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THE DISTRIBUTOR-MANUFACTURER

Since the infancy of the recording industry a half century ago, starry-eyed entrepreneurs have been stimulated to try their hand at producing records. Quite frequently, as the charts can readily attest to, these neophyte A&R men have met with startling success. Within the confines of today's broad market spectrum it's certainly no surprise that countless youngsters with little or no formal training have overcome the tremendous obstacles and, after a few hits, been transformed into ringing geniuses.

One significant drawback to contemporary indie record operations is that they usually have an abundance of creative talent and a paucity of capital—a decisively unhealthy mixture for any going business. This very shortcoming long ago gave rise to such well-entrenched distributor-owned labels as Soma, Josie, Jamie, etc.

In the past six months, however, we've noticed that distributors, as manufacturers, have been clicking with more of their records than ever before. In some cases these "spin-off" labels have developed into sturdy enough entities to stand on their own merits without the support of their parent firms.

The hottest distributor-manufacturer is Pittsburgh's Fenway Distributorship whose Co & Ce label springboarded the Vogues ("You're The

One" and "Five O'Clock World") into national prominence. The trend is borne out by the fact that innumerable well-established distributors are entering the manufacturing arena every day.

These distributor-owned labels have many advantages over their non-affiliated competitors. They all have invaluable promotional know-how and, in most instances, the necessary financing to support their record arms in the incipient stages. In addition, distributor-manufacturers tend to be more sophisticated in their merchandising philosophy than the average newly-formed indie. Placing heavy emphasis on their strength in home-market territories, each distributor-manufacturer attempts to break a record in his own area before releasing it on a national basis. Plainly, it's far easier spreading a regionally sales-tested master than the untried record debut. Another relevant factor is that distributors are more apt to work with fellow distributors than a one-shot type record operation.

The distributor-manufacturer is obviously here to stay. In the coming weeks and months more wholesalers will probably become involved in the active production of records. The industry should regard this as a boon for, in all probability, fresh talent and records can be effectively showcased that might have otherwise never received exposure.

Industry Jumps On The Batwagon

NEW YORK—Not since the twist craze exploded six years ago has the music industry been captivated by any fad as much as 'Batmania' which, at presstime, has stimulated the release of fifteen separate records.

All of the recordings, of course, were springboarded into existence by ABC-TV's twice-weekly "Batman" show. The program, which portrays the daring-do exploits of the famed comic book crime-fighter and his teenage sidekick, Robin, has registered impressive figures in the early ratings race and has been the recipient of across-the-board praise from the consumer press. The fascination of "Batman" is far more than kid-deep. Audience composition data reveals that the stanza is watched by the very same sophisticated adults who have made camp an integral part of the contemporary sub-culture.

The main-theme of the Greenway-20th Century-Fox production was penned by Neal Hefti and published by Miller Music. In addition to Hefti, who has released his own composition on the RCA Victor label, there are five covers of the tune: Al Caiola (United Artists), the Gallants (Capitol), the Riddlers (Mike), Labert Ellis (A&M) and the Marketts (Warner Bros.). Nelson Riddle, who scored the "Batman" background, is also reported slicing the theme for 20th Century-Fox with a lineup of other labels racing to cut still more versions of the selection. Meanwhile back at the Big 3, the pubbery is setting follow-up plans for record exploitation of more Batman music via development of new tunes from the Riddle score.

But that's only part of the story. Nine other manufacturers have rush-released decks utilizing the Batman title but not the Miller theme. These independent versions include entries by the Spotlights (Smash), Jan & Dean (Liberty), Robin & the Avengers (Arden), the 4 Of Us (Hideout), Ricky & the Riddlers (Panorama), Scotty McKay (Claridge), Gate Wesley-Billy LaMont (Atlantic), Gene Simmons (Hi) and the Campers

A dance has also been created via the Atlantic candidate, the full title of which is "(Zap! Pow!) Do The Batman."

Further excitement has been generated by KHJ-Hollywood, which has instituted a "Batphone Secret Number" contest. Promotion involves a bit in which listeners are asked to guess the "unlisted number of the Batphone hotline to the Batcave" from on-the-air clues. Other outlets are prepping similar exploitations.

Chess Exceeds \$1 Million Billing at Its 'Profits In The Sun' Sales Meet

SAN JUAN, PUERTO RICO—Warmth, camaraderie and friendship are the words which best describe the Chess corporation's recently-concluded Puerto Rican Sales Convention held at the Americana Hotel in this city over the weekend of Jan. 14th. It was also an atmosphere which resulted in distributors ordering in excess of \$1,000,000 worth of new product.

The convention also had a sentimental overtone to it since it was the company's first big sales meet in more than a decade; since many of the distributors were with the company in its infancy and are still with it

today; and thirdly because the convention took place immediately after a calendar year which saw the Chess, Checker and Cadet labels attain their biggest volume and profit ever at the hands of the distributors in attendance.

The convention, officially tagged "Profits In The Sun" was, of course, designed to introduce new Chess, Checker and Cadet product. The titles responsible for the huge \$1 million figure included: "Hang On Ramsey" the new Ramsey Lewis LP featuring "Hang on Sloopy;" "Unbelievable"—Billy Stewart; A series of LP's tagged "The Real Folk Blues" with separate album by Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf and Sonny Boy Williamson; "The New Look"—Montella Bass; "More Fools Needed"—Rev. C. L. Moore; "Interaction"—Sonny Stitt & Zoot Sims; "Smokin' With Willis"—Willis Jackson; "Feeling Good"—Jean DuShon; "Tough"—Art Blakey; "Swings Cool"—Fred Wacker Big Band; and "The Blues—Vol. 5". The thirteen albums above shared billing with approximately 20 Ramsey Lewis albums and about the same number on Ahmad Jamal, Chuck Berry, Bo Diddley, Moms Mabley, Pigmeat Markham, Muddy Waters, Rev. C. L. Franklin, James Moody, Illinois Jacquet, Lou Donaldson, Gene Ammons, Etta James and Bob Hope.

Although the mood throughout the convention was a relaxed one, the minimum amount of formalities included a very touching welcoming comment from Len Chess in which he thanked his many distributors for the magnificent job they had done for Chess product during the year and recognized the tremendous effort during 1965 on the part of the com-

Lathouwer Named To New CRDC Post; Capitol Moving Singles From N.Y. to L.A.

HOLLYWOOD—Maury Lathouwer has been appointed CRDC's new single sales manager, it was announced last week by William Tallant, Jr., vice-president and national sales manager of Capitol's distribution arm.

Last week Tallant unveiled a country music expansion program with the appointment of Wade Pepper, the firm's single sales manager, to the newly-created post of country and western sales manager, with headquarters in Nashville.

Tallant also revealed that to facilitate the sales and marketing efforts for singles, Lathouwer would be based in Los Angeles, instead of New York, effective Feb. 1.

In his new post Lathouwer, who moves to Los Angeles after an eight-year affiliation with the firm's Chicago branch, will be responsible for all single sales activities with the exception of country singles product,

which Pepper will handle along with the country LP's.

Lathouwer joined Capitol in 1957 as a salesman in the Windy City office. Four years later he was promoted to district promo man, a post he held until his present promotion.

In making the announcement, Tallant said that Lathouwer "has not only been an outstanding promotion man for Capitol; he has also been personally responsible from the start—both in airplay and sales—of many of Capitol's hit records these past few years."

Decca Re-Signs Bert Kaempfert

NEW YORK—Following an uninterrupted string as a consistent best-selling Decca recording artist, Bert

Kaempfert has been re-signed to a new exclusive long-term contract with the label, according to an announce-

ment made last week by Leonard W. Schneider, the firm's executive vep. Kaempfert, whose recordings have been available on the Decca label in the U.S. since 1960, catapulted to fame on the heels of such hits as "Wonderland By Night," "Afrikaan Beat," "That Happy Feeling," "Red Roses For A Blue Lady," "Moon Over Naples" and "Three O'Clock In The Morning." He is currently represented on the album charts with "The Magic Music Of Faraway Places." Coincidental with the re-signing Decca rushed out a new Kaempfert single, "Bye Bye Blues," which is number sixty-seven on this week's Top 100. In addition to his success as a recording artist, Kaempfert is a prolific song writer, with many hits to his credit, recorded both personally and by other leading artists. In addition, he has just returned home from Hollywood where he composed and conducted an original musical score for a soon-to-be-released Universal flick "A Man Could Get Killed," starring James Garner, Melina Mercouri, Sandra Dee and Tony Franciosa. This is Kaempfert's first American motion picture and Decca is making plans to issue an album of the music from the sound track timed to the release of the picture.

London Markets 4 LP's

NEW YORK—As part two of its recently announced "Spring Policy Program—1966" London Records released four new LP's last week and at the same time intensified the promotional efforts on a fifth album which was released just prior to the recent holiday season.

Headlining the package is a Tom Jones entry on the Parrot label. The disk is titled after and contains the Welsh chanter's currently charted single "Thunderball." The set also contains Jones' next single "Promise Her Anything" the title tune from the soon to bow flick.

The balance of the release consists of a new instrumental set by Willie Mitchell "Driving Beat." The disk will be offered on the Hi label. While in the folk-pop bag is Julie Felix's British recorded LP titled "The Second Album," and the Mike Leander Orchestra's offering of "The Folk Hits."

The object of the stepped up promo campaign is the Fortune's LP which contains both of their single clicks "You've Got Your Troubles" and "Here It Comes Again" and is titled after the former.

Kurtz Takes Over Cameo/Parkway Post

NEW YORK—Phil Landwehr, managing director of Cameo/Parkway Records, announced last week that the duties formerly performed by Herman Kaplan, who has resigned from the company, have been taken over by George Kurtz, administrative vice-president of Premier Albums.

Kurtz will supervise the coordination of day-to-day activities between the firm's Philadelphia and New York offices. "It is my intention to develop," Kurtz stated, "a closer liaison between our people in Philadelphia and sales manager Jerry Shifrin than has existed in the past. The rapid growth of C/P and its new 'open door' policy makes this imperative." Kurtz has assumed this new function in accordance with Premier's management contract with Cameo/Parkway.

Kaplan stated that he will shortly announce his future plans.

ABC-Par Releases Twenty-Four LP's

NEW YORK—ABC-Paramount released twenty-four LP's last week including 10 entries under its own logo, nine on its wholly owned Impulse label plus three on the Dunhill and two on the Jerden labels, both of which the company distributes.

The parent label's entries include the McGuire Sisters' company debut titled "The McGuire Sisters—Right Now" plus "Andiamo, Let's Go" by Don Cornell, Shirley Horn's "Travelin' Light," "A Ray Of Country Sun" by Wade Ray, Della Reese's "I Like It Like Dat," Frank Fontaine sings "All Time Great Hits," Jerry Fielding conducts the "Hollywood Brass," the Highwaymen do "Stop, Look and Listen," Ray Charles has "Crying Time" and the Impressions have "Ridin' High."

The nine LP Impulse jazz package includes Yusef Lateef's "Psychicemotus," "Latin Shadows" by Shirley

Scott, a John Coltrane, Archie Shepp team up on "New Thing At Newport," John Coltrane's "Ascension," "Ask Me Now" by the Pee Wee Russell Quartet with Marshall Brown, Chico Hamilton has an aptly titled disk "El Chico," while John Lee Hooker does "It Serves You Right To Suffer," Gary McFarland and Co. do "Tiajuana Jazz" and Gabor Szabo has "Gypsy '66."

Under the Dunhill logo will appear LP's by Barry McGuire "This Precious Time," The Mamas and Papas "If You Can't Believe Your Eyes And Ears" and P. F. Sloan "Twelve More Times."

On Jerden, Paul Revere and the Raiders do "In The Beginning" while an LP titled "The Hitmakers" is a collection which includes the Kingsmen, Don and the Goodtimes, Ian Whitcomb, Paul Revere and the Raiders and Sir Walter Raleigh.

Capitol Enters Little LP Market

HOLLYWOOD—With an initial availability of twelve little "name" artists LP's, Capitol Records' distributing arm last week (17) entered the industry's little LP market.

The Capitol label little LP's will carry an SU prefix. Titles of the first twelve, which have all been taken from albums by top-selling artists, are: "You'll Never Walk Alone" (The Lettermen), "The Nat King Cole Song Book" (The Hollyridge Strings), "Today—My Way" (Nancy Wilson), "Here And Now" (George Shearing), "Then Was Then—Now Is Now" (Peggy Lee), "My Cherie" (Al Martino), "Silk 'N Brass" (Jackie Gleason), "Summer Wind" (Wayne Newton), "German Beer-Drinking Music" (Alfons Bauer), "Before You Go—No One But You" (Buck Owens), "Golden Country Hits" (Hank Thompson), and "Behind The Tear" (Sonny James).

According to CRDC president Stan-

ley M. Gortikov, the little LP's are tentatively scheduled for quarterly release. "Of course," he said, "it all depends on how the operators and one-stop react. If warranted, more titles will be made available."

Gortikov said that extensive surveys were made by the label prior to entry into the field. "Key operators expressed a definite need for the music. It also showed that operators wanted "Name" artists with adult programming, and that is what Capitol is giving them. "CRDC's chief interest is, naturally, to sell our regular LP's. However, we feel through exposure in the juke box field we will aid Capitol artists and help LP sales."

Gortikov said that Capitol's next little LP release which will also carry top name artists, has been set for April. The number of the LP's to be released, or the type of product, has not yet been announced.

A & M Names Mulhern Dir. of Eastern Operations



HOLLYWOOD — Bill Mulhern has been director of eastern operations for A&M Records, it was announced last week by Jerry Moss, the label's president.

Mulhern comes to the A&M fold with experience in both the radio and record business. For three and one-half years he operated as eastern regional promotion manager for Kapp Records and most recently was general manager of Jamie/Guyden Distributors.

Moss noted that Mulhern will function in all areas for the label on the east coast and will be opening an office for them in Philadelphia.

Ted Cooper Joins Epic As Staff A&R Producer



NEW YORK—Ted Cooper has joined the staff of Epic Records as a staff producer, according to an announcement made last week by Bob Morgan, the label's A&R director.

In his new position, Cooper will be responsible to Morgan for recording artists as assigned and for developing album ideas and artists.

Cooper comes to Epic from the Shapiro, Bernstein pubberies, where he served as general professional manager and, prior to that, as a staff writer. While he was at S-B, the company published such hits as (Continued on page 51)

NARM Study Replies Reveal Tremendous Growth

PHILADELPHIA—Early returns of the questionnaires which went to the regular members of the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM), in preparation of the 1965 annual association study, indicate that 1965 saw the greatest growth in record merchandising ever recorded in the disk industry. Based on the first group of returns sent to the NARM office, indications are that outlets serviced by rack-jobber members of the association will go substantially above the 1964 figures of almost 25,000. This net increase is noteworthy, particularly in view of the fact that the questionnaires show that rack-jobbers are dropping small, unprofitable accounts, which are either bad credit risks or difficult to service properly. The growth of record rack merchandisers is basically in the area of larger, full-scale record departments, featuring all hit and catalog product. The gain in this area more than overshadows the loss of smaller, unprofitable accounts.

Gross volume figures in early returns reveal a substantial increase

in multi-million dollar operations in rack merchandising. Early indications are that there is a much larger group of NARM members doing in excess of two million dollars, as well as a growing number quoting a gross dollar volume in excess of five million dollars. In keeping with this apparent trend in growth, on the other end of the scale, the smallest volume figures quoted on early returns are considerably higher than the low volume figures of 1964—indicating that even the smallest rack operations have grown percentage-wise alongside their giant competitors, and have entrenched themselves with their outlets, doing more business with them, in addition to expanding into more and different types of outlets. A small, but noticeable trend in types of outlets serviced is in the area of record stores. Indications are that a growing number of record specialty shops find the services of a record merchandiser the most economical answer to their buying problems.

Monument Launches Global Record Label

NEW YORK—Monument Records has launched its second subsidiary label, LTD International, it was announced last week by Fred Foster, the parent label's president. LTD will be devoted exclusively to the acquisition of foreign-produced recordings to be released in the U.S. and abroad by Monument distributors.

First records to be released under the new LTD International logo will be four masters acquired from Astor Electronics of Australia and its Go label, featuring Laurie Allen and Bobby Bright with "I Belong With You" and "Trouble In Mind," plus the M. P. D. Limited on "Little Boy Sad"

and "Wendy, Don't Go." Monument has set immediate release for these recordings in the U.S. Combine Music, one of the firm's pubberies, has acquired the American rights to "Wendy, Don't Go" and "I Belong With You."

Monument's international division, helmed by the Hollywood-based Bob Weiss, will acquire foreign material for regular release under the LTD label in order to develop a regular catalog of foreign recordings in English, French, Italian, German, Spanish, etc., as well as instrumentals.

Monument's other subsid label is Sound Stage 7 Records.

A Star Of Tomorrow: Columbia's Bobbe Norris

NEW YORK—The entire sales, merchandising, promotion and advertising departments of Columbia Records are launching a major unified campaign to make the country aware of a new

singer called Bobbe Norris. The all-out promotion is timed to coordinate with this week's release of the lark's debut single, "Put Your Little Foot Right Out" b/w "Quiet Room," supervised by Columbia A&R producer Mike Berniker. In addition, she has cut her first LP from which the single was drawn. The album tagged "Bobbe Norris, The Beginner" will be released in the near future.

The campaign is reminiscent of past intensive efforts by the company to introduce unknown performers who have later achieved super-star status (e.g. Barbra Streisand and Bob Dylan).

For special impact, the single is wrapped in a specially designed color sleeve featuring a picture of the songstress and a paragraph praising her as "a song stylist in the great tradition . . . with a stunningly different sound." In conjunction with the release of the single, the label has devoted a four-page cover story to the singer in this week's issue of its merchandising publication "Insight." The article has been reprinted and will be mailed along with the single to 5,000 deejays throughout the country.

