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cash box editorial**The Disco LP Craze**

The disco 45/disco LP/12" 45 configuration, which the record industry is moving into in typical helter skelter fashion (see story inside), is a positive attempt to expand the potential markets of the industry. Unfortunately, the industry is going about it without a unified approach, with the distinct possibility that we may ultimately wind up with a half dozen different formats.

Nevertheless, the disco market has opened up new potential markets for record sales, the first such attempt since quad, and possibly the last before some sort of videodiscs. While sales of the new configuration have not been outstanding, new avenues and new consumers have hopefully bought records that they would not have bought in single or album forms.

The different configurations are a problem, though. While corporate lawyers absolutely frown on any sort of "the-industry-should-get-together-and-talk-about-it," perhaps an RIAA-sponsored meeting could come up with some sort of standardization for the disco configuration.

Without that, we have companies running off in every different direction. And who can say for sure that the lack of a uniform concept on quad, instead of both discrete and matrix, was not *the sole factor* that hindered quad's development into a viable format.

And who can say for sure that the development of the videodisc may not be similarly hindered, as the different companies develop non-compatible formats?

Meanwhile, we must admit some initial skepticism at the disco LP type of record. We weren't too sure that the configuration would make a go of it. And while initial sales reports are in the 10,000-25,000 range generally (pre-returns), that apparently generates sufficient sales to justify and make profitable the added configuration.

Where the disco market will go is anyone's guess. But it is a positive and healthy sign to see the industry able to enjoy an additional configuration which is bringing in extra dollars.

Progress To Open Distributorship In Chicago Market

NEW YORK — Progress Record Distributing, Inc., an independent distributor based in Cleveland, will expand its operation with the opening of a branch in Chicago. Harold Davis, former branch manager for Phonodisc in Chicago and a veteran of the Chicago record market, will become the new facility's general manager.

At press time, Joe Simone, owner of Progress, had not settled on a location, but he indicated that a final selection was imminent. Simone noted that he would probably acquire a space of approximately 20,000 square feet, though that would naturally depend on current availability. If all operational details proceed as scheduled Progress could be open for business in Chicago within 30 days.

With this move, Progress becomes the second major independent distributor servicing Chicago. M.S. Distributors, for all practical purposes, maintains a monopoly of the market. But, Simone seemed unconcerned. "There's a strong enough need for an alternative, because it's a big enough market," he said. "The market is large enough to support M.S. and ourselves and I assume we'll become a rather substantial distributor there."

At press time, there was still no definitive word on which, if any, manufacturers were planning to switch.

No Lines Yet

Curiously, Simone is entering the Chicago market without any record company commitments to supply him there. But, again, he seemed resolved almost to the point of sounding unconcerned. "I don't know that I'll have to approach any manufacturers, quite frankly," he said. "I believe there'll be enough lines available once we get our doors open."

When pressed, he noted that he had not even approached A&M and Motown, the

Federal Grand Jury Begins Industry Probe

LOS ANGELES — A Federal Grand Jury in Los Angeles has begun a massive investigation of the recording industry, and a number of manufacturers and retailers on the west coast have been served with subpoenas.

The subpoenas, which cover the five-year period from 1971 through 1976, are for information about the manufacturing, dis-

tribution and sale of phonograph records and tapes within the United States. Specifically, the Grand Jury has requested all company records and documents relating to "prices, terms or conditions of sales, discounts, credit terms, distribution methods, customers, competition or competitors, (and) market conditions."

Cash Box has obtained a copy of one of the subpoenas, which has an order to appear at 9:30 a.m. on March 16 at the U.S. District Court House in Los Angeles, to testify before the Grand Jury. Attached to the subpoena is a list of 28 specific types of documents the Grand Jury has requested.

Among the areas the Grand Jury seems most interested in are market share, pricing, customer complaints on pricing, the multiple pricing structure, advertising policies, advertising allowances (free goods), supply problems and artist royalty rates.

All Financial Data

The Grand Jury has also requested the companies named in the subpoenas to furnish complete financial data, including all price lists and employee expense accounts. Further, the subpoenas order the companies to turn over to the Grand Jury all corporate correspondence and memoranda relating to price changes.

Cash Box was unable to determine the exact number of subpoenas issued by the Grand Jury, or whether they were sent pursuant to any specific complaint.

Jonathan C. Gordon of the Justice Department's Antitrust Division refused to comment on the subpoenas, saying:

"The Antitrust Division of the United States Justice Department policy toward ongoing investigations is not to comment on them." Gordon also refused to answer any questions on the nature of the subpoenas, such as the reason behind them, to whom they were sent and if the subpoenas were part of a nationwide investigation.

Among the documents requested by the subpoena are those which show:

- The official name and address of the firm, the date and state of its incorporation;
- The names and addresses of company employees, down to the level of sales manager, for the 5 year period covered by the subpoena;

Pressing and Jacket Fabricating Costs Are Hiked by Record And Album Manufacturers

LOS ANGELES — Several record pressing companies, who handle the bulk of subcontracted LP production, and four LP cover/jacket fabricators, who print an estimated 95% of industry record jackets, have raised their prices during the past few weeks. The hikes, which were not announced to the press, range from 1.5¢ to 2¢ per LP pressing, and average approximately 5% on album covers, according to the manufacturers and a survey of their accounts.

Among the increases implemented, Columbia Record Productions upped their LP pressing price 1.5¢; Monarch Record Manufacturers, Los Angeles, went up 1.5¢ per LP; Specialty Records in Olyphant, Pennsylvania had a hike of 1.63¢ per LP;

Presswell Records, New Jersey increased their price an estimated 2¢ to 2.3¢ per LP, according to accounts. PRC in New York registered a 1.8¢ increase per album. GRT in Sunnyvale, California, and Bestway Products, Mountainside, New Jersey, have not increased their prices, but probably will in the near future, according to management.

At press time it was learned that Columbia Record Production's price on LPs is now \$.420 per LP (to 10,000 units); \$.410 per LP to 25,000 units; \$.405 per LP to 50,000 units; \$.40 per LP to 100,000 units; and \$.395 for over 100,000 units.

Reasons Vary

Reasons for the hike in LP production were more varied, however. "There are a lot of reasons behind our increase," explained

John Williams, vice president and general manager of Monarch Record Manufacturers in Los Angeles. "In the past all of our price increases were tied to the cost of vinyl, and the other cost increases we had to absorb were minor when compared with the vinyl increases. That was the key and we were able to maintain our pace that way. However, since November 1974, when we last raised our prices, labor has gone up an average of 10% a year, label paper and corrugated product went up 7% and 6.4%

It was learned at press time that four major fabricators of album jackets have raised their prices. Queens raised their jacket price by 5%, and IVY Hill, Sherwood Packaging, and AGI increased prices by yet unreported amounts. See related story page 9.

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Korvettes' Detroit Record Prices Hit \$2.99; Peaches Store Opening Seen As Factor

NEW YORK — On the heels of Peaches' recently announced selection of suburban Detroit as the site for its twelfth "super-store" (Cash Box, January 22), Korvettes advertised nine current releases in this Sunday's edition of the *Detroit News* for \$2.99. Except for a three-day sale just before Christmas, this is the first time Korvettes has advertised front-line releases for such a low price in Detroit. It is also the first time in the eight months since the Retail Price Survey began that Cash Box has observed a major retailer promoting current releases for \$2.99 outside of New York.

Local retailers told Cash Box that Kor-

vettes' price was a dollar below the average sale price in Detroit for current releases. Unused to this New York-style "loss leader" merchandising approach, a large number of record customers have reportedly been drawn into Korvettes' five area stores. "It (\$2.99 sale) sure does draw," a Korvettes record department manager, in one of the affected stores, lamented. "And our personnel still have to go through the same motions, marking the albums, that they do on records that I make money on. I'm not at all pleased." He added that the \$2.99 sale might continue for two weeks or longer.

Peaches Responsible?

One Korvettes store manager in Detroit speculated that the unusual low price might

have been prompted by the Peaches move. "Nobody's told me anything," he said, "but it would seem to be Peaches." Asked for his feeling about Peaches coming to Detroit, he said, "Of course, I hate to see big competition like that here."

Other Detroit retailers agreed that the \$2.99 sale, advertised only in the Sunday *News*, was a response to Peaches. Phil LeAnnais, manager of Dearborn Music, the closest store to the new Peaches site on Schaefer St., said the super-store would undoubtedly cut drastically into Korvettes' r&b sales, because Peaches "is a lot deeper in catalog." Inner-city Detroit, where Peaches is expected to make its biggest impact, is considered a strong r&b market.

LeAnnais, while he "wishes they weren't coming in," expects to survive the Peaches invasion. He explained that although Peaches will be only about three miles from his store, it will also be two miles from the Detroit line and will draw heavily from the inner-city. "We do half our business in Dearborn and Dearborn Heights, and the rest from the northern suburbs," LeAnnais said. He added that he hopes to open a new 3,000-foot store at about the same time that Peaches will be opening its unit.

In response to Peaches, he has already put 75 or 80 of the top 200 LPs on sale for \$3.99, whereas normally he sells only 10 or 20 albums at that price. "I'll take a drop in sales particularly at the beginning," he

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CBS, RCA Up 6.98 Prices For Albums

LOS ANGELES — CBS joined WEA this week in raising wholesale prices on \$6.98 list albums for subdistributors, from \$3.36 to 3.38, on all of their \$6.98s except for its Masterworks series. But CBS also raised their dealer price from \$3.61 to \$3.65, whereas WEA had held their dealer price on \$6.98 list albums at the same level. No wholesale increases were announced at this time by CBS on \$7.98 list albums, and CBS did not change their tape pricing, which WEA had lowered to both dealers and subdistributors. But speculation arose that more changes from CBS would be forthcoming after their Atlanta meetings,

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There have been rumors circulating of a service that would provide computerized marketing data from a series of retail outlets around the country, which would be linked to ASI Marketing Research Inc. A spokesman for ASI would neither confirm or deny these rumors.

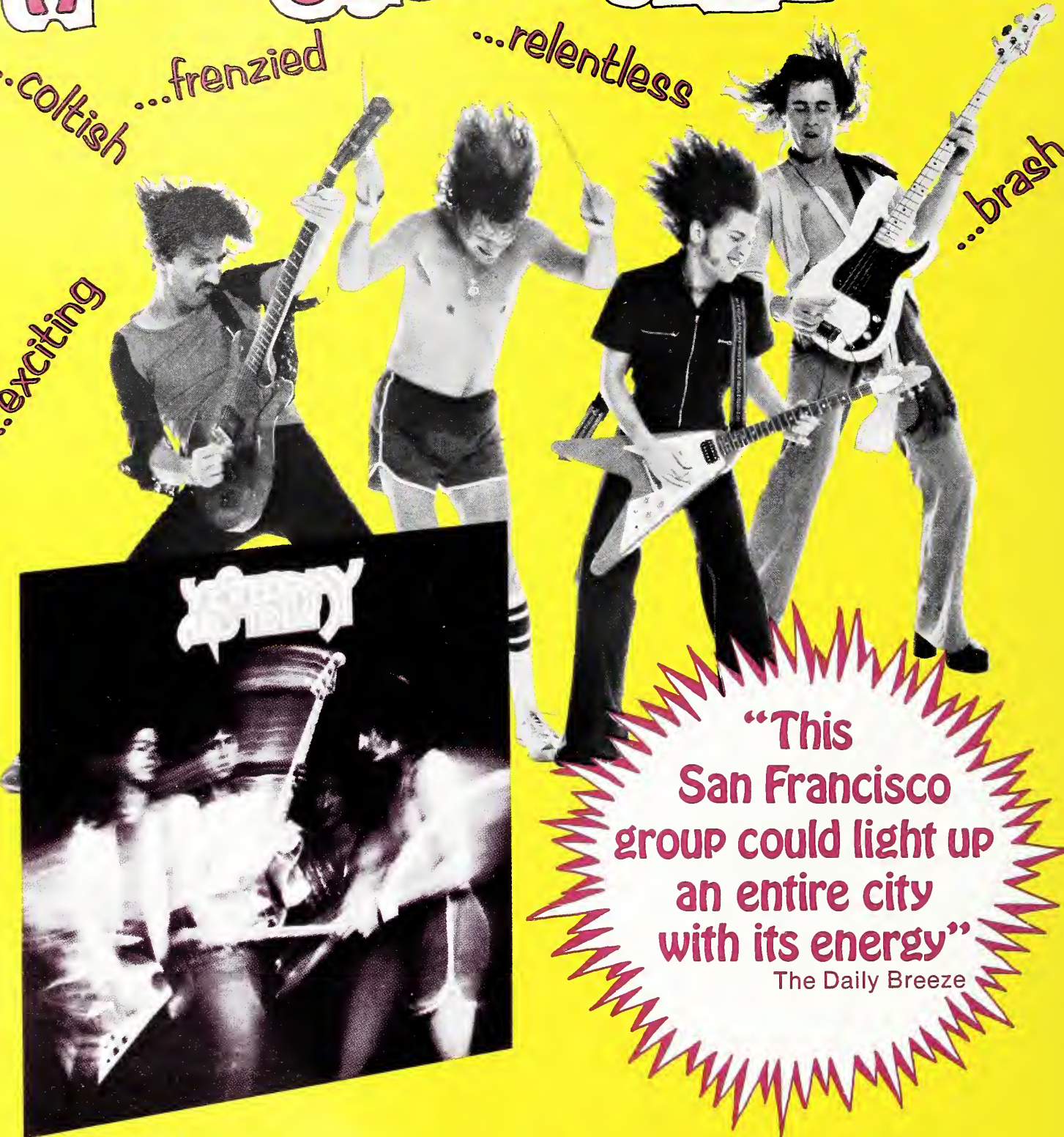

Rising Raw Materials Prices Lead to Higher Album Costs

Record prices are beginning an upward climb, and company executives say that rising costs are the reason (**Cash Box**, January 22). Last week, in the first installment of a four-part series, **Cash Box** examined the various cost increases which have taken place in the area of record pressing. In the second of this series, packaging costs are examined and explained.

NEW YORK — The increase in the cost of packaging albums which has occurred since 1969 parallels and, in some cases, exceeds cost rises in other facets of the record business.

According to industry sources, four firms dominate the highly specialized record packaging field: Ivy Hill, Queens Litho-

graphic and Shorewood Packaging, all based in New York, and Album Graphics, headquartered in Chicago. Together, these companies print the majority of album jackets and sleeves. Ivy Hill and Queens Litho are full-service operations, also printing labels, inserts and other ancillary items.

The price of packaging the average, single-disc album ranges from 11¢ to 13¢, depending on the number of jackets and sleeves in a particular run. This comprises about one-fifth of the total cost of producing an LP, which averages 50-55¢.

Competition In 'Service'

"Prices in the industry (for printing a standard album jacket) usually vary by no more than half a cent, a cent tops," said Leonard Verebay, vice president of Queens Litho, headquartered in New York. "The competition comes in personal relationships, politics. Any one of the packaging companies will do a good job of printing your jackets or sleeves."

Richard Block, vice president of marketing for Album Graphics, a nine-year-old firm specializing in direct jacket

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FCC Hearings On Payola To Begin

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The FCC will begin public hearings on its payola-plugola inquiry within a month, putting back in action an investigation which has been continued sporadically behind closed doors since 1964 and which is to be "nationwide and all-embracing in scope," according to one FCC attorney.

Recent, and as yet undisclosed information about the apparent continued practice of payola, plugola and a variety of "similar improper practices" led the commission to resume hearings. Chief Administrative Law Judge Chester Naumowicz Jr. has been

delegated authority to subpoena relevant material and witnesses, and has named Judge Joseph Stirmer to preside at the hearings.

Charles W. Kelley, chief of the FCC's Broadcast Bureau hearing division, is handling the investigation of payola-plugola which, he said, is "apparently a widespread practice in at least some portions of the industry" and not limited to particular geographic areas of the country. He specified that the FCC must concern itself with regulating licensed broadcast stations, not record companies or DJ's, however. "If people think the acceptance of money isn't worth the risk, then we've made some advance."

Defining The Scope

The commission is still working to define the scope of the problem, to determine how extensive the illegal activity is, who is responsible, whether station licensees are keeping track of what goes on and to define what is covered: "a whole gray area." Because the practice has become more subtle than when "stations were handed \$100 and a record," Kelley observed, that gray area is substantial. The legislation in the communications act concerning such illegal practices may be inadequate, he said, but first questions must be answered regarding the FCC's legitimate interest and

Cleveland Carries Unconventional Reputation Caused By 'Division,' Aggressive Competition

NEW YORK — Cleveland is one of the country's more influential record markets. It is also one of the most unconventional. That reputation for being unusual stems from the effect the city's pronounced east-west geographic division has on retail strategy, the strong reputation Cleveland has for breaking new acts and an advertising pattern that places extraordinary reliance on a progressive FM station, WMMS-FM.

The character of the Cleveland market is further revealed by booming retail record sales that have spawned aggressive competition in the form of an unusually high concentration of national and local chains within the same midwest market.

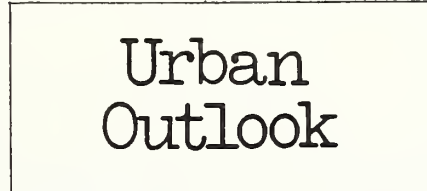
Two Separate Markets

Cleveland has essentially been treated by retailers as two separate markets: east side and west side. The strategic impor-

Peaches explained the unusual move by saying, "We see Cleveland as a segmented city where people just don't seem to cross over from one side to another. Therefore, we placed one store in the east and one in the west."

Cleveland retailers generally regarded the east side as a very affluent and culturally sophisticated market compared to the more conservatively-oriented, blue collar and middle class dominated west side. While record sales on both sides of the city have been overwhelmingly dominated by rock, country sales were reported to be substantially higher on the west side. In turn, the east side, with its

With the release of "Tejas," ZZ Top's fifth album for London Records, the "Little Ol' Band From Texas" has established itself on both the album selling and live performance fronts. Their most recent prior to "Tejas," "Fandango," was released in April of 1975 and certified gold the following June, reaching #8 on the **Cash Box** Top 100 Albums chart and logging 51 weeks on the chart. Their third album, "Tres Hombres," was released in June 1973 and certified gold in May, 1974. Both albums subsequently earned platinum record awards from London Records, indicating sales of over one million units each.

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Jimmy's Adds Three L.I. Stores; Competition Acts

NEW YORK — The recent opening by Jimmy's Music World of three new stores on Long Island brings the total number of units in the fast-growing chain to 17. It has also sharply intensified price competition among local record retailers.

Since Jimmy's opened the first of its five Long Island stores in Huntington a few months ago, \$2.99 has become a regular price for store specials in at least two chains with outlets in the area. The Sam Goody store in Huntington's Walt Whitman shopping mall has run unadvertised \$2.99 specials ever since the Jimmy's unit appeared across the street from it. In addition, current albums by such groups as Heart, Rufus and Renaissance have been adver-

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Lack Of Uniformity On 12" Single A Problem

LOS ANGELES — Record companies looking to the 12-inch single as a new source of income face a lack of standardization of the format as perhaps the biggest obstruction in their path.

