself with the facts as they exist today.)

GAMES BIZ DRIVING AHEAD

Many Believe This Division Can Regain Lead if Sales Continue at Present Pace. Report Ops Ordering New Equipment in Good Volume

CHICAGO—If this present sales pace, which started during the '56 holiday season continues on for the months to come, there is no doubt, a great many believe, "that the games field can regain the volume and dollarwise sales lead over all other divisions of the industry."

Since the beginning of the '56 holiday season the games business started booming and has continued unabated. Many engaged in the amusements field are, themselves, very much surprised at the sudden turn to the most expensive equipment.

"But", commented one well known amusement games leader, "the fact remains that the games, regardless of the price, are bringing in more money and that means more profit to the operators."

He, like many others, believes that the games field has every opportunity to recover "in a great big way and take the lead it had for many years for top sales".

Others are of the belief that, if

the amusements field takes the lead again, "it will mean better profits and progress for all concerned for all operators are using amusement games as the items to help them meet payments of all other types of equipment."

This used to be the case in past years and probably is the case today, according to those who are supposed to know what is happening with operators in various sections of the country.

"Amusements are today's answer for greater progress for all the operators," reports one well known leader.

"What's more", he adds, "with the games business driving ahead as fast as it is today, there is no doubt that all will profit accordingly and that the entire industry will be more capable of handling whatever financial load it assumes."

Music May Enjoy Its Best Year In 1957

Modernization of Routes Being Stepped Up as Distributors Offer Top Trades to Remove Old, Wornout Phonos. "10¢ Play Plus" Also an Important Factor For Modernizing Routes

CHICAGO—Reports have been filtering thru from various leading music distributors to the effect:

"The automatic music business may enjoy its best year during 1957."

The major reason for this statement, according to many who have made it, is that, "distributors are trading away up high to help operators modernize their routes".

The claim is that leading distributors everywhere in the country have taken cognizance of the many reports which have appeared in this publication and, adding these to their own observations, have agreed that they can "help business at this time by helping the operators to get rid of old, wornout phonographs."

Many of these distributors are also of the belief that "the average operator wants to rid himself of scarred, scratched, wornout, dirty phonographs, just as *The Cash Box* has reported, and by trading high, we can help the operators to modernize their routes, thereby enjoying better income while all the industry benefits".

If this attitude on the part of leading distributors continues there is no doubt, as the claim goes, "that business is bound to enter into its biggest sale volume during 1957."

Manufacturers are also reported to be backing distributors to do whatever they possibly can to rid all areas of old, wornout, screechy, scratchy phonos "to benefit the industry public-relations-wise".

A concerted sales effort in this direction is bound to zoom sales to a new high point for the year and this means better business for all concerned.

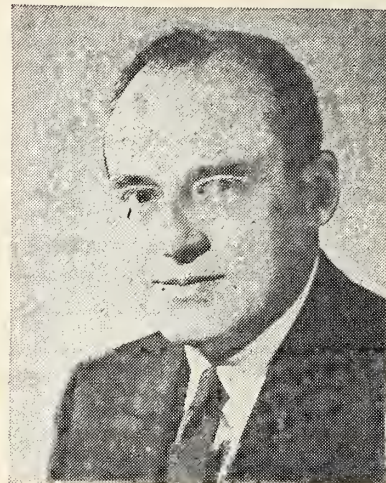
Another important element that has entered into the modernization program for many music ops is the fact that they want to not only switch to dime play but also to a more equitable commission arrangement.

"To do this", as one well known operator points out, "we have to introduce the latest model phonographs and, we believe, this always helps us to change to dime play and a more equitable commission basis.

"At the same time", he adds, "as we bring in new machines we move the later models down one step to the next most profitable locations, so that all around we can arrange for a better percentage basis."

With both these factors at work, distributors trading high and dime play on a more equitable commission arrangement in view, there is no doubt, according to leaders, "that the music industry can enjoy its greatest year during 1957."

