The Cash Box

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Pop Absorbs Rhythm & Blues

The rapidly advancing record business has seen some drastic changes in its broadest categories during the past half-dozen or so years.

Only six or seven years ago, singles were in sharply defined pop, rhythm & blues and country categories. Following through with the chronology, only three or so years ago, both rhythm & blues and country music began to lose their clearly defined identity and both began spilling over into a broader pop category.

However, the past year or two has turned up a strange twist which has seen country music achieve renewed strength (sort of a renaissance of true country music) while rhythm and blues music has almost completely been absorbed by the pop field.

The country charts during the past year have indicated this increased strength of country music as a music with a market of its own, while the rhythm and blues charts, with the exception of just a handful of disks, are almost completely made up of pop releases.

Taking last week's rhythm & blues chart as an example, we find that of the fifty titles listed, only six are records which have never made *The Cash Box* Top 100 Best Seller Chart. In essence this indi-

cates that the rhythm & blues list is almost 90% pop in nature. There is no longer, in our opinion, any dividing line between R & B and pop since most all of the artists who originally made up the r & b category are today pop stars.

However, close scrutiny of the country charts reveals that just the opposite is true. Forty-two of last week's top fifty country tunes have never shown on the Top 100 list. For some inexplicable reason, true country music is stronger and more clearly defined in the eyes of the people who buy country music and in the eyes of the trade, than it's been in the past half-dozen years.

As a result of our close analysis of these charts during the past year, the editors and editorial staff of *The Cash Box* have decided to delete the rhythm and blues section as a separate feature and will now incorporate all record reviews and listings in our pop department, expanding the pop department to include such information. The move becomes effective immediately.

The handful of true "down-home" blues singers in our business will henceforth be reviewed in the pop section with the review describing the special appeal and contents of the material as is currently being done with other special categories such as polka material, foreign language recordings, spoken word disks, jazz singles, etc.

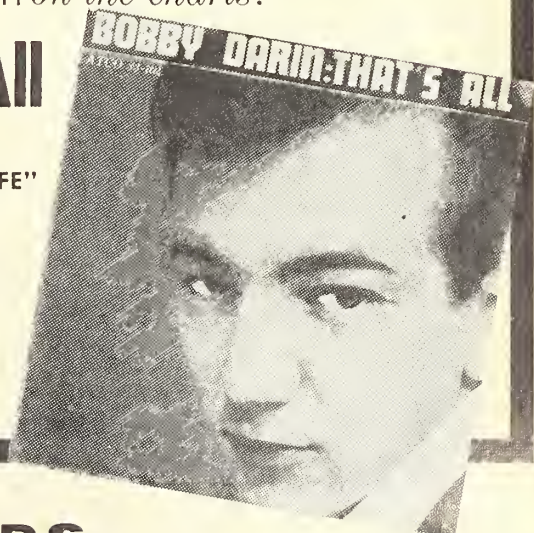

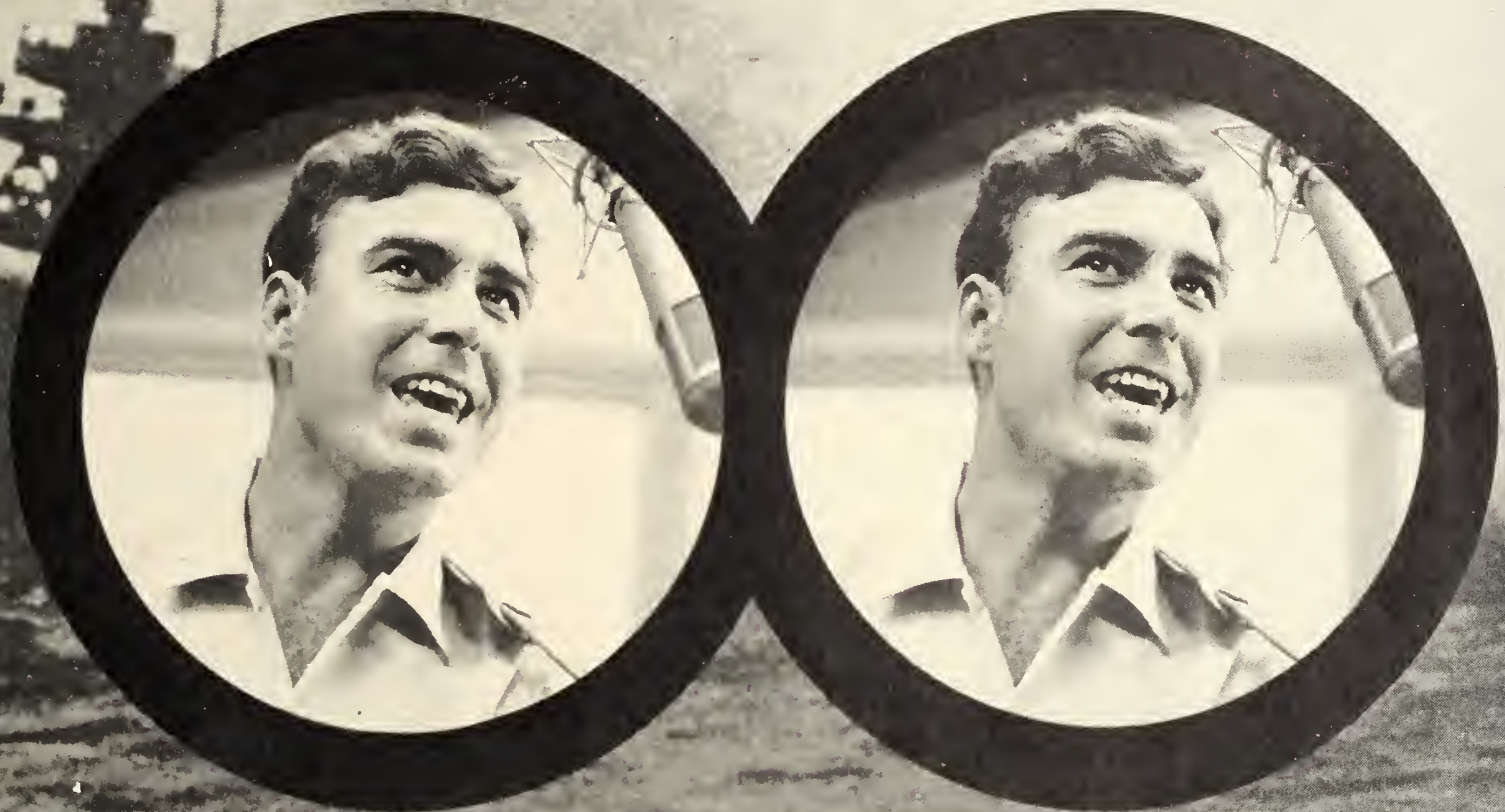

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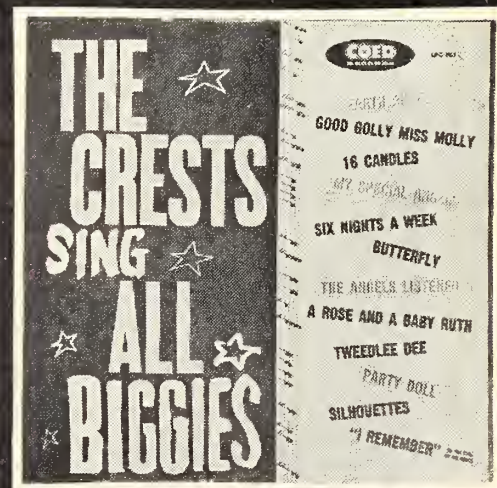

B+ "THE THRILL IS GONE" (2:23) [DeSylva, Brown & Henderson ASCAP—Brown, Henderson] The chorus lightly handles the evergreen while the Weston strings swirl about. It all makes for a smart swing side that's liable to make some noise. From Weston's "The Sweet And The Swingin'" LP.

B "I LOVE YOU" (2:25) [Leo Feist ASCAP—Archer, Thompson] Same agreeable route for another oldie.

PARETTI SISTERS (Al-Brite 1500)

B "UNDISCOVERED LOVE" (1:55) [Weimar BMI—Brandon, Williams] Gals offer a pro blend on a melodic teen romancer. A good-sounding combo backdrop. All in all, a deck the kids will enjoy.

C+ "LOOK, BUT DO NOT TOUCH, CHA-CHA" (2:01) [Sani Gil BMI—Leonard, Laron] Bright cha-cha ballad-novelty from the femmes and ork-chorus.

SHORTIE BILLUPS (Fine 1002)

B "WHY CAN'T YOU BE TRUE" (2:02) [Neilor BMI—Bibbins] Flavorful melodic opus is well taken care of via Billups' lively vocalizing. Bright stanza with teen appeal.

B "THE CLOCK SONG" (2:11) [Summit ASCAP — Jenkins] Sunny romantic novelty affair on this end.

KALIN TWINS (Decca 31064)

B+ "CHICKEN THIEF" (2:00) [Acuff-Rose BMI — B. & F. Byrant] Songsters and Jack Pleis rock-a-string ork have good beat fun with the novelty romantic. A sparkling rhythmic that might make it.

B "LONELINESS" (2:50) [Scope BMI—Pitney] Boys and ork turn-around for a pretty softie.

AL BYRON (Guaranteed 207)

B+ "AMERICA THE BEAUTIFUL" (2:24) [David Jones-Milbern BMI—Bates] The lovely item receives a strong, yet soft-spoken reading from Byron. His fine backing includes an easy-beat from the combo and effective falsetto bits from a femme chorus. Can come-thru.

B+ "BEAUTIFUL DREAMER" (1:53) [David Jones-Milbern BMI — Foster] An appealingly tender version of the great Stephen Foster opus. Can figure, too.

JIMMY BYRON
(Everest 19336)

B+ "DOES MY HEARTACHE SHOW" (2:14) [Cedarwood BMI—Loudermilk] Songster can do chart business with his fine warble of an inviting wistful against a Latinish ork-chorus setting.

B+ "ANOTHER" (2:24) [Moss Rose BMI—Drusky, McAlpin] This end is a contagious pop version of the current Roy Drusky C&W hit. Tune has that "Heartaches By The Number Sound" and arrangement here resembles the Guy Mitchell "Heartaches" deck. Can make it too.

ROD BERNARD (Mercury 71592)

B+ "ONE OF THESE DAYS" (2:25) [Big Bopper BMI—Harrington] Teeners will dig the songster's and combo's funky-like date here. Bernard hit awhile back with "One More Chance"; he could come-thru again.

B "LET'S GET TOGETHER TONIGHT" (1:55) [Big Bopper BMI — Harrington] A brighter sound here, but top-half comes across with more individuality.

NAPPY BROWN (Savoy 1582)

B+ "MY BABY KNOWS" [Crossroads BMI—Herman, Cadena] Brown has the know-how to breathe life into this exciting, upbeat blues affair. A slam-bang session that has the necessary youngster appeal.

B "DOWN IN THE ALLEY" [Savoy BMI—Brown, Biggs] As title suggests this side's a low-down blues lament, delivered in Brown's effective moaning manner.

RICHARD BARRETT (Seville 104)

B+ "DREAM ON" (2:20) [Rush BMI — Barrett] Infectious rhythmic from songster Barrett and his vocal-instrumental (rock-a-string) backing. This happy sound has got to be watched closely.

B "I AM YOURS" (2:14) [Rush BMI—Barrett] The declaration is persuasively rendered by all concerned.

LITTLE JUNIOR PARKER
(Duke 317)

B+ "THE NEXT TIME" (2:25) [Lion BMI — Malone] Quick paced blues shout is an excellent vehicle for Parker's pro handling. Combo really wails in support. A contagious outing that bears marks of success.

B "YOU'RE ON MY MIND" (2:03) [Lion BMI — Malone] Combo attains that special low blues sound through effective use of harmonica and guitar, while Parker offers the lyrics in his most soulful style.

KOOKIE BEAVERS (Gone 5086)

B+ "(How Much Is That) DOGGIE IN THE WINDOW" (2:01) [Joy ASCAP—Merrill] A Chipmunk-like version of one of Patti Page's biggest hits. Effect has lots of kiddie-slanted charm and could get tune back on the charts.

B+ "THREE LITTLE FISHES" (2:02) [Joy ASCAP—Dowell] Familiar kiddie tale is also charmingly portrayed. Worth watching, too.

THE FALCONS (Flick 008)

B+ "THAT'S WHAT I AIM TO DO" (2:05) [West-Higgins BMI—Schofield, West] The Falcons, of "You're So Fine"—(UA) fame pop up on this Flick outing with what could be another big one for them. Tune's an enticing rhythm romantic that bounces along brightly.

B "YOU MUST KNOW I LOVE YOU" (2:10) [West-Higgins BMI—Schofield, West] Here the group lets loose a torrent of frantic, rafter-shaking sounds. Lead is a vibrant standout on both ends.

RAY RIVERA (Decca 31049)

B+ "HO - DEE - ING - DONG" (2:05) [Compton ASCAP — Rivera, Stride] Catchy folk-type romancer is contagiously surveyed. The light Rivera vocal receives an affable setting that includes a good handclap bit. Might come thru.

C+ "LET ME KISS YOU GOOD-NIGHT" (2:19) [Compton ASCAP—Rivera, Stride, Manges] OK beat bounce to another novelty affectionate.

ERNIE FREEMAN (Imperial 5656)

B+ "DARK EYES" (2:11) (Post ASCAP—Arr. Reynolds] Combo and chanting femme chorus combine to give the mainstay a solid sock-rock view. Tune is getting current disk play; this version could be the big one.

B+ "ROCKIN' RED WING" (2:13) [ASCAP—Haynes] More good belt news on another familiar opus. A vocalist heads the affair. There's also been disk activity on this item, too.

BRUCE HAYES/MARY MAYO
(Dwain 262)

C+ "SING WITH BRUCE HAYES" (Side 1)—Sprightly and sentimental sing-along affair on three oldies: "I Want A Girl," "When Your Old Wedding Ring Was New," and "Down By The Old Mill Stream."

C+ "SING WITH BRUCE HAYES" (Side 2)—All-sentimental approach to three more chestnuts: "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling," "I Had A Dream" and "Let Me Call You Sweetheart."

CHUCK HOWARD (Kim 1045)

B+ "CONGRATULATIONS TO YOU" (1:50) [Howard] Appealing item about a gal-and-the-other-guy is invitingly essayed by Howard and the soft-beat combo-chorus setting. Could pull solid pop-R&B coin.

