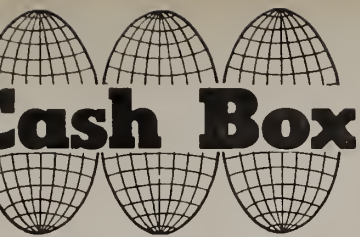

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INDIE PRODUCERS & THEIR LABELS

The operation of the indie producer continues to spiral on its course to a virtually complete vertical entity. The successful songwriter of a few years ago decided to produce his own sessions, and gave birth to today's commonplace entrepreneur, the "indie producer." The indie producer made the object of his creativity—song and master—available for distribution to the label that offered him the best deal, both in money and merchandising acumen. To solidify to a greater extent the control of his endeavors, the indie producer went ahead and formed his own music publishing and management firms.

Now the indie producer has moved a very logical step further. He has formed, in a growing number of cases, his own label. Thus, step by step, he has put a greater financial stake in his efforts. The indications at present are that the indie producer is content to tie-in with a major label for national distribution rather than go it alone in developing a distrib network.

It should be noted that while label off-shoots of indie production firms are generally moving into larger disk operations for distribution, they, never-the-less, are being staffed with management teams of their own. These labels, then, are not mere affiliates of a parent company, but are as close as they can get to being self-sustaining indie label set-ups.

An interesting point that comes to mind in this area of indie producer label operations is that they feed yet more labels into the market with

easily identifiable sound images. The "difference" in session sounds among various indie production firms is often an aural trademark. Grouping a distinctive approach to recordings marks another step in the classification of labels into "sounds" and types of music rather than the highlighting of an artist roster.

In the field of rock 'n roll diskings, it has been the indie producer more than any other factor who has recognized that a "sound" can make or break a record. He has seen fit to bring new talent into the market with the realization that if the performer is given a sound with teen-market merit, such a sound is the key to the initial acceptance of the artist. From there on in, it goes without saying, the artist will have to rely more and more on his own ability. While indie producers have helped give new talent a start, they have also been responsible for bringing many an established artist up to date, thereby reaffirming the perennial appeal—if provided with a proper sound format.

While a number of labels have made production deals with indie producers for some years now, large indie recording companies have entered a new phase in their association with indie production firms. The label that acts as the national distrib for an indie producer's own outfit offers its merchandising know-how, and thus the indie producer is completely on his own to develop those sounds which he feels have the best chance to succeed. It's a strong combination.

Labels Begin To Evaluate Policies Regarding End To 10% Excise Tax

NEW YORK—The record industry is taking preliminary stock of what the consequences of the elimination of the 10% excise tax on disks will be.

Disks, as well as phonos, were among the items singled out by President Johnson last week as part of his recommendation to Congress that a number of manufacturer excise taxes be eliminated, the first cuts of which would take place on July 1 (disks and phonos are in that time element).

With the President's formula considered a sure-thing for Congressional approval, labels, the ones who pay the levy and make it part of their pricing to distributors, have already started looking into the cut and its aftermath.

Labels Start Evaluation

Some labels contacted by Cash Box last week admitted to "informal discussions" among sales personnel following news of the President's message. It should be remembered that while the inclusion of disks as part of the cut in excise taxes may not have come as a total surprise, disks have always been absent from the list of goods said to be up for the cut.

Top sales execs of the majors and strong indies preferred to withhold specific comment on whether their firms would hold-the-line following the cut, or pass on the "savings" to distributors. They said that there were too many specifics to be reckoned with—the actual bill was not available for scrutiny—before a definite policy could be arrived at. Several noted that the matter was already in the hands of their legal departments. One label exec stated flatly he would try to hold the line, while another conceded that he would have to go along with any moves made by the majors. A clarification called for by one exec was on the matter of inventory on hand before passage of the

cut and the kind of "protection" the Government would offer on that product.

Distributors who were contacted also took a wait-and-see stand, but seemed resigned to prospect that the cut would not necessarily lead to lower prices. A New York record dealer also voiced the opinion that the excise tax cut would not be passed on down the line. He said that initial savings would stem from the purchase of phonos and tape machines.

RIAA Hails Cut

Meanwhile, the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA), which had spearheaded industry attempts to repeal the excise tax on disks, hailed the President's action through its president, Goddard Lieberson. Lieberson, who heads Columbia Records, noted that the RIAA had fought for repeal on the grounds that the tax on disks was discriminatory since it was imposed on a product that was largely cultural and educational in character, a burden not carried by books, sheet music and other art. He also pointed out that the tax on disks only gave the Government 2/10th of \$1 of the total excise tax collected.

Lieberson urged that all segments of the business communicate with their local Senators and Congressmen to request that the President's recommendation for the repeal of the excise tax on record be "speedily implemented."

General Show Biz Cuts

If the President's proposal goes through, there'll be an end to the 10% excise tax for admissions to theaters, concerts and interies by Jan. 1, 1966. As far as theaters and concerts are concerned, there seemed little likelihood that the customer would see lower admission prices. However, niteries are expected to pass the cut down to their patrons.

Victor Bringing 31 LP's To Market In June

NEW YORK—RCA Victor last week announced that the firm's June release will consist of 31 albums and 8 Four-Track tapes; the product to be comprised of 2 Original Broadway Cast LP's, a special movie soundtrack, 14 popular packages, 5 additions to the Red Seal line, 4 new "Victrola" outings, and five Camden albums. The tapes will include 4 popular sets, 2 Red Seal issues and 2 Camden packets.

Product from the parent company features the casters from "Half a Sixpence" with Tommy Steele; and "Flora, the Red Menace" starring Liza Minnelli; with the original soundtrack recording from the upcoming Kim Novak film, "The Amorous Adventures of Moll Flanders." Included on the popular agenda are: Charlie Rich's "That's Rich;" "The Latin Sound of Henry Mancini;" "The Voice and Guitar of Jose Feliciano;" "For You From Us" by the Astronauts; "Stan Worth Plays and Sings the Broadway Beat;" Sergio Franchi performing "The Songs of Richard Rodgers;" "Soul Searchin'" from Claus Ogerman and Orchestra; Dotie West with "Here Comes My Baby;" George Hamilton IV's "Mister Sincerity—A Tribute to Ernest Tubb;" "Insight" by the Rod Levitt Ork; Ed Ames with "My Kind of Songs;" "Livin' It Up With Flora, the Red Menace" from the Showguys (featuring the Showguys); "An Evening With Belafonte/Makeba;" and Glenn Yarbrough's "Baby The Rain Must Fall."

Red Seal albums feature: Sargent conducting the London Symphony Orchestra in a performance of Prokofiev's "Peter and the Wolf" and his "Classical Symphony in D;" "Van Cliburn Conducts;" Rubenstein reading Beethoven's Sonata in F Minor, Op. 57 and Sonata in C, Op. 2, No. 3; "Music to Have Fun By" with various conductors and orchestras; and "The Sixth Book of Madrigals" by Monteverdi.

Additional classical product bared on the "Victrola" label will consist of: Montoux's direction of Elgar's "Enigma Variations" and the "Variations on a Theme by Haydn" by Brahms; Gibson and the Royal Opera House Orchestra playing the "Carmen Suite" by Bizet, Gounod's "Faust Ballet Music" and "Funeral March of a Marionette;" Graffman is the featured soloist with Munch and the Boston Symphony in a reading of Brahms' "Concerto No. 1;"

LP Charts A Harvest Of Top 25 Flick, Cast, TV Sets

NEW YORK — Movie soundtracks, Broadway musicals and TV shows are coming up with increasingly saleable material in their LP offshoots. This is apparent from a survey of this week's Cash Box LP chart. Ten out of the first 25 LP's on the list can be identified with the worlds of film, theater and TV, including the week's top 2 sellers, "Mary Poppins" (Vista) and "Sound of Music" (Victor), both soundtrack items.

Further down the line, there are Andy Williams' "Dear Heart,"—Columbia (5), titled after the hit song and flick of the same name; "My Fair Lady"—Columbia (6), a soundtrack; "Goldfinger"—UA (7), a soundtrack; "My Name Is Barbra"—Columbia (10), named after Barbra Streisand's recent TV spec; "Girl Happy"—Victor (11), an Elvis Presley soundtrack; "The Roar of the Greasepaint"—Victor (20), a cast LP; and "Do I Hear a Waltz"—Columbia (25), another cast LP.

Past the first 25 albums, a number of soundtrack items is present, including "Your Cheating Heart"—MGM (37), "The Greatest Story Ever Told"—UA (47), "Zorba the Greek"—20th Century Fox (60). In addition, "Hello, Dolly!" the long-running Victor cast LP, is stationed on the number 69 spot this week.

Mercury: 13 'Lucky' LP's

CHICAGO—Kenny Myers, label chief at Mercury Records, has tagged the firm's mid-May program a "Hit-O-Rama For Hot Sales." Highlighting the diskery's campaign is a release of 13 albums which include pop, soundtrack, ethnic and classical packages.

A 36-voice California choir is debuting in a collection entitled: "The Young Americans Presented by Johnny Mathis;" and Freddie and the Dreamers will bow their second LP for the label tabbed after their singles hit "Do The Freddie." The other 11 outings include: Judy Henske's Mercury premiere, "Little Bit Of Sunshine . . . Little Bit Of Rain;" Frank and Tony's "Into a Thing;" "I'm On My Way" with Josh White, Jr.; the soundtrack recording from "Dingaka" scored by Bertha Egnos and Eddue Domingo; "The Golden Hits of Lesley Gore;" "Through Our Eyes" from the Bitter End Singers; "The Electrifying Guitar of Walter Raim;" and four classical packages.

The classical line will add these four LP's to its catalog: cellist Janos Starker and pianist Gyorgy Sebok performing various compositions including Mendelssohn's "Variations Concertants" and Martinu's "Variations on a Theme of Rossini;" Joseph Szigeti is featured soloist playing Prokofiev's Violin Concerto No. 1 in D with the London Symphony under the direction of Herbert Menges and Stravinsky's "Duo Concertant" with pianist Roy Bogas; "Ida Presti and Alexandre Lagoya Play Spanish Music for Two Guitars;" and the first in a series to form a complete library of Mozart piano concertos, this LP to consist of the Concerto No. 15 in B Flat, and the Concerto No. 16 in D.

Label Is A Part Of New Show Biz Complex

NEW YORK—A significant new entertainment industry complex (film company, record label, publishing firms, TV production unit, etc.) has been formed under the over-all corporate mantle of New Art, Inc.

This MCA-type operation, which is primarily a flick producer-packager, will literally be involved in all aspects of the performing arts. Show biz attorney Howard Gotbeter will serve as president of the movie company (New Art Productions), while radio-TV producer Jack Jason will be the executive vice-president. Music business veteran Joe Gotfreid, who at one time ran the Teresa Brewer publishing interests, cut indie records dates and ran the Adonis label, will be vice-president and general manager of the record company and pubberies (an ASCAP and BMI will be formed in the immediate future.)

Gotfreid left New York last week (18) for London to supervise the recording of the Albert Hague-penned title theme to N-A's initial film, "Night Caller," a John Saxon-Mark Richardson starrer which will be released in the U. S. this fall.

While in England Gotfreid will A&R an album with Ernestine Anderson, a recent pactee to New Art Records, as well as cutting a film, themes date with Mark Richardson, another exclusive N-A recording artist.

The exec told Cash Box that the new label will release a wide range of recorded product running the gamut from classical music to rock 'n' roll. Among the artists recently inked to the diskery are: the Buffalo Philharmonic with Lucas Foss, jazz 88'er Amy Darlich, Louis Bellson with whom an LP has already been recorded, legit baritone Alfredo Geroldo, who is the featured artist on the firm's first single released last week, "Forget Domani" from "The Yellow Rolls-Royce," and a new group called the Hemi Demi Semi Quavers.

Gotfreid also indicated that the label will release six soundtracks during the rest of this year. However, he

CHICAGO—The Smash-Fontana label operation had a banner year in 1964. Charlie Fach, head of the set-up, has revealed that gross sales for 1964 neared \$3 million, and this year the amount will double.

Fach cited the fantastic success of Roger Miller in both the singles and LP fields. Other artists who figure strongly in the sales showing are Jerry Lee Lewis, Wayne Fontana and the Mindbenders and James Brown.

The Smash label was started in 1961, and two years later, Fontana came into existence, followed more recently by Cumberland, a country music outlet.

Besides Fach, the exec line-up includes Lou Dennis, national promo head, and Alan Mink, national promo manager, both of whom joined the label in 1963.

In this restless age, when a change of scene seems to be a matter of course, and radio station personnel rosters undergo constant alterations, it is almost a surprise when an air-time personality achieves any sort of longevity with a single employer. One such personality is WMCA-New York late evening commentator Barry Gray, who, this month, celebrates his 15th anniversary with the station. Beginning his midnight-to-3 A.M. interview show in May 1950, Gray initiated his now lengthy list of celebrities and public figures with Jan Murray, Joe E. Lewis and Phil Foster. Kennedy, Eleanor Roosevelt, Pierre Salinger, C. P. Snow and New York's mayor Robert Wagner, to name a few. Congratulations and happy anniversary to Barry Gray. . . . Another celebration this month is that of WWDC-Washington, which marked its 24th year of broadcasting early this month. Our felicitations to the entire staff of the recently-sold station.

Speaking of staying power, ten years ago everyone said that Elvis Presley would quickly fade from the spotlight, and today the older generation insists that the Beatles can't possibly last. However, KFWB-Hollywood not only believes that the British mop-tops will be around in the year 2000, but is going to great lengths to insure its theory. Acting in concert with the students and staff of Edgewood High School in West Covina, the Movietown station will place a collection of records from its Top Forty survey into a time capsule set to be buried at the school on June 8, thus guaranteeing that the populace of the next century will be able to enjoy the same substantial music that we enjoy today.

KDKA-Pittsburgh is also acting in conjunction with its teenage audience, but in a slightly different vein. Working hand in glove with the local CYO, the Steel City station is jointly sponsoring an art contest for teens as part of this year's Pittsburgh Jazz Festival. The contest, running until June 1, calls for the youngsters to make up 14 x 22" posters with a jazz theme, and prizes will include free tickets to the festival for the top ten artists, as well as a Hamilton watch for the jazzy-est work.

Out in the midwest, a Home and Garden Festival hosted by Jack Tobin, WDAF-Kansas City, Mo. home handyman expert, saw a huge turnout to view the exhibitions of over forty merchants. The affair, which ran for two days and staged displays of boats, trailers, campers, automobiles and various household items, as well as carnival and pony rides for the kids, was visited by over 30,000 spectators. Quite a large crowd, considering the weather, which included tornado warnings, torrential rains, high winds and hail.

Considered to be the oldest r&b deejay in point of service, WLAC-Nashville spinner John R. has taken a step to the other side of the turntable, waxing his first recording, "Keep On Scratchin'." Estimating that he has dished out over 50,000 spins in his 22 years with the station, the jock is featured on his initial Smash effort spouting his familiar jive talk against a backdrop of very funky blues sounds.