Although the 12-inch single is presently being used only with disco songs and artists, some record executives, such as Neil Bogart, president of Casablanca Record and FilmWorks (*Cash Box*, Dec. 18, 1976), see the medium extending beyond the field of disco and eventually replacing the seven-inch single completely.

Different Philosophies, Policies

Since virtually every manufacturer has a different philosophy behind their decision to produce the larger discs, they vary in their policies of what speed to use, how many songs to include, the number of artists on each single, the length of the songs and list prices.

Disco singles from Motown Records, for example, feature a different artist on each side of the 12-inch 33 1/3 rpm record. The reason, according to their national sales manager, is "we feel we're giving (the consumer) a little something extra."

Casablanca's singles are also 33 1/3, but future releases will have one long cut or two short cuts (by one artist) on one side of the record and nothing on the other side.

The "Disco Lucy" 12-inch single from Island Records also features the same group on both sides, but is 45 rpm. WEA's disco single from the Undisputed Truth has a speed of 33 1/3. "Some are one or the other and not marked on the label," complained one retailer.

Two, Three or Four Songs?

Most 12-inch singles on the market contain two songs, but the vice president of Island Records said they may put three songs on one single if each is only three or

four minutes long. Some WEA label executives have reportedly discussed issuing a four-song single in place of an album by certain artists whose sales are marginal.

Manufacturers' suggested retail selling prices also vary from company to company. Playboy Records lists its two disco singles for \$1.94. WEA's sole entry in the field lists for \$2.49, while Casablanca suggests a retail price of \$2.98 for its 12-inch singles. Motown disco singles have no list price, according to the label's national sales director.

Added Confusion

Casablanca recently added to the confusion by putting out two Donna Summer songs ("Love to Love You, Baby" and "Try Me, I Know We Can Make It") in a Valentine's Day promotional package listing for \$4.98.

Because it had only two songs, it sometimes has been confused to be a disco single. The songs, however, were long versions having a total playing time of approximately 35 minutes.

This length classified the 33 1/3 rpm disc as an LP, not a disco single, according to Casablanca's vice president.

Lack of Communication

One record company executive noted the problem and commented, "In the past, when someone in the industry has come out with something innovative, like Paul McCartney's three-record set, all the other companies have known about it ahead of time. But in this case, it seems like there has been a real lack of communication between labels. It doesn't appear that they have checked to see what anybody else is doing before bringing out their product."

Motown's Feelings

Miller London, Motown Records national sales manager, said the reason Motown is putting different artists on each side of its disco singles is that "we happen to feel the more we give the consumer, the more successful our package is going to be."

Motown presently has three 12-inch singles on the market. One is the Originals backed with Jermaine Jackson, the second has one song each from Thelma Houston and the Commodores, while the third is Eddie Kendricks and Willie Hutch. All are 33 1/3 rpm.

"Right now, we want to get the consumer locked into Motown. We feel that with disco, the more we give them for their \$1.90, \$2 or \$3, the better off we're going to be from a sales standpoint.

"Let's face it, if you spend that kind of money you want to get a lot, but you also

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Retailers Disagree On Print Vs. Radio Ads; Television Becomes More Popular Medium

NEW YORK — A recent *Cash Box* survey of key record retailers across the U.S. reveals a wide diversity of opinions about the comparative effectiveness of print, radio and TV advertising. In most cases, the media mix used by each of these chains seemed to vary with its specific market demographics and the image it tries to project.

The only retailer that did not fit into this picture was Sam Goody, a New York-based chain with 27 stores in four states. According to George Levy, president of Goody, the record companies almost always determine whether Goody's co-op LP ads will appear on TV or radio or in print. "We don't have much control over it," he said, mentioning WEA's recent ban on print

advertising in New York (*Cash Box*, August 24) as an example of the situations.

Other retailers, including Record Bar, Aurasound/Discount Records and Peaches, agreed that WEA is "particular" about the media and timing chosen for its

ads. However, none of them reported as little latitude in the choice of their media mixes as Goody did.

Complete Flexibility

"It depends in part on the label involved,"

Television Time Costs Are On Rise

Record retail operators who plan to commit a larger share of their co-op budgets to television advertising may have a hard time convincing record companies to go along with them in many cases. Within the past year, according to a recent report in the Wall Street Journal, a number of national advertisers have seen their costs rise about 30% to an average of \$80,000 for a single minute on prime-time network television.

The trend toward higher costs for TV spots has risen because the demand for commercial TV time has increasingly exceeded the supply. As a result, TV industry revenues soared an estimated 25% of prime network time, local TV ad revenues jumped 31% last year, well above the 20.8% volume gain for the networks. The net result of this burgeoning demand for local spots has been that the cost of running even local TV commercials has also begun to increase at an alarming rate.

Peaches Plans Major Expansion In Near Future

NEW YORK — Following the mid-February opening in Detroit of Peaches' twelfth store (*Cash Box*, January 22), the national record retail chain plans to open a number of other stores within the next year, according to Tom Heiman, chairman of the board of Peaches.

An informed source close to the company revealed that as many as 10 new Peaches outlets may open for business during 1977 and that an equal number of new units are on the drawing boards for 1978.

Heiman declined to specify the locations of any of the stores which the company is planning to open this year. As for the number of outlets involved, he stated: "It depends on the profitability of the stores we have now in terms of expansion."

Cleveland Market's Unconventional Reputation Stems From Competitors

combination of a significant black population and particularly wealthy suburbs, has accounted for a higher percentage of R&B, jazz and classical sales.

'Strange Place'

Cleveland residents have been considered extremely prone to stay in their own neighborhoods, and especially likely to stay, and shop, on their side of the city. Consequently, competition between retail record stores has been unusually localized. "Cleveland is a strange place," said John Cohen, president of the Disc chain, which has four mall stores in Cleveland and 36 nationally. "It's just not a mobile population."

Whether or not they shop locally, though, Cleveland's record buyers have proven to be substantial consumers. Record sales in Cleveland have been remarkably strong. Joe Bressi, marketing director for the 70 Stark-Camelot chain with stores in 22 states (five mall stores in Cleveland), explained, "There's no doubt Cleveland is one of the better markets in the country." Cleveland retail executives surveyed by **Cash Box** resoundingly confirmed both Bressi's statement and a description of the market by Terry Cooper, general manager of the 23 unit Record Land chain, with six mall locations in Cleveland, as "very healthy."

The retailers also agreed with John Anderson, retailing supervisor for the five Cleveland neighborhood-style stores in the 22 unit Record Theatre chain, when he said "Cleveland is a highly competitive music city, which makes it very interesting."

Evidence of the intense retail competi-

tion within Cleveland was illustrated by widespread, frequently low sale prices and the high concentration of successful chains within the market, including Peaches, Camelot, Record Theatre, Record Land, Disc and the local Record Rendezvous chain, which has two stores downtown and two in suburban malls.

\$3.99 Is Standard

The standard sale price in the Cleveland market has emerged as \$3.99, and even large mass merchandisers, such as Gold Circle and J.C. Penney, each with six Cleveland locations, have prominently displayed that price for current \$6.98 releases in their local advertising.

However, the mass merchandiser which aroused the greatest antagonism among Cleveland retailers was Cook United, an 87-unit national chain, with a total of 24 outlets maintaining record departments in Cleveland, 14 in J.P. Snodgrass clothing boutiques, and 10 in Uncle Bill's discount stores.

Cook United has instituted an all-label sales price of \$3.95, advertised at least twice a month, and a shelf price of \$4.90, comparatively lower than the \$4.99 to \$6.19 shelf price range of most Cleveland retailers. Cook has also run advertised all-label sales for as low as \$3.65. Subsequently, "lowballer" charges have been leveled against the giant chain.

John Cohen was especially critical, labeling Cook's prices "ridiculous," explaining that they are "giving the goods away." Cohen's Disc stores maintain a regular shelf price of \$5.98, but sale prices have been advertised at \$3.99 "just to be competitive." "It's a crazy disease," Cohen lamented, accusing Cook United of being "one of the parasites in the business here."

"We will do what the market dictates," replied Harry Suttmiller, buyer for Cook United. "If the market goes down to \$2.99, we'll follow, and we'll be below them," he promised. But, "we're not going to set the pace as far as low balling prices go."

Terry Cooper was not comforted by Suttmiller's and termed the J.P. Snodgrass pricing policy a "very, very serious problem." Cooper's Record Land stores have a shelf price of \$5.99, but he admitted, "Every time we advertise a price, we take it to the basement (\$3.99) like other people do."

Suttmiller asserted, however, "If you walk into a Snodgrass store, you will find less product at \$3.99 than you would at Record Land." He conceded, however, that "records are a small part of the business and are used as a draw to sell clothing."

Suttmiller vowed to maintain what he termed the "low price image" of Snodgrass and Uncle Bill's, saying, "We're going to run \$7.98 list at \$5.25. If the competition is going to go to \$4.99, we're going to go lower and beat everybody's price in town."

Cook United's trump card may be low prices, but Peaches gigantic stores brought the larger-than-life "supermarket concept" of record retailing to Cleveland, much to the consternation of rival stores.

The Monster

Even though Peaches prices have been low, with a shelf price of \$4.98, and an unadvertised rotation of 75 to 100 albums on sale at \$3.98, Cooper described what really has hurt Cleveland competitors: "The monster of the 800,000 Peaches inventory."

"Sure Peaches takes business from me," said local retailer Sheldon Turk. Turk once owned four record stores in Cleveland. Two went out of business, and now Turk owns Melody Lane and Music Grotto, two "neighborhood" stores which advertise a sale price of \$3.99, and carry a shelf price of \$5.99. Surprisingly, Turk was not bitter about Peaches impact, and even complimented the chain, saying, "I think their merchandising is super."

Other Cleveland retailers weren't so generous. "If anybody thinks they can

make it at 10, 15 or 20% gross margin," Cohen said, "they're out of their minds. Eventually they'll go down the drain." Suttmiller agreed, and said "I believe Peaches is going to die in this town."

Peter Schlein was even more outspoken. Schlein, owner of Record Revolution, an east side store which attempts to project a "hip" image, advertises a sale price of \$3.99, sells new releases for the first 30 days at \$4.99 and carries a shelf price of \$5.69. He exclaimed, "I think Peaches is in a lot of trouble. Anyone who's in the retail business walks in there and says 'Hey, this is a loser, I don't care how beautiful it is. Did they ever hear of bottom line?'"

'They Speak For Themselves'

"The stores speak for themselves," replied Heiman. "Our stores across the country are all pretty equal, and we have had no problems in Cleveland." Heiman seemed unconcerned about the competition, labeling Cleveland "as average competitively as any market that we're in."

However, Terry Ross, manager of Peaches east side Cleveland store, acknowledged Cleveland offered "a lot more competition" than at least one other midwest city, St. Louis, where Ross previously managed a Peaches store. "In Cleveland," Ross said, "we have to do a little bit more as far as getting our name out there by using a little more advertising and promotion, and working closer with d.j.s and labels. As far as business goes, though, we're doing well."

"In every city we go into," Heiman related, "someone always says we're going to die. If our stores are doing so bad, we wouldn't be able to continually open them, and we just opened a new store in Cleveland in '76."

The new Peaches store, in fact, was taken by Stuart Mintz, president of Record Rendezvous, as yet another indication that "the record market in Cleveland is past the saturation point." Bressi echoed a similar concern, noting that "although the market as a whole is strong, it's being cut into so many pieces that individual stores might actually be down in sales." Suttmiller went even further, pessimistically viewing the Cleveland market as "in a state of non-growth, because, for one thing, there's no new industry coming in."

Break-out Reputation

Discussion of Cleveland's break-out reputation, however, changed that forboding tone to one of enthusiasm, pride and gratitude. Cleveland music consumers it appears have developed an almost predictable tendency to serve as the initial, receptive source of retail and concert support for new, unestablished acts in the rock area of the music industry.

"Cleveland is a break-out market, there's no doubt about it," emphasized Heiman. "Of all the markets we're in, Cleveland's in the top." Larry Silver, advertising director for Record Theatre, explained that. "Customers in Cleveland aren't afraid to go on new product, and that fact makes the city an excellent break-out market."

Bruce Springsteen, David Bowie, The Tubes, Roxy Music, Boz Scaggs and Genesis were among the most frequently cited acts which executives felt had broken in Cleveland. Besides contributing greatly to the national importance of the market, Cleveland's break-out tendency has also been a continuing source of local profit. Alex Mayewsky, manager of Northern Record Sales, a downtown Cleveland one-stop, translated the break-out reputation into dollars and cents, commenting, "Cleveland seems to be very open-minded, which means varied types of artists can be marketed successfully."

The Agora

As with any untested product, someone has to initially take a chance on the new acts

in Cleveland. Besides FM radio stations, particularly WMMS-FM, the Agora nightclub in downtown Cleveland was often mentioned as an excellent example of the city's "phenomena orientaton," as described by Schlein. The 1,000 seat club was called a "great showcase" by Cohen, and the Agora's record of featuring acts such as Springsteen and The Tubes playing to packed audiences before their national sales were significant seems to bear out Cohen's contention.

Not everyone, though, subscribed to the break-out doctrine. Suttmiller felt that "from a sales perspective, the Cleveland break-out market is not all that it's cracked up to be. You may get a ton of unknown records played on the air, and still don't sell records." William Collins, buyer for Record Shack, a major one-stop in suburban Cleveland, added, "In some respects the credit as a break-out city is true, but in other respects, it's like any other midwest city. What the hell else is there to do? So you get 20,000 screaming teenyboppers on soapers to go see Kiss — well, then I guess Cleveland's a hot spot."

The #1 FM Station

Nevertheless, the overwhelming conviction that Cleveland was, indeed, an unusual, break-out market extended even to the advertising patterns of the city's record retailers. Specifically, the retailers have chosen WMMS-FM, a free form station with consistently high, if not top ranked ratings, as their dominant advertising vehicle.

To be sure, other, more tightly AOR formatted FM stations, mainly M-105 and WGCL-FM, have received substantial retail accounts in a market that depends primarily on audio advertising. But WMMS has, in the words of Schlein, "become the bible around here. You can't go without it."

All of the surveyed retailers had, in fact, placed ads on WMMS for their respective operations, and Peaches, Cook United, Record Theatre and Disc have all concentrated a significant portion, if not the bulk of their advertising income on WMMS. Anderson called the station "instrumental," and Turk described WMMS as "really a very dominant force in a market that's very hip radio-wise."

Only Bressi and Cooper showed a preference for newspaper ads. Bressi reported that his print-radio advertising ratio was 60-40, placed primarily in the Thursday Cleveland Plain Dealer and the paper's Friday weekend entertainment supplement entitled "Friday Magazine." Cooper also used The Plain Dealer, along with Cleveland's afternoon paper, The Press, and a freely distributed weekly paper called The Scene, which Cooper felt was valuable to the younger buyer.

Other retailers indicated that they placed ads in the Plain Dealer's "Friday Magazine" either semi-frequently, or at least on occasion. Turk, for his part, reported that he too had been going to the Plain Dealer's Friday supplement, "but I changed it go The Press because the rates are better, the readership is local and there's less competition."

power to act on the matter. The commission will "find out all we can from whatever sources we can . . . stations, the record industry, producers, promoters . . ." But so far, Kelley said, not as many people are willing to talk for attribution as the commission had hoped.

Kelley declined to comment on WOL(AM) Washington, nor would he specify any other stations which may be under investigation on allegations of payola. Sonderling Broadcasting's WOL has denied published reports of an investigation of illegal practices.

which were held last weekend.

At press time, it was further learned that RCA had also raised its subdistributor price from \$3.36 to \$3.38 on \$6.98 list LPs. In addition, it was reported that Casablanca had raised its "Kiss Alive" double album from \$7.98 list to \$9.98 list, and was planning to issue their next Angel album as a \$7.98 list single LP.

As a result, it appears only a matter of time before the rest of the industry at the branch distributed level moves up to \$3.38 as a standard \$6.98 list price. But the main concern of the subdistributors still remains at the \$7.98 list level, where the industry appears headed over the next few months. What CBS will do with its \$7.98 subdistributor prices remains a constant topic of conversation.

Where It Now Stands

At this point, CBS and WEA, the two dominant forces in the industry, are going with completely different prices and programs. WEA's new \$7.98 subdistributor price, \$3.95, which is eleven cents higher than it was before (and twelve cents higher than what CBS currently charges), presents the most interesting spread. There are two views in the industry on what may happen. One is that it is only a matter of time before the other manufacturers see they can charge the same price as WEA and similarly raise their wholesale prices. The other view, held by a very small minority, is that WEA could possibly be hurt by the move and be forced to roll back its prices somewhat. Meanwhile, a few accounts are experimenting with a two tier pricing structure (**Cash Box**, Jan. 29) charging one price for every other manufacturer and a higher price for WEA.

Other areas are similarly interesting. Will CBS agree with WEA that albums and tapes should be sold to the consumer at the same price, in spite of what are still slightly higher manufacturing costs for tape? Or will CBS move to an \$8.98 list for tape? And will CBS drop its tape costs for both subdistributors and retailers as WEA did, thereby equalizing the prices charged accounts on \$6.98 or \$7.98 list product, disk or tape?

And What Will Happen With Quad?

These questions and others are most certainly on the minds of accounts who buy from the major labels. And now, with WEA's price to subdistributors coming close to or equalling the prices charged by some of the country's independent distributors (most indies are getting from \$3.90 to \$3.95 from their major users), some industry execs wonder if the indies, who have always been a nickel to a dime higher than the major labels, may once again resume that pricing position, instead of simply being on a par with the majors' prices.

NY Court Denies Springsteen Bid

NEW YORK — The State Supreme Court Appellate Division has unanimously affirmed Judge Arnold Fein's injunction barring Bruce Springsteen and Jon Landau from recording an album on CBS Records.

The suit, brought by Laurel Canyon Ltd. owner Mike Appel, charged Springsteen with breach of contract. In addition to issuing an injunction against Springsteen, Judge Fein ruled that Landau had no rights under the Laurel Canyon-Springsteen contract.

John Vincent, 74

He is survived by his widow, the former Ruth Kimball, two sons and a daughter. Memorial services were held this week in Los Angeles.

Five Labels Enjoy Unaccustomed Success With Current Hit Singles

NEW YORK — Five record companies which have not made an impact on the **Cash Box** Top 100 Singles chart in some time are now enjoying exceptional success there.

"Torn Between Two Lovers" by Mary MacGregor on Ariola, currently bulleting at #2 on the **Cash Box** chart, has already become the highest charted single in the company's history and "Jeans On" by David Dundas, which peaked at #14 three weeks ago, is the most successful single for Chrysalis since it became an independently distributed label last September.

Bang Records expects "Dazz" by Brick, which peaked at #5 two weeks ago and appears at #7 this week on the **Cash Box** chart, to eclipse the company's best selling mark set by The McCoys with "Hang On Sloopy" in 1965. Similarly, Janus Records, with "Year Of The Cat" by Al Stewart bulleting at #14, and 20th Century Records,

England Is Pres. Of New ABC Distributors

LOS ANGELES — Don England has been named president of the newly-formed ABC Record Distributors, Inc., a division of ABC Records, announced Jerry Rubinstein, ABC Records chairman of the board.

