MOA CONVENTION Record-Op Panel Featured

This year's MOA Convention which will be in session next week, (May 9, 10 & 11), at the Morrison Hotel in Chicago, promises to be, for the record industry, one of the most important and rewarding MOA meetings to date.

Although in the past, record companies welcomed the opportunity afforded them by the annual convention to meet personally with juke box operators and record distributors, the big complaint after each MOA affair was that a wonderful opportunity to meet in a panel discussion with operators was being overlooked.

However, this year, as a result of an intensive effort by *The Cash Box* and its publisher Joe Orleck, an entire morning is being devoted to just such a panel meeting at the upcoming MOA event.

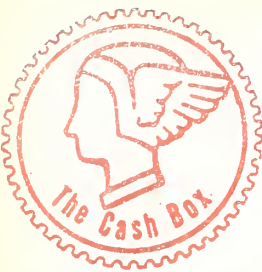
Records have always been the life's blood of the juke box industry. And in turn, the 500,000 juke boxes in America have always been tremendously vital consumers of

single records. Now for the first time, the people behind these two industries can come together and discuss problems affecting both.

At present, plans for the panel discussion are off to a great start with important record company personnel and key-one stop operators, who can contribute much to a forum of this type, set to speak. Too often, however, people attend such a conference expecting all industry problems to be solved. This, of course, is not likely.

But if as a result of this discussion, which will undoubtedly have operators turning out in force to air their problems, the affected parties get a better understanding of the others' difficulties, needs, and wants, then the forum will have been a solid success.

We are confident that this move by MOA to bring the thinking of two integrated industries out into the open will be extremely beneficial for all concerned.

Payola Probers Hear of Clark's "Outside" Interests

WASHINGTON—Much of the "universe"—as one witness put it—of disk jockey Dick Clark was revealed last week in testimony before the House subcommittee looking into payola. Before Clark himself was set to testify last Friday (at presstime), Congressman John B. Bennett of Michigan, a member of the subcommittee said that the testimony heard had made a "pretty convincing" case against Clark.

The highlight testimony was given by Philadelphia's Harry Finfer, vice-president of Universal Distributors and part-owner of Jamie Records, who revealed that Clark—on a \$125 investment in Jamie—had made \$31,375 over a 2½ year period (1957-59) from the firm. Clark purchased 125 shares in Jamie—at a \$1 a share—on June 16, 1957, and over the period he held the stock he was paid \$16,700. When Clark relinquished his "outside" interests last December as a result of his network's (ABC) directive, Clark was paid \$15,000 for his interest in Jamie.

Finfer said that Clark was brought into the firm because of his "expert knowledge" of the record business. He would go to Clark, with a new disk, Finfer said, and Clark would give Jamie "the benefit of his advice and experience." In addition to Clark's interest in Jamie, it was learned that Tony Mammarella—former Clark producer who quit the Clark show rather than give-up his other interests—received over the same 2½ years at least a \$1,000 from Jamie and \$4,000 from Universal for "promotional services." There were also two \$500 "gift" payments to Mrs. Mammarella for the birth of her baby. According to Finfer, Clark did not know that Mammarella was getting paid from the Finfer firms.

The subcommittee also revealed records which showed payments to deejays made by both Jamie and Universal. From May 1, 1958 to Dec. 31, 1959, deejays all over the country received about \$15,000 from Jamie, while from July 1, 1957 to July 1, 1959, Universal had paid about \$34,246.43.

Finfer said these payments were also given to deejays for "advice" on new Jamie releases.

According to Finfer, Clark again knew nothing about payments to other disk jockeys by the companies. "If you'd stop being cagy," retorted Bennett, "you could answer this: How much of the money were you paying disk jockeys to play your music and how much for listening?" Finfer replied: "I can't separate the two. We were paying for both—except in the case of Clark. We were not paying him for airing records. There were many Jamie titles he didn't play."

Rep. John Moss noted that while Clark was involved with Jamie, the diskery produced "only" 51 records, and he expressed amazement that the label would pay "thousands of dollars" for advice on such little output. Moss said he would write to the In-

ternal Revenue Department and Department of Justice for review of the Finfer testimony and inquiry into the matter of payments listed in the Jamie-Universal books as "promotion" expenses.

Earlier in the week, the testimony of Bernard Goldstein, vice-president of Computech, a New York electronic processing firm, and Thomas Noonan, research director of The Billboard, produced statistical figures on Clark's programming and influence on popularity charts which one subcommittee member termed "uncrystal clear."

Goldstein testified that he was hired by Clark to expose the "universe of Dick Clark." Goldstein said he analyzed every record on Clark's "American Bandstand" show between Aug. 5, 1957 and last Nov. 30. According to Goldstein, there were 1,885 disks played a total of 15,662 times. Of these plays, Goldstein said that 4,230—or 27%—were disks in which Clark might possibly have had a financial interest. Goldstein ran into a barrage of subcommittee skepticism about his computations when he produced a chart he said was based on best-selling charts from The Cash Box and Billboard, and which gave a "popularity score" of 23.9% for Clark-affiliated records. Rep. John Moss of California, said that the data had been "weighted to the interest" of Clark and that Goldstein has been "more interested in getting the account than in getting facts." This was denied by Goldstein who declared that the information gathered—amounting to about 300 pounds of statistical data—was his company's initial attempt at "data processing with semi-judicial implications."

Goldstein produced another chart showing that in Billboard's "Hot 100" listing, disks played on the Clark show

would have an "impact" of 2.336%. Under the questioning of the subcommittee, Goldstein could not offer a clarification of the percentage's meaning. He said he had received the figure of Billboard's Noonan. Noonan—who had testified earlier—was brought back to the stand, and when asked to explain the figure, said that he had arrived at the figure "in such a slipshod fashion that I can't explain how I arrived at it."

Noonan's prior testimony involved Billboard's methods of determining the popularity of records. "Does Billboard take into account," subcommittee counsel Robert Lishman questioned, "the fact that Clark and his companies have paid payola to numerous disk jockeys throughout the country to get his records exposed?" Noonan replied he knew nothing of this, and this area of questioning was dropped by Lishman. Noonan later said that Clark was currently the "single most influential person" in determining pop disk sales.

Billboard's editor, Paul Ackerman, was the opening witness in the renewed hearings. He said payola was an outgrowth of song-plugging and recommended the appointment of an industry commissioner or czar to keep the industry "clean."

The subcommittee also heard closed testimony. Those questioned included deejay Alan Freed, George Paxton, publisher and head of Co-ed, and Co-ed's Marvin Kane, Bernard Lowe, Cameo Records topper; Harry Chipetz, head of Philly's Chips Distributors; and George Goldner, prexy of the End-Gone-XYZ labels. Oren Harris of Arkansas, chairman of the subcommittee, assumed "eventually all of the testimony would be made public." He also said the investigation might run into Monday or Tuesday of this week.

The entire Decca catalog of C&W music is being made available during the promotion, which works thusly: dealers can select any twelve sets from the catalog and receive an additional LP of their choice free plus a 10% discount off the face of the invoice. Offer also includes all C&W EP's (minimum order here is 12 EP's).

To add further impetus to the pro-

motion, three new albums are being released: "Webb With A Beat"—Webb Pierce; "Good'n Country"—Jimmy Martin; "The Original Hit Performances—All Time Country And Western."

Two color bins, mounted litho cards and various other sales aids are being offered to dealers through the network of Decca branches.

Artists in the Decca C&W catalog include Kitty Wells, Red Foley, Goldie Hill, Jimmy Davis, Wilburn Bros., Ernest Tubb, Rex Allen, Justin Tubb, Jimmy Wakely and others.

Atlantic Ben King-Promo

NEW YORK—Atlantic Records will conduct one of its biggest artist promotions ever for Ben E. King, former Drifters' lead who is now a solo act. Campaign will be tied-in with King's initial solo outing on Atlantic "Show Me The Way" b/w "Brace Yourself." Atlantic promo men Larry Maxwell, Norm Rubin and Sammy Vargas are now attending to nation-wide promo on King's behalf.

King began his new career several weeks ago when he appeared at New York's Apollo Theatre. He did the lead work on such Drifters hits as "There Goes My Baby," "Dance With Me" and "This Magic Moment." King's move parallels that of Clyde McPhatter, who also worked with the Drifters, but eventually went out on his own.

NARM To Meet In Chi

CHICAGO—A regular board meeting of the NARM will be held at the Palmer House in Chicago, May 8th & 9th.

Stations Renewal Time Cut?

WASHINGTON—The FCC was last week reported "very close" to adopting the proposal that radio stations be required to renew their licenses in less than the currently required time of three years, if a question of their public service arises. This was revealed when the Senate Commerce Committee heard from FCC Commissioner Robert E. Lee as a result of his nomination for a second term in the seven-year post.

The Committee itself has advocated well-defined requirements as to the percentage of time outlets must devote to public service broadcasts. The FCC has drawn criticism from three members of the Committee, Chairman Magnuson of Washington, Monroney of Oklahoma and Yarborough of Texas, for failure to act in cases where stations the Committee has found station laxity in public service programming.

Capitol Debuts "Star Line" LP Series In May Issue

The pop releases are: "Sands At The Sands"—Tommy Sands (cut at a Sands' performance in the Las Vegas nitery; performer is the label's May "Artist Of The Month"); "Let's Dance The Cha-Cha"—Harry Ortega and the Caribo Tropical Orch.; Let's Dance The Waltz"—Hilton White and his Palace Orch.; "Let's Dance The Merengue"—Pete Balboa and the Nassau Palms Orch.

Packages in the series are identified by an eye-catching "Star Line" emblem and copy line, embossed in gold on the cover of each album. The disks bear a special label.

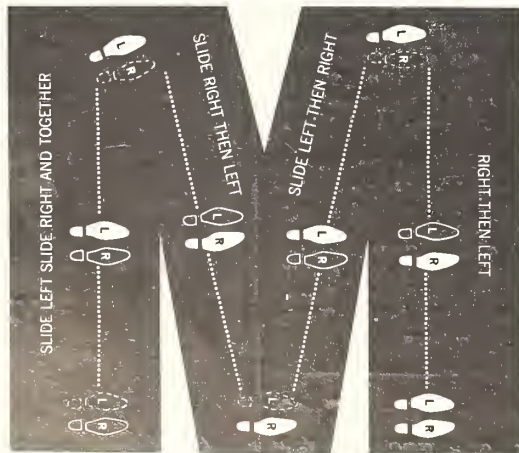

Before Governor Rockefeller signed a bill plugging a "loophole," high-priced talent—entertainment or sport personalities—paid-up at the end of the year. Their status was then classified as "independent contractors."

Artists on the "Iolanthe" release include Sir Malcolm Sargent and the Pro Arte Orch., the Glyndebourne Festival Chorus and soloists.

RIAA Reports '59 Disk Sales Near Half-Billion \$; Stereo 20%

NEW YORK—Record sales on the retail level last year were close to the half-billion dollar mark, according to the eighth annual report by the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA). Although final figures are not yet available, it now appears, the report said, that total manufacturers' sales for '59 will be \$255,000,000, and if all records were sold at list price, the total retail sales would be \$475,500,000. Thus, the industry continued to grow at about the same rate of increase—about 10%—established in 1958, when manufacturers net sales were \$198,000,000. The report added that stereo records "probably" accounted for 20% or more of all LP sales, but "this performance was not uniform throughout the industry," RIAA noted. "The growth in popularity of the stereophonic records," the report said, "was not as rapid as some had believed probable, and the limiting factor was, of course, the slow distribution of new stereophonic

phonographs. However, the instrument makers are encouraged about more rapid progress in 1960.

In noting the relationship between album and singles sales, the report said that last year albums "apparently" accounted for 65% of all sales on a dollar basis.

In reviewing the year, the report included a "noteworthy development" that seven RIAA members will report total sales between 2½ and 10 million dollars for 1960, which puts diskery's in RIAA's class "B" membership. When RIAA was organized in 1952, only three companies qualified as class "B" members.

The report also noted that although several new members joined RIAA in 1959, the association began 1960 with a "somewhat" smaller membership roster than it did in 1959. "This, with few exceptions," RIAA said, "is due to either consolidation of companies or withdrawals from the industry."

Marek New RIAA President

NEW YORK—George R. Marek, vice-president of RCA Victor Records, was elected president of the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) at the association's annual membership meet here last week (26). Marek succeeds Mercury Records' prexy Irving B. Green.

NEW YORK—Joy Records has pacted songster Chuck Howard, Dave Greenman, the label's national promo head announced last week. Howard's first sides are "Congratulations To You" and "Let Me Walk You Home, Jeanette." The former song was re-recorded here by Howard after he cut the tune (his own) in Columbus, Ohio, where Joy rep Johnny Farrow saw him perform.

UA Unveils May Pop LP Month With 5 Sets

NEW YORK—May is Pop Album Month for United Artists Records. The label is releasing a set of five albums this month, all of which are in the popular music field.

