As the record business expands literally by leaps and bounds, retailers all over the country are facing a problem which is causing them more and more concern. It is the problem of display.

The development of today's album jacket has been based on the proven fact that the more attractive the cover, the easier the sale. Now to take full advantage of this, retailers have to be able to display albums in open face bins so that customers can spot them at a glance. It is only in this way that the jackets can do their salesmanship most effectively.

But the problem of course is space.


Most stores have very limited areas in which to display records. To display everything open faced at 12" by 12" an album would necessitate an almost impossible expansion in store space and at today's costs that is an impracticallity. Therefore means have to be found by way of fixtures to display the packages.

There are several firms today which are designing logical bins for albums but of course in looking into the possibility of purchasing these new fixtures, store owners very often find that it involves a complete redesign of their stores at a cost which they cannot afford either in terms of money or interms of time lost during the alteration.

Therefore if the record industry is to continue to expand and grow as if has been, it seems to us that the task of helping dealers solve their interior display problems belongs to the entire record industry and not to each individual store for it goes without saying that if retailers as a whole are in a position to sell more records, everyone in the record industry must benefit from it.

We suggest therefore that either through the RIAA or some other agency set up by the record firmsbig and small—centralized information be made available to record stores on the most practical new display equipment and all the concomitant factors which go into installing them. Moreover an absolutely necessary accompanying program would have to deal with the financing of the improvement of stores which is worked out in almost all appliance industries and which is certainly germain to the record business. Just off-hand we might suggest some central agency, representing the entire industry, which would make funds for the redesign of stores available to individual retailers at a lower rate of interest than can currently be obtained from banks.


The record industry is dependent upon the ontlets which sell records. Without these, nothing else matters. It seems to us therefore that it is incumbent upon the industry as a whole to see to it that stores in which records are sold keep pace with the progress that the rest of the industry is making, not for any altrnistic purpose, but for the simple end in view of selling as many records as possible and keeping our industry in the expanding state of prosperity in which it finds itself today.

At the dinner, Morris Levy, President of Roulette, awarded a gold watch to Henry Droz, Arc Distributing, De-troit, for top sales performance. The show was highlighted by performances of some of the company's top attractions: Jimmie Rodgers, Shaye Cogan, Larry Storch and the Play-mates. Also, Carol Hughes and Jack Hammer, new pactees who as yet have not had a release, entertained. There was also a special long distance phone-call from Milton Berle from Las Vegas. The distributors were able to hear the call through a pre-arranged plan which piped Berle's voice over two loud speakers.

On Sunday morning, Roulette held a special informal "farewell breakfast" for all distributors prior to their departure.

Roulette's entire future program for the coming months will be keyed to the slogan, "A Sound Bet-Buy Roulette."


Miller Heads All Columbia **Pop Music Activities**

NEW YORK-The appointment of Mitch Miller as Director of all Columbia Records Popular Artists and Repertoire has been announced by Goddard Lieberson, president of the company. Heretofore, Miller has been concerned chiefly with single records.

In this newly-constituted post, Miller will act as chief executive in the coordination and supervision of popular albums, single records, and country material. Reporting to him will be Columbia's roster of creative per-sonnel: George Avaikian, Director of Popular Albums, who will continue his present activities; Percy Faith, East Coast Musical Director; Paul Weston, West Coast Musical Director; and Don Law, Director of Country and Western Artists and Repertoire. Miller will continue to function actively in the production of popular single records but will delegate phases of this operation to a larger extent to Faith, Weston, Law and Al Ham; Lieberson explained.

"With the enormous growth of popular albums as well as single, it has become increasingly apparent that there can be no separation of directions in these two phases of popular music," Lieberson declared. "I feel that Mitch Miller, with his broad musical background spanning the concert, radio, television and recording field, has the unique creative genius to fuse the two branches of popular music production. His accomplishments in the field are unique-he has developed more new artists, and new repertoires then any other individual in the record field. In this new posi-tion we afford Mitch fullest scope for his ingenuity. He assumes leadership of the strongest and most gifted area of the strongest and most gifted creative team in the industry."

tive team in the industry." A fellow student with Miller at the Eastman School of Music in Roches-ter, Lieberson brought him to Co-lumbia Records in 1950 as Director of Popular Artist and Repertoire, a position which involved single disks almost exclusively. During his years at Columbia, Miller has produced twenty five records that have reached the million sales mark, four that have exceeded two million sales and many other hits.





Capitol Kicks Off Lineup Of 31 New Albums For October

HOLLYWOOD — Capitol Records last week kicked off a lineup of 31 new h'gh fidelity albums for October, including the soundtrack album of music from the Columbia Pictures production of "Pal Joey" starring Rita Hayworth, Frank Sinatra and Kim Novak, 12 new popular sets (including the initial Capitol packages of Anna Maria Alberghetti, Dolores Gray and Murray McEachern) seven new classical albums, including the first for Capitol by composer-conductor, Erich Leinsdorf, and 11 new "Christmas In Hi-Fi Around The World" albums, the largest in the company's 15-year history.

The "Pal Joey" album features arrangements by Capitol artist Nelson Riddle. The movie and soundtrack offer such songs as "I Didn't Know What Time It Was," "There's a Small Hotel," "Bewitched" (sung twice, once by Sinatra, once by Hayworth), "The Lady Is a Tramp," and "My Funny Valentine."

Also in the release is another album aimed at the hi-fi addict, "Full Dimensional Sound From The Capitol Tower" including popular music tracks by Glen Gray, Joe "Fingers" Carr, Richard Jones with the strings of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Jackie Davis and Billy May and classical tracks by the Pittsburgh Symphony, the Concert Arts Orchestra, Laurindo Almeida, Hollywood Bowl Symphony, Roger Wagner Chorale, Leonard Pennario and Sylvia Marlowe and the Concert Art Players.

The new popular albums include: The first-for-Capitol packages, by Anna Maria Alberghetti, Dolores Gray, and Murray McEachern. Miss Alberghetti's debut album is called "I Can't Resist You." Van Alexander conducts the orchestra. Miss Gray's debut album is "Warm Brandy." With an orchestral assist from Sid Feller, Miss Gray vocalizes intimate love songs. "Caress" is the premiere Capitol album for Murray McEachern.

Others on the top pop release are these: "Ol' Rockin' Ern" by Tennessee Ernie Ford with music conducted by Jack Fascinato, in an album of songs written by Ford himself. Another top Capitol artist who wrote all the numbers in his new album, "Ports of Call," is Les Baxter. The big band sound of Les Brown and His Band of Renown is heard in another album of original music, the all-instrumental "Composer's Holiday," in which Brown commissioned such composers as Elmer Bernstein, Frank Comstock, Andre Previn and others to write new songs especially for this package. Jane Froman's new album is "Songs At Sunset." Marion Evans conducted the orchestra.