Rubinstein, who formulated the concept and structure of the new division with England, said, "The new division was formed to provide the most efficient control of ABC Records product from manufacture to distribution to sales. The formation of ABC Record Distributors is in keeping with our philosophy of divisional autonomy within the framework of ABC Records.

"Don, like the president of any of our other divisions, will report directly to me," Rubinstein added. "The structure of ABC Records, Inc. will remain unchanged, with operational vice-presidents responsible for all other domestic operations of the company."

England is expected to announce appointments with the new distributing division shortly and elaborate on its structure.

with "I Like Dreaming" by Kenny Nolan bulleting at #9, also anticipate their current successes to erase the best selling marks set by "Brazil" (The Ritchie Family) in 1975 for 20th, and "In The Summertime" (Mungo Jerry) in 1970 for Janus.

Secondary and Tertiary Action

National promotion directors for all of the companies, credited secondary and tertiary radio markets for breaking their singles and being instrumental in their overall success. Julie Zimand, national promotion director for Ariola, cited a phone call from WVFE (Baxley, Georgia) reporting exceptional phone requests for "Torn Between Two Lovers." Zimand subsequently concentrated promotional efforts on other southern secondary stations, which resulted in increased airplay and sales. Then, Zimand said, his final task was to "make other markets aware of the song," which he successfully did.

Billy Bass, national promotion director for Chrysalis, explained that "more than 50% of the secondary markets took 'Jeans On' to number 1, which strongly influenced the major markets, even though Detroit, Cleveland, New York and Boston have still held out." Bass described the song, currently #18 on the **Cash Box** chart as a "basic, simple, pop single that people could identify with," and credited an appearance on the "Midnight Special" TV show with giving the single "new life."

Linda Alter, national promotion director for Bang Records, attributed the popularity of "Dazz" to "the group, a tricky guitar and bass combination" and timing. "We happened to catch a real good time when cross-over records were happening, and we stepped right in when K.C. (& The Sunshine Band) hit a lull." Regional airplay contributed heavily to "Dazz" success, Alter said, mentioning Atlanta and Miami as the two cities where the record "broke and crossed over first."

Barry Goldberg, national promotion director for 20th Century, said he had been "working 'I Like Dreaming' for a long time. There was an initial reluctance for stations to play it because it is a slower record. In

New Trial Date For Heart Case

by Chuck Comstock

LOS ANGELES — U.S. District Court Judge Donald Voorhees has continued until February 11 the second pre-trial hearing in the stormy litigation involving the attempt of Heart to leave Mushroom Records.

Both sides were scheduled to present arguments and depositions in the case on February 4, but the date was continued to allow both sides more time to present evidence and prepare written statements. In the meantime, as reported earlier (*Cash Box*, Jan. 22, 1977), tapes of Heart's unfinished second album have been assigned for neutral safekeeping to the Bekins Storage master vault in Seattle.

Although Judge Voorhees set aside until the next hearing Mushroom's request for a temporary restraining order disallowing Heart from entering negotiations with other record labels, Mushroom chief Shelly Siegel has issued a stern warning to third parties who would become involved.

In a statement issued January 26, Siegel stressed that "any third parties dealing with Heart are doing so at their own peril. We here at Mushroom are very confident, and no one here is losing Heart."

records and tapes, Jimmy's, which continually promotes new releases for \$2.99, "is a threat in certain areas. We're combating his prices with prices in our own stores in areas that he's in." Besides its \$2.99 specials, Gorlin said rock, folk and soul albums have been marked down to \$3.99 across the board in Record World's Centerreach and Huntington units. Also, the chain has been running all-label coupon sales for \$3.99 in the student newspaper of the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

Despite the appearance given by the measures it has taken to combat Jimmy's, Gorlin stressed Record World is not unduly disturbed by the new competition. "It's not really bothering us, because we are a catalog store. I guess he's really hurting maybe top 100 stores like Masters, Korvettes and so on." In addition to such discounters, Gorlin said Jimmy's is also having an effect on "mom and pop" stores.

Reaction

Asked for a reaction to Jimmy's expansion, Dominic Follo, store manager at Sam Goody's Huntington store, responded: "We're going to bury him, that's what we're going to do." Follo said that Goody was "matching" Jimmy price-wise; but, except for his store's \$2.99 specials, its sale prices range from \$3.69 to \$4.19, which is the same as the prices pertaining in most other Goody stores.

An exception is the Goody outlet in Centerreach which lowered its shelf price on \$6.98 list releases to \$3.75 about two weeks ago. In comparison, the recently opened Jimmy's outlet in Centerreach normally sells its albums for \$3.99 while its \$2.99 sales are matched by Goody's \$2.99 store specials.

nation's two largest independently distributed manufacturers for support. Progress distributes both lines in Cleveland. "They both know I'm opening," he declared. "If they're not happy (with M.S.), I'm sure that I will be a good alternative." But he reiterated that he had no guarantees or assurances from either manufacturer and he would not approach them.

Part of the reason for that feeling is Simone's intention to treat and develop Chicago separately from Cleveland. "Chicago will develop its own personality with its own people and create what I hope will be a valid image in the marketplace," he explained, "as we have developed in Ohio and western Pennsylvania. Our growth in Chicago will come from exactly the same reasons that we grew in Cleveland; taking care of the dealers; taking care of the radio stations; and respecting the manufacturers."

'Chicago Is Toughest'

According to Milt Salstone, owner of M.S., that may be easier said than done. "Chicago is the toughest record market in the country and that includes New York," he declared. "Right now, what makes it so tough is that we don't have a strong retail base here." It is estimated that 50% of the consumer market there is serviced by rack jobbers.

Salstone was hesitant to speculate on Progress' prospects for success, but offered, "The thing that'll give me an edge is my know-how. I'm here 31 years."

Yet, the most revealing insight into what can be expected in the coming months, probably came from two isolated comments. When asked if Simone could, in fact, make a go of it in Chicago, Salstone replied, "I think I'm pretty good; I wouldn't attempt it." When asked to comment on M.S.'s alleged stranglehold on the market, Simone offered, "Well, there'll be another one now."

Crackerbox Palace (3:52) (Ganga — BMI) (Harrison)

JANIS IAN (Columbia 10484)
Miracle Row (2:14) (Mine — ASCAP) (Ian)

This title track from Ms. Ian's latest LP packs a lot of music into a short space of time. The arrangement, centering around a simple rhythm section, is Latin-influenced, and the lyric is delivered with intensity. A good record for FM or top 40.

DICKIE GOODMAN (Shock 6) (Dist: Janus)
Kong (2:25) (Unichappell — BMI) (Ramal, Goodman)

Seizing the current movie rage, Goodman is getting a bit suggestive for his under-five audience here, but there are still enough gags for the kids, so you might even say that he's spreading his demographic appeal. Past efforts have tended to exhibit a comet-like behavior where charts are concerned. Number 77 with a bullet on the **Cash Box** Top 100 Singles chart this week.

MELBA MOORE (Buddah 562)
The Way You Make Me Feel (3:34) (Charles Kipps — BMI) (Kipps)

The versatile Ms. Moore delivers a record that could be at home in the disco or on nearly any AM radio station. The production is in a classy jazz motif and her relaxed vocal control is spellbinding as usual.

BARRY WHITE (20th Century 2328)
I'm Qualified To Satisfy You (3:08) (Sa-Vette/January — BMI) (White)

White once again makes his propositions on the dance floor. Avoiding the excess frills that White has indulged in recently, this record displays more primal energy than his recent singles. From the LP "Is This Wotcha Wont?"

MELANIE (Atlantic 3380)
Cyclone (2:19) (Neighborhood — ASCAP) (Melanie)

Undoubtedly the best single choice from "Photograph," this record illustrates Melanie's little known side. The rhythm surges with drums, guitars and horns, and her voice handles the powerful arrangement very well. For top 40 and FM play.

ALESSI (A&M 1896)
Don't Hold Back (3:10) (Alessi — BMI) (Alessi, Alessi)

With vocals stretching into the upper registers, the Alessi twins (ex-Barnaby Bye members) offer an open-feeling pop song from their duo debut LP. The rhythms bounce higher through each chorus, with fine supporting parts from all instruments.

THE ROWANS (Asylum 45376)
Ooh My Love (3:18) (Lemuria — BMI) (Rowan)

Dense multi-tracked vocals are the melodic vehicle of this simple pop tune. Though the melody line almost gets lost in the wash of sound, the chords are the stuff of which singles should be made. From the "Sibling Rivalry" LP.

WAR Featuring **ERIC BURDON** (ABC 12244)
Magic Mountain (3:55) (Far Out — ASCAP) (Allen, Brown, Dickerson, Scott, Jordan, Miller, Oskar, Goldstein)

Looking back, the coalition of blues rock singer Burdon and War's jazzy rock sounds was a marriage made for future trends. This funky blues track from the recently issued "Love Is All Around" album is highlighted by Burdon's controlled scream and Lee Oskar's distinctive harmonica. For varied airplay.

PURE PRAIRIE LEAGUE (RCA 10880)
Fade Away (4:09) (Rotgut/Fireball — ASCAP) (Reilly, Coshorn)

From the "Dance" album, this is a ballad aimed at the pop stations. Instrumentation runs the gamut from a down-home pedal steel to a massive horn and string section, reflecting a well-channeled country influence. A great group for vocal harmonies.



BURTON CUMMINGS (Portrait 70002) (Dist: CBS)
I'm Scared (3:37) (Shillelagh — EMI) (Cummings)

Closing in on a top-five solo debut with "Stand Tall," Cummings presents a melodic pop song with soaring orchestral backdrop and an unusual theme. Cummings' forte is the clear and forthright delivery of the lyrics, making his music playable on top 40 and eminently chartable as well.

ELECTRIC LIGHT ORCHESTRA (UA XW939)
Do Ya (3:45) (United Artists/Jet/Intersong — ASCAP) (Lynne)

Riding the tail of a top-ten hit with "Livin' Thing," ELO have played the trump card from "A New World Record." This Jeff Lynne composition was a smash for the Move, and this arrangement treats the classic with all the respect it demands. Major station adds and pop chart numbers due in short order.

JOHNNIE TAYLOR (Columbia 10478)
Love Is Better In The A.M. (3:00) (Groovesville — BMI/Conquistador — ASCAP) (Scales, Griffin, Davis)

America's musical marriage counselor (the one with the platinum prescription) is back with bedtime stories told to a funky accompaniment. Few others sing such lyrics with equal conviction. R&B with a strong crossover possibility.

PARLIAMENT (Casablanca 875)
Dr. Funkenstein (3:48) (Rick's/Malbiz — BMI) (Clinton, Collins, Worrell)

The real mad doctor here is none other than legalized lunatic George Clinton, whose slick rap is a never-ending stream as the music moseys along. From the certified platinum "The Clones Of Dr. Funkenstein" LP. "I hope you all got your sunglasses on out there."

AMAZING RHYTHM ACES (ABC 12242)
Dancing The Night Away (3:59) (Fourth Floor/Rick Hall — ASCAP) (Smith, Brown Jr.)

Feelings of "Dock of The Bay" are summoned up by this record's opening lines, as the solo vocal represents loneliness in slow tempo, while memories of happy times dance out in double time. A solid record from the group whose Memphis soul sounds have shown admirable crossover potential in the past.

MINNIE RIPHERTON (Epic 50337)
Stick Together (Part One) (3:24) (Dickiebird/Jobete/Black Bull — ASCAP) (Riperton, Rudolph, Wonder)

A disco-programmable record from this talented young vocalist, who has begun to use her tremendous high range more artistically than acrobatically. Stevie Wonder had a hand in writing this one from the "Stay In Love" album.

AL GREEN (Hi 2322) (Dist: London)
I Tried To Tell Myself (3:24) (Jec/Al Green — BMI) (Mitchell, Green)

Majestic horns herald this record, taken from the "Have A Good Time" album. Green is at his best when not too heavily influenced by fads, and this record sticks close to the Memphis mainstream. Initial action through the R&B airplay route.

NARARETH (A&M 1895)
I Want To (Do Everything For You) (3:10) (Tree — BMI) (Tex)

Nazareth hammers out this Joe Tex song in a blues style, shouting the lyrics out in unison. The bass grumbles as the guitars whine in this intriguing pop offering from "Play 'N' The Game."

STEVE HILLAGE (Atlantic 3384)
Hurdy Gurdy Man (3:04) (Peer International — BMI) (Leitch)

An edited version of the extended cut from Hillage's "L" album, here is Donovan's song of lasting importance. Syncopated rhythms and Hillage's winding streams of guitar lend distinction to this version. Already receiving heavy FM progressive play.

MILLIE JACKSON (Spring 170) (Dist: Polydor)
I Can't Say Goodbye (3:30) (Gaucho/Bill Lee — BMI) (Nichols, Williams)

An easy-going number from Ms. Jackson, relaxed enough to allow the sensuous huskiness of her voice to ring through. A really bluesy feeling pervades this record aimed at the R&B airplay route.

TOM CHAPIN (Fantasy 788)
Just Another Story (3:22) (The Last — ASCAP) (Chapin)

Chapin exhibits solid songwriting talents in this single from his debut LP, as well as displaying a distinctive vocal character. The subtle pop production allows his performance to shine through with a subdued glow. Note that Chapin's been performing steadily before college audiences over the past year.

DEARDORFF & JOSEPH (Arista 0230)
Never Have To Say Goodbye Again (3:20) (Chicken Key/Dawnbreaker — BMI) (Commanor)

This duo's mellow pop sounds are most easily placed in the same category as those of Seals and Crofts, though the similarity is one of feeling only. A grandly produced record with a catchy chorus line from their debut LP.

BILLY KIRKLAND (Lifesong 45019)
I Think I'm Growing Up (3:20) (Blendingwell — ASCAP) (Kirkland)

A mainstream pop record from Kirkland, featuring a stong upbeat that sometimes recalls Phil Spector. An expansively harmonized chorus and a few twinkling guitar riffs to round it all out. Aimed at the heart of top 40.

JAMES DARREN (Private Stock 136)
You Take My Heart Away (Theme from "Rocky") (3:34) (United Artists — ASCAP/Unart — BMI) (Conti, Connors, Robbins)

Here's the guy who stole countless hearts during the heyday of the pompadour. Now, through the time machine, he is putting in a new bid with this much-covered theme. He sings opposite a female lead in this big arrangement. For pop or MOR. Somebody has to hit with this one!

DAVE & SUGAR (RCA 10876)
Don't Throw It All Away (3:09) (Famous — ASCAP) (Benson, Mindell)

To all appearances, this group is Tony Orlando and Dawn's country counterpart, but this ballad has programming possibilities in the pop and easy listening areas. Cathedral-like reverberation lends dramatic effect to the vocal harmonies here.

RALPH MacDONALD (Marlin 3308) (Dist: TK)
Where Is The Love (3:17) (Antisia — ASCAP) (MacDonald, Salter)

From his "Sound Of A Drum" album, here is the MacDonald composition that was a hit for others, notably Roberta Flack and Donny Hathaway. This version features an unusual harmonica solo by Toots Thielmans, and reflects the composer's affinity for a strong beat and colorful percussion.

MR. BIG (Arista 0229)
Romeo (2:43) (Jet Lag — BMI) (Carter, Carter)

From their debut LP, this single demonstrates the group's strongest points: beautifully blended vocal harmonies and very accessible pop melodies. A key change makes the impression stronger to the finish.

FREDA PAYNE (Capitol 4383)
I Get High (On Your Memory) (3:07) (Jobete — ASCAP) (Sawyer, McCloud)

The echoed refrain "I Get High" is the main thrust of this record, a slick production featuring big band and Ms. Payne's reaching high notes. Could be programmed R&B, pop or even easy-listening.

RCA Corp. 4th Qtr. Income Up 68%

NEW YORK — RCA Corp.'s net income in the fourth quarter of fiscal 1976 hit an eight-year quarterly high of \$56 million. This represents a 68% increase over the comparable period in 1975. Sales were a record \$1.5 billion, up seven percent over \$1.4 billion in the fourth quarter of 1975. For all of 1976, RCA reported net income of \$177.4 million, up 61% over the 1975 total of \$110 million. Sales for the past year rose

to \$5.4 billion, up 11% from \$4.8 billion in 1975. The results reflected record profits for RCA Records and other RCA divisions, including the National Broadcasting Co., Banquet Foods, Random House publishing, RCA Service Co. and Hertz auto rentals. Edgar Griffiths, RCA president, told the

Worker Theft Worries Stores; Not Checked By Inventory

NEW YORK — A nationwide survey by a large business security firm has concluded that retailers are not able to control employee pilferage adequately, and music retailers queried by **Cash Box** supported that conclusion.

The merchandise coordinator of a major national record chain told **Cash Box** that at least 50% or more of his chain's inventory shortages can be attributed to employee thefts and that large-scale polygraphing of store employees has confirmed the depth of the problem.

"Frankly," the retail executive said, "this has us frightened to death. I could give you lots of ways we're getting burned, but I can't tell you how we can stop it."

According to several retailers across the country, inventories do not accurately reflect the amount of employee theft. However, most of the retailers considered customer theft to be an even greater problem. In general, larger stores reported more success in controlling all kinds of pilferage, due to deployment of full-time security staffs, "employee check-out points" and the institution of computerized registration.

Alan Basmajian, record manager and assistant record buyer at the Coop in Boston, said shortages of inventory average about one or two percent at all three Coop stores.

While he was unable to break down that shortage by cause, he believed very little of it was employee thievery. "Employees here don't have a reason to steal," he explained.

"They get basically anything they want, anyway."

Basmajian noted that the Coop checks all employee packages, coming and going. Other retailers pointed to the Coop as having one of the nation's better in-store security systems.

One Percent Or Less

Jim Grimes, vice president of merchandising for National Record Mart, said his chain's average shortage at inventory time was one percent or less, largely because of fully-computerized registration. Grimes said headquarters, in billing all its stores (like a distributor), takes a unit count, which is repeated in each individual store. This cuts down on bookkeeping errors, Grimes noted.

In addition, he said headquarters makes a monthly check. "We know what's supposed to be in the stores," Grimes said. Inventories at all stores are done by "fixture," (box, shelf or facade) and a major shortage in any part of the store would easily be picked up, Grimes continued.

Nevertheless, he agreed it was impossible to determine how much of any shortage is internal and how much is outside shoplifting.

Tony Morel, manager of Mushroom in New Orleans for the past two months, said in his short time there he has been aiming for almost a "perpetual inventory."

"Retailers never think they have a theft problem," said Morel, adding that it is a concern in any retail store. Morel said most of his students were Tulane University students, but conceded that a college education

Blue Jac Sues Springboard Intl: Illegal Warwick Records Alleged

NEW YORK — Burt Bacharach and Hal David's Blue Jac Productions has filed suit against Springboard International Records, Inc., charging that the company has manufactured and distributed Dionne Warwick records without legal consent. The complaint also charges that the names and likenesses of Blue Jac, Warwick, Bacharach and David were subject to unlawful commercial exploitation. A total of \$19 million in damages are sought.

