

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Juke Boxes Lead The Way In Promoting

STEREOPHONIC SINGLES!

Once more the juke box industry is leading the way in promoting a vast change in the record industry. For the introduction of stereophonic juke boxes has created a pressing demand for stereophonic singles and EPs long before the record industry as a whole thought the need would arise. As a matter of fact, until the needs of juke box manufacturers were made known to the record firms, most record execs had no intention of issuing stereophonic singles for the time being. They planned first to introduce stereophonic through albums and let its first acceptance come through that medium.

This whole development indicates once more the interdependence of the record and juke box industries. For in the past the needs of juke boxes have also determined the course that the record industry had to take. For instance, when 45rpm was first introduced, it was thought that it would be a long, long time before 78's were completely eliminated. Yet that very thing has come to pass years before anyone would have thought it possible because 45's turned out to be ideal for juke box use and the exposure and promotion which juke boxes gave to these records speeded up

immeasurably their acceptance by the public.

Likewise in pre-juke box days, records used to run anywhere from three to four minutes and sometimes longer. Yet this sort of time was completely impractical as far as juke box operating was concerned for a machine obviously could take in only half its potential income if records ran four minutes instead of two. Therefore operators were forced to buy the shorter timed records for their machines and in turn record companies were gradually constrained to issue more and more shorter timed disks until today it is a rare occurrence when a record reaches three minutes.

Now once again the juke box industry is paving the way for the promotion of stereophonic singles by the speed with which it is accepting and making use of this new development. And in the very near future, as more juke box manufacturers introduce stereophonic machines, the drive to stereophonic will be further accelerated. Once again therefore we are witnessing the vital effect which each of these great industries—records and juke boxes—have upon each other.

Record dealers throughout the nation will merchandise the "Keys a la Carte" program vial four-color film strip window streamers showing the covers of all the albums, a window-counter display unit, and a three-foot pre-assembled mobile.

Bulk allocation of the albums is being made available to disk jockeys throughout the country as well.

Capitol Signs Jeri Southern

HOLLYWOOD—Jeri Southern has signed an exclusive long-term contract with Capitol Records, it was announced last week by Glenn E. Wallichs, President of the company. She will record both single records and albums for the label, Wallichs said.

Long regarded as a top vocalist, Miss Southern's previous recordings have included such hits as "An Occasional Man," "Married I Can Always Get," and "You Better Go Now."

In addition to her recording work and appearances on major network TV shows, the songstress has performed in supper clubs and in concert halls throughout the United States, Canada, and in Mexico City.

Miss Southern's recording sessions in the Capitol Tower will be supervised by Capitol artist and repertoire producer Tom Morgan.

Miss Southern previously recorded for Decca and Roulette.

Mercury President Thanks Foreign Affiliates For Platters' Success Abroad

CHICAGO—The Platters, Mercury recording stars, returned last week to the United States, after a highly successful six-month tour of Europe and the Middle East.

The response to The Platters' visit was tremendous, according to reports, and they set attendance records, wherever they appeared. Much of the credit for the great popularity attained by the Platters abroad, Mercury attributes to its vast network of Foreign Affiliates and Licensees. Mercury's President, Irving Green stated. "The reception given The Platters is a testimonial to the conscientious endeavor and loyalty of our Affiliates and Licensees and I want to take this opportunity to publicly express the gratitude of Mercury and The Platters. I also feel that this is the proper time to relieve any apprehensions that our foreign friends might have over Mercury's recent pacting with the gigantic E. M. I. Records Ltd. of England. To clarify the situation, the E. M. I. agreement calls only for the handling of Mercury's repertoire in England and the British Empire (with the exclusion of Australia, Canada, Hong Kong, Jamaica and New Zealand) and under no circumstances will there be any infringement into territories in which Mercury has contractual obligations with any of our existing Affiliates and Licensees."

The foreign firms to which Green refers are: Inter-Bas of Argentina; Electronic Industries of Australia; Otto G. Preiser of Austria; Discopress of Belgium; Fabrica De Discos Rozenblit of Brazil; Quality Records Ltd. of Canada; Industrias Electricas Y Musicales of Chile; Colombiana Del Sonido Ltda of Colombia; Metronome Records of Denmark; Yacoumopolous of Egypt; E. M. I. Records Ltd. of England; Ackumulator Industri of Finland; Compagnie Phonographique Francaise (Barclay-Disque) of France; The Icaros Record Co. of Greece; Metronome Records of Germany; C. N. Rood of Holland; Diamond Mercury Record Co. Ltd. of Hong Kong; Hed-Arzi of Israel; Gurtler & Co Ltd. of Italy; Records Ltd. of Jamaica; King Record Co. Ltd. of Japan; Corporacion Nacional Electronica of Mexico; Pye Ltd of New Zealand; Brodrene Johnsen of Norway; Super Record Co. of the Philippines; J. C. Donas, Lda. of Portugal; Mercury Espanola of Spain; Trutone of Africa Ltd. of South Africa; Metronome Records of Sweden; Gurtler & Co. of Switzerland; Gramofon Turk Limitet Surtketi of Turkey; and Ricardo Y Rodolfo Giocia of Uruguay.

Mercury's overseas operation had its beginning back in 1948, scarcely a year after Mercury had come into corporate being. Irving Green, the firm's President and Irwin Steinberg, a Vice-President and Treasurer, focused on the foreign market as a prime source of additional income for the company. Closely studying the activity of the major record powers at that time, the two felt that the international market was still untapped. The financial burden of domestic growth prevented an exploratory visit to each country to determine who could best represent the Mercury label. However, Green and Steinberg, in time, compiled a prospectus list

and using it as a "tour guide", Green personally flew around the world to set up the working agreements; when he returned after several months abroad, Mercury had an international set up. The first Licensees to sign with Mercury and who have been associated with the firm since the inception of its foreign policy are Trutone of South Africa, Metronome of Sweden, Barclay-Disques of France, and Diamond-Mercury of Hong Kong.

With the expanding growth of additional affiliates and licensees, it became necessary to create a special division that would devote itself to the intricate problems at hand. Consequently in 1950, the International Division of Mercury was formed with headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland. Brice Somers of Britain was retained by Green to serve as Director of the Division. Somers' two key lieutenants are R. G. "Dick" Whittington, whose territory includes Europe and the Middle East; and Dr. Leo Vidal, who handles the South and Central American Record scene.

The Platters have not been the only artists who have benefitted from the coverage of Mercury's foreign network. In the period of ten years, Mercury has expanded its international interests to a point where it now has thirty-two Foreign Affiliates who provide Mercury with representation in some of the most important market areas of the world. Because of this factor, Mercury talent such as Sarah Vaughan, Billy Eckstine, The Diamonds, The Gaylords, Florian Zambach, and others have found lucrative bookings overseas.

In many instances, Mercury's agreement with an Affiliate is a reciprocal arrangement, — a circumstance that has provided the parent Organization with many artists and records that have proven to be outstanding sellers here in America. Some of the more notable imports have been, "Lullaby of Birdland" by the Blue Stars, recorded by France's Barclay-Disques; "The Little Train" by Vassel and Storz, sent by Metronome of Germany; "Come Prima" by Tony Dalardo, imported from Gurtler and Company of Italy, and currently climbing the charts in this country; one of the most promising singing discoveries of recent vintage, Ernestine Anderson, whose "Hot Cargo" album, originally recorded in Sweden by Metronome, has been on the best selling album lists here; and a wide assortment of album material from many of the other Affiliates and Licensees.

