GUEST EDITORIAL

Reaching The Yuppie Home Video Market

We hear a great deal of talk lately from economists, the media and Madison Avenue about the "Yuppie" market and how it is the most sought-after segment of the consumer population. The home video industry is just as eager to secure its share of this lucrative trade as is any other enterprise.

We have been conditioned to think of the Yuppie market as a vast pool of college educated, pin-striped professionals. But the true Yuppie "generation" is composed not only of this stereotype, but also of a large number of people involved in technical and trade areas. These individuals, like their business counterparts, are educated, issue conscious and reside in households supported by two substantial incomes. The significance of this second group is that when they are included within the Yuppie market, they form an enormous mass of consumers, making the actual Yuppie market two or three times larger than originally estimated.

Within both these groups there tends to be a more equalized sharing of responsibilities and greater involvement by each family partner in the cultural and social activities of the home. These activities include an increasing awareness of the amount and quality of television/VCR programming they and their children watch.

Having themselves been brought up on network television's violent action shows and often superficial sitcoms, this generation also experienced the "Golden Age" of television, with the result that they are more critical of both television and video programming. They are also beginning to realize the potential of the VCR to do more than just entertain. After years of seeing their children steeped in "Rambo"-type cartoons and "Gobot" videos, discriminating Yuppie parents

are starting to think: "Wouldn't it be great if there was a way to introduce the classics, say a Jack London or a Rudyard Kipling, to my kids through the VCR."

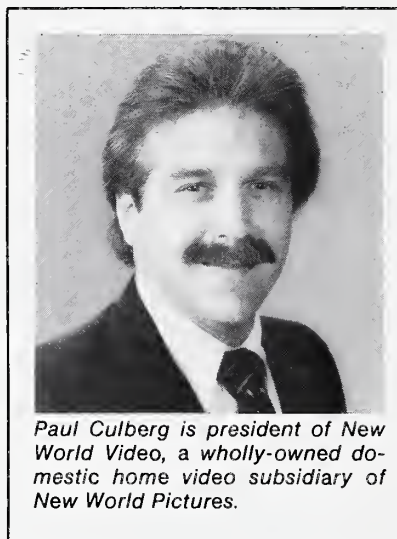
So what does this mean to the video producer? It should tell us that Yuppie customers are beginning to seek alternatives to straight theatrical video offerings. In order to accommodate these expanding tastes which will open new avenues in the home video market, we must begin to provide a broader range of home video titles. This is not to say that there still isn't an enormous market for theatrical releases. There is and always will be. We shouldn't, however, limit ourselves to just this area.

Another key to how well we tap into this Yuppie market depends on our ability to produce quality programming, programming that can entertain and stimulate.

Economics will also have a strong impact on our opportunities in this market. For years market researchers have been telling us that because of the two-income household, there is now more expendable income for entertainment. But there are also more entertainment pursuits competing for these dollars. Should we see a movie, go out to dinner or rent a videocassette? The cost of each option may be the deciding factor. To get the competitive edge, we could offer video titles, especially non-theatrical titles, at a lower price point than the entertainment titles of the past. We should anticipate

that this, along with an attractive selection of releases, would influence the consumer to take this home video option.


There is a large and hungry audience out there, an audience that is more involved, more aware and more media savvy than ever before. We are just beginning to scratch the surface of the needs of this Yuppie market. How we react to their buying trends and potential buying trends will determine how we prosper and progress as an industry.

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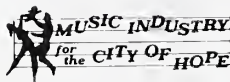

MCA Acquires Front Line Facility, Full Moon Also Bought; New Azoff Pact

LOS ANGELES — Sid Sheinberg, president and chief operating officer of MCA Inc. announced last week that MCA will acquire all of the stock of Front Line Management, Facility Merchandising, Inc. and Full Moon Records in exchange for MCA Inc. common stock. The acquisition represents MCA Records and Music Group's entry into personal management of musical entertainers, the vending of novelty items in venues nationwide and additional involvement in recorded music.

Sheinberg also announced that Irving Azoff, president of MCA Records and Music Group and one of the principals of the acquired companies, will enter into a new long-term pact with MCA Inc. and will oversee the new acquisitions.

Front Line Management currently represents some of the top contemporary music artists including Don Henley, Heart, Chicago, Stevie Nicks, Dan Fogelberg, Jimmy Buffett, Michael McDonald and Boz Scaggs. Howard Kaufman, another principal of the acquired companies, will enter into a long-term agreement with MCA and continues as president of Front Line Management reporting directly to Azoff.

Facility Merchandising, Inc. handles

novelty vending rights in over 25 venues nationwide and was partnered in a successful venture with MCA Inc. for the vending rights to the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics.

Full moon records includes on its roster Chicago and Peter Cetera. Warner Bros. Records will continue to exclusively manufacture, market and distribute Full moon products worldwide.

TV Stations Ordered To Pay BMI

NEW YORK — In an order handed down May 6 by Judge Lee P. Gagliardi of the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, local television stations that have been delinquent in making retroactive music payments to BMI have been ordered to report and or pay these fees covering the period from February 1, 1983 to November 16, 1984. This was the 22-month period during

which the Buffalo Broadcasting case was being appealed. In addition, Judge Gagliardi ordered that local stations which had not paid the music fees by January 31, 1986, also pay interest at the rate of nine percent per year.

It was on May 13, 1985 that Judge Gagliardi granted BMI a retroactive adjustment of licensing fees. At the time of the decision, BMI president Edward M. Cramer estimated perhaps as much as \$30 million in retroactive fees might be forthcoming.

Working with the All-Industry TV Com-

Westwood One Settles Amway Suit

LOS ANGELES — The lawsuit filed by Westwood One, owners of the Mutual Broadcasting System (MBS), against Amway, former owners of Mutual, was recently settled in Los Angeles Superior Court, it has been reported.