As a highlight of its promotion activities for the performer, Columbia is conducting a unique advertising campaign. A standard shipping label will be included in every copy of next week's leading trade publications. The label will serve as a coupon en-

Henry Glover Returns To Roulette As V.P.

NEW YORK—Vet A&R man, songwriter, arranger Henry Glover has returned to Roulette Records after an absence of two years, it was announced last week by Morris Levy, the label's president.

Glover will serve in the capacity of vice president in charge of A&R. In the past he has participated in the production of a number of hit records including "The Peppermint Twist" by Joey Dee and the Starlighters and "For Sentimental Reasons" by the Cleftones.

Glover's activities will take him into the production of album and single product and the field of artist-writer relationships.

Pickwick/33 Releases 6 New Albums

NEW YORK—Pickwick International announced last week the release of six new Pickwick/33 LP's.

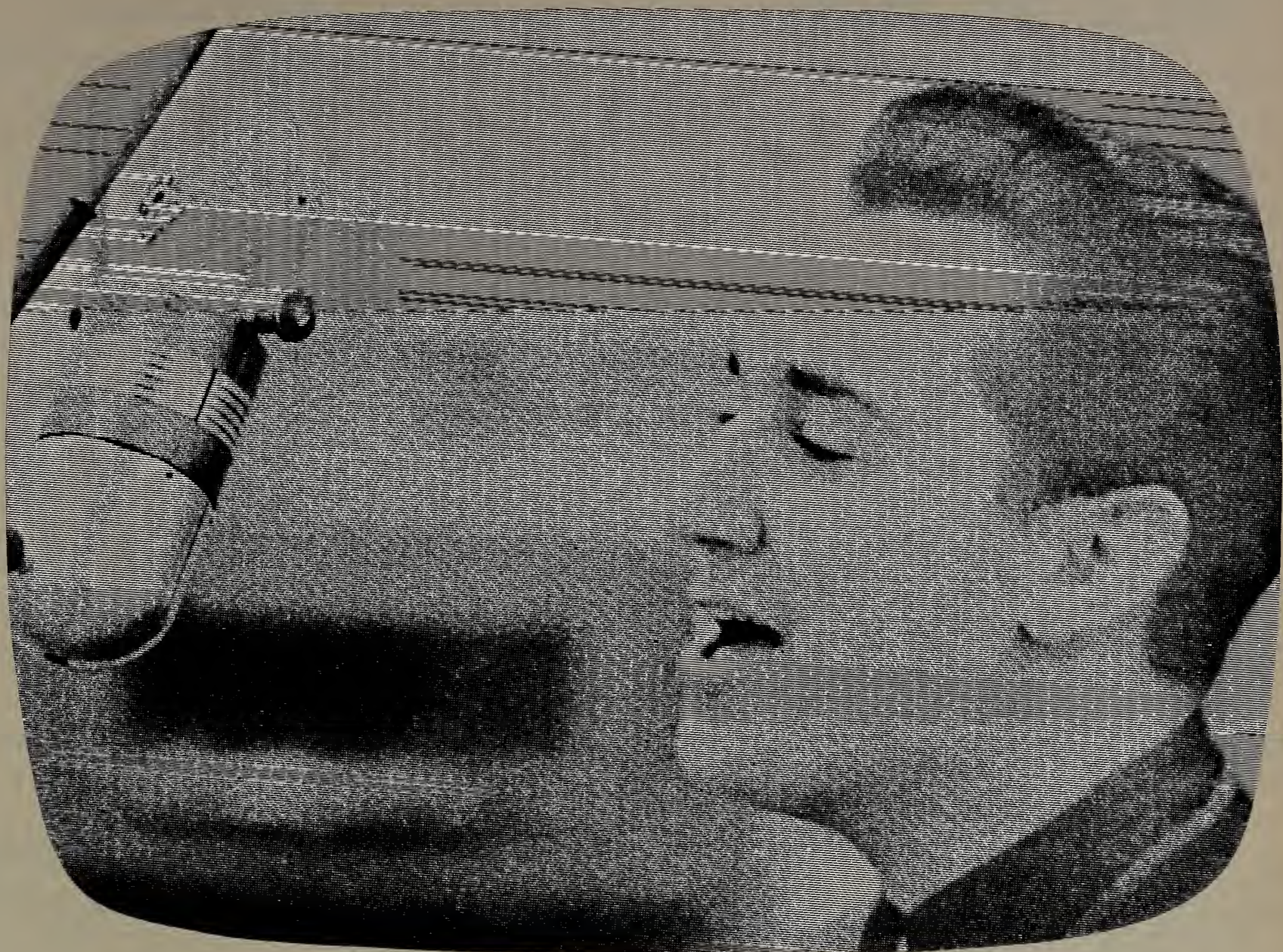
Artists included in the package are Barry McGuire and the New Christy Minstrels; Little Anthony & The Imperials; Count Basie & His Orchestra; Russ Morgan; Stan Getz and a single album featuring Roger Miller, Roy Orbison and Jerry Lee Lewis.

Added to the twelve that the label issued just before Christmas, the budget label has put eighteen new LP's in the field during the past month.

The new albums, according to Cy Leslie, president of the parent firm, will be featured in the second phase of the introductory advertising, promotion and publicity program for Pickwick/33 that was highlighted by the biggest trade and consumer advertising program in the company's history. This involved display ads in magazines and newspapers, co-op ads, in-store displays, special racks, stands and floor dumps, promotional material for direct mailing, special tie-ins and a public relations program.

The overall success of the company was recently evidenced when the parent firm revealed that it had enjoyed a rise of 16% in sales and 40% in net earnings over the comparable six months in 1964. During this period, (May 1 to Oct. 31, 1965) Pickwick had sales of \$3,512,311 and net earnings of \$184,691 or 60 cents per share.

Leslie commented that "while we have continued to enjoy a steady growth in our budget lines, there is no question any longer that the paperback concept that launched Pickwick/33 has proven itself to be the most dynamic factor in the growth of the \$1.98 album market. 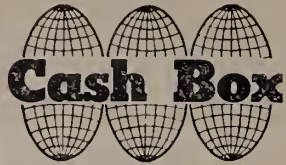

The Byrds can easily have their third number one in a row (they're currently coming off "Turn! Turn! Turn!") with this excellent newie tabbed "It Won't Be Wrong." This one's pulsating, fast-moving blues-tinged romancer about a love-sick fella who begs his girl to give him half-a-chance. "Set You Free This Time" is a laconic, medium-paced wooser essayed in an emotion-charged style by the group.

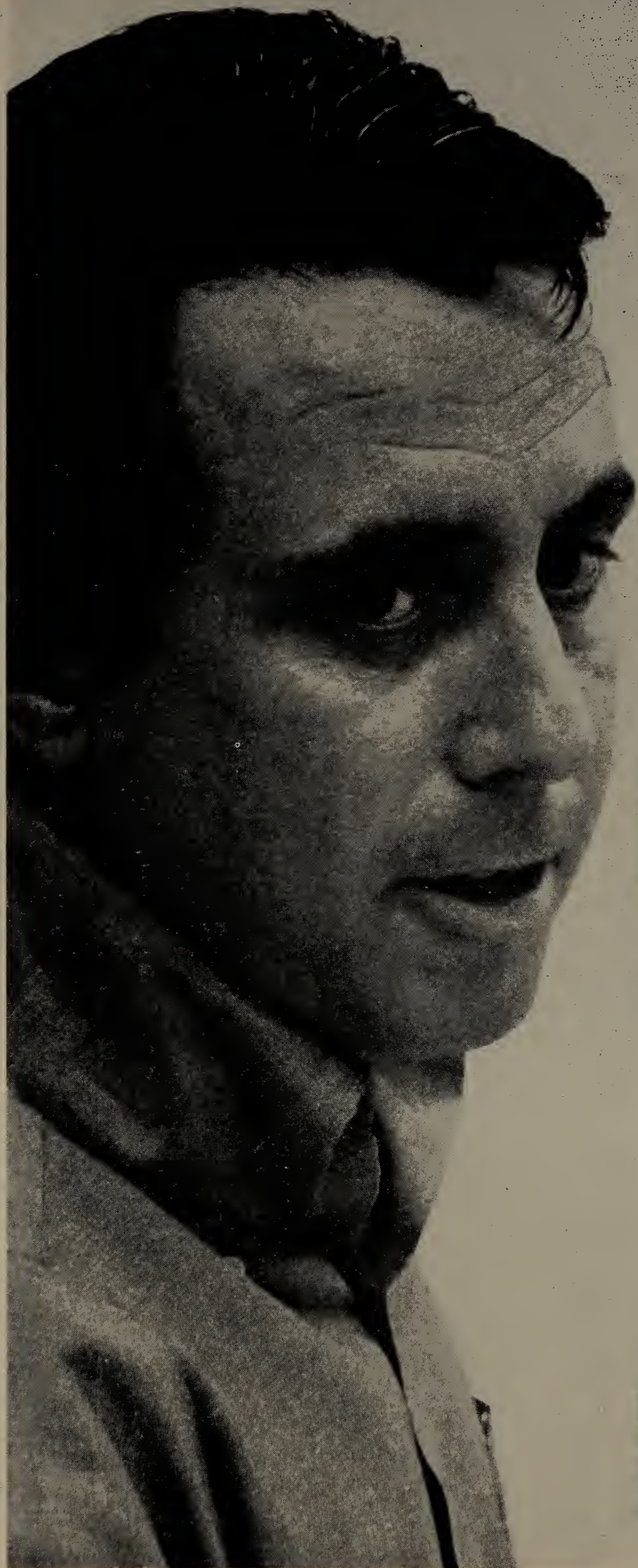

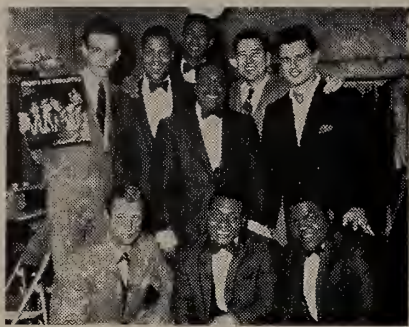

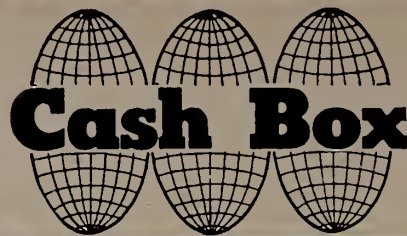

The first Oscar went to Con Conrad and Herb Magidson for "The Continental" from the Fred Astaire-Ginger Rogers musical "The Gay Divorcee." Through the years, right up to this 38th running of the annual Oscar derby, the selection of the ten contenders and five nominees have been made by the music branch of the Academy, a group of some 250 motion picture tunesmiths and lyricists, most of whom reside in the L. A. area. This group has, on occasion, been accused of being somewhat provincial in their selection of the nominating songs. If true, it could be the reason why, for the second successive year, the Beatles' effort has been scratched from the entries in the Oscar derby. Last year it was "A Hard Day's Night" which was left in the paddock. This year it's "Help", which, by Ringo, is not listed in the top ten contenders. In any event, it's just possible that this year's award will go to two N. Y. based writers, Burt Bacharach and Hal David, who composed the smash title song from "What's New Pussycat". At this writing insiders are favoring "The Shadow of Your Smile" from "The Sandpiper" with "Pussycat" as the strong second choice. It should be recalled that at

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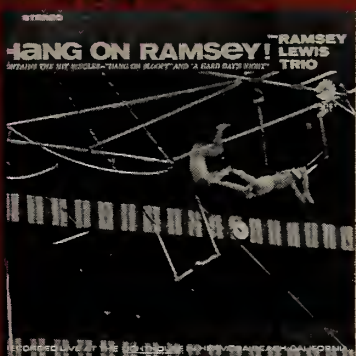

Both Jordan Christopher and the Wild Ones record under the aegis of A&R staffer Gerry Granahan. The producer also has high hopes for Samantha Jones, the Reasons and Solomon King.

Other new faces that will be promoted during the year are the Clevelanders, Andrea Carroll, the Promises, Lloyd London, and Jaye Kennedy.

Fred Wise Dies

NEW YORK—Lyricist Fred Wise, 50, died suddenly last week (18) in New York City. In addition to penning a vast amount of songs, 36 of which were recorded by Elvis Presley, he was a practicing psychologist.

Wise was born in New York City and graduated from Columbia University. Before he began writing songs, he worked in the publicity dept. at MGM. A member of ASCAP for 25 years, he was penning songs long before he became a psychologist in 1955. He wrote many of his hit tunes with Randy Starr.

Wise's pennings have included "A Your Adorable," "Misirlou," "Let Me Go Lover," "I Won't Cry Anymore," "A Hand Full Of Stars," "Lonely Blue Boy," "Accidentally On Purpose," "Wooden Heart," "Don't Ask Me Why," "Rocka-Hulla Baby," and "Follow That Dream," and many others.

His earlier songs include "Nightingale," "You, You, You Are The One," "Roses In The Rain," "Let's Harmonize," "Wise Old Owl," "Let's Go This a-way," "The Robe Of Calvary," and "The Chocolate Sundae On A Saturday Night."

Wise is survived by his wife, Elaine, and his daughter, Erica.

Leonard de Paur Leaves For Africa

NEW YORK—Conductor Leonard de Paur and his chorus have departed for Algiers, their first stop on a 3-month tour of African nations under the auspices of the U.S. State Department's Cultural Presentations program. The troupe will give concerts in Algiers, Tunis, Cairo, Khartoum, Addis Ababa, Nairobi, Leopoldville, Lagos, Lome, Accra, Monrovia, Freetown, Conakry, Bameko and Dakar.

Their departure was celebrated by a special invitation concert for dignitaries of the U.N. on Jan 11 in the Dag Hammarskjold Library Auditorium, held under the joint sponsorship of the Senegalese and the U.S. permanent representatives to the U.N.

Some of the tunes performed at the concert, including several songs of the new African nations, are featured on de Paur's recently-released Mercury album, "Sings Of New Nations," which also includes two songs from Israel. The LP has been chosen for submission for an award at the first World Festival of Negro Arts which will take place in Apr. at Dakar, Senegal. The festival will gather recordings, books, paintings, sculpture and films representative of Negro culture from all the nations of the world. The de Paur Chorus is the first American group of artists to be announced as appearing there and will end the African tour with two concerts in Dakar on Apr. 7 and 14.

FGG's Gottehrer To Europe

NEW YORK—Richi Gottehrer of F.G.G. Productions, the hot indie producing set-up, leaves on a three week trip to Europe this week (24). His sojourn will take him to Germany, Italy, France, England, Holland and Switzerland. While in Europe he will scout new disk talent and look for new material for F.G.G.; he will also attend the San Remo festival.

Membership in the Nashville section of the organization includes engineers from all over Tenn. and parts of Kentucky. Each month the meetings are held in a different location.

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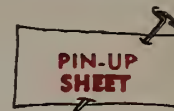

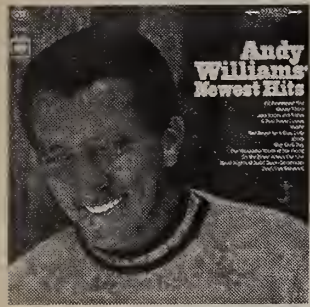

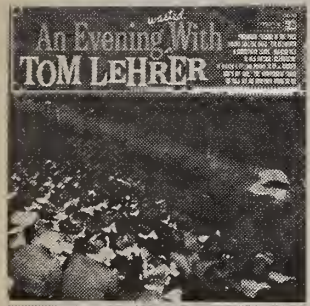
ANDY WILLIAMS' NEWEST HITS—Columbia CL 2383/CS 9183

A master in the field of presenting good music, Andy Williams has consistently had excellent reactions to his past album offerings and he can expect the same type of response to this set of grooves. Smooth orking backs the chanter as he sings several of his recent winners, including "And Roses And Roses," "A Fool Never Learns," and "Quiet Nights Of Quiet Stars." The golden tones of the singer should make a winner of this one.



SATIN PILLOWS AND CARELESS—Bobby Vinton—Epic LN 24182/BN 26182

Already a veteran in the hitmaking scene, young Bobby Vinton has dubbed this album offering after his two most recent single hits, "Careless" and "Satin Pillows." A warm, tender style, set to a batch of highly romantic ballads, gives the package the necessary ingredients for top sales. Other tracks that should draw the consumer include "Bitter Teardrops" and "Two Purple Shadows."



AN EVENING WASTED WITH TOM LEHRER—Reprise R/RS 6199

With his "That Was The Year That Was" album meeting with a great deal of success, Tom Lehrer can look forward to similar red-hot sales with this reissue of some of his earlier efforts, originally recorded in Cambridge, Mass. in 1959. New Lehrer fans will happily note that the artist's sharp wit was just as biting then as it is now, while his old faithful followers will reminisce to such ditties as "Oedipus Rex" and "The Masochism Tango." Expect heavy action.



HANG ON RAMSEY!—Ramsey Lewis Trio—Cadet LP/SLP 761

Primarily known in jazz circles, the Ramsey Lewis Trio has generated a high degree of excitement in pop circles with its jazz-flavored renditions of chart monsters, including the group's recent whopper, "Hang On Sloopy," which highlights this session. The usual infectious sound of the threesome, with accomplished solos by members Eldee Young (bass), Red Holt (drums) and Lewis on the keyboard, gives the set a wide range of appeal. Other top listening bets include "High Heel Sneakers" and their current charter, "A Hard Day's Night."