The list includes three dance packages, George Williams' Swinging Big Band in a set entitled "Put On Your Dancing Shoes," "Stanley Melba and his Orchestra At The Horse Show Ball," and Charlie Palmieri and the Duboney Orchestra with "Let's Dance The Charanga." The other albums on the United Artists schedule are music from "Can Can & Anything Goes" by Benny Carter and Hal Schaefer and Al Caiola's "Guitars, Guitars, Guitars." The latter album consists of six guitars recorded twice playing the original arrangements of a dozen swing era standards. All of the May albums are available in monaural and stereo.

Other albums making up the RCA Victor May Red Seal release are the Brahms Violin Sonata No. 3 in D Minor and the Bach Partita No. 3 played by violinist Jaime Laredo; "Roberta Peters in Recital"; Performances of the Ravel and Debussy Quartets by the Julliard String Quartet; the Mozart Piano Concerto No. 25 played by Andre Tchaikowsky with Fritz Reiner and the Chicago Symph. coupled with the "Don Giovanni Overture"; Robert Shaw conducting the

RCA Victor Orch. and Chorus and baritone Mack Harrell in performances of Bach Cantatas No. 56; the Sibelius Symphony No. 5 and "Karelia Suite" played by the London Symph. Orch. conducted by Alexander Gibson; Schumann's "Dichterliebe" sung by Cesare Valletti; and Creston's "Walt Whitman Suite" and "Lydian Ode" played by the Academy Symph. Orch. of Rome under Nicola Rescigno.

The entire May Red Seal release will be advertised in various consumer disk publications. Both Jaime Laredo and the Debussy and Ravel Quartets will bear self-selling stickers on their front covers and all the albums will be featured in an in-store streamer, as well as the dealer bulletin.

Mercury Extends Operation Springboard

CHICAGO—Mercury Records will extend its "Operation Springboard" for an extra fifteen days. The spring-time sales plan which has been in effect since April 1, will now be effective up to and including May 15.

"A number of only-partially filled orders have accrued through a combination of circumstances—over-demand of certain best-selling LP's being the major factor," said Peter Fabri, director of package goods for Mercury, in explaining the "O.S." extension.

"In addition, inclement weather played a part, with the April snowstorms slowing down transportation in many areas of the country. We feel

that the time extension will give every dealer the opportunity to buy in under the extra-large April discount, and give our distributors the chance to fulfill these orders," Fabri concluded.

"O.S." is similar in mechanics to Mercury's "Go Like '60" operation which made last Jan. the biggest month of any year in the firm's entire history. In over-all process, the current plan provides that for any or every purchase of ten LP's from the label's newest monaural and stereo releases the dealer is entitled to purchase sixty records selected from the entire catalog at an extra discount.

MGM Signs Vera Lynn

NEW YORK—Vera Lynn, popular British songstress, was signed to record for MGM it was disclosed last week. According to MGM prexy Arnold Maxin, Miss Lynn's recordings will be released simultaneously throughout the world on the MGM label. Both albums and singles are slated for her.

NEW YORK—There are busy months ahead for Connie Francis. The popular MGM Records singing star flies to England to headline the "Sunday Night At The London Palladium" TV Spectacular May 8. May 10—TV appearance in Germany; May 11—Variety Club luncheon in London, honoring golden disk stars; May 12 to 17—cuts three albums in London—May 18—"Europe No. 1" radio appearance in Paris; May 21—benefit appearance in Newark, N.J.; May 23 to 29—headlines at Blinstrub's in Boston, Mass.; May 30 to June 11—headlines at Sciolla's in Philadelphia, Pa.; June 5—appearance at U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis; June 12—Ed Sullivan Show; July 8 to 14—headlines at Diamond Beach Club in Wildwood, N.J.; July 18 to 22—headlines at Holiday House in Pittsburgh, Pa.

Flick opens in Michigan later this month. The Seattle Capitol manager stopped traffic in the city's downtown district by having balloons, imprinted with "Can-Can" copy, dropped from the roofs of theatres showing the film. Some of the balloons contained a certificate returnable to any dealer for a free copy of the album. "Can-Can"-dressed girls in Cleveland, Buffalo and Baltimore have been delivering LP's to stations and dealers.

Kooper has been connected with various publishers (Walt Disney and Santly Joy) and has had his own record firm and publishing companies.

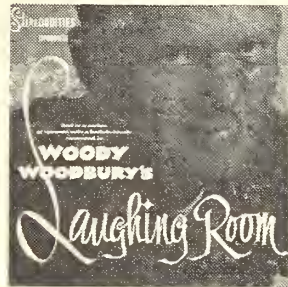

COMMENTS OF AMERICAN RECORD MANUFACTURERS AND DISTRIBUTORS ASSOCIATION

Summary

Because:

1. Free sampling of records to radio stations is largely responsible for the tremendous growth in the broadcast industry and the record industry in the past decade; and
2. Broadcast stations are serviced without regard to size of community or broadcast wattage of the particular station with free records by our members; and
3. Between 150 and 200 new records are made available to broadcasters each week, of which, only 20% ever receive airplay and only 8% become significant sellers, clearly indicating that there is no implied promise on the part of broadcasters to play free records; and
4. If stations have to buy records it will stifle the creation of new talent, place an unreasonable financial burden on broadcasters and bring financial catastrophe to the record industry. If stations have to give sponsor identification to records, public distaste will curtail the broadcasting and recording industry; and
5. The receipt of a free record by a broadcaster does not constitute a valuable consideration inasmuch as there is no obligation upon his part, real or implied, to play the record; should the Commission find that receipt of the free record and subsequent airplay is a valuable consideration, then it should apply the De Minimis doctrine meaning that the law does not concern itself with trifles and not require sponsorship identification.
6. The total availability of every form of music to every sector of the nation is the direct result of radio stations being permitted to receive records free of charge for actual air use—the restriction of this practice would deprive the public of one of its most important sources of educational development, awareness and acceptance of ethnic cultures and sheer enjoyment.

ARMADA believes that sponsorship identification as applied to free phonograph records is not required within the meaning of Section 317. We respectfully request that the Commission reinterpret Section 317 to achieve this result.

ARMADA Files Comment

CHICAGO—ARMADA has just filed comment with the FCC in answer to the Commission's "Notice of Inquiry" applying to the Section 317 interpretation.

Signed by Ewart Abner, president of ARMADA, and Roy Scott, the Association's attorney, the comment describes ARMADA's membership and goes on to say that "the existing interpretation of Section 317 is not in the best public interest, and is detrimental to the recording industry and the objectives of ARMADA."

The comment gives a short history of the simultaneous growth of the recording and broadcasting industries and states that the Commission is in error in its statement that stations in "major metropolitan areas" are favored by manufacturers who send them free records while stations in smaller cities pay for theirs. The ARMADA comment states that ARMADA members sample station without regard to size of the community or wattage.

In speculating as to the ultimate result of the 317 ruling ARMADA feels that if stations are forced to buy all records it will seriously affect the selectivity that radio stations possess in programming the greatest possible variety of material. ARMADA feels leading artists will benefit while new talent would be seriously hampered. In the event stations must announce donors or records, ARMADA feels that the monotony of these announcements will "disgust" the radio audience and impose a burden on stations that could result in loss of revenue.

The comment goes on to say that the FCC's Public Notice has caused serious questions to be raised by broadcasters as to the legality of their actions and dealings with the record industry and explains that record companies are closely allied with radio stations, and manufacturers depend upon the radio stations' weathervane to determine tastes of the public. Conversely, stations benefit from the manufacturers' designing of records which meet with the public's approval.

The ARMADA comment also describes the confusion caused in both industries as a result of the Public Notice.

ARMADA comments that "the receipt of free records marked 'not for sale' for audition and/or actual air use by broadcast stations does not constitute a valuable consideration for which sponsorship identification must be made under the act. Certainly the members of ARMADA do not feel that in sampling broadcast stations there is any implied promise to play the record or contractual relationship created between the parties." Laws are referred to in the comment to support the Association's position.

ARMADA concluded its comment to the FCC with a summary which appears on this page.

Cochran Memorial LP Featured In 5 May Liberty Releases

LOS ANGELES—In tribute to the memory of one of its leading young artists, Eddie Cochran, killed in an automobile accident on April 17 in England, Liberty Records last week headed up its May releases with a special Cochran memorial album. Five other LP's are featured both in monaural and stereo on the Liberty list for May.

David Seville, whose Chipmunk records have made him Liberty's top novelty artist, returns with an LP titled "Sing Again With the Chipmunks." Martin Denny, another of Liberty's major artists, salutes movies with an LP titled "Exotic Sounds From the Silver Screen," with a special jacket liner by Louella Parsons.

Chick Floyd salutes Hawaii, with "Little Grass Shack," with a selection of the island's most popular standards. Jad Paul is featured on the Liberty LP "Rebel." "Cool Heat" is the title of Ethel Azama's latest Liberty LP, a cross section of show tunes.

Don Bohanan, Liberty's national sales manager, will spark the May release program of his company, and set out last week on a tour of major cities, for conferences with Liberty dealers and distributors. Detroit, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, New York, Philadelphia and Chicago are on the Bohanan itinerary.

In Chicago Bohanan will be a delegate to the MOA meet.

Design Issues Its First "Compatible" EP

NEW YORK—Cy Leslie, president of Pickwick Sales Corp., which handles Design's "Compatible" Fidelity Records, announced last week the release of the first diskery's "Compatible" EP.

Like its namesake LP's, the 45 rpm "Compatible" EP performs with equal fidelity on both monaural and stereophonic equipment, according to Design. The platter was recorded by "Texas" Jim Robertson and features two new Western tunes on one side, ("Carry On" and "A Woman") and a five minute rendition of the cowboy classic "The Great Divide" on the reverse.

Leslie stated that the recording was made as a result of "letters and phone calls that Pickwick has received from juke box operators and distributors all over the country asking for a 45 rpm "Compatible" record that they could use on their machines." "These requests," Leslie said, "have been building in volume since the news of the "Compatible" recording first appeared in the trade papers. We have a ready made market for this and future EP's on the more than 500,000 juke boxes in the U.S."

Sign June Valli For Soundtrack Vocal

NEW YORK — June Valli, currently hitting via her hit Mercury recording of "Apple Green," has been signed by Joseph E. Levine to sing the new love ballad, "Evening Star" in his forthcoming pic spectacle, "Hercules Unchained."

The song, with lyrics by "Starduct" author Mitchell Parish, will be heard in several key sequences in the Warner Bros. release, which will be presented throughout the country in early summer.

The voice of Miss Valli, and variations of the music, written by European composer Enzo Masetti, will also be woven into the film's narrative background score. In addition, Mercury is currently formulating plans to release the first recording of the ballad, featuring Miss Valli, prior to the film's first engagements.

"Hercules Unchained" stars Steve Reeves, Sylva Koscina and Sylvia Lopez.

Victor Boston Pops LP Special Reported Clicking

NEW YORK—RCA Victor's Boston Pops 75th anniversary album "Everything But The Beer" has received one of the biggest initial orders in Red Seal history, the label reported last week. At the moment, Victor distributor orders are outrunning the double-LP set's initial pressing and Victor plants are working overtime to make up the gap.

The Pops package was developed as part of a joint promotion with the Anheuser-Busch Company of St. Louis, brewers of Budweiser Beer. Each album, in addition to the two LP's, contain two red-glazed beer mugs bearing special Boston Pops anniversary inscriptions. There is also a special price offer to the consumer if he wants additional mugs from the Shawnee Pottery Company, the manufacturers of the mugs themselves.

"Everything But The Beer" will get special featured treatment in a two-color, square column ad in various consumer mags.

For dealer use, Victor has prepared a variety of point-of-sale and local advertising material. A major display in full color is being shipped now for either window or counter use. Budweiser is distributing one thousand displays and sample packages to its distributors. The album is being featured on Victor's regular release streamer and dealer bulletin. In addition, ad mats in various sizes are available.

Arthur Fiedler, conductor of the Pops, will make several appearances on national TV and radio shows in conjunction with the release of the album and the album itself will be the center of a one-minute commercial on "Bonanza."

On a local level, Victor distributors are working closely with Budweiser Beer wholesalers on special promotions. "Everything But The Beer," for example, was launched in the Boston area this week at a special dealer meeting held by the Eastern Co. which was attended by Arthur Fiedler. At that time, a special dealer contest was set up by the Boston distributor and plans for collaboration with the local Budweiser Beer distributor outlined.

19 Columbia Albums For May Release

NEW YORK—Nineteen new albums are slated for May release by Columbia Records. A breakdown shows one special album of current popular hits, eight popular, four jazz, five Masterworks and one Adventure in Sound.

A special release in the popular field, "The Hitmakers," spotlights Columbia's top-selling artists with current best-sellers. Included are two hits presently among the top five on best-seller charts—"Greenfields" by the Brothers Four and "Sink the Bismarck" by Johnny Horton. Other Columbia stars represented are Doris Day, Tony Bennett, Johnny Mathis, Percy Faith, Mitch Miller, Frank De Vol, Marty Robbins, Ray Bryant, Kitty Kallen and Jerry Vale.