B "CHATTANOOGA SHOE SHINE BOY" (2:10) [Stone, Stopp] A lively rock account of the standard from the 40's and now being successively revived by Freddy Cannon. Howard and his setting give it a good sound.

B+ "TRUE DEEP LOVE" (2:02) [Hillary Little Darlin' BMI—Cooper] An infectious quality here as a songster offers a quick-pace vocal against good guitar sounds. Beat makes OK teen sense.

C "THE RED-LIGHT BANDIT" (2:01) [Hillary Little Darlin' BMI—Cooper] Caryl Chessman is the theme of this upbeat folkish tale. Opus doesn't take any position on the case, but title will be tough on spins.

DEAN JONES (88 Brand 801)

B "ST. JAMES INFIRMARY" (2:06) [Mills ASCAP—Primrose] Classic opus is rendered with an eye on the teen market. The Jones' delivery has some nicely charged moments. Backing includes good blacksmith hammer sounds. Might get a reaction.

C+ "WHERE DOES A DREAM GO TO DIE" (2:42) [Hallmark ASCAP—Leahy, Adelson, Livingston] Songster does a pleasing job on the pretty disenchanted.

B "AN IMPROVISATION ON 'NONE BUT THE LONELY HEART'" (3:19) [Governor BMI—Tchaikovsky, Adpt. Conniff] Similar approach to the great Tchaikovsky tune. Both tracks are from Conniff's latest LP, "Concerto In Rhythm" (Vol. 2).

JOEY SANTO (Palace 101)

C "YOU'RE SO WONDERFUL" (2:15) [Mido BMI—Stone, LeLue] A hard-beat affectionate with some appeal.

C "AIN'T'CHA" (2:05) [Coin ASCAP—Keefer, Keefer] This shuffle-beat item doesn't break any commercial fences.

DYNA-TONES (Cha Cha 702)

B+ "EH CUMPARI" (2:15) [Rosarch BMI—Adapt. LaRosa, Bleyer] The one-time Julius LaRosa success comes around again, this time with a sock beat vocal-combo touch. Side's got teen color and could make a stir.

KJAN-Atlantic, Iowa has come up with a unique promotion, but it's not new. They've been doing it for five years. Program director Bob Einhaus writes that on St. Valentine's Day, wives of station personnel take over complete announcing duties—including sports, news and weather. During the day, the vacationing jockeys entertain sponsors at an open house held at a nearby night club. 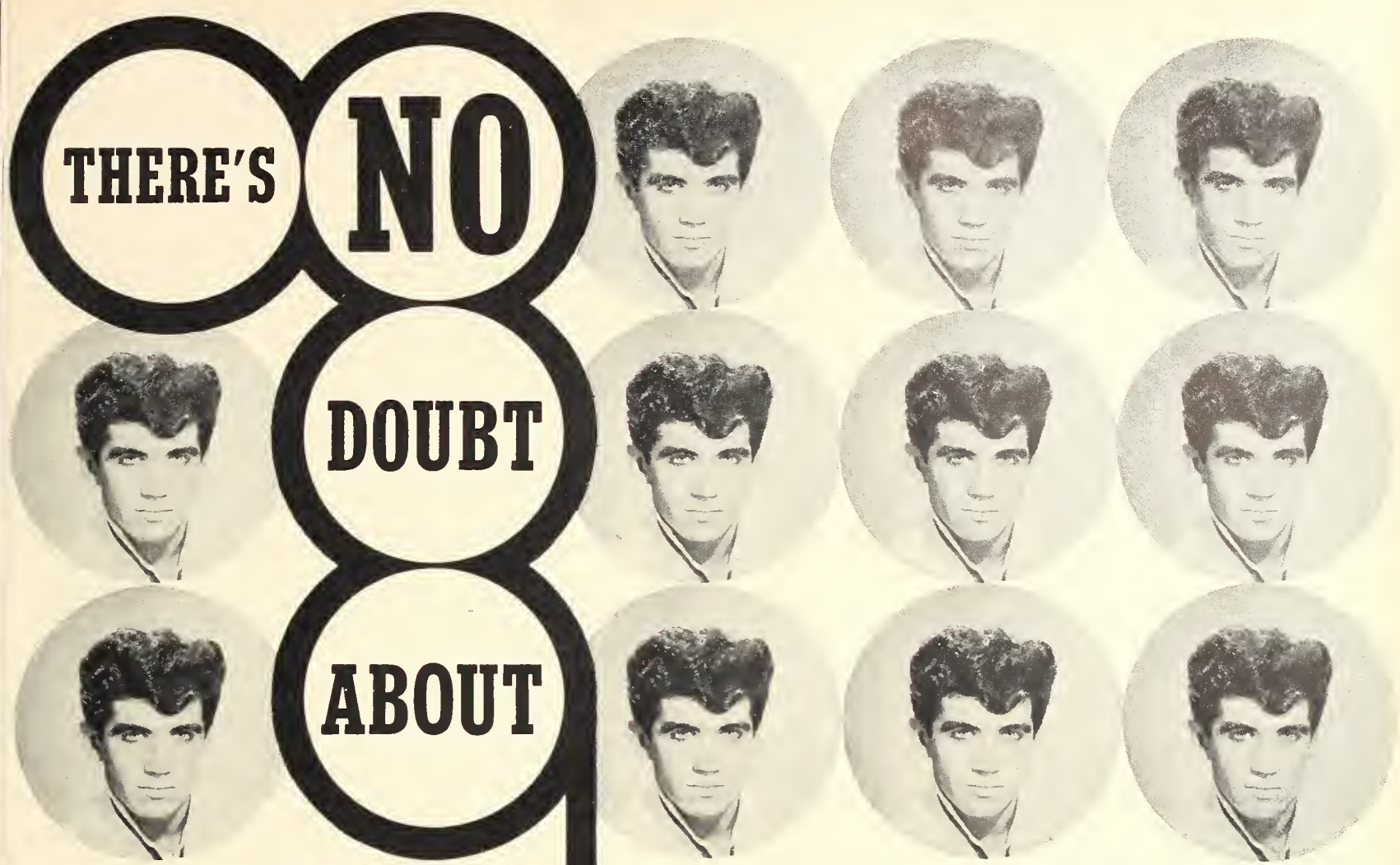

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RIAA Comments On Compatible Stereo

NEW YORK — The engineering committee of Record Industry Association of America, Inc. recently reaffirmed its recommendation made early in the summer of 1958 on the feasibility of a compatible true stereo record, and concluded that this aim is no closer to attainment than was the case two years ago. The RIAA

said this conclusion of the committee followed "careful tests made independently by all of the engineers concerned."

However, further research is being actively continued in the hope that some new means can be found that will make it possible to manufacture a completely satisfactory compatible stereo record, a statement concluded.

Mastertone Cuts Compatible LP On Westrex System

NEW YORK — Sidney Feldman, president of Mastertone Recording studios, this city, announced last week that he has developed a technique for cutting compatible recordings using the Westrex 3-C stereo system. Feldman stated: "The recordings we have produced in this test can be played with either stereophonic or monophonic equipment. There is no degradation of sound quality under normal conditions. The recording is cut with the American Standard 45/45 system. We made the master record in our own studio using the Westrex 3-C stereo system and a Scully automatic lathe. We employed our exclusive "Sonic Sentinel" process of continual groove width and depth protection."

Feldman revealed that he made the recording for the Audio Engineering Society meeting to demonstrate that the compatible record can be produced on Westrex equipment. At the meeting, held on Feb. 24th, this record was demonstrated by John Mosely. Previously, several score of these records were subjected to continuous wear tests by being played on automatic record changers. The wear tests show that the compatible stereo grooves do not wear as readily as the full stereo grooves, Feldman reported.

The technique of cutting compatible stereo was developed in 1931 by A. Blunlein in England. He was granted British patent 394,325 in June of 1933.

Feldman claimed certain advantages for the Westrex system as opposed to Fairchild: "Westrex 45/45 is the recognized American Standard, where the other systems in use are vertical-lateral. We are also utilizing only two Matrixing operations while the others use three. Eliminating one matrix reduces the 'leakage' between channels.

"To make it possible to cut loud records, we are also utilizing automatic variable-depth control of the grooves. With this process, when the music gets loud, the groove depth is automatically adjusted to accommodate the increased volume. This permits us to cut loud records without the playback stylus jumping out of the grooves. (This depth control is accomplished automatically by sampling the difference component in an advance-tape-head set-up. This in-

NEW YORK—LeRoy Holmes, pop A & R Chief of Everest Records announced the re-pacting of lyric tenor Charles K. L. Davis to an exclusive Everest recording contract.

Immediately after the signing, Holmes started the wheels turning on a new Davis album which is being rushed for release at the "earliest possible time."

In addition to his busy recording schedule, concert dates and top super club engagements, Davis is slated for a return guest appearance on the March 27 Ed Sullivan TV'er.

NEW YORK—Arnold Shaw, general professional manager of E. B. 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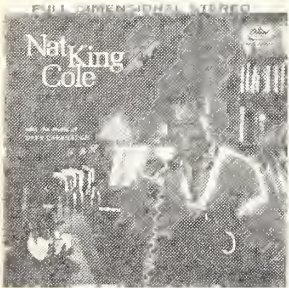

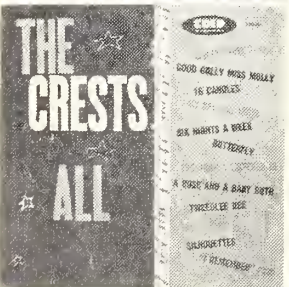
"TELL ME ALL ABOUT YOURSELF"—Nat King Cole—Capitol SW 1331

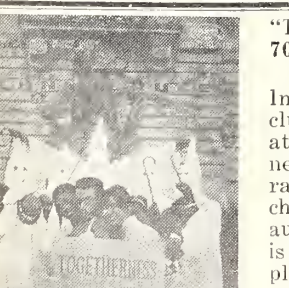
"LAVENDER BLUE MOODS"—Sammy Turner—Bigtop 1301

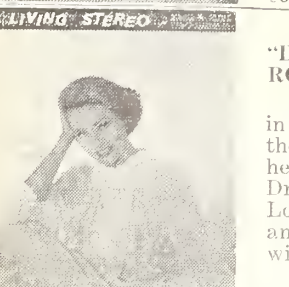
"THE CRESTS SING ALL BIGGIES"—Coed LPC 901

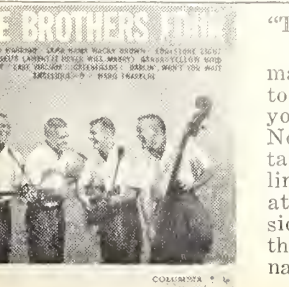
"TOGETHERNESS"—Lenny Bruce—Fantasy 7007

Strings and rhythm backing is in complete sympathy with the mood. Late-hour listening special.



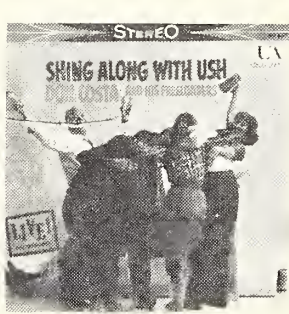
"THE BROTHERS FOUR"—Columbia CL 1402

The quartet sings pseudo-folk material but makes no pretenses at authenticity—they seem to just enjoy themselves in their enthusiastic, youthful way. With such varied material as "I Never Will Marry," "Eddystone Light," the contagious "The Zulu Warrior" and "Hard Travelin'," the boys, all originally fraternity brothers at the University of Washington, exude a passion for fun music-making. This first album by them should go a long way in bringing them to national attention, as is their single, "Greenfields."



"GRANTED IT'S GOGI"—Gogi Grant—RCA Victor LSP 2000

Versatility is the object of the diversified selections here and Miss Grant does justice to them, coming through with the element of versatility attempted at. Johnny Mandel's scores help a lot, but it is Miss Grant's expressive voice that easily conveys the mixed emotions of the songs. They include, "I'm Getting Sentimental Over You," "That's My Desire," "Don't Be That Way," "I'm Confessin'" and "You're Getting to Be a Habit With Me." An immensely worthwhile album.



"SHING ALONG WITH USH"—Don Costa and his Free loaders—United Artists UAS 6074

This album is informality epitomized. A large group of reveling non-singers were gathered at a real party (according to the notes and borne out by the performances) and this sing-along session was cut leaving in all the noise, merry-making, whistles, and other sundry noises that occur at such a brawl. The brassy Dixieland type music is right in line with the mood. Selections include "Goody, Goody," "If You Knew Susie," "Heartaches," "It All Depends On You" and "Now Is the Hour." Great way to bring a ready-made party into the home.



"SONGS FROM THE OLD WEST"—The Diamonds—Mercury SR 60159

A lineup of pop songs embracing the feeling of the pioneering West (with two authentic exceptions) are sung with appropriate endearment by the pop vocal group. Pete Rugolo is around to offer excellent arrangements utilizing expertly contrived touches of authenticity. The selections include "San Antonio Rose," "Wagon Wheels," "There's A Gold Mine in the Sky," "Streets of Laredo" and "Home on the Range." Solidly built entertainment package.



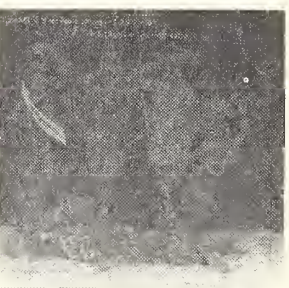
"LATIN CAMEOS"—The Knightsbridge Strings—Top Rank RM 315

A dazzling, silken mood is woven from the most famous Latin pop songs. Giving the session an original and immediately identifiable sound is the imaginative arranging and use of supplementary instruments. Among the tunes are "Besame Mucho," "La Paloma," "The Breeze And I," "La Golondrina," "Amapola" and seven others of equal fame. Pure mood enjoyment is the result of this well produced album.



"MUSIC FROM 'ONE STEP BEYOND'—Composed and Conducted by Harry Lubin—Decca DL 8970

For the unusual stories presented on the "Alcoa Presents" TV series, Lubin has composed scores which delicately underline the "supernatural" themes of the stories. For such story titles as "Island Off Spain," "Paris," "Trip to the Far East," and "Jungle Aire," he conveys the national feelings of the music with a languid, haunting quality running throughout. An intriguing mood album which will enchant non-viewers of the TV'er as well.



