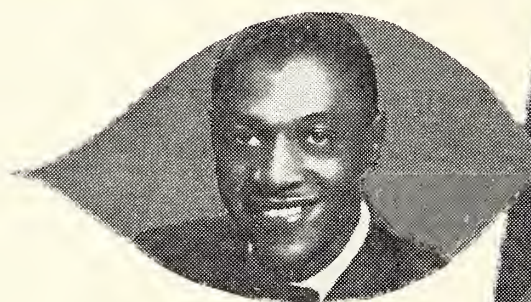

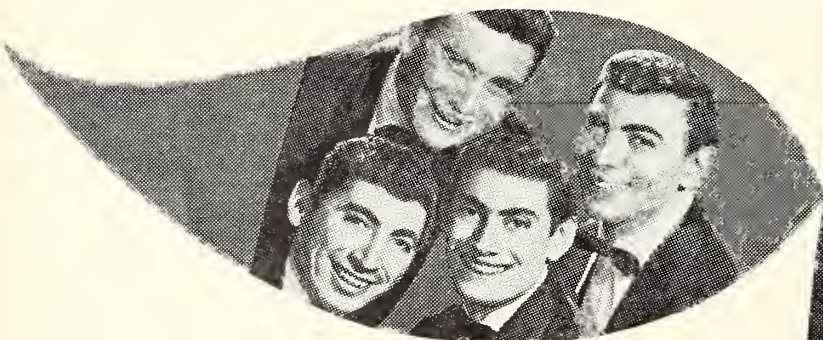

ALBUMS

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It's an astounding fact, but true, that album sales today account for 60% of the popular record market.

This tremendous upsurge in packaged goods sales has taken place in a comparatively short time—the last couple of years—and has found record companies large and small taking a new look at their merchandising methods.

Whereas formerly companies put the vast majority of their efforts into the single field and thought of albums as a nice base to have, today the thinking obviously is to develop the album business and if a pop single hit should come along also, that would be fine. Don't misunderstand, we're not saying that record companies are neglecting single records. That would be quite shortsighted of them for the gravy still lies in a pop single hit. But most companies are putting efforts into the album field which they never expended before. Firms which had a large album catalogue have enlarged it tremendously and other firms, which in previous years would not even have thought of issuing albums, are now bending every effort to create a strong catalogue themselves.

A measure of the seriousness with which album merchandising is being attacked is the development of the jacket in recent years. Today almost every company issues albums with four-

color jackets and art work which is knowingly designed to sell.

In addition, various dealer plans have stimulated interest in albums among the retailers themselves and have made them highly aware of the profit to be had from such sales.

Adding to the increased public interest in albums has been the general price reduction which has taken place in the last few years. Albums have come within the reach of almost everyone price-wise. So much so that only last week two double record albums came into *The Cash Box* Best Selling Pop Albums list. This means that among the top 25 albums in the country are two which the public has paid twice the price it would normally pay for an album. It's obvious therefore that today albums are priced to sell to a mass market.

As far as albums are concerned, the future couldn't be brighter. All sorts of projects are in the planning stage for albums which will continue to hold the public's interest and capture the huge public which has not yet become buyers. Naturally, singles will always be with us and most companies will continue to strive to capture that elusive single hit, but albums today play, and will continue to play, an increasingly important part in the entire pop record picture.

B+ "THE FLIRT" (3:03) [Kassner ASCAP—Silver, Alfred] Monia Liter, a gifted newcomer to the London label, makes an impressive debut with a delightful musical portrait of a flirt. Extremely colorful, light-hearted instrumental novelty with a soft-shoe tempo. Refreshing side that could do big things in the next few months.

B "BLUE FANDANGO" (2:30) [Kassner ASCAP—Coslow] An attractive latin rhythm backdrop showcases the string-filled aggregation on this flowery romancer. Lovely melody.

ANITA ELLIS
(Epic 9204)

B "MAN WITH A HORN" (2:58) [Crystal ASCAP—Lake, Jenny, de Lange] Anita Ellis, a highly talented lark with an exciting jazz sense, comes up with a strong single release that should boost her up the stardom ladder. Potent material by a voice jockeys will enjoy. This gal will make the grade.

B+ "FORBIDDEN FRUIT" (2:19) [Hill & Range BMI—Sherman, Sherman] The canary gets an exciting guitar-filled rock and roll background for her multiple voice belting of a commercial jumper. Good beat that swings. Guitar accompaniment is sensational. Looks like a smash.

THE FABULOUS McCLEVERTYS
(Verve 10029)

B "DON'T BLAME IT ON ELVIS" (2:28) [Antilleane BMI—Manning] Verv guns for a share of the hefty Calypso business with a clever novelty about the much publicized pelvic shake of Elvis. Side has a powerful beat and a swinging sound. Boys should do well with this one.

C+ "TICKLE, TICKLE" (1:55) [Antilleane BMI—Manning] Another colorful Calypso ditty with an authentic quality. Cute lyric should get laughs.

CONNIE BOSWELL
(RCA Victor 20/47-6813)

B "JAPANESE SANDMAN" (2:22) [Remick ASCAP—Egan, Whiting] Connie Boswell bows under the Victor moniker with a wonderful and charmingly simple new version of a classic oldie. Pleasant arrangement.

B "GIANNINA MIA" (2:45) [Schirmer ASCAP—Friml, Harbach] The veteran songstress works on multiple tracks for this catchy rhythm treatment of another top drawer standard. Colorful new arrangement jockeys will be spinning often.

DAVID CARROLL ORCH.

B "L'L STEEL BAND" (1:59) [Geo. Pincus ASCAP—Lampert, Gluck, Jr.] Some clever instrumental work is displayed by David Carroll's ork as the crew glides thru a happy novelty with a steel band sound, so popular today in Calypso music. Cute bouncer with the chorus joining in, occasionally.

B "CUDDLE UP A LITTLE CLOSER" (1:56) [Witmark ASCAP—Harbach, Hoschna] A charming soft-shoe beat treatment of a wonderful oldie, is presented in a warm, reminiscent manner by the Carroll men. Arrangement features sound effects of the sand-shuffling, soft shoe dancer of old.

Currently riding in the disk derby's top three with his smash waxing "Don't Forbid Me," and with a dozen previous hits under his belt, Pat offers a superb new two-sider that should follow in the footsteps of his other record breakers. For his millions of fans who enjoy the rhythmic Boone, Pat jumps thru an excellent up-beat love song tagged "Why Baby Why." Superb rocker with a potent vocal performance that'll flip the kids. Top notch teenage material. The companion piece "I'm Waiting Just For You" displays the crooning Mr. B. with a lovely multiple track, shuffle-beat love song. Tender, sentimental blues tune with great potential. Another double-barrelled smash for the youngster.

they present it in winning fashion on their latest Mercury waxing. It's an exciting rhythm, opus with a great beat and a number of terrific gimmicks sure to have the kids hopping. Titled "Little Darlin'," the tune is a commercial swinger out the rock and roll field. The boys' cover treatment is far and away their best effort to date and it should be up on the charts in a matter of days. The latin tempo, the bass voice recitation plus the wailing chants of the tenor all add up to a top drawer performance. Flip "Faithful And True," has the quartet blending warmly on a tender love ballad. Top portion is the one to watch closely.

● The amazing Mr. Haley continues to shatter records on his tour outside the U.S. In Australia he wowed 'em and had them begging for a return visit. In England he's

playing to sell-out audiences and seems to be one of the hottest performers to visit the isles to date. For his American fandom, Haley introduces another sizzling two sieder that should have the kids hopping around the clock. "Forty Cups Of Coffee" is a wild, rafter-shaker with that inimitable Haley drive from start to finish. Swinging arrangement of a tune that rode the R & B charts for a number of weeks in '56. This one should make the pop lists in short order. Equally exciting is the companion deck "Hook, Line and Sinker." Another torrid rocker with driving guitar, bass, drums and sax. Haley's international following will flip over this twin threat.

ART MOONEY ORCH.

B "DONKEY GOT DRUNK" (2:36) [Hampshire House ASCAP—Rivera, Stride, Manger] Ray Rivera and the Cloverleaves handle the vocal duties on a pleasant calypso ditty colorfully styled by Art Mooney's ork. Happy cutie that should make noise in today's market.

C+ "I NEVER HAD A WORRY IN THE WORLD" (2:12) [Hampshire House ASCAP—Morehead, Kent] Mooney and the chorus bounce thru a light, happy ditty with a charming old fashioned flavor. Good community-sing deck.

JUDY HOLIDAY

B "FULL OF LIFE" (2:37) [Columbia Pics ASCAP—Duning, Quine] The lovely title song from a new flicker in which Judy Holliday is starred, is tenderly handled by the versatile star. A chorus assists Judy with a warm background. Touching side that could make the grade after the pic hits the local theatres.