Within the last ten years, Irving Green has made twenty-three trips across the oceans in an effort to maintain a close personal relationship with each of his licensees. Other Mercury executives who have visited foreign lands on behalf of the International Division are Art Talmadge, Vice-President in charge of Artist & Repertoire; Irwin Steinberg; Wilma Cozart, Vice-President in charge of the Classical Division; and David Carroll, the firm's Musical Director and an important member of the Artist & Repertoire Staff.

In an equalizing gesture, representatives of every one of Mercury's Foreign Affiliates & Licensees, have visited the Mercury Home Offices in Chicago within recent times.

Responsibility at the Home Office for coordination of all affairs that pertain to the Foreign Affiliates and Licensees, rests largely on the shoulders of Mathilde Cuburnek, Office Manager of the International Division; Marvin Wolfberg, Mercury's Comptroller, who aids in the handling of the financial facets; and Tom Schlesinger, the firm's Publicity Director, who keeps the far away places informed with the news of Mercury's activities. In addition, a staff of fifteen girls devote their time exclusively to the paper work.

The presentation was made in the fifth-grade classroom of Mrs. Calhoun. Thousands of cards from dozens of states were received in the contest conducted by Race on his midnight to 6 a.m. show.

A veteran of fifteen years in the music business, Cain had started as a trumpet player with Noro Morales and Miguelito Valdes. He has worked on TV shows for both the CBS and NBC networks and is an accomplished writer and arranger. Cain stated that he is in the market for new Latin talent for Seeco and can be reached at the label's offices.

Warner Signs Artists

BURBANK, CALIF.—Warner Bros. Records added to its growing talent roster last week with the signing of term contracts with three artists: the Chico Hamilton Quintet, the Sonny Moon Orch., and a vocal group called the Stereos.

Chico Hamilton, winner of numerous jazz polls for the past few years joined Warner Bros. following negotiations with artist and repertoire director George Avakian. Drummer Hamilton begins a two-month national tour shortly with dates in New York, Baltimore, Miami, Detroit, Philadelphia and Los Angeles. He is scheduled for a European tour in March 1959.

The Stereos, a new vocal group, were also signed and discovered by Avakian in New York. Their first release, "Freeze Mambo" and "Solo Mio Rock" has just been released.

The Sonny Moon Orchestra makes its debut via two sides titled "Count Down" and "Remem'bring."

Stereophonic Disk Club Formed By Bel Canto

HOLLYWOOD—Bel Canto Records has formed a stereophonic record club which will enable purchasers of the label's two channel disks to receive free albums. The company will include a certificate in each album sold, six of which will entitle the collector to the Bel Canto LP of his choice free. The entire transaction will be handled at the dealer level, eliminating the usual contract to purchase a number of albums to qualify for the free one.

Meanwhile, Bel Canto will release five new albums in the pop field this week and two in its classical series.

"Introducing Si Zentner and His Dance Band," features the former Jimmy Dorsey and Harry James lead trombonist and his newly formed orchestra. Vocals are by Lynn Franklin. Also by Zentner is "High Noon Cha Cha Cha," with Latin arrangements by Billy May. "Didn't It Rain," is an album of Negro spirituals recorded by The Exciting Voices, conducted by Evelyn Freeman and backed by full orchestra. "Fran," marks the vocal debut of newcomer Fran Lacey. "Larry Fotine and The Beale Street Buskers," presents an album in Dixieland. In the classical series is "Quintet for Piano and Strings, Opus 81" by Dvorak and "Quartet for Piano and Strings" by Beethoven backed with "Quartet in G Minor for Piano and Strings—K478" by Mozart.

Stuarti Set For Arthur Murray TV Appearance

NEW YORK—Enzo Stuarti, recently signed to an exclusive recording contract with United Artists Records, is set for an appearance on the Arthur Murray show on NBC-TV on Monday, November 10. Stuarti, whose current record for United Artists is "Come Prima," is making a return visit after scoring on his last exposure on the Murray show.

Stuarti will sing "Come Prima" as one of his numbers.

Previous TV credits include several dates on the Ed Sullivan show and "Tonight." He is a veteran of such Broadway hits as "Two on the Aisle," "As the Girls Go" and the Jones Beach spectacular, "Night In Venice."

Jerome To Hit The Road For Roulette

NEW YORK—Irv Jerome, newly appointed National Sales head of Roulette, hits the road at the tail end of the month to meet with Roulette distributors and District Sales and Promotion Managers and promote Roulette album and single sales. Joe Kolsky, Roulette Executive Vice President, should be back from his road tour by the time Jerome goes out.

On his initial jaunt for the diskery since his appointment, Jerome will lay emphasis on Roulette's new album release, the first under Jerome. The new release will be kicked-off about November 15, and Jerome will cover as many markets as he can on its behalf.

The term District Sales & Promotion Manager is a new title for Roulette promotion men. Such men will be held responsible for sales as well as promotion in their areas, and will devote more time with salesmen and in retail shops.

Victor To Release Menotti's "Maria Golovin"

NEW YORK—RCA Victor will release a complete recording of Gian-Carlo Menotti's new opera, "Maria Golovin." The cast will include all the original singers who created their roles when the opera made its world-bow as an NBC Opera Company Production at the Brussels World's Fair in August. Among them are Franca Duval, Patricia Neway, Richard Cross and William Chapman. Orchestra and chorus are conducted by Peter Herman Adler.

The opera will be a special Red Seal release and will be issued on 3 LP's. "Maria Golovin" will mark Menotti's third operatic recording on the RCA Victor label, following "Amahl and the Night Visitors" and "The Saint of Bleeker Street." Menotti is also represented in the RCA Victor catalog by the recent Pulitzer-Prize winning "Vanessa," for which he wrote the libretto for Samuel Barber's music.

Promoting Through Hats

NEW YORK—MGM's Ben Cutler "Debutante Party" society package is being promoted via a hat Cutler gives away at his dance engagements, and which is being made available to MGM distributors at 17¢ per hat (the remaining portion of the 50¢ per hat cost is being shared by Cutler and MGM).

MGM suggests distributors use the hat for distribution to disk jockeys, dealers, local record reviewers, and for displays in dealer windows along with dummy covers.

Phillips Joins Gem & United

NEWARK, N. J.—Bill Borak, prexy of Gem and United Record Pressing Companies, announced last week the appointment of George Phillips as Director of Stereo Record Production for both Gem and United.

Phillips, who hails from New Zealand, has over ten years in the disk pressing industry, having served as plant engineer for Columbia Records West Coast branch, and most recently with American Sound in Belleville, N. J.

Boyd Raeburn To Sell Design Records In B.W.I.

NEW YORK—Cy Leslie, president of Pickwick Sales Corporation, parent firm of Design, Stereo Spectrum and Cricket Records, announced last week that he has concluded a deal with Boyd Raeburn's "Island Artists Limited" to act as exclusive distributors for the Design line in the British West Indies.

Raeburn is vice-president and major stockholder in Island Artists, Ltd., which in addition to being a recording firm is also the holding company for Drake Enterprises Ltd. and Entertainment Enterprises Ltd.

Raeburn stated that he will make his home in Nassau and will fly back to the States only when he is needed for important band dates, to huddle with the Design execs or to record for Design, with whom he has a free-lance deal as an artist-arranger and producer.