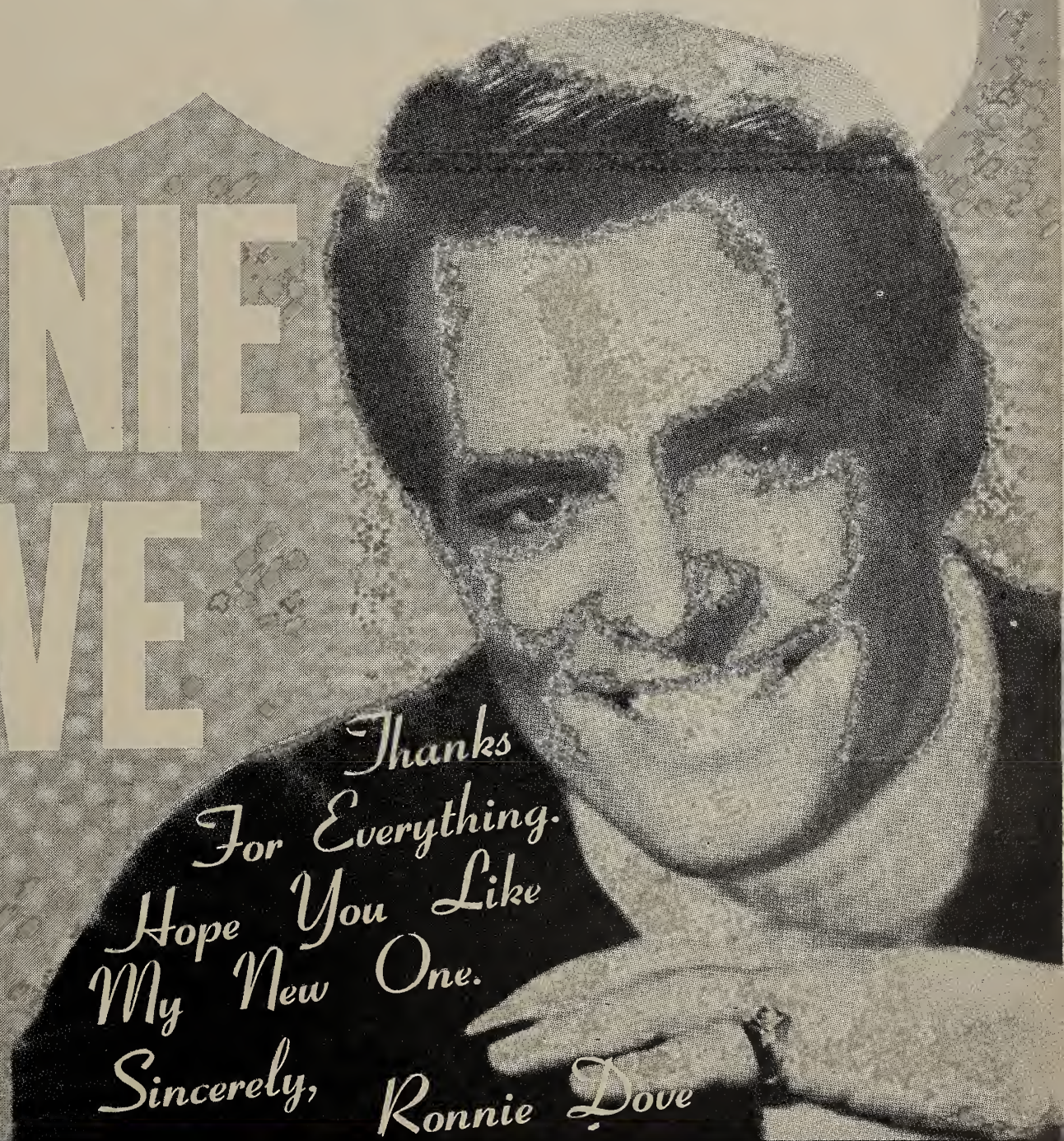

Pick of the Week

A WORLD OF OUR OWN (2:39) [Chappell, ASCAP—Springfield]
SINNER MAN (2:15) [Chappell, ASCAP]
SEEKERS (Capitol 5430)

The Seekers should have no difficulty in duplicating their "I'll Never Find Another You" first-time-out-triumph with this blue-ribbon follow-up called "A World Of Our Own." The side is rhythmic, pop-folk message-song which delineates the shape of things to come in a somewhat euphoric world. On the bottom lid the crew dishes-up a rousing, emotion-packed rendition of the bluesy folk sturdie.

WHEN A BOY FALLS IN LOVE (2:30) [Kags, BMI—Cooke, Levert]
THE PIPER (2:28) [Kags, BMI—Cooke]
SAM COOKE (RCA Victor 8586)

The fans of the late Sam Cooke should come out in droves for this follow-up to the current "It's Got The Whole World Shakin'!" The "A" side here, "When A Boy Falls In Love," is a tender, lyrical slow-moving romancer which tells what happens when a fella gets hooked on a gal. "The Piper" is an interestingly off-beat folk-blueser with a haunting melodic undercurrent.

I'LL KEEP HOLDING ON (2:27) [Jobete, BMI—Stevenson, Hunter]
NO TIME FOR TEARS (2:37) [Jobete, BMI—Holland]
MARVELETTES (Tamla 54116)

The Marvelettes' long, impressive string of hits should be still further enhanced on the basis of this top-drawer entry called "I'll Keep Holding On." The tune is a shufflin' pop-blues tearjerker about a love-sick gal who contends that she'll stick with her guy no matter what he does. Tremendous potential here. The flip, "No Time For Tears," is a tradition-oriented funky r&b tale of romantic rejection.

NO REGRETS (2:43) [Barclay, ASCAP—Dumont, David]
SEESAW OF DREAMS (2:39) [Chappell, ASCAP—Rolandi, Segurini]
SHIRLEY BASSEY (United Artists 872)

Shirley Bassey proved her Top Ten ability last time out with her smash recording of "Goldfinger" and this potent reading of the Edith Piaf-associated "No Regrets" should also do strong biz. The lark reads the plaintive, bittersweet romantic lament in an impressive, emotion-packed, dramatic style. On the undercut she dishes-up a lyrical rendition of "Seesaw Of Dreams."

DO THE BOOMERANG (2:00) [Jobete, BMI—Cosby, DeWalt, Woods]
TUNE UP (3:04) [Jobete, BMI—DeWalt]
JR. WALKER & ALL STARS (Soul 35012)

Jr. Walker and the All Stars are still clicking with their tremendous reputation-establishing deck of "Shotgun" and this top-drawer follow-up, "Do The Boomerang," is a cinch to go a like hitsville route. The tune is a hard-driving, fast-moving funky pop-blues contagious rocker which intros a new teen dance. "Tune Up" is a catchy, slick blues-oriented instrumental stanza.

LONG LIVE LOVE (2:39) [Rose Hill, BMI—Andrews]
I'VE HEARD ABOUT HIM (2:27) [Rose Hill, BMI—Andrews]
SANDIE SHAW (Reprise 0375)

Sandie Shaw is going great guns in her native England with "Long Live Love" and there's no reason why the platter can't become a similar success on this side of the foam. The tune is a rhythmic hand-clappin' warm-hearted romancer about a real lucky girl who's finally found the guy she's always dreamed about. "I've Heard About Him" is a hard-driving, dual-track bluesy weeper.

SEEIN' THE RIGHT LOVE GO WRONG (2:31)
[Sea-Lark, BMI—Schroeder, Brooks]
TRAVELLIN' ON (2:45) [Eddie Shaw, ASCAP—Romoff]
JACK JONES (Kapp 672)

Jack Jones is a natural to grab both Top 40 and middle of the road spins with this-rung follow-up to his "The Race Is On" smash dubbed "Seein' The Right Love Go Wrong." The tune is a plaintive slow-moving countryish lament about a heartbroken guy whose gal gives him the gate. On the flip Jones offers a rousing high-powered updating of "Travellin' On."

SEVENTH SON (2:45) [Arc, BMI—Dixon]
UN-SQUARE DANCE (1:55) [Trousdale, BMI—Rivers]
JOHNNY RIVERS (Imperial 66112)

Johnny Rivers should quickly add this new Imperial entry to his long string of previous blockbusters. The side is a lively, fast-moving chorus-backed happy-blueser with a contagious danceable beat all about the joys of a "Seventh Son." "Un-Square Dance" is an infectious hoedown-styled countryish instrumental offering.

MARY WELLS (20th Century-Fox 490)

Mary Wells can score heavily in the loot dept. with either end or both of this new double-header entry from 20th Century-Fox. One side, "He's A Lover," which is culled from the lark's premiere 20th C-F LP, is a slow-shufflin' romancer about a lucky lass whose guy is a modern-day Romeo. The other end, "I'm Learnin'," is a rhythmic, chorus-backed ode about a gal who learns about love by the trial-and-error method. Eye 'em both.

OPERATOR (2:55) [Jobete, BMI—Robinson]
I'LL BE AVAILABLE (2:36) [Jobete, BMI—Robinson]
BRENDA HOLLOWAY (Tamla 54115)

Hot-on-the-heels of her recent "When I'm Gone" smasher Brenda Holloway comes up with a top-flight follow-up stanza tabbed "Operator." The tune is a rollicking, pop-r&b happy romancer about a lucky lass who finally gets that all important phone call from the guy of her dreams. "I'll Be Available" is a raunchy, hard-driving infectious affair about a girl who is quite hung up on one fella.

SHE'S GONE AGAIN (2:25) [Milky Way, BMI—King]
NOT NOW (I'LL TELL YOU WHEN) (2:40)

BEN E. KING (Atco 6357)

The vet pop-r&b songster should zoom up the charts lickety split with this ultra-commercial new Atco stand tabbed, "She's Gone Again." The side is a medium-paced, chorus-backed effectively building weeper about a guy who's singin' the blues since his gal left him for the Nth time. "Not Now (I'll Tell You When)" is a rhythmic infectious romancer about a guy who can't resist his girl friend.

ARE YOU SINCERE (2:26) [Cedarwood, BMI—Walker]
YOU'LL BE SORRY (2:32) [South Mountain, BMI—H. & D. Costa]
TRINI LOPEZ (Reprise 0376)

Heavy summer sales are indicated for this new Trini Lopez offering, "Are You Sincere," which is culled from the chanter's "Love Album." The side is an easy-going, chorus-backed melodic updating of the years-back romantic sturdie. The bottom lid is a heartfelt ear-arresting rendering of "You'll Be Sorry."

Although Ronnie Dove is still scoring with "One Kiss For Old Time's Sake," this impressive follow-up, "A Little Bit Of Heaven," should quickly develop into blockbuster proportions. The side is an easy-going, chorus-backed countryish romancer about a lucky fella who's been on cloud number nine since he's met the girl of his dreams. "If I Lived To Be A Hundred" is a tender, plaintive heartfelt romancer.

MY CHERIE (2:33) [Blackwood, BMI—Damian, ASCAP—DeAngelis, Sawyer]

AL MARTINO (Capitol 5434)

The vet songster seems destined to zoom up the charts in no time flat with this top-notch newie tabbed "My Cherie." The side is an easy-going, melodic, chorus-backed sentimental tale of romantic devotion sold with loads of poise and feeling by Martino. The coupler's an ear-arresting reading of the romantic evergreen.

MARIE (2:18) [Irving Berlin, ASCAP—Berlin]
YOU CAN TELL (3:15) [Belgravia, ASCAP—Squires, Eden, Dunstall]
BACHELORS (London 9762)

The Bachelors are a cinch to jump into the winners circle with this power-packed new London release. The plug side here, "Marie," the years-back Irving Berlin sturdie, is given a rhythmic teen-angled updating complete with some interesting counterpoint and harmony portions. "You Can Tell" is an easy-going, low-key shufflin' romancer. Also merits a close look.

The appropriately seasonal-themed item is a tender, sweeping, chorus-backed romancer about a gal who wonders if her guy really digs her. "He's The Greatest" is a pulsating, fast-moving big-beat happy-go-lucky thumper.

STEVE LAWRENCE (Columbia 43303)

Steve Lawrence is an odds-on bet to quickly get back in his money-making ways with this first-rate Columbia newie called "Last Night I Made A Little Girl Cry." The tune is a dramatic, medium-paced full ork-backed teen-oriented romancer about a fella who decides that he was decidedly wrong to let his gal go. The flip's a lyrical, slow-moving sung in English and Yiddish reading of "Where Can I Go."

The lark has had hits in the past and she can well triumph once again with this top-drawer, pop-r&b offering from Modern tabbed "You Turned My Bitter Into Sweet." The side is a medium-paced romancer about a gal who is so involved with her guy that he has the power to change her animosity into love. "I'm In Your Hands," is a rhythmic, rock' affair all about the problems of a real love-sick femme.

The tune is a medium-paced, blues-tinged weeper about a lad who plans to stick by his gal even though their romance is kaput. "My Heart Keeps Telling Me" is an infectious pledge of romance with a catchy south-of-the-border melodic undercurrent.

Ian and the Zodiacs stand an excellent chance of breaking thru and creating plenty of sales excitement with this new Philips entry labeled "So Much In Love With You." The side is a rollicking, rhythmic Mersey Beat romancer about a lad who was head-over-heels in love with a gal but leaves her when he realizes that she was wrong for him. "This Empty Place" is a bluesey, soulfully-rendered weeper.

MAGGIE THRETT (DynoVoice 205)

Newcomer Maggie Thrett stands an excellent chance of establishing a national reputation for herself with this top-drawer DynoVoice bow labeled "Soupy." The tune, obviously inspired by the Soupy Sales-originated mouse craze, is a rollicking, chorus-backed pop-r&b teen-angled slow-rocker with an infectious danceable back-beat. Eye it. "Put A Little Time Away" is a plaintive, slow-moving bluesey tale of remorse.

IF YOU REALLY WANT ME TO, I'LL GO (2:07)
[Billie Fran, BMI—McClinton]

WALK ABOUT (2:14) [Billie Fran, BMI—McClinton]
RON-DELS (Smash 1986)

Here's a hot master which Smash picked-up from the Fort Worth-based Brownfield label which could become one of the biggest items of the summer season. The plug side, "If You Really Want Me To, I'll Go," is a rhythmic rollicking folk-countryish lament about a lad who loves his gal so much that he'll leave her even though he doesn't want to. "Walk About" is a catchy, infectious instrumental stanza.

NATURAL BORN MAN (2:19) [Cedarwood BMI—Weems, Franklin]

TRICKS OF THE TRADE (2:22) [Cedarwood BMI—Tillis, Walker]

RITCHIE WEEMS (Dunhill 202)

Ritchie Weems can establish both himself and the Dunhill label with this introductory effort labeled "Natural Born Man." The side is a rollicking, dual-track, hard-driving rhythmic folk-blueser sold with loads of soul by the chanter. On the coupler Weems dishes-up a first-rate version of "Tricks Of The Trade."

Best Bets

BABY WASHINGTON (Sue 129)

● ONLY THOSE IN LOVE (2:47) [Brown, BMI—Singleton, Kaempfert] This easy going, steady building ballad has an unusual strong quality of growing on listeners. Catchy vocal quality and lovely orking on this deck could create quite a sales stir. Watch closely.

(B) THE BALLAD OF BOBBY DAWN (2:48) [Sea-Lark, BMI—Halley] Strong blues wailer.

LEE TRACEY (Mr. Maestro 806)

● UNTIL YOU WERE GONE (2:50) [Hill & Range, BMI—Byers] This solid blues lament from Lee Tracey could move up nicely on the r&b charts and deserves careful watching for a pop showing. The soulful vocal is aided by a softly building ork backing. Fine effort.

(B+) CLAP YOUR HANDS (1:57) [Sentimental, BMI—Davis] Shuffle-rocker.

KEELY SMITH (Reprise 0374)

● SOMETHIN' WONDERFUL HAPPENED (2:24) [Kita, BMI—Smith, Bowen] Tony Hatch arrangements and the lovely vocal sound of Keely Smith work together to turn out a side that is likely to stir up considerable spinning and selling action. Solid beat and a wild sound.

(B+) HAVE YOU EVER BEEN LONELY (2:43) [Shapiro, Bernstein, ASCAP—Brown, De Rose] Revamping of the old ballad.

KAL DAVID (Tollie 9043)

● COME ON HOME (2:16) [Conrad, BMI—David, Grebb, Cetera] A catchy rhythmic rocker that could score nicely for Kal David, this side features an infectious multi-dance up-tempo beat and some smooth vocal sounds. Keep an eye out for this noise-maker.

(B) DANCING DANNY (2:34) [Arc, BMI] "Louie, Louie" beat side.

JERRY NAYLOR (Tower 139)

● IT'S ONLY MAKE BELIEVE (2:14) [Hill & Range, BMI—Twitty] Jerry Naylor could make a name for himself with this powerfully rendered reading of the ballad sound that clicked for Conway Twitty several years back. Could gather plenty of air time.

(B+) LEAVE HIM AND COME TO MY ARMS (2:00) [Hatcher-Curb, BMI—Hatcher, Curb] Steady stomp beat here.

HONEYCOMBS (Warner Brothers 5634)

● SOMETHING BETTER BE-GINNING (2:11) [Jay Boy, BMI—Davis] The Honeycombs could climb back onto the charts with their first outing with Warner Brothers, a solid throbbing rock ballad with unusually fascinating orkwork. The former Vee-Jay artists have a strong entry here.

(B+) I'LL SEE YOU TOMORROW (2:11) [Ivy—Blakley] Impressive ballad.

RAY STEVENS (Mercury 72430)

● MR. BAKER, THE UNDERTAKER (2:31) [Lowery, BMI—Stevens] Ray Stevens, who clicked with the "Ahab the Arab" novelty sound, could repeat via this off-beat view of the undertaking trade. Steady beat behind it makes for dancing amid the chuckles.