C+ "THESE WILL BE THE GOOD OLD DAYS" (2:23) [General ASCAP—Fulton, Steele] The comedienne glides thru a corny ear pleaser set to an inviting soft-shoe beat.

MITCHELL TOROK
(Decca 30230)

B+ "PLEDGE OF LOVE" (2:10) [Lin BMI—Redd] Country songster Mitchell Torok gets a pop backing on an exciting new tune that has a winning sound and will appeal strongly to the pop market teenagers. Lovely melody with a commercial beat and a top notch arrangement. Watch this sleeper. Could make a big splash in the next few weeks.

C+ "WHAT'S BEHIND THAT STRANGE DOOR" (2:16) [Trinity BMI—Moore, Davie, Reid] Torok offers a sequel to the recent hit "Green Door." Via a cute new tune with the same beat and a similar arrangement, he tells what went on behind the "strange door." Pleasant ditty that'll garner dee jay play because of the gimmick.

JOHNNY DEE

B+ "SITTIN' IN THE BALCONY" (1:57) [Bentley BMI—Dee] Colonial, the label to introduce "A Rose And A Baby Ruth," has another contagious item with great teenage appeal. This one features Johnny Dee with a guitar filled jump ballad. It's a catchy ditty with some clever lyrics about a guy and a gal smooching in the balcony. Kids'll love it.

C+ "A-PLUS IN LOVE" (2:40) [Bentley BMI—Dee] The songster does a fine job on another of his own compositions. Rhythm romancer.

DEAN MARTIN

B+ "THE MAN WHO PLAYS THE MANDOLINO" (2:55) [Fred Raphael ASCAP—Bergman, Keith, Fanciulli] A wonderful new Italian flavored romancer from the MGM flicker "Ten Thousand Bedrooms," is excellently fashioned by the warm, bubbly voice of Dean Martin. Touching song about the mandolin player who's always winning a girl for another guy; but he has no gal of his own. Lovely ballad that could develop into a big one for Martin.

B "CAPTURED" (2:09) [Bourne ASCAP—David, Carr] The warbler gets a good latin beat assist on this emotional love tune. Moody love story with a dramatic lyric.

(Decca 30236)

B+ "HAVE YOU EVER BEEN LONELY" (2:33) [Shapiro-Bernstein ASCAP—DeRose, Brown] Decca Records comes up with an exciting new find—the Jaye Sisters. The gals have a wonderful style and a smooth, exciting harmony which comes over beautifully on this easy-going revival of a top oldie. Watch these kids. You'll be hearing them often.

B "BLACK, BROWN, OR BLUE EYES" (2:16) [SongSmiths ASCAP—Girard, Marsala] The larks display their versatility on a catchy interpretation of a good rock and roll beat ballad. Pretty tune.

WERLY FAIRBURN
(Savoy 1509)

B "MY HEART'S ON FIRE" [Crossroads BMI—Myers] Country songster Werly Fairburn, currently a member of the rockabilly association, belts out an exciting rock and roller that swings. Solid teen stuff.

C+ "SPEAK TO ME BABY" [Crossroads BMI—Myers] Another free-swinging rhythm opus tailor-made for the teensters who like their music for dancing.

COUNT BERNADINO & CALYPSO KNIGHTS
(Mardi-Gras 1031)

B+ "10 RUM BOTTLE" [—Traditional] The Mardi-Gras label, best known for its many hits in the cha cha-mambo field, joins the calypso fold with an exciting, fast-moving traditional excellently fashioned by Count Bernadino and his boys. Wild beat and delivery. Commercial stuff that could break.

C+ "HOME COOKIN' MAMA" [Anteana Music—Manning, Smith] The pace is slowed up a bit for this catchy calypso novelty colorfully styled by the boys. Two solid sides with an authentic sound.

EDDIE COCHRAN
(Liberty 55056)

B+ "SITTIN' IN THE BALCONY" (1:57) [Bentley BMI—Dee] Eddie Cochran makes an exciting debut on Liberty with a catchy rhythm romancer about a guy making love to his girl in the balcony. Solid new rhythm item aimed directly at the teenager. Potent version that'll bite off a share of the sales melon.

C+ "DARK LONELY STREET" (2:20) [Simon Jackson BMI—Cochran, Capehart] A sentimental ballad is chanted by the deep voiced songster on this end. Side has a folk flavoring.

LES BAXTER'S ORCH & THE NILSSON TWINS

B+ "RAIN ON MY WINDOW" (2:21) [Kahl BMI—Abrams, Reid] Les Baxter's orch and chorus supply a light and colorful instrumental backdrop for the Nilsson Twins' cute delivery of a sentimental romancer. Catchy arrangement of a tricky melody. Potent item to watch.

B "I DANCE WHEN I WALK" (2:07) [Criterion ASCAP—Hoffman, Manning] A cute cha cha beat accompanies the larks on another light and catchy romantic novelty.

● Every now and then, an outstanding, almost poetic recording with a narration set against a sumptuous choral-orchestral background, hits the record scene with great impact. "Shifting, Whispering Sands" and "Melody of Love" were two such recordings to make the grade in recent years. The latest waxing in this category—destined to hit the charts—is David Carroll's tender presentation of a number called "The Ship That

Never Sailed". Carroll's strings and chorus supply a beautiful showcase for the moving, poetic recitation by Franklin MacCormack. Penetrating performance we'll be hearing often. Dee jay programming will feature this side regularly. Flip is a slow, waltz-tempo version of the evergreen "I Love You Truly". Chorus offers a warm, lyricless vocal. Top half sounds like a big new hit for '57.

● David Seville, who attracted considerable attention from disk jockeys with his superb treatment of "Armen's Theme," offers an outstanding follow-up that should have no trouble outdoing the maestro's initial click. The beautiful new opus has a short and simple moniker, "The Gift." It's an enchanting love theme beautifully interweaving the sound of a guitar in the foreground set against a hushed choral backdrop. At mid-point, the chorus takes the spotlight, harmonizing brilliantly on the enchanting theme with tender love lyrics. Sounds like a winner. Coupling, "The Donkey And The Schoolboy" is a light and infectious bouncer with whistling and a happy-go-lucky lyricless vocal by the chorus. Charming novelty. Keep a close watch on the upper portion.

His name is Paul Evans, an 18-year-old lad who bows in with a wonderfully commercial technique, cleverly employed on an exciting up tempo novelty. The tune is dubbed "What Do You Know?" and features the songster in a happy mood telling the listener about all the neighborhood romances, in answer to the tune's title question. Clever lyric with great teenage appeal. And the beat is tops for bopping. The coupler, "Dorothy" stars the guitar-strumming lad on a tender name tune with a romantic story line. Top deck has the edge. Paul Evans is here to stay.

The lark, who makes her debut on the label this week, has a powerful piece of material to work with and she handles it in top form. Titled "My Heart Has A Mind Of Its Own," the tune is a dramatic, heart-rending love story tearfully portrayed by the talented youngster. The song is aimed directly at the teenagers and just can't miss the bulls-eye. It's got the rock & roll beat the kids want. Bottom deck is a good jump item tagged "Lover Boy." Carol will make noise with the top deck.

B+ "40-20-35 POLKA" [—Dana, Dana] A raucous polka novelty with a cute title is happily pranced thru by Walter Solek and the orchestra with a male vocal in the spotlight. Good juke fare.

B "YES, YES, YES, POLKA" [—Dana, Dana] Another high stepping dancer full of life from the onset to the conclusion. A vocal is again featured.

GENIE PACE
(Jade 103)

B "STORYLAND" (2:15) [Donrey ASCAP—Benskin, Schoeman] Newcomer Genie Pace makes a strong showing as she lends her rich, polished voice to a pretty ballad employing the lines from a number of nursery rhymes as lyrics. Good, fish-beat tune that could catch.

C+ "A KISS IN A BOTTLE" (2:18) [Catawba BMI—Goodman] The canary picks up the beat on this half and jumps thru a cute rhythm ditty. Good dance deck.

B "SIESTA" (2:20) [E. B. Marks BMI—Manning] With the nation so Calypso conscious, GNP issues a coupling of cute Calypso novelties from Josephine Premice's LP of such tunes. Cute item that could catch on in today's market.

Director Of New Popular
Album Department

NEW YORK—The appointment of George Avakian as Director of Columbia Records' newly created Popular Album Department, has been announced by Goddard Lieberson, president of the company.

Avakian will head a department consisting of Paul Weston and Lowell Frank on the West Coast; Irving Townsend, Nat Shapiro, Al Ham and Calvin Lampley on the East Coast.