Hallmark Participates In "Stereophonic Pop Concert"

NEW YORK — Hallmark Records took part in a "Stereophonic Pop Concert" held at New York's Carnegie Hall, Sunday, November 2.

The affair, part of the International Music Salute commemorating Israel's Tenth Anniversary, featured the Symphony of the Air, live, conducted by D'Artega. The stereo highlight was a "Holiday In New York" stereo portrait which featured the D'Artega orchestra and a Hallmark stereo tape demonstration of various big city sounds (subway, shooting gallery, air planes, etc.). Music by the the Symphony of the Air was integrated into the Milton Cross narrated tape.

Performers included Roger Schime, pianist; Shoshana Shohan, Soprano; Val Valente, tenor, and Herbert Mayer, composer-conductor.

Don Shirley To Have First Symphony Performed

NEW YORK—Pianist-composer Don Shirley who is currently being heard with his trio at the Hickory House will have his first symphony publicly performed on Saturday afternoon, January 3, by the Gallery Concert Orchestra at the Museum of the University of Pennsylvania.

A symphony for strings, this will mark Shirley's debut as a symphony composer though he has composed for organ, string ensembles and for piano as well as creating all his own compositions for records, night club appearances and concerts. Shirley's new trio, with Ken Fricker on bass, and Juri Taht on cello, which opened at the Hickory House in September has been held over for the months of November and December. The Music of Don Shirley will be heard on an Audio-Fidelity album to be released shortly.

Destiny's First Release

NEW YORK — Robert Archibald, prexy of Destiny Records, this city, announced last week that the firm's first releases will be available sometime during the week of November 15. In addition, Archibald announced the pacting of former RCA Victor and nitery thrush Kathy Barr to an exclusive long-term contract to the label.

National distribution for Destiny has been set-up in key areas. Archibald stated that he will enter the LP market soon.

Victor Ships Xmas Package To DeeJays

NEW YORK—With Christmas programming needs of the disk jockey in mind, RCA Victor is shipping to its entire disk jockey list a specially prepared long play album, "Twelve Ways to Easy Christmas Programming," and three new Christmas singles, it was announced last week by Ray Clark, Manager, Planning and Merchandising, Single Records.

The three new Christmas singles, Harry Belafonte's "I Heard The Bells on Christmas Day"/"Mary, Mary," packed in a Christmas sleeve, David Hill's, "Christmas Bride"/"Christmas In Your Heart," and Hugo Winterhalter's "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer Cha-Cha"/"Christmas Song Cha-Cha," the latter already sent, are shipping with the album on November 18.

Clark pointed out that "Twelve Ways to Easy Christmas Programming," will simplify the task of the disk jockey in programming past and current Christmas music, for the album includes such all-time best selling singles currently available in stores and station libraries, such as "Sleigh Ride," "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer," (the Winterhalter "Cha-Cha" version), "White Christmas," "Come All Ye Faithful," "I'll Be Home For Christmas," and "Mary's Boy Child," the world-wide Belafonte million seller. Artists featured in this album include Como, Belafonte, Winterhalter, Lanza, Arthur Fiedler and the Boston Pops, and Spike Jones.

Another important feature for the disk jockey, according to Clark, will be the specially prepared album sleeve with a complete listing of RCA Victor Christmas single merchandise already available in the station library, with timing, publisher and affiliation noted for each selection.

MGM In Audio-Visual Release Presentation

NEW YORK—MGM Records is presenting its audio-visual slide presentation on its new releases to dealers in Hartford, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Buffalo. MGM Records' presentation to distributors was so successful that special shows are being arranged for dealers at the request of distributors. Dealer shows are being set up at the Colony Restaurant in Hartford, the Carlton House in Pittsburgh, the Warwick in Philadelphia and the Lafayette in Buffalo. MGM Records expects to continue to present these audio-visual slide programs with each new album release, the next one being scheduled for January.

"Trans-Bay Stereo Network"

SAN FRANCISCO — KJBS, San Francisco and KROW, Oakland have joined forces to establish the "Trans-Bay Stereo Network" with regularly scheduled stereo programming. While other systems for stereophonic broadcasting have been employed since Audio Fidelity's introduction of the Stereodisc to San Francisco early last February, the KJBS-KROW wedding marked the first AM-AM set up for simulcasting in this area. Chatton Distributing Company, one of the top stereo distributors for Northern California reports heavy interest in programming itself and albums featured.

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
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Cash Box Survey Finds:

Record Distributors Overwhelmingly Optimistic About Rest Of Year's Business

NEW YORK—A survey just completed by The Cash Box shows that the nation's record distributors are overwhelmingly optimistic about the business prospects for the remainder of the year. A smashing 87% of the distributors predicted that when the final 1958 sales figures were tallied the results would range from good to excellent. Only 13% took the negative attitude and predicted that the results would be poor.

Another result of the survey was surprising in view of the consistent moans heard about the trade in recent weeks. 60% of the distributors stated that Fall business had been even better than that of the summer—and such statements carried more weight in view of the 72% who had rated their summer business from good to excellent. However, the talk throughout the trade that Fall business was not as heavy as had been expected was substantiated by a strong minority of 40% of the nation's distributors.

Distributors indicated, and this is certainly no news to the disk trade, that their prime interests were singles and albums, while ep's showed no real strength. Distributors evaluated ep's as 0 to 5% of their gross sales. The surging strength of LPs was indicated when distributors evinced more interest in the package goods than in singles. Obviously, while distributors recognize the importance of singles in today's and future markets, they see even greater importance of the LP in the overall picture.

The distributors' optimistic feelings for the 1958 sales picture as a whole was based primarily on the surprising strength of stereo package sales, and the certainty of its growth with the absorption of stereo phonograph sets by the consumer. With saturation drives in all phases of equipment and stereo record promotion being launched immediately and in the months to come, distributors look to the future with great anticipation.

From the hundreds of suggestions supplied by the distributor, the following seemed to be the most agreed upon solutions for bettering the record industry.

The Rack Jobber — Distributors seem to feel that the rack jobber presented a major problem to the distributor and the retail store in that he handled only the hits and prevented the traffic from coming into the retail store which stocked the manufacturer's entire line. This eventually hurt the manufacturer in that he loses the plus sales that usually go along with the "hit" sales.

The Discount House — This is usually a bulk operation that pulls enough business away from the small retail shop that cannot exist without

a full profit. The great number of smaller retail shops that go by the wayside are deemed a necessary part of the record business.

The One-Stop — Distributors feel that the one-stop should be a one-stop in actuality and not sell below dealer cost.

Too Many Releases — Almost all the distributors seemed agreed that there were too many releases and that the manufacturers should stop issuing junk and even average records. (Manufacturers would also like to issue only hits, but when they ship samples they think they are mailing "hits".)

Don't Follow A Hit Artist Too Quickly — A strong complaint from several areas is that manufacturers follow a hit artist with his next release when the hit is still in the top ten. This, they claim, causes a sudden cessation of sales and starts the returns from the stores.

Trans-shipping. No comments necessary.

More Local Promotional Aid — Distributors feel that the manufacturer should cooperate to a greater extent with local newspaper and deejay promotion.

Reduction In The Price Of The Single — Many distributors feel that the price of the single is out of line with that of the ep and lp and that a more realistic price structure might bring the traffic back into the store.