Exact terms of the settlement have not been disclosed, but are expected to be filed with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Westwood One, which acquired the

nation's largest radio network, from Amway in December of 1985, filed suit against the Ada, Mich.-based supplier of toiletries and other household products

Whitney Houston, whose self-titled debut once before topped the album chart, has prevailed in a battle with Van Halen's "5150" and regained the No. 1 position. Her album has been on the chart 60 weeks! Van Halen's a mere six. The only other albums in the Top 50 that have been on longer than "Whitney Houston" are "No Jacket

Required" (63 weeks) by Phil Collins and Bruce Springsteen's "Born In The U.S.A." (99 weeks).

Half of the records in the Top 10 of the album chart are fairly new, though. Records released within the last six weeks that have climbed into the Top 10 are: "5150" by Van Halen; Prince's "Parade"; "Dirty Work" by The Rolling

Nestor Int'l In CD Venture

LOS ANGELES — Tom Nestor, president of Nestor International Corp. in Long Island, New York, has announced plans to build a compact disc manufacturing facility in Long Island. The plant is expected to be on line by December, 1986 with an initial disc manufacturing capacity of 10 million discs per month, to be doubled by the fourth quarter, 1987. The venture, called Nestor International Compact Disc Facility (NICD) will be producing both audio and video ROM discs as well as interactive discs. NICD will be aligned closely with MicroNest International, a sister company, with interests in hard software development.

New Orleans Fest: Jambalaya, Crawfish Pie & Music, Music, Music

NEW ORLEANS — Twenty-year-old Yvette Brunet was bored at this year's New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival and she didn't mind admitting it to a reporter from the *New Orleans Times-Picayune*: "There's not much to do," said Ms. Brunet, "unless you want to listen to music and eat."

It seemed to me that most of the 200,000 or so other people who jammed the infield of New Orleans' Fairgrounds Racetrack over the five days of the outdoor portion of the Jazz & Heritage Festival were unusually content to listen to music and eat. After all, they had over 260 different acts to choose from over the five days and over 100 different forms of food and beverage. They also had some 130 different crafts sellers to shop from, if, like Yvette Brunet, they got too bored to listen and eat.

The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival — this was the 17th — is unique among such events in the world: 10 stages go full-tilt from 11 in the morning until 7 in the evening; tickets for a full day can be had for a mere six bucks; and the whole thing is run not-for-profit. Quint Davis is the producer and George Wein, the grand poobah of jazz festivals, is the executive producer.

Now there are two ways to approach the Jazz & Heritage Festival (I should point out that there are also evening concerts — in clubs, concert halls, and on a riverboat — but I won't concern myself with them here). One can taste — a little zydeco here, a little barbecued alligator there — or one can partake heartily — a full set of Stevie Ray Vaughn here, a full portion of the Second Mt. Triumph Missionary Baptist Church's fried chicken there. I did both — catching glimpses and noshes at times, zeroing in on full performances and groaning plates at other times. There's no space to describe everything, but suffice it to say, I didn't go from New York to Louisiana to hear jazz, any more than I'd expect somebody to make the reverse trip for the crawfish. I spent most of my time listening to zydeco, Cajun music, blues, gospel and rhythm and blues (New Orleans has to be the last place on earth where rhythm

and blues means what it did 30 years ago. Some of the last of the great soul singers — Ernie K-Doe, Clarence "Frogman" Henry and, particularly, Johnny Adams and Aaron Neville — still sing things like "Searchin'" and "Ain't It The Truth" down there). In fact, jazz is only a small part — maybe 20 percent — of

BUSINESS NOTES

Cleveland Chosen As Home For Rock And Roll Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK — Cleveland, Ohio has been conditionally chosen as the home for the permanent facilities of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. The announcement was made May 5 by Ahmet Ertegun, chairman of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame Foundation, at a news conference at Atlantic Records' New York headquarters attended by Cleveland Mayor George V. Voinovich, Ohio Governor Richard F. Celeste, United States Congresswoman Mary Rose Oaker, other city and state officials, and Foundation board members and music industry leaders.

The selection is contingent upon the fulfillment by the city of Cleveland of several conditions within the next few months, including securing an acceptable site and providing firm commitments for funds to cover construction costs and an endowment for the Hall of Fame, Ertegun said.

The completed Hall of Fame will house a library, an archive and museum, and an auditorium for rock and roll performances, films and lectures. Within the next few months, the Foundation will conduct an architectural design competition to select an architect for the Hall of Fame. Details will be announced in the near future.

"After months of research, we're confident that we have made the best possible selection for a permanent home for the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame," Ertegun said. "As we all know, rock and roll did not emerge in just one place at one time, and Cleveland has played as significant a role as many other cities in the development of this music. We listened to proposals from a gratifying number of cities, but from the outset, the city of Cleveland has shown a level of enthusiasm and commitment that made it the clear choice."

USA For Africa Makes Grant Of Nearly \$3 Million

LOS ANGELES — United Support of Artists for Africa (USA For Africa) has announced domestic grants totalling \$2,965,000 to three national organizations and 69 local and state agencies. This is the second series of domestic grants announced by the foundation formed in 1985 to distribute the proceeds from the recording, "We Are The World." Ten percent of the funds generated from the record and related projects is designated for relief, recovery and development projects in the United States.

A total of \$345,000 was awarded to three national programs: Advertising Council Food Stamp Project (\$50,000); Food Research and Action Center, National Food Network/Training Project (\$150,000) and Center on Budget and Policy Priorities (\$145,000).

The 69 state and local organizations receiving grants offer a variety of programs relevant to both the hunger and homelessness issues in urban as well as rural areas.