MORE HIT SOUNDS OF THE LETTERMEN—Capitol T/ST 2428

A trio which tops many a campus popularity poll, the Lettermen should find little difficulty in drumming up large quantities of sales for this pleasing platter. The bill of fare, aimed at the modern young record buyer, is generously laced with contemporary chart bloomers, as well as several of the group's own best-sellers. Sure to please audiences in a wide variety of age brackets, the album features such tracks as "Secretly," "The Things We Did Last Summer" and "Yesterday."



IT'S MAGIC—Jerry Vale—Columbia CL 2444/CS 9244

Jerry Vale turns on the charm of his voice with this package of romantic melodies. Backed by the soft orking of Marty Manning, the chanter displays excellent interpretations of such tunes as "My Melancholy Baby," "My Prayer," and the Jule Styne-Sammy Kahn classic, "It's Magic." This easy-to-listen-to collection of romantic ballads should be a strong contender for chart honors.



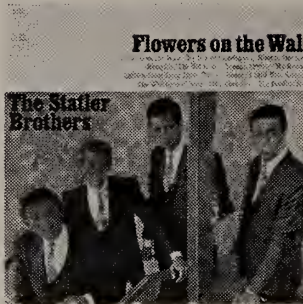
BROOMSTICK COWBOY—Bobby Goldsboro—United Artists UAL 3471/UAS 6471

Young rocker Bobby Goldsboro has racked up a healthy, unbroken chain of singles hits, including his latest deck, "Broomstick Cowboy," after which this LP has been dubbed. Daily featured performers on Dick Clark's "Where The Action Is," the group wails with a hardcore rock sound that's perfect for the contemporary dance addicts. Other tracks sure to attract the teens are "Night Train" and "I Can't Get No Satisfaction."



FLOWERS ON THE WALL—Statler Brothers—Columbia CL 2449/CS 9249

The Statler Brothers have wasted no time in cashing in on their current dual-market chart rider, "Flowers On The Wall," with their debut Columbia LP dubbed with the same name. On the album, the lads have grouped their favorite tunes which include, in addition to the title track, "King Of The Road," the traditional "Whiffenpoof Song," and "Memphis." Flavored by the group's distinctive mountain and gospel harmonies, this collection of tracks should be big in the sales department.



OUR TIME'S COMING—Dino, Desi and Billy—Reprise R/RS 6194

Dino, Desi and Billy, whose debut album "I'm A Fool," hit the charts, can look forward to similar success with their second LP. The package contains recent chart riders set to the guitars, drums and voices of the young lads. Top selections include "Get Off My Cloud," "You've Got To Hide Your Love Away," and "Hang On Sloopy." Watch for a big reaction to this set of grooves.



CRYSTAL CHANDELIER—Vic Dana—Dolton BLP-2041/BST-8041

Vic Dana has followed up his recently charted "Crystal Chandelier" single with pleasant LP package titled after that same click. The smooth-voiced chanter adds pretty outings of such other recent hits as "Yesterday," "Go Away From My World" and "Kiss Away" to the top notch lead track. Loads of listening pleasure on this album should make it a strong item with both the middle of the road and Top 40 fans.



LET'S PLAY STRIKE!—Phil McLean & Betty Stanton—Roulette 506

The same concept that made a smash of "Welcome To The LBJ Ranch" could make a sales giant out of this Hugo & Luigi comedy package called "Let's Play Strike." Laughs fly fast as the package pokes fun at the recent N.Y.C. transit strike in the form of mock-interviews with the major principals involved, including Mike Quill, Mayor Lindsay and Governor Rockefeller. Although the voices of the principals are real, dummy questions have been inserted to give the "answers" much more zonk. May be a biggie.



BEWARE THE BANTAMS—Warner Bros. W/WS-1625

Rocking into the spotlight with this collection of top teen tunes is this pre-teen trio of brothers aged 9, 10 and 12, and appropriately named the Bantams. With instrumentation consisting of a guitar, bongo drums and maracas, the boys swing their way through such well known tunes as "Please, Please Me," "Please Mr. Postman" and "Ticket To Ride." This trio must be heard to be believed and the many fans they could make with this debut disk will surely also become believers.



RIGHT NOW!—Lainie Kazan—MGM E/SE 4340

Lainie Kazan brings both the power of the stage and the intimacy of a small nitery to her debut disk. The statuesque lark gives full range to her voice in potent renditions of such pretty tunes as "Joey, Joey, Joey," "Danny Boy" and "Feeling Good," among a host of others. Club and TV work has helped to establish Lainie Kazan in the world of music and this LP is another giant stride in the same direction.

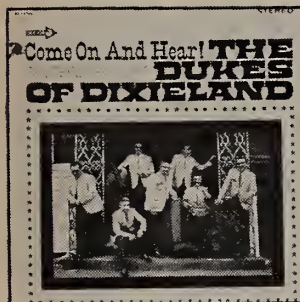
COMIC BOOK HEROES—Capes and Masks—Mainstream 56096/S 6069

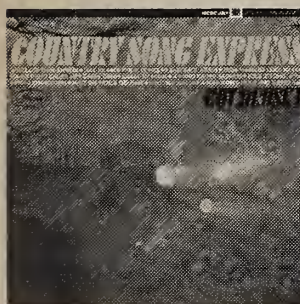
COME ON AND HEAR—Dukes of Dixieland—Decca DL 4708/74708

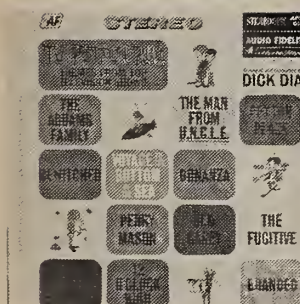
SKY HIGH—Quartette Très Bien—Decca DL 4715/74715

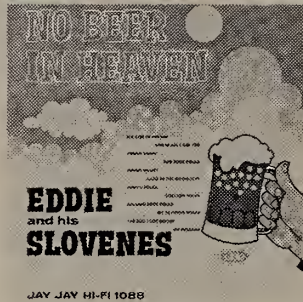


TRAVELIN' MAN—Dick Curless—Tower T/ST 5015

Backed by a lively accordion, the group comes on strong with such tunes as "Tick Tock Polka," "Rolling Rock Polka," and title track "No Beer In Heaven." This set should be an excellent addition to Jay Jay's quickly growing catalog of polka music.

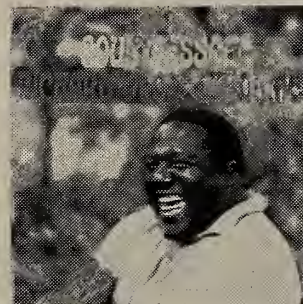
WITH RESPECT TO NAT—Oscar Peterson Trio and Orchestra—Limelight LM 46029/LS 86029

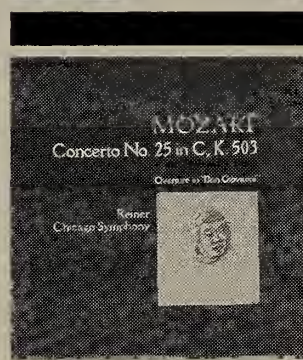
THE RUMROLLER—Lee Morgan—Blue Note 4199

SOUL MESSAGE—Richard "Groove" Holmes—Prestige 7435

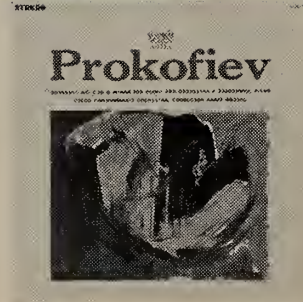

PROKOFIEV CONCERTO NO. 2 IN G—Baloghova, Czech Philharmonic/Ancerl—Artia 707/S707

This powerful piano concerto, Prokofiev's second, is given a strong interpretation by pianist Dagmar Baloghova, a noted artist in Eastern Europe, and the Czech Philharmonic under the baton of Karel Ancerl, an aggregation that has not become well known in this country due to the political situation. However, this reading of the dramatic piece should leave no doubt in the mind of the classicist as to the finesse of both composer and the artists.

Critic opinion has also been unreservedly favorable. Greer Johnson of *C* magazine responded to the vocalist with unqualified enthusiasm. Nominating her as a 1966 Candidate for Fame, he devoted the cover and a feature story to Miss Norris in the Jan. 29th issue.

After hearing her recording, Ed Sullivan booked her for an appearance on his CBS TV'er later this spring. Other television performances are scheduled to follow.

A highlight of the lark's rapidly accelerating career will be her performance in New York's Persian Room in June. Other top clubs throughout the country will present her in the near future.

Judy Collins Begins Major Concert Tour

NEW YORK—Judy Collins has embarked on a tour of cities that will take her across the continent. She began the tour on Jan. 23 in her home town of Denver. After the Denver concert, the lark will appear at Symphony Hall, Boston, the Dade County Auditorium in Miami, and at a number of eastern colleges.

Included in her repertoire is her first single, "I'll Keep It With Mine," a folk-rock song by Bob Dylan, recently released by Elektra.

Chandler Signs With Columbia

NEW YORK—Folk vocalist Len Chandler has signed an exclusive recording contract with Columbia Records. The singer was brought to the attention of the diskery by John Hammond, director of talent acquisition. Chandler's first album, "Len Chandler: To Be A Man—A Recording Debut," will be released in the near future. He composes all of his material, which deals primarily with social commentary in a satirical style.

Kapp Sets Fast 'Singles '66' Pace

NEW YORK—Kapp Records has launched an early '66 drive in the singles field, with four of their first 1966 releases reportedly already breaking well and a number of additional sides upcoming shortly.

The currently moving sides include four widely diversified records, headed up by the return of Britain's Searchers, whose newest side, "Take Me For What I'm Worth," is the work of American songwriter, P. F. Sloan.

Jack Jones, who has scored recently with two country-based songs, has "The Weekend," from Jones' new "For The 'In' Crowd" LP. An unusual effort is by the Missionaries of Mary Choral Group from Ireland with "Angels (Watching over Me)," which comes from the Pye label in England. The fourth is the Detergents first side for Kapp, "I Can Never Eat Home Anymore," a take-off on the Shangri-La's recent hit, "I Can't Go Home Anymore."

On the album front, both Jones' "For The 'In' Crowd" package and the original cast set of the resoundingly successful new musical, "Man of La Mancha," are reportedly setting a fast pace. "La Mancha," with music and lyrics by Mitch Leigh and Joe Darion, is a nightly sell-out at its ANTA Theatre location, where the show is contracted to remain until June.

they face, NARM members' early returns show for the first time, a de-emphasis on discounting as a major business problem. Although all returns received thus far show that to a greater or lesser degree, record product is discounted almost universally, discounting is not a major problem, and discounted prices seem to have reached a level with which the record merchandiser can live.

Jules Malamud, NARM's executive director, in issuing the statement on the early returns to the study questionnaire, said: "The tremendous growth in volume which early returns show was the situation with virtually every NARM record merchandiser, has underscored the importance of the theme of the 1966 NARM Convention—Planning For Profits—to every regular member of NARM. With a greater number and variety of outlets to service, with a greater gross dollar volume to handle, and with the more complex problems this type of rapid business growth brings with it, the business sessions program of our forthcoming convention—which this year will be professionally planned and executed by a team of top management, merchandising, and business consultants—will be the most valuable in our history. We are well aware that large volume does not necessarily reflect realistic profits. Proper profit management can be the key to the future reliability and growth of the record merchandising segment of the phonograph record industry."

pany's execs: Phil Chess, vice president; Marshall Chess, vice president and director of the International division; Max Cooperstein, national sales manager; Dick LaPalm, director of album sales; and Paul Gayten, west coast sales and promotion manager. Following Leonard Chess' comments were a thank you from Phil Chess and a brief comment about the international expansion of Chess from Marshall Chess. Max Cooperstein then introduced the new product mentioned above, playing cuts from the various LP's.

Dick LaPalm followed with a bit of appropriate advice to distributors. He suggested that they assist Chess in broadening and enhancing the company's image, requirements for future growth. "We cannot rest on our past laurels. Ours is a dynamic and changing society and part of the requirements for staying loose, alive, dynamic and creative in that society is that organizations like record companies be willing to experiment with new approaches . . . even if that experimentation involves a modification of the company's image." LaPalm continued, "We will broaden our scope and certainly we will supplement the image of this company and still remain Chess. All we ask, gentlemen, is a fair shake from you and your help in modifying the image of Chess, Checker and Cadet."

LaPalm also introduced a new co-op ad program for distributors which operates as follows: As an added incentive and to encourage local advertising for the Chess, Checker and Cadet LP's, a distributor will be given an advertising

budget amounting to 2% of the total billing on LP orders placed at the convention. This was offered with a recommendation that the distributor add 1% of the billing figure to the Chess offer. Then he went into definitive comments as to how to obtain advertising credit.

An announcement was also made regarding the revision of the singles return privilege policy which gained a round of applause from the group. A 10% return privilege was introduced on single purchases with a 30¢ credit given on all records returned over and above the authorized amount for each quarter, a move designed to keep the distributor free of dead single inventory. The 100% exchange of LP's continues.

Many distributors called the "Profits In The Sun" convention the best in a long time for three major reasons: product they said was the best ever from Chess; the program and ad policy was the best yet; and everything was sold without pressure.

MIAMI BEACH, FLA.—Tony Wilson, who heads the recording division of the Sun film and recording operation being built in the former Copa City nightclub, in this city, said that the new equipment for the studio, which will open in Feb., will include a four-channel stereo, 18-input console being custom built by the Neumann Co. in Germany. Wilson added "Sun Recordings' studios have been designed to meet the need of top recording companies and their artists to cut disks and albums while appearing at Miami Beach area clubs. Our studios will be available for television, radio and independent record sessions."

Murray Finesmith Dies

NEW YORK — Murray Finesmith, president and co-founder of Mac Murray Press, died Dec. 16, 1965 at the age of 54. He pioneered as a printer in the record label and album cover field. Finesmith is survived by his wife Cele, and sons Stephen, Shelly and Robert.

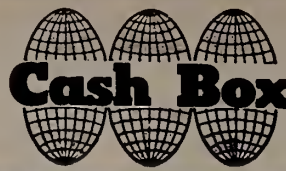

SPAIN

On December 14th the song that is going to represent our country at the Eurovision Song Contest was on TV. This year the system to choose the song was different than previous ones. TVE (Spanish O and O TV Station) asked SGAE (General Society of Authors of Spain) to ask composers for songs. Among 18 songs sent, a jury composed by four members of TVE, chose "Yo Soy Aquel" ("I Am That Man"), penned (music and lyrics) by Manuel Alejandro. The song will be sung by the number one Spanish singer, young Raphael. Raphael and Manuel Alejandro form a very well known team in the music business; the singer has a repertoire consisting mostly of songs by Alejandro. The Spanish song for the Eurovision contest is published by Ediciones Quiroga and Ediciones Música de España.

Music critics have chosen the most important Spanish artists of 1965. The results are as follows: Male Singer: Raphael (Hispavox Records). Female Singer: Nuria Feliú (Edigsa Records). Group: The Brincos (Novola Records). Song: "Sola" ("Alone") Music and Lyrics by the Brincos. Published by Universal Jazz.

Raphael has a success with his Spanish version of the "Carol Of The Drum," published by Quiroga (Mills).

The recent hits in Spain are "Capri C'est Fini," by Hervé Vilard on Mercury, published by Southern; "Il Mondo," by Jimmy Fontana on RCA, published by RCA; "Aline," by Christophe on Hispavox, published by Canciones del Mundo; "Eve Of Destruction," by Barry McGuire on Dunhill, published by Armónico, and many others. "Il Mondo" has passed the 100,000 mark.

We recently had two important visits: the Animals, who performed for a week in Madrid and Charles Aznavour, who came for a TV show and presented "La Bohème," his latest hit.

A new record magazine is being sold in Spain. It is "Discomania," published by Raúl Matas, a Chilean deejay who has been successfully working in Spanish radio.

A new group was recently born. It was presented at a big party. The group is called the Flecós and they record on Vergara.

Discophon is going strong releasing under Epic label some CBS recordings. CBS was handled here before by Hispavox.

Brunswick label, handled previously by Fonogram, is now represented by Spanish Columbia, who also represents Decca, London, Barclay and Durium.

Odeon (EMI here) has released a lot of groups. Recently the firm launched records by Manfred Mann, Herman's Hermits, Animals, Hollies, Seekers and Beatles. Beside that, they are recording many Spanish groups such as the Salvajes, the Lone Star and many others.

"Cartagenera" by Los 3 Sudamericanos is reported by Belter as one of their best sellers along with "Il Silenzio" by Roy Etzel on the Cantagallo label (of the Busse organization).

AUSTRALIA

Young local lad Normie Rowe is scoring for about the fourth time in a row with a single. Latest in the chain is "Tell Him I'm Not Home," which is released on the Festival/Sunshine label. Chappell & Co., through their subsidiary, Planetary-Nom, have printed and released the sheet music to "Tell Him I'm Not Home."

Mike Vaughan, Manager of the Easybeats (one of the hottest groups in Australia), leaves Australia by air on January 19th for a three week visit to the United States. It is understood that the main purpose of the visit is to finalize arrangements for a personal appearance tour of the U.S. by the Easybeats. Plans are well in hand for an American release of one of the group's several singles, all of which have been successful throughout Australia. Their latest release on the Parlophone label is "Women" and "In My Book."

Some time back radio station 3XY in Melbourne embarked on a policy of featuring and programming Australia's National First Fifty Albums. They have a well prepared and printed chart which lists, in numerical sequence, the fifty best-selling albums in Australia; the station's entire program output is taken from these albums. The 3XY boys believe the wisdom in this type of programming is being reflected in improved station ratings. Record companies welcome the 3XY policy because it provides a valuable outlet for the exposure of albums.

