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Threat To Exec Talent

Many of today's leading music industry executives began their careers on the local distrib scene. This phase of the business is a logical beginning merely on the basis of geography. For when a young man decides to make the music business his vocation, the local distrib represents in its city—particularly in towns that do not draw label headquarters—the strongest point of departure.

As the spawning ground for industry exec talent, however, the local distrib scene is being threatened, presenting a problem that could do great harm to the continued flow of personnel to the exec ranks of the record business. The threat has developed over a number of years, with contributing factors that include the growth of wholesalers, the demise of small operations and, more recently, the consolidation of distrib under a single corporate roof. These major transitions, it would seem, may tend to stifle the schooling of industry novices, since they usually limit the need for administrative personnel at local distrib set-ups.

Another area of concern involves the

possible loss of the record business' touch with local markets, with all their individuality and specific needs in merchandising, sales and promotion. Will the impersonal nature of "home-office" handling of these essential ingredients to record sales cancel-out the rapport that must exist between the manufacturer of a product like a recording and the market it attempts to serve?

The business of music—especially the merchandising of product—has taken on new challenges and vistas in recent years. Success here is almost totally dependent on a man's creative use of his experience. This experience is still the greatest tool—if imaginatively applied—at the command of the industry.

The growing conglomerate structure of the business is not to be denied, since the current economics of the business demand this course. The industry must take into account the toll in talent it may affect. Searching for alternatives in the schooling of future talent seems to be a critical problem of the here-and-now.

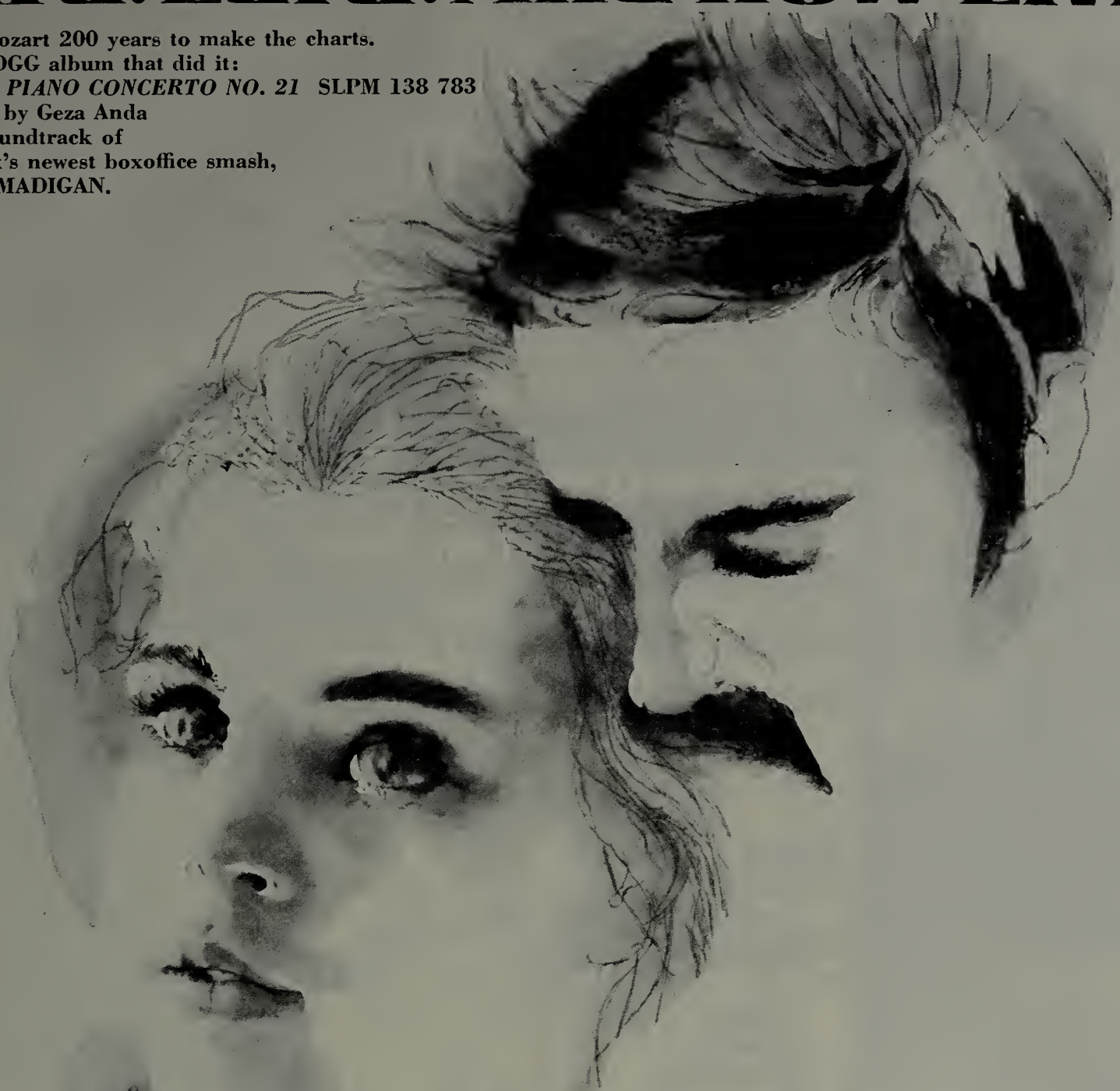

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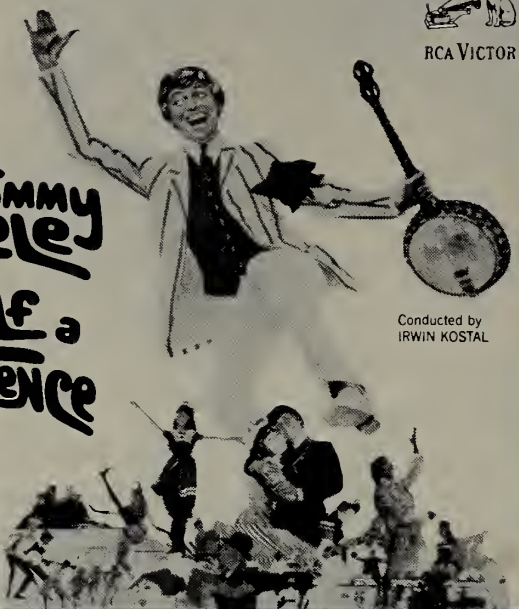

San Remo Fest Winner: 'Canzone Per Te'; See Fest Sticking Despite MIDEM Click

SAN REMO—"Canzone Per Te," a song in the romantic tradition, is this year's winning San Remo Song. It was presented at the festival (Feb. 1-3) by CBS artist Roberto Carlos, and Sergio Endrigo (Fonit-Cetra), also the writer of the song, which is published by Edizioni Usignolo, a division of Fonit-Cetra.

Second place winner was "Casa Blanca" (White House), a ballad with an Oriental feel, written by Aldo Caponi (Don Backy). Presented by Or-

nella Vanoni (Ariston) and Marisa Sannia, it is published by El & Chris. Third place winner is "Canzone," a folk-like Italian ballad, also penned by Aldo Caponi and performed by Adriano Celentano (Clan) and Milva (Ricordi). Publisher is Clan.

The MIDEM Factor

Many MIDEM participants, exhausted after the rigors of the week and unable to spare the time to attend both events, returned to their offices. Some however returned later in the week to San Remo while others equally exhausted spent a few days relaxing in the Mediterranean sunshine making a leisurely journey from Cannes to San Remo.

It must be admitted that after the high powered activity of the MIDEM, San Remo was something of an anticlimax. Attendance figures were also affected. While the hoteliers and restaurateurs of Cannes reported even

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Anti-Bogus Bill Offered In Calif.

NEW YORK—Legislation has been introduced before the California State Legislature that would make it a crime to counterfeit and pirate disks and tapes.

Introduced as an addition to the State Penal Code by Assemblyman Charles J. Conrad, with 15 other Assemblymen listed as co-sponsors, the bill (Assembly Bill No. 83) makes liable for prosecution under a misdemeanor charge those who pirate or counterfeit records or tapes as well as those who sell them. The bill is closely patterned after the law that was enacted by New York State in 1966.

Henry Brief, executive director of the Record Industry Association of America, voiced the hope that the passage of such legislation in California would contribute effectively toward the elimination of counterfeiting and piracy of records and tapes which syphons off millions of dollars from record companies, artists, publishers, composers and musicians.

Groop To J/G

PHILADELPHIA—The Groop, top Australian vocal/instrumental team, will appear in the U.S. on the Jamie/Guyden label. Larry Cohen, head of sales promotion, said the first side J/G will release will be the act's current Aussie hit, "Woman You're Breaking Me," due for release this week (16). Cohen said the acquisition of the team, which cuts for CBS in Australia, is part of the label's newly implemented drive to obtain strong masters and indie producing talent. The Groop appeared on Cash Box' International Section cover last week.

Jack Gold Named Columbia A&R VP

NEW YORK—Jack Gold has been promoted to vice president of A&R at Columbia Records. This post was previously held by Bill Gallagher, who is now a vp at MCA.

Clive Davis, president of CBS Records, parent company, said that Gold will plan and direct the pop, country music and classical A&R activities for Columbia, reporting directly to him.

Since joining Columbia Records in Dec., 1966, as executive producer of west coast A&R, Gold has produced a number of hit singles and albums by Barbara Streisand, Jim Nabors, Ray Conniff, Percy Faith and Patti Page.

Gold is credited with strengthening and realigning the west coast A&R operation and bringing to the company Jerry Fuller who produces the hit group the Union Gap.

Gold has achieved success as a writer, producer and publisher during his fifteen years of experience in the music industry. Prior to joining Co-

Cue From LP's: Labels To Stereo Singles

NEW YORK—The industry shift to stereo-only product on the LP level is also making headway in the singles area.

The stereo single, which started off as a method of catering to stereo juke boxes and, more recently, to FM stations that program in stereo, is on the brink of widespread exposure to consumers. Two labels have already reported a switch to stereo singles releases. Elektra plans to use the now familiar Howard Holzer process to produce "compatible" inventory in both singles and albums. Buddah Records, which claims to have devised a "compatible" system of its own, is converting to stereo-only, beginning this policy with the new Lemon Pipers single due this week. It's the contention of Neil Bogart, head of Buddah,

a division of the Kama-Sutra operation, that the entire industry will go stereo, with minor exceptions, in six months.

Atlantic Records, first of the labels to announce the adoption of the Holzer process, is expected to produce singles in the process once it begins production of product under the new system.

Objections Raised

Some industry corners have raised objections to a release of stereo-only singles on the basis that reproduction of these dates would not be up to par when broadcast over AM radio stations that do not possess stereo phono facilities. However, the development of a truly "compatible" disk—an achievement claimed by Holzer and Buddah—would resolve the AM programming issue.

Contemporary Acts Top Grammy Nominees; RCA Heads Categories With 65 Choices

NEW YORK—Nominations for the 10th annual presentation of Grammy awards by NARAS, the disk awards society, have reached the final stage. Final nominees in 48 categories will compete for Grammys at NARAS dinners in New York, Hollywood, Chicago and Nashville on Thursday, Feb. 29.

In the race for label recognition, RCA and its affiliated labels, Camden and Colgems, have received 65 nominations, running far ahead of the second-place label, Capitol (and Angel), with 38 nominations. CBS' Columbia and Epic labels are third with 33 nominations, followed by Warners-7 Arts (& Reprise) and Liberty (Soul City, Blue Note and Pacific Jazz) with 20, MGM/Verve (and DGG) with 16, and Atlantic/Atco (and Stax & Dial) with 15. Other multiple nominees include A&M, London (& Deram), ABC (& 20th Century Fox), Dot (& Dynovoice), Mercury (Philips & Fontana), Scepter, Bell, UA, Soul, Elektra, Buena Vista, Monument, Decca (& Brunswick). Single nominees are Cadet, Everest, Vanguard, Caedmon, Spoken Arts, Canaan.

Leading Acts

Singers Bobbie Gentry, Glen Campbell, Vikki Carr and Aretha Franklin, two vocal groups, the 5th Dimension and the Association, and composer-arranger Burt Bacharach appear most often in the 48-category listing, along with such veterans as The Beatles,

Grammy 'Best' TV'er

There'll be another "Best on Record" TV show this year, representing those performers who earn Grammy awards from NARAS the night of Feb. 29. Show will be telecast on May 9, with many of the winners making appearances. Timex will sponsor the show.

Frank Sinatra, Leonard Bernstein, Ed Ames, Ray Charles, and Petula Clark.

On the basis of the first round of balloting by the Academy's membership, consisting of more than 2,000 of the recording field's creative contributors, Bobbie Gentry with her famed "Ode to Billie Joe" has garnered seven performance nominations, including one each for Record and Album of the Year, and has been cited as composer in the Song of the Year category. Her record has also been

picked for possible arranging and engineering Grammys.

The 5th Dimension and Glen Campbell have come up with six performance nods apiece, the former for their "Up, Up and Away," the latter for two songs, "By the Time I Get to Phoenix" and "Gentle On My Mind." Miss Franklin's nominations are also split between two songs, "Respect" and "A Natural Woman;" Miss Carr's has been cited for her album of "It Must Be Him," while Bacharach's double threat covers both his "Casino Royale" score and his arrangement of "Alfie."

The four Beatles performance nominations are for their "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" album, which could also win Grammys for their arranger, engineer and art director. Among Sinatra's three performance nods are one for Record of the Year (with daughter Nancy on "Somethin' Stupid") and one for Album of the Year for his "Francis Albert Sinatra/Antonio Carlos Jobim" offering.

Bernstein Heads Classics

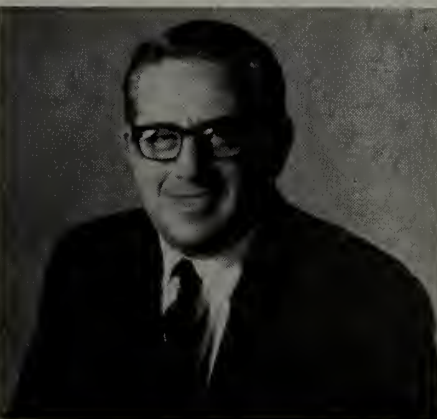
Bernstein shines in the classical division with a total of five conducting nominations for three different recordings spread over four categories, including two for Classical Album of the Year. Three works by composer Gustav Mahler, two conducted by Bernstein and one by Georg Solti, also highlight the classical section, which again spots such familiar names as Vladimir Horowitz, Leontyne Price, Artur Schnabel and Leopold Stokowski.

More Pop Awards

Back in the popular categories, Ed Ames has been picked as a possible Grammy winner in both Record and Album of the Year categories for his "My Cup Runneth Over" and figures as well in the Best Male Vocal Performance division.

Voting continues this week when the Record Academy's active members receive their final ballots, which must be returned to the independent accounting firm of Haskins and Sells by February 19.

The opening business session, inaugurating the business portion of the confab on Monday (18), will close with the President's Panel, which will follow the keynote address of Norman Racusin, vp and general manager of RCA Records, and a talk by Stanley Foster Reed on business mergers.

Acting as moderator for the panel will be Bill Gallagher, vice president

of Music Corporation of America (MCA). Participating on the President's Panel are Al Bennett of Liberty Records; Clive Davis of Columbia Records; Berry Gordy, Jr. of the Motown Records; Irving Green of the Mercury Records; Cy Leslie of Pickwick International; Alan Livingston of Capitol Records; Mike Maitland of Warner Brothers/Seven Arts; Larry Newton of ABC Records; Norman Racusin of RCA; and D. H. Toller-Bond of London Records.

It is expected that much of the discussion will center on the next ten years, rather than looking back at the past ten years. This is in line with the subject of Racusin's Keynote Address and the general convention theme "NARM's Golden Decade, Volume II."

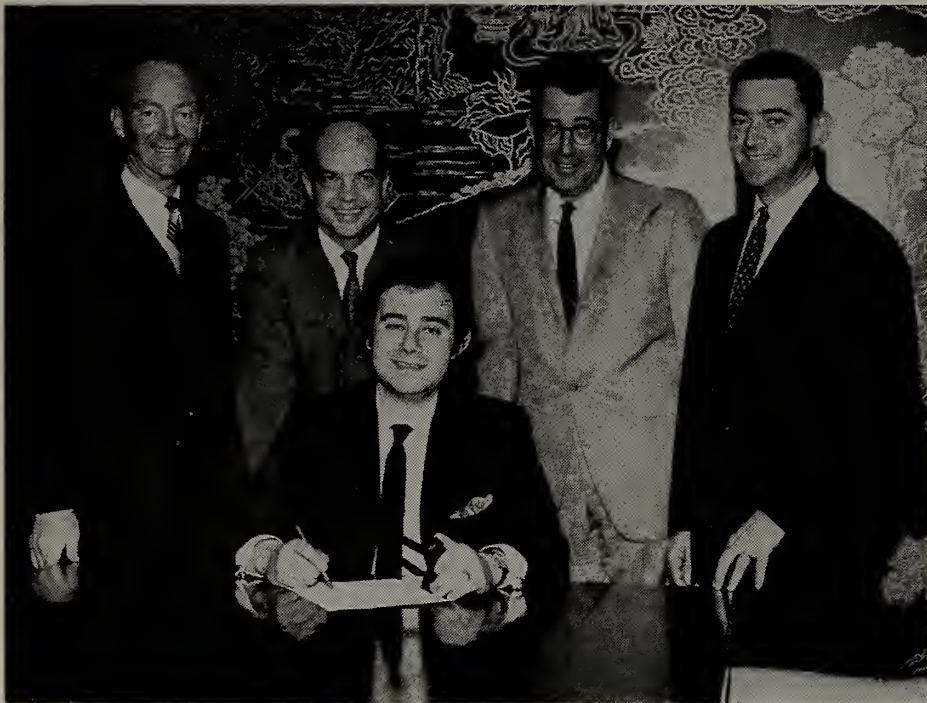
Hendrix Fails To Stop Sale Of Capitol Disks

NEW YORK—U.S. District Court Judge Charles M. Metzner ruled this week against Jimi Hendrix in the singer-guitarist's attempt to have Capitol Records, Inc., temporarily enjoined from manufacturing or selling the recordings released by Capitol in the album entitled "Get That Feeling."