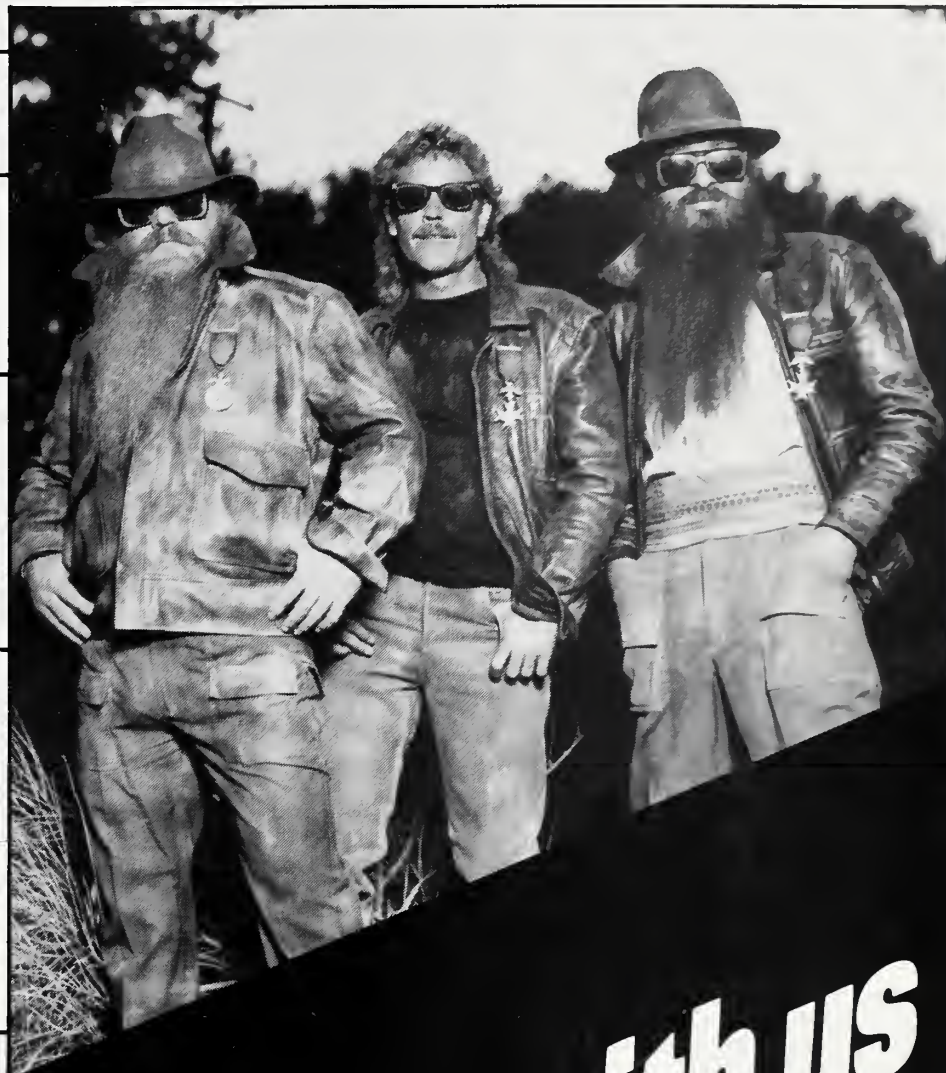
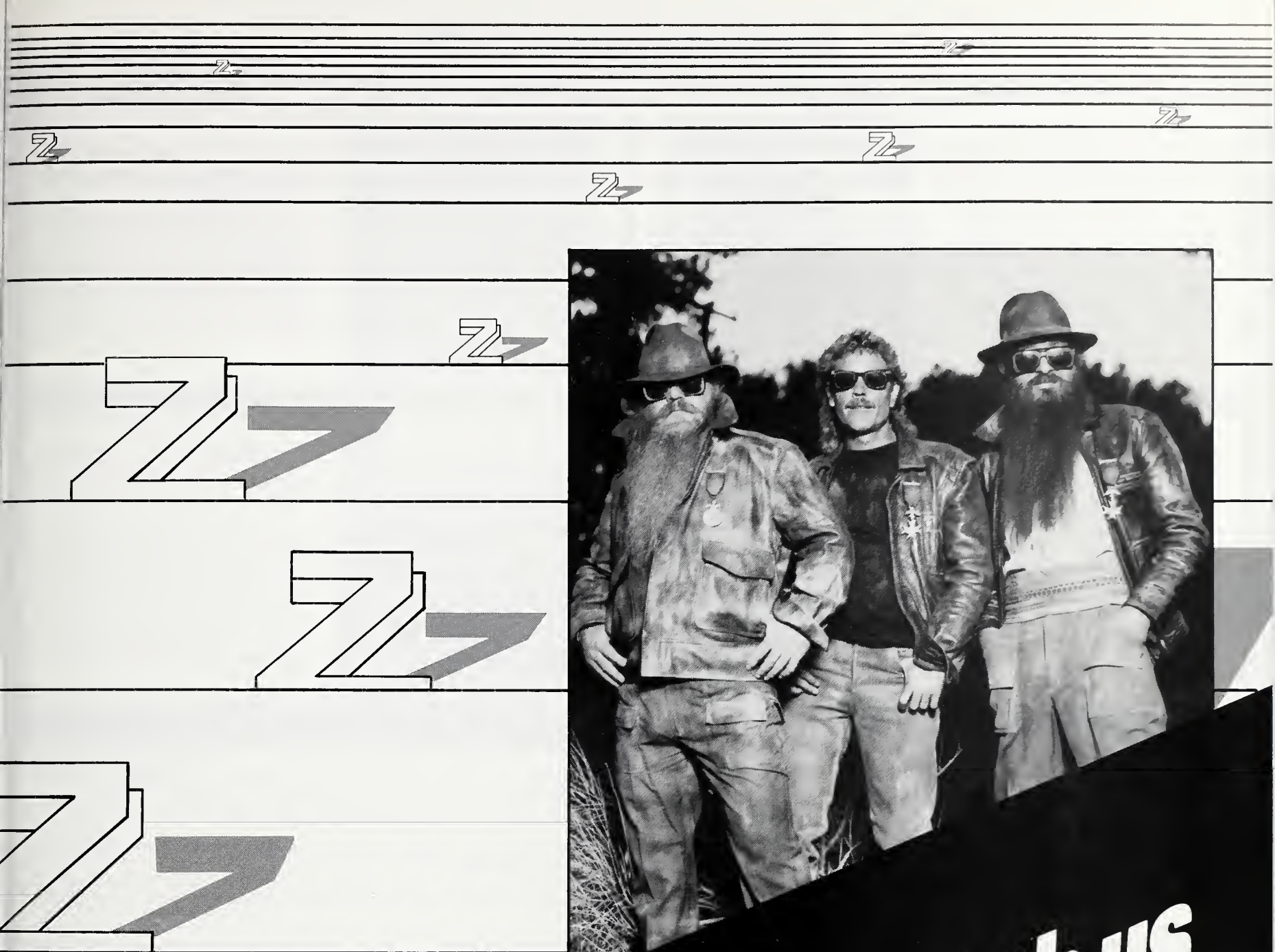

