## cash box editorial

### On Cover Records

Singles of the same material by competing artists vying for chart success at the same time — the famous "cover record" — are having a renewed, more-controversial-than-ever resurgence. Their renewed vigor at this juncture in exposure difficulties at the radio level leaves the industry with a number of thoughts to ponder as to their effectiveness in creating a "cover battle" winner, a pattern that was more clear-cut in the past when two (or even more) cover records could share triumph on the air and in sales.

Presently, the following artists are pitted against each other: O. C. Smith (Columbia) and Al Wilson (Bell) on "La La Peace Song"; Abba (Atlantic) and Sweet Dreams (ABC) on "Honey Honey"; Art Garfunkel (Columbia) and Tim Moore (Elektra) on "Second Avenue"; Tim Moore again and Ron Dante (Bell) on "Charmer" (winner of the American Song Festival); and Lou Rawls (Bell) and Tavares (Capitol) on "She's Gone."


These current cover battles may not resemble days of old when it was rather commonplace to see as many as six or seven "covers" on a new show or movie theme; yet they, nevertheless, are a major subject of conversation these days, particularly in promotional circles.

Without drawing distinctions between the first of a series of recordings of the same material, cover records, obviously, represent faith by a record company in coming out on top no matter what other versions are around. This basic rationale, however, conflicts with the hard realities of today's radio playlists, and the resulting contention of many that, more often than not, cover records are snuffed out before they attain significant sales mileage.


Interestingly enough, there have been some examples of acts who did lose out on a cover battle, only to reappear with their follow-up releases and enjoy substantial chart success. These include such acts as Paper Lace and B. W. Stevenson. The theory here is that while these performers lost a battle they won the war for themselves by creating good radio level identity on the recordings that didn't quite go all the way, and dug for themselves a foothold that resulted in later success.

Another concept advanced about today's cover records is that, more than ever, they offer an exciting, if not ego fulfilling, challenge to company management and enliven the daily routine of battling for hits. However, tradesters seem to be asking themselves, is the prospect of winning such a battle overshadowed by the difficulty in obtaining a true victory — which isn't a minor sales or chart edge with insignificant numbers?

Whatever the philosophy behind cover records, they're likely to continue to excite and, yes, infuriate, various levels of the trade as long as there's a good piece of material and recording artists who dig it. It's just that the marketing of cover records in the light of today's exposure realities does present more than a "we-got-THE-record" expression of faith.



## Stuart, Mayfield's Gemigo Goes Indie; New Act Concept

Stuart and Mayfield continue to operate Curtom Records, the highly successful soul label distributed nationally by Buddah Records.



## Polygram U.S. Mgmt Shifts: Brockway Vice-Chairman Vogelsang Is President

### Steinberg, Farr Waiser Sr. VP's

NEW YORK — Top management changes at Polygram Corporation in the U.S. have been announced by Coen Solleveld, chairman of the board of the company.

Bob Brockway shifts from president of Polygram to vice-chairman of the board, while Werner Vogelsang, president of Polydor International assumes additional responsibilities as president of Polygram Corporation, which is the umbrella company for the Phonogram-Mercury, MGM and Polydor labels and Chappell Music.

In addition, the heads of Phonogram-Mercury, MGM-Polydor and Chappell — Irwin Steinberg, Bill Farr and Norm Weiser, respectively have been named

senior vice presidents of Polygram Corporation.

This realignment is the second major shift at the company in several weeks, with Bill Farr recently named president of Polydor, Inc. — parent of the MGM-Polydor labels — following the departure of Gil Beltan in that post. Farr had previously served as chief of Phonodisc, Inc., the distribution arm of Polygram. Don England replaced Farr at Phonodisc.

Solleveld termed the new organizational structure a step forward for Polygram. It will provide the environment for a broader and more concerted market penetration. It will permit more effective use of senior executives in the group to concentrate on the long range development of Polygram's activities in this department.

## Actions On Broad Front Give Anti-Piracy Drive Big Boost

MADISON, WISC. — The Supreme Court of Wisconsin has ordered a lower court judge to grant an immediate temporary injunction barring Economic Consultants, Inc., doing business as E-C Tape Service, and its president, David L. Heilman, from making or selling pirated sound recordings. The lower court was also directed to issue an order barring Heilman and his company from destroying, transferring, concealing or otherwise placing beyond the jurisdiction of the Wisconsin courts their inventory of pirated recordings and other assets, or their books and other documents.

The Supreme Court thus overruled the decision by Judge Robert W. Landry, of the Milwaukee County Circuit Court, who granted a temporary injunction against the defendants but stayed the effective date for 90 days. Judge Landry had also refused to extend a previously issued order by the Supreme Court that would have restrained the transfer of assets by

the defendants.

The Supreme Court ruling was made in response to an application for an Alternative Writ of Mandamus by Mercury Record Productions, Inc., and a number of other record companies. They had brought suit against Economic Consultants and Heilman alleging that the unauthorized duplication of their sound recordings by the defendants was unfair competition under the laws of the state of Wisconsin. Another Mandamus application, in which the defendants asked the Supreme Court to vacate the lower court's delayed restraining order, was simultaneously denied by the Supreme Court.


### Judge's Comments

The case dates back to Dec. 1972, when the original unfair competition suit was initiated by the plaintiffs. Judge Landry had originally ruled that the piracy of sound recordings could not be enjoined under existing state law, although he termed piracy as "morally reprehensible" and called it "a shabby business that offends a person's sense of fair play." That decision was appealed by the







## Stones' LP Keys Atlantic Release

HOLLYWOOD — Atlantic Records is making waves with its 9 album September release, spearheaded by a new Rolling Stones album entitled "It's Only Rock 'N' Roll." Also included is the J. The Great Spirit Made Us All," showcasing Brubeck and his sons Chris, Dan, and Darius; a multifaceted musical experience entitled "Journey" composed, arranged, and produced by the gifted Arif Mardin; "Newmanism," a set of jazz with r&b accents by David Newman; and a new group named Hatfield and the North on Virgin Records, distributed by Atlantic, making sonic shock waves with their debut LP "Hatfield And The North."

Recently, RCA Records introduced George McCrae and "Rock Your Baby" internationally via a whirlwind promotion tour in Europe that included press receptions, television shows in Holland and Germany, and syndicated radio interviews that aired throughout Japan.