Regular popular releases for May include four debut performances for the label: "Like Love" presents this year's Academy Award winner Andre Previn in twelve songs with love in

their titles; "Swinging Dors" introduces British film star Diana Dors in her first vocal effort; "Torch Song" presents Sylvia Syms in a group of intimate, lyric ballads; and "Lopez Playing" headlines Vincent Lopez, his piano and his orchestra.

Remaining popular releases are: "Four Seasons of Love," a salute to romance by song stylist Polly Bergen; "The Band With That Sound—Les Elgart and His Orchestra"; "Madison Time," jazz pianist Ray Bryant's treatment of the nation's new dance craze; and finally, "Frankie Yankovic Plays the All-Time Great Waltzes."

Four May jazz releases include: "Southern Scene" by The Dave Brubeck Quartet; "Mingus Dynasty" featuring Charles Mingus and His Jazz Groups; "LeGrand Piano" in which jazz pianist Michel LeGrand and His Trio describe the city of Paris in the jazz idiom; and "And Then They Wrote . . ." with pianist Teddy Wilson playing twelve songs by a dozen of the greatest jazz pianist-composers.

In the Masterworks category, pianist Alexander Brailowsky makes his debut on the label with Chopin's Preludes, Opus 28 which Columbia is issuing in honor of the 150th anniversary of the composer's birth.

Remainder of classical releases include: Mendelssohn's Piano Concerto No. 2 in D Minor performed by Rudolf Serkin pianist, with the Columbia Symphony Orchestra conducted by Eugene Ormandy and Concerto No. 1 in G Minor for Piano and Orchestra in which the pianist is heard with Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra; four Concerti four Diverse Instruments by Vivaldi with Leonard Bernstein conducting the New York Philharmonic and soloists Harold Gomberg, John Wummar, and William Haim; the Budapest String Quartet in Mozart's Quintet for Clarinet and Strings in A Major with David Oppenheim, Clarinetist, and "Eine Kleine Nachtmusik"; and an album by Spanish classical guitarist Renata Tarrago.

Sole offering from Columbia's "Adventures in Sound" series is "The New Trio Los Panchos" which teams young Puerto Rican singer Johnny Albino with Alfredo Gil and Chucho Navarro for the first time on records.

Coral Pacts Novelty Group

NEW YORK—Coral Records' A & R staffer Jack Hansen has completed negotiations with Don Reed of Kartune Productions for extensive recording of Susie Singer with Sammy Saxophone and the Toy Band. The group is actually comprised of the Jack Halloran Singers, who will record under a pseudonym.

The first two sides released this week are "High Hopes" (the Academy Award winner for this year) coupled with "Going My Way" (the Academy Award winning tune from "Going My Way").

Negotiations are also under way for an animated cartoon motion picture series featuring the group. Future releases will be planned to feature other artists in the group.

Rank's Levy Says Heavier Ad-Promo Sked Answer To FCC Ruling's Effect On New Talent

Roulette Signs Gracie

NEW YORK—Roulette Records last week announced the signing of rock 'n' roll singer Charlie Gracie who is best known for his smash recording of "Butterfly." Gracie was formerly on the Cameo label, and his other money-makers include "Fabulous," "Cool Baby," "Ninety Nine Ways," "I Love You So Much It Hurts," and "Wanderin' Eyes." Gracie has made numerous theatre and club appearances all over the U. S. Gracie is well-known overseas, having made a tour of England in 1957 and 1958, highlighted by an appearance at the London Hippodrome.

Joe Reisman, who signed Gracie, stated that the singer's first release is scheduled for May 15th.

11 New Harmony LP's

NEW YORK—Columbia Records is releasing eleven albums on its Harmony label in May.

The month's selection include a language record, "Basic French," that offers ten French lessons by Howard G. Harvey, Professor of French at the University of Rochester.

Another novelty is "Allen Funt's Candid Microphone," a collection of people caught in unguarded moments.

Popular albums are by established stars and include: "Lavender Blue" by Dinah Shore; "I Could Have Danced All Night" by Ted Straeter; "Great Bands!" by various top orchestras; and "The Dance Beat of Xavier Cugat and His Orchestra."

Other categories are represented with: "Sacred Songs" by Wilma Lee and Stony Cooper, country and western artists; "The Whiffenpoof Song and Other Great Choral Favorites" by the De Paur Chorus; and "Rhapsody in Blue" featuring Liberace in classical selections.

Two releases in stereo only are "Windjammer" with Art Lowry in songs from the Cinemiracle production and "Hi-Fi Holiday for Banjo" featuring banjoist Joe Maphis.

Blaine Home Robbed

NEW YORK—The home here of Jerry Blaine, Jay-Gee Records prexy, was robbed by two thieves last week (26) of jewelry and furs worth \$73,000 and \$500 in cash. By the middle of the week, a suspect was picked-up by police.

The thieves gained entrance into the house by posing as policemen who had information regarding Blaine's son, in the Army stationed in South Carolina. Both Blaine and his wife, Anne, were forced into the upstairs bedroom and bound hand and feet with adhesive tape.

NEW YORK—Pointing to an advance "teaser" ad campaign plus a hefty schedule of publicity and advertising starting the week that the disk bows (2) Len Levy, director of sales for Rank Records of America, declared last week that the trade publications are now more necessary than ever in introducing new talent, seriously handicapped many say by the FCC 317 ruling.

In a letter to his distributors, Levy stated: "In light of the present radio station situation, we all know how difficult it has become to gain a showcase for new talent. After hearing Jerry Jackson's first recordings, 'A Chance To Prove My Love' and 'For Each One There's Someone,' we felt it imperative to create as much interest as possible in this outstanding talent." Levy went on to say that the combination of trade paper advertising plus publicity ballyhoo creates advance interest on the part of the radio station when a record by an unknown is presented to them. While this was always considered an important means of introducing new artists, this is the first statement by a major disk executive that the FCC's Section 317 has made such press exploitation "imperative."

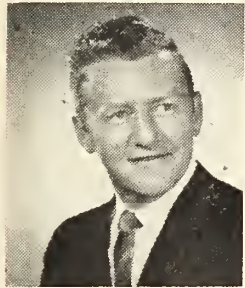

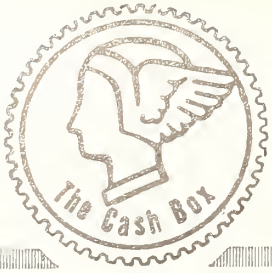

Album Reviews

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK

"UNFORGETTABLE" — Dinah Washington — Mercury SR 60232

Latest in the thrush's string of albums geared to her new-found pop acceptance features her in a brace of ballad evergreens plus a few blues. The string and chorus accompaniment contrast and therefore point up the singer's vinegary, earthy qualities. Among the selections are "This Love Of Mine," "The Song Is Ended," "When I Fall In Love," "A Bad Case Of The Blues" and the hit title tune. Chart material.

"LINGER AWHILE"—Billy Vaughn—Dot DLP 3275

Count this album in as the latest in Billy Vaughn's fantastic string of hit instrumental albums. Unlike his last one, "A Summer Place," which was quiet mood music, this set puts more emphasis on gimmick attraction: whining sax deep in echo over a pronounced rocking beat. Much more in line for a teen audience. Among the tunes are "Whispering," "Red River Valley," "Side By Side" and "Do I Worry."

"HIT ME AGAIN"—Jonah Jones—Capitol T 1375

The muted trumpet of Jonah Jones is in full swing again rapping out his appealing sound on such likeable tunes as "Gentlemen Jimmy," "High Hopes," "Moten Swing" and "The Surrey With The Fringe On Top." Vocally he's also in a groove on "Blueberry Hill" and "I'll Always Be In Love With You." A steady disk favorite.

"PROVOCATIVE PERCUSSION" Volume 2—Enoch Light and the Light Brigade—Command RS 810 SD

The ork leader's "Persuasive" and "Provocative Percussion" albums are in great demand by the sound bugs and this latest venture into the ping-pong world of hifi-stereo gimmicks adds another to the list. Light goes all out on the gimmick end and the dial twisters will have a ball on such cuts as "Matilda," "Temptation," "Hernando's Hide-away" and "The Natives Are Restless Tonight."

"SIXTEEN TONS"—Tennessee Ernie Ford—Capitol T 1380

The warm, personable Ford personality had its roots in such songs as "Shot Gun Boogie," "Smoky Mountain Boogie" and "Milk 'Em In The Mornin' Blues," and culminated in the smash "Sixteen Tons." This panorama of Ernie's disk career also includes "Mule Train" and "Cry Of The Wild Goose." His many fans will want to add this to their collection.

"LIKE LOVE"—Andre Previn, His Piano and Orchestra—Columbia CL 1437

With Columbia now in charge of the artist's disk talents, it issues a sort of follow-up to his highly successful "Like Young" LP for MGM. Previn, in the double role of pianist and ork leader, offers sublime mood readings of songs with 'love' in the title: "When I Fall In Love," "I Wish I Were In Love Again," "Like Someone In Love" and "Love Is Here To Stay" among others. Has that chart look.

"ALAN KING IN SUBURBIA"—Seeco SAW 2101

King's embittered comments on suburban living hit home with so much truth that at times the listener overlooks its humor value, but it is precisely this type of humor which has endeared him to so many audiences. This album is a composite of songs, sketches and monologues all dealing with the problem, or his adversity, to suburban living and will be greatly welcomed by the horde of suburbanites. He even has a capable voice, too. Can do very well in light of the current success of humor LP's.

"JACKIE PARIS SINGS THE LYRICS OF IRA GERSHWIN"—Time T/70009

The songster's feeling for and phrasing of the material here plus excellent jazz accompaniment make this LP one of the finest entries in the current disk "re-discovery" of the great lyricist. Ira did not collaborate with George on any of the songs but since he has kept himself in top-flight company away from George, the songs here are of a high standard. They include Kurt Weill's "My Ship," Jerome Kern's "Long Ago And Far Away" and Harold Arlen's "Let's Take A Walk Around The Block."

"SCENT OF MYSTERY"—Original Film Soundtrack—Music Composed by Mario Nascimbene & Jordan Ramin—Ramrod T-6001

First album from the new Ramrod diskery is the soundtrack music from the Mike Todd Jr. flick. The film is set in Spain and the music is appropriately bound up in lilting Spanish melodies and rhythms. Extra attraction is Eddie Fisher singing the two songs from the film, "The Chase" and the title tune. An enjoyable listening session.

"THE SOUND OF CHILDREN"—Hugo & Luigi with their Children's Chorus—RCA Victor LSP 2159

Genuinely charming and irresistible are the sounds of the children's chorus on this album. There is nothing new in arrangements or gimmicks here, just a chorus of 22 little voices blending on such "adult" songs as "Get Me To The Church On Time," "Lullaby Of Birdland," "Standing On The Corner," "Smile" and "Over The Rainbow." Hugo & Luigi have applied taste and freshness in their handling of the production and it shows in the captivating results.

"THE FRANZ LISZT STORY"—Harry Sukman—Liberty LST 7151

"Song Without End," the forthcoming movie based upon the life of Franz Liszt has prompted Liberty to record pianist Sukman in a program of the famous composer's works. Sukman also leads the orchestra in these popularized arrangements of Liszt compositions, displaying a fine technique for such a project. Selections include "Hungarian Fantasy," "Liebestraum," "Concerto No. 1" and "Sonata in B Minor." Good pop-classical item.

"RIDIN' HIGH"—Teresa Brewer—Coral CRL 57315

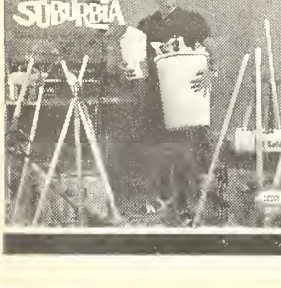
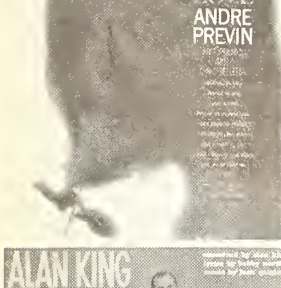
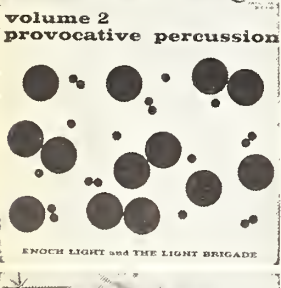
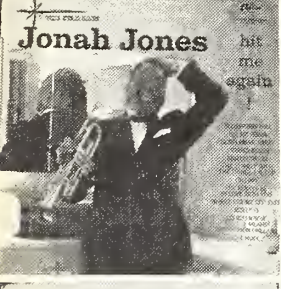
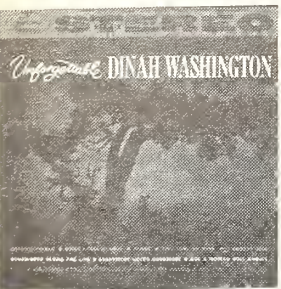
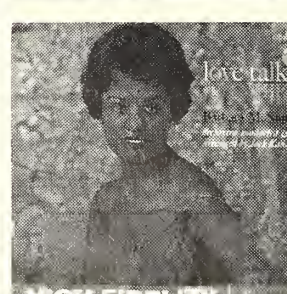
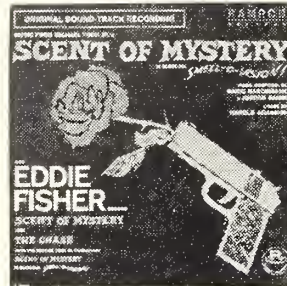
This is a completely different Teresa Brewer than the disk market is accustomed to. Instead of the usual cute, coy Tessie, this album introduces the coquettish Teresa, with love emotions and an easy-swinging gait. Even the material benefits for she has chosen such superb songs as "Just In Time," "That's All," "Day By Day" and "Lover, Come Back To Me." Miss Brewer has grown into a mature artist.