Also included in the pop lineup is a Marian McPartland album of standards, uptempo tunes, and folk songs plus a McPartland original, "With You In Mind." Guy Lombardo sets aside his "Sweetest Music This Side of Heaven" to offer an all up-tempo album called "The Lively Guy."

The full string section of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, with Richard Jones conducting, is heard in an album called "Stringtime." As a sequel to his "Hey! Let Yourself Go!" on Capitol, Nelson Riddle and his orchestra's new LP is called "C'Mon... Get Happy!"

The new Capitol classics albums for October include the following:

Leopold Stokowski, is heard directing his symphony orchestra in "Landmarks of a Distinguished Career." This package, with a full-color photo of Stokowski on the cover, includes such performances by the maestro as Debussy's "Clair De Lune" and "Prelude To The Afternoon Of a Fawn," Sibelius's "Finlandia" and Strauss, Jr.'s. "On the Beautiful Blue Danube."

Marking his debut on Capitol is Erich Leinsdorf conducting the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra in Debussy's "Le Mer" and Ravel's "Daphnis et Chloe, Suite No. 2."

Presented as a boxed five-12-inchrecord set is a package by the Hollywood String Quartet playing The Late Quartets of Beethoven as performed at the Edinburgh International Festival earlier this year. Another album by pianist Leonard Pennario is also on the release. This album features romantic piano music of the 19th century. It includes "Prelude, Chorale and Fugue" by Franck and "Fantasia In C Major, Op. 17" by Schumann. In Laurindo Almeida's new album, "New World Of The Guitar," this artist performs works by 20th century composers who have combined the guitar music of earlier times with the musical feelings of the present.

Nathan Milstein plays 10 violin vignettes in his new Capitol album, "Milstein Vignettes." He is. accompanied by pianist Leon Pommers. Rounding out the Capitol classic releases for October is an album by the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra conducted by William Steinberg, playing Beethoven's "Symphony No. 7, Op. 92."

An important part of the October release from Capitol is an 11-album "Christmas In Hi-Fi" assortment the largest presentation of Christmas merchandise in the label's history.

"The Music of Christmas," featuring a Christmas tree on a field of black on the album cover, is performed by the Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra conducted by Carmen Dragon. The package includes old familiar songs of Yuletide.

"A Jolly Christmas From Frank Sinatra" offers such Noel tunes as "Jingle Bells," "I'll Be Home For Christmas," "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas" and nine others.

The new album by Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians is "Now Is The Caroling Season."

Via its 'Capitol' of the World Series, Capitol rounds out its Xmas release with a series called "Christmas Around The World" in eight separate 12-inch albums, each recorded in a foreign land by foreign musicians. The Series includes "Christmas In Mexico," "Christmas In Germany," "Christmas In Italy," "Christmas In Spain," Christmas In France," "Christmas In Holland," "Christmas In Sweden," and "Christmas In England."

Fred Fox To Europe To Reorganize Affiliates

NEW YORK-Fred Fox, Vice President of the Sam Fox Publishing Company left Friday, October 4, on a two month trip to London and other important cities on the Continent in order to reorganize his company's foreign affiliates.

As chairman of the Committee on International Contacts for the Music Publisher's Association, Fred Fox will

prepare a report on music conditions abroad based on his observations. Dr. Franco Colombo and David Adams, respective heads of the American branches of the famed Italian music publishers, G. Ricordi, and Boosey & Hawkes are also members of this committee. The new administration of the Music Publisher's Association is headed by Arthur Hauser, President of Theodore Presser.

BMI Announces 6th Student Composer Awards

NEW YORK-Broadcast Music, and BMI Canada, Ltd., have announced the sixth annual Student Composers Radio Awards (SCRA) to further the creation of concert music. The awards total \$13,500, and are divided into sums ranging from \$500 to \$2,000 granted at the discretion of the judges. Among the leading music educators and composers who will judge the compositions are William Schuman, composer and President of the Juilliard School of Music; Earl V. Moore, Dean, School of Music, University of Michigan; Henry Cowell, composer; and Claude Champagne, Assistant Director, Quebec Provincial Conservatory.

Under way since September 29th, and open until midnight, February 15, 1958, the awards are open to citizens or permanent residents of the United States, its territories and possessions or Canada, who will be under thirty years of age on December 31, 1957. Entrants must be enrolled in accredited public, private or parochial secondary schools, in accredited colleges or conservatories of music, or engaged in the private study of music with recognized and established teachers.

Students currently in military service may apply if they meet all other requirements and if they were engaged in the study of music immediately prior to entrance into military service. The years spent in the armed forces are to be deducted from the applicant's actual age in determining eligibility.

For the final judging, the SCRA panel will be augmented by other leading composers, publishers and interpreters of music. The prizes, to be applied towards tuition and subsistence during further study, will be awarded not later than June 1, 1958.

Because it is the purpose of Student Composers Radio Awards to encourage student composers in the creation of concert music, no limitations are established as to instrumentation or length of manuscript. However, the National Judging Committee advised "all applicants to consider well the various ensemble combinations which are most customarily utilized in concerts and radio broadcasts. Because of the high cost of broadcasting and recording large instrumental compositions, such as those written for full symphonic orchestras or bands, composers will be well advised to limit the number of instruments to be employed."

Students may enter as many as three compositions, but no contestant may win more than one award or prize. Compositions need not have been composed during the year of entry.

BMI is now mailing contest rules and invitations to music schools, conservatories and secondary schools in the United States and Canada. Copies of the rules, entry blanks and further information about SCRA may be obtained by writing to Russell Sanjek, Director of SCRA Project, Broadcast Music, Inc., 589 Fifth Avenue, New York 17, New York.

FCC Grants Levitt Permit **To Build FM Station**

SAN FRANCISCO — Alan Levitt, President of San Francisco Records has been granted permission by the FCC to construct and operate a new radio station in San Francisco.

Levitt has been known in San Fran-cisco for several years as a radio announcer and disk jockey. Most re-cently he has concentrated solely on the operation of a record shop, Music San Francisco, and San Francisco Records.

Two months ago Levitt filed an ap-plication with the FCC for a 10,000 watt FM station at 94.9 megacycles, designating the call letters as K S F R, the last three letters standing for "San Francisco Records."

"San Francisco Records." Located high atop San Bruno Moun-tain, construction of KSFR began September 28th, when C. M. Edmonds, Chief Engineer for the station arrived in San Francisco to supervise opera-tions tions.

in San Francisco to supervise opera-tions. Projected coverage of KSFR will be beyond Santa Rosa to the North of San Francisco—through Sacramento to the East, and through Monterey to the South. Special custom designed audio equipment is currently being constructed for the studios which are located in the heart of San Francisco at 217 Kearny St. Levitt stated, "KSFR will be the first true high fidelity station in the area. Columbia Completes Factory Branch Establishment

NEW YORK-The completion of a major conversion in distribution, involving establishment of factory branch operation in areas representing 60 per cent of the country's total record sales potential was announced last week by Goddard Lieberson, President of Columbia Records.