Ladies And Gentlemen Emerson, Lake & Palmer," on Manticore, distributed by Atlantic; and Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young's latest for Atlantic "So Far," which features a compilation of their greatest musical moments and cover art by Joni Mitchell, have both been certified gold by the RIAA just a few weeks after their release.

## Livingston To Cut 'Jack' 2

CULVER CITY, CALIF. — Alan Livingston will produce the soundtrack album for "The Trial Of Billy Jack," the "Billy Jack" sequel that will be released in over 1,000 theatres on Nov. 13. In addition to producing, Livingston will also select the record label with which a distribution agreement will be made.

## ABC Adds Two New Soundtracks

LOS ANGELES — Jay Lasker, president of ABC Records, has announced that the label is preparing soundtrack albums from two new motion pictures for rush-release this month. The two films are "The Trial of Billy Jack," a sequel to the successful "Billy Jack," and "The Dove," which stars Joseph Bottoms in the true story of a 16-year-old Californian who became the youngest person to sail around the world alone.

"The Trial of Billy Jack," which was produced by Joe Cramer, directed by Frank Laughlin and stars Tom Laughlin, is scheduled to open Nov. 13 at over 1000 theaters throughout the U.S. It has a score by Elmer Bernstein ("The Ten Commandments," "To Kill A Mockingbird," "Hawaii"), and the soundtrack also includes versions of songs by Teresa Laughlin, Delores Taylor and John Lennon and Paul McCartney. The score for "The Dove," produced by Gregory Peck and directed by Charles Jarrott, was written by John Barry, well-known for his themes for several James Bond movies and an Oscar-winner for his song and score for "Born Free." A Paramount picture, "The Dove" opened in selected markets late last month.

The acquisition of these two soundtracks continues ABC Records' growing participation in the soundtrack and original cast recording field. Already this year, the label has released the soundtracks of "The Lords of Flatbush," television's "QB VII" and "Chinatown," the latter two both composed by Jerry Goldsmith. Additionally, ABC's purchase of Paramount Records early last August brought numerous best-selling soundtracks to its catalogue, including the scores from "Love Story" and "The Godfather."

In the coming months ABC will be releasing several more soundtrack and original cast recordings, among them the original cast recording of "Mack & Mabel," the David Merrick musical that opened on Broadway October 6, starring Robert Preston and Bernadette Peters and will a score by Jerry Herman, and the soundtracks of "The Little Prince" and "Nashville." "The Little Prince," a Paramount presentation scheduled to open at the Radio City Music Hall November 7 and in the rest of the country in December, stars Richard Kiley and Bob Fosse and has Frederick Lerner and Fritz Loew's first motion picture score since "Gigi" in 1959. "Nashville," director Robert Altman's treatment of the world of country music, will have an original c&w score and is set to open at Easter, 1975.

## Sherman Readies New Dusty Springfield LP

NEW YORK — Garry Sherman recently completed work with record producer Brooks Arthur conducting and arranging Dusty Springfield's new ABC-Dunhill album "Elements."

The Springfield LP marks Sherman's return to assignments for individual artists on pop records. He arranged and conducted Miss Springfield's hit "What's It Gonna Be." In recent years Sherman has been concentrating on television, movies, and theater.

Sherman was orchestrator and music supervisor for the Broadway musical "Purlie" and composed, arranged, and/or conducted music for "Alice's Restaurant," "The Heartbreak Kid," and "Midnight Cowboy." He is chief orchestrator for Coca-Cola's television/radio "Look Up America" campaign.

The soundtrack album for "Airport '75" was recorded at Burbank and produced by **Sonny Burke** for MCA Records. Maybe **Johnny Carson** will cut there next.

Pacific Presentations attempted yet another unprecedented freaky event with the First Annual Hollywood Street Revival and Trash Dance held at the Hollywood Palladium Friday (11). Concert stars were **The New York Dolls**, **Iggy Pop**, **Flo & Eddie**, **Michael Des Barres** (formerly of **Silverhead**), **The GTO's**, **The Hollywood Stars**, **Zolar X**, **Kim Fowley**, **Rodney Bingenheimer**, and additional guest stars. The first annual pop star pie fight was scheduled for this gala glitter street concert. The cops just loved it.

Looks to be an extremely busy musical season in the Apple. **Bachman-Turner Overdrive** who are climbing the charts like they are going out of style have their new LP in the top five this week. These hard rocking Canadians are sought-after property on the concert scene, that's for sure. In Detroit, **BTO** was scheduled to appear at Cobo Hall which has a maximum capacity of 12,000 which was sold out by mail order. Those letters were coming hot and heavy, that's for sure. A second show was then added and the 12,000 seat hall was sold out in two hours. Then a matinee was scheduled for that Saturday and ducats began selling at an incredible rate with probable sell-out expected. **BTO** certainly have become superstars. **The Ohio Players**, those skin-tight musicians will be playing "In Concert" on October 11. **Bad Company**, the phenomenal **Led Zeppelin** Swan Song labeled superstars, will be very special guests on **Don Kirshner's** "Rock Concert" airing October 12. The group's LP which has gone gold was just #1 on the **Cash Box** LP charts and the single "Can't Get Enough" is in the bulleted #3 position on the **Cash Box** single charts — not a bad debut. **Marc Bolan**, of **T-Rex** fame dropped by the **Cash Box** offices to talk about **T-Rex's** 20 city tour of the U.S. and Canada. A party for hit Swedish group **ABBA** was held Monday (30) at the Swedish con-





**VAN McCOY — His Music Is The Real McCoy**

Van McCoy, whose recent chart item "Love Is The Answer," has certainly answered the talent question, is an articulate spokesman and proves to be a viable force on the music scene. His talent has blossomed and matured and he has become the kind of diversified music man who incorporates arranging, producing, conducting and performing into his vast repertoire of musical aptitude.

"Love Is The Answer," takes the essence of orchestral splendor and combines it with an animated string section and driving trumpet. The grandiose lead trumpet is played by the articulate fingers of Mel Davis who can really belt it out. This new wave of "orchestral soul" is burgeoning every day. After all, with the talents of Van McCoy, Barry White, The Love Unlimited Orchestra, and the Philadelphia International sound of MFSB, it is easy to see the rapidity with which this musical genre has firmly established itself. McCoy feels that the combination of ingredients which constitutes the orchestral soul sound are soul roots which come from basic rhythms coupled with a symphonic sound. This music is a moving testament to two cultures and the synthesis is a unique, fresh and interesting sound.