Lieberson pointed out that although Avakian is best known in the record industry as a Jazz Artist and Repertoire producer and authority, he has also achieved extraordinary success as a producer of popular material. It was Avakian who developed Columbia's program for a 12-inch popular 'LP' catalog. The major portion of this catalog has been recorded under Avakian's personal direction.

Associated with Columbia Records since his undergraduate days at Yale University, Avakian joined the company in 1946.

2 Volume Dorsey Tribute
Released By RCA Victor

NEW YORK—As a memorial to Tommy Dorsey, RCA Victor this month released a special two-volume "Tribute to Dorsey." Both albums contain Dorsey classics which previously had not been released on long play records. The 32 numbers chosen span the recording history of Tommy Dorsey on RCA Victor records from 1936 to 1946. This tribute is being released in two separate single-record volumes rather than in a two-record package.

Volume I includes four numbers by Dorsey's famed Clambake Seven, a jazz group he used at dances, concerts and recording dates. Such numbers as "Rhythm Saved the World," and "You're a Sweetheart" are presented by this group. Big band arrangements of "Liebestraum" and "Loose Lid Special" are also featured as well as a vocal on "Everything Happens To Me" by Frank Sinatra

In Volume II Frank Sinatra is heard on five numbers, Jo Stafford contributes two vocals while Connie Haines and arranger Sy Oliver sing one song apiece. Many collectors' items, such as "March of the Toys," with its muted trumpet passages, and "Chloe," are offered on this disk. The liner notes list the complete personnel for each number. Such names as Bunny Berigan, Charlie Shavers, Ziggy Elman, Buddy Rich, Dave Tough, Bud Freeman, and a host of others, are represented in the volumes.

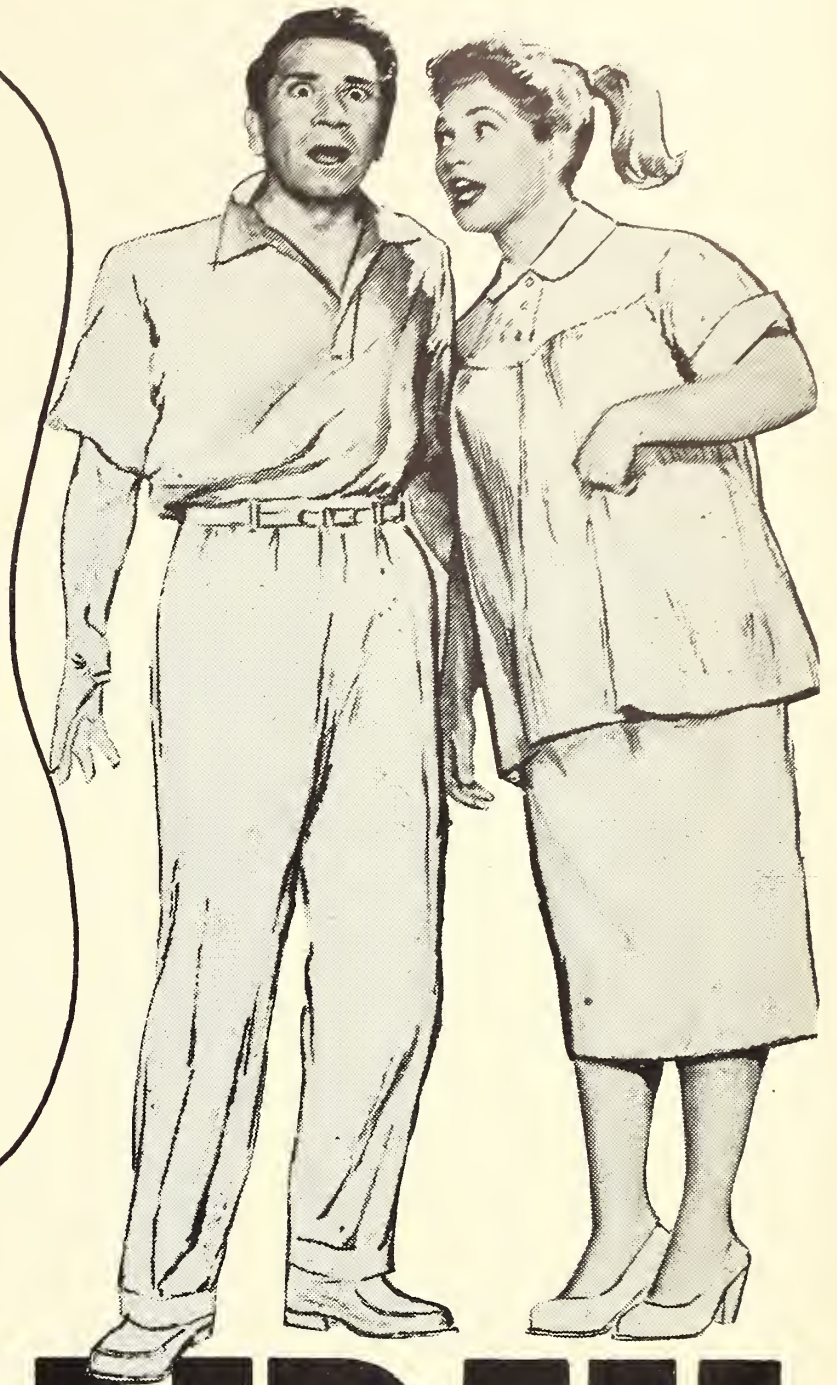

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Album Reviews

POPULAR

"AROUND THE WORLD IN 80 DAYS"—Music From The Sound Track—Decca DL 9046 (1-12" LP)

The stir caused by Michael Todd's star-studded "travelogue", "Around The World In 80 Days," is certain to make this pressing of the sound track score a good seller. Written by the late Victor Young, the music is brightly descriptive of the places the picture encounters ("Paris Arrival", "India Country Side"). The film's principal theme, "Around The World", is woven throughout the disk, and its sweeping melody made effective scoring when the camera panned the scenery. Important stock item.

"MUSIC OF LEROY ANDERSON"—Frederick Fennell Conducting The Eastman-Rochester Pops Orchestra—Mercury MG 50130 (1-12" LP)

IRISH SUITE; SLEIGH RIDE; FORGOTTEN DREAMS; SERENATA; A TRUMPETER'S LULLABY; THE PENNY-WHISTLE SONG; SANDPAPER BALLET; BUGLER'S HOLIDAY.

Conductor Frederick Fennell, who has been giving the public worthy recordings of light and serious band works, has a delightful disk containing six inviting melodies by Leroy Anderson plus the composer's "Irish Suite", a gay orchestral piece based on six famed Irish melodies. Mr. Anderson's arrangements lend themselves particularly well to hi-fi treatment which is exactly what they get in this fine pressing. Strong pop-semi-classical market.

"HEART AND SOUL"—The Music Of Hoagy Carmichael—Sung By Alan Dean With Robert Maxwell, His Harp And His Orchestra—MGM E 3461 (1-12" LP)

HEART AND SOUL; I GET ALONG WITHOUT YOU VERY WELL; HOW LITTLE WE KNOW; THE NEARNESS OF YOU; MY RESISTANCE IS LOW; BALTIMORE ORIOLE; STARDUST; IF YOU DON'T LOVE ME; SKYLARK; JUDY; BLUE ORCHIDS; ONE MORNING IN MAY.

Hoagy Carmichael, who has an impressive collection of evergreens to his credit, is handsomely represented in this LP featuring singer Alan Dean and harpist Robert Maxwell and his ork. Dean, who scored with a single, "Luna Rosa," provides a deft romantic feeling to the romantic items, while swinging lightly to the up-tempo selections. Robert Maxwell's harp support is soft and, at times, slickly light-hearted. Excellent tunes, professionally rendered with charm.

"MY BLUE HEAVEN"—Gene Austin—Decca DL 8433 (1-12" LP)

MY BLUE HEAVEN; CAROLINA MOON; I CRIED FOR YOU; JEANNINE; RAMONA; MUSIC, MAESTRO, PLEASE; TONIGHT YOU BELONG TO ME; FORGIVE ME; IF I COULD BE WITH YOU; IF I HAD MY WAY; CHINA BOY; I'M IN A MELLOW MOOD.

A pioneer among crooners (and one of the most successful), Gene Austin is heard in 12 songs closely associated with him in this entry from Decca. Suave and possessing a smooth delivery, Austin covers such favorites as "My Blue Heaven", "If I Had My Way" and "Ramona." Those who heard Austin in his prime will be grateful for the chance to hear the entertainer again via this package.