Hendrix and a production company, Yameta Co. Ltd., brought suit last month in U.S. District Court, Southern District of N.Y. seeking a preliminary injunction restraining Capitol from selling or distributing any Hendrix recordings. Judge Metzner declined to issue such a ruling, but did issue a temporary injunction pro-

hibiting Capitol from further sale of "Get That Feeling" in the album jacket originally used. The original jacket was, in the judge's opinion, possibly confusing to the public.

Commenting on Judge Metzner's ruling, Voyle Gilmore, Capitol vice president for A&R and creative services, stated: "naturally we're pleased that we shall be able to continue to sell what we feel to be very fine recordings including the talents of a great musician, Jimi Hendrix. We are now in the process of designing a new album cover that will satisfy the requirements of Judge Metzner's opinion."



PARA PACT FOR SCHIFRIN—Composer-conductor Lalo Schifrin has signed a long term multi-faceted contract with Paramount Pictures Corp.

According to Arnold Burk VP in charge of music operations the package deal includes an exclusive recording contract with Dot Records and Paramount's publishing firms, in addition to a non-exclusive pact for the scoring of at least one motion picture per year.

Dick Peirce, vp and general manager of Dot, revealed that Schifrin would provide the company with a minimum of two albums yearly. He lauded Schifrin's popularity as an artist based on two best-selling LP's—"Mission:Impossible" and the original sound track of Warner's "Cool Hand Luke," an Oscar contender for Schifrin in the category of best original score for a motion picture.

William R. Stinson, executive vice-president and general manager of Paramount Pictures Music Publishing Companies called Schifrin "one of the most excitingly versatile talents in our dynamic industry."

The composer, a two time Grammy winner and two time Emmy nominee was signed last week by Martin Ritt and Kirk Douglas to score "The Brotherhood," a Paramount release starring Douglas. The assignment however is separate from his new deal with Paramount Pictures. It will be the sixteenth Hollywood Motion Picture score for the Argentine born composer since moving to Hollywood in 1964; others include "The Cincinnati Kid," "The Fox" and "The President's Analyst" for Paramount.

He has also scored many television shows and specials in addition to "Mission: Impossible," including a number of Wolper Productions. His most recent television score is for "The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich," a series of three hour long Wolper specials beaming on ABC-TV March 6th, 8th and 9th.

He wrote "Jazz Suite on the Mass Text," which RCA-Victor commissioned him to compose after the Ecumenical Council decreed the Catholic Mass did not have to be celebrated in Latin. Schifrin combines jazz with Gregorian chants and 20th Century techniques.

Schifrin began his musical studies at an early age in his native Argentina. His father, now retired, was Concert Master of the Buenos Aires Philharmonic for 30 years. When he was 16, Schifrin discovered American jazz and was fascinated by it. At 17, he became a student of composition under Juan Carlos Paz, one of the leading composers of contemporary music in South America, and through him learned the serial techniques of music. He later went to the Paris Conservatory of Music on scholarship.

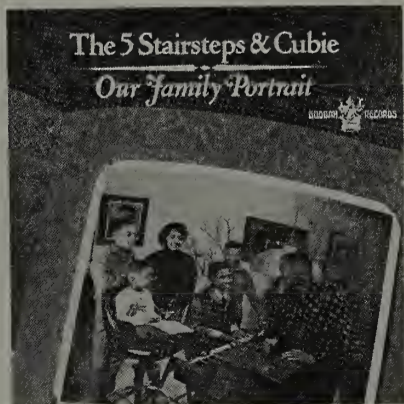

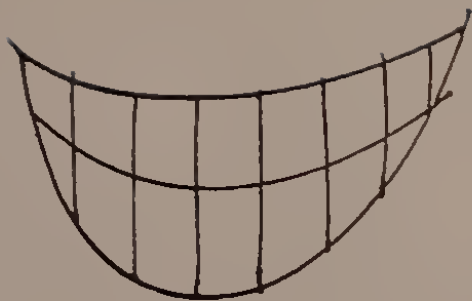

Nicholaw stated: "The communications industry needs a closer liason with the students who plan to pursue careers in the communication media. KNX Radio, as the leading news station in Los Angeles, can contribute a great public service to these students by establishing a program that will dispel misconceptions about the communications industry, provide them with the latest information about the standards and modes of operation of the news media, and make them aware of available career opportunities." The all-day news seminars will feature leading southland authorities plus KNX and CBS News personnel. A special guest speaker from the CBS Network will deliver an address to the entire group of students. Place, time, and date of the first news seminar will be announced shortly.

Al Michel, general manager of WOPA, metropolitan Chicago's only full-time ethnic radio station, and Esmont Sonderling, president of The Sonderling Broadcasting Corporation, have announced the acquisition of its first TV outlet, WLKY-Channel 32-Louisville. The approval of the Federal Communications Commission was received in December, and control was passed to the Sonderling Group on January 16. Sonderling announced that the purchase price for the TV station was \$6,800,000, which is reputed to be the highest price ever paid for a UHF station. WLKY is the ABC affiliate in Louisville. At the same time, Sonderling announced that an agreement in principle had been reached for the acquisition of Michael John Associates and its affiliate companies, with offices at 41 East 42nd Street, New York City. The Michael John organization specializes in Corporate Group Communications, with emphasis in Industrial Education, numbering among its clients American Airlines, Indian Head Mills, IBM Corporation, P. Lorillard Company, J. P. Stevens & Co., Spring Mills, etc. Michael G. St. John, founder and president of Michael John Associates, will continue as operating head of the planned, new SBC subsidiary and will become a member of the board of directors of the parent corporation. The acquisition is subject to the execution and consummation of a final agreement. "In bringing these companies under our Corporate umbrella," Sonderling noted, "we are keeping with our announced accelerated pace of diversification." Further, Sonderling stated, "We are currently considering and /or are in negotiations with other interests."

Joseph L. Jones, an employee of KLAC-Los Angeles has negotiated the sale of an original feature-length screenplay to film producer Herberth Kauffman. The suspense drama, entitled, "That Dark Thing In The Alley," tentatively is scheduled to be filmed in London sometime this fall or in the early months of 1969. Jones has been employed in the KLAC mail-room for the past two years and will shortly be transferred to the KLAC publicity department. The move is one of expansion, designed to strengthen the department, it was announced by Boh Harris, KLAC ad and promotion manager.

WRKO-Boston recently embarked on a "Time Marches On" promotion. Every hour, from 7:07 A.M. through 11:07 P.M., the WRKO deejays asked a listener to name a year from 1900 through 1967, then he played a produced historical vignette. If the year of the historical happening matched the year the listener named, he won \$500 in WRKO cash. Four lucky winners carted off the \$500 prize from WRKO. The first winner Mrs. Jeanette Trionfi of Revere, chose 1961 because it was the year her daughter was born. Ironically, this was the very same reason the next winner, Mrs. Loretta Walsh of Chestnut Hill used in choosing 1959. Her child's birth brought Mrs. Walsh, a policeman's wife, a \$500 check from WRKO. Two young people, Danny Ryan and Carmen Cavello rounded out the quartet of "Time Marches On" winners in Boston.

WNEW-New York has just concluded an attractive contest with five Coral Electric Sitar as the prizes. WNEW general manager George Duncan commented that "each Coral Sitar is valued at \$300; and it can easily be played by anyone who can play an electric guitar." Launched on January 27, the WNEW contest ran through February 11. Winners will be announced February 19.

NEW YORK—Having played a part in the success of other artists as a writer, Graham Gouldman is now recording in his own right for RCA Victor Records.

The young (22) English talent, writer of hits for Herman's Hermits ("Listen People"), the Yardbirds ("For Your Love"), the Hollies

("Look Through Any Window") and "Behind the Door" (Sonny & Cher), debuts on the label with single, "The Impossible Years" (not connected with the Broadway comedy), and an LP due in April. In an interesting switch, Peter Noone of the Hermits

is a co-producer of the singles session, both sides of which (flip is another Gouldman hit by the Hermits, "No Milk Today") he penned. The LP will have one side devoted to his established repertory, while the second side will feature Gouldman material that has never been cut.

Never a solo performer before, Gouldman has performed with many English groups, none of which achieved important recognition. The artist-writer, however, makes demos of his new songs. One of them was overheard by an RCA exec during a conference with Gouldman's American rep, Steve Weiss. Weiss also runs Gouldman's American publishing operation Man-Ken Music, an affiliate of his England-based New Songs Music.

The son of an English playwright, Gouldman began his career as a guitarist with small groups at the age of 15. His first song was "Listen People," penned four years before the Hermits brought it fame.

Gouldman is spending three weeks in the U.S. promoting his RCA affiliation. The label has world-wide rights to his diskings.

SMOKEY ROBINSON & THE MIRACLES' GREATEST HITS—VOL. 2—Tamla 280

Smokey Robinson and the Miracles should have no difficulty climbing the charts with this powerhouse album. The set contains a host of soul-filled ballads and finger-snappers that have conquered the singles charts for the group ("Going To A Go Go," "The Tracks Of My Tears," "I Second That Emotion" and "The Love I Saw In You Was Just A Mirage," to name a few). An insured winner, this one should be seeing action in a couple of weeks, if not sooner.



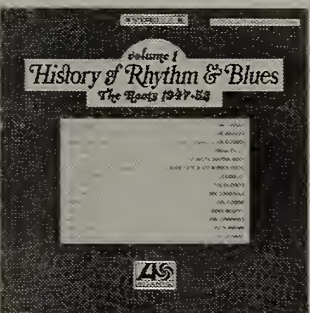
THE DELTA SWEETE—Bobbie Gentry—Capitol T/ST 2842

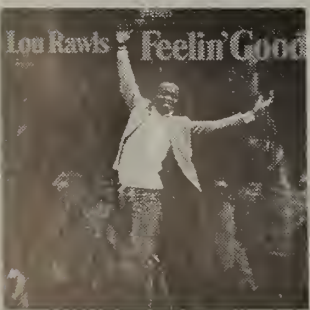
HISTORY OF RHYTHM & BLUES—Various Artists—Atlantic (SD) 8161, 8162, 8163, 8164

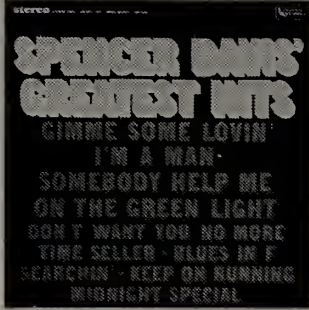
THIS IS AL MARTINO—Capitol T/ST 2843

Teeing off with a groovy, rhythmic reading of the Box Tops' recent smash, "The Letter," Capitol's famed pop-Blues chanter Lou Rawls offers a set that's bound to see lots of action for him. Rawls' style combines soul with sophistication in a highly successful and inimitable manner, and his popularity, as has already been proven, is not of the short-lived variety.



SPENCER DAVIS' GREATEST HITS—Spencer Davis Group—United Artists UAL 3641/UAS 6641

Here's a collection of the biggest singles by the Spencer Davis Group. Included are such hits as: "Gimme Some Lovin'," "I'm A Man," "Somebody Help Me," and "Keep On Running." There's plenty of the strong beat sound that the group is so well known for, so this LP is a front running candidate for powerful rock sales.



SUNSHINE DAYS—Sandler & Young—Capitol T/ST 2854

Should be plenty of spins and sales in the cards for Tony Sandler and Ralph Young via their latest album effort. Standard artists on the programming lists of most middle-of-the-road stations, they fare extremely well in the record shops, too. Their smooth voices, backed by lush orkings, drift soothingly through the air and relax the listener. Listen.



INEZ & CHARLIE FOXX' GREATEST HITS—Dynamo DM 7002/DS 8002

Inez & Charlie Foxx are one of the most popular soul duos in the world, and their album showcases them in some of their most successful efforts. The rousing "Mockin' Bird," a chart item for the brother and sister act, starts things off, and there isn't a let up, except for the spaces between the tracks, until the end of the set. "Count The Days," also a chart entry for Inez & Charlie, is another highlight of this package. Should do well.



ULTIMATE SPINACH—MGM E/SE 4518

Ultimate Spinach is one of the most important of the new Boston groups. The group offers infectious, but not hard, rock. Instrumentation often sounds psychedelic, but it never gets as wild as that of the Coast groups. Lyrics are freaky and fantastic. The group's first album stands a good chance of establishing the Spinach as a nationally popular act.



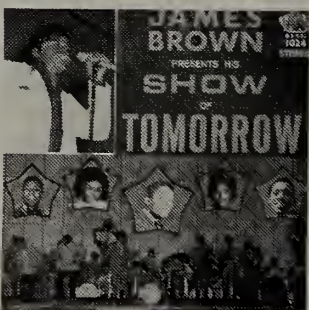
HEAVY—Iron Butterfly—Atco 33227/SD 33227

Already beginning to climb the charts with this album, the new rock group known as the Iron Butterfly stands an excellent chance of building up a country-wide following. On this set, James lends his inimitable talents to "That's Life" and "Please, Please, Please." The other performers also sing two songs each.

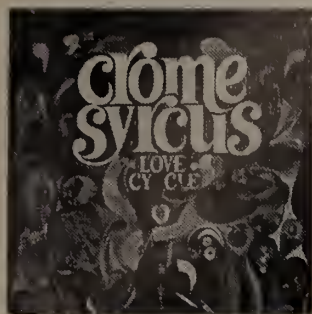

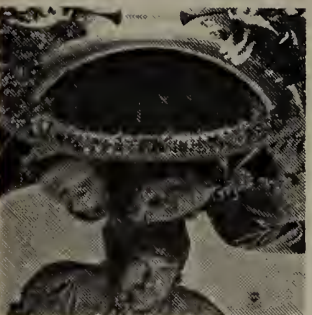
THE HASSLES—United Artists UAS 3631/6631

UA is currently readying a big push on the Hassles; understandably so, for the group has a quite marketable rock sound, particularly in the instrumental department. This LP is full of the hard-driving, thumping music that is the life-blood of the discotheque (the first track is an instrumental that would have almost any rock dance fan on his feet in two seconds). Another track to note is "Every Step I Take—Every Move I Make," which is the Hassles' new single.



THE SPLIT LEVEL—Dot DLP 3836/25836

The Split Level is a new group (three guys and a girl) with a sound that could appeal to a wide cross section of the disk market, gleaned spins and sales from both pop and middle-of-the-road areas. The group performs finger-snapping rock items and pleasant choral ballads with equal skill. Dot has a lot of faith in the group and is backing this faith up with a lot of bread. So watch for action.



EDEN'S CHILDREN—ABC/ABCS 624

Fanciful lyrics and funky rock sound characterize this album by ABC's new group, Eden's Children. Group member Richard (Sham) Shamach-penned all the selections on the set, and the group performs them with energy. ABC plans to promote Eden's Children heavily, and that, coupled with the group's own talent, could tee off a success story.

Jazz Picks



JACKPOT—Dave Brubeck—Columbia CL 2712/CS 9512

Recorded live in Las Vegas, this Jazz 'Jackpot' is sparked by the incisive piano of Dave Brubeck against Paul Desmond's alto sax, Joe Morello's drums, and Eugene Wright's bass. High card of this album is "Ace In The Hole," followed by "Out Of Nowhere" and "Win A Few, Lose A Few." Should be plenty of jazz spins and sales in store for this one.



UP POPS RAMSEY LEWIS—Cadet LP/LPS 799

Ramsey Lewis and his trio (other members are Cleveland Eaton on bass and Maurice White on drums) are backed up on this set by an orchestra conducted by Richard Evans. Their treatments of such well known tunes as "Soul Man," "Respect," "Goin' Out Of My Head," and "Alfie" are exceptionally tight. A wide pop split should add considerable sales to this delightful jazz LP.

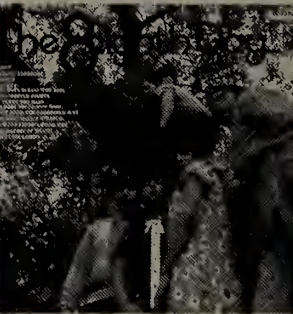
DANCES OF DOWLAND—Julian Bream—RCA Victor LM/LSC 2987

Julian Bream is certainly the most widely known lutenist of our time. His artistry as master of the lute is a recognized fact throughout most of the world and, to that, this package offers wax testimony. Dowland's lute music was written 3 centuries ago and is enhanced by a simplicity that marks his tunes as timeless. Bream's interpretation is warm yet reserved; precise yet gentle. A delightful album.



