

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Returning To 'Returns'

One of 1972's closing editorials made a point about the return problem that saw "market awareness" on the wholesaling and retailing levels as one way to help reduce what many regard as the industry's biggest "cleanup" factor.

We now offer a manufacturer's point of view, thanks to an illuminating sales convention rap between Jac Holzman, president of Elektra Records, and Joel Friedman, president of the W-E-A branch system, through which, of course, Elektra forms the "E" in W-E-A. In reply to a question by Friedman—who termed "returns" the industry's greatest problem—Holzman gave his views on the matter—adding to it his feelings about "dumping," too.

On returns, Holzman said that the reduction of returns could be assisted by manufacturers through the "care on issuing LP's," by allocating a proper number of albums on the wholesaling level and by not "overselling" an artist, particularly a newcomer. Holzman also believed that a "fixed return percentage" on returns should be tried again on an experimental basis. The latter concept was in answer to a question on "dumping." And in one sentence, we believe, Holzman said it all: "Dumping erodes the bottom line, the confidence of the retailer, the buyer" and, last but certainly not least, "the artist." Holzman admitted that Elektra had been involved in "dumping," but made it clear that "we won't do it again."

Experience has been a good teacher for Holzman. We would hope that this could be the case for others who might feel that it makes sense to "take the money and run." But, the truth—as Holzman said in his "erosion" remark —is that the industry is not running away from anything, but "into" something, namely a present false economy at the expense of future progress through industry stability.

This editorial and that based on wholesale-retail "market awareness" should make it clearer that the problem of "returns" and its evil sidekick, "dumping," is an all-industry concern. Again, we urge the industry to do more talking about it on the level of an allinclusive meeting ground like NARM, which, fortunately, will raise the matter at its convention next month. At the moment, we feel the dilemma can be greatly solved by a philosophic attitude that looks beyond the present and into the years ahead. "Erosion of confidence" is an ugly phrase to take into the future of the industry.



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Motown Industries Is Formed; Gordy Chief; Abner Label Pres

HOLLYWOOD — In a sweeping re-structuring and expansion of the Mo-town entertainment complex, pres-ident Berry Gordy has revealed the creation of Motown Industries as the parent organization embracing the recording-music publishing-motion picture and television conglomerate.

Exactly two years ago, Merrill, Wayne, Alan, Jay and Donny Os-mond released their first MGM single, "One Bad Apple." The single went on to become the group's first num-ber one record, and their first to be certified gold by the RIAA. Since that time, the Osmonds seem to have acquired the midas touch, garnering gold awards for each of their albums as well as for their "Yo Yo," and "Down By The Lazy River" singles: When Donny Osmond stepped out as a solo performer, he too added to the When Donny Osmond stepped out as a solo performer, he too added to the group's gold mine with "Sweet And Innocent," "Go Away Little Girl," "Puppy Love," "Hey Girl," and five LP's. The Osmonds' success as a re-cording and performing group has reached the international level with as many as three singles on the Great Britain top ten charts at once, and a command performance before the Queen. Queen.

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Gordy assumes the titles of chair-man of the board and president of Motown Industries, effective immedi-ately. He also named Ewart G. Abner II as president of Motown Corp. Record

Gordy said he was stepping aside as president of the record company at this time "because it seems approprithis time because it seems appropri-ate to turn the reins over to a man who knows every facet of the busi-ness and is respected by all of us. There is no better man to carry on the tradition and philosophy of Mo-town Records."

Abner formerly headed various key areas of Motown for some six years.

Motown has moved forward dra-matically in the past decade in multi-ple areas of the entertainment specple areas of the entertainment spec-trum. This past month alone Motown claims the #1 grossing motion pic-ture (Lady Sings The Blues), the #1 Broadway musical (Pippin), the #1 single (Papa Was a Rolling Stone), the #1 album (All Directions), the hottest soundtrack album (Lady Sings the Blues), the #1 music pub-lishing operation, and the #1 TV net-work animated series (The Jackson Five Show). "With our new executive align-

"With our new executive align-ment," Gordy said, "we are better prepared than ever to challenge the new horizons that lie ahead."

RCA Sets Price For Sub-Dist.: **Ups Dealer Tag**

NEW YORK—RCA Records said late last week that effective Jan. 15 it is establishing, within price control guidelines, a sub-distributor pricing guidelines, a sub-distributor pricing structure on its product which will be applicable to those who qualify as sub-distributors in those areas where the company has established its own distribution.

At the same time, RCA Records announced it had found it "necessary to effect a slight increase" in the dealer prices for its pop record al-bums and tapes.

Holzman's Far-Reaching Views At Elektra Sales Convention

PHOENIX — After more than 20 years of running a company he formed more than two decades ago as a college student, Jac Holzman has developed a number of wide-ranging philosophies about the music busi-

ness. There were publicly expressed at There were publicly expressed at the label's sales convention here (Jan. 4-7) during a rap sessions be-tween Holzman and Joel Friedman, president of the W-E-A distributing company. Holzman fielded a series of questions by Friedman during a ses-sion billed as "The Jac & Joel Show." Here are some of the responses, topic-by-topic:

Industry Potential

"There are an awful lot more phono-graphs out there than there are rec-ord buyers. I think that's been proven by the tremendous success of certain television packages. Michael Kapp ask-ed me how many polka sets I thought had been sold through television. The answer was far in avcess of 1 million answer was far in excess of 1 million

albums. That means every p buyer had been reached. It's been polka abuyer had been reached. It's been said many times before and it's worth re-peating: a \$1 million dollar LP, which represents about 475,000 to 500,000 units is really not such an achieve-ment when you think we're reaching only 1% of the population . . . we've become accustomed to a philosophy in the last couple of years that says catalog doesn't sell, which is not true; that a record will sell most of what it's going to sell in 90 days; that's true if you only promote it for 90 days . . . you've got to keep market-ing the artist; if the music is there you must keep chasing it. The record companies have a couple of things to do. We've got to find new ways to nationally market records we've got to get off our asses and go out to those stores we don't normally course and dowloan zew rate il cutlets

we've got to get on our asses and go out to those stores we don't normally cover and develop new retail outlets; we've all got to think of new ways to reach people because at least 50% of American homes have phonographs ... and we're just not reaching them."

NEW YORK — 1973 is expected to mark a major turning point in the recording industry's battle against those who pirate and counterfeit records and tape recordings, according to Stan Gortikov, president of the Recording Industry Association of

America. "We feel we have finally wrested the initiative and gone on the offen-sive," Gortikov adds. "We have far to

Pirate Sellers Hit In Court **Royalty Decision**

NEW YORK - M. Joseph Blumenfeld, Chief Judge of the United States feld, Chief Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Con-necticut, entered two judgments on Jan. 3, in an action instituted by a number of Fox Agency publishers against sellers of pirated recordings based upon the increased penalties provided by the enactment of the Federal anti-piracy bill in October, 1971. 1971.