The story of Van's musical career augments his musical diversity one step further. He started as a singer and then went into songwriting. He used to write hits for the Shirelles. This was the beginning of his career which soon picked up speed and he eventually found his way to arranging. He decided upon his own arranging because he found it difficult to communicate his musical ideas to other arrangers. The occasional intangibility of the abstraction of musical expression can evade the most accomplished of musicians and Van found that he could work best by himself. McCoy became interested in producing when he fell under the watchful eyes of such men as Paul Griffen, Teacho Wiltshire, and Gary Sherman. But young Van did not stop here

for his musical thirst carried him even further. For he then became interested in production.

His mentor in the production field was Luther Dixon and McCoy's first producees, if you will, were Peaches and Herb, Gladys Knight and the Presidents.

Van's talent is cumulative. Because he has touched on just about every facet of the music industry, his work now is a synthesis of all of these contributing elements. He arranges, conducts and sings on the "You Make Me Feel Brand New" Stylistics LP. He wrote "Keeping My Fingers Crossed" on the Stylistics' album.

His new Avco LP uses "Love Is The Answer" as its central theme and builds continuously from that point. His new album is totally instrumental and Van includes his interpretations of such vocal hits as "You Are The Sunshine Of My Life," "Touch Me In The Morning," "Proud Mary" and "Ain't No Mountain High Enough." There are also originals including "Funky Feet" and "African Symphony." The album has a wide range of appeal and could go to definite R&B, pop, and MOR stations. Discotheques could also make excellent use of these diversified sounds.

The LP, which was produced by Hugo & Luigi, was handled with a top hits of the 70s type of appeal. Consequently, the selection of material was carefully attended to until the package was conceived. On the LP are New York musicians at their finest. A soul Philharmonic orchestra so to speak. Or a soul Philly orchestra, after which it was modeled. As a matter of fact the violinists who appear on the LP play with the Philharmonic orchestra.

**Robert Lamm — Glad To Be Chicago Bound**

Robert Lamm, singer/songwriter/keyboard whiz with Chicago appreciates his position in one of the world's biggest recording and performing groups, but modestly shrugs when his hits are mentioned. The list of tunes made famous by Chicago and penned by Lamm is impressive — "Does Anybody Really Know What Time It Is?" and "Beginnings" from the first album when they still called themselves the Chicago Transit Authority, "Saturday In The Park," "25 or 6 to 4" and "Free" to name a few from the seven gold albums so far released under the familiar Chicago logo.

So Robert Lamm certainly didn't need to prove anything to anybody. But now he has released a solo album, entitled "Skinny Boy," containing eleven new tunes and he took time to come around to the Cash Box offices to explain his sudden solo venture.

"Sometimes we challenge ourselves to see how we stand. Producing an album was something I didn't know if I could do or not so I did it and found out. Everything I've learned about production I've learned from Jim Guercio. I work differently than he does but I found out in making "Skinny Boy" that I do have the ability to make important decisions."

"Skinny Boy" is a collection of songs with a solid, if spare core of bass, drums and Lamm's keyboards around which swirl various string arrangements. Using Terry Kath from Chicago on bass and good friend Ross Salamone on drums, Robert recorded the basic tracks, more times than not in just one or two takes, and then worked closely with Pat Williams who did the string arrangements. The results are a friendly, frothy collection of musical ideas that weave throughout their basic rock fabric strands of jazz, Latin and classical sounds.

"I wanted it to be pure," Lamm explains. "I didn't want to use brass because I really

couldn't hear it at the time and," he smiles knowingly, "if I did it would be another Chicago album." The album features Lamm's vocals and his keyboard work and gently stresses the non-guitar side of popular music. On only four of the cuts is any guitar present at all.

"It was a really hard decision to stick my neck out and do the album, but I think the results are worth it."

Robert Lamm was born and raised in Brooklyn and first got involved in music as a choir boy. When he moved to Chicago with his family at the age of fifteen he quickly got into a blues band with a solid Ray Charles influence. Interest in jazz led him to the Music School of Roosevelt University where he studied piano and composition. Eventually, and fortunately for the millions of people they've entertained, he joined Chicago and started making albums. Then came "Skinny Boy."

"I decided to do a solo album about two years ago. I had these tunes that I hadn't developed for Chicago and I really couldn't foresee that happening so I did a demo tape to send to our publisher and I had so much fun I started to get serious about it. I asked myself, 'Hey, why don't I do this for real?'"

So between the hectic Chicago schedule of touring, recording and writing new material, Lamm recorded "Skinny Boy." He insists his new album will not conflict with any of his work with Chicago which he considers his chief responsibility. "I fantasize sometimes about doing a small club solo act, but doing it alone terrifies me actually."

The way Lamm learned about producing, by actually doing it, is also the way he is getting involved in filmmaking. Hard at work on an 18 minute documentary film, Robert is getting a good sense of the filmmaking process. The project started out when Lamm and a film student friend got interested in lawn bowling. "It's a weird subject I suppose but it impressed me visually. We wanted to do something impressionistic and started getting involved with the old guys who lawn bowl. We tried to catch the poetry of what they were doing, but as we got to talk to them we got fascinated with them. So the film, as it is turning out, is really about old people."

One of the songs from "Skinny Boy," called "Until The Time Runs Out" was written specifically for the last two minutes of the film and now Lamm is composing the rest of the music.

With Chicago's next album almost complete and scheduled for a November release Lamm has very little time. "It's the first album in a long time, maybe since the fifth album, where as many people as possible in the group stayed in the control room and contributed ideas. It really shows. We think it is very good."

But the release of the eighth album might very well be delayed because a single from Chicago VII, "Wishing You Were Here" is beginning to move (83 with a bullet).



**Wishing You Were Here** (2:54) (Big Elk, ASCAP—P. Ceters)

Culled from their highly successful "Chicago VII" LP, this tune is a brilliant edit of the original cut. 
**ODDS & SODS — The Who — Producers: The Who and various others — Track/MCA MCA-2126**

One of the Who's most interesting packages to date, the group's latest LP encompasses material ranging from "I'm The Face," recorded in 1964 to "Postcard," an interesting opener done just this year though it was started in 1969. This being the Who's tenth anniversary and tenth album, it seems appropriate that the cuts assembled here represent different eras of their development. It's a gutsy LP with the typical Who panache that has always been the band's trademark. We love "Naked Eye" and "Pure and Easy."