"THE MOST RECORDED SONGS OF ALL TIME"—Buddy Cole, his piano and Orchestra—Warner Bros. W 1357

One would imagine these songs to be tired out by now, but Buddy Cole has provided them with still more life through the warm, sentimental, string-filled, piano-led arrangements utilized here. The songs are: "Begin the Beguine," "Over the Rainbow," "September Song," "Tenderly," "Autumn Leaves," "Star Dust" and 4 others of equal incidence. An exemplary mood album. Informative liner notes are a rare delight.



"IMAGINATION"—Malcolm Peters and Orchestra—Time 70007

"Imagination" refers to the ingredient used by composer Ron Goodwin and leader Peters in musically conveying the feelings of such diversified subjects as "African Patrol," "Jubilee, U.S.A.," "Big Top Circus," "Prairie Schooner" and "Waitin' For the Dawn." These are the titles that identify the various moods they have set up. It is a lesson in good music sense and meticulous attention to musical symbols, despite the large use of cliches. A superbly produced album, it excels sound-wise.

Kingston Trio Returns Favor With Salt Lake City Benefit

SALT LAKE CITY—The Kingston Trio didn't forget the pilot who saved their lives last year when their chartered airplane was forced down during a driving snowstorm.

The pilot, John Rich of Salt Lake City, recently suffered a severe stroke. To help defray Rich's medical expenses and provide financial aid while he is confined, the Trio flew here last Monday (22) and gave a benefit concert that night at the Terrace Ballroom. All profits will be turned over to Rich.

The near-disastrous crash-landing occurred last March 13—Friday the 13th—while the three members of the group—Dave Guard, Bob Shane and Nick Reynolds—were en route to a concert at Notre Dame University.

Rich was headed for South Bend airport when both generators conked out. Unable to use the plane's radio, Rich began to let the twin-engine craft down through the blizzard. Visibility was practically zero. Flying a few hundred feet off the ground, Rich spotted a field and told the Trio to brace themselves for a crash landing.

With deep snow providing a cushion, Rich brought the plane down to a safe, if rugged, landing.

Though shaken by the ordeal, the Kingstons hauled their instruments out of the ruffled plane, trudged a few hundred yards to a highway, flagged down a passing truck which took them to Goshen. From there they proceeded to Notre Dame in a taxi, arriving at the auditorium five minutes before they were scheduled to go on.

The Trio's benefit for Pilot Rich is the second benefit performance the boys have given in recent months. At a concert in Emporia, Kansas, late last year they raised \$3500 for Dr. Tom Dooley, the famed surgeon of the Laos jungles. Dr. Dooley, whom the Trio met when he was in the U. S. for a cancer operation, told the Kingstons that the Laotian natives never could pronounce his name until they heard the Trio's recording of "Tom Dooley"—the disk that shot the Trio into international prominence.

Jensen Intros New Cartridge

CHICAGO—A new ceramic stereo cartridge with high channel separation rating in the field has been introduced by Jensen Industries of Forest Park, Ill.

The new Jensen Stereo 53 develops peak response to 25,000 cycles per second, far beyond the range of the human ear, and goes to a low of 16 cycles, reports Mike Remund, Jensen sales manager.

Offered in four needle combinations, the new Jensen stereo cartridge in its Standard # 53 model comes with two sapphire needles and will retail for \$10.95.

"IN HARMONY WITH HIM"—The McGuire Sisters—Coral CRL 57303

The McGuire Sisters offer a warm inspirational concert of hymns, psalms and essentially pop songs of a religious nature. The approach is reverent, with organ accompaniment setting the mood. Included are such melodies as "Bless This House," "In the Garden," "The Lord's Prayer," "Ave Maria" and "It Is No Secret." A good addition to the bulging ranks of albums of this sort.



"THE ONE ANY ONLY HANK BALLARD AND HIS MIDNIGHTERS"—King 674

Leading off with his own slam-bang version of Rusty York's "Sugaree," Ballard moves lustily through a dozen powerful rhythm affairs including both frantic swingers and soulful "down-home" chants. Among the tunes are "Cute Little Ways," "Kansas City," "House With No Windows" and "She's Got A Whole Lot Of Soul." Deck's got the appeal for pop and r&b marts.



"THE GROUP VISITS PUGET SOUND"—Golden Crest CR 3056

The Group is a quintet of youthful folk singing enthusiasts. In this, their first recorded effort, they essay eleven traditional folksongs, plus one original, including "Drunken Sailor," "Wayfaring Stranger," "Darlin' Corey," "Hulla Balloo." It is on these ribald, salty songs that they achieve their best results, conveying them with exuberance. A new "name" worth listening to.



"T-BONE WALKER SINGS THE BLUES"—Imperial LP 9098

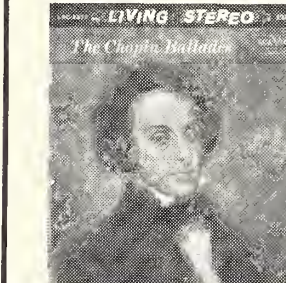
Walker epitomizes the gut-bucket blues singer. His is a driving, tearing, shouting style; a style in demand in the pop market more so than the melancholy, vinegary singers (Hopkins). This album doesn't give the singer enough room, for the arrangements are tight, with full ork backing occupying what could be vocal room. Nevertheless Walker is here with his guitar to offer sizzling performances of "You Don't Love Me," "Tell Me What's the Reason," "Travelin' Blues," "Evil Hearted Woman" and "Cold Cold Feeling."



"PLAY BACH"—The Jacques Loussier Trio—London PS 188

French jazz pianist Loussier takes eight small pieces by Bach, the most important classical composer to modern jazz, and offers "jazzed-up" versions. Though Bach's music is most easily adaptable to this approach, the session doesn't quite come off, either because there's too much Bach left in, or because there's still not enough correlation between Bach and jazz to allow for this direct interpretation. Nevertheless Loussier is to be commended for the effort. There's still much of interest to be learned here, and there are plenty of swinging moments.

"THE CHOPIN BALLADES" — Artur Schnabel, pianist—RCA Victor LSC 2370

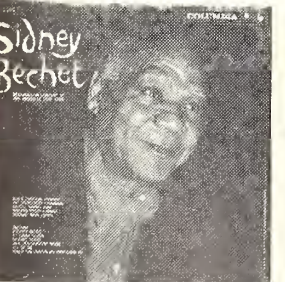

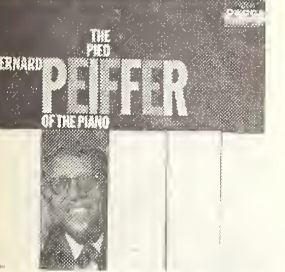
"SATCHMO PLAYS KING OLIVER"—Louis Armstrong—Audio Fidelity AFSD 5930

In a tribute to his first mentor, Satchmo plays and sings a bill of tunes that were associated with King Oliver (with a few exceptions). Armstrong is in top form here; his trumpet sings out of full, sweet tones, his voice still the top jazz voice around, and the group with him deserves mention too: Peanuts Hucko, Trummy Young, Billy Kyle, Mort Herbert and Danny Barcelona. The songs include "St. James Infirmary," "I Ain't Got Nobody," "Dr. Jazz," "Drop That Sack" and "Chimes Blues." Another fine session for the multitude of his fans.



"SIDNEY BECHET"—Columbia CL 1410

One of Bechet's last concert appearances was caught on tape by Columbia and is offered here. In the group at the Brussels World's Fair were such distinguished "mainstream" names as Buck Clayton, Vic Dickenson, Arvell Shaw, Kansas Fields and George Wein, forming with Bechet a driving, swinging crew. Intros by Bechet have been left in, as have the tremendous audience reactions to the music. Tunes include "Indiana," "In A Sentimental Mood," "All of Me" and "The Saints." Important issue for traditionalists.



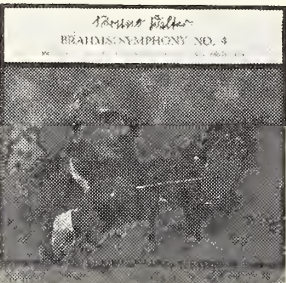
"THE PIED PEIFFER OF THE PIANO"—Bernard Peiffer—Decca DL 9218

Peiffer's cerebral piano playing reaches intellectual bounds not understood by the ordinary jazz fan, yet he can detect a thoughtful, clearly defined objective in his approach. His touch is light and delicate, though not fragile, and with a definite deliberateness. The material for this album is all of the pop standard category: "Willow Weep For Me," "Here I'll Stay," "I Can't Get Started" and "While We're Young." An absorbing session by the pianist.



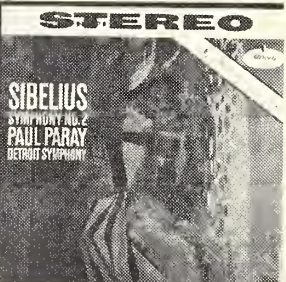
"BLUES-ETTE"—Curtis Fuller Quintet—Savoy MG 12141

Two thirds of the front line of the Jazztet—Fuller and Benny Golson—are present at this session which also includes Tommy Flanagan, Jimmy Garrison and Al Harewood in the rhythm section. The date is strictly Golson dominated—his compositions, arrangements and solos, with Fuller accepting a big share of the solo load. The tunes include "Five Spot After Dark," "Minor Vamp," "Twelve-Inch" and "Undecided." Interesting hard blowing date. Golson and Fuller are in excellent form.



BRAHMS: Sympathy No. 4 in E Minor, Op. 98 — Bruno Walter conducting the Columbia Symphony Orchestra—Columbia ML 5439

A new recording of Brahms' fourth by the dean of romanticists (Walter has a Brahms fourth with the N.Y. Philharmonic already available on Columbia). True to his tradition, this interpretation, as the previous one, is invested with deep-seated emotion; but forsaking the driving power one is used to in this work. Rather it is an interpretation of tenderness, of calm passion and love for the piece. Walter is still an enchanter.



SIBELIUS: Symphony No. 2 in D Major, Opus 43—Paul Paray conducting the Detroit Symphony Orchestra—Mercury SR 90204

Abounding with patriotic passion, Sibelius' second symphony is accorded a powerful interpretation by Paray. He directs with a firm hand, eliciting the bold responses from the ork which are so necessary for the complete fulfillment of this work. A stirring listening experience, as is so common with Sibelius. Excellent sound.



RICHARD STRAUSS: "Ein Heldenleben"—Herbert Von Karajan conducting the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra — Deutsche Grammophon DGS 712022

Making his conducting debut for Decca, Von Karajan has chosen this "heroic" composition by Strauss. It is "program" music of almost-symphonic proportions; bold, vivid, striking in its broad themes; and with the conductor's zealoussness, it comes off in extremely lucid terms. Von Karajan's familiarity with the work leaves little to be desired in interpretive possibilities. Musically complete issue.

Everest Announces New Sales Plan; Extends 10% Discount Stocking Prog.

NEW YORK—Charlie Schicke, general sales manager of Everest Records, has announced the launching of a special merchandising program: the Everest March-April album buy. This program will present a classical album release and one popular album every other month. Advertising and point of sales promotion will be utilized during the program. Also, a copy of each of these albums will be sent to key buyers free of charge. In addition, Schicke stated that the special February 10% discount stocking program has been extended through March 25, 1960.

This special 10% discount will apply to all distributor album purchases with the exception of the March album buy selections, from March 1 to March 25. This includes new March releases. Any back orders accumulated at the termination of either program will be honored.

New Jamal Album

NEW YORK—Argo Records will release its first Ahmad Jamal LP since last August's "Jamal At The Penthouse" on March 16. Called "Happy Moods," it features the trio back in a studio recording after a series on-the-spot sessions.

Also in the March release is Milt Mackner's first LP for the firm, "Mighty High" titled after his recent successful single.

Two more recordings complete the month's package, and both spotlight Chicago jazz groups. "Richard's Almanac" is by the Richard Evans trio (he's the former Lionel Hampton and Dinah Washington bassist) and "The Legend Of The Bix" is by The Metropolitan Jazz Octet. Latter is headed by tenor saxist Tom Hilliard and features his compositions and arrangements of legendary jazz trumpeter Bix Beiderbecke's work.

Concert-in-the-Home LP's

NEW YORK—American Society Records has announced a "Concert-in-the-Home" series of classical recordings. The first six LP's are headed: "The Royal Music of Europe" and include music of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. Composers represented are Ravel, Bach, Vivaldi, Belemann, Mozart, Haydn, Pergolesi, Beethoven, Geminiani, Boyce, Couperin and Purcell. Sleeves of each album has a Picasso drawing. Sets are available in monaural and stereo.

Gold Disk



HOLLYWOOD—Duane Eddy beams with pleasure as Lester Sill, president of Gregmark Music, presents him with his first gold record, for his million-selling Jamie Single "Rebel Rouser." The twenty-one-year-old guitarist also received a gold record for his album, "Have Twangy Guitar, Will Travel," which has sold more than 400,000 copies to date.

Decca A&R Execs Meet

NEW YORK—As a result of the national increase in sales activity since the beginning of the year, Martin P. Salkin, vice president of Decca Records, last week announced a week long series of meetings starting in New York. In addition to the home office executives, Sonny Burke and Owen Bradley, Decca West Coast and Nashville A&R chiefs respectively are in attendance.

Separate confabs are being held with Decca and Coral executives and the complete A&R staffs respectively, to formulate plans for the remainder of the year. Strong emphasis will be placed upon coordinated efforts with the sales, sales promotion, publicity and promotion departments. Discussions will be devoted to long range plans for the development of new talent and new product to maintain the "current pace of the label's position in the industry."

Victor-Airlines Promo

NEW YORK—Music of the Islands and the Orient figures strongly in the promotion now under way by RCA Victor Records and Northwest Orient Airlines. An EP with selections drawn from four Victor albums—"Music Of The Islands," "Orienta," "Aloha From Hawaii," and "Hawaiian Beach Party"—will be made available to consumers through a coupon in each of two million special Northwest flight packages. The airline distributes the packages to every passenger, and they are also available at Northwest ticket offices.

In addition, Victor and the airline have planned a program of 1000 radio spots heralding the EP highlighter; and an "extensive" selection of point of sale material for use in both record outlets and Northwest ticket offices.

Rosen Rejoins Hansen

NEW YORK—Charles H. Hansen of Hansen Publications has announced the appointment of Bob Rosen to his L.A. office. The L.A. tenure is to familiarize Rosen with the Hansen operation.

Rosen was formerly with Seeco, Herald-Ember, and Gone-End labels and was with Hansen five years ago.