"LOVE TALK"—Barbara McNair—Signature SM 1042

Barbara McNair is a vibrant and captivating song stylist who can swing with verve or balladize a love story with strong emotions. This Signature date finds her doing just so on a bill that includes such fine vehicles as "All About Love," "This Could Be The Start Of Something," "A Hundred Dreams From Now" and "If You Love Me." Her voice is clear and she dotes on clearly defined phrasing. Thanks go to Jack Kane for the excellent arrangements. An all around appealing vocal package.

"101 HIT SONGS"—Lou Stein and his Quartet—Everest SDBR 1082-2

Pianist Stein offers two disks full of the most cherished pop evergreens, 101 in all. Almost an hour and a half of uninterrupted medleys, there has rarely been such an all-encompassing collection of tunes under one cover. And the Stein piano style, along with the proper rhythm help, is bright and airy right through, with maximum concentration of the melodies. An invigorating, worthwhile listening experience.

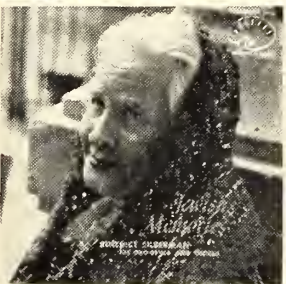
"HOME-MADE SONGS AND BALLADS"—Paul Clayton—Monument M 4901

Reputedly one of the leading folklorists, Clayton sings a program of original folk songs in his recording debut. Several numbers here are actually vintage tunes but are revised and retitled by Clayton for his repertoire. (i.e. "Pharaoh's Army Got Drowned" is actually the old spiritual "Oh Mary Don't You Weep.") Clayton is a fine professional entertainer and here with chorus and additional musical accompaniment offers such tunes as "Durango Jail," "Love For Love" and "Pretty Peggy-O."



"DOIN' THE HULLY GULLY"—The Olympics—Arvee A 423

Group that scored with the title tune continues to whip up a rocking storm on its first album. It's a violently explosive album, its eight tracks destined to get much teen approval. Numbers include "What'd I Say?" "Big Boy Pete" and "Dodge City" as well as the title song. Teen hoopers will get the message.



"JEWISH MEMORIES"—Benedict Silberman, His Chorus and Orchestra—Palette MPZ 1012

Silberman has put together an endearing concert of beloved Jewish melodies. He has lavished upon the songs orchestrations that pull out the stops on sentimentality and a wordless chorus is used to good effectiveness too. Instrumentation is basically Eastern European and Mid-East in its extensive use of woodwinds and percussion. Noteworthy is the slow treatment of "Bei Mir Bist Du Shoen." Other highlights include "Mekabel Poinim," "Rebbi Elimelech" and "Reiselle."



"THE GREAT DANCE BANDS OF THE '30s AND '40s"—Charlie Barnet and His Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM 2081

Of acute interest to jazz fans is this re-issue of old Barnet band sides cut when the band was riding the crest of the Swing Era wave. It includes all of the famous Barnet recordings: "Cherokee," "Pompton Turnpike," "Redskin Rhumba," "Lumby" and a pointedly timeless parody of the sweet bands, "The Wrong Idea." Sound is unusually good considering age of the disks and should occupy many hifi turntables.



"THE BIG BAND DIXIE SOUND"—Ted Heath and His Music—London PS 184

These tunes never sounded so good, or rather, it takes a precision unit as Heath's to give these old melodies a modern kick-in-the-pants, and send them swinging out as pure enjoyment. Everyone seems to be having a ball here, even the soloists sound more interesting than they have in a long time. Among the selections are "The Darktown Strutter's Ball," "South Rampart Street Parade," "Muskat Ramble," "I Wish I Could Shimmy Like My Sister Kate" and "King Porter Stomp." Solidly enjoyable session.



"THE TIME IS RIGHT"—Lou Donaldson—Blue Note 4025

Donaldson's excellent rhythmic feel is the factor, as heard in the opening chorus of "Lou's Blues." With Ray Barreto, Dave Bailey, Laymon Jackson and Horace Parlan laying down the infectious rhythm base, Lou and Blue Mitchell are able to romp easily across "Idaho," "The Nearness Of You" and "Tangerine." The two hornmen complement each other's warmth and expressiveness, and both are individualistic soloists. This is a very pleasant swing session.

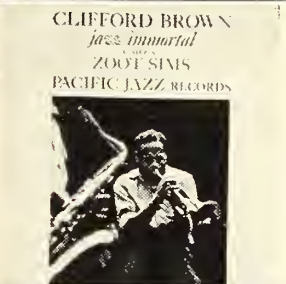
"SOUTHERN SCENE"—Dave Brubeck Quartet, Trio & Duo—Columbia CS 8235

Brubeck's second recording of "Southern" songs, but this time the pianist is in a more ambitious mood. Whereas his last such outing contained lightly swinging interpretations here he experiments with time figures and other Brubeckmania, foregoing some of the instruments at times for trio and duo readings. Desmond, Wright and Morello again prove their infinite importance to the group, getting lots of spotlight room. Selections include "Oh, Susanna," "Little Rock Getaway" and "Darling Nellie Gray."



"LET'S HAVE A BALL"—The Tyree Glenn Quintet—Roulette R 25115

The title seems to be the trombonist's approach to jazz. He is clever and humorous, being able to bring this off through his excellent musicianship. An exponent of the plunger, he uses it liberally here and also throws in a couple of vocals. Among the dozen numbers are "Angel Eyes," "Like Someone In Love," "Yesterdays" and "Sometimes I'm Happy." Easy listening in store here.



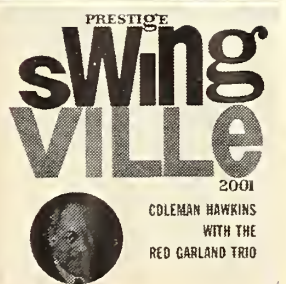
"JAZZ IMMORTAL"—Clifford Brown, Zoot Sims—Pacific Jazz PJ 3

This 1954 wax date bears testimony that a great talent was lost with the 1956 death of Clifford Brown. Playing Jack Montrose arrangements with Zoot Sims and Shelly Manne among others, Brown turns in stellar performances on "Joy Spring," "Dahoud," "Finders Keepers" and "Bones for Zoot," which the tenor star boots off in great form. In fact Zoot is in flying form throughout. Top jazz appeal here.



"MY GENTLEMAN FRIEND"—Blossom Dearie—Verve MG VS-6112

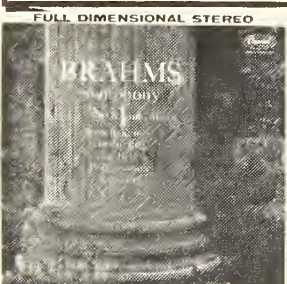
Blossom Dearie's voice is such an individual sound that it is with special delight that a new album by her is welcomed. Her bright piano runs are perfect accompaniment for that fresh, crisp, pixieish voice. And her material reveals her concern for little known and obscure songs. Here she sings "Little Jazz Bird," "You've Got Something I Want," "Hello Love," "You Fascinate Me So" and two French ditties. Her appeal is basically jazz.



"COLEMAN HAWKINS WITH THE RED GARLAND TRIO"—Prestige/Swingville 2001

Leading off the label's new "Swingville" LP series, Hawkins puts forth enough evidence to prove that he is still one of the top men on his instrument. One of the few old timers to keep pace with modern developments, the Hawk is playing even harder and with more fire than before. This set he is teamed with Red Garland's exciting piano, an ideal accompanist and an outstanding soloist. Give them room on "It's A Blue World," "Red Beans" and "Bean's Blues."

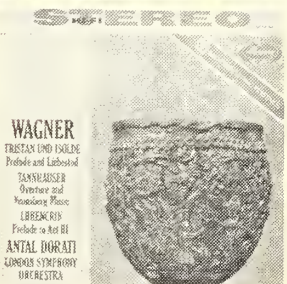
BRAHMS: Symphony No. 1 in C Minor—Rudolf Kempe conducting the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra—Capitol SG 7208

One of the sturdiest warhorses of the classical repertoire, Brahms' 1st, is given an exemplary stereo recording. Kempe's royal treatment of the majestic piece, especially of the many beautiful themes that dot the landscape, makes this a highly desirable album. The fourth movement is an especially rewarding one.



DVORAK: Symphony No. 5 in 1 Minor ("From the New World")—Leopold Ludwig conducting The London Symphony Orchestra—Everest SDBR 3056

Dvorak's powerful, stimulating picture of America, transcribed into his own Bohemian musical idiom, is heard here with resounding impact. Ludwig's interpretation is munificent in its broad, sweeping power. There is always a consistent demand for this work and Everest's fine stereo sound makes this a desirable disk.



WAGNER: "Tristan Und Isolde," Prelude and Liebestod; "Tannhauser," Overture and Venusberg Music; "Lohengrin," Prelude to Act III—Antal Dorati conducting the London Symphony Orchestra—Mercury SR 90234

The stimulating, vividly alive and gripping music of Wagnerian preludes are collected here in a beautifully designed orchestral picture. The "Lohengrin" piece is so different from the others, that opening side 1 with it, as done here sets the stage for the more tragic figures of the other selections. Excellent stereo sound too.



ENGLAND

Ron Bell, Exploitation Manager for Oriole and Embassy Records, has just returned from a nine-day promotional tour of the Continent. In Germany exploratory talks took place regarding the possible distribution in that country of the Embassy label. Bell also visited Herr Batzang, Import Manager for Electrola, German representatives for the Oriole label. In Hamburg meetings took place with Mr. Seeger of The Peer Musik Verlag Publishing House and in Brussels a call was made on the company's Belgian distributors.

Ronnex Records. Courtesy calls included B.F.N. in Cologne and the commercial station Radio Luxembourg where, Bell reports great reaction to "Little Christine" by Oriole's up-and-coming star Dick Jordan. On the same label Lorna Henderson makes her debut with a couple of cute catchy numbers "Steady Eddie" and "Lollipops to Lipstick," whilst another newcomer to the label, Neville Taylor waxes "Dance With Dolly" and "Free Passes."

The new Warner Bros. label this week presented the first "Warner Bros. Record Show" on Radio Luxembourg. Eight programs are planned in the initial series with Jimmy Savile as regular d.j. During a recent visit to New York Savile appeared on Radio W.I.N.S. exchanging views on the anglo-american record scene with Bruce Morrow. Savile, who for six years, has been Manager for Mecca Dance Halls in this country was this week awarded the Gold Cup for the top Ballroom Manager of the World.

The Decca Record Company gave a party this week for jazz singer Chris Connor in this country to appear in Granada TV "The Variety Show" after which she flies to Paris to cut a number of sides with The M.J.Q. London Records will shortly be issuing a new Chris Connor single "I Only Want Some"—a blues number written by Leiber and Stoller with accompaniment by The Stan Applebaum Orchestra. Her latest L.P. "Witchcraft" is issued here on the same label.

Tony Hall, Coral and Brunswick Exploitation Manager and popular Radio Luxembourg d.j. is delighted that the only female singer to make the British charts for some months is Brenda Lee with "Sweet Nothin's" on Brunswick—published by The Peter Maurice Music Company.

American teenagers living in Britain will form the "Juke Box Jury" of the popular BBC TV show on May 7th when the program leaves the usual studio setting and visits the American Dependant High School at the American base at Bushey Park, Middlesex. Producer Johnnie Stewart has selected four pupils whose ages range from 17 to 19 to make up the panel. All have been in Britain for some years and are interested in pop music and records. As usual popular d.j David Jacobs, now happily recovered from a bout of chicken pox, will be in the chair.