On January 1, 1957, Lieberson stated, Columbia-owned distribution centers will open in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. Already in operation are nine branches throughout the United States, established under a scheduled program which began two years ago under the di-rection of Hal B. Cook, Vice-President in Charge of Sales for Columbia Records.

"Our decision to initiate companyowned distribution reflects absolutely no criticism of our former independent distributors who have all done remarkable sales jobs. The program was undertaken with reluctance in order to maintain the company's com-petitive position. We believe that factory branches in major market areas have become necessary for more concentrated effort and greater sales."

In the three newest branches, as in of ownership. Full present record sales department personnel will be retained by Columbia.

"Thanks to the splendid cooperation of our present distributors, billing and other financial affairs will be maintained continuously through the transition period," Lieberson stated. The new branches will follow Co-Ine new branches will follow Co-lumbia's previously-established pat-terns: headquarters will be selected in prime commercial locations; com-pany-designed displays in each center will serve as dealer guides to maxi-mum display effectiveness. The company also regards the branches as important training ground for devel-opment of specialist personnel.

Overall direction of sales and pro-motion activities of the branches will be assumed by William Gallagher, Co-lumbia Field Sales Manager. Ad-ministrative matters wil be supervised by Jack Loetz, Manager of Sales Ad-ministration for Columbia Records.

The cities in which Columbia-owned branches will be located as of Janu-ary 1st are as follows: Kansas City, St. Louis, Philadelphia, Detroit, Bal-timore, Boston, Cincinnati, Seattle, Indianapolis, New York and Newark, Chicago and Los Angeles.

World-Pacific Records Debuts

HOLLYWOOD—The World-Pacific label made its bow on the record scene last week. This is the name adopted by Pacific Enterprises In-corporated to replace the now five year old Pacific Jazz label.



This move was made after more than a year of deliberation by Pacific executives Richard Bock, Phil Turet-sky, and Woody Woodward. Although the label's chief output will continue to be jazz, more and more production is planned in the popular album field. Therefore, on a long-range basis, the identification with jazz only was con-sidered inadvisable. In the past, a fair percentage of the label's output —though jazz—had a wide enough appeal to reach a much broader mar-ket than the jazz market alone. How-ever, because of the label's name, sales were believed sacrificed. The Pacific Jazz tag will be main-

The Pacific Jazz tag will be main-tained, since "Pacific Jazz Series" will be present on the album cover and label whenever the album is clearly a abel whenever the album is clearly a jazz album produced for the jazz mar-ket. The first album to be released under the World-Pacific Record ban-ner, is Chet Baker and Bud Shank's "Theme Music From The James Dean Story." All the material currently in the Pacific Jazz catalogue is expected to be transferred to the World-Pacific Records label before Christmas. All musical production will con-tinue to be personally supervised by the firm's president and A&R chief, Richard Bock. No changes have been made on either the executive or artist level. However, the shift to World-Pacific does officially herald the label's entry into the popular album field.



Automobiles may require manual guidance only to place them in the proper lane of a superhighway network where electronic controls co ld take over." James' M. Skinner, Jr., president, Philco Corp: "If the weather bureau predicts rain, the pedestrian will have an electronic umbrella to protect him. It will be invisible, but will keep him dry." Ruddick C. Lawrence, vice-president, New York Stock Exchange: "A shareowner population by 1976 ranging between 15 and 20 million." C. R. Smith, president, American Airlines: "The morning should arrive in New York about 8:30 A. M. (before he laves)". Edward T. McCormick, president American Stock Exchange: "Many well known companies will fall by the wayside, while others, some not yet born, will be market leaders."

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. -- Vice-Adm. Edwin D. Foster (retired), now RCA vice-president in charge of economic planning, told a group here attending a fall conference of the Southern New Jersey Development Council, that American industry should plan on indefinite continuation of the cold war. "If the United States maintains a margin of superior military and economic strength" he said, "and keeps the free world united -all of which I believe we shall doit is unlikely Russia will risk all-out war". Foster further stated that the economic boom has now leveled off at a record high plateau and "the current sidewise movement will be lowed by an upward trend du lowed by an upward trend during the next decade, approximating the 40 per cent upward trend of the last 10 years."

The Music Operator And Copyright Legislation

Now that the results of an adverse decision have become most noticeable in the amusements field, operators engaged in automatic music have some idea of what can happen should legislation, adverse to their present business structure and practices, come into being on a national scale.

There isn't even an iota of a doubt that such copyright legislation, as ASCAP and similar other organizations, are trying hard to push thru Congress, would bring about the end of the automatic music business as it is known today.

It is up to every single music operator in the nation to be on his guard. To be alert. To be prepared. To cooperate in every fashion that will be indicated, when open hearings are called in Congress, on the two bills that are continued in the Sub-Committees On The Judiciary in both the Senate and the House.

These two bills, H.R. 9122 and S. 1870 should be in the possession of every music operator. They should be kept in a most prominent place. So that he can always remain alert to the fact that these bills are still awaiting hearings.

The music operator should indelibly impress on his mind the fact that these two bills can mean the end of the automatic music business as it is constituted today.

Passage of either one of these two bills will, most definitely, wipe out the greater majority of music operators. Push them out of business entirely. The additional overhead expense these two bills would bring into being would be an absolutely impossible load for the music operators to carry.

Tho this first session of the 85th Congress is over, the two bills hold good for the second part of this Congressional session which will re-open on January 7, 1958. No new bills have to be introduced.

This fall will find ASCAP, and similar such organizations, pushing harder than ever to get these bills out of the committees and onto the floors of both the Senate and the House for a vote when the 85th Congress returns for its second session.

Attorneys for both the manufacturers as well as for MOA are alert to this fact. But by and of themselves they are weak without the complete, staunch, unswerving support of every single music operator, his employees, his friends, his locations and everyone with whom he deals to help them.

The music operator must remain alert. He must be prepared for the time when a call will go forth for his immediate and all-out support to again defeat the copyright legislation proposed by H.R. 9122 and S. 1870.

(Editor's Note: Tear out this editorial. Paste it up in a prominent place in your office. Attach both H.R. 9122 and S. 1870 alongside of it. This is the one sure way of not forgetting that a dangerously sharp sword still continues to hang over the head of every automatic music operator in this nation.)

Nation's Ops Faced With: **ZOOMING OPERATING COSTS**

Constant Creeping Inflation Pushing Operating Overhead Expenses Higher and Higher. Leaders Agree With "The **Cash Box" That Answer is More Equi**table Share of Gross Intake With **Locations Sharing Expenses** As Well As Profits

CHICAGO—More and more oper-ator leaders, nationwide, agree with The Cash Box that the time has, at long last, arrived when the operators long last, arrived when the operators must stop working for their locations. "The time has come," as one well known operator advised, "when, like "The Cash Box' has editorialized, all have to arrange for a more equitable share of the gross intake from all equipment. We've got to make the storekeepers real partners. "They must share in the expenses

"They must share in the expenses as well as in the profits."