Federal anti-piracy bill in October, 1971. On a motion for summary judg-ment against Tape Center Ltd. and its principal Ramona A. Cortese, the Court awarded statutory damages in the amount of \$8,250 based upon the statutory minimum of \$250 for in-fringement of each musical work, to-gether with \$3,864.50 as costs of the action and a statutory attorney's fee of \$4,500. On a motion for a default judgment against Matty Ballaro, a distributor of the recordings, the Court entered default in the amount of \$12,250 based upon an award of the statutory minimum of \$250 for infringement of each musical work, together with costs of the action in the amount of \$1.288 17, and a statu-tory attorney's fee in the amount of \$1,500.

Berman Statement

Albert Berman, head of The Harry Fox Agency, Inc., hailed the judg-ments as a "major step in the anti-piracy campaign of his publisher principals." He emphasized that this (Cont'd on p. 70)

go before piracy is effectively curtailed, but we know we are hindering many operations, jeopardizing the pi-rates' profitability, and increasing their risk of criminal prosecution."

Factors Cited

Gortikov credits a number of fac-tors as being responsible for the prog-ress made in the industry's antipiracy drive.

First, says Gortikov, is the indus-try's "firm resolve" to take all neces-sary steps to eradicate an illegal busisary steps to eradicate an illegal busi-ness that has been draining more than \$200,000,000 annually from the legiti-mate industry. This led RIAA to quadruple its anti-piracy budget in 1972 and to establish its anti-piracy intelligence bureau with a full-time staff of attorneys and investigators headed by Jules E. Yarnell in New York. RIAA also joined with the Na-tional Association of Record Mer-chandisers (NARM) in marshaling a nationwide network of shoppers who have been feeding information on pi-rates' activities to the companies whose products are being illegally du-plicated, as well as to Federal, State and local law enforcement agencies.

More Civil Suits

Gortikov notes that the flow of intelligence has resulted in a sharp in-crease in the number of civil suits brought by record companies against manufacturers, distributors and re-tailers of bogus records and tapes throughout the country with an al-most perfect record of success. Moremost perfect record of success. More-over, acting on information developed by RIAA, law enforcement authorities have become increasingly active in making raids, arresting the owners of pirate operations and impounding huge quantities of pirated or counter-feit merchandise and duplicating eouipment.

The labels are Paramount, Dot, Neighborhood, Tumbleweed, Green Bottle, Family, Blue Thumb, Just Sunshine and Sire. Martell continued to say that art-ists such as Melanie, Commander Cody and Donna Fargo have had as much success outside the United States as at home. "Melanie," contin-ued Martell, "has just completed an enormously successful tour of Japan. Her latest album Stoneground Words is doing extremely well in Europe, Her latest album Stoneground Words is doing extremely well in Europe, and she is currently one of the top selling vocalists in Germany. In 1972 alone, Melanie was the recipient of the Cash Box #1 Top Female Vocalist award, and Germany's Musik Markt named her #1 Female Foreign Vocal-ist. She was awarded the United Kingdom's Silver Disk Award, in Ger-many, an Otto named her Most Popu-lar Female Singer, and Schallplatte, a German publication voted her #1 Top Female Foreign Vocalist. Melanie was also awarded a Gold Album for her UNICEF album which was recorded by artists who made the UNICEF tour with her."

Donna Fargo and Commander Cody have also received their share of rec-ognition and honors in 1972. Donna was awarded the Cash Box #1 Most Promising Female Artist in both Country and Pop. 
Azteca's 9-Day West Coast Tour

BMI Establishes Music Study Grant For CISAC Council

NEW YORK — In order to encourage study of copyright matters dealing with Latin American performing rights societies, BMI (Broadcast Mu-sic, Inc.) has established a BMI/ CISAC Pan American Council schol-arship. An annual grant of \$1,500 will be available to the council imme-diately. The funds are intended to en-courage the study of problems of ad-ministrative and legal nature relating to copyright within the realm of the Latin American societies. At the end of a three-year period, BMI will make an additional payment to the council to defray the cost of publishing the results of the studies. The scholarships were established by BMI president Edward M. Cramer, following the 28th CISAC (Interna-tional Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers) Congress in Mexico City in Oct. 1972. At those sessions, Cramer engaged in discus-sions of the difficulties confronting the Latin American organizations. In a letter offering the scholarships, Cramer wrote to Roberto A. Talice, president of the council: "Discussions relating to Latin American societies during the congress were of particu-NEW YORK — In order to encourage

relating to Latin American societies during the congress were of particu-lar interest to BMI. The difficulties confronting these organizations will be overcome in due time, just as societies in other parts of the world have eventually been able to solve similar problems. BMI demonstrates its coop-eration and friendship by offering these scholarships to the Pan Ameri-can Council of CISAC."

CISAC Comments

Council president Talice responded to the proposal, saying: "During its last meeting, the Pan American Coun-cil of CISAC discussed the news about the scholarship which BMI offers to encourage the study of prob-lems of administrative and legal nature relating to intellectual proper-ty within the area of influence of Latin American societies. "We advise you that this council

"We advise you that this council has accepted your offer and is now in the process of selecting the person who will receive the scholarship. As soon as we have made the choice, we shall let you know."





Book Review:

Buddy Holly . . . A Biography In Words, Photographs and Music by Elizabeth and Ralph Peer, II

Publishers don't often compile biographies of their songwriters, but then Buddy Holly was more than just another tunesmith. And Elizabeth and Ralph Peer II have obviously done much personal interviewing of friends and relatives close to the late rock pioneer to round out the purely business angle one might expect from authors who dealt with their subject primarily in that regard.

Holly is here verbally characterized in a readable, terse style, as a composer and performer who worked hard to get where his music eventually placed him. But he's also shown clearly through an excellent collection of photos and memorabilia reproductions.

Thirty-six Holly songs form the bulk of the book, including all his self-penned hits as well as the material he made famous for other songwriters. Perhaps the most remarkable section of the book however is a copious discography, listing foreign as well as domestic releases by Holly himself and by others who sought to duplicate his success by recording the material so closely associated with him.

So in one 148 soft-covered edition are all the facts and insights any interested party could ask for. A most important contribution to the preservation of rocs history. r.a.





His career at this point in his life was "on and off," shuttling from the strip joint to his parents home in Gibralter and back again to the desert disrobes.

Life Experience continues to rain down on this trouper who started smoking at five years old. He's now 16 in our story, a bit more mature (he can shave now), and he's traveling with his brother in a group called the **Diamond Boys**. This group recorded for RCA in Spain covering American hits like **Elvis**' "Return to Sender."

At 18 Albert left the group and went to England. His ticket to London was paid for by five songs he knocked out and sold to RCA. Life Experience rains still more. Next he becomes a duo act joining forces with **Richard Cartwright** (a former Diamond Boy, it sounds rather like the counterpart to the Zigfield Girls). The two appear on "Thank Your Lucky Stars" and other pop TV shows. Nothing consequential happens.