Springboard International Records was licensed to manufacture and distribute Dionne Warwick product by Scepter Records, which itself was licensed to distribute Warwick records by Blue Jac, owner of all Warwick masters. By an arbitrated agreement reached near the end of last year, Scepter relinquished all rights to Warwick product after it had been determined that the record company had not lived up to the terms of the original licensing agreements (**Cash Box**, December 15). Scepter has also since filed for bankruptcy.

In a prepared statement, Springboard vice president of business affairs George Port previously stated that the arbitration was "not binding upon us and does not affect our rights (**Cash Box**, January 15). Springboard recently released "Only Love Can Break A Heart," a Dionne Warwick album on the Musicor label, and still retains a catalog of some ten Warwick albums on various labels.

Eastman Responds

Contacted in New York, Lee Eastman of Eastman & Eastman, the legal firm representing Blue Jac, commented "Our contention is that they (Springboard) never had the right" to distribute Warwick records. He further stated that the arbitration had nullified all of Scepter's rights as of November 1, 1972, adding that the Scepter-Blue Jac agreement contained a bankruptcy clause which invalidated the agreement upon Scepter's bankruptcy.

Springboard executives were unavailable for further comment on the issue.

- Each label or name under which record and tapes have been manufactured and distributed;
 - The dollar and unit volume of records and tapes shipped from each company facility for each of the calendar years 1971 through 1976;
 - The location from which the raw materials utilized in the manufacture of records and tapes were obtained for each of the calendar years 1971 through 1976;
 - The names and addresses of competitors;
 - The annual dollar amount of net sales of records and tapes in each classification (e.g., pop, rock, jazz, country and western, soul, etc.) for each year 1971 through 1976;
 - The structure of the firm's marketing and distribution organization for the period covered by the subpoena;
 - The methods employed to distribute records and tapes at the wholesale and retail levels within the United States.
- The subpoena also requests all documents which discuss or refer to:
- Market share, projected market share, market position, and market strength of the firm or any other manufacturer or seller of records and tapes within the United States;
 - Any policy or program involving prices at or above a minimum retail level which are enforced, suggested, maintained or determined by the firm, specifically including communications between the firm and retailers concerning any such policy or program;
 - Price reductions or price cutting by any competitor or customer;
 - Any pricing problems for the firm in the sale of records and tapes;

- Any complaints of a customer concerning prices or the supply of record and tapes provided such customer by the firm;
 - Any complaints by a customer concerning prices charged by any other customer of the firm;
 - Any multiple pricing structure based upon the size of a retail outlet, volume of records sold, assumption of warehousing distribution by a retail outlet, or any other reason;
 - Any actual or proposed discontinuance of sale of records and tapes by any company to any customer, including, but not limited to, complaints of threatened lawsuits based on any violation of the antitrust laws, including the Robinson-Patman Act, by any manufacturer or seller;
 - Any minimum advertising policy;
 - Any agreement, expressed or implied, by the firm not to provide advertising allowances of money, merchandise, or other compensation, to the customer of any competitor in the sale of records and tapes;

surance increases and utilities actually had more to do with our increase than material and labor. If it were just labor and material, I could get by. We were able to offset some costs to us by internal improvements and increased volume, at least as far as the vinyl increase is concerned." Williams added that the increase from Monarch still did not provide an adequate price for the service his customers get. "They're still squeezing us."

Numerous Reasons

"The reasons we hiked prices were numerous," stated Hugh Landy, president of PRC, who added that the price increase did not cover the increases PRC has absorbed from suppliers. "Raw materials went up 4.5%, electricity went up 57.4%, natural gas was increased 57%, oil 25.7%, labor increased 17.5%, general factory supplies, such as corrugated materials, not including vinyl 15.3%, and raw materials for sleeves and such went up, and there was a penny a pound vinyl increase last June that we just absorbed. The total raw material increase was 4.5%." Landy added that these figures were for the last 27 months, and that the last time PRC had a price hike was in October 1974.

Price Increase

The price increase from Columbia Record Productions went unexplained, despite repeated attempts to contact CRP executives. A letter to accounts from CRP mentioned a large number of cost increases, and cited the expense of electricity, oil and natural gas, as well as labor and paper costs as reasons behind the CRP hike.

An official at Specialty Records, who asked not to be identified, confirmed that Specialty had increased the price of albums, but added that "the record industry is very funny, I'm sure you know that. It's a really, really touchy situation," and declined further comment.

Bill Joseph of Presswell, stated that the president of his company was "unavailable," but that he was "next in line." Joseph reported "there has been a price hike," and that the 2¢ per LP raise reported by accounts was "in the area." Accounts surveyed by **Cash Box** stated the Presswell increase was between 2¢ and 2.3¢ per LP.

Others That Didn't

Companies that did not increase their prices will probably hike the cost of LP pressing in the next few months, according to two manufacturers who did not increase pressing rates.

"We haven't had any price increase," stated Dan Boyd, operations director for GRT, "but basically, we see a price increase coming in the near future, for much the

same reasons that everybody else has gone up. We're holding right now, but it's getting very difficult. You can look for a price increase soon, maybe within the next month."

"We have not increased our price," stated Jerry Massler, Bestway Products vice president, "but we are considering it. The reasons are material and oil, primarily, along with labor, which seems to go up every year." Massler added that his company was a "little higher" than other companies who do custom pressings, simply because some of his records are 135 gram versions, as opposed to most pressings, which are in the 110 gram range. "I'm one of the mavericks," added Massler, "and when I go out to my customers my price is sometimes 2¢ higher than competition, simply because I'm putting in 2¢ more of material into the record itself. Most people are totally unaware of this, but the increased weight cuts down on warpage, and hence, returns." Massler also offers a 100 gram LP.

Jackets Up

Jacket manufacturers, without exception, mentioned the increased price of raw board as a factor in raising their prices.

"The rise in cost of bleached sulfate board was universal," explained Richard Block, AGI marketing vice president. "Every company felt the increase, without exception." Other jacket manufacturers cited additional areas of concern.

"There were increased costs in everything," complained Ellis Kern, executive vice president of Ivy Hill. "Board cost is only one factor. You have labor increases, fuel increases. The power alone that we consume is enormous."

Floyd Glinert, vice president in charge of marketing for Sherwood Packaging Corporation, stated that cover prices for LPs were increased an average of 5½%. "We attempt to play catchup ball in this regard," explained Glinert, "and that 5½% figure is at the top, depending on volume price breaks." Sherwood, which is the largest cover producing company is experiencing "price increases ourselves. The primary ingredient is board, but we have to pay whatever they charge," noted Glinert, who added that additional costs in freight, glue, ink and printing plates all contributed to the increase.

And the RIAA, following the lead of major manufacturers, has increased the price on gold and platinum records by \$5 per unit.

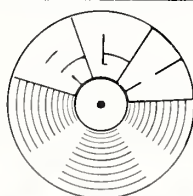

Wall Street Journal he expects RCA's 1977 sales to rise ten percent to 12% over 1976. He added that RCA's much-discussed consumer video-disc player would not be introduced this year, but a decision on whether to market it by the end of 1978 could be ready sometime this year.

Griffiths explained the key factors in that decision are the company's ability to lower the price, increase the recording time and broaden available programming. The company has recently dropped plans for a common stock issue because it has announced that it doesn't need major outside financing, even for the video-disc project.

want to get the best. Everyone else is doing just straight cuts or part one/part two things with the same artists. We feel we're giving a little something extra."

London agreed with most of the other manufacturers about what effect the disco singles would have on seven-inch or LP sales.

"You are only going to have a certain amount of sales unless it goes to a national configuration where they either make the 45 obsolete as they did the 78, or it will be just another configuration of sales like

albums, tapes and singles."

Only Advantage

He said the only advantage in bringing out disco singles is that "it's a new configuration of sales; a different market that you are going after.

"Right now, single sales are not doing so hot anyway and it is just another mode of trying to generate some business. It doesn't affect album sales because album buyers won't buy just a 12-inch. They are going to buy the album, too, so it will probably increase album sales."

asserted. "But I'm not going to do anything drastic (price-wise) right now."

Matching Prices

Lloyd Welch, manager of one of Harmony House's Detroit stores, said he didn't expect the new Peaches "super store" to be much competition for his chain, since none of the Harmony House outlets will be within 15 miles of Peaches.

Like LeAnnais, Welch said he didn't expect to indulge in any drastic price-cutting, despite Korvettes' current sale. The lowest price Harmony House plans to advertise next month will be \$3.97 on selected releases. However, Welch explained, Korvettes' lowballing tactic is having an effect on Harmony House because the chain has an advertised policy of matching prices in any other store's ad (with a coupon). "But the people who came in with Korvettes' ads also bought other stuff. It didn't hurt us that much."

Heavy Advertising Seen

Welch believed that expectation of Peaches' store opening will spur a general wave of radio and print ads over the next few weeks. "It should be real fun. I know a lot of retailers are really going to be breaking out with a lot of ads in February."

So far, however, Korvettes is still the major print advertiser among Detroit's record retailers. Additionally, a spot check of AM and FM radio stations did not show that there has yet been a marked increase in time buys for record ads.

According to a source close to Peaches, the new store has already bought some radio time in Detroit with co-op money. This was evidently done, not only to promote the Peaches' name in advance of the store opening, but to anticipate an increase in time buying by its competition.

David Bowie Ads

Among other retail developments this week, ads for the just-released David Bowie album on RCA were observed in four surveyed markets and advertising supplements promoting assorted cutouts at Radio Shack stores appeared in nearly all of the surveyed markets.

Ads for the Bowie LP, which lists for \$7.98, appeared in these markets; in Boston at Strawberries for \$4.89, Music City for \$4.99 and the Coop for \$4.49; at Sam Goody in Philadelphia for \$4.89 and Sam Goody in New York for \$4.49; and at Recordmasters in Baltimore for \$4.99.

In some ads, the Bowie album was promoted with other \$6.98 list releases by the same artist. In other cases, it was advertised with one or more 2-LP sets. At Strawberries, it was promoted with the latest Queen album (also \$7.98 list).

The early appearance of several Bowie LP ads offers a marked contrast to the initial promotion of the Queen LP (**Cash Box**, January 22). Only one Queen ad was observed during the first two weeks after the album's release because, according to George Steele III, vice president of marketing for Elektra/Asylum, the campaign's first phase was geared to radio and its predominately teenage listeners. Ads for Queen LPs, however, were observed in six markets last week (**Cash Box**, January 29).

Spokesmen at RCA in New York

declined to comment on the company's marketing strategy for the Bowie LP, saying that preliminary plans had not yet been confirmed. One RCA representative did say, however, that the strategy would not be based on price. "We'll promote the Bowie album the same way we'd promote it if it was \$6.98."

Radio Shack Returns

For the third time in the past four months, a Radio Shack ad supplement for records and audio equipment appeared in nearly every market monitored. As in the past two supplements, assorted cutout albums, specially packaged for Radio Shack under the chain's own "Realistic" logo, were advertised for \$2.99; in addition, the latest supplement promoted cutout eight-track and cassette tapes for \$3.39.

Charles Levine, senior buyer for Tandy Corporation, which owns more than 3,000 of Radio Shack's 5,000 stores, stated that the chain has been promoting records on a regular basis since last fall, when the decision was made to package the cutouts under the "Realistic" banner. By accepting this deal from a cutout wholesaler, Levine noted, "we committed ourselves to sell them (records)." Levine declined to name the source of Radio Shack's records.

Managers of Radio Shack stores around the country indicated that, while records are more than promotional items to sell audio equipment, they form a fairly small percentage of overall sales. Estimates of this percentage ranged from one to three percent.

In terms of Tandy's gross from its Radio Shack operation, however, this extra margin from record sales runs into millions of dollars annually. If the record sales of one Radio Shack unit in Detroit — \$1,200 worth during the month of December alone — can be taken as typical, album sales at Tandy's Radio Shack outlets may even total as much as \$3 million per month.

Baltimore Clearance Sale

In an unusual ad for an all-label sale, Record and Tape Collector in Baltimore offered 10% off shelf price with one album purchase, 20% off with two LPs and 30% off with three or more albums. Store manager Maury Bass said Record and Tape Collector holds two such sales a year, at inventory clearance times.

"It works very well," Bass said of the sale. "Most people buy at least three records. With three, at current releases, it comes to \$3.84 a record. It's one thing to pick up a top 100 album for \$3.84, but it's another thing to come in and buy the first album John Coltrane ever made for under \$4." The store's regular sale price is \$3.94 and its shelf price is \$5.49, Bass said.

More Low S.F. Prices

Odyssey Records and Tapes in San Francisco became the third retailer in that city to go below \$3.80 on current releases in the past three weeks. Odyssey advertised 11 CBS releases for \$3.66, following all-label sales at Record Factory for \$3.77 and Tower Records for \$3.66 (**Cash Box**, January 29).

David Town, manager of one Odyssey store, said his unit runs the same sale every year at inventory time, and that it was not related to competition.

NEW ADDITIONS — Benjamin Simon Taylor, nine pounds, was born to James and Carly on Monday, January 24, their second child. . . Barry Manilow's first television special will air over WABC-TV, March 2, with Penny Marshall (Laverne) as guest. . . RCA recording artist Ralph Graham appeared on the WNEW-TV children's show "Wonderama" the week of January 27, with February and March airings set. . . Ex-heavyweight champ Joe Frazier provided some musical entertainment for the inmates of Riker's Island on January 26. . . Jeanne Napoli's first album, "Jeanne," will be released by Vigor Records on April 2. The vocalist/performer opens at the Rainbow Grill April 4. . . Worth, Texas, and ending the first part of the jaunt with March 9, 12 and 13 dates at the L.A. Forum. . . After a few preliminary appearances, **Santana** began their national tour in Los Angeles January 29, with tentative plans to finish in D.C. March 19. . . Also on tour are **Electric Light Orchestra**, who began in Phoenix, Arizona on January 17. . . With the official announcement made that the **Grateful Dead** and various parts thereof had signed with Arista Records, **Clive Davis** revealed that he had begun "talking to" the group six years ago! . . . CHANGES IN LATITUDES, CHANGES IN ATTITUDES — Jimmy Buffett — ABC AB 990 — Producer: Norman Putnam — List: 6.98

When the first lady is pictured in *People* sporting a "Coral Reefer" t-shirt, it should be obvious that Jimmy Buffett's cult-like following is growing, as well it should. There is more of a Latin/reggae influence on this album, rather than the country sound we have heard on previous albums, but Buffett hasn't forgotten his familiar themes. With a wry humor he touches on sailing, losing at love, American expatriates and, of course, drinking. For AOR and top 40 lists.

SWEET EVIL — Rick Derringer — Blue Sky PZ 34470 — Producer: Jack Douglas — List: 6.98

This latest work by Rick Derringer is a solid presentation of good ol' rock and roll by one who knows how. Instrumentation is good but vocals have improved to the extent that Derringer achieves almost a Joe Walsh sound. AOR programmers will no doubt find room but at least three cuts have definite top 40 potential.

NO STRINGS — Ace — Anchor ANCL 2020 — Producer: Trevor Lawrence — List: 6.98

Ace hasn't been heard from since their chart-busting "How Long" but they are back with a third album that seems to be worth the wait. Having moved to our shores and adding a new guitarist (Jon "Woody" Woodhead), Ace has put together a balanced set of rock and roll music that should do well on AOR playlists and might find top 40 happiness with a couple of cuts. With strong vocals by Paul Carrack and pleasant three part harmonies Ace may once again find itself with a trump card.

PHOTOGRAPHIC SMILE — Mr. Big — Arista 4083 — Producer: Val Garay — List: 6.98

For their debut album in the United States, this English quintet has put together a very pleasing collection of songs displaying their ability to play rock and roll hard or soft. With a vocal sound somewhere between Yes and The Hollies, Mr. Big features well-written lyrics and unique musical arrangements. Already popular in England, they are assisted on this album by the talents of Jim Keltner and Andrew Gold. Some top 40 potential but mostly an AOR programmer's delight.

TOM JONES' GREATEST HITS — Tom Jones — London LC 50002 — Producer: Gordon Mills — List: 5.98

As part of their Collector Series, London has re-packaged all the heavies of this pop favorite with the palpating pelvis. All of Tom's chart-busters are here, featuring the throaty vocals and subdued musical arrangements that spotlight his powerful voice. This package of ten favorites should do well, especially with its lower price. For top 40 and MOR playlists.

LEAVE HOME — Ramones — Sire SA 7528 — Producer: Tony Bongiovi & T. Erdelyi — List: 6.98

With punk rock in its heyday, the time has come for another Ramones album. As always, the Ramones don't require a lengthy attention span since none of their selections are over 2 1/4 minutes and all feature the staccato phrasing and uncomplicated lyrics common to the genre. A few things could make top 40 playlists as the simple guitar chords don't require the stereo capabilities of AOR.

HE'S ALL I GOT — Love Unlimited — Unlited Gold U-101 — Producer: Barry White — List: 6.98

With pleasant harmonies and a soft soul sound, these Barry White proteges have put together an album that should find a home on a variety of playlists including R&B, MOR, top 40 and disco. There are songs to dance to, sing along with, or just listen to when the day is long. Their melodic arrangements backed up by a hint of symphony should give this album a diverse and plentiful following.

BLONDIE — Blondie — Private Stock PS 2023 — Producer: Richard Gottehrer — List: 6.98

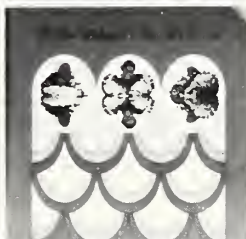
A fun group that doesn't take itself too seriously, Blondie should get some FM action on "X Offender," "Attack Of The Giant Ants," and "Man Overboard." Other, equally unlikely titles include "Kung Fu Girls" and "Rifle Range." Good vocals in a style bred from fifties style rock and roll and punk rock.

PAST TIMES BEHIND — Daryl Hall & John Oates — Chelsea CHL 547 — Producer: John Madara — List: 6.98

With two current albums on the charts, this popular duo have give us some vintage material from the 1971/72 era. An interesting collection that shows more clearly the reasons for their current success, the albums's mood is mellow with no evidence of the group's ability to go loud. But AOR, MOR and some top 40 stations will find cuts on this LP to their liking.

Nothing for top 40 programmers, but a pleasant change of pace for AOR folks.



I'M EVERYONE I'VE EVER LOVED — Martin Mull — ABC AB 997 — Producer: Michael Cuscuna — List: 6.98

Martin's fifth album (first for ABC) will no doubt be helped by the notoriety he achieved with his portrayal of wife-beating Garth Gimble on *Mary Hartman*. But this superb master of musical parody appears to be ready for the attention he deserves to accrue. With a guest roster of artists too numerous to mention, Martin handles the serious themes of sexual perversity, narcissism, alcoholism, and tastefully (?) satirizes both the 'Philadelphia sound' and disco music. For enlightened AOR programmers.