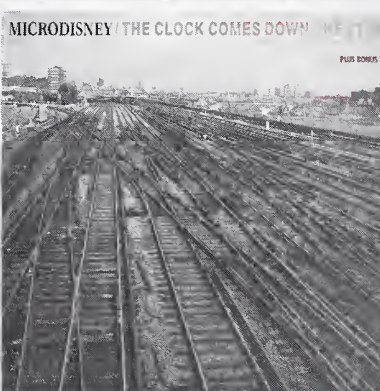

THE PANEL COULDN'T REED — It was the finale of the **Music Business Symposium** — a gathering of artists, producers and industry gunslingers under the title, "The Role Of Music And Media." Sitting on the stage in front of about 100 people at L.A.'s Ambassador Hotel were: producer/manager **David Rubinson**; publicity mogul **Howard Bloom**; L.A. *Herald Examiner* pop music critic, **Mika Gilmore**; *BAM Magazine* publisher **Dennis Erok**; NARAS president **Mike Greene**; Columbia recording artist **LL Cool J**; RCA recording artist **Lou Reed** and the moderator, **Al Kooper** (filling for no-show **Bob Guccione Jr.**) who told the audience, "Please don't ask any stupid questions." What promised to be an interesting, if not chaotic, discussion on a variety of topics, turned into a long, sometimes humorous, sometimes ridiculous discussion on one overly discussed topic: **The PMRC** and the record industry. On one hand you had panelists complaining about the lack of leadership on the part of anyone in the industry and on the other you had Mike Greene advising someone in the audience to contact **Stanley Gortikov** of the RIAA for complete and thorough details on the subject ("That's the R-I-A- what?," the person inquired). Other highlights of the 90-minute session included about four minutes of Lou Reed noting that he doesn't like snuff films or child pornography but he would

let his own children listen to his early music. Reed, unfortunately, was never heard from again, though all the other panelists seemed to pay him homage through their comments. Reed just kind of sat there, wire rim aviator sunglasses and black leather jacket perfectly in place. He was definitely cool to look at. Speaking of cool, LL Cool J had his own four minutes and he used it to tell us that if it ever came down to changing his lyrics or not having a record put out, he'd "bootleg the album and send it to my fans." But that was it for LL (or is it Cool J?). The rest of the time was taken up by (quite frankly) the people the audience didn't come to hear. That's not to say they didn't make cogent and viable comments — it's just that after a while nobody cared (especially Reed, who looked like a rock and roll animal caged too long in the basement of the Ambassador). By the time somebody asked if the subject could be changed, it was too late — his was to be the last question fielded by the panel. Time was up. The panel was over, the symposium was over and the people who were left in the room were free to go. Oh well, maybe next year — just don't expect Lou Reed.

SHORT CUTS — The House of Representatives has passed and sent to the Senate a bill authorizing the minting of a gold medal in honor of the late **Harry Chapin**. The legislation authorizes \$20,000 for the production of gold medals. Chapin, who died in an auto accident in 1981 led a massive anti-hunger drive throughout his career . . . **Reflex Records** will soon be releasing the new **Aztec Two-Step** record (remember them?). "Living In America" should be out later this month . . . **The Fabulous Thunderbirds** will give a benefit concert at the Oregon State Penitentiary on May 20. The facility holds 1,750 maximum security prisoners (including 300 lifers) . . . **Allied Artists Records** is planning to create chaos in Santa Monica as it has announced a "Talent Search" at **At My Place** on May 13. Held in conjunction with the National Academy of Songwriters, the label is looking for "compositions in the areas of pop, r&b, rock, dance and ballads." More info can be had by calling (213) 463-7178 . . . On Wednesday May 14 **Chief Commander Ebenezer Obey and his Interreformers Band** will take the stage of L.A.'s **Music Machine**. Some people call it Maliki, some call it Juju, we'll just call it a guaranteed sell out . . . **Margie Evans**, who has become national spokesperson for the blues, will be the recipient of the Gertrude Gipson Community Achievement Award on Monday May 12 at the **Pied Piper** nightclub in Los Angeles. The charismatic singer also landed a part with **Lauren Hutton** in the film, *From Here To Maternity* . . . CBS recording artist **Joe Zawinul** brings his "one man improv-

ising orchestra" to the **Beverly Theatre** on May 23. The show is in support of his first solo record in 15 years, "Dialects" . . . And finally, we hear **X** will be making a rare club appearance at a westside club on Thursday May 15.