A little more London rain and Hammond is now found in his early twenties, playing with a group called Los Cuico Ricardos. Right about here Hammond is

NEW YORK-DONNA FARGO: ALL ABOUT A FEELING

There's something special I want to say about **Donna Fargo**. It doesn't have much to do with facts, or even thoughts for that matter. It's all about a feeling that she has the power to tap, within herself and within others. Whether this feeling be called expression, communication, art or charisma is unimportant, becaus these are only words, not feelings. After all, the dictionary has plenty of words to tell what things such as love

After all, the dictionary has plenty of words to tell what things such as love mean, but the dictionary can't tell you how love feels. If I wanted to write down the facts, I could tell about the numerous awards Donna's two million-selling singles have garnered for her, but suffice it to say that she was one of the major new stars of last year's music scene.

But Donna has a special feeling, and **that's** what this article is all about. When the gold on all of her awards tarnishes and fades, the feeling will still be with her, proving itself as far more enduring than superficial fame and fortune. There's something inside Donna that wants to touch everybody, and there's something beaming out of her that **does**.

Because of her firm grip on her desire to communicate, Donna's words, music and voice speak in basic and essential human awareness (otherwise known as getting right down to the heart of the matter). Whether she is singing, or just sitting around and talking, she is always interested in sharing her experiences with an understanding twinkle in her eye, she is just as willing to listen to a point being made by another as she is to make a point of her own.

It all adds up to an aura of composed tranquility, with a strong underlying air of confidence, very simply, the qualities of being the happiest girl in the whole U.S.A. Donna radiates the feeling of riding high on a wave of optimism—she's in the middle of a fairy tale about a California schoolteacher who wrote a song and became a superstar. And the fast rise to fame that she has experienced

introduced to Mike Hazelwood at Radio Luxembourg. Albert exits the group and begins writing with Mike, who up to this point hadn't had any hits. But change was written in the skies. Their songwriting partnership soon becomes one to be coveted by publishers. They write some almost-hits—"The Train," recorded by Colours of Love, and "Goodmorning Freedom" by **Blue Mink**. Then come the million sellers—"Make Me An Island," "Little Arrows" (four million), and "Gimme Dat Ding." The latter two songs were written for a British Children's show called "Oliver and The Overworld," created and produced by Hammond and Hazelwood. The sprinkle of Life's success is reaped.

The now-affluent team next becomes involved singing in two groups, the Family Dog and Magic Lantern, and with the latter they score, this time as recording artists with "Shame, Shame."

Some more traditional London rain, and the team splits from the group and decides to go off to a place where it never rains, Southern California. This is the place **Mike Hazelwood** had always heard about via the song "California Dreamin" " and the novel "Grapes of Wrath." Unfortunately, in the beginning, the legendary mecca wasn't able to fulfill expectations, including a guaranteed supply of sunshine. Life Experience continues it's cascade even in Southern California.

Hazelwood recalls it as "hard times" and says he would have been even more despondent had it not been for the genuine encouragement of his hyper-optimistic partner. The two writers have very disparate personalities and are aware of their complementing natures. Hazelwood is reserved and methodic while Hammond is the relentless extrovert. It is precisely Hammond's unyielding perserverance that kept him out everyday, knocking on doors of west coast record companies. He went to them all only to be rejected. Hammond recounts how ABC/ Dunhill showed some interest but finally returned his tape. However **Barry Gross** and **Marty Kupps**, then at ABC, saw something in Hammond and soon convinced **Hal Landers** and **Bobby Roberts**' Mum Records of the performer's potential. That was six months ago. Today Southern Californians' can look up at a billboard publicizing Albert Hammond, unless of course their umbrellas happen to be hindering the view.

Meanwhile Hammond and Hazelwood continue to write for Albert's second LP.

has done anything but unnerve her. Her underlying confidence stems from the fact that she is singing more than a song; Donna is giving a musical narration of her life story and philosophy.

Self Fulfillment

Did you ever hear of a self-fulfilling prophecy? It's the process a person goes through when he or she decides that something is going to happen in his or her life. The person then works toward making this prediction happen, (both consciously and subconsciously) until it finally does. This is what Donna did with her song. "The Happiest Girl In The Whole U.S.A.;" she wrote about how things should be at their best, and when the song became a hit, it made her feelings come true for her. Since the feelings she set forward in the tune were so basic and universal, people from all walks of life were able to relate to it, and "Happiest Girl" became a number one record in pop markets across the nation, as well as in the country markets where it started. The same concept held true for "Funny Face," which quickly sold over a million copies to both country and pop fans, since it touched on romantic feelings that have no country and pop borders.

Categories Are Confining

For this reason, **Stan Silver** (Donna's husband and manager) has been having difficulty in deciding what to call Donna when a TV emcee or deejay asks him for a short phrase that summarizes her musical style and appeal. "You know what kind of phrases I mean," Stan mused as he tugged on his beard in deep thought, "things like 'the First Lady of Country,' 'the Queen of Soul' and 'Pop Superstar,' but something that really says what Donna is doing." Although we discussed just about every conceivable phrase, none of them had the proper descriptive powers —they were all too confining and only began to describe portions of Donna's artistic latitude. Perhaps there is no all-encompassing phrase for her, since she serves as a link between many different factions of American music. Perhaps as Donna continues to follow through on her hitmaking instincts, giving us more musical vignettes with universal appeal, we will be able to see her music on a broad enough basis to be able to invent a category that will actually describe all of her talents. But until that time, we must describe her simply as **Donna Fargo**, since words fall short of description. She's all about a feeling. m.p.

Four Tops Barbara Mason

COCONUT GROVE, L.A. — The Four Tops, who have been spinning gold records for over a decade, satiated their opening-night audience. They opened their rousing, precisioned act with their brand new ABC/Dunhill single "Ain't No Woman," and it was plain to see that there was no woman or man in the capacity crowd who could resist the infectious beat.

It would take an applause meter to discern which one of their string of hits is most outstanding. In fact it's their long list of hits that make an audience anticipate a great show even before the curtain goes up. The Four Tops, one of the best quartets around, fulfill every expectation. Included in their flawless performance was "Baby I Need Your Loving" (their first hit, circa '61), which if rereleased today, unaltered, would probably become a hit all over again. That's been the secret of their success—production, cosmopolitan material, and exceptional vocals. The unmistakable lead voice of Levi Stubbs can make practically anything sound good.

The group was adept on "Still Waters," a superb Jobete copyright which should be covered by other artists. The also sang the title tune from their last Motown album, "That's the Way Nature Planned It," but then devoted too much time to other less significant songs from the same album. Their hit ABC/Dunhill single, "Keeper Of The Castle," didn't quite keep the pace associated with the record. It seemed a little slow. Nevertheless the Four Tops remain "keeper of hits."

Also on the bill was Buddah Records' Barbara Mason. She has a unique voice which is also very sexy. Unfortunately she's just a bit too emphatic about the latter quality. A sex kitten doesn't have to growl.