(B+) THE OLD ENGLISH SURFER (2:58) [Lowery, BMI—Stevens] Comic take-off on way back surfing.

MARTY DE ROSE (Decca 31796)

● CORE 'N GRATA (Ungrateful Heart) (2:40) [Franco, Columbo, ASCAP—Cardillo, Cordiferro] This potently orked Italian ballad packs quite a wallop and should see plenty of spins sending Marty De Rose well along the hitsville path. Gorgeous vocal sound here.

(B+) I WALK THE STREETS (2:49) [Leeds, ASCAP—Modugno, Zambrini, Raye] Very interesting orking on this unusual ballad.

IKE AND TINA TURNER (Loma 2015)

● SOMEBODY NEEDS YOU (2:25) [Jobete, BMI—Wilson] Driving rock sounds on this Detroit styled throbber. Watch for Ike and Tina Turner to catch a good deal of r&b exposure via this outing. Should click on the r&b circuit and could take-off on the pop route.

(B+) (I'LL DO ANYTHING) JUST TO BE WITH YOU (2:15) [Placid, Real Blue, BMI—Turner] Bluesy side with a lazy loping gait.

RAY LYNN (Epic 9798)

● WISDOM OF A FOOL (2:26) [Planetary, ASCAP—Alfred—Silver] This pretty tune is redone in almost the same manner, and the new youngsters should take to it quickly. Watch the action on this one very closely.

(B+) MISS TEMPTATION (2:26) [Tuneville—BMI—Strzelecki] Rock-a-cha cha.

JEWELS (Dimension 1048)

● BUT I DO (2:20) [Acs, BMI—Guidry-Gayten] The new appearance taken on by the Detroit sound on this deck makes for a powerful steady beating rocker that should attract plenty of r&b attention and could break loose on the pop scene. Deserves very close watching.

(B+) SMOKEY JOE (2:05) [Monica-Flomar, BMI—Simpson—Ashford—Armstead] Rock-a-beatin' blueser.

MISSION BELLES (London 9760)

● SINCERELY (2:40) [Arc, BMI—Fuqua-Freed] The Mission Belles could sound off with this sweet shuffle reading of the way back r&r ballad hit. Pleasant harmony and powerful style backed with an interesting ork shimmer should garner considerable air play and sales reaction.

(B+) WHEN A GIRL REALLY LOVES YOU (2:40) [Budd, ASCAP—Kaye-Raymonde] Mid-tempo shuffle-cha ballad.

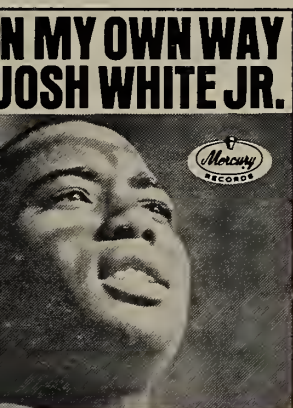

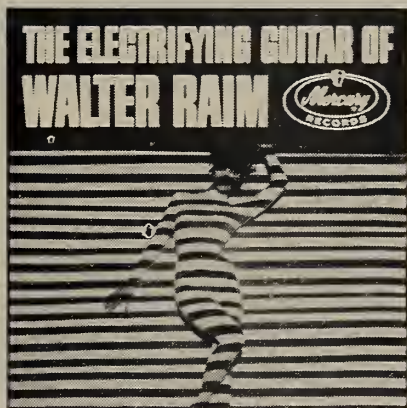

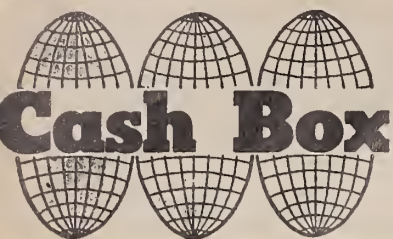

Best Bets

CHIFFONS (Laurie 3301)

● **NOBODY KNOWS WHAT'S GOIN' ON (IN MY MIND BUT ME)** (2:21) [Bright Tunes, BMI—Force] Some catchy echo effects, and a bright vocal sound backed by unusually building orking on this deck which should catch a good deal of air play, and could sky-rocket up the charts."

(B+) **THE REAL THING** (2:13) [Baby Monica, Flomar, BMI—Simpson, Ashford, Armstead] Very good sounding cover of the Tina Britt click.

FRANKIE RANDALL (RCA Victor 8587)

● **YELLOW HAIRED WOMAN** (2:19) [Angelica, ASCAP—Dunham, Davis] Smooth voiced Frankie Randall could score heavily with this happy-go-lucky lilter from the film "Wild Beach Weekend." The catchy refrain and lighthearted liveliness of this number should carry it a long way.

(B+) **THE ART OF LOVE** (2:16) [Northern, ASCAP—Raye, Coleman] Ambling Sinatra-styled ballad.

PAT LUNDY & BOBBY HARRIS (Heidi 111)

● **WE GOT A THING GOIN' ON** (2:40) [Eden, BMI—Northern-Briggs] Rock beat on this cha-cha solidly backed by big rhythmic throbbing ork. Watch this Atco distributed disk to sky-rocket in r&b locales, and with its infectious sound it could break big pop-wise.

(B+) **I REALLY LOVE YOU** (2:58) [Cotillion, BMI—Briggs—Northern] Soulful chanting on this lover's duet.

DONALD BYRD (Verve 10344)

● **YOU'VE BEEN TALKIN' 'BOUT ME BABY** (2:30) [Glamorous, ASCAP—Garnett, Hirsch, Riviera] As a result of deejay requests, this side from Byrd's hot "LP has been released and should catch a good deal of sales response in the r&b locales. The track is a bluesy jazz tune with a chorale workout.

(B+) **BLIND MAN, BLIND MAN** (2:27) [Hancock BMI—Hancock] Interesting choral echo effect on this solid blues side.

JIMMY McGRUFF (Sue 128)

● **TURN BLUE** (2:58) [Sagittarius—Jell—Renner, BMI—McGriff] Coin ops should find this an item that can pull plenty of coin. The funky and highly soulful sound obtained by jazz organist Jimmy McGriff maintains a tremendous tension throughout. Fine piece.

● **BUMP DE BUMP** (2:45) [Sagittarius, BMI—McGriff] Both sides could come through for the artist with this lid that picks up the tempo into a lively blueser. Happy shadings of gospel for bouncy vigorous uplift. Both sides culled from McGriff's latest LP.

REFLECTIONS (Golden World 22)

● **WHEELIN' AND DEALIN'** (2:26) [Myto, BMI—Hamilton, Wylie, Lewis] Watch out for the reflections to climb back onto the pop charts via this steady beating mid-tempo throbbler that features an infectious lilting rock sound. Could score as they have done before.

(B+) **DEBORAH ANN** (2:37) [Myto, BMI—Hamilton] Curious blend of rock and r&b sounds here.

THEE MIDNIGHTERS (Chattahoochee 684)

● **WHITTIER BLVD.** (2:02) [Conte, BMI—Thee Midnighters] One of the crews with a piece of "Land of 1000 Dances," Thee Midnighters could score with this powerful collection of ork drives. The up-tempo number is filled with vigor making it a natural selection of the dance set. Eye closely.

(B+) **EVIL LOVE** (2:25) [Conte, BMI—Phillis] Groovy blues rocker.

PICKIN', STRUMMIN' AND SINGIN'—Flatt & Scruggs—Columbia CL 2354/CS 9154

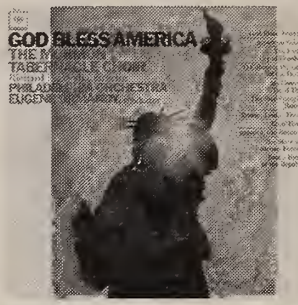

GOD BLESS AMERICA—The Mormon Tabernacle Choir—Columbia ML 6121/MS 6721

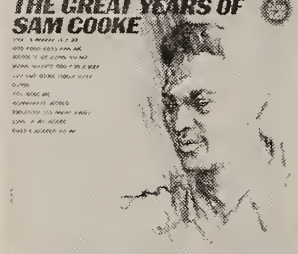

The soulful style of the late Sam Cooke is the object of this musical tribute by brother L. C. Cooke. With a voice and heartfelt interpretations remarkably similar to those of his brother, the artist delves back in time to come up with a grouping of tunes which were an integral part of his late brother's greatest years. The album, comprised strictly of compositions by the Cooke brothers, includes such well-known numbers as "Cupid" and "Wonderful World," as well as the way-baker, "You Send Me." This one could catch a big reaction.



JUAN SERRANO AT THE WORLD'S FAIR—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3328

Crystal-clear artistry and bold, racing imagery are the keynotes of this outing by Juan Serrano and his flamenco guitar, recorded live at the Spanish pavilion of the New York World Fair. The highly acclaimed artist depicts a vivid musical portrait of his native Spain as he ranges from fiery, spice-filled rhythms to those of poignancy and pathos, displaying a splendid understanding of his instrument. Outstanding presentations include "Altozano," a haunting gypsy lament, and the intense Zapateado, "Chapines."



FRESH FROM THE FUNNY FARM—Don Bowman—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3345

The delightful, whimsical humor from the bluegrass belt gets another refreshing treatment in the hands of comic-songster Don Bowman. With a collection of lively musical satires, the laugh-maker spoofs the tear-jerking ballad idiom with such numbers as "The Last Of The Dad Dates," and points the farcical finger in the direction of TV sagas with "Coward At The Alamo." His touching adaptation of "Graduation Day" shows that nothing is sacred to Bowman except the art of good, honest fun. A sure-shot with country fans.



A SLOW HOT WIND—Jacqueline Peters—Warner Bros. W/WS 1597

A newcomer to the recording scene who looks as if she should attract a lot of attention from the record buyers is Jacqueline Peters, making her wax debut with this Warner Bros. album. With a voice that's sincerely sultry and provocative, the songstress caresses a searing selection of moody ballads and torrid torch sessions in a very refreshing style. Highly effective cuts include, in addition to the title track, "The End Of The World" and "Help A Good Girl Go Bad." This one bears attention.



HELLO BROADWAY—Jonah Jones—Decca DL 4638/DL 74638

With a zesty, first-rate outing, the Jonah Jones Quartet offers a sparkling salute to the Broadway scene with a dozen chestnuts from Glitter Street's current crop of musical standouts. Delving into "Funny Girl," the foursome comes up with a moody interpretation of the top stanza, "People," and, from the brand new conquest, "Roar Of The Greasepaint," comes a swinging rendition of "Who Can I Turn To." Also featured among the session's highlights is the title track from "Funny Girl," helping this album become another memorable outing by the quartet.

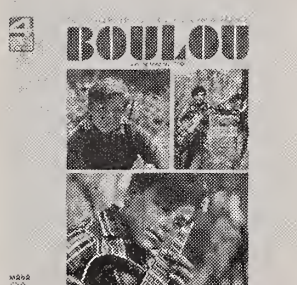
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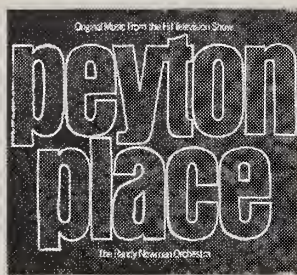
GIGLIOLA CINQUETTI—London International TW 91364

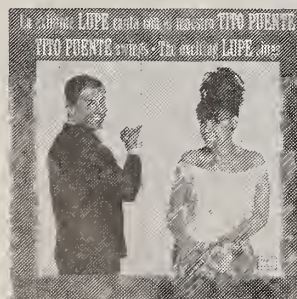
INSTRUMENTALLY YOURS—Grady Martin—Decca DL 4610/DL 74610

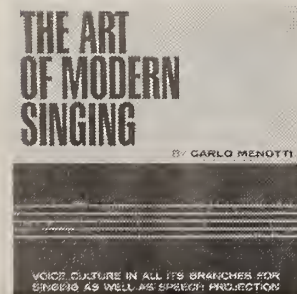
RUSSIAN FOLK SONGS—Sasha Zelkin—Audio Fidelity AFSD 6137

Declining the use of gimmicks, the balladeer relies solely on a rich, warm voice and plaintive guitar to recreate the joys and frustrations of the Slavic peoples, including in his repertoire such tunes as the fiery "Gari! Gari! (Burn, Burn, Gypsy Love)" and the haunting "Moscow Evenings," which was a while-back jazz hit in the form of "Midnight In Moscow."



TITO PUENTE SWINGS/THE EXCITING LUPE SINGS—Tico—LP/SLP 1121

One of the brightest names in the Latin-American dance field, Tito Puente has joined forces with his songstress-teammate from the 1965 Venezuelan Carnival, La Lupe, in a vibrant package of tropical dance tempos. The pair copped the first place honors at the festival, and have included in this set, many of the numbers that were featured in their award-winning performance. Top tracks in this one include "Todo," and "Jala Jala," as well as the lovely "Maria Dolores."



THE ART OF MODERN SINGING—Carlo Menotti—Art of Modern Singing CM-1000

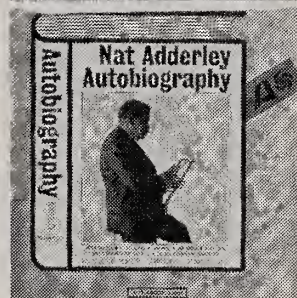
Carlo Menotti, the outstanding authority on singing and voice culture who has instructed such stars as Frankie Avalon, Pat Boone and Al Martino is now available on a two-disk set delivering instruction in breathing and diction along with the many facets that are involved in developing one's voice. SOLO MONK—Thelonious Monk—Columbia CL 2349/CS 9149

One of the most closely followed musicians on the jazz scene, Thelonious Monk turns in an unusual performance on this new Columbia LP. The famous pianist runs through twelve selections in his inimitable style, entirely on his own. Although his performance lacks the support of his outstanding combo, the 88er is sparkling, playing with a wit and brilliance that should attract many new fans for the artist. Tunes include: "I Surrender Dear" and "I Should Care."



AUTOBIOGRAPHY—Nat Adderley—Atlantic 1439

With Nat Adderley on cornet all the way through, this set takes on a special vitality as the ace hornman renders eight of his best known compositions in a musical "Autobiography." Featured tracks include "Sermonette," "Work Song" and "Jive Samba." The fine playing of the assorted combos goes a long way to making this the stunning set that it is, and certainly it will be one much sought after by followers of the contemporary jazz scene and the many fans of this artist in particular.



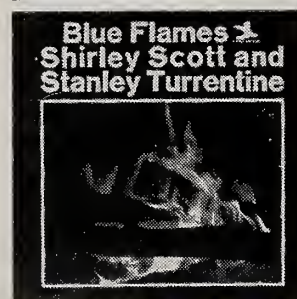
BEHIND THE EIGHT BALL—Baby-Face Willette—Argo 749

Among the standout selections are "Half A Crown," "April Showers" and "Watermelon Man." The set has a groovy nature that could score pop and jazz.

BLUE FLAMES—Shirley Scott & Stanley Turrentine—Prestige 7338

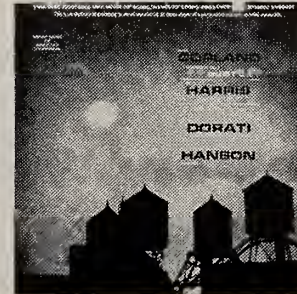
The husband and wife team of Stanley Turrentine and Shirley Scott have been blazing a hot pace on the jazz paths in recent months with several fine sets featuring the combined talents of these two outstanding artists. The recent research which places this work as the ninth symphony by Czech composer Antonin Dvorak sets this package apart as does the excitingly sensitive approach taken by the conductor and the superlative playing of the Philharmonia Orchestra. Angel's outstanding recording technique is used to the optimum in this magnificent offering on the 80th Birthday of the distinguished maestro.