NEW FACES TO WATCH

Glen Burtnick remembers playing *The Stone Pony* in Asbury Park, N.J. recently when Bruce Springsteen dropped by to jam. "We were doing 'Twist and Shout' and he sang a verse and he goes 'take it, Glen' and I go 'oh sh*t,'" says Burtnick. "I mean, how do you follow a guy with a voice that big?" With an album called "Talking In Code" (A&M), that's how.

But let's not slot Burtnick as a Bruce clone. Though he's a product of the Jersey shore scene (he was a member of *La Bamba* and *The Hubcaps*), he's got a made-for-AOR-sound that's unmistakably his own. He's also one musician who's confident enough to admit that he uses computerized drums and anything else at his disposal for that matter.

In fact, one of "Talking In Code" 's two ballads, "Perfect World," might well go down in rock history as the first song written on a telephone answering machine. Burtnick brought songwriter Steve Krikorian to his L.A. hotel room last year and strummed him a melody he had written; Krikorian wanted to bring the song home to add lyrics but they didn't have a tape recorder. Solution: Burtnick sang the song into Krikorian's telephone answering machine. The next day Krikorian left lyrics on Burtnick's machine. A week later Burtnick played a revised version of the song into Krikorian's machine. "We ended up meeting each other only once in the beginning and once in the end," says Burtnick, "but really the entire song was written over the phone."

Burtnick likes to keep his romantic ballads few and far between though. "It makes them stand out more that way, as opposed to having 10 songs about broken hearts," he says. Instead, Burtnick sings and writes about less-sung subjects. "Hole In My Pocket," for example, "is about misplacing time — something that happens to everybody," he says. "Time is something that stretches and condenses and

compresses . . . I really celebrate when I write a song I'm happy about that says something but that's not about love."

Burtnick has been an inside secret in the music business for some time now. In addition to his *La Bamba* stint, he's co-written with Marshall Crenshaw (on "I Hate Disco Music") and Cyndi Lauper. Now, "Talking In Code" lets us all share that secret. The album's first single is "Little Red House," a mid-tempo rocker that is far from typical Burtnick, given his broad stylistic range, and this is perhaps indicative of a musical personality that readily absorbs the aural world around him.

"When I was a kid I went through some heavy stages with different artists where I'd (play their records) and lose my identity for an afternoon," he says. Which perhaps explains why Burtnick's never seen Bruce Springsteen — the patron saint of the Asbury Park scene — in concert. "I've been over to Springsteen's house but I've never seen the guy live," admits Burtnick. And because *The Boss* might be too big an influence, Burtnick "plans to keep it that way, to tell you the truth."

Michael Jackson Becomes A Pepsi Recording Artist (Again)

NEW YORK — Michael Jackson will appear in and help create Pepsi-Cola television advertisements again, Pepsi USA president and CEO Roger Enrico announced at a May 6 press conference. Jackson will collaborate with Pepsi on a minimum of three TV commercials, one of them in Spanish, which will be aired internationally in 1987. Pepsi, in turn, will help promote Jackson's new album, slated for fall release.

Enrico called the agreement the "most far-reaching . . . ever made between a corporation and a performing artist" (Pepsi's sponsorship of 1984's "Victory" tour was a national, not an international, venture.). As part of the agreement, Jackson will write two pieces of music for Pepsi, will serve as a creative consultant for Pepsi in 1988, and may direct an ad as well. "He's already working with us on some of the most dynamite advertising concepts we've ever seen," said Enrico, calling Jackson "our most dynamite entertainer."

Still, Enrico shied away from terming the promotional pact an 'endorsement'. "I think endorsements are old hat and out of touch with what's going on," he said. He also denied reports that Jackson is being paid \$15 million in the deal. Enrico said the actual figure is "less than \$15 million and more than \$5 million" and "is the most money paid for any" such

agreement.

Jackson, wearing his patented Sergeant Peppers' jacket and sunglasses, appeared on the Red Parrot stage and thanked everybody in a sixteen-word statement. "Why are you doing this, Michael?" one reporter asked Jackson as a cart of some 65 advertising awards was rolled out for the photo session. Jackson, looking embarrassed, turned his back to the audience. Enrico cut in quickly with talk about the awards. The question was not answered.

Jackson's manager, Frank DiLeo, announcing that his "client had already left the building," then answered questions with Enrico. DiLeo, chomping on a large, unlit cigar, said that "we're working on" the new Jackson album but could not confirm a release date. Any tour plans, he said, would be decided upon after the LP's completion.

Also under wraps is a Jackson video which was screened at the press conference but will not be released to the public because, according to Enrico, "it's comprised mostly of footage from Michael's personal library (and) we don't have clearance for its release." The video begins with a clip of the Jackson Five singing "I Want You Back," cuts to a split screen that juxtaposes Jackson, winning about a dozen awards, with a lip-synced version of "Billie Jean." It ends with

Joe Cocker: With The Mad Dogs In The Past, The Englishman Rolls On

NEW YORK — It is probably hard to forget the first time you saw Joe Cocker perform — whether it was live or in the *Woodstock* movie; the contorted face; the ceaseless hands — playing an unseen guitar one minute, grasping frantically at sweat-soaked strings of hair the next; the voice that sounded like Ray Charles soaked in bourbon. He scared the hell out of some people — his spastic motions, those bulging eyes. It had to be a put on: this little Englishman who sounded blacker than Solomon Burke and acted on stage like a man with St. Vitus' dance.