Miss Mason succeeds with her hits "Bed and Board" and of course "Yes I'm Ready." Also strong was her offering of "Me and Mr. Jones" (which brought to mind why no one has written an answer song to "Me and Mrs. Jones") and her new single "Gimme Your Love." This tune can make Barbara Mason a household name again. much lacking in the way of dance routines. Their individual talents, their all around performance capability, their experience and professionalism really makes them one of the outstanding performing groups. The Spinners are together and more than proved it with this Apollo performance. "It's A Shame" was one of their opening selections. Also, their new single release, "I'll Be Around" came across with zip and fire. The group also does fantastic impressions of other groups and artists and they do it with class. FOLK CITY, NYC—The relationship between Vanguard's Al Anderson and Kama Sutra's NRBQ is a variation on the Rod Stewart and Faces theme. It erodes the bottom line so terribly, public confidence in the artist and dealer confidence in the company. Classical Records "In 1963, when Nonesuch was formed, classical records were selling for \$4.98. I decided to take a paper-back book approach, and I remem-bered my taste as a student . . . and so I conceived of Nonesuch almost backwards. Records were going to be \$2.50, not \$2.98, not \$1.98, which sounded cheap. \$2.50 is a good, solid honest price, fair-value. Unfortunate-ly, we did not have any well-known artists, so we would put this unusual repertoire (baroque, avant-garde, which are Holzman's classical musical tastes) in attractively-designed jack-ets with liner-notes that would ex-plain the music and the social milieu in which it was written. It was nine months before anyone started chasing us, and by that time we were unstop-pable . . . Price is very much a factor in the Nonesuch success. Labels that can have success in the full-price category are those that have the Bernsteins, the important operatic names. Pricing

"I think \$6.98 is going to be the top price. If you look at the price of books over the years, they've just es-calated. \$5.98 or \$6.98, especially when you consider that these prices are discounted more often thom not is when you consider that these prices are discounted more often than not, is are discounted more often than not, is a very realistic price for what the public gets. There's not a hell of a lot we can do about that. I really don't see a price much in excess of \$6.98 in next three or four years, and I think the price rise has not been a forced one, but an evolutionary one. I remember the ad Columbia took out when RCA dropped its price in 1964 from \$5.98 to \$3.98 overnight, and I saw visions of Elektra going under. The ad said, "Records are Not Beans." Beans.

Beans." And records are not beans, they're not commodities, they're potent musi-cal art. With stereo there was a natu-ral two-tier system, and then we did have to have a price rise. Everybody was chasing after us; the artist was demanding far more money; 16-track recording doubled the cost of record-ings. It has to be paid for someplace.

We have a responsibility to you to give you profitable product. \$5.98 is not too much to pay for what you get, and \$6.98 is not too much to pay, since the consumer is paying \$6.98 for 30% of the product released anyway.

Elektra's Deal With Warners

We made up a list of all the rea-sons you would like to be with some-body, and you made a list of what you were scared about. It always reduced itself to one item: the freedom to do your job the way you viewed it. The opportunity to go to our own distribution setup, the opportunity to begin to have some kind of mar-keting control with product that you had creative control. Besides, who could resist playing in the same band with Mo Ostin, Joe Smith, Ahmet Er-tegun, Jerry Wexler and Nesuhi Erte-gun? Perhaps I'm the only man who has been merged who feels two and half years later that if he had to make the decision over again, he would do exactly the same thing.

Quadraphonic Sound

About two years ago, it became obvious that quadraphonic sound would be legitimate creative force, and although the W-E-A labels have total autonomy, there are areas in which we work closely together. Being the most engineering qualified among the three record company presidents, I undertook to form the Warner, Elektra, Atlantic Joint Engi-neering Committee. Our job has been to investigate anything that might affect your futures and our futures. Quad was on the horizon and a whole to investigate anything that might affect your futures and our futures. Quad was on the horizon and a whole bunch of Japanese hardware manu-facturers were interested in getting us to adopt a system. And we resisted all these blandishments to make sure we would have a system that would guarantee you growth in the years to come. Quad is inevitable, quad is coming. Already quad has developed far more satisfactorily than stereo was when stereo was introduced in 1958, prematurely I think. Very short-ly, we will begin to announce a series of quad releases which will be issued in April or May of this year. We feel it is very important for Warners, Elektra, Atlantic and W-E-A to take a lead. We don't want to be forced by somebody else to adopt a system we a lead. We don't want to be forced by somebody else to adopt a system we might not want, or to issue records according to engineering standards that do not meet marketing, artistic, technical standards for us. You will have an announcement from us in about 30 days. Unless we get into quad soon, we will not be able to en-courage our artists and producers to begin to work with this important new medium. 

Tape sales in 1972 reflected a large percentage of the total sales picture, accounting for up to 30% of the unit sales. the unit sales.

Construction was begun in Burhank last Aug. on a three story structure designed by A. Quincy Jones, Architect, and coordi-nated by Warner Bros. Art Director Ed Thrasher. The new building, which surrounds indoor and outdoor gar-dens, will house the new offices and recording studios and is scheduled for completion in early 1974.



U.S. Song Fest Sets 4 Concerts Famous Music Global Success

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. — The premiere American Song Festival, the first of its kind in this country, will be presented in four evening concert programs, Aug. 30-31 and Sept. 1-2, 1973, at the Saratoga Performing Arts Center, Saratoga Springs, N.Y., it was announced by Lawrence W. Goldblatt, chairman of the board and president of the American Song Fes-tival Corp., and Craig Hankenson, general manager of the Saratoga Performing Arts Center. Budget for the Festival is \$1 150-

Performing Arts Center. Budget for the Festival is \$1,150,-000. The festival will be the first in a series of annual Labor Day competi-tions among songs written by Ameri-can composers-authors, amateur and professional. The final evening's con-cert will be internationally televised and a souvenir album containing per-formances of all songs competing in the Festival's finals will be released following the event, expected to be attended by over 100,000 persons. Open to all U.S. composers, the

attended by over 100,000 persons. Open to all U.S. composers, the Festival is a competition wherein 36 semi-finalists songs will be judged by a selected panel of experts from all aspects of the music/entertainment worlds. Hundreds of thousands of en-tries are anticipated by the Festival's producers prior to the June 15 sub-mission deadline.

Grand Prize

A grand prize of \$25,000, plus a concert grand piano affixed with a gold medallion commemorative of the Festival, will be awarded to the com-poser whose song is judged best over-all. With three songs to be chosen on each of the first three nights, the nine finalists will receive prizes of \$5000 finalists will receive prizes of \$5,000 each.

each. From the expected thousands of en-tries, 36 songs will be selected by the Festival's board of directors to com-pete as semi-finalists in the competi-tion. The 36 semi-finalist composers will each receive \$1,000 round-trip travel to the Saratoga Springs site for two, and first-class accommoda-tions for the duration of the Festival as its guests. as its guests.

as its guests. The 36 semi-finalist songs will be performed in preliminary concerts the first three nights of the Festival. Three winners will be chosen on each of the three nights, and the nine win-ning songs will be performed and judged in the final, internationally televised concert on Sunday, Sept. 2.



