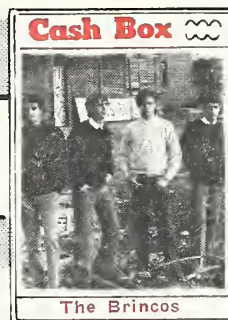

Cash Box

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On Lower Cost Pressure

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There has been a fantastic impression created in some industry quarters that would lead one to believe that while the cost of doing business steadily rises in other industries, the record business, by some miracle, can produce recorded product at continually declining financial outlays.

liable statistics from which conclusions can be drawn that there are lower costs within the entire spectrum of making records. Costs, in truth, continue on the upswing, just as they do in all segments of our economy.

Far beyond trade-talk, the astonishing view that the record business can thus afford to favorably react to demands for lower prices from large users—the area where the problem seems to be most acute—is already working against the financial well-being of many labels.

Yet, people who should know better (or do know better) have been a victim of the fiction that the industry can tolerate a state-of-affairs that can somehow avoid the introduction of hairline profit margins or none at all.

A vicious cycle starts the moment a distrib salesman is told by a large user that the price scale on particular product is too high and that a better price break records can be obtained from "the other guy." This matter reaches the home-office, where more fuel can be added to the fire by salesman who may "elaborate" on the wholesalers point-of-view. Fed by what can be termed a "false down-side price pressure," the home-office is easily conditioned to an even lower price rate than is offered through regular discount schedules. Thus, without giving the matter much thought, the home-office is psychologically pressured to acquiesce to unwarranted increases in discount deals, to the detriment of a more realistic profit margin.

Well, the time for thinking the whole thing out is now. Thoughtful consideration of the matter should lead the way to action, or at least a meaningful start in the right direction. The latter must involve an educational campaign, starting at the salesman's door-step and continuing on to all segments of the business, that will bring home the point that the costs of making records today are higher, whether its the expense of administrative personnel, studio time, pressing, advertising and promotion or what have you. There must be a climate evolved that recognizes that more and more price breaks are an impossible business practice.

That record companies deserve a profit for their endeavors is undeniable. That a reasonable profit should be severely hampered by unreasonable men is a cause for immediate industry concern to set the record straight.

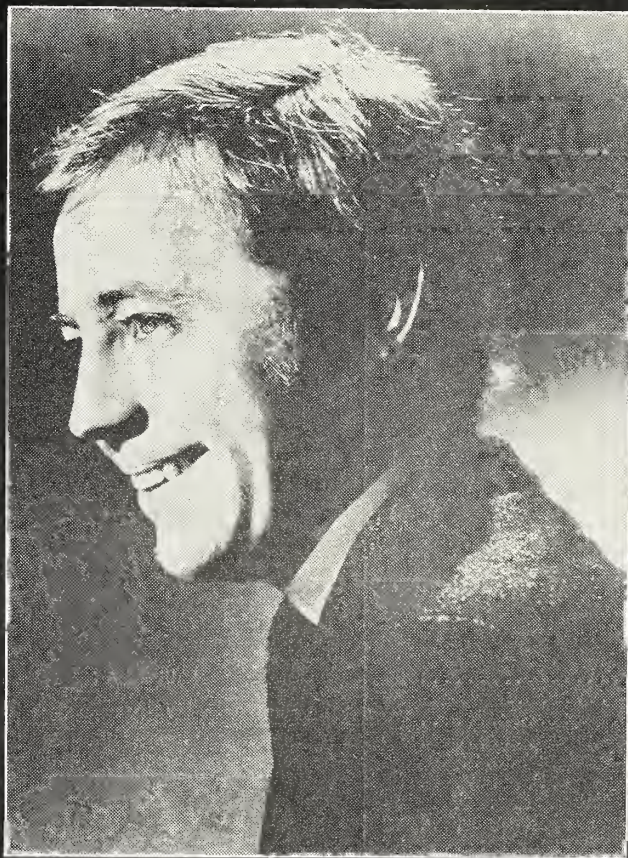
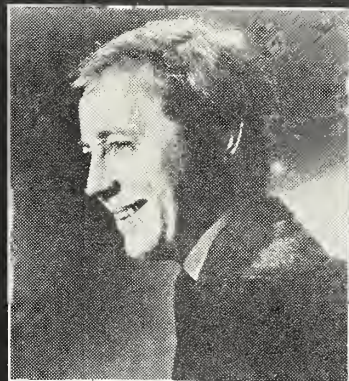

Air Crash Claims Lives Of Two Decca Execs; Is Horowitz Survives

NEW YORK—Two executives of Decca Records were killed and a third miraculously survived last week's crash of a jet airliner in which 58 persons lost their lives.

Dead as a result of the accident, which occurred as the plane approached Cincinnati Airport, were Charlie Lauda, chief engineer at Decca, and Bruce Hart, assistant to Is Horowitz, chief of classical recordings, who was among the four survivors of the tragedy.

Lauda, with Decca since 1943, was in his 60's, and is survived by his

wife and three children. Hart, 35, is survived by his widow and four children.

The three executives were scheduled to record the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra.

Horowitz was reported to be doing "very well" in Booth Memorial Hospital in Covington, Kentucky.

Funeral services for Hart were held last Sat. (13). Lauda's funeral will be held this Tues. (16) at Fairchild & Sons at 1570 Northern Blvd., Manhasset, Long Island, New York.

Columbia Releases 28 Albums For Nov.

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has announced the release of 28 albums, including 13 popular, 13 Masterworks and 2 EX series LP's, for the month of Nov.

Highlighting the pop portion of the release is the latest Robert Goulet package, "On Broadway," as well as "Monk Misterioso" by Thelonius Monk and "Of Course, Of Course" by the Charles Lloyd Quartet. Others include "Music For The Late Hours, The Tony Bennett Song Book" by the Ralph Sharon Trio, "Roots: An Anthology of Negro Music In America" by Voices, Inc., "Father Of The Folk Blues" by Son House and "Water Boy" featuring the Don Shirley Trio.

Rounding out the pop albums are "A Remembered Love" by Bill Purcell, "Dance To The Hits Heckscher Style" by Ernie Heckscher and his Fairmont Orchestra, "Polkas And Waltzes—Just For Fun" by Frankie Yankovic and his Yanks, Lenny Welch's "Since I Fell For You," Mongo Santamaria's "El Bravo" and the Pipes and Drums of the 48th Highlanders of Canada with "Scottish Heritage."

The new additions to the EX series include Horacio Molina's "Intimamente" and "Una Voz Que Lloramexican Passion" by Cuco Sanchez and Antonio Bribiesca.

The 12 Masterworks releases are highlighted by Leonard Bernstein's newest composition, "Chichester Psalms, For Orchestra And Chorus," featuring Bernstein, the New York Philharmonic and the Camarata Singers.

The release also features "Bach: The Well-Tempered Clavier, Book I, Volume 3" and "Bach: The Well-Tempered Clavier, Book I Complete" by pianist Glenn Gould, "Brahms: The Three String Quartets; Schumann: Piano Quintet In E-Flat" by the Budapest String Quartet, with Rudolf Serkin on piano, and "Sibelius: Symphony No. 5, Pohjola's Daughter" with Leonard Bernstein conducting the New York Philharmonic.

There are four sets by Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra, including "Ormandy Conducts Bartok," "First Chair Encores, Vol. I," "Tchaikovsky: Fourth Symphony" and "The Great Tchaikovsky Symphonies, No. 4, No. 5, No. 6."

Rounding out the Masterworks release are "Love Respet," a series of poems read by author Robert Graves,

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ABC-Par Gives VP Posts To Three

NEW YORK—ABC-Paramount Records has added three new vice-presidents. Larry Newton, president of the label, last week announced the promotions of Howard Stark, Albert Genovese, and Loren Becker.

Howard Stark, formerly director of singles sales and promo, has been upped to vice-president in charge of sales and promo. Stark joined the company in 1961 as sales director for the classical label, Westminster, and in 1962, added merchandising and sales for Impulse, the jazz line; and the Apt label to his duties. He was appointed director of singles sales and promotion in January, 1965.

Albert Genovese, the new administrative vice-president, has been with ABC-Par since its formation 10 years ago. Joining the organization as comptroller, he took charge of administration, and has guided the com-

pany's accounting department and personnel affairs, in addition to supervising budgetary activities.

Loren Becker is promoted to vice-president and general manager of Command Records. He was recently named general manager of Command and had previously acted as sales manager for the ABC-Par subsid. He has been with Command, its parent Grand Award, and predecessors since 1952. When ABC-Paramount purchased Grand Award and Command in 1959, Becker came to the company as sales manager for the two labels.

In commenting on the promotions, Newton said, "It's a source of great satisfaction to me to have the support of executives such as these, and to be able to advance them to three of the most important positions in our organization. Their promotions are well deserved."

White Whale Swims Past The Million Mark

HOLLYWOOD—In the five months since White Whale first dived into the record waters, the label has already landed more than a million units in sales. And this with the release of just two singles and one album—all by a group named The Turtles. It's a whale of a story when one realizes that these are the only records so far propagated by the young label.

The first Turtle single, "It Ain't Me Babe," released in July, climbed into the national top ten. The album, utilizing the same title, is now on the charts along with the group's newest single effort "Let Me Be," which is number 36 on this week's Cash Box Top 100.

The firm is headed by two young veterans of the music business—Ted Feigan and Lee Leeseff. Feigan, president of the firm, schooled under the tutelage of George Goldner, Larry Utall, Liberty Records and more recently as an indie promotion man in the LA area. Lee Leeseff, the label's v.p., has been in the promotion end of the music trade for six years having been associated with Liberty Records, Cameo-Parkway and, until the formation of the new firm, as west coast promotion man for Record Merchandising Distributors in LA.

Leeseff punningly describes the firm as "one with a purpose." But more seriously adds that they are gearing the operation along conservative lines and releasing product "that we believe in 100%." They are hoping to keep ahead of musical trends and possibly set a few themselves. Leeseff says that the firm's name was "bounced off a couple of eastern labels. If there's a Blue Cat and a Red Bird—why not a White Whale?" It's a particularly apt trademark when one considers that the whale does not have a sense of smell but does exhibit an acute sense of hearing.

It was Feigan and Leeseff who first heard The Turtles when they appeared at The Reveaire, a teenage nightclub in Redondo Beach, early this summer.

Weiss Move To Monument Signals Label's Expansion On International Front

HOLLYWOOD—In an appointment reflecting a general expansion of the company, Fred Foster, president of Monument Records, has named Bobby Weiss as vp and director of the international division of Monument Records. Weiss, a veteran of 13 years on the international music scene, will direct the global affairs of Monument, Sound Stage Seven, a label affiliate, and various associated publishing firms, including Combine, Vintage and Music City.

Although the headquarters of Monument are in Nashville, Tenn., Weiss will operate out of a Hollywood-based bureau plus a to-be-determined London or Paris office, with the foreign music specialist constantly en route to England, the Continent, the Orient and South America in order to maintain proper liaison with licensees of the record and music publishing divisions.

Foster's Monument has had a big success story with such talent as Roy Orbison, Boots Randolph, the Kim Sisters, Jerry Byrd, Jimmy Driftwood, Dolly Parton, Bob Moore, Lloyd Price, The Casuals, Harlan Howard, Demetrius Tapp, Smitty (Irvin) and Buck (Ryan), Grandpa Jones, the Ginny Tiu Revue, Rusty Draper, Ramona Jones plus Sam Baker and Roscoe Shelton on Sound Stage Seven.

One of the first moves Foster and Weiss will make is to develop the Monument product abroad above and beyond its present status in addition to opening their own music publishing companies country-by-country.

Weiss has flown to Nashville for meetings with Foster and the Monument team and will go on to New York for meetings before returning to his Hollywood base with office space now being set by Weiss in California.

Foster and Weiss will open a new phase of global activity for Monument with Weiss acquiring masters and copyrights for foreign sub-licensing via the global motion picture and TV companies for their soundtracks, etc. All this, in addition to the super-

Pop, Int'l LP's From Epic

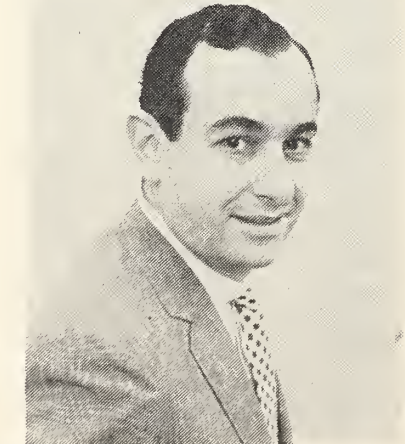

Also included in the outing is the Fleetwoods' "Folk Rock," the Gants "Road Runner" LP and "Amen," a one hundred and thirty-eight voice full orchestra package of inspirational music. The choir is from the First Baptist Church of Van Nuys, California.

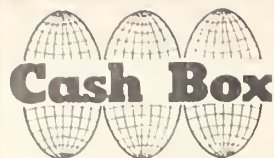

THE BEST OF HERMAN'S HERMITS—MGM E-4315

Tremendously popular Herman's Hermits have a powerhouse commercial outing with this collection of their biggest hit singles. Including such blue ribbon chartbusters as "Mrs. Brown You've Got A Lovely Daughter," "I'm Henry VIII, I Am" and "Can't You Hear My Heartbeat" the British quintet take a long step toward completely satisfying their innumerable fans' desires. The LP should be one of the boys' biggest.

THEIR SECOND ALBUM—Sam the Sham and the Pharoahs—MGM E/SE-4314

Sam the Sham and the Pharoahs have come up with a powerful follow-up to their first package, "Wooly Bully." In this disk, Sam and the group make the rhythm pot boil with a wild assortment of tunes that carry the Pharoahs trade mark—that Memphis beat. The LP whose theme is one of mystery and magic with a beat, includes their current hit "Ju Ju Hand," "I've Got A Voo Doo Doll," and "Love Potion #9." This one should do very well with the teens.

KEEP ON DANCING—Gentrys—MGM E/SE 4336

The Gentrys garnered big sales reaction and excellent chart status with their initial MGM single, "Keep On Dancing," and promise to do equally well with this debut album, dubbed with the same title. The seven-member group delves into rockdom's past hits in a session that's sure to move a lot of dance addicts or please beat-minded listeners. Some of the wild tracks include "Hang On Sloopy" and "Do You Love Me," in addition to the title track.

MUSIC OF THE YOUNG HOLLYWOOD COMPOSERS—Andre Previn—RCA LPM/LS3491

Represented on this disk, apart from the contributions of Andre Previn, are the works of some of the newer movie composers on the Hollywood scene: Henry Mancini, Elmer Bernstein, Johnny Williams, Johnny Mandel, Michel LeGrand and Jack Lemmon. Such tunes as "The Pink Panther Theme," "Nevermore," and "To Kill A Mockingbird," set to Previn's inimitable style make this LP an extremely enjoyable package.

LOVE AND KISSES—Rick Nelson—Decca DL 4678/DL 74678

Popular actor-singer Rick Nelson has titled this romance-oriented LP after his soon to be released movie, "Love And Kisses." Combining easy going rockers with warm soft ballads, the album is aimed for the romance-minded audience. Included among the tracks are the three tunes from the movie, "Love And Kisses," "Come Out Dancing" and "Say You Love Me," plus Roger Miller's "I Catch Myself Crying" and a host of other goodies, tailored to the artist's relaxed style.

THE BARBARIANS—Laurie LLP 2033

The Barbarians should do well in sales with their first package, which includes the group's hit single, "Are You A Boy Or Are You A Girl," and their upcomer "What The New Breed Say." The four lads also rock out such tunes as "Mr. Tambourine Man," and "The House Of The Rising Sun" to round out a swinging performance. The teens should go for this well done disk in a big way.

THE SOUND OF FOLK MUSIC—Various—Vanguard SRV-125/SRV-125SD

Vanguard has delved into its extensive catalogue of folk music to present this outstanding collection of 16 well known artists, doing some of their best loved work. Featuring such outstanding folksters as Joan Baez, Cisco Houston, and the Weavers, the LP affords long time folk fans a chance to reminisce, and new devotees of the sound a chance to get to know many of its outstanding exponents, all in one fell swoop. Lots of happy hours will be spent listening to this one.