Constant creeping inflation con-tinues to zoom operating costs higher and higher. As this publication has been predicting for a long time, there is no relief in sight. The answer must come from the operators themselves.

They simply must get together with their location owners and point out that they can no longer continue ahead on any basis but that of a more equitable share of the gross intake from their equipment.

The loudest and greatest number of complainers about zooming overhead expenses are those operators who are still continuing to charge 5ϕ per play and continuing to operate on a 50%-50% commission basis.

How any operator can continue to charge a nickel (2ϕ) per play, exactly half of what he used to charge 18 years ago, in 1939, and pay over 350% more for new equipment plus over 450% more for operating over-head expense, no one but a fairy tale wizard will ever be able to answer.

If the nickel operators believe that there is enough gross intake to keep them in business, were it more equit-ably divided, then it is up to them to take this up with their locations.

take this up with their locations. The answer to constant increasing operating costs is for the operator to simply prove this to his locations. He must show his accountant's re-ports. He should sit down with each businessman whom he serves and prove that he must have a more equitable operating arrangement to be able to remain in business.

Certainly, even before he enters into such conversation, he should first change over to " 10ϕ play plus." Here he may find that he can continue on profitably without further aggravating his locations.

Such, being the possibility, then the operator who hesitates to adopt "10¢ Play Plus," as has been urged by The Cash Box for many, many months, is simply endangering his livelihood as well as his business future future

There is no doubt that, if he lets go of locations, someone else will take over who can intelligently sell the location owners on " 10ϕ play plus" a more equitable share of the gross in-take take.

Businessmen try every possible method prior to upsetting their cus-tomers. Operators must do the same.

They simply must arrange for a more equitable share of the gross intake and to do so must adopt either intake and to do so must adopt either a minimum (front money) guarantee, based on depreciating equipment over a one or two year period, or else a more logical commission basis of either 65%-35% or even 70%-30%but, in any case, must get 10ϕ play into operation first.

The huge telephone companies na-tionwide never hesitated for an in-stant when they realized that their coin operated phones were not bring-ing in income to match overhead ex-pense. They just simply pointed out this fact and were allowed to change over to 10ϕ per phone call.

Intelligent and hard-hitting oper-ators in various of the nation's urban centers followed suit. They immedi-ately adopted The Cash Box' sugges-tion, now over 14 years old, to change over to 10¢ play.

over to 10ϕ play. They further followed The Cash Box' suggestion over a year ago for " 10ϕ Play Plus" when continued creeping inflation was devaluating the American dollar and proved that even dime play wasn't enough to hold the profit line.

profit line. " 10ϕ Play Plus" front money, mini-mum, or a more equitable percentage basis is necessary for operators to be able to survive continued zooming overhead expenses and constant dollar devaluation caused by unchecked in-flationary forces.

Six Years On 100% **Dime Play**

COAL CITY, ILLINOIS—Melvin Burt of Burt Music, this city, advises that he has been on 100% dime play for the past six years.

"I was the first operator in Coal City to go on dime play," recalls Mel.

"And no matter what my competi-tors did, I remained on 100% dime play from the very beginning."

Mel Burt advises that operating on dime play has increased his collections from 25% to 30%.

Boston Judge Denies Injunction Asked by Boston Music Machine **Operators and Location Owners**

BOSTON, MASS.—The preliminary injunction asked by legal counsel rep-resenting Boston restaurant owners, cafes and the music machine industry challenging the legality of fees of up to \$160 a year for juke boxes, tv sets and radios in public places, was de-nied by Judge Vincent Brogna in Suf-folk Superior Court and pleadings of all parties were completed Tuesday, October 1. It is contemplated that as a result

October 1. It is contemplated that as a result of this action, the case will be speedily sent to supreme court for determina-tion, Atty. Hirsh Freed, counsel for a cafe in the test case, stated. That the constitutional guarantees of free speech and freedom of the press are applicable to automatic phono music was argued in Suffolk Superior Court. Judge Brogna at that time refused to issue a temporary injunction against public officials "performing their duties unless present in the courtroom." He ordered a hearing, and then denied a prel.minary injunc-tion and set October 1 as the date for all parties to have their pleading

all parties to have their pleading completed.

an particle to nave then preating completed. The test case now heading for the Massachusetts Supreme Court is seen as the opening move in the battle undertaken by the Music Operators Association of Massachusetts. Atty. Arthur Sherman, counsel for the Assn., and Atty. Hirsh Freed of the law firm of Brown, Rudnick and Freed, have been working on the ef-fort to have the "exorbitant" fees on phonos set by the city of Boston and the State lessened or wiped out. Boston ops must pay a total of \$160 per machine per year for seven day operation under the new fees set

January 1 of this year. They pay \$50 for a city license for weekdays; \$50 for a city Sunday license; \$50 for a State Sunday license; and \$10 Federal tax; total of \$160. A bill in equity is still to be filed, which will charge that an attempt to license a phono by exacting a fee is a prior restraint on free speech. The fees will also be attacked as excessive and excessive charge of services that prior restraint on free speech. The fees will also be attacked as excessive and excessive charge of services, that of policing the machines. They will also contend that playing of a disk is a form of entertainment which does not detract the playing of it from the protection of the free speech guaran-teed by the U.S. and State courts merely because a form of expression is used for purposes of entertainment. The attorneys told the association at a recent session that they will con-tend that simply because an enter-tainment form is used it does not take it out of the category of something which should be protected by the guarantees of free speech. In the case now being brought to Supreme Court, Freed was appearing as counsel for a cafe and other li-censed operators of restaurants and taverns in what is meant as a test case. The proceeding was a petition for a declaratory judgment in which Freed asked the court to rule that the Federal government alone has juris-diction over the licensing of the ty,

Freed asked the court to rule that the Federal government alone has juris-diction over the licensing of the tv, radio and juke boxes. Loss to the city under such a ruling would be many thousands of dollars a year. The Judge refused to issue a tem-porary order restraining city and state officials from collecting the li-cense fees, and later refused to issue an injunction.

In-Lines and Phonos Lead Sales Parade. Antwerp and Brussels Vie For Buying Honors. Both New and Used Equip't Featured

BRUSSELS, BELGIUM—The coin-biz boom here continues booming unabated.

After visiting England and France, the average coinman who visits An-twerp and Brussels begins to smile

again. Here in Belgium are the latest games and phonos from the U.S. Cafe owners consider the phonos and games their most important as-set. Even more valuable than their fixtures

Small cafes in both Antwerp and Brussels as well as in Liege and everywhere else in Belgium are jam-med with couples dancing to juke

box music. What's more, the music is 100% American. Nat "King" Cole is this nation's favorite. Louis Prima, Dean

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NICKEL AND DIME DISPENSERS

Martin, Pat Boone, Fats Domino, Louis Armstrong, and all the other U.S. pop stars are as well known here as they are in the U.S.

