On "Give Me Your Love", Cole is at his romantic best as he chants a dreamy slow-waltz ballad. Beautiful arrangement and delivery of an enchanting ballad that grows on you with each listen. This tune was a smash in Europe. Two big coin catchers to go with. Take your pick.

It's a soft, slow-moving romantic tale about a five year old girl who was too young for the lad of ten. But when she's seventeen he's twenty-two and the romantic picture changes. Lovely lyric and melody. Sounds like a winner. The boys discuss "The Riddle Of Love" on the flip, a cute romantic lilter also designed to appeal to kids. Jocks will be spinning both ends heavily.

Infectious side with a clever lyric and a delightful melody. Should get heavy air play. The companion deck "It Doesn't Matter Anymore", composed by vocalist Paul Anka, is a refreshing romantic bouncer with a variety of rhythms that immediately arrest the listener's attention. Both sides could make it big.

● Chuck Berry, one of the most

consistent rock and roll performers, delves into the standard catalog and comes up with a great oldie which he revamps in his unique style and sends across in strong commercial fashion. Working against a good cha cha backdrop, Chuck chants the wonderful evergreen "That's My Desire" in a manner that should be strongly received by the teeners. Big side to watch closely. Flip, "Anthony Boy" has the ace betting a cute Italian flavored bouncer. Upper end in the big one.

JOE REISMAN
(RCA Victor 7449)

B+ "TRINI" (2:00) [Planetary ASCAP—Pockriss, Vance] This catchy uptempo mambo performance by the Reisman chorus and ork could mean chart business. The male songsters are good-natured on the song, while the ork dishes-out a bright beat. A joyful affair to watch.

B+ "SO GOES OUR LOVE SONG" (2:38) [Sheldon BMI—Hill, Sherman] There's much to be said for this tender essay also. Lovely chorus' (femmes here, too) chanting and singing is sympathetically supported by the ork. Two showings of note from Reisman.

JANICE HARPER
(Capitol 4131)

B+ "LET THERE BE LOVE" (2:12) [Coliseum BMI—Miller] The lark once again gets the big romancer from the diskery (i.e. "Bon Voyage") and she comes through with a soaring performance on a demanding opus with inspirational feel. Knowing stanza that can go over.

B+ "I NEED YOU" (2:26) [Leeds ASCAP—Henderson] Miss Harper scores again on a lush, Latin-beat arrangement of a strong romantic. Both sessions can attract attention.

GOGI GRANT
(RCA Victor 7438)

B+ "TWO DREAMS" (2:30) [Korwin ASCAP—Allen, Stillman] A touching tune of love found is expressively handled by the top-drawer songstress. The number reaches far above the regular run of the ballad mill. In performance, Miss Grant's reading does likewise. Heavy jock play due this track can move it.

B "(KISS ME) HONEY, HONEY (KISS ME)" (2:22) [Duchess BMI—Timothy, Julien] This portion brightens up to a cheerful cha-cha entry by the performer and the ork-chorus. Breezy work to eye, too.

SAM BUTERA
(Capitol 4119)

B "HANDLE WITH CARE" (2:23) [Singleton BMI—Burks, Blackwell] Butera does well as he pounds out a contagious rocker. Not the least of the pro beat feel here is the low-down, New Orleans rock-jazz combo work from the Witnesses. Inviting teen stint.

C+ "FRENCH POODLE" (2:24) [Sapphire ASCAP—Shaw, White] Novelty swinger.

THE CHANSONAIRES
(Hamilton 50012)

B+ "LOVE ALWAYS FINDS A WAY" (2:35) [Rik Page BMI—Motola] The Chansonaires dish up one that's gonna make the jocks sit up and take notice. It's an ear-arresting cha-cha that the group chants sans lyrics. Deck has the potential to step way out.

B "IF YOU WERE HERE TONIGHT" (2:12) [Winston ASCAP—Motola, Hoffman] More of the same pleasing chant-along-to-the-cha-cha beat sounds here.

DONNY LEE MOORE
(Golden Crest 512)

B "YOU LEFT ME STANDING ALONE" (2:17) [Gamut ASCAP—Moore, Levitan] Donny Lee Moore puts his heart into his delivery of this sad romantic ballad. Expressive multiple-vocal effort ably backed up by Cy Seymour's ork and chorus.

C+ "FIRE!" (2:02) [Gamut ASCAP—Levitan] Under end is quick beat cutie that Moore delivers with lots of country inflections.

BUCHANAN & GOODMAN
(Novelty 301)

B+ "FRANKENSTEIN OF '59" (Part 1) [Goodman, Goodman] The team, which several years ago offered the novelty sensation, "Flying Saucer", turns a similar trick on a horror theme: Frankenstein is on the loose, with the narrative being interrupted at appropriate times with snatches from various hit decks ("Come Prima", "Beep Beep", "Tom Dooley", "Problems") etc. A novelty performance that can break wide-open.

C+ "FRANKENSTEIN RETURNS" (Part 2) [Goodman, Goodman] The zany doings continued.

JIMMY CLARK TRIO
(Round 1001)

B "THE CAT" (2:04) [Velvet BMI—Clark, Cappy, Jones] The vocal-instrumental threesome rips through a novelty-beat item in which both the rock drive and gimmick are used to pretty good advantage. Boys sock out the lyrics, combo belts the tune and cat-sounds constitute the gimmick end. Side moves.

C+ "TINGALAYO (THE DONKEY SONG)" (2:07) [Velvet BMI—Perkinson] Wild, Afro-Cuban production from the guys. Another track that hits hard.

DARRELL RHODES
(Winston 1029)

B "I THOUGHT ABOUT YOU" (2:17) [Slim Willet BMI—Willet] Here's a happy-go-lucky romantic ditty that could kick up an all-market storm. It's a dandy pile-driver waxed in bright rock-a-billy style by Darrell Rhodes. Watch it.

C+ "LOU LOU" (2:14) [Slim Willet BMI—Willet] This end Rhodes enthusiastically pounds out a torrid, gal-titled rock 'n roller. Sock juke box fare.

OCIE SMITH
(Citation 1034)

B+ "TRY A LITTLE TENDERNESS" (2:21) [Robbins ASCAP—Woods, Campbell, Connelly] It's only a matter of time before Ocie Smith puts one up in the big hit category. His deep, rich voice is a listening treat and his piping of this beautiful standard could bring him the national acclaim he deserves. Rico Henderson's ork neatly assists.

C+ "HOW TIMES HAVE CHANGED" (2:16) [Coliseum BMI—Moore, Fredricks] Under lid is a fetching, tear-compelling rock-a-ballad attractively wrapped up by Ocie and the Henderson crew.

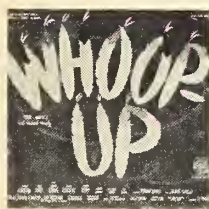

[Bourne ASCAP—Turk, Handman]

JAYE P. MORGAN (MGM 12752)

● Talented Jaye P. Morgan joins MGM's roster of hit female vocalists with a beautiful debut release that could go all the way. Working with top drawer standards, one half displays the canary with a winning rendition of "Are You Lonesome Tonight". Excellent bit of warbling by Jaye set against a lush Ray Ellis ork-chorus backdrop with that big ballad beat so popular today. It could take off. Flip is a soft, smooth shuffle treatment of the oldie "Miss You". Inviting side too. But we'll place our chips on the upper half.

"WISHFUL THINKING" [Vanderbuilt ASCAP—Robin, Ranger]

"WHEN YOU WISH UPON A STAR" [Robbins ASCAP—Leigh, Harline]

"LITTLE ANTHONY & THE IMPERIALS (End 1039)

● Little Anthony and the Imperials, who hit it big with "Tears On My Pillow", should do a bang up job on the charts in '59 with "Wishful Thinking". Side is a pretty rock-a-ballad with a good teen lyric and a melody that reminds the listener of "Tears On My Pillow". Little Anthony's clear diction and sparkling vocal style come over effectively. Another contender for the big time. The wonderful oldie, "When You Wish Upon A Star" is brought to life again on the flip. This one could be a favorite all over again with the kids. But top half has the edge.

"I'M AFRAID YOU'LL NEVER KNOW" (2:19)

GERRY GRANAHAN (Sunbeam 122)

● Gerry Granahan, the lad who had a long run on the charts with his novelty reading "No Chemise, Please" should have an even bigger smash in his latest effort—a more serious romantic opus titled "I'm Afraid You'll Never Know". It's a lovely Latin rhythm romancer handled with warmth and sincerity by the songster against a lush choral backdrop. Side builds as it progresses via the excellent use of a changing octave delivery. The coupling offers Gerry on a torrid rockin' item "King Size". Watch the top one.

"CHARLIE BROWN" (2:12) [Tiger BMI—Leiber, Stoller]

"THREE COOL CATS" (2:08) [Tiger BMI—Leiber, Stoller]

THE COASTERS (Atco 6132)

● The Coasters, who had a tremendous year in '58, as evidenced by their Cash Box award winning "Yakety Yak", start off '59 with what looks like another two-market chart topper. Tagged "Charlie Brown", it's a tantalizing, two-tempo (alternating between a slow thump and a quick beat) that the crew works over in hilarious fashion. Under lid is an infectious, cha-cha-novelty heavily overshadowed by the smash potential of the top lid.

"WHEN YOU'RE SMILING" (2:18)
[Mills ASCAP—Fisher, Goodwin, Shay]

"A LOVE TO LAST A LIFETIME" (2:34)
[Wemar BMI—Brandon, Williams]

BOBBY FREEMAN (Josie 855)

● Bobby ("Do You Wanna Dance") Freeman should make the kids wanna dance with his exciting new interpretation of the oldie "When You're Smiling". Accompanied by some sensational guitar work, Bobby jumps into the evergreen and comes thru with a torrid jump reading that's sure to thrill the younger set. Side rocks right from the first note right thru to the last, and every second is great. Freeman changes mood on the flip as he chants the touching, romantic ballad "A Love to Last A Lifetime". Pretty bit of crooning that could also make big money. Kids have tremendous coupling here.

JO STAFFORD
(Columbia 41321)

B+ "HOW CAN WE SAY GOOD-BYE" (2:31) [Grady ASCAP—Stafford, Cahn, Weston] A warm and touching love tale is thrused in Jo's sincere, heart-felt, ballad style. Beautifully written number interpreted most effectively against a simple piano backdrop.

B "MY HEART IS FROM MISSOURI" (2:06) [Grady ASCAP—Drake] A cute march tempo novelty is infectiously handled in refreshing style by the star. Good deejay change-of-pace.

SONNY JAMES
(Capitol 4127)

B+ "DREAM BIG" (2:09) [Famous ASCAP—Hampton, Bacharach] An exciting arrangement and accompaniment showcases Sonny James as he multiple-tracks a good rocker that could blossom into a money-maker. Good, full sound and dance tempo kids could go for. Watch this one. It could be another big one for the songster.

B+ "YO-YO" (2:05) [Marson BMI—James] Sonny compares himself with a yo-yo in the hands of his gal. He does this via a good rockin' novelty that specializes in gimmicks and arrangement. Another contender for big coin.