Donagan In U. S. To Wax For Atlantic

NEW YORK—Atlantic Records hosted a cocktail party last week at the Friars Club in honor of the arrival of Lonnie Donegan to the U. S. and to celebrate its pact with the British songster for release of his records here.

Donegan, accompanied by Maurice Kinn, publisher of Britain's New Musical Express, will remain in the U. S. for approximately ten days, during which time he will record an album and several singles for American release under the Atlantic banner.

One album, cut in England and already available there under a different title on the Pye-Nixa label, is being released by Atlantic here titled "Skiffle Folk Songs."

The party was attended by U. S. and British press representatives, officials of the B.B.C. and British Information Service. Also in attendance was Alec Delmont of Gallo Records, South Africa, which releases Atlantic and other American independents there.

Grayco To Cut TV Tune

HOLLYWOOD—Songstress Helen Grayco has received permission from 20th Century-Fox TV and James Michener for the exclusive rights to the title "Adventures In Paradise" for her first album with Hanover-Signature Records.

Besides the title song, which was written by Lionel Newman and is used as a theme for 20th's television series, Miss Grayco has commissioned Les Baxter, Martin Denny, Harry Owens, Arthur Lyman, and Carl and Eddie Brandt to write original songs in the exotic mood of the album. These will be integrated with tropical standards. Bob Thiele, Hanover-Signature prexy, will fly to Hollywood this month to personally supervise and produce the Helen Grayco album for immediate release.

Argo LP Price Rise

CHICAGO—Leonard Chess, prexy of Chess Producing Corporation, this city, announced last week that the price of all Argo Record albums will be increased to \$4.98 effective March 15. This price pertains to both monaural and stereo LP's.

"We have decided to increase the list price of our high quality Argo jazz LP line to meet the competitive pricing of all other jazz albums in the markets," Chess said.

Among the jazz albums available are the recordings of Ahmad Jamal, Marian McPartland, Chubby Jackson, Ramsey Lewis, James Moody, Barry Harris, Smokey Stover, Al Grey, Max Roach, and many other jazz artists.

The Lancers also announced last week the formulation of Lancers Commercials, Inc., a new company formulated specifically for the purpose of recording and filming radio and television commercials for all products. Offices of Lancers Commercials, Inc., will be in Beverly Hills and New York.

Villa-Lobos On Display

NEW YORK—A collection of orchestral, chamber and choral works by the late Heitor Villa-Lobos has been presented to the New York Public Library as a gift from Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI), which licenses much of the Brazilian composer's music. Many of these items are being shown in a retrospective exhibition at the Music Division of the Library, Fifth Avenue and 42nd Street, New York City, through April 23.

Among the BMI items presented to the Library are the "Bachianas Brasileiras" Nos. 1, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9, the "Cello Concerto," "The San Sebastian Mass," "Uirapuru," the "String Quartets" Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 12, and many other works from Villa-Lobo's prolific output.

All aspects of the life and work of the Brazilian composed are highlighted in the exhibition. Printed scores, including many works never performed in this country, musical comedy and ballet programs, books by and about the composer, photographs and drawings, as well as the BMI material, are featured in the display.

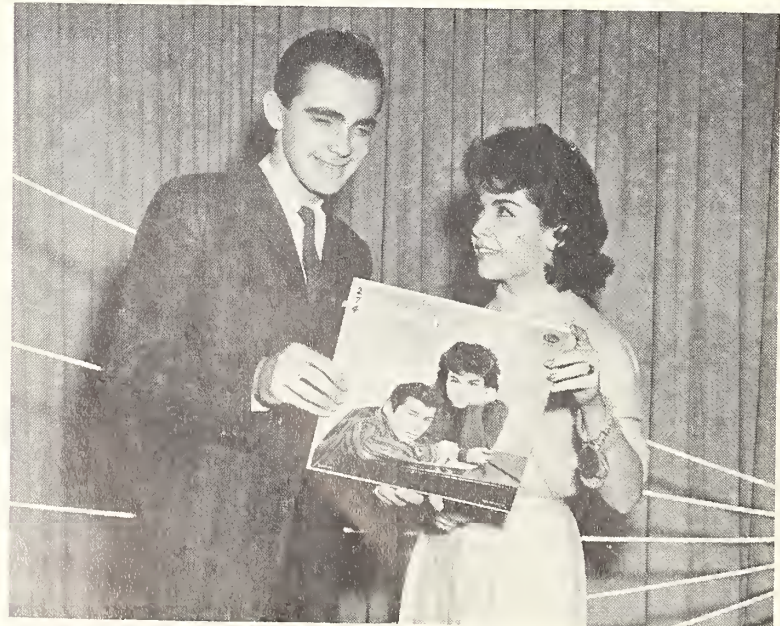

Vaughn Monroe will record both singles and albums for United Artists. Don Costa UA's A&R head, is producing a series of recording sessions with Monroe and his first single will be released shortly. He previously cut for Victor, his long-time label.

Starting with "There I've said It Again" in 1945, Monroe has had a long succession of hits including "Ballerina," "Ghost Riders In The Sky," "Mule Train," "Cool Water" and "They Were Doing The Mambo," and his theme song, "Racing With The Moon."

Although Vaughn Monroe's first success came during the dance band era, it was chiefly his singing that caught the attention of the music buying public. The popularity of his recordings resulted in a contract to star on the "Camel Caravan" radio show which remained on radio continuously for eight years. When the "Caravan" moved over to television in 1950, Monroe continued as its star. During this period, Monroe was called to Hollywood to appear in feature roles in two motion pictures, "Singing Guns" and "The Toughest Man In Arizona."

It was in 1953 that Vaughn Monroe disbanded his orchestra and embarked on a new career as a "single." He has since appeared in leading hotels and supper clubs throughout the country.

Also appearing will be the Butler Irish Dancers from Toronto, and local New York Irish-American talent will be represented by the McNiff Dancers.

NEW YORK—Lou Klayman, president of Action Records, Inc., last week announced his appointment as distributor for Dot Records in the New York territory.

Klayman stated that the "Triple A" organization (Action Of New York, Astor of Pittsburgh, headed by Herb Cohen, and Arnold of Chicago, presided by Morrie Price) has been "steadily and powerfully building." "Based on the figures for the first two months of 1960," Klayman said, "there is no question that this will be a great year, both for the 'Triple A' organization and the record industry in general."

Action's president pointed out that the LP end of the business has been "enjoying a period of unprecedented prosperity and excellent growth" but, added: "It is important to bring out that the consumer is selecting more carefully each day and that the manufacturer must also be far more selective with his releases . . . sticking entirely to quality rather than quantity. The single record appears to have found a steadying level at this point and seems to be on the upgrade again."

American violinist Isaac Stern will make an 8,000 mile round trip to appear on BBC TV on March 8th playing Brahms' Violin Concerto in D with the London Philharmonic Orchestra. Immediately after transmission Stern flies back to New York to fulfill other commitments.

"Love, Kisses and Heartaches", the latest disk by Oriole recording star Maureen Evans, has been chosen as 'Record of the Week' by Radio Luxembourg. Her last disk "The Big Hurt" received the same distinction. Oriole Records has just recorded the theme music from the Eros film "Inn For Trouble" by The Gordon Franks Players.

When the successful TV show "Boy Meets Girls" finishes on March 5th, the star Marty Wilde leaves for a belated honeymoon trip to the States. Plans include visits to Hollywood and Las Vegas. His latest Philips disk "Bad Boy" released in the States on Columbia is climbing "The Cash Box Top 100".

Hymie Zahl of Fosters Agency told *The Cash Box* that he has clinched a deal with American Manager Norm Riley for Johnny Preston to visit Britain for a ten-week tour commencing April 10th. Preston will join the Conway Twitty show (reported in last week's *Cash Box*). Also in the bill will be British artists Wee Willie Harris and Tony Crombie. Johnny Preston is sure of a big welcome with his "Running Bear" on Mercury currently high in the British and American charts.

Promoter Arthur Howes announces the addition of Pye recording star Lance Fortune to the forthcoming Everly Brothers' tour of Britain. Lance's disk "Be Mine" is rapidly shooting up the British charts. Others in the bill include Danny Hunter, the Freddie Lloyd Four and The Fleerackers.

Leslie A. MacDonnell who took over control of the world's most famous variety theatre The London Palladium from Val Parnell in January of this year, announces the future policy for the theatre does not include variety. In its place long running shows and pantomimes will be presented. Following the current pantomime hit "Humpty Dumpty" will be a full scale revue starring Liberace.

Following his recent trip to Germany and Belgium Jeffrey Kruger announce that he has signed a world-wide deal covering all countries except Gt. Britain, America and Canada and the Benelux, in which countries he has his own publishing companies, with Southern Music Publishing Company. The deal calls for big all-out promotion by Southern to sell British Jazz copyrights throughout the world and the British artists managed by Jeffrey Kruger, or signed his record producing company—Ember Records (International) Ltd. Recordings of his artists will also be released with co-ordination of Southern in many countries hitherto not exploited, and artists benefiting include Tony Crombie, Tony Kinsey, Eddie Thompson, Ronnie Ross, Tommy Whittle, The London Jazz Quartet, Georgie Brown and Roy Young.

Notable releases from the Decca group include an E.P. by Anthony Newley including his current British chart topper "Why", "Anything You Wanna Do", "Personality" and "My Blue Angel". 21-year-old Calcutta born Paul Byrd makes his disk debut on Decca with a medium rocker "A Year Ago Tonight" on R.C.A. is Jim Reeves' "He'll Have To Go" currently in the American Top Ten. Brunswick releases a presentation album of Gershwin Gems by George Bassman and his Orchestra titled "The Gershwin Years" available on mono, aural and stereo. Two hits rocketing up "The Cash Box Top 100" are released over here on the London label—David Seville and the Chipmunks with "Alvin Orchestra" and "Paradise" by Sammy Turner.

Two new E.P. releases from Pye this week both from American hit music due here shortly. British musical comedy star Edmund Hoekridge sings a selection of songs from Frank Loesser's brilliant folk opera "The Most Happy Fella" and adding to the fast growing number of disks from "The Flower Drum Song" Gary Miller has waxed a selection including "Sunday", "Love Loc Away", "You Are Beautiful" and "Grant Avenue". Pye A & R Manager Michael Barclay and Philip Waddilove encouraged by the success of skiffle king Lonnie Donegan's "Puttin' On The Style" and "Does Your Chewing Lose It Flavor" both recording during a live performance, have decided to repeat the formula for his next disk "My Old Man's A Dustman" to be cut during a performance at Doncaster on February 20th. Donegan left for the States on February 29th where he will cut an L.P. for his American label, Atlantic.

Philips this week released a new Guy Mitchell recording "The Same Old Me"—could be a successor to his "Heartaches By The Number" hit still high in the British charts. Flip side is the Western style "Build My Gallows High". Also from Philips another Flower Drum Song recording, this time by Andy Kostelanetz and his Orchestra—including two of the biggest hits "I Enjo Being A Girl" and "A Hundred Million Miracles". On Fontana Elaine Delma follows her first disk "Porgy" with a new single "That Old Feeling" and on the same label comes an L.P. of songs from her native Ireland by attractive singer Eileen Donaghy. Fontana A & R Manager, Jack Baverstock, is planning a new record for Al Saxon to follow his recent successes "Only Sixteen" and "Marina".

A special Columbia release for immediate sale is the fast climbing American hit "Wild One" by Bobby Rydell who is a likely visitor to this country in the near future for personal appearances. Another top American hit, this time released on the Mercury label is the Brook Benton-Dinah Washington "Baby Backed With 'I Do'". Capitol has issued a new single by Gene Vincent, currently enjoying a successful nation-wide tour plus appearances in TV's "Boy Meets Girls", entitled "My Heart" and "I've Got To Get You Yet".

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Saarikko In U.S.



NEW YORK—N. E. Saarikko, Finnish manufacturer of phonograph records and musical instruments, is in the United States for two weeks, touring with the Finnish Jazz Society. In Finland he represents the Philips and Fontana labels as well as his own label, Triola.

Norway's winning song from the local song festival, "Voi Voi", to appear in the Eurovision Song Festival in London at the end of March, was written and composed by Georg Elgaen, a teacher at the Ullern School near Oslo. He wrote his song with English lyric with an eye on the English market, and he hoped to get it published. However, Norwegian Radio-TV announced a song competition about the same time, and Elgaen took a chance; made Norwegian "translation" of his English lyric, and wound up the winner. Swedish TV and the film industry will try to find a way to co-operate and hear. A member of the Swedish Parliament has taken the first step to change negotiations between the two who until now have been deadlocked. Reports of the first meetings do not look too promising. The idea that Swedish film studios should make films for TV, but it is reported that film studios are too expensive for the TV.

Chris Barber and His Jazzmen gave concerts at Stockholm Concert Hall Feb. 25. Vocalist, Otilie Patterson, only sang two numbers, since she just had been ill with the flu which now is sweeping all over Europe. The critics were disappointed, the general feeling in today's dailies being that Chris Barber was much better last time he visited Sweden—two years ago.

Warner Bros., has now released its first numbers on the Swedish market. Particularly stereo records, all releases so far have gotten the very best notice from all papers here.

David Oistrach has given two concerts at Concert Hall in Stockholm.

Got a quick call from Philips in Hamburg, and the story I heard is as mysterious as it is interesting. Four months ago Philips received a tape from Holland. They didn't know whether the tunes were good or not, so they decided to test them. They sent records to all German trade men, music shops and coin machine men. The reaction was sensational and at once Philips got an order for about 36,000 records, and one day later for about 50,000. Now Philips is only pressing these two records, from which they expect one surely will become a hit. It is called "Laila", a simple melody and a strong lyric. But this is not the end of the story. The interpreter and the orchestra are perfectly unknown. The singer sings a broken German. Nobody knows who he is or where he comes from. "Laila" is released on Fontana.

Also from Philips came the news that the German 57-year-old Eugen Jochum and 30-year-old Bernard Haitink, from Holland, after the death of Eduard van Beinum in April, 1959, were appointed leaders of the Concertgebouw Orchestra of Amsterdam, now on the Philips label.

Larry Douglas, American composer and music publisher of ASCAP in New York is in Paris. He will be in Germany early in March and will visit recording companies and German music publishers, and booking agents, representing such American artists as Oscar Pettiford, who now makes his home in Copenhagen, Phineas Newborn, Jr., Kenny Burrell and Tito Puente and his Latin American Band. On April 4th and 5th Larry will record his own commercial session in Paris, for an album and EP's. This album will consist of twelve of his own compositions and is to be called "The Music Of Larry Douglas In Paris" with French orchestra and Chorus. This session will consist of 32 pieces of France's finest musicians and the arranger will be Europe's number one arranger of the Lido in Paris, Jean Pierre Landreau. The album and EP is to be recorded in both Monaural and Stereo and will be released at the same time in France, England and the United States.