It's strange to hear conversation being carried on in Belgian and Flemish and an American songstar singing away in the vernacular of the

deep south. All know the titles of the latest disks. They're rushed here by air-mail. Phono importers here vie with each other on presenting the very newest "Disk O' The Week" from The Cash Box to their cafe locations. newest

With the forthcoming World's Fair to be held in Brussels, this city is cleaning, polishing, building and re-building. Overhead passes and roads go up overnight. An entire World's Fair city is rising up, seemingly out of nowhere, on the outskirts of Brus-

sels. The in-line games get greater play action here than was ever the case in the U.S. The average Belgian is ab-

the U.S. The average Belgian is ab-solutely mad over the suspense and thrill action of these games. A new in-line placed on location is an outstanding event. Players come from miles away to try the game. Their criticism decides whether it will be a hit or a flop or "just an-other game". The only sad shadow in all this fabulous coin picture is the fact that in Antwerp phono play is still at the low price of about 2¢. It's higher in Brussels. EP disks have raised the cost.

cost. "With the World's Fair coming here in '58," advises Frans Van Mal-der of National Music, who is among the nation's largest music ops as well as Rock-Ola distributor here in Brus-sels, "we are raising the price to 5 Francs per play, 5 plays for 20 Francs".

That will bring the cost up to 10¢

per play, five plays for 40¢. But Van Malder, like most ops in Belgium, gets \$25 minimum front money guar-antee. The ops then split whatever is left on a fifty-fifty basis. A very interesting sight for the

average comman from the U.S. is to walk along almost any street here in Brussels, or any other town in Bel-gium, and see the shining lights of the phonos and hear the games in action

Title strips are actually hand paint-ed and very colorful. In fact, they can actually be called works of art. Belgian pronunciation of the names

U.S. games brings many a chuckle Americans. For example, Dude anch is pronounced "DOODEH Ranch is pronounced "DOODEH RAHNCHEH". The "i" is softened in "bingo" and the word dragged out. Here it's "BIHNNGAW".

Regardless of pronunciation, and regardless of anything else. action is terrific here. Competition for sales to

cafes is getting keener by the min-ute. The price cutters keep merrily cutting away. Importation continues at a fast

pace. In-line games sellers are back-logged and the demand continues to gro

The British and French look on longingly. They come here to see the latest U.S. games and phonos. A few seem to stick to their fingers and sud-denly appear in their countries by divors motheds. divers methods.

The Belgians claim there are about 25,000 phonos already on locations in this nation of 9 million people. There are probably about 35,000 to 40,000 or more games in operation, they believe but no one seems to know lieve, but no one seems to know.

Taxes are high. Ops complain about constant, increasing costs. It all sounds like the good old U.S.A. but spoken in Belgian or Flemish. And the boom continues booming.

Belgium's Juke Box Hit Parade

BRUSSELS. BELGIUM - In view of the fact there are no disk jockeys featured on the government controlled radio, the nation's 25,000 juke boxes (the number continues to grow daily) set the hit parade.

Records featured in the juke boxes are 100% American tunes. Most obtain their disks from top record distributors here. A few, anxious to prove they are always first with the very latest (The Cash Box reviews and charts are used exclusively), order direct from U.S. One-Stops and have the disks flown to them here.

In a few cases a small indie disker will cut a pop tune with a Belgian songstar. But the demand is so great for the original U.S. version, that very, very few of such cuttings ever get anywhere. The public, young and old, know the American recording artists very well. They are emphatic in their demands for U.S. disks.

The juke boxes start each new tune on its way to popularity. The music must be danceable. The Belgians love to dance. Every cafe, regardless of how tiny it is, features a dance floor usually in an alcove, with a raised platform. The juke box is given the featured location in the cafe.

Every juke box is polished and shined daily by the cafe's employees. In view of the fact that juke box ops give 24 hour service there's never a darkened light bulb or an "out-oforder" machine. Cafe owners quickly admit that the juke box is their business mainstay. They treat it with the very greatest respect.

As do the juke box ops, the cafe owners vie with each other on presenting the latest U.S. tunes first. Cafe owners have become acquainted with The Cash Box. They watch the charts, along with the op, and ask to hear any disk that continues to climb.

In fact, new tunes are discussed with customers and, in many cases, entire conferences come about prior to a new disk being inserted into the juke box. The majority of title strips are works of art. They're painted in colors by professionals.

Most interesting is the system of barter and exchange for recordings. An old disk for a new disk or an old disk for an old disk. In each case, the price is different. Here, too, the bigger ops enjoy a profit.

Most interesting is the fact that the vocalists are singing in English and few here understand or speak English. But most can repeat the words while they sing the tune. This has resulted in more people studying English here than ever before in Belgian history. This is also true of Holland and Luxembourg.

There's a much closer feeling for Americans here due to the juke boxes than ever before. Most of the teenagers can make themselves understood to English speaking peoples. And this is attributed to juke box popularity here. The average boy or girl can rattle off the names of U.S. disk stars and their biggest hits just as fast as he or she can call for mama

as fast as he or she can call for mama or papa. The big problem facing the Bel-gian juke box op is to raise the cost of play. Due to the import cost of a new U.S. phono, higher prices for supplies, 24 hour service, demand for constant record changes, he must get close to dime play. The big hope is the 1958 World's Fair here in Brussels from April to October. Ops believe this is the golden opportunity to change to 1 play 5

Fair here in Brussels from April to October. Ops believe this is the golden opportunity to change to 1 play 5 Belgian Francs and 5 plays for the Belgian 20 Franc coin. This would be equivalent to 1 play 10¢, 5 plays for 40¢ in U.S. money. There are thousands of small cafes throughout Belgium. Most are jam packed on about three nights of every week with dancing to juke box music. The season of the year means very little even though air conditioned cafes are, as yet, unknown. Belgium's juke box biz is going ahead at such a fantastic rate that few can, as yet, point the course. The phono makes are well known to the cafe owners. Seeburg, Wurlitzer, Rock-Ola, AMI and United are tops. Then come a few German phonos, but the U.S. juke box is so outstand-ing here that whatever German pho-nos have been sold must be located in out of the way places

ng here that whatever German pho-nos have been sold must be located in out of the way places. As a new U.S. hit record is an-nounced for delivery there is much excitement among the ops and cafe owners. "Tammy" has been promised for the first work in Orthor Dir owners. "Tammv" has been promised for the first week in Ortober. Dis-cussions range from hot to cold. All argue whether the Belgians will like the tune as well as the artist. Deb-bie Reynolds is new here. But the discussions would create much inter-est among U.S. ops if they were pres-ent. And, perhaps, even bring out a chuckle or two as the Belgian juke box starts another disk into the na-tion's hit parade.

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

35% Of Germany's 40,000 **Phonos Are U.S. Manufactured**

HAMBURG, GERMANY - Leaders

HAMBURG, GERMANY — Leaders here estimate that there are now about 40,000 coin operated phono-graphs on location in Germany. Of this number they are inclined to estimate that about 35% are U. S. manufactured phonos. "The rest", they claim, "are German made ma-chines chines.