POP BEST BETS

JACKIE GLEASON SILK 'N' BRASS—Jackie Gleason—Capitol W/SW 2409

Jackie Gleason fans will not be disappointed with this collection from the comedian-maestro. "Silk And Brass" offers a superb companion album to stand beside his enduring "Velvet Brass," and once again, twin orchestral sections, each consisting of four trumpets and four trombones, spread a warm glowing sheen of brass over well-loved standards and current favorites. Highlights include "The Girl From Ipanema" and "You're Nobody Till Somebody Loves You."

THE FIVE EMPREES—Freeport FR-3001/FRS-4001

The solid beat of three guitars, a drum and an electric piano set to popular rock melodies should make the Five Emprees' first album a successful outing. Their natural talent and distinctive blend generates excitement with each song, whether from rock or r&b areas. Included in the package is "Johnny B. Goode," "Tell Her No," and their single hit "Little Miss Sad."

RED SKELTON CONDUCTS—Liberty LRP 3425/LST 7425

On films, stages or TV screens, veteran comic Red Skelton has proven to be a master in the art of communicating with his audience, and, in his initial Liberty album effort, he communicates extremely well. Whether guiding his orchestra through longtime favorites ("As Time Goes By") or through his lovely self-pennings ("Lovely Is The Look Of You"), Skelton conducts with imagination and displays exceptional insight into the music being presented. An enchanting debut.

THAT ALDRICH FEELING—Ronnie Aldrich—London SP 44070

This Aldrich package is going to delight many listeners as did his album "Melody and Percussion for Two Pianos." There have been several Aldrich albums since the initial big seller, but this one, despite the time gap, is virtually volume two of that first triumph. In it the pianist has gone back to the double piano percussion source and set it to such tunes as "My Favorite Things," "Memories Are Made Of This," and "When I Fall In Love."

SALOON SONGS—Jimmy Roselli—United Artists UAL 3451/UAS 6451

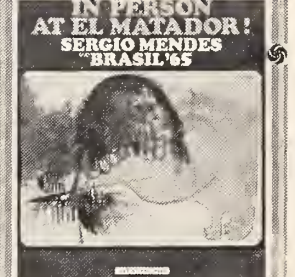
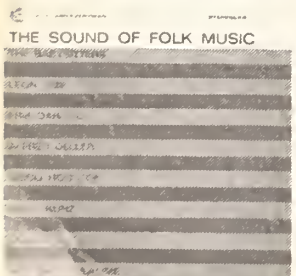
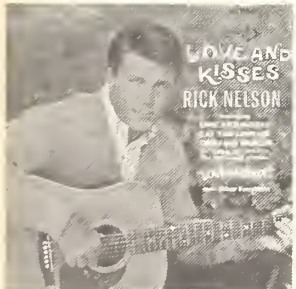
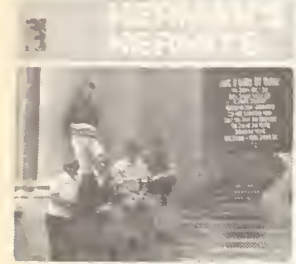

Rather it was the desire to present the original sound as packaged in Rio, for the enjoyment of North American audiences. Give a listen to such blue ribbon efforts as "Black Orpheus Medley," "Samba Do Astronauta" and "Noa Noa" and you'll hear people living the music that they make. This one should be highly favored by devotees of the Latin sound.

MARLENE DIETRICH IN LONDON—Columbia OL 6430

Whether in front of a movie camera or a recording microphone, Marlene Dietrich is an electrifying performer, and this Columbia album, recorded 'live' at the Queen's Theatre in London, is a superb sampling of her dynamic vocal artistry. Her dexterity with a lyric, new or old, and her inherent 'feel' for the message therein make up a truly exciting package for the record collector. Best listening bets include her famed "Lili Marlene" and "La Vie En Rose."

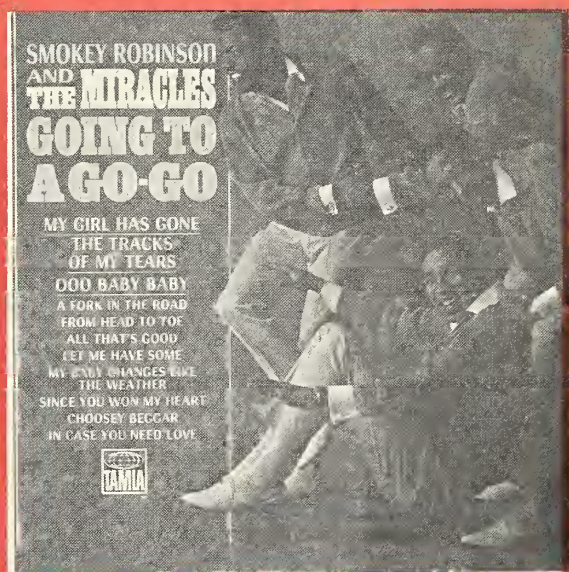

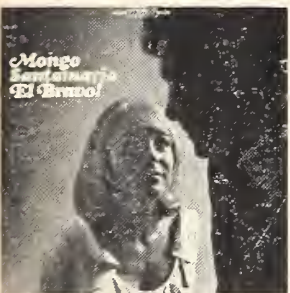
AIN'T THAT NEWS—Tom Paxton—Electra ELK 298/EKS 7298

Accompanied on the piano by the distinguished George Schick, the soprano creates beautiful imagery with her pure, rich tones and impeccable artistry as she does a superb job with such pieces as Mendelssohn's "Suleika; Das Erste Veilchen; Schilffied" and Mahler's "Ich Atmet Einen Linden Duft."



EL BRAVO!—Mongo Santamaria—Columbia CL 2411/CS 9211

Excitement and versatility are the keynotes of this Latin package by Mongo Santamaria. Backed by a throbbing, jazz-oriented combo, Santamaria gives a stimulating demonstration of his bongo prowess as well as his, and his fellow members' penning abilities. Heading up the set with the vigorous Santamaria-penned title track, the group continues to undulate with such pulsating tracks as "Black Stockings" and "Mantiguero."



HEARTBREAK TRAIL—Hank Snow—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3471

One of the top names in the country market, Hank Snow has come up with a musical tribute to another well-loved name in the c & w field, the Sons of the Pioneers. The chanter, backed by the well-tempered sound of the Jordanaires, lays aside his own hit-filled repertoire as he delivers a dozen of the most well-known tunes associated with the Pioneers, including such sturdies as "Cool Water" and "Tumbling Tumbleweeds." Should go well in country markets.



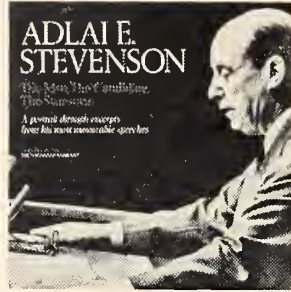
WONDERFUL LIFE—Irene Krall—Mainstream 56058/S-6058

Mellow-toned songstress Irene Krall covers a full range of material in this soft and sweet LP. Excellent grooves include "The Three Bells" and "Off To The Sea."



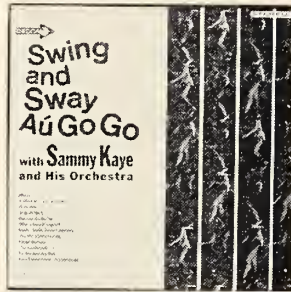
ADLAI E. STEVENSON THE MAN, THE CANDIDATE, THE STATESMAN—RPI AS101 61447

Radio Press International has added a tasteful memorial to Adlai E. Stevenson to its catalog of history oriented albums. The collector's item portrays the statesman through excerpts from his most memorable speeches, including the Ambassador's acceptance speech at the Democratic National Convention, Aug. 17, 1956; his eulogy of Sir Winston Churchill, Jan. 28, 1965; and President Johnson's eulogy, July 14, 1965.



TUFF GUITAR ENGLISH STYLE—Al Caiola—United Artists UAL 3454/UAS 6454

Guitarist Al Caiola has recorded a fitting followup to his recent "Tuff Guitar" effort. Present here is a driving rhythm section, set to the cream of the British top tunes of the past seasons with the musician's masterful touch. Among the golden goodies are the Beatles' "Help," and the Dave Clark Five's "Catch Us If You Can." The resulting album is a lively instrumental exhibition.



SWING AND SWAY AU GO GO—Sammy Kaye—Decca DL74687 DL4687

Sammy Kaye knows where the action is and proves it with this LP, which combines the popular teen-age rhythms with the power and richness of the big band sound. Set to such tunes as "What's New Pussycat," "Ship of Fools," and "Forget Domani" is Kaye's hypnotic feeling for swinging danceability. With reeds, brass and even a swinging organ vibrating the big beat, this one could make it big with both youngsters and oldsters.



BEST OF THE BEATLES—Peter Best—Savage BM 71

Former Beatle drummer Peter Best has been introduced to the American album-buying public with this hearty collection of Liverpool sounds. Fine drum performances by Best are the keynote of this vocal session, and the solid, steady beat throughout could attract a good portion of the teen buying public. Some of the better tracks include "Shimmy Like My Sister Kate" and "Last Night."



THE PRESIDENT'S MARCHES—Golden—LP 163

For the many devotees of the stirring march tempo, this album contains the marches of several Presidents, including Washington, Lincoln, Jefferson, Jackson, highlighted by "The President Lyndon Baines Johnson March, which has been recorded by his alma mater, the Southwest Texas State Band. Included with the disk is an educational American history wheel which contains personal data about each President.



ROY HEAD AND THE TRAITS—TNT 101

Hard on the heels of his current smash single, "Treat Her Right," comes Roy Head with his potent package of sometimes rocking, sometimes raunchy r&b sounds. Backed by his band, the Traits, the chanter blasts his way through a series of self-penned tunes such as "Here I Am In Love Again," "You're Turn To Cry," and "Night Time Blues" that should have his new found fans jumping up and down for more.



OTUITUI-TAHITI—Manuia & Maeva—Reo Tahiti RT/RTS 520

The beautiful melodies of the Pacific Islands have been expressively showcased on this album by a pair of femme Tahitian vocalists known as Manuia and Maeva. Throbbing rhythms and haunting native ballads are backed by a pop-styled combo, giving the package a large amount of appeal to American buyers, who should find tracks like "Otuitui Ta'u Mafatu" and "Tangi Tika" exceptionally listenable.

SOUL BIRD: WHIFFENPOOF—Cal Tjader—Verve VS626/V6-8626

The soul sound of Cal Tjader's vibes weaves a continuing thread throughout this groovy set. With strong group backing, Tjader shines on these tracks, with a special hurrah for "How High The Moon," "Soul Bird (Tin Tin Dao)" and "That's All." Fans of nodding, funky, ingratiating jazz sounds, should find this effort an especially pleasing one. Watch it for lots of action with a wide variety of aficianados.



OF COURSE/OFF COURSE—Charles Lloyd Quartet—Columbia CL 2412/CS 9212

The Charles Lloyd Quartet covers a wide range of music in this LP and happily, they cover it well. With sax, guitar, bass and drums, the boys drive through a whirlwind "Apex," sensitive ballads the likes of "The Song My Lady Sings" and "Voice In The Night," and "Goin' To Memphis," an old-times jazz based blueser. The firm, clean technique and projection of the artists mark this as an LP worth getting to know.



THE REAL EARL HINES—Focus 335

The inimitable Earl Hines was at his finest when he cut this series of numbers at a "live" concert. Backed by bass, tenor sax and drums, the 88'er has added his own touches to some evergreens, which come back to a startlingly new life. With a special nod to "I Ain't Got Nobody," "Tea For Two" and "Someone To Watch Over Me," the LP should be a big one for the many fans of this longtime piano pacesetter.

JAZZ BEST BETS



IF YOU CAN'T BEAT 'EM, JOIN 'EM—Gerry Mulligan—Limelight LM 82021/LS 86021

Baritone sax blower Jerry Mulligan makes a bow in the direction of the pop charts with this powerpacked outing. Picking up on such recent hits as "Mr. Tambourine Man," "A Hard Day's Night" and King Of The Road," Mulligan adds his jazz touch to the chart-topping tunes and what comes out is a pleasure to say the least. Watch this one for possible double barreled-sales, with both jazz & pop fans.



RHYTHM CRAZY—Jimmy Cleveland—Emarcy MGE 26003/SRE 66003

The trombone artistry of Jimmy Cleveland is spotlighted on this groovy seven track LP excursion into the world of jazz. Backed by a strong septet, Cleveland shines on the swinging lead track of "Crazy Rhythm," drives on "Our Delight" and makes sweet moody music on "We Never Kissed." The overall sound is a purely professional one, making for an album of pure listening pleasure which should be enjoyed by many a jazz buff.

BEETHOVEN: SYMPHONY NO. 5—Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra/William Steinberg—Command CC 33-11031/CC 11031SD

The 5th Symphony of Beethoven is perhaps the best known and best loved work of the composer. The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, under the baton of Dr. William Steinberg, gives this universal piece a firm, highly polished reading, which completely brings forth the masterpiece qualities of the work. This LP should be warmly received by both the lovers of the composer's work, and by classical buffs in general.



HANDEL: MESSIAH—Angel CL 3657

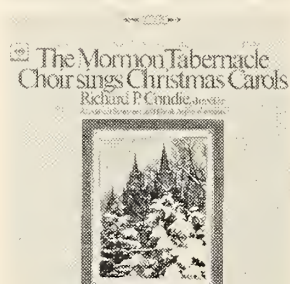

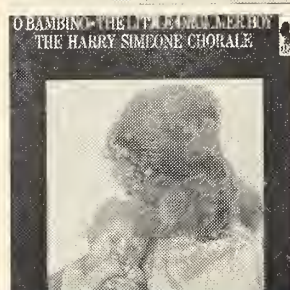
THE MORMON TABERNACLE CHOIR SINGS CHRISTMAS CAROLS—Columbia ML 6177/MS 6777

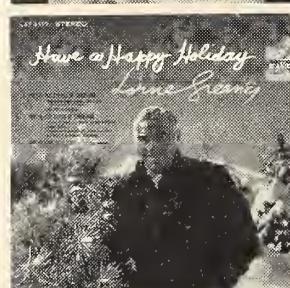
WINTER WONDERLAND—Earl Grant—Decca DL 4677/74677