"NIGHT LIFE"—Lurlean Hunter—Manny Albam And His Orchestra—Vik LX-1061 (1-12" LP)

GEORGIA ON MY MIND; WHAT A DIFFERENCE A DAY MADE; HAVE YOU MET MISS JONES; THAT OLD FEELING; IT'S THE TALK OF THE TOWN; GENTLEMAN FRIEND; NIGHT LIFE; IT COULD HAPPEN TO YOU; MOONDRIFT; SUNDAY; LIKE SOMEONE IN LOVE; THIS TIME THE DREAM'S ON ME.

Vik has a winner in this pressing featuring stylist Lurlean Hunter. Bright ork support and a respectable collection of standards are two elements that form a sturdy foundation for Miss Hunter to apply a soft ballad or rhythmic up-tempo delivery. There's a notable blues voice too on "Georgia On My Mind" and the one new song on the bill, "Night Life". Dependable vocal sessions.

"TWO-A-DAY AT THE PALACE"—Benny Fields And Blossom Seeley—Mercury MG 20224 (1-12" LP)

THAT'S ENTERTAINMENT; I LOVE A PIANO; THE SOFT SHOE SONG; LADY PLAY YOUR MANDOLIN; LULLABY OF BROADWAY; TOOT TOOT TOOTSIE; THAT TEASIN' RAG; SONG AND DANCE MAN; JUNE; THERE'S NO BUSINESS LIKE SHOW BUSINESS.

Nostalgia comes in easy-to-take doses on this Mercury pressing of 11 numbers by the famous vaudeville husband-wife team, Benny Fields and Blossom Seeley. The set opens and closes with two recent tributes to show business, "That's Entertainment" and "There's No Business Like Show Business" and between those tunes memory lane takes over with such palace pieces as "I Love A Piano," "Toot Tootsie Goodbye" and Fields' own specialty, "Lullaby Of Broadway." The two performers sound as if they relish the material. The package should be greatly enjoyed by those who recall the team's heyday.

"WILL SUCCESS SPOIL ROCK-MANINOFF?"—Rosa Linda, Piano—Era EL 20010 (1-12" LP)

WILL SUCCESS SPOIL ROCK-MANINOFF? (PRELUDE IN C MINOR); 88 KEYS (ETUDE); PRELUDE IN G MINOR; 18TH VARIATION ON A THEME FROM PAGANINI BY RACHMANINOFF; RHAPSODY ON A THEME FROM PAGANINI BY RACHMANINOFF; JOE GREEN GOES TO TOWN (QUARTET FROM RIGOLETTO); CARMEN HAS A BIZET DAY (GYPSY DANCE FROM CARMEN); A DREAM OR TWO (WALTZ IN A FLAT); 2ND PIANO CONCERTO; SAMBA A LA CHOPIN.

With a clever title as the lead, this package from Era is a meeting of two usually distinct areas of music, pop and classical. Pianist Rosa Linda has arranged 11 classic melodies in a souped-up, rhythmic style. The results are refreshing, and witty sessions by the keyboard artist. In some of the numbers ("18th Century Variation On A Theme From Paganini By Rachmaninoff") Miss Linda plays the material, in part or whole, straight and with a good deal of sensitivity. A trio supporting Miss Linda dig these remodeled classics the most. Novel and commercial idea.

"SI! SI! NO! NO!"—Machito And His Orchestra—Tico LP 1033 (1-12" LP)

SI SI NO NO; ADIOS; FREEZELANDIA; SAMBIA; CONTIGO EN LA DISTANCIA; MAMBO INN; MAMBO A LA SAVOY; HAY QUE RECORDER; BEEREBEE CUM BEE; HOLIDAY MAMBO; NEGRO NANAMBORO; CARAMBOLA.

Cha-cha-cha's ever increasing audience can obtain another disk spotlighting the polished cha-cha-cha antics of Machito and his ork. In a package that contains several vocal efforts, Machito, working on mostly originals, is once more the exciting and colorful purveyor of the Latin dance sensation. Solid name value to those in the know.



Album Reviews

"INSTRUMENTAL TREASURES OF STEPHEN FOSTER"—Florida Concert Society Under The Direction of Raymond Carlisle—Request RLP 10035 (1-12" LP)

A SOLDIER IN THE COLORED BRIGADE; NELL AND I; I'LL BE HOME TOMORROW; WHY NO ONE LOVE; SOIRÉE POLKA; LITTLE ELLA; VILLAGE BELLS POLKA; OLD FOLKS QUADRILLES; I SEE HER STILL IN MY DREAMS; SANTA ANNA'S RETREAT FROM BUENA VISTA; WILLIE BRAVE; LOUISIANA BELLE; VILLAGE FESTIVAL.

Known mainly for his songs, Stephen Foster was also a prolific writer of instrumental numbers. Request records has issued a package containing 15 Foster instrumentals as performed by the Florida Concert Society under the direction of Raymond Carlisle. The pieces consist of marches ("A Soldier In The Colored Brigade"), love songs that include the beautiful "Nell And I" and polkas ("Village Bells Polka"). The orchestra is engagingly effective in bringing these rich samples of early America out in the open again. Appropriate Currier & Ives print on the package. The name Stephen Foster will carry much of the set's sales weight on dealer shelves.

"A TRIBUTE TO TOMMY DORSEY"—Maury Laws Orchestra And Chorus—Featuring Hi-Lo And The Dame—GMS LPG 5000 (1-12" LP)

GETTING SENTIMENTAL OVER YOU; BOOGIE WOOGIE; SONG OF INDIA; THIS LOVE OF MINE; WILL YOU STILL BE MINE; ONCE IN A WHILE; YES INDEED; SUNNYSIDE OF THE STREET; I'LL NEVER SMILE AGAIN; QUIET PLEASE; SWANEE RIVER; EMBRACEABLE YOU; THERE ARE SUCH THINGS; OPUS NO. 1; MARIE; ROYAL GARDEN BLUES.

This is another disk tribute to the late Tommy Dorsey. A combination of narration and ork performances, the effort is an entertaining and comprehensive essay on the man and his music. Sixteen of Dorsey's most well-remembered numbers have been recorded with fidelity to the maestro's particular band arrangements. "Hi-Lo-Jack And The Dame," in their role as the "Pied Pipers", handle their vocals (i. e. "I'll Never Smile Again" and "On The Sunny Side Of The Street") effectively. Thoroughly polished performances.

CLASSICAL

GERSHWIN: Rhapsody In Blue—Concerto For Piano And Orchestra In F—An American In Paris—Variations on "I Got Rhythm"—Second Rhapsody For Piano And Orchestra—Cuban Overture For Orchestra—Symphonic Scenario Of Porgy And Bess—Three Preludes For Piano—Sondra Bianca, Pianist—The Pro-Musica Symphony Orchestra Of Hamburg—Conducted By Hans-Jurgen Walther—MGM 3 E1 (3-12" LP)

MGM has released a 3-disk Gershwin omnibus containing seven of the great composer's piano and orchestral works plus Robert Russell Bennett's excellent "Symphonic Scenario Of 'Porgy And Bess'." The Gershwin staples are all here, "Rhapsody In Blue", "An American In Paris", and the "Concerto In F". Making rare waxing appearances are such Gershwin jazz-inspired items as "Variations On 'I Got Rhythm'" three Preludes For Piano and the "Second Rhapsody For Piano And Orchestra". The piano soloist is Sondra Bianca, who performs with sensitivity and excitement. Also in step with Gershwin is the Pro-Musica Symphony Orchestra Of Hamburg under Hans-Jurgen Walther's direction. Beautiful sound. The lure of the serious Gershwin all in one release will attract many purchasers.

CHOPIN: Les Sylphides—**DUKAS:** La Peri—The Halle Orchestra—George Weldon, Conducting—Mercury MG 50117 (1-12" LP)

Of the two ballet works here, the Chopin opus has received more attention from the diskery. A collection of separate short pieces by Chopin (i. e. Mazurkas, Preludes, Waltzes etc.), "Les Sylphides" is brimfull of melodic enchantment. Dukas' "La Peri," rarely performed off stage, is an evocative, impressionistic piece of orchestral beauty. English conductor George Weldon and Halle Orchestra perform brilliantly. Dazzling sound. Attractive package. Good competition for established versions of the works.

JAZZ

"IMPROVISATIONS BY THE DON SHIRLEY DUO"—Don Shirley, Piano—Cadence 1015 (1-12" LP)

SOMETIMES I'M HAPPY; BUT NOT FOR ME; TENDERLY; WHAT IS THERE TO SAY; AUTUMN LEAVES; ATONAL OSINATO BLUES IN B FLAT; WHEN I FALL IN LOVE; OVER THE RAINBOW; LET'S FALL IN LOVE; WALKIN' BY THE RIVER.