"Even tho", they state, "all will agree that the American juke boxes are the best, the fact remains that the operator can buy two German made phonos for what he has to pay for one U. S. juke box.

"What's more", they point out, "the German made juke boxes are getting better each year." In short, the average German coin-man wouldn't be surprised if the per-centage of phonos on locations thru-out this accuracius and anturnriin

out this aggressive and enterprising nation grows in favor of the German made product as the years go by. "Who knows", said a well known

German distributor, "but the day may come when the tables are turned and German manufacturers export to the U. S."

Germans Foresee More U.S. **Manufacturing Firms Opening** In Big European Cities

HAMBURG, GERMANY-Leading German commen are of the belief that more and more U. S. manufac-turers will tie in with German manu-

turers will tie in with German manu-facturers, or open their own manu-facturing plants here. They point to the sensation created by the new Ford car here. Ford owns 84% of the manufacturing set-up here. The price of this new Ford is roughly \$1,700. General Motors and its 100% own-ed Opel is giving Ford a run for the money. One of the new model Opel cars sells for only \$1,500. The Germans can't see amusement games manufacturers opening here due to the fast and furious changes in models. But they point to the Rock-Ola phonos now being built here by Nova Apparate Gesellschaft. They

Jamaican Travels Europe

HAMBURG, GERMANY - Gene Martinez, United Engineering Agencies, Kingston, Jamaica, B.W.I., is traveling thruout Europe making contacts for his firm.

Martinez explained that growing restrictions on American dollars has thrown many obstacles in the firm's path in its business dealings with the U. S.

In an effort to get parts and supplies for his firm's many machines, Martinez came to Europe to meet with manufacturers. He feels certain he will have arranged for very important contacts before he leaves Europe to return to the U. S. and then

to Jamaica. "This visit to Europe", he said, "has been a revelation to me. I was here in 1955, but the great growth that has taken place since is truly

It means that, by co-operating with each other, and cutting down on du-ties between each other, merchandise shipped in from outside the European Economic Union will be forced to pay much higher duties. Germans, therefore, feel it is to the advantage of all leading U. S. manufacturers to quickly awaken to the facts and to start manufacturing in Europe.

German Customs Reduces Import **Duties 3%**

HAMBURG, GERMANY-Tho not too much has, as yet, been openly publicized in this regard, the fact remains that custom duties here have been cut by 3 per cent on imports of new machines into this prospering, hard working country.

The result has been a general price reduction which greatly favors imports of new U.S. machines to this top operating nation.

Certain leading distributors have already advised their operators of price cuts on new machines in keeping with the new tariff rates.

Tho the new, lower duties went into effect as of August 20 of this year, effect as of August 20 of this year, they have just begun to have their full meaning on Germany's operators. By cutting the prices, importers are allowing ops to amortize new U. S. coin machines that much faster. This means better sales for the importers who have to compete with German made phonographs that sell here for half the price.



First German Made Rock-Olas Already in England. Nova Sets Up New Mfg. **Facilities. Firm Plans Ahead To'58 and** '59 Sales. Foresees Top Biz For German Made Rock-Olas in Years Ahead

HAMBURG, GERMANY — Rock-Ola coin operated phonographs are being assembled here at the impres-sive headquarters of Nova Apparate Gesellschaft, this city. The first of the new Rock-Ola phonos, 120 selection models, have been shipped to England and are on locations in London. The Rock-Olas made here feature a new German manufactured cabi-net, as well as German amplifier, speakers and other units. Alfred W. Adickes, who heads Nova, has 30 years of coin machine experience behind him, stated "We are not gauging our manufacture on just what can be done in a few short months. Instead, we are planning months. Instead, we are planning

ahead to 1958 and 1959. We do not

ahead to 1958 and 1959. We do not look upon the juke box manufactur-ing business as something that is of short duration." Adickes and his Nova organiza-tion are pointing ahead to the time when it may prove feasible for U.S. manufacturers to set up plants in Europe to offset whatever effects may come about when the European Eco-Europe to offset whatever effects may come about when the European Eco-nomic Union, composed of the West-ern European countries, begins to operate effectively. Tariffs on imports may rise, at that time, to much high-er levels. Very large American in-dustrialists have already recognized this possibility. They have plants in operation now in Germany as well as in other countries.

HAMBURG, GERMANY — Just like in London, England, the Es-presso coffee houses have caught a strong hold on the German public, and are mushrooming here like piz-za palaces in the U.S.

za palaces in the U.S. These coffee spots are crowded from early morning to late in the evening. And more of them are popping up everyday, everywhere in Germany's leading cities. Juke box operators, naturally, "ere among the very first to capital-ize on these locations. Today these opera ors vie with each other to be first to contract the new coffee house the moment it opens. Many are just long counters in

Many are just long counters in narrow stores with stools and high benches—with just enough room for petrons to stand up and enjoy a cup of Italy's famous Espresso coffee.

They're reported to be real great juke box locations. The enterprising

Imports of U. S. made Rock-Ola phonos, advised Adickes, are still ar-riving in good quantity. Shipments continue to Germany. Austria, Switz-erland, Belgium, Holland and other countries. These imports are now be-ing supplemented by shipments from the Nova plant here.

As production gets under way, Nova will add Italy to its shipping roster, in addition to England. But like all manufacturing getting under-way, the firm is undergoing the first production problems. More space for production problems. More space for manufacture has been obtained but already even this is proving insufGerman juke box op has quickly taken advantage of this fact. It is said a new coffee spot doesn't even think of opening without a juke box to help keep customers entertained.

Working For 10c Play

OCALA, FLA. — Fletcher G. Ful-ler of this city advises that he is working hard to change over his ma-chines to 10¢ play.



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"Ideas' Man Hits Town" **Reports England's "The World's Fair"**

Bill Gersh Interviewed On International Aspect Of The Coin Machine Industry

NEW YORK — The following is a report of an interview with Bill Gersh, publisher of The Cash Box, as report-ed in "The World's Fair", English weekly trade magazine devoted to the British Coin Machine industry. Into London last week swept one of the most dynamic international figures in the coin machine business. And it was international business that brought American William Gersh to Britain. Bill Gersh has been in the coin business since 1928. He is the founder-publisher of its leading Amer-ican Journal, "The Cash Box" having previously helped to found "Auto-matic Age." He is a brilliant ideas man, with the drive and ability to see them through. He was a prime mover in the found-

see them through. He was a prime mover in the found-ing of the powerful organization called the Music Operators of Amer-ica, and he has brilliantly led the successful campaign for 10-cent play. Now he has a new baby, and one he considers a vital necessity to the industry. The London response to it certainly confirmed his view. It is this. The industry has now reached such a world wide pitch that an or-ganization which can act as a plat-form for the sharing and solving of



problems between exporters, importers and others, is overdue. And Mr. Gersh has persuaded every major exporter of juke boxes and allied equipment in America to join an organization which is to be called the International Coin Machines Export-Import Council. He is now on a two-month tour of the main European centres of the in-dustry discussing with heads of every important branch of the industry the setting up of Council machinery. He came over following the scores of en-couraging letters from Europe which his original announcement of the plan provoked. "I always visit London first when I come to Europe," he told me, in an exclusive interview, just before he went on to Paris. "That way I build my European trips on a sure foundation. "In the past few days I've had full and frank talks with leaders of your industry." he added, "and I have been very much impressed by what they have had to tell me. I have also been very much impressed by the quality of the young men who have come into the business here recently. They are helping things along with brains and vigor.