HAVE A HAPPY HOLIDAY—Lorne Greene—RCA LMP 3410/LSP 3410

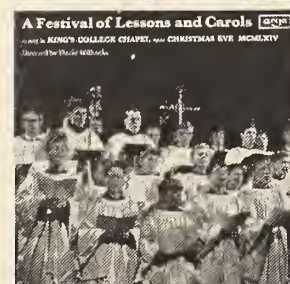

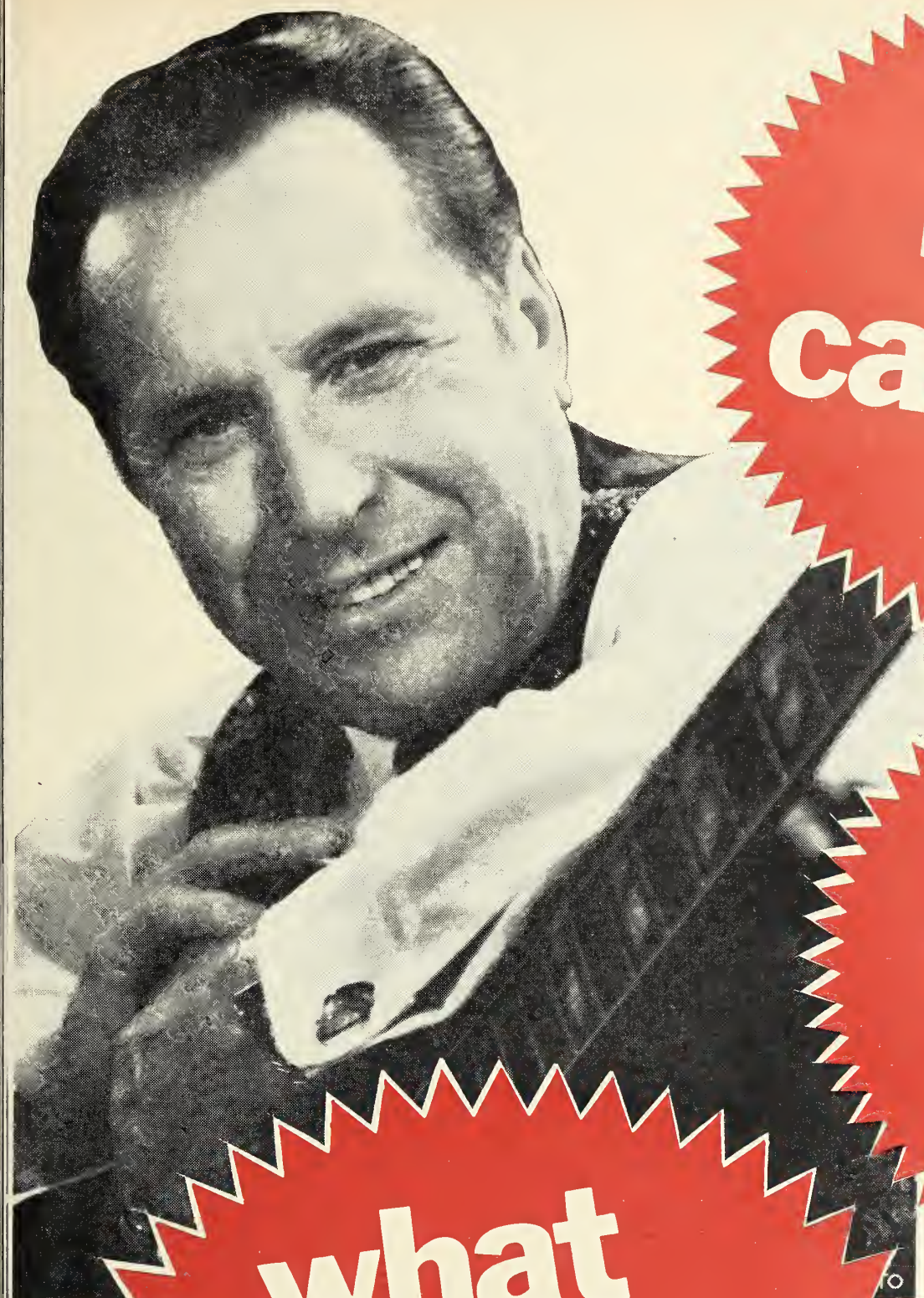
HOLIDAY CHEER—Dean Martin—Capitol T/ST 2343

In order to bring the service within the scope of a two-sided LP, it has been shortened by reducing the number of lessons and Carols to six. The choir is joined in the hymns by a specially invited congregation drawn from choirs of the Ely Diocese, affiliated with the Royal School of Church Music.



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WMCA's Mendelsohn: A Broadcaster For All Formats

NEW YORK—Although many arm-chair experts in broadcasting circles have long espoused their private theories on the success or failure of any given station, few radio mahatmas are as outspoken as Herb Mendelsohn, WMCA-New York's general manager. In a recent interview with Cash Box Mendelsohn succinctly outlined his personal broadcasting credo which has been developed from nine years in the business including a stint at WKBW-Buffalo which, under his stewardship, trebled its sales in three years despite the fact that the ratings remained constant.

Mendelsohn earnestly believes in the personal approach: "A station can't exist without empathy with the audience. We at WMCA have a kind of love affair going on with our audience. People, as far as we're concerned, are 85% of the deal."

Continuing with his anti-vacuum philosophy, the exec noted that it's extremely important for every station to have a distinctive "point of view." If a station makes a radical change and steps out of character, the results, Mendelsohn believes, can be disastrous. This does not mean, however, that any outlet cannot successfully shift its programming format. The dangers arise when the image that a station projects becomes altered or diluted.

"Radio is drastically different from television," Mendelsohn went on, "in the fact that radio listeners are emphatically loyal—they don't switch dials in the fickle manner of TV viewers."

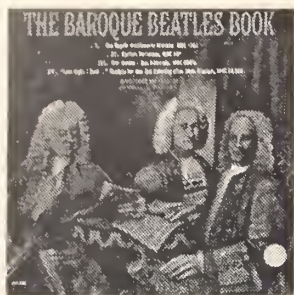
Mendelsohn holds that each individual station is always more important than any of its air personalities as "the station provides the line for a deejay" to reach his listeners. He also pooh-pahed the popular practice of deejay stealing: "A big name personality on one station can't necessarily switch to another station and keep his rating unless he's capable of adopting to the new format."

Radio, according to Mendelsohn, is something somebody listens to when he's doing something else. He thinks that the audience is basically lethargic but can be stimulated when an area of genuine community interest is exposed.

Hitting closer to the WMCA picture, Mendelsohn said the station's perspective is "to operate in the idiom of most New Yorkers" by playing the type of pop music that most people obviously want to hear intermixed,

Elektra Album Treats Beatles' Tunes With That Baroque Beat

NEW YORK—Beatles' songs go for baroque in a new LP release from Elektra Records. The concept of a student of the classics (and an admirer of Beatleites Lennon-McCartney



compositions), Joshua Rifkin, the album is called "The Baroque Beatles Song Book."

Elektra believes that the set is a candidate for winner of off-beat records-as-a-Xmas-gift this year, and plans a major promo campaign to support this thinking.

Rifkin has orchestrated the songs in an authentic baroque manner, assembling a group of New York musicians, called for the occasion the Merseyside Kammermusikgesellschaft, to perform four separate pieces. There are baroque variations on such Beatles' themes as "I Want To Hold Your Hand," "I'll Cry Instead," "Things We Said Today," "You've Got To Hide Your Love Away," "Ticket To Ride," "Please Please Me," "A Hard Day's Night," "She Loves You," "Thank You Girl," "Eight Days A Week," "Help!" and "I'll Be Back."

The set, which has the blessings of the Beatles themselves, is expected to be ready for sale this week. The label got a 3-column story send-off for the album in a special news-review feature in last Tuesday's New York Times.

The exec does not believe in curtailing the time for a deejay to speak. "Time is of no consequence if a meaningful point has to be made," he said. He is firmly convinced that any individual station will eventually rise or fall on the human equation and not on in-depth media research projects or frantic format changes.

In concluding, Mendelsohn said that he has no intention of letting WMCA rest on its laurels. Countless upcoming promotional projects are on the drawing boards and as one is discarded or rejected, a new one is quickly instituted.

Pepsi Cola is utilizing a special James Bond package in conjunction with the video special, "The Incredible World Of James Bond," to be aired on NBC Nov. 26, while Maxwell House and the Girl Scouts of America are joining forces with UA to present special disks made at the recent Girl Scouts Roundup.

UA's special projects division is offering its roster of clients, the UA label's catalog and its backlog of motion picture soundtracks. With the creation of this new department, Douglas has been working closely with many of the major advertising agencies on their premium problems, and is able to coordinate with the facilities of UA's film and television arms, as well as the disc division.

The special projects division was formed to create and develop subsidiary income for all divisions of United Artists Corp.

Jewel-Paula Label To Be Distributed In Japan

SHREVEPORT, LA. — Stan Lewis, owner of Jewel-Paula Records, recently announced the completion of negotiations with King Records of Tokyo, for the distribution of the line in Japan. The label is presently being represented in 54 countries.

Lewis also said that negotiations are underway with Turicaphon of Switzerland for distribution of the label there.

NEW YORK—Initial shipments have been "exceptionally enthusiastic" for Disneyland's new series of "Walt Disney Wonder Pack" Little LP's. Disneyland's Marty Kadish reported the response to the kiddie line last week, shortly after the official release of the first batch of sets.

They include eight packages, each a 7" LP with a full color, 24-page booklet which is part of the record's sleeve. Titles of the debut sets are "Mary Poppins," "The Lady & The Tramp," "101 Dalmatians," "Three Little Pigs," "Peter Pan & Wendy," "Cinderella," "Alice In Wonderland" and "Sleeping Beauty." Each set lists at \$1.

Banking on a particularly heavy demand around the Yuletide season, Disneyland is making a big ad-promo push in the weeks ahead.

Coronados Form Company

NEW YORK—The Coronados have just formed Recording Artists to develop and record new talent. The members of the group travel widely and have reported seeing highly qualified, unsigned talent during their travels.

Steve Ortiz will act as talent scout for the new organization, Reuben Ortiz will supervise recording and Ginger Ortiz acting as executive secretary. Their first record production deal, which was negotiated with Ben Rosner of RCA Victor, involves recording themselves on singles and LPs for that label. Their current waxing is "Cu Cu Rro Cu Cu Paloma," and an album is being planned for the near future.

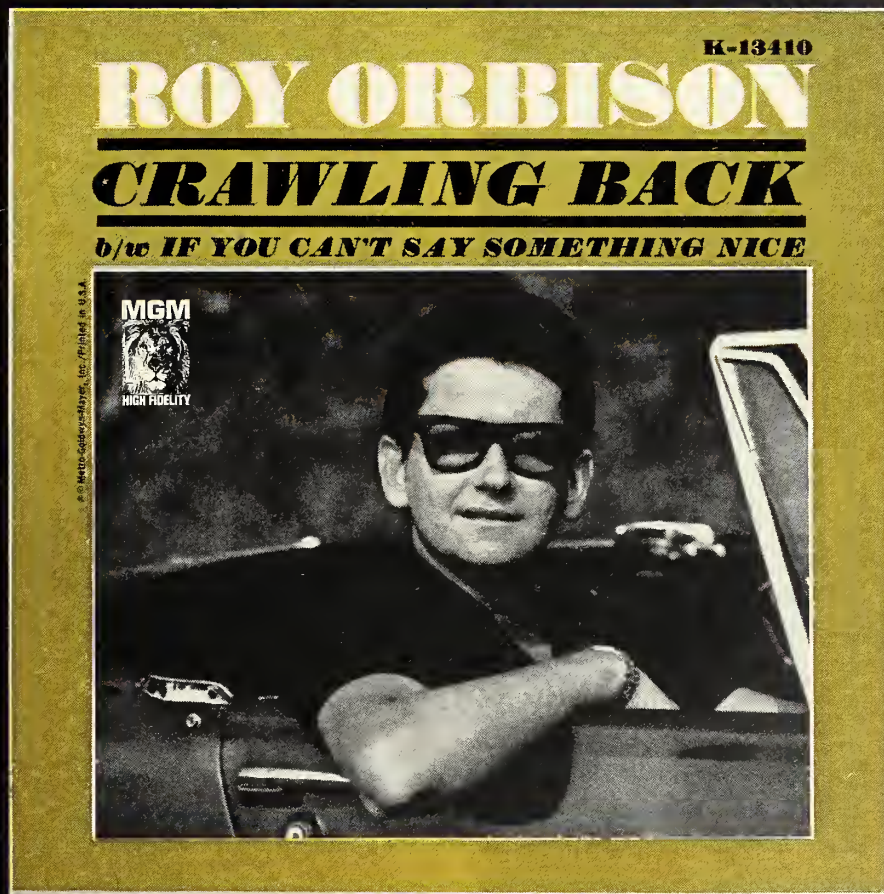

'Finian's Rainbow' To Glow On Screen

Acuff-Rose Eyes Japanese Market

NASHVILLE—The Nashville-based Acuff-Rose publishing, agency and recording complex now reaches out to most of the major countries of the free world. At least one more nation, Japan, now widely regarded as the world's largest music and record market, is expected to become a target for stepped-up Acuff-Rose activity as a result of a forthcoming visit to that country by Wesley H. Rose, president of the Nashville combine. Rose left on his extended far east tour last week.

Long a champion of the importance of the international music business, Rose at one time worked through key publishers, such as Chappell, Campbell-Connelly and Bourne in Britain, in the exploitation of Acuff-Rose copyrights, but the business grew so rapidly that opening of a branch operation appeared justified. That branch, located in Britain, numbers eight people, including three executives.

The model operation includes the publishing end, under office chief, Nick Firth; the agency business under Colin Berlin and a promotion wing under Mel Thompson. The agency there handles such talent as Tom Jones, Mia Lewis and a new group, the Roving Kind, whose discs will be released on Decca in England and through the A-R subsidiary, Hickory Records, in the United States.

Rose looks upon Japan as a nation that's filled with opportunity for American product. High on his agenda will be a general scrutiny of how the business works there, and discussions with leading Japanese industry people. "We want to get our catalog exposed and exploited there," he said. "We know there's a great world-wide demand for our Hank Williams songs. We've done a lot of business with 'Tennessee Waltz,' by Redd Stewart and Pee Wee King; with Don Gibson's 'Oh Lonesome Me' and 'I Can't Stop Loving You,' and with Roy Orbison's 'Oh Pretty Woman.'"

During the trip, Rose will also have a detailed look at the music, record, radio and personal appearance scene in the State of Hawaii. He also hopes to have stronger ties there. Another prime target for increased business is Germany, where language is admittedly a barrier, but the market is there just the same.

Acuff-Rose already has its own offices in England, Germany, France, the Benelux countries, Italy, Scandinavia, Switzerland, Australia and Brazil. The original overseas branch in London, was opened 11 years ago and reportedly marked the first international offshoot for an American, country-oriented firm.

On the record front, the Hickory label exists under its own name in

many key world markets. In England, for example, Pye has exclusive rights to the Hickory catalog, and the product comes out on the Hickory label. In the United States, Hickory currently releases eight Pye artists, including Donovan, Lonnie Donegan, Joe Brown & the Bruvvers and the Overlanders, among others.

Similar expansion of releasing arrangements for Hickory is expected to develop in the numerous nations where the label already exists, while other countries, where the label is not yet available, are expected to join the fold in the months to come.

Clarence Williams Dies

NEW YORK—Jazz pianist Clarence Williams, who composed the music of "Baby Won't You Please Come Home" and many other songs, died last week of diabetes at Queens General Hospital. He was 67 years old.

He was born in Plaquemine, La., learned the organ and guitar as a child, and became a professional entertainer at the age of 12.

While in his teens, he ran away from home with a minstrel show. In New Orleans he met Ferdinand Joseph Morton, composer of the "Jelly Roll Blues." Morton was so impressed with him that he frequently allowed the young man to act as a stand-in leader. Williams also played the piano with the orchestra.

During the 1920's, he came to New York and entered radio. One of his acts was the Clarence Williams Trio, another member of which was Irene Gibbons who later became his wife.

The pianist later was active in recording and music publishing. He eventually sold his library to MGM, who continued to bring out the Williams catalogue of music under his name.

Among his works were "Brown-skin," "Royal Garden Blues," "Shout, Sister, Shout," "Gulf Coast Blues," "Papa De-da-da," and "West End Blues."

"Shout, Sister, Shout" became the theme song of the Boswell Sisters. Another of his melodies, "I'm Falling For You," was featured by Billy Eckstein.

Besides his wife, he is survived by his two sons, a daughter and six grandchildren.

Tram Diskery Seeks Rock 'N' Roll Talent

BUFFALO—Tram Records is back in business planning to do a consistent series of recordings in the next three months.

Charles Trammell, president and owner of the company, was recently in New York City on a daily hunt for r&r talent.

Trammell said he would be visiting New York regularly to audition talent, and most of his recording would be done there. A former singer himself, he gave up his career to go into business as a recording executive. He stated that his own career has given him all the necessary equipment to be an A&R man for his company.

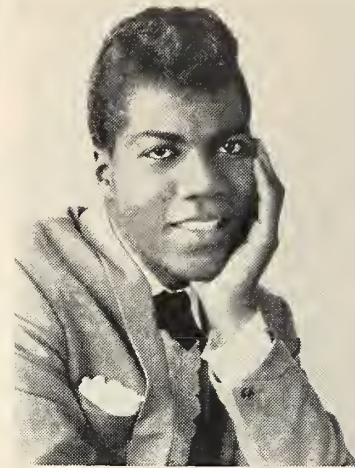

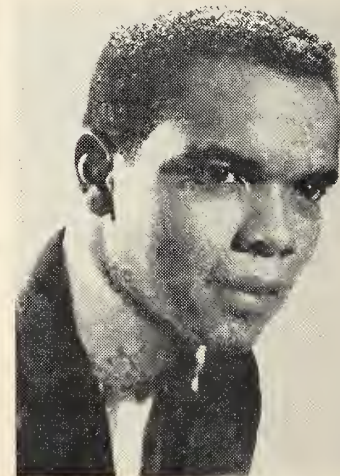

Recordings of new material include "If It Isn't in Your Heart" by Jerry Vale, Columbia; "Inside I've Died" by Marlene Mars, M-G-M; "Mother Nature and Father Time" by Brook Benton (currently riding the charts) and "I Can't Stand This Love, Goodbye" by The Others on RCA Victor.