RCA came up with a smash regional hit recently in the state of South Australia with local artist Ernie Sigley featuring "Mona Lisa" and "Think About Me." He is a staff member of Channel 9 in Adelaide (the capital of South Australia), and this record, his first for RCA, shot to the very top of radio station charts in South Australia within three weeks of release. According to Ron Wills (A & R Manager for RCA), had sales in other States been on a par with South Australia, it would most certainly have earned a gold record for Ernie Sigley. Ron Wills went to Adelaide recently to record more material by Ernie, and all are hoping for national success next time out.

In the world of concerts we have two important shows coming along that should do big business. Pan Pacific Promotions has their "Caravan Of Stars" show which headlines Tom Jones and Herman's Hermits, and is scheduled



FRANCE

With the beginning of the New Year, we have the pleasure of discovering a new French label: Impact Records. This label is distributed by Festival Records. Its praxy is André Chagneau and its general manager is Roger Maruani. With the label they want to prospect and promote new French and foreign artists. The first Impact record is an EP by the Immigrants, recorded in the U.S. by Metronome.

Societe Francaise Du Son: This record company presents this week through Decca label, the Tom Jones hit "Thunderball." The Tom Jones success was so important last autumn with "What's New Pussycat" that Decca now presents the third Tom Jones LP in France. "Bye Bye Birdie" by the Moody Blues has a very good start. Through RCA Victor label we have discovered a good EP with four titles by Jean Claudric's orchestra. The four titles are French, and Claudric's interpretation is typical of French style. An interesting new name through the same label is Annie Nobel. She is author-composer and has a nice voice. One of her compositions is "Les Nanas."

Polydor: Reverend Kelsey, who just signed an exclusive contract with Polydor International, arrived last week in Paris for a one night show at the Théâtre des Champs Elysées. At this occasion Polydor France released an LP. Polydor will now distribute in France the King label. First record to be released is a James Brown EP. Polydor will also become the distributing firm of German label SABA, which is managed by Joachim Berendt. Marcel Amont, recorded a new EP, "La Tigresse." It is a French treatment of "Teach Me Tiger," the April Stevens hit.

Editions Labrador: Johnny Hallyday just released an EP containing three titles of his last LP, "Johnny Chante Hallyday." They are "Le Diable Me Pardonne," "Toi Qui T'En Vas," "Tu Oublieras Mon Nom" and a song written by Jean Jacques Debout "Il Y A Deux Filles En Moi." Through the RCA label, Noël Deschamps, a new rock n' roller, recorded a song published by Labrador, "Je Suis Un Sale Menteur."

Publications Francis Day: Dick Rivers just released, through EMI, a new title "Demain." It is the French treatment of the Fortunes' hit "Here It Comes Again."

Nouvelles Editions Barclay: Marie Laforêt recorded on her last LP four titles by Michel Jourdan and Armand Canfora. They are "Viens," "Plus Je T'Aime," "L'Orange," and "La Flute Magique."

Philips: Six Months after the Barbara's second LP, Philips releases an EP with maybe the best song of that great artist and author-composer, "Une Petite Cantate." On another EP is the "Concerto de Aranjuez" by the Modern Jazz Quartet with Laurindo de Almeida.

to begin an 18-day tour in Sydney on January 21st. Aztec Services and Stadiums Pty has combined their powers to bring a show headlining the Seekers and Mark Wynter. This one is set to start its season in Perth on February 1st, and will play all major cities.

The city of Melbourne, in the State of Victoria, had its night life suppressed for many, many years as a result of liquor licensing laws which required hotels to close their bars at 6pm, and seriously curtailed the activities of the few clubs in the city. Many overseas visitors will no doubt recall these laws which have been decried for countless years by thousands of people. Well, like they say, if you yell long enough and loud enough someone will eventually hear you. The State Government eventually heard the complaints about the restrictive liquor laws in Victoria. The result is that from February 1st hotel bars will remain open until 10pm. Lounges, entertainment centres and such will have the freedom to go beyond the 10 pm closure; cabarets and night clubs will be free to serve customers until 3AM. It looks for sure that nightlife in Melbourne will really begin to come alive after all these years. This is great news for singers, musicians and entertainers because the extended hours should create a great deal of extra work.

Local artists Bobby & Laurie, who recently signed a recording agreement with Albert Productions, have their first record under the deal released by EMI on their Parlophone label; the titles are "Sweet And Tender Romance" and "Down In The Valley."

The Leeds Music folk are very delighted over the potential of the new Lennon-McCartney song "Michelle" which is creating such world-wide interest. At the moment there is a broadcast and record release restriction on the song, but this is expected to be lifted about the first week in February, and it seems sure that several versions of the song will be released at this time.

ITALY

Bovema's HMV-label manager Rien Heeremans reported that the label is ready to set up an extensive promotion campaign for French singer Marc Aryeen, who recently signed for distribution of his HMV-discs in this country. Aryeen's first single release "C'Est La Vie" b/w "Parce Que Je T'Aime" will be out soon.

Imperial launched singer John Lamers' initial item on the label "Ik Bewonder Jou" b/w "Weet Jij." Cees-Jan V. Dooren, singer of the label's prominent beat group the Markees, is now finalizing plans for the release of their disc "I'm A Man" b/w "Markees Party" on the New Zealand-market through the intermediary of his father.

HMV has several new items on this week's agenda, a.o. Rex Gildo's "Mein Geheimnis," Adamo's new EP including his current hits "Chanson En Rondelles," "J'Aime" and "Comme Toujours," Manfred Mann's "There's No Living Without Your Loving;" and the coupled single-item of "Chim Chim Cheree" b/w "A Spoonful Of Sugar" from the Mary Poppins-soundtrack LP. The label also hit the stands with the vol. 2-LP of "Johnny Jordaan Successen" which has the balladeer's "Al Mijn Tranen" on one of its tracks, a favorite of many Dutch-U.S. emigrants.

Atlantic launched Solomon Burke's "Baby, Come Home" and new LP's by Casey Anderson ("Blue Is A Woman Gone") and Joe Tex ("The New Boss"). Columbia furthermore unveils strong chartbusters by Freddie And the Dreamers, Herman's Hermits and the Shadows ("War Lord").

In Amsterdam, Phonogram organized a press-conference in the first week of January to celebrate the simultaneous release of two LP's by Holland's leading cabaret-groups: Lurelei and Shaffy Chantant. Dutch singer-actor-composer Ramses Shaffy was invited for the occasion to come to Lurelei's own Theatre, managed by Eric Herfst, leader of the Lurelei group. A hundred of Holland's leading journalists and officials from broadcasting and theatre-world formed the selected ensemble for which both Lurelei and Shaffy Chantant did a special performance from their recorded repertoires. Shaffy's group—invited to come to the Edinburgh Festival in England this summer—includes cabaret singer and actress Liesbeth List and Loes Hamel, pianist Polo de Haas (also a remarkable concert & jazz pianist) and actor Joop Admiraal who reads modern poetry. The accent in highbrow Shaffy Chantant lies on chansons d'amour and vocal repertoire in which mild, bizarre humor is prominent. The star in Lurelei is Jasperina de Jong, outstanding lark and humorist. The satirical repertoire is written, for the greater part, by gifted musician and poet Guus Vleugel.

The American Spiritual And Gospel Festival 1966 arrived at Schiphol Airport, January 15th, to start a second European tour with a performance in the Amsterdam Concertgebouw. Last year, the leader of the group, The Rev. Samuel Kelsey and his congregation from the Temple Church of God in Christ (Washington, D.C.), was contracted by Philips' Phonographic Industries for a special Fontana-recording of the S & G Festival 1965 in the Glocke Kirche, Bremen, Germany. The success of this LP in Europe was a stimulant to Kelsey to continue his tour-schedules, although his main goal is a purely non-commercial, religious point of view to spread the Gospel in his own fascinating way through the entire world. Dutch impresario Paul Acket, who must be credited with presenting the group in Holland, P.P.I.'s Fred Burkhardt, and Frank Visser from Phonogram were present at Schiphol Airport to welcome the group in Europe. In the company were the Dorothy Norwood Singers, the Gospelsaires of Paul Arnold, Rev. Little, and the Harmonizing Four of which Phonogram released the Vee-Jay recording "My Lord What A Morning" in the "Gospel Train" series. A fascinating jazz-album was recorded by Holland's top jazz singer Rita Reys (11 years under exclusive Philips contract) with Edison Award-winning bandleader/arranger/tenorsax man Oliver Nelson. Nelson formed a ten piece band of leading American and European instrumental soloists, among them Benny Bailey, Art Farmer, Lee Konitz, Sahib Shihab, drummer Stu Martin, Ake Persson from Sweden, Klaus Doldinger from Germany and from Holland the Pim Jacobs Trio, Herman Schoonderwalt, Piet Noordijk and Cees Smal. The Philips LP is entitled "Rita Reys Meets Oliver Nelson."

New albums from Mercury's Limelight series were released in Holland via Phonogram. They are "s Make It" by Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers, "El Nutto" by Terry Gibbs group, "Woody's Goodies" by the 1964-65 Herman Band and "Jambo Caribe" by Dizzy Gillespie's Quintet.

Phonogram rush-released the following English and American singles in December: "Thunderball" by Tom Jones and "Good Lovin'" by Brian Poole, both on Decca, the London-recording "Let's Get Together" by the We Five, and on Fontana "Keep On Running" by the Spencer Davis Group and "Midnight Six Man" by the Pretty Things.

Barclay made its first Dutch recording "Een Glaasje Madera, M'dear" (Have Some Madeira, M'dear—Flanders and Swann) by a singer unknown until a few weeks ago: Ted de Braak. Deejays were so enthusiastic about the recording and gave it so much attention that the title has become popular overnight. "La Bohème" by Charles Aznavour is on the move as well as "La Passionata" by Gus Marchand.

Last week was wonderful for Negram—they have 3 records in the Dutch top ten: "Wasted Words" by the Motions (The best selling beat record ever made by a Dutch group), "Yesterday Man" and "To Whom It Concerns" both by promising new singer Chris Andrews. And it looks as if the new Kinks' disc "Till The End Of The Day" will get on the Top 10 next week. Other strong climbers include "Take Me For What I'm Worth" by the Searchers, "Les Marionnettes" by Christophe, both renditions of "Michelle" (the Overlanders and Billy Vaughn) and a new strong Dutch beat record, "Subject Of My Thoughts" by the Sandy Coast.

As to "Michelle," this Lennon & McCartney song will be a big international seller in the coming months and Negram is very proud to be able to release both strong renditions. The first sales results in Holland are quite sensational. Negram is currently making a big promotion and publicity campaign for it. We expect "Michelle" next week in the top 50. Another Rubber Soul tune, "Girl," has just been released in England by the Truth. Negram will rush-release this record, too.

Negram is also proud to announce the acquisition of the great Scepter line. From the American hit-parade, Negram released 3 records this week: "Are You There" by Dionne Warwick, "If You Gotta Make A Fool Of Somebody," a revival by Maxine Brown and the latest rhythm & blues best seller by Chuck Jackson "Good Things Must Come," which seems to be the favorite record of George Harrison.

New releases this week come from the Great Warner Bros.-Reprise catalog. Some important newies include "It's All Over" by the popular Everly's "Let Me Show You Where It's At," the latest by Freddie Cannon, who hit the top 50 with "Action," "Tears" by Vic Damone as well as an EP by the Everly's. Coming soon: "These Boots Are Made For Walking," the future hit by Nancy

The most important surprise of the San Remo Festival 1966 is the return of Giuseppe Di Stefano to the popular music world, in fact, the great tenor began his career singing in the night clubs or in the music hall. The earnings of these dates allowed the young singer to attend a singing school. After many years of hard work, Giuseppe Di Stefano made, at last, his first debut in "Manon" by Massenet, at Reggio Emilia. After this superb interpretation he began a series of appearances which rendered him famous all over the world. In San Remo Giuseppe Di Stefano will present the tune "Per Questo Voglio Te."

Radio Record Ricordi, one of the most important Italian diskeries' publishing houses, which won the 15th San Remo Festival with "Sepiangi Se Ridi" by Bobby Solo (first place) and "Le Colline Sono In Fiore" (second place) by Wilma Goich, also well be present in the 16th Festival.

Gale Garnett after making herself known to our public by appearing on TV in the summer show "Mare Contro Mare" has recently returned to Rome where she waxed her second Italian record. The two new songs are: "Saluta L'Amore" composed by herself and translated into Italian by T. Bonicatti and C. Latessa, and "Che Senso Ha" by Rynolds.

Another very young boy who is attaining international success is Monty. His big songs are "E Poi Che Faro," a tune already well known in France as "J'Amais Personne Avant Toi" coupled with "Tutte Le Sere."

The Ivy League, already famous in Italy with their "Funny How Love Can Be," have recently presented another record, "That's Why I'm Crying" (Ecco Perche' Sto Piangendo) b/w "A Girl Like You."

An LP by the Kinks, the four English boys who started their band only one year ago and in this short time won English and American fans, has been published.

Two other albums on sale now in Italy are: one by the Scarches and one by the rockin' Barriers who will make soon a long appearance in Italy. The Renegades have recently waxed their first Italian record "Cadillac," considered to be their best.

Sinatra, "Lonely Weekends," by Sammy Davis and Sinatra's latest American chart rider "It Was A Very Good Year." Negram is still very busy with its Sinatra LP action which seems to result in strong sales for all WB/Reprise albums.

CBS Holland recently signed the famous Dutch beat group the Lords for recordings on the label. Their first single is "Belinda" c/w "People Wonder." Preceding this release, a big promotion campaign has been set-up, which is to accompany the group's activities from now on. CBS organized a press-party at the Grand Hotel Gooiland in Hilversum recently, which was attended by countless Dutch reporters and radio and TV-officials. The Lords were dressed like true Lords: black overcoats, top hats and Tuxedos; to be brief they are sophisticated! CBS has high hopes for this group and their first single is expected to hit hard on the local market. Recent CBS additions to the classical LP field include Janacek's "Slavonic Mass," featuring various soloists, the Westminster Choir and the New York Philharmonic conducted by Leonard Bernstein; Stravinsky's "Petrushka Suite" (original version) coupled with Kodaly's "Hary Janos Suite" and an album containing piano works of Claude Debussy played by the eminent CBS pianist Philippe Entremont.

GERMANY

The hit parade listings of Germany in all 3 major trade papers here have taken on a large format "hang in the window" look. The hit parade lists of the German top fifty are now fighting for window space in record shops all over the country and could very well lead to the end of a major problem in Germany, namely the feeding of actual information to a general public now not informed as to what leads the charts in Germany. This problem can keep record sales for singles strung out over a long period of time and can keep a record which is moving well regionally due to radio play out of the national limelight, as each major area in Germany only has 1 radio station to listen to. The chart information will lead to the teenager asking to at least hear new hits which have stirred up enough regional action to make the listings. Cash Box is already printing a weekly singles report from two of the major papers "Music" and "Automaten Markt" and the monthly LP listing of the other magazine "Music Market."

Hans Sikorski recently celebrated the 30th anniversary of his publishing house in Germany. The firm, which was formed in Berlin, has now had its home in Hamburg for 20 years.

The 3rd annual "Beat Band" festival will start in Recklinghausen on Jan. 30th. The festival started activities in 1964 with 9 bands and grew to 29 groups in 1965. This year, 60 bands are expected to compete for first place and a possible start in the record business.

Electrola reports that the radio promotion chief for classical music, Hans Richard Stracke, has left the firm. Klaus Werner, who has handled pop promotion, will take over the department and will be assisted by Werner Jung who has handled contacts with discoltheques until now.

Ariola's George Ehmke, who is export mgr. for the firm, tells us that the firm has taken over the repertory of the Russian state owned record company. Artists such as Svjatoslav Richter, David & Igor Oistrach and Iwan Petrow are included in the catalog, which will be expanded to about 100 LP's this year. The label has signed former Polydor star Fred Bertelmann to an exclusive pact. Switzerland's Peter Hinnen is set for a tour of Czechoslovakia with his own show. From there he will head for a 6 week tour of Japan.

New Barclay rep. in Germany Gaby Richt tells us that the label has kicked off in fine fashion with the 12 year star of the label, The Little Prince, who has his new German waxing set for several top TV shows here. French star Dalida is recording "Il Silenzio" in German as a followup to the hit Italian waxing by the artist. Charles Aznavour has also recorded his hit "La Boheme" in German, and the two French entries in the "Song For Europe" contest Hugues Aufray and Marjorie Noel are also set for German waxing sessions. The production is expected to grow as the year grows older, and new German talent is also being searched for.

Teldec Records kicked off the "beat 66" series with "It's Good News Week" by Hedgehoppers Anonymous, "Mystic Eyes" by Them and "Love Is Strange" by Sonny & Cher.

Metronome records has signed the Barclay group to an exclusive distribution pact which brings stars like Charles Aznavour, Jacques Brel, Dalida, Maurice Chevalier and many others to the label. Gaby Richt is handling Barclay production and publicity for Germany. Suzanne Doucet has signed a new 2 year pact with Metronome. The young lass has been a best selling beat artist for the firm, but her first LP of folk melodies and chansons is a best seller. Acker Bilk, who is set for a concert tour of Germany this month, will play his first dance in this country in the town of Beversen near Hamburg.

The Sam The Sham & The Pharaohs tour which covered Hamburg, Kiel, Hannover, Berlin, Osnabrueck, Muenster, Luedenscheid, Cologne, Bremen, Nienburg, Wilhelmshaven, Oldenburg, Schmallingberg, Siegen, Duellken, Duesseldorf, Wuppertal, Essen and Munich was a tremendous success for the group. The tour also included local groups the Shamrocks from Sweden and the Yankees from Germany. Sam was pushing his new waxing of "Red Hot" during the tour. All of the groups are distributed here by D.G.G.-Polydor. Polydor artist Fritz Schulz Reichel, better known as "Crazy Otto" and the Gunter Kallman Choir are now on tour in South Africa where they are playing in Johannesburg, Durban, Port Elizabeth and Capetown.