Manufacturer Supports "10¢ Play Plus Plan"

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH. — John W. Haddock, president of AMI, Inc., this city, advised this past week:

"I am more than willing to place my name in support of efforts to promote both 10¢ play and, in addition, the improvement of arrangements between operators and location owners by means of more equitable commission arrangements, front money or guarantees."

Haddock points out that operators, today, are giving locations tremendously improved service. Service which, because of the many improvements made, costs the operators much more money.

"The service being rendered by today's juke boxes", Haddock stated, "properly programmed and serviced, as they are by conscientious operators, has tremendously improved both in variety and quality from what was possible a few years ago.

"Consequently", he continued, "operators deserve, and are economically entitled to, a better deal.

"This is, of course", he concluded, "desirable from the standpoint of manufacturers, such as ourselves, that operators should be financially strong and healthy."

15c, 2/2 Game Play?

CHICAGO—This probably comes as no surprise to many amusement games operators.

There has been much discussion here, because of the higher prices of some of the present bowling games, as to whether operators should arrange for 15¢, 2 for 25¢ play action for these machines.

There are many operators here who are of the belief that the larger and better known amusement alleys will get 15¢ from the players.

"Compared to actual bowling", one operator said, "the new bowling games are so realistic that the players are thrilled with the fact that by playing our games they become better bowlers.

"Costs for bowling on any lanes around town have gone up tremendously", this operator continued, "and since so many of the players class our new bowling games in the same category, there is every reason to believe that they will pay 15¢ per play, 2 plays for 25¢."

Changing over to this type of play action, according to mechanics and engineers, is not as easy as it sounds. Today, with slug rejectors as standard equipment, a complete new chute has to be developed to handle dime and nickel, three nickels and also the quarter as well as variables of a quarter so that the players get what they pay for when they play 15¢ and 2 for 25¢.

As manufacturer's sales managers here have stated, "We'll be happy to meet this request if the operators want 15¢, 2 for 25¢ play.

"But", they added, "they'll have to give us the necessary time to arrange for such coin play action."

"Juke Box Derby" TV Show To Start Feb. 9, Emanating From L.A.

LOS ANGELES, CALIF.—George A. Miller advises that the California Music Merchants Association's sponsored Television Show will go on the air for the first time on Saturday evening, February 9, over Channel 2, emanating from this city.

The TV show will be known as "Juke Box Derby", and will be televised between 7 and 7:30 PM. each week. Miller states that the services of a nationally known Master of Ceremonies has been retained, as well as the services of Buddy Bregman's Orchestra.

"This television show, which will be seen thruout the entire State of California in the very near future," said Miller, "promises to become a national venture before the end of 1957."