are helping things along with brains

"It is obvious that the next few years will see a tremendous growth in the coin machine business here. There is obviously a great need for talks on an international scale to set-

There is obviously a great need for talks on an international scale to set-tle the many legal and human prob-lems that are constantly arising. "The International Coin Machine Export-Import Council will provide the platform for solving these prob-lems, and the machinery for an ex-change of information and opinion. "The scheme has been welcomed in Britain, as has the suggestion that the first annual meeting of the organi-zation should be held in Chicago next May, during the great M.O.A. con-vention that will be held there then. Not only will the exporters and im-porters be able to get together in the right atmosphere, but executives from all over the world will be able to see, at the same time, the very latest in at the same time, the very latest in juke boxes and allied equipment at the

juke boxes and allied equipment at the convention. "I already have promises from leaders of the industry in Britain that they will attend. "Letters I have had from virtually every operating country in the world indicate that the first Council meeting will take in every important territory.

every operating country in the world indicate that the first Council meeting will take in every important territory. I hope to go on to Asia in January (after my return to America from Europe) to meet exporters and im-porters there. Japan is now manu-facturing quite a number of models under license, and will soon be supply-ing many Far East countries, and al-ready there is considerable activity in Malaya and other places. "It will do so much good every-where when exporters and importers are able to get together through the Council, let their hair down, and solve mutual problems. At present there are many unnecessary misunderstand-ings. Maybe a box is wrongly packed for shipping to Europe and gets dam-aged on the way. The European im-porter thinks it's a dud he's been sold by the American exporter, who, in turn, when he gets letters of com-plaint, thinks the European man's a no-good-liar. I've had it all, both ways in conversations. "And very often the whole thing could be cured permanently if these two fellows (each excellent in his way) could just get together to re-solve their problems and plans. "In fact it will, I am sure have startling and satisfying results for (Continued on page 69)



Ships Overseas By Water All The Way

CHICAGO—J. A. (Art) Weinand, sales manager of Williams Manufac-turing Company, this city, reported that, whenever possible, export ship-ments of Williams' games go out from Chicago to overseas ports by water all the way.

Citing the many advantages of the "express service" to world buyers, Weinand, who claims to have pion-eered this service long before World War II, stated, "There's far loss handling Onco

"There's far less handling. Once the boat is loaded at the dock here in Chicago, the shipment is untouched until it reaches its destination. The games arrive in beautiful shape.

"The customer saves money when we route the shipment via the Great Lakes. As for the time", Weinand added, "it's about the same as over-land to the port of embarkation."

Shipping the games by water has proven best for Scandinavian coun-tries, The Netherlands and some ports in South America, Weinand said.

"Years ago," he explained, "the ves-sels used to stop off at many places along the lakes and the St. Lawrence River. But now, most of them provide express service.

"Unfortunately, this is not a year around operation," Weinand con-cluded. "By Thanksgiving, there's al-ways the chance that the boat could be locked in by ice."

Holland Juke Biz Grows Steadily

AMSTERDAM, HOLLAND - Not a booming phenomena like in Belgium but, instead, slow, steady growth characterizes Holland's juke box hiz.

This is attributed to the fact that This is attributed to the fact that the Dutch are a great home loving people. They do not patronize cafes in large numbers nor into the wee hours of the dawn as is the case in France and Belgium.

But the Dutch love pop music just as much as any of the other European countries.

In this nation of 11,000,000, Pat Boone, at present, leads the pop mu-sic stars. Pat's "I'll Be Home" sold over 75,000 copies. That's a big hit in Holland.

Slim Whitman's "Rose Marie" passed the 100,000 mark. Doris Day's "Que Sera, Sera" has passed 75,000 and is still selling very strong. Vera Lynn's "Auf Wiedersehn" reached about 98,000.

In short, pop tunes are just as much appreciated here in Holland as anywhere else on the globe. And even if Elvis Presley didn't click here as well as he has in other European countries, the Dutch kids still like music with the big beat.

Just like many other Europeans, Hollanders have to depend on little Luxembourg to hear deejays exploit new tunes. In Holland, the govern-

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ment radio and TV is based on news with LP background music.

But regardless of all this, Hol-land's juke box biz enjoys steady growth. Cafes have new phonos. The music, on a fine day, drifts out to the passersby in the street from the cafes.

cafes. For a 3ϕ phone call, Hollanders here can listen to the latest pop tunes. This is a service of the Phillips peo-ple. It started with one telephone line as an experiment, just a short time ago, and now there are 18 phone lines. There will probably be more before the year is over. The TV bug has also bitten the Hollander. He forgets to leave his comfortable chair at home while en-grossed in his own TV movie screen. This usually lasts from 6 to 9 months. He then gets over the novelty of his

He then gets over the novelty of his. He then gets over the novelty of his TV receiver and returns to his for-mer habits and haunts. Salesmen continue to scurry about selling the idea of juke box music to cafe owners and all other possible locations.

locations. It will take a little more time but all feel sure that juke box music is bound to catch on and that Hol-landers will all be great juke box players.

Holland Phono Ops Educate Locations

AMSTERDAM, HOLLAND-This city of about 1,00,000 people, according to a well-known record and juke box distributor, has, at this time, from 200 to 300 juke boxes on locations here.

Most of these are used phonos imported from the U.S. But, in view of the fact used phonos can and do give lots of trouble, this distributor as well as other distributors of new phonos, believes that sales of new juke boxes will continue to grow.

It's only the past 5 to 6 years that It's only the past 5 to 6 years that juke boxes began to appear in Hol-land. The Dutch being homebodies don't gather about in cafes as do the French and Belgians. The big prob-lem, among cafe owners, is to make their places so attractive that the local Dutch will come out of their homes and patronize their places.

The downtown business sections of Amsterdam, mostly patronized by travelers and tourists, is where the majority of the 200 to 300 phonos in Amsterdam are located. The outlying suburban sections have only a few of the music machines the music machines.

But the Dutch salesman is an ag-gressive and persistent individual. He feels it takes about 100 calls to break down the average cafe owner's

resistance. This keeps him going on ahead. And this bulldog tenacity is bound to build business. At least that's what the juke box distribs believe will happen over a period of time.

Southern Holland, it is reported here, has the far greater majority of juke boxes on location. This area is also growing greater as more ma-chines of every kind are being placed on locations.