The company was largely a one-man operation, until Fred Parker was added as general professional manager a few months ago. Parker's chief concern, other than placing tunes, has been to build up Eden's writing staff. The roster now includes Lou Stallman, George Devens, Mikie Harris, Charlie Singleton and, of course, Otis.

The list of artists who have had hits with the pubbery include Sarah Vaughan, Dinah Washington, Brook Benton, Connie Francis, Paul Anka, Clyde MacPhatter, Johnny Mathis, Nat King Cole and many others.

The firm is represented throughout the United Kingdom by its affiliate Eden Music, Ltd. and various publishers have sub-publishing rights to its catalogue in other European countries. Plans are in process to establish representation for the company in South America.

Mana Reveals Plans For New Studio



HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—Mana Productions, has revealed the exterior plan for their recording studio being constructed in Hollywood, Florida, designed to house the latest recording and technical facilities. The main studio can accommodate 125 musicians, as well as a choral group of 100, with isolation booths available. The studios are designed as floating shells within the structure for complete control of sound and vibration interference. The 23,000 interior square footage will be completely air conditioned and heated to provide uniform temperature, humidity and dust free protection for recordings, tapes and master files. In addition to

the two separate air conditioning systems, there is an emergency generator in case of power failure in the area.

The company will record its Tiara label in the south Florida studios but will continue its publishing and record distribution activities out of their main office in Fort Wayne, Indiana. The Hollywood studio is equipped for film recordings and will specialize in video tapings. The technicians can handle remote (on location) recordings along with live studio broadcasts.

The custom fabricated building, utilizing polished stone and anodized aluminum trim, is of precast cement and structural steel. The plans provide for a sheltered entrance marquee, landscaped parking areas and a heliport to provide convenient transportation to and from the major airports in the area and the larger hotels along the coast.

Donald J. Muzeroll is president of the firm, Ruth Sadler is executive vice president, and David Peebles is secretary-treasurer. The company has engineering and administrative personnel already under contract.

ASCAP Holds Seminar On Saleability Of Tunes

NEW YORK—Next to talent, the greatest asset for a new songwriter is his ability to sell his song. This comment on the music business was made by the ASCAP panel on American Music at the recent sixth and final session of the seminar held at Judson Hall in New York. The panel consisted of Leon Carr, composer of "The Secret Life of Walter Mitty"; his partner, Earl Shuman, writer of "Seven Lonely Days"; William Goldenberg, composer of the incidental scores for "An Evening With Mike Nichols and Elaine May" and NBC-TV's "That Was The Week That Was"; and Larry Alexander, lyricist who has penned songs with Goldenberg for albums by Liza Minnelli and Georgia Brown.

Because of today's highly competitive market, the panel advised the audience of young writers that a good "demo" record is essential in bringing their songs to the attention of the publishers. Shuman noted the growing number of pro performers who arrange and perform new songs for these "demos."

On Nov. 15, at Judson Hall, ASCAP will present a showcase of music written by those attending the Seminar. The audience will consist of music publishers, producers and recording executives.

MCA Sets New Earnings Peak

HOLLYWOOD—The highest net income for any first nine month period in the history of MCA, was reported last week (11) by Jules C. Stein, board chairman of the huge entertainment complex.

The unaudited consolidated net income for the nine months ending Sept. 30, 1965, was \$11,593,000 and after preferred dividends amounted to \$2.36 per share on the 4,687,107 average number of share of common stock outstanding.

For the corresponding nine month period of 1964 the consolidated net income \$10,301,000 which after preferred dividends was equal to \$2.09 per share on the 4,565,620 average number of shares of common stock then outstanding.

The above figures include the company's interest in the reported consolidated net income of Decca Records for the respective nine month period.

The Strangeloves will embark on a four-day tour with the Beach Boys this weekend, playing dates in Minnesota and Missouri.

Claridge Buys Christmas Master

NEW YORK—Claridge Records has picked up a Christmas master by Van Trevor called "Christmas In Washington Square." According to Claridge president Frank Slay, the deck has already been garnering spins and store requests in Connecticut and Maine.

"Goodbye Babe"

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Epic's Len Levy Finds That Some Plain Talk Uncovers Ops' Desire For Little LP's

NEW YORK—Tradesters who attended the recent Music Operators of America convention in Chicago may recall that Len Levy, vp and general manager of Epic Records, put the matter of future Stereo Little LP product before juke box men.

"Do you want them or not," he said in effect. Months later, the exec is happy to state that they do. Citing an "extremely strong" response to the line, Levy had always felt that the Little Stereo LP was always worthy of manufacturer support.

Limited response to their appearance at first, Levy contends, put truth into the cliché of putting the "cart before the horse." There were two major complaints involving Stereo Little LP's, Levy notes. One was an insufficient amount of machines that play the Little Stereo LP and the other involved a lack of variety in such product.

The situation has improved to the extent that Epic has just released its largest batch (eight) of Stereo Little LP product, which covers a broad spectrum of pop music, including the Glenn Miller Orchestra, Bob Dylan, Lester Lanin, Jane Morgan, Buddy Morrow, Cliff Davis and Bobby Hackett. Another Epic ops line is its Memory Lane Series, recently augmented by the release of six disks.

Levy is able to read the pulse of one-stops, principal outlets for jukebox material, by continuous contact on the one-stop level. This involves periodic road trips by Levy to major one-stops and a strong mailing campaign. From both, Levy is able to collate suggestions that lead to Epic policies with regard to the type of product released on Stereo Little LP's.

vision of the foreign marketing of all Monument product and music publishing activities plus the contracting and determining of the companies to represent the Monument music businesses abroad.

The execs are now prepping for a trek to England, Europe and the Orient to review foreign licenses currently repping Monument plus meeting with music publishers, writers, talent and their personal managers, as well as key motion picture production companies and producers of feature and TV film product.

Louise Roos of Amsterdam, who has been manager of foreign relations headquartered in Nashville, continues in this post and will work closely with Weiss.

Foster recently entered into a tie-up with Playboy magazine whereby he acquired world rights to a 12-inch lp featuring vocalist Johnny Janis, produced by Hugh Hefner entitled, "Once In A Blue Moon." Special promo tieups are underway with Playboy on the lp—and Weiss will work on the global release of this as well as all product issued by Foster's companies.

Weiss pioneered in the overseas representation of American recording and music publishing companies, having been the very first American resident abroad for a major American label—when he went overseas in 1952, as European director of Capitol Records, where he remained (based in Paris) until January of this year. Until 1957, Weiss was with Capitol and when they sold out to EMI-England, Weiss then moved over to the global music publishing side with Edwin H. Morris Music as International Manager for a two-year stint. Then, in 1959, James B. Conkling, then President of Warner Bros. Records, signed Weiss to helm the WB record and music publishing affairs, naming Weiss international director, a position he held until he went to indie global consultation for various record companies last year. In January of this year, he was named vice-president of the Rogers and Cowan public relations agency and resigned this position in order to join Monument.

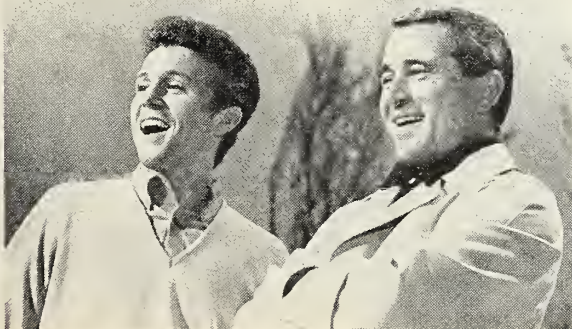

Credit Deal For 'Carry-Corder 150'

NEW YORK—A sharp reduction in the dealer price of Norelco's "Carry-Corder 150" plus a special program to protect the value of current retail inventory, was just announced by North American Philips Company.

At the same time it was disclosed that effective immediately, the minimum dealer advertised price of the cordless, cartridge-fed unit in cooperative advertising will be reduced from \$119.50 to \$98.75.

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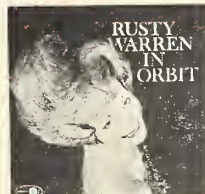

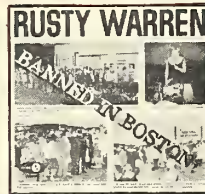

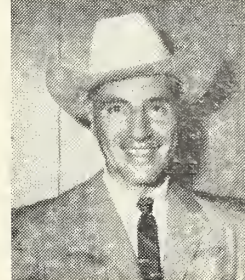

James touring with Johnny Cash, Tex Ritter and June Carter, called us from Washington to say that the crowds are really great, and that he'll be back in Nashville before long.

In addition to being a well known figure in the country music world, Little Jimmy Dickens looks like he's about to make a name for himself in TV as well. Pittsburgh is also getting more western sounds thanks to WJAS-AM-FM. The station began programming c & w six nights a week as of Nov. 8. . . . Further expansion came on Oct. 11, when WIVK-Knoxville was granted permission by the FCC to increase its daytime broadcasting power to 50,000 watts. Along with this change, the station has also undergone several personnel changes. Mike Hanes, from Roanoke, Va., is the new program director, and new deejays include Kenny Dearstone, Bill Jeffers and Ron Cassidy. The latest in the stations series of 'live' country shows was a wing-ding on Nov. 13, highlighted by Ferlin Husky, Skeeter Davis, Roy Drusky, the Carter Family, Stonewall Jackson and Simon Crum.

Hank Secord, the country feller up at CKRM-Regina, Saskatchewan, tells us that he'd like to receive each and every new c & w disk, including gospel, so send them along. He also says that anyone passing through Regina

is most welcome to drop in and guest on "Hank's House." . . . An S.O.S. is also being sent out by WIOO-Carlisle, Pa., which has been on the air for only a short time. . . . Speaking of new disks, Little Richie Johnson (Box 3, Belen, N.M.) still has copies of "Bright Lights And Country Music" by Bill Anderson, "Think I'll Go Somewhere And Cry Myself To Sleep"

by Charlie Louvin, "White Lightnin' Express" by Roy Drusky, "Big Job" by George Jones, "If This House Could Talk" b/w "Poor Red Georgia Dirt" by Stonewall Jackson and "I'd Better Call The Law On Me" by Hugh X. Lewis. . . . Deejays who did not receive copies of Jack Reno's latest record, "The Biggest Man," may write to him, on station letterhead, at KLLL-Lubbock, Tex.

Smokey Warren, who books talent packages out of his offices in Linden, N.J., dropped in with Tex Valen to let us know that Valen has been set for a tour of Europe early in '66. Accompanied by his Rhythm Ramblers (Jack Smith, Curly Gramacke, "Sidesaddle" Eddie Pal, Bobby Foster and Bud Carson), Valen will make a circuit of U.S. bases in France, Germany and Italy, and will return to the States at the end of Jan. Right after returning, the boys will be heading on up to Newfoundland and Labrador. Valen's latest record is a Christmas release called "Please Mr. Santa" b/w "Christmas Means Happiness."

Margie Singleton, who recently signed with United Artists, has signed an exclusive booking agreement with Jimmy Key's Talent Agency in Nashville. The songstress is out with a brand new single, "The Easy Way Out" b/w "I'm Guilty This Time," and a new album, "Crying Time."

Down in the Sooner State, KFMJ-Tulsa spinner Billy Parker tells us that he now owns his own record company, Pride Records, and also his own publishing firm, Par-Cor Music. A very busy guy, Parker also produces wax sessions and writes the songs. He stages shows with his band, Rocky Kaple & the Shotguns, and also hosts a weekly country spot on KTUL-TV. But that's not all. He's also got a new record out on Pride, "I Fall In Love Too Easy."

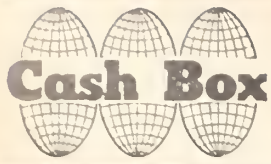

Sonny James, consistently decorating the charts with his ballad outings, including his current smash, "Behind The Tear," looks for equal chart action with this change-of-pace, called "True Love's A Blessing." A jumping, happy-go-lucky romper, this one should go a long way with the spinners and buyers. The flip, "Just Ask Your Heart," is a sweet, warmhearted swayer.

The Brincos (Fernando, Manolo, Junior and Juan) is the first modern Spanish group to register sales in vast quantities. They are currently high in the Spanish charts with "Borracho" (Drunk) and "Sola" (Alone) released by Zafiro S.A. on the Novola label. The Brincos' first disk, "Flamenco," issued at the end of 1964, has now sold more than 100,000 copies, has been released in some 30 countries and been covered by many foreign artists. The group recorded in Spanish, English and Italian and has recently visited Italy to record and appear on television. Their records also sell well in France and Mexico. The Brincos write all their own songs. As well as topping popularity polls and best selling lists, they recently won the Gran Premio Nacional del Disco award of 1965 with "Borracho," voted the best song of the summer. They own their own publishing company, Brincos S.A., and future engagements include the 1966 San Remo Festival.



GREAT BRITAIN

Latest figures from the Board of Trade reveal that manufacturers sales of gramophone records in Aug., valued at £1,969,000, were eight per cent lower than in August, 1964. Home sales decreased by twelve per cent but export sales were nearly one third higher. Production of 45 r.p.m. disks was again lower than a year earlier. Output of 33¹/₃rd r.p.m. disks was also slightly lower but production of 78 r.p.m. records was higher than in August last year.

An announcement from Philips Records informs us that a production and distribution contract has been signed between Leslie Gould (managing director of Philips) and Shel Talmy, director of Orbit Universal Music. From December, Talmy will be releasing new material under his own label, Planet, designed to develop new artistes and become a major factor in the record business in Britain. The director, an American by birth, has been living in Britain for some time and has been associated, with enormous success, in the production of all recordings by the Kinks and the up-and-coming group, the Who.

The BBC is getting ready for the Eurovision Song Contest which takes place in Luxembourg next February. As usual one singer will sing all six songs in the British heats and this year the honour goes to Scottish singer Kenneth McKeller. Each week for five weeks McKeller will sing one number in the BBC's "A Song For Everyone" and in the sixth programme, "A Song For Europe," he will perform all six numbers and viewers will decide on the winning number by sending in their votes on postcards. The final will be on Feb. 7th. The songs, composers and lyric writers have been named and are as follows:

"A Man Without Love" by Cyril Ornadel with lyrics by Peter Callander, "As Long As The Sun Shines" by Ian Gourlay with lyrics by Cliff Hanley, "A Touch Of The Tartan" with music and lyrics by Philip Green, "Comes The Time" by Ron Grainer with lyrics by Caryl Brahm and Ned Sherrin, and "Country Girl" music and lyrics by Robert Farnon.

Granada TV is producing a 50-minute spectacular devoted entirely to the music of John Lennon and Paul McCartney and the programme is set for Dec. 17 screening. Guests include Cilla Black, Peter and Gordon, Lulu, Billy J. Kramer, Marianne Faithfull, Alan Haze and Tony Crombie, Fritz Speiser's Barock and Roll Ensemble, George Martin and his Orchestra and Peter Sellers. Flying in from America especially for this show are Henry Mancini and Esther Philips and from France, Richard Anthony. The show is being produced by Johnny Hamo.

As all football fans know, the World Cup Match takes place at Wembley, Middlesex in July 1966. This may not be a shattering piece of news and it may seem a little out of place in a music column until one realises that publishing personality Sid Green is connected with it. It seems that the Football Association have adopted as their mascot a cartoon character by the name of World Cup Willie—the Brainchild of artist Reginald Hoye. World Cup Willie will soon become a well-known figure in Britain via TV, hoardings, car-stickers, blazer motifs, key rings, and wrapper advertising of every description. To help him along musically Sid Green has written the words and music of a little ditty titled "World Cup Willie" which has been recorded by Lonny Donegan with the Michael Sammes Singers, published by Chappell, and set for release by Pye Records on Nov. 26. The disk will be sent to all football grounds in Britain where first class league games are played and relayed over loudspeakers to the spectators. Could be that little Willie could make the charts.