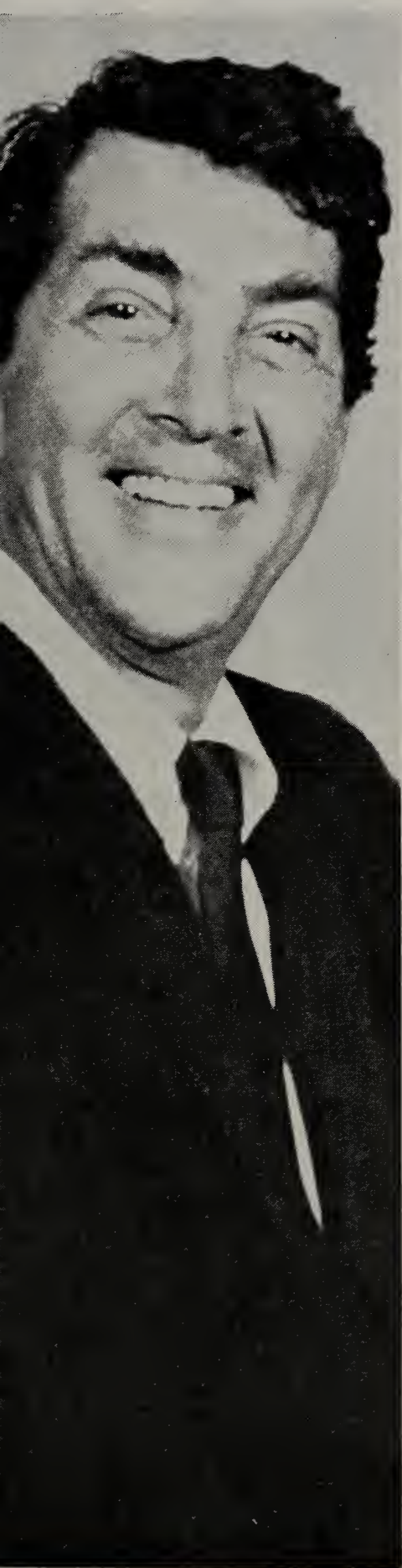

AF Deals With English Label For Distribution

NEW YORK—Audio Fidelity Records has inked a 3-year agreement with Starlite Artists, Ltd. for distribution rights of the British label's product in the U.S., Canada, Mexico and Central America. Herman Gimbel, president of AF, worked out the deal with Peter Walsh, president of Starlite Artists. Walsh also develops and books complete packages through Starlite Artists, Ltd.

HBR Off On Right Foot

LOS ANGELES—Hann-Barbera Records' vice president and general manager Don Bohanan last week announced that the label, which premiered on May 10, has already surpassed the sales figure of 200,000 units of LP's and singles with several distributors yet to report.

The initial HBR release was comprised of 11 singles and 6 long play albums, all of which feature the firm's famous cartoon characters.

Bohanan credits the unprecedented initial success of the diskery's product to its ability to capture the audience-appeal of characters such as Yogi Bear and Boo Boo, the Flintstones and Huckleberry Hound, for the record trade.

Prime importance is placed on the acceptance of the HBR product by major Top 40 stations, many of which have requested drop-in tracks for use within their regular deejay shows. Much of this activity has been generated by imaginative HBR approach to promotion of the cartoon record product. Telephone calls have been made to many key radio stations utilizing the voices of cartoon characters as they appear in the TV series and on Hanna-Barbera Records. Merchandising of the records is being integrated into the more than 400 comic books, color books and other printed materials which are distributed to the consumer.

NEW YORK—Steve Alaimo, ABC-Paramount recording star, has been signed as one of the regulars on "Where The Action Is," the Dick Clark production for the ABC-TV network, debuting on June 28th.

Aimed at the teen audience, the musical series will use outdoor and other locations rather than television studios. The series will air from one to one-thirty pm, five days a week, featuring young guest artists daily, in addition to the regulars.

Alaimo enjoyed success recently with "Real Live Girl," and his latest release, the vocal version of the hit song, "Cast Your Fate To The Wind," has reportedly had initial acceptance.

Kennedy To Epic/Okeh Spot

NEW YORK—The newly established position of district promotion manager for Epic Records and its subsidiary, Okey Records, in the Los Angeles and San Francisco areas has been filled by Brett Kennedy, who formerly did independent promotion on the West Coast.

Her duties will include obtaining maximum air-play for the labels' releases in the San Francisco and Los Angeles markets, and, in addition, she will coordinate publicity and promotion activities for Epic and Okeh artist appearances in these vicinities.

'Fiddler' Up For 10 Tonys

NEW YORK—"Fiddler On The Roof" is up for 10 Tony awards this year, the most nominations in any category among the Broadway offerings presented between May 1 of last year and May 17, 1965. Two English musicals follow in total award nominations, "Half A Sixpence," with 9, and "Roar Of The Greasepaint," which closed out the 1964-65 musical season, with six. Final winners will be announced on June 13. The Tony is presented for "distinguished contributions to the theater."

Pitney To Produce Fall Road Spectacular

NEW YORK—Nat Kalcheim last week announced that as a result of the highly favorable reception accorded Gene Pitney's "Shower Of Stars" package, the Musicor singing star will produce his own teen-age road spectacular for the fall season, under the banner of the William Morris Agency.

The current package, a six-week schedule of one-nighters, began on Apr. 16 and is to run through the end of this month (30). Jerry Brandt, head of the agency's music division in New York, estimates that the tour, organized and sold by the firm for Tim Tormey and Dick Clark, will have grossed in excess of a quarter of a million dollars by its completion, establishing itself as the nation's top grossing show of its kind for 1965.

PHILADELPHIA—As part of an expansion move, Al Melnick's Philly distributor outlet, Alsam, has added the Audio Fidelity label to the various lines it handles in the area.

Jankowski Instrumental Gets Lyrics From Mercury

CHICAGO—Marking the first time in many years that Mercury Records has issued a cover of its own original hit, the label has rush released a vocal version of the Horst Jankowski hottie, "A Walk In The Black Forest," entitled "I'll Walk With You."

The lyric to the instrumental smash, written by Kal Mann, a Philadelphia writer responsible for many Cameo-Parkway hits, was recorded last week by the Bitter End Singers to complement the Jankowski version.

Stirring up more Jankowski momentum was the report from the William Morris Agency's German affiliate indicating that the artist would be arriving in New York later this week, with scheduled appearances on the "Merv Griffin Show" and "Shindig." Other video stops are also included in his U.S. itinerary, as well as concert appearances, with repertoire ranging from jazz thru semi-classical.

Earlier this year, the label released Jankowski's debut album in the states, following his many successes in Germany on Mercury's affiliated Philips label. Titled, "Bravo Jankowski," the LP found it hard getting off the ground due to the artist's relatively unknown status here, which prompted a release of the single, "Walk In The Black Forest" and a retitling of the album to "The Genius Of Jankowski." Since then LP sales have soared, now exceeding 70,000, while the single continues to make strong moves up the charts.

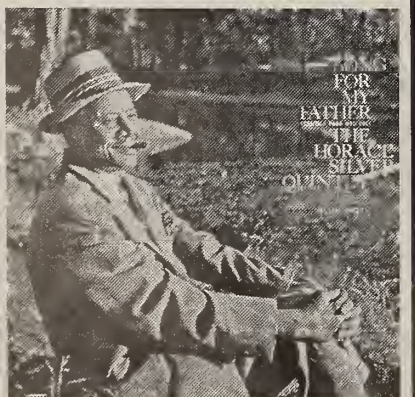

Tape Association (MRIA) Merges With EIA

WASHINGTON—The Magnetic Recording Industry Association and the Electronic Industries Association have agreed to merge under a plan adopted by members of both associations.

Approval of the merger plan was announced jointly last week by W. G. Paradis, MRIA president, and James D. Secrest, EIA executive vice president, following a proxy meeting of EIA members. MRIA members had previously approved the proposal following affirmative action by both boards of directors. Paradis is vice president and general manager of the radio products division of Warwick Electronics Inc., Chicago.

"We believe this merger will be beneficial to members of both associations and will enable EIA to strengthen its representation in an important sector of the electronics industry," Paradis and Secrest said in a joint statement.

"The combined organization will operate under the name of EIA because of its comprehensive character, representing manufacturers of all electronic products. However, members of MRIA will have a 'home' in EIA which will adapt its organization and services to meet the requirements of the producers of magnetic recording equipments and components."

A conference of former MRIA members, including those who have been EIA members as well, has been scheduled on May 26 at the O'Hare Inn in Chicago.

"The purpose of this meeting," Secrest explained, "is to let MRIA members get acquainted with EIA and to let EIA officers and staff members know what is expected of EIA as a result of the merger."

MRIA was formed in 1952 in New York City. It later moved its headquarters to Chicago.

MRIA had more than 30 members of which eight have also belonged to EIA. Most of the new members will be interested either to the consumer products division or the Parts Division. The latter already has several sections operating in the magnetic components area.

The MRIA-EIA merger will become effective on issuance of a certificate by the state of Illinois in which both associations were incorporated.

Colpix' Levine Starts Heavy A&R Schedule

HOLLYWOOD — After a month's orientation as the new west coast A&R director for Colpix/Dimension, Hank Levine is settling down to a heavy disk production schedule.

Having just completed a single session with The Bushmen, he's preparing single dates for at least six other artists, completing one album, arranging another, cutting commercials and starting to score a film. And he hopes to accomplish all of this within the next 30 days.

With Coca-Cola commercials and the scoring of a new Universal film, presently titled "The Fit," the former free lance arranger-conductor plans to utilize outside arrangers in the future. Levine reports that Gene Page is already set to chart the Peterson and Livingston dates.

Previously Levine was associated with a number of hit singles including "Walk Like A Man" by Jody Miller, "Tips Of My Fingers" by Roy Clark, "Tragedy" by The Fleetwoods, "Sacred" by the Castells, "Doll House" by Donnie Brooks, "Uptown" by The Crystals "I Love How You Love Me" by The Paris Sisters and "Silver City" by The Ventures.

Paramount Pics Doubles Income For 1st Qtr. of '65

NEW YORK—The Paramount Pictures Corp., the parent firm of Dot Records, more than doubled its earnings in the first quarter, according to a report issued last week by George Weltner, president of the company.

Consolidated net profit of Paramount for the quarter ended Apr. 3 amounted to \$2,186,000, equal to \$1.39 a share, on 1,569,956 shares outstanding. In the same period last year the company earned \$1,041,000, or 63 cents a share from operations. An additional gain of \$723,000, or 44 cents a share, from the sale of investment, brought the net income for 1964 to a total of \$1,764,000, or \$1.07 a share.

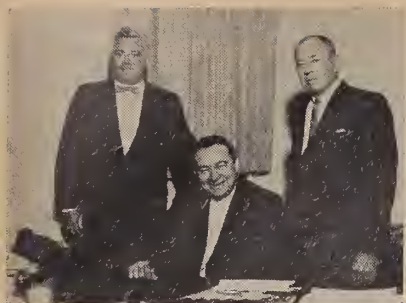

From there, the Sinatra-Basie-Jones combination will head for New York, where it will headline the Forest Hills Music Festival on July 9 and 10. Complying with Sinatra's wishes, Don Friedman and William Gruman, producers of the festival, scaled seats at the reasonable prices of \$2.95, \$3.95, \$4.95, \$5.95 and \$6.95.

After leaving New York, the group will depart for concerts in Detroit, Baltimore, Chicago and Washington, D.C.

NEW YORK—In an effort to acquaint millions of air travelers with the wide-ranging product of Columbia and Epic Records, Columbia Special Products has completed negotiations with Trans World Airlines to have the diversified catalogs of both labels heard on the airline's Boeing 707 StarStream flights.

HOLLYWOOD — Burton Records, latest venture for real estate man Burt Sugarman, has located offices at 9206 Cordell Meuse in Los Angeles. The firm plans to utilize the talents of several indie producers and has already signed up a number of "name" film and television performers, including Mamie Van Doren, Carole Wells, Patti Chandler and Bob Denver (who plays Gilligan on "Gilligan's Island"). Sugarman reports that he's planning to spend about \$125,000 for recording an exploitation during the next four months. National promotion manager is Leland Rogers.

The first eight sides have been cut with national distribution set and foreign licenses being negotiated. Firm is an outgrowth of 26 year old Sugarman's interest in the music industry over the past several years. Also set is a BMI publishing firm, Burt Sugarman Enterprises Inc.

One of the first sides includes the Explosions' recording of "Work With Me Annie," which Imperial Records has purchased for immediate release. Under the agreement, finalized by Bob Skaff for Imperial, Burton will continue to produce future Explosions' singles for the Imperial label. Sugarman, also involved in management, will handle the group which is scheduled to introduce the single on this week's (26) "Shindig" television show.

Sugarman is presently negotiating for an interest in at least two night clubs here and on the east coast and is planning to produce his first feature musical film before the end of the year.

Marty Hoffman To Mercury Promo In N.Y.



CHICAGO — Moving to further strengthen its lines of communication in the East, Mercury Records has named Marty Hoffman to the New York office to work with press and media sources, representing Mercury and its affiliated labels. Irwin Steinberg, exec. vp of Mercury, says that Hoffman will be working with publicity director John Sippel, headquarters in the home office Myrna Greenfield, who will continue to work out of New York for Imperial, the jazz affiliate, and Charles Gilbert, who handles the classical of Mercury product.

Hoffman is a veteran entertainment and record industry publicist, entering the field in 1952 with the Sotheby's O'Rourke Public Relations firm. From 1956 through 1962 he was assistant publicity director for the Decca, Capitol and Brunswick labels. He has also been affiliated with the Fred Warshaw personal management company where he was active in the development of The Serendipity Singers, The Toliver and the Bitter End Singers, respectively Philips and Mercury artists.

Hi Inks Venice Stalks

MEMPHIS—Venice Stalks along with her combo, the Scepters, have been inked to a five-year Hi recording contract, it was announced last week by Joe Coughi, president of the label.

Coughi said that an initial single utilizing original material would be released in the immediate future.

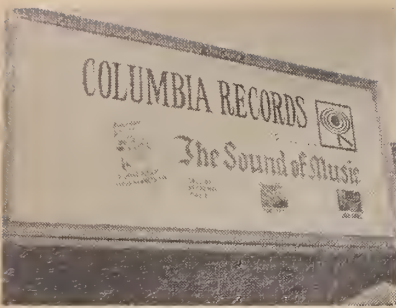

Keepnews To Exit Colpix

HOLLYWOOD — Orrin Keepnews, merchandising manager of Colpix/Dimension Records, will exit his position there at the end of this month in order to return to A&R work. Keepnews, whose present position is involved principally with promotion advertising and publicity, has spent 13 years in the industry, primarily as an A&R producer and executive with the now-defunct Riverside label, which he helped found. In that capacity, he was closely associated with the careers of such artists as Cannonball Adderley, Thelonious Monk, Bill Evans, Charlie Byrd, Mongo Santamaria, Wes Montgomery and the Staple Singers, among others.

Full details of his future plans have not been made known as yet, but his immediate future activities will involve independent production in a variety of fields, specifically including several projects for Colpix.

Atlantic Signs New Orleans Producer

NEW YORK—Atlantic Records has signed New Orleans producer Wardell Querzerque, head of Nola Productions, to produce singles for the label. Querzerque is the producer of the Willie Tee r&b hit, "Teasin' You," as well as the current Tee outing, "Thank You, John." The deal was set by Atlantic veep Jerry Wexler, who returned last week from a whirlwind trip to New Orleans and Memphis.

While in New Orleans, Wexler also picked up two masters for the label, Bennie Spellman's "The Word Game" and Eddie Bo's "Timber," a new dance which is a variation of the Jerk. The latter was obtained from Cosmo Matessa and the former from Joe Banashak, with whom Wexler also made a deal for Atlantic to issue an LP with Chris Kenner. This will be the artist's first album and will contain all of his hits, including "I Like It Like That" and "Land Of 1000 Dances."

While in Memphis, the label veep attended a recording session featuring Stax artist Wilson Pickett, which was recorded by Jim Stewart and Steve Cropper. Atlantic, which distributes Stax, is now rushing out the new Pickett single, "In The Midnight Hour."

20th Century-Fox Raises Earnings

NEW YORK—The Twentieth Century Film Corp., the parent firm of the 20th C-F label, tripled its earnings in the first quarter of 1965.

In the first three months of this year earnings totaled \$2,899,000, or \$1.05 a share compared with earnings of \$909,000, or 33 cents a share in the corresponding period last year. A provision for federal income taxes was not required for 1965 and 1964 because of a net operating loss carry-forward utilizing foreign tax credits and provisions recorded in preceding years for the purpose of financial statements.

Total revenues rose to \$30,363,000 from \$22,262,000 a year earlier, with gains achieved in flick production and in film series made for television.