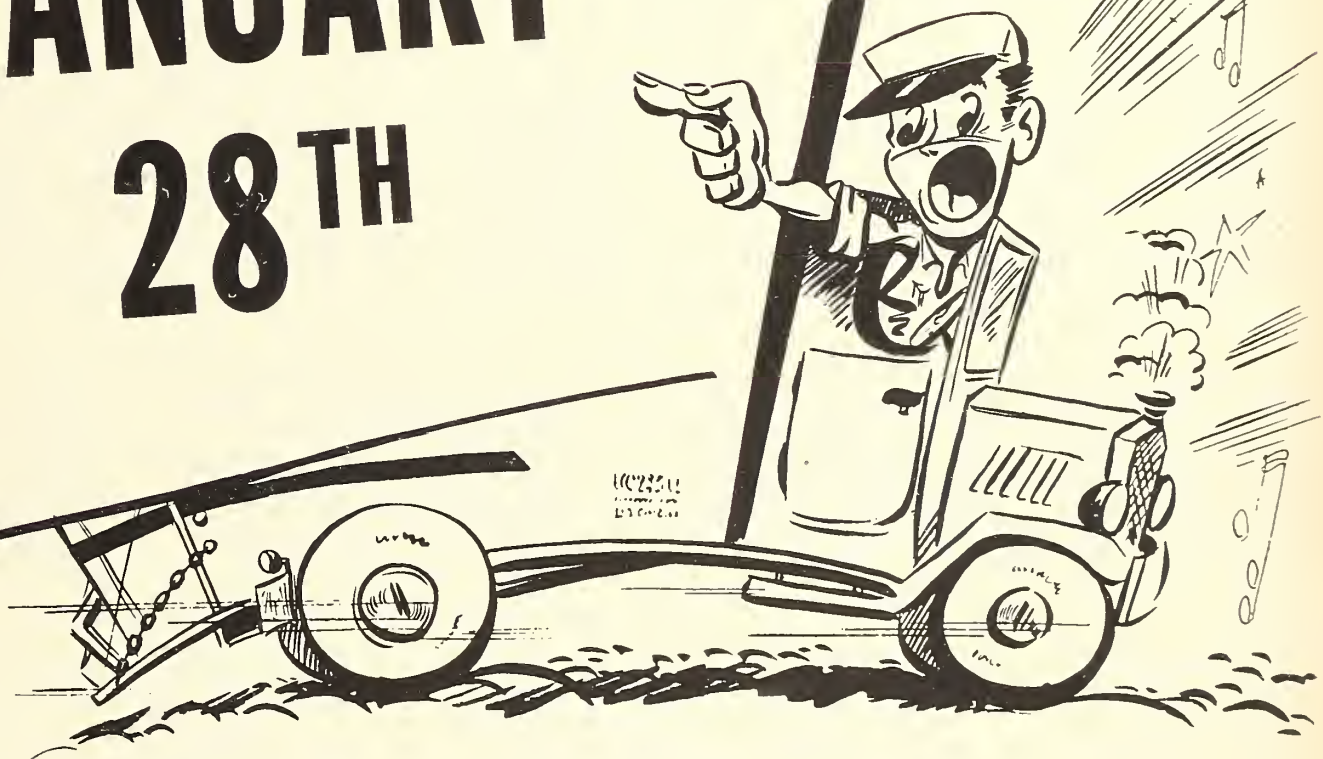

Delbert Conley of Cerro Gordo, Ill. is of the opinion that 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission basis is best.

Seward S. Price of Barboursville, W. Va. agrees that 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission basis is the answer.

Ed Devinger of Mt. Pleasant, Ia. is also a believer in 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission basis for operators.

Robert L. Holt of Salt Lake City, Utah, believes in 10¢ play plus \$5 per week front money.

Will L. Barrett of Shawnee, Okla., agrees with Holt.

John M. Sullivan of Detroit, Mich. believes that ops should adopt 10¢ play plus 60-40 commission basis. Eugene Zigmond of Cheyenne, Wyo. is in full agreement with him. So is E. G. Dowe of Beaver Dam, Wisc. So is Jack S. Marshall, Jr. of La Junta, Colo. So is B. T. Smith of Colorado Springs, Colo. So is Richard Bates of Telkwa, B.C., Canada.

George Ellis of Vancouver, B.C., Can., advises, "We have been on 10¢ play since 1953. The first in British Columbia." He now urges all operators to get on 10¢ play plus \$15 per week front money.

Stanley Berk of Detroit, Mich. urges operators to change over to 10¢ play and a 60-40 commission basis.

Stephen T. Shy of Milwaukee, Wis. believes that operators should get either \$10 per week front money or work on a 60-40 commission basis.

Howard N. Ellis of Omaha, Nebr. urges 10¢ play plus 70%-30% commission basis.

A. Somers of Logan, Utah, is for 10¢ play plus \$5 per week front money.

Milton A. Pritts of Denver, Colo., urges all ops to use 10¢ play plus \$15 per week front money. "Especially on Mills Panorams", Pritts advises.

Bryan E. Edwards of Douglas, Wyo., believes in 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission basis. So does Ben B. Korte of Glendale, Calif.