Prevent Use Of Record As Loss Leader Item — A popular complaint of the distributor was the use of the record as a loss-leader item by department stores. This, they felt, was unfair competition in that dealers who lived only on the income from the sale of records could not afford to meet the cut price and stay in business. Manufacturers could help by not making special deals with large department stores and chains.

Train Retail Salesmen — One of the complaints registered was that too many of the employees in the retail shops were clerks—not salesmen. Several distributors asked manufacturer aid to set up some kind of local school to train the retailer and his staff in the principals of selling.

There was also irony in some of the "beefs" proffered by the distributor. One of the greatest problems of the manufacturer is the 100% guarantee that he feels he is obliged to give the distributor which places him in the position of consigning instead of selling. In this survey many distributors complained of the same thing. Only they objected to the fact that they (the distributor) had to give the 100% guarantee to the retailer.

Elisabeth Schwarzkopf offers scenes from many great operettas—DuBarry, Casanova, Count of Luxembourg, Zarewitsch, Boccaccio and others.

Maria Callas presents highlights from Verdi and scenes from Rigoletto.

Birgit Nilsson makes her Fall 1958 debut with the Chicago Lyric Opera. With Hans Hotter and the Philharmonia Orchestra she is heard in scenes from The Flying Dutchman and Die Walkure.

A program of the music of Prokofiev, Liadov and Tchaikovsky, features Nicolai Malko and the Philharmonia Orchestra.

Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau continues his recording program with a collection of the Songs of Richard Strauss.

Duets from Otello, Faust, Carmen, Pearl Fishers and Iris complete the

vocal records in the November "opera month" release. Rosanna Carteri and Giuseppe di Stefano together sing the Love Duets, accompanied by the Sinfonia di Milano, Antonio Tonini conducting.

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



"GORME SINGS SHOWSTOPPERS" — Edye Gorme—ABC Paramount. ABC-254

The songstress provides some disk-stoppers of her own in this excellently performed collection of show-tunes that were highnotes of their respective shows. Displaying great variety of expression, Miss Gorme masters the outlook of such fineries as "My Funny Valentine", "You're Just In Love", "Hello Young Lovers" and "Johnny One Note". Should be the performer's biggest album seller yet.



"DANCE WITH DICK CLARK"—(Volume 1)—ABC Paramount ABC-258

The teen magic of the Clark name gives this package of beat instrumentals a sure ticket to the charts. Arranger Don Costa has set a sure-handed beat pattern on a dozen standards and rock favorites, and the Keymen combo comes through with a polished beat drive. Tunes include "Miss You", "Love Is Strange", "Isle Of Capri" and "Willie And The Hand Jive".



"THE FABULOUS ARRANGEMENTS OF TOMMY DORSEY IN HI-FI"—The Tommy Dorsey Orchestra Starring Warren Covington—Decca DL 8802

These newly recorded sides of famed Tommy Dorsey arrangements — Warren Covington at the helm of the late Dorsey ork—has great nostalgia and the Covington single click, "Tea For Two Cha Cha", on its sales side. The bright review includes such Dorsey favorites as "Song Of India", "The Dipsy Doodle", "Opus One", and, of course, "I'm Gettin' Sentimental Over You". Import ork showing.



"SING ME A SAD SONG"—George Hamilton IV—ABC Paramount 251

This Hamilton tribute to the late Hank Williams has what it takes to admirably represent the best of Williams' compositions, and almost assure it a chart run. The songster deftly catches the expressiveness of Williams' melodic efforts of unrequited love ("Half As Much", "Cold Cold Heart") and, in two instances, the religious nature of the composer-singer's work in a sacred line ("House Of Gold", "How Can You Refuse Him Now"). The Nick Perito ork effectively leans on strings.



"JACK SCOTT" — Carlton LP 12/107 (Stereo & Monaural)

One of the first LP issues from Carlton, the disk is backed-up by two strong Scott single clicks, "My True Love" and "With Your Love". These tunes plus nine others, mostly previous Scott sessions, display the artist to fine rockaballad and rockabilly advantage. Teeners looking for a beat package will turn in this direction.



"INTERVIEWS OF OUR TIMES"—Fantasy 7001

For those who take to far-out humor, this entry is loaded with often hilarious, satiric jabs on topical subjects, including cool-talk, hi-fi, and Lawrence Welk. The performers here, who are not billed, manage to maintain an informality in their presentations which adds to the party-time effect of the disk. In fact, spin of the disk during a party should be the fun highlight of the affair. Potent novelty entry.



"JE T'AIME . . . I LOVE YOU"—Joni James—MGM E 3718

The disk is a companion piece to Italian song fest by the thrush, "Ti Voglio Bene . . . I Love You", and comes at a time when Miss James is enjoying her single success, "There Goes My Heart". Singing in both English and French, the songstress caresses such standbys as "The Last Time I Saw Paris", "April In Paris", "La Vie En Rose", "Speak To Me Of Love". Lots of sales and platter spinner play due here.



"GOLDILOCKS" — Original Broadway Cast — Columbia OL 5340

This original cast production of the Broadway musical has lots of musical comedy sheen in both the songs and their performances. The Leroy Anderson melodies (his first for Broadway) are deftly appealing, and the Walter Kerr, Jean Kerr and Joan Ford lyrics are skilled in their wit and warmth. Pro showfolk principals are Elaine Stritch, Don Ameche and Russell Nype. Best tunes: the ballads "Shall I Take My Heart And Go?", and "Save A Kiss" and the clever "Who's Been Sitting In My Chair?". A bright show-music coterie entry.



"LOVE AMONG THE YOUNG"—Jennie Smith—Columbia CL 1242

Miss Smith, who was heard to good advantage on her first LP, "Jennie" on Victor, divides her talents here between cuddled vocals on one side, swinging sessions on the other, and in each tempo the twenty-year thrush has notable regard for melody and lyric. Inventive Ray Ellis ork support even when swinging keeps the Smith voice out front. Good crop of standards and newer tunes ("A Fine Romance", "A Very Special Love", "'S Wonderful"). A fine collection of legit singing.




"BOB AND RAY THROW A STEREO SPECTACULAR"—RCA Victor LSP-1773

Here's one of the most deft and entertaining cases for stereo yet. From a musical standpoint, the disk is a sampling of ten new Victor stereo releases (Melachrino, Julie Andrews, Skitch Henderson, etc.) which display separation of sound exceedingly well. From a comic, stereo-gimmick standpoint, there are five bits by Bob and Ray on a haunted-castle theme, and, in each, humorous stereo tricks are dramatically sprung upon the listener. An expert stereo omnibus.



"MARY MARTIN SINGS A MUSICAL LOVE STORY"—Disneyland WDL 3031

This is Miss Martin's first real adult-directed effort for Disneyland after 3 kiddie-styled packages, and it's another disk instance by the musical comedy star of crystal-clear projection of lyrics and charmingly intimate appeal. The class 17-song bill is sung in continuous fashion against effectively simple John Lesko (her disk-concert accompanist) combo work. Miss Martin's "Music With Mary Martin" tour should add considerable sales value to this choice vocal set.



"LOUIS UNDER THE STARS"—Louis Armstrong—Verve M GV-4012

Having been successfully paired with Ella Fitzgerald on several Verve LP's, Armstrong solos for the first time on the label, and performs a meandering vocal trick on eight evergreens, including "Have You Met Miss Jones?", "Body And Soul" and "Top Hat, White Tie And Tails". Trumpet moments by Satchmo are as sweet as the Russell Garcia strings. Appealing pop-styled Armstrong stints.