James Inks New Cap Pact

HOLLYWOOD — Sonny James has just signed a new long-term recording contract with Capitol Records, it was announced last week by Voyle Gilmore, the label's vice-president of A&R.

The chanter, who is currently riding high on the charts with "I'll Keep Holding On," is one of the key artists in Capitol's current C&W program and has just released a new LP tabbed after his single hit as part of the two-month long country campaign.

Tom Smothers Goes Pop

BEVERLY HILLS—Tom Smothers, well-known for his clowning antics as part of the Smothers Brothers comedy duo, has added a new member to the act with the arrival of his brand new son, Thomas Bolyn Smothers IV. Smothers' wife, Stephi, gave birth to the baby at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital, giving the folk-comic just enough time to slip into the nursery for a quick look at his firstborn before catching a plane to Texas in order to meet up with Brother Dick for concert dates in Houston, Austin and Dallas.

Although the brothers had taken a three-week hiatus to await the blessed event, nature didn't cooperate and so the trip to the hospital had to be sandwiched in between the duo's appearance at the CBS affiliates' buffet dinner at the Beverly Hilton Hotel.

The Smothers Brothers will be hosting their own comedy series on CBS-TV next fall.

The Byrds, who are currently burning up the charts with their first Columbia recording of "Mr. Tambourine Man," were formed in Los Angeles last August.

Individually they have a substantial amount of experience. One was a New Christy Minstrel, another was leader of a bluegrass group, a third was the lead guitarist for Bobby Darin.

Though the crew was only formed a comparatively short time ago, their collective success in the last month has not been an accident. Before releasing them on the public, their management—previously deeply involved in folk music—trained the Byrds and prepared them for what they knew would be a highly competitive field.

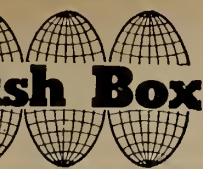
Their deck was not due to be released in England but public demand—the record having been played on the powerful pirate, Radio Caroline—forced Columbia to rush release "Mr. Tambourine Man" on May 21.

Cal Tjader

The name Cal Tjader belongs to the prominent front line cadre of jazz artists that are "household words." Entering the world as Callen Radcliffe Tjader, Jr. in St. Louis on July 16, 1925, Cal today maintains and enjoys a worldly status as leader of a continuing jazz group of respected artistry.

While still an undergraduate at San Francisco State College in 1948, he managed to include traveling and playing drums and bongos with the pristine edition of Dave Brubeck's trio. Later, Cal's talents were re-directed towards vibraphone as his major instrument and by 1953 he answered the beckoning of the George Shearing Quintet during its spurt to popularity. Cal's exposure with Shearing earned him the 1955 "New Star" award for vibes in Down Beat Magazine's International Jazz Critic's Poll. The rest is history.

Over the past decade the Tjader quartet has played some of the top night clubs both in the U. S. and abroad. The group is currently scoring with their single and LP of "Soul Sauce" on the Verve label.

JIMMIE DAVIS (Decca 31797)

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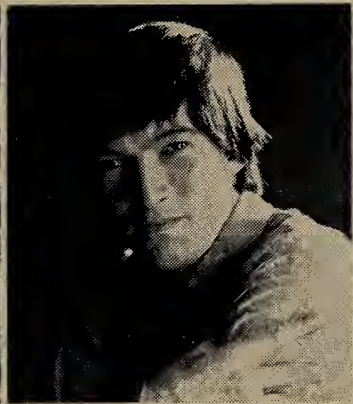
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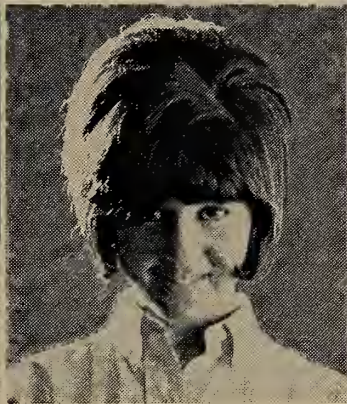
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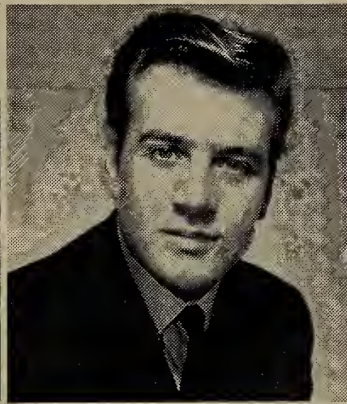

The British Song Festival at Brighton



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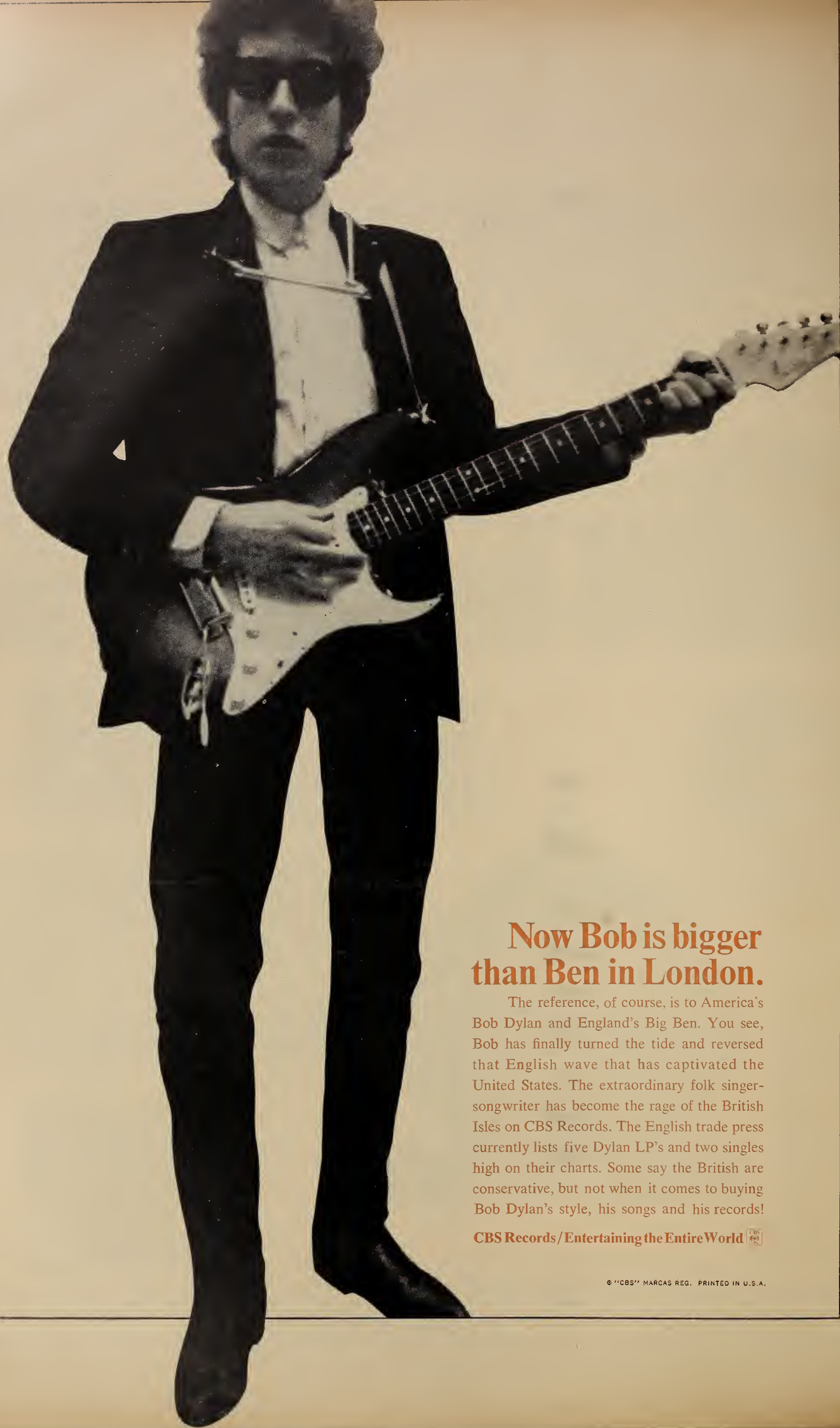

The first British Song Festival at Brighton takes place this Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, May 24, 25 and 26. Organized by the Music Publishers' Association the Festival comes at a time when British material and British artists are enjoying greater global success than ever before. The songs presented at Brighton have all been penned by Britain's top writers and composers and will be sung by some of this country's most popular performers. They are pictured above in alphabetical order.



Now Bob is bigger than Ben in London.

The reference, of course, is to America's Bob Dylan and England's Big Ben. You see, Bob has finally turned the tide and reversed that English wave that has captivated the United States. The extraordinary folk singer-songwriter has become the rage of the British Isles on CBS Records. The English trade press currently lists five Dylan LP's and two singles high on their charts. Some say the British are conservative, but not when it comes to buying Bob Dylan's style, his songs and his records!

Cash Box GREAT BRITAIN

Burlington Music is delighted with Roger Miller's success here in England, and the firm's foresight in arranging, with Philips Records, for Miller to make his first appearances here has certainly paid off. Miller, whose previous disks "Me" and "Chug a Lug" did very well in the States failed to make the same here. Philips then issued "King of the Road" and it garnered a lot of attention and started moving very slowly. Burlington Music decided that a re-appearance by Miller might do the trick. The result? Resounding success for Miller personally; a No. 2 in the Top Twenty charts and a ready-made public buying for his follow-up "Engine, Engine, No. 9" (Philips). Burlington Music since 1963.

Dave Clark Five make their third tour of the States, arriving June 13, and will include four weeks of p.a.'s, radio and TV. Prior to the Stateside tour, Clark leaves Britain May 23) Clark makes his first visit to Australia and New Zealand. His popularity in America is still as strong as ever although it has faded over here during the last few months. His current British single "The Home" (Columbia), which was released in America at the beginning of the year and reached the No. 12 position.

Pitt, who heads up the Good Music publishing company, formed his independent production company, Riot Productions, a few months back. Now having his first taste of success via "That's How Strong My Love" in the In Crowd which is published by Bourne Music. Pitt has also waxed with Charles McDevitt and Shirley Douglas, and a single, "The What Is Least", a number specially penned for them by Donovan, and a single with the release of the Jack La Vien production, "A King's" Philips has issued the original soundtrack album with narration by The Duke and Duchess of Windsor. The background music, which was composed by Ivor Slaney, is published by La Vien Music, a subsidiary of the Riot organization.

Writer Mike Hawker, responsible for many hits by many top British artists, has joined the Mercury Division of Philips Records as A & R Manager. Johnny Franz remains in charge and will supervise all recordings and will seek out new talent for the label. Mercury recently scored considerable chart success via Julie Rogers' "The Wedding," followed by "Like A" Philips have quite a few potential charters lined up including the new single by Wayne Fontana and the Mindbenders, "It's Just A Little Bit Too" (Fontana); Roger Miller's follow up to the "King of the Road" smash, "Engine, No. 9" (Philips) and Julie Rogers' "Sudden Love" (Mercury), which will be presenting at the British Song Festival.

Can r & b artist Donnie Elbert flies in for ten days of TV, radio and appearances on June 2. The visit is timed to coincide with the release of "A Piece of Leather," issued here on Sue (a subsidiary of the Island Record). The Aladin label, which Island formed earlier this year to take a pop catalogue, has released a single by Dinah Lee, a New Zealand artist who has had considerable success in the States. The disking is her version of "The Nitty Gritty" (Shirley Ellis made the American charts but failed to make it here) and the songstress flies in to promote the record on her tour. During her stay in Britain she will cut several tracks for a subsequent release.

Of the Sparta copyrights entered for the British Song Festival, "From the Bottom of My Heart" by the Moody Blues, has already been placed in the States, France and Germany, and cover versions including a Johnny Rivers disk is being lined up. Another entry, "Here In My Arms," penned by Shaper and Tom Springfield has also been taken for these territories.

and cover versions are being lined up. Expanding its publishing activities, Sparta has recently opened an office in Scandinavia in association with V. Helm Hansen, and a German branch within the Peter Meisel organization. The third Festival entry shared with Lynch Music (part of the Belinda (London) Organization) "I'll Stay By You" was also penned by Shaper in partnership with singer Kenny Lynch.

Gene Barry flew into Britain for a season at London's Talk of the Town, commencing May 17. It comes as a surprise to Britain that Barry, better known here for his "Burke's Law" TV series, is also a cabaret artist and has appeared in several American musicals. He also makes his disk debut here with "Gene Barry Sings of Love and Things" on RCA and appears in "Sunday Night at the London Palladium" May 24.

We regret that we gave the impression that Marianne Faithfull was under the management of Tony Calder in a recent column. She is, of course, entirely contracted to Gerry Bron of Bron Associated Publishers.

Cyril Shane of Shapiro Bernstein is raving about one of his company's entries for the British Song Festival, "Leave A Little Love," from the pens of Les Reed and Robin Conrad, to be sung by Lulu, the little Scots girl who stepped into chart stardom with her recording of "Shout". So confident is Shane about this copyright that he predicts not only British success but world wide acclaim. The number is also to be waxed by French singer Johnny Hallyday for September release in France.

Johnny Bev, responsible with Des Champ, for the Maureen Evans song for the British Song Festival, has his own disk release as a singer on Columbia with a Rod McEwan composition, "You Pass Me By," published by Ambassador Music.

Pye artist Mark Wynter has chosen the oldie "Someday (You'll Want To Want You)" for his current disking, which has been given an up-to-date arrangement by a & r manager Tony Hatch. Other releases from Pye include Chuck Berry on Chess with "Dear Dad," and "Red Bird Goldies," featuring big hits of the Red label by such artists as the Dixie Cups, the Shangri-Las and the Ad Libs, etc.

When the Telstar TV satellite first made headlines late in 1962, independent producer Joe Meek was so impressed by the enormity of the project that he penned a tune entitled "Telstar" and recorded it by a group called The Tornados. As everyone knows, the disk was a fantastic success topping charts on both sides of the Atlantic and having the distinction of being the first recipient of the Cash Box International Gold Award. The disk, which on Decca has sold over 5,000,000 copies around the world and is still selling. Now after watching the first Early Bird transmission, Meek has penned another tune, called it "Early Bird," formed a new group called The Tornados and the disk has been issued by Decca. Meek, Decca and the publisher's Music are all hoping that "Early Bird" will repeat the success of that treasured setter, "Telstar".

The 1st British Song Festival: The Time Is Right

It is surprising that, despite several attempts in the past to set up the kind of British Song Festival, such an event has even materialized in this year. All praise therefore to the Music Publishers' Association for succeeding where others have failed and for turning an age-long dream into reality. The time is right for such a Festival. During the past few years the musical eyes of the world have been focused with growing intensity on the British music scene. British writers and artists, established in their own homes, soon found their songs and words infiltrating the continental markets from one end of Europe to the other. Consolidation in the East led to consternation in the West as the British sound broke through the seemingly impenetrable transatlantic barrier and set about conquering the American and world market. Suddenly London became the mecca of the music industry and recording execu-

tives, music publishers, agents and managers from all over the world arrived to view the scene and buy the goods bearing the all important "Made in Britain" tag. Thus the British Song Festival becomes a magnificent 'shop window' for our pop music offering visitors to our shores an ideal opportunity for getting together. Cash Box joins the organizers in extending a warm welcome to all those who plan to attend the Festival at Brighton which is confidently expected to become the San Remo of Britain. San Remo, which started life as a small local project, has now achieved international status. The Brighton Festival is expected to follow a similar pattern and it is hoped that in time the event, which today is one hundred per cent national, will develop into a major international affair with artists from many countries coming to sing British songs. Over 500 songs were submitted to publishers for consideration from

which the Committee selected 70. When it was known which artists had accepted invitations to take part in the Festival their names were circulated by the M.P.A. to its members. The artists were then sent a selection of songs suitable to their style for their consideration and choice. These are the 16 songs to be presented at Brighton. To ensure one hundred per cent success the M.P.A. maintained close contact with the recording companies to ensure that the material sung at the Festival had hit potential for world wide exposure. The heats of the contest will be held on Monday, May 24th and Tuesday, May 25th. Eight songs will be sung on each night and a panel of ten top disk jockeys (five each night) will judge which four songs on each evening shall go into the final on Wednesday, May 26th. The finals will be judged by a panel made up of TV producers from each of the 14 regions who will be present in the concert

hall. The Grand Prix award to be presented to the winner is an imposing Challenge Trophy called "The Golden Manuscript" on which will be inscribed the music of "Greensleeves"—the oldest traditional English song still alive in the field of pop music today. Production of the contest will be by ITV company, Associated Radio diffusion who will be covering the three nights with nation-wide transmissions. The orchestra of Bob Miller and The Millermen plus a special string section has been engaged to accompany the artists. The promotion of the Festival has been handled by London Impresario, Arthur Howell and press and publicity by Leslie Perrier Associated Ltd. The Brighton Corporation has been most cooperative in giving the organizers every possible assistance and they are hosting a civic reception at the famous Dome and Pavillion as a climax to the three-day event.