Vera Lynn who recently left The Decca Record Company after 25 years begins a new fortnightly series for BBC TV on May 7th. A number of Continental artists have been engaged as guests. Also in the show will be The George Mitchell Singers and Orchestra conducted by Eric Robinson. Meantime negotiations continue with several major labels for the services of this popular British singer.

American rock singer Eddie Cochran who had been touring this country and who was killed in a car crash on Easter Sunday was travelling to London Airport to fly back to the States. With him in the car were co-star Gene Vincent, song writer Sharon Shelley and agent, Patrick Tompkins, all of whom escaped with injuries. Vincent has flown back to the States for a rest before returning to continue the tour. Replacing Cochran will be Pye recording star Lance Fortune and Vince Taylor.

Nat 'King' Cole booked for two concerts at The New Victoria Theatre, London on May 14th, will also tele-film his own show for transmission in this country and on the American network.

The new ABC TV program "Wham" has plenty of new and novel ideas—most striking being the arrangement of cameras showing artists in the foreground with audience in the background. Top teenage stars lined up for the series include Dickie Pride, Billy Fury, Little Tony, Peter Elliott, Vince Taylor, Jess Conrad, Joe Brown, Johnny Carson. The program will be compered by Keith Fordyce. Producer: Jack Good.

Brian O'Hanlan, Public Relations Officer for London's Pigalle Restaurant reports that tickets for more than a quarter of the performances for the Sammy Davis Jr. season are already sold. During the three weeks season Sammy Davis with The Will Maston Trio will give two two-hour shows a night including Sundays.

Having completed the move into their luxurious new suite of offices in London's Savile Row Cyril Baker, Director of Belinda (London) Ltd. will be making his first trip to New York arriving on May 11th for a brief visit and discussions with Julian Aberbach of Hill and Range Songs Incorporated. Since Cyril Baker opened the London office of Belinda Music three years ago the organization has rapidly expanded and now comprises over 20 subsidiary companies.

Lee Silver, Independent Producer, Publisher and Manager of The Royal Teens is on a short visit to London to investigate the possibility of a tour and television appearances for the group whose Capitol disk "Believe Me" is No: 5 in the Italian charts. After London Silver will go to France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, Italy and Spain.

A capacity audience filled The Royal Albert Hall this week for the only London concert this year by famous conductor Mantovani and his Orchestra, making a fitting climax to his highly successful 1960 British tour. To mark the occasion Decca released a new L.P. "Mantovani Operetta Memories" presented in an illustrated full colour 12-page album. Later this year Mantovani leaves for his fifth American tour.

Just five weeks after release Lonnie Donegan's "My Old Man's A Dustman" on Pye has sold over half a million copies proving the fastest rising hit in the company's history.

Within two weeks of release the Pye L.P. recording "This Is Hancock" starring comedian Tony Hancock, reached the No: 1 spot in The Cash Box British L.P. chart.

With distribution now fixed in this country Warner Bros. has lost no time in releasing the Edward Byrnes-Connie Stevens disk "Kookie, Kookie, (Lend Me Your Comb)"—the year old stateside hit. Warner Bros. has high hopes that the Connie Stevens solo disk "16 Reasons" will follow its first success "Cathy's Clown" by The Everly Brothers into the charts. Also on the same label comes a new Bill Haley disk "Candy Kisses" backed with "Tamiami."

A disk debut this week on Decca by 23-year old Chris Wayne with "Lonely" a beaty ballad written for him by American song writer Buddy Kaye, with choral and guitar accompaniment by The Echos. Wayne and his Group were the winners of a recent talent contest and are currently on a three-month tour promoted by Jeff Jruger. Jerry 'Here Comes Summer' Keller has a new release on London "Now, Now, Now" accompanied by The Richard Wolfe Orchestra the backing is "Lonesome Lullaby." "Teenage Sonata" by Sam Cooke still in The Cash Box Top 100, is released here on R.C.A. and on the same label Elvis Presley's "Stuck On You" is still riding high.

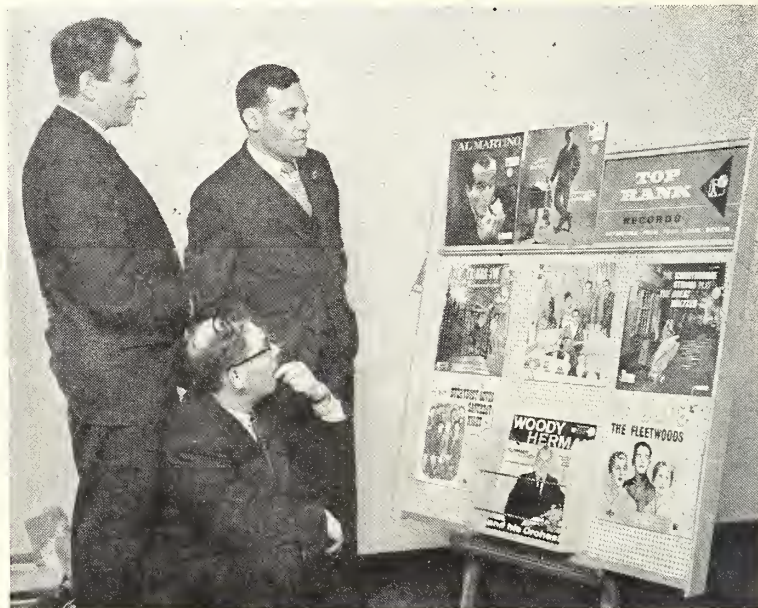

Rank Exec Conference



LONDON—Here to confer with executives of the Rank Organisation Record Division, Harold Friedman (r), general manager of Rank Records of America, admires a colorful display of albums in Top Rank's new low price "Buy" series with Bernard T. Ness (l), general manager, Rank Record Division, and Robert L. Roberts (kneeling), commercial manager, Rank Records, Ltd. From London, Friedman went to Paris to hold discussions with Hachette, a partner with the Rank Organisation in Rank Audio Plastics, Ltd.

From Top Rank comes the British release of three American hits including an attractive version of "16 Reasons" by Sheila Buxton coupled with "Good-night God Love You," "Cherry Pie" by Skip and Flip and the fast climbing Harold Dorman version of "Mountain of Love."

With two consecutive chart toppers to his credit Adam Faith goes all out for the hat trick with his latest Parlophone release "Someone Else's Baby"—with the same composer Johnny Worth and the same brilliant accompaniment by John Barry—Faith may well be the first British artist to achieve this distinction.

John Barry with a big band has his own new release this week "Beat For Beatniks" backed with "Big Fella" on the Columbia label. The fabulous performance of "Mack The Knife" by Ella Fitzgerald is now available on H.M.V. The backing is "Lorilei." Following the sensational success of his first L.P. released here "Inside Shelley Berman" H.M.V. are bringing out two tracks as a single—the titles are "Hold On" and "Nephew Trouble."

The latest waxing by Conway Twitty, due here next month for a 24-day tour, is released this week by M.G.M. The titles are "What Am I Living For" and "The Hurt Of My Heart."



AUSTRALIA

Full details of the next Lee Gordon show, scheduled for May, have now been finalized. The line-up is Crash Craddock, Everly Bros., The Champs, Marv Johnson, The Crickets, Bobby Rydell and the lone Australian on the bill, Lonnie Lee.

Show opens in Perth on 9th May, then Adelaide (10th), Melbourne (11th), Brisbane (12th) and Sydney (13th & 14th). This will be the first Lee Gordon tour to visit Perth in four years, the last one being the Stan Freberg Show. Crash Craddock was a sensation during his previous visit to this country and should prove equally popular here this time as his records are still hot. The Everly Bros. will be on their second visit and The Champs have also been here before. The Crickets have built up a big following here through their successful disks. Marv Johnson will be making his first Australian tour—although he was scheduled for a previous trip here this year but could not make it. His single "You've Got What It Takes" is doing quite well. Bobby Rydell is picking up plenty of fans following the release of his "Wild One." Young Australian star Lonnie Lee has two hot disks doing good business here, "Starlight Starbright" and "Ain't It So."

The No. 1 song of the 2UE Top 40 is "Little Boy Lost" and the three most interested parties had an exuberant Easter celebration. From an idea by top D-J Tony Withers, to his music publisher Jack Argent of Leeds Music, to composer-performer Johnnie Ashcroft, the resultant combination made a hit record for E.M.I. in Australia which Capitol America has already taken up for release. The song is dedicated to a four-year old boy who survived 77 hours in dense jungle country to be rescued by an all-out effort which closed all business houses in the local township of Guyra in New South Wales. It is expected that Tommy Steele, currently visiting Australia, will record his own version for British Isles release.

All of a sudden we have two albums released with the title "Shout." RCA has issued the Isley Brothers LP of this title, and the Johnny O'Keefe "Shout!" album is also available. O'Keefe's single cover version of "Shout" nudged the original—by the Isley Bros.—out of the top sales spot here some time ago.

Ken East, Record Sales Manager of the vast E.M.I. group of labels, has advised me of several important staff changes which followed the re-organization of the Record Sales Department. Kevin Ritchie has been appointed Record Promotion Manager for all E.M.I. records. Len Parry has accepted the position of New South Wales Record Sales Supervisor. David Nance has been added to the country sales staff for E.M.I. in New South Wales and John Jones has taken up the post of Metropolitan Sales Representative for the Northern and Western suburbs of Sydney.

Johnnie O'Keefe is now dubbed the "hit-finder" of the Australian record industry in addition to his title of Australia's King of the Rock. His first trip to the USA brought back "Starlight Starbright" a No. 1 hit for Lonnie Lee in Australia and "Bells Bells Bells" now making it for The Allen Brothers "down under." On his second trip, Johnnie brought back a new hit record for Lonnie Lee, "Yes Indeed I Do" plus some exciting songs for the top vocal group The Delltones and a hitmaker song "Sweet Thing" for a new artist Booka. O'Keefe supervises the recording sessions and then gives the artists a chance to promote their songs on his highly rated TV program "Six O'Clock Rock."

A new album released by Top Rank which should catch a good share of LP sales is "Just A Dream" by Jimmy Clanton. Clanton is enjoying great success here with his single of "Go Jimmy Go."

Eula Parker, composer of "The Village Of St. Bernadette," is back home in Australia for several weeks on a working holiday. Eula, who is also a vocalist, has already been signed for several TV shows—the first of them being an appearance on The Graham Kennedy Show, an hour-long national show.

Visiting American singer Billy Eckstine did a marathon job on Good Friday for the 3DB/Sporting Globe Royal Children's Hospital Appeal, which is an annual fund-raising appeal on behalf of the hospital. He endeared himself to thousands of Australians with his sincere efforts to raise funds and his singing performances in response to many pledges for large donation sums.

Pye Records look like making some real noise with Lonnie Donegan's "My Old Man's A Dustman." To add a unique touch of authenticity to their promotion literature for this release, disk-jockeys, radio stations and reviewers have received a delightfully concocted letter—on a dirt-smear letterhead—from "Dusty" Donegan, Refuse Disposal Officer (Grade 2). This record is definitely for stardom here.

Philips has issued the album Jimmie Rodgers "Hits" The Trail. With Rodgers' popularity increasing in the C & W field, Philips' expect this LP to do well for them.

In a smart move to cash in on the tremendous popularity of Bobby Darin in this country, Festival Records has issued an EP of Darin (from his American Decca days) with the Jack Pleis Orchestra and Chorus. Titles are "Hear Them Bells," "The Greatest Builder," "Dealer In Dreams" and "Help Me."



ITALY

After meeting Mr. Giannini of CGD at the San Remo Festival this year, Hal Neely, manager of King Records, Cincinnati, decided to publish an LP by Betty Curtis, a singer on CGD. Jamie Records has already published an LP by Betty Curtis.

Pat Boone arrived in Italy and settled in Venice for a few days where he will take part in some shows for American TV, with well known Durium singer Marino Marini and Italian movie star Pierangeli. He has been very warmly welcomed. The Corriere d'Informazione, one of the most important Italian daily papers published a large photo of him taken on his arrival in Italy. The artist is expected to go to Rome. Miss Bacchini of Decca Italiana informs me that the record "Words" by Pat Boone has been recently released in Italy.

Philips Italiana has had its first important appearance on the Italian best seller list with, "Por Dos Besos" by Francis Bay, and "Theme From A Summer Place" by Percy Faith. Only one record on Philips had previously been on the Italian list—"E' Vero" (It's True) by Marino Barreto. Corrado Lojacono of Philips Italiana is very successful with his new song, "Giuggiola." He had recently composed (with much success) "Carina" (Pretty). Philips Italiana is trying to release Frankie Laine's "The Valley Of One Hundred Hills" again. Arturo Testa, a Philips singer has recorded "Why" backed with "El Paso."

Maestro Alfredo Rossi, manager of Ariston, has published the song "Por Dos Besos" which is a terrific hit in Italy. In fact this cha cha is sixth on the Italian list.