KING SIZE — B.B. King — ABC AB 977 — Producer: Esmond Edwards — List: 6.98

B.B. King is one of the best at mixing rock and blues and his new album is no exception. There seems to be a greater use of horns and strings than in the past but it adds up to a balanced musical fusion of sounds that is effective and palatable. Best success should be with R&B and AOR programmers.



IF THE LIGHTS DON'T GET YOU THE HELOTS WILL — The Stanky Brown Group — Sire SA 7529 — Producer: Hank Medress/Dave Appell — List: 6.98

With musical arrangements that accent the point of their lyric passages, this interesting group of five musicians feature strong vocal harmonies and the ability to produce standard rock and roll with flair. They can cook or simmer as the mood requires but it is the philosophy expressed in their words that is particularly notable, as is their white soul remake of the old Supremes hit, "Stop In The Name Of Love." Best chance for air-play with AOR programmers.



THE ALL NEW MICKEY MOUSE CLUB — The Mouseketeers — Disneyland 2501 — Producer: Walt Disney Productions — List: 3.98

Featuring daily theme tunes from the recently revived Mickey Mouse Club, this album contains fourteen tunes by an engaging chorus of modern-day mouseketeers, supported by tastefully upbeat and contemporary sounding musical arrangements. Skeptical? Well, these sprightly adolescents do a more than adequate version of "Walking The Dog," a lively "Joy To The World," and a lighthearted "Mousekadance Disco." Move over, Disco Duck!



BIG WHA-KOO — Big Wha-Koo — ABC AB 971 — Producer: Roy Halee — List: 6.98

In one of the best debut albums around, this talented group of accomplished musicians hope to establish a reputation that will help people remember their unusually enigmatic moniker. With musical roots too numerous to mention, this group is blessed with seven talented players who produce a sound that is both melodic and powerful. Comfortable with both romantic ballads and solid rock and roll this group is sure to be heard from on many AOR playlists.



BEAVERTEETH — Beaverteeth — RCA APL 1-2076 — Producer: Rodney Justo & Beaverteeth — List: 6.98

This southern-based quintet deny their roots on this tasteful album of solid rock and roll with just the barest trace of the familiar "rebel rock" sound. Featuring a vocalist that reminds one of a softer Lee Michaels, this band can also produce a Nilsson-like quality, and in all cases provides a fresh approach to the more familiar themes of conventional rock and roll. For AOR programmers mostly but top 40 potential is there.



STORMIN' — Brainstorm — Tabu BQL 1-2046 — Producer: Jerry Peters — List: 6.98

Go ahead and dance. Nobody could stop you from catching on to these infectious tunes and moving your feet. "Lovin' Is Really My Game," "Prelude," and "Easy Thangs" all show excellent instrumental arranging and execution, and are easy adds for R&B playlists.



MYSTIQUE — Mystique — Curtom CU 5012 — Producer: Curtis Mayfield — List: 6.98

Ralph Johnson, former lead singer of the Impressions, is the featured vocalist on this tasteful collection of R&B and disco material. With the able assistance of Jerry Butler, Curtis Mayfield and others the emphasis is on soulful renderings of tunes that you can bump or sway to. Strings and horns are especially tight on several cuts, but a balanced effort throughout. For R&B with top 40 crossover in some markets.

One of our favorite musicians, pianist **Dolo Coker**, has been signed to Xanadu. This is a nice break for a musician who has been the number one pianist in Los Angeles for some time. His first album features **Blue Mitchell**, **Harold Land** and **Art Pepper** and is scheduled for April release.

New from Blue Note: **Donald Byrd** "Caricatures" including a host of heavies led by **David T. Walker**, **Patrice Rushen** and **Alphonse Mouzon** and "The View From The Inside" by **Bobby Hutcherson** and his current band.

In that time the company has come up with strong product by **Norman Connors**, **Alphonso Johnson**, **John Lee-Gerry Brown**, **Lee Ritenour** and **Eddie Henderson**.

DIZZY'S PARTY — **Dizzy Gillespie** — **Pablo 2310 784** — **Producer: Norman Granz** — **List: 7.98**

That elder statesman of bebop, **J.B. Gillespie** has long fostered an ambition to become a major record star. With this album, and especially with the title track, he may make it. The only problem is, specifically, his own contribution. His young band — with a couple of additions — gets to the funk in fine fashion, but alas, ol' Diz simply can't get to the new music the way a **Hubbard**, **Byrd** or **Mangione** can. If he's serious he'd be better off emulating one of his compadres, **Miles Davis**, and leave the bulk of the playing to the youngsters.



SNAKE RAG — **Louis Armstrong** — **Chlaroscuro 2002** — **List: 6.98**

This album consists of previously unissued alternate takes from some **Armstrong All-Star** session from late 1959. Pons is in excellent form vocally and instrumentally and the support he gets from **Trummy Young** and **Billy Kyle** is of high caliber. The remainder of the band is not the best but **Louis** shines through everything. The music is associated with **King Oliver**, **Louis' mentor**, and as such makes for a departure from the customary **All-Star** repertoire of the time. A fine job all around.



AURORA — **Tom Harrell** — **Adarno 9502** — **Producer: Arne Lawrence** — **List: 6.98**

Harrell is a young trumpet player who has been featured with **Horace Silver** for the past few years. This is his first album on this new label. Fellow Silverite **Bob Berg** on tenor sax completes the front line and there is a five man rhythm section with **Lennie White** on drums. The music is spirited mainstream-modern with both horns showing good chops and ideas. Some refreshing new talent here.



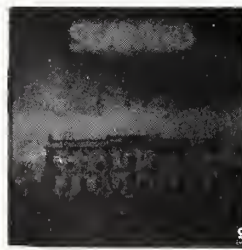
CATALONIAN FIRE — **Tete Montollu** — **Inner City 2017** — **Producer: Nils Winther** — **List: 6.98**

Montollu is the best pianist in Europe and one of the three or four best in the world. The fact that he is little known apart from a hard core of fans should change with the U.S. release of **Copenhagen** albums such as this. A blind Spaniard, he made one brief tour here about ten years ago. This trio date features **Tootie Heath** and **Niels-Henning Orsted Pederson** who are both splendid accompanists. The program is varied but on this particular disc, the ballads (including a gorgeous "Old Folks") stand out. Piano fans will flip for Tete.



BASIE JAM #2 — **Count Basie** — **Pablo 2310 786** — **Producer: Norman Granz** — **List: 7.98**

This is a pleasant small band outing by some middle era pros including **Lockjaw Davis**, **Benny Carter**, **Clark Terry** and **Al Grav**. The jams are a bit on the laid-back side but the mellow assurance of the players comes through at all times. Especially rewarding is "Doggin' Around," a tune which doubtless served similar purposes more than forty years ago. **Basie** is, of course, **Basie**, which means one of the most indispensable sounds in jazz.



SEAWIND — **CTI 5002** — **Producer: Harvey Mason** — **List: 6.98**

Seawind is a Hawaii-based band with all the crossover techniques well under control. The basic band is two horns and a rhythm section, but there is a variety of percussion added here and all the band members double, so there is remarkable textural variety throughout the album. The band plays good solid contemporary funk and the soloists are strong (especially **Kim Hutchcroft** on reeds). This could be a big one!

Major Broadcast Properties Sold Pending FCC Approval

LOS ANGELES — Three major broadcast properties, including KOIN in Portland, Oregon, WQMS-FM in Hamilton, Ohio and KTRY AM & FM in Bastrop, Louisiana were being readied for sale this week, pending FCC approval.

Oklahoma city based Gaylord Broadcasting has made application to the Commission to purchase KOIN AM & FM in Portland, Oregon for \$1.5 million, according to Gaylord vice president Lee Alan Smith. KOIN is presently owned by Mount Hood Broadcasting which is 50 percent owned by Newhouse Broadcasting based in Syracuse, New York. The remaining 50 percent of Mount Hood Broadcasting is locally owned in Portland.

Gaylord's holdings include KRKE AM/FM in Albuquerque and television stations in Tampa, Milwaukee, Houston, Dallas-Ft. Worth and Seattle. Television stations in New Orleans and Cleveland are also pending FCC approval for purchase by Gaylord.

Hamilton, Ohio Purchase

Queen City Communications of Cincinnati has acknowledged it will purchase

WQMS-FM in Hamilton, Ohio, with the sale expected to be made final sometime in mid summer pending approval by the FCC. WQMS-FM, owned by Detroit based Trinity Broadcasting, is one of two broadcast holdings that company has. WBFM-FM in Detroit is the other, but according to Dan Ninowski, Trinity vice president, the company would retain that station. No purchase price was disclosed.

Charles Murdock, president and general manager of WLW in Cincinnati, told **Cash Box** that he will supervise operation of WQMS-FM after the transaction.

Louisiana Sale Submitted

The sale of KTRY AM & FM, Bastrop, Louisiana from Jamie Patrick Broadcasting Ltd. in Bastrop to Cotton & Montgomery Enterprises, also Bastrop, will make the stations the only black owned and operated pair in a three state region, according to part owner Henry Cotton. The tentative contract was signed last week, Cotton said, and will be submitted to the FCC this week. Sale price for the two stations was \$210,000. Jamie Patrick Broadcasting, as well as Cotton & Montgomery Enterprises, holds no other broadcast interest.

Filmways Adds Radio Programming Operation

LOS ANGELES — Filmways, Inc., a Los Angeles-based corporation with entertainment, publishing and manufacturing operations, is expanding to include the formation of Filmways Radio, Inc. The new company adds radio product to the corporation's already numerous holdings which include motion pictures, TV productions, broadcast electronics, Heatter-Quigley, Inc., Rhodes Productions Co. and Wally Heider Recording.

Utilizing the facilities of the Heider recording complex in Hollywood, initial plans are for the company to develop a full line of programming formats for automated stations, as well as the development and production of syndicated radio features. A weekly 5-hour strip with air personality Charlie Tuna is currently being produced for American Forces Radio and Television Service.

John Price has been named Filmways' director of marketing, while Verna Greathouse will be music director and Patty

Collins an administrative assistant.

Director of Programming

Steve Epstein, previous operations director for the ProGramme Shoppe, will serve as director of programming and operations. Epstein describes Filmways' initial offering, "The 20/40 Format" as "radio for grown-ups," based on its demographic target.

Rodger Layng, program director of KPOL-FM, Los Angeles will be programming consultant and along with Caron Brenner, KPOL air personality, will act as announcers for the new format.

'Record Report'

The company is also now exclusively producing and syndicating "Record Report," with Robert W. Morgan. The program, twice-daily 3½ minute vignettes, covers news of records and views of record personalities and is airing 150 stations presently.

Filmways Radio, Inc. will be located at 1610 North Cahuenga in Hollywood.

Cox B'casting Plans Merger With Cox Cable

5 TV & 10 Radio

Cox Broadcasting owns and operates five television and ten AM and FM radio stations in Atlanta, Charlotte, Dayton, Pittsburgh, San Francisco-Oakland, Miami and Los Angeles. The company has pending an acquisition for an FM station in Baltimore. Its other operations include business publishing, motion picture production and data processing services.

Cable TV Systems

Cox Cable owns and operates 38 cable television systems serving over 428,000 subscribers. The company also provides pay television programming by cable and multipoint distribution.

Cox presently owns 56.1 percent of the shares of Cox Cable.

TAAN Initiates New Radio Syndication Pgm.

LOS ANGELES — Trans American Audio News, a programming syndication service offering to radio the guests normally seen on national network television, has been formed in Orange, California. The new service, more properly known as TAAN, features casual interviews with guests such as Joan Baez, Ernest Borgnine and Dr. Margaret Mead and is formatted to a maximum time of five minutes per show.

printing, agreed. The key to success in the marketplace is service. "In other industries, the lead time might be four to six weeks," he explained. "In this business, it's three to seven days. In times of stress and strain, if you can't deliver, you may lose an account."

Two Printing Techniques

Basically, albums are printed in two ways: directly onto "solid bleached sulfate" (bleached board), a relatively new technique pioneered by Shorewood in the early 1960s; or printed onto a fine piece of paper, called "slick," and shipped to a fabricator who then glues it to a "chipboard jacket." When larger quantities of 50,000 to 100,000 or more jackets are needed, direct printing is considerably cheaper, with savings on waste and shipping.

"When we got into the business in the

mid 1960s, we decided direct printing was the format of the future," said Block. For example, he pointed out that nine of the top 10 LPs on a recent **Cash Box** Top 100 Albums chart were direct-printed. Chipboard jackets, he continued, are used more in catalog items, which make up a sizable portion of the full-service printer's business.

Rising Overhead

Costs in the record packaging industry rose an estimated eight to ten percent during 1976. Heading that hike is the cost of paperboard, which has risen steadily over the past five years. Heating oil, similarly, costs two to three times as much as it did four years ago. "Three years ago I paid 16¢ for heating oil . . . now I'm paying 48¢," said one printing executive. Energy costs overall have hit packagers particularly hard, since they not only have to heat and air-condition

their buildings but must also air-condition overheated machinery parts and humidify plate-making devices.

Most of the industry is unionized, and spokesmen for the major packagers say that wages, which have risen about 25% since 1973, have generally kept pace with the cost-of-living. A skilled pressman, according to Verebay, can make \$30,000 or more a year with overtime, and administrative labor costs have likewise gone up. Finally, trucking, affected by increases in fuel and maintenance costs, adds another two to five cents to the cost of packaging a record. Queens Litho built a second plant in Indianapolis primarily in order to save freight costs to the west coast.

Biggest Rise In Paperboard

Because packaging firms are moderate to small-sized independent operations, without heavy computerization, they are

hard-pressed to itemize their costs quickly. Nevertheless, several firms believe at least 40% to 50% of their operating expenses are in paperboard.

Paperboard, which includes not only bleached board and "coated one-sided litho stock" (chipboard), but various grades of sleeve and label paper, has gone up in price over 200% in the last five years.

Block, a former paper company staffer, said board costing \$180 a ton in the early 1970s now runs \$425 to \$450 per ton. Another printing executive said his paper cost has gone from \$180 to \$405 a ton since 1973.

Queens Litho, which just raised its price to the record companies, did so largely on the basis of a recently announced five percent increase in paperboard prices. Before 1970, the packagers say, paper prices were

Green Valley Record Store Goes Back To The Beginning : Mail Order

NASHVILLE — Green Valley Record Store has projected it will sell 100,000 to 110,000 units of a special record package entitled "Amazing Grace" by February. The repackaging, featuring Red Foley and Jimmie Davis singing gospel, is selling more or equal to what would be a top ten selling album through television advertising.

Steve Goldstein, part owner of Green Valley Record Store with business consultant Harold Hitt, said, "I anticipate the mail order business of Green Valley to be over a million dollars based upon current volume, which isn't bad for a company starting out two months ago."

The Nashville office of Green Valley Record Store is directed by officers Harold Hitt and Steve Goldstein. Marilyn Perryman, general manager, and Dean Hitt serve as television time buyers. The operation carries no inventory except what small number they need; there are no returns to deal with; and most important, they have no receivables, meaning they see immediate return in cash. "What we've done with Green Valley Record Store," Goldstein explained, "is to go back to the original principle, cut out the middlemen and use media as our retailer. This method is more convenient and a less expensive purchase plan for the consumer."

One method Green Valley developed is to utilize television to market record product through key outlet advertising. This is a simple general advertising principle previously neglected by record marketers. Record companies previously marketed their product with the idea that

because record stores sell their records, advertising on radio would encourage airplay and then they could tag the record stores through the radio ad. While airplay may result, the numbers sacrificed make radio a less efficient method of reaching audiences.

According to Goldstein, "Television is the most effective use of the advertising dollar to promote and sell country records. We can pinpoint our market and pinpoint our audience and the demographics of our audience. Our market for the "Amazing Grace" package has been defined as "older women." Knowing this, we can buy time on "Dinah," or the "Merv Griffin Show" and have 85% effectiveness reaching our market, so our advertising dollar is well spent."

Utilize Print Media

Another facet of the Green Valley marketing thrust is to utilize the print media, convincing record companies to coupon their ads and let Green Valley handle the mail order response. Tagging the ads record companies have already budgeted for consumer publications makes the product available directly through the ad and accessible to the 50% of the population that are considered to be mail order buyers. Mail order buyers, are those people living in rural areas where record product is unavailable or limited.

Couponing ads help defray the cost of advertising, and sales generated from the ad can pay for the total cost. According to Goldstein, "Couponing ads also provide a demographic profile of the record buyer. By inquiring as to the age and sex of the record buyer on the coupon with the added address information, a record company can determine a region and demographic profile. And more important, the record company doesn't spend money on advertising with no measure of its effectiveness. You're going to get back definite results and recoup some of the cost of the ad. That's why we've been working closely with RCA and MCA. In the upcoming months we'll be working with Columbia, Capitol, United Artists and ABC Records and I expect by June every company that sells country records will be couponing their ads."

Working with the record companies, Green Valley Record Store acts as a fulfillment service, buying the records wholesale and fulfilling mail orders as well as providing a demographic profile by region. Mail orders are routed through the Nash-

GREAT MOMENTS AT THE GRAND OLE OPRY — Various Artists — RCA CPL 2-1904 — Producer: Ralph Emery — List: 7.98

This collection of artists' recollections of the Grand Ole Opry includes a four page centerfold (written and edited by Ralph Emery) of artist photos and bios. "Great Moments" is a four record set that highlights 15 Opry stars, with vocal descriptions about what the Opry has meant to them over the years. Artists include Connie Smith, Minnie Pearl, Hank Snow, Jim Reeves, Ronnie Milsap, Dottie West, Porter Wagoner and Dolly Parton. The album's artwork should also garner it good positioning inside retail stores.



VINTAGE '77 — Tommy Overstreet — ABC DO-2071 — Producer: Ron Chancey

Tommy Overstreet's deep, mellow vocal tracks, along with Ron Chancey's production work, makes this LP a strong one. There is an abundance of backup chorus on side two of the album, with programmers apt to favor "You Bring Out The Best In Me" and "Lady Beware." Those previewing it for airplay will receive quick musical surprise at the end of "Like You."



JOHNNY PAYCHECK (Epic 8-50334)

Slide Off Of Your Satin Sheets (2:57) (Rose Bridge Music, Inc. — BMI) (D. Tankersley-W. Carson)

The lyric content of this record is possibly one of the strongest of any of Paycheck's previous material. Paycheck's voicing on key lines like "... his money buys you everything but lovin', so I guess I'm good for something after all," is potent stuff and with Billy Sherrill's usual expert production added to that, the tune is this week's strongest entry. Playlists will add it immediately and jukeboxers will consider it a must.

RED SOVINE (Starday SD 148)

Just Gettin' By (2:58) (Tree Pub. Co. — BMI) (D. Owens-G. Vowell)

Red Sovine sings! And sings well! This ballad, a tender love story, is done exceptionally well by this artist, who has had a tremendous track record. His vocals are strong against a very nicely orchestrated rhythm track that includes, among other things, superb keyboards. Jukebox play is a tossup, but the record will receive airplay right out of the box. It's a winner!