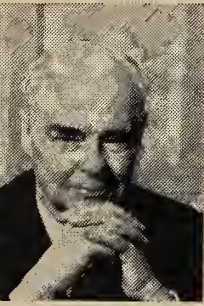

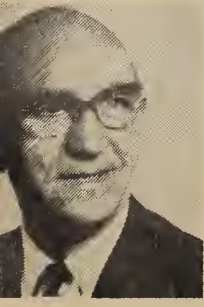

The retail level of records in Australia is already the highest of any English speaking country far as we know; and sales on a pro rata population basis, are probably the best. We don't see how a price increase can help this situation. Perhaps some serious thought should be given to a reduction in price. This surely would do more to stimulate sales.

Noleen Batley, one of Festival records leading stars, who recently returned from three weeks in Japan, will spend the next couple of weeks in Sydney promoting her next single which is slated for simultaneous release in Japan and Australia later this month. Both titles are original Japanese songs and sung in Japanese by the songstress who spent the best part of a week learning the Japanese lyric. The titles are "Ho Ho Ni Hikaita Namida" and "Aima No Ankosan."

Among the latest big batch of singles from E.M.I. we find Cilla Black with "I've Been Wrong Before," "Help Me, Rhonda" by the Beach Boys, Jody Miller's "Queen Of The House," "I'll Be Doggone" from Marvin Gaye and "Daddy" by Reparata & the Delrons.

Southern Music has printed and released a whole flock of sheets in conjunction with the locally recorded album by Neil Williams, entitled "Roman- tically Yours," which is on the CBS label. The record has been the subject of some controversy here and a couple of important radio stations have so far refused to program it, however, sales are reported to be continually improving.

Local lass Robyn Alvarez, who is a ballet star turned pop singer, has a new single out on the London label, through the Festival organization, which couples "Love Of The Love" with "Nothing."

John Emmerson, from Allans Music house, reports the ten best sellers in sheet music as follows. "I'll Never Find Another You," "Do What You Do Do Well," "Rock And Roll Music," "The Wedding," "I Know A Place," "Red Roses For A Blue Lady," "It's Not Unusual," "King Of The Road," "Down- town" and "Times They Are A-Changin'."

Looks as though the movie version of "The Sound Of Music" is off to a great start. We see enormous queues lining up outside the theatre for bookings.

W & G Records rush-released a single featuring the Sunglows with "Pea- nuts," which is enjoying chart ratings on Cash Box 100 right now.

Australian Record Company has released an album to coincide with the appearance of Sarah Vaughan at a leading Australian night club for four weeks. The set on the Roulette label is titled "The World Of Sarah Vaughan," and her latest single from the same label, "A Taste Of Honey c/w "The Good Life," has also been released.

One of RCA's top disc attractions is Digger Revell, who has a new single out with "My Prayer" and "High School Confidential." Revell backed by his group the Denvermen, plus orchestra directed by Thomas Tycho, who is a leading musician in television.

On the subject of local discs, the outstanding success story is that of GO!! records, which is a subsidiary of Astor Records. They have made two releases to date and both of them have become national hits which (to those who know the Australian trade) is quite historic. The boss of the GO!! label, Neville Smith, is naturally delighted at the success of GO!! and believes the success of the label proves that if you come up with the right record it will do well no matter where it originates from.

For Phillips records it looks as though popular Julie Rodgers is heading for the number one spot again with her standout revival of "The Hawaiian Wedding." She is still enjoying chart action with "The Wedding."

DAVE BERRY (DECCA)

23 year old Dave Berry is noted as much for the unique and colorful presentation of his act as for his rhythm and blues style of singing. Early experience was gained by singing in pubs and clubs. MAUREEN EVANS (CBS)

drop of Holland's annual shower of Queen's birthday honours fell on the famous HMV artist Toon Hermans, who was appointed officer in chief of Oranje-Nassau for his outstanding artistic efforts. The label this week released several strong Cash Box toppers, including "Before You Go," Johnny Miller's "Queen Of The House" and "Help Me Rhonda," among others. The label ordered a series of Beach Boys films scheduled for TV-plugging in the course of this year.

There is new EP's out by Cor Steyn, Les Shalom and the Dutch organ "The Great Gavioli." Gramophonehouse furthermore reports the Cocktail Trio's latest hit, "Vlooiencircus," is making top sales at the moment.

The Columbia label reports fast sales for Cliff Richard's "Look In My Mirror," released on a 45 rpm EP here. Also on the agenda this week are the new releases by Herman's Hermits, Freddy & the Dreamers, the Seekers and the

In the spring, Phonogram develops a special sales-action, in close cooperation with prominent dealers in Amsterdam, Rotterdam, the Hague, Delft and The Hague, to reach the many foreign summer tourists to this country. In addition, the luxuriously designed albums in various languages stress the organ music, and are in highest demand, especially among American tourists. Among these organs, the barrel-organ "The Arab" is the most popular. The albums with organ medleys always feature richly illustrated covers on the instrument in question and some extra articles on Holland as a favorite tourist country. A very interesting release in the tourist LP field is the album "This Is Holland" with organ medleys, carillon sounds, Dutch folk-dances, the Band of the Royal Marines, the Pro Musica choir and an accordion-group the Three Jacksons. The album itself surpasses every other in this field, with magnificent color-illustrations of typical Dutch customs and home industries. To attract tourists, prominent dealers are provided with large cardboard displays, eye-catching pieces in the form of windmills.

Holland's classical record-market, 10" LP's of well-known concerts keep selling steadily and large sale, indicating that demand for this type of music is insatiable, although prices cannot be called popular. However, attention should be flawless, featuring the best possible interpretations by soloists and orchestras whose names have the strongest impact on the record-buying public. The Dutch Philips series coded VR (or VZ for the stereo) are offering soloists like Haskil, Haebler, Grumiaux, Oistrakh and others in their latest releases.

Sensational discoveries at S.P.P. (Philips France) of Edith Piaf's latest recordings, old shellac pressings from the Thirties which had been out of the catalogues in later years, have led to a most interesting LP, "Edith Piaf Du Temps De La Môme Piaf." The set was also released in Holland with already remarkable success.

Full advantage of the tremendous popularity of the Pretty Things (their appearance in Holland caused sensation and wild controversies here, their recording of "Road Runner" (Fontana) is jumping up the hit parade. The group is in particular was already in demand, since the release of the group's first single the number as a featured song.

Fontana's "Folk Blues USA" series on the Fontana label, an even bigger success than expected, has been extended with three albums of famous American blues singers, Jimmy Reed ("Things Ain't What They Used To Be"), Slim Bees ("Bee's Back In Town") and the late Big Bill Broonzy ("The Man In Mind").

At a general meeting in Paris, between French, German and Belgian Vogue Records, it was decided that, more and more, Negram will have the full co-operation in the common release programme for Europe. It (Continued on next column)

It was also decided that Germany and Holland will take care of the distribution scheme for the common market, which further proves that, with this organization, the force of each company will come up very fast and very efficiently. This Paris meeting, so reports Negram's Robert O. will have a very important bearing on the future.

Delta's "Het Spel Kaarten" (Deck of Cards), which jumped into Dutch market as a bomb, will be released in Germany by Deutsche Vogue German version, also developed in Holland. Deutsche Vogue's Lawrence Ya said that this record will also go into the German market with full promotion and he expects another hit from the item, in that area.

From the hit field, Negram announced very important news. After the successful performance of the Everly Brothers, "That Will Be The Day" caused a fantastic demand in this country and new releases from Sandie Shaw, Honeycombs, Francoise Hardy, the Ivy League, Jackie Trent and Trini Lopez are expected to be the new hits for the month of May. Present hits such as Kinks and Dean Martin's "Send Me The Pillow," along with Guy Martin's "N'Avoue Jamais" have reached a fine place in the Dutch hit parade.

A TV contract was signed by Sandie Shaw for two shows, on which she will sing 8 titles for Dutch TV.

Last week Eurodisc's famous singer, Rudolf Schock was in Holland together with Margit Schramm and Werner Boelke to do a two hour program which Dutch broadcasted in a relay programme with Radio Munich in Germany. In advance there was a successful press conference and new plans are in making to have Schock return to this country for a 14-day tour in the autumn. His latest disc attained good sales in this country.

CBS Holland released a tremendous new Album by the international famous Dutch Dixieland band, the Down Town Jazz Band, founded by pianist Roefie Hueting in the early part of 1952. The Album features well-known Dixieland standards such as "Weary Blues," "St. Louis Blues," "Royal Gallop Blues," "High Society," "When The Saints," "Tiger Rag," "Battle Hymn Of The Republic" and "South Rampart Street Parade." Recently, CBS Holland released the first Stereo Album of the Jacob Sisters. The 4 German girls frequently appear in person in Holland, being very popular artists in the Netherlands as well as in other European countries.

Recent releases in the CBS' pop album field include another album by the famous C & W songster Marty Robbins, entitled "The Song Of Robb" featuring such items as "Lovesick Blues," "I Hang My Head And Cry," "Bouquet Of Roses" and many others.

Further, CBS Holland released an album entitled "The First Hurrah!" by the Clancy Brothers & Tommy Makem and Johnny Mathis' "I'll Search My Heart." Also, in the "Spoken Word, Documentary Series," CBS Holland released a package entitled "De Carco A Voltaire," Vol. I & II, a two-record set, narrated by the well-known French actor Jean-Marc Tennberg, and containing short stories and poems by French poets and novelists.

 latest local releases from Scandia-Musikki Oy, all on the Scandia label, include Eija Merilä with "Anteeksi" (Amore Scusami) b/w "Nuoruuden Leikit," Finnish group the Renegades has done "Motelot"/"You Love Me Too," while Konpojat (Flower Boys) have cut "Minne Kukat Kadonneet?" NORWAY
 The invasion of foreign artists in Norway is considerably great this year. The Everly Brothers were in Oslo on April 24. The Animals appeared at the Sæderkøppen in Oslo on May 4. During a Fair at Sarpsborg in May, several artists were contracted for appearances. Bobby Bare was there May 21, Emile Ford and His Original Checkmates will be there on May 27 and Josephine Baker, May 29. The Searchers are contracted for a tour all over Scandinavia June 1 to 14, and Millie will make no less than three tours in Scandinavia this summer, the first one June 12 to 21, including Norway and Sweden, the second, June 25 to 28, in Sweden only, and the third between July 18 and August 28, which includes the whole of Scandinavia. This information was sent to Cash Box by Arne Bendiksen A/S who has booked the above mentioned artists for Norway.

The Beatles again topped the list of best selling LP's during May. Their "Beatles For Sale," as number one, was their only record on the Top 20 LP chart. Jim Reeves came second with "The Best Of Jim Reeves," fifth with "The Jim Reeves Way" and seventh with "Gentleman Jim." The Rolling Stones led up at third spot with "The Rolling Stones No. 2," at eighth spot with "The Rolling Stones" and 12th with "Around And Around." At fourth spot on the soundtrack from "My Fair Lady," and 10th was another soundtrack recording, "Goldfinger." Sven Ingvars, the Swedish group who has been doing so well here this year, came sixth with "Sven Ingvars," and finally, Elvis Presley held the ninth spot with his album "Roustabout," while his "A Hard Day's Night" came in 13th.

Bobby Bare was awarded a Gold Disk after selling 25,000 copies of his "100 Miles Away From Home." About a year ago, when appearing in Norway, he got a Silver Disk for his "Detroit City." This is the 10th Silver Disk awarded this year, an unusually high figure, but it seems as if a hit in Norway these days, means great sales, very great compared with some years ago. Aftenbladet, a daily paper in Oslo, is handing out the Silver and Gold Disks and has done so for several years now.

The first year has been very busy and very successful, Jørg-Fr. Ellertsen reports to Cash Box. It was in May a year ago he started his own company, Jørg-Fr. Ellertsen A/S, with the labels Troll and Kristne Toner. The first records from the new company were released May 10 last year. Since then the company has released 48 singles, 8 EP's and 4 LP's, all local products. Looking back at the first year, Ellertsen says that the sales result must be considered satisfactory, considering that the company has been working mainly with record debutants. One American, one Swedish and 40 Norwegian acts are signed with the company and are released on the Troll label. Religious records are on Kristne Toner. Latest releases from Troll includes debutant Rigmor Kaller, 14, with "Lille Dukke," a Norwegian version of this year's Eurovision winner "Poupée de Cire, Poupée de Son."

SWEDEN
 Music publisher Thore Ehrling, head of Ehrlingförlagen, is off for the British Song Festival. His one month long trip also takes him to New York where he expects to see old and new business contacts.

Japan is a coming market, according to reports from everybody here. More and more Swedish recordings are finding their way to Japanese record buyers, Cash Box learned. Helge Roundquist of Cupol Records said he is having negotiations with the far East at the moment and Roland Ferneborg of Swesc has had several LP's released in Japan so far, with more coming. Gunnar Bergström of Sonet Records AB also reported that he has just had his first LP's released in Japan.

Cupol will release Eartha Kitt on a new label in Sweden for the future, Cash Box has learned. At the moment the company is more than busy handling the independent label, Olga (distributed by Cupol here), where the Hep Stars is currently the top group with no less than three records on the charts.

Ake Oquist, head of Moonlight Music and the label Midnight Sun Records sounds satisfied with the start of his company, since he was lucky enough to get a top seller with the Bjellars & Tine recording of an old Swedish standard. Lars Lindau of Philips-Sonora AB is back behind his desk again after 30 days in military service. Handling the CBS label at the company, he found himself having plenty of new records to listen to when he returned to work. Also away for another two weeks, from the same company, is Sture Borgehl of Sonora Musikförlags AB, Philips' publishing dept. He has just visited the California-based publishers and is currently visiting business friends in New York.

LP sales are growing in Sweden these days, while most people feel that singles and EP sales are down, saleswise. In any case, it seems that within a short time, Sweden will no longer be primarily an EP market since, among others, the teenagers seem to favor singles for pop tunes and LP's for the standards.

Among foreign artists visiting Sweden are Alma Cogan, who opened recently in Gothenburg, P. J. Proby, just opening in Stockholm, Georgie Fame, coming here around June 1st, the Downliners Sect, coming in for a concert in Stockholm this weekend and several more during June and July.

Lennart Reuterskiöld of Reuter & Reuter AB has been finding his present business trip to Eastern Europe very interesting. Despite certain copyright control problems that still have to be solved in some cases, there is a lot of stuff to find in eastern Europe, and much of it may very well have a market in the western hemisphere.

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We wish to start our column this week by devoting a few lines to a well-known Decca disk which recently has been released here by Decca Italiana. The record to which we refer, is the first stereo recording of the Wagner's opera "Il Crepuscolo Degli Dei," done by the Philharmonic Orchestra of Wien, conducted by Solti. The operatic cast is composed of Grace Hoffman, Anita Valkki, Helen Watts, Clara Watson, Fischer Diskau, Christa Ludwig, with Wolfgang Windgassen and Birgit Nilsson as protagonists.

This is, of course, the first stereophonic recording of Wagner's famous opera, presented not only on the Italian market, but on the world record scene, and this is the reason why we wished to point it out. The release was announced to CB by Paolo Tosi manager of Decca Italiana.

Back to the light music field, but still on the subject of Decca, we would like to mention the latest release of the successful English group The Rolling Stones, called "The Last Time."