Still speaking about Sid Green, we hear that he has acquired the Major Music catalogue from which comes the latest Val Doonican single "A Million Miles From Nowhere" issued on Decca.

Jack Heath of Millwick Music is delighted to have the new Sorrows' single "You've Got What I Want" on Piccadilly. It was penned for them by Mickie Dallon who gave them their previous success "Take A Heart" which has now been given world wide release.

An eight-minute colour film has been made by the Ivy League which features their "Tossin' And Turnin'" hit and their latest Columbia single "Our Love Is Slipping Away." The film is set for screening in America, France, Germany, Australia, Sweden and Italy as well as several other countries in order to tie in the release of the single in those territories. The Ivy League started their careers as songwriters under the name Cartr-Lewis and Perry Ford, branched into the artistes field and now combine both facets. They did, of course, pen both "Tossin' And Turnin'" and "Our Love Is Slipping Away"—both published by Southern Music to whom they are under contract.

The Yardbirds, currently in the Top Ten with their double-sided Columbia hit "Still I'm Sad" and "Evil Hearted You" make a brief visit to Belgium and Holland before starting their nation wide British tour co-starring Manfred Mann on Nov. 18.

French singer Francois Hardy, in partnership with Julian More, has penned new Pye single "So Many Friends" published by Rogers Music. . . . American in London Albert Van Dam's album "Crazy Horse Saloon" has just been issued by Pye and set for release in France by Barclay and Germany by Deutsche Vogue. . . . Sylvie Vartan, who with husband Johnny Hallyday appeared in the Royal Variety Show, has first disk release in Britain "One More Day" on Decca. . . . The Small Faces follow-up their "Whatcha Gonna Do About It" hit with their own composition "I've Got Mine" on Decca published by Contemporary Music. . . . A hit for Them in the States "Mystic Eyes" now issued here on Decca.

MEXICO

Italian song "Il Mio Mondo" (My World), was released in both Italian and Spanish versions by Emilio Pericoli and we received the same song, in Spanish by Daniel Riolobos (Musart) and by Lucho Gatica on Capitol. We imagine there will be other versions appearing in the next few days.

Speaking about Emilio Pericoli, he recently arrived at México City to fulfill a contract at La Fuente night club and to appear on several TV shows. Pericoli's records are distributed by Gamma Records in Mexico.

We received news from Mexican artist Andy Russell who is performing in the United States. Andy appeared on the "Hollywood Palace" TV show. We also understand that after finishing his performances in the U.S., Andy will fly to Argentina to fulfill some other contracts.

The Beatles top hit, "Yesterday," was cut in a Spanish version by popular group Los Hermanos Carrión, under the name of "Desde Ayer" (Since Yesterday) on Orfeon Records. This will be part of the LP by Los Hermanos Carrión, with songs composed by Lennon and McCartney. Los Carrión are planning to perform in the United States and perhaps also to record in English.

Four EP's recorded by Spanish idol Tito Mora are in circulation in México City.

Four new songs appeared on the Capitol label, by Lucho Gatica. The musical backgrounds were made in Spain where he performed in the past months. All these songs were sung in the romantic style and now Lucho is preparing new songs to be released in town, perhaps with Page Cavanaugh's musical direction and Billy May's arrangements.

Newly arrived in México City is Mario Freidberg, general manager of Tizoc Records. Mario brought the waxings of Herb Alpert and his Tiajuana Brass, which he distributes in town. Mario also told us that in the coming weeks 2 LP's will be released by Herb Alpert.

Chilean group Los Hermanos Silva, who were performing in the United States, cut, at RCA Victor, their version of Luis Demetrio's new composition "Te Necesito," treated in a very nice ballad style. Los Hermanos Silva will do a short season in town.

Blonde young singer Lolita, who now is exclusive with RCA, cut a record titled "Don Juan Tenorio," with a very modern beat. Lolita is doing several weekly performances on teen TV musical shows and is one of the favorites of the young audience.

Gamma Records is preparing a big Frank Sinatra promotion. Gamma is distributing the Reprise label in México.

Los Moonlights, one of the most popular rock and roll groups we have at the moment, made a series of 52 performances in different cities of the country, before arriving in México City, where they will record at RCA. The Moonlights' biggest hit is "Rosamaria."

South American singer Alberto de Luque, returned to the capitol after a long tour through the country. And before leaving the country, Alberto will do an album for Polydor.

American actress Charmian Carr is actually in town for the premiere of her latest picture.

CBS Records announced that their best female seller Sonia López is in circulation again. After being sick for a long time, she has started a tour in different places in the country.

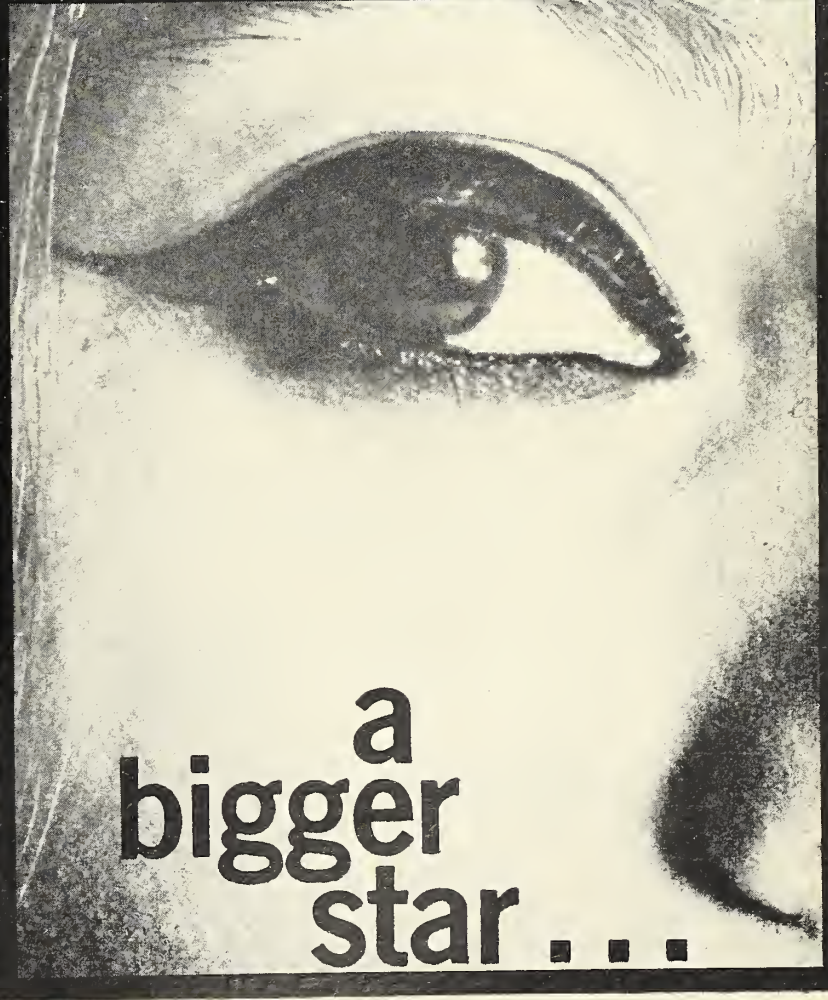

One world of music on one great label





ARGENTINA

Phonogram hosted the social highlight of the week by throwing a party at the Cinzano Club celebrating the 1964 Silver Record obtained from a local music magazine in Buenos Aires devoted mainly to classical music. At the cocktail party gathered the main disk jockeys and reporters, as well as the label's toppers and several musical reviewers. Other interesting news from Phonogram is the possibility of the direct importing of classical records, to areas where there is not enough market to justify a local release. This movement, if put in practice, would certainly enrich the number of records available to the classical music fan.

This CB rep had the pleasure of chatting last week with Mauricio Brenner, Fermata's boss, who has just returned from a three week tour of Europe. Brenner reported that he was greatly impressed by the activity in London, a city he liked very much. His time in Europe was of course devoted partially to business, but he spent many hours having a look at what's going on in the continent's show biz and TV.

Still more proof of the current power of TV for promoting records: shortly after the big hit of Luigi Tenco's "Ho Capito Che Ti Amo," even now selling strongly, there is another single gaining tremendous force after its wide exposure on the TV'er "teletheater" "Los Hermanos," Frank Pourcel's "Avec." It is worth mentioning that very seldom released instrumental tunes reach high positions in the charts, which makes this event even more unusual. It may be that, in the future, musical background for TV programs will have to be considered very seriously by the diskeries, since the results are really magnificent, if the selection is made with care. Odeon, who released the Pourcel waxing, places it on top of its sales reports this week.

Julio Korn Publishers expect that "Ron y Tabaco," Tulio Enrique Leon's next release in Argentina, will reach the same success as "La Pollera Amarilla," his chart riding start in this country. Luis Dimas (Music Hall) has recorded the old standard "A White Sport Coat," with lyrics in Spanish and new arrangements, while Juan Ramon (RCA) has cut "Capri C'Est Fini" and "Mes Mains Sur Tes Hanches," two French smashes.

Reports from CBS inform us that folk singer Jorge Cafrune is preparing a new album, after the success obtained with "Ando Cantandole al Viento," currently among the top selling folk albums. His new production will be an LP devoted to the story of "El Chacha," an historical personality of the 19th century. Words for this work have been written by Leon Benaros and the music is by several top names including Eduardo Falu. In the tango field, Leopoldo Federico has recorded an album by Roberto Grella and his trio; this LP will be marketed in a few weeks.

RCA infos about the release of three albums containing soundtracks of films currently being shot. One of them is "Muchachos Impacientes," starring Marco Antonio Muñoz, Juan Ramon, Simonette, Raul Lavie and Emily Cranz; the others, "Mi Primera Novia," with Palito Ortega as the main actor, and "El Galleguito de la Cara Sucia," once more with Juan Ramon. The diskery has obtained very good results from soundtracks, with "The Sound of Music" being among the nation's best selling LP's.

Trova Records, under the Counterpoint/Esoteric label, is releasing Adriano Bancheri's "Festino," recorded by Noah Greenberg and the Primavera Singers, along with Telemann's Concerti Grossi, in the Karl Ristenpart and the Sarre Orchestra version. The latter also includes Telemann's "Overture," previously not available here. In the Folkways line, the news is an album with U.S. folk music recorded by several artists.

Apolo Publishers—according to information furnished by Roberto Lambertucci—is working on the promotion of "Llora Mi Piano," a tango recorded already by several artists and written by Mariano Mores and Rodolfo Taboada; also on disk is "Amor Viejo," penned by the same Mores and Homeric Exposito, another local composer.

Rosamel Araya, recording for Disc Jockey, is once more in first line with his version of "Dos Corazones," from the recently premiered flick "La Pergola de Las Flores," starring Antonio Prieto and Maruja Diaz. Another single cut by Araya is "Campo Lindo" and "El Parque;" both songs are also included in the film. Araya's records are also being widely promoted in Uruguay, where the artist performs quite often.

Music Hall reports good reaction for the second single cut by Luis Dimas, "Amiga Mia" b/w "Cuando el Sol Brille Otra Vez." "Amiga . . ." is penned by the same Dimas. On the international side, the Swinging Medallions have cut "I Want To Be Your Guy" and "Bye Bye Silly Girl," and Pedro Laza has waxed "Quitate El Saco" and "El Boyero." There is also an interesting compact 33 with versions by Hector Maure, Alberto Castillo, Caldara-Lesica and Agustin Magaldi, singing tango standards. Teen singer Pancho Torres has also an EP, with titles "Mi Soledad," "Enamorados" and "Olvidate de Mi."

Producciones Fermata is outing EP's by Italian stars John Foster and Luigi Tenco, with tunes from their best selling LP's. Fermata's Mina is also starting a good run, after the heavy promotion from "Studio Uno," the giant Italian TV program.

The company will publish an LP by the West Minstrels from the sound track of the film "Vaghe Stelle Dell'Orsa."

Iva Zanicchi has recorded "Carta Bianca" the Italian version of "Cara Mia."

Paul Anka, after some months absence has waxed a new single, "La Pineta," a composition of his, and "Per Carita.'" While he was in Rome to record these songs, Anka filmed two inserts for the television show, "Stasera Rita."

The new English band Ivy League is making their debut in Italy with a record containing "Funny How Love Can Be" and "Lonely Room." This record placed first for many weeks in England.

John Schroeder has been able to produce a new type of sound called The Sounds Orchestral. The record is therefore a curiosity for the Italian public. It contains "Cast Your Fate To The Wind" and "To Wendy With Love."

Mr. Rignano and Mariano Rapetti went to America to contact the American Editorial World.

The new record by Bobby Solo, "Lacasa Del Signore," helps the singer to approach Elvis Presley. Next month they will act a film together.

Gino, the Sudan singer, will go to the San Remo Festival and now he is introducing his new record, "Io Non Ti Amo Piu."

Ornella Vanoni has come home from the U.S.A. where his first LP of Italian songs will be published.

Wilma Goich has come home from Japan and now she is going to Belgium where she will record two shows for young people. Her new record "Ascoltala Voce/Il Diritto Di Amare," will be published in Italy soon.

GERMANY

The German top hit scene is a fast moving business these days. Although the really big hits, which are few and far between, hold their popularity for months on end, the singles business here is now an all or nothing business. U.S. and British material continues to flourish, especially in the large cities with discotheques playing an important role. In the small towns, the German tune continues to hold strong. Right now, 4 upbeat records from the Rolling Stones, 2 from Sam the Sham & the Pharaohs and one from Casey Jones And the Governors, a Liverpool group who made their way to popularity here in Germany are doing well. Another fast moving smash is "Balla Balla" by the Rainbows, a "Wooly Bully" type record with a lyric reading "My Baby, Baby Balla Ball." That's the lyric. The beat is penetrating and the unknown group have a smash on their hands. 4 regulars hold down posts in the top charts including Peter Alexander, who has held his popularity for years on end, the folksy brother-sister team of Renate & Werner Leismann, and the two modern rhythm youngsters from Berlin, Manuela and Draf Deutscher. Udo Jergens, who has developed into one of the most popular artists on the continent with his compositions and records, makes his first entry in the top 10 in a long time with his new record to round off the top 10.

Just a few seasons ago it took a long time for a hit to get off the ground and if it did, it stayed on top a long time. Now the turnover is not as high and hits move at a tremendous pace. This week, 6 of the top ten are new entries. Next week, we'll discuss the radio exposure and TV exposure situation in this market.

Polydor has released the first waxing by the Tony Sheridan group, the Big Six from Scotland.

Philips tells us that the new Leo Leandros disc is taking off. The firm is also pushing the first platters from new teenage lasses Erica and Daniela. Electrola has released a new recording of "Tosca" from Puccini with Maria Callas.

Both Polydor and Philips have released new jazz catalogues. Ralf Arnie is publishing new hits by Vicky on Philips, Chris Howland, Carmela Corren, Peter Hinnen and the Leismanns on Ariola, Janneke and Billy Mo on Decca and Dieter Heck along with Jim Robson on Polydor.

Ralph Maria Siegel is pushing two top international hits, "Hang On Sloopy" now with 3 recordings out including the original version by the McCoys, and "Il Mondo" the Italian smash hit with the original by Jimmy Fontana, a German recording by Vittorio and an instrumental version by Roy Etzel.

Polydor has signed Brigitte Petry the East German lass who escaped to the West after a fab career in the Eastern sector. Her first release hits the market this week.

Philips has released a new LP by Holland star Corry Brokken who had a top hit here recently with her German version of "La Mamma." Joan Baez is also getting an all out push from Philips.