Bert Kaempfert is back from Hollywood where he did the music for the film "A Man Could Get Killed." Bert is tickled pink about the success of his song "Spanish Eyes," which is riding the charts. It is by Al Martino.

CBS kicked off 1966 with a gala press conference in Frankfurt where members of the press were invited to hear the firm's international artist Dunja Rajter. The lark has her first LP "Songs From Yugoslavia" recorded for the label. Producers Horst Lippman and Fritz Rau, who handles almost all of the big jazz tour packages for Germany, were also on hand for the festivities.

Teldec has released the first single by Jim Edward Brown in German. Kurt Feltz handled the production.

Germany's top selling artist Freddy Quinn has signed for a repeat stand of his main role in the German musical "Homesick For St. Pauli." The musical, which was started 3 years ago and marked the artist's first long term stage appearance, was a best selling LP and a top film as well. The repeat will take place in Hamburg and starts on February 3rd. Music from the show is published by Edition Esplanade and Hans Sikorski Music, and Polydor released the LP. The music was written by Lotar Olias. That's it for this week in Germany.



GREAT BRITAIN

For too long, too many manufacturers have been releasing too many records—particularly singles. EMI's decision to cut down releases and maintain a schedule proportionate to the talent available and the demands of the market will be welcomed by the dealer and consumer alike. EMI's new release policy is also in line with their new look exploitation policy. This calls for more programmes per week on Radio Luxembourg with fewer records and fewer deejays.

Decca Records is the latest British company to follow the trend of independent distribution. From July 4th (Independence Day), Decca disks will be handled exclusively by their own distributors, Selecta and Vogue in the U.K. and Solomon & Peres in Northern Ireland. As previously announced, EMI commences independent distribution on July 1st.

Ken Glancy, managing director of CBS Records, this week concluded an agreement with indie producer Shel Talmy's Orbit Universal Music Company whereby Orbit will produce singles and albums for world wide pressing and distribution by CBS. Glancy told Cash Box that the Talmy deal will provide another source of pop repertoire which the company is anxious to build up. The agreement is completely independent of Talmy's Planet label deal with Philips Records. Orbit productions will be issued on the normal CBS label. First releases scheduled for February will include a debut album by versatile pianist Nick Hopkins, and a big band album by David Whittaker is also being lined up.

Ben Nisbet, director of Feldmans, is currently in New York for executive meetings with Arnold Maxim of Robbins Music and is staying at the Americana Hotel. Nisbet has secured for Feldmans the Malcolm Arnold score of the new Hayley Mills film "Sky West And Crooked."

Sparta Music has signed a publishing representation deal with Modern Music Inc. of California, and the first copyright comes with the release of the Ikettes "I'm So Thankful." Sparta has also acquired the rights of Britain's latest No. 1 smash "Keep On Running" by the Spencer Davis Group for France where it is also being recorded by Johnny Hallyday. Sparta also has the number for Italy, Belgium and Luxembourg.

Herb Alpert's "Spanish Flea" is currently shooting up the British charts and is earning plenty of performing fees for Burlington Music, who has acquired the U.K. rights from Almo Music Inc. Burlington also has "English Swings" by Roger Miller (Philips) now entering the Top 20. The company's general manager, John Nice, is currently on his first visit to America and Canada for meetings with Mimi Trepel in the New York office and Fraser Jamieson and Brian Chater in Montreal. He will also visit publishers with whom Burlington has deals in Nashville, Memphis, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Tony Hatch is still in the news. His composition "My Love" looks as if it will take Petula Clark to the top of the U.S. charts for the third time. "Call Me," which he also penned, has taken Chris Montez back onto the American hit parade and has been waxed here by Lulu for release on Decca. Hatch also cut "Can't Help Thinking About Me," a debut disk on Pye by David Bowie, contract writer to Sparta Music who also publish the number.

"Charlie Girl," the British musical by David Heneker and John Taylor, starring Anna Neagle and Joe Brown is breaking box office records at London's Adelphi Theatre. The original cast album is issued on CBS with score published by Britannia Music.

Tom Jones second album "A-Tom-Ic Jones" has been issued this week by Decca. It is just a year ago since his first smash "It's Not Unusual" took him to the top of the British charts and also established him in the United States. He followed this up with a three month American tour. But it is unusual that his subsequent recordings including "What's New Pussy Cat" and currently "Thunderball" have enjoyed more chart success abroad than at home. Not unusual is that Tom Jones is now off on his travels again—this time for a three-week tour of Australia. On February 10th he returns to America for three more weeks and an appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show and Sammy Davis Show returning to Britain in March.

Also traveling abroad, the Fortunes are currently touring the U.S. where they will tele-record eight TV shows before returning to Britain on February 23rd to promote their latest Decca single "This Golden Ring" penned by Roger Greenaway and Roger Cook, the duo who gave them their "You've Got Your Troubles" success. In February the Fortunes also fly to Holland for TV and p.a's.

First disk from the newly formed indie record production company Page One set up by publisher Dick James and A & R manager Larry Page is "Waltzing To Jazz" by the Larry Page Orchestra on Decca.

Quickies: "The River" (by Ken Dodd) now topping Best Selling Sheet Music lists for Peter Maurice Music. . . The Zombies wax "Remember You" from the film "Bunny Lake Is Missing" (Decca). . . Dutch group Rene and his Alligators debut on Decca with "She Broke My Heart." . . Comedienne/singer Libby Morris signed recording contract with RCA Victor and makes label debut with "One Of Those Things." . . RCA issues Peter Nero's "In Person" album. . . Two more cover versions of Paul McCartney/John Lennon composition "Michelle" by Les Baxter (Pye) and Billy Vaughn (Dot) released here by Pye Records. . . Decca Chairman Sir Edward Lewis currently on ten-day visit to New York.

CANADA

Great Canadian action coast to coast on the latest outing by Chad and the Guess Whos. Some stations are playing both sides, many have charted only "Baby's Birthday" or the flip "Hurting Each Other." Leading spinners everywhere report request action on the record is extremely heavy and sales on the first class quality outing by the young Winnipeggers is backing this action up. The "Hey Little Girl" release that appeared first under a mysterious label is now strongly established on numerous charts under the artist's real identity, Jimmie Cross. Dave Boxer has charted a couple of Canadian items well up on his hit list from CFCF Montreal. "Joker" by the Young Canadians is well underway in the Montreal area thanks to exposure on the Boxer air stanzas, as is "Blue Lipstick" by Patrician Ann. Latest by the Strangeloves, "Night Time," is also a big winner for Dave. The "Nut In The Hut," as Boxer's legions of fans almost reverently refer to their hero, is off on a mid winter vacation to the Caribbean. His secretary, Sue Johnston tells Cash Box that the recent live show in the Montreal Forum, promoted by Dave and starring only Canadian acts was a complete success. The idea was an all day show with one top Canadian attraction after another. It was billed as "Bring Your Lunch Hopsville," and some seven thousand young Montrealers did just that. Turn-out and comment was so good, reports Sue, that they plan another similar show for the Easter holidays.

Andy Kim is still getting some good reaction to his debut on Red Bird. "I Hear You Say" is drawing rave notices in many eastern markets. Andy and his brother Joe, his manager, are keeping their fingers crossed that some of the eastern action will spread across the country.

Bob MacAdorey the CHUM music director, has taken a firm stand on the development and exploitation of Canadian recording talent in a series of articles recently in the Toronto Telegram. They are most enlightening and thought provoking. It remains to be seen if there will be any public outcry, denouncing the articles.

Ed Lawson at Quality in Toronto reports that Canada has test marketed another single to excellent advantage. The title is "It Was A Very Good Year" by the Turtles was listed and played heavily by Paul Michaels at CJRN-Niagara Falls. Reaction has been sensational and the cut, taken from the group's LP, now appears certain to be released in the U.S. It could very well give the Sinatra version a run for chart listings. For one thing it's much shorter and the Deejays will dig that.

Bill Fisher has a hot item for sure on his Fi Sound label. It is called "It's All Over Now" by the Sceptres has been tagged for release in the U.S. on the Brent label, on the strength of chart listings and sales in Canada. The Montreal-based group has a real winner on their hands and Fisher will be on that cross Canada trip in the very near future to spread news of the Sceptres in all the major markets. The Bobby Curtola single is a run away smash in most Canadian markets. Chart listings a plenty, to say nothing of sales on the Tartan outing, penned by Kingston spinner Bryan Olney. The title is "While I'm Away." Surprising thing about the side is that it is a solid smash, and an instant winner in the artist's home town of Port Arthur.

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MEXICO

At the past RCA Victor Latin American Licensee's Convention, which took place in Mexico City during Jan. 11, 12 and 13, George R. Marek, vice president and general manager of the record division of RCA, declared to the delegates that this label will release songs in several languages. This will be the most important artistic interchange in the world and will be of great benefit to Mexican artists.

Before Gilbert Becaud left Mexico City for his country, France, he recorded at the Capitol Studios a song he wrote, "Pajarito De Mil Colores" (Bird of A Thousand Colors). He was accompanied by a mariachi group, who gave him a nice sound of trumpets.

Mexican opera singer Plácido Domingo will participate next season in the New York City Opera, which will start on February 22. Plácido will star in the opera "Don Rodrigo."

Musart Records released a series of three albums by the Manhattan Pops Orchestra. The first with old American standards, the second with popular French songs, and the third with traditional Spanish themes.

After a short visit in Mexico where he spent Christmas with his son and did six videotapes for different sponsors, Andy Russell left for Los Angeles where he has to fulfill several record, TV, and personal appearance contracts. Andy told us that very soon a series of his new recordings will appear in the U.S. on an American label.

Orfeon Records announces the signing of tropical combo Lobo Melón, which some time ago belonged to RCA. They broke up the group, but now with new tropical ideas, they formed a new one and immediately will start to record.

Capitol Records released the latest album cut by the Beatles, "Rubber Soul," which sold in the first week in the United States 1,400,000 copies, according to René Flores, promotion manager of this company. Beatles' selling in Mexico has increased very much in the past weeks since the picture "A Hard Day's Night" was released.

Emilio Pericoli returned to his performances at La Fuente's night club, with veteran comic Harry Mimo and beautiful Ana Luis Peluffo.

Peerless Records cut several new LP's on the Eco label. Among them are Los Apson Boys doing an album titled "Aleluya" and another one made by beautiful Laura Armendáriz and named "Deseando Y Esperando." Queta Garay also released another album as did Pablo Castellón. All of them contain foreign hits translated to Spanish.

Dusa Records released a new EP sung by Connie Francis with Italian versions of the songs "Tango Italiano," "Quando, Quando, Quando," "Simba" and "Mr. Twister." There are rumors that Connie Francis will soon debut in Mexico at La Fuente's place.

CBS announces a new extended play with the Village Stompers, playing the themes "Lemon Tree," "Red Roses For A Blue Lady," "Mr. Tambourine Man" and "We'll Sing In The Sunshine."

Pepe Delgado and his combo, released a 33 1/3 album on Musart Label with songs like "The Girl Of Ipanema," "Dancero," "Cuando Vuelva A Tu Lado," "Capullito De Alhelí," "Lamento Cubano," "El Baile Del Sillón," "La Sitiera," "La Guantanamera" and "La Bella Cubana."

Lucho Gatica cut a new single at Capitol Records and was accompanied by the orchestra of Jose Antonio Zavala. The songs are "Te Necesito," "El Perro," "Vamos A Soportarnos" and "Las Cuatro Estaciones." All of them are composed by Luis Demtrio. Lucho returned from Washington, where he did a series of videotapes for the Organization of American States. It is probable that Lucho will do some TV shows in town.

Mario Patrón, one of the finest pianists we have in the jazz field, returned to Mexico after a long tour through Europe, and immediately signed a contract with Capitol Records.

Beautiful model and singer Erika, finished a new single at the Philips' label. It contains the Spanish version of American hit "Wishin' And Hopin'."

Gamma Records released the number one hit in Spain, "Borracho," with its creator Los Brincos. This song is included in a Spanish picture "Mas Bonita Que Ninguna" now playing in town. The flick stars beautiful Rocío Dúrcal, who also cut this song for Philips.

DENMARK

Latest releases from Metronome Records include a new single by Jørgen Ingmann with the Greek song "Korfu" backed with "Røde Roser Fra Santa Monica" (Red Roses From Santa Monica); the latter is a German song.

Coming up very strong here is a Danish version of "Shame And Scandal In The Family" with Daimi on Metronome and "The Carnival Is Over" with the Seekers on Columbia.

FINLAND

Renrik von Denffer of Fintone Oy told Cash Box that he is very happy about the present success of the Mercury EP "Twilight Time" by the Platters. At the moment this 13 year old recording has become a bestseller in Finland, and on one of the recent charts, it held the 13th position, Denffer reports. Inspired by the present success, Fintone Oy is planning to release another single by the Platters this week, preferably one including an oldie like "Twilight Time."

NORWAY

1965 was a good year for the record biz in Norway. To judge from the many Silver Disks (representing a sale of 25,000) presented to its winners by the Oslo daily Arbeiderbladet, record sales seem to be going up very much. Not less than 21 Silver Disks were presented to winners. Beatles got their share of the Silver with seven. Four Gold Disks were also distributed to the late Jim Reeves for "I Won't Forget You" and "He'll Have To Go" and "Adios Amigo" (all on RCA Victor) and to the Swedish group Sven Ingvars for "Fröken Fräken." A Diamond Disk for the sale of 75,000 went to the late Jim Reeves for "I Love You Because" (presented March 27th), and the same record got Norway's first Platinum Record for having sold 100,000 (November 19th).

SWEDEN

Another new label has debuted here. It is called Bill and headed by Arne Bill. The debut record presents Bengt Hjord, sometimes billed as "Sweden's Bob Dylan" with "It's Just A Song" b/w "That's The Reason Why I'm Here." GDC handles the distribution of the new label.

Sweden's local Song Festival 1966 takes place on Swedish TV January 29th. So far contracted to sing the songs (there will be ten of them) are Gunner Bergkvist, Ann-Louise Hansson, Lill Lindfors, Monica Nielsen, Carli Tornehave and Svante Thuresson. The latter is a member of the vocal group Gals and Pals. Eventually, Per Myrberg and Gunnar Wiklund will be heard in the competition, depending upon if their other engagements make it possible for them to appear on TV that day. The winning song will represent Sweden at the Eurovision Song Contest 1966.

Latest releases from AB Philips-Sonora include Anita Lindblom with "Det Bästa Jag Kan Tänka Mig" (The Best Thing That Ever Happened To Me) b/w "Du Är Botten, Men Jag Gillar Dej" (You're The One) on Fontana, and on Philips a single with two local songs recorded by Sven Ingvars.

Latest releases from Metronome Records include "A Sweet Woman Like You" b/w "Close The Door" by Joe Tex, "Seesaw" b/w "I Never Get Enough Of Your Love" by Don Covay, and "My Girl" b/w "Just One More Day" by Otis Redding; all three are on the Atlantic label.

Now, when Sweden is facing its hardest winter in decades, the first plans for the coming summer in the Swedish amusement parks is being revealed. Contracted for tours are the Osmond Brothers, Emile Ford, Paul Anka (Aug. 6 to 21), Manhattan Parade with King Coleman, and Leo Price Hullabaloo Orchestra with Faye Adams are some names coming here. Much requested but too expensive for Sweden are Sonny and Cher. Negotiations with other artists are going on, and those that have been mentioned are Count Basie and Frank Sinatra Jr.

ARGENTINA

A new record company has been formed in Buenos Aires by a group of musicians and artists under the Oberon banner. Several recordings are already available, and among them a version of recent hit "A Casa D'Irene" by Los Tres Impactos. Last week we had a chat with topper Jorge Fernandez, who mentioned waxings by Diego Soler—folk music—the Sonora Santander and Sonora Trinidad. Address of the new society is Parana 178, Buenos Aires, Argentina.

Luis Calvo of Sicamericana infos that the latest recording by Rodolfo Zapata, "No Vamos A Trabajar," is topping the label's best sellers, followed by Shawn Elliot's "Shame And Scandal In The Family" and the Kessler Sisters' "La Notte E Piccola," promoted by TV 11's "Studio Uno," one of the best rated programs of 1965. Zapata has now recorded the songs from his first film, "La Gorda," while well known artists Los Martinicos have cut "Este Es El Carnaval," aimed at the oncoming celebrations.

Julio Korn Publishers informs that new star Nancy Li, launched by CBS and going good with her first single, "La Plage," has now recorded "Summer Nights," the Marianne Faithful hit; on the same label Ivar and Raivo have recorded "Run Baby Run," coming straight from the US hit lists. The publicity is also working on the music of "What's New Pussycat," the Peter Sellers-Peter O'Toole film currently being screened in Buenos Aires.

The latest news from Fermata states that the organization has acquired the rights to Nini Rosso's big hit "Il Silenzio" and hopes it will turn into a success in this market, too. The first local recording will be made by Bobby Cuatro (Music Hall), and others are expected to be released soon. On the same label, Danny Montano has recorded "Ojos Espanoles," while Marito Gonzalez waxed Mina's "Solos" and Tomas Campos waxed "Muy Cerca De Ti."

Trova Records report that during December Enrique Villegas, well known local pianist and arranger, recorded for them an album with his Trio, before leaving for the States. Title of the album is "Villegas In Body And Soul," and one of the sides of the record is occupied by "Body And Soul Variations on Johnny Green." The record is due this week.