Our friend Benito Vassura, owner of Jaguar Records, has put in the spotlight an LP released by the famous tenor, Gino Bechi, marking the artist's return to the record scene. Title of the disk is "Le Belle Canzoni Italiane" (The Best Italian Songs), and it constitutes an anthology of some of the most famous Italian compositions from the year 1920 until 1964. On the A side of the disk songs from 1920 to 1964 include "Miniera," "Tango Delle Capinere," "Chitarra Romana," "Piccola Butterfly," "Mandolinata A Sera," "Terra Straniera," and "Io Che Amo Solo Te," while the B side contains "Roma Non Fa' La Stupida Stasera," "Souvenir D'Italie," "Un Disco Dall' Italia," "Mamma," "Tango De Mare," "Tornerai" and "Creola." The orchestra is conducted by Angel Pochetti Gatti.

Top news of the week, concerns the firm Ducale. David Matalon, owner of the company has announced the opening of a record pressing plant provided with the most modern machinery. The factory is located in Bellano in the district of Como near Milan.

For the first time Spanish artists have been introduced into the Italian musical scene. We refer to the Duo Dinamico of Spanish EMI. EMI Italiana has decided to include a disk by this group in the list of records which will be specially promoted during the summer. This is the first Italian recording made by Duo Dinamico, and includes "Un' Estate Senza Te" b/w "Desilusion." Both numbers are published by Southern, and are of Spanish origin.

GERMANY

"Fips has done it again!" is an often heard expression in the German music business as Bert "Fips" Kaempfert has certainly done a job of establishing his music "Made In Germany" on the charts all over the world. The likable young Hamburg musician has already passed the 1/2 million mark in sales of his "Blue Midnight" LP in the U.S. and his new hit, "Three O'Clock In The Morning," is moving up the Cash Box Top 100 in rapid strides, as Kaempfert plans a concert tour of the U.S. starting in the fall of 1966. It's a long time away, but he took plenty of time to get to the top and he deserves all of the popularity and credit that he can get.

Another top instrumental single from Polydor and "Made In Germany" the "Tokyo Melody" which was just awarded the prize from the Grammophon Record Retailers Association in England as the best pop instrumental recording by an orchestra in 1964. Helmut Zacharias, who has been a world favorite for many years, has really hit pay dirt with this recording and we hope that plenty of hits will follow. The third member of the German instrumental trio is, of course, Horst Jankowski, whose success was reported in full in last week's issue.

A big music festival will be held during August in Zoppot, Poland, and Germany will be represented by Polydor's Sven Jenssen. The promoters are the Polish TV, the Belgium TV and the Poland state concert agency. Last year 24 nations were represented at the festival, and this year 30 nations will be there. After the festival, the special artists pacted for entertainment will be on a ten day tour of Poland. Germany's Knut Kiesewetter is also on that tour.

Ann Busse, who has been many years with the Karl Heinz Busse Music Publishing and the Italian Record Production firms, has now taken over management of the new Telstar Publishing company and the new Echolette Record Distribution Company in Munich. The two firms are subsidiary companies of the Echolette Distribution Company, which has done big business all over the world with its electronic orchestra equipment and as sole importer of top quality Hi Fi equipment. The firm also owns music shops, sound studios and night clubs here in Germany.

Rolf Budde reports that his publishing house has plenty of hot newies including the big San Remo hit, "Se Piangi, Se Ridi," from Bobby Solo, who has now recorded the tune in German, the top Beatles' hits, "Ticket To Ride" and "Eight Days A Week" (which has also been done in German by Piet Laester on Columbia), "Golden Lights" by Twinkle, and almost all of the tunes from the "Ferry Cross The Mersey" LP by Gerry and the Pacemakers.

Larry Yaskiel from Vogue called to say that the firm has a new hot release of "Queen Elisabeth," a record made especially in honor of the English monarch's visit to Germany on May 18. The new Suzie single is over the 50,000 mark in 2 short weeks and "Downtown" from Petula Clark has sold 300,000 records including 125,000 in English and 175,000 in German. Other hits for the firm are "Goodbye My Love" from the Searchers and "Sag Ihr Ich Lass Sie Grussen" by Udo Jurgens.

Peter Meisel reports that his Hansa Records has a big hit on its hands with "Il Silenzio" by Nini Rosso. The Italian master hit has passed the 40,000 mark in 8 days and is selling at a hot 5000-records-a-day clip. Polydor has shot off a quick cover on the instrumental hit with Heinz Schachtner.

The German film industry has started a new series of hot detective films with the new hero being Jerry Cotton, a local paperback hero of hundreds of stories. Now the film industry, in an attempt to get a James Bond type of film going from this country, has started the first in the Jerry Cotton series. U.S. actor George Nader will be doing the main roles and the music for the film has been released here by Polydor.

Ralph Maria Siegel reports that his musical, "Herr Kayser and the night gale," will be done on German TV on May 23. The musical has been playing successfully in theatres all over Germany.

Gunter Gayer of Sikorski Music called to tell us that the tune "Invisible Tears" now has a hot new German waxing by Anna Lena of Sweden. Metronome. Gunter was also on hand for the German recording of Dali and Robertino as well. The publishing house has a side from each of the above mentioned dates.

Hans Gerig reports that his publishing house has a list of foreign and local hits as long as his arm with such top stars as Petula Clark, Wanda Jackson, Roberto Delgado, Gitte, Rex Gildo, Sacha Distel, the Rolling Stones, Martin Lauer, Caterina Valente, and Nana Mouskouri. Several of the tunes are already on the top 10 charts and several others are on their way there.

Deutsche Grammophon has announced the plans for a U.S. tour by the Amadeus Quartet running from June 30 to Dec. 5. The extensive tour will include the Aspen Music Festival, two weeks at Stanford University, and other visits to universities and concert halls all over the U.S. and Canada. That's it for this week in Germany.

ARGENTINA

A figure of international prestige will be coming to Buenos Aires following who have arrived in the last few days. Besides Jamaica's Millie Small and drummer Gene Krupa, this week actor-singer, George Maharis will arrive. The hero of "Route 66" is engaged for clubs, theaters and TV, and will stay in Argentina about fifteen days, before heading back to the United States.

Lagos Editorial announces that it has engaged two works of Chango Rodriguez, which are becoming hits in versions by Eduardo Rodrigo, Los Tucu Tucu, Los de Cordoba, Gasparin, Los Claudios and Julio Molina Cabral. The tunes are "Te Ruego" and "Nuestra Noche" and belong to the takiraris rhythm, which is spreading in the Pacific countries.

The new LP's released by Sicamericana include "Otra Vez El Bolero," interpreted by Fernando Alvarez; "Al Abordaje" with Los Pick Up, and "Grandes de Todos Los Tiempos" with Lawrence Welk and his orchestra. Among the simple records, one that is selling very well is "Limonere" in the version by Irini Lopez.

Korn Editorial tells us that the recordings of the tune "Nuestro Balance," as cut by Chico Navarro for Philips, by Alberto Marco for Music Hall, by Ricardo Guzman for CBS and for Odeon by Nestor Fabian. In addition the quarteto Imperial recorded "La Luna Y El Pescador," while "El Muro" was cut by Rosamel Araya for Disc Jockey, by Hugo Dargo for Music Hall, by Violeta Rivas for RCA, and Enrique Guzman for CBS.

Ala Nicky tells about the engaging of Horacio Deval to wax an LP with songs by Carlos Gardel. They will also make an LP of international music with the maestro Vlady and the accordionist "Tito" Visio.

Adolfo Pino of RCA Victor Argentina announced to Cash Box that the authentic yenka in the version of Rauno Lethinen is selling very well. An important LP, "Boleros," has come out in the interpretation by the "Rey," Palito Ortega. This record was recorded by Ortega in Brazil and some of the tunes are already catching on like "Lo Mismo Que Ud" and "Dos Rieles." Los Chalchalers have recorded the folkloric success of the moment, "Que Seas Vos." By May 20, one of the best Italian figures of RCA, Nico Fidenco, is expected in Buenos Aires. Ricardo Mejia of RM Productions tells us that there will be two productions for RCA Victor Argentina with La Charanga Sabanera singing "Taco Morales" and Los Trombones del Caribe singing "Manuco Alvarez." Each group will record six tunes.

Fermata Editorial announces that "Yenka, Yenka" and "Leccion De Besos" (Letkis-Yenka) were recorded by Anton Donen. Fermata, which has put the yenka and bostella rhythms on the market, tells us of the recording made of bostella by Los Bucaneros; "Ven A Bailar La Bostella" and "Bailemos Bostella." Finally, Hector Maure has recorded the tune "La Mesa Del Tango."

Odeon Industries informs us that there is a record by the Trashmen, which is causing a frenzy. The record has "Pa-Pa-Um-Maw-Maw" and "Surfin' Bird." Also Los Jets recorded two hits, "Es Una Mujer" and "Un Mundo Sin Amor." Rita Merello, one of the most loved figures of the artistic element in Argentina, has cut "Lo Mismo Que Usted" and "Vieja Ola," and with this same title, has made an LP which includes "No Aflojes," "Sobre El Pucho" and "Donde Hay Un Mange."

Castell Blanco of Edami Editorial tells us of the promotion of the tunes "Espera A Mañana" (Aspetta Domani) and "El Amor Tiene Tus Ojos" (L'Amore Ha I Tuoi Occhi). The first of these tunes represented Edami in the San Remo Festival and was among the final selections. The second tune, by Pallavicini-Kramer, has spread in other countries, and in England there is an English version made by the Bachelors, with the title "True Love For Ever More." This tune was taken from a Japanese melody and has a version made in Japan by Ito Jukari.

Fermata Productions put on the market "Esta Noche No He Ilorado" in the version by Peppino Gagliardi. The record appeared under the Jolly label. For Lebra's Serie, Los Killer made "No Me Importo Tu Dimero" and "Tom Dooley."

Neumann Editorial has an album of tropical music with twelve tunes of the North American editorial Hall of Fame Music. The tunes in this album have been recorded by Tito Rodriguez, Bienvenido Granda, Rolando La Serie and Leicentico Valdes.

H y R Records informs us of the third LP from the Mexican label, Cisne, which is called "Mariachi America De Alfredo Serna" and has tunes such as "Las Mañanitas" and "La Feria De Las Flores."

Rodriguez Luque of Disc Jockey tells us that they have released a record which is a hit in Brazil, called "Tren De Las Once" by Les Demonios de Garoa. On the other side of the record is "Chum-Chim-Chum."

CBS Records is very active because of the forthcoming arrival of George Maharis. The label has three LP's by Maharis and is currently doing a publicity campaign in the trade magazines. In addition, about thirty record houses in Buenos Aires have a big picture of the artist in their windows. The label has also organized radio contests in honor of his arrival.

The arrival of Millie Small has coincided with the release of one of her records, "Hasta Luego Cocodrilo," b/w "Amo A Un Hombre De Nieve."

Leo Vanes, whose daily column on show business in the newspaper "Cronica" is one of the most widely read and debated in Buenos Aires, has initiated a daytime radio program along the same lines as his column over LS6 Radio America, Monday to Friday, with great success.

FRANCE

Enrico Macias left the Olympia last week. The Music Hall season is now over at the Bobino and at The Olympia and Summer programs are now in session. At the Olympia there is a Russian troupe called "Music Hall de Moscou," and we've learned that the female lead of that program, Edith Pierah, has just released an EP in Paris with Russian songs on the Chant du Monde label. Edith will also record several songs in French here.

We have also news from:

VOGUE: A new record by Michel Paje has two songs he composed himself and two adaptations. The first record has been released by a newcomer Geneviève Cognet. At the age of three, this girl was quite well known as a Yéyé girl. This time she was called Gélou and was cut by B.A.M. records. Geneviève is now an author and composer. Jean Leccia who has been Charles Aznavour's orchestra conductor released his first record as singer. We really liked his French treatment of famous Neal Hefti composition: "Duet." Leccia is cut by Disc AZ (Vogue distribution). Interesting "Musette Parade" by Aimable on the Mode label, and Vogue releases the first Sandie Shaw LP (Pye records).

C.E.D.: La Compagnie Européenne du Disque which releases such labels as Riviera, Erato, Supraphon, Sue, Jag, Cameo Parkway, will also distribute in France the Austrian label, Amadeo. New record by Frank Alamo with four good songs: "Des Filles Et Des Garçons" (Good Night Irene), "Dis-Non" (Tell Her No), "Reste Comme Tu Es" and "Ma Vie À T'attendre". It was released on the Riviera label.

BRAZIL

Rita Pavone was in Brazil once again. Her personal appearances were highlighted by her successful opening at the "Teatro Record" in Sao Paulo, in Rio de Janeiro the success was repeated. As before, the tiny Italian artist hit the front pages of all newspapers, and the magazines dedicated many pages to the pert young songstress. All record shops were decorated with large posters of the artist, and her many records could be seen in display windows all over. Celebrating a long-awaited come-back, RCA Victor released one of her albums, titled "Ritorna Rita Pavone," which is heard for the top spots on the charts. Although she has left for personal appearances in Caracas, Venezuela, she is still being seen frequently on Channel "TV Record," on video-tapes recorded during her short stay in this country.

"Opiniao," one of the biggest hit shows of the recent times, was made bigger through the participation of singer-actress Maria Bethania, who came to Rio to play the part of Nara Leao. Presently in Sao Paulo, she is scoring consecutive sell-outs, and the public deliriously applauds the star with her rendition of the hit number "Carcara." RCA Victor has issued a timely release of a compact with the same name, which has received terrific receptivity from the public, originating at the same theater at which "Opiniao" is playing, where the label very wisely installed a special counter for record sale.

In the persons of E. Skinner, general manager of the Record Division, Ramalho Neto, promotion manager, and C. A. Nobili, sales manager, RCA Victor is visiting the most important capitals and other Brazilian cities in order to come in contact with the local problems connected with the music business and its market in the new economical and social situation of Brazil. At the same time, these men are finding out about other matters which will help to improve the work of the various divisions of the company. One of the new improvements is the decision to make the company's record releases monthly, rather than weekly as before, thus allowing a better job of motion and sales.

News from Chantecler states that harp soloist Luiz Bordon, an exclusive artist of that company, is starting a tour of Latin America, Puerto Rico and Japan. Although Bordon was born in Paraguay, he has been living for a long time in Brazil, and since he was very successful here, playing Brazilian music, he will promote this type of music during his tour.

The new "TV Globo" of Rio de Janeiro, operating with RCA equipment, announces the video tape presentation of the famous "Andy Williams Show." The public awaits these presentations anxiously, knowing that Williams is a great fan of the new Brazilian music. They also expect to see Dorival "O Rei do Samba" and "And Roses, And Roses" Caymmi, and Antonio Carlos (Tom) Jobim.

The presentation of the Zimb Trio, and Ellis Regina, in Lima, Peru, was a tremendous success. The Peruvians became overnight unconditional fans of the Modern Popular Music of Brazil. While the lark's first album on Philips, which came out practically at the same time as her single with the hit number "Arrastao" (1st Prize at the "First Festival of Brazilian Popular Music"), is having an extraordinary success, the release of the second album by the trio, is due to appear on the charts very soon. Incidentally, the number "Arrastao" was cut on Elenco by author Edu Lobo, immediately after the Festival, which was probably a good reason for the brilliant start it had.

The international music season in Brazil promises to be an excellent one, considering the schedule, which includes Sylvie Vartan, Nico Fidenco, George Maharis.

Another Brazilian artist, Blackout, is promoting "samba" on the radio, TV and night-club work.

When the NARAS Grammy Awards were announced in this country, the reaction over the awards copped by Joao Gilberto, Astrud Gilberto and Rinaldo De Almeida, were those of surprise (since Brazilians didn't realize that important MPM is in the US), and of euphorism. However, the press complains, and rightly so, that these artists have very little promotion in Brazil, in spite of a confirmed international success.

The Farropilha label just released a number based on the musical background of the very successful TC series, "O Direito De Nascer." The melody of the tune is "Mamae Dolores" and it is being largely requested. The group Os Farroupilhas, together with the new Jongo Trio, will soon tour to Mexico and New York, as part of a promotion project by Varig Airlines.

Johnny Alf, considered by many as the real "father" of Bossa Nova, is expected by the Mocambo label and has already started his first work for the company. This is another good effort by the label, formerly dedicated to a more traditional type of music, to modernize its repertoire and promote the new wave of Modern Popular Music. Our heartiest congratulations and best wishes to Sonderman and Rozemblit.