The instrumental group, Johnny and The Hurricanes, after their first big success in Germany "Red River Rock" is again very successful here with their newest recording, "Reveille Rock".

Vico Torriano with his Spanish record, "Ave Maria No Morro", on Decca, is placed very high on the international market. After only four weeks this record is on the best seller lists of many foreign countries.

While on a world tour, Red Nicholas and his Five Pennies will come to Germany in March.

Conny, beloved German teenage star will start an American career, as America is interested in her new style of singing. She now has a new record titled, "Lippenstift am Jackett" (Lipstick on the Short Coat) on Electrola. Ralph Bendix, successful with the hit, "Kriminal Tango" returned from America where he prepared a tour and negotiated with TV and with Capitol Records. His "Glen Cannon Song" is very fine.

An interesting record is that with Johnny Teupen, who is the only jazz harpist in Europe, entitled "Gay 90's Rock" on Columbia.

After his big success with the German version of "Marina", Will Brandes recorded a new song, which already has a lot of fans, "Gartner aus Liebe".

Angele Durand on tour throughout Polen in March.

Rocco Granata, who for some days stayed in Frankfurt for interviews on radio and television, recorded a new song called, "Oh Oh Rosie" and "E'Prime Vera".

Some of the winners of the hit parade of Radio Luxemburg for the winter season are as follows: The Golden Lion, (highest prize) will go to Freddy Quinn for his song, "Unter Fremden Sternen", the Silver Lion will also go to Freddy for "Du musst alles vergessen" and the Bronze Lion will go to Ivo Robic for "Morgen". The official presentation of the prizes will be in April.

"Rendezvous In Paris" is the title of a TV film which is being filmed in the studios of Radio Monte Carlo in Paris. German artists like Alice and Ellen Kessler, Peter Kraus and Helmut Zacharias are contracted.

For twelve minutes Peter Kreuder plays thirteen of his most beloved evergreens from the years 1930 and 1940, on his new recording. The famous pianist and composer plays songs such as, "Sag beim Abschied leise Servus" and "Ich brach e keine Millionen" on Ariola.

Jan and Kjeld from Denmark, who had much success with "Banjo Boy" go to Ireland. The singing brothers—14 and 16 years old, will work in the town of Reykjavik from March 3rd until March 25th.

Outstanding events of 1959 are recorded on an LP on Ariola. The record includes events such as Krushchev in the United States, Theodore Hess, Satellites and The Berlin Crisis and the Geneva conferences.

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ITALY

The outstanding event of the week was the Fifth San Remo Jazz Festival which took place on Saturday and Sunday, the 20th and 21st of February. As years go by, this international jazz show became increasingly interesting and important. Part of the first evening was telecast on Italian T.V. On the screens appeared Roy Eldridge playing "Blues For Norman Granz", Jimmy Giuffre Trio playing, "The Easy Way", Shelly Manne playing "Poinciana", and Ella Fitzgerald singing, "It's Wonderful", "Misty" and "Mack The Knife". Out of all these songs, only the disk "It's Wonderful" is available in Italy. Ella Fitzgerald has been the leading jazz artist appearing in this Festival. She also sang other music by Gershwin such as, "But Not For Me", and "The Man I Love". That same night, the 'first lady of jazz,' left for Rome where the following day she took part in two concerts and then flew to Paris immediately afterwards. Critics lauded Shelly Manne. He is known here for his parts in "The Man With The Golden Arm" and "The Five Pennies".

Ella Fitzgerald's personal manager, Norman Granz is reported to have chosen Lugano, Switzerland as his new seat. At SAAR, the house representing the Verve label, in Italy, we saw the five Verve albums of Gershwin melodies sung by Ella Fitzgerald, the splendid covers of which were drawn by the most famous French painter, Bernard Buffet. These covers are said to have cost a tremendous amount of money.

I made the acquaintance of Italian singer Natalino Otto, who is perhaps the only one to keep a firm grasp on the changing tastes of the public and is recording high sales. He belongs to Fonit since the outbreak of the war. From that time until now we saw many styles change, but Natalino Otto has kept a steady personal style and still has a large following. During fascism, jazz and U.S.A. light music were quite forbidden in Italy, but this singer, who then went to the United States many times was among the first to bring the new U.S.A. music fashions to Italy. He was married many years ago to well known singer Flo Sandons (who records for Durium) and they represent the best married couple of Italian singers. Natalino Otto is a publisher too and he emphasizes his hit, "Labbra Di Fuoco" (Lips Of Fire) which, sung by his wife Flo Sandons, is fairly successful and appeared among Italy's best sellers.

This week I paid a long visit, with other journalists, to the Melodicon factory, which is to be considered among the best equipped factories of the Italian record industry. Melodicon moulds and distributes the Philips repertoire which includes one of the most important catalogues of classical music. Ing. Baron, the director of Melodicon, personally presented with much pride, all the machines, explaining the processing to us. He showed several control booths, where they listen to samples taken from the manufactured disks in order to avoid faulty records going out of the factory. Ing. Baron said that he was one of the first Italian managers to know of The Cash Box and use it in Italy, some eight or nine years ago.

During the visit to the Melodicon factory, I had the chance to meet Mr. Trombetta, the composer of "Kriminal Tango". This tune, sung by Ralf Bendiz/Electrola and by Hazy Osterwald/Polydor, goes on appearing among Germany's best sellers, as reported by Eva Morell. "Kriminal Tango" is a sample of a song which obtained much success abroad before becoming successful in its own country. In Italy, a version sung by Marino Marini (Durium) is distributed and sells fairly well. The Italian text was written by Mr. Locatelli, press office manager of Durium, who sent me a copy of the recording.

From Paris, Larry Douglas, of Laerteas Music Co. writes, "I've been here in Paris since Jan. 4, 1960 from New York City. I'll visit Milan early in March and will stop by your Cash Box office. I'll be here visiting recording companies and Italian music publishers. Also, I'll be here visiting with Italian booking agencies".

As foreseen in my last column, "Why" by Frankie Avalon appears among Italy's Top Ten best sellers in the number 7 spot, while "Milord" by Edith Piaf disappeared from the chart.

The publishing house, Leonardi (Milan) sent me a copy of "Morgen" played by Eddie Calvert (Columbia). The tune "Morgen" is topping the German chart and this record will be distributed in Italy by Leonardi.

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AUSTRALIA

Leading French entertainer Maurice Chevalier has arrived in Melbourne to begin his one-man show for a four weeks run at Melbourne's Comedy Theatre in the J. C. Williamson circuit. Chevalier, looking extremely young and dapper for his years, has just concluded a night club season at Las Vegas.

W & G Records is launching one of its biggest promotion drives to back the release of Mindy Carson's new single of "Wake The Town And Tell The People" c/w "When I Fall In Love". This disk comes to W & G under their contract with Joy Records of America. "Wake The Town And Tell The People" is published here by J. Albert & Son Pty. Ltd. and Sterling Music—a subsidiary of the Chappell organization—publishes "When I Fall In Love". Both these companies operate from headquarters in Sydney. The record labels on this release carry small photographs of Mindy Carson; the practice of printing artists' photos on singles labels was re-introduced here some time ago by W & G, who now apply this added attraction to most of its singles.

Several singles of "The Village of St. Bernadette" has already been released here and now and the promotion race for top honors is on in earnest. There is great interest in this song here since it was written by a popular Australian girl Eula Parker. Even though this number did not reach the top spot in The Cash Box, it seems fairly certain to achieve that distinction in Australia. Eula Parker, who is currently in London was a member of The Parker Sisters, a vocal group who were exceptionally popular in this country some years back. It is expected that Eula may return to Australia within the next few weeks to visit her family and to assist in the promotion of "The Village Of St. Bernadette".

Following an editorial in the 20th February issue of The Cash Box suggesting a change in term from rock 'n roll to Teenbeat, there has been a marked swing in Australia by disk-jockeys to the usage of "Teenbeat" when describing disks that are popular with young people. If similar action was taken by D-Js in other countries, the term "Teenbeat" would become a regular descriptive feature of today's popular music.

Coronet Records has embarked its "March Is The Conniff Sound Month" promotion. It is making a solid drive on all Conniff albums, several of which are also issued in stereo. Radio and TV exposure will be consolidated with press ads, special window streamers, display cards and consumer literature. With the tremendous regular interest in Conniff, March should be a great month for Coronet.

The Readers' Digest/R.C.A. special offer of twelve 12" LP's in an album for £17.5.0 has now been extended to Victoria from New South Wales where it was first introduced a few months ago. The whole operation is being conducted through the mail and recipients are being offered the opportunity to play the disks for several days before deciding to buy. The price of £17.5.0 is about half the price for the same number of classical disks through normal retail channels.

Among the latest singles released through the Festival Records group are several disks of strong sales potential, including Freddy Cannon's "Way Down Yonder In New Orleans", "Talk That Talk" by Jackie Wilson, "Bourbon Street Beat" by the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra with Warren Covington, "No Love Have I" by Webb Pierce and Bill Haley's "Skokiaan".

Publisher Larsson Declares War On Swedish Radio

STOCKHOLM.—Publisher-composer Ake Gerhard Larsson, winner of this year's Swedish song festival in Sweden, where he was author-composer of three of the four melodies in the finals has started his private war against the Swedish State owned Radio and TV company.

Larsson, who also is publisher, with his own company Europa-Produktion, publishing mainly his own compositions, and Belinda (Scandinavia) AB and Robert Mellin (Scandinavia) AB, the former representing Hill & Range Songs, says that the Swedish radio is trying to "kill" the success of his songs by refusing to air them. Larsson, who is the publisher of a paper, Show Business, seems to have avoided letting his own paper get involved in this affair, and has instead backed up his campaign in cooperation with the evening paper, Aftonbladet, who, facing future great headlines, seems to be most willing to undertake the crusade against the present officials of the Swedish Radio-TV company. It

is well known that Larsson does not want any change from the present state-owned type of broadcast or television stations to commercial radio TV, but according to statements made in published interviews he has made it clear that his campaign is mainly to get new people as officials of the Radio-TV company, people who might be more in favor of his own compositions and less willing to play songs from rival composers and/or publishers. In order to get this "change policy", Larsson has recently promised he will apply to the Ministry of Communication, under which Radio TV belongs, within a short time.

German Studying U.S. Radio-TV

Philips (Belgium), phoned The Cash Box that English singer Marty Wilde, whose career is one of the astounding ones in the record business, has had great success with his wonderful interpretation of the song "A Teenager In Love". The famous English impresario, Larry Parnes discovered him in 1957 and with the songs, "Endless Sleep" and "Donna" Marty Wilde reached the English hit parade.

Coen Solleveld, director of L. C. Phonogram, Amsterdam, left Holland on Friday, February 19th and went to Arosa for a fortnight to spend his winter-ports holidays.

Nico Boer, in former days a radio program manager, and the man who already is a program manager for L. C. Phonogram for 15 years, hosted a big reception on Saturday, February 27th, to celebrate his 30 years in show business and his marriage of 25 years.

A single by Bobby Darin has just been released on the London label titled, "Beyond The Sea" (the English version of Charles Trenet's "La Mere") and "That's The Way Love Is."

Last week, Coen Solleveld and Rheinhard Klaassen, L. C. Phonogram sales manager, went to London on a routine visit. The former saw Stefan Stewart of the International Federation of the Phonographic Industry to work out a solution for the difficulties between BIEM and the industry as far as Holland is concerned. Of course the two gentlemen also paid a visit to Ted Lewis and Jack Philips from Decca headquarters and Les Gould from the Philips associates in London.

As president of the Dutch Group on the International Federation of the Phonographic Industry (I.F.P.I.), Solleveld, together with the other members of the Board of said body, came to an interim agreement with BIEM representing organization for Holland, STEMRA. This means that the exploitation of BIEM protected material can be resumed in Holland.

Vico Torriani will come to Holland on March 12th to make his appearance in a big show-broadcast on Dutch television. In the same show the East-German artist Barbel Wachholz will appear. Wachholz' first record was released some weeks ago in Holland (on the Fontana label, managed by L. C. Phonogram, Amsterdam). We also hope to see some famous Dutch artists, such as, Corrie Brokken, the Malando Orchestra, the New Orleans Syncopaters and Willeke Alberti, the daughter of Willy Alberti, the "Tenore Napolitano" of the Benelux.

In his European tour, Miles Davis will visit Holland at the beginning of April and probably will give concerts in The Hague and Amsterdam. The Dutch jazz lovers rejoice at his coming.

Also Anthony Newley, who just released the numbers, "Why" and "Anything You Wanna Do", will probably visit Holland before long.

Greetje Kauffeld, Holland's top girl vocalist, is a free lance singer for the past three weeks. This week, "Niet Voor Mij" (Not For Me) one of the best songs of the Dutch Song Festival was released. Greetje sings that popular song with much feeling. Pieter Goemans was present at this recording. He composed the song, "Niet Voor Mij" and is getting an international reputation with his compositions in Benelux.

The Dutch rock & roll sensation, Peter & His Rockets, has cut a single, "Marijke" and "Jenny". Peter composes his own songs.

Hans Boskamp (a famous football player and son of the well known Dutch actor Johan Boskamp) and his wife Nan Boskamp sang a duet for the Imperial label (managed by L. C. Bovema, Heemstede). The titles are "Aan De Amsterdamse Grachten" (composed by Peter Goemans) and "Was Jij de Eninge" (the Dutch interpretation of "If You Were The Only Girl In The World").

The Four Tielman Brothers have cut a single of "My Maria" and "You're Still The One" for Imperial.

Lewis Merritt of Interdisca, New York, is visiting Benelux now. Merritt is making a trip through Europe and will visit all Rank members. On February 19th he spoke at large with one of the directors of Delahay Record Company (representatives of the Rank label in Benelux), Hans Kellerman. Merritt knew Kellerman because he was waving a copy of The Cash Box at him at the airport Schiphol.

Emile Garin of L. C. Gramophone, Belgium (representative of the labels La Voix De Son Maitre, Columbia, Pathe, Capitol, Electrola, Fonit, Parlophone, M.G.M. and Oldeon in Belgium) told The Cash Box that Belgium has almost 1000 record shops and in 500 of them the best selling record since mid-December, 1959, up to this very day has been and still is "Milord" (Columbia) sung by the incomparable Edith Piaf (more than 25,000 copies of that E.P. have been sold). Interesting to note is the fact that this French recording—recorded by Piaf in Capitol Studios in Hollywood, has been a hit in both Flemish and Wallon parts of Belgium.