INSTANT HAPPY—Don Ho—Reprise R/RS 6283

Don Ho often sings about his native Hawaii, but ukeles and steel guitars are conspicuously absent from his performances, and his style is more American middle-of-the-road than Hawaiian. A skillful entertainer who can quickly establish a solid rapport with an audience, Ho packs them in wherever he appears. His disk following is also considerable. On his new album, he offers ten selections; "White Silver Sands" and "Kamehameha-Home Sweet Home" are two of the more evocative titles.



ON/THE EIGHTH DAY—Kapp KL 1554/KS 3554

The seven members of the Eighth Day (five guys and two girls) make infectious rock music, and their new venture could start them off on the road to success. The set has a clean sound, both instrumentally and vocally, and the slow numbers, as well as the toe-tappers, have appeal. With the proper exposure and promotion, this package could break out. Keep it in sight.



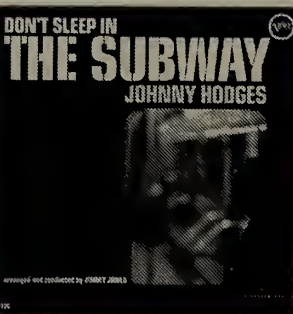
A BREATH OF FRESH AIR—Marlene VerPlanck—Mounted M/MS 108

Marlene VerPlanck, known in the advertising world for her Winston Cigarettes and Rinso Soap commercials, is making a bid for fame as a pop-good music songstress with this album. A winning performer, her voice is, as the title of the LP indicates, like "A Breath Of Fresh Air." She radiates an atmosphere of gentleness and delicacy that could win her many fans. Keep an eye on this set. It could do quite well.



HERE'S TO YOU—Hamilton Camp—Warner Bros.—7 Arts W/WS 1737

Known outside of folk music circles primarily as Andrew the janitor on the "He & She" TV'er, Hamilton Camp, with this LP, emerges as a voice to be reckoned with on the pop scene. The set is a delightful example of the better elements of folk blended into a striking contemporary setting. "Seven Circles" and "Here's To You" are highlights. Musicians on the date include Dick Rosmini and Van Dyke Parks. Watch for this one to cause a stir in the marketplace.



DON'T SLEEP IN THE SUBWAY—Johnny Hodges—Verve V/V6 8726

The title track and "Wisteria" are highlights of this mostly smooth, gentle jazz venture. Hodges' inventive sax sets the pace throughout the set. It's a fun-filled package that should delight many a jazzophile, thus achieving good sales figures and a good shot at the charts.



THE HONEYSUCKLE BREEZE—Tom Scott & California Dreamers—Impulse A/AS 9163

Here's a delightful jazz package featuring strong choral backgrounds arranged (for the most part) by Ian Freebairn-Smith. Scott's sax is a standout on the title track, as is Lincoln Mayorga's piano on Joan Baez' "North." Other outstanding tracks include Donovan's "Mellow Yellow" the Association's "Never My Love," and the Beatles' "She's Leaving Home." Smooth and easy going, this beautiful set will doubtless realize plenty of good-music action in addition to swinging a lot of jazz play.



P.D.Q. BACH ON THE AIR—Professor Peter Schickele—Vanguard VRS 9268/VSD 79268

"Professor" Peter Schickele has greatly amused the classical music world with the compositions which he attributes to P.D.Q. Bach (1807-1942?). Schickele himself writes the pieces, which are spoofs on serious music. On this LP, done in a radio show format, Schickele presents P.D.Q. Bach's "Echo Sonata For Two Unfriendly Groups Of Unfriendly Instruments" and other works. MERCURY'S NEW LOGOS—Mercury Records' family of labels has instituted logo changes in a move designed both to strengthen the corporate image and to stay abreast with the progressive nature of the corporation.

New logos have been designed for Mercury, Smash, Limelight, Wing and Emarcy. The Philips and Fontana designs will remain the same at this time, although discussions have been undertaken with executives at Philips Phonographic Industries in Baarn, Holland.

The Mercury logo has undergone its first change in 12 years and now will be coupled with the Smash, Lightlight Wing and Emarcy symbols. "This move further solidifies the connection each label has with Mercury," explained Jim Ladwig the corporation's director of art and advertising.

Ladwig noted that the change in the Mercury logo is a natural outgrowth of its original form because of the strange identity the label has enjoyed over its 23-year history. The word "records" has been dropped from the design because of the company's wide involvement in other fields, including home entertainment products and productions. The new logo will thus be used for all Mercury product references.

Handleman Stockholders Approve 2-For-1 Split

NEW YORK—Stockholders attending a special meeting in Detroit for the Handleman Company have approved proposal for a 2-for-1 split in the company's common and Class-B common stock.

Currently, the company has 1,561,065 shares of stock outstanding. When the split becomes payable (Feb. 21) to

stockholders of record as of Feb. 6, the outstanding shares will number 3,122,130.

Handleman Co., Detroit based independent wholesale merchandiser of phonograph records and a wholesale merchandiser of drugs, pharmaceuticals as well as operator of a 17-unit chain of discount retail outlets in Canada, recently approved a 20% increase in dividends to 30 cents per share quarterly. This rate will become 15 cents a share after the split.

Paul Mauriat



Conductor-arranger Paul Mauriat actually started in music at the age of four. His father was a musician, descended from generations of professional classical musicians. He lived in the provinces of France. When Paul was 10, the family resided in Paris. At 14, he had completed his studies at the Conservatoire. He first wished to become a classical pianist. Soon, however, he discovered the improvisational world of jazz. He liked the lighter music. By the time he was 17, Paul had formed his own orchestra, touring the cabarets and concert halls of France and the Continent. After several years of French touring, he came to Paris to face the challenges that city provided. A producer arranged a recording session for him, and he was on his way, arranging and conducting for artists such as Charles Aznavour. "Love Is Blue," number 1 on the charts this week, was taken from the Philips album, "Blooming Hits," which is number 5 on the LP charts this week.

First Edition



The First Edition is comprised of Mike Settle, rhythm guitar; Thelma Camacho, vocals; Terry Williams, guitar; Kenny Rogers, bass; and Mickey Jones, drums. All five members sing solo within the group. Mike has written much of the music performed by the First Edition. After working in New York for a few years as a writer and performer, he became musical director of the New Christy Minstrels. Trained in classical singing, Thelma has made the successful transition from opera and light opera to rock. She was with the New Christy Minstrels when she met Mike, Kenny, and Terry, and with them formed the First Edition. Terry, whose father played first chair trombone for Tommy Dorsey, and whose mother was a vocalist with the band, took up the guitar at 14. Kenny played with the Bobby Doyle Trio, a jazz group which recorded for Columbia. He then joined the New Christy Minstrels and left after a year to help form the First Edition. Mickey has played with Trini Lopez, Johnny Rivers, and Bob Dylan. "Just Dropped In," the First Edition's current Reprise single, is number 46 on the charts this week.

Korvette's Selling Time For 'In-Store' Commercials

NEW YORK—An "In-Store Radio Announcing System" is being launched by the E. J. Korvette discount chain this week (12) to reach the 1 million who shop each day at 45 stores in four regions.

According to Eve Nelson, vp of the audio sales division, a number of record companies have signed or are about to sign up for the point-of-purchase ad medium.

\$1 Per Spot, Per Store

The Korvette "In-Store" Radio Announcing System, which is available for sponsorship at the rate of \$1 per spot announcement per store, uses headquarters controlled pre-recorded tapes on completely automatic, versatile electronic equipment, and reaches the Korvette customers with a manufacturer's advertising-sales message when the potential buyer is just a few feet from the point-of-purchase.

The in-store broadcast tapes are produced by Korvette in its own specially designed, centrally located New York based recording studios, which are manned by professional announcers and copywriters who will work in close cooperation with the sponsoring manufacturers.

Choice of Programs

Broadcast Time on the "In-Store" Announcing System will be sold in segments: each segment covering two days—Monday/Tuesday, Wednesday/Thursday, Friday/Saturday. The minimum purchase of one segment consists of eight announcements (four per day: once in the morning; once in the early afternoon; once in the late afternoon; and once in the evening.) (Buying one segment in each of Korvette's 45 stores would give the manufacturer 360 messages.) A sponsor may buy as many segments as he desires for a week, month or year, and can double his segments if he so chooses.

The sponsor's message can be broadcast either throughout the entire 45 store Korvette chain or to less than

the full chain by choosing from Korvette's four specific geographic regions, as follows: Greater New York City, 21 stores; South New Jersey and Philadelphia, 9 stores; Baltimore and Washington, 5 stores; Chicago, Detroit and St. Louis, 10 stores.

The spot announcements will run as long as 60 seconds, with about six minutes between commercials. A complete tape contains 30 announcements and is self-rewinding on the store machine. (The new tape announcement system will not interfere with each individual store's in-store paging announcements.) However, stores will not be able to make their own special merchandise announcements under the new plan.

"The Korvette "In-Store" Announcing System has been designed to accommodate both large and small companies," Mrs. Nelson says. "While a large firm can use "In-Store" Announcements as a tie-in with regular Korvette advertising, to supplement their national advertising campaign, or to promote special window displays, smaller companies now also have the opportunity to advertise during peak selling periods when in-store traffic is heaviest at an extremely low cost."

"We have tested a pilot in-store announcing program for two years in eleven of our stores by utilizing marketing tests, merchandise exposures, new department openings and new product introduction. These eleven stores increased their credit sales as much as 60 percent . . ."

Judge Dismisses Writers' Action Against Trio Music

NEW YORK—Judge Backer has dismissed, after trial in the Supreme Court, New York County, a claim by Mark Barkan and Audrey Saxon that Trio Music had violated its duty as a publisher by taking a song from Barkan and Saxon entitled "Look Of Love" and two years later publishing another song of same title by Jeff Barry and Ellie Greenwich. The second song by Jeff Barry and Ellie Greenwich was a hit.

The plaintiffs claimed that once a publisher accepted a composition it had a duty not to accept a similarly entitled composition. This had been the case when Mills Music was found liable for publishing "Red Roses For A Blue Lady" after it had previously accepted a similarly titled song.

Judge Backer agreed with the contention of John L. Eastman of Eastman & Eastman, representing Trio Music, that there was no violation of any duty by a publisher to an author in its publishing a composition at a subsequent date with the same title as that previously published by it by another author and composer.

John L. Eastman is the son of Lee Eastman, the music industry attorney.

Unpublished Porter Songs To Grace New B'way Show

NEW YORK—A new Broadway musical will be decked out with 17 unpublished songs by the late Cole Porter. Show will be "Holiday," based on a play written by Philip Barry in 1928. Eight songs have already been selected by Buster Davis, currently the conductor for "Darling of the Day," who will also baton the Porter musical. Producer is Albert W. Selden, co-producer of "Man of La Mancha." Burt Shevelove, co-author of "A Funny Thing," will write the libretto. A proverbial "trunk" of 100 songs by Porter was recently opened. Some of the material was penned for shows, but never used.

Hirt To Play At NAMM Show

CHICAGO — RCA Victor Record's crack trumpeter, Al Hirt, will entertain at the annual banquet of the 67th annual NAMM (National Association of Music Merchants) Music Show and Convention at the Conrad Hilton Hotel here in Chicago on Wednesday night, June 26. Hirt, along with the Pee Wee Young Set, will present a full program for the NAMM banquet, which traditionally climaxes the NAMM Music Show on the night before its closing.

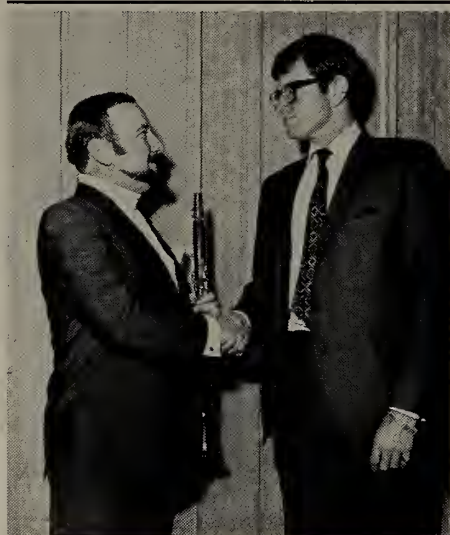
Catron On Promo Trip

FOCUS ON JAZZ

MORT FEGA

Let me begin by stating that I am opposed to the trend of big record companies buying out smaller record companies, particularly where jazz recordings are concerned. The bureaucracy that is so much a part of big business can only intrude upon the close personal relationships that are such a vital necessity in the over-all scheme of things. Generally speaking, the jazz producer is concerned with achieving the best possible music of his genre, jazz, and his primary consideration is not how it will sell, but how it will sound. I don't mean to imply that sales is not a consideration, but with the dedicated jazz producer it is not the only consideration. Logically, he must feel that if his product is excellent it will sell well. But, I repeat, his first commitment is to the quality of the music. If our man is burdened with the pressures that must come from the higher echelons it must affect his thinking; when it does that, it also affects his attitude about whom and what he is going to record. With some exceptions, the best of recorded jazz, to date, has been produced by the small independents, working on a low budget, and having only to answer to themselves.

A Big Exception

Occasionally, something of a reverse nature occurs that justifies the existence of the major companies in jazz. Several weeks ago ABC Records began distributing the catalog of Riverside Records, whose original product had virtually evaporated from the market, much to the dismay of jazz appreciators all over the world. Many, like myself, had worn paper thin some of the many fine items from the voluminous Riverside catalog and, until this recent development, had no way of replacing that which we have enjoyed so much and choose to continue enjoying. Now, with the prospect of ABC releasing much of the best of Riverside's catalog, jazz aficionados' best interests will be served.

Thanks for the reincarnation of Riverside must be given to Bob Thiele, himself a tireless jazz enthusiast as well as the director of jazz activities at ABC. It was Bob who prevailed upon Larry Newton to secure a long-term lease of the Riverside catalog from Jesse Selter; it's Bob who is overseeing the schedule of releases and its appropriate packaging; it was Bob who prevailed in issuing the albums in their original form, just as they had been done originally by Orrin Keepnews, instead of chopping them up in an effort to give them a new look; I'm certain it was Thiele who insisted that Keepnews be given credit on each album as the original producer. Thiele's attitude, in spite of his affiliation with a large firm, indicates clearly that he hasn't forsaken that wholesome attitude toward music and musicians, something he learned at an early age when he inaugurated the Signature label in the early Forties.

Debut LP Product

The initial Riverside release consists of thirteen albums, three by Thelonius Monk, two by Bill Evans, two by Wes Montgomery, and one

each by Odetta, Johnny Lytle, Charlie Byrd, Sonny Rollins, Mongo Santamaria, and Yusef Lateef. It is planned to issue approximately seventy-five albums from the Riverside catalog by the end of the year. In its leasing deal, ABC has access to everything in the original catalog, with the exception of the vintage material.

The March release will consist of eleven more albums by Monk, George Russell, Bill Evans, Max Roach, Wes Montgomery, Fats Navarro, Johnny Lytle, Milt Jackson, Art Blakey, and Joe Albany.

The April release will again feature Monk, Bill Evans, John Coltrane, Cannonball Adderley, Clark Terry, Herbie Mann, and a group of six albums recorded in 1962 in New Orleans featuring active musicians of that time and that place. At this time there are no release schedules beyond that time.

In keeping with the policy of the parent company, ABC, the Riverside albums will be released in stereo only. Monaural copies will be made only to serve as disc-jockey copies for those stations that do not broadcast in stereo. The albums will have a suggested retail price of \$4.79. In about two weeks two singles will be released, one by Johnny Lytle and the other by Wes Montgomery. These two will be the beginning of a succession of single releases that will be gleaned from the extensive catalog. Of further interest is the news that, under the banner of Riverside, ABC will release some new material, currently recorded. So, in a manner of speaking, ABC will have another affiliate, Riverside, along with its present jazz outlet, Impulse. All the new material will be recorded under the personal supervision of Bob Thiele, as is what is released on Impulse.

Will Others Follow?

While this article started on a somewhat negative note, it should be clear by now that I regard what ABC is doing with Riverside in a very positive light. In every field there are those that do and there are those that follow. It is to be hoped that ABC will prosper with its Riverside undertaking, and in its prosperity give heart to other labels to re-evaluate their policies about making available to the jazz public so many fine albums that have been deleted from their catalogs, things for which many jazz listeners pay prohibitive prices to have reproduced from the rare, original albums. I think of the marvelous Serge Chaloff albums on Capitol that are absolutely unavailable. I think of those great Buck Clayton albums on Columbia. I think of the Tal Farlow albums on Verve, Hal McKusick on Decca and on Victor, all those good things on Bethlehem. They're too current to be considered vintage and they're much too good to be unavailable to those who want to own them. So, to anyone in a position of authority at a record company who might be reading this, please look in your vault of masters and consider the service that you could render the record buying public by re-issuing those things of merit that you own, things that should be owned by many, not few.