Plenty of news from the Teldec house this week. First of all, top German teenage songstress Manuela, who is now riding the top 10 with her new waxing of "Love and Kisses," just returned from England where she did her first English language recording. Decca will release it in England, and the record is also set for stateside release. Manuela will do the first waxing of "Two Shadows" b/w "Nitty Gritty" on "Ready, Steady, Go" TV'er in Dec. Manuela's stablemate Draf Deutscher, Germany's best r&r selling teenager, also did his

first English waxing called "Amanda" b/w "I'm in Love With an Angel" in England. The Rolling Stones manager Tito Burns is interested in the youngster for the states and England. Deutscher will do records in Italian and French this year. His new record is also high on the charts. Both artists are handled by Peter Meisel's Hansa productions. Teldec is busy with a red hot hit, Barry McGuire's "Eve of Destruction" which has passed the tremendous sales figure of 180,000 for Germany, Austria, Switzerland. On the artist import side of the picture, RCA Victor's Paul Anka was here for the recording of 4 sides and a TV shot along with Gale Garnett. Both artists are produced here by Werner Muller for Teldec. Kurt Feltz will handle the first German production of Jim Edward Brown who is due here in the next few days.

On the classical side, baritone Hermann Prey, who will open in the Metropolitan Opera next year in the new Lincoln Center in New York, is making one of his rare German tours which covers 12 cities and is completely sold out. Mario Del Monaco just visited Germany for concerts in Dusseldorf, Bonn, Berlin and Duisberg. The singer who is now doing a film about his life in Italy will open the Stuttgart State Opera in 1966 and will also perform in Hamburg. On the occasion of the 20th anniversary of Prof. Karl Muenchinger's Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra, a reception was held by Teldec and Decca. The orchestra has been recording exclusively for the labels for the past 15 years. Sir Edward Lewis, president of Decca in England presented Prof. Muenchinger with a certificate stating "It is with great pleasure that we congratulate Professor Karl Muenchinger and the Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra on the occasion of the 20th anniversary of its foundation. For the last 15 years these great artists have been recording exclusively for the Decca Record Company, an association of which we are extremely proud. We are confident of their continued success in the future." Teldec has now released new LP's by the orchestra, which will tour Europe starting this month. The tour starting in Warsaw, Poland will take them to Prague, Czechoslovakia, Budapest and a German tour in December covering several cities.

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SCANDINAVIA

DENMARK

Latest releases from Tono and Metronome include a special list of children's records from the two companies. With Christmas around the corner, the promotion campaign started in the beginning of November, Cash Box learned.

NPA (Nordisk Polyphon Akts.) has rushed out Marianne Faithfull's "Yesterday" "Oh Look Around You" on Decca. Other NPA releases include Peter Alexander with "Fräulein Wunderbar" and Lolita with "Männer, Masten und Matrosen," both on Polydor. Local star Johnny Reimar on Philips, now on the charts with his Danish version of a Swedish tune, seems to be very successful with Swedish songs. Last spring, he got a Silver Disc for his version of "Fröken Fräken," and now with the Christmas sale coming up, his "I Lust Och Nöd" might very well give him another Silver, if not a more expensive and desirable metal.

Carl Carlsen, 40 years at the NPA office, retired Oct. 29. Carlsen was head of the order dept. at the company.

HNF (Hede Nielsens Fabriker A/S) rushed Sonny & Cher's "Baby Don't Go" on Reprise, Freddy Cannon with "Action" on Warner Bros., and Trini Lopez with "Sinner Man" on Reprise. The company is doing very well at the moment with "Eve Of Destruction" with Barry McGuire at RCA Victor. Local artist Eugen Tajmer has done "Tusinde Roser" (Millions Of Roses) b.w. "Forst Bryllup-Nu Tomhed" (Gettin' Married Has Made Us Strangers) on RCA Victor, and "Ka' Du Gaette" (Alouette) b.w. "Der Findes Ikke Nogen Anden Dig" (I'll Never Find Another You).

Tono has the theme song from the new Danish flipper "Jensen Laenge Leve" (Long Live Jensen), just about to open in Copenhagen after having been shown in other Danish cities. The theme song is titled "Uhyggen Breder Sig," composed by Sven Gyldmark, who with his Orchestra has waxed the song on Tono. It is backed with another film song, Chaplin's "Titine" from "Modern Times."

FINLAND

Popular Finnish bandstand-program "Nuorten Tanssihetki" has been moved from Tuesday to Wednesday. The popular teenage TV show's producers Paavo and Antti Einio are now using more and more foreign artists for the telecast. Among names seen and heard this autumn, so far, are the Kinks, the Swinging Blue Jeans (from England), Larry Finnegan (from the U.S.), the Moonlighters and the Painters (from Sweden). In addition, of course, top teenage talents from Finland are frequent guests.

British group Herman's Hermits on Columbia entered the charts here last month with two titles, "I'm Henry VIII, I Am" and "The End Of The World." Pohjoismainen Sähkö-Oy (PSO) handles the records here. They are also very busy at the moment with the Beatles on Parlophone with "Help."

NORWAY

A recent local pop band competition in Bergen (a city in western Norway, a local Liverpool as far as finding new talents is concerned) was won by Philips' Helge Nielsen, Rune Larsen and the Stringers. A rhythm-&-blues group, the Rhythmic Six, also under contract to Philips, came second. The company did in fact start the Bergen wave of pop music in Norway by its serial "The Bergen Beat."

SWEDEN

"Dona, Dona" done by Joan Baez, has been published here by Reuter & Reuter AB, it was reported to Cash Box. "Scandal In The Family" and "I'll Be Seeing You" has also been published by the company.

Publisher Felix Stahl, at the moment visiting his office in Hamburg, sent this office a list of 11 new songs to be published here by his Stockholm Musikproduktion. Titles include "A Hatchet, A Hammer," "A Taste Of Honey," "Do You Hear What I Hear," "Mystic Eyes," "Misty," "My Heart Sings," "In Apple Blossom Time," "Rescue Me," "Unchained Melody," "Whatcha Gonna Do About It" and "Where Do You Go."

Metronome has a new LP with ballad singer Cornelis Vreeswijk, entitled "Ballader Och Grimascher." Few Swedish records these days are so enthusiastically received by music critics as the chanter's. Concerning his new LP, a critic wrote that "Santa Claus Is Dead" is a nice fairy tale that definitely should be banned from children. The lyrics are very "tough," as most of his songs. It is an open question if radio and/or TV is likely to air any of his songs, or if they "for moral reasons" will put that dead-skull on the record which means "banned from airing."

BELGIUM

Adamo witnessed quite a triumph in the Ancienne Belgique (Old Belgium) in Brussels. He interrupted his successful tour of France to perform in the Belgian capital. All seats were booked days ahead and people lined up in the hundreds for tickets. Adamo also performed at a charity concert; tickets sold for 150 fr and once again the house was packed. While referring to one of the stars of SA Gramophone, we should also mention that the firm has had several of its artists over here recently, including **Hans-Richter Haaser**, **Henri Tisot** (with performances in Flemish and Walloon cities), **Rita Gørr**, **Samson François**, **Mathé Althéry**, **Lucien Lupi**, **John Pritchard**, **Claude Ciari** and several more. The bestseller of this firm is undeniably an . . . LP! It is a live recording of Adamo's performance at the Olympia theatre in Paris, aptly called "Adamo à l'Olympia." It is establishing a new sales record. This again is something quite unique. We would also like to mention that this firm in view of the Yuletide festivities is putting out seven new albums under the title "Unforgettable recordings of our time."

Ranch is an unpretentious record company, but it can nevertheless boast a few hits on its label. The firm is, in fact, a subsidiary of the publishing house under the management of Mrs. Bosmans. The firm recently held a reception under the motto "Ranch des Vedettes" (Stars' Ranch), during which the stars were presented to members of the press, radio and TV. The two current best-sellers of the firm are **Jean-Marc Bertrand's** "Capri c'est fini" (It's All Over Capri) and **Benoit Philippe's** "Lisette" and "Que c'est doux l'amour" (How Sweet Is Love).

Vogue once again has a crack record in the offing, "Yesterday Man" by **Chris Andrew**. A very strong press and sales promotion campaign is currently being undertaken by the firm for the records of the following artists: **Charles Trenet**, **Joe Tex**, **Esther Philips**, **Marie-José Neuville** and **Sonny & Cher**. **José Thomas** also enjoyed a pretty good reception. A children's EP has been produced by the same firm with texts by **Charles Aznavour**. It is called "Le Crocodile Majuscule" ("The Big Crocodile").

Roland Barbey of the music publishing house of the same name, located at 3, rue des Français, Chatelet, has pinned his hopes on a recently pressed disk by **Ange-Line**, a handsome 17-year-old girl, who hails from the Charleroi area. On the Parade label she recorded "L'Oiseau Bleu" ("Blue Bird") and "Je Suis Allée" ("I Went Away"). She also appeared on a Flemish teenage TV program and she got good reviews, especially in Wallonia. The lark seems to stand a good chance to acquire fame across our borders. The label also has something new by **Jacques Huygens**.

Teenage singer **Dan Ellery** records for Inelco. In a previous column we referred to this young man and would now like to stress his exceptional performance, namely two of his own works for which he wrote both the music and the words. They include his latest single "Diamond Lake" and "I . . .". RCA now enjoys a considerable success with **Barry McGuire's** "Eve Of Destruction".

Polygram's classical record of the month "Brahms Piano Concerto No. 2 In B Flat Major" Op. 83 by pianist **Gina Bachauer** and the "London Symphony Orchestra" conducted by **Stanislaw Skrowaczewski**.

The firm recently announced a new LP series with the integral work of famous French chansonnier **George Brassens**.

On Monday Oct. 11 a press cocktail party took place in the Polygram Studios in Brussels on the occasion of the publication in Belgium of the first EP by the **Three Singing Nuns**. Everybody was enthusiastic and Primavera Music Publishers hope the trio will do well. In the first part of November their second EP with Christmas songs will be released in Belgium.

Artone released a new batch of single recordings from the Festival catalog by **Andre Verschuren**, **Michel Delpech**, **Pia Colombo**, **Marcel Azzola** as well as LP offerings by **Aidre Verschuren** and **Guy Béart**.

Les Surfs, scoring with "Scandale Dans La Famille," were in Brussels for a special RTB-TV show. The Madagascan boys and girls, present at a press conference organized at the Artone Building, came into contact with several important reporters.

Jay & the Americans have the song to become one of the most popular, one of the leading groups, over here. It is the well-known "Some Enchanted Evening."

Recent Funckler-released additions to the local Chess International catalog include albums by **Chuck Berry** "Rockin' With Chuck," **Ahmad Jamal**, "The Roar Of The Greasepaint," **Howlin' Wolf's** "Poor Boy" and an extended play by **Muddy Waters**.

An excellent beat-record "Baby" has been released on the Colpix label. The tune by the **Bushmen** is a song with hit-capacities in our territory.

Recent CBS releases in the single field include the **New Christy Minstrels** "Chim, Chim, Cher-ee" b/w "They Gotta Quit Kickin' My Dog Around." "Chim, Chim, Cher-ee" is the marvelous song that won the American Academy Award. **Peter Kamp** sings "Ein Traum Ging Vorbei" and CBS released "Ain't It True," the very popular song by wonderful **Andy Williams**. New CBS additions to the popular LP field include the great folk-singer **Bob Dylan** with "Highway 61 Revisited," **The Brothers Four** with "The Honey Wind Blows" and lovely **Aretha Franklin** with an LP called "Yeah! !!" CANADA

Another Crosley effort of note on RCA is his album debut, "A New Star In Town." Arrangements are progressing slowly, but very satisfactorily for establishment of Tartan Records' American affiliate. It is to be called Tartan-American, and will be H.Q.'d in Cincinnati.

The Hurdon Bros. are still in search of distribution tie-ups in one or two key American centres, and look forward to their first product on the shelves in the U.S. by the first of the year. Meanwhile, Bobby Curtola continues to win honor after honor across Canada. He currently hosts his own coast to coast TV'er, "After Four." The young singer's LP "Golden Hits" for Coca Cola had a phenomenal sale across Canada and will win him a Gold Disc, which will be presented to Curtola on TV before the year is out. Danny Roman reports that sales action on the debut LP by David Clayton Thomas and the Shays has been exceptional, even though it has been on the market for but two weeks. The two current singles by the group will shortly be released in the U.S. and Europe. Both "Out Of The Sunshine" and "Take Me Back" have enjoyed lengthy stays on charts from coast to coast in Canada. Roman reports that the LP is hot in all Canadian centres. David Thomas recently put in some very successful p.a.'s in the Ottawa area. He'll be heading back to the Capital before long. Meanwhile, the Shays have been big drawing cards at a Toronto night spot. Thomas heads into the Montreal Forum on Dec. 29, and will appear before more than 10,000 Montreal youngsters.

Ted Daigle's commercial London LP outing, "Bottoms Up," continues to sell well wherever the c&w sounds get regular air exposure. His set is one of the best featuring home-grown talent in many a moon. Ted tells CB he just completed an appearance in Ottawa, together with a wide cross section of artists in a benefit for the family of the late Ward Allen, one of the brightest stars ever in Canada's country music sky. Daigle's old chum Fred MacKenna, star of CBC TV's coast to coaster, "Sing Along Jubilee," has been appearing with country thrush Myrna Lorrie at the Canadian Lakehead's Crest Motor Hotel. The songstress, her band and Fred MacKenna are set for a swing through Northwestern Ontario centres that will culminate in a big show in Kenora about the end of November. Lorrie's manager, Fred King, reports that the show is S.R.O. wherever it is booked. Incidentally, King in his role of P.D. at Lakehead's CJLX, has just debuted a top forty chart. It appears weekly and represents one of the new entries in the chart race across Canada.

The Canadian Downbeats, a leading Regina recording group, send along a copy of their latest, "Surf Party." It is reported doing very well on their home town chart and is showing strongly nationally as well. They expect the release of their follow-up disc shortly.

"Bulldog Walk" by Moe Koffman is really getting the big push from the promo department from London's Gaye Galin. A recorded intro by Koffman was supplied to several key Canadian spinners in hopes that the disc would get a little extra air time. It must have; sales are on the upswing and it appears that the singer may make the chart scene across the Country after some time without a hit single.

"I Love How You Love Me," by April and Nino is another Atco outing that is making some chart noise. It's very strong in the Duluth-Minneapolis, St. Paul areas of the U.S., and as a result has caught on in neighboring Canadian markets. It could be a real left field outing for the brother-sister duo, with a swinging bag pipe riff here and there.

Corrine Burke, the Phonodisc charmer in Winnipeg, is up to her pretty ears in orders for the Kapp comedy set, "You Don't Have To Be Jewish." The two hottest singles currently in Winnipeg for Phonodisc are the outings by Fontella Bass, "Rescue Me" and "I Hear A Symphony" by the Supremes. The Supremes seem sure for the number one spot all across the country faster than you can say Tamla-Motown.

Pierre Thibeault, the man from B.M.I., is making calls on broadcasters across the country, attempting to enlist their aid with regard to logging air play on B.M.I. tunes. He isn't having too much success. Should he not get cooperation from the country's radio men on a voluntary basis, some severe steps are within the realm of the licensing firm to get a bi-annual report of air play on their selections. It could mean another two weeks every year of that ghastly task of preparing daily logs on the records played on Canadian stations. It is to be hoped that something can be worked out so that all parties will be satisfied.

Australian Records have made a big release of new albums for the month of November. The albums include "Ahmad Jamal At The Blackhawk," "My Favorite Things" by Judy Bailey, "Angel Eyes" by the Dave Brubeck Quartet, "Something Tender" by Bud Freeman & Two Guitars, "The Leasebreakers," "What's In Our Heart" by George Jones & Melba Montgomery; "Love Affair" by Ray Conniff, "Strangers & Cousins" by Pete Seeger, "After School Session" by Chuck Berry, and local production of spoken word material entitled "Henry Lawson's Australia" presented by Leonard Teale.

In the field of Christmas albums we find five new issues from Festival: "Mary Christmas" by Eddie Fisher, "Christmas With Billy Vaughn," Christmas Mood" by the Knightsbridge Singing Strings, "Christmas With Jimmie Rodgers," and the Danny Kaye package "Hans Christian Anderson & Tubby The Tuba."

Essex Music Of Australia are in pretty good shape at the moment with quite a few strong titles to their credit, such as "San Francisco Bay Blues," "Satisfaction," "Everyone's Gone To The Moon," "Where Have All The Flowers Gone," "Get Off Of My Cloud," "Turn, Turn, Turn," and a new local song, "Dance Puppet, Dance."