Cadence's front line jazz pianist, Don Shirley, has another issue of jazz interest and significance. If one can use the term "classical" jazz, then Shirley is the boy that makes the most of it. Reading material (in this instance all standards with the exception of "Atonal Ostinato In B Flat") with the flourishes and lyricism of a classical piece, Shirley probes with brilliance and uncanny invention. Bassist Richard Davis is Shirley's only support. Many remarkable jazz feats here.

"BARITONE SAX: LARS GULLIN"—Atlantic 1246 (1-12" LP)

SUMMERTIME; FEDJA; A FOGGY DAY; PERNTZ; ALL OF ME; MEAN TO ME; SO WHAT.

Lars Gullin is one of the better known jazzmen hailing from Europe. His baritone sax has been heard on several available-in-America pressings; this one from Atlantic catches Gullin in a fine creative light, brooding impressively over at least one selection ("Summertime") and swinging heartily throughout most of the others. BMI To Concentrate On Legit Musical Field

NEW YORK—Broadcast Music, Inc. is enlarging its scope with the organization of a new department designed to introduce affiliated authors and composers to the legitimate musical field.

Allan Becker, formerly with the musical comedy division of Chappell will coordinate the activities of the new department and conductor-composer Lehman Engel will serve in an advisory capacity.

The new division will be devoted to developing untapped talent; soliciting book authors to collaborate with BMI affiliates for the purpose of arranging complete musical packages; searching for properties that lend themselves to musicals; refreshing writers in the technique of song-and-dance stage by having Broadway producers, directors and others conduct discussions; and arranging auditions whenever specific talent warrants this move.

MGM Records Has Three

NEW YORK—Excitement is running high at MGM Records with the disk company reporting fast sales action on three strong selling records.

The single disks creating the sales activity are Robert Maxwell's "Song Of The Nairobi Trio" (Solfeggio), David Rose's "Calypso Melody" and Connie Francis' "No Other One". The Maxwell record is reported by MGM to have broken wide open in Detroit and has carried over into Chicago, Cleveland and Pittsburgh while the David Rose disk is said to be enjoying sock sales in all distribution points.

The Connie Francis record, out only a week, has racked up an unprecedented sale, according to MGM brass, which also adds that interest in Connie's disk at the dee jay level has been tremendous.

Lieberson also announced the appointment of James S. Foglesong to the post of Epic and Okeh director of pop albums and he will report directly to Maxin. Foglesong was formerly the music editor of Epic Records.

Holtzman stated that he was considering several flattering offers and had not yet made his decision. He stated that it was definitely in the music field and that he will be cutting records.

Holtzman, during his tenure, introduced Roy Hamilton, Something Smith and the Redheads, The DeJohn Sisters (who have now moved to Columbia Records), The Four Coins, and a host of others.

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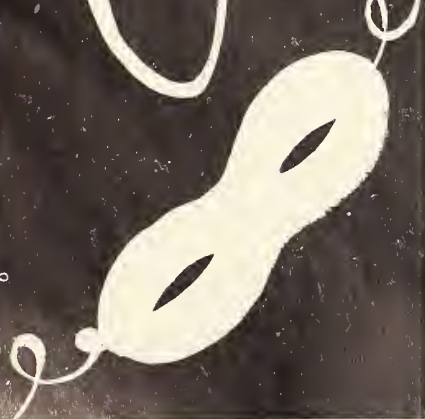

Ok wax that should pick up action, especially the areas where Specialty is strong and in those markets it gets to first.

B "LET ME TELL YOU, BABY" (2:35) [Venice BMI—L. Williams] Williams dishes up a middle beat jump with an infectious vocal. Williams tells his baby he "now knows the score". Good rocking side.

JIMMY RICKS

(Baton 236)

B+ "BAD MAN OF MISSOURI" (2:26) [Roosevelt BMI—Singleton, Dixon] Jimmy Ricks makes his debut on the Baton label with a rhythmic folk story of Billy the Kid. Quick beat bouncer that the deep, rich Ricks voice does things to. Good listening that should get lots of play.

B+ "I'M A FOOL TO WANT YOU" (2:54) [Barton ASCAP—Wolf, Herron, Sinatra] Ricks turns to the ballad on the flip and is good in his sensitive treatment of the melodic pretty. Another fine performance.

THE BELTONES

(Hull 721)

B+ "I TALK TO MY ECHO" (2:45) [Keel BMI—Andrew Pope] The Beltones have an unusual sound as they team for delivery on this slow beat rhythm ballad. Pretty tune, turned out with an effective blend of voices. Good exposure could grab some action for this side.

B "OOF-GOOF" (2:15) [Keel BMI—Andrew Pope] The Beltones go into an up tempo tune with a swinging reading. The fellas turn it out in good style making it a potent two-sider.

LEE JACKSON

B "FISHIN' IN MY POND" (2:31) [Armel BMI—Willie Dixon] Lee Jackson chants a slow, rhythmic blues that is for the southern markets. Appealing, drifty type wax.

B "I'LL JUST KEEP WALKIN'" (2:15) [Armel BMI—Lee Jackson] Jackson wails a slow beat blues in which he tells of his troubles. Down home stuff with a strong beat.

THE SCOOTERS

(Dawn 224)

B "REALLY" (1:40) [Coliseum BMI—Darwin, King] The Scooters dish up a driving quick beat wax that skips along all the way. Cute ditty and cute sound and treatment. Infectious side that could grab a big piece of attention.

C+ "SOMEDAY WE'LL MEET AGAIN" (1:50) [Lively Arts BMI—Howell, King] The Scooters turn hollow on this side and do a fair turn, but the overall appeal fails to meet that of "Really".

EARL BOSTIC

(King 5025)

B+ "TOO FINE FOR CRYING" (2:47) [Earl's Music BMI—Bostic, Trammell] That Bostic horn is back on wax and the situation's better for it. A slow beat rhythm blues with an enjoyable vocal by Bill Jones. Good, deck loaded with feeling. Should grab a piece of action.

B+ "AVALON" (2:55) [Remick BMI—Rose, DeSylva, Jolson] Bostic's horn takes this side over completely, giving the famous oldie the Bostic touch. Delightful sax treatment that should give the instrumental lovers something to shout about. Two solidly commercial sides.

"It was on the latter which Pierce and the Opry came to the parting of the ways", Kilpatrick stated, adding, "We parted friends".

The artists blend just beautifully as they reveal a secret love affair on a touching, moderate paced tale tagged "Oh! So Many Years". On "Can You Find It In Your Heart", an up tempo opus (not to be confused with the recent Tony Bennett clicker) Webb pleads with Kitty to give him another chance. Both lids means money in the bank for all concerned.

Titled, "No Thanks, Bartender", it's a quick beat tearjerker that Red puts across with telling effect. A splendid, rinky-dink musical backdrop rounds out a powerhouse platter. The under portion, "Juke Joint Johnny," is a steady-driving, rhythmic affair that Sovine belts out in a potent, money-making style. Top half has the edge but don't sell the flip short.

Terrific choral and instrumental assist on a deck that has the potential to skyrocket to the top of both the country and pop markets. On the lower side, "Step It Up and Go," Mac receives another attractive backdrop by the chorus and ork as he flavorfully rocks his way through a rhythmic novelty item tailor-made for the teenage hoofers. Ops, here's your chance to latch on to two real winners.