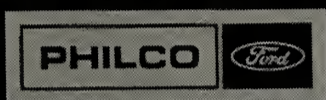



Gold For Union Gap

NEW YORK—A gold record has been awarded the Union Gap, featuring Gary Puckett, for its very first Columbia Records' single, "Woman, Woman." The gold record signifies sales in excess of one million copies as certified by the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA).

Columbia has followed up the group's hit single with the release of its initial LP, entitled "The Union Gap." During the first week of its release, the album reportedly sold over 100,000 copies, and it is represented on the charts. On the basis of this excellent sales response, Columbia executives anticipate that the LP will duplicate the success of the single in achieving a Gold Record.

Both "Woman, Woman" and the group's new album were produced by Jerry Fuller, producer of Columbia Records west coast A&R.

The Union Gap is comprised of Gary Puckett (vocals, guitar), Dwight Bement (tenor sax), Kerry Chater (bass guitar), Gary "Mutha" Withem (woodwinds, piano), and Paul Wheatbread (drums). The group was organized in San Diego, California, in January 1967, and named after the historic town of Union Gap, Washington. Dressed in Civil War uniforms, the group attracted a considerable following as they moved down from the north into southern California, playing clubs and colleges.

Deutch To Hollywood

NEW YORK—Murray Deutch, executive vp and general manager of the United Artists Music Companies, trekked to Hollywood Feb. 11 to confed with Norman Weiser, vp in charge of UA's West Coast music and record's operation, to meet with UA exec about music for upcoming UA films, and to visit with A&R execs at various labels in the Hollywood area.



London Awards Plaque To Martin Distrib's Holdman

NEW YORK — London Records last week awarded a plaque to Phil Holdman, veteran sales staffer at James H. Martin Distributors in Chicago, in recognition of Holdman's 20 years of selling London Records product. The award was made by London's national sales and distribution manager, Herb Goldfarb, who flew into the Windy City especially for the ceremony.

In point of service, Holdman is the senior seller of London product in the nation, having commenced at the debut of the company in 1947. "He has sold all London product from Gracie Fields' 'Now Is The Hour' to the Rolling Stones," said Goldfarb, who conveyed the company's warm thanks to Holdman for his long-standing and highly successful sales efforts on the firm's behalf.

Present at the ceremony, which was followed by a private luncheon, were James H. (Jimmy) Martin, president of the distribution firm which bears his name; Ronnie Bernstein, general manager of the Martin company; Ralph Ebelar, Martin's promo chief; and Sam Cerami, London's regional promotion man for the Midwest, in addition to Holdman and Goldfarb.

Mauriat To Visit US

NEW YORK—Not long ago the question was "who is Paul Mauriat?" Now that everyone is aware of the performer whose "Love Is Blue" is #1, the query has become "where is Paul Mauriat?"

The French musician arrived in the U.S. this week to solve that question, but due to a series of engagements across Europe his stay will be brief. Mauriat is scheduled to remain in the country from Feb. 11 to 17 for a meeting with Philips product manager Lou Simon and national promo manager John Doumanian regarding upcoming new product and the surging sales of his catalog which has blossomed as a result of the hit single. He also made an appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show.

Monti Rock III Pacted To Gottehrer's Label

NEW YORK—Monti Rock III, former hair dresser who turned rock performer three-years ago, has signed exclusive long-term recording contract with Sire Records. Announcement of the signing was made by the label's president Richard Gottehrer.

Rock came to fame with a series of night club appearances and several television visits to the Merv Griffin and Johnny Carson Shows. He is to appear in a soon-to-be-released movie, "Two Thousand Years Later," and will do a Judy Garland special in a few months.

Label's plans include the immediate release of a single and LP by the artist.

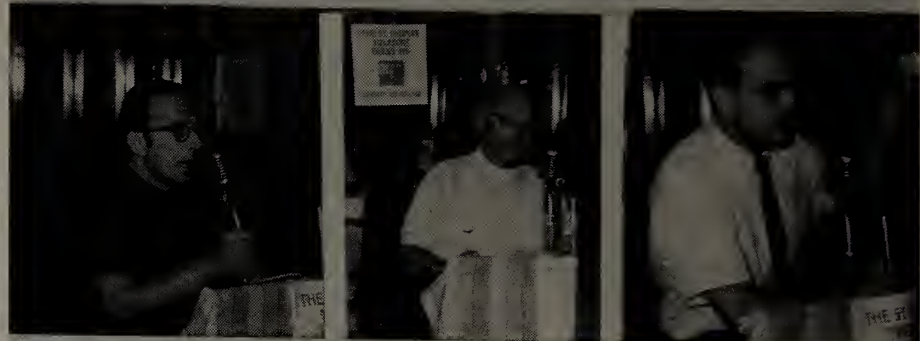
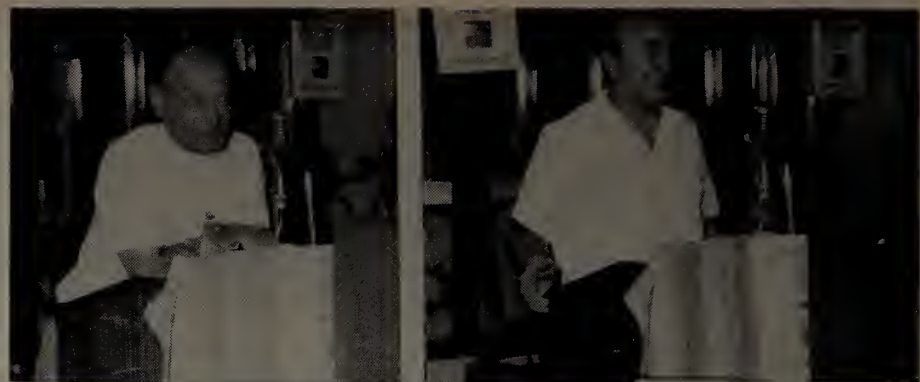

better business during the MIDEM week than they experience during the highly publicized Film Festival, their counterparts at San Remo found things quieter than usual. The benefits to be derived both from MIDEM and San Remo are loaded most heavily in favor of the publisher rather than the record man.

Therefore at this year's San Remo publishers once again predominated. As in recent years the songs tended to be more national than international and Italian publishers far outnumbered those from other territories. Publishers from countries such as America, Britain, Germany, France and Scandinavia were few and far between.

San Remo will remain Italy's major musical event of the year. Publishers the world over will continue to follow it closely in the hope of picking up another International hit such as "Al Di La", "Volare" or "Non Ho L'Eta". But there is no doubt that MIDEM has taken over as the major International music market.

Alpha Distributing Corp. is already set for distribution in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut. In secondary markets where distributors will be set later on, Rose Saggio will handle servicing of mail orders.

As with such previous releases in Monmouth-Evergreen's Composer Series as "Through The Years With Vincent Youmans", "Dietz & Schwartz: Alone Together" and "Twelve Isham Jones Evergreens," the new Kern and Berlin packages have been conceived,

Bogart remarked that "the release of Buddah's first soundtrack shows the accelerated product maturity of the label in its six months of operation. 'Treasure Of San Gennaro' will receive the same concentrated promotion and publicity that we give to our pop releases. Buddah will be working closely with Paramount Pictures to ensure the full development of the film and the soundtrack album." A specially recorded single of the theme, produced by and featuring Teddy Randazzo, will be released with the album. This will be Buddah's second compatible mono-stereo single release.

Buddah is currently represented on the charts by "Green Tambourine," "A Million To One," and "Simon Says."

Based on the successful Broadway musical, the movie version of "Half A Sixpence," starring Tommy Steele is scheduled to have its grand premiere in New York and Los Angeles at the end of February. The movie will debut in other key cities early in March, with over 40 dates currently booked.

As part of its merchandising plans, RCA has scheduled consumer advertising in the Saturday Evening Post, the New York Times, the Los Angeles Times and the Chicago Tribune. In addition full page ads will run in the trades.

To aid promotion on the local level, RCA is supplying 20, 30 and 60 second transcriptions for radio play, as well as various size ad mats. Point-of-sale material includes window displays, streamers, stickers in Day Glo colors, buttons and mounted album covers.

DGG Offers 7 Feb. Sets

NEW YORK—Deutsche Grammophon, the European classical label which is distributed in the U.S. by MGM Records, is offering seven new albums for the month of February.

Highlighting the release is a recording of Hugo Wolf's rarely performed Spanish Song Book. The cycle for voice and piano, which utilizes poems based on Spanish themes, is performed by Elisabeth Schwarzkopf, Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau and Gerald Moore. The set marks the debut of both Miss Schwarzkopf and Gerald Moore for Deutsche Grammophon. It is the only recording available of most of the material.

Next comes a coupling of conductor Herbert von Karajan's versions of the four tone poems Finlandia, Valse Triste, Tapiola and The Swan of Tuonela.

Aurele Nicolet is the flute soloist and Rudolf Baumgartner conducts the Lucerne Festival Strings in an album of virtuoso flute concerti. The concerti included are: Mozart's D Major, K. 314; Blavet's A Minor; and Leclair's C Major, Op. 7. No. 3.

Not often recorded works, Schumann's "Davidsbueandler Dances" and "Papillons" have only two versions listed in the catalogue. The February release includes a new performance by DGG pianist, Wilhelm Kempff.

In time for the Easter season, DGG is releasing an album of Ave Maria and other Choral Music. It is performed by the Don Cossack Choir conducted by Serge Jaroff. Included with the Bach-Gounod Ave Maria are eleven Russian choral works.

Eugene Jochum has recently completed his project of recording the nine Bruckner symphonies with the Berlin Philharmonic and the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestras. For the month of February, the complete symphonies have been packaged into a special presentation album which includes an illustrated brochure. The package is the only complete edition of the Bruckner Symphonies available in this country.

From Archive the month of February brings a new recording of Purcell's "Dido and Aeneas." It is sung in English by Tatiana Troyanos and Barry McDaniel. Charles Mackerras conducts the Monteverdi Choir and the Northwest German Radio Chamber Orchestra. The set is a DGG/Archive debut for both Miss Troyanos and Mr. Mackerras.

A pair of R&B LP's is also included

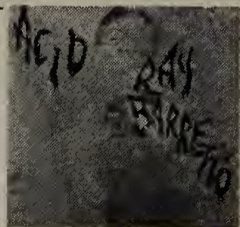

The New York and Philadelphia soirees are the first of more than half a dozen promotion visits across the

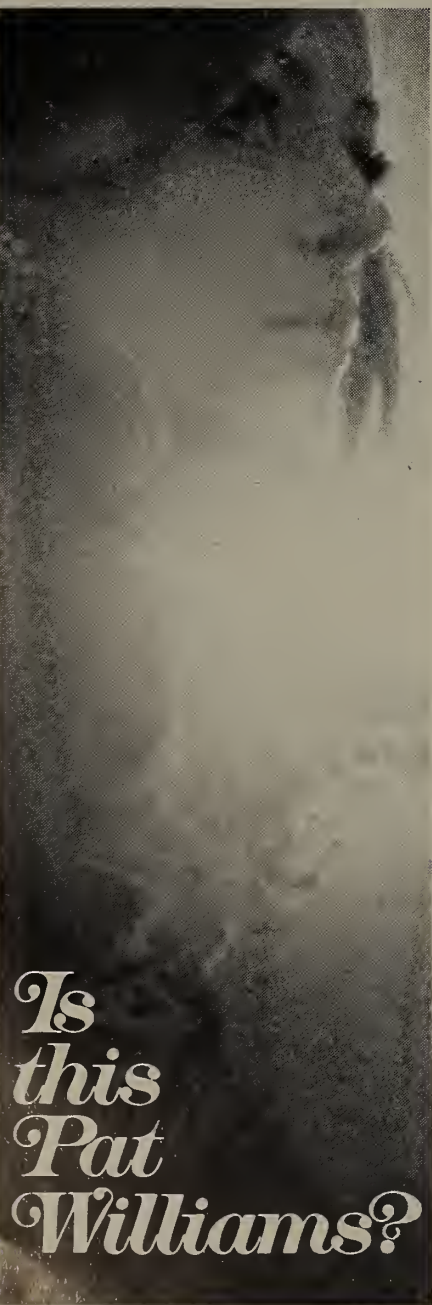

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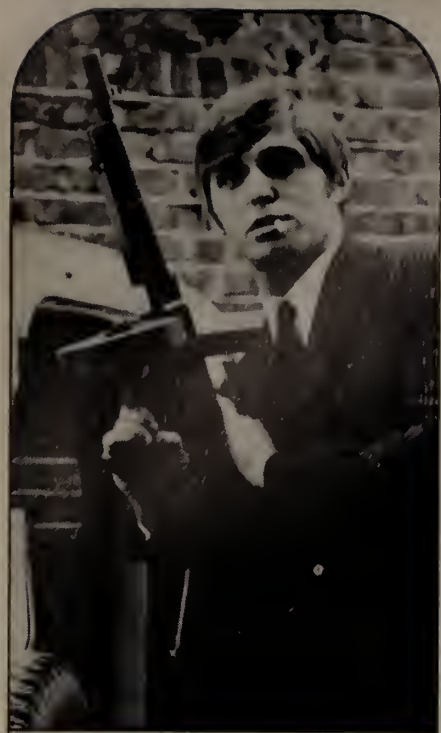


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Fame To Seek Fame In U.S.

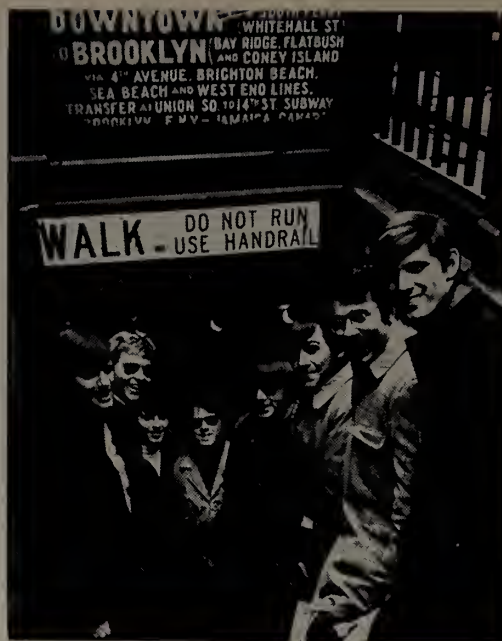

Talent On Stage

PHLUPH

BOSTON—To hear an imaginative and creative group, after listening to much of today's musical redundancy, is a marvelously refreshing experience. The group we're referring to is known as Phluph (Fluff), perhaps the finest of the up-and-coming talent on the Boston scene. Phluph is exceptional in that most of their music is self-composed, as exemplified by their Verve album, "Phluph."

On Feb. 2, Phluph played a hold-over performance at Boston's newest disco, the Psychedelic Supermarket. They displayed their many and diversified talents in a surprisingly polished fashion for a relatively young group. The performance was organized and well executed but by no means sedate.

The most outstanding feature of their act was the incredibly even balance they managed to obtain. In this area, the organist, Joel Maisano, skillfully demonstrated the difference between a good musician and an artist.

He adeptly complemented, yet simultaneously offset, the harmony of the rest of the group. Lee Dudley, the drummer, paced the group in an ear-shattering but extremely smooth and fluid style. The lead guitarist and technical leader of the group, John Pell, contributed to the cause with a superb guitar and an even better voice. He sang a self-composed cut from their album called "Love Eyes," which was by far the instrumental and vocal highlight of the night. Rounding out the group, on base, was Steve Ginsberg, who just happens to hold a master's degree in physics. He backed and blended the group with proficient timing and obvious experience.

Phluph is a well balanced, tight group, with a firm style and an excellent sound. We can't see anything that could possibly hold back a group like this. When their reputation catches up with their ability, Phluph may very well be famous throughout the world.

Farrell In Talent Hunt

NEW YORK—In order to broaden his own knowledge of performing and recording talent in other parts of the country, producer Wes Farrell, whose current project, the Beacon Street Union, is promotion touring for MGM, has been doing some traveling himself.

He just recently spent a week in Tyler, Texas, 15 miles west of Dallas, recording the Basement Wall, a group from New Orleans. The Studio he used was the same one where "The Letter" and "Judy In Disguise" were cut. "We tend to think of New York and Hollywood as the recording centers," Farrell says, "but they have some really great talent in some of these smaller towns." Farrell says he spent time auditioning in Dallas while he was in Texas.

In addition, Farrell also saw talent and studios in Detroit on his visit recently.

Farrell's expansion plans for his Coral Rock Productions and Senate Records label include opening offices in Hollywood for his next project which will be west coast based. He will be negotiating for space in that city while he is there.

Farrell may be reached at the Beverly Wilshire in Hollywood from the 13th thru the 23rd, while the Beacon Street Union appears at the Cheetah in that city.

1st Circus Maximus Deck Out On Vanguard

NEW YORK—Vanguard's hot new recording ensemble, Circus Maximus, has just released its first single, "Lonely Man."

Their debut album, entitled "Circus Maximus," was released by Vanguard last fall. A second LP is currently in the works and due for release in March.

Circus Maximus made history by appearing in concert at Carnegie Hall (Dec. 26 & 30, 1967) as a comparatively unknown group less than a year after its formation. The contemporary rock group, Circus Maximus, and The New York Pro Musica, the leading ensemble devoted to Medieval and Renaissance music, meshed their talents in a Baroque/Rock experimental concert.