**DAVID LIVE — David Bowie — Producer: Tony Visconti — RCA CPL2-0771**

Recorded at the Tower Theatre in Philadelphia, July 14-15, 1974, David Bowie's smashing two record set presents the uniquely gifted entertainer in a totally unadulterated light. As the jacket states, "It is complete and exact." No overdubs or applause, etc., were added to this record which speaks highly of David's integrity. Michael Kamen seems to have emerged from out of God knows where (he was charter member and founder of New York Rock Ensemble) to direct the music which includes "1984," "Rebel Rebel," "Suffragette City," "Jean Genie" and "All The Young Dudes."



**DRAGON FLY — Jefferson Starship — Producers: Jefferson Starship, Larry Cox — Grunt BFL1-0717**

The Jefferson Starship, to bring the record up to date, consists of Paul Kantner, Grace Slick, David Freiberg, Craig Chaquico, John Barbata, Papa John Creach, Pete Sears, and on this LP, Marty Balin (who sings vocals on "Caroline"), Larry Cox, engineer/co-producer, Pat Ieraci, production consultant and amp consultant Paul Dowell. Got it? It may be difficult separating the Airplane from the Starship from Hot Tuna etc., but this new Starship LP is well worth a listen as the aforementioned talented people collaborate in making a provocative record. Our fave is "Hyperdrive."




**TOGETHER FOR THE FIRST TIME...LIVE — B. B. King, Bobby Bland — Producer: Steve Barri — ABC/Dunhill DSY-50190/2**

Put two geniuses like B. B. King and Bobby "Blue" Bland together and you're bound to come up with a winning combination, which is exactly what the case is here on the duo's new ABC/Dunhill live two record set. The past masters of the blues improvise some very tasty selections here including "3 O'Clock In The Morning," "It's My Own Fault Baby," "Don't Cry No More," "That's The Way Love Is," "I Like To Live The Love," "Everybody Wants To Know Why I Sing The Blues" and "I'll Take Care Of You." A great blues LP.



**NIGHTBIRDS — Labelle — Producer: Allen Toussaint — Epic KE 33075**

It's great to have Patty LaBelle, Nona Hendryx and Sarah Dash, collectively Labelle, back on the recording scene again. Everyone knows that these three ladies have the power to move mountains with their incredible voices and now that they are under the Epic wing we can expect nothing but big hit records from them. This LP is particularly strong and we favor the cuts "Somebody Somewhere," "You Turn Me On" and their fabulous live showstopper, "What Can I Do For You." This one's going to be Labelle's biggest!




**JOURNEY — Arif Mardin — Producer: Arif Mardin — Atlantic SD 1661**

Arif Mardin is a man who maintains a low profile and so many people remain unaware of the tremendous impact he's had on contemporary music both pop and jazz over the last two decades. Hopefully this LP, though it doesn't feature the master producer as an artist, will at least put his great sense of aesthetics and direction into sharper focus. The tunes that Arif has selected for this LP are reflective of his favorite rhythms, motifs and musical modes and are a showpiece of good taste and music.



**SMILER — Rod Stewart — Producer: Rod Stewart — Mercury SRM 1-1017**

Emerging with his first solo LP in over a year, Rod Stewart does so beautifully with material by the likes of John/Taupin, McCartney, Dylan and Goffin/King/Wexler (not to mention Chuck Berry's "Sweet Little Rock 'N' Roller" and three he co-wrote, "Farewell," "Sailor" and "Dixie Toot"). Throughout the LP, Rod's vocals are excellent and he seems to have matured even more as an interpretive stylist. It's good to see Rod back on the solo scene and sounding so together.



**NIGHTMARES — J. Geils Band — Producer: Bill Szymczyk — Atlantic SD 18107**

The Bad Boys from Boston make their charge for the top of the hill every fall and, without fail, come away with a gold disk six or eight weeks after they release an LP and "Nightmares" looks like it's going to pick up where "Ladies Choice" and "Bloodshot" left off. Filled with the hard driving rock blues that has always characterized the band, the new Geils LP features Peter Wolf, Seth Justman and Co. really getting down and playing hard rock n' roll. We think the best tunes are "Detroit Breakdown" and "Stoop Down #39."




**LIVE & IN CONCERT — Four Tops — Producers: Steve Barri, Dennis Lambert, Brian Potter — ABC/Dunhill DSD-50188**

Right from the top, the fantastic hit single, "Are You Man Enough," you know that this live Tops LP is a smash. The group lives up to its long standing reputation for excellence in every cut, ranging from "Standing In The Shadows Of Love" and "Baby I Need Your Lovin'" to "Keeper Of The Castle" and their recent hit of last summer, "One Chain Don't Make No Prison." **SHE CALLED ME BABY — Charlie Rich — Producer: Chet Atkins — RCA APL1-0686**


Charlie Rich is a unique man — he's probably the only singer who has hit albums simultaneously on as many as three labels. Though under current contract to Epic, Charlie is still finding his musical memoires, in this case, a very tasteful RCA package which features such selections as "Share Your Love With Me," "Ol' Man River," "Ten Dollars And A Clean White Shirt" and the sentimental title track. Rich is consistently super, so you can bet this collection is as exceptional as he is.



**WAR BABIES — Daryl Hall/John Oates — Producer: Todd Rundgren — Atlantic SD 18109**

The unique harmonic blend of Daryl Hall and John Oates is not as sweet and distant as it once was, but that's because Todd Rundgren produced this, their third LP, and the combination of songs is as different as any we've heard over the span of two records. "Abandoned Luncheonette" was one of the most critically acclaimed albums of '73 and "War Babies," despite its maudlin title, is actually a potential hit album with some fine material on it — material the duo will be able to perform live (their only weakness on last year's tour with the Bee Gees). The energy level here is very high and the caliber of material exciting and challenging. We like "70's Scenario."