"TALK TO ME"—Little Willie John—King 596

This round-up of Little Willie John singles has lots of teener sales in the bag. Listening to the performer's single sessions as a group, one is impressed by the beat versatility of the artist, which ranges from the blues to uptempo enthusiasm. Tunes include the title click, his latest, "Tell It Like It Is", "Uh Uh Baby", "Person To Person", "I've Been Around".



"DANCING WITH THE SMART SET"—Meyer Davis And His Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM-1756

On his first Victor package, the granddaddy of the society beat paces his ork through glossy arrangements of a fist-full of old-timers and recent show-movie tunes. When folks come around for a disk of this sort, here's a very likely purchase candidate. Must for the society ork shelf.

JESSE CRAWFORD

"LEAD KINDLY LIGHT"—Jesse Crawford, Organ—Decca DL 8721

Crawford understandingly reads 14-favorite hymns, and the performances have not only year-round appeal, but particular strength during the upcoming Yuletide Season. Selections include the title effort, "Sweet Hour Of Prayer", "The Old Rugged Cross" and "Abide With Me". A major religious organ issue.

"INTRODUCING SI ZENTNER & HIS DANCE BAND"—Bel Canto ST 1007 (Monaural & Stereo)

Zentner, a one-time Les Brown, Harry James and Tommy & Jimmy Dorsey lead trombonist, heads a crew of highly competent West Coast musicians in a sparkling display of ork vitality and polish. The stereo version of the affair is a sound joy. Selections are mostly evergreens, and two of them are capably handled by vocalist Lynn Franklin ("The Nearness Of You", "Back In Your Own Backyard"). A deejay programming treat.

"NORO MORALES AND HIS ORCHESTRA AT THE HARVEST MOON BALL" — Roulette R-25045

A perennial ork guest at New York's famed Harvest Moon Ball dance contest, the top-drawer Morales outfit dishes-out a varied dance-floor beat affair, naturally staying on Latin home ground most of the way. Tie-in with the dance event adds greater dance-floor appeal to the disk.

"MOLTO ITALIANO!" — (Vol. 3) — Johnny Puleo And His Harmonica Gang—Audio Fidelity AFLP 1883

There's lots of room in this collection of Italian favorites for rhythmic and vibrant harmonica work, and Puleo and the crew prove a colorful match for such items "Funiculi Funilula", "O Sole Mio" and "Ciribiribin". Harmonica and/or hi-fi fans will find good harmonica performances in hi-fi hands here.

"I'LL REMEMBER APRIL . . ."—Raoul Poliakin And His Orchestra With StereoChorale — Everest LPBR-5001

Among the initial Everest LP issues, the disk is a pro, well-sounding day-dreaming affair by Poliakin's ork and the fine vocal ensemble billed as the StereoChorale (the songsters are heard on six of the twelve tracks). The sturdy program consists of "remembrance" items on one side, "moon" tunes on the other. Work that knows the mood-music score.


JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK

"CHRIS CRAFT"—Chris Connor—Atlantic 1290

Miss Connor carries about every tempo and mood in the jazz book here, and the results are always tasteful vocal accounts. Backed smartly by four and five man setups, the stylist encounters such notable items as "The Night We Called It A Day", "Johnny One Note", "Lover Man" and "Blow, Gabriel, Blow". Traffic friends of Miss Connor will be after this presentation.

"RAY CHARLES AT NEWPORT"—Atlantic 1289

Recorded during a Charles appearance at the Newport Jazz Festival last July, the disk is a kinetic vocal-instrumental blues display by the performer, which should wrap up sizeable sales in both rhythm and blues and jazz corners. Charles is wonderfully charged vocally on "I Got A Woman", superbly down-and-out on "A Fool For You" and romping and aggressive on either piano or tenor sax on the four instrumental sessions.



"CAL TJADER'S LATIN CONCERT"—Fantasy 3275

Vibraphonist Tjader, who has been one of the most successful adherents to the jazz-goes-Latin (or vice versa) school, turns in his eighth Fantasy pressing of swinging jazz on a Latin theme. Expertly recorded at Tjader's frequent location, San Francisco's Blackhawk, the quintet breezily touches on eight selections, four by Tjader himself. This is fast-moving jazz inventory.



"MAX"—Max Roach, Drums—Argo LP 623

This Argo's first Roach attraction, and the event is occasioned by a rich, well-employed lineup of talent behind (often in front of) the top-drawer drummer. Roach, trumpeter Denny Durham, pianist Ramsey Lewis, tenor saxist Hank Mobley and bassist George Morrow romp with resourceful zest and, in several instances, with reflective warmth. "That Ole Devil Love" is the only standard on the six dates. Powerful jazz merchandise.



"DRUMS ON FIRE!"—Art Blakey with the Jazz Messengers—Benny Barth with the Mastersounds—Chico Hamilton with the Gerry Mulligan Quartet—Chatur Lal—World Pacific WP-1247

Beautifully recorded, the disk is a rhythmic field day for the four drummers listed above. Each artist is given a track of his own, and all respond with a constant supply of percussive color and ingenuity. Of special note is the trigger-fast pounding of India's Chatur Lal, who works on a two-piece drum native to his country, the Tabla. Brilliant drum round-up.

CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK



"OPERATIC ARIAS" — Boris Christoff, Bass—Orchestra And Chorus Of The Opera House Rome—Conducted By Vittorio Gui—Capitol—EMI G 7125

Christoff's remarkable bass voice has been superbly recorded on a program of six arias, four by Verdi and two by Bellini. The arias provide a variety of vocal reflections by Christoff, and, to be sure, his voice masters the emotions of his material. Selections include "Del Futuro Nel Bujo Discerno" from Verdi's early opera, "Nabucco" and "Cavatina" from Bellini's "Norma". What a vocal prize!

TCHAIKOVSKY: Symphony No. 4 — Philharmonia Orchestra—Thomas Schippers, Conductor—Angel 35443

Among the brightest of America's young conductors, Schippers knowingly reads the emotional punch of the Tchaikovsky mainstay. The disk's stirring quality is summed up in a rousing display of the final movement. Solid sound. Fine version of the oft-recorded work for the symphony crowd.



"THE ORGAN CONCERTOS OF HANDEL"—Nos. 1 to 6—E. Power Biggs, Organist—Sir Adrian Boult Conducting The London Philharmonic Orchestra—Columbia K2L 258

The effort is among the first packages to note the upcoming Handel Bicentennial (1759-1959), and what better way to start things rolling than Columbia's expert organist on a program of the composer's six organ concertos? To add authenticity to the proceedings Biggs recorded the works in England on an organ actually used by Handel. A booklet bios the composer and contains info on how these recordings came about. A major issue of serious organ performances.



Center Of Attraction



NEW YORK—Center of attraction is Leon Merian, whose band appeared for a one-night stand at the Hotel Statler recently. Dropping in to enjoy the evening's festivities were 20th-Fox prexy, Henry Onorati, on the right, Leon's personal manager, Joe Cain. Leon, whose initial pairing for the 20th-Fox label is "Mardi Gras March" and "Bourbon Street Parade", slipped on a loose rug the night before the show and had to wear the eye patch.