Ken C. Shyvers of Seattle, Wash. believes that 10¢ play plus 75%-25% commission basis is the answer. "But", adds Shyvers, "most important of all, and to protect every operator as well as the entire industry, a legal franchise' should be immediately arranged."

Colorado Op Features Sliding Scale Incentive Plan

COLORADO SPRINGS, COLO.—Perhaps one of the most elaborate and yet, one of the most ingenious plans, yet presented since The Cash Box proposed that all operators of amusements and music adjust to: 10¢ play plus front money and/or a more equitable commission basis, is that of B. T. Smith of The Music Company, this city.

"I have used a sliding scale on locations with good success", advises Smith.

"By using this", he explains, "it leaves more up to the location. In other words, a good location might get 50% and a poor location only 25% commission.

"But this will make the poor location", he reports, "work hard to get more money in the machines so that this location, too, can get a bigger cut."

Smith then goes on to elaborate on the sliding scale method he uses. He advises,

"This might vary on music machines, depending on the number of wall boxes, speakers, etc., the operator has in the location.

"Some locations", he says, "where a lot of such equipment is placed, should be started off with 50%-50%

only on \$80 per week or more.

"Locations that gross \$60 or more per week, 50-50.

"Locations that gross \$50 to \$60, 60-40.

"Locations that gross \$40 to \$50, 70-30.

"Locations that gross under \$40, 75-25."

Smith also suggests that operators can use this sliding scale:

"50-50 where locations gross more than \$60 per week.

"55-45 where locations gross \$55 to \$60 per week.

"60-40 where locations gross \$50 to \$55 per week.

"65-35 where locations gross \$40 to \$50 per week.

"70-30 where locations gross \$40 to \$45 per week.

"75-25 where locations gross under \$40 per week."

He also offers another sliding scale where operators are using older equipment.

"50-50 where location gross is \$50 or more per week.

"60-40 where location gross is \$40 to \$50 per week.

"70-30 where location gross is \$30 to \$40 per week.

"75-25 where location gross is under \$30 per week."

Canadian Ops Report Their "10¢ Play Plus" Methods

CHICAGO—Most surprising has been the fact that Canadian operators have been using 10¢ play plus front money and more equitable commission bases.

W. A. Cox of The Pas, Manitoba, Canada, reports:

"We find that 10¢, 4 for 25¢ play, is the least objectionable. It is also the easiest to institute.

"There was a small kick", Cox continues, "the first week we put this into effect. Then nothing was heard.

"At 4 for 25¢ play", Cox explains, "it is only about 6¢ per play. But the average player, of whom 80% are between 13 and 30 years of age, will insert a quarter before he will put in a dime. This ups the total.

"The average coins", Cox says, "in a \$100 collection is \$70 in quarters and \$30, or less, in dimes.

"Certainly", he advises, "dime play is the answer with machines at \$1,600 in Canada."

But Cox does not stop here. He plans ahead to \$5 per week front money and a 60%-40% commission arrangement. He advises that it "is pretty hard to keep relations good if more is taken, unless", he adds, "there is a large installation of wall boxes."

Richard Bates of Telkwa, B. C., Canada, has the following to report:

"We operate on 10¢ play and have devised a 60%-40% commission basis with all locations.

"We have found this to be entirely satisfactory", he adds, "even though our territory is widely scattered and laced with next to the poorest roads."

Bates concludes with, "We found that 5¢ play was slowly dragging us under."

London's Phono Ops Assn. Shows Growth

LONDON, ENGLAND—Tho as yet far from the membership the organization would like to be able to report at this time, the Phonograph Operators Association of this city, is enjoying steady growth.

C. H. Jones of Bal-Ami, London, is Chairman of the association and Gordon Marks of the Phonographic Equipment Company, Ltd., London, is Vice-Chairman.

Temporary headquarters of the Phonograph Operators Association is at 290/296, High Road, Ilford, Essex, England.