**THE PLAYER** — First Choice — Producers: Stan Watson, Norman Harris — Philly Groove PG 1502

The record is geared to the love mood and it's very effective in putting the flavor of romance into each song. We like "Sweet Sweet Lady," "How Can I Love You" and "Baby I Don't Like You."



**BARRY MANILOW II** — Barry Manilow — Producers: Barry Manilow, Ron Dante — Bell 1314

The talented and charismatic Mr. Manilow is back again with his second Bell disk and further proof that what he did in helping Bette Midler become a star was just one of his many musical gifts. On this LP, Barry has stuck basically to his own compositions and for good reason. He has a touch with lyrics that reaches from the deep emotion to erotic whimsy and he gets the most out of his music. The arrangements and dynamics of tunes like "I Want To Be Somebody's Baby" and "Avenue C" are flawless. We like this LP a lot.

Her new Shelter LP is a fabulous combination of Mary's singing and songwriting capabilities and she displays as much soul and perception in her lyrics as she does with her voice. Particularly enjoyable tracks from this LP include "Singing The Blues (Reggae)," "Brother," "Seasons," "Levon," and the stunning title track.





**KYLE** — Kyle — Producers: Danny Janssen, Bobby Hart — ABC ABCD-832




Filled with about fifty zingers, the record is a collection of the stars doing their thing — being funny (sometimes accidentally) and the editing is superb. Stars whose answers to host Peter Marshall's questions are particularly funny are Burt Reynolds, Karen Valentine, Rose Marie and the inimitable Paul Lynde.



The team that did so well with Gershwin take on Rodgers & Hart, which means that the material is Grade A — and, by and large, rarer stuff from the celebrated song team. Among the finds of particular beauty is "Nothing But You," a tender Rodgers waltz sung with affection by Miss Hudson. Whyte does very well with the poignant "You Have Cast Your Shadow on the Sea," while in a duet the pair romp through in 20's style on a breezy "What's The Use Of Talking." Surely, not the Rodgers & Hart most people would know, but plenty of stuff they should.

## Midnight Special Tapes In Tulsa



Bartell Media Corporation owns and operates three AM and three FM radio stations and publishes ten magazines.



**Chicago**

THE FORUM — When 18,000 people get up en masse and scream their approval for a musical act, they're saying a lot more than any critic or critics could say in a dozen volumes — and more eloquently at that. Approval by mass audiences is what pop music is all about and for those too blown out by their own jaded tastes to at least appreciate other people having fun, there must only be envy and the empty feeling of jealousy that spurs so many writers to the ultra-critical approach.

Chicago, as any group will, has a standard approach to concerts and some are better than others, but what better yardstick for a concert's success than sampling on the spot audience reaction. Everyone I talked to at the show was wild about Bobby Lamm, Terry Kath and co. as they reeled off hit after hit in as precise and professional manner as is possible in a sports arena. After all, Chicago was not playing Carnegie Hall and the acoustics they had to deal with were less than ideal, but they are brilliant showmen, consistent in what they do and the spontaneous joy they generated with their brand of uptempo, bright rock 'n' jazz, gave me the impression that they were really enjoying themselves, a fact Lamm confirmed in a recent visit to **Cash Box**. In fact, Lamm said he thought the concert was one of the best the group had ever done in Los Angeles and that not only he, but the rest of the group, its management and Columbia Records was extremely pleased by the way the show went off.

Though each had his own favorite, "25 Or 6 To 4" and "I'm A Man" will always stand out as my favorite Chicago tunes and perfectly counterbalanced the material the group has been working on more recently.

**Merryweather's Space Rangers**

WHISKY L.A. — Veteran Neil Merryweather, whose Heavy Cruiser and Mama Lion brainstorms once combined heavy metal with a touch of whimsy premiered his latest collation, the Space Rangers at the Whisky recently in a proficient demonstration of the creative use of hard-core rock. The group combines heavy metal music with a 2001 image for visual effect, but rely upon their near-to-virtuoso musicianship to carry the show. The result is a provocative musical event reminiscent of a marriage of Zolar X with the Moody Blues.

Making extensive use of the Chamberlain (which seems to have supplanted the mellotron as this year's "in" instrument) the group created a textured background for such tours-de-force as "Hollywood boulevard," a tersely lyrical opus complete with evocative lyrics and strong musical hooks that could transform the song into the latest Californian anthem. Merryweather's voice is strong, and his backing, especially by keyboardist James Herdon and drummer par excellence Tim McGovern served to embellish their best efforts and suffice for the lesser material.

The group was obviously restrained somewhat by the close confines of the Whisky; their act seems geared to a somewhat larger setting. They nevertheless came through very well. The majority of their songs were drawn from the recent Mercury LP, "Space Rangers."

**John Denver**

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN — An enthusiastic crowd greeted RCA recording artist John Denver in his Madison Square Garden appearances last weekend, and their enthusiasm was more than matched by Denver's performance.

Backed by a full orchestra, Denver managed to bring the thousands of people in the audience close to him, making it seem like a folksy club.

Running through most of his repertoire, Denver did songs which reached back to his early work, like "Poems, Prayers and Promises," and "For Baby (For Bobbie)." He then traveled through "Take Me Home, Country Roads," and "Rockie Mountain High." But it was Denver's performances of material from his new album, "Back Home Again" which really got people up and singing. "Annie's Song," "Matthew," and "Back Home Again" were the rousers.

Denver's easy style did not hide his superb musicianship, and, adding to the overall effect of the show, was a slide presentation which illustrated many of his songs with pictures, both still and movies.

Truly one of today's most important artists, Denver delivers with talent and style, which shows why he is as important as he is.

**Rick Wakeman**

HOLLYWOOD BOWL, L.A. — the combination of classical music and rock filled the evening air with one of the most memorable musical events of the year. Today's generation packed the Bowl to hear and enjoy Rick Wakeman with The New World Symphony Orchestra and Choir play Rachmaninoff's Symphony 1 in D, Opus 13; plus selections from Wakeman's "The Six Wives of Henry VIII."

These musical numbers were beautiful, but the feature of the evening was Wakeman's composition "Journey to the Center of the Earth." Wakeman was backed by David Measham conducting the orchestra; Roger Newall, guitar; Jeffrey Crampton, guitar; Barney James drum and timpanies; Gary Pickford Hopkins, guitar and vocal; Ashley Holt, vocal; John Hodgson, percussions; with David Hemmings outstanding narration of this Jules Verne classic.