LIFE IN A TIN CAN-The Bee Gees-RSO SO

They set the tone for a generally ballad-oriented pop/country out-ing. The oldies included are capped by the original recording of his great version of "Old Shep." "I Slipped, I Stumbled, I Fell" is the set's one rocker. Bound to be another big one for The Big One.

JUST BEING MYSELF—Dionne Warwicke— Warner Bros. BS 2658

Warner Bros. BS 2658 Dionne is here handled by none other than the impressive production contingent of Hol-land-Dozier-Holland. The result is not unlike a bit of early Diana Ross excitement being grafted onto her already pleasing vocal cap-abilities. The up-tempo tunes are the most trail-blazing for her, especially the single, "I Think You Need Love." All the eight songs come from the HDH Gold Forever stable, and enable Ms. Warwicke to find herself in any number of moods and moments. Should be her biggest in many LPs.



After an auspicious debut from Memphis, she moves to the label and is expertly produced and arranged by Arif Mardin. Many of her tunes are country copyrights done on a 180 degree soulful turn. The best example of her talent here is her current single, Dolly Par-ton's "Touch Your Woman." There's a foxy soul Memphis style in "How Do You Spell Love." And Chicago blues in "I'd Rather Go Blind." Bound to be one of the broadest and brightest talents of the year.

GREETINGS FROM ASBURY PARK, N.J.— Bruce Springsteen—Columbia KC 31903 Though the kid's from the postcard-famed resort, there's not a pinball or seaside tune on the album. Bruce is into headier things, and his lyrics rumble loudly with insight as they ramble on. There's a common ground between his music and that of Van Morrison, Jackson Browne and a side of Dylan. If words can make a singer-songwriter's reputation. can make a singer-songwriter's reputation, Springsteen will have them screaming "au-thor" in no time! "For You" shows a par-ticular strength.

He is a whimsical poet who tickles a keyboard and makes everyone, in-cluding the 88's feel all the better for it. He's been out of the public eye a bit of late, but you know what they say about making the heart grow fonder. If he can twist the record buying public around his little finger with the same ease with which he tweaks the English language and hypnotizes a crowd, he's got the charts in his hip pocket. (His puns are better!) better!)

NOT TIL TOMORROW—Ralph McTell—Re-prise MS 2121

prise MS 2121 Do nice guys finish last? Critical acclaim is no big thing to Ralph, except on a personal level which is just where he performs what he has written. In England, he is bigger than legend, the folkie standard to which others are compared. Glowing eyes and solemn re-spect greet the dropper of his name here, when one comes across an initiate. With his first for Reprise, Ralph should be able to get the wider public attention he so righteously deserves as a guitarist/balladeer of the high-est order. Do nice-guys finish last? Not this time. one, ABC Recording artist Nolan Porter, took the whole thing pretty much in stride—until she proceeded to tell him that there was something wrong with his ear. Nolan has partial hearing in one ear, and since it's not detectable, this divulgence made him think twice about the lady in the back seat. She continued to startle him with, "Your present record album will launch you, but it will be the next one that will make you prominent." Nolan was really astounded by this discourse, which he claims was being delivered by a very

astounded by this discourse, which he claims was being delivered by a very straight, well-groomed woman.

At the destination, she got out of the taxi, and replied, "My third eye to yours," and handed him a commendable tip. Nolan swears, it's all true, and the only way to document it would be to locate this woman who resides in San Francisco and drives a car with a license plate that spells out Tarot. Ironically Nolan's new ABC single is called, "If I Could Only Be Sure." It has nothing to do with the foregoing although most of the lyrics he writes are in essence autobiographical. He says his music is "an expression of experience" and is therefore able to relate his life to music.

This writer first became acquainted with Nolan Porter when we were both in college. Nolan sought some musical career counseling and when he heard that this interviewer, a fellow student, had some knowledge of the music business (even in his green years) an audition was arranged. The operatic voice that came out was nothing like the funky driving one that accounted for his hit recording of 'Keep on Keepin' On.'

Gabriel Mekler, Nolan's record producer, had something to do with the latter's transition in vocal style. It was thru Gabriel's sister, one of Nolan's college sing-ing friends, that he was introduced to the man who produced Three Dog Night and **Steppenwolf. Manni Mekler** is now a young opera singer in Europe. Nolan recalls how Gabriel first asked him to sing "Sunshine Superman," and he did it in his super-well trained voice. It was probably the first time "Sunshine Superman" ever came out sounding like Rouvaun. However Mekler had enough acumen to see that Nolan Porter, good voice and all could go from classical to contemporary. They worked together everyday for months, and finally Nolan was signed to Gabriel's Lizard Records. Recording under various pseudonyms he had some hits with "Groovin" Out on Life" and "Keep on Keepin' On".

Now Nolan is on ABC/Dunhill Records, using his surname and doing the thing he loves most-singing. He's currently developing his live act and will soon record his second ABC album, you know the one that mystic said would bring him prominence. It's well worth keeping our third eye out for this album, to watch Nolan grow even more as a performer and of course just to see if the old gal knew what she was talking about. ron baron

The result of the studies point to a more prominent slotting for the lower-priced product in the Musical Isle racks as an ad-junct to the normal, full-price line business.

The developments have been steadi-In developments have been steadi-ly building since MIA opened its own promotional division last June in St. Louis under veteran Mound City disc man, J. A. (Jim) White. Previously, White had operated his own budget and disc promo firm, J. A. White Solos Sales.

Sales. The special promotions were car-ried out by MIA in a series of dis-count, department and individual (non chain) stores in Missouri, Illi-nois and Kansas. In one of the most successful merchandising tests, a series of tapes carrying a \$2.99 list price were sold at two for \$5, with two loss leaders, Cat Stevens' "Catch Bull at Four" and Neil Diamond's "Moods," used to sweeten the pot.

MOR Product

MOR Product Items in the 99 cent category in the middle-of-the-road field, by such art-ists as Pete Fountain, Lawrence Welk, Guy Lombardo and Roger Williams, also were found to be big movers. Many of the smaller individu-al (non chain) stores found the going particularly good with \$1.00 classical product with unusually good business being done by the famed Mercury "1812 Overture" by Antol Dorati and the Minneapolis Orchestra. In all the Musical Isle promotions, special display tables were set up in

In all the Musical Isle promotions, special display tables were set up in such a way as to not detract in any manner from regular album and tape merchandising. The displays, in gen-eral, were spotted in high traffic areas with in-store signs and newspaper advertising to back up sales efforts. In an interesting but not directly related finding, it was learned that college stores tended to move more album product as opposed to tapes than the average non-college loca-tion. On the theory that tapes are more likely to be bought by the mo-bile (auto) market, this could reflect the fact that students are likely to have less time behind the wheel than the average non-collegiate customer, the average non-collegiate customer, in the view of one MIA exec involved in the study.