BOB CROSBY & THE BOB CATS
(Dot 15890)

B+ "PETITE FLEUR" (2:38) [Hill & Range BMI—Bechet] Bob Crosby and his Bob Cats turn in an inviting version of a European smash that's skyrocketing on America's best sellers via Chris Barber's platter. Crosby's waxing could bite off a share of the sales.

C+ "SUCH A LONG NIGHT" (1:56)
[Vernon ASCAP—Stegmeyer] The Bob-O-Links handle the vocal chores on this good rock-a-cha-cha opus. Driving instrumental accompaniment should appeal to hoofers.

ARLYNE TYE
(Carlton 486)

B+ "WHO IS THE ONE" (2:38)
[Sounds ASCAP—Kaplan] Arlyne Tye makes an impressive debut under the Carlton banner with an emotional rock-a-ballad that could make the grade. The canary has a mellow voice and pretty material to work with.

B "THE UNIVERSE" (2:42) [E. B. Marks BMI—Ross] Another potent, dramatic rock and roll ballad delivered with emotion by the artist.

THE LANCERS
(Imperial 1873)

B+ "GOLDEN YEARS" (2:20)
[Alan-Edwards BMI—Mittendorf, DaCosta] The crew, formerly on the Coral label, warms-up to a beat-romancer in which the teen years are looked upon with the thought they will be fondly remembered in the years ahead. Side grows-on-you. Well-worth keeping an eye on.

B "TAKE ME TO YOUR LEADER" (2:03)
[Alan-Edwards BMI—Mittendorf, DaCosta] The popular space-age phrase is the basis of a cute novelty about a Martian who lands on earth. His voice is a speed-up stint, of course.

B+ "AM I TO BE THE ONE" (2:00)

B+ "ANGELIQUE" (2:19) [Michele ASCAP—Hein, Gianco] Morgan debuts on 20th Fox with a pro swing-beat treatment of a romancer tabbed after a currently successful novel and perfume of the same name. Sprightly support from combo and chorus, the latter giving out with "ra-ta-ta-ta" chants. Deck is being promoted via a tie-in with the book and perfume. Effort will get hefty air-play.

[Bourne ASCAP—Davis, Burke] The chestnut is revived with a fine contagious beat by Morgan and friends.

C+ "WILLOW WEEP FOR ME"
[Bourne ASCAP—Renell] Henderson offers the evergreen with a lazy-summer-afternoon reflection and the Smith boys do same instrumentally.

● Vera Lynn could have one of her biggest money-makers in years in her dynamic delivery of an overpowering ballad dubbed "Window". The British star gets great support from a huge chorus and a lush Johnny Douglas orchestra as she gives her all for this stirring love tale. Deejays will be spinning this one heavily. Watch it closely. Flip is a bright, spirited Charleston-flavored bouncer dubbed "Be Happy". But it's the top portion that counts.

"DINAH- CHA CHA" (2:47)

[Mills, Edwin H. Morris ASCAP—Akst, Lewis, Young]

"I STILL GET JEALOUS" (2:25)

[Edwin H. Morris ASCAP—Styne, Cahn]

WARREN COVINGTON & THE T. DORSEY ORCH. (Decca 30827)

● Covington, who has twice given evergreens a chart cha cha touch ("Tea For Two" and "I Want To Be Happy") is in form to do it again on "Dinah", a session culled from Covington's "Tea For Two Cha Cha" LP. Like the previous Covington successes the brass shouts the melody while a percussion set-up provided the Latin beat. Under session takes an OK cha cha view of the oldie from "High Button Shoes". Simpler presentation of "Dinah" makes it the reading with the chart look.

"FIREBALL" (1:48) [Nor Va Jak BMI—Tomasco]

"I DON'T KNOW" (2:09) [Nor Va Jak BMI—Tomasco, Tharp]

THE FIREBALLS (Kapp 248)

● The instrumental newcomers make a sock debut on "Fireball", a portion with enough rock fervor to get teen approval on a chart scale. Opening with soft chords, the boys then go on to demonstrate they can really turn their guitars loose. On the under track, songster Chuck Tharp and the combo get off a solid, hard-beat sound. "Fireball" should prove of greater teen interest.

B "PETITE FLEUR" (2:40) [Hill & Range BMI—Bechet] Clarinetist Darenbourg, who scored with "Yellow Dog Blues", heads a crew in a noteworthy rendition of the current chart item. Darenbourg's work is clarinet sweet and his support swings gently. Reliable "Petite Fleur" entry.

B "OVER THE WAVES" (1:47) [Jendar BMI—Arr. Darenbourg] Good swing stint on the P.D. which Mario Lanza recorded successfully as "The Loveliest Night Of The Year".

GENE SUMMERS

(Jane 106)

B+ "I'LL NEVER BE LONELY" (2:15) [Ted BMI—Tarver] Songster Summers knowingly middle-beats a pleasing beat-romantic and receives solid vocal chants and guitar-spotlighted support from the Rebels. Teeners will find this session highly palatable. To be watched.

B "TWIXTEEN" (1:55) [Ted BMI—Tarver] Artist and backing up the tempo with sock results. Driving portion.

PATTY SATURDAY

(Swan 4022)

B+ "LOVE IS BEAUTIFUL THING" (2:05) [Kincord BMI—Saturday, Daret] The lark sings a sweet beat tune with conviction. Backing reflects the sentiments of the effort well, too. A poised ballad statement that can show up.

B "LADIES CHOICE" (2:08) [Kincord BMI—Saturday, Daret] OK side pounded out to good Big Beat effect by Miss Saturday and fine-sounding combo.

B "GO MR. DILLON" [Arc BMI—Love] Dean rhythmically hops to a jumper concerned with Matt Dillon, the hero of TV's "Gunsmoke". Combo and chorus follow with a handclapping zip that's right up teen alley. Rousing rock affair that has a sound.

C+ "I'M READY" [Oury ASCAP—Oury] The songster and rock 'n roll companions keep up the hectic beat pace here.

B "LIVE IT UP" (1:29) [Sands ASCAP — Bernstein] Slick jam session by the Bernstein crew. Date is also from the Sinatra flick. Both upper and lower lids will be in soundtrack LP on the film.

B+ "I'M FOLLOWING YOU" [Bourne ASCAP — Dreyer, MacDonald] The stylist makes an engaging, semi-rock case for the oldie. With the combo and chorus (organ-highlighted) snappily playing along, Miss Sherwood leads the way with a zesty swing touch. Sure to please countless jocks. Portion that can score.

B "LOOK FOR THE SILVER LINING" [T. B. Harms ASCAP—Kern, DeSylva] A glowing rendition of the great Jerome Kern inspirational. The track is from the performer's new album of the same name.

B "THREE O'CLOCK" (2:05) [Northern ASCAP — Milton, Drake] Laurie London of "He's Got The Whole World In His Hands" fame, sings the praises of the three o'clock (schools out) hour via a swinging jump item. Torrid rocker with a cute teen lyric.

B "MY MOTHER" (3:00) [Chappell ASCAP — London] Laurie penned this touching song about his mother. Touching number that should tug at the heartstrings of parents.

B "THERE I'VE SAID IT AGAIN" (2:48) [Valiant BMI — Evans, Mann] Vaughn revives one of his former smashes with today's popular rock-a-ballad beat in the backdrop. Pretty side that should attract deejay attention.

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LONDON LOWDOWN and

England's Top 30 Records

Latest success story is that of **Bridie Gallagher**, the girl from Ireland. Practically unknown nine months ago, she burst upon our TV screens a couple of weeks ago on "Sunday Night At the London Palladium" and scored an immediate hit. Things have moved fast for Bridie since then—she has signed a contract with Decca, and last Monday flew to the U.S. to appear on the Ed Sullivan Show over there.

Still high on the charts over here is **Perry Como** with his "Mandolins In The Moonlight" and "Love Makes The World Go 'Round".

BBC has announced a record number of entries by British publishers for the Eurovision Song Contest of 1959 which will take place at Cannes on March 11th. Twelve songs will be selected to make up two thirty-minute programmes on TV in February, and the British entry for the finals will be chosen from viewers' votes.

Big Bopper's "Chantilly Lace" entered the charts last week and should go right to the top.

Rank Records announced last week that it has now obtained the distribution rights in this country for Twentieth Fox Records, and among their first releases will be LP's from the soundtracks of Twentieth Century films.

News this week that **Eddie Standing** is leaving the London publishing firm of Campbell Conelly after 31 years with them. Eddie says he may join another firm or, more probably, will start his own publishing business. Taking over as General Manager is **Roy Berry**, who since 1955 has been in charge of Berry Music.

Orchestra leader **Reg Owen** has been offered a concert tour of the States with a band composed of top U.S. instrumentalists. This follows the terrific success over there of Owen's "Manhattan Spiritual". If the tour fails to materialize he will almost certainly go to America for an extensive promotional tour.

One of this country's top singing groups, the **Mudlarks**, are going to be launched in America next month. Their first issue in the States will be "The Love Game" coupled with "Abdul The Bull". The Mudds are hoping to cross the Atlantic to make personal appearances to coincide with this release.

Contract trouble with some of the artists involved has caused the BBC to drop the telerecordings of some of the top American shows. "The Perry Como Show" will continue however and so also will occasional showings of programmes featuring **Bob Hope** and **Sid Caesar**.

Released this week in England is the **Marino Marini** disk from the film "Honeymoon". This could be yet another top record for the quartet, which is now undertaking its first nation-wide tour in this country. This will include a return appearance on ATV's "Sunday Night At The London Palladium".

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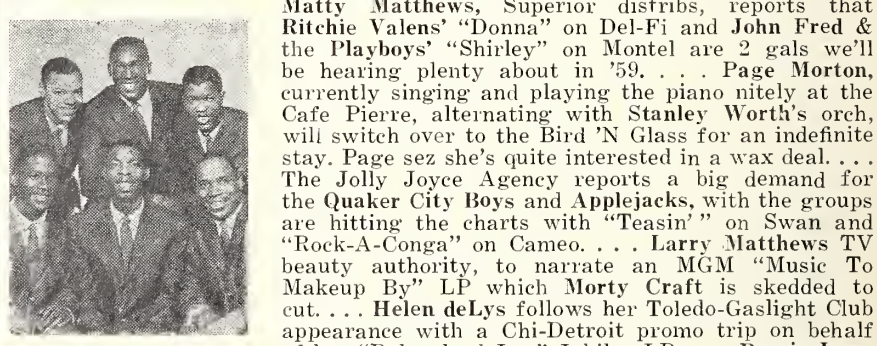

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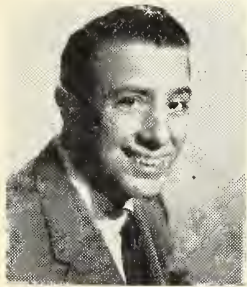

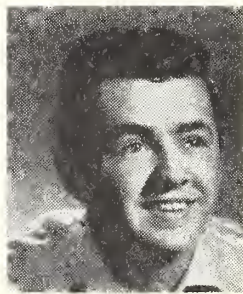

Mercury Artists will make a guest appearance at the meeting nearest their current geographical location; for example: the Diamonds and the Platters will be at the Los Angeles conclave; Rusty Draper, plus Mike Nichols and Elaine May at the San Francisco Meeting; the Gaylords at the Detroit get-together; the Mark IV, the Harmonicats, Joy Layne, and Frank D'Rone, at the Chicago Meeting; Sarah Vaughan, Herman Clebanoff, June Valli, Brook Benton, Gino and Gina, at the New York gathering, etc.