CONNIE CATO (Capitol P-4379)

Don't You Ever Get Tired (Of Hurting Me) (3:03) (Tree Pub. Co. Inc. — BMI) (Hank Cochran)

This record, which should prove to be a very good ballad programmer, shows better production work than any Cato record to date. Background vocals are flawless and coupled with Cato's own interpretation of the song's lyrics, "Don't You Ever Get Tired" will make an immediate indentation on virtually every country playlist. Airplay rotation will be strong with jukeboxes adding it also.

DAVE & SUGAR (RCA JH-10876)

Don't Throw It All Away (3:09) (Famous Music, Inc. — ASCAP) (Gary Benson-David Mindell)

With a solid hit behind them, Dave & Sugar certainly have it together on this fresh ballad. The acappella chorus lines are a bit unique, and the song's melody — somewhat haunting — will most likely grow on you after a second listen. Airplay on drive time will be minimal, but the other dayparts will certainly see this record being featured. Playlists and very few jukeboxes.

JOHNNY CARVER (ABC DOA-17675)

Sweet City Woman (3:10) (Covered Wagon Music — ASCAP) (Rich Dodson)

Complete with banjo instrumentation throughout, Carver's re-do of the old Stampeders' hit is not one of the stronger covers he's attempted. It's a good programmer, but those who open the hour with it will find it contains sort of a lackluster punch. It should fit in well with country formats though, adding a cheerful, MOR'ish type sound to strict hard country sweeps.

GENE WATSON (Capitol P-4378)

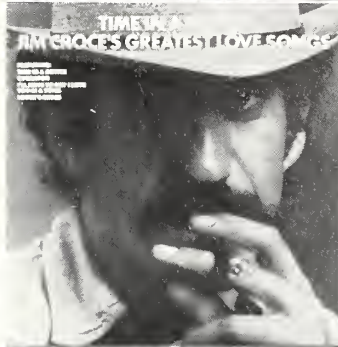
Paper Rosie (3:56) (Doubleplay Music/Quality Music Pub. Ltd — BMI) (Dallas Harms)

Even though "Paper Rosie" registers a 3:56 timing, music directors should not hesitate on considering it for their music rotation. Some may choose to program it during certain dayparts as a test, but most will find that the lyric alone presents the song as one of this week's strongest records. Watson's mellow voice, in addition to the simple love story, should make this song one of his biggest ever. Jukeboxes and playlists alike will see action on this record.



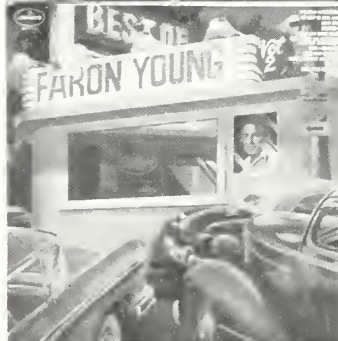
ME AND McDILL — Bobby Bare — RCA APL 1-2179 — Producers: Bobby Bare and Bill Rice — List: 6.98

This collection of Croce material is flawless in both its content and production. Using a number of the artist's standards juxtaposed against other mellow ballads, "Love Songs" should receive airplay and sales from the beginning because of the Croce legacy. "Time In A Bottle," "Operator," and enchanting lyrics on "Lovers Cross" make up album's standout tunes, although all cuts may be programmed by country and AOR stations.



THE BEST OF FARON YOUNG, VOLUME 2 — Faron Young — Mercury SRM-1-1130 — Producer: Jerry Kennedy — List: 6.98

Has the Singin' Sheriff been around long enough to have a "volume two" of greatest hits? Certainly! Faron Young has put together a nice balance of ballads to uptempo material in this collection, and he also wrote the best tune on the LP, "Goin' Steady." If this cut is not used as a programming record out of news, it will be a mystery to us. The artists' consistent sales, along with a proud track record, should boost this LP to the same status as all previous Young product.

JIM MUNDY (ABC DOA 17678)

I've Never Really Been In Love Before (3:00) (Sunbury Music, Inc. — ASCAP) (S. Earle)

This soft and easy ballad by Mundy will be a good prospect for all country playlists. Listeners should begin to pick up on the tune's message immediately, while music directors will certainly recognize Jim Foglesong's good, clean production on the record. The rhythm track is outstanding and Mundy's vocals are better than ever. Definite playlist addition!

MICKEY NEWBURY (ABC AH 54006)

Hand Me Another Of Those (1:55) (Acuff Rose Pub. Inc. — BMI) (Mickey Newbury)

This self-written ballad may be the one that will establish Newbury as an even stronger country artist than he is now. The record is not the standard beer drinkin' song as such, but reflects more of a progressive country feel as Newbury shows off his expertise at not only writing but singing. The record's timing — 1:55 — will make it a welcome addition to programmer's playlists with jukeboxers considering it also. Great female backup.

WENDEL ADKINS (Hitsville H 6050 F)

I Will (2:47) (ABC Dunhill Music, Inc. — BMI) (O. Solomon)

Listeners may react very curiously to this tune because of Adkins' almost identical sound with Waylon Jennings. Aside from that, the contrast between the record's mellow beginning and its uptempo chorus lines is catchy and that mixture should grab programmer's ears right away. Given a chance on the air, the record could prove itself, although jukebox adds are doubtful.

JACKY WARD (Mercury 73880)

Texas Angel (2:54) (Jack and Bill Music Co. — ASCAP) (Jerry Foster-Bill Rice)

Although Jacky Ward has gained respect with his previous material, this one neither highlights nor downgrades his vocal abilities. There's some nice use of harmonica and brass, but Ward does not stand out vocally as he should. It's a mediocre effort for this talented performer, who's very capable of a top ten record. Foster and Rice wrote the tune and country programmers will certainly take note of that. Jukeboxes — maybe.

BOOTS RANDOLPH (Monument 45-209)

Honky Tonk (Part 1) (3:29) (W&K Pub. Corp./Islip Music Publ. Co. — BMI) (H. Glover-B. Doggett-B. Butler-S. Sheppard-C. Scott)

Some fancy sax work by the master and clean, crisp hand claps throughout this tune make this Boots Randolph version of "Honky Tonk" a very smooth programmer. Randolph's interpretation is much more mellow than previous versions, with excellent orchestration backing his solo work. Although it's not the strongest instrumental, if it's mixed carefully in the hourly rotation, programmers will be able to capitalize on its "memory" effect with a great deal of success. Playlists and jukeboxes.

ANN J. MORTON (Prairie Dust PD 7612)

Don't Call Me No Lady (2:23) (Me And Sam Music — ASCAP) (Ann J. Morton)

If country programmers have not heard of Ann J. Morton, this may be the record that will establish her as a bona fide country artist. It's a strong programming record, with a heavy emphasis on fiddles, and is somewhat reminiscent of the old Jeannie C. Riley stuff. The tune is a must for music directors to screen, with potential adds to playlists and jukeboxes following that.

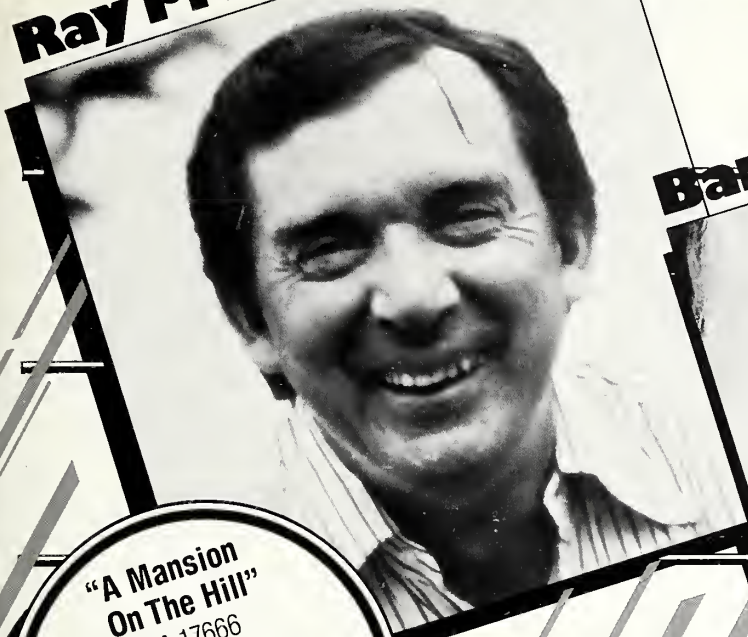

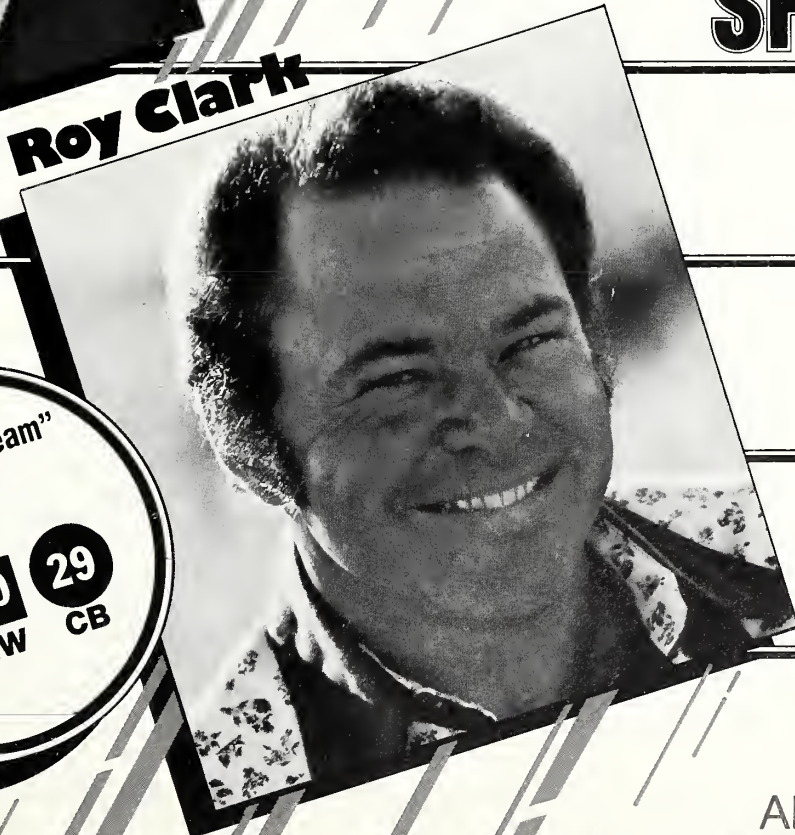

There was an estimated crowd of 3,500 people with that many turned away from the concert. **Red Steagall** made a guest appearance and **Wills' widow Betty** attended.

Linda Hargrove will be featured on an upcoming overseas broadcast by the BBC. **Melba Montgomery**, who recorded many Hargrove compositions, will be included in the interview by **Colin Chandler**.

Jessi Colter's new album, which is scheduled for a February release, is a menage of gospel tunes.

Stoney Edwards is in the process of organizing the first all black country band to back him on tour dates.

Red Steagall and **Hank Thompson** are negotiating details in conjunction with their booking agency, the **Jim Halsey Company** in Tulsa, to perform a benefit for **Keith Coleman** who died recently. **Coleman** was one of **Bob Wills' fiddlers**. The tentative date for the benefit is February 20.

Barbara Mandrell and family have been in Alberta, Canada on a ski vacation which they will combine with interviews and promotion work in the area. It was the first time **Ms. Mandrell** had been on skis, but husband **Ken Dudney** reports she was a natural.

Bobby Vinton is in Nashville to record an album for ABC. An interesting aside to the **Bobby Vinton, ABC merger** is **Jim Foglesong**, president of ABC/Dot, who first signed **Vinton** when he was with **Columbia** in New York years ago. **Bob Morgan**, who currently produces **Vinton**, hired **Billy Sherrill**, current president of Columbia-Nashville, who produced **Vinton's** early hits.

J.J. Cale, blues guitarist most famous for his recording of "Crazy Mama" in the sixties, performed before two SRO crowds January 24 at the **Exit/In**. Playing with **Cale** was star steel guitarist **Buddy Emmons** and guest percussionists **Karl Himmel** and **Jaime Nichols**. **Cale** entertained a broad range of music including the hit from a recent album, "Cocaine," **Ray Charles' "I Believe (To My Soul You're Trying To Make A Fool Out Of Me)"** and the beautiful "Magnolia." **Audie Ashworth**, **Cale's** producer, also attended.

David Allan Coe has begun an eight-state, 35-date tour including an engagement at the **Pickin' Parlor**. **Coe** proves an innovative, versatile performer, combining a magic act, three costume changes and musical directions enhanced by friend **Guy Clark** joining **Coe** in a jamming blues segment of the second show January 18. Enthusiasm built as **Coe** went through a country segment of self-penned hits "Would You Lay With Me In A Field Of Stone," "Willie, Waylon & Me," "She Was Greener Than The Grass We Layed On," as well as popular songs "Please Come To Boston" and "Up On Cripple Creek" and the gospel flavored "Will The Circle Be Unbroken." **Coe's** backup group, "The Tennessee Hat Band," followed the leader then soloed **Neil Young's** hit "Cowgirl In The Sand" and "I Guess I Owe It All To Pamela Brown." **Coe's** new album is entitled "David Allan Coe Rides Again" and features "Lately I've Been Thinking Too Much Lately" upon a February release. Indications from the performance hear **Coe** riding up the charts.

A recent performance of the **Earl Scruggs Revue** for "Austin City Limits" PBS television show was recorded live for the revue's first live album entitled "Live From Austin City Limits." A January 21-22 performance included a new member, former pedal steel guitarist from **Vassar Clements' band**, **Jim Murphy**. **Scruggs** favored a blues banjo on "Can't Seem To Care," bluegrass pickin' on the **Beverly Hillbillys' theme** song and "Foggy Mountain Breakdown" and four-part harmony on "The Salty Dog Rag."

The **Carter** family also has a forthcoming release on Columbia entitled "Father's Fiddle," penned by **Epic** artist **Dave Loggins**.

New RCA artist **Paul Craft**, who opened the January 24 performance for **J.J. Cale** at the **Exit/In** has two songs nominated for Grammy awards.

John Hartford received a Grammy nomination in the ethnic-folk category for his eleventh album entitled "Mark Twang" on **Flying Fish Records**. **Hartford** received an award for his tune "Gentle On My Mind."

The **Oak Ridge Boys** will appear as presenters and sing a medley of gospel songs on the Grammy awards show scheduled to be televised nationwide February 19.

Freddy Fender will headline at the **Sahara Tahoe** February 3-5, then begin a tour of the midwest. **Fender** is one of country music's most booked artists.

Mel Tillis has been cast to guest star as himself in an episode of the projected new television series, "Nashville 99," with **Claude Akins** and **Jerry Reed** as star adventurers.

Little David Wilkins' latest single on MCA was written during an engagement at the Atlanta Fairmont Hotel when a lady in the audience asked **Little David** to dance with her. **Chic Doherty**, MCA vp in Nashville, told her, "He'll play the music, but you can't make him dance." The line gave **Little David** an idea for the song, which he later wrote with **Jody Johnson**.

Billie Jo Spears, **Don Williams**, **Tommy Overstreet**, **Skeeter Davis** and **George Hamilton IV** will appear at the **Film Trust Arena** in Johannesburg, South Africa for the International Festival of Country music ongoing February 1-5.

Crossover Hits: Who Will Get Gold Records, Top 40 or R&B

LOS ANGELES — With the crossover syndrome ever present, the problem of who is awarded within the record companies is becoming a very pressing one. R&B promotion men feel in some instances they are being slighted for one reason or another in favor of the top 40 promotion men. Some one-stops and radio stations also have mixed feelings about awards for million selling crossover hits.

In speaking to several national, regional and local R&B promotion people across the country, each told of different situations where they or someone they know were bypassed one time or another in receiving awards they felt they were due. One west coast one-stop told *Cash Box*, "The record companies have a tendency to believe that record promotion stops with the radio stations, and simply overlook the fact that the one-stop is a very important entity in the sale of their product. If some of the larger one-stops didn't push some product, making certain their customers were aware of new product, let there be no doubt that the record wouldn't happen. But even with this knowledge, I have never received a gold record from any company. There have been several crossover hits that companies have approached me with, before anybody else that did well, and you never hear from these people again until they get another record."

What's The Policy?

Bruce Wendell, vice president of national promotion for Capitol Records explained "the issuing of gold records to radio stations or promotion people, is basically a judgmental decision. In a situation where we know that a promotion person went above and beyond the call of duty to break a record, one way or the other he would get a gold record. But generally speaking, when we have a big record that several people deserve recognition on we find giving bonuses rather than gold records to be best. In the case of a big crossover hit, we would recognize the 'key' top 40 and the 'key' R&B stations that were instrumental in breaking the record. For example, WRKO in Boston was the first major top 40 to jump on the Sylvers record, before the Sylvers were big cross-over artists. But the R&B station probably wouldn't receive one because the group is already big R&B. By the same token, I don't give our gold records for Paul McCartney to top 40 stations because he is already big top 40, but if he were to suddenly break big R&B it would be a different situation."

Otis Smith, vice president of ABC

Records added "if a pop record crosses R&B, gold records are given to individuals responsible for breaking that record R&B. If we are dealing with an R&B record that crosses pop, it is simply the individual responsible for breaking record pop, and those corresponding radio stations."

Howard Smiley, general manager of TK Productions, added "the giving of gold records is basically left to the discretion of the company. We don't want to get a reputation of giving out too many because then it is nothing special. We will generally give a radio station a gold record if they stuck their neck out for us in adding the record early, whether they are in a large or small market. We don't give them to many of our promotion people as a rule, but here again, if we feel they deserve this type of recognition, they will get it."

Foresight and Daring

Dick Kline, vice president of promotion for Atlantic Records, explained "our company does not have a policy per se regarding gold records, but we give out gold records or a plaque to programmers who have had the foresight and daring to add a record on a new or 'cold' artist when it's just been released. We feel that the programmer who has the intuitive desire to create what the public wants to hear should be rewarded, and we handle the R&B and pop in the same vein. There should also be a sincere meaning behind an award, but the meaning can be watered down if you are giving out a great deal of them. As for our promotion people, we don't award an individual, because we feel we are a team, and when one team has done a bit more than the rest, that team receives an award."

Nashboro Releases Six New Albums

NASHVILLE — "The Father of Them All" by R.H. Harris and the Masonic Quintet heads a list of six albums released by Nashboro Records in January.

The other releases were "Why Was I Born" by the Supreme Angels, "Gotta Find A Better Home" by the Angelic Gospel Singers, "Live In Concert, Vol. 2," a two-record set featuring such artists as Clara Ward and the Famous Ward Singers and Rev. Isaac Douglas, "With All Our Love" by Tommy Ellison and the Five Singing Stars, "Our Greatest Hits" by the Brooklyn Allstars and "I Have A Dream," the recording of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s speech. Nashboro reissued the latter disc after obtaining exclusive rights to the master.

Reflections 'N Black

Melba Moore was well received during her appearance at one of the official Presidential inaugural balls in Washington, D.C.