New releases from the Astor group of labels include "Round Every Corner" by Petula Clark, "I Will" by Dean Martin, "Can You Please Crawl Out Your Window" by the Vaeels, "It's Alright" by the Uglys, and the first album on the GO!! label entitled "Bobby & Laurie" featuring Bobby Bright and Laurie Allen.

Ray Bull, general sales manager for Australian Records, has just returned from a visit to Perth, Western Australia, where he spent a good deal of time with ARC's distributor in that state, Athol M. Hill. Bull says that Hill's company is all geared up to handle heavy Xmas sales traffic.

Two new locally produced singles on the Sunshine label (distributed through Festival) feature Peter Doyle with "Watcha Gonna Do About It" c/w "Do It 'Zulu Style," and a group called the Purple Hearts with "Here 'Tis" and "Long Legged Baby."

Tony D'Ambra of Minstrel Records, who handle the Durium catalogue in Australia, report great success with the Marcello Minerbi version of "Zorba's Dance." Durium is currently very hot across the nation with the Nini Rosso rendition of "Il Silenzio," which has enjoyed an enormous run here.

RCA is out with a single by our old friend from Adelaide, South Australia, Ernie Sigley. This is Ernie's first effort for RCA and it carries "Mona Lisa" and "Think About Me," a local song by Colin Kirby. Ernie has had experience in all fields of entertainment, including a stint as a disc-jockey with Radio Luxembourg.

To honor her coming to Japan, the label is planning to release her record which includes Japanese locals and American newest pop hits like "He Couldn't Care Less."

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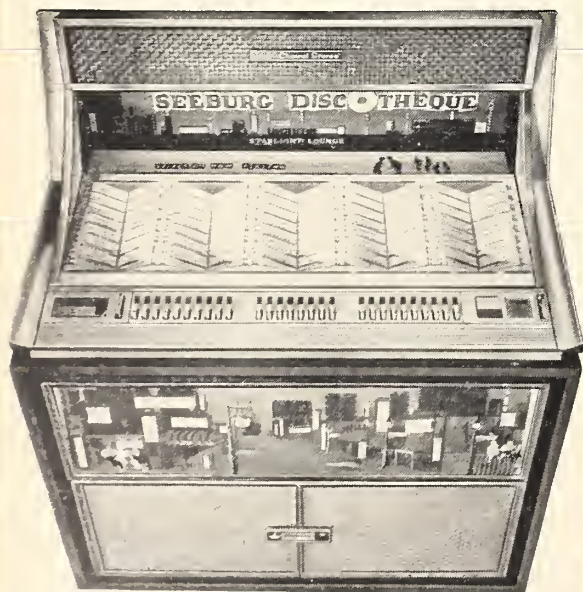

Editorial

A Call For Professional Help

"Public relations"—a phrase read and heard numerous times by the coin machine industry—and certainly promoted many times by this magazine. But what does it really mean? How many in our business have heard it spoken or run across it in print but are not quite clear of its meaning or know what its application can do? Worse yet, how many of us are familiar with the concept but refuse to devote time or money to it or simply don't believe in its value?

Basically, public relations is the establishment of an image in the mind of the public, a feeling, if you will, toward a particular person or enterprise—in this case, the business of operating coin machines for a living. How the heart of the public reacts toward a business has a great deal to do with the success of that business. Since the opinion of a person is formed by what he reads, sees and hears, these obviously are the tools of public relations—the media of communications and face-to-face contact by members of the trade with the man on the street.

In most areas of the country, the general public feels a certain doubt about coin machine operators and a distrust of what they consider to be a shadowy, devious enterprise. But we're not telling you anything you don't know. Is this image deserved? Certainly not. Does it exist? You bet. What are its effects on our weekly sales?

It stunts the growth of equipment routes by denying access of operators to many potentially lucrative locations.

It harasses present business through its most crippling result—unfair legislation.

It hurts per-machine sales when a customer refuses to deposit a coin in one of our pieces of equipment for fear of supporting the "shadowy figure" who owns it.

It inhibits the natural expansion of our infant, yes, infant, industry—expansion which would insure better personnel, even more improved equipment and supplies, and all the other benefits incumbent upon a moving, dynamic industry.

And don't forget self respect and respect from your local community. But we're not telling you anything you don't know.

Certainly, several earnest attempts have been made toward creating a respectable image for the trade by our national association and other well meaning groups. But, for lack of interest in many quarters, this, and practically all else has gone by the boards. Right at this point let's forget interest—we need zeal! The zeal of every member from every level of the trade, from the manufacturer on down to do his utmost to promote that much needed public respect.

What we'd like to suggest is for our trade once again to look for help outside the business—professional help as only a top-flight public relations agency can offer. Practically every industry has a good PR agency working to maintain or improve the public attitude as it affects their businesses. Why isn't our industry actively working with such an agency? Really, what industry needs one more than we?

Professional agencies have the skill, the influence, the publicity contacts and, overall, the experience in molding public opinion. Do they cost money? Yes. But is our image costing us money? Of course it is. But we're not telling you anything you don't know.

Our manufacturers, as the most influential group in the trade, should carry the ball and spearhead this program. Working with MOA, they have the means necessary to contract a professional PR outfit. And this time the trade to a man should get behind the program. Let's back up our belief in our business with action and turn that belief into a reality. It's going to be hard but it most certainly can be done.



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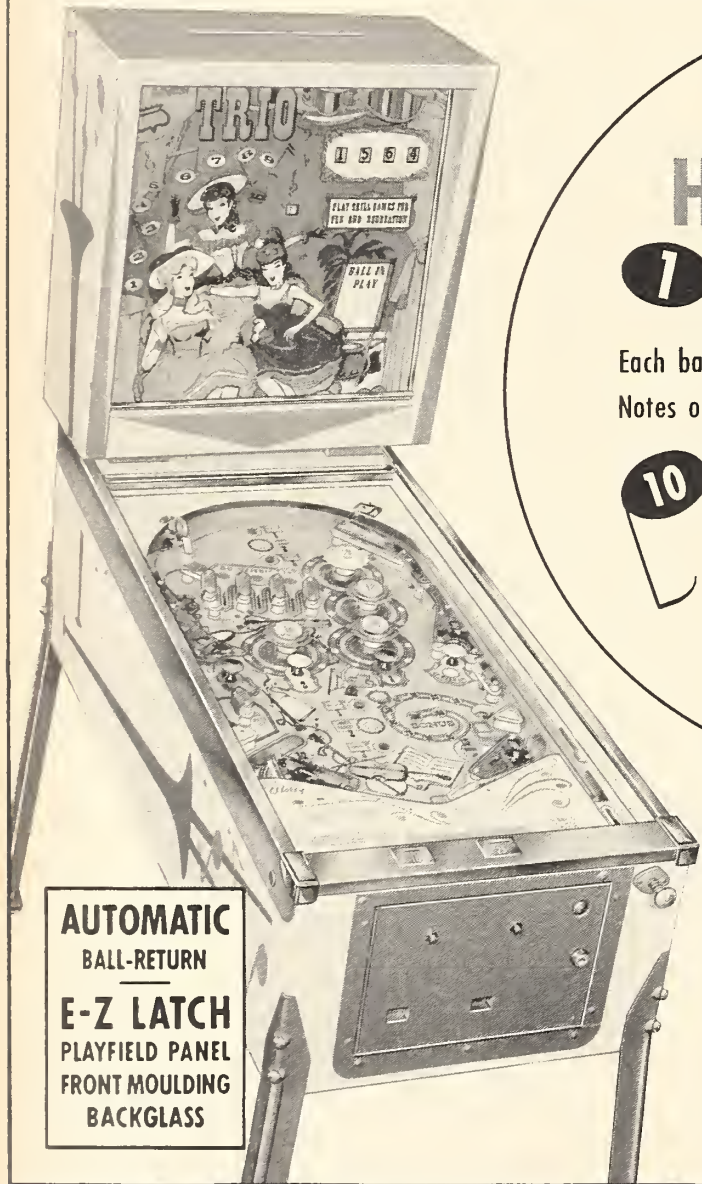
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**All-Tech Announces
Timer-Table Lineup**

HIALEAH, FLA.—A new concept in coin-operated pool table operation was unveiled here last week by All-Tech Ind. Inc. with their release of a full line of 6-pocket "Timer Pool Tables." Lew Cohn, VP and sales director for the firm, declared that the new timing mechanism on these tables will allow all balls that are pocketed during the play of the game to be returned immediately to the player, until the pre-set time runs out, enabling him to play any game he wishes including straight pool, rotation or nine ball.

Cohn stated, "this startling innovation has made all other coin-operated tables obsolete simply because any game is now possible on one of our Timer Pool Tables." Cohn further advised, "naturally the table also allows use of the regulation 2 1/4" cue ball. Other tables 'capture' each ball as it is pocketed, but ours come right back so long as the time is running," he added.

The new timer mechanism also features a multiple accumulator. "The player can insert as many quarters as he likes and enjoy uninterrupted play," Cohn stated. The mechanism also keeps a running total of cash deposited with an accompanying metering device. The timer pool table operator has the option of setting the mechanism from 7 to 13 minutes for each game. Cohn declared that the new line offers four sizes, from 3 x 6 to 4 1/2 x 9 and is available wherever all-Tech tables are now distributed.

**Stereo Singles Series
Released By Seeburg**

Last week, the Seeburg Corp. announced the release of an ambitious stereo singles record program for the music operator, complete with a printed catalogue listing over 100 choices. The new stereo singles records are only for use on coin-operated phonographs. The records are not for sale nor may they be broadcast. They are available to music operators on a leased basis only.

Seeburg's president J. Cameron Gordon noted that there are 20 singles in their Country & Western series and that the Rhythm & Blues series for the younger set and the adult series each contain 20 singles. Included among the releases are old standards, teen, latin, waltzes, dixieland, Hawaiian, Mexican, French and Italian material. A new updated catalogue listing all new records will be issued every 90 days.

An operator can choose the ten singles he wishes to lease and have his choice of replacement. He may exchange them anytime during the one year term of the lease and obtain replacement records in the same quantity as those returned, Gordon advised. Operators are thus not required to take a pre-selected group of ten records at any time in the program. "The operator selects the records he wants and replaces them when he wishes," Gordon added.

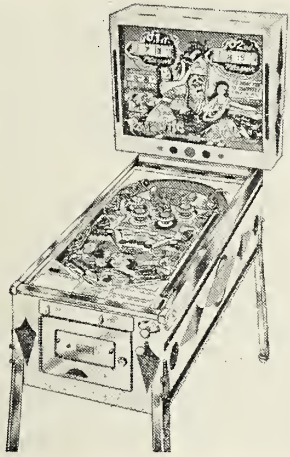

The name of the newest Gottlieb flipper is "Paradise," a two-player competitive game.

"We not only strive to provide coin machine operators the world over with that extra touch of supreme quality and originality; but, also, that something that brings many coins into the cash box regularly," Gottlieb asserted. "Gottlieb flipper amusement games are, for that reason, the big profit makers in all the world coin machine markets."

Among the other innovations in "Paradise," according to Gottlieb, are new diagonal rollovers which guide the ball directly in front of the conveniently located flippers. Also, new color-disc targets for more playfield action.

"Then there are the ever popular 'relay-action' kickout holes for still more thrilling, rapid action on the beautifully designed and appointed playfield, as well as 'roto-lights' which indicate the value of the relay holes," Gottlieb said.

Gottlieb detailed the scoring action

on the playfield and lightbox, "guaranteed to create maximum play and profits in the vast majority of locations of all types and sizes." Four rollovers and four targets increase the values of the holes and spin the roto-lights. Six rollovers turn the pop-bumpers "on-and-off" for "super high" scores.

Gottlieb's "Paradise" two-player flipper amusement game offers three or five ball play (optional) and the Gottlieb "Watch Feature."

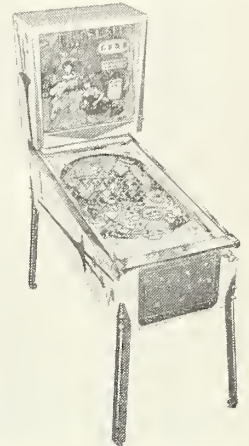
Sample shipments of the new competitive play flipper have already been rushed out to Gottlieb's network of distributors for demonstration in their showrooms.

Carryover Scoring Features Highlight Bally's New 'Trio' Single Player Pin

CHICAGO — Bally Manufacturing president Bill O'Donnell spoke at length and with much enthusiasm about Bally's new one-player flipper game, "Trio." "To begin with," he said, "repeat play and bystander follow-up play is built-in."

"Left-over bonus scores on the playfield," O'Donnell explained, "as well as left-over advances on the backglass are a double attraction for continued repeat play by the same player. The build-up bonus can score up to 290 points when the ball is shot into the bonus kick-out hole, while specials are scored when musical notes on the backglass advance to number 10.

"Bonus and backglass advances,

both of which carry over from ball to ball and game to game, are accomplished by tricky patterns of skill shots which players are finding extremely fascinating as they maneuver the ball to hit the trio of red, white and blue bumpers when lit. The bumpers in turn are lit by crossing correspondingly colored buttons, one set of red, white and blue buttons being located toward the top of the panel, another trio of buttons toward the bottom. The buttons, which are the keys to lit targets, light automatically before each ball is shot, and remain lit until hit.

"Having lit the targets by hitting buttons, the player's next goal is to hit those targets, advancing the bonus 10 points for each hit. The free-ball gate opens when the bonus is 100 even, and each free-ball escaping through the gate advances the backglass lights one step.

"The 'chain reaction' of scoring which is built into 'Trio' is a principle which has been neglected in recent years. The success of 'Trio' on test locations proves that players welcome this tried and true play principle like a long lost friend."

Daddis Forms United Billiards, Inc.;

New Lineup To Ship By Mid-December

NEWARK, N.J.—Art Daddis, long prominent in the coin machine industry, has entered one more phase in his career by announcing the formation of United Billiards, Inc. with himself as president. Daddis stated that the factory, which is located at 9-17 Loretto St. in this city, is already putting the finishing touches to prototypes of a complete lineup of coin-operated 6-pocket tables and advises that full production on all sizes will insure shipment and delivery to the trade by mid-December.

Daddis revealed that the United Billiards lineup will present a "new approach in coin-operated pool table design with all components immediately accessible to the operator or his serviceman." The coinvet, who says he founded the new manufacturing firm "to make a better table for the operator at the right price," claims his new line will offer every good feature on the present market and will present a combination of beauty and ease of maintenance in its design.

"My experience in the pool table business has furnished me with knowledge on many features of pool table operation which operators have found irksome and were eliminated when we designed our line," Daddis advised. "Operators will be able to

get in and out of locations faster because we designed our table with this and many other thoughts in mind," he added.

"As the trade will see when we premiere our line," Daddis stated, "even though there has been no stinting in quality on our tables, our previous consideration in construction and design will enable us to offer these tables at a most reasonable price."

Discotheque Dixieland Jazz Craze Forecast By Bilotta

NEWARK, N.Y.—John Bilotta, president of Bilotta Enterprises, Wurlitzer equipment outlet here with branch offices in several other large New York State cities, is not only predicting a new musical craze nowadays but is doing his utmost to promote it. Calling the new musical look "Discotheque Dixieland Jazz," the prominent coinvet declared last week that, "Dixieland jazz, played with a good rock beat, is going to draw the biggest action on locations since the advent of coin-operated discotheque."

The New Orleans sound, already capturing the interest of many operators and their location owners and customers in the upstate area, according to Bilotta, is reportedly capitalizing on the inroads made by coin-operated discotheque. The Bilotta Dixieland Discotheque program for locations consists of the Wurlitzer phono-speaker package, programmed with a good deal of New Orleans jazz, alternating with a live dixieland band and set in a location featuring a New Orleans decorative motif. Exploiting discotheque even further, Bilotta says he has "flapper girls" set to take the place of "go go" girls in the disco cages.

Helping the swing to Discotheque Dixieland Jazz, the Wurlitzer distributor has gone as far as to hire two prominent upstate public relations

consultants to help present the plan to prospective locations, is personally supervising the set-up of locations and opening night festivities in several large population centers here, including Rochester, Geneva and Syracuse and has been to see representatives of record manufacturing firms to determine the amount of available dixieland programming material for the Wurlitzer discotheque package.