Still regarding the French repertoire, we have been and still are enjoying big sales figures with "Les Compagnons De La Chanson" recordings (Columbia) such as "Venus", "C'est Ca L'Amore" and "Le Marchand De Bonheur". The song, "Salade De Fruits" released exclusively by H.M.V.—Columbia and Pathe is now on Belgium's Top Ten, the best selling versions being Annie Cordy (Columbia) and Bourvil (Pathe).

Gilbert Becaud appearing in Brussels (13th to 18th of February) has made a real triumph, all concerts being sold out. His recording of "Pilou Pilouhe" is now No. 3 on I.N.R. (Belgian National Radio Network) Hit Parade.

Carlton Attacks British Diskeries For "Copying"

NEW YORK—Joe Carlton, Carlton Records topper, has decried the "copying and imitating" of American hits by English diskeries. Carlton made his attack in a letter to England's Musical Express columnist Bruce Charlton, who, in a recent article — headlined "Cheek" — accused Carlton of "sour grapes"—after Carlton announced a "Buy American" campaign. Two of Carlton's U. S. hits, "Seven Little Girls" by Paul Evans and "Starry Eyed," by Gary Stites, were covered by English firms and both bested Carlton's original versions in sales.

"There is not sour grapes for us in the fact that Michael Holliday's 'Starry Eyed' succeeded where the Gary Stites' version did not in your market," Carlton wrote Charlton, "but you have overlooked the fact that Michael Holliday's record is note for note, bar for bar, sound for sound, utterly and completely in concept a direct copy of the Stites record." Carlton stated that the same applied to the Avons' cover of the Evans hit.

"Yes, we covered an English song called 'Summer Set,'" Carlton noted, "but if you listen to Monty Kelly's record, now so successful in America, you will realize that at no time did we set out to borrow anyone's conception or arrangement."

Carlton also answered charges by Charlton that U. S. publishers were paying much less for U. S. rights to English material than English publishers were paying for U. S. efforts. This means, Charlton said, that English publishers have to get all the covers they could on a tune.

"The typical advances paid by the English music publishers," Carlton said, "is more likely 200 pounds than 2,000 pounds (a high Charlton quoted) . . . You say it is imperative for the British publishers to get as many cover records as possible. I think the word is advantageous. Every British record that copies an American hit also eliminates one side of a record which could have been assigned to a British original song with a British artist. So you see this tactic, in the long run, will only go further to discourage the development and acceptance of British products in your own market."

Audio Fidelity is currently considering a number of labels for distribution in England.

According to Frey, "The British have taken to Audio Fidelity Records most encouragingly. Of the 27 different LP's we have released in England during the first 10 months of our operation (ending February 16) 27 different LP's each have sold in excess of 1000 with many approaching the 2000 mark."

Frey will be in England for the Audio Hi-Fi Fair April 21 through 24.

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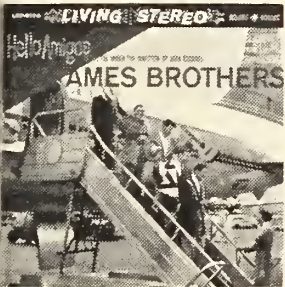

During this time period WNTA Radio will air any record, providing it is in good taste, if the time is paid for by the record company or distributor. All records played will be identified as to source. Commercial copy pushing the record will be permitted.

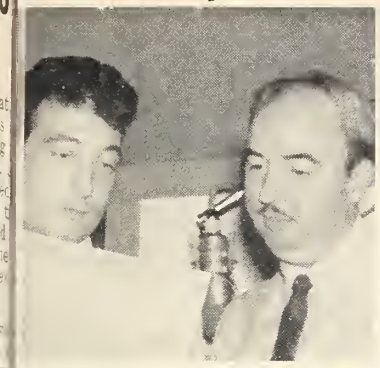

The Mercury distributing operation at Music Distributors will be under the management of Gene Becker.

The New Orleans outlet is being purchased by William F. Johns, Jr., head of a broadcasting group operating stations in Minneapolis, Minnesota, Mason City, Iowa, and Ft. Lauderdale, Florida.

Gay plans to continue operating his four remaining stations (WGAY, WQMR, WTCR, WFTC) as well as his Town & Country organization which is engaged in packaging and producing shows for radio, television, and personal appearances. He will shortly announce a "blockbuster" expansion program in the entertainment field.

The act originated New York less than a year ago, has steadily become a top night club attraction there (Blue Angel) with a national TV appearance (Pontiac Spectacular) to its credit.

Rendezvous Appoints Beusee Sec. Treas.

NEW YORK—The appointment of Arthur Beusee to the post of secretary-treasurer of Rendezvous Records has been announced. Rod Pierce, label president and general manager, said that Beusee will assume many and varied duties of internal organizational nature. A third expansion move by Rendezvous involves an actual move to new headquarters in Hollywood, with negotiations for a selected location about to be concluded.

Separate contracts were signed with Art Farmer and Benny Golson providing for individual albums to be recorded as well as those with The Jazztet.

Initial plans are to record The Jazztet which was formed last fall and has since been appearing in the top jazz clubs around the country. The group, under the co-leadership of Farmer and Golson, features Curly Fuller on trombone, Lex Humphries on drums, Addison Farmer on bass and McCoy Tyner on piano. The Jazztet has just completed a successful engagement at the Blackhawk in San Francisco, is currently on a concert tour and will headline at Chicago's Blue Note starting March 16. Tracy announced that the group's first album, "Meet The Jazztet," will be released April 15.

Peter Jay and The Cavaliers are discoveries of the company's A & R manager, Joe Meek.

Recognizing the value of new gimmicks to attract the teenager, Triumph plans the early release of a stereo EP "I Hear A New World," the musical theme being sounds from outer space.

Saga was formed in August 1958 by Barrington-Coupe and his co-director Major Banks with the aim of producing LP's within the price range of teenagers and young people interested in classical music. Selling at 25/- the company has, since its first release two years ago of "Ballet Music from 'Swan Lake'" by the Bolshoi Theatre Orchestra, built up a large catalogue of classical recordings ranging through the works of such composers as Tchaikovsky, Chopin, Mendelssohn, Schumann, Beethoven and Bach. Among the best sellers has been Bach's Brandenburg Concerto by The Hamburger Kammerorchester under the British conductor, Harry Newstone. Resulting from the very favorable reviews received for this disk sales trebled overnight.

Barrington-Coupe told The Cash Box that the combination of British conductors and major Continental orchestras has been a successful feature in his company's policy of recording and promoting British artists. Other recordings of this kind in the Saga catalog are by The Royal Danish Orchestra, The Hamburg Philharmonic, The Berlin Philharmonic and The Goldsbrough Orchestra with British conductors George Hurst and Lawrence Leonard. The latter is a conductor for the London production of "West Side Story".

One of the most important solo artists to record exclusively for Saga is the popular classical pianist Eileen Joyce. Another successful pianist is London-born Joyce Hatto whose first disk for the Saga label—Gershwin's "Rhapsody In Blue" with the Hamburg Pro Musica Orchestra conducted by George Byrd (now established as a leading conductor of Gershwin)—sold over 25,000 copies in the first eight months.

To promote further interest in the label, Saga Records organized a series of concerts at London's Royal Festival Hall featuring contract artists with leading orchestras under the title "Saga Nights". Last year the company exhibited at The Radio Show, where the stereo demonstration room proved one of the major attractions. At this time it commenced manufacturing its own equipment—tape recorders, amplifiers, etc. and have now two factories, one in Purley and one in North London where it has a completely equipped recording studio. A year ago the company issued its first pre-recorded tapes with playing time ranging from 32 to 50 minutes and selling at between 35/- and £4 for a 50-minute stereo tape. All tapes

Musidisc's Sergio Announces International Expansion Plans

NEW YORK—Nilo Sergio, president of Gravações Musidisc Ltda. of Brazil and Musidisc International Inc. of New York is back in the U.S. for a short stay, and has announced some of the N.Y. company's plans for the remainder of 1960.

Among Sergio's steps to expand the company's activities were the appointments of Leo Peracchi as musical director and Walter S. Valverde as sales mgr. for Musidisc International. Peracchi, the well-known Brazilian maestro and arranger now residing in the states, had already produced several arrangements for Musidisc. Valverde, a New Yorker, was manager of Discount Record Shop in Philadelphia for many years and will now handle marketing for the company.

Sergio also announced that an agreement has been made with CBS International to handle export sales for Musidisc to areas where the company does not have pressing arrangements under royalties. Gravações Musidisc has signed a contract with MGM Records to release that diskeries label in Brazil. Gravações now represents three American labels, the other two being Vox & Grand Award.

Vernon Plank, veepee & general mgr. of Musidisc Int. has announced a special deal for March on the label's catalog. Distributors & dealers will get one free LP with every 5 LP's purchased. The offer is good from March 10 to March 31 and will include the diskery's new albums: "Duel," featured the Brasilia National Band playing Spanish "torero" selections, and "Concert for Lovers," featuring the Magic Strings & Golden Brass.

Plank also announced that 6 new distributors have been opened up, which are:—Canadian Music Sales, Toronto; Mutual Distributors Inc., Boston; Summit Distributors Inc., Chicago; Allen Distributor Co., Richmond; Commercial Music, St. Louis; Allied Music, Detroit.

Leadership Is Necessary

To Combat

Overburdening Tax Problems

The Coin Machine Industry, in the overall picture of American business, is acknowledged to be "small business". Not only is it "small business" in itself, but it is composed of thousands of small businesses. To further weaken its structure, the industry is divided into three divisions—music, amusement machines and vendors—with each group at variance with each other.

The industry, therefore, as can easily be seen, is at the mercy of any group or agency which moves against it. And one of the most vulnerable positions of every segment of the industry is taxes. Due to the nature of the business, government agencies from local counties to the federal branch have sought to extract a maximum of revenue from the coin machine businessman—to a point where it has become unbearable and confiscatory in a number of areas thruout the nation.

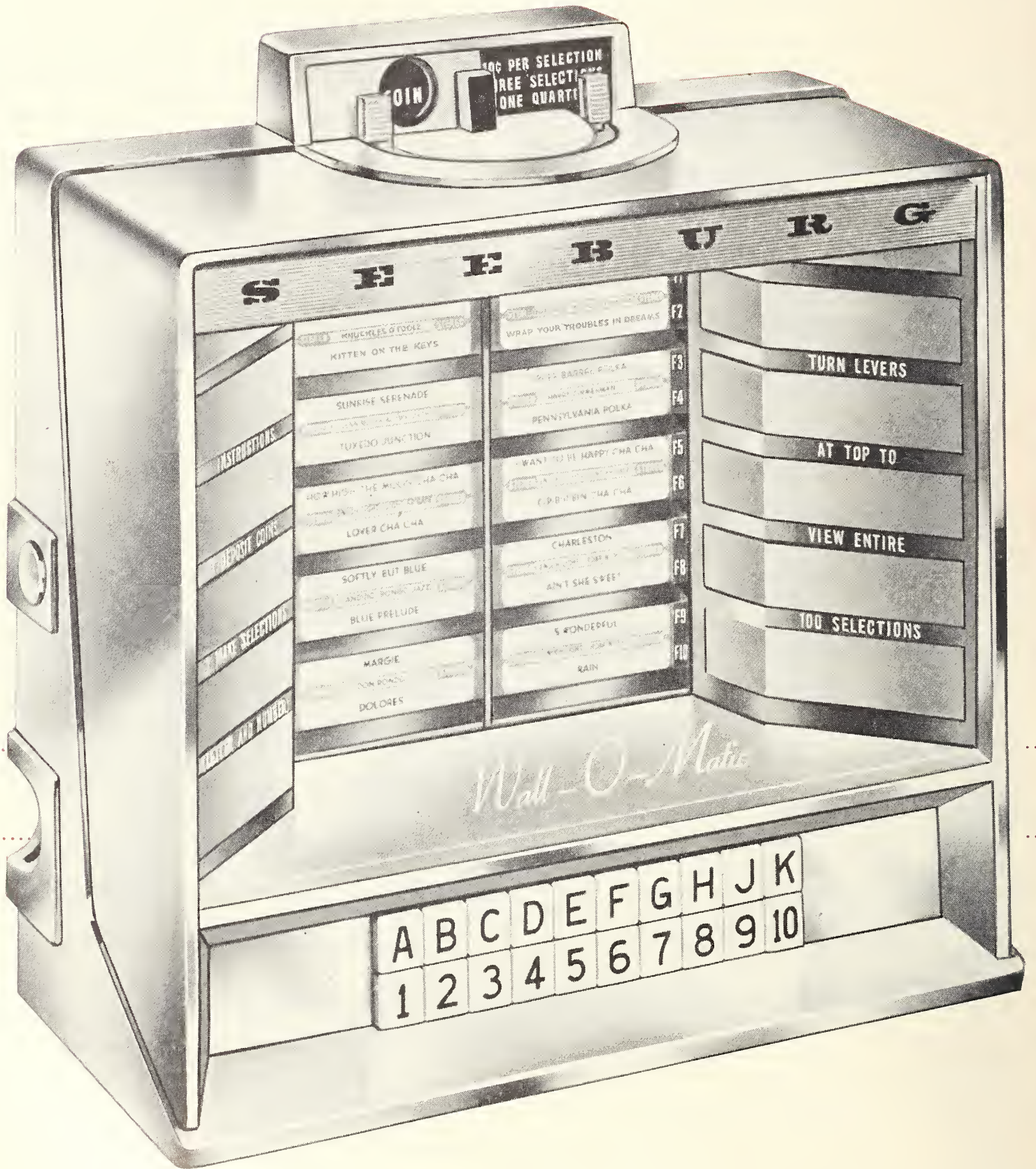
In an editorial, June 27, 1959 issue of *The Cash Box*, we asked the question "Are Coin Machine Operators Being Taxed To Death?" We reproduced a typical list of taxes as supplied by an operator from West Virginia—a total of 15 different taxes.