But it wasn't a put on. In the North England steeltown of Sheffield, Joe Cocker lived and breathed Ray Charles, and other great American soul and blues singers, until he turned himself into an original — a gravelly voiced rock and roll interpreter with Ray Charles' ability to weave dross into gold. When, after several years of singing in England, Cocker hit the Woodstock Festival, he was a seasoned — and quite unique — performer. And when he teamed up with Leon Russell — the appropriately chapeaued Mad Hatter with the silver beard — musical hell broke loose. They were a wild team in the early '70s — the small, seemingly-shy Cocker doing the singing, the snake-oily Russell doing the writing, arranging, producing, and general ringleading. Lots of drinking, some fighting, the stereotypical post-'60s rock and roll bacchanal — the "Mad Dogs and Englishmen" tour, immortalized on film, on disc, and on scarred hotel room walls around the world.

Yet that was all years ago. In 1986 — 11 albums under his belt — Joe Cocker is still very much with us. Because, in some odd way, Joe Cocker is a classic.

"I give my heart to my audience," he says, "Without music there isn't much left of me. In my mind, I'm constantly thinking music. Without it, I'm a lost soul."

It isn't hard to believe. Joe Cocker's soul

is right on his sleeve, and on his latest Capitol LP, "Cocker," he sings with the same intensity, the same heart-and-throat-wrenching power that he first displayed all those years ago when he first gyrated into view singing "With A Little Help From My Friends." "Shelter Me," the LP's first single — the one with that dynamic black-and-white video — has it. Randy Newman's "You Can Leave Your Hat On," the LP's second single, has it as well.

"I still get a little crazy," says the mellowed Englishman, "but I am taking it easier. I'm not quite as berserk as I used to be. I try to pace myself now."

"Joe Cocker is looked upon, for a lot of reasons, as one of the priorities of the roster," says Don Grierson, vice president, A&R, for Capitol Records. "He, of course, is a legend in his own time and we all think of him as a great artist. He's had some controversial images in his life, of course — all the drinking and all that stuff — but he's in very good shape, very healthy now, and very serious about his career."

Grierson says that "Cocker" took an unusually long time to make — finding the right material for the unique Cocker voice was a chore. What Grierson calls "the easy way out" — letting the great interpretive singer fill up a disc of great interpretations of songs by the great rock writers — was never considered.

"You can't survive in today's mainstream, such as it is, if you just do that," says Grierson. "He's got to stand up and be, as he is personally, an original — he's got to stand up with an original record. I said, 'If we're going to do this, Joe, we've got to be serious about competing with the Top 10 in the country, and in the world.' And he's ready for that — it's just finding the songs that work for Joe as a singer and an artist, and are honest, and, at the same time, finding something that has the potential of cutting through and being a hit."

ON THE WATERFRONT — The pigeons got out of line at the Waterfront Marathon band fest in uptown Hoboken May 4. One pigeon, a stout, anti-social looking thing, splattered a "Dance Fever in Jersey City" ad in the *Hudson Reporter* I was reading. "Bummer," some guy remarked. But things got worse. The pigeons reached critical mass by 4:30 pm when the headliners, **The Cucumbers** (Fake Doom Records), took the stage. The Cukes retaliated with a great song called "Birds" during which drummer **Yuergen Renner** whistled like one. After the song, guitarist **Jon Fried** spoke to the avidly anti-bird crowd: "There was a whole flock of birds flying over Washington Street when we did that song. Hey (addressing the birds) we were only kidding." "Birds" was the high point of a seven-hour, nine-band extravaganza which featured the roaring guitar rock of **The Wygals**, the spare country sounds of **77 Sunset Strip**, would-be Brits **Rula Lenzka**, the **R.E. Mish Desk Set**, the Brazil-'66-meets-Beatles-'65 songs of **The Wayfarers**, and the straight-ahead rock of **Yo La Tengo**. The surprise of the day, though, came from the relatively unknown **Tiny Lights**. Their forty-minute set mixed **Jane Scarpantoni's** cello playing and **Donna Croughn's** violin riffing with a folk-rockish backbeat, recalling **The Ordinaires**, early **Dionne Warwick**, and **The Zombies**. When **Tiny Lights** stuck to the cello-violin mix,

as on "Painted Skies," they were evocative and impressionistic — and their ballsy cover of **The Beatles'** "Helter Skelter" was on-target. Third-billed **77 Sunset Strip** also played a notable set; this trio's smooth three-part harmonies provided just the right tone for their sparkling lyrics, especially in songs like "Give Yourself A Chance" and "Time Has A Way Of Opening Our Eyes." **The Wygals** got straight to the point with an unabashed rock 'n roll set that was propelled by **Eric Peterson's** raging guitar backing. But the day belonged, as expected, to **The Cucumbers** who gracefully overcame sound problems to put on a playful, exuberant, and inventive 40 minute set. Lead singer **Deena Shoskes** exuded a vulnerable sexuality as she sang "If This Isn't Love," and guitarist **Jon Fried** added inimitable rhythmic textures. The Cukes closed the Waterfront Fest (which wasn't really on the waterfront at all) with their new single, a steady, knock-out cover of **Elvis Presley's** "All Shook Up." People smiled and danced. Birds flew all around.

WHOLE LOTTA ZEP — Everybody seems to be rediscovering **Led Zeppelin** lately; not a week goes by when some band doesn't do a Zep cover tune. At the Hoboken Waterfront Fest, **Rula Lenzka** closed with "The Immigrant Song." At the Ritz March 8, **The Golden Palominos** encored with "Misty Mountain Hop." **Kiss**, April 11 at the Meadowlands, encored with "Whole Lotta Love." **The Ordinaires**, at CBGB's April 19, closed with "Kashmir." **Camper Van Beethoven** even threw in a couple of bars of "Communication Breakdown" at Folk City March 12. And during their recent tour, **The Replacements** covered "Heartbreaker." What's next? An all-Zeppelin radio station? A club catering exclusively to Zep cover bands? No. Nothing short of a reunion would satisfy this appetite.