Rick's equipment included Double mellotron, two single mellotrons, four moogs, RMI piano, Hohner Clavinet piano, Fender 88 piano, two Steinway pianos, two Helpinstill pickups, 18 channel mixer, 600w SAE amps, three 2-way JBL monitor cabinets, and a Hammond C3 organ. The flowing robes and long golden hair of Rick Wakeman added that extra touch of class to this classical evening featuring this most outstanding rock concerto.

"Journey, Recollection, Battle, and Forest. Battle featured inflated giant monsters rising from beneath the stage that complimented this vibrant part of the concerto. The audience response was so tremendous the entire company returned for two encores, and even then a loud appreciation was heard for many minutes. The sound of the crowd was lasting; but the memory of a fine evening of music by a very talented Rick Wakeman will last in the hearts of all that attended.

**Marvin Gaye  
The Independents  
Clouds Of Joy**

RADIO CITY MUSIC HALL — A sellout crowd welcomed Marvin Gaye back to New York. The atmosphere of the concert reminded one of the adulatory hysteria that Beatle fans exhibited during the mid-60s. Hordes of women stormed the stage and attempted to touch or, hopefully, kiss the Tamla sensation. A cordon of Gaye's representatives blocked the stage, but the protection most often proved futile. Gaye managed, amidst all the pandemonium, to give a sparkling performance. He was backed by a large brass section, a well-equipped trio of percussionists, and a smooth quartet providing vocal accompaniment and soulful choreography. Gaye's voice was at its silken best. At times, the sound was almost entrancing and seemed to caress the audience. Yet during the playing of his hits "Let's Get It On" and "Trouble Man," Gaye's voice took on the power of a dynamo as his impeccable intonation heightened the funky drive of his unleashed musical tempest.

The stage was backdropped by a tie-dyed blend of purple and blueish hues. A revolving yellow ball spun as Gaye wove his musical magic. His smash "Come Get To This" was effectively supported by Gaye on piano. Unfortunately, the sound reproduction did not adequately transcribe the clarity and precision of his keyboard expertise. The crowd, however, did not seem to notice the distortions. They remained on their feet throughout the entire performance. In fact, the isles were so crowded that dancing seemed impossible. Yet, the audience was so affected by Gaye's sensuously exhilarating harmonies that they danced in front of their seats.

Gaye's performance was a more than ample thank-you to his fans, who have made him one of America's most popular musical talents.

The Independents were a visual and aural hit. The Wand group accompanied Chuck Jackson's bluesy soul with a stylized choreographical charade. The backup singers also proved to be talented performers in their own right, as their solos thoroughly delighted the audience.

Opening for Gaye were the Clouds of Joy. The ABC-Dunhill group accelerated the audience's excitement of anticipation to a fever pitch. Their well-mixed vocal harmonies were punctuated by improvisational dancing. If the response of the crowd was any indicator of success then we can expect to hear from both groups in the future.

## r&b ingredients

**KINSHASA, ZAIRE** — The ambitious dream of bringing together the top black musical artists of Africa and America became a reality here with the presentation of the first of three **Zaire '74** stadium concerts in this Central African capital city. **James Brown** was the opening night headliner, and despite the handicap of going on at 3:30 a.m., he brought the audience to life and dazzled them with his pyrotechnics. Brown, sticking with his roadshow format, didn't make his appearance until the second half of his show, but his faithful fans waited him out and cheered him. The concert was held in the newly refurbished 60,000-seat soccer stadium where **Muhammed Ali** and **George Foreman** were scheduled to fight until Foreman's eye cut resulted in the postponement. Ali was among the spectators at the opening night concert and received a roaring salute from the crowd. Preceding Brown on the opening night show were several African acts and American entertainers. **The Fania Allstars** with **Pacheco** in command ignited the audience first with a rousing set of Afro-Latin rhythms that brought calls for an encore.

**The Pointer Sisters** were less successful in clearing the language barrier with their slick and imaginative act. Better suited for Las Vegas than Central Africa, their show is largely a sendup of the American music of 30 years ago.

Promoters **Don King** and **Lloyd Price** expressed the feeling that the concerts represent a tremendous cultural achievement in bringing the two continents together with music.

Certainly the technical achievement was remarkable, and the concert stage assembled by **Bill McManus** and **Chip Monck** was second to none with the most professional equipment. Twenty-five American technicians installed the massive amount of equipment and excellent sound system.

The opening night concert pulled an estimated 25,000 persons, the ticket sales being handicapped because of an advance sale and the high range (\$2 to \$3) of the prices in this country where many people work a day for less than the minimum ticket.

King said plans were being made to lower the ticket price to \$1 for all seats for the final concert to give everyone an opportunity to see at least one of the history-making concerts.

Price said, "The primary thing is the film for the world to see rather than just filling up the stadium, but we want as many people as possible to enjoy the concert in person. The fact that we spanned 9,000 miles and put more than \$2 million into this project makes it unlike anything ever attempted before."

King added, "We promised that we would deliver the artists and the equipment, and we did. We are all very proud that we got to take part in this remarkable cultural event."

**The Supremes, Mary Wilson, Cindy Birdsong** and **Scherrie Payne** have been set for a one week tour of Brazil starting on October 14, which will see them performing at the Teatro Tuca Theatre in Sao Paulo, The Brune Theatre in Rio de Janeiro, the Circle de Las Artes in Rio, the Blue Cassara and the Circulo de Militar in Sao Paulo.

"A Hit Baby" — Sunday Sharpe, who has a solid hit in singing about "I'm Having Your Baby," has roots that go deep into country music. Raised in Florida, the daughter of a father who "plays anything" according to Sunday, the family was totally committed to songs like "Cold Tater," "Out Behind The Barn," "Foot Prints In The Snow," and of course the men that made the songs popular. Men like Bill Monroe, "Little" Jimmy Dickens and Hank Snow. But it wasn't until four years ago that Sunday realized that she, herself, could sing those songs and grow into one of the freshest new artists on the scene today.