"I made a special point to drop in on Len Levy of Epic Records down in New York to discuss the availability

of Dixieland material he could provide from his catalogue," Bilotta said. "Len, among others, has always had a high regard for the music operator in providing us with the programming material we need," he added.

One opening night jamboree was scheduled to take place last Fri. at Zappia's Restaurant in Newark where the "disco-dixie" program was to premiere the New Orleans look, complete with flappers and wall decorations. The band, supplied through the Finger Lakes Div. of the A.F.M. (musicians union), has promised to cooperate with the program in their territory.

Bilotta advised that the customer-drawing power of dixieland discotheque will enable an operator to get a better cash box percentage from his location owners and thereby defray the cost of equipment. "The location draws more folks (especially since dixieland appeals to all age groups), makes more money and the operator can get a fairer share," he said. "It makes good economic sense and we're gonna prove it," Bilotta added.

He has placed his PR staff (Ron DeFrance and Tony Busch) at the disposal of any operator wishing to make a presentation to a location owner.

Outlook Bright For New Coin Production

WASHINGTON, D. C.—On Nov. 1, the United States Mint released 230 million "new" cupronickel quarters for public consumption, through the nation's banks.

The new "sandwich" formula for coin-making, a cupronickel skin over a copper base, was developed to meet the current coin shortage, halt the "silver drain" and provide enough coins to satisfy a national economy that is becoming more and more vending-minded. According to a survey made in 1963 by a Boston research company, the year 1985 will see a demand for 12 billion coins—and the Treasury has already boosted that estimate by moving the projected date up to 1975.

Federal officials originally planned to release 9 billion new coins this year, but now they are driving for 11.2 billion, especially with the Christmas season only a month away. Other problems include collectors, who may keep the new coins or the old ones for their curiosity value, and hoarders. Production schedules are also working against facilities which are many years out of date. New manufacturing and storage space construction is now underway, working against time, and some officials predicted that even with the Philadelphia and Denver mints going full-steam, and a re-opened San Francisco mint at full capacity, a fourth mint will have to be built.

A campaign by the vending industry resulted in a modification of the "new" coins design, to make them workable in vending machines.

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ARA Gets Braves' Pact

ATLANTA — When the Atlanta Braves occupy their new stadium here, the 52,000 people it seats will be serviced by Automatic Retailers of America. ARA has just signed a long-term contract with the Braves to provide food and beverages through vending machines.

Little Brenda, Mighty Fats

NEW YORK—The Petite bundle of brassy song, Miss Brenda Lee, strides and cajoles through six cuts from her latest Decca album on the Little LP lists. Included are, "Unforgettable," "Too Many Rivers," "Think," "Call Me Irresponsible," "Whispering" (shades of Paul Whiteman!) and "No One."

Providing his steady beat which has provided steady sales over the years, Dot's headliner Billy Vaughan & His Orchestra relax their way through six standards: "Moon Over Naples," "Any Time," "Love," "A Walk in the Black Forest," "Please" and "My Love, Forgive Me."

Comes now the moody one, long and tall Nina Simone, with inside tips on the sad life. The great Bessie Smith classic, "Nobody Knows You When You're Down and Out" leads off, followed by "The End of the Line," "Trouble In Mind," "Tell Me More and More and Then Some" and the old folk tune, "Chilly Winds Don't Blow."

When rock and roll was young, one man stood out as a constant hit maker and now he's back with modern versions of his famous tunes—Fats Domino. Featured cuts from his Mercury album are "Blueberry Hill," "Ain't That A Shame," "Oh, What A Price," "Let the Four Winds Blow," "I'm Gonna Be A Wheel Someday" and the gully-low blues, "So Long."



Eastern Flashes

LAST NIGHT—At twenty-seven minutes and forty-four seconds after five p.m., Musical Distributors staffer Dave Freed was behind the counter, carefully putting parts away. At United East Coast, Lou Druckman was gazing at the machines, some ready to be shipped out, some in long cartons leaning against the wall waiting to be unpacked. At Runyon Sales, Louis Wolburg, hosting a service school for the Rowe Diplomat Model N, had just finished passing out sandwiches and coffee for the thirty servicemen attending, and at Cash Box, typewriters were still snapping at white foolscap, phones were ringing, people were talking . . . when the lights went out.

THAT NIGHT—Home-bound workers had rung for elevators, some had seen the doors close on them just as the lights went out. Others heard forlorn yells from the shafts ("The elevators are not working! The elevators are not working!") and headed for the back stairs. Out on the street, shadows moved by, some giggling, some cursing, some evaluating (a long-haired young fellow said to his long-haired friends: "It is most interesting to note the various behavioral patterns tonight" and his pals answered, "Yeh, daddy") some felt liberated (a woman on upper Broadway began singing hymns at the top of her voice) some were frightened (a woman in a blacked-out subway car announced that she was a diabetic and must have something to eat by six o'clock; the other passengers went through their pockets to find candy and gum). Civilians began to direct traffic and when it became known that the black-out was city-wide, the candles flickering in the windows seemed to make it a holiday. "Remember the moon and sky you saw last night," Lou Druckman said, "because you'll probably never see it that way again." A party of ten walked through Central Park by the moonlight, marching in military step ("you move faster that way") and the searchlights sliding across the buildings reminded many of a wartime night.

OUR NIGHT—"We'd hardly begun eating," said Louis Wolburg, "when it went black. Here were thirty servicemen and a special lecturer from Rowe come from all over the Five Boroughs and the state—we're going to schedule it again. Definitely. But what a shame." Dave Freed walked over to Fifty-Seventh Street and Eighth Avenue by the subway entrance in the Hearst Building, and passed the next five hours in conversation with a young lady. Then another "strandee" offered him space when his father came in to pick him up. They were on the Brooklyn Bridge when a fire broke out. Cars were stalled or out of gas on the lanes. Finally Dave made it to Brooklyn, called Max Gulden, and Max picked him up. "I wonder how Tex Antoine is going to explain this?" Lou Druckman laughed. He had waited at the United showrooms for awhile and then gone over to Al Simon's. Al gave everyone a lift home. "People in New York," said Lou "can take a bow. Out-of-towners 'like to visit but they don't like to live here', and we're supposed to be coarse and rough, but those people can keep still now and start applauding. Nobody panicked, everybody knew what to do and helped his neighbor. They behaved beautifully. This night set a record. New York can take a bow."

MUTE MACHINES—Naturally, collections during the great blackout were nil even though thousands of tavern locations were jammed with customers looking for something to occupy themselves with during the longest night in history. With the exception of manual vending machines, the coin machines affecting some 30 million people were dead.

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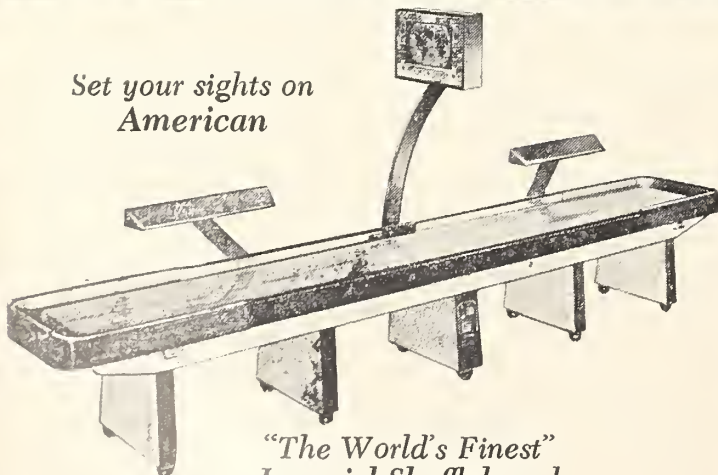
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Chicago Chatter

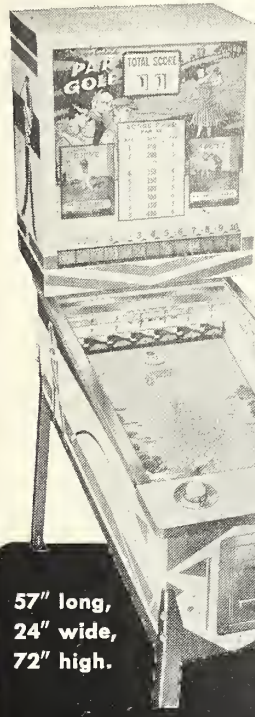

EVERYTHING'S UP-TO-DATE AT EASTERN—A tour and talk with Bert Betti of Eastern Novelty took up most of a pleasant and instructive day. The showrooms were flooded with sunlight and the new pool tables made an impressive sight. Clean and well-kept, the offices (which are equipped with NCR machines to handle the bookkeeping), the workshop and the showrooms all reflect Bert's belief that a coin-machine company should be in plain sight for public appeal. The soft-spoken, second-generation coinman pointed to the stockpile of slates for pool tables. "Each slate weighs 275 pounds and one crate holds ten of them." Multiplying those figures by the number of crates in stock and the activity in the showrooms and offices, the impression received was: business moves best when modern techniques are fully exploited, especially in a world-wide industry. "I expect," said Bert, "that there will be one million pool tables sold in this country this year. I think it's a wonderful game and so, from all reports, does most of America." He spoke at length about the industry's public image: This is what is hurting us the most. When my father started this company in 1932 he did it completely in the open, because he wouldn't give his name to something he was ashamed of, and I have followed his practice. Why, in the old days, some distributors used to paint their windows! The industry is long past that. I don't think anyone has yet seen how far this industry can go. But we'll always be held back by an unfair public image unless we do something about it."

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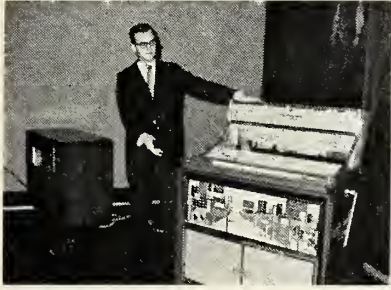
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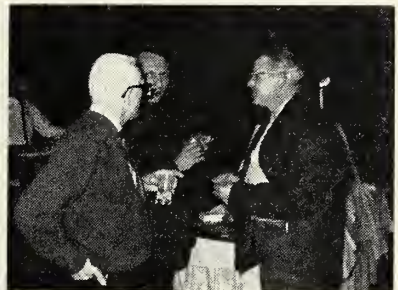

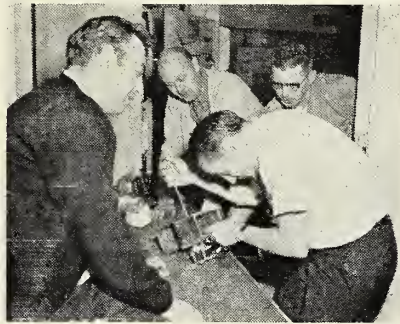
Seeburg Graduates 1000th Troubleshooter

CHICAGO—Class No. 76 has recently graduated its 1000th Student under the service school program conducted by the field engineering and training department of the Seeburg Corporation. This class was conducted by John Fulton, Seeburg field engineer. The school is managed by Freeman E. (Woody) Woodhull.

Now more than two years in existence, courses are conducted on the music machines (phonograph and background) and venders. Recently instruction on the Seeburg line of electronic organs was added to the school curriculum.

Temporary headquarters for the school are located at 1010 West Weed Street. Upon completion of the new multi-million dollar building now under construction at 1510 North Dayton Street, the school will be moved to its larger, more permanent quarters where both music and vending schools will be in progress simultaneously. Presently they are, of necessity, staggered.

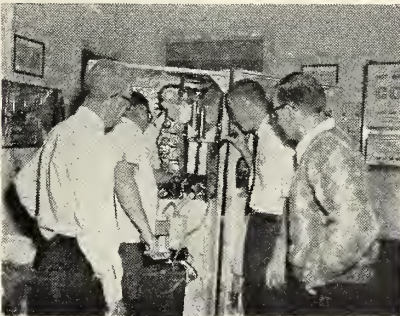
Fulton and Woodhull described the typical five-day program, such as Class 76 went through: The first two days were taken up with thorough theoretical and functional familiarization with the vender, wherein the vender was completely disassembled



and re-assembled. The third morning was spent in learning to read schematics and then the class spent the afternoon shooting trouble. Fulton "bugged" the venders and the class "debugged" them to their heart's content.



The fourth day was spent on refrigeration, beginning with simplified explanations and followed by a 16mm sound movie film rounding out the theory of refrigeration. After that, the students were divided up into groups of three and practiced their newly acquired knowledge on actual refrigeration units specially mounted on cabinets to facilitate the best possible convenience in learning. Then the instructor "bugged" the refrigeration units and the class "debugged" them with zest.



"Active participation by the serviceman on real location-type, equipment insures his training to be practical, usable, and instills confidence in his ability to cope with any and all servicing problems," said Woodhull. "We want these men to leave here with good working habits and scientific

trouble-shooting procedures. This will give them confidence and their competence will make a highly favorable impression on location owners."

Any phonograph or vending serviceman employed by an operator of Seeburg music or vending equipment, who handles his own servicing, is eligible to attend classes. The operator applies for the training program for his service personnel by simply contacting his nearest Seeburg Distributor.

When the application is accepted for a specific school program a hotel reservation is immediately made at the hotel close to the downtown area of Chicago. Students are taken to and from the factory schoolroom and the hotel, in private cars arranged

for by Seeburg.

Each student is provided with a daily allowance to pay for the hotel room, meals, and cab fare to and from O'Hare Field and the hotel. The Seeburg distributor who arranged the trip for the operator's personnel will reimburse the operator for one-half the roundtrip transportation cost.

The service school lasts for a full five days. At the conclusion of the training program the students are duly graduated and presented with appropriate diplomas by Woodhull. The evening before graduation is an outing to a local night club for dinner. Each student receives an attache case to carry all the service literature, along with the diploma.

NAMA Plans East Office

CHICAGO—Plans to establish an Eastern office of the National Automatic Merchandising Association beginning January 1, 1966 were announced last week by Thomas B. Hungerford, executive director.

Herbert M. Beitel, former legislative counsel of the association, will be in charge of the new office on a full-time basis with headquarters in Philadelphia, Hungerford said. The association opened a similar office in Los Angeles in 1959 to serve members' interests in the Western states.

"We are indeed fortunate to obtain the ability and experience of Herb Beitel in this important new move toward improved member services," Hungerford said. "As NAMA legislative counsel from 1955 to 1961, he knows the vending industry and association work better than any other person we could have added to our staff from the outside."

"We hope that this new Eastern office will give members along the Eastern seaboard the same advantages which have proved so helpful in the West after we established the Los Angeles office under Sidney S. Kallick," Hungerford said.

He added that specialized NAMA services furnished to members from the Chicago office will continue as before, with Beitel handling local matters in 12 states and in the District of Columbia under co-ordination from the association's main office. This co-ordination will apply to legislative, public health, public relations and similar programs.

From Philadelphia, the NAMA Eastern office will cover the following states: Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia and the District of Columbia.

Sales Tax Deals Near-Lethal Blows

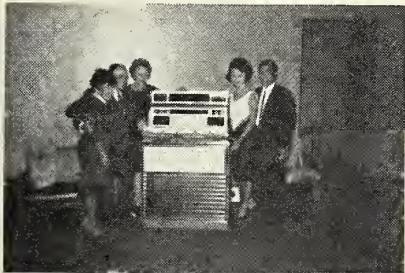
NEW YORK—The city sales and cigarette taxes which went into effect the latter part of this year have dealt some near-crippling blows to the wholesale and vending industries here, so damaging as to be roughly equivalent to the loss of one out of every four machines on the routes of some operators contacted last week.

Several wholesalers report that their business is off 20-25% and cigarette sales in vending machines are off from 30-40% according to some operators. One operator said, "It's as if I'd lost a quarter of my machines in less than a quarter of a year."

Meanwhile, 'bootlegging' has run rampant, with truckloads of "duty free" cigarettes coming in from New Jersey and Connecticut. The situation is similar to that in Washington State, where a cigarette sales tax increase has brought a rash of 'border-hopping' from tax-less Oregon.