Small Things Considered

LOS ANGELES — I sat quietly observing a seven-year-old girl named Marsha Ann and a 10-year-old boy named Jason, glued with their ears to the radio. I observed their movements, which ran the gamut from slow and deliberate to anticipatory excitement. I focused in on their eyes that darted about, but always returned back to the radio. I got caught up in their excitement of self expression to compete, to participate and to absorb. However, most important I caught myself becoming wrapped up on the greatest children's radio program I had ever heard or envisioned in my mind.

Allow me to present "Kids America." What is Kids America? Allow me to fill you in on this outstanding program. In January 1984, New York public radio WNYC launched an ambitious, live week-day program designed to capture and hold the attention of a largely untapped audience — children, aged six to 12. "Kids America" (formerly titled: "Small Things Considered") quickly became an overwhelming success. It not only attracted youngsters but it hooked their parents along with other adults.

"Kids America" is under the direction of radio producer Keith Talbot and hosts Kathy O'Connell and Larry Orfaly. "Kids America" stimulates interest and imagination. Each program is a lively, 90-minute mix of music, creative sound effects, games and special call-in features on various themes.

The telephone provides a linkage between the audience and the hosts through the use of an 800 number. This 800 number gives the listener an opportunity to participate and communicate with some of the special guests. (Written correspondence is also used). What guests? you ask. Let's start with the star of "Martha's Mishaps," obviously Martha. During this *live* soap opera for children (yes I did say soap opera), Martha's "problem of the week" is dramatized with sound effects and music. Listeners call in and offer advice to help Martha solve her dilemma.

Paging Dr. Book is a takeoff on Dr. Ruth Westheimer. "Dr. Rita Book" offers "reading remedies" for all situations. Books are prescribed for young readers who want to improve their reading skills or need advice on a special problem.

How about "Duke of Words" (isn't this great). This world traveler conducts a weekly spelling bee, using words that relate to his most recent journey. Then, the tables are turned and the "Duke of Words" is quizzed by listeners during "Stump The Duke."

For the more cosmically inclined, meet "Xeno the Alien." This spacy creature is lost on the planet Earth. He calls upon the "Kids America" listeners to help him figure out "where in the world" he is. Kids make use of both geography and logic when they attempt to help Xeno to figure things out.

Sure there's more, "Susan's Songs" features Susan Dias and her unique talent of writing songs on the spot with the "Kids America" audience. Listeners call in and describe themselves, a situation or event, and Susan, accompanied on the piano, weaves the information into a song, *live* on the air.

Another feature of "Kids America" is Radiovision. Here classic musical pieces are played as well as new music by composers like Brian Eno and Laurie Anderson providing the inspiration for young artists. Children listen to a selection and draw pictures or describe images evoked by the music. I call this "mind aerobics" and it's healthy!

Other entertaining educational features include: "Mystery History Guest Game,"

"Sam's Computer Games," "Pet Questions," "Kids America Listeners' Poll," "Kids America Request Countdown" and much more.

Sound too good to be true? Trust me, it's true! Testimonials to the success of this long overdue children's educational entertainment program include: The George Foster Peabody Award; The National Education Association Award, for the Advancement of Learning Through Broadcasting; Action for Children's Television (ACT) Achievement Award (that certainly speaks well of radio; San Francisco State University's Broadcast Media Award; New York State Broadcaster's Association Award and the Major Armstrong Award.

What's that? What about some kids' comments? Well, here are some very astute observations taken from the kids' correspondence that pours into WNYC weekly. Andrew, Minneapolis, Minnesota: "I listen to 'Kids America' every weekday. I enjoy Marcy, Martha and Xeno. I have played 'Book Buzz,' 'Martha's Mishaps' and 'Stump The Duke.' My teacher has a poster. I looked at it and the rest is history."; Barbie, Cincinnati, Ohio: "I listen to 'Kids America' whenever I can and I love it. I think it's neat that Susan makes a song in a couple of seconds and how the 'Duke of Words' spells real hard words." Abigail, Saderville, Kentucky: "I listen to 'Kids America' with my mom and dad each night and hope it's on the radio for a long time." Jessica, Newton, Massachusetts: "I'm a listener of 'Kids America' and I'm 9 years old. I think 'Kids America' is great and awesome. I have a question for you. How come when I have two fish in my fish tank, one of them always dies?" (I've always wanted to know that too).

Moms and dads have also become victims of this most wholesome program. S. Doremus, Boston, Massachusetts: "This 27-year-old kid from Boston, Massachusetts likes your program too! Thanks, you spark the imagination in a wonderful way." G. Socha, Minneapolis, Minnesota: "As a parent, I appreciate your program for being entertaining, imaginative and informative without "talking down" to our young people." J. Rawls, Somerville, Massachusetts: "Thank you for the way you push the importance and enjoyment of literacy, language and ideas. You're doing a real public service." P. Nokovic, Milwaukee, Wisconsin: "I teach music at Whitnall Elementary School and I am alerting all of my students to Kids Kids, Kids, 'Kids America.' Thank you for caring and creating the fantastic."

By the tone of this feature if you have not become completely aware of my personal endorsement of 'Kids America,' then obviously this feature has been stapled on the inside top of your coffin cover. This show is not for those who have no life to live, but rather for those who care and desire a better future to give to our "children's children's children" (to borrow a Moody Blues phrase).