Reports indicate that the organization would like to be in position very soon to be able to challenge the Royal Performing Rights Society and also

the Phonographic Performing Rights Society on payment of royalties.

The Royal Performing Rights Society receives three shillings per week from each operator (about 42¢) and the Phonographic Performing Rights Society receives one shilling, sixpence, per week from each phonograph (about 20¢).

This is a total payment from each phonograph here of about \$32.24 per year.

The operators here hope to encourage all phonograph ops thruout the British Isles to join in with their program to help eliminate this payment.

At the same time, many believe that, by coming together as an association, other problems will also be cured.

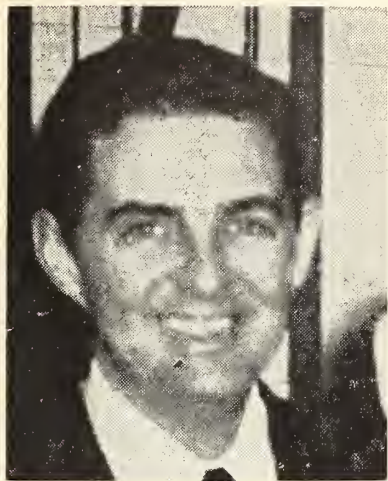

"It's What's in THE CASH BOX That Counts"

Lack Of Cooperation Blamed For Inequitable Commission Bases

CHICAGO—Many operators who have written in regarding the fact that their areas are, as yet, on an inequitable commission basis, blame this on the lack of cooperation among the operators.

One man wrote in to advise that he had started out with front money when he changed his machines over to dime play, but that other operators who had heard of this immediately tried to obtain his locations by offering the former 50-50 commission basis without front money.

"The result was", he advised, "that though we did not lose the locations we did have to withdraw the front money plan which we had instituted and which had met with the approval of the locations to begin with."

Other ops claim that placement of machines, especially in top spots, and in most cases new machines, on a small rental basis, has upset entire routes with the result that the operator who rents the machines can't make any progress and keeps all others from progressing.

One operator advises, "If the majority of the operators here would only get together and stick to their word, we would easily be able to obtain front money or a more equitable commission basis."

It seems that many operators have gone ahead on their own with good salesmanship and have been able to arrange for legal lease contracts with locations whereby they enjoy dime play as well as front money over a period of years, especially where they have installed new equipment.

One operator reported in this regard, "After trying for a long time to get the others here together with our firm, we just gave up and went ahead on our own.

"We arranged a legal lease contract and got our locations all signed up for a period of from three to five years with \$15 per week front money.

"Since then", he advises, "other operators in this area have followed suit. But", he adds, "many are still holding out and, believe it or not, these are the men who are crying the most about lack of profit.

"They won't cooperate", he says, "and yet they'll cry everytime we see them about how they're losing money. When we offer them copies of our contract they take these and later on, as we have learned, they'll throw them away.

"It's just a sad thing that so many people in this industry don't realize that when they install a brand new and expensive machine that they should obtain an equitable percentage for themselves.

"We certainly want to compliment your publication, 'The Cash Box', for pointing the way out for us and others here. Keep up the good work. These slackers will just simply have to fall in line or go broke."

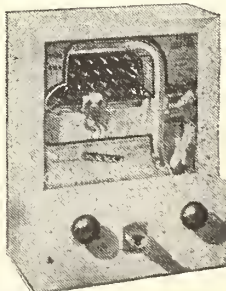
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Western Mass. Music Guild's Xmas Party

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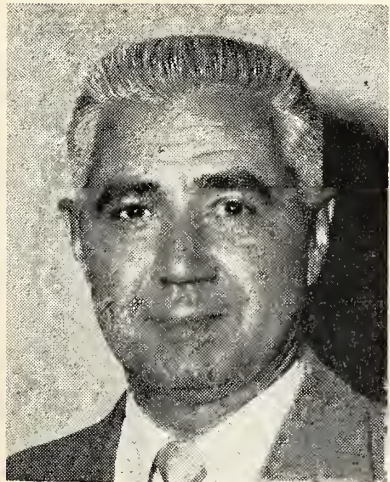
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CIAA Points Up Reasons For Operators' Associations

CHICAGO—In a bulletin mailed this past week to members of the Chicago Independent Amusement Association, Sam Greenberg, president, submitted to operators here the following statement made recently by the United States Chamber of Commerce:

"Trade associations are an inherent part of the American Democratic system. They provide a medium through which all firms—from the smallest to the largest—in any business or industry may join forces and work together for their common good.