Reprise Inks Vogues; Group Plays Penn. St.

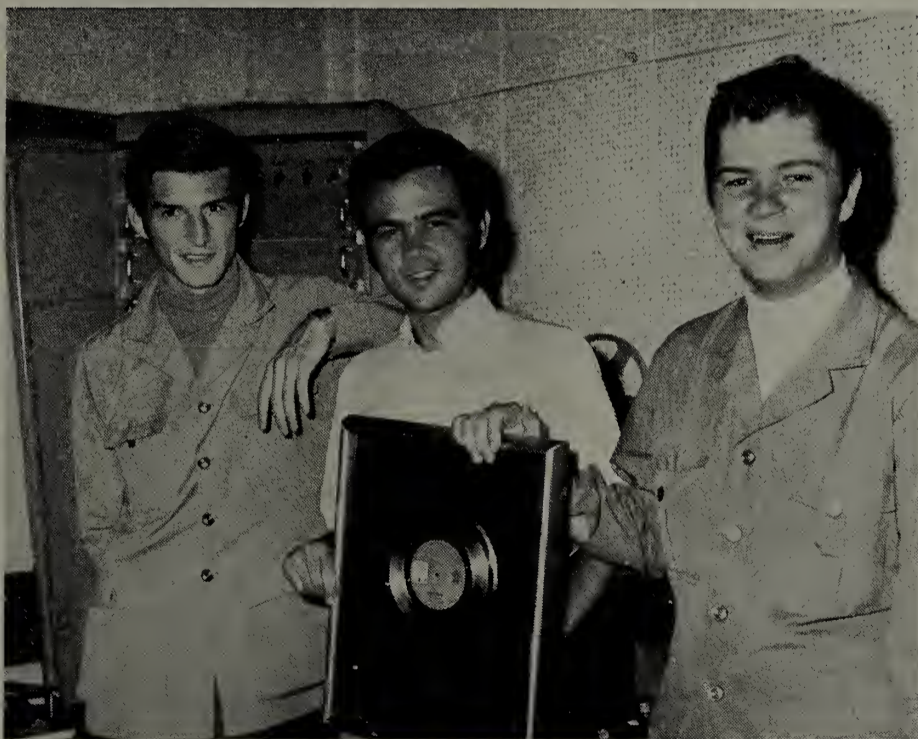

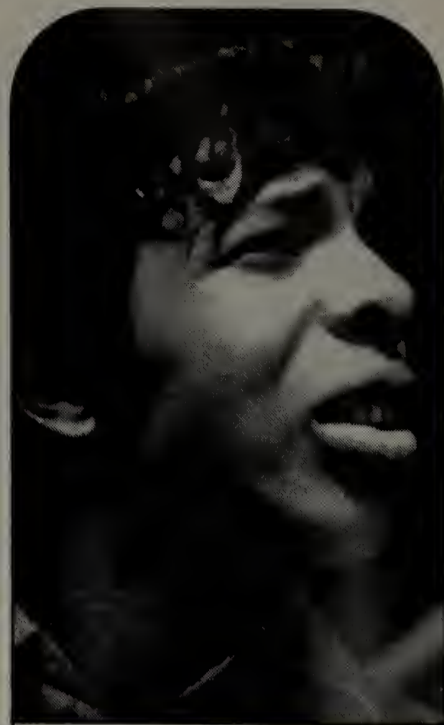

New Country TV Show Begins Production

NASHVILLE—A new concept in country television has been kicked off with the inception of "At Home With The Stars," a video segment which has already gone into production in Nashville. The package, which will be hosted by Jack Brown, will consist of filmed tours into the homes of the biggest names in Country Music, as well as in-depth interviews with those personalities and their families. Breaking ground for the project was a segment filmed in the home of country favorite Faron Young.

No rigid format is planned for the show. Each episode is aimed at being as individualistic and free-moving as possible, with the personality of each particular artist shaping the formats of the various shows.

Both Brown and his production crew are native Nashvilleans, having worked with Country Music entertainers and

executives for many years. A 1963 graduate of Emory University, Brown has been associated for the past three years with Broadcast Music, Inc. as director of non-broadcast licensing, a position which has kept him in close contact with top-name country personalities.

Show representatives report that no expense will be spared to make the syndicated color broadcasts of "At Home With The Stars" truly representative of Country Music and to showcase the program in its best light.

"The wit, charm, knowledge and depth of character of our Country Music performers have never been revealed to the nation's television audiences," comments Brown. "At Home With The Stars' will film the Country Music stars in a relaxed and familiar environment. They will be discovered as interesting individuals as well as entertaining performers."

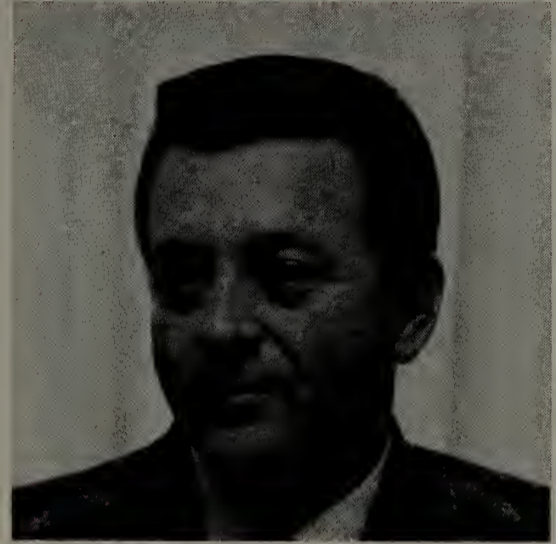

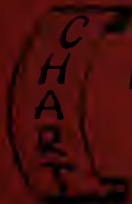

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Cash Box Country Roundup

The Country/Western Music Promoters' Organization of Northern California (founded in Jan. of 1967) recently held its First Annual Awards Dinner in celebration of its one year history in existence. The evening's festivities were emceed by Duke Martin, program director of KEEN-San Jose, and were highlighted by the presentation of awards in five categories (Buck Owens-Male Vocalist; Tammy Wynette-Female Vocalist; Tom Tall-Most Promising Male Vocalist; the Buckaroos-Country Band; "It's Such A Pettry World Today"-Song of the Year). Honored guest speaker was Armand Delgado (representing California's Governor Ronald Reagan), who also presented the award for Male Vocalist. Other presenters were organization president Charles Erwin, founder Bob Gocke (who also received a special award), KEEN radio personality Marshall Smith and KGSC-TV-San Jose producer-director Sanford Daigle. . . . The organization has recently installed new officers, effective Jan. 22, who include Bob Gocke—president; Wilbur DeBois vice president; Mrs. Irene Schneider—secretary and Mrs. Ina Hall—treasurer.

From the office of Gladys Hart, director of the Colorado Country Music Festival, comes word that a special deejay forum will be scheduled at the organization's upcoming 6th annual C&W convention to acquaint members of the trade industry with the operations of radio in connection with programming, station format, promotion, etc. A questionnaire will be used to select a deejay to head up this portion of the festival.

Peer-Southern has been supplied by the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission with 500 turnpike brochures, which Roy Horton is distributing to deejays throughout the country as part of a promo campaign for Dick Todd's Decca release, "Pennsylvania Turnpike, I Love You." Word has it that Horton is trying to work out a deal with the Turnpike Commission to waive all speeding tickets if the offenders are listening to such stations as WRCP-Philadelphia, WORK-York, WCMB-Harrisburg, WCBG-Chambersburg, WVSC-Somerset or WEEP-Pittsburgh. Fat chance, Roy!

From radioland we hear that Ed Briggs is back at the KBBQ microphone after a bout with the flu, and is asking that artists take time to call him during his show (5:30-8:30 a.m., California time) in order for him to build up a "beeper" collection. Ed also mentions that the station is planning another star-studded country extravaganza in conjunction with KFOX-Long Beach. Set for Mar. 9 at the Shrine Auditorium, the package will feature the Kitty Wells Show (with Johnny Wright, Bobby Wright, Bill Phillips, etc.), David Houston, Tammy Wynette, George Jones and Grandpa Jones. . . . Down in Huntsville, Ala., a flood has completely wiped out the record library of WBHP, the country outlet in that area. An emergency call has gone out from that station for help to rebuild the library. Any help from labels, artists or other outlets could certainly be put to good use. . . . Country Johnny Mathis, who just recently returned to the country scene, has just added his name to the personality roster with W FAG-Farmville, N.C. and can use help to get him

started. Johnny, by the way, has a new Little Darlin' disk, "Paint Me A Picture of Happiness," due for release shortly. . . . Don Rhea informs us that KCKN-Kansas City marks its 43rd anniversary this month, and will celebrate the birthday with a big country blowout on Feb. 25 at Memorial Hall, that city. The show will feature Hank Locklin, David Houston & the Persuaders, Liz Anderson, Lynn Anderson, Conway Twitty & the Lonely Blue Boys, Charlie Walker, Archie Campbell, John L. Sullivan and Bill Laundry, as well as the full roster of eight country gentlemen. . . . From the Badger State, we hear that Johnny Howard has jumped into the disk production arena—although quite accidentally. According to Johnny, the station sponsored a contest during Country Music Month asking listeners to bring in their own lyrics, from which a winning set would be chosen and set to music. The tune was also to be recorded, with 500 store copies pressed. As a result of the contest, says Howard, the winning tune, "Trouble, Sweet Trouble," was recorded on the Top Gun label by Curley Fields and received excellent response in the Wisconsin area, causing the label to release it nationally. . . . Country Music is now getting an extra boost in the vast Northwestern Ontario area with the inception of the new Fred King spot, broadcast daily over CKPR-AM-FM. King, a veteran country entertainer, has recorded sessions with Myrna Lorrie, and expects to have an audience of almost 175,000 (a good number of which have no other available radio signals) on both the AM and FM channels. Labels are invited to forward their latest releases for exposure on the new vehicle, while artists are asked to help kick off the new show with either phone or pre-taped greetings. Calls can be made between 2:05 and 3:30 p.m. to (807) 344-7931. . . . WGSB-St. Charles, Ill. has split its format in half, programming 12 hours of easy listening and, now, 12 hours of country. The station, which boasts of an audience potential

topping a half million, features the only nighttime programming of country music in the Chicagoland area, and mentions that several important labels offer very poor servicing. . . . Out in Sacramento, John McRae has been appointed general sales manager of Radio KRAK. McRae has formerly acted as national sales manager of WCKY-Cincinnati and as general manager of KEWB-San Francisco. . . . Another new sales manager position has been announced by KBBQ-Burbank where Felix Adams was named to the role. Adams has just vacated the same position at KRAK, and previously headed the sale department at KLAC-Los Angeles. . . . KGBS' Bill Thompson has undertaken a position with Comedic Productions in Beverly Hills, which he will handle along with his broadcasting duties at the station. At Comedic he will be involved with the Smothers Brothers TV show. . . . Audie Ashworth of the Hubert Long talent offices speaks for a great many when he asks that stations include the name of the person who is to receive records be included somewhere on their surveys and charts. Stations should realize that it would be extremely helpful to many people if these people knew who was responsible for receiving disks.

Seems like '68 is a deadly year for songwriters to be on the receiving end of Cupid's darts. With only one full month tucked away (and a couple of spare weeks), a couple of countrydom's diminishing supply of bachelor tunesmiths have already bit the dust—or have at least made the first tentative steps toward certain doom. A few short weeks ago, one of Music City's more high-flying eligibles was shot down when Glenn Sutton was snatched by the lovely Lynn Anderson, and just last week another prolific pen-man, Steve Karliski, found himself corralled. Steve, who announced his engagement to the Nashville Room's beautiful Jackie Giroux, is looking toward a date at the altar sometime in April.

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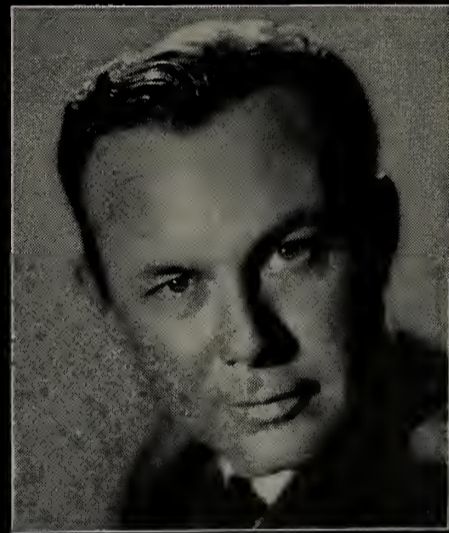

DAVID HOUSTON (Epic 10291)

Have A Little Faith (2:14) [AI Gallico BMI-Sherrill, Sutton]

The David Houston batting streak is such that he could probably sing "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star" and have a smash. However, David uncorks another beauty here as he tells us to "keep the faith, baby," in an easy-swinging manner that's sure to get him elected to another chart-topping role. Flip: "Too Far Gone" (2:25) [AI Gallico BMI-Sherrill]

JIM REEVES (RCA Victor 9455)

That's When I See The Blue (In Your Pretty Brown Eyes) (2:21) [4 Star BMI-Blake, Belew]

As usual, the Jim Reeves styling on this deck is synonymous with super smoothness and mellowness beyond compare. In addition to the enchanting Reeves performance, the material here is also top-notch, so look for the deck to climb straight to the top. Big pop action predicted, naturally. Flip: "I've Lived A Lot In My Time" (2:39) [Valley BMI-Reeves, Rhodes, Reynolds]

JIMMY DEAN (RCA Victor 9454)

A Thing Called Love (2:15) [Vector BMI-Hubbard]

With a tune that's a cross between "Louisiana Man" and "Big Bad John" Jimmy Dean looks for another big sales piece, with a strong possibility of twin-market action. The tasty flavor of "A Thing Called Love" gives it loads of potential. Flip: "One Last Time" (2:52) [Plainview BMI-Oakes]

JAN HOWARD (Decca 32269)

But Not For Love My Dear (2:59) [Blue Crest BMI-Frazier]

Just off a monster duet with Bill Anderson in "For Loving You," Jan Howard strikes out toward chartsville on a solo basis once again with "But Not For Love My Dear." This package of strong material and adept workmanship (not to mention an eye-catching title) is a cinch to make big moves. Flip: "Count Your Blessings, Woman" (2:19) [Stallion BMI-Anderson]

JOHNNY WRIGHT (Decca 32267)

Go Get It (1:55) [Wilderness BMI-Howard]

The latest offering by Johnny Wright, tabbed "Go Get It," should add another notch to the songster's barrel of hits as it makes its way toward the Top 50 scene. A light and lively bouncer, the deck features a cute flavor and a definite change of pace from Johnny. Flip: "Atlanta Georgia Baby" (2:10) [Kitty Wells BMI-Anglin]

CHARLIE LOUVIN (Capitol 2106)

Will You Visit Me On Sundays? (2:45) [Blue Crest BMI-Frazier]

Charlie Louvin should find enough acceptance to this deck to provide him another ride into chart country. The lid, called "Will You Visit Me On Sundays?," is a mid-tempo stanza in the currently popular prison vein and may be his biggest in a long while. Flip: "Tears, Wine and Flowers" (2:20) [Five L's BMI-Louvin]

SONNY CURTIS (Viva 626)

Day Drinker (2:15) [Viva BMI-Curtis]

Sonny Curtis stirred up some excellent noise with his recent "Bummin' Around" effort, and could well go even farther with this followup deck. Titled "Day Drinker," the side is an easy-paced finger-snapper that has a nice twin-market sound. Flip: "Atlanta Georgia Stray" (2:15) [Rustlend BMI-Cantry]

OTT STEPHENS & TRINA LOVE (Chart 1022)

Don't Let Your Big Mouth Take You (Where Your Feet Can't Walk You Out) (2:24) [Yonah BMI-Gibson]

Based on the reaction stirred up by their recent noisemaker, "If You Can't Bring It Home," Ott Stephens and Trina Love may well bring home this mouthful titled "Don't Let Your Big Mouth Take You (Where Your Feet Can't Walk You Out)." Novelty session should do nicely. Flip: "Read It And Weep" (2:14) [Yonah BMI-Anderson]

Best Bets
RAY CORBIN (Monument 1050)

Absence (2:32) [Tree BMI-Miller] A fine piece of material gets a real pretty presentation in the hands of Ray Corbin. The strong sound of this weeper merits an extra listen and plenty of spins. Could easily break out big. Flip: "In My City" (2:30) [Combine BMI-Wilson]

BOOTS TILL (K-Ark 808)

You Don't Own Me (1:47) [Forest Hills BMI-Howard] Boots Till has a history of stirring up chart action every now and then, and could well see that kind of reaction to this deck. Attractive ballad may happen. Flip: "Cheater School" (1:50) [Stringtown BMI-Till]

LARRY PAGE (Paula 291)

Somebody Knows (But Just Ain't Tellin') (2:05) [Su-Ma BMI-Page, Hurley] Larry Page makes his Paula disk debut with a thumpin' ditty that could capture the imagination of lots of buyers. A cute item here. Flip: "I Let Her Get Lonely" (2:37) [Four Star BMI-Belew, Bishop]

SLIM WHITMAN (Imperial 66283)

Rainbows Are Back In Style (2:30) [4 Star BMI-Burgess] Here's a brand new Slim Whitman effort that may be just the thing to bring the veteran songster back into the chart picture. Excellent sound. Flip: "How Could I Not Love You" (2:20) [Aso ASCAP-Blair, Kay]

GORDON CASH (Tamborine 3)

Cloud Nine To The Bottom (2:24) [Combine BMI-Chestnut] Could be lots of action in store for this item by Gordon Cash. The honky-tonkin' thumper gets a nice treatment from the artist, and may get good spins. Flip: "Wake Me Up" (2:06) [House of Bryant BMI-B./F. Bryant]

RALPH LOVEDAY (Hilltop 3018)

Then Breakfast Came (2:40) [Southtown BMI-Crysler] There may be enough in these grooves to cause lots of deejay action on the deck. The clever novelty side has a good chance to garner healthy sales reaction. Flip: "The First One To Know" (2:38) [Combine BMI-Owens, Paton]

Webb Pierce opens this album with his recent smash, "Fool, Fool, Fool," and from there on in it's good country listening all the way. Whether handling his own material or tunes that have climbed to the top as recorded by his contemporaries, Pierce delivers a wallop that's hard to beat. Tunes such as "Gonna Find Me A Bluebird" and "I Can't Help It (If I'm Still In Love With You)" make this one a sure sales biggie.