We have on hand now a list of taxes imposed on operators in New Orleans, La. The license tax, and permit fees, are for each machine on location: *City License, \$50.00; State License, \$50.00; Charity Hospital Permit, \$2.50; Police Pension Fund Stamp, 25¢; Personal Property Tax, \$20.00 per game (approx.); Federal Tax Stamp, \$250.00; and Use or Sales Tax, \$25.00.*

How can this problem be handled? We feel that where a territory is overburdened with taxes, and the area is covered by an association, an official (or a committee) of the organization should make an effort to meet with a representative of the governmental agency to discuss the matter. It could be most difficult to decrease or eliminate a tax, once it is put into effect, but there is always the possibility that when the true facts are presented, some relief might be effected. In territories where there is no association, it would be well for the leaders there to consider the formation of an organization representing the members—or at least have a meeting of the leaders to select an individual or a committee—who will present the coinmen's tax problems.

The most effective measure for coinmen to undertake is to be prepared in advance to combat any contemplated tax legislation. This would mean having a "watchdog" in the various branches of the local, state and federal agencies, who would be aware of any attempt to saddle additional taxes on the industry. Then the representatives of the industry could approach the proper people with facts and figures in an attempt to defeat any attempt to add any further tax burdens. We are sure that once the legislators are familiar with the coinmen's position, they wouldn't wish to overburden them with taxes to the point where they are actually putting American businessmen out of business.

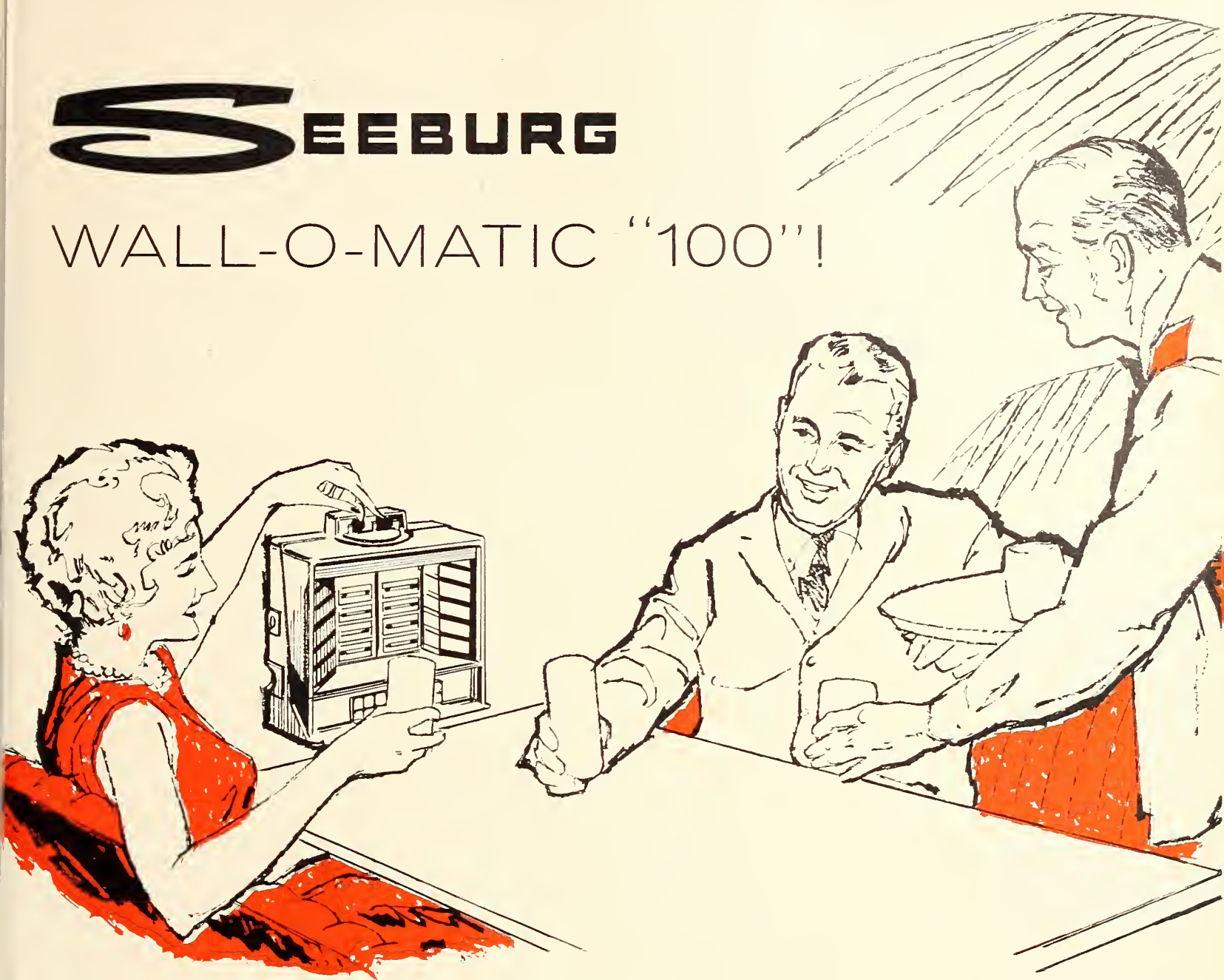

Seeburg Acquires Minthorne Music

Purchase Assets Of Distrib Firm To Form Seeburg Distributing Co.

CHICAGO—The Seeburg Corporation has announced the purchase of the assets of Minthorne Music Company in Los Angeles and has taken over the sale and distribution of Seeburg coin-operated phonographs, background music and vending equipment, under the name of The Seeburg Distributing Company.

The new company will function in southern California and in Clark County, Nevada, which is primarily Las Vegas.

Jean J. Minthorne of Minthorne Music Company will continue as a Seeburg distributor in Phoenix, Arizona, covering the state of Arizona, as he has in the past.

The Seeburg Distributing Company will occupy the premises at 2920 West Pico Blvd. in Los Angeles and will be under the management of D. J. Dono-

hue, former Seeburg West Coast division manager. Donohue has represented Seeburg in this capacity in the same territory for almost 20 years and is well known to operators up and down the entire West Coast.

Donohue has made the following appointments: Dean R. McMurdie, general sales manager; Ralph Cragan, sales manager—phonograph division; George C. Mahlum, sales representative—San Diego area; Robert Alexander, manager—service department; Sherman A. Arps, manager—parts department; and William M. Luther, comptroller.

Wayne Davis and Matthew Nordberg will continue as sales representatives. Sales managers of the background and vending division will be announced at a later date.

American Arbitration Association Clause In MONY Operator-Location Contract Reviewed After 1 Year

Attorney Summarizes Results Of Contract Disputes Since Feb. 1959

The following article describes arbitration of operator-location contract disputes after one-year's experience. Morton Singer, attorney and counselor at law, prepared the arbitration clause for the present Music Operators of New York contract in conjunction with the Commercial Arbitration Tribunal of the American Arbitration Association. He has represented coin machine operators in all arbitration disputes concerning operator-location contracts and prepared this article exclusively for The Cash Box.

For as many years as the coin machine has been used, so long has the industry been plagued with a series of ills. Some may say that it is the nature of the beast—others may say that the industry breeds its own ills.

As the coin machine industry developed, forms of uncertainty were born that created problems which impeded its development. These imponderables took some of the following forms: inducing the breach of the contract by a third person; refusal of the location owner to require a buyer of his location to assume the operator's contract; the requirement to make substantial gifts and bonuses to induce the making of the contract with the location owner, sometimes, far out of proportion to the earnings of the location; the grant of loans without interest to be repaid out of the vending machine's earnings; the refusal of the location owner to specifically perform the contract, and many other facets, too numerous to catalogue.

The old contract which was universally used in the industry was archaic, took too long a time to enforce and was most expensive to litigate. In order to meet this problem it was necessary to devise a contract which had teeth and which could be enforced quickly with a minimum of lost motion. The old contract was enforceable only in the courts with much time wasted waiting to be reached for trial, adjournments ad nauseum, adherence to the technical rules of evidence, further loss of time awaiting trial and in general an unsatisfactory result.

It was this unhappy situation that prompted Music Operators of New York, herein referred to as MONY, under the dynamic leadership of Al Denver, its president, to seek out a better method of taking confusion out of the industry and of helping the operator stay in business.

After many months of planning and conferences, a new contract was developed that provided the location owner and the operator with a good working agreement. There was mutuality of obligation; both parties were bound to perform for a definite term; the location was obliged to retain and maintain the vending machine on the premises to the exclusion of all others; the operator was bound to share the proceeds in accordance with the parties' agreement; and the sole remedy for any breach, dispute or disagreement was arbitration via the Commercial Arbitration Tribunal of the American Arbitration Association.

First Case Tried February 1959

In February 1959 the first case to be tried under the new contract was heard and decided. Although the location had a contract with about four years to run he decided to BUY his own phonograph. He notified the operator to remove his phonograph immediately. The operator complied. A demand for arbitration was served, the

cause came on to be heard with forty five days, and an award was issued directing the location to reset the phonograph, to pay attorney's fees and damages. The award was confirmed in the Supreme Court, King County and a judgment entered. The location removed the new phonograph and reset the operator's phonograph and complied with the Award in toto.

Breach Of Contract By Third Person

At or about this time many contracts were being breached through the efforts of a third person. A contract in a specified instance was breached; a demand for arbitration was made and in about ninety days hearing was held. Subsequently an award was issued. This case was energetically defended by a lawyer who appeared for the location. But the award directed that the phonograph be reset, damages be paid and the phonograph be maintained on the premises to the exclusion of others. The award was confirmed and a judgment entered thereon. This case was settled thereafter.

In another case, the location was induced to breach by a third person. But this time on advice of counsel the location did not appear nor answer the demand for arbitration. In fact the location did not answer any communications. But the contract covered precisely this kind of situation. The arbitrator heard the case issued an award granting substantial damages, a direction to specifically perform the contract and to reset the phonograph. The award was confirmed and judgment entered. The matter has been adjusted in a most satisfactory manner.

In two other cases which were breached through the efforts of the same party, motions to stay the arbitration were made in the Supreme Court of the State of New York. Both motions were denied, and the contracts were sustained by the Court as being valid and binding obligations. In another case an appeal was taken from a motion confirming an award but to no avail. The appeal was dismissed.

The law concerning this contract has been pretty well settled by now. Where a location is induced to breach his contract with the operator, the matter can go to arbitration, and the award will be sustained. The contract has been sustained on other phases as well.

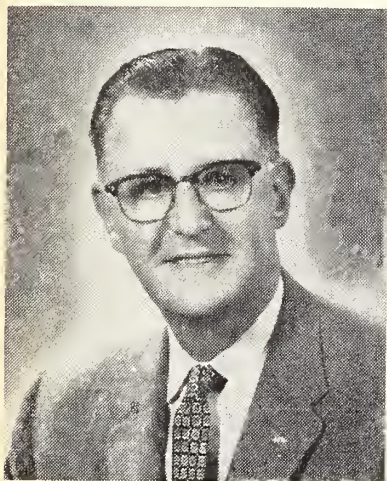
Sale Of Location

Another very serious problem involves the sale of a business to a third person who refuses to assume the operator's contract. Several of these cases have gone to hearing and have been decided in the operator's favor. In one case the location was sold while the contract had a considerable period of time to run. A demand for arbitration was served, the hearing was held and an award for damages was issued against the seller. The award was confirmed in the Supreme Court of the State of New York, New York County, a judgment entered thereon, and proceedings are under way to collect the judgment.

In a case of the same nature, after the location was sold to a third person who refused to assume the contract, arbitration proceedings were demanded and had. The hearing was contested down to the last wire, even in the Courts where a motion to confirm was opposed. This matter has

ing the transition period, the entire operation took several weeks to accomplish.

"Now that we are finally settled in our new plant, we will concentrate on the development of arcade games and equipment for the trade," Gore said.

settled by direction of the Court, the case should be closed in the next thirty days.

In still another case the location was sold to a third person who did not assent to the contract. The motion to contest the award is presently under consideration by the Court, and will be decided very shortly. The Court has indicated that the case should be settled, and most probably it will be adjudicated.

While handling these various cases, a novel situation arose. The operator entered into a contract in writing for the location for the installation of a phonograph. He was to return the following day with the instrument and neck which represented a bonus. On returning to the location, the operator was told that the location had signed with someone else and therefore the location did not want to do business with this operator.

A demand for arbitration was made, a hearing held and an award granted the operator \$500.00 damages. Unfortunately the operator did not pursue the case any further, since he felt that the location was insolvent. The proceeding ended this point.

Refusal Of Location To Comply With Contract

In addition to the "inducing-to-achieve" cases and the "sales-to-third persons" cases we have had a series of cases which I call administration cases. These cases involve the refusal of the location to observe and comply with the terms of the contract. In one case, the location refused to repay a loan made to her, refused to permit the operator to open the phonograph, and in general refused to comply with the terms of the contract. A demand was made requesting specific performance. After the hearing the arbitrator issued an award which directed the location to comply with the contract or pay damages. The award was confirmed and a judgment entered thereon. Proceedings to enforce collection of the judgment are now under way.

In still another case the following situation arose. The phonograph had been installed after the contract had been signed. The location was not doing too well, and the location said at this was due to a bad source of power. It was suggested that the operator remove the phonograph until the power source was repaired. Then after the location requested the operator to reset the phonograph, the operator discovered that another phonograph was in operation on the premises. The usual demand was served, a hearing held and an award was issued directing the location to reset the phonograph and to pay damages.

Sale Of Location Stock

There is still another series of fact situations that have arisen. In these cases, the location changes hands through the sale of the location's capital stock. The same corporate name remains. The sole difference is the new ownership. When this happened, and the location took the incumbent phonograph out of service and installed a new phonograph, arbitration proceedings were instituted. After hearing, the arbitrator directed that the location reset the operator's phonograph and to pay damages. The award was confirmed. On confirmation, the new phonograph was removed and the operator's phonograph was reset. In addition the location agreed to pay damages and attorney's fees.

In another case the stock was purchased by a new owner. Shortly after the transaction was completed, the operator was given an ultimatum—either grant a larger loan or take the phonograph out of service. When the operator refused the larger loan, the phonograph was taken out of service and placed on the street. Arbitration proceedings were demanded. Before any further proceedings could be taken, the matter was adjusted, and the phonograph was returned to service. This took only fifteen days.

The following situation arose after a sale of stock to a new owner. The location took the existing phonograph out of service. A demand for arbitration was made, and after two hearings were held, a consent award was entered into. The phonograph has been reset, and the location has agreed to pay money damages.