It all started at a New Year's party, when, as part of the fun and entertainment, Sunday took a turn singing with the band. The success of the venture

surprised Sunday even more than it surprised her audience. Among those present that night was her friend and employer, "Dorothy." Even though she was not in the business of music, Dorothy recognized Sunday's potential and insisted she develop and pursue her talent in that direction. **Country Music Hall Of Fame To Expand In 1975**

NASHVILLE — The Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum, long recognized as a leading cultural and historical museum, will expand its physical plant by nearly 100% in 1975. It was announced here today. Frank Jones, chairman of the board of the Country Music Foundation and vice president of Capitol Records' country division, made the announcement of the planned expansion during a meeting of the Foundation Board of Trustees in Nashville. Plans for expansion formed the most prominent topic of discussion at this fourth quarterly meeting of the Country Music Foundation Board of Trustees — a distinguished group of music-industry leaders charged with operating the Hall of Fame and administering other educational programs of the foundation.

The expansion — which is the result of more than a year's advance planning — will double the display area of the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum and will also increase the space available to the Foundation Library and Media Center. The Project will cost "in excess" of \$500,000.

Earl Swensson Architects Inc. have been retained by the foundation as architects for the project, the goal of which is to expand the size of the Hall of Fame facility while preserving the basic iden-

tity of the original building. William Ivey, foundation executive director, noted that "attendance at the Hall of Fame has increased steadily over the past few years, and we're now serving nearly 300,000 visitors each year, so the need for expansion is great. Other educational activities of the foundation have also grown, so we are faced with an equal need to expand the Library and Media Center in order to accommodate a growing collection and larger staff."

Planning and design phases of the project will commence immediately, with groundbreaking scheduled for Sept. of 1975. Connie B. Gay, president of the board of trustees, stressed the complexity of the expansion project. "We must build in the off-season to avoid disrupting the normal operation of the museum," Gay noted, "and we also must execute a design which either preserves or enhances the existing building. The trustees of the foundation are aware of the difficulty of the task, but we are convinced that the result will produce a more comfortable and exciting Hall of Fame building."

The Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum was first opened to the public in the spring of 1967. Since that time, more than one million visitors have toured the facility.

## Talent Buyers' Seminar Set

NASHVILLE — An impressive bill of speakers will headline this year's Talent Buyers' Seminar, called "SAAY '74" (Seminar — Answers & Assistance for You).

The three-day event begins on Sunday, Oct. 13 with registration, a party sponsored by Amusement Business and the Seminar's first talent showcase. All told, twenty-three country artists will be showcased during the Seminar.

On Monday morning, Oct. 14, the group will be welcomed by Wesley Rose, president of the Country Music Association; Nashville's Mayor Beverly Briley; Bud Wendell of Opryland; a Tennessee State official and Minnie Pearl. The first Seminar, called "Publicity Requirements for Fairs," will follow the welcoming addresses. Speakers will be Danny Davis; Martin Ritter, Allentown Fairs; Paul Soleberg; and Lou Acosta, Six Flags Over Texas. Attorney Dick Frank, John Polk of RIAA, and LeRoy Van Dyke will then address the subject of Tape Piracy.

The Monday afternoon sessions will concern "Parks—Their Requirements and Needs." The subject will be presented in talks by Lawrence Waltman, Sunset Park; Dick Overdorf, Appalachia Lake Park; and Bob Cross of Disneyworld. "Talkback Workshop" will be handled by C. L. Teachworth, State Fair of Virginia; Myles Johnson, Clay County Fair; Niles Gray, Appalachia County Fair; and Tommy Cash.

Tuesday's events begin with the subjects of "Services, Facilities and Obligations to Talent at Fairs." Speakers include Sonny James; Dottie West; Johnnie Massey; Fred Huff, DuQuoin State Fair; and Bill Wynne, Eastern States Exposition. The last official Seminar will cover the topic of "Product Sales" as discussed by Wilson Sparks, Mid-South Fairs; and Bill Uthmeir, Uthmeir Enterprises; as well as a country music artist. A full afternoon of country entertainment will then round out the activities.

The talent buyer's Seminar is sponsored by the CMA. Bob Neal of the William Morris Agency is chairman of the Talent Buyer's Committee and serving with him are: Buddy Lee, Buddy Lee Attractions; Walt Heeney, Amusement Business; Dick Blake, Hubert Long International; and Harry Peebles, the Harry Peebles Agency.

WSM has proposed that people from Music Row, as well as their listening public, be involved in the nomination of five candidates for the honorary title and that the candidates agree, before their nominations are announced, to serve in this position if elected and that the public at large be involved in the election itself. Once elected, the Mayor of Music Row would serve for a one-year term with limited ceremonial duties. No particulars regarding the actual form of election have been set forth.

LaCosta says "Get On My Love Train" — Capitol Records has just released "Merle Haggard and The Strangers Present His 30th Album," and Haggard is currently on a tour which will take him throughout the U.S.

Mac Davis has been in Nashville recently recording demos (for the first time) at Pete Drake's studio. Pat Rolfe, head of the Hill and Range Publishing operating in Nashville, and writer Doodle Owens are just back from a very successful New York visit. New writers just signed to the company are Shorty Hall and Lou Rochelle.

RCA veteran artist, Hank Locklin, is set for a tour of New Zealand. The popular Irish tenor has had to forgo his Irish tours to some extent because of the unrest in that country. Avco Records is fast moving along into the country field since opening the new Nashville operation under the direction of George Richey (manager) and Frank Mull (sales & promotion). Their first move in this direction is the acquisition of a talent from JMI Records, namely, Mark Kaye James. They have acquired all of Mary Kay's masters from JMI including the previously released singles, her current release "It Amazes Me," as well as unreleased masters. The duo returned to Nashville after having worked 2 big shows at Spencer, Iowa's Clay County Fair — one of the nation's largest county fairs. Dot recording artist, Pat Roberts, whose current single "Love Song Singin' Man" is receiving good national air-play, just completed one of the busiest outdoor summer schedules of his career. Pat appeared as headliner at over twenty-five fairs, including appearances at Expo '74 in Spokane, and at the Ellensburg Rodeo, one of America's oldest and best-known rodeos.


### SEASONS OF LOVE — Bobby Wright — ABC 842



## Some 10,000 Food Vending Firms To Attend Oct. 17-20 NAMA Show

CHICAGO — Diverse topics of current interest, ranging from economic forecasts to merchandising and future planning are expected to draw heavy attendance at the business meeting of the 1974 National Convention and Exhibit of Vending and Foodservice Management which will take place at McCormick Place in Chicago from Oct. 17 to 20.