"Operation Papoose" is the latest in a long line of Mercury inspired Sales Plans, designed to increase the volume and stature of the retail dealer. It will be in effect until February 15th of this year.

Del-Fi Has Successful Year

HOLLYWOOD — One of the most successful independent record companies to come to the fore during the past year was the new West Coast independent, Del-Fi Records. The label was founded in December of 1957 by Bob Keene, West Coast band-leader, who previously had been associated with Keen Records, at the time of the release of the first Sam Cooke recordings.

Del-Fi hit the big time with the release of the first recording by 17-year-old Ritchie Valens, who Keene discovered singing at a local Los Angeles high school affair. Valens' waxing of "C'mon Let's Go" sold over the quarter million mark in this country and is now in the number ten spot in England. At this time Keene formed Kemo publishing as a subsidiary of Del-Fi, with veteran West Coast publisher, Herb Monteil. Kemo has since published all of the

Ritchie Valens hits, which were also written by Valens.

Currently, Del-Fi is represented on the charts with both sides of the new Ritchie Valens disk, "Donna" and "La Bomba". Del-Fi is now expanding into the album field with the release this week of the first Ritchie Valens LP. In production now, are ten albums scheduled for release within the next six months. Plans also call for a regularly scheduled single release, with "C'mon Let's Dance" by The Carlos Brothers out last week. Also out last week, is "Fast Freight", the first of a series of recordings by Valens under the name of Arvee Alens, which feature Valens instrumentally on the guitar. In the overall plans for the future growth of Del-Fi, Keene feels that Valens can become a valuable property as an instrumentalist, as well as being one of the country's top vocal stars.

High Fidelity Doubles Sales In 1958

HOLLYWOOD — High Fidelity Recordings, a strictly album and tape line, grossed \$2,400,000 for the year ending 1958, a 100% increase over the previous year, it was disclosed last week by label prexy Richard Vaughn.

Vaughn credits 1958 last quarter sales, which saw High Fidelity release thirty stereo disks and albums and seven 45 rpm stereo extended play albums, as the biggest in the label's history. Coupled with the stereos HiFi monaural LP's, spearheaded by Arthur Lyman's "Taboo" album had the greatest dealer acceptance to date. The label's large tape line was up 50% in sales the first nine months of last year.

Lyman was the biggest seller for the label last year, followed by George Wright, The Surfers, and Elsa Lancaster.

High Fidelity's national sales manager, Pete Stapleton, attributes much of the 100% increase to label's broader distribution base, entry in every major hi fi show in the country, and label's personal field men. Stapleton's field men include Bert Gottlieb, Eastern representative based in New York; Ross Lashbrook, mid-Western representative in Chicago; and Doug Norton, Southern rep stationed in Durham, North Carolina.

Form Belmar Records

NEW YORK — Newly-formed Belmar Records, this city, last week announced the appointments of Ken Hecht as the label's A&R head and Marty Rubin in charge of national sales and distribution. Ruth Shapiro supervises Belmar record promotion.

Hecht has been active in show business as a song-writer (he clefted "No One Knows", the Dion & The Belmonts smash on Glory), director and producer of television and cafe attractions. Hecht inked songster Mark Lano to an exclusive Belmar contract. The first sides by Lano include "That's What I Like About Girls" b/w "I'm Breaking In A Broken Heart".

Rubin is rapidly setting distribution throughout the country and has franchised eleven East Coast territories.

HOLLYWOOD—Tex Ritter and Paul Smith, two long-time exclusive Capitol recording artists, have signed new long-term renewal contracts with the company, it was announced last week by President Glenn E. Wallichs. Tex Ritter, whose first contract with Capitol Records was in June, 1942 (1942 was the year of Capitol's founding), commences his new pact Feb. 5, 1959, under the direction of artist and repertoire producer Lee Gillette. Ritter's current single record on the label is "The History Song," which is coupled with "I Looked for a Love." Smith's initial contract with Capitol was dated Dec. 15, 1953. This keyboard artist specializes in LP recordings for the diskery, the most recent of which is "Delicate Jazz." Earlier albums by Smith were "Softly, Baby," "Cool and Sparkling," "Cascades," and "Liquid Sounds."

Decca Classical LP's

NEW YORK — Decca Records has released four classical packages (monaural & stereo) for mid-January, including one of the first stereo performances of Beethoven's Ninth ("Choral") Symphony. The two-disk Beethoven set features Ferenc Fricsay conducting the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, singers Irmgard Seefried, Maureen Forrester, Ernst Haefliger, Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, and the Choir of St. Hedwig's Cathedral, Berlin.

The three other issues include: "Encore!"—Pianist Ruth Slenczynka performing short piano works by Mendelssohn, Schubert, Debussy, Rachmaninoff and others; Austrian pianist Jorg Demus in two separate releases of Schubert pieces (one package contains the Impromptus, Op. 90 and Op. 142 and other includes "Moments Musicaux" and Drei Klavierstucke".)

Urania Distrib Changes

BELLEVILLE, N.J. — Early last fall Urania merged its distribution with Decca Records in four markets on an experimental basis. "The test was eminently successful", the company reports, and more markets were added during November and December.

Now Urania and Decca have announced full-scale distribution in all but the Chicago-Milwaukee-Peoria area. Allstate Record Distributing Company will remain as the only independent wholesaler and presently covers the above-mentioned region.

Bill Nielsen, Urania's Director of Sales, has stated that in every area where Decca has assumed the line, business has taken a sharp upturn. He also points out that excellent relations between Urania and Decca are due in a great measure to the ability of Decca's Lou Sebok.

The final tally of distribution with which Urania will operate in 1959 is 41 Decca, 1 independent.

RCA "Peter Gunn" EP

NEW YORK—RCA Victor is releasing this week an EP containing four selections from the label's successful TV soundtrack LP, "Peter Gunn". Themes included on the EP are "Peter Gunn Theme", "Fall-out!", "A Profound Gass" and "Sorta Blue".

The EP also follows the release of a single from the LP, "Fall-out!" and "Dreamsville".

Tropical's 10 New LP's

NEW YORK — Sidney Siegel, president of Seeco Records and the \$1.98 line, Tropical Records, disclosed last week that ten new albums have been added to the catalog of the low-price label and will be shipped to distributors and rack jobbers in the United States and South America during the month of January.

The Tropical sets are "Merengues" by Damiron and Chapuseaux, "Cuban Stars"—Matamoros & Portables, "Dancing To The Riverside Orchestra", "Mexican Stars"—Los Panchos Trio and Chucho Martinez, "Singing For You"—Johnny Lopez, "The Universitarios In The Antilles", "King Of The Tango"—Hugo Del Carril, "Porto Rican Stars"—Jose Luis Monero and Ruth Fernandez, "Bimbi And His Oriental Trio" and "The Sweetheart Of Song"—Eva Garza.

"Currently", Siegel stated, "racks of Tropical Records are in supermarkets, newsstands, books shops and in Sears Roebuck stores in Argentina, Brazil, Peru, Chile, Colombia, Venezuela, Mexico, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Panama, El Salvador, Guatemala and the Netherlands West Indies.

"We are, of course, selling Tropical in regular retail record stores. Unlike the situation in the United States when the cheap lines were first introduced, the Latin retailers welcome Tropical because such an enormous percentage of the population down there simply cannot afford to spend \$3.98 for an album. Tropical has built the retailer's traffic enormously, as we predicted it would.

"In addition, by opening up new avenues of merchandising via the racks, we are reaching more people with records than ever before and this too will help to broaden the market."

Connie "Queen of Hearts"

NEW YORK — Connie Francis, MGM Records' songstress, has been voted "Queen of Hearts" by the 1959 Committee of the Heart Fund. The Heart Fund will send to deejays—as part of its 1959 radio campaign—a recorded message from Miss Francis.

Maurice Chevalier, who also records for MGM, has also cut a Heart Fund message for Jocks.

Galligan Leaves Sunbeam

NEW YORK — Neil Galligan announced his resignation as vice-president of Laurel, Valando, and Sunbeam Music and Sunbeam Records. Galligan had been with Valando Music and the associated firms since 1948. He is currently examining a number of offers.

Paul Cohen Resigns From Coral Records

NEW YORK—Paul Cohen, with Decca & Coral Records for the past 25 years, resigned last week from the diskery.

Cohen will vacation for a while before he makes any decisions about future business activities.

Cohen began his career with Decca back in August of 1934 as a salesman for the diskery in Chicago. Later he became branch manager of the Cincinnati branch and eventually came to New York where progressed in the A & R department under the late Jack Kapp. He also worked with Mayo Williams in Decca's R & B department and helped make Decca's Country Music department one of the strongest in the industry.

Among the many stars whose careers Cohen played an important role in are Red Foley; Ernest Tubb; Webb Pierce, who came up with 18 consecutive smashes recorded by Cohen; Kitty Wells, one of the top female artists in the Country music field; Goldie Hill; Bobby Helms; Patsy Cline; Rex Allen; Al Hibbler; Owen Bradley; Kenny Roberts; the Cowboy Church Sunday School Choir; Jimmie Davis; the Four Aces; Brenda Lee; Warner Mack; Slew Foot Five; Merv Shiner; Sister Rosetta Tharp; Mitchell Torok; the Wilburn Bros.; Jan Turzy; Bill Darnel; the Commanders; Red Sovine; and many others.

The chain of hits he's had with Decca and during the past nine months with Coral includes "Tennessee Saturday Night", "Chatanooga Shoe Shine Boy", "Wondering", "Back Street Affair", "Searching", "My Special Angel", "Honky Tonk Angels", "Unchained Melody", "Tell Me Why" and literally an endless line-up of others.

He leaves Coral with a number of hits on the charts including: "Lonely Teardrops" by Jackie Wilson; "O' Falling Star" by the Four Knights; "Wiggle Wiggle" by the Accents; "May You Always" by the McGuire Sisters; "The One Rose" by Teresa Brewer; and he recorded the new Buddy Holly coupling, "It's Raining In My Heart" b/w "It Doesn't Matter Anymore".

Upon learning of Paul Cohen's resignation Webb Pierce phoned in the following statement: "I want to go on record that it's Paul who deserves much of the credit for my success in the country field. Paul had faith in my abilities during the early days and had an uncanny knack for picking hit material over years".

Ford Signs Danny Scholl

NEW YORK—Singer Danny Scholl of the Jack Paar TV Show has signed a recording pack with Ford Records, it was announced last week. The contract was negotiated with Scholl's manager Harry Steinman while the singer was recovering at Roosevelt Hospital here after a recent illness.

Scholl, who previously recorded for Decca and RCA Victor, will have his first single release on Ford next week with a waltz entitled "Hope."

Also signed by Ford recently was Gene Strider, lead male vocalist of the Air Force Tops In Blue show, who was released from the service several months ago.

MGM and Morty Craft Split

NEW YORK—Arnold Maxin, president of MGM Records, last week announced that Morty Craft, A & R head, was no longer with MGM.