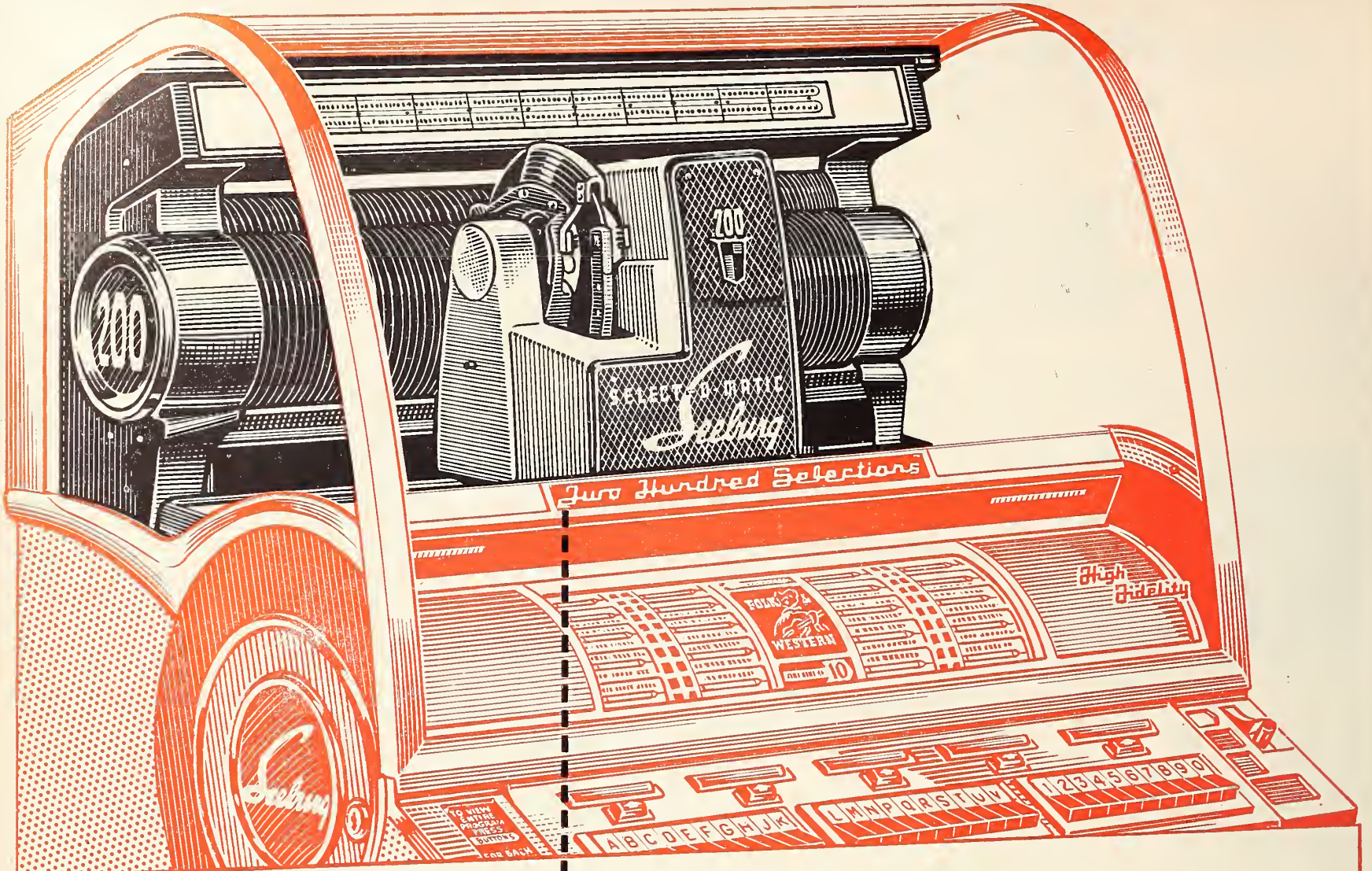

ALBANY, N.Y.—An announcement was made last week by Governor Harriman that he would approve sale of more than a quarter of the state's St. Lawrence River power to the Reynolds Metals Company. He acted after learning that the General Motors Corporation would build an aluminum casting foundry near the proposed Reynolds aluminum production plant at Rooseveltown, N.Y. The contract has the support of some and is opposed by others. However, from general observation, it's our view, that should these plans go thru, employment will be available (both plants combined) for close to 2,000 people. This would tend to activate business in this area, which would react to the benefit of coin machine operators, who would have a number of new locations available for their equipment.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. — With peak sales and net income achieving records during 1956, R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company, this city, is betting on continued growth of the cigarette industry with its announcement of a capital expenditure of \$20 million planned for 1957. John C. Whitaker, chairman, told stockholders that net income in 1956 increased, as did sales to a new record volume of \$957,366,846, an increase of 10.5 per cent over the 1955 total, and an 8.6 per cent rise over the previous high in 1952. The Winston filter brand showed a rapid growth, and Camels continued its leadership even tho its volume declined below 1955.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Regardless of some talk here and there about “depression” and “recession”, it's pointed out that even tho some industries will slump a bit, many others are desperate for both materials and labor to fill orders. One of these industries is “shipbuilding”. Maritime Administrator Clarence G. Morse told the House Merchant Marine Committee this week that there are steel shortages amounting to 40 per cent holding up its program to build 60 new ships. At the present time, he said, there are about 12,000 working in the yards, a gain of 100 per cent over last year, and at full production, some 36,000 men will be needed.

DETROIT, MICH.—We quote: “The auto industry's retail sales curve should start moving sharply upward within the next few weeks. This is a traditional trend in the auto industry. Should it develop as expected in many sources the 6.5 million unit sales volume for 1957—predicted by most top industry chiefs—would seem to be a distinct possibility.”

INCREASED LABOR COSTS ADD HEAVILY TO OVERHEAD.

CONTINUED CREEPING INFLATION, LOWERING VALUE OF DOLLAR, CUTS DIME TO ABOUT 4¢ PURCHASING POWER.

GENERAL OVERHEAD EXPENSE CONTINUES RISING AT AN UNPRECEDENTED RATE UPSETTING ANY POSSIBLE PROFIT FROM INCREASED PLAY ACTION.

COST OF SERVICING EACH LOCATION NOW RANGES ANYWHERE FROM \$5 TO \$10.

KEENER COMPETITION, SHRINKING PROFITS, WHILE COSTS RISE, REASON FOR GROWING NUMBER OF BUSINESS FAILURES.

It won't take any operator very much time to realize, reading the above headlines, why he simply must change to: *“10¢ Play Plus Front Money and/or A More Equitable Commission Basis.”*

With overhead expenses increasing at an alarming rate. With constant creeping inflation lowering the value of the dollar and, therefore, cutting the dime down to a very thin 4¢ in purchasing power. With prices of all new machines definitely on the way up, for manufacturers can no longer continue to absorb increased prices of raw materials and components and higher labor costs. With keener competition shrinking profits, while all costs rise and causing an ever growing number of business failures. With the cost of servicing each location now anywhere from \$5 to \$10.

With all this definitely upsetting any possibility for better profit from increased play action, every operator is now faced with what the nation's leading economists proclaim as “necessary economic readjustment.”

There is only one economic readjustment for the operators. That is to obtain a more equitable share of the gross receipts from all equipment, whether music or amusements.

Very, very few businessmen, if any, can work on 10 percent. But that is just what the operator, who splits the take on a 50-50 basis, is doing.

He winds up, from his 50% share, with but 10% for himself, after he pays his overhead expenses.

The location owner, in turn, winds up with better than 45% of his 50% share. All the location has to pay is for the cost of electric current used while the machine was in operation.

Since, by working on a 50%-50% basis, the operator actually proclaims his location his partner then, surely, the location should be treated as a partner and stand for half the overhead cost of operation, before any profit can be divided between the two.

How To Boom Business: MUSIC OPS WORK WITH LOCATIONS TO STIMULATE PLAY PATRONAGE

Closest Possible Cooperation Coming Into Being Between Ops and Locations as Both Seek Ways and Means to Bring More People Into Locations and Thereby Stimulate Greater Play Action

CHICAGO—If the present trend continues there is no doubt, many believe, that the nation's music operators are on their way to boom play action up and above any high point it ever before reached.

Cooperation between operators and location owners is closer today than has ever before been the case.

This has been brought into being by 10¢ play, by minimum guarantees and also by attempts to arrange for a more equitable division of the gross intake from machines.

Operators have become more frank with location owners. At least with those location owners in whom they are most interested. The kind of business men with whom they can honestly and frankly discuss their business. They prove that they need a more equitable share of the gross receipts in one fashion or another.

This has brought into being a demand for a method to obtain greater play action.

Operators realize that they cannot overtax the location owner. Once they have installed dime play as well as a more equitable commission arrangement or other equitable division of the gross intake, then the problem arises as to how to get more play, so that both will better profit.

Many plans are being proposed and

just as many methods are being tested.

For example, just a few years ago, one well-known manufacturer pointed out that, from letters received from operators, these operators were actually cooperating with their locations to air condition the places.

The operators had learned that air conditioned businesses were bringing in a continuous stream of customers during the torrid months.

This air conditioning project, as certain operators advised this manufacturer, was helping them to keep up their gross collections, even during the hottest months.

But much more than even this is required, operators believe, to assure their locations enjoying more business which, as they explain, means more business for themselves as well.

Perhaps one operator puts it best for all when he said:

"The big problem today, for all operators everywhere, is to discover a method of how to assure greater play action on all machines.

"This," he concluded, "would mean more money to the location owner and more money to the operator.

"With the location owner happy and satisfied, the operator then has a finer and more progressive business future assured him."

Chi Music Assn Leaders Seek Method to Assure Ops Greater Income

Search Thru the Hundreds of Letters Received by The Cash Box on More Equitable Intake Arrangement to Find New and Better System to Help Ops Obtain More Income



CHICAGO—Phil Levin, president and Earl Kies, executive vice-president of the Recorded Music Service Association, this city, met with Bill Gersh and Howard Freer of The Cash Box to study the hundreds of letters The Cash Box has received from operators from all over the nation on a more equitable arrangement of the gross intake from machines.

“We agree that the operator must obtain a more equitable division of the gross intake”, Kies stated, and added, “the operators here in Chicago are, in most cases, obtaining a minimum guarantee from locations and this”, he stated, “is pretty well taken care of in this city.”