Countryside Records Expands Roster; Develops San Fernando Studio Scene

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
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Tara's Theme Is Major Ties With International Music Mkt

NEW YORK — For Tara Interna-tional, 1972 was a very good year. All facets of the diversified music op-eration reported success stories, be-ginning with the placement of Young Blood Records' of England smash hit "Joy" by Apollo 100 on the Mega la-bel in the United States. At the present time, Tara acts as the international rep and office for Mega Records, Metromedia Records, The Longines Symphonette Society, Golden Records, GWP Records and several other U.S. labels ranging from R&B to country and contem-porary to jazz. Int'l Ties

During 1972, license agreements were concluded for Mega in Austral-ia, New Zealand, England, Japan, Scandinavia, South Africa, Benelux, France, Venzuela and Argentina.

ia, New Zealand, England, Japan, Scandinavia, South Africa, Benelux, France, Venzuela and Argentina. Mega's award winning artist, Sammi Smith, made her first overseas ap-pearance in England late in the year. Contracts for other world markets are now in negotiation and by mid-1973 Mega will be represented in 90% of the world music market-place. Also, during the past year, a deal was concluded between Metromedia Records chief Jack Wiedenmann and Dick Broderick, president of Tara In-ternational, whereby Tara became the international arm of Metromedia Rec-ords. Since that time, new licenses have been negotiated for Metromedia with GRT of Canada, RCA of Aus-tralia, Carosello of Italy, SAMI of Venezuela and Global Music in Ger-many. In addition, the license agree-ment in Japan with Nippon Columbia was re-negotiated and extended. Tours of overseas areas are being prepared for such Metromedia artists as Bobby Sherman and The Hillside Singers and agreements for other world markets are presently in the process of negotiation. Contracts have been concluded for the Longines Symphonette Society to introduce their mail order packages in

Contracts have been concluded for the Longines Symphonette Society to introduce their mail order packages in the New Zealand market with Allied International. This makes the first ap-pearance in the Far East area of the Longines mail order packages. In ad-dition, negotiations are being final-ized to introduce Longines product into Japan, Mexico, Portugal, France, Scandinavia, Benelux, Germany and Australia. Other markets are still open and will be covered during the

coming year.

Other Deals

Some of the other license contracts consummated during the past year in-clude Vee Jay in Australia with RCA; Royal American in Canada with GRT; Young Blood Records of England in Australia with RCA; Japan with Vic-tor Musical Industries, Mexico with Orfeon and GWP Records in Austral-ia with M7.

In the United States, Tara Interna-tional was represented on the charts with Mac and Katie Kissoon's version of "Chirpy Chirpy Cheep Cheep" on ABC/Dunhill and Apollo 100's "Joy" on the Mega label. Current product includes the Tomas Ledin record of "Lay Me Your Body Down", from Scandinavia, on Mega and "Ela Ela" by Team, from Germany, on the Met-romedia label. Tara's production arm, Quest Pro-ductions, produced the critically ac-claimed Peter Thom album, released on the United Artists label in the United States and Canada, and on Phonogram in the rest of the world. Thom's second album is currently in

on the United Artists label in the United States and Canada, and on Phonogram in the rest of the world. Thom's second album is currently in production along with some new ma-terial by Orville Stoeber. Tara International also represents Radio Tele-Music, the record produc-tion arm of Radio Luxembourg and-in particular—the new hit group from Holland, "Focus," released in the U.S. on the Sire label distributed by Famous Music Corp. An extended tour will be coming up early in 1973. Tara also produced the English lan-guage version of Art Sullivan's French smash, "Ensemble." Entitled, "Don't Go," it will be released early this year in the U.S. The year ended with Tara being appointed exclusive agents for the Expodisc 73 and the Miami Beach In-ternational Song Festival which will convene May 9-16 at the Convention Hall in Miami Beach, Florida. The Expodisc 73 is the first planned annu-al music business trade show and song festival. According to Aldo Legui, President of the Festival, the decision to utilize Tara was made because of the compa-ny's expertise in the International music market. Broderick announced that Frank Swenson, marketing direc-tor of Tara International, will per-sonally take charge of the Expodisc 73 campaign.

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W-E-A Int'l Sales Showed 60% Volume Increase In '72

NEW YORK — Nesuhi Ertegun, president of WEA International, re-ports that the company increased its business in 1972 more than 60% over 1971. This was accomplished, noted Ertegun, by strong sales of top American artists on the Warner Bros., Elektra and Atlantic labels, aided by overseas tours of these ar-tists, as well as the development by the company of important national artists.

WEA International consists of six subsidiary companies, located in Eng-land, France (WEA Filipachi), Ger-many, Japan (Warner-Pioneer), Aus-tralia and Canada, and has licensing arrangements in scores of other coun-tries. All WEA International firms distribute Warner Bros., Elektra and Atlantic and their subsidiary labels. Phil Rose is exec vice president of WEA International.

The first WEA International prod-The first WEA International prod-uct meeting was held in Cannes, France in January, and included prod-uct presentations from all three firms. Among the new artists intro-duced were America, Malo, Harry Chapin and Roberta Flack. All of them subsequently broke Top Ten abroad. abroad.

The importance of overseas tours for American artists was strength-ened by the sales surge that followed the appearance of Roberta Flack, Bread and Alice Cooper in Europe. A similar sales increase was apparent after the appearances of Jethro Tull and Lad Zappelin in Lapan and Led Zeppelin in Japan.

In England

WEA International in England took over distribution of the Atlantic label in March and immediately start-ed chart activity with the Drifters, Archie Bell and the Drells, Aretha Franklin, Roberta Flack, the Rolling Stones, Yes, Led Zeppelin and many more. 1972 also saw the first artist owned by the United Kingdom firm to break on an internatinal basis— America. Their single, "A Horse With No Name," and album, "America," went to No. 1 on the U.S. as well as on the British charts.

In France

WEA Filipachi, the French company, established its first star in 1972, Veronique Sanson. Her first American recording will be released in the United States by Elektra this month. The Japanese firm, Warner-Pioneer, had several No. 1 records with Rumi-ko Koyanagi, who is the leading girl singer of her country, and Pedro & The Capricious.

In Australia

Australia inaugurated its own sales and distribution operation on October 1. This resulted in maximum market penetration for artists on the WEA group of labels in that country. The WEA German subsidiary solidified its position in West Germany preparato-ry to opening its own sales-distribution operation this month. The firm expanded its operations dur-

ry to opening its own sales-distribution operation this month. The firm expanded its operations dur-ing the year and opened a new ware-house facility outside Hamburg. Hans Officier, former foreign rep-ertoire manager at Negram Records in Amsterdam, was named European coordinator for WEA International. Officier coordinates the activities of the WEA International offices in London, Paris and Hamburg, and ac-tivities of the WEA licensees in other European countries. He makes his office in Amsterdam. Succeeding Officier as label manager for the War-ner Bros.-Reprise, Elektra and Atlan-tic labels at Negram was Giovanni Tonino, who came to Negram from Polydor-Holland. Nesuhi Ertegun and Phil Rose made extended trips to Latin Ameri-ca, Japan and Europe last year, set-ting new licensees for the Warner/Re-prise, Elektra and Atlantic labels in Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, Venezuela, Holland and Switzerland. In Mexico, Gamma, S.A. was named the new licensee for Atlantic Records; Warner and Elektra were already handled by the firm. In Brazil, a new deal was made with Gravacoes Electricas. A new arrangement was made in Argentina with Sicamericana to han-

A new arrangement was made in Argentina with Sicamericana to han-dle Atlantic in addition to Warner/ dle Atl: Elektra.