"There was a disagreement," stated Maxin, "over the employment status between Craft and Loew's, Inc. Loew's then issued a letter of agreement which terminated Craft's employment at the end of 1958. Negotiations for a contract for the ensuing year fell through, so Craft, who felt his talents were worth more than he was receiving decided not to continue with the MGM organization."

Most mentioned by the trade in recent weeks to replace Craft at MGM was Ray Ellis. However Maxin's comment on this was, "A few people have been mentioned for Craft's job, but no successor has yet been named."

In a statement made by Martin J. Machat, attorney for Morty Craft, Machat said:

"There has been a disagreement between Loew's, Inc. and Morty Craft over his employment status and Mr. Craft is no longer with MGM Records. Mr. Craft was originally employed by MGM Records as chief Artist and Repertoire director. In addition to his a & r duties, he was appointed director of sales and director of promotion for all pop singles.

"On September 1st, 1958, Mr. Craft received a new employment agreement wherein he was given as a bonus a percentage of the gross profits of the pop singles department," continued Machat.

"Under MGM's newly found success and Mr. Craft's participation in the gross profits, he was on his way to becoming the highest paid a & r man in the history of the record business," concluded Machat.

Craft will take a short vacation and review some of the offers he has received. He will make no decisions for about two weeks. In the meantime he can be reached through his attorney, Martin J. Machat.

Spargo Joins Rank

NEW YORK—Peter Spargo has been named national promotion head of Rank and Shad Records, it was announced last week.

Spargo comes to the Rank and Shad set-up from Mercury Records, where he did Eastern promotion work. Before his association with Mercury, Spargo was employed by Robbins, Feist & Miller, publishers.

Dot January LP's

HOLLYWOOD—The Dot Records line-up of LP's for January includes eight packages, available in monaural and stereo.

They are: "Billy Vaughn Plays"; "Around The World"—Steve Allen; "Polka Dot Party"—Herb Shriner; "Jack Kane Salutes The Comics"; "Whispering Hope"—Bonnie Guitar; "My Baby" Ken Nordine; "What's My Line?"—Eight "mystery guest" interviews by the TV show panel.

Allied Veep in N. Y.

NEW YORK—Samuel Salzman, Allied Record Manufacturing veep in charge of manufacturing, flew into New York last week from the firm's home base in Hollywood for a visit with the supervisory heads of American Sound Corp., in Belleville, N. J., which is the East Coast operation of Allied.

Salzman is discussing with American Sound execs the possibility of an expansion project at Allied's East Coast plant. Salzman will return to the West Coast in about a week, at which time John F. Wegener, Allied's financial advisor, will come east.

Dick Jacobs Appointed A & R Topper of Coral

NEW YORK—Leonard W. Schneider, Executive Vice-President of Decca Records, Inc. last week announced the appointment of Dick Jacobs to the position of Director of Artist and Repertoire for Coral Records.

Jacobs was graduated in 1936 from New York University with the degree of Bachelor of Music. He started his

musical career in 1946 after his discharge from the Army, as arranger for Tommy Dorsey. Two years later, he formed an arranging partnership with Sy Oliver which proved to be an extremely successful merger. The team worked with all the top artists in the music field including such talents as Frank Sinatra, Perry Como and Eddie Fisher.

RCA Country Stereo LPs Outselling Pops

NEW YORK—RCA Victor reported last week that sales of the stereo versions of all country/western LP's has matched, and sometimes exceeded, stereo sales on more conventional Pop LP's. The diskery is releasing all C&W albums in stereo, including Don Gibson's latest, "No One Stands Alone".

Foreign Distr For Monacle

NEW YORK — Monocle Records, this city, signed contracts last week giving the label distribution in Canada and the Benelux countries (Belgium, Netherlands and Luxembourg). Quality Records of Canada will manufacture and handle Monacle there and Tonalty of Belgium will handle the Benelux end. Other foreign deals are various stages of negotiation. Joe Reisman Leaves RCA Victor

NEW YORK—Joe Reisman, A & R exec with RCA Victor and a leading arranger, announcer last week that he is leaving his Victor post February 1st.

Reisman stated that he is mulling over numerous offers and will announce his future plans when one is decided upon. At present, however, Reisman has made no definite decision about future activities.

Reisman has been arranging and recording for Victor for the past four years. He arranged four million-selling records for Perry Como, one each for the past four years—"Papa Loves Mambo" in 1955, "Hot Diggity" in 1956, "Round And Round" in 1957 and "Catch A Falling Star" in 1958. He both produced and arranged "Catch A Falling Star" for Como.

Prior to his Victor activities, Reisman was a free lance arranger and arranged a great number of Patti Page's hits including "Doggie In The Window", "Tennessee Waltz", "I Went To Your Wedding", "Changing Partners", and "Mocking Bird Hill". He also arranged for Johnnie Ray and Julius La Rosa.

Among Reisman's other accomplishments was the composition of the background score for the film "Indiscretions of an American Wife".

Vanguard Enters Pop Dance LP Field

NEW YORK — Vanguard Records announces its entry in the popular "dance" LP field with the recording of Ben Ludlow and his society orchestra. In addition to leading his orchestra, Ben Ludlow composes, plays the saxophone, banjo, the tin whistle and the ocarina.

Heavy TV Schedule For Platters

NEW YORK—The Platters, stellar Mercury Records' vocal team, are currently getting hefty TV exposure.

Last week, the group guested on the George Gobel (Jan. 13) and Dick Clark (Jan. 17) TV shows and are skedded to do the new Buddy Bregman program on Jan. 25. In addition, the artists are tentatively skedded for upcoming appearances on the Ed Sullivan Show, The Hit Parade and the Canadian Hit Parade over Canada's CBC-TV.

After the group ends its current engagement at the Moulin Rouge in Los Angeles this week, it will begin (Jan. 23) an 18-day tour of eastern cities in "The Biggest Show of Stars for '59". This tour will be followed by stints in Chicago and Miami.

Nashboro Records Signs Erle Hall

NASHVILLE, TENN.—Erle Hall, actor-singer, who has appeared in many Broadway plays has been signed by Nashboro Records, and is skedded to get a big promo push from the diskery.

Born in Nashville, Hall graduated from the University of North Carolina, where he received a B. A. degree in drama. In 1951, the performer came to New York and has since been featured on Broadway in such legit plays as "Inherit The Wind", "Candida", "Athello", "What Every Woman Knows". He has done film and TV work, having appeared in the flick, "Garment Jungle", and on such TV shows as "Frontiers Of Faith", "Kraft Theatre", "Robert Montgomery Presents" and "You Are There".

Onorati To Coast

NEW YORK—Henry Onorati, president of 20th-Fox Records, the recording subsidiary of Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation, left last week for the Coast with film company president Spyros P. Skouras and other Fox executives for a "summit meeting" with West Coast executive Buddy Adler and members of his staff.

Vice-president Lou Del Guercio will also embark for the conference later in the week.

The agenda will include discussion of record releases on important 20th-Fox film musicals to be released in 1959 among which are: the Bing Crosby starrer "Say One For Me," and the Cole Porter scored "Can Can."

6. Plan terminates February 15th.

Lion Records are not included in this plan.

MGM Records has set special quotas for distributors and according to Arnold Maxin, president of MGM Records, and Charles Hasin, sales manager, "this should start MGM Records off to a great new sales year."

As a special adjunct to the campaign, MGM Records has announced a "Joni for January" campaign and has supplied special advertising and display material to dealers on all Joni James albums releases.

Pal Records Formed

CUCAMONGA, CALIF.—The formation of Pal Records and Pal-O-Mine music, here, was announced last week by Olivia B. Buff, label prexy. Songwriter Benny Weissman and A&R man Bill Silva have joined the diskery and will devote themselves exclusively to Pal.

The Managers Committee will work with Joe Martin, director of sales, advertising and merchandising, and with Jules Malamud, national sales manager.

Malamud and Martin will schedule a series of meetings at the factory headquarters as well as in the field to work over timing of releases, size of releases, incentive programs, sales programs, delivery, co-op advertising, sales to racks, chains and syndicates and general policy covering the labels' relationship with retail dealers.

The first meeting of the committee is tentatively scheduled for February 10th at the Miller plant offices in Swarthmore, Pa.

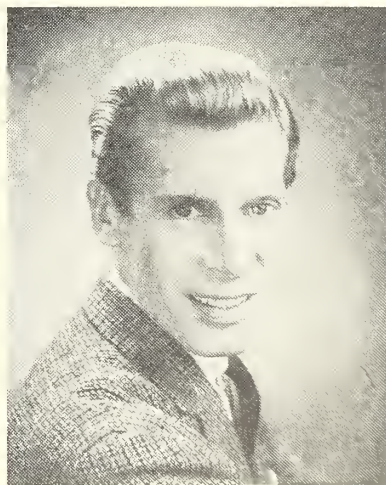
Seeman Named Manager Of New York One-Stop

"COME DANCE WITH ME!"—Frank Sinatra—With Billy May And His Orchestra—Capitol W 1069

Sinatra's on the swinging path again and a sock sales future for the set is obvious. Backed effervescently by the Billy May ork, Sinatra takes twelve fine numbers and makes them his sparkling swing own. One the the new items here, the title tune, is sure to get the tremendous jock play garnered by the performer's "Come Fly With Me" track from his smash LP of the same name.

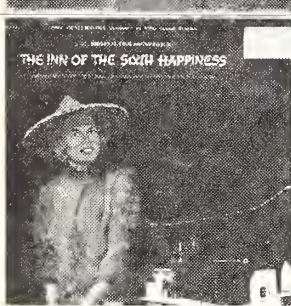
... FROM THE 'HUNGRY i'—The Kingston Trio—Capitol T 1107

This waxing by the "Tom Dooley" boys is sure to get quick chart recognition. (their initial LP, "The Kingston Trio", is still on the lists). Recorded at San Francisco's famed "angry man" hiway, "The Hungry i", the team presents crop of rewarding folk essays with spirit and warmth. Selections include "Wimoweh", "When The Saint Go Marching In", "South Coast" and "They Call The Wind Maria" (the Lerner-Loewe item from the musical, "Paint Your Wagon").



"BILLY VAUGHN PLAYS"—Dot DLP 3156

When the Vaughn ork plays an LP, the waxing has chart strength; his latest is no exception. Fourteen durable romantics are clung to by the Vaughn ensemble with typical Vaughn sentiment. Tunes include "Blue Moon", "My Happiness", "Jealous Heart", "Blueberry Hill". Sure-fire ork stock.



"THE INN OF THE SIXTH HAPPINESS"—Original Film Soundtrack—20th Fox 3011

The set may well be the first chart soundtrack entry of the year. The pic has produced a smash single, the engaging children's march item, "This Old Man", and the effort itself has won critical applause. An unusual aspect of the deck is actual dialogue sections from the film by principals Ingrid Bergman, Curt Jurgens and the late Robert Donat which begin each track of the sentimental and tense Malcolm Arnold score.



"LUSH INTERLUDE"—Stan Kenton And His Orchestra—Capitol T 1130

Ten of Kenton's own works—until now displayed in band format—have been hauntingly re-arranged by Kenton and Pete Rugolo for band plus strings, resulting in mood work with more than pensive listening in mind, but with almost classical ork ingenuity. Most of the takes are moody inventions, some are sock, full ork affairs. Sides include "Artistry In Rhythm", "Lush Waltz", "Interlude", "Machito" and "Collaboration". For Kenton followers, a new, indeed lush, look at Kenton themes.