In his first stage appearance of a 20-year radio and television career, Steele will present a big name list of performers, including: Connie Francis, the Big Bopper, the Royaltones, Dicky Doo and the Don'ts, Donnie Owens, Jimmy Clanton, the

Shields, Cozy Cole, the Solitaires, the Kalin Twins, Frankie Avalon, Clyde McPhatter, Thurston Harris and Jerry Butler and the Impressions. The complete list of performers will be announced at a later date.

"THAT CHRISTMAS FEELING"—Bing Crosby—Decca DL 8781

A perennial Holiday disk favorite, Crosby makes his 1958 appearance on Decca with a collection of previously released Seasonal evergreens. Supported by various orks (Victor Young, Vic Schoen, etc.) and vocal groups (Andrews Sisters, Ken Darby Sisters, etc.), Crosby renders, singly or in medley fashion, such items as "Twelve Days Of Christmas", "The Christmas Song", "The First Noel", and "Deck The Hall". A natural for the Xmas shelf.



"CHRISTMAS WITH JESSE CRAWFORD HI-FI PIPE ORGAN"—Decca DL 8794

The disk is sure to be part of the Holiday proceedings of many homes this year. Popular organist Crawford divides his program into selections of a more serious Xmas nature on one side ("The First Noel", "O Holy Night", etc.) and pop favorites on the other ("White Christmas", "Have Yourself A Merry Little Christmas"). In each category, Crawford's playing is marked by simple, expressive statements. Prime Holiday issue.




"CHRISTMAS IS FOR CHILDREN"—Songs, Stories About Christmas For Children — Lic L70079

Cut in Germany, the waxing is an effective string-featured—organ and bells supplemented review of twelve Holiday standards, both traditional and pop. The tonal quality of these performances often sound like one giant organ majestic tribute to the Holiday. Reliable Yuletide offering.



"POLISH CHRISTMAS CAROLS"—Ted Maksymowicz And His Orchestra—The Echo Choir of New York—ABC-Paramount ABC-260

A strong polka attraction during the year Maksymowicz and his ork, plus the robust male Echo Choir of New York, sing a program of gay and warm Polish Christmas Carols. The carols are sung in Polish. Many of Maksymowicz's following and general Polish traffic are sure to be interested here.



"CHRISTMAS FROM HAWAII"—The Surf HiFi R410 (Monaural & Stereo)

Merging pop and Hawaiian stylings, the vocal quartet rhythmically and warmly handle a collection of fourteen Holiday efforts taken from traditional, pop and Hawaiian areas. The move from one musical area to another with showmanship and taste. A fine trio adds both Hawaiian and Yuletide touch to the tracks. Boston Meets Miss Tropicana



HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records, on behalf of its "Tropicana Holiday" package, sent on a nation-wide tour, Felicia Atkins, a lead dancer in the chorus line at Las Vegas' Hotel Tropicana, who is also featured prominently on the cover of the album.

Sponsored jointly by Capitol Records Distributing Corp. and the Tropicana Hotel in Las Vegas, Miss Atkins recently completed a ten-day, eight-city deejay tour, with stops in Chicago, Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, Boston, San Francisco, and Los Angeles.

At each stop the Australian beauty visited deejays to plug the Capitol "Tropicana Holiday" album, and was at the opening of the new show at the Tropicana on October 29, which is based entirely on the Gordon Jenkins music in the album. This event marks the first time in Las Vegas history that one of its stage extravaganzas has been built exclusively around a recording. CHICAGO — Music man Howard Miller will bring ten of the nation's top recording artists to Chicago for his fourth pop music concert at the Opera House, December 6.

Miller, whose previous shows have all played to full houses, will again feature an array of musical talent which currently has records on the best seller lists. Scheduled for two performances at 7 & 10 P.M., the show will headline the Everly Brothers, Frankie Avalon, Connie Francis, the Poni-Tails and many more.

In turning impresario for the fourth time, Miller, one of America's best known disk jockeys, will present a music revue "geared to appeal to all musical tastes", including rock and roll, multiple voice groups, ballads and jazz.

Brusk To Head Design Disk Sales Set-Up In Europe

HAMBURG, GERMANY — Using the free port of Hamburg, Germany, as a warehouse and shipping center, Design Records is currently creating an European sales organization on the style of the U. S. distribution pattern under the direction of Tom Brusk.

Brusk, who bears the title of "European Sales Manager," will build a force of salesmen who will be delegated territories throughout the European continent and will be shipped merchandise directly from the central Hamburg warehouse.

Cy Leslie, president of Design Records, speaking from the international headquarters of Design in New York, revealed that complete record albums will be shipped to Hamburg just as they go to distributors in the United States.

"We can press and ship to the free port of Hamburg for less money than it would cost us to manufacture our records overseas from tape. This means that we will be able to offer our albums for comparably cheaper prices in Europe just as we do in the United States. If we pressed in Europe, we'd have to charge the amount of money for our product that everyone else does in Europe and thus we would be losing the price edge that we need to really penetrate that area."

Brusk, who graduated from Ohio State Law School in 1926, has had a varied background in television and in the record business. Until 1946, he was in the liquor business. In that year he joined Tele-King, video set manufacturers, as Assistant to the president. In 1952 he became the executive vice-president of Remington Records. He left Remington in 1955 to become partners with Archie Bleyer. Brusk left Bleyer in 1956 to join Eli Oberstein's Record Corporation of America and exited just a few months ago to become European sales manager for Design.

Herb Hendler Joins Warner Bros. Staff

BURBANK, CALIF.—James B. Conkling, president of Warner Bros. Records, last week named Herbert Hendler to the post of administrative assistant to the president.

Hendler, a veteran of 16 years experience in the record industry, will assist in establishing administrative and operational procedures of the company.

Hendler's vast experience in all phases of the record and music business includes a total of eleven years with RCA Victor Records, during which he served as director of Artists & Repertoire, and various other capacities in the sales and advertising departments. He organized and managed the Ralph Flanagan and Buddy Morrow orchestras in 1950-52, and left the band business in 1954 to devote more time to production and writing.

His appointment is effective immediately, and he will headquarter at the firm's offices in Burbank.

MGM Get "Whoop-Up"

NEW YORK—MGM Records has snared the original cast album for the forthcoming Broadway musical "Whoop Up". Arnold Maxin, president of MGM Records handled negotiations which brought the score under the MGM banner.

MGM attributes its winning of the rights to the "Whoop Up LP because of the company's success with the "Gigi" film sound track and because of the diskery's current prominence in the singles field.

"Whoop Up" is from the book "Stay Away Joe" which was published recently. Feuer and Martin are the producers and Moose Charlap and Norman Gimbel wrote the score which Frank Music is publishing. Frank Music's latest endeavor in the musical field is "The Music Man".

Maxin stated that in addition to the original cast recording, he plans to release a jazz version of the score by Dick Hyman and a lush instrumental version by David Rose and his Orchestra.

Bright vocal and instrumental support on a happy-go-lucky charmer. Youth Band For Newport

NEW YORK—A band made up of student musicians is being organized by the Newport Jazz Festival to play the weekend of July 4, 1959 at the 6th annual Newport Jazz Festival.

The group, known as the "Newport Youth Band", will be organized by a member of the Festival's Board of Directors, Marshall Brown, who created and directed the Farmingdale High School Band, of the '57 Festival, and the International Jazz Band of the '58 Festival.