The Committee to Save Art and Culture is staging a campaign to bring headline entertainment back to Harlem. Because the area has been labeled a "bad" area by some, it was being by-passed by many forgetting that it was previously considered the mecca of entertainment in New York for many black entertainers. Bill Hichman, chairman of the organization (CSAC) is confident that he will be able to instill the fact that the community is worth saving in the minds of many people. One of their initial programs is tentatively set for Memorial Day weekend, with invitations being sent to several artists, with the hope that they will lend their talents to this cause.

The NAACP Image Awards dinner and show have been reset to Sunday, April 24 at the Century Plaza Hotel in Los Angeles.

WENZ in Richmond has changed its format to more of a progressive style, coining the phrase "Z-14 creative sophistication in black." They are now programming a list of thirty albums and fourteen singles. **Al Scott** has assumed the duties of program director, and **Mickey Arnold** will be music director.

Herbie Hancock's forthcoming LP will feature live recordings from the Newport Jazz Festival, which was titled "A Tribute To Herbie Hancock." The festival featured Hancock in three different sets, with three different bands, more or less showing his metamorphosis in music through the years. The first band included many of the musicians from his **Miles Davis** days, the second was the band that was with him through "Headhunters" and the third band is the band he presently tours with, that is more in a contemporary vein.

CASH BOX COIN MACHINE

First Electronic, Coin-Universal System Uses Custom Microcircuit

FOLCROFT, PA. — American Microsystems, Inc. (AMI), one of the leading manufacturers of microelectronic circuits, has begun delivery of a custom-designed and built integrated circuit that will be used in the first universal, all-electronic coin-changing system for vending machines. The microcircuit permits the system, which will be offered next spring by Mars Money Systems, headquartered here, to accept and dispense coins of any country.

The coin mechanism will have virtually no moving parts and will completely eliminate the rails, fingers, switches, deflectors, motors, cams, flippers and magnets used in conventional vending machine coin changers. The Mars Money Systems changer features electronic coin validation employing a unique set of three sensing stations wired to the LSI/MOS 40-pin circuit which determines whether the coin is good or not. (LSI refers to Large Scale Integration and MOS to Metal-Oxide-Silicon.)

This coin validation mechanism is self-calibrating and is designed to accommodate the forthcoming small U.S. dollar coin, which is expected to become highly significant to the vending machine industry in the near future.

Sensing Stations

The sensing stations consist of three pot cores, coil-like inductors, imbedded in the coin passageway walls, that sense the frequency shift associated with the coin's shape and size as it passes in front of the sensor. By orienting the three coils differently, measures of coin thickness and embossing depth, coin diameter, and composition can be detected. The LSI chip receives this frequency shift information, which usually ranges from 10 to 100 KHz,

compares it with stored tolerances, and determines validity.

Although other companies have already introduced coin changers in which the coin counting and coin return portions are electronic, the Mars Money Systems all-electronic system represents an important step in the vending machine industry.

Fully 50 percent of all machine breakdowns are caused by stoppages in the coin mechanisms due largely to variations in mechanism dimensions, weight and shape. These are often caused by wear, damage, slugs and the introduction of extraneous matter. Jam-ups are extremely costly in both lost machine operation time and maintenance. To limit these costs, many coin-changing mechanisms are made to accept spurious coins thereby avoiding jamming, but further adding to cost of machine operation.

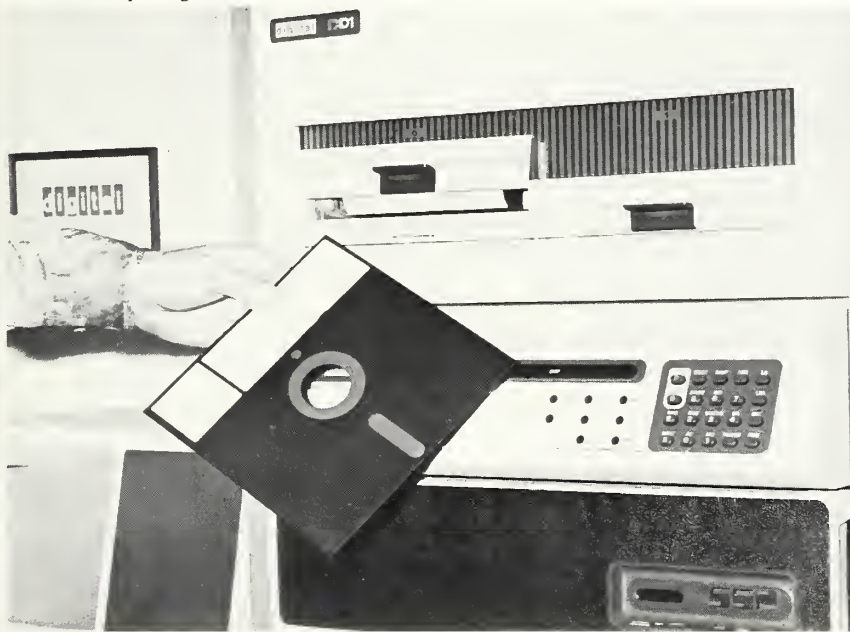
Extensive laboratory tests made with a predecessor Mars Money Systems electronic system in England, where the company is the leading one in its field, showed that 16 percent fewer jams occurred compared with other systems. The system tested also included an LSI/MOS custom microcircuit designed and built by AMI of Santa Clara, Calif.

Cost Is Factor

According to Fred Heiman, president of Mars Money Systems, cost was the major factor in selection of a custom circuit over other electronic alternatives.

"There is no way we could do what we wanted using standard circuits in the space we had and as cost-effectively. This would be an impossible product without custom LSI and the cost would be 10 to 100 times more."

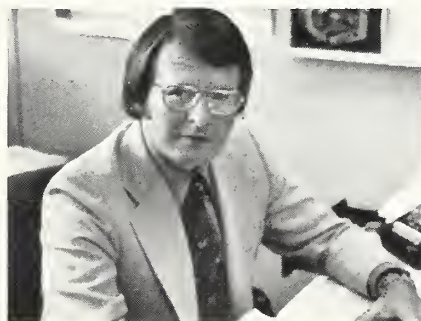

In addition to the games, which offer 90 seconds of play per quarter, a special 35mm slide projection system along with BART advertising panels is designed into the top structure. Changing slides present various San Francisco and Bay Area sports, entertainment and information visuals.

"We think the machine, here at this one station on an experimental basis, will provide fun for our riders between trains," a BART spokesman said. "And the information and revenue won't hurt, either."

"The BART location is an excellent example of the viability and earning potential of the theatre concept. It is a new entertainment idea that combines extra sophistication and excitement with high profits for any high traffic location," Frank Ballouz, Atari national sales manager said.

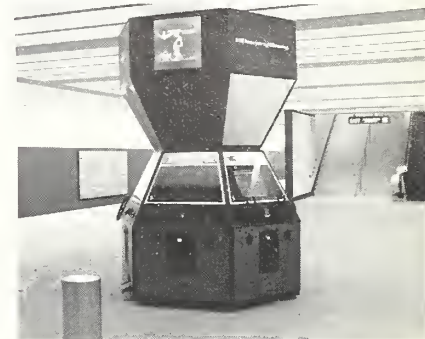
Each theatre provides a complete video package that can be custom designed to integrate into any playing environment.

Atari's Theatre Kiosk

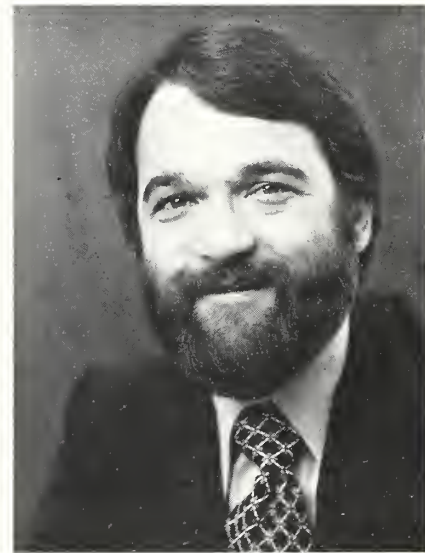

CHICAGO — In a nine-month report to stockholders of Seeburg Industries, Inc., president Louis J. Nicastro said net income of the company in the third quarter of 1976 was \$179,000, or 7 cents per share, which compares with a loss of \$2,057,000 in the corresponding 1975 period. Revenues were \$30,152,000, up from the previous year's \$26,373,000.

Net income for the first nine months of the year was \$1,548,000, or 60 cents per share, which compares with a loss of \$5,908,000 in 1975.

Retailers View Print Vs. Radio Advertising

said Jill Bartholomew, manager of the agency that handles advertising for Record Bar's 75 stores in the south and southwest. "With most of them we have complete flexibility. With maybe two or three — one of those being WEA — we have less."

Get Results

According to Dieter Wilkinson, general manager of Pickwick International's Recco division, which includes the 83-unit Aurasound/Discount Records chain, "We direct the media that advertising is placed in, in all cases. Obviously, if a manufacturer comes in and says, 'I've got x amount of dollars and wants you to run radio, if we were to disagree with that, we would let them know; but ultimately, we would acquiesce and run with his particular recommendation.'" Wilkinson added that "we're out to get the most results we can out of any given ad."

Mike Weiss, advertising manager for Peaches, whose 11 "super stores" are scattered around the country, estimated that "by and large, 85% of the time, they (record companies) commit the money (for ads) and I decide the media." Similarly, Joe Bressi, marketing director for the 70-unit Stark/Camelot chain, said, "They pretty much leave it up to us in most cases as to whether we want to use print or radio." And according to Jim Grimes, advertising manager for the 50-store National Record Mart chain, his company's control over its media choices "is pretty much total."

Radio Vs. Print

At National Record Mart and Record Bar the ratio of radio to print advertising is roughly 80:20. "With most of it, we stick to radio," Grimes explained. "I just feel that kids listen to radio more than they read the newspaper, and if it's a new artist it's hard to

just take a newspaper ad and say we have a new album by this so-and-so that nobody ever heard of."

Bartholomew agreed that radio was the best medium for reaching the youth market. But she cautioned that "it depends on the market and the product. We do more in radio than anything else, but we have some college and military markets where specialized publications are very effective." Likewise, Grimes pointed out that newspaper ads can be helpful in selling to the adult record market.

Peaches concentrates 85% of its co-op dollars in radio, according to Weiss. Out of the 15% of the budget which is mostly used to buy print ads, he said, "A good part is classical, and one of the problems is that in a few of our markets, there's no classical radio. I have no choice; I have to go into print in that situation."

"I don't think that the major newspapers, like the L.A. Times, attract the rock record buyer. I think those one-shot, one-day ads are very ineffective. The largest part of your record buyers — and this applies not only to rock, but to jazz, r&b, etc. — listen to the radio and want to hear a piece. A real nice cover doesn't sell an album."

Another reason for the chain's avoidance of print advertising, Weiss stressed, is the fact that promoting an album with a price runs against the grain of Peaches' marketing philosophy. "We never, never advertise price. It's like rule one in our advertising. To have my ad next to Franklin Music in Atlanta in a Sunday (newspaper) section means nothing because I'll be advertising product and I'm trying to get the Peaches idea across. But we're not trying to get people in on a price basis; we don't want that."

College Market

Sam Goody runs three times as many print ads as radio or TV spots. Although the firm's president noted that Goody had been moving more and more in the radio and TV area, he felt that print is necessary in the long run, especially in the classical market. "The classical buyer is much more attuned to looking at newspapers. The trouble is some of the youth market never even reads the paper."

Most of Discount Records' stores are located in university areas where the young people are comparatively literate. "Because of the nature of these stores," asserted Wilkinson, "we found that the local and campus newspapers bring us our best results. Number two, of course, is radio. Many times we have our best results taking a newspaper ad and backing up with radio play."

Wilkinson added, however, that the FM stations which are found in nearly every college town are not always a good advertising medium unless they're used in conjunction with print ads. In Minneapolis, for example, "the station's so laid back that it's very hard to put your message across," he said.

Bressi favors print over radio in a 65:35 ratio, because he commonly runs print ads "with very competitive pricing. It's tough to get across (price) on a radio spot."

High TV Costs

In Cleveland and the Tampa Bay region, "two areas where we have enough stores to make the costs worthwhile," Bressi has experimented with TV spots which have been very successful. "The best medium is TV where the costs are correct, which is only in a few places. Every time we've run television, we've seen a more noticeable (sales) increase (than from print or radio ads)."

Bressi pointed out that it is unnecessary to include a price in a TV ad. "In TV, you're more or less selling an image rather than a price. And in most cases, very few of your competitors are on television. So it gives you that advantage, too."

Bartholomew explained that the chain has not run a TV ad since Christmas of 1975. That campaign, she added, "was extremely effective. But it was also a lot more work to put the package together, get it aired properly, get the production done and get the label to approve it." Similarly, Bressi admitted that he has run into some resistance from record companies on running co-op TV spots "because of the costs."

Discount Records/Aurasound has used very little television advertising. "Where we have used it," Wilkinson said, "the results seem to be on a par with radio. But I don't feel we've really exploited it to its full potential."

Wave Of The Future?

"Television hasn't been a big factor up to now," remarked Weiss. "But this year I expect to use it as much as possible. The visual end of the entertainment media trip is becoming very visible right now. And you can see this with the video cassette machines that are coming out and the higher sales that the hardware is getting. Obviously people are becoming more visually-oriented."

"At the same time, the quality of TV music shows is also increasing. The TV advertising around things like Don Kirshner, Soundstage and so on is very important. You've got the audience; you've got the record buyers watching. Whereas radio is giving you the same thing 24 hours a day. It's giving you music all day, and you can count on it for that. On TV, however, it's the exception when there is a good music show on (within a single day). It's important to key in on those exceptions because that's when the music people are going to be watching."

Lifesong will offer a 10% discount to distributors on the entire label's catalog for the month of February. In addition, the company is offering a cash prize for the best retailer window or in-store display of the Lifesong catalog with a color television to be awarded to the salesperson servicing that store. Merchandising aids will include a full color calendar for February with reproductions of all the covers of albums in the Lifesong catalog, along with a Jim Croce mobile featuring a Valentine's Day theme, removable for the remainder of the month.

'Large Catalog Company'

Fuhrman has emphasized his desire to build Lifesong into a "large catalog company." With that goal in mind, the label has begun its "Gold Diggers" oldies series featuring five Jim Croce singles, Henry Gross' "Shannon," the label's first gold single, and a single version of a much-requested Cashman and West cut from the "American City Suite" album.

The late Jim Croce, all of whose product is now owned by Lifesong, will continue to be listed on the label's artist roster, although Fuhrman pointed out that he will mainly be a catalog-building artist. Croce releases, therefore, will never take precedence over new releases by Lifesong artists. Fuhrman stated that further packaging configurations for the Croce catalog, as well as previously released product by Terry Cashman and Tommy West, Croce's producers and co-owners of Lifesong, have yet to be determined.

Asked if he felt that Lifesong Month would help build the label's identity, Fuhrman stated that he did not feel that the label name "is very important to the consumer. I think it is very important to the industry, however, to peers, distributors, rack jobbers and retailers. You can also have an easier time of bringing artists to a label with a good reputation."

ville office then sent to RCA's special products division in Indianapolis for distribution. An average of 1,500 orders are processed each day.

The "Amazing Grace" package is the private project of Green Valley Record Store to generate revenue for the company. Green Valley leased the product from MCA and sells it via telephone and mail order through television advertising. Marilyn Perryman and Dean Hitt buy TV time after running an ad for one week to test the market. If it proves profitable they will buy additional time for up to eight weeks. The "Amazing Grace" ad is currently running on more than 100 stations.

Additional duties include monitoring the stations where ads are running and keeping a mail order count. Goldstein said, "Another extension of the Green Valley project designed to protect ourselves during the spring and summer months when TV time is more competitive and expensive is to produce a syndicated TV show to support the "Amazing Grace" sales. The show will feature Porter Wagoner as host of the 'Good Ole Country Gospel.' What we hope to do is barter the show with television stations and keep the time we barter for ourselves to sell records. For six commercial minutes per half hour, we give the station the show free plus three minutes. Then we get three minutes to sell our records. This way we utilize the time bank of that off season."

Rising Raw Materials Prices Lead To Higher Album Costs

"fairly stable."

Major Woe

The increase in paperboard is the major woe of one packager, who hopes to turn a six percent pre-tax profit in 1976 (three percent net). "My total cost of doing business is up eight percent over the past year. So now I've got to turn around and raise my price to the record companies nine percent to maintain that profit margin." The executive added that "obviously we've had to eat some of our paper cost increases."

The major increase in paperboard costs has had at least one noticeable effect on the appearance of the record album.

The era of the "fancy package," in which unknown artists were given elaborate four-color gatefold jackets and ornate sleeves, ended when paper costs and the recession peaked at the same time. Today, fancy jackets and sleeves are generally reserved for established artists.

Paper Firm Explains Hike

Why have paperboard costs risen so steeply? A look at recent financial statements by International Paper Company, one of the leaders in its field, provides a partial answer to this question.

During the five-year period from 1970 to 1975, the cost of wood fiber delivered to IP's pulp mills rose about 60%. Timber costs, however, are always the smallest category in IP's annual breakdown of its expenses. For example, during the nine months ended September 30, 1976, IP spent \$24.3 million on wood and approximately \$1.9 billion on the "cost of products sold" (i.e., manufacturing).

The hidden cost involved in the primary raw material of paper is the amount of capital that must be invested in order to secure lumbering rights to the dwindling timberlands. According to IP's figures, its investments in timberlands rose 400% between 1971 and 1975.

At the same time, expenses for environmental protection increased three-fold. The company blames environmental regulations (as well as the start-up of a new paper mill in Ticonderoga NY) for an acceleration of increasing cost trends. In addition, a drop in demand from 1974 to 1975, at the depth of the current recession, led to decreased earnings during that period.

Last year, though, the picture brightened for IP. An increase in demand for its products, expected to continue through this year, brought net earnings for the first nine months of 1976 up 44% to \$206 million from \$143 million during the prior-year period. Sales for the nine-month period rose 18% to 2.657 billion from \$2.244 billion during the first nine months of 1975, while sales of paperboard, paper and pulp jumped 15% to \$1.39 billion from \$1.178 billion. During the same period, production of these products increased 17%, keeping a little bit ahead of sales.

A spokeswoman for International Paper declined to comment on the likelihood of more price increases on paperboard in the coming year. However, it is not improbable that once demand catches up with supply prices will start rising more sharply than they have done within the past year.

This has certainly been the case in the past. Between 1971 and 1975, for example, there were not only periods of slumping demand for paper, but also a year in which price controls were imposed on American industry. Yet, while its overall sales during this period were only up 36%, IP managed to raise its net earnings by a staggering 75%.

Shrink Wrapping

The cost of shrink-wrapping the finished record package has risen along with everything else. According to Frank Gallagher of Cook Labs in Norwalk, Conn.,

a record pressing company, the cost of a 4500-foot roll of shrink film (which will wrap 1,800 records) has risen from \$26 to \$60 in the space of four years. He added that energy and labor costs related to shrink-wrapping are "minimal."