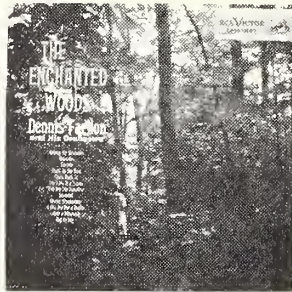
"TORCH TIME"—Gogi Grant—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 1940 (Monaural & Stereo)

Miss Grant, who proved how well she could carry a vocal torch as the voice of the late Helen Morgan in the flick bio of the singer, is concerned wholly here with wistful gems, requiring the touch of an eloquent vocal poet and she comes through superbly. The stylist displays an understanding and poignancy on the likes of "Summertime", "Something Wonderful", "Yesterdays", showing a glad-to-be-unhappy attitude on "Be-witched", and "Mad About The Boy". Henri Rene's ork follows Miss Grant's sentiments artfully. An outstanding vocal collection.



"LOOK FOR THE SILVER LINING"—Roberta Sherwood—With Orchestra Directed By Jack Pleis—Decca DL 7/8839 (Monaural & Stereo)

Fine pop hymns are expressed in all their inspirational warmth by the stylist, who is expressively assisted by the Jack Pleis ork-chorus. The Sherwood reflections include such notable items as the title song, "You'll Never Walk Alone", "I Believe", "May The Good Lord Bless And Keep You" and "Over The Rainbow". A disk of great vocal conviction.



"THE ENCHANTED WOODS"—Dennis Farnon And His Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 1897 (Monaural & Stereo)

Conductor Farnon, with more than a hint of jazz direction, heads a woodwind-featured ork of almost symphonic proportions in mostly silken-textured renditions of melodic beauts. Though the game here is generally a mood one, two numbers, "The Lady Is A Tramp" and "Winter Wonderland", swing invitingly. Smart tunes include "You Are Too Beautiful", "Moonlove", "Day By Day", "Fools Rush In" and "If You Are But A Dream". Class ork product.



"MELLOW-DEE"—Lenny Dee, Organ—Decca DL 7/8796 (Monaural & Stereo)

The oft-heard from Decca organist brings a slick organ caress or beat to a dozen sentimental oldies. One of the delights of Dee's work here is the lightness with which he can handle an instrument that can often be overplayed. Easy drum work supports the artist. Tunes include "Tenderly", "June Night", "I Never Knew", "I'm Through With Love". Organ enthusiasts will find deck a pleasure to hear.



"BROADWAY SPECTACULAR"—Norman Leyden And His Orchestra—Camden CAM/CAS 467 (Monaural & Stereo)

The deck—previously issued on the Concert Hall label—is an admirable ork account of ten Broadway melodies of note. Leyden's full ork is true-to-the-melody and richly scored. The durables include "If I Loved You", "So In Love", "Some Enchanted Evening", "You're Just In Love", "I Could Have Danced All Night". One of the better mood buys at \$1.98.



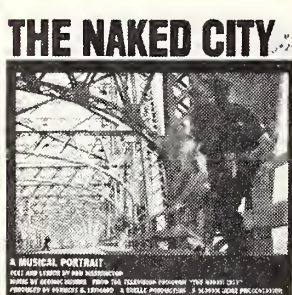
"MUSIC FROM THE BLUE ROOM"—Jan Garber At The Roosevelt Hotel In New Orleans—Decca DL 7/8793 (Monaural & Stereo)

Dance disk specialist Garber gives the society beat crowd much to cheer about here as his keyboard and ork sell a bill of mostly familiar tunes with sentiment and rhythm. Tempos include the fox-trot, waltz, cha-cha, Dixieland and swing. Traffic on to business man's bounce type affairs can be assured of pro work from Garber.



"SKIN AND BONES"—Carl Stevens And His Orchestra—Mercury MG 20365

Conductor-trumpeter Stevens, whose work for Mercury has included two Military Band packages, directs a fine percussion ("skin"), trombone ("bones") featured ork in a smart, danceable enterprise. Working mostly on mainstays ("Imagination", "All Of You", "Soon", "Fascinating Rhythm"), the ensemble displays class invention on varying tempos, from sentimental to scintillating. Ork variety with consistently good-sounding arrangements (all but two by Stevens).



"THE NAKED CITY"—A Musical Portrait—Colpix CP 505

This production, a sort of biting "Manhattan Tower", is based on the TV crime series on New York, and via jazz-directed George Dunning themes and Ned Washington lyrics and "book" traces the misadventures of a gal who tries to make good as a singer in the city, does, and then leaves with her man for the hinterland. Narrator of the proceedings is John McIntire, a police Lieutenant on the video "Naked City". Morris Stoloff heads the ork and Joanne Greer and James Darren do well as singing principals. Should interest faithful "Naked City" fans.



"THE MAGIC CARPET"—Music Of The Middle East, Vol. 4—Mohammed El-Bakkar And His Oriental Ensemble—Audio Fidelity AFLP 1895 (Monaural & Stereo)

The colorful, pulsating rhythms of the mid-east are for the fourth time the vehicles for the El-Bakkar outfit on Audio Fidelity, and those who have taken to the three previous issues are sure to enjoy another encore. Sound is first-rate.

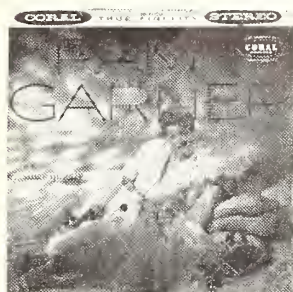

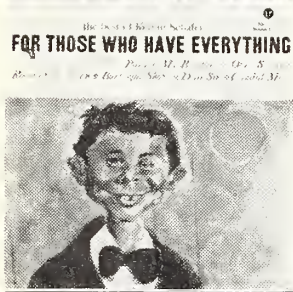
"PAM GARNER SINGS QUIETLY"—Coral CRL 7/57250 (Monaural & Stereo)

Miss Garner is a songstress well worth attention. Indeed, she sings "quietly" here, but not without making a natural melodic case for the tunes and presenting them often with "quiet" perking-up of tempo. Her material denotes a willingness to hear from all fields, a factor which brings around such divergent entries as "My Heart Stood Still" and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot". Other items include "In The Still Of The Night", "Lonesome Road", "Speak Low" and "Softly As In A Morning Sunrise". The Charles Dant ork is soft, and gives Miss Garner the floor. Excellent LP debut.



"AROUND THE STEREO WORLD"—Berlin Concert Orchestra Conducted by Lajos Kevchazy—Rondo-lette SA 59

Fine budget-price (\$2.49) stereo buy from the label on a lively collection of ten light classics representative of various nations. Performed with spirit are such plums as Greig's "Norwegian Dance", Gounod's "Faust Waltz", Rimsky-Korsakov's "Flight Of The Bumble Bee", Strauss' "Tritsch Tratsch Polka". Stereo depth is good.



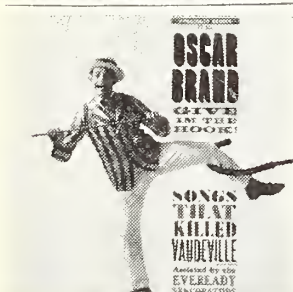
"FOR THOSE WHO HAVE EVERYTHING"—(Vol. 1) The Best of Kermit Schafer—Jubilee KS-1

This two-disk comedy offering is a collection of excerpts from six humor sets produced by well known boner-seeker Kermit Schafer ("Pardon My Bloop", "Dear Sir", "Candid Mike", etc.). The issue thus places lots of party fun variety under a single roof. Schafer's fame in the comedy waxing field lends valuable novelty shelf appeal here.



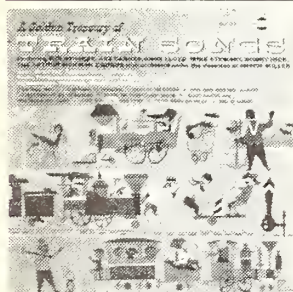
"BANJORAMA"—Carmen Mastren—Mercury MG 20343

The banjo rarely has had it as good on disks as here. Mastren, a Tommy Dorsey and Glenn Miller Air Force band alumnus, is the banjoist head of a six-man crew (banjo, two guitars, bass, drum, piano) in a rollicking, sometimes sentimental program of twenty-two tunes best suited for the banjo. Presented in single track and medley fashion are such oldies as "Sweet Sue", "Camptown Races", "Bye Bye Blues", "Dark Eyes" and "O Susanna". Well-performed banjo nostalgia.



"GIVE 'IM THE HOOK!"—Oscar Brand—Assisted by the Eveready Syncopators—Riverside 12-832

Folk balladeer Brand reads with relish nineteen tunes which, according to the sub-title here, "killed vaudeville". Whatever course they set for vaudeville, these late nineteenth and early twentieth century bon-bons of satire and pseudo-sentiment are a delight to hear from Brand, who seems to be having the time of his life going through the histrionics required of many. The three man instrumental accompaniment—headed by pianist Robert Abramson—plays the game wonderfully, too.



"TRAIN SONGS"—Various Artists—Golden GLP 33

The kiddie set invitingly programs a collection of songs and special material on a train theme. Performed by a skilled group of grown-ups and kids plus an ork and chorus under Mitch Miller's direction are such numbers as "Down By The Station", "Casey Jones", "Gandy Dancers' Ball" and a fine cross-country train tour. Excellent \$1.98 musical effort for children.



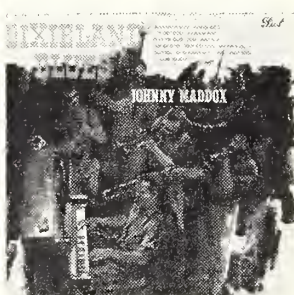
"FLOWER DRUM SONG"—Cy Coleman And His Trio—Westminster WP 6106

Pianist Coleman and fellow jazzists Aaron Bell (bass) and G. T. Hogan (drums) have a bright and inventive go at eight tunes from the new Rodgers-Hammerstein musical. The selections were wisely chosen as they allow for various expressions from the crew, ranging from the sock stint ("Chop Suey") to the ballad ("You Are Beautiful"). Each track opens with a short suggestion of the show's San Francisco China Town locale and from there on it's pure (and fine) jazz. A choice jazz interpretation of "Flower Drum Song" material.



"BLUES WALK"—Lou Donaldson, Alto Sax—Blue Note 1593

Donaldson, who has had an alto sax say in seven Blue Note issues, mixes tempos up nicely under a quintet format here. Digging into a program of six numbers (two the standards "Autumn Nocturne" and "The Masquerade Is Over"), the jazzist turns his performing dial from blue to brisk and in between with style. Though its Donaldson's show most of the way, there's fine invention from pianist Herman Foster, drummer Dave Bailey, bassist "Peck" Morrison and conga artist Ray Barretto. Sturdy jazz performances.



"DIXIELAND BLUES"—Johnny Maddox and His Dixie Boys—Dot DLP 3131

Dot's big ragtime keyboard boy and a crew of skilled Dixieland-wise musicians (i.e. Mannie Klein, Red Callender, Matty Matlock) offer lots of bright and carefree drive on a dozen blues classics. Numbers include "St. Louis Blues", "Basin Street Blues", "Yellow Dog Blues" and "Royal Garden Blues". Sound will get applause from the hi-fi crowd. Sure to delight Dixieland lovers.