“What we are mainly interested in”, said Phil Levin, “is a new and better system whereby the operator will be assured more play and, there-

fore, more income from his equipment.

“We’ve all been on dime play for some years now”, Levin continued, “and we also find that the majority of our members obtain a minimum guarantee from those locations where they can put this into logical practise.

“What we are seeking at this time”, Levin said, “especially as we go thru these hundreds of letters which have been written to The Cash Box, is some method whereby we won’t have to tax the location owner any further.

“By that I mean”, Levin explained, “is that by setting on 60-40 we are actually taking money from the location owner. At least”, he commented wryly, “that’s how the location owner feels about such a division of the gross receipts.

“Instead of taxing the location owners in this or any other similar fashion, except where we have to, and we have made such arrangements where we have to, I would much rather institute some new idea, or some new system or plan where we could help increase the play so that the operators would, because of some such new plan, be able to enjoy increased income.

“Perhaps”, he then stated, “the additional increase would be taken, in some cases, by the operator. But, in most cases, the location would also enjoy increased income, so that both the operator and the location owner would be happier.”

Many systems were discussed in a two hour meeting. Even the possible use of single chute 2 for 25¢ play which might be soon tested here.

Another plan brought to the fore was the use of trading stamps or some ticket system whereby players would be entitled to receive a free record after they had accumulated a sufficient number of the coupons.

There was also discussion about sending out dignified, intelligent salesmen, as employees of the association, to visit with locations, where and when requested, in an effort to arrange for a more equitable division of the gross intake, to study the programming of the phonos and to, possibly, find a means whereby greater play could be assured the operator in each location.

Both Levin and Kies complimented The Cash Box on its efforts to help bring into being a more equitable division of the gross intake.

They were also very much impressed with the tremendous number of letters which The Cash Box had received from operators all over the nation.

More Statewide Ops' Associations

Foresee Growth of Statewide Operators Associations. Many Will be Composed of Operators Who Have Mixed Routes

CHICAGO—"The trend is to statewide associations of operators", stated one well known leader here.

This definitely seems to be the case. The young West Virginia Association is a very potent example. So is the South Dakota association. The Wisconsin operators' organization continues to grow with each meeting.

Other states are also realizing that the time has come when they should form together into statewide organizations.

Tom Sheldon Letter To Al Schlesinger Re: Trade Assoc.

NEW YORK—Tom Sheldon, Sheldon Amusement Company, Payette, Idaho, writes The Cash Box: "Due to the correspondence I have received concerning my article printed in the February 9 issue of The Cash Box, urging trade association and better business relations, I am writing a letter to Mr. Al Schlesinger, managing director of National Coin Machine Distributors Association, in answer to his letter and sending a copy to you. It is in answer to other correspondence I have received and other comments concerning the items carried in the article."

The letter to Al Schlesinger by Sheldon reads:

"Thank you for the letter received from you dated February 4, 1957, with reference to my article published in The Cash Box concerning my belief that the entire coin machine industry is in dire need of a trade association, by which genuine business and trade ethics of a good sound high standard can constantly be maintained throughout the entire industry at all times.

"There is no doubt in my mind but what your organization is a step in the right direction as far as the distributors themselves are concerned. However, it is my feeling after 24 years of being in the coin operation business that the great problem at the present time is of coordinating the operating and sales procedures—such as ethics, publicity, business relations, etc. among the operator, manufacturer and distributor.

"It seems to me (regardless of their desire to accept us or not) we, the operators, are partners of the distributors and manufacturers. And it surely is to their advantage for us to operate our business by the use of good sound methods.

In most cases, the statewide associations are composed of operators with mixed routes. In West Virginia, the operators have amusements, vending and music, yet all belong to one statewide association.

One well known leader stated sometime ago, "If it were only possible to get a Board of Directors composed of one leader elected from each of the 48 states, we could then put together the greatest organization for the greatest possible good of all the nation's operators."

There is a call from among the nation's operators to have one nationwide board of men who would represent the 48 states. One man to each state. Each man elected by his state organization to this post.

"For example", this same leader stated, "as in the case of a more equitable depreciation arrangement for all equipment, as has been suggested by The Cash Box for many years, it is necessary for a truly national body to meet with the Ways And Means Committee of the House and also of the Senate to get such action under way."

He also points out that in many other national matters, a board composed of all the 48 states, would prove invaluable to the industry.

"This is my reason for suggesting the creation of a trade association, one that will aid not only the large manufacturer, distributor and operator, but also the small coinman in the same field.

"Our public relations in a large portion of the United States is not good for the industry. Without a doubt in my mind this is the reason for over-taxation on coin equipment in some sections of the country. This could be corrected very easily by a long range program.

"In our section we have a distributor who is taking advantage of the dissatisfied locations on dime play. Selling them his line of music on the theory of stay on a nickel and own your own box. He is selling the location this equipment on terms of very little down, and sometimes no down payment, with 2 or 3 years to pay for it. To my way of thinking, this is very poor business ethics for a distributor to follow and can only lead to poor business relations between the manufacturer, distributor, and operator. The manufacturer could, and I believe would, want this kind of procedure corrected. And this again could be easily accomplished by a trade association.

"The manufacturer at times has seen fit to over-produce and thereby force their distributors to over-sell the operator, creating a poor financial picture in our coin machine industry.

"Sales quotas set up by manufacturers is good business only as long as the distributor is meeting his quota of sales through good sound sales and promotions. My reasoning for this is because an over-loaded operator will have a tendency to back down operating percentages, just in order to obtain locations to operate equipment that he had no need for in the first place.

"We are resolved to the fact that we no doubt have a few undesirables in the coin machine industry, and it is the personal responsibility of every good operator, distributor and manufacturer to seek these people out, expose them, and expel them from the industry. This action alone can do more to help public relations than any move we could consider as a trade association.

"The day of the racketeer flourishing and floundering around, his boisterous attitude towards life, must go from the scene of the coin machine industry. He must be replaced by the honest, hard working, civic minded solid citizen type of person. This action will in turn give us our day before city, state and national legislative bodies on a basis that we can reap better results concerning taxes and policies of operation.

"In closing my letter to you, I certainly hope that these few ideas have met with your approval and I do sincerely urge your organization to keep up the good work you no doubt are accomplishing. Probably some day it can be merged with the operator and manufacturer, and by all the teams of the industry working together, I am sure we will, and can, make this a bigger and better industry for all concerned."

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CIAA Studies "10¢ Play Plus"

Execs of Chicago's Amusement Ops' Association Study Hundreds of Returns Received by The Cash Box on "10¢ Play Plus" to Decide on Best Plan to Use

CHICAGO—The Chicago Independent Amusement Association executives, namely: Sam Greenberg, president, David Brody, treasurer, and Edward Mohill, secretary, met this past week to study the hundreds of letters *The Cash Box* has received from operators all over the country to find what they believe will be the best "10¢ Play Plus" plan for the amusement operators here in the Chicagoland area.

As Dave Brody stated, "Well, we're over the biggest hump anyway. All the games in the Chicago area are on dime play.

"Some operators", he continued, "on the new large bowling games, especially, are already obtaining 60%-70% commission basis. In my case", he added, "I have some locations on a better basis than this.

"But", he also advised, "unless all the operators turn to a more equitable arrangement with their locations they just won't be able to stand up under the tremendously increased expenses they are now paying."

Brody also came forth with the following suggestion, "When I was in the kiddie ride business", he advised, "one of the manufacturers here made a most thorough financial study of my operation to learn exactly what the overhead and costs were against income.

"I hope that one of the manufacturers of games will again make such a thorough survey of one of the routes here. This will definitely prove to the operators the need for *The Cash Box*' "10¢ Play Plus" plan."

Sam Greenberg, president of CIAA, remarked while going thru the hun-

dreds of answers *The Cash Box* received from operators:

"As far as *The Cash Box* is concerned we consider everyone of its suggestions, from '10¢ play' to '10¢ play plus', the greatest and most constructive in the history of the industry.

"We want everyone of our members to make sure that they are subscribers to *The Cash Box*.

"These hundreds of letters from operators from all over the U. S. and Canada, and many other countries", he added, "is convincing proof of itself that the operators realize they must arrange for a more equitable share of the gross proceeds from their equipment.

"The higher costs of games, the increasing overhead expenses, the many other costs we are paying every week, all force the operators to do something, and do it quick, if they are to survive present conditions."

Edward Mohill is a great believer in a more equitable arrangement of the gross intake between the locations and the operators.

"Where the gross is of such a nature that the 50-50 can remain and still prove profitable to the operator", he says, "then this should remain in effect.