IT'S ANOTHER WORLD—Wilburn Brothers—Decca DL 4954/74954

For some of the smoothest country harmonies around, the Wilburn Brothers certainly fill the bill. In this set, as usual, the popular twosome display some of the reason for their being consistently atop the vocal group pile, as they unleash not only a pair of their own chart winners ("Roarin' Again" and "It's Another World"), but such other goodies as "Walk Through This World With Me" and "I've Got That Hurt On The Move." A sure-fire chart piece here.


COUNTRY CLASSICS—Floyd Cramer—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3935

A collection of some of the biggest tunes to decorate recent country charts gets a taste of Floyd Cramer's distinctive piano stylings in this tasty set. The easy-going keyboard meanderings of the artist are set to such giants as "Ode To Billy Joe," "Laura (What's He Got That I Ain't Got)" and "Misty Blue," among others, in a set that's bound to get a wide variety of air-play. Lots of pop and middle-of-the-road play can be expected.


TRUCK DRIVIN' CAT WITH NINE WIVES—Jim Nesbitt—Chart CHM/CHS 1005

Jim Nesbitt made his mark on the music scene with novelty numbers, and his delivery of songs in that vein definitely marks that as his forte. But, although he really scores with tracks like "Truck Drivin' Cat With Nine Wives" (his current single) and "A Tiger In My Tank," he's also at home with the blues, as he demonstrates in "She Didn't Come Home" and "The Husband Is The Last One To Know." Platter shows him off to good advantage.


SOMEWHERE BETWEEN—Bonnie Owens—Capitol T/ST 2861

Bonnie Owens offers here an assortment of material tastefully picked and tastefully delivered, a fact which should be appreciated by many a buyer. Backed by the Strangers, the bonnie lassy is primarily in the blues bag in this one, dishing out such heartbreakers as "Gone Crazy" and "I Let A Stranger Buy The Wine." Lots of listenable sounds among the grooves.


FUNNY FOLK FLOPS—Don Bowman—RAC Victor LPM/LSP 3920

Easily the best known in the world of the country parody, Don Bowman offers another assortment of extra-special material—some new and some timeless—done up in the unforgettable Bowman manner. Those who dig Bowman's brand of humor are bound to find favor with the package, especially with such items as "Messin' Up My Mind (Gentle On My Mind)" and "Green Sleeves."


MAKE MINE COUNTRY—Kay Adams—Tower T/ST 5069

A songstress who can belt out an uptempo number or uncork a ballad with the best of them, Kay Adams offers a smattering of both in her latest Tower LP. The powerful Adams tonsils, set to such tracks as "Six Days A-Waiting" and "Roll Out The Red Carpet," make for some excellent listening and can assure the disk of some nice sales action. For ballad fans, Kay also includes "She Didn't Color Daddy" and "Don't Talk Trouble To Me."

INTERNATIONAL SECTION

Elis Regina is the Brazilian songstress who created a sensation at the International Gala of the recent MIDEM gathering in Cannes, France. An artist in the Bossa Nova style, she was signed, only a few hours after her Gala appearance, for three weeks at the famed Olympia in Paris in March. She appears world-wide on the Philips label. Mercury Records in the U.S. is expected to release an LP by the star in the near future.

In a £9,500,000 (\$22,800,000) deal, the world's biggest recording company, Electric and Musical Industries, has acquired a 25 per cent share in Associated British Picture Corporation, one of the Big Two organizations in the British film industry which operates 270 theatres among other things. The deal could lead to a £38,000,000 (\$91,200,000) takeover by EMI of the whole ABPC complex which has, in addition to its film interests, a stake in commercial TV, closed circuit television, tele ads, bowling alleys and other assorted activities. The deal, announced by Sir Joseph Lockwood, Chairman of EMI, and Sir Philip Warter, Chairman of ABPC, confirmed earlier rumors that EMI had arranged with Warner Bros.-Seven Arts to sell its 25 per cent stakeholding in the British company. Terms were a straight 47/6d. (\$5.70) a share. The EMI Chairman added that he wanted to make a similar offer of about 47/6d worth of shares and loan stock to other Associated British stockholders.

Such a takeover bid would give EMI control of Thames-TV, the new station formed by ABC-TV, an Associated British subsidiary, and Rediffusion-TV, to run the London weekday commercial TV franchise. Such a move would have to meet with the approval of the Independent Television Authority if the ITA is to continue to allow Thames-TV to open up in July. A provision in the Thames-TV contract with ITA is that should the Warner Bros.-Seven Arts stock change hands or should foreign interests take over ABPC, then the ITA could either terminate the contract or switch control of the station from ABPC to Rediffusion. But even if control of Thames-TV is switched, the prospective takeover would make EMI the single most powerful organization in show business hereabouts. EMI engulfed the Grade Organization ten months ago and thus acquired a show business agency complex of great strength. With the deal, Grade Organization Director Bernard Delfont won a seat on the EMI Board and is believed to have a major part in some inspired deals pulled off by EMI in show business.

As foreshadowed at the company's last sales convention, CBS Records has moved into a new stride in the British market. Under the generalship of Ken Glancy, the company is spiraling to its best term ever in the few years it has been functioning as a solo operation. If previously the label has tended to rely for profitability on its vast catalog of American artists, now the banner is in the business of new business, creating new hits, new talent and new interest amongst dealers. It is a mark of the determination of CBS not to miss out on its chances to make a sale that the company has now begun to distribute product by air. The device, expensive of course, is used sparingly but, in order to cater for any real demand, CBS has been ready to foot the bill. Such marketing determination, the province of Olav Wyper, has seen CBS for the first time with two local artists at the top of the Hit Parade—Georgie Fame with "The Ballad Of Bonnie And Clyde" and the Love Affair with "Everlasting Love."

Artists plus CBS marketing-promotion strategem, not only kept the first U.S. independent in the top spot for successive weeks, and in a healthy No. 1 and 2 position for a followthrough, but also proved a personal triumph for producer Mike Smith. Brought into the CBS fold as a staff man after his big success with the Tremeloes recordings, the first local hit for the CBS label, Smith has just taken over recording chores for Georgie Fame. He also waxed the Love Affair. With the new Tremeloes single "Suddenly You Love Me" hot-footing into the Top Ten, Smith has three platters in the top echelons of the sales charts which puts him paces ahead of any other British producer at the moment.

Key CBS merchandisers, meantime, have devised a policy of big impact promotions. Currently underway is a major four-week push on Bob Dylan whose new album "John Wesley Harding" will be the subject of heavy press advertising, sponsored airplay, display pieces, etc., which should, if the advance order of 20,000 copies is any guide, stimulate hot business in a market starved of Dylan for a considerable period. A special-boost, "Artist Of The Month" campaign to be instituted by the company, begins next month with a major promo on Tony Bennett. Ray Conniff will be drumbeaten in April; Country and Western in May; Hip pop in June; and in July and August, traditionally slow months in disk dealing, CBS will concentrate on boosting orchestral and continental albums.

Nems Enterprises, which has just been subject to a board level shuffle which put Vic Lewis in the drivers seat with Geoffrey Ellis, is shortly to launch its own label, Oval Records. Discussions with the major diskeries about pressing and distribution are currently going on. New Nems talent will be pacted to Oval and Lewis indicates that some established Nems acts may sign with Oval when their present contracts with other logos expire.

Yet another new label for the over-bulged British market is contemplated by click author-composer Les Reed. He is scheduled to launch Chapter One Records next month with an unspecified number by Jason Cord, Chapter One's first pactee. Reed has arranged pressing and distribution with Decca.

Making its mark this month the Trend label formed by Barry Class, manager of the Foundations. Trend bows with two singles "Speak To Me" by the Explosions and "Breaking Up A Dream" by the Ways and Means."

Britain's top film music composer John Barry has become Chairman of Ember Records, an independent label helmed by Jeffrey Kruger. Also joining the Board is Barry's friend and associate, film director Bryan Forbes plus Jimmy Henney. Barry is to act as Executive Producer for all Ember's major recording activities while Forbes will go cahoots with him on prospective film projects. Jimmy Henney, of late a key aide with Barry, has been set as Head of Promotion and Recording at the label. Henney will also head up with Kruger the Henney Music Corporation which is being formed to embrace all Ember's publishing activities.

Fred Jackson's Germany company, Music Edition Fanfare, is to prevent Bron Music catalog in Germany, Austria and Switzerland. The company had a tremendous No. 1 hit with Manfred Mann's "Ha Ha Said The Clown" and were responsible for obtaining 15 cover versions of the song. The new deal gives the company access to all future Manfred Mann compositions.

February is an all-classical month for Music For Pleasure when they issue 12 LPs, seven in stereo including a double-album set of Beethoven's 8th and 9th Symphonies. The release also features Sir Adrian Boult introducing the "Instruments of the Orchestra" and "The Red Army Choir" featuring folk songs by the famous Alexandrov Song and Dance Ensemble.

Along with the name of managing director Brolly, Mike Sloman, who for the past year has served as European representative for the U.S. Decca label, will now assume the position of A&R administrative director, along with the additional responsibility of coordinating the promotion and publicity activity for the new British label. Also joining the A&R department is writer-producer-arranger Mike Leander, as a production executive on an exclusive basis. Leander's previous record industry experience includes a three year history with the British Decca company as a producer and writer, during which time he was responsible for the production of all Marianne Faithful albums and singles. Other names with which he has been associated have been Shirley Bassey, The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Cliff Richard and Lulu, to name but a few. His composing credits include the score for Universal's film "Privilege," among others.

Other appointments include the naming of Peter Roddis to the position of sales and marketing manager. Roddis, after ten years as a sales and promotion executive with the British Decca company, joined RCA overseas as a field promotion and sales manager then being shifted to that company's marketing manager, a post he held until now and his assignment with

MCA Records, Ltd.

Alan J. Crowder has been named label and production manager having had approximately ten years of similar industry experience in these areas.

Roger Watson has been set to function in the new record company's promotion division, having previously been with the promotion departments of British Decca and Major-Minor Records. And Vickie Walton will assume the position of press and publicity co-ordinator.

Along with Brolly, the directors of MCA Records, Ltd., are Milton R. Rackmil, Jay Kantor and Arthur Jones.

CBS Int'l Lowers PX Disk Prices

NEW YORK—CBS International has announced that it has lowered the price on records it sells to the Armed Forces' post exchange.

Prices to the PX's had been raised on Nov. 1, 1967 from \$1.80 to \$2.00 for LP records. The current reduction restores the \$1.80 price until further notice.

First Leg Of Global Tour By The Rascals

NEW YORK — The Rascals have signed to appear in Stockholm, Istanbul and South Africa this summer. Performances in these three countries constitute the first of a series of worldwide concert tours The Rascals will be making throughout 1968. The remainder of these tours will be in Europe, the Far East and South America.

The Rascals latest release is "Once Upon A Dream," their fourth album; the group also recently received an RIAA gold record for "Groovin'," one of the top 10 single records of 1967.

BGG Checking Canadian Broadcasters On Attitudes Towards Canadian Disks

TORONTO—The Board of Broadcast Governors, the governing body overseeing Canadian broadcasters, recently sent out a questionnaire to record companies and distributors in an effort to gain as much information as possible on the attitude of Canadian Broadcasters with regard to records produced in Canada.

Move Generally Hailed

This first effort by the BBG to understand the problems facing the Canadian music industry has been hailed as one of the most important government moves in many years and will no doubt supply the enthusiasm needed by Canadian producers, who have recently succumbed to the pressure of "no airplay" to get back into the business. As one producer put it, "This investigation will supply myself and my colleagues with new hope in re-generating our productions."

It has been taken for granted that U.S. subsidiaries in Canada might oppose any regulation of Canadian content, however there are indications that many record companies would welcome the additional recognition for originating product, and their U.S. parent companies are looking to Canada as an untapped market of talent and record masters.

The BBG is looking into the question of Canadian content in an effort to understand fully the problems of the Canadian record companies and the independent producer. Currently, the airplay of Canadian content has been quoted as being as low as 3%. The BBG is anxious to hear from various areas across Canada in an effort to ascertain what can be done to make Canada a music making nation. The inquiry will deal with all aspects of music from country and rock to reviews, easy listening, and classical music.

The BBG is asking questions like "Do Canadian artists feel they must leave Canada to receive recognition?"

Obviously, the BBG and the government are interested in curtailing the "talent drain" from Canada.

The investigation, which is now in progress, is being heralded as the most progressive move to promote Canadian talent in Canada and throughout the world ever undertaken.

The Broadcast Act presently being considered by the Canadian government already contains provisions for the BBG to make demands of broadcasters to program predominantly Canadian content.

"Meet At The Midem," a song written by Frank Pourcel and Andre Salvat, was the official Midem hymn. It promises to become an international hit. By the end of Midem, original publishers Tutti and France Etoile sold it to every foreign country.

Jean Pierard, Tutti manager, who represented in Cannes Sergio Gobbi's motion picture "L'Etrangere," is delighted with the international success of the soundtrack music. In France the song "Chanson pour L'Etrangere" (which is the main theme from the film) has been recorded by Romuald who composed the music of "L'Etrangere." This song was just recorded in Italian by Dalida and in German by Udo Jurgens.

The most fantastic surprise for Tutti however was the fabulous success of Paul Mauriat's "Love Is Blue" in the United States. Pierard can't forget that a year ago, during first Midem, he unsuccessfully tried to sell the song to American publishers present in Cannes.

Georgie Fame was very disappointed this week because his "Ballad Of Bonnie And Clyde" was placed under an interdict by French TV. Georgie who specially came to sing it for a TV show, was not allowed to. The reason is ORTF, after a lot of protest against violence on television, decided to forbid all songs of such nature. Georgie will be back in town in April for a concert with Count Basie's Orchestra. This will be part of an extensive European tour.

Polydor is strongly promoting in France Julie Driscoll and the Brian Auger Trinity who were such a great success at Midem. Two singles and an LP have already been released in France through the Marmalade label.

With the great success of John Fred and his Playboy Band with "Judy In Disguise," Mr. Joop Visser of Bovema released the album "Agnes Englisch" of John Fred on Stateside. Another very important release on Stateside is the soul album "More For Your Money." This album will be an enormous promotion for the Rhythm & Blues repertoire in Holland. Mr. Kick Klimbie of Bovema's pop department released Tim Andrews' "Sad Simon Lives Again" and "With This Ring" of Glenn Weston. Both are new artists of EMI. Also he reports the release of Carike Keuzenkamp's "Timoty," the disc for which she was awarded a golden record in South Africa.

Bovema-Gramophonehouse introduced the Buddah label and could not make a better start than with the U.S.A. hit "Green Tambourine" by the Lemon Pipers which is the favorite tune of the Dutch pop stations this week.

CNR started the new Injection label. Artists contracted for this pop label are Ralph Anderson, Tielman Brothers, Daddy's Act, Clungels, Bintangs and Groovy's. The first two records on this new label have already been released: "The Birds Are Coming Over/Worlds Apart" by Ralph Anderson and "Nina Don't Go" by the famous Tielman Brothers. Next week Injection will release the Them LP "Belfast Gypsies."

Bospel Music's Joop Gerrits can contentedly look back at the results which were booked at Midem. The sole agency of Intune Ltd. London was gained for the Benelux countries. Some tens of important and less important titles were drawn for the Benelux countries, and the crown on Bospel's presence was the fact that this firm has been able to dispose of Dutch music in England, Germany and France, of which local versions will be released shortly in the concerned countries. For instance, Michel Legrand will produce a French version of the Belinda's Rob Balijn composition "Faites Vos Jeux."