"THIS IS ME, J. C. HEARD"—J. C. Heard Octet—Argo 633

There's lots of free and easy jazz fun and invention here as drummer-vocalist Heard and good company get to a variety of jazz facets (i.e. swing, blues, Afro-Cuban). Besides his fine drum work, Heard offers three vocals perfectly suited to atmosphere of their respective tracks (the Afro-Cuban softie, "Nightingale", the light blues item, "Blues For Sale"). Other jazzists include Bennie Powell, Frank Wess, Joe Newman. New Argo packages contain EP sampling of the Argo jazz line-up. Inviting jazz work on a good-natured theme.

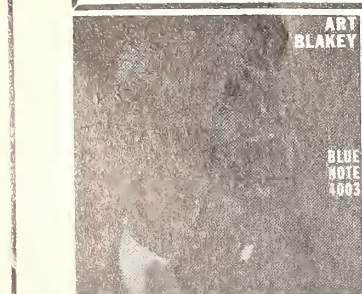
CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK

"ART BLAKEY AND THE JAZZ MESS-SENGERS"—Blue Note 4003

A dandy combo display from the famed Blakey crew, with the sound refreshing, clean and almost continually of interest. Working with six items, one the standard "Come Rain Or Come Shine", the other the three-part "The Drum Thunder (Miniature) Suite", the outfit gets its most vivid moments from drummer Blakey, trumpeter Lee Morgan and tenor saxist Benny Golson. Sure-fire jazz set.



"THE ART OF SONG"—Cesare Valtelli, Tenor—With Leo Taubman, Piano—RCA Victor LM/LSC 2280 (Monaural & Stereo)

The Met tenor was well received as an art song recitalist at New York's Town Hall earlier last year, and enthusiasts of both opera and the art song will find much pleasure in Valtelli's renditions of fourteen pieces by Schumann, Schubert, Scarlatti and others. The material—passionate, lyrical or gay—allows Valtelli to display a fine sense of a variety of emotions.

Verbit's Plea To Manufacturers

PHILADELPHIA—Nelson Verbit, head of Marnel Distributing in this city and Baltimore, made an open plea last week to manufacturers to stamp "Discontinued Merchandise" on the outside of all albums that they are discounting and closing out.

Verbit stated, "It is common practice for manufacturers, at this time of the year, to dump the LP's in their line which have not moved well. Ordinarily, this is done in the form of special deals, which amount to discounting, or by openly slashing the price on the dead items. This is a healthy practice and one that distributors welcome just as much as the retailers. However, because of the tremendous price confusion that already exists in the public mind, this year it would be extremely beneficial to industry-wide public relations if these "end-of-the run" recordings were stamped "Discontinued Merchandise" on the outside.

"Actually, there are several reasons for this. For one, the public is hearing rumblings of a devaluation of monophonic records due to stereo. Certainly, every retailer is extremely

apprehensive about this. Putting this special stamp on the packages would allay any such fears and at the same time would explain why the public is getting such a good buy on the LP's. It's the same psychology used on other products by retailers who have close-outs and would actually build the "savings factor" in the buyer's mind.

"For still another reason, albums today sell for anywhere from one to six dollars with very little apparent difference in value, sound and packaging to explain the wide disparity in price. If we are to maintain the public confidence in the price structure of the record business and not strip all prestige away from our product, we've got to be able to explain why albums are variously priced. With the "Discontinued Merchandise" stamp, we can build the honesty of a genuine sale without creating more confusion and suspicion every time we try to sell a full-priced album for the full-price."

Harry Stone Named Executive Director of Country Music Assn.

NASHVILLE—The announcement of the appointment of Harry Stone as executive director of the Country Music Association, effective February 1, was made by Wesley Rose, chairman of the Board of Directors, last week.

Stone, radio and television station executive and programming expert, who has always been a booster of Country and Western music and made it an integral part of his programming formats, was appointed Executive Director of the Country Music Association at a meeting of the Officers and Board of Directors at Nashville, January 10 and 11.

Stone will have the assignment of keeping Country and Western music foremost in America's entertainment, expand it even further into the international markets, and to carry out all of the Country Music Association's plans and policies.

The appointment of Stone was by unanimous action of the members of the CMA Board of Directors after it had considered many of the top names in the Country Music Industry for the position.

Stone has had long, and intimate, experience in radio entertainment and programming. He was with Station WSM at Nashville for 23 years prior to 1951 and at the time of his resignation was vice-president, general manager, and a member of the board of directors. During his WSM tenure he helped build up the Grand Ole Opry to its current prominence.

Since leaving WSM, Stone has been a TV consultant, establishing and assisting in setting up stations, including KPHO-TV at Phoenix, Arizona, KCEN-TV at Temple, Texas, and WGRP at Chattanooga, Tennessee. He also served with the American Broadcasting Company at San Francisco, and for a period of seven months

was operations manager of WSIX-TV at Nashville. In May, 1957, he set up WWL-TV at New Orleans and has been active in supervising operational matters, hiring personnel, and planning the station's programming. For some time he has also been local sales manager for the station.

Connie B. Gay, president of the Country Music Association, made the following statement on Stone's appointment:

"By accepting the position of Executive Director of CMA, Harry Stone brings to it the integrity, experience, and leadership so necessary to launch it as the dynamic trade association that it is destined to become."

Stone, in accepting the appointment, made the following statement:

"I am proud to be associated with the Country Music Association and to be working with people whom I have known for so many years. I am particularly pleased by the confidence reposed in me and have full faith that this Association can keep country music on top as America's most favored entertainment. Capitalizing on country music's strength today can mean so much to the future of the men and women who have invested their money, their careers, and their lives in it, and I will sincerely strive to give to it all the unremitting effort it so richly deserves."

While Stone's appointment was the principal business of the meeting, the Association also completed various organizational matters, appointed standing committees, and set up procedural matters to preserve and promote the great potential of country music throughout the world.

The next meeting of the Country Music Association's Board of Directors and Officers will be in Nashville on April 3 and 4.

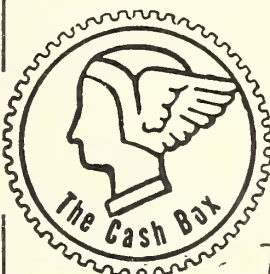
Schuster Named Capitol's Phono Administrator

We were with a group of people one day recently, and among them was an operator of amusement and music machines. In the general discussion our operator friend was asked "What business are you in?" His answer, haltingly and with obvious embarrassment, was "I'm in the entertainment business." This coinman was ashamed to identify his business as "coin operated machines."

We have found this attitude to be more the rule than the exception. With all the adverse publicity over the past many years, coinmen tend to camouflage their business identity. Because of the ignorant and sensational seeking Press, TV and Radio; headline seeking politicians; and a certain unsavory past history (altered long ago with the advent of the modern phase of the coin machine business), the industry and its members have taken an unmerciful and uncalled for pasting (which someday, thru public relations efforts, will be completely eliminated).

Instead of being ashamed of their association with the coin machine business, its members have every reason to be PROUD—YES, MIGHTY PROUD of it. The thousands of coinmen (and its additional thousands of employees) are bringing to the millions of people in this hectic and tensed-up world a means of economical amusement, entertainment and service,

which in reality is a therapeutic treatment for its many ailments.

To defeat the ingenuity of the games' manufacturer by running up a high score on a pinball, bowling, shuffle game; displaying athletic skill; shooting down an enemy with electric rays or pellets—all these give the player pleasure and relaxation. Competition on these games among players presents an opportunity to display individual skill as well as bringing about a social atmosphere of comradeship.

The music machine industry presents to millions the pleasure and relaxation afforded only by music—be it a ballad, a folk tune, a jazz rendition, a rock 'n' roll, a blues, a cha-cha, or a native melody from the "old country". The juke box is the only instrument whereby the public can by self-determination, select the music of its choice.

The variety of vendors offer the public the convenience of selecting products where otherwise they would be inaccessible or terribly inconvenient.

Should the coin machine people who are making all the above possible be PROUD? We say—without qualification or hesitation—it not only should be PROUD—it should BRAG about its service to the harassed peoples of the world. Very few industries can equal it.

MFERS LIST STEREO SINGLES

Name Artist Selectivity Already Substantial. More Record Companies Entering Field

NEW YORK—There is no doubt now that both the Coin-Operated Phonograph and the "45" record are as much a part of the Stereo Age as the home phonograph and 33½ RPM.

All five of the Coin-Operated Phonograph Manufacturers have gone stereo to one extent or another—their activities ranging from complete commitment to either conversions or announced plans for stereo units.

The record manufacturers, slow to release 45 RPM stereo at the outset, have suddenly come to life. A large number of companies have 45 RPM records on dealers' shelves or ready for release and most others who are significant factors in the business either have publicized or confidential plans to release 45's.

Although most record companies are not yet at the point where they feel they can release simultaneous stereo and monaural singles for the hit market, many are recording all hit tune material stereo as well as monaural, with the intention of immediately releasing stereo versions of those records that begin to approach hit tune status.

Stereo offers unlimited opportunities for the kind of startling effects that create hit records—and record manufacturers are aware of this.

Another potent factor in focusing their attention on the tremendous potential of the 45 RPM stereo record has been the emergence of the stereo

portable as one of the hottest selling items in the home phonograph business. As long ago as the NAMM Show in July there were portables in production. In the early Fall less-than-\$100 portables put in an appearance on the market. And today, three major producers have portable stereo phonographs listing at \$39.50. This marks the beginning of a home market for stereo singles.

Now that stereo 45's are being released almost daily, the coming year will find stereophonic installations in thousands of top juke box locations.

From the Furnishings Mart in Chicago comes the word that manufacturers of stereo phonographs finally feel they have breached the terminology confusion barrier that has stunted public acceptance of stereo heretofore.

Another big factor in the acceptance of stereo phonographs by the consumer is the trend by the manufacturer to place on the market one piece units, thus overcoming the reluctance of the female in the home to fit extra speakers into the decor of her room.

The home units should find a wide acceptance in 1959, thus increasing the market for 45's and thus enlarging the market for a larger gross sale of stereo singles. This will bring more and more singles into the market from which the juke box operator can choose from.

The company which introduced stereophonic sound to the coin-operated music industry last September has spent the intervening months in researching the stereo potential and has come up with a line of phonographs and remote equipment which it claims will make possible true stereo installations in all locations regardless of size or shape.

In announcing that Wurlitzer Week showings will begin across the country on January 19, Bob Bear, Wurlitzer sales manager, introduced the theme for the current line. "We say," stated Bear, "that our new products are 'geared for greater earning power' and feel that the flexibility of choice offered operators substantiates this statement. This year we are offering a larger combination of models than we ever have in the past. There is a new dual pricing wall box for use with our 200-selection models and a selection of four speakers which can be used in pairs or in various combinations to insure the installation of a true Stereophonic Music System wherever the demand exists. Never before has it been possible for us to give operators as exactly what they want in a coin-operated music system. In the 1959 line we have included all the most wanted features as standard equipment in the models we expect will lead in sales. All features are available as optional factory installation in other models. We have offered both stereophonic and monophonic music systems in the 200 and 104-selection phonographs. Each operator may order a music system complete with remote equipment to fit the exact specifications of the location in which it will be installed. We think this will be another first in the coin-operated music field."