Sebastiao Bastos, prexy of Audio Fidelity do Brasil, took the initiative to create within the company a label which will only cover national releases. The first release of the new label, which is called Som Maior, are due in the near future and a special promotion is expected, in the same line of comparing material for a better export of Brazilian Music.

Old-time Brazilian chanter Silvio Caldas, one of the most popular artists of this country, is celebrating his 50th Anniversary in showbiz. He was expected by the São Paulo night club, "Le Club," for a series of personal appearances, returning to his night life after six years. The room will be open out nightly, just with the hundreds of personal friends of the very charming "Titio."

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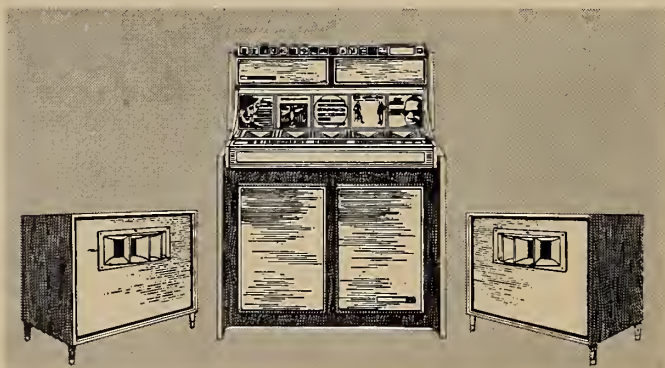

Editorial

THE PROPOSED EXCISE TAX REDUCTIONS

Never before has so much confusion been brought about by a tax cut proposal than the one submitted to Congress last Monday by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Where there is confusion, there is the possibility of misunderstanding, and in business, this usually means financial loss or serious disappointment.

Since nothing but the President's proposal has been presented to Congress for a report, the nation's business has hung on every word of interpretation as printed in the local press and reported on television. Too often, in an attempt to clarify certain areas, even the highest levels of communications media have faltered, unintentionally of course, but inaccuracies have appeared throughout many of the explanations.

By placing certain categories under the retroactive date of May 15 should the proposed tax cut be passed, the obvious reaction from businessmen in industries other than automobiles and air conditioners is to hope that their industry's expected reduction will also be retroactive, and in an amazingly short amount of time many actually believe that their products will be subject to these same sales stimulators designed for the retail level.

While the coin-operated amusement machine excise tax of ten percent is listed in the President's report, there is nothing to indicate that the reduction will be retroactive. As a matter of fact, it is too early to forecast whether the difference in cost will be passed on to the distributor and eventually the operator, in every instance. While the message which calls for the tax reduction specifies **complete repeal** by July 1, 1965 there is always the possibility that Congress will delete, revise, or sustain the wording. To attempt to read the minds of the House Ways and Means Committee, and again, the Congress, would be foolhardy. And what does this mean to the operator? Obviously, to refrain from buying new equipment in the hope of a tax reduction which is clearly nothing more than a political proposal at the moment, could hurt a route more than the possible savings could help, if and when a bill is passed.

The President's message outlines the ten percent excise tax on manufacturers' coin-operated equipment in one section of the proposal, and a \$10 annual stamp tax paid by locations on every machine in another section. Many newspapers have omitted one, or the other, from reports—while still other members of the press have apparently linked the two taxes evidently because they both pertain to coin-operated equipment.

The one category which seems positive is the proposed repeal of the ten percent cabaret tax—the excise tax which has snuffed the nite club and entertainment business, and which has had effects on the music machine industry's progress in advancing its various discotheque programs. This excise tax is proposed for complete repeal also, with an effective date of January 1, 1966.

A top executive of a coin machine manufacturing firm last week told operators to view the proposed tax with a jaundiced eye. To withhold the purchase of equipment is to walk hopefully as a child being tempted by candy. He implied that the candy may never come within reach. When and if it does, however, there is the possibility that whatever savings which come about may be passed on. This will be up to the individual factory. The annual \$10 location stamp tax, which was assumed by most operators, will probably be removed. And the cabaret tax of ten percent appears to have finally struck pay dirt and not a moment too soon.

Further comment on the possible benefits to be derived from this proposed tax reduction would be founded on pure conjecture.



MONY Contract Batting 1.000 In 101 Transfers

NEW YORK—The Music Operators of New York Inc. location installation agreement, introduced last year and made available in February to member ops (CB Feb 27 p. 63) has been batting 1.000 since overcoming the first challenge following transfer of ownership of a location, last March. According to Attorney Teddy Blatt, Haskell & Blatt, the contract has held up in 101 instances, to date, where an operator used the agreement to protect his rights in the location and to continue operating under the same agreement in dealing with the new ownership.

Formerly, operators had to resort to MONY's former contract, relying on American Arbitration Association proceedings in order to defend their investment. Not a single challenge has gone to court, according to Blatt, who added that location attorneys have realized the fruitfulness of such a case once they read the contents of the agreement. MONY's contract was written within the bounds of New York State law.

In addition to transfer of ownership or sale of location, the agreement includes a chattel mortgage agreement, protects against future copyright changes, audio-visual equipment, places the brunt of taxes on the location, installation of 'live' music on the premises, and other protections which total twenty-one provisions. The contract was written under the direction of MONY President Al Denver.

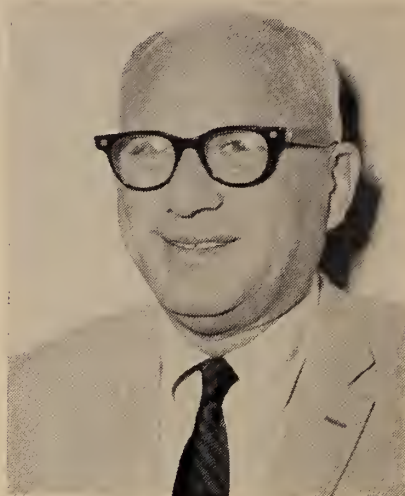

Wurlitzer Discotheque, is equipped with a discotheque remote switch to enable bartenders to call on Wurlitzer special recordings or the manufacturer's regular 45 offerings, and ties with the factory's Promo-Pak—a \$50 offering consisting of nine two-to-ceiling wall posters, window back-bar streamers, table tents and promotional material including paper mats for local advertising. Highlight of the meet was formal announcement of an exclusive agreement between the Arthur Murray Corporation and Wurlitzer for the national promotion of each other's products and services.

The Wurlitzer wall banners are proof and are hung on rollers for handling. Distributors were told that banners could be installed in an artistic tiled ceiling in seconds, in a paper clip which costs nothing and which won't damage the location.

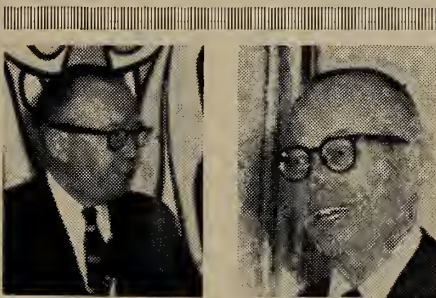
The entire program was presented with the understanding that Wurlitzer is offering the package strictly as a service for operators who ask for it, the package is complete and fully functional in every respect.

To get the big sound, operators can order the "Heritage III" speakers from distributors, who in turn will buy them from Utah's factory. Wurlitzer is not using the speakers. The "Heritage" Utah speakers displayed cost \$199.50 each, list price through outlets. Distributors will sell the speakers to operators for less than \$150.00, depending on the volume.

Wurlitzer's banners are undoubtedly the most colorful discotheque display ever manufactured. Nine cartoon-like drawings depict an artist's conception of modern dances with the result a humorous and certainly eye-catching screamer with copy inviting operators to do the "frog," "monkey," "y-gully," "bird," et al. Each is symbolized by a caricature. "Have you ever seen a 'mashed potato' looking like that?!" inquired Advertising and Promotion Manager A. Palmer, during his presentation. Making the posters is a black-lit process brought about by standard 48-watt fluorescent tubes which retail for each. "Buy 'em in a hardware store. They last indefinitely. Pick up fixtures if you have to at about \$10," continued Palmer. He suggested that operators use existing fixtures wherever possible. "We're not looking for you or anyone else spend a dime on the necessary ingredients

because there is no need to," exclaimed Palmer. A public-address system microphone also comes with the new phono for use during dance hours.

The discotheque switch, when thrown for listening to the Wurlitzer Discotheque Library, main ingredient of the big-dance sound, enables patrons to play the 33 rpm disks for 25¢ and 50¢. Standard disks also on the machine will not play until the switch is activated again—but the juke box collects the money and records the plays while discotheque is in session. Upon resuming regular play, by throwing the switch again, the disks selected prior to discotheque are then heard. Factory officials said that a minor adjustment can be made so that the machine will play both discotheque records and regular records at any time, without using the switch.

Arthur Murray Dance Studio Corporation President Harry Evons addressed the distributors and pledged 100% support and cooperation through the studios 300 franchises. Grand opening sessions can be sched-

uled for installations. The program calls for free dance instruction sessions at juke box locations to stimulate business on location. A pair of instructors with two hours of lessons costs \$40.00. The deal is to be set between the operator and the location owner. All Wurlitzer discotheque promo material displays the Arthur Murray name and informs listeners that the discotheque records were selected by Arthur Murray officials. The Wurlitzer library consists of ten 33 rpm disks of selections culled from Columbia LP's featuring rock 'n roll, big band, and group-singers who record for Columbia. Palmer stated that RCA Victor will announce three discotheque little LP's next month and will release more material as the operators demand it.

C. B. Ross, Wurlitzer chief engineer, said that the speakers, which feature discotheque display streamers across the face of the grill, offer 80 watts with 8-ohm impedance, and that each speaker contained two 12-inch, two 8-inch and four 4-inch speakers, with "enough volume to satisfy any location." He also told distributors that the remote discotheque switch can be installed "in a matter of seconds" onto the machine. "The two-screw plate which holds it onto the bar will take longer to screw in than the wiring!" continued Ross.

Wurlitzer Executive Vice President Bill Herleman flew in from Chicago to welcome the distributors and deliver the keynote talk, planting firmly the factory's attitude toward satisfying the needs of the distributor and the operator. "We will enjoy our finest year in business this year," said the exec. He referred to Wurlitzer's Annual Report issued last week which reports \$44 million in sales for the year ending March 31st. The factory's net was \$1.9 million. Sales were up \$3.3 million as compared with 1963-64. "We don't make our money at Wurlitzer by playing the stock exchange and watching our stock value go up and down like a yo-yo," stated Herleman. "We'll be around for a long time after I'm gone. We've been here for 109 years by making phonographs and other products better and better. You've had your share of 'firsts' and you will continue to receive this support

from your factory," continued the Chicago exec. "We moved from number 26 to number one in the piano field. In electronic organs we're number two—Hammond is number one and probably will be for another year or two," stated Herleman. "You'll see more and more innovations like your new wallbox which is such a tremendous success." Herleman advised distributors that the factory will continue to bring sensible programs to the industry for mutual profit. The meeting was laced with references to "brand x," the "competition." "What happens to the distributor, the operator, the location, when and if the discotheque shine wears off," stated Bear, earlier. "We're not skyrocketing to a zenith and then plummeting to oblivion with any program!" Palmer told distributors that the reason Wurlitzer did not announce a discotheque program sooner was because the factory wanted to avoid costly mistakes. "Now you've got a package that was worth waiting for," said the ad exec. "We wanted the best available to assist us in selection of music and to round out a solid program. We found it in the Arthur Murray Studios," continued Palmer. "Our music had to appeal to the proponents of the new beat—and we've got it. We also realize that not every location is a discotheque potential, per se." Palmer told distributors that reception to the first ten Wurlitzer Disks has been "excellent." Arthur Murray dancers demonstrated the appeal of the dance, with speakers blaring, and the latest dance steps demonstrated. The black-lit hit the banners, the music was turned up and the Wurlitzer discotheque package was official.

Bear summed up the all-morning session which was held at New York's Summit Hotel on Tuesday with several observations. "We're not going to lease records, 'cause we don't believe in it. We will refuse to sell at outrageous prices because there is no need for it." Discussing the new installations, he said that to be successful, remember, "you must select the

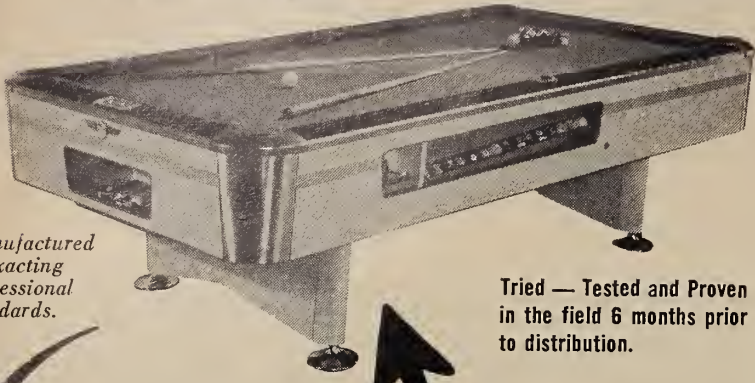

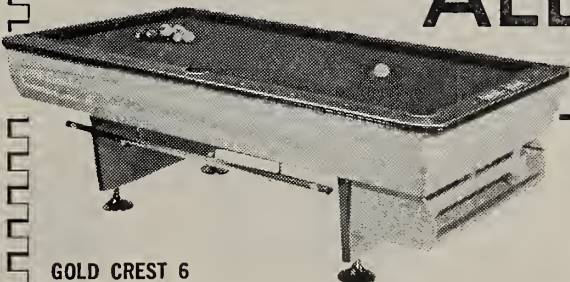

■ Pin Features Humorous 3-D Animation In Backglass



Among the exciting innovations on the flipper cabinet are: Colorful "sunburst" pop bumper caps, "Easy-Vue" angled plastic bumper caps, bright plated steel plunger housing, an extra heavy duty ball lift shaft, and the floating playfield plastic which stops warpage.

Gottlieb's original standard cabinet features include: Beautiful stainless steel cabinet trim, chrome plated gold legs, sparkling metal "Jewel Posts", playfield protection rings under the pop bumpers, plated metal lightbox door for added security, the Gottlieb "Hard Cote" playfield finish for extended life of the playboard, and the playfield "Auto-Clamp" for ease and simplicity in servicing the playboard mechanism in locations.

Washington DC Trade News

• Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson's request that Congress reduce excise taxes across the board, and in most instances remove the so-called temporary taxes entirely, will affect the coin machine industry to a large extent. (See editorial.) In addition to reductions of excise tax on automobiles, jewelry, toiletries and air conditioners, the President's proposal would also remove the ten percent manufacturer's tax on coin-operated amusements July 1, 1965; the \$10 annual stamp tax paid by locations for each machine on the premises; and on January 1, 1966 would remove the ten percent cabaret tax which was seen as an expected boost for juke box locations which offer dancing. The House Ways and Means Committee, at presstime, was reportedly giving speedy action to the measure.

• The Federal Trade Commission, in an official letter directed to the attention of the US Senate, asked that the period of three years before cigarette advertising carry a notice indicating that smoking is harmful to health, be reduced to one year. At present, the Senate Commerce Committee has approved a measure which calls for labeling of cigarette packs effective July 1, 1965, and similar warning notice on cigarette advertising to begin in three years. The letter was seen as a possible upset of plans in the Senate and may give support to Sen. Maurine Neuberger's offensive to place greater control on cigarette advertising. The letter stated that labeling was not enough action in view of the tobacco industry's prior agreements and that one year was enough time to determine whether labeling is effective.

Don't let your location owner replace the 'live' music. Use your machine to complement the musicians during off hours or evenings. Install the entire package at one time if you're going to use it at all. Tell the location about a cabaret tax of ten percent. It's important. If he insists on free play the machine, tell him about ASCA and royalties. He'll find out later anyway and you can save him headache now. The Arthur Murray name means plenty. Promote it where you see potential. Your local dance studio can direct patrons to your location. You can capitalize on free dance lessons. There's no limit to the possibilities if you want to promote with this package," said Bear.

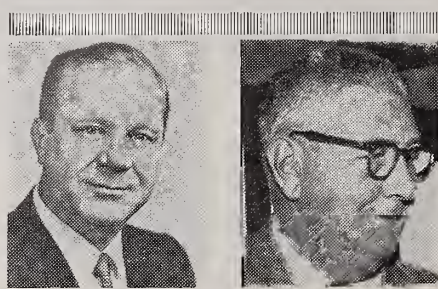