In February Negram-Delta will be releasing five new singles on Pye—all five potential top ten records for Holland. The Foundations will try to exceed their success of "Baby Now That I Found You" with their second British chart item "Back On My Feet Again" written again by famous team MacAuley-Macleod. The same team has penned Long John Baldry's new chart buster "Hold Back The Daybreak." "Pictures of Mastick Men" has been the debut for the Status Quo. Bruce Forsythe has recorded for Pye a tune written by Tony Hatch and Jackie Trent: "I'm Backing Britain." Sandie Shaw, last but not least, is back on the scene with two items penned by Chris Andrews, "Today" and "London."

Petula Clark's new Vogue single will doubtlessly be another best-seller in Holland. This time no Hatch-Trent composition, but a ballad of Les Reed and Barry Mason: "Kiss Me Goodbye." At the end of February, Warner Bros.-Seven Arts is starting the distribution of her sensational new musical movie "Camelot." Negram-Delta has released the sound-track and is expecting another "Sound Of Music" type best-seller.

Once again, Iramac has the number one carnival topper of the year. Last year, Albert Brosens scored heavily with his carnival rendition of the Beatles' "Yellow Submarine." And now, Toon Hermans, the most commercial talent on record, sold 50,000 of "Mien Waar Is Mijn Feestneus" in its first week. The record has rocketed to number one on the charts which makes it the biggest hit ever for the young company. Iramac is also very happy with the new Starday albums registering on the U.S. album charts. "Traveling Shoes" by Guy Mitchell, "Phantom 309" by Red Sovine and "Country Hits By Candlelight" by George Morgan are scoring heavily in the Country & Western charts. And give Iramac a further impact on the country market in Holland.

New single releases of CBS include Johnny Cash' "Rosanna's Going Wild," Aretha Franklin's "Mockingbird" and Marty Robbins' "El Paso." New CBS releases in the popular LP field include an album by Patty Page entitled "Patti Page's Greatest Hits" and another by famous British Group the Tremeloes entitled "Alan, Ric, Dave and Chip."

One of the most fabulous success stories to come out in recent times in Germany is that of Larry Yaskiel's swinging Stigwood-Yaskiel International organization. The firm which is celebrating it's first birthday as the only indie promotion outlet in Germany have had no less than 24 different top 40 entries in the German lists in 1967. Right now, the top 2 tunes in the chart are also from SYI. December showed 7 top 40 entries and January had as many. Last month showed a tremendous schedule with Procol Harum flying in for the first time.

The Bee Gees coming to the Deutsche Grammophon convention in Hanover to pick up their gold award. Midem saw the troupe moving in fine fashion wheeling and dealing with Peter Knight, Jr., right on Larry's heels making deals.

Artists who have visited Germany last year under the SYI banner are headed by the Bee Gees with the Who, Cream, Jimi Hendrix Experience, Manfred Mann, the Fortunes, Johnny Young, Sandy Posey, Procol Harum and the Move following. The last two acts were actually acquired by SYI for Deutsche Grammophon distribution as was the A&M catalog. Other artists handled by SYI include the Lovin' Spoonful, Sam The Sham, the Sopwith Camel, the Caravelles, Janis Ian, the Four Seasons and Jerry Lee Lewis, just to name a few. The publishing arm of the firm under the capable leadership of Rudy Slezak has captured hits on a regular basis and even Rudy doesn't believe the tremendous growth of his catalog in such a short time. It's a swinging group that also plans to go into production soon and says that it's just a matter of time before they have their own record firm. Whew! Great going to a young avant-garde group of Englishmen and Germans who filled a gap in the German music business and filled it well. Happy birthday.

Tutti Music is pushing the GM recording of "Our Love Doesn't Need Any Words" with new star Kenny which is stirring up action in radio and disco-ques. Interesting figures show that there are 13,805,653 TV sets for the about 60 million inhabitants of West Germany. These figures are easy to collect as each TV set is registered for purposes of collecting the money which pays for the program. Each TV set owner must pay \$1.25 (5 marks) monthly for the privilege of owning a set and watching TV. Growth figures show that 119,554 new sets were registered in December alone. That also means that there are now 74 TV sets for every 100 radios in Germany at the end of 1967.

The complete recording of Wagner's "Tristan And Isolde" under Karl Boehm with the cast of the Bayreuth Festival 1966 was distinguished by the Japan festival of Arts and the Japan Record Academy. The Deutsche Grammophon had already been given the Grand Prix by the Record Academy last year for Boehm's "Wozzeck." Now the two recordings have been awarded 5 international prizes.

Hansa's Peter Meisel swinging with "Dear Eloise" by the Hollies and his production of "When A Man Loves A Woman" by Manuela already over the 130,000 mark in sales. The record's in German.

Top arranger, composer Chris Bruhn trying his luck with instrumentals on Teldec. First single is "Day Dream Believer" coupled with "The Last Waltz."

Telefunken picked up an honorable mention award for their "Vespro della Beata Vergine" from Monteverdi from Hi Fi Stereo Review.

You'd need three weeks time to listen to the 200 LP's that Phonogram-Ton is releasing for their LP program 1968. 33 new LP's are getting their start along with 167 catalog favorites.

Phonogram star Vicky who was the first to sing the top U.S. hit "Love Is Blue" at the Eurovision Festival last year is now visiting Canada where she is set for 7 TV shows, 18 radio appearances and 4 major press conferences in a very few days.

Record sales in East Germany totaled 41 million marks or about 10 million dollars.

Peer Music's Theo O. Seeger tells us of hot work with "The Bells Of San Francisco" by Carnegie Hall, "A Walk In The Sky" from the Flower Pot Men on Deram, "Wear Your Love Like Heaven" from Donovan on Epic, "Bit By Bit" from Neil Christain on Deutsche Vogue, and many others.

Cedric Dumont, head of light music and entertainment, dropped me a line to tell about the new streamlined program conception for Swiss Radio. A radio hit parade is now being broadcast weekly on Tuesday evenings with the ten top hits, a daily show called the "Young Wave" is being broadcast at 6:15 P.M. for a 45 minute package, Wednesdays calls for youth party programming and "Disco-Debut" gives young d.j.'s a chance to show their wares. All in all, it's a pop paradise compared to German radio. Congratulations to Cedric who swings as always!

One of Germany's most popular figures, Fritz Koehler, is leaving Teldec after a long stay with the firm. Rumors have it that the competition at Phonogram-Ton (formerly Philips) have bought the swinging Mr. Koehler who will wheel and deal for the new team at Phonogram-Ton who have a new name and a whole lot of reorganization in the works.

Editorial

In Praise of the One Stop

In recent months, the record one stop has come under critical attack, principally due to his so-called dictatorial manner in choosing tunes for his operator-customers according to the profit markup rather than location suitability. Criticism has also been aimed at his reluctance to merchandise such low-profit specialized items as little LP's and to take the time to review the bulk of weekly releases he receives with his operators' location tastes and suitability foremost in consideration. In some instances it is asserted that the one stop is arrogant enough to list two or three record titles each week for his customers to buy and let his programming service stop there.

First off, let's say this attitude does exist in some quarters, but in actual fact, it is the operator's consistent support of such a one stop that keeps him running his business in this manner. The problem also stems from the operator's own reluctance to spend the proper time dishing out his locations' programming needs and to follow up by demanding the records he requires from his one stop. As Billy Cannon declared, jukebox programming is a forgotten art . . . a practice once exercised with concentration and style, now left to the discretion of the one stop.

There are those one stops who do consider the operator's patronage as a privilege not to be taken lightly but

to be serviced courteously and effectively with the very best record suggestions for the route; far from a hindrance, these firms are a credit to our trade.

There are two reasons an operator shops at a particular one stop: 1. he likes the service or 2. it's close by and he doesn't care too much about the service. For some ops, programming is a real drag. It takes too much time. Leave it up to the one stop and spend your time on other things. Well, it is to the credit of those conscientious one stops who have picked up the ball from the operator and fill in as programming director, quite well.

Last week we had the pleasure of inspecting Henry Leyser's vast record library at his A.C.A. headquarters in Oakland. Hank employs two girls to sift through the volume of new record releases he receives each week to ferret out the most suitable tunes for his varied locations. Florida's Sol Tabb also maintains an extensive record library. Likewise Billy Cannon and others to be sure. But the vast number of music operators have neither the financial resources nor the space to keep past hits on the one hand nor the prominent reputation to enjoy regular mailings from the record companies. They must rely upon the one stop's supply of both for his source. Here again, in both past hits and present picks, the conscientious one stopper offers a truly valuable service and it is to this individual we ask to keep up the good work.

BALLY RESPONDS

CHICAGO—Pressing the telephone to his ear with his left hand and frantically jotting down orders for the 'World Cup' soccer game with his right, Paul Calamari, sales manager of Bally Mfg. Co., panted out a promise that production of the two-player face-to-face competitive game is being rapidly stepped up.

"Earnings of the first hundred 'World Cup' on test location Calamari said, "tipped us off to an exceptional demand. But we frankly did not expect the avalanche of orders which have fallen in on us. And as the news of 'World Cup' collections traveled—especially with license approval in the two game hungry cities of Chicago and New York—the demand continues to snowball.

"Drastic shuffling of production lines, including sacrifice of some slot production, is in process to increase 'World Cup' output. By the end of the month, we hope to be close to current in filling orders. Meanwhile, we ask the patience of operators and distributors. 'World Cup' is well worth waiting for," Calamari added.

Gosteli, Tarans Discuss Market Plans for 160M

MIAMI—Charles Gosteli, head of Societe Electri-Kicker, manufacturers of Jupiter phonographs, paid a recent visit to Bob and Sam Taran here at Jupiter Sales of America headquarters to kick off plans for stepped-up promotion on the phonograph line.

"In the first year, Jupiter has gone beyond our expectations in the United States market," Gosteli declared. While in Miami, he also conferred with Eddie Frink, Jupiter's chief engineer, on the many innovations on the new Jupiter 160M jukebox, due for American release in late February.

Shortly after Gosteli's departure, Bob Taran winged to the Far West to firm up details on formal introduction and distribution plans to the West Coast market for the Jupiter line. Taran advised that plans for a nation-wide Jupiter service school program (a part of the company's accelerated drive on the national scene) would be announced shortly.

Attendance was far above that of the 1967 show. By Tuesday evening, a count of 21,598 was released, as compared with 17,911 folks who had attended by the second day of the previous show. Exhibit displays, featuring the wares of foreign nations, was also in strong evidence. Those countries exhibiting included: Great Britain, Germany, Canada, Belgium, Austria, Italy and Czechoslovakia.

Realistic Batter-Pitcher Action Provided By ChiCoin's New Baseball



ChiCoin ALL STARS

CHICAGO — The Chicago Coin Machine Division of Chicago Dynamic Industries released to the trade last week their 1968 amusement game entry for the coming baseball season. ChiCoin's All Stars is a two-player that has a unique 'pitcher control' feature which allows both players to

play the game simultaneously. Realistic pitcher-batter competition exists whereby one player can control the type of pitch delivered (straight, curve or slider) while the batter anticipates the pitch in an attempt to score runs.

Chicago Coin's Mort Score stated upon the release of All Stars, "additional excitement is generated with the red bases loaded button that lights up when there's a man on each base and stays lighted until the 5 run target or either bleacher ramp is hit by the ball," Score went on to say, "All Stars, features two bleacher ramps . . . each scoring 5 runs when lighted for a total of 10 extra runs."

Other All Stars features include the star target that is adjustable for extra runs, balls and bonus features. A feature that allows an extra ball plus ten runs if a player lights the letters, A-L-L-S-T-A-R-S. A player can also get an extra ball and ten runs if he can activate the 5 run target when the bases are loaded. Also if he can hit the same target when either of the two extra ball features are lighted he will receive an extra ball.

Other features include new steel door and trim, double coin chutes 10¢-25¢, and new resilient long-life nylon bat. Looks like a long season and lots of play for All Stars.

Factory Report



United Billiards — Making More Than the Name Implies

United Billiards, Inc. was founded in 1965 by Art Daddis, one of the solid sales veterans of the coin machine business, who after decades of dealing with operators as a salesman decided to set out, as he says, "to make a better pool table."

The years before Daddis turned his talents toward table production, he traveled the length and breadth of the U.S.A. plugging the wares of several music, games and table factories, talking with operators, learning from them what they liked about the products he represented and what they would like to see changed. Naturally enough, he collected hundreds of suggestions over the years, some he kept in the back of his mind, others he discarded as interesting but impractical. Finally he made the decision to try his own hand at making a coin table (a product he had been selling for several years previously) and opened the first United Billiards plant on Loretto St. in Newark, N.J.

Daddis collected or rather selected a dozen or so carpenters and cabinet makers for his first factory crew and

set forth a table design based upon the suggestions from operators he considered worthwhile . . . smoother, less complicated runways, fewer moving parts in the coin drawer, a freer, quieter action all 'round which he dubbed the "velvet touch". To create this table in the most efficient time possible, he designed a production line patterned after the Detroit auto factories with each man a specialist in one selected area.

Daddis originally stated, "in order to succeed in this highly competitive business of making pool tables, you have to have something different to show the operator." He incorporated everything from a "tamper-proof" money counter into the cash box with a hardened steel cash door to dust and dirt free runways . . . a list of two dozen-plus features he proudly listed in his promotion pieces.

Another of Daddis' different approaches to pool tables was his appointment of exclusive distributors in each selected territory . . . a policy he has retained till this day. "Exclusivity gives distributors the time to

concentrate on the product and it pays off for both of us," Daddis contends.

The very first United table, a model 300, rolled off the line Nov. 3rd of 1965, followed in time by the 400, the 200 the 100 and finally in early 1968 by the regulation sized model 500. Success in those early days, both in the appointment of qualified distributors and the acceptance of the product led to the purchase of a second building on Hunter St. in Newark. Daddis managed to operate on controlled production for the first year or so, making only as many tables as he could sell, but the policy has since been abandoned. "Now," Art says, "we sell all we can make."

Fast and furious activity at both the Hunter and Loretto plants still could not fill the distributor orders in any reasonable time and Daddis decided to consolidate the entire operation in one immense plant on Progress St. in nearby Union which he opened in mid-1967. Today in the Union factory, United enjoys 37,000 sq. ft. for office and manufacturing space with an additional 10,000 sq. ft. for parking alongside. At present, the shop and office personnel has swelled to 30. Design and engineering is now headed up by Gene Daddis with Earl Young supervising production and development.

The step by step production line begins with the uncrating and cutting of plywood (usually delivered in lots of 500 to 1,000 sheets in widths varying from 1/2 to 3/4"). The flat work (cabinet sides, bottoms etc.) goes down one line while odd shaped pieces (e.g. the rails) go down another. Mica is then laminated to the flat pieces while the rails are trimmed in rubber and felt. The mounting Dept. then collects its component pieces and assembles the cabinet (outside shell). Inside assembly (such as the runways) are then inserted. Afterward, the assembled components are screwed together, stapled, glued etc. for rigidity. Then comes the inspection Dept. which gives a scrupulous going over to the cabinet (now mounted on the legs), before the slate is placed into it (at United, an electrical crane-hook and harness enables movement of the heavy slate by one man). Then to the cleanout section where a stem-to-stern second inspection is given the table by United veteran shop employee Vincente Valdes. Afterward, the cushions (which feature the adjustable aluminum T-Channel) are bolted to the table. A

third inspection follows before the finished piece arrives at the packing area. Using this system, Daddis claims his line can now turn out 40 tables a day . . . and maintain the quality control his distributors demand.

United Billiards has embarked on a diversification into other types of amusement equipment, starting in 1967 with the 'Teeter Meter' counter game, followed by the 'Bocchetta' (see cut) and ultimately by United's 'Nice and Easy' (a unique bowler due for release before next MOA). United's table line now also includes the 'Bunny Pool' (rebound pool table) as well as the 'Patrician' regulation-sized commercial parlor table.

United Billiards' leap into the coin machine industry has been called a "Cinderella Story," having progressed in a little over two years to its prominent position in the pool table manufacturing community. When it's 'Nice and Easy' bowler hits the market, the trade might again witness another "overnight" entry this time into the hallowed territory of the big games factories.

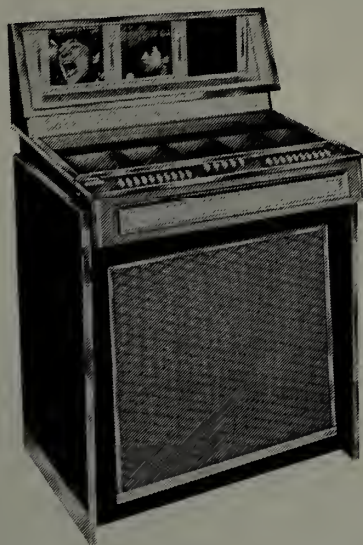

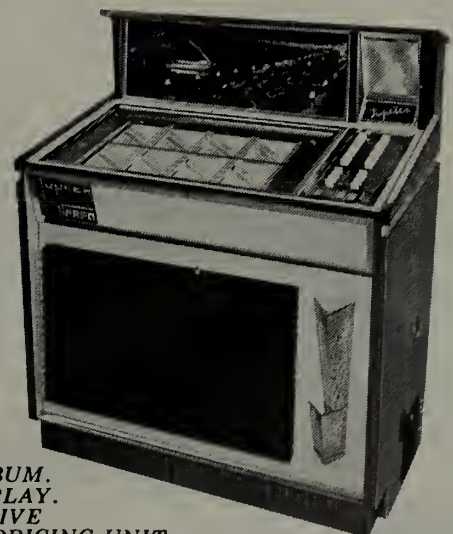

Starting the New Year with an instructional explosion, Wurlitzer phonograph service programs were undertaken in Seattle, Washington and Los Angeles, California. A top crew of training specialists headed by C. B. Ross, Service Manager, and consisting of Harry Gregg, Southeast Field Service Engineer, Leonard Hicks, Far West Field Service Engineer, staffed the school with an assist from Walt Peteet who left his semi-retirement in Alaska to aid in the training program at the Seattle school.