A listing of model qualifications for the new Wurlitzer line indicates four major models which may be ordered with various complements of equipment. They include—

- Model 2300 S—Stereophonic 200-selection with stepper and dual pricing.
- Model 2300—Monophonic 200-selection with stepper.
- Model 2304-S—Stereophonic 104-selection (less stepper).
- Model 2304—Monophonic 104-selection (less stepper).

Hideaway units are available with 200-selection mechanism and 104-selection mechanism.

Wall boxes for every purpose are offered in three styles. Each is contained in a highly chromed case and has a special lock with a special key.

Model 5252—New 200-selection dual pricing—50¢ play.

Model 5250—200-selection single pricing—50¢ play.

Model 5207—104-selection single pricing—5-10-25¢ play.

The four speakers are each designed for a specific purpose. They include—

Model 5122—Stereophonic Console Floor speaker.

Model 5123—Stereophonic Wall Speaker.

Model 5124—Stereophonic Corner Speaker.

Model 5125—The Wurlitzer Stereophonic Extender Speaker which is used in pairs to carry the music with pleasing volume into all portions of the location.

All Wurlitzer phonograph models for 1959 are housed in identical cabinets. The styling and design are entirely new. In keeping with the modern trend, sculptured lines and gleaming chrome highlight the outward appearance of this beautiful creation. Colors are predominantly blue and gold. The top casting, lighted by a fluorescent tube from behind, carries the word "Wurlitzer" on the left and the description either "Stereophonic" or "High Fidelity" on the right. This is to give patrons an indication of the type of music they may expect to enjoy when playing a new Wurlitzer.

All exterior trim parts, including the dome glass, are interchangeable. The main apparent difference between the 200-selection and the 104-selection machines is the title strip holder and the number of selector buttons appearing in the lower casting.

Lighting is accomplished by using two 30-inch fluorescent tubes, one placed in the top dome casting and the other behind the selector button panel. The title strip lighting is from above. Color is reflected onto the grille through a light shield immediately above it. A new easily read "Record Now Playing" indicator is located in the center of the title strip holders on every model. Select indicator and reject buttons are lighted. Twin dome locks are set into metal spear castings on each side of the phonograph. Operator service card and license holder is in the steel panel at phonograph top.

"Once again, in producing trouble-free mechanisms and true stereophonic sound, Wurlitzer continues its leadership," stated Bear.

"To create true stereophonic sound the music must emanate from at least two different sources," Bear said.

"It must be projected toward the listener. To accomplish this, new Wurlitzer Stereophonic phonographs may be used in conjunction with one of several remote speaker complements. For instance, the model '2300S' phonograph and a model '5122' console floor speaker will combine into a complete Stereophonic Music System. The stereophonic phonograph may also be used as Channel A with a wall or corner speaker used to carry the music from

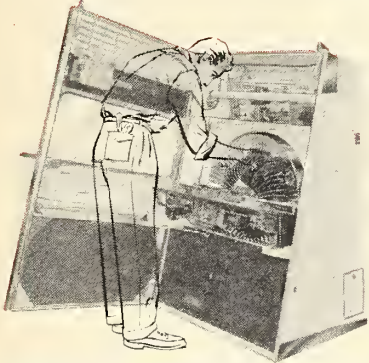

To Include Tax,
Insurance And
PR Programs**

OAKLAND, CALIF.—George Miller, national president and managing director of Music Operators of America, Inc., reports that the year 1959 should be a year in which MOA progress will continue to grow in leaps and bounds. "MOA has successfully completed the enrollment of a national group life insurance plan which is available to members only and their business associates, partners, employees, etc." said Miller. "This program and the national tax council which has recently been inaugurated are two of the most important projects for the year 1959", continued Miller.

Miller went on to recount the association's plans for this year. "Leo Kaner, Chicago, will receive his first retainer fee this month and the National Tax Council is now a reality and a program which will prove most beneficial to MOA members. Any member who wishes information on income taxes, personal property taxes, depreciation schedules, bookkeeping systems and similar information may write their request to Music Operators of America, Inc., 128 East 14 Street, Oakland 6, California. All requests will be forwarded to Leo Kaner, who will reply direct to the member requesting such information. This service will not cost our members one cent but all requests must be made through our office to ascertain whether the operator is a paid-up member.

"If a member is interested in changing only his bookkeeping system or making other inquiries of a personal nature he may contact Kaner direct. We hope that the tax booklet, which will be mailed to every member answers many questions that are in the mind of the operator. The information in this booklet would cost up to twenty times the annual membership dues if it were obtained through private sources.

"During the year 1958, the MOA legal staff began work on a National Depreciation Schedule, plus copyright legislation and other types of taxation which are detrimental to the automatic phonograph industry as a whole", commented Miller.

Miller stated that "the next national program to be inaugurated by our national association will be a National Public Relations Program, to be handled through a New York firm, designed to give the juke box industry the type of publicity that it so well deserves. This program will acquaint the general public through news publications all over the United States with the activities of the small business man who has a route of phonographs from which he derives his livelihood.

"Questionnaires will be sent out from Leo Kaner's office to operators all over the 49 states inquiring about taxation, licensing, etc. in every area. The information will be compiled and a program will be started whereby the national association can assist the music operators in defeating or revising certain unfair business licenses and/or taxation that involve the automatic phonograph business", concluded Miller.

Channel B. It is possible also to eliminate the use of the speaker within the phonograph and by installing wall or corner speakers, to have Channel A on one side and Channel B on the opposite sides of a wall, facing the room. Another important feature in the flexibility of the Wurlitzer Stereophonic Music System is the extender speaker. Only Wurlitzer has included this important unit in its line. Extender speakers are to be sold in pairs and are used to augment the music from a Stereophonic Music System and to carry a continuous pleasing volume to patrons in large or oddly shaped rooms wherever they may be seated. The extender speakers carry the indication 'right' and 'left.' They must be installed in pairs approximately opposite one another with the speaker opening which is faced at 20° from center pointing down the room away from the phonograph and/or its companion speakers. Each extender contains a 6x9 speaker cone and carries the treble and middle ranges of the music. Stereo charts and location floor plans graphically indicate how speakers may best be installed to insure true stereophonic music in locations of every type.

"Each Wurlitzer stereophonic phonograph includes a dual channel amplifier. This is so designed that it may be used to play both channels through the built-in phonograph speaker complement or may be divided as previously indicated to carry Channel A through the phonograph speakers and Channel B through a floor console or a single companion speaker. The amplifier has a total output of approximately 40 watts and can furnish 20 watts per channel when separated.

"A stereo pickup is used in conjunction with the dual channel amplifier. It is designed to offer equally good performance from stereophonic or monophonic records. The stylus head has three leads. One is a common wire and the other two are fed into separate sides of the dual amplifier. The cartridge contains a double stylus with a one mil. sapphire needle on each side. When a needle shows wear, the lever on the cartridge may

be flipped from one to two, bringing the second needle into place. When both needles are worn, the entire stylus may be removed from the cartridge and replaced.

"The components in the speaker system are identical in all 1959 Wurlitzer phonographs. They consist of two 12-inch cones, one heavy-duty and one mid-range, plus a 7-inch tweeter. The speakers are inter-connected by two crossover networks, one mechanical and one electrical. The console floor cabinet includes a speaker complement identical to that of the phonograph." These components join to create one of the finest music systems ever offered. Wurlitzer stereo sound reproduces music to the fullest capability of the human ear. No hidden highs, no lost lows, every tone gradation of every instrument produced with fabulous fidelity.

"The Wurlitzer 200-selection phonograph may be ordered from the factory with dual pricing in either the stereophonic or monophonic version. This is not a kit. It is a built-in system which is part of the regular coin register unit. The 5252 wall box is designed for use with the dual pricing system and, like the phonograph, has lighted panels which indicate—

1. 5¢ credit
2. Make 10¢ selection
3. Make any selection

As in the case of all Wurlitzer phonographs since the introduction of 50¢ play, the phonographs and the 200-selection wall boxes accept all denominations of coins, nickels through half-dollars and the dual pricing system is adjustable to a vast variety of plays-per-coin combinations. The 5250 wall box has 50¢ play but no dual pricing feature. The 5207 wall box available for use with 104-selection phonographs accepts nickels, dimes and quarters in a variety of coin-play combinations."

Across the country, Wurlitzer distributors are demonstrating stereophonic music from a special set of stereo single 45 rpm standard records. They have invited operators to stop in, enjoy the living realism of stereophonic music and become familiar with the flexibility of "The Wurlitzer Line for '59."

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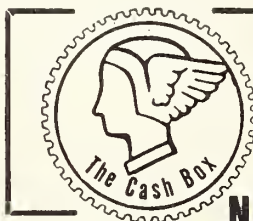

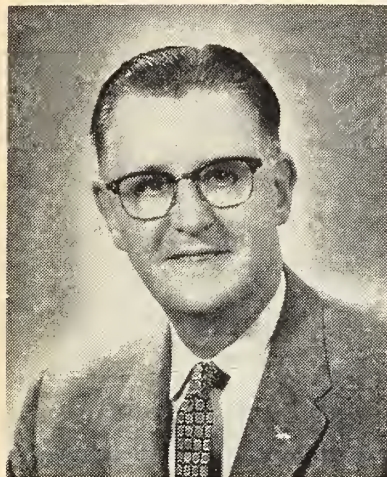
NEW ENGLAND NIBBLES

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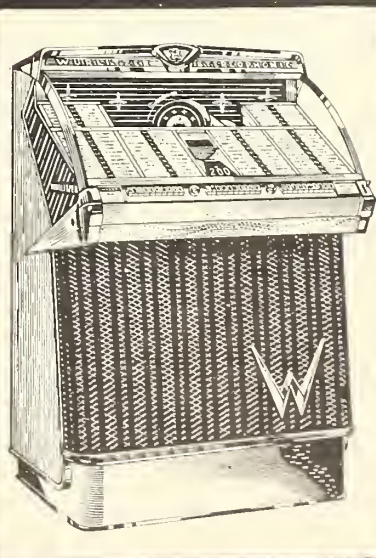
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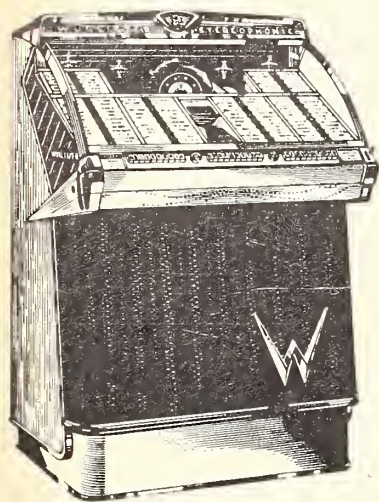
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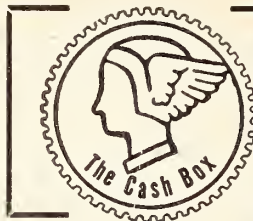
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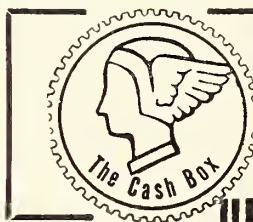


New Models Spur Distrib Sales And Op Collections EASTERN FLASHES

and the nickel play is the rule in this territory. We hope to solve these problems for all by discussing them and making suggestions to manufacturers."