"Mustafa," currently number one in Belgium, is published in Italy by Ariston. There are four record versions of this funny and odd record, one of the Vogue label distributed by Durium, the second on the Barclay label distributed by SAAR, the third sung by Marino Marini on the Durium label, and the fourth sung by Gege' di Giacomo on the Stereo label.

"Puppy Love" by Paul Anka, which was number one for two weeks on The Cash Box list is right behind "It's Time To Cry," which is third on the Italian list. VCM released the record, "But Not For Me" by Johnny Nash. Mr. Candida informs me that the sale of this record is rising, as well as that of "Tom Piliby" by J. Boyer, which won the Eurovision Great Prize of 1959 in London.

GERMANY

At the big Trade Fair in Hanover, which started on April 24th, the German phonograph industry will demonstrate the qualities of stereophonic sound to the visitors. Though stereo records and players had been introduced in 1958, they soon became important to the German market. In 1958, the German industry produced 150,000 stereo records, and in 1959 1.3 million were produced. During the same time the production of stereo record players grew from 110,000 to 550,000. About 80% of all record players in the past year have been produced in stereo.

In the German record catalogues, famous conductor Wilhelm Schneider is leading with 650 titles, followed by the Philharmonic Orchestra of London with 360 titles, and then popular German tenor Rudolf Schock with 326 titles. They are the top artists, and are followed by violinist Helmut Fadenias and the Symphonic Orchestra of Vienna. Deutsche Grammophon Gesellschaft offers 226 titles by the Berlin Philharmonic and 214 titles by Louis Armstrong. Teldec offers the Philharmonic of Vienna with 169 and Will Glahe with 168. The Lester Lanin dance orchestra on Philips has 194 titles and Benny Goodman 161. The top artists of Metronome are Chris Barber, the Modern Jazz Quartet and Ernie England. Actress Sarah Leander is the number one artist of the Ariola catalogue.

For the first time since the war, German record firms, Teldec, Deutsche Grammophon, Philips, Ariola and Metronome decided to sell the remaining records of the past, which still are laying in the factories. This shall be done from the end of April until May 20th.

In December and January, young German baritone Herman Trey will sing at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York, under the guidance of Georg Soltis. He will sing the part of Wolfgang in "Tannhauser" by Richard Wagner. He recently sang "Don Giovanni" for the first time in Cologne.

Teldec is expecting much success in Germany with The Browns' "The Old Lamplighter" on RCA and Johnny and the Hurricanes recording of "Beatnik Fly," on London.

After his successful engagement in Hamburg, Vico Tormiani will again go on tour. This time he will go to Moscow, Bukerest and even to Teking.

After "Mr. Blue," Detlef Engel has recorded the German version of the American hit, "Let It Be Me," sung in its original version by the Everly Brothers.

Stereo Highlight Of Hanover Industrial Fair

HANOVER, GERMANY—Stereo is the highlight of the 1960 Hanover Germany Industry Fair. Exhibits include stereo phonos, equipment and radios. In addition, there are displays of 4-track tape machines that both record and playback in stereo and short-wave radios for export that have two amplifiers for stereo disks or tape.

According to the German phono-TV-radio trade association, wholesalers last year were shipping their goods at rates from 50 to 100% higher than other consumer goods. TV sets and combinations had a 43% sales increase in 1959 over the preceding year. There was a 19% increase in radios and radio-phonograph combinations. Disk players, tape recorders made lesser gains of 6½ to 7½%.

Renato Carosone in U.S.

NEW YORK—Renato Carosone and His Sextet, the popular Italian group, arrived here last week (29) for personal appearances. The crew made their initial American TV appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show over the weekend (1) and immediately set-out on a cross-country concert tour. SCANDINAVIA

In connection with the visit of Nat "King" Cole, EMI of Sweden (Capitol Records) hosted a wonderful party at Grand Hotel on April 25th.

Pat Boone was greatly appreciated by his audiences when he gave his two concerts at Stockholm's Concert Hall last Tuesday (19th). However most of the critics were very cold the next day. Knäppupp Records, who handles the Dot label in Sweden, reports that the visit has resulted in higher interest and sales in Boone records.

First Swedish lyric version of the French song "Tom Pillibi" (Number One in the Eurovision Song Festival in London last March) is being waxed by debutant Marianne Nilsson from Karlskrona in Southern Sweden. Miss Nilsson has won several song contests and is now under contract to Philips.

"The Ballad of Caryl Chessman" recorded by Ronnie Hawkins and released in Denmark by Sonet, is spotted as a coming hit at the local Hit Parade. The Caryl Chessman case has been given more attention in the newspapers here in Scandinavia than it is getting in United States

The Swedish song "Är du kär i mej ännu, Klas-Göran?" (Are you still in love with me, Klas-Göran?) has been number one on the Hit Parades in Sweden, Denmark and Norway and will soon also hit Finland. The composer of the song, Stig Andersson, seems to have difficulty recognizing the "hero" of his song, since the name is changed in most countries where the song is sung. In Sweden he was Klas-Göran, in Denmark he became Klaus-Jörgen, in Norway he changed to Karl Johan and now in Finland he is introduced as Kustaa (which means Gustav). However, the song seems to be the biggest hit by a Swedish composer in some years in the domestic as well as international market.

Polyphon in Copenhagen has recorded "Hallo, Johnny" from the new Danish film "Köbenhavn, Kvinder og Kærlighed" (Copenhagen, Women and Love) which is expected to become a great longrunner at the Danish cinemas. Katy Böttger recorded the song.

Gröna Lunds Tivoli, Stockholm's well known outdoor amusement field opened for the season on April 22nd. Since almost the start of this century the opening day of Tivoli has marked the arrival of spring in Stockholm. Seen in a daily paper's review of the opening: "A rocket-inspired coin machine was called 'Send a Rocket to the Moon'—it reminded one of certain American rocket experiments..."

"My Fair Lady" has now been given 400 times at the Oscars Theatre in Stockholm, an all-time record in the Swedish capital. The LP record album with the cast of the theatre has sold around 35,000 copies, also something of a record for Sweden, as far as LP records are concerned.

Artists to be presented to the Stockholm public at the Gröna Lund-Tivoli this summer includes: Birgit Nilsson, Jussi Björling, Nicolai Gedda, Alice Babs, Siw Malmkvist and Paul Anka. The managers worked very hard to bring Elvis Presley to Sweden, which probably would have resulted in an all-time record for the spot, but had no success.

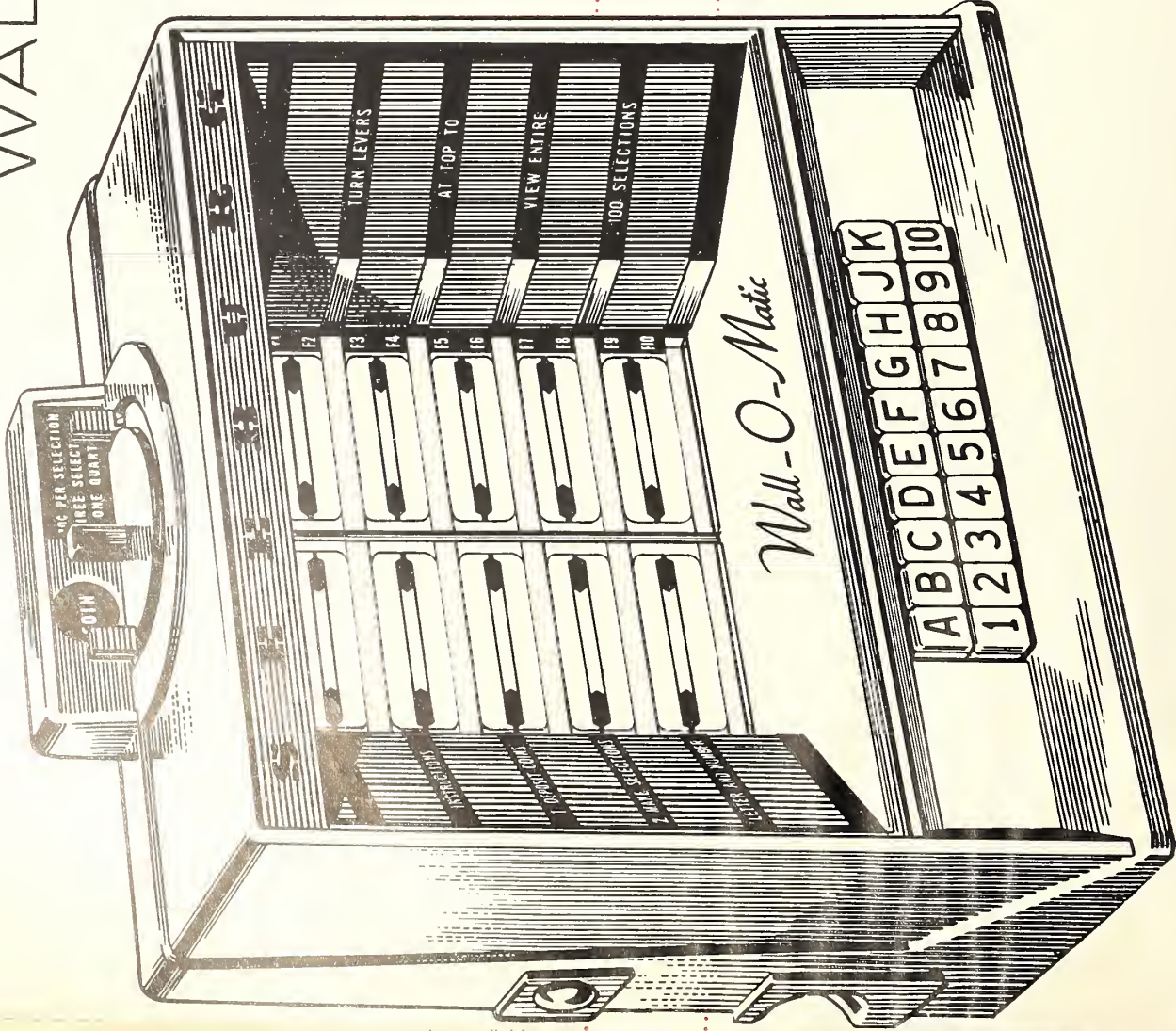

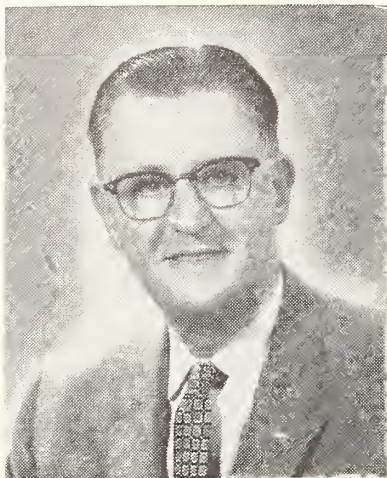
Miller Reports Sellout Of Exhibit Space As MOA Reservations Increase Expect 1000 Operators At Convention

Other top flight talent have agreed to perform, but at press time confirmation from Miller had not been received.

A special music forum will be conducted with representatives of The Cash Box and Billboard moderating the meeting. On the panel during the record manufacturer forum will be Kenny Myers, Mercury Records; Jack Burgess, RCA Victor; Bud Katzel,

Jones Reports Flood Of Coin Machine Council Membership Applications

CHICAGO—With the membership drive under full speed, Herb Jones, Chairman of the Membership Committee of the Coin-Machine Council for public relations summed up the interest with one sentence:

"I feel like the little Dutch boy who took his finger out of the hole in the dike," he said. "Enrollments are just flooding in!"

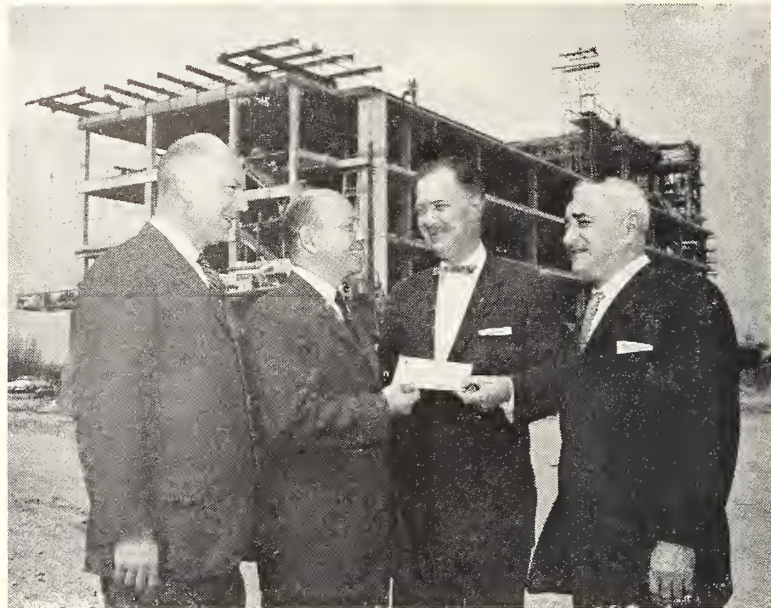

Gottlieb Memorial Hospital Receives First Installment Of Federal Funds \$213,000 Check Follows 25% Completion



CHICAGO—With Gottlieb Memorial Hospital construction 25 per cent completed, the institution was given its first installment of \$213,000 in Federal Hill-Burton funds.