"In any line of business, the bene-

fits of association action, such as increased efficiency, improved products, better marketing, elimination of un-economic restrictions and practices, are reflected throughout the entire business community, and ultimately are passed on to the customers of business.

"The Chamber strongly urges upon American businessmen, continued support for and participation in the work of their respective trade and industrial organizations."

Greenberg stated that, although CIAA has made great progress in the past year, some operators fail to realize and understand the benefits and values which come from unity within an industry.

These operators, he asserted, are very happy to reap the benefits which are accomplished for them by the Association, such as with Legislation, Licensing, etc., but ignore their obligations toward the group which brings about these benefits.

Greenberg called for 100% cooperation of every Chicago operator, and suggested that this could be accomplished if every one of the membership sent in his dues immediately.

He concluded by urging "each and everyone to act now, so that by the 15th of January, our Association will represent and speak for all of the operators within our industry."

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Price Lists" acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business, and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics. These buyers will purchase machines "as is" at prices quoted by the trade at large and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.

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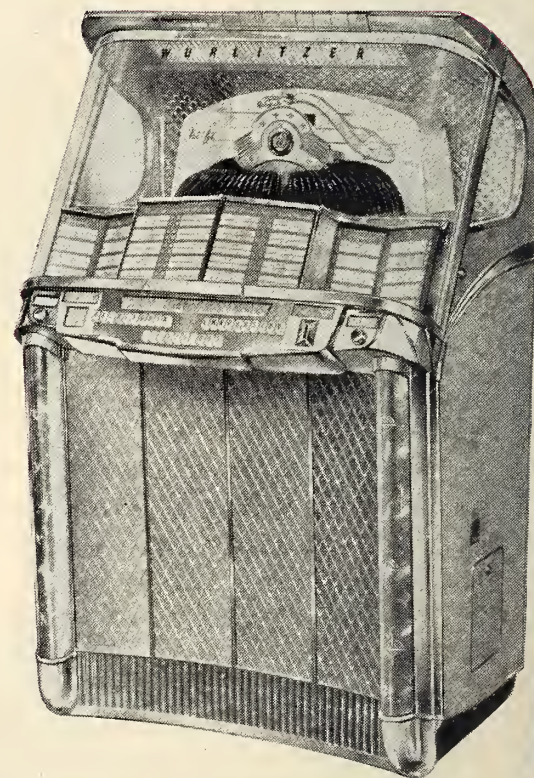
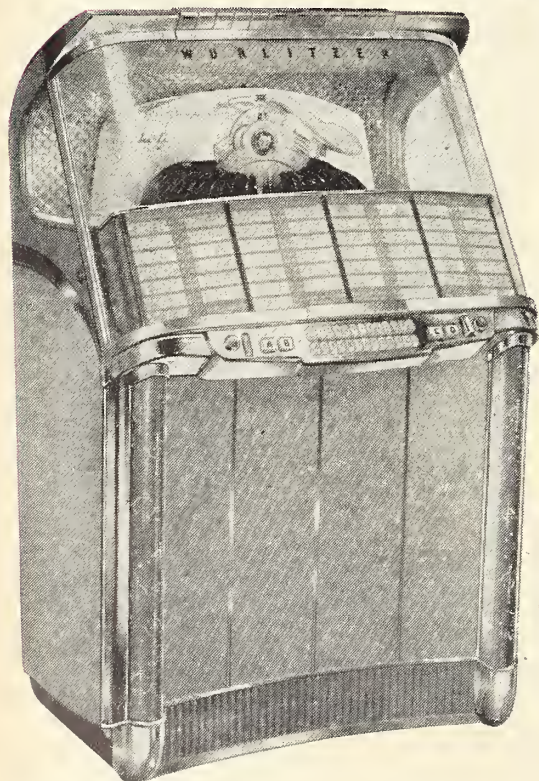
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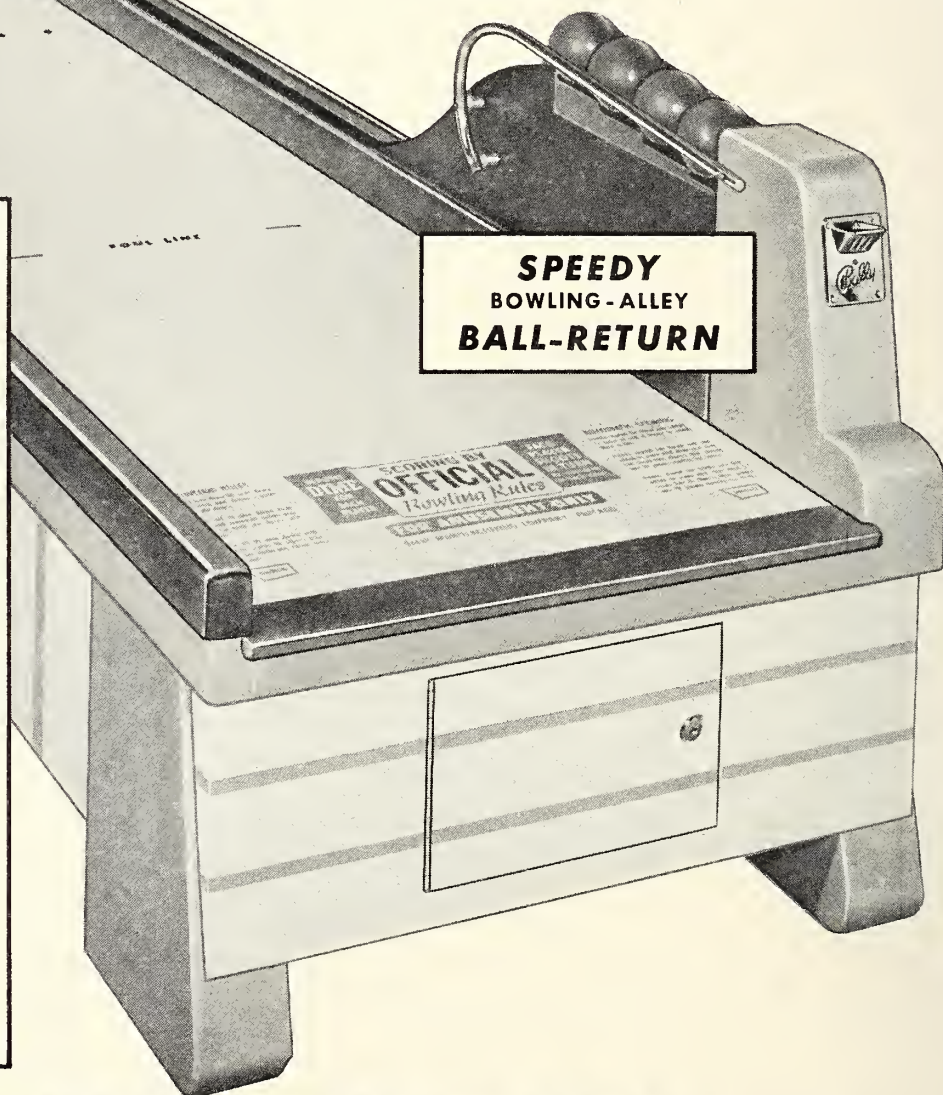
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