Ala-Nicky infos that Italian artist Ennio Sangiusto will arrive in Buenos Aires in a few days; the diskery is releasing a single by him, containing "Non E Finita" and "Ay, Que Calor." On the local side, there is an EP by Nicolas Barrios and his group, devoted to bolero music.

Smart Publishers report that they are promoting "Anche Se," one of the biggest Gino Paoli smashes in Italy, now available in Argentina in the Ornella Vanoni version. The singer is a good seller here, and has appeared consistently on the lists during the past year. Also coming from Smart, "Tendido En La Playa" is now being promoted in Mar del Plata and resort areas with good success.

Claudio Caramelo has recorded a new single for Odeon Pops with a version of Anthony Newley's "What Kind Of Fool Am I," in Spanish, coupled with "No Tengo Amor," penned by the same Caramelo. Richard Anthony's latest is "Eso Seria Hermoso" and "Io Che Non Vivo Senza Te." In this record the orchestra is directed by Jacques Denjean.

One of the most consistent instrumental groups these days in Argentina is Los Iracundos, who have been recording for RCA for more than a year. The interesting point about these boys—coming from Uruguay—is the international appeal of their music. Their "Jingle Bells" has been released in countries like Canada and Colombia. In Argentina they have been selling steadily for several months and now take a place in the lists with "Todo Termino." A new single is being released this week, and the diskery hopes to keep it in a straight selling line with the previous ones.

The promo dept. of Phonogram reports the release of the first album by European songstress France Gall, winner of the recent Eurovision song Festival. The album includes, of course, the winning tune, and others recently recorded by her. Coming from Polydor is an album by Armando Pontier, with Alberto Podesta and Hector Dario as singers. The LP has titles like "Pecado," "Aerotango" and "El Embajador." Under the Verve banner, there is an album by Astrud Gilberto, "The Shade Of Your Smile," with a selection of bossa nova tunes.

Two ten inch LP's are coming this week from Disc Jockey: one of them is the latest Rosamel Arya production, once more being heavily promoted throughout the country; the later is a Palette recording of Hawaiian music by the Waikikis. Araya has several albums on the market, and all of them are selling wonderfully, according to the reports from Luque's company.

CBS has released the second album by folk artist El Chango Nieto, discovered at the 1965 Cosquin Folk Music Festival in the province of Cordoba. Nieto is 22 years old, born in Saita, and has a personal style and good sales appeal. This album features "La Tucumanita," "Solito," "Vidala del Tunante" and several other current folk hits, and is expected to run well. Nieto seems to have also good possibilities in the international market.

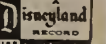

JAPAN

Mr. Goldschmidt, manager of Anvers Radio in Brussels, received important visitors from the United States. Harry Levine, president, and his assistant Genovese at ABC-Paramount came over to Belgium to renew the contract for the distribution of this label in Belgium. The meeting and the business transaction went off in the best of circumstances. In the course of the meeting the contract for the distribution of Impulse and Command were also renewed. Goldschmidt obtained the rights for the distribution of the new label, Boom, and will put out the first Sheep record under the title "Hide and Seek" b/w "Twelve Months Later." Another visitor on a business trip was Mr. Oestreicher, of Turicaphon (Austria), and as a result, Anvers Radio has acquired the distribution of Elite Special, a very fine LP-label. On Command, the firm is expecting some remarkable LP's from the States, among them Beethoven's 6th Symphony. Mr. Janty, Sales Manager, attended these meetings and he expressed to Cash Box his satisfaction about the splendid outcome.

Maurice Dumitresco, manager of the most popular foreign orchestra in Belgium, Clark Richard and his Tropical Stars, has decided to create his own record label: Roover Records. The A-side of Clark Richard on this Roover label is "Set Him Free." The numbers on this first record are published by the music publishing firm Passe Partout and Dancing, following an agreement with Lambrechts, manager of this firm. Polydor is to distribute the record in Belgium. The distribution abroad remains to be arranged. We should mention that such stars as Claudia Silva, Benoit Philippe, the Sylvester's Team and the Duo Acropolis are under contract with Dumitresco. The firm's address is Roover Records, Lausanne Building, Boulevard Leopold III, Brussels 3. Phone 16 69 46.

Van de Walle, manager of Discobel, has told Cash Box that his Dutch records are doing quite nicely. Included are "Ik Heb Me Weer Vergist" (I've Got It Wrong Again) by Bob Smit and the Duke City Sextet, and "Wasted Words" by the Motions, a Dutch beatgroup. Furthermore he informed us that Olivier Despax is to come to Belgium for an important TV-show, centered around Despax, in which this Riviera-star is to sing six of his hit-tunes. Guy Marchand is due to appear soon on the Flemish TV with the numbers from his latest EP: "Tout En Dansant La Rumba" (While Dancing The Rumba), "Casanova," "Baby" and "L'Amoureux Transi" (Bashful Lover). Of these tunes the first one seems headed for success.

Werner Huys, owner of the publishing firm Disco Music, informed us about a change of address. It is no longer at Bissegem, but at Deurne: Disco Music, Dascotelei, 34, Deurne (Antwerp). Phone 03-36 75 97. He is currently actively promoting the newest Red Sheldon single, "I'm Gone." He also owns the copyright on the B side of this Motions record, which is enjoying good sales.

Primavera own the rights on the A side of the Motions "Wasted Words," as well as "I Will" by Dean Martin, and "A Well Respected Man" by the Kinks. More Primavera hits are "Même Si Tu Revenais" (Even If You Came Back) by Claude François, the hit of the moment; "Fais La Rire" (Make Her Laugh) by Hervé Villard; "Ik Heb Geen Zin Om Op Te Staàn" (I Don't Feel Like Getting Up) by the first Dutch pop-art group HET.

Jean Vanloo, manager of Unidans Production is organizing a tour in Belgium with the Kinks from March 12 to 20. Thirteen gala-performances are scheduled. The promotion has already been launched and so far everything points to a splendid success. The Vogue records firm is providing valuable assistance. From March 25 to 28 he has planned a promotion tour with the Silkie, and he is currently discussing with Philips how best to conduct the promotion. Unidans is also involved in the promotion of Olivier Despax in Belgium.

SA Gramophone is looking after the distribution of a Jean Meeusen production, songstress Ann-Christy, who has a single that will be successful in Europe: "Alors, Dis Moi Ton Nom" (Please Tell Me Your Name) and "Mon Coeur Est Fou" (My Heart Is Mad). Adamo has just recorded four Spanish versions of his French hits. The sales of the first Marc Aryan LP on Markal has gotten off to a flying start.

Philips is trying to bring the Walker Brothers to Belgium for a TV-show. Perhaps these efforts will be successful, in which case the company is to launch a full promotion campaign. Efforts are also being made to organize a visit by the Pretty Things. Sales of the latest Sheila single "Le Folklore Américain" (American Folklore) are still way up. The firm is quite happy about the continued large-scale sales of Claude François' most recent hit, "Même Si Tu Revenais."

F. R. Faecq, manager of World Music, informed us about the death of the composer Peter Packay, whose real name was Pierre Paquet. Packay was one of the best known and most popular Belgian contemporary jazz composers. His compositions, together with those of his friend and collaborator David Bee, have been and still are, part of the stock of artists and orchestras of radio and TV. Peter Packay was one of Belgium's best representatives abroad.

After trying to find the best sellers during the X'mas and New Year holiday season at main shops in Tokyo, the following are reported selling well: In the LP section, Presley's two set album, released by Nippon Victor to honor his ten years' anniversary, has been selling wonderfully. "Mary Poppins," released by Nippon Columbia, has shown increasing sales. "All Of The Guitar Melodies," released by Teichiku Records, is an attractive collection of movie theme songs. "Futari No Sekai" by Carmen Cavarello on Decca is gathering more and more popularity. However, the most notable one is John Coltrane's original number "Supreme Love" on Impulse. Recent sales of the record have shown that he has many fans among Japanese music lovers.

In the SP section, "Karelia" is doing well. The SP is released by Nippon Gramphon on Polydor and by Nippon Victor on Phillips. Besides the above SP, the Ventures have a big hit. The Ventures' X'mas LP sold many copies.

In Japanese locals, Miyoko Tashiro and Vauve Satake showed favorable sales.

Nippon Victor has signed a contract with Nissei Theater to hold musicals at the theater every year. The purpose of the shows is to develop Japanese music and at the same time to distribute Japan's music all over the world through Nippon Victor's sales channel. The firm has a sales-right of the records and the Nissei Theater has other rights including that of TV broadcasting. The first performance since the contract was signed started on Jan. 2 with "Treasure Land," which is written by Shintaro Ishihara, exclusive manager of the theater, and composed by Hachidai Nakamura. The LP "Treasure Land" is scheduled to be released by the firm in the middle of January.

As a result of research made by Daily Records News, the top five of LP, SP and locals during last year are the following: In pop LP section, "Sound Of Music" (Victor-Sound Track), "Ventures In Japan" (Toshiba), "Best Of Ventures" (Toshiba), "My Fair Lady" (Columbia-Sound Track) and "Beatles '65" (Toshiba) are included.

In SP section, "Diamond Head" (Toshiba-Ventures), "Caravan" (Toshiba-Ventures), "La Plus Belle Pour Aller Danser" (Victor-Sylvie Vartan), "La Playa" (Toshiba-Sound Track) and "Pearly Shells" (Victor-Billy Vaughan) are included. That Ventures possessed two ranks both in LP and SP, prove how popular the group is.

The locals section includes "Onnagokorono Uta" (King-Vauve Satake), "Aishite, Aishite, Aishichattanoyo" (Victor-Miyoko Tashiro), "Yawara" (Columbia-Hibari Misora), "Matsunoki Kouta" (King-Yukiko Ninomiya) and "Natsuno Hino Omoide" (Grammophon-Teruko Hino).

Nippon Victor will come out with two extraordinary releases in the middle of January. One is "Kneel Before You" the original sound track of the Herald movie, and the other is "Diamandez Golden Album" including "Blue Moon," "Falling Leaves," "Malaguena." The LP is to honor their coming here, scheduled on Jan. 13 at the invitation of Toho Geino Production.

King records will also bring out an anniversary LP release on Feb. 20 to honor Kanko Ogawa, composer of the firm, who received the Nippon Grand Prix Composers Award of '65. The LP includes "Sayonara Wa Dance No Atode" "Love Me Only," "Good Night Kiss," "Tango Of The Night" and others.

BRAZIL

Orlando Stefano, of the promo dept. of Indústrias Elétricas e Musicais Fábrica Odeon told us about the latest releases of the company. They are as follows: as Mardi-Gras is approaching, the label is releasing an LP with a good selection of that lively and jumpy type of popular music, under the title "Carnaval de 1966"; it includes some of the most famous names in "marchas" and "sambas." A newly pacted artist of MPM, Geraldo Vespar, appears in an album titled "Samba, Nova Geração," where the young artist proves his talent with the "violão" (Brazilian guitar). Another new name the chanter Sylvio Cezar, of the Bossa Nova beat, who has an album entitled "Só Tinha De Ser . . ." one of the MPM hits is included in it. Traditional ballad songster Anísio Silva returns to disc activity in an album called "Anísio Silva Volta Com O Sucesso," which will no doubt please the fans of the popular old-timer. In the traditional line of Brazilian music, another LP is being released under the title "Alma E Coração," bringing the romantic voice of Antenógenes Silva. A varied selection of the biggest hits by the big names connected with Odeon are included in an album called "P.S. Parada De Sucessos." It is a disc that may become a best-seller in its line. There is no doubt that the first Brazilian artist that conquered the U.S. public was the late Carmen Miranda—Odeon is paying homage to the "notable gal" with an album called "A Nossa Carmen Miranda," which contains several of her international hits.

Reprise records are being distributed in this country through Odeon. Because of the 25th Anniversary of Frank Sinatra, the label is releasing some of his discs, distributing in the record shops all kinds of special promotion material, and requesting the radio stations to produce special programs in honor of the great artist. This is the time to ask again what has been asked hundreds of times: "Why isn't Frank Sinatra coming to Brazil?"

At the special request of the London British label, represented in this country by Odeon, a whole series of productions is being done here for the catalog of that company. It is a good opportunity to promote music, and some good discs are already being released, such as "Brazilian Beat," with Cipó and his authentic Rhythm Group (rhythm of the popular samba), "Bossa Nova for Swinging Lovers," with the Ipanema Pop Orchestra interpreting all the big hits of the MPM. "Tempo Trio" is another album in the BNN style, with a good selection by an excellent small instrumental group (piano, bass, drums). Another Latin American rhythm represented in this production is Boleros from the Tropics, with Juan Villa Rica and his Orchestra, with twelve of the most popular numbers in that rhythm. A selection of U.S. hits played by Sacha's piano, is in this album titled "Drinks After Midnight."

Through the efficiency of the promo man of Companhia Brasileira De Discos (Philips) in São Paulo, Carlos Gonçalves, we come across the latest news from that company: the two top stars of the label, Elis Regina and Jair Rodrigues, are receiving, in Rio de Janeiro, the important disc award "Euterpe." This last artist cut a single for the label intended for the next Carnaval '66, with strong number "Pai De Santo," music by Vicente Longo, words by Jota Junior, arrangement by Maestro Portinho. The first time Jair sang this number in public, during a Carnaval Show on Channel 7, at São Paulo, the public stood up and applauded for a long time. A very good album, produced by A&R man of CBD, Mário Duarte, with the title based on one of the best compositions of last year "Preciso Aprender A Ser Só," by one of the best voices of the popular music of Brazil, Wilma Bentivegna, with arrangements by Maestro Waldomiro Lemke, was released and is bound for good sales. One of the bands of this disc features a selection of the biggest hits of Evaldo Gouveia and Jair Amorim. Another interesting release in the satirist-comic type is a single by the best comedian of the moment in Brazil, Renato Corte-Real, in which he sings "Carlos Cará," a parody written by that artist called "Carcará." This will be a sales champion no doubt.

Discos Continental has an efficient and charming promo and PR man in Alfredo Corleto, who gives us news of the latest releases of the company: a second volume of the series "Evidência," with orchestra and chorus of Maestro Elcio Alvarez, in which the band-leader presents several varied (Brazilian, North American, Italian and French) hits of the moment, in a pleasant dancing rhythm, in a production by A&R man Diogo "Palmeira" Mulero. From the Argentine label Disc-Jockey, tango styles by the instrumental group Ponta Porã is included in the album "Bandoneon Arrabalero Vol. 3." It is being released with some hits of that music. One of those albums of sure success, due to its varied repertoire is the one by Continental, titled "Na Roda Do Sucesso," in which representative artists of the label sing and interpret 14 of the biggest hits of the last few months. We have in this LP the participation of Os Vips, Os Incriveis, Djalma Dias, Jose Leão, Erlon Chaves & Orch., Manolo Menendez, Poly, Elcio Alvarez & Orch., Francisco Petronio, Orlando Alvarado, Geraldo Vandré, Nilton Cezar, Lindomar Castilho and Carlos Piper & Orch.

Luiz Mocarzel, who is promoting the new label of Sebastião Bastos Som/Maior, informs us about the new releases of the company: a second and even better album by the MPM group Sansa Trio (José Briamonte, Aírto and José Ordoñez). More of the best MPM style is in another album by César Camargo Mariano, formerly with the Sambalão Trio (husband of popular songstress Mariza), and still another disc in which this excellent pianist rejoins his old instrumental group Reencontro Com Sambalão Trio, with Humberto Clayber and drummer Aírto. Last but not least in the high level of Bossa Novissima recordings of the company is an album by Sambossa/5 (Luiz Melo, Kuntz, Turquinho, Maguinho and Clayber). One of the best voices of Brazilian popular music at the moment is that of baritone José Tobias, who waxed an excellent single ". . . Das Rosas" and "Canta Maria." Another single by a young lark who recently received the "Ídolos Da Juventude" award of Radio Excelsior of São Paulo and is singing in some of the best night-spots of that capital has been released. Ana Maria, the charming and attractive lark interprets "Esqueça" and "Não É Fácil."

Eric Skinner and A. Ramalho Neto, general manager of the Record Division and A&R and Promo Manager for RCA Victor Brasileira are presently in Mexico where, as we informed before, they will attend the RCA Victor Latin American Record Licensee's Convention. We were among the many people who came to wave good-bye to the two execs and wish them luck for the promotion of our music. Skinner and Ramalho took along a batch of promotional material, as well as reports that will show the representatives from other Latin-American countries (and some Europeans also represented in the Convention) all that is being done in Brazil in the ever growing record business.

Marcos Augusto Nobili, who is heading the promo department of Discos RGE, is proud and happy to confirm the fact that the two albums by the Zimbo Trio, the best small instrumental group of Brazil in 1965, are being released in the U.S. through Liberty Records. This way, the trio will be presented to the U.S. public and that will open the door for a future visit. Rubinho, the drummer of the combo, considered to be the best in this country, could not attend the latest programs of the "Teatro Record" during Christmas and New Year because he was operated on recently in Curitiba, where he, together with Luiz Chaves and Amilton Godoy (piano) were receiving the "Pinheiro De Ouro" award for the best trio of the year in the State of Paraná. French music is back in Brazil among the best-sellers, mainly through the releases of the Barclay label, represented here by RGE: Charles Aznavour, is being appointed by the critics as the best international attraction of the year, while Dalida is scoring with her renditions of "Zorba Le Grec" and "Il Silenzio."

Another difficulty is arising in the record business in Brazil, which is bringing a lot of commotion within the companies and in the Association of Record Producers. Due to the period of sacrifice we wrote about in our Review 1965, high cost of life, etc., the musicians through their Union are trying to force a raise of 100% over the hourly price for recording sessions. The matter is not yet solved and this may have great influence for the future of the record business in Brazil.