Major Breakthrough Achieved

There are still many more cases to be heard. But the important point is that a major break-through has been achieved. An industry that has been exposed to bad publicity; that has been subject to Congressional investigation; that has been subject to invasion by persons of ill-repute, has suddenly reached a place where it can stand on its own feet, and obtain relief quickly and with dispatch. Now the coin machine industry has attained a position which will enable it to go forward without fear of reprisals. It has found a tribunal which will give it a fair opportunity to present its proof and obtain the relief that is so necessary to its well being.

The MONY contract is an excellent one. It is proven. It does not require the fatigue inducing waits in Court. It affords a forum which will grant it rapid relief. In arbitration proceedings the operator can obtain an injunction under the contract, specific performance, money damages, and any other form of relief. The contract provides for arbitration before one arbitrator; it provides for arbitration proceedings in the absence of one party to the agreement.

The proceeding can be instituted in one of two ways. It can be begun by the service of the demand for arbitration by either registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, or by the personal service of a "ten day notice". Either method has its own advantages. But the important consideration is that the operator now has a fool-proof document with substance and which can assure him of a better opportunity of increasing his operation and of KEEPING his route intact.

One thing is certain. With the passing of time, many location owners will discover that you cannot sell your businesses without having the operator's contract assumed by the buyer. For otherwise the seller will be obliged to pay damages for the balance of the term of the contract which the buyer failed to assume.

Surely the phonograph should not be treated in a different manner than an existing conditional bill of sale which is a lien on the fixtures. But the impression in the industry is that this is one contract that can be breached willy-nilly and no one can enforce it. This is no longer true. The MONY contract is enforceable and this can be done quickly and with dispatch.

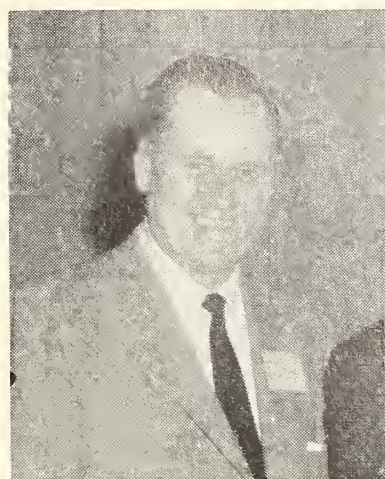
American Arbitration Association Acclaimed

In any discussion of this nature one must say a word about the tribunal which administers the arbitration phase of the contract. The American Arbitration Association has done a tremendous job in assisting the writer in setting up the program. They have put their facilities at his disposal. They have tried at all times to comply with the aims and desires of all parties before it. Their most impartial and meticulous handling of the claims has left nothing to be desired.

For an organization that desires an administrator with high ideals, magnificent facilities and admirable qualities, you do not have to look far. The American Arbitration Association has everything to service and to assist an industry out of chaos, such as the phonograph industry found itself embroiled in. By rapid, impartial action this industry should soon find itself in a position where its contracts will be recognized as binding, with mutuality of obligation and with a respectability that properly belong to it.

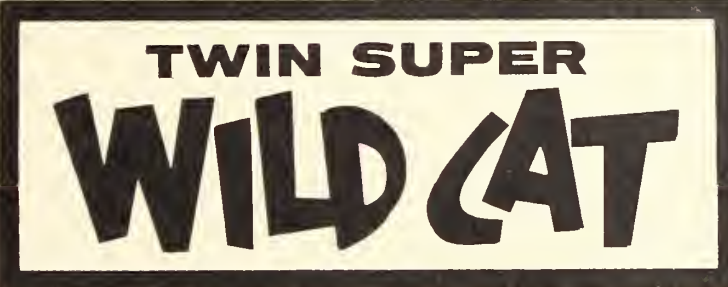
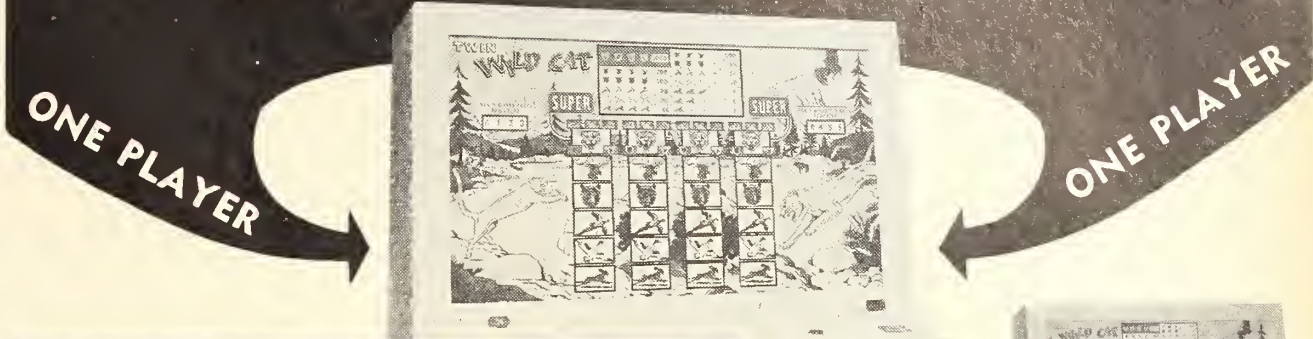
The amplifier sells for \$89.50 and is currently being distributed through each State Distributing Company, Atlanta; F.A.B. Distributing Company, New Orleans; and Rex-Bilotta Corporation, Syracuse.

While the unit does not provide a stereophonic sound it does separate highs and lows on monaural records channeling the sounds through two speaker systems thereby creating a wider range of sound which, according to Cornet, "fills a room with music". The unit has been designed for juke box operators who are reluctant to install stereo phonographs in certain locations that do not warrant the expenditure. While the amplifier was invented by H. C. Hogencamp, of Columbus, the unit was designed by each State Music Company engineers for juke box use. According to Cornet, research, and development and promotional costs are being financed by the Martin Theater Corporation, movie house chain with several hundred theaters in the South.

Cornet advised that inquiries from European music machine manufacturers and distributors have resulted in a program calling for travel to several European countries for personal contact with interested coin firms. Stereomonic Company will exhibit its amplifier at the forthcoming MOA Convention in Chicago.

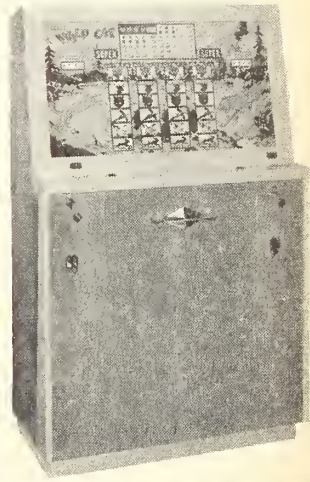

panel on the backbox, below the race track, from which the player selects his horse for the race. The object then is to advance his horse to win the race and earn extra points. The horses are numbered from '1' to '6'."

Lewis further explained that the pop bumpers on the constantly rotating turntable are marked from "1" to "6", and that the player would, of course, attempt to hit the pop bumper on the turntable to coincide with the number of his racing horse. Bottom rollovers also advance horses.

There is added fast action on the playerfield with several cyclonic kickers and two flippers at the bottom of the playfield.

Lewis also stated that Williams Electronics added another important innovation by moving the coin chute to the steel front door panel. The new coin chute, according to Lewis, is completely fool-proof. "In fact, it is virtually impossible to cram foreign objects in the slot." The game also includes the many other previously successful Williams Electronics pinball features.

"With the usually lush spring season practically upon us," Lewis concluded, "we know we have a strong entry in our 'Nags' 5-ball pinball amusement game, and we are going all-out in production. Location pretests have proved this fact to us."

CHICAGO—"The emphasis, in Williams Electronics' newest pinball game, 'Nags', is definitely an innovation," asserted Sam Lewis, vice-president and director of sales, as he explained the commanding features of the pinball amusement game, last week, in an interview.

"In our designing and planning of 'Nags'," he continued, "we took into consideration the fact that players are drawn to fast action and animation. For this reason we have created a fast action game—with a constantly rotating turntable with pop bumpers on the playfield, and a three dimensional race track with moving (running) race horses on the backbox. "There is also a horizontal, light

2-way orange section—now the big new feature of 'Laguna Beach'—were so startling that we decided not to hold the feature for future use but to bring it out immediately in what you might call a pepped-up 'County Fair'—that's 'Laguna Beach'.

"What's the 2-way orange section? The answer is that, instead of serving only to release free Red Letter Games, as in 'County Fair', the orange section is also a scoring section. In 'County Fair' any 2 in orange section give player a Red Letter Game—next game free with guaranteed features. In 'Laguna Beach' 2 in orange still release the Red Letter Game. But 3 in orange section will score as green 3—if proper signal-panel is lit on backglass—and also release Red Letter Game. 4 or 5 in orange score as green 4 or 5—and in each case also give the free Red Letter Game," continued O'Donnell.

"I'll admit it doesn't sound like any 'revolutionary' advance, but it sure shows up in the cash-box. Of course, the 2-way orange section adds to last-ball suspense and gives the player an added opportunity to score. This naturally increases income, partly because of increased play-appeal, partly because the '3 Or More In Orange' signal is lit by coin-play.

"'Laguna Beach' retains all the features of 'County Fair'—the OK feature, Red Letter Games and all others—plus the bonus money-making feature of the 2-way orange section. Result is that, when we fill back orders for 'County Fair' with 'Laguna Beach', operators will be getting extra value—and extra earnings which we all know they need badly. By the same token, because we are chopping off 'County Fair', you might say, in the middle of the run, operators will realize a later benefit in top re-sale value. Sometimes a little thing has big results. That's the case now—a little thing like an extra juicy orange," concluded O'Donnell.

CHICAGO — Announcing "Laguna Beach", new in-line type pinball-game, Bill O'Donnell, general sales manager of Bally Manufacturing Company, this city, revealed that the decision to discontinue "County Fair" in favor of "Laguna Beach" was based on results—which he described as "startling,"—of location-tests of a new feature introduced in "Laguna Beach."

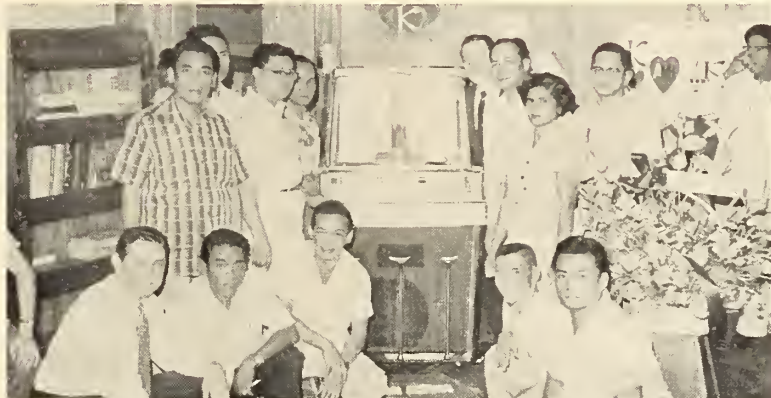
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Morcoin Shows Model "K" In Manila

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Coinman Decries Tax Situation In New Orleans La.

NEW ORLEANS, LA.—A coin machine operator in this area has expressed his feelings regarding the current tax situation as it applies to the coin machine industry. Following are his comments:

Local game operators have good reason to believe that they are the most highly taxed in the world. Here is a breakdown on what it costs in yearly licenses, taxes and permits on each game operated in New Orleans, City license \$50.00, State license \$50.00, Charity Hospital Permit \$2.50, Police Pension Fund Stamp 25¢, Personal Property Tax \$20.00 per game (approx.), Federal Tax Stamp \$250.00, Use or Sales Tax \$25.00, and this comes three or four times a year as new games are placed on location. All of this comes to a grand total of more than \$450.00 per year. It is this high license and tax rate, together with the exorbitant loans that most locations demand, that are the reasons some of the largest and oldest operators in the city are selling out their businesses. The latest operator to sell out was Antonio Bologna, who operated the extensive Double-A Amusement Company. If the cost of equipment, licenses and other expenses keep rising, no doubt there will be others selling out in the near future.

(Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

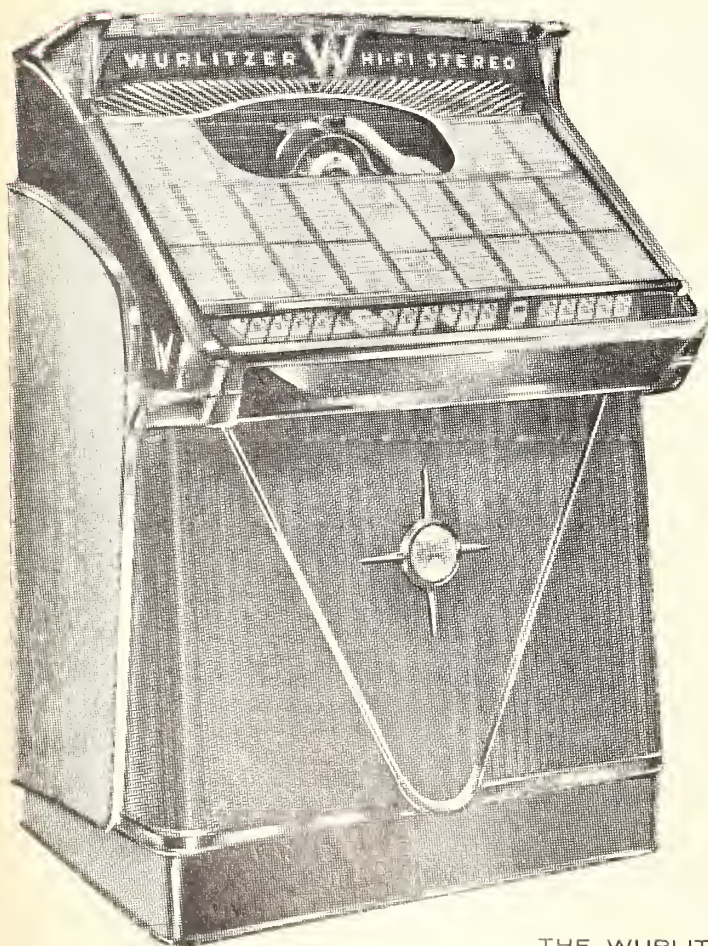

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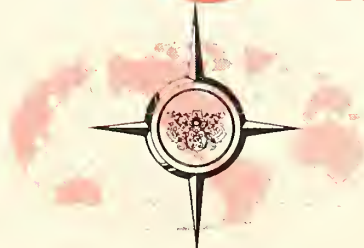