Presentation of the initial payment out of a total of \$822,000, which has been allocated for the hospital under the Federal law providing for aid to areas seriously short of hospital facilities, was made at the building site at 8800 W. North Avenue by Jerome V. Ray, chief of the bureau of hospitals of the Illinois state department of public health.

Ray inspected the hospital construction and declared he was "highly pleased at the rapid progress in making new hospital beds available in this mushrooming west suburban community where medical facilities have not kept pace with the growing population needs."

Gottlieb Memorial Hospital was designated for Hill-Burton financial aid after a state survey indicated that

the west suburbs surrounding the site are critically short of hospital beds.

In accepting the first installment of Hill-Burton funds, Louis Zahn, president of the West Towns Hospital Association, observed that the Gottlieb Memorial Hospital financial campaign is still far short of its goal of \$4,000,000 for the building program.

"However, it has been gratifying to find that so many leading industrial firms in the west suburbs, cognizant of the community needs for more hospital beds, have enlisted in the drive to fill our financial needs," noted Zahn. "If we could be assured of the support of all industrial firms in this area in like measure to the backing we already have from companies which have contributed, we would go over the top."

Mencuri states that he will be affiliated with Southland Engineering, Inc., and that the company will feature a "new approach" to the kiddie ride business.

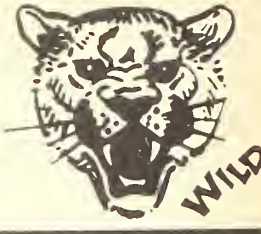
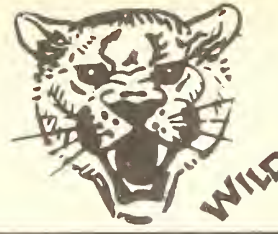
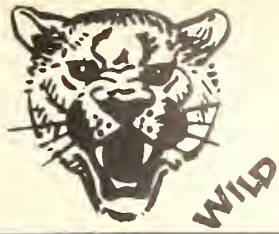
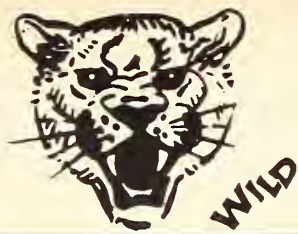
NCMDA To Meet Earlier

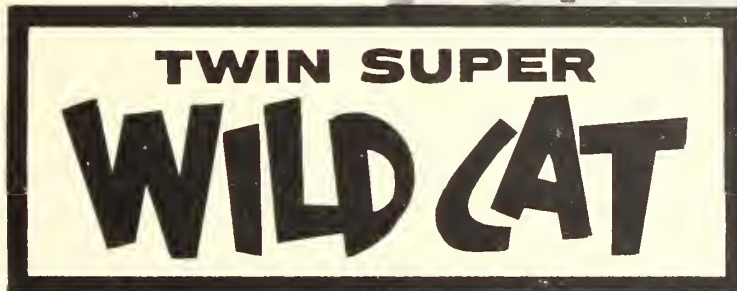
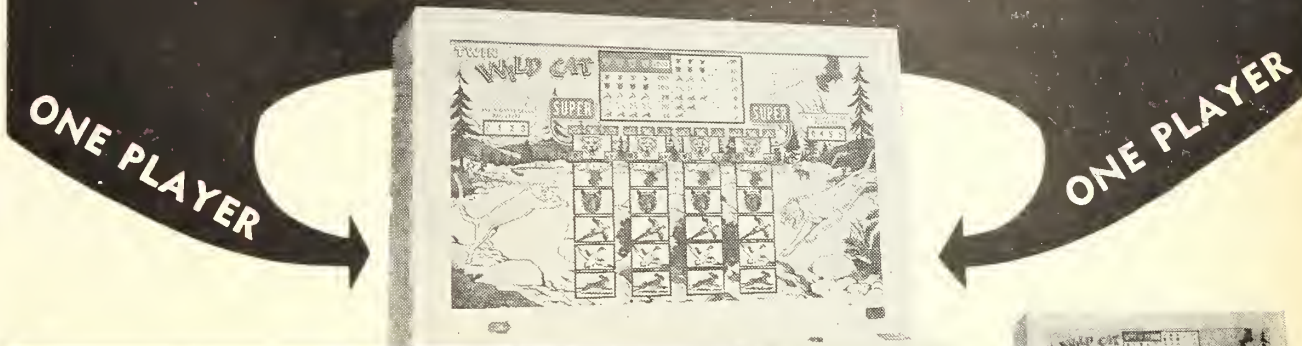
The board meeting will actually commence at 10:30 a.m. and continue until the noon hour. There will be every effort to dispense with all of the business on the agenda by noon.

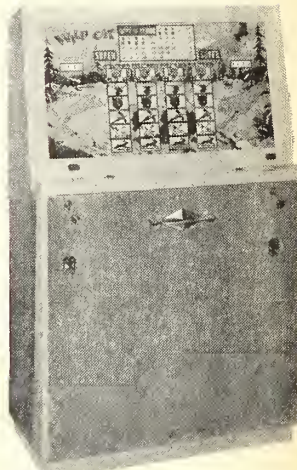

N.Y.C. Exporter Hits Back At British Distrib For Criticisms

Lays Fault At Buyer's Doorstep

NEW YORK—Following is a letter received from Meyer Parkoff, president, Atlantic New York Corporation, Seeburg distributors in this area, in answer to an article which appeared in the April 30 issue of The Cash Box. The letter was addressed to Joe Orleck, president and publisher of The Cash Box. It reads as follows:

I read with interest a report that appeared in *The Cash Box* magazine, the April 30th issue, the headline on page 50 which read: BRITISH DISTRIBUTOR CRITICIZES U.S. EXPORTERS FOR POOR EQUIPMENT, SERVICE. This news item brings to mind a similar report which overseas importers made against the U.S. exporters during the wartime period for the same poor equipment and poor service.



MEYER C. PARKOFF

Having been a distributor for many years and specializing in the exporting of phonographs overseas, I wish to take objection to this British distributor, who criticizes U.S. exporters. I lay the fault right at his doorstep for many reasons. The European importers can't expect quality merchandise if they are only interested in price and nothing else matters. Then again, they should take into consideration that their purchases should be made through reliable factory distributors, and not fly-by-night jobbers, who may give them a better price on equipment.

These are two very important objections that overseas importers should take into consideration. Quality merchandise from quality distributors means good prices. You only get what you pay for!

In the years that we have been doing business in the export market, I can think of no criticism that we have received from our customers concerning the quality of our equipment or the manner in which it was packed. We offer our equipment, and accurately describe all the specifications concerning our offering. Our customers rely 100% on our integrity that we will give them what they pay for. So far, we have adhered to this principle and intend to continue to do so at all times.

Another important factor that comes to mind that some European importers fail to take into account is the use of the cheapest routing to bring the merchandise over to Europe. These ships pile the merchandise one on top of the other and do not take extreme care in loading the merchandise that is causing the damage to the equipment.

Therefore, Mr. Orleck, I believe that the criticism that this British distributor casts at the U.S. exporters is not warranted and is definitely out of order. If he will analyze the situation carefully, he will realize that

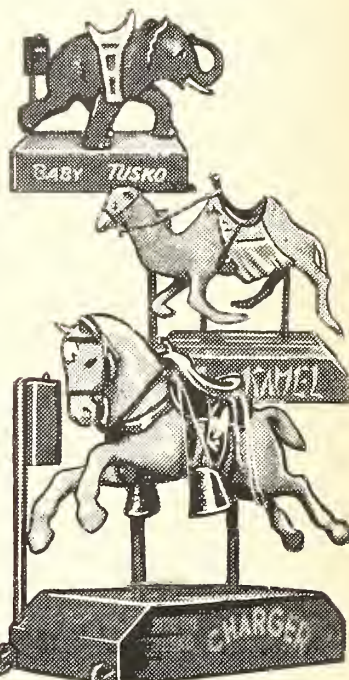
he can get quality merchandise from quality distributors at reasonable prices. It will pay him in the long run to do business the proper way, and not think of price as the ultimate product in his purchasing of equipment from U.S. exporters.

He said: "Right now we can easily foresee a 'baseball' production run of at least another full month. Possibly beyond that period of time."

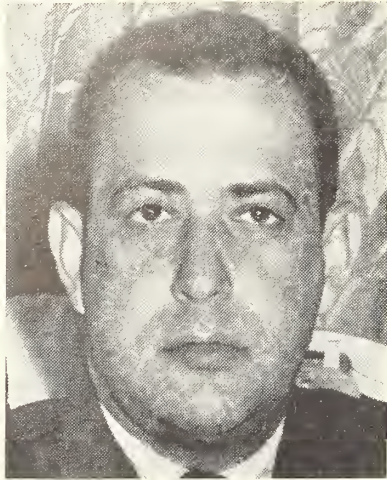

"Naturally," he added, "we are urging our distributors to submit only



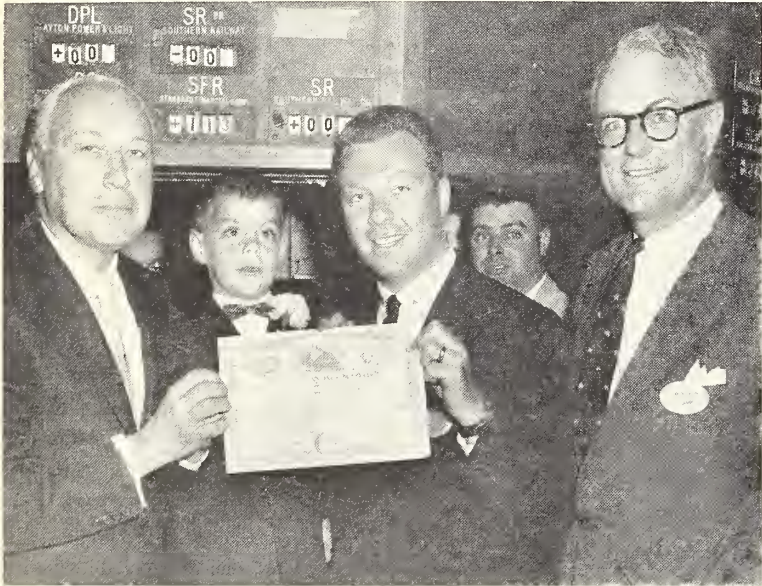

In 1959 Standard reported earnings of \$1,102,341 or 72¢ per average share outstanding compared with earnings of \$826,724 or 04¢ per average share in 1958. Earnings for the first quarter of 1960, ended March 31st, again reached a new high, totaling \$314,453, or 19.6¢ per share, compared with earnings of \$273,802, or 18.1¢ per share, for the same 1959 quarter.

\$65 Million Amusement Attraction To Open June 19th In East Bronx, N.Y.

"Freedomland" Expected To Rank With West Coast "Disneyland" Venture Backers Look For \$20,000 Daily Gross

NEW YORK—A \$65,000,000 amusement park project, fashioned after the famed Disneyland and designed by C. V. Wood who built the California spectacular, is currently under construction in the East Bronx section of New York City with a completion date set for June 19.

What was once a sprawling swamp area in an isolated section of the northernmost county of New York has been converted into a unique kiddieland for the area which hopes to account for a daily gross of more than \$20,000, from opening day through next Fall.

Theme of the attraction is Early America and "Freedomland," official name of the park, is actually a small sized United States.

The park's 85 acres are shaped like the map of the U.S. with rivers, streams, lakes and mountains placed in corresponding sections from "New York" to "California."

Special attractions will actually be staged every twenty minutes throughout each day the park is open. "Chicago" will "burn," stagecoaches will be "robbed," Indians will "attack" and "natives" will stroll the streets of "Little Old New York," complete with gaslights.

In order to reflect authentic feeling, Freedomland's backer's have imported hundreds of animals, saddles, canoes, stage coaches and burros, from all parts of America. Chinese junks will sail the waters of the California "gold

coast," while Indians, wolves, cowboys, (all stuffed), will perch from trees, behind wagons, atop mountain peaks, all as a part of the most extravagant amusement project seen anywhere in the United States with the possible exception of Disneyland. Three thousand employees will man the spectacle daily and will be appropriately dressed in costume, setting the respective scenes from coast to coast.

As expected, the concession division of this project will feature vending machines, arcade machines, and all types of coin-operated equipment. To date, the concessions have not been officially set and plans for opening day include paid attractions for kids and adults which feature rides in canoes, visits to special settings, and showboat trips, all in addition to the admission price which has been set at \$1 adults, 50¢ children.

Wood advised that Freedomland would be open in time for official ceremonies on June 19th although visitors to the area last week found portions of the amusement center incomplete.