According to Festival President Louis L. Lorillard, the aims of this project are twofold: 1) To provide a healthy atmosphere in which young people can learn the skills required in playing jazz and dance music in ensemble form; and 2) To present vocational training to the many young musicians in the New York area who will make jazz and dance music their profession.

Membership in the Newport Youth Band will be restricted to teenage boys and girls, from the greater New York area, ages 13 to 18, who will be selected starting November 1st in auditions conducted by Brown. The band will audition and rehearse on Saturdays; it will be composed of 4 trumpets, 4 trombones, 5 saxophones, piano, bass, guitar, and drums. Vocalists may be added at a later date.

Brown (B.S., M.A.), a duly licensed teacher in the State of New York with wide teaching experience, stated that all members of the band will receive group instruction in intonation, phrasing, interpretation, rhythm, tone, technique and sight reading. The application of these factors will be to music in general and to jazz in particular.

Specialists in the jazz and dance music field will be invited to talk about their particular skills before the group. The band will also provide opportunities for young composers and arrangers to have their music performed. All expenses for the project are being borne by the non-profit Newport Jazz Festival.

White To Europe For Everest Disc Sessions

NEW YORK—Bert White, director of classical artists and repertoire for Everest Records, has arrived in Europe for five weeks of recording sessions in London and Paris. Accompanying White during his recording of European orchestras will be Harry F. Belock, president of Belock Instrument Corp., Everest's parent organization. Belock will supervise the employment of new experiments in stereophonic recording at the sessions, which will utilize Everest's own equipment, shipped overseas in a mobile sound truck. Raoul Poliakin, Everest musical director, and Joseph Kane, recording engineer, will join White in London.

Everest will record Sir Adrian Boult, Jenos Ferencsik and Malcolm Arnold conducting the London Philharmonic Orchestra; and Sir Eugene Goossens, Aaron Copland and Rudolph Schwartz, musical director of the BBC Symphony Orchestra conducting the London Symphony Orchestra at Walthamstow, London, from Nov. 10 to Nov. 30. The Orchestra Lamoureux under the direction of Igor Markevitch will be recorded in Paris from Dec. 8 to 14. The albums, including both symphonic and chorale works, are scheduled for release early next year.

Everest Records, a product of Belock Recording Co., a division of the Belock Instrument Corp., released its first recordings in October.

NEW YORK — Roulette released two vocal singles by two new artists who have been added to the label's growing roster. Bob Benton, is out with the two standards, "You Call It Madness" and "Lament To Love", which was penned by Mel Torme. 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Speakers Set For DeeJay Festival

NASHVILLE, TENN.—Top-ranking leaders in the broadcasting and music fields have been chosen to speak at the Seventh Annual Western and Country Music Disk Jockey Festival in Nashville, according to Bob Cooper, General Manager of WSM, host for the festival. As the convention dates of November 21-22 draw nearer, plans for the meeting of some 2,500 disk jockeys and industry heads are rolling into high gear, Cooper said last week.

Governor-elect Beauford Ellington of Tennessee will welcome the conventioners to his state, and will introduce the keynote speaker, Matthew J. Culligan, Executive Vice President of NBC.

Other speakers and panel discussion leaders will include Connie B. Gay, president of the Country Music Network on "What You Can Do To Make Country Music More Profitable for You and Your Station"; Roy Morris, Advertising Director of the Pet Milk Company on "Country Music and Its Stars' Proven Ability to Move Merchandise"; George Marek, Vice President and General Manager of the Record Division of RCA Victor on "The Growth of Country Music and Its Place In Your Future"; and Col. Vernon Rice, USAF on "Your Fullest Public Service Advantage Is With Country Music."

In addition to speeches by major industry leaders, panel discussion and seminars are being planned in conjunction with the major recording companies and music publishers to give the jockeys from far-flung corners of the U. S. an idea of national trends, industry policies and new ideas.

Foley Scores At Texas State Fair

DALLAS, TEXAS—The talents of Red Foley plus a solid promotional effort by his "Jubilee U.S.A." sponsor, work and play clothes manufacturer Williamson-Dickie, combined to make Foley one of the stand-out attractions of the recent 1958 Texas State Fair here.

Williamson-Dickie Mfg. devised ten days of exploitation for their TV star which began with staffing a booth at a heavy-traffic spot on the fair grounds, where a continuous tape of Foley's songs were played on a public address system. Visitors to the booth were invited to participate in a contest throughout the ten days between the opening of the Fair and the Cotton Bowl appearance of Foley & Co., each person being given a lapel card (which by no small coincidence bore the Dickie's logo and a caricature of Red Foley) on which was printed a five-digit number. The cards having been prepared in duplicate, it was up to each fair goer to find another person wearing an identical number. Over 300 persons were able to locate matching numbers and were awarded personally autographed copies of Foley's newest Decca hi-fi album, "He Walks with Thee," a collection of the inspirational songs he has made popular on network television and radio.

Giant postcard-size photos of Red Foley, dressed in a Dickies "Slack-time" casual coat and imprinted with the date, place and hour of his in-person performance, were handed out—by the thousands, daily—from the booth.

Supporting members of the "Jubilee U.S.A." cast (nine acts and a band are included in the troupe) made well-advertised autographing appearances at the booth on show day.

BMI Shows Literary Items

NEW YORK — Two rare literary items in the children's books field, the original autograph manuscript, illustrated by its author of "Old Mother Hubbard" and the manuscript of "Mary Had a Little Lamb," are part of a unique collection from the BMI Archives exhibited at the Library of Congress in Washington during the 40th Children's Book Week, November 2 to 8, and continuing through to the end of the year. Among other rarities included in the BMI material being loaned to the Library are autograph manuscripts or first editions of "The Death of Poor Cock Robin," "What All the World Is Made Of" (the "What are little girls made of?" poem of Robert Southey), "Little Boy Blue," "A Visit from Saint Nicholas" and "Now the Day Is Over." Items of musical interest include the rare first edition of Mozart's Sonatas for Harpsichord, K.6 and K.7, written when he was 7, the manuscript and first edition of "The Parade of the Wooden Soldiers," and lithographed sheet music covers of the mid-1800's dealing with children and children's songs.

Few people had any idea how popular his recordings were during his lifetime and although we knew he would continue to sell it is astonishing even to us the way his LP is moving. We have every reason to believe that this album will hit the 80,000 mark before the end of December."

NEW YORK — Herbert M. Moss, president of Gotham Recording Corporation, has announced that Gotham has produced five new jazz LP's which were released simultaneously last week on the MGM label. 

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Man of the Week



CHARLES MASON JOHNSON

Coinmen are not unlike businessmen in any other industry. Like most people, when a new idea or new approach to a problem is suggested, the first impulse is to say "no," "it can't be done," or "it won't work." However, like in other fields, there are always some who have the imagination and initiative to say "Let's give it a try"!

Regardless of this negative attitude, most in our field, because of the very nature of our business, entertainment and amusement, are more progressive than in most other trades. Factories continually dream up new equipment intended to attract the fun loving public, whose tastes and whims are highly unpredictable in advance. The distributors take on these new machines, and the operators, after scrutinizing them, place them on location for the ultimate decision of the public. If the public takes to the equipment, everyone in the coin machine chain benefits. If the public turns up its noses at the equipment, then that particular venture was unprofitable.

The coin machine business, an industry providing the public with low priced, economical entertainment—be it amusement or music—is one in which its members cannot afford to become neglectful for one moment.