We had a chance to talk again with Paulinho Machado De Carvalho, President of Emissoras Unidas who, as we had the opportunity to write before, is responsible not only for the presentation in this country of the biggest international names but also of the best promotion of Brazilian music in this past year. The big problem of bringing international attractions to Brazil, according to radio and TV, is the saturation of names that are of interest to the local public, that is, since all the well-known artists were already presented here, there would be little interest in bringing them back (exceptions are naturally Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin and a few others); on the other hand, the new names, who are already top performers and recording names outside, are practically unknown to the Brazilian public and would not gross enough money. The only way that these well known stars can be brought here is by taking advantage of the artists' tour to other Latin-American countries, mainly Argentina. While we wait for the international stars to come, Paulinho very wisely turned to local artists and is giving them full support. He is presenting the biggest names of the Brazilian Popular Music (traditional, bossa-nova and teen-music) with the same support as were shown international performers. This has given a good boost in the sale of the Brazilian produced records and the local music and artists in general. A new TV program, in the "Discotheque" style for the teen set is being produced by Eduardo Moreira and Bob Corte-Real, for Paulinho's TV-Record (Channel 7 of São Paulo) and is bringing new interest to the international big-beat. The new wave of Brazilian compositions of that type of teen-music is competing with the original on a strong basis. Note the top selling discs in this new area by the Brazilian musicians and artists.

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Editorial

From London—A Welcome To The 22nd Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition

Welcome to the annual Amusement Trades Exhibition, Europe's premier coin machine show which takes place on Tuesday, January 25th through Thursday, January 27th, 1966. This is not just another A.T.E., it's a very special one, and marks a new epoch in the Trade Association's 22 years of service to the amusement industry. A year ago we said that the Board of Directors, well aware of the inadequacy of the old venue and under pressure from exhibitors, were doing everything possible to find more commodious premises in which to stage this important event. The efforts of the Board have been rewarded and the demands of the exhibitors fulfilled. This year, for the first time, the A.T.E., after 21 years in the South of London, moves north to the eminently more suitable Great Hall at Alexandra Palace and a display area of 26,000 square feet—just 2½ times more space than hitherto available.

Early doubts as to whether it would be possible to dispose of all this extra space were soon dispelled as applications started to come in. Not only was every available inch sold but several late applicants had to be turned away. Much of the extra space has been absorbed by regular exhibitors taking larger stands. There is an all time record of 90 exhibitors amongst which are 26 newcomers including two from France and one from Japan. With more space at their disposal manufacturers and distributors will be able to show a wider and more comprehensive range of equipment. At the time of writing it is

impossible to foresee what effect the change of venue will have on attendance figures, but there is every indication of a considerable increase. Certainly the usual faces will be around and the organisers are certain that many new visitors will be attracted by the curiosity value of seeing the exhibition in its new home.

As usual in the exhibition hall itself there will be a tremendous amount of new equipment from and for the leading markets of the world. As far as home production is concerned the emphasis is still on the big new multi-player machines and many interesting variations of these will be on show for the first time. A major event of the year has been the amendment to the Betting and Gaming laws which came into force last November limiting payments in kind to five shillings (70¢). As expected, this clarification of the law resulted in a tremendous boost to sales bringing a new demand for equipment, particularly fruit machines, from cafes, snack bars and, last but not least, 'pubs.' Many leading manufacturers and distributors have completed deals with large brewery firms not only for fruit machines but for games of all kinds.

The temporary import tax brought in by the new Government is still with us, although reduced from 15% to 10%, and there is no sign of a further reduction. Despite the tax, United Kingdom imports of American amusement machines for the third quarter of 1965 were appreciably higher than in the same period a year earlier but the number of phonographs imported from the U.S. has fallen considerably. The Government credit squeeze has perhaps slowed down payments more than it has impeded business itself, thus hitting the supplier rather than the operator. Nevertheless, manufacturers with a good product have had a better year than ever before. The year has also seen the arrival of many new companies, not only manufacturers, but firms set up to construct and service the growing number of public play machines. As far as Britain's switch to decimal coinage is concerned there have been no new developments. Although the Labour Government, like the previous administration, appears to favour the change, it seems to be fairly low down on their list of priorities and unlikely to come about in the foreseeable future.

Still looking to the future, and coming back to the exhibition itself, an important decision has been reached concerning the timing of the show. The season for seaside arcades, which represents something like 50% of the business in this country, starts at Easter. With the fast growing popularity of the larger and more complex multi-slot machine, manufacturers find it increasingly difficult to give an early enough delivery date for equipment not ordered before the end of January. There has therefore been a growing demand for the date of the exhibition to be brought forward in order to allow a larger manufacturing time between the show and the onset of the following season. A questionnaire sent out by the A.T.E. organisers revealed that more than 75% of the exhibitors suggested that the ideal date for the show would be either the end of November or the beginning of December. In view of this, the Board felt they had no option but to comply with the views expressed. Consequently, the 23rd Amusement Trades Exhibition is to be held at the Alexandra Palace from 29th November to 1st December this year. This means, of course, two shows in 1966 but for the future there will be just one at the new end of year date.

In the meantime, as the curtain rises on the 22nd A.T.E., we extend our thanks to the Organising Committee and members of the Amusement Caterers Association and Amusement Trades Association and wish the venture every success. Once again **Cash Box** welcomes you to Stand A.1.a. where copies of this special issue will be available. Subsequent issues will carry editorial and pictorial coverage of the event.

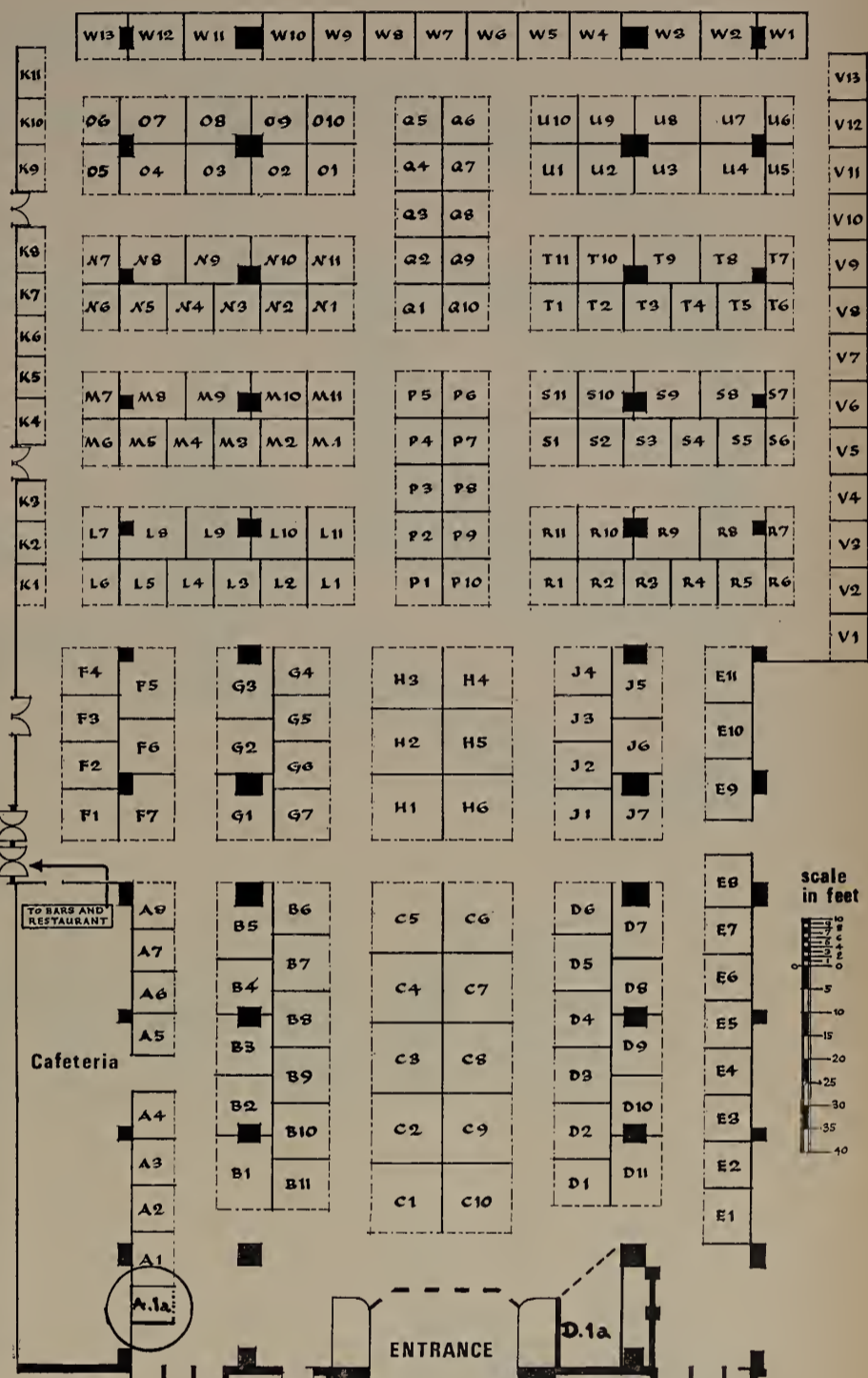

As sole U.K. importers, Ruffler & Walker will show the complete 1966 range of Rock-Ola machines highlighted by the Rockola "Starlet" 100 selection first introduced last year plus a complete range of ancilliary equipment, i.e., receiver units, remote wall selection boxes and a wide choice of additional speakers, etc. Ruffler & Walker will introduce their revolutionary new pintable "Bank-A-Ball-Goldie" which pays out gold awards. It is an ordinary Gottlieb pintable to which Ruffler & Walker have added the gold award feature and for various sequences the machine pays out gold awards from the back flash with a maximum win of ten gold awards for one game—value 6d each in kind giving a maximum value of five shillings. REGENT AUTOMATICS SUPPLY (STAND NO. B10)

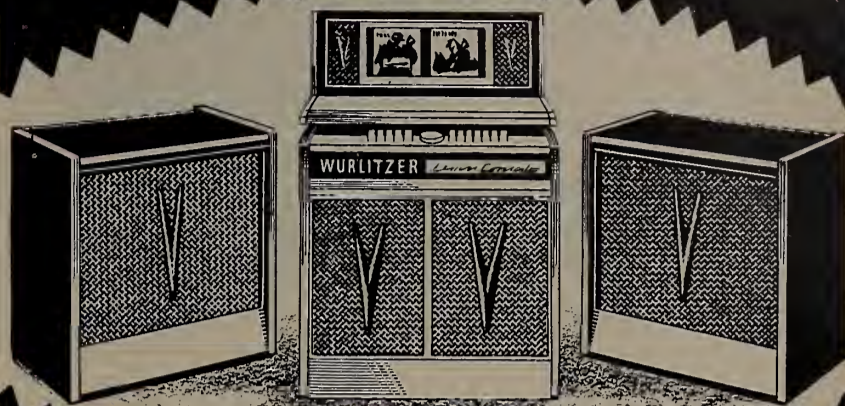

This is a large capacity heavy duty machine ideally suited for rapid counting of sort coins in quantity. It can be easily set to pre-determined quantities for batching, and has a re-settable batch counter and a total unit counter. In five minutes it will count £250 in six pences. As well as the "Majorcount", I.C.C. will show the "Intercount" (model V.1) portable coin counter. A simple, compact and durable machine capable of counting 1,500 sixpences per minute. Simple adjustment allows it to count any coin. Automatic stops are in multiples of five up to one hundred and a continuous count mechanism allows large quantities to be checked in bulk. 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Chain Reaction Keynotes Blue Ribbon Scoring



Bally BLUE RIBBON 4-Pl.

CHICAGO—"Chain reaction" scoring was claimed as a prime success factor in the popularity of Bally's new "Blue Ribbon" 4-player flipper game on test locations. Bill O'Donnell president of Bally Manufacturing, talked about the game at length.

"I didn't invent the 'chain reaction' description," O'Donnell said. "The label was put on 'Blue Ribbon' by a test operator to summarize scoring in which one skill shot sets up another goal for another skill shot.

"For example, the bottom left roll-over scores Special when lit. How is the Special rollover lit? By matching lit numbers 4-4 in Red and Yellow Ribbons on the playfield. How do you light up number 4 in the two Ribbons? All you have to do is hit one of two Red Targets or the Red Rollover and one of two Yellow Targets or the Yellow Rollover at the moment when number 4 is lit in the Sequence Panel also on the playfield.

"How is 4 lit in the Sequence Panel? Well, one number is 'spotted' in the panel before each ball is shot, and the light travels—1,2,3,4,1,2,3,4, etc.—every time any Target is hit or any top rollover is crossed.

"'Chain reaction' scoring also opens the Free-Ball Gate, when matching numbers 1-1, 2-2 or 3-3 are lit in Red and Yellow Ribbons. But the big job of 'chain reaction' scoring is to ring up bonus scores—300 for lighting all 4 numbers in Blue Ribbon, 200 if all numbers are lit in Red Ribbon, 100 for completely lighting either Yellow or Green Ribbon.

"Meanwhile, the Targets and Roll-overs, which are the fuzes which set off each 'chain reaction', score 20 every hit. In fact 'Blue Ribbon' offers 27 separate score-building objectives, not including match-score which, of course, is optional. This kind of slam-bang scoring is another reason why every location test points to 'Blue Ribbon' as a prize winning profit producer for operators."

Belam Exec Tours Far East

NEW YORK—Vic Haim, president of the R. H. Belam Co., prominent coin machine exporters in this country, is currently touring the major equipment buying centers in the Far East and has reported that the market there is expanding. Haim has stopped at Japan, Okinawa, the Philippines and other centers and will return Feb. 10th.

8-Ball Comes To Pinball With Williams 2-Pl.

CHICAGO — Williams Electronic Manufacturing Corporation's designers and engineering specialists have come up with the suspense-filled, actionful "8 Ball" game that is so very popular among pocket pool devotees in the new, competitive two-player flipper amusement game of the same name. Sam Stern, the genial president of Williams Electronic Manufacturing, spelled out the unique popularity of the "8 Ball" two-player when he stated last week that advance orders strongly indicate that this game is a must for most locations where amusement games get the most play.

He added that coin machine operators have been clamoring for just such an amusement machine for their locations. As a result, a considerable part of the production facilities at Williams Electronic have been earmarked for heavy action on "8 Ball". Shipping has been geared to meet the demand of the growing needs of the international markets.

C. B. (Bill) DeSelm, of the sales dept., explained to the Cash Box reporter that "8 Ball" flipper is adjustable by the operator for three or five ball play.

In playing and scoring the game of "8 Ball" flipper the players select either "solids" or "stripes" as in the original pocket billiard game. There is a "Horse Shoe" feature toward making the "8 Ball", and high score as well.

Furthermore, according to DeSelm, making the "8 Ball" awards the player an extra ball to play. The suspenseful action builds up in this newest Williams flipper amusement machine with suddenness and rapidity. There is also a "Number Match" feature in "8 Ball".

Cabinet features include: Highly polished stainless steel moulding and trim around the playfield area atop the cabinet; the Williams "Plastikote" finish on the playfield for greater durability; an automatic ball lift; and the standard three-way multiple coin chute.

Stern advised in conclusion that production will be kept at peak to assure best possible delivery to the markets in this country and overseas to amply supply the most operators at the quickest time.

New Coin Production Up

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Assistant Treasury Secretary Robert A. Wallace announced that on December 30, at ten in the morning, the Denver mint began striking new cupro-nickel half dollars.

Bearing the likeness of the late President John F. Kennedy, the design of the coin will be held for twenty-five years, subject to the decision of Congress.

Containing 40 per cent silver as compared to the old standard of 90 per cent, the new coin will have a "core" of 21 per cent silver. To be placed in circulation early this year, the Kennedy half dollars will bear a 1965 date, and will be shipped to Federal reserve banks to join the present supply of circulating half dollars.

III. Employment Service And MOA Board Work Toward Establishing Mechanic School

Copyright Royalty Proposal on Behalf of the Membership of the Music Operators of America, Inc.

S 114. Scope of exclusive rights in nondramatic musical work: Royalty payable with respect to phono-records used on coin-operated machines.

In the case of phonorecords of musical works, the exclusive right provided by clause 4 of Section 106(a) to perform such works by or upon coin-operated machines, shall be subject to the conditions specified in this Section.

(a) To be entitled to receive royalties under this Section, the copyright owner must be identified in the registration or other public records of the Copyright Office. To be entitled to permit musical works to be reproduced or rendered by or upon a coin-operated machine by means of phonorecords the operator of such a machine must (1) register at least once each year with the Copyright Office and such registration shall be evidenced by a certificate issued by the Copyright Office identifying him and each such machine, (2) affix an identifying certificate, or authorized copy thereof issued by the Copyright Office, to each such machine in a prominent place thereon for ready inspection. No such certificate shall be transferable or have any validity hereunder if used by any person other than the operator to whom it is issued. The failure by an operator to comply with the requirements of this paragraph renders the reproduction or rendition of musical works by or upon a coin-operated machine fully actionable as an act of infringement under Section 501.

(b) A royalty shall be payable by every operator of a coin-operated machine by or upon which a musical work is performed by means of a phonorecord in the amount of 2 cents for each musical work recorded on a phonorecord which is acquired by him for such purpose. No other royalty shall be payable in respect of the performance of a musical work by or upon a coin-operated machine by means of a phonorecord.

(c) Royalty payments shall be made quarterly in January, April, July and October, by the operator or his agent, and shall include all royalties for the 3 months next preceding. Each quarterly payment shall be accompanied by a statement of account certified by the operator or his agent as being correct.