Officials have designated more than 100 acres around the "United States" for parking area and the package was seen as the greatest potential amusement draw in this section of the nation. A real live Western atmosphere with \$65,000,000 in attractions could attract children from all over the United States and probably will.

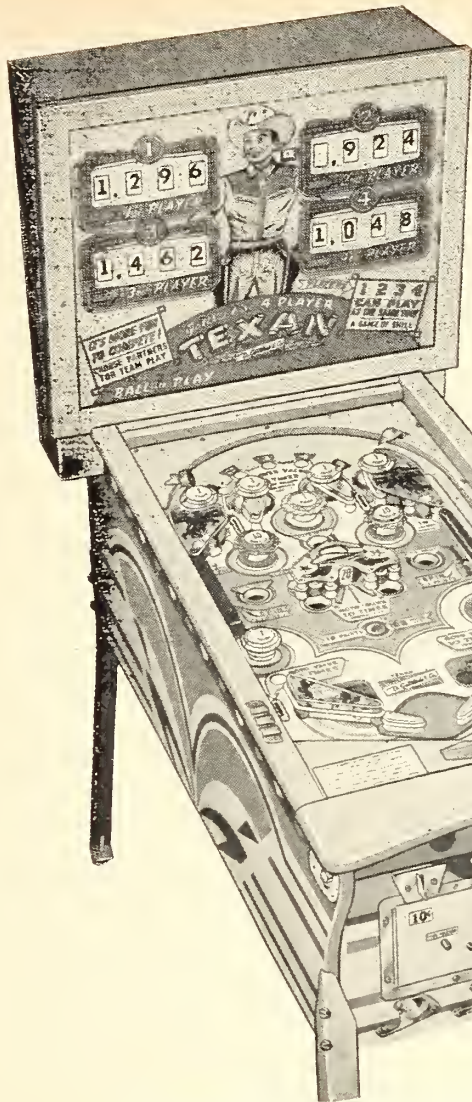

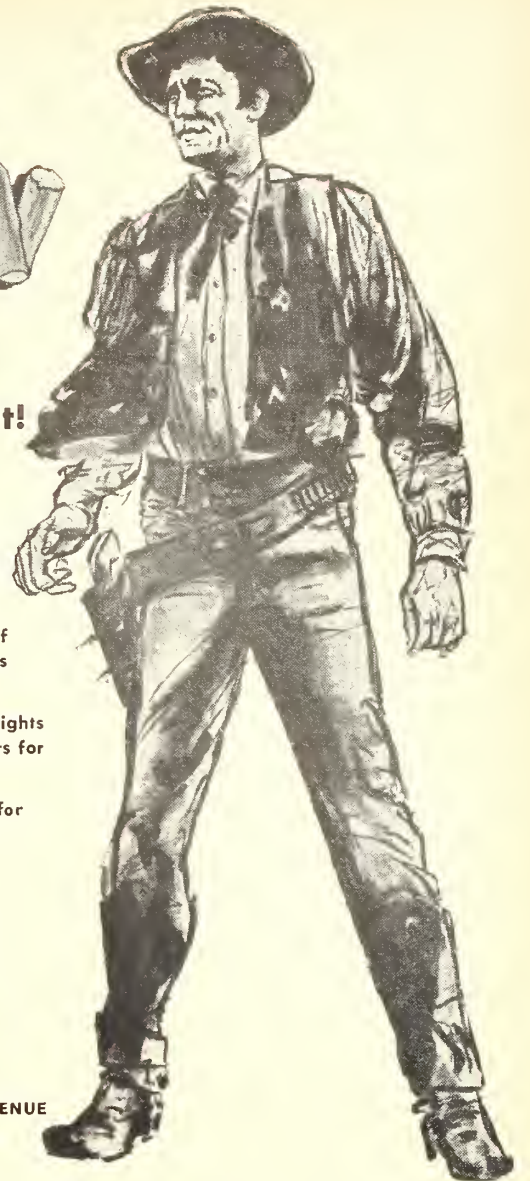

Wurlitzer Awarded \$3.5 Million Contract U.S. Army Ordnance Orders Proximity Fuses

NORTH TONAWANDA, N.Y.—The North Tonawanda Division of the Wurlitzer Company has been awarded a contract in an amount exceeding \$3,500,000 for an undisclosed number of proximity fuzes to be delivered to U. S. Army Ordnance. Today's signing of the order was disclosed by Roy F. Waltemade, Vice President and Manager of the North Tonawanda Plant. The entire production will be accomplished at that facility. The quantity covered by the order is to be produced in a twelve-month period, with the first deliveries expected in September. The new contract will permit employment of about 200 additional production workers.

For many years, the efforts of Wurlitzer Research and Development have been turned toward the development of miniaturized power supplies. Wurlitzer has worked on and developed phases of the present contract since 1948. This effort resulted in a large contract for miniaturized power supplies which were manufactured on a production line basis during the years of '52, '53, and '54.

The proximity fuze is part of an advanced concept in field warfare. As is true of all modern electronic components, a high degree of reliability is required. In the case of this fuze, units are accepted only after ballistic testing by the government under actual firing conditions. This differs from the previously accepted practice of bench inspection by government representatives within the manufacturer's plant.

According to John W. Lally, Manager of the Electronics and Defense Products Division of Wurlitzer, the company is also negotiating several more sizable projects for the manufacture of electronic equipment to assist in the various missile programs of the U. S. Government. In announcing this activity Mr. Lally said, "This contract is in addition to others for the Defense Department currently in

production by Wurlitzer. It indicates the increasing role which the Electronics and Defense Products Division is playing in the over-all activity of the North Tonawanda Plant."

CHICAGO—Cecil L. Huxford, exhibit sales chairman for the 1960 N.A.M.A. Convention scheduled to be held in Miami Beach, Florida, has advised that only 15 booths remain available for potential exhibitors, after sale of booths to more than 100 companies depleted the available space.

Huxford stated that the sale of exhibit space set a record for N.A.M.A. conventions with 42,000 square feet of space signed.

The 14th Annual N.A.M.A. Convention will be held in Miami's Convention Hall, October 29 through November 1.

"The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

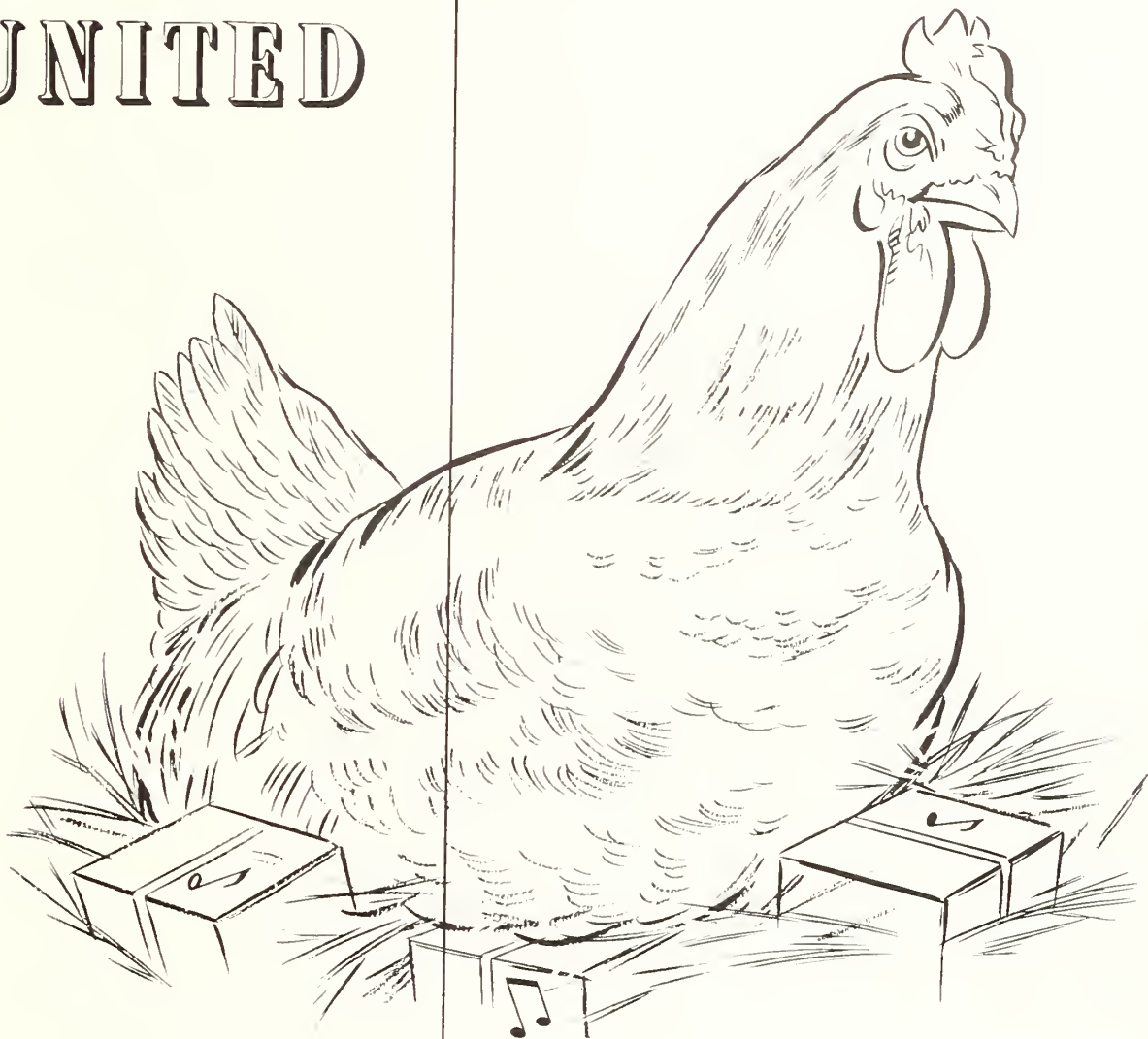

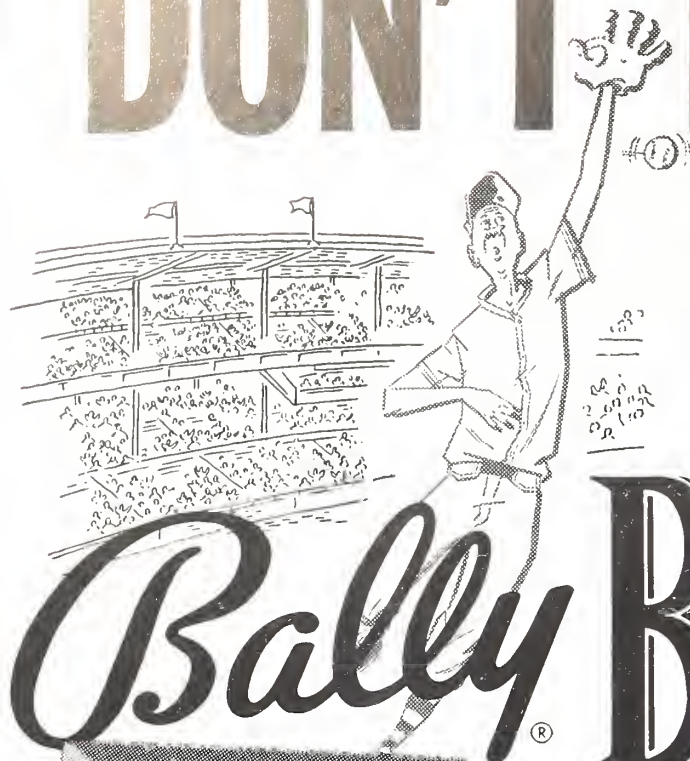

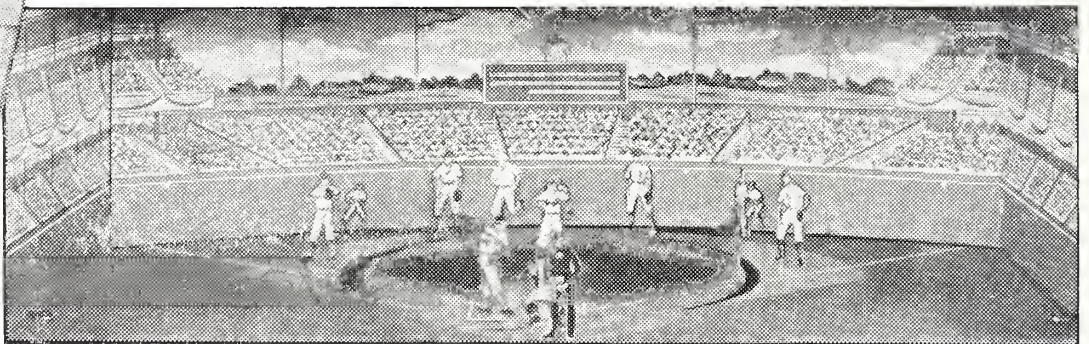