And because of the necessity of producing, selling, and operating up-to-the-minute, profit producing machines, it

seems to us that the majority lose sight of the overall need to knit all its members into a close, harmonious group, working as a solid unit to protect itself from scores of abuses by outside influences. Most of the industry's members are small, hard working individuals. When they complete a day's work—with all its aggravation, they've had it.

Other trades seem to be able to bring its members into harmonious groups, whether it be local or state or national associations. It would seem to us that the coin machine fraternity has as many, if not more, problems than other industries. But it also seems to us that there isn't a more neglectful or thoughtless group than those in our industry.

Many problems which, upon first blush, seem to be unsolvable, could, upon discussion and meeting with others in the field, be terminated successfully. One of the most pertinent examples is the now predominating 10¢ play. It took a long time—it was a hard struggle—but today it's a fact.

So we say, "Let's Try It"!! Whether it be a new machine—or a new idea. Let's recapture the spirit of those who pioneered this industry. If the problem seems to be too great, or impossible—let's get together with our fellow coinmen. What may seem to be impossible for the individual, may be more than possible for a group.

NAMA SHOW LARGEST YET

More Than 6,000 Visit Exhibits. While Heavily Attended By Vendors, Strong Representation Also Present From Music And Games Operations

William Fishman Re-elected President; Thomas B. Donahue, First Vice-President; Herb A. Geiger, Second Vice-President; and Norval B. Rader, Treasurer

ST. LOUIS, MO.—The National Automatic Merchandising Association Convention, held at the Kiel Auditorium, this city, from Sunday, November 2, through Wednesday, November 5, was the largest from an attendance standpoint and the most successful from a business standpoint, yet held.

More than 6,000 paid visitors viewed approximately 125 exhibits, attended nine workshops and two general sessions with regular daily lectures by leading people in the vending industry covering every phase of vending, from cigarettes and coffee to food, finance and supermarket installations.

Although out-of-town visitors were spread through six major hotels main hospitality suites were centered at the Chase Hotel and the Sheraton-Jefferson. Several manufacturers played host to the visiting coinmen with sumptuous private parties.

While the primary attendance consisted of vending coinmen, there was a large representation from leading music and game operators.

William S. Fishman was re-elected for a one-year term as president of the NAMA at a meeting of the Board of Directors on November 2. Thomas B. Donahue was elected first vice-president, Herb A. Geiger second vice-president, and Norval B. Rader treasurer. Donahue, Geiger and Rader are holdovers from the previous year.

A new Board of Directors was also elected. They are Norval Rader, Louis Risman, M. B. Rapp, Robert M. Miller, Harold A. Steuber, Sidney S. Rudin, and Henry R. Davidson.

Fishman, in a talk at the convention described his "operator's viewpoint of the value of NAMA membership." He pointed out that the operators' annual membership dues comes to an average of \$86, and that most operators get many more times that value from both specific and intangible benefits.

Fishman stated that the industry is vital and growing in spite of the recent recession and that the potential growth factor of automatic merchandising is "beyond measure."

"Last year has been a year of progress and achievement, with more new members than ever before, better interest, and increasing accumulated surplus for the association," said Fishman.

"This association was founded to combat unfair legislation and it still does it today for each of you. We join NAMA because it promotes our own economic self-interest and makes the whole industry better accepted and recognized.

"For the operator, your association is the forum, the town hall, the meeting place of the industry," Fishman pointed out.

"We hope to have more regional meetings, more local discussions for operators at the grass roots than ever before in the coming year," he promised.

F. P. Pinballs Legal Rules Ore. Circuit Judge

WOODBURN, ORE.—Circuit Judge Arlie Walker, on Monday, October 27, ruled in Polk County, that free-play pinball machines are legal.

Walker gave his opinion in a declaratory judgment suit brought by Marshall McKee, operator here, against Oregon Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton, who had ruled earlier this year that free-play is a thing of value and therefore the machines were illegal according to Oregon law.

McKee filed his complaint in March, received a temporary restraining order, and asked for a declaratory judgment which allows interested parties to know their legal rights in a matter before the actual cause of action arises.

Judge Walker ruled for McKee that free-play pinballs were legal, upsetting the ruling made by Thornton.

"At last," said Gordon, "we have a Congressman in Washington who understands the problems confronting the coin machine operator."

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

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Belief Growing That Britain Will Reduce Purchase Tax On Phonos and Games GREAT BRITAIN GLIMPSSES

Look out for news shortly of an important move into Europe by British coin machine interests (and not any of the ones who already have ties there). At least one bright British coin man with money has realized the importance of the European common market, and has wisely decided to get a stake in it at the earliest possible stage. No doubt others will follow suit. Incidentally, belief is growing in Britain that in order to meet increasing European competition, as the common trading area is extended, Britain will dramatically reduce purchase tax on a wide range of goods which will probably include the categories that take in phonographs and amusement machines. This could revolutionize the business in Britain as this equipment is rated at 60 per cent respectively in purchase tax. . . . Stereo is going to be the star of the juke box section of the Amusement Trades Exhibition. Every major firm will show it. In addition Bal-AMI and Rock-Ola are expected to exhibit their new models for the first time. The show is a complete sell-out months before it opens. Amusement machines, via Eire, are to be shown in range and quantity for the first time since the war. There is great speculation on what they will be. . . . Such is the growth of the juke box business in the United Kingdom that the major music publishers, led by the largest, Chappell's are engaged in appointing exploitation men whose main concern will be to plug music on the boxes, via the operators. A special juke box record program (paid for by British Music interests) is also being beamed from Radio Luxembourg every Friday evening. . . . A completely novel device, based on a juke box tape mechanism, has just been brought into London from Paris. It is called the Publiphone, and is manufactured by the French Musimatic firm. The Publiphone answers questions in busy centers of all sorts. No more can be said about it at this stage, as demonstrations are just getting under way. Showing the machine to many interested customers, including a very large commercial concern, is Londoner Tommy de Wertheimer. . . . Two of the latest American Cole Products drink vending machines, made under license in Lancashire, England by Ditchburn Vending Machines, Ltd., an associate company of the largest British juke box concern, have been doing capacity business while on show at Britain's Motor Show, which has just ended. They are the Hotspa and Colespa. . . . Noramats have been arriving in quantity from Europe in the past few weeks, and are being converted to penny and threepenny play by Ruffler and Walker, Ltd.

"Would I recommend young men to get into this business?", asked Little Jimmy.

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

The get-together followed some months of correspondence and careful preparation, with goodwill gestures being made on both sides.

Notice of the important meeting was revealed to Council members only a few days before when they held their seventh meeting at the Adelphi Hotel, London. In the absence of Cecil Jones in America, Cyril Marks, the vice-chairman was in the chair. Members attending were secretary, Mrs. Shaw, and Messrs. Kaye, Katz, Hardy, Needs, Betts, Briggs, Walker, and Young.


At the meeting on the 8th of August, several members expressed a desire to hold a further general meeting before the annual general meeting next March, 1959. The Secretary reported that these members had been asked to confirm, in writing, their request and to state for what purpose they wished this meeting convened. A questionnaire had been sent to all members to find out individual wishes on this point and since a majority voted against such a meeting it was decided that no further general meeting should be held this year.

Discussion regarding the need for a London branch then took place and it was decided that this need was real. The Secretary was requested to take steps to form such a branch which should meet every two months, the first meeting to be arranged for the end of November.



(Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.