Sponsored by NAMA, the exhibit will comprise some 160 exhibitors and is expected to draw close to 10,000 registrants, according to Alvin M. Corry, NAMA chairman.

Keynote speakers will include George E. Reedy, press secretary during the Johnson administration and dean of the Marquette University School of Journalism, and Leo Cherne, executive director of the Research Institute of America.

Discussion topics will include the current status of affirmative action programs in the hiring of minority workers, route accountability and security procedures, trends in industry management in the face of inflation and shortages, the status of the office coffee market, application of computers to commissary management, merchandising in vending operation, management of independently owned companies and effective handling of training programs.

Entertainment will be highlighted by the appearance of Stan Kenton and a comedy program at the Saturday night banquet, a Pirate's Ball on Friday night and a 4-in-1 party on Friday, featuring four different musical themes.

Under the slogan "PRO" fits in PROFITS, all meetings will be held at McCormick Place during the four mornings of the convention, beginning with the annual meeting of NAMA and Reedy's keynote address of Oct. 17.

The exhibits will open each afternoon at McCormick Place, including demonstrations of the winning entries of the 1974 National Sandwich Idea Contest. Exhibits will present the latest models of vending machines, commissary equipment, vended products and food items used in foodservice management, as well as services required by operating companies.





With all this activity it seems hard to imagine Van doing anything but working. But, **McCoy** is also an entrepreneur and for a man with all his musical talents he has undertaken his own production firm called White House Productions. The company's first disk was "5-10-15-20 (25-30 Years Of Love)" by **The Presidents**. The disk was a number one smash on the R&B charts. Eventually, **McCoy** said, the company would attempt to originate its own sound as **Philly International** has successfully done. A sound which would be indigenous to the Washington area, that just might drive the listeners buggy. The company's current activities include a new single by **Anacostia** on Columbia Records called "Too Busy Thinking About My Baby"; an LP by the **New Censation** on the Pride label and a new single on Warner Bros. by **Bill Harris**.

Van's publishing is handled by Warner Bros. Music, headed by president **Ed Silvers**.

"We had decided not to put it out as a single," Lamm says, "because it would be impossible to do live without the **Beach Boys**."

But as it has gone in the past with Chicago singles, the choice was made for the group. So many radio stations played the song and it was greeted with such a favorable response that Columbia Records felt obligated to put it out. Lamm looks at the choice for a single from "Skinny Boy" in the same way. "I don't really hear a super, AM smash on the album, but I can't be sure. I'm waiting for response from the radio stations and if there isn't any response it just means that there isn't supposed to be a single from the album. It's just supposed to be a good album all by itself."


And will Lamm's record lead to other members of Chicago following the solo route? Lamm isn't sure.

"There's nothing concrete but Terry has been wanting to do one for a long time and I think he'll get around to doing it. **Peter Cetera** has a lot of tunes and his stuff is folkier, country-ish. I think it would be good for their heads to do it," Lamm speaks from experience. "The main thing is that they have all been enthusiastic about my album and have wished me well."

And besides Chicago VIII there is plenty of activity for the parent group. Planned now is a New Years Eve Show for television which will feature **The Doobie Brothers**, **the Beach Boys**, **Herbie Hancock** and **Olivia Newton-John**, all in 1930s black tie and tails. Lamm is enthused about it. "I want to get a film clip of **Duke Ellington** back in the 30s doing a number for the show. It will be a memorial to him."

And if that is what Robert Lamm wants that is probably exactly what will happen.

plaintiff record companies to the Supreme Court which last June unanimously overruled Judge Landry and remanded the case to his court "with directions for further proceedings not inconsistent with this opinion."

When Judge Landry finally granted a temporary injunction but postponed the effective date for 90 days and refused to extend the order barring the removal of assets, the plaintiff record companies petitioned the Supreme Court for a Writ of Mandamus which was issued on Sept. 30.

WASHINGTON — Raids by the Maryland state police and the FBI resulted in the arrest of four men and the seizure of \$65,000 worth of allegedly pirated 8-track cartridge tapes.

More than 10,000 tapes were seized in a raid on a warehouse operated by Cee Lee Associates in Beaver Heights, Md. Arrested were Lee Kopit, of Silver Springs, Md., and Frederick Toland and Richard Tener, both from Greensboro, N.C. All three were charged with violating Maryland's anti-piracy law.

FBI agents arrested Abdel Rahim Oman, 32, who, was allegedly selling infringing copies of sound recordings from a van in a parking lot here. More than 8,000 pirated tapes were seized.

Bill Clark, a spokesman for the Maryland state police, said a lengthy investigation that had preceded the raids indicated "a highly profitable organized type of crime that extends all along the Eastern Seaboard as far north as Boston and south to North Carolina.

"That is why we have requested and received the assistance of the FBI and other state police agencies," he declared.

Including the current seizures and arrests, state police have arrested 20 persons and seized almost 37,000 pirated tapes so far this year, Clark said.

BOSTON — Paul Analitto, doing business as Poor Paul's, has been indicted on three counts of selling pirated tapes in violation of the Massachusetts anti-piracy statute. Trial is expected to be set for sometime in October.

Police were said to have traced the location of Analitto's distributing operation from information obtained from a retailer whose store was raided several months ago.

The prosecution will be handled by assistant district attorney Bonnie McLeod-Griffin.

PORTSMOUTH, O. — Luther Linton, owner of the Tape Barn here, has been charged with federal copyright violations following his arrest by FBI agents who seized 3,100 allegedly infringing 8-track cartridge tapes from his premises.

NORFOLK, Va. — James A. O'Keefe, owner of the Chesapeake Tape Company, pleaded guilty in federal district court here to one count of copyright infringement and was fined \$1,000 by magistrate Gilbert R. Swink.

FBI agents armed with search warrants had raided O'Keefe's residence, his place of business and two vans, seizing 6,000 pirated tapes and about \$3,000 worth of equipment and supplies.

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. — FBI agents here raided two boardwalk locations, seizing 90 pirated tapes at King Kelly Limited, owned by Larry Sherman, and close to 500 tapes in a store at 2503 Boardwalk operated by Saleh Kraiem of Brooklyn.

Assistant U.S. attorney Dominick Ammaroso said the filing of charges is pending.