In Venezuela, Nesuhi Ertegun made a new contract with Polydor, S. A. as licensee for Warner/Elektra in addi-tion to Atlantic.

An agreement was made with Ne-gram to market the Warner/Elek-tra/Atlantic lines in Holland.

A new contract was concluded in Switzerland for Musikvertrieb AG to handle the three firms in that country.

A deal was also reached with Les Fils de Georges Haddad & Cie. in Lebanon to handle all the WEA lines in that country.

Emilio Vitale Is Dead At 60; Leading Brazil Music Figure

BRAZIL — Emilio M. Vitale, a major figure on the Brazilian music scene, died in Sao Paulo, on Sat., Jan. 6, at the age of 60.

the age of 60. In the record business, he was president of SOM Industria E Comercio S.A., owner of the "Copacabana" and other labels, which has become in recent years a leading independent record company in Brazil. He was a director of the recording studio company, Estudios Reunidos.

ny, Estudios Reunidos. In the music publishing business, he was a director and had been for many years previously in active charge of Irmaos Vitale S.A.-Industria E Comercio, the oldest and largest Brazilian music publishing company, which achieved early renown as the original publisher of such worldwide hit songs as "Brazil," "Tico Tico" and "Come To The Mardi Gras." In addition to its music publishing, the Irmaos Vitale S.A. organization includes divisions engaged in the manufacture of record players and appliances, operating retail shops, large scale commercial printing, and a publishing division, LEX, which reprints exclusive editions of official Brazilian Federal and State laws.

Vitale, with his brothers, was the moving factor in the original establishment and in the stabilizing of the administration of music performing rights organizations and the collection of performing fees in Brazil. His interest and participation in performing rights activities had continued uninterruptedly until his death. He was a special delegate designated by the Government of Brazil to the 1972 CISAC Congress held in Mexico. During the meetings of the Pan-American Council at the Congress, Vitale was one of three members, selected from different countries, as a permanent commission to orient new performing rights societies and to assist in the forming of societies in countries in which such societies do not yet exist.

In addition to his recording and music publishing interests, Vitale was a director of a construction and real estate company, Vitale Engenharia E Projetos Ltda.

Vitale management of the music publishing company Irmaos Vitale S.A.-Industria E Comercio and of the record company SOM Industria E Comercio S.A.—will continue. In addition to Vitale's brothers Afonso and Jose who are senior directors, four sons and nephews, constituting the next generation, are active in the businesses.

Vitale is survived by his widow Carmen, his sons Sergio, Luiz, Rubens and Fernando, grandchildren, brothers and a sister.

Following this, the group will swing back to Sydney, Nova Scotia (19); Halifax, N.S. (20); Monkton, N.B. (21); St. John, N.B. (22); Quebec City (23); Montreal (24) and Kingston, Ont. (25). An Ottawa date is also being set.

lice and the courts that piracy is not an innocent prank engaged in by small fry for a couple of bucks. "It is big business that yields fantastic profits to large, well-financed pirate operations, many of which are linked to organized crime." This growing awareness has led to stiffer penalties being meted out to offenders being meted out to offenders.

being meted out to offenders. Gortikov points out that one man, convicted of piracy and counterfeiting as well as mail fraud in Memphis, Tenn., was sentenced to three years in prison. He cites a 20-day jail term imposed on a pirate in North Caroli-na for contempt of a previously is-sued injunction barring him from ille-gally duplicating the recordings of a number of legitimate companies. The pirate, says Gortikov, was able to shorten his stay in jail only by purg-ing himself of the contempt citation by destroying hundreds of thousands of bogus tapes.

by destroying hundreds of thousands of bogus tapes. "This type of punishment is exactly what is required to drive these leeches out of business," says the RIAA pres-ident. "An injunction or a small fine serves neither to put the pirate out of business nor to deter others engaged in similar illicit activities. It's a li-cense to steal. But send a pirate to jail, confiscate his illicit merchandise and equipment, and you've not only put one pirate out of business but you've also created a domino impact you've also created a domino impact on others."

on others." This is why Gortikov says he fa-vors stiffer penalties in national and state anti-piracy legislation and at-tainment of such greater penalties has been adopted as an RIAA objective.

tive. Among the other highlights of RIAA's battle against piracy in 1972, Gortikov listed: Six major pirate manufacturers were shut down, with nearly two and one-half million bogus tapes confis-cated, along with reproduction equipment. Total loss to the pirates was more than \$14 million.

A major pirate distribution center in New York, which supplied pirate tapes throughout the country, was raided and put out of business. More than 50,000 bogus tapes, valued at more than \$300,000, were seized.

Intrastate wholesale and retail op-Intrastate wholesale and retail op-erations were closed down in a num-ber of states, including Minnesota, Il-linois, Oregon, New York, Utah and Wisconsin and their operators hauled into court. In each case, the retailers were prohibited from selling their supplies of bogus tapes. The loss to the retailers involved thousands of dollars dollars.

Police raids on individual retail stores served notice on small retailers that they are not immune from arrest and prosecution. One raid in New York State resulted in the technical arrest of 50 small retailers. Police confiscated the retailers' supply of bogus tapes.

bogus tapes. Gortikov also credits the enactment of the new copyright law protecting recordings from illegal duplication with having further limited the pi-rates' ability to run rampant. Noting that this is Federal legislation with equal applicability throughout the country, Gortikov said that pirates could no longer move their oper-ations with impunity to another state after being enjoined via a civil suit or prosecuted under a state anti-piracy statute. statute.

statute. "The proof is that although we uncover evidence of piracy daily, the bulk of it is confined to recordings made and released before Feb. 15, 1972, the effective date of the Copy-right Law. The pirates obviously will risk civil action in state courts or prosecution under state laws rather than be caught violating the Federal law. Since the bulk of pirated product had been concentrated on duplicating current legitimate pop hits, its means that they are using material which is becoming increasingly dated with the passage of time. The constitutionality passage of time. The constitutionality of the California State anti-piracy statute is now being reviewed by the U. S. Supreme Court and its 1973 decision will clarify the future cause of actions under state laws."