"But", he advises, "the fact remains that the great, great majority of locations, better than 80%, are of lower intake. It is absolutely necessary for the operator, if he wishes to remain in business and progress on ahead, to immediately arrange for a more equitable division of the gross income from all of his equipment."

Ed Mohill takes time out to state, "As far as we are concerned, *The Cash Box* is the one and only trade magazine in our industry."

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Favor More Equitable Division

CHICAGO — Every week more and more operators advise *The Cash Box* that they definitely must arrange for a more equitable division of the gross intake from all of their machines with their locations.

Hundreds of such letters have already been published. These have attracted tremendous attention and very great interest.

Open discussions among operators, regarding many of the letters that have already appeared, have led many to the opinion that more equitable arrangements between operators and their locations is coming into effect faster than many now believe is the case.

Some amusement and music operators in this city, where dime play has been in effect for some years now, report that they are obtaining front money. Others report they are obtaining minimum guarantees. Some state that they work on a 60%-40% commission basis. One well known operator reports that he has "locations on 65%-35% basis".

The drive for more equitable division of the gross intake between the operator and the location owners is under way. From various parts of the country reports have arrived that entire associations are studying what would be the best system.

Here in Chicago, the membership

of such organizations as the CIAA (Chicago Independent Amusement Association) and the RMSA (Recorded Music Service Association) are bringing up the question of what method is best to obtain a more equitable share of the gross intake.

For example, just the other day, the following operators wrote in to *The Cash Box* to advise what they thought was the best method.

Edward L. Herman of Branchville, N. J. is a firm believer in dime play plus \$10 per week front money from each location.

The Cechetti brothers of Jeanette, Pa. are more conservative in their belief. They think that 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission basis is best.

Harry J. Bennett of Belle Vernon, Pa. believes that operators should get 10¢ play plus \$5 per week front money.

Both Lew Wolf of Snyder, N. Y. and James M. Wisnouse of Windber, Pa. think that the operator is better off with 10¢ play plus \$5 per week front (minimum) money.

These are only just a few of the hundreds of letters that have already arrived at the offices of *The Cash Box* here in Chicago.

The fact remains that this tremendous interest shown in a more equitable division of the gross intake proves the need by and of itself.

Jersey Mystery Writer

CHICAGO — *The Cash Box*' offices here received a letter from a Newark, N.J. "mystery writer" who forgot to sign and add his firm name.

"There can be no set and fast rule", the Newark, N.J. mystery man writes, "as regards 10¢ play and commission or front money. It must vary according to the machine in operation and the amount of business a place is doing."

"As regards the machine in operation", he continues, "you don't have to have as much front money for a machine that is three to five years old as for a brand new machine."

"Sometimes", he advises, "it is more profitable to get 50% of a collection than the so-called large front money."

"For instance", he explains, "it is better to concede 50% in a stop that is doing \$50 gross than to get \$15 or so front money in a place that is doing \$25 a week gross."

"Generally speaking", he adds, "I have found that 1/3 commission on the first \$15 of business and 50% commission on any amount over \$15 seems to appeal better than taking front money. If a place consistently does \$50 a week and insists on a straight split, it's not too bad."

(Editor's Note: What this operator is actually obtaining is \$5 minimum guarantee. Each location requires a different system. This publication suggests that the operators arrange for a more equitable share of the gross intake from all of their machines on the basis that is most suitable to them and to their location owners).

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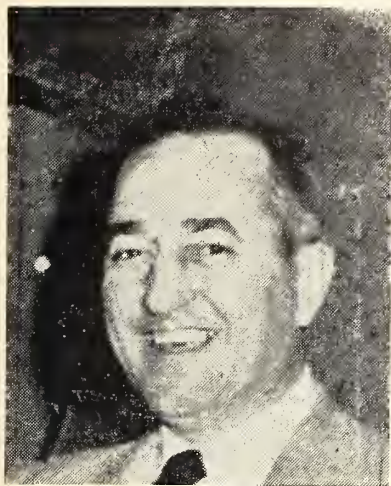

U.S. Mint to Produce 427,000,000 Pennies

Opens Bigger Potential for One Cent Play Counter Machines

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Due to tremendously increased demand the U.S. Mint has decided to step up its output of pennies.

Mint director, Wm. H. Brett, discussed the problem in closed-door testimony before a House appropriations subcommittee.

He told the committee that the government plans to produce 427,000,000 pennies beginning with its fiscal year, July 1. This year the U.S. Mint turned out about 1,093,000,000 pennies.

Brett claims that odd prices, such as \$3.98 as well as vending machines and sales taxes have continued to step up demand for pennies right along.

(Editor's Note: The Cash Box published an article in its February 9, 1957 issue, Page 55, "Bigger Market For One Cent Counter Machines. Boosted Taxes Cause U.S. Mint To Step Up Penny Production". This article urged the creation and manufacture of 1¢ counter machines to help ops obtain a share of the many pennies being passed out at the cash registers in almost every retail establishment due to sales taxes. These little penny business stimulators have always proved themselves extremely profitable.)

Internal Revenue Service Considering Depreciation Revision

Opportunity for MOA to Serve Music Mach. Industry

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Internal Revenue Service announced this week that it will revise its list of long-established useful lives for depreciable property for income tax purposes.

The present list was compiled in 1942. The restudy will cover the thousands of pieces of equipment and the useful lives assigned to each.

The project has been under consideration for several years. It is considered vital because of the important changes in industry, business and agriculture which have come about since before World War II.

The public is invited to make comments and suggestions on the new list. Such communications should be submitted in duplicate to the Internal Revenue Service, Engineering and Valuation Branch, here, prior to June 30.

(Editorial Note: As there has never been a definite established method of depreciating coin operated equipment, here is an opportunity for MOA to take action for the music machine operator. It could be discussed by a committee appointed by MOA at the forthcoming MOA Convention in Chicago.)

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Amusement Ops See Better Times Ahead

Higher Priced Games Have Helped Ops More Solidly Set Dime Play. Many Have Also Been Able to Arrange More Equitable Division of Gross Intake With Locations. Because of These Important Achievements Amusement Ops Now See Better Times Ahead.

CHICAGO—There is a growing belief among many leading amusement operators that better times are ahead. In the first place, they point out, because of the higher priced amusements, they have been able to solidly set dime play working in their locations. Furthermore, they explain, due to the higher prices of the new games, many have also been able to arrange for a more equitable division of the gross intake. In some instances, they report, they have quickly and easily arranged for minimums and also front money guarantees to help defray the cost of the new and higher priced amusements. Because these progressive moves are being adopted by all operators, regardless of the amusements they bring into their locations, they foresee better times ahead. "There's no doubt any longer", one

amusement operator here stated, "that dime play is the answer to greater intake for us. "The location owners agree with us for they, too, are enjoying the greater intake. "Now, in addition to the dime play, and because of the tremendously increased costs of the new amusements, we have also been able to arrange for minimum guarantees and more equitable commission bases. "This", the operator explains, "has definitely proved that we are on the way to a more progressive business. "As long as the operators will adopt these progressive and better business methods we are going to have the opportunity to enjoy more profitable operations." One operator here says, "Believe it or not I'm very happy now that prices of the new games went so high. This woke me up. It made me get out and show my locations that I just

Op Explains Only 50% of Front Money To Ops

STOCKTON, CALIF. — Lambert Music Company of this city, well known music operators in this area, explains that only 50 per cent of front money, which the operator arranges between himself and his locations, actually goes to the operator. Lambert reports that this happens where the commission remains on a 50%-50% basis. "In regards to front money", he advises, "you have to remember that the amount of the front money is only increasing your collection by half its amount. "Therefore, front money of only \$10 per week", he continues, "increases the operator's gross by \$5. That is if the operator is on a 50%-50% commission basis which", he points out, "I believe that most operators are. "An increase of \$5 per week", Lambert points out, "is not going to make the operator a rich man. Especially when he considers his operating costs. "Costs of records, needles, tubes, bulbs, title strips, collection books, especially car expenses and, greatest of all—labor, as well as the cost of new equipment, cuts deeply into the front money the operator can get. "Yet", Lambert concludes, "even this small amount of front money (\$10 per week) sure would help lots of operators."

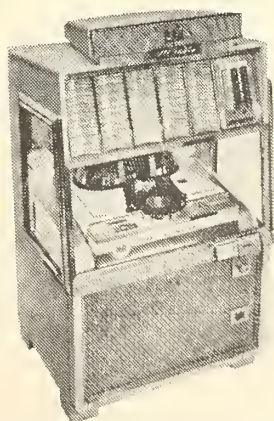

[Also known as the "C. M. I. (Coin Machine Industry) BLUE BOOK"]

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories are much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such buyers will purchase machines "as is", at prices quoted by the trade at large, and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.