(d) If the copyright owner or his agent does not receive the quarterly payment and statement of account when due, he may give written notice to the operator that, unless the default is remedied within 30 days from the date of the notice, the right to so reproduce or render the copyright owner's musical work by means of a phonorecord will automatically terminate. Such termination renders the reproduction or rendition by or upon a coin-operated machine of the copyright owner's musical work for which the royalty has not been paid fully actionable as an act of infringement under Section 501. A wilful failure or refusal by an operator to make, or cause to be made, the quarterly payment accompanied by the statement of account, when due, shall constitute an offense in violation of Section 506(a).

(e) "Operator" as used in this section means any person who, alone or jointly with others, owns or has the power to exercise primary control over one or more coin-operated machines by or upon which a musical work may be performed by means of a phonorecord.

"The organization is similar to a hospital," Rosen observed in a Cash Box interview last week, "similar in the respect that a hospital has many specialists on the staff, some on a full time basis, others on call for special tasks. gaining any location, big or small, through the help of visual and analytical presentations and a consulting representative accompanying an operator to the location if that be desired.

Financing—Rosen himself will personally handle operator requests for financial analysis with advice on how and where to gain funds the operator may need for expansion and development. Rosen's experience as director and organizer of the Globe Consumer Discount Corp. and the Escrow Corp. is well known to Philadelphia area operators and his help has always been in demand. 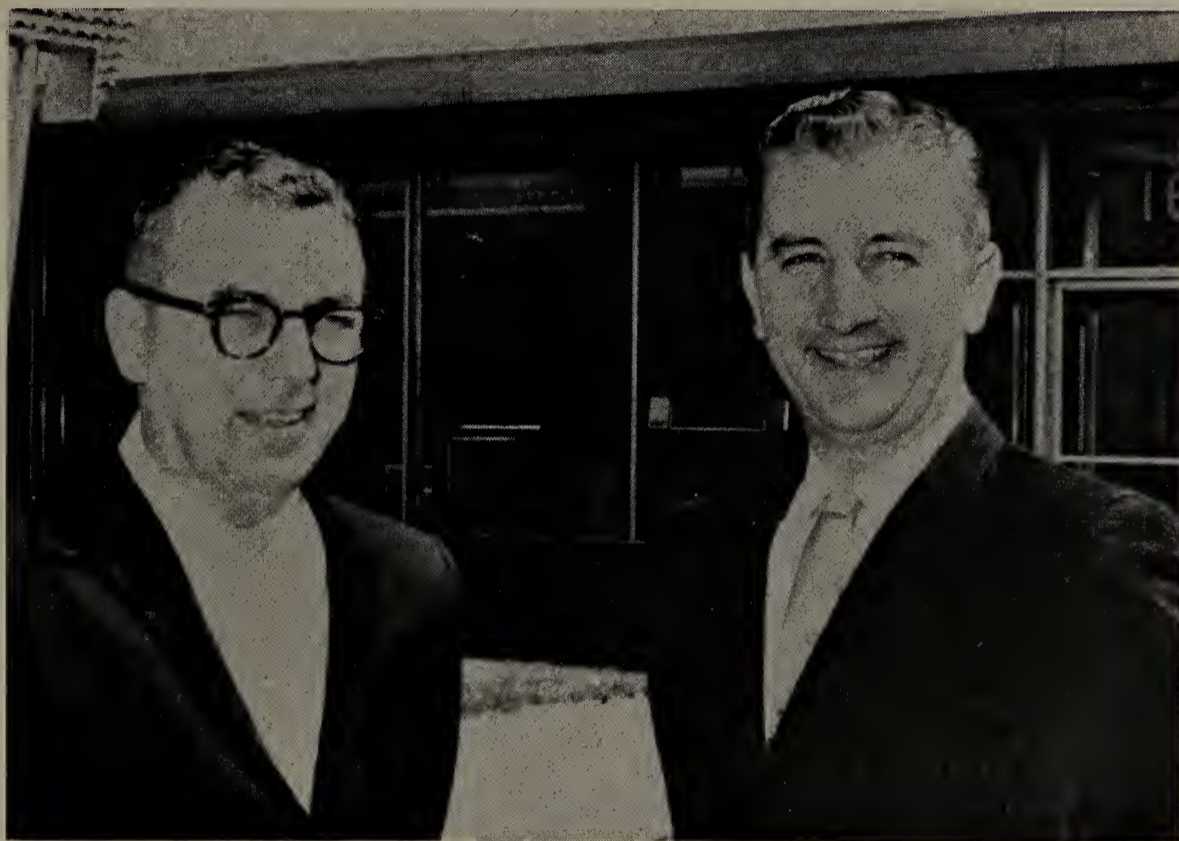

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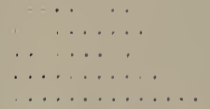

Meanwhile the mint has been stamping the 1966 date on pennies and nickels (it's safe to, now that more coins are in circulation). These announcements came from Assistant Treasury Secretary Robert A. Wallace. Busy as he is, there's another man in Washington even busier—Sen. John D. McClellan (D. Ark.) who is currently assigned to many committees, one of which is the Copyrights Subcommittee group. 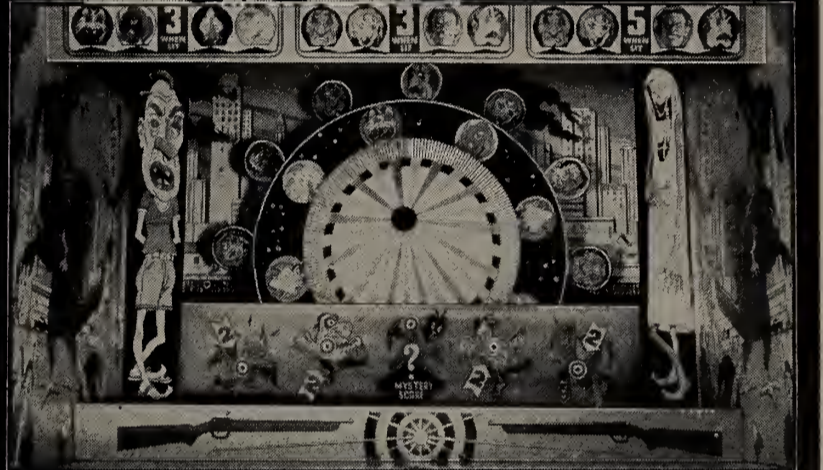

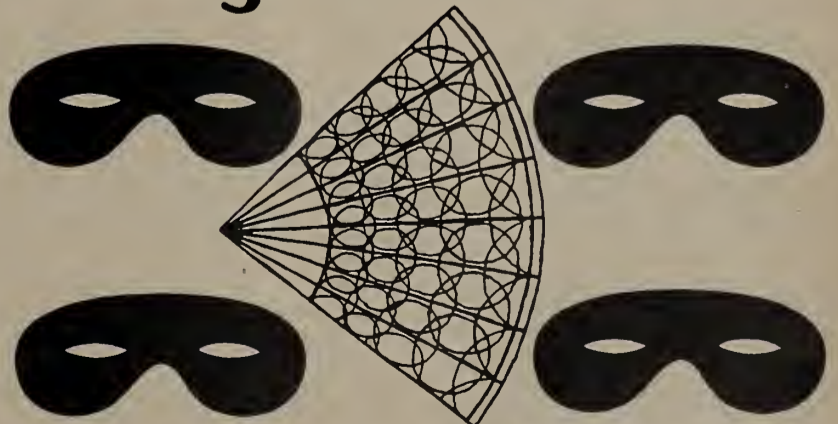

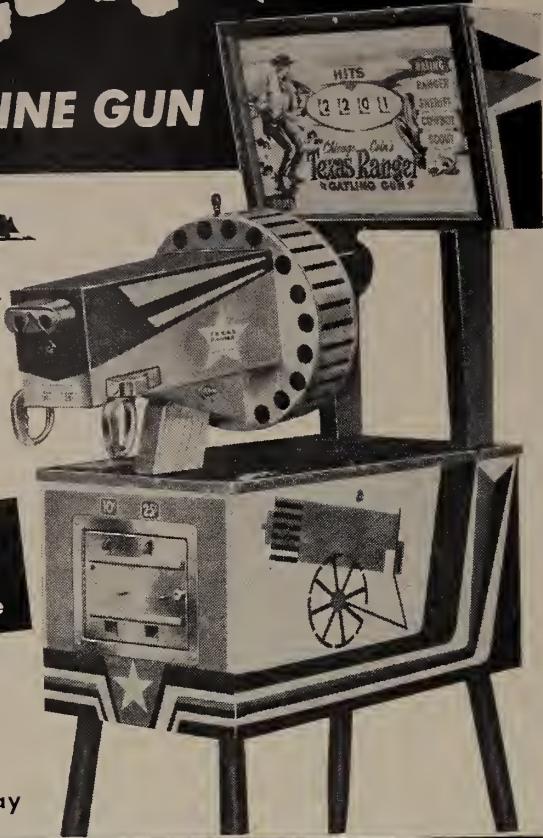

Seeburg Buys T. H. White, Cleveland Instrument Co.

CHICAGO, ILL.—The Seeburg Corporation has acquired all of the assets of The H. N. White Company, Inc., Cleveland band instrument manufacturer, it was announced today by Delbert W. Coleman, chairman of Seeburg, and Sidney M. Katz, president of Seeburg Musical Instruments, a division of Seeburg. Purchase was made for 120,000 shares of Seeburg common stock.

White has produced "King" and "Cleveland" band instruments for school bands and professional musicians since 1895. The 71-year-old company manufactures both brass and reed band and orchestra instruments, including trumpets, trombones, saxophones and others, as well as carrying cases and bags. It presently has under construction a new 125,000-square foot plant, which will double production capacity and enable the company to meet the increasing demand for its entire band instrument line.

"Seeburg gains further diversification in musical instrument products through its entry in the field of band instruments, one of the most significant factors in the music industry," Katz said. "Now the company can offer full lines of band instruments, pianos, organs, guitars, amplifiers, banjos, basses and cellos. White, one of the oldest and best known names in band instruments, will continue to be operated under the White name as part of the Seeburg Musical Instrument Division."

In September, 1965, Seeburg acquired Kay Musical Instrument Co., Elk Grove, Ill., a major manufacturer of guitars and other fretted and string instruments. Last week it was announced that Seeburg had acquired Gulbransen Company, Melrose Park, Ill., a leading maker of pianos and organs.

Seeburg is one of the largest manufacturers of coin-operated phonographs and vending machines, and has other divisions producing background music systems and hearing aids.

1965 Seeburg Report

CHICAGO—Sales of The Seeburg Corporation in the fiscal year ended October 31, 1965, were \$89,685,740, resulting in net income of \$642,743, equal to 26 cents per share on 2,472,530 shares outstanding. This compares with 1964 volume of \$82,268,523, and earnings of \$4,038,474, equal to \$1.72 per share on 2,348,050 shares outstanding.

Delbert W. Coleman, chairman, told stockholders that a large part of the decline in earnings was attributable to non-recurring expenses connected with the construction of a new principal plant in Chicago, but added that there were other contributing factors. "The move into the new plant," he said, "involving as it did the transfer of highly complicated automated production lines on which are manufactured the company's intricate quality-controlled equipment, proved an arduous and time-consuming task, one that was costly beyond expectations. Nor did the extraordinary expense cease when the operations of several old plants had been consolidated in the new facility and productivity finally restored to normal. Management found it necessary to write off certain obsolete unfinished inventories and write down certain finished goods. Also, in the course of the year, management conducted an intensive review of all corporate activities and was forced to conclude that some were less fruitful than anticipated. Accordingly, reserves were established to provide for the cost of terminating or correcting these activities."

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Coleman said that in many important aspects 1965 had been a rewarding year for Seeburg, a leading manufacturer of vending equipment, coin phonographs, musical instruments, background music systems, and hearing aids. "The company greatly expanded its operations in the musical instrument field by means of three acquisitions," he noted, "and the recent completion of the transfer to the

new plant has resulted in greatly increased production efficiency and capacity."

Sales continue to rise, Mr. Coleman said, and management anticipates "that profit margins will show improvement with each successive quarter and that the current year will be the most profitable in the company's history."

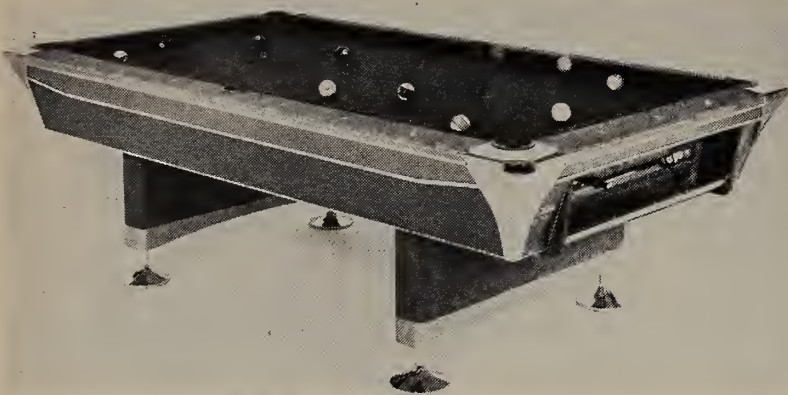

A New Drawer For Fischer's 'Empress'

TIPTON, MO.—Frank Schroeder, director of sales for Fischer Manufacturing Company, Inc., advised this past week that some very effective feature changes in Fischer's "Empress" line of coin-operated pocket billiard tables have been made in the factory because of a multitude of requests to do so by coin machine operators from all over the United States.

He said: "We have had many requests from operators asking for a new drawer for our 'Empress' line, with the very same features as the 'Regent' 91B table. Consequently, we have already gone into production on just such a drawer, and tables are presently being shipped to our distributors with this new drawer innovation."

He further explained that the new table (pictured here) is known as "Empress" model 101B, size 57 inches by 101 inches, and 92B, size 52 inches by 92 inches.

Schroeder stated that the trough has been greatly improved with metal, and a self-cleaning feature. It also has the 'lock-in' cue ball for greater location effect.

Schroeder added: "We have also modified our leg saddle on both the 'Empress' and 'Regent' models of coin-operated pocket billiard tables. The modified tables have steel reinforcements, plus bolts to secure the legs to the tables. These bolts are screwed in from the bottom, thus enabling the operator to remove them without removing the playfield.

"The innovated improvement will

keep the table far sturdier for years," he stated. "Furthermore, we have asked our distributors to display the table without the playfield to be able to more fully illustrate this improved innovation to the nation's operators."

Schroeder also issued a reminder to the coin machine operators that Fischer's new, smaller, precision weight cue ball, which at a diametric measure of 2 5/16 inches is 31/1000 smaller than competitive cue balls. It offers a far better strike objective to players. It actually is 31/1000 above center for much better play and skill, according to Schroeder.

CINCINNATI—L. T. Patterson, president of Patterson International Corporation announced "with deep regret" that William Byers, former sales manager for the firm, had passed away of a heart attack in December.

NAC Reports Year's Candy Sales; Names Eight Regional VPs

CHICAGO—The National Association of Concessionaires reported that candy sales for October 1965 came to an estimated \$153.1 million—five per cent below sales for the previous month and four per cent below sales for October of 1964, while poundage sales for the first ten months of 1965 rose by one per cent.

London Clean & Dry Show

Official Films, Inc., is a television program producer and syndicator, active in distribution of film series and feature films. Official will supply, on a regular basis, productions to be used in these machines.

The board of directors of Color-Sonics will consist of Louis C. Lerner, chairman of the board; Frank F. Oddi, vice president—operations of Victoria Investment Company, Ltd.; Howard B. Koerner, vice president—operations of Official Films; Herbert A. Finke, president of National Company and Stanley Green, Henry Schwartz and Saul Knazick, officers of Intersphere.

The officers of Color-Sonics are Louis C. Lerner, chairman of the board; Stanley Green, president; Henry Schwartz, executive vice president; Saul Knazick, vice president—marketing; Frank F. Oddi, vice president,—finance and planning.

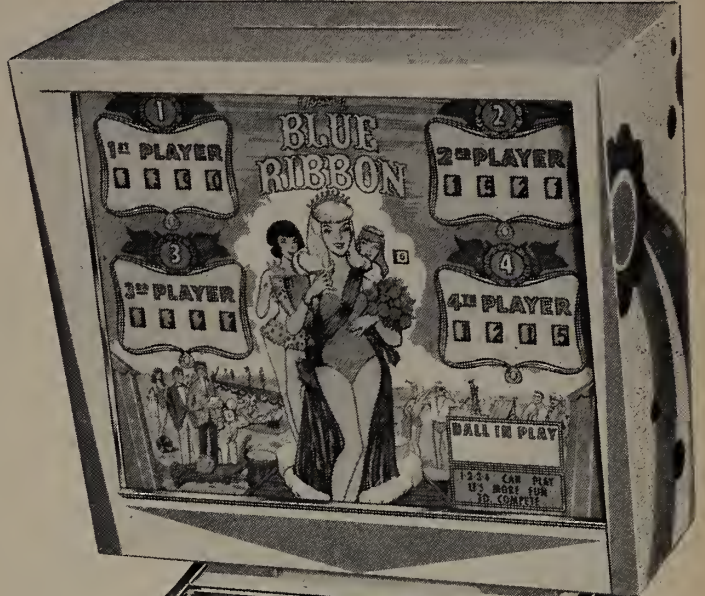

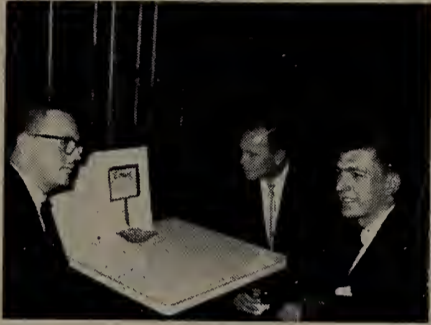