Explaining follow-up action on piracy intelligence received by the RIAA, Gortikov noted that all information and evidence is turned over to the U. S. Department of Justice in Washington for investigation and prosecution by the FBI and U. S. Attorneys. Definitive action by these agencies is accelerating, and ever-expanding investigations and prosecutions are anticipated. Gortikov also reported increasing interest in piracy offences by other government agencies, such as the Senate Commerce Committee, Internal Revenue Service, and Postal Service. Citing the close liaison achieved by RIAA with other industry groups, such as the music publishers' Harry Fox Agency and the National Association of Record Merchandisers, Gortikov says this has resulted in an even greater flow of intelligence and in-

ation of Record Merchandisers, Gorti-kov says this has resulted in an even greater flow of intelligence and in-formation interchange. "When we find a pirate operating, we notify the Harry Fox Agency. Chances are the pirate is not paying royalties, and the music publishers have a cause of action. In turn, they feed us information on the illegiti-mate use of recordings. Similarly, NARM has arranged for its members to notify us when they run across someone making or selling illegal du-plicates. They have also intensified their efforts at securing state anti-piracy laws.

their efforts at securing state anti-piracy laws. "This," Gortikov added, "is exactly what everyone in the legitimate re-cording industry should be doing— sharing a common interest in working to put these pirates out of business and insuring the survival and growth of our industry." He cautioned those who supply in-formation on piracy activities against

He cautioned those who supply in-formation on piracy activities against "despairing or abandoning" their ef-orts when no immediate counterac-tion is visible or taken." "It takes time to build up a case for civil or criminal action. All of these things cannot be done simultaneously over-night," Gortikov explained. "But this information is extremely valuable. Some of these tips have not only exposed the retailer selling pirated recordings, but have in many cases led us to the pirate manufacturers. "But rest assured, he continued, "that sooner or later well hit them all—manufacturer, distributor and re-

all—manufacturer, distributor and re-tailer. We want everyone to know that no one is immune. We must erad-icate this evil wherever it exists."

Police Seize 1000 **Tapes** In Arrest

PASADENA, CALIF. — Close to 1,-000 pirated 8-track tapes, several hundred master tapes, catalogs, la-bels, sleeves and a shrink wrap ma-chine were seized by police here when they arrested a man and a woman on a warrant from Clark County, Nevada, charging them with obtain-ing preperty under false pretenses

Those arrested were identified as Gary Edward Stokes, 29, and Sandra Kay Jones, 23, both of 141 No. Grand Avenue, here.

The owners of the premises, a 3-story mansion known as the Silver Queens' Home, obtained a Superior Court Order to oust the tenants who,

they said, were using the property as a base for a tape piracy operation. The owners charged that they had rented the 20-room residence to Mr. Stokes in June when he told them he was an architect interested in restor-ing the landmark. The owners al-leged, however, that they found Sto-kes and his associates were using the garage of the home to make pirated tapes

tapes. Superior Court Judge Jose Sprankle, Jr., ordered Stokes and twenty John Does, also named as de-fendants, to post \$100 in cash and \$50,000 in bond, pending the invento-ry of the property. Moreover, he awarded the owners of the mansion \$8,898, trouble damages for money owed in back rent.

(Cont'd from page 7) is the first time a court has dealt with the numerous issues involving appli-cation of the increased infringement penalties made available by the amendment to the Copyright Law contained in the 1971 Federal anti-piracy bill. "Under the old law, our publishers were often frustrated in their at-tempts to obtain substantial damage awards by the lack of adequate rec-ords kept by sellers with respect to their sales of bootleg recordings. Un-der the old copyright law, recovery of damages was limited to an award of the statutory royalty of \$.02 for each copyrighted musical work reproduced on each recording sold. In this case, copyrighted musical work reproduced on each recording sold. In this case, the total number of recordings sold by the defendants were small, and an award computed on the old basis would have been minimal. By apply-ing the increased penalties, the Court has made clear that the sale of even one bootleg recording subjects the one bootleg recording subjects the seller to a liability of the statutory minimum of \$250 for each copyright-ed musical work recorded thereon,"

minimum of \$250 for each copyright-ed musical work recorded thereon," Berman said. "Another significant aspect of the judgments is that all infringing sales occurred prior to the amendment. Our attorneys, Abeles, Clark and Oster-berg, argued that the intention of Congress in providing for increased remedies was to make the award ap-plicable to all past infringements. As a result, the Agency publishers have claimed in all pending infringement actions that an award of damages should be based upon the increased penalty provisions and not the old royalty formula. Judge Blumenfeld is the first judge to consider the argu-ment and his favorable interpretation should have widespread application in numerous pending actions," Berman added. added.

Berman explained that the judg-ments highlight the substantial liabil-ity to which sellers of bootleg re-cordings expose themselves under the cordings expose themselves under the present law. In addition to statutory damages, the Agency publishers' claim the right to recover any profits from the infringing sales, the destruction of inventory, an award of costs and an attorney's fee. Berman predicts that substantial infringement awards will cause retailers to appreci-ate the financial consequences of dealing in bootleg recordings and avoid exploiting them.

and George Tucker; National Cinema-tape Inc., and American Cartridge Recordings, a division of National Communications Arts, Inc., and Alexander Magosci, Jr.; Telecor In-dustries, and Charles Gellert and Harold Davidow; Audiotape Inc. and Elias Saka, also known as Lou Saka; and Diamond Sounds, Inc.

EDITORIAL:

Merchandizing Play

The subject of "merchandising", or more simply, promoting extra play on the jukebox, game and table, hasn't been discussed in print for a dog's age. Reason being, most of the country's operators and their route people are just too darned busy with the hectic route routine (and all its annoying problems) to give sufficient thought (much less time) to actually start merchandising programs at their locations.

About as far as any operator goes in this area is to give his locations promotion money (marked or otherwise). The idea of staging little contests or big tournaments on pins, shuffles or pool tables is a bit too much to consider. After all, it takes a clear mind

... a mind not beset with who gets how much in the loan/bonus basket, which new machine has to get installed, which old machine has to be fixed again, and the rest, to do it right. Now, here's an idea! What about all those full time record programmers out there getting their feet wet in play merchandising?

May be a wild thought but merchandising is just a logical extention of record buying . . . that is, buying the right records for the right location, which is the art of record programming in the first place. Pro-grammers, possibly more than anyone, know the peculiar tastes of the locations on their routes. They know, or should, which of the stops would like a Saturday night contest on the shuffle (with a bottle of booze for the winning team), or a weekend tourney on the pool table (for a pro cue stick). They also have the time and the ability to show the location how to do it properly.

We think this is a sound, sensible idea. Any operator who's ever tried full scale merchandising knows he's earned extra coinage. So why not turn your record buyers/programmers into route "play-merchandisers". Makes great sense and could earn fine surplus-income if done properly.

Each summer Bailey Amusement hires at least one student and among the firm's illustrious alumni are the cur-rent principal of Gloucester High; a district manager of a life insurance company; and an executive with Tex-aco in Richmond. Bailey's numerous civic activities were also emphasized. He was one of the founders and directors of the

the founders and directors of the Gloucester Youth Baseball Inc.; was named Director of the Gloucester Chamber of Commerce in 1969; and served on the Board of Deacons of the First Presbyterian Church of Gloucester.

In conclusion the article said "as a businessman he (Bailey) has contributed quietly; as a citizen, loyally; and as a friend, generously."

Such an article, while being a fine tribute to Gilbert Bailey, also serves a valuable public relations purpose for the entire coin machine industry.