Michael Gallo, in the purchasing department of CBS, added that the cost of shrink film has risen 47% since 1972. This is considerably less than the 230% increase reported by Cook Labs; however, the difference can be accounted for by the fact that CBS buys in much larger quantities than a small presser like Cook does. The big corporation's automated wrapping system, too, brings substantial savings: whereas Cook uses about 3 feet of film to shrink wrap one album, CBS needs only 2 feet to do the same job.

Joe Kroll, plant manager of the CBS pressing plant in Pitman, N.J., said that "most of the cost (for shrink wrapping) is in the film and in the labor." He pointed out that, while electric power is required to heat and shrink the film, energy costs do not form a large percentage of the expense involved.

Since shrink film is made from petrochemicals, however, oil prices do have a definite effect on its cost, according to Gallo. To prove his point, he noted that shrink film costs increased substantially in 1973, the year of the OPEC oil embargo.

Graphics And Design

As Roland Young, art director for A&M Records, noted, the cost of designing an album cover is by far the smallest part of the total cost involved in packaging. However, according to Bob Defrin of the graphics and design department at Atlantic Records, that cost has gone up considerably in recent years.

Defrin said that he recalled paying \$300 back in the late '60s for a cover illustration that would cost \$1,000 today. He estimated that art costs in general have gone up two or three times what they were 10 years ago. Atlantic's current budget for the design of an album cover, he added, is approximately \$2,500. Defrin believed that this was a "standard" budget for the industry as a whole.

Gallo declined to give a dollar figure for the cost to CBS of shrink film, which the company normally buys in 12,000-foot rolls. However, a spokesman for a major film supplier stated that a 50-gauge, 15-inch-wide roll of that length goes for approximately \$46.55.

Both Young and Defrin pointed out that their companies do less and less gatefold jackets, which cost nearly twice as much as do ordinary jackets. Defrin noted, however, that exceptions are regularly made on releases by such top-selling groups as the Rolling Stones.

In the opinion of Atlantic's spokesman, gatefold jackets are not of much use as a marketing tool because "there is no impulse buying today." People go into a record store "to buy a specific album," he said, therefore, gatefolds are "a waste of time."

Young, who concurred with Defrin, hinted at another reason for the decline in gatefolds. Record companies have realized, he said, that esthetic considerations are less important in selling albums than the image of an artist or group, which can be conveyed on an ordinary album cover. "We're getting more into an advertising agency type of thing," he commented.

At least 50% of the designs for A&M's album covers, Young stated, are contracted to outside agencies. The company's recording artists, he said, are primarily responsible for this phenomenon. They want the graphics done on the outside because "if they're done in-house, they all tend to come out the same."

tion in federal bankruptcy court in Memphis.

Representatives of the firm said they are undecided as to what to do with the masters, but raised the possibility that the company might try to resurrect Stax, probably in Los Angeles.

Mickey Weissman, a partner in the firm, said the other major option would be distribution of the tapes by one or more distributors.

'A Lot of Calls'

"I'm sure we'll be getting a lot of calls on it," Weissman said. "All we know is that they've (the tapes) been sitting there for more than a year producing nothing." The masters have been stored in a bank vault since December 1975 when Stax was closed down after being forced into involuntary bankruptcy proceedings. The once successful soul recording firm was declared bankrupt last summer.

Jesse Selter, board chairman of NMC Corp., a subsidiary of Nassi and Associates, said he had listened to many of the tapes and described the music as "excellent." Among the artists and groups on the masters are Isaac Hayes, the Staple Singers, Johnnie Taylor, the Emotions, the Dramatics and Booker T. & The M.G.s.

Selter said his company had "resurrected" Westminster Records and Riverside Records in recent years.

Selter said that if an attempt to revive Stax — which would involve signing new artists — is made, the masters would be kept as a package. He said it is undecided whether the Stax labels would be used.

Among its other ventures, the Nassi firm reportedly has bought and sold a chain of California grocery stores and recently has been acquiring stores from W.T. Grant Co. Nassi and Associates originally bid \$1.4 million for the tapes but decreased its offer when it heard of a number of claims of lien

against them.

Cream Bid

The only other offer came from Los Angeles-based Cream Records, which bid up to \$3.75 million to be paid from royalties the masters might produce over the next five years. Although Cream offered \$200,000 down and \$200,000 in three years, the Stax trustee decided not to gamble on the masters' saleability.

Cream's owner Al Bennett, who once ran Liberty Records, said that if his bid had been successful he had definite plans to try to revive Stax in Memphis.

The purchase may come with a number of legal problems attached. Chief among them is a claim by Atlantic Records, once a Stax distributor, that it owns rights to all masters produced between 1963 and 1968. Atlantic claims to have contracts to that effect, although none were produced at the sale.

Legal Problems

"I'm not going to predict what all the legal problems might be," said David Cocke, one of the lawyers for Union Planters National Bank, which claims an \$8 million secured interest in the tapes.

Secured and unsecured creditors who had filed claims before Stax was ruled bankrupt now take their claims against the proceeds of the auction.

Such claims total around \$30 million. However, it appears that one of the two chief creditors who claim a secured interest — UP and CBS, Inc. — will receive the bulk of the proceeds. CBS says it has a \$6 million secured interest under a 1972 distribution contract with Stax.

Which of the two has a priority lien is still to be decided by the court.

Stax' electronic equipment was brought for \$50,000 by a Memphis group and the office furniture for \$26,000 by a Memphis auction company.

FBI Raids Continue

NEW YORK — FBI agents seized over \$50,000 worth of pirated tapes last week in a nationwide drive against what the agency termed "white collar crimes." The largest tape raid occurred in New Haven, Connecticut, where agents confiscated bootleg recordings valued at \$10,000 from Cutler's Record Shop at 33 Broadway in New Haven.

On the west coast, approximately 1400 pirated tape recordings were seized from both Sylvester J. Thompson in Los Angeles and Charles Fredrick Moss of Bend, Oregon.

In Ohio, a total of 7500 allegedly pirated tapes were confiscated in five separate raids. The raided stores included Surplus Sales Annex in Marietta, Belpre Discount Tapes in Belpre, Bill's Army and Navy Store in Athens, and Rich Oil Company in Portsmouth.

Newman felt Stewart's critically acclaimed lyrics, as well as the song's melody, were responsible for its popularity. "The groundwork for the song's success," Newman added, "was Stewart's considerable recognition as an established FM artist."

British Survey Shows CBS Leads In Singles Market For Fourth Quarter

LONDON — CBS Records/UK can look back on 1976 as the most successful year in its history, according to managing director Maurice Oberstein, who himself completes his first full year as head of the CBS affiliate.

Forty-three CBS singles placed on industry charts here during the year at an average of one new chart entry nearly every week. In addition, CBS artists realized an aggregate total of two platinum albums (sales over 1 million pounds), ten gold albums (sales over 250,000 pounds), five gold singles (sales over 500,000 units), 30 silver albums (sales over 100,000 pounds) and 12 silver singles (sales over 250,000 units).

Moody Named To CBS Records Post

TORONTO — CBS Records Canada Ltd.'s president Terence Lynd has announced the appointment of Richard Moody to the position of vice president and general manager, A&R Records and Tapes Ltd.

Moody has been actively involved in the record and tape industry for the past 15 years. He joined A.R.S. Records Canada Ltd., a wholly owned subsidiary of CBS Canada Ltd., in 1970 and most recently held the position of western regional manager.

Blue In Production Pact

LONDON — Barry Blue has signed an exclusive worldwide production deal with CBS Records. He will initially be working with British bands.

The British Market Research Bureau (BMRB) survey of the 1976 fourth quarter shows that CBS was the number one company in UK singles sales for that period, with a 20.7 percent share of the market. This represents a considerable lead over the next ranking company (EMI) with 14.8 share. It also is the first time since quarterly surveys were introduced by the BMRB five years ago that EMI has been topped as such.

The BMRB survey also indicates that CBS/UK's share of the singles market for the final quarter of 1976 represents an 11.4 percent improvement over the company's position for the same period in 1975.

Decca To Release New Justin Hayward Album

LONDON — Justin Hayward is the latest member of the Moody Blues to announce solo plans with an album entitled "Songwriter" and a single, "One Lonely Room," set for Feb. 11 release by Decca.

Hayward was vocalist, lead guitarist and writer with the Moodies over a 10-year era which saw sales of 20 million of the group's seven albums. Among the titles he penned were "Nights In White Satin," "Tuesday Afternoon" and "Question." Hayward has most recently been involved with the Blue Jays project for which he wrote the hit "Blue Guitar."

His debut album was produced by Moody Blue producer Tony Clarke, and Hayward formed a group of his own for the LP recording and some showcase concerts planned for this spring.

RCA Begins Ambitious Campaign On Five LPs

LONDON — RCA has started 1977 here with promotion campaigns on five varied albums by Elvis Presley, Jefferson Airplane, David Bowie, Jack Jones and The Band of the Coldstream Guards.

The Presley LP, entitled "Elvis In Demand," is a special compilation using suggested tracks from the official Presley UK fan club, and includes his latest single hit "Suspicion." RCA has organized 200 window displays around the country, plus window stickers and heavy consumer press advertising.

Jefferson Airplane's "Flight Log 1966-76" on the Grunt label is a double album with booklet insert and is being pushed with rock press advertising and selected spots on Capital Radio, Radio Clyde and Piccadilly Radio. "Low" by David Bowie is being backed by 300 window displays, posters and extensive press advertising.

"The Full Life" by Jack Jones is receiving specific MOR exploitation with advertisements in the large circulation *Radio Times* and *Woman* magazines and window and in-store displays in 200 retail outlets specializing in MOR product. "Ballet On Ice" by the Coldstream Guards Band is an album of music selected by British Olympic skater John Curry, who wrote the liner notes. It was released to coincide with the opening of Curry's ice show and London's Shaftesbury Theatre, with window displays in the London area, foyer displays and program advertisements at the theatre and advertising in the London evening press and in magazines.

Smile Plans Increased Activity In New Year

TORONTO — Smile Records' Dave Coutts projects an increase in product releases in 1977, a year that marks his fifth year in the record business.

Starting the label with a private consortium behind him, and a firm belief that he could make Canadian disks pay, Coutts has released an average of three singles a year, and his success average has been 60 percent.

While his financing is blue chip, Coutts has sought to overcome cash flow hardships by instituting an aggressive publishing division which now supports a full time person in the Smile office.

Shortly before leaving for MIDEM, Coutts said that "plans are to continue to promote Canadian writers through Smile's publishing affiliates, Maple Creek/Snowberry Music and to increase the exploitation of its catalogue at home and abroad."

Three new artists are to be introduced on the Smile label this year. In terms of product, as many as 10 singles and two albums are scheduled for release with GRT Records distribution.

Everett Named Bron A&R Director

LONDON — Mike Everett has been named director of A&R for the Bron Organization by Bron directors Gerry and Lilian Bron. He will be responsible for coordinating the company's music activities, including the acquisition of songwriters for Bron Music and signing and developing new acts for Bronze Records.

Everett's music industry career began as a salesman at Philips Records, and during seven years with that company, he moved into the album A&R management, working closely with the Bron through the Vertigo label with acts such as Colosseum, Juicy Lucy and Uriah Heep. After his Philips service, Everett spent four years with RCA here as UK A&R manager and was involved with such artists as Charles Aznavour, the Sweet and Dave Edmunds. He has been in RCA's New York office for the past year as international A&R director.

His appointment is described as part of a strengthening of top management within Bron, whose signings of Scaffold, Heron and Woody Woodmansey's U-Boat mark its interest in developing new talent in tandem with its established artist roster, which includes Uriah Heep, Manfred Mann's Earth Band and Osibisa.

Direction Records Is Formed In Montreal

MONTREAL — John Williams has formed his own record company, Direction Records, with distribution to be handled in Canada by RCA Ltd., it was recently announced.

The former director of recording and publishing with CBS Disques, Montreal, Williams is planning to record French and English language artists with the intention of securing international releases. The first record from the new company will be the single by disco singer Jackie Robinson, "Pussyfootin'." The record will be released almost immediately and will be followed by an album. The release has been negotiated with Ariola, a German label that has had a considerable number of North American disco hits.

The first staff appointment at the new label is that of Michel Normandeau as executive assistant to the president. Until recently, Normandeau was a member of Harmonium, one of Quebec's most successful groups.

Normandeau and Williams will administer two new publishing companies formed by Direction — One Way Music, affiliated with CAPAC, and No Turns Music (BMIC).

Four Seasons Go Gold

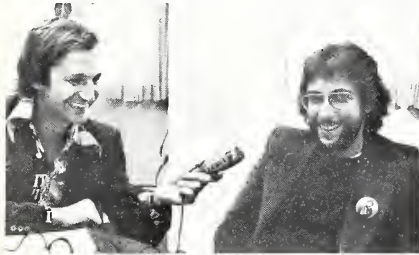
EMI Pays Sex Pistols

LONDON — Controversial punk rock group the Sex Pistols have received a 50,000 pound pay-off from EMI following the company's decision to terminate its contract with the group.

Pistols manager Malcolm McLaren said, "We came to a mutual agreement, but we have got neither a penny more nor less than we were due."

The group received 30,000 pounds, according to McLaren, when it signed with EMI last October. The balance was due over the next two years, but has presumably been paid off now in recognition of the contract's severance. McLaren added that there has not been a "settlement" with EMI but "a fulfillment of obligations."

The Sex Pistols hit the headlines just before Christmas when they bombarded TV host Bill Grundy with a stream of obscenities, and the final breaking point for EMI came when the four-man group spat and vomited at London Airport.

NEW YORK — Jonathan Clyde has joined WEA in the U.K. as label manager of Elektra/Asylum. He replaces Ian Gurney who has left the company. Clyde was previously with Elektra/Asylum, where he was label manager from September 1971 to June 1974. Since then he has been responsible for running Dark Horse Records in the UK.

Argentinian News

BUENOS AIRES — Jorge Embon, president of Arfon Records, recently reported to **Cash Box** that his company is planning to expand its activities during 1977 on the basis of new local recordings, some of which will be for regional markets. Embon prefers to record locally, instead of representing foreign labels because of the value attained by the catalog he may control for other markets. Arfon is based in Buenos Aires in its own building, which will in the future also house recording studios.

Carmusic Records president Laura Roma Casella is also reporting expansion plans for this year, including a strong local cast and an entry into the rock music field, which currently accounts for a good percentage of total sales. Carmusic recently signed singer Daniel Patino, whose first recording reached top 100 status at the end of 1976.

AMI's Electronic Coin System

AMI designed the chip based upon close cooperation with Mars Money Systems and working from written specifications and a list of functions for each of the microcircuit's 40 pins. AMI then developed the logic and circuit design.

In considering the choice of custom, and the associated costs of tooling and development, Heiman says the volume anticipated will amortize those costs sufficiently to keep unit costs low.

"Our system, which is physically and electrically interchangeable with mechanical changers presently in use on most vending machines, is being marketed in the U.S., Europe and Japan. We will use enough chips to warrant the custom design," he said.

Large Chip

The AMI chip, containing 3500 transistors, is relatively large by microcircuit standards: .194 x .198 inches. It uses an LSI/MOS technology called Ion Implanted PMOS, a highly developed process that is well tested and economical. The chip includes a one-bit microprocessor that keeps track of the money calculations. A programmable ROM is included in the system that permits adaptation to any coin system in the world. The system adapts to multi-price machines and the LSI chip can be factory-programmed for any combination of up to 63 prices from \$0.05 to \$3.15. When the customer makes a selection, a

binary-coded signal is generated which indicates to the LSI chip the price of the selection.

The sensor self-calibration feature works as follows: the chip receives the three validation inputs and can consider what to do if two of them indicate the coin is acceptable and one dissents. Since temperature changes can cause slight variations in frequency, the system permits the tolerances for acceptability in the third parameter to be adjusted slightly for subsequent coins.

The LSI chip also credits and accumulates the coins deposited, compares this with the price set for the selected item, and signals the vending cycle when the appropriate deposits are made. If the coin return tubes to make the necessary change are empty as indicated by a sensor connected to the chip, the chip calculates whether the correct change can be produced with available coins. If not, the vend is not made, coins are returned, and the "Exact Change" indicator is lit.

The LSI chip is also designed to accept the dollar coin. When the newest coins are introduced, the system is preprogrammed for them and the sensors need only be tuned to accommodate them.

AMI is one of the world's leading suppliers of MOS microcircuits, including custom, standard, and memory types. The company is in the components business only and does not compete with its customers' end products.

tion or good family background did not ensure honesty.

Electronic Registration

He said he has instituted electronic registration, providing unit counts and total sales volumes. These, he said, are regularly compared with inventory forms filled out by record clerks when the merchandise arrives. "If we see a shortage of 400 albums, we know it's got to be shoplifting," he said. However, small shortages could be the result of an error in counting inventory, he added.

Tom Roos, merchandise coordinator for Record Bar's 73 stores, said the average Record Bar unit had only eight or 10 workers and is not nearly large enough to justify security personnel or elaborate electronic surveillance systems. Still, Roos said, the chain had made limited headway in controlling employee theft by checking references more carefully and, in general, being more conscious of the problem. He said quarterly inventories were effective in determining shortages, but were of no use in pinpointing the cause. Record Bar experiences a two or three percent average shortage, he said.

Roos pointed out that most stores announce their inventories several days in advance in order to have all employees there

on those days. In the case of one chain, however, personnel from headquarters descend on each store, which might have at least some benefit in not giving dishonest employees the chance to cover their tracks.

Still, Roos said, "I can't see where not announcing inventories is going to have much effect on thefts."

Stan Goman, manager of a Tower Records store in Los Angeles, said, "In my personal case, I'm not that concerned." He said while he wouldn't absolutely state that none of his 32 employees had ever taken a record, "I don't think we have a problem with employees." He said the store employs security guards and has been checking in-store inventory counts against an audited inventory performed last October. Goman said consumer shoplifting did present a problem, but a number of thieves had been caught stealing records.

All surveyed retailers stated that the best way to control theft was a year-round security system, but with the constantly rising sophistication of record thieves, even those systems left something to be desired.

"If an employee is consistently robbing you blind, there are ample ways to find out," one merchandise executive said. "But we've found some employees working with customers. It's very difficult to stop that kind of thing."

Peter Pan Store Sales Reach All-Time High

LOS ANGELES — Sales at Peter Pan Records, a leader in sales of children's records and book/record sets, are at an all-time high, according to Martin Kasen, president of the firm. Kasen said Peter Pan has achieved this plateau by capitalizing on the trends in children's product.

The exclusive rights to "Super Heroes" were recently acquired and added to the firm's current lineup which includes "Six Million Dollar Man," "Batman," "Spiderman," "Conan," "Superman," "Space 1999" and "Star Trek." Peter Pan has been using TV advertising in selected markets,

resulting in an increase in sales in those markets. Plans are for the company to expand its line to take further advantage of consumer acceptance

Elton John Sets 1st Network TV Special

LOS ANGELES — MCA Rocket recording artist Elton John will star in his first network television special, "An Evening With Elton John," February 3 on ABC.

The 90-minute special was filmed "live" in Scotland in February, 1976, at the Royal Edinburgh Festival.