The program in Seattle covered a period from January 15th thru 19th and was held at the Edgewater Hotel. Ron Pepple and Marshall McKee, Wurlitzer distributors in Washington and Oregon, hosted a group of thirty-eight service people, several of whom came from the far reaches of Alaska and others from as far east as Montana and Idaho.

For the first time, two ladies, each of whom is already associated with the phonograph business, took the full five-day course. They were Mrs. Pauline Heyer who, in addition to handling the Parts Department for Northwest Sales Company in Seattle, is also capable of running service for that company, and Mrs. Jackie Webb of Ketchikan, Alaska, who handles service for the Capitol Vending Company.

According to C. B. Ross, the enthusiasm for the schools was so intense that some of the daily classes lasted as long as twelve hours.

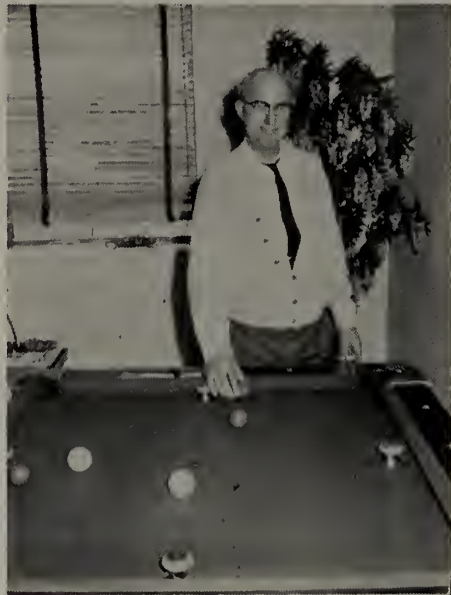

servicemen took advantage of the free instruction proffered by The Wurlitzer Company.

Further schools are planned in the near future and the exact dates and locale will be made known to distributors and operators in the areas involved as soon as firm hotel arrangements can be completed.

All-Tech To Buy Lead Fabricators; Joins to Republic

NEW YORK — All-Tech Industries, Inc., Hialeah, Florida, announced it has agreed to purchase Lead Fabricators, Inc., a privately owned Brooklyn, N. Y. company, for an undisclosed amount of cash and stock.

The acquisition, according to Justin J. Goldsmith, All-Tech president, is the second step in All-Tech's previously announced expansion into the metals field.

On October 31, 1967, All-Tech acquired Republic Metals Company, Brooklyn, N. Y., engaged in the smelting and refining of non-ferrous metals including lead, tin and antimony.

Lead Fabricators, Inc., extrudes metal parts for their air conditioning, plumbing and heating industry and produces lead shields for x-ray and nuclear radiation control. The company will be operated as an affiliate of Republic Metals, and the combined metals operation will be further expanded into an integrated production complex, Goldsmith said.

Melvin J. Levy, president of Lead Fabricators, will be retained in that position. No management changes are anticipated.

All-Tech Industries is engaged in the production of leisure-time products, non-ferrous alloys, and industrial filtration systems and precision components and hardware.

**UCM Awarded Contract
To Mfg. Vendors Of Cards,
Stamps & Envelopes**

ST. LOUIS—UMC Industries, Inc., has received a contract from the United States Post Office Department for production of 680 postal merchandising machines to be used for automatically dispensing postal items such as stamps, postal cards and packets of stamped envelopes.

The company plans to manufacture the postal units in St. Louis at the plant of its subsidiary, National Rejectors, Inc. Deliveries are scheduled to begin in October.

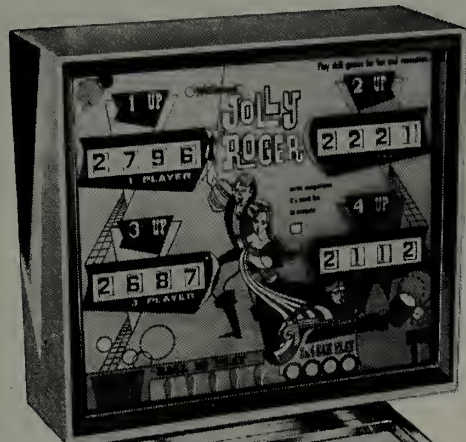

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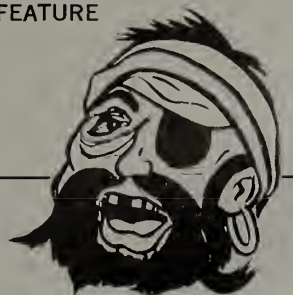

"All we need to break down the natural hesitancy of the op's is a few hustling distributors."

Whether Bill Nutting is flying high in the California skies, out on the court playing a rugged game of tennis, out on the ocean scuba diving or sitting at his desk solving an intricate production problem . . . his fresh, crisp, modern, aggressive attitude comes thru to compliment his youthful appearance.

This week's Profile subject, William G. Nutting, president of Nutting Associates, manufacturers of Computer Quiz, gives that 'first impression' of a man who 'does something' first and 'talks' about it second.

Nutting and his lovely wife, Claire, are the proud parents of three children. While residing in Mountain View, Calif., Nutting maintains a 5,000 sq. ft. building at 556 Ellis Street, housing administrative and production offices.

Bill was born and reared in the Chicago area and attended Oak Park and River Forest Turnship high schools from 1940-44. After high school he entered the Army Air Corps as an Aviation Cadet. In the fall of 1946, he enrolled at Colgate University, transferring to the University of Colorado in 1948 and earning his B.S. Degree in Business Administration.

Nutting took a job with National Motor Bearing Company as a general executive trainee, then, in 1951, went with Rheem Mfg. Co. where he received experience in production line foreman, inventory control, purchasing and inside sales. In 1956, he transferred to Rheem's Chicago plant for an inside sales and office management position.

Nutting resigned from the Rheem organization in 1959 to return to California and enter the retail business. In 1962, he became a financial partner of Edex Company, a teaching systems manufacturer. As the small company developed, he was drawn to a device developed as a sideline known as 'Knowledge Computer.' He then became active in marketing the new device and received his first taste of the coin machine industry.

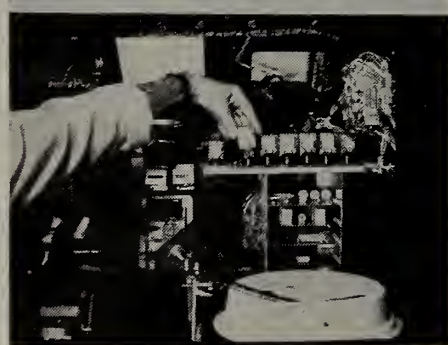
"With the upcoming large population of the computer generation, the growing emphasis on knowledge, education, TV quiz programs, etc., a sophisticated educational coin-operated game seemed to have potential," Nutting said. "After a year of exposure the consensus was that the idea was good, but the Knowledge Computer was too expensive and too difficult to service. It was obvious that a redesign was necessary to lower manufacturing costs, make the unit aesthetically appealing and more easily serviceable," he added.

After this redesign project was completed, Nutting formed Nutting Associates and acquired the patents from Edex—thus, the birth of Computer Quiz. Production was started.

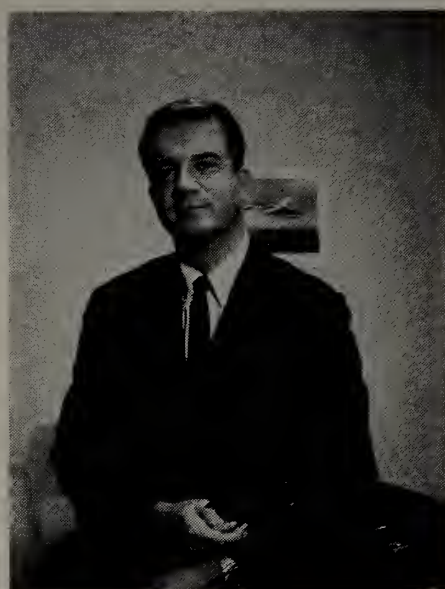
Bill stated, "After one year of test marketing over 400 units out on location, we felt we were ready to go after National distribution, the MOA show marked the end of our test market phase and the beginning of our national sales program. We are confident that the marketing experience gained during those twelve months will prove invaluable to the distributors and operators of our units. We forecast a great potential for innovative ideas in the industry and we look forward to participating in it."

When Nutting was asked whether he felt Computer Quiz would open up new locations, he stated, "Although, Computer Quiz can be placed anywhere that other amusement games are, we feel that the real market for C.Q. is in the new locations, locations where other amusement machines would not fit. For instance, motel lounges and student union centers."

As far as the educational application is concerned, Nutting thinks, "there are many educational applications for C.Q. After all, the machine was originally a teaching device adapted for

the coin-op market. The marketing of coin-op equipment is quite different from marketing teaching machines however, but we will probably get into the educational markets a few months down the road."

The Computer Quiz is produced in a new 5,000 square foot building where Nutting's staff of competent technicians do virtually all manufacturing with the exception of the cabinet work.

While Nutting has plans to market other devices for the coin-op market, they feel it would be premature to "advise details at this time."

One indication that Nutting has given a great deal of thought to the continuing availability of film programs was apparent when he said, "Our library of films is a continuing process to insure the continuity of Computer Quiz in the future. Our programming is all done 'in house' and with each passing month, we become more sophisticated in producing new and exciting film programs."

"Our basic marketing policy is to set up a nationwide network or chain of distributors," Nutting said, "we will, however, sell directly to buyers in areas where no distributor is available."

"As far as selling directly to locations," Nutting went on to say, "we will do so only in special situations, such as in the case of amusement parks, etc."

"The steady income figures range up to \$500-\$600 gross per month for the good locations, such as airports, colleges, lounges, large bowling alleys, etc.," Nutting stated.

The pricing structure for Computer Quiz is based on 10c plays; the coin acceptor will take nickles, dimes and quarters (3 games for a quarter).

He went on to say, "All the machines are programmed to give a 'Genius' test to players attaining a certain score. This Genius test is actually a free play of the machine. In a few areas we have had to eliminate this free test, but most areas of the country permit such a bonus."

When asked about the foreign market for C.Q., we learned, "We'll certainly go to the foreign markets with Computer Quiz. Now is not the opportune time for us, however. Working effectively in the foreign markets requires a great deal of management time, and we feel we would rather put this time into establishing a strong national network. We will first establish our national distributors and meet their needs; then we will begin to market internationally."

History has it that operators are reluctant to try new amusement game ideas, unless they are proven money-makers. Nutting says, "We have certainly encountered the hesitancy among coin machine operators towards the purchase of new types of equipment. However, there is a very effective grapevine in the coin-op industry, and the word is getting out that these machines make money. All we need to break down the natural hesitancy of

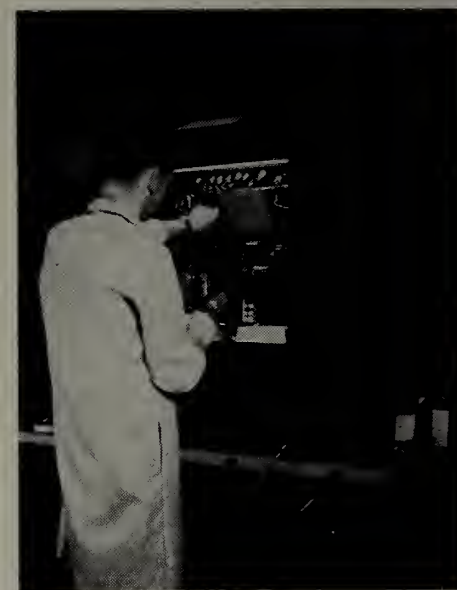


Photo shows a final check-out technician examining a Computer Quiz on its way off the production line.

the industry is a few hustling distributors that can lay out machines where operators can see what they make. We are presently assigning a very high priority to finding such distributors."

We feel that Computer Quiz has started a trend toward more sophisticated coin-op entertainment. The early stages of getting started are rough for a new manufacturer, but the question and answer game is definitely here to stay. Most importantly, innovation in coin-op equipment is here to stay, and innovation is the real product that we plan to offer the industry over the coming years."

It is always a pleasure for us to interview and talk with young aggressive men in the industry, regardless of whether they have been in it for one year or ten years. Taking nothing away from the many fine veterans (they have, and continue to prove their value to the trade), it is a natural known fact that one day the whole scene will rest in the hands of the young businessman. Bill Nutting is but one of many young businessmen in this business and we owe it to the trade and to ourselves to give them complete support whenever needed and wherever possible.

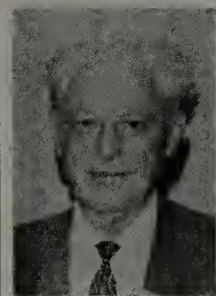

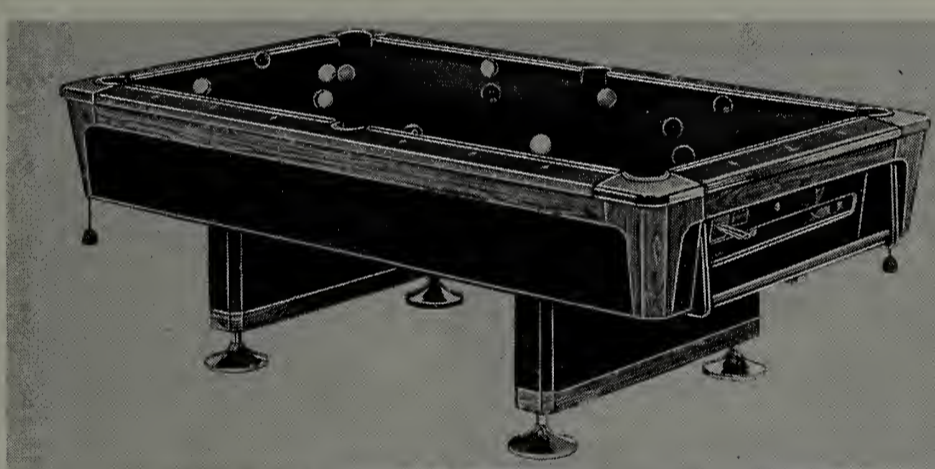

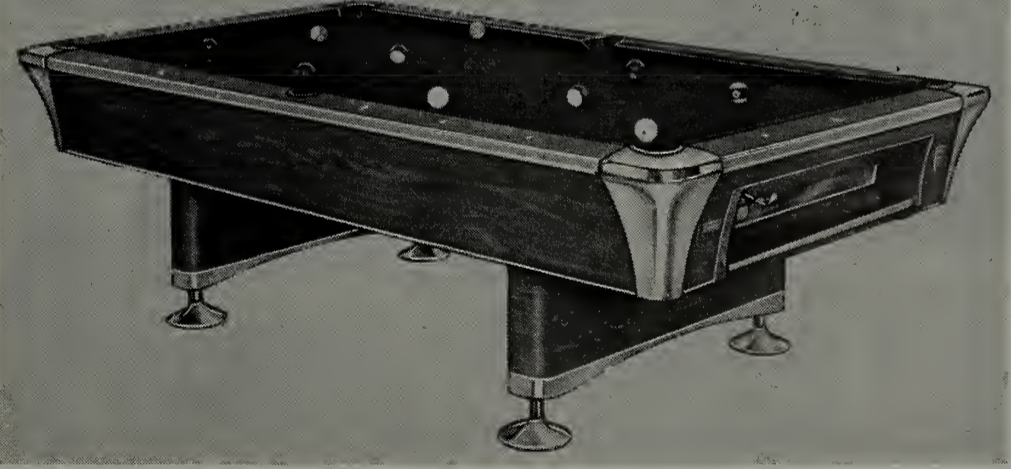

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Canteen 1st Qtr. Sales Reach Record Highs

CHICAGO—Canteen Corporation reported that sales for the first quarter fiscal 1968, ending Dec. 23, 1967, reached record highs but that net earnings, as anticipated, were lower than a year ago.

Sales and incomes from operations totaled \$80,942,000, compared to first-quarter fiscal 1967 sales of \$80,039,000. Net earnings amounted to \$2,247,000 or 32c per share, compared to \$2,860,000 or 41c per share for the period a year earlier.

O'Malley said that "the quarter just closed was on budget and that Canteen anticipates both sales and profit

growth during the balance of fiscal 1968.'

The Canteen chief executive also noted that the sale of the Rowe Manufacturing Division has been approved by the stockholders of Triangle Conduit & Cable Co., Inc. The assets were sold for approximately \$30,000,000, of which more than \$24,000,000 will be received in cash, \$4,000,000 in Triangle 6% convertible subordinated debentures, and \$1,500,000 in an installment note. The sale resulted in a net loss of approximately \$1,400,000 which was fully reserved during the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, 1967.