Strange to say, the Dutch here in their capital of Amsterdam, point with pride to Southern Holland as their most progressive area as far as juke boxes are concerned.

The business of selling juke boxes to cafe owners is a very good one. The entire transaction is handled through the banks. The seller gets his price from the banker. The cafe owner usually makes arrangements to pay the bank. Then the seller con-tinues contact by selling new records to the cafe owner. to the cafe owner.

to the cafe owner. Though the juke box business has met with some comment here and there, due to American motion pic-tures portraying juke box ops as any-thing but righteous business men the industry continues to move ahead and, it is believed, in time will be an im-portant element in the entertainment of all the people here.

Norwalk opened the session with the invitation to the men present to attend the AMI schools held regularly one full week each month in Grand Rapids. He introduced Cliff Bitting as the

He introduced Cliff Bitting as the man who teaches the schools at the factory, in addition to other engineer-ing duties. Bitting, supervisor of field service for AMI, conducted the class. Time limitations did not permit Bitting to go into all details of the AMI mechanism during the session, but he thoroughly described the com-ponent parts and their functions, showed where they are located in the phonograph, how to get at them eas-ily and gave the names of the parts. He then went into the principles of operation, touching on certain servic-ing adjustments that may quickly be done on location. Bitting emphasized the accessibility of the transfer (toggle) switch, which in this year's "H" models has been simplified in number of parts.

For Mechanics" the phonograph will be explained in greater detail. At the end of the class there was a ques-

be explained in greater detail. At the end of the class there was a ques-tion and answer period. Refreshments and coffee were served at 10:00 P. M. both sides. They'll shake hands and the former will say to the latter in effect: 'I didn't know you were so helpful. I could certainly use a hun-dred pieces of equipment if you could help me get them into my country.' "International financial customs, and trade problems, often of a highly-complicated legal nature, also want sorting out by Council lawyers and want to be passed on to members with authority and speed. So many troubles would never happen if this was done. There could be many more machines in Britain, and fewer financial and customs problems, if there was a high-level exchange of information and sharing of counsel. "In addition, this could and should

sharing of counsel. "In addition, this could and should be a two-way traffic. American manu-facturers hate to have to leave money uselessly in a foreign country. Amer-ican financiers do not want to make dollars so scarce that no one can trade with them. American distributors want to handle British and other for-eign equipment. The Council could greatly assist in helping European exporters to send machines and acces-sories to America. "With the sort of growth in the

"With the sort of growth in the industry that is going on all over Europe, it may well be that surprising

things will happen in the next year or two. And anyway, if the inter-national machinery exists it will be so much easier to get together and work out deals of all sorts. "As happened with M.O.A., I will step out as soon as the Council is firmly established, and let them get on with it. I have no ulterior or par-tisan motive. I'm just convinced that it is one of the greatest needs in our business at the moment, and that it will become even more useful in the near future when jet travel brings our two continents virtually as close as Britain and the Continent are today." With "powerhouse" Gersh as he sped on to France last weekend— prior to visiting a dozen European countries, was his charming wife who writes a column in "The Cash Box" about "Us Gals." Of "School For Mechanics" Trade Terms On Coin Equip't.

HAMBURG, GERMANY—The fact that Western Germany coinmen are enjoying good business here is in no small way from all reports, due to the liberal financing now in vogue.

Operators get anywhere from 12 to 24 months, and in many cases without even a down payment, to pay for the machines they buy (with the exception. of state-accepted slots). This is a deciding factor in the continuation of the present coinbiz boom.

the present coinbiz boom. This very liberal financing policy, even tho it is profitable for the sellers, is still a high water mark as far as business procedure is concerned. It means that the importing distributor of phonographs and games must have unusually fine financing arrangements and a great resource of liquid assets. As can be quickly surmised, distribut-ing here is no business for the finan-cially weak. Not only does it require large sums of money to be able to keep importation of machines moving, but even more financial strength to handle the ensuing sales. Tho there is a profit, most naturally, in the fi-nancing end of the business, the chances taken on importing quanti-ties of certain machines far over-shadow the profit factor.

A few mechanically imperfect num-bers, imported in quantity, can mean the end of even a financially respon-sible firm. This has already hap-pened. And will continue to be the

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case except where great care is ex-ercised. The optimism and financial derring-do of the average recognized distributor here is, to say the least, extremely valorous from any viewpoint.

These distributors, by their very confidence in the industry and their willingness to back their faith with all the finances at their command, are really responsible for the continued boom now under way here. As men-tioned above, many take no down pay-ments and allow 24 months to pay. This may amaze some U.S. distribu-tors, especially those who have pulled in their financial horns, but here in Germany it is not considered amaz-ing. Rather, it is considered part and parcel of the distributing busi-ness. ness.

Distributors in Germany also oper-ate. They make every endeavor, how-ever, not to clash with the very oper-ators whom they are helping to fin-nance. They go all-out to help the operator, even to aiding in promotion and shopkeeper education. Where op-erators hesitate to place new type machines, the importer-distributor will act as the trial horse and turn operator to establish the success of the machine. the machine.

Keen observers are certain that the future success is assured as long as the importing distributor continues to offer liberal financing policies.

CHICAGO—Bill DeSelm, sales man-ager, United Manufacturing Com-pany, this city, reported this past week that the firm is shipping the new "Jumbo Bowling Alley" with 2 plays for 25ϕ as standard equipment.

Plays for 25¢ as standard equipment. "Almost our entire demand," De-Selm stated, "for this great new bowling game, is for the quarter chutes to be installed right here at the factory. We know of very few operators who change it back to dime play after they have placed the game on location.

"What's more" he added, "with our 'Jumbo Bowling Alley', the operators

are receiving the major portion of the gross, usually 65 per cent." DeSelm pointed out that location owners realize this is an expensive piece of equipment, and are therefore inclined to go along with the oper-ator on a more equitable commission basis, if he hasn't done so before.

Locations also know, DeSelm said, that this game has "longevity," that it will earn bigger returns, that it will increase the attractiveness of his place of business and that it will dress up his location.

"Our new 'Jumbo' is the kind of attraction that makes each spot a local neighborhood club, where all get together regularly and often for fun and relaxation," DeSelm asserted.

and relaxation," DeSelm asserted. Many letters received by United Manufacturing from operators all over the country indicate that they are highly elated over the fact that players are accepting the new ball bowler on 2 for 25ϕ play, according to DeSelm.

Both the location and the operator Both the location and the operator find that there are no complaints in regard to the quarter coin chute. They also report that it's just as easy to get a quarter from two players, which means they are getting 20% more than the same game operated on one player for a dime player for a dime.

DeSelm also pointed out that United is helping the operator toward a more profitable and more equitable division of the increased earnings when the games have quarter coin chutes when shipped from the factory. "The operator places the new bowler

Juke Box Ops More **Equitable Share**

"But the big problem for oper-ators," in his estimation, "is to some-how step up income sufficiently to match increasing costs."