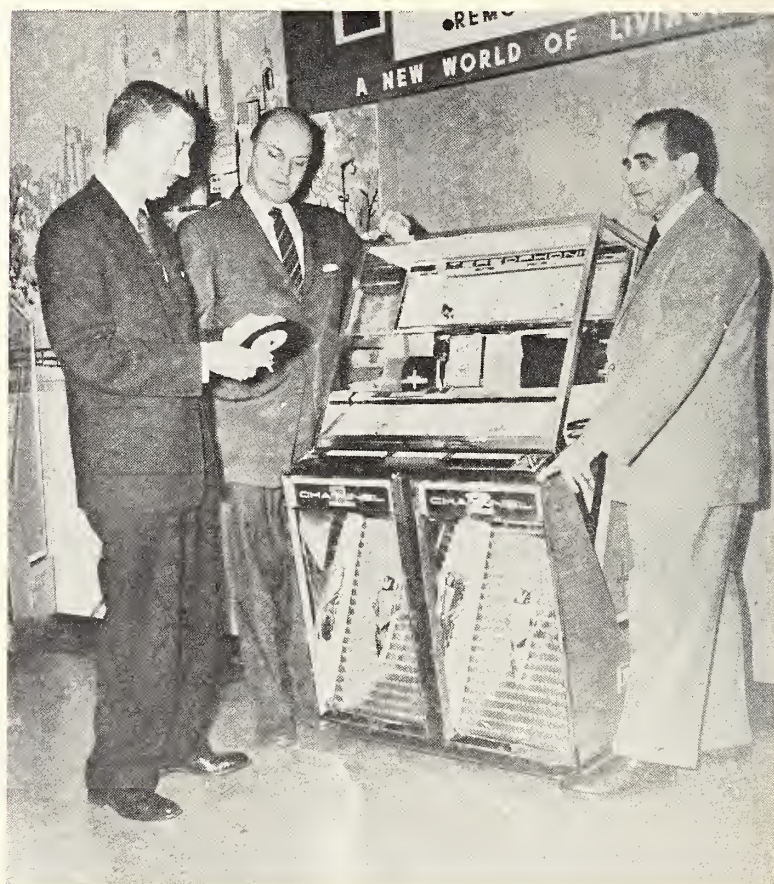

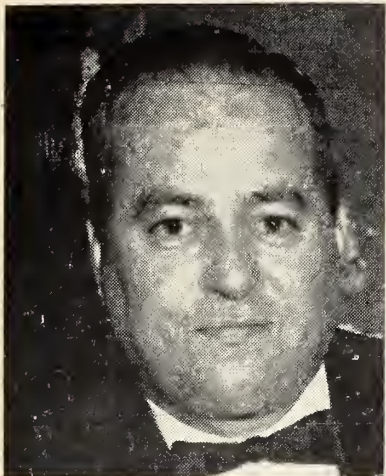

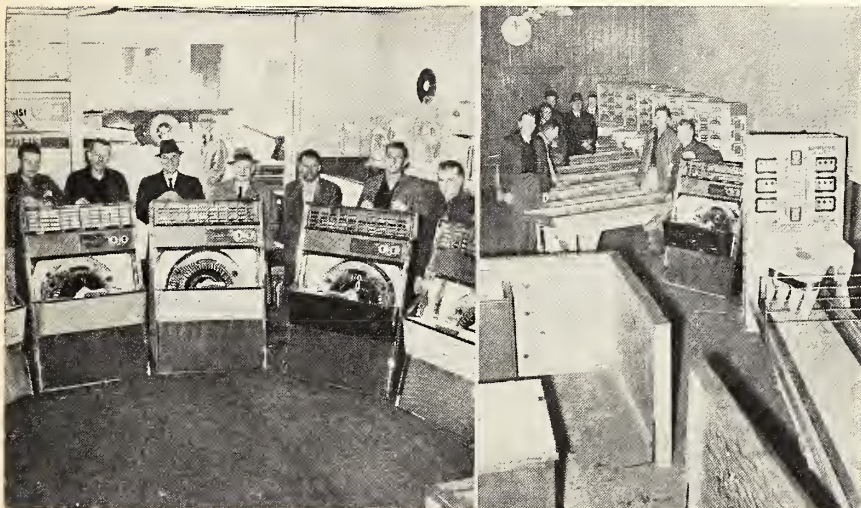

"Help 20% Through Bank"

SCHENECTADY, N.Y. — Ogden Whitbeck, Mohawk Skill Games Co., this city, says, "Except as a means of getting a location from another operator, we are 100% for giving loans to locations. However, we wouldn't take advantage of a location by giving him second-class merchandise since this would lower collections and income. We help about 20% of our locations, through our bank, in obtaining loans to help them over 'rough spots', improvements, new or additional equipment, etc. 50% of this type help is offered by us rather than being solicited by the locations. We feel this is good business, to help our customers."

However, continued Whitbeck, "We would not use our own capital for loans. This would be foolish! Locations will pay a bank, when they might possibly ask us to wait on a due date. Our losses after 25 years in business wouldn't amount to 1/2 of 1% of our share of collections. Our bank advises that under 2% is good, depending on the type of business."

"Keep To Low Minimum"

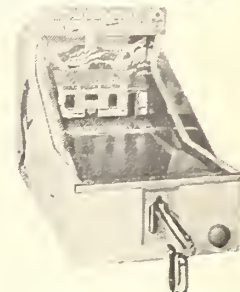
ORLANDO, FLA. — Frank Pell, Frank Pell Amusement Co., says, "Loans to locations are sometimes necessary in order to keep a location open, especially when the time comes for the location to renew its license. However, loans should be kept to a low minimum.

"There are definitely lots of losses in making loans to locations with no security, but it is possible that this may be offset by the additional business which an operator gets by helping locations get started in business", stated Pell.

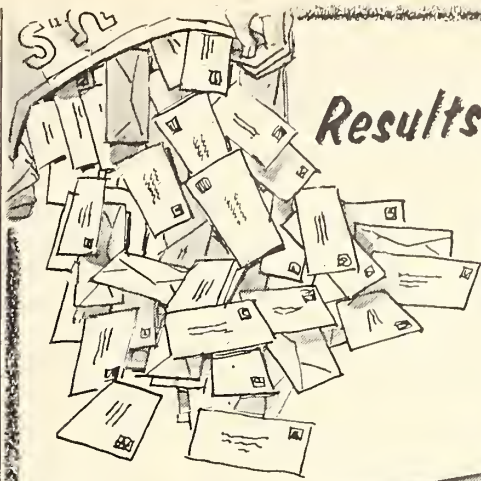

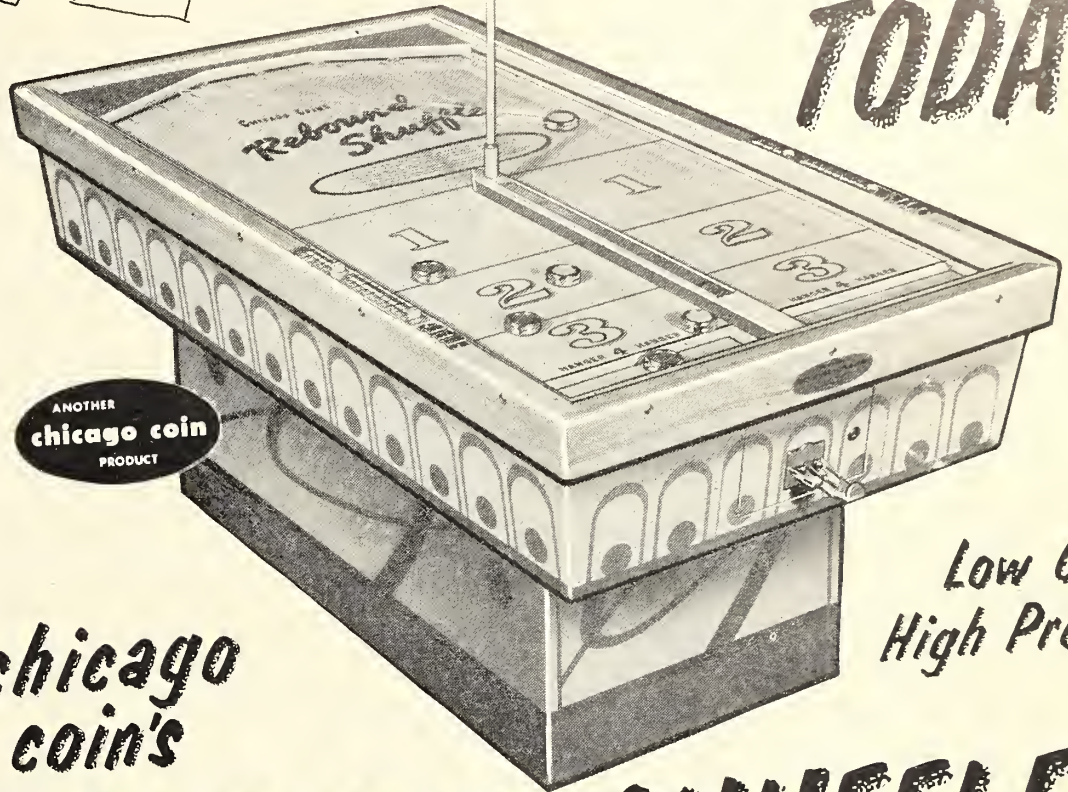

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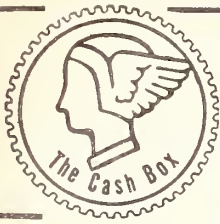
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**Chantal Ltd. Appointing

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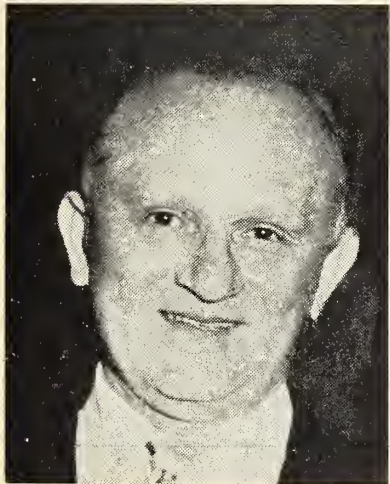

As the Baltimore coinmen hold what is acknowledged by them to be the finest association party in the nation, the 1959 banquet will probably be something out of this world.

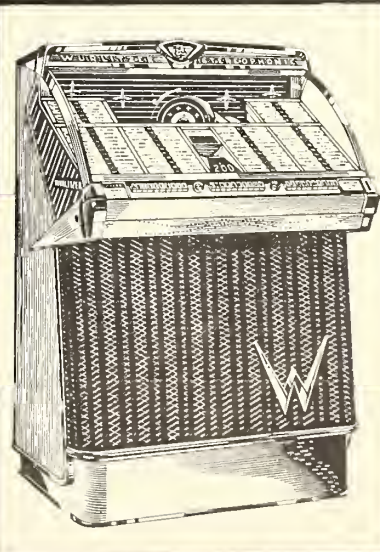