In addition to the above thought, allow me to indulge in a bit of brain prodding antics at commercial radio. Why not investigate the remarkable rating's this program has harnessed? . . . Food for thought . . . where there are kids involved in an educational program, you are sure to find moms and pops. These moms and pops represent the "baby boomers" (25-49). Isn't it amazing how it all works in tandem.

To WNYC and Keith Talbot, you have unintentionally outsmarted commercial radio with class . . . BRAVO!

MOORE'S SATELLITE IS LAUNCHED — Pete Moore, an original member of Motown's hit making group **The Miracles**, recently held a listening party introducing his label, **Satellite Records** and its first release, "Victim" by **Denise Stewart**. Moore, the consummate professional, who co-wrote such hits as Marvin Gaye's "Ain't That Peculiar," The Miracles' "Tracks Of My Tears," and The Temptations' "Since I Lost My Baby," nurtured his label and artist for two years. Why, you ask, did it take two years to announce Satellite Records? If you know Pete Moore, then you know he will not release a piece of product until he feels it is the highest quality that can be offered to the record buying public. You might say that Pete Moore "will not release a record until it is time." Based on the enthusiastic response from the attendees at the listening party, which included a live mini performance by Denise, I would say that Pete's label and the versatility of Ms. Stewart's four and one half octave range (that range suggests influences from sources as diverse as **Barbra Streisand**, **Nancy Wilson** and **Chaka Khan** but with stylistic virtuosity that is strictly her own) have combined on a hit record that will send Satellite Records and Denise Stewart into orbit with other industry hit makers.

MAURICE TO MEMPHIS — **Maurice White**, a performer and producer with **Earth, Wind and Fire**, who has seven double-platinum albums, seven Grammy awards as well as production credits for stars like **Barbra Streisand**, **Neil Diamond** and the **Emotions**, has announced his plans to open and operate a new production company focused on the musical magic of his native city. White and songwriter **David Porter**, who was a prime force behind the rise of **Stax Records** in the '60s and '70s, will be partners in **Memphis Mecca** and are working now to affiliate the company with a major record label. Porter said, "Our thrust will be to recapture the base left open

by **Stax**." He added that developing new talent, training songwriters and publishing would also be part of any musical bonding that takes place in the city." The announcement by White and Porter gives impetus to the community wide drive to recapture the world prominence Memphis once enjoyed as the birthplace of the blues, rock and roll and rockabilly, and as a capital of the recording industry. They hope to be operational by the end of May 1986.

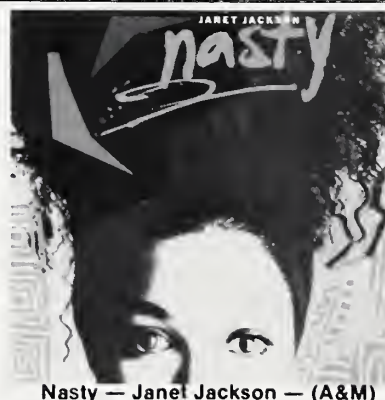

FEATURE PICKS

HOMECOMING — Eddie Harris/Ellis Marsalis — Spindletop STP-105 — Producer: David Torkanowsky

Two canny post-bop veterans in a splendid album of duets. Both pianist Marsalis and saxophonist Harris range easily over numerous moods — they can be delicate and romantic or lowdown and funky — and they both know how to push without straining; they're playing at their very best here. A pair of originals each, along with three original versions of standards, make up the tasty menu on this delightful, breezily swinging LP.

MOBO SPLASH — Kazumi Watanabe — Gramavision 18-8602-1 — Producer: Kazumi Watanabe

Kazumi Watanabe once again has his Mobo working. The dazzling electric guitarist has whipped up another slick, frenetic, exciting fusion extravaganza, featuring some hard-driving solos from a trio of saxophonists: Michael Brecker, David Sanborn and Kazutoki Umezu. This is original stuff — nobody sounds like Watanabe and few can blend as many diverse influences (traditional Japanese music, bebop, fusion, funk, etc.) into such a cohesive whole.

OUTSIDE IN — Scotty Young — Space Administration RRL 85-108 — Producer: uncredited

A pleasing neo-bop LP from Scotland-born bassist Scotty Young. The five players — Young, pianist Mark Levine, trumpeter Jerry Rusch, saxophonist Richard Aplanalp, and drummer Sherman Ferguson — are low-key soloists and the album has a cozy intimacy and warmth that is as attractive and soothing as some of Young's titles — "Heather on the Hillside," say, or "See How the Garden Grows."

SHOPWORK SHUFFLE — The Los Angeles Jazz Workshop — AM-PM AM 16 — Producers: Jim Linaoh, Bill Yeager

This is a big (over 20 pieces) huffing-puffing big band under the razor-sharp direction of Bill Yeager. Mike Daigeau contributes snappy originals (including "Mickey's Revenge," a fantasy on Walt Disney themes) and clever arrangements of standards, and the members add the spirited enthusiasm that permeates workshop bands.

ON JAZZ

Lee Jeske, New York

PAST TENSE — It just about boggles the mind: all six major labels have jazz divisions. All six! With RCA, the last hold-out, hiring veteran **Steve Backer**, the possibilities are astonishing. Not only will all of the majors be signing new acts — though I have a feeling that "new age" will outnumber jazz artists — but the moldering vaults will finally be plundered. Backer, Atlantic's **John Snyder**, and MCA's **Ricky Schultz** are going to have a lot of catching up to do in the reissue department, what with the output of vintage material from Blue Note and PolyGram. Blue Note has just chimed in with a dozen blue chip items, just about every one a hard bop jewel. They are **Dexter Gordon's** "Our Man In Paris," **Jackie**



McLean's "Let Freedom Ring," **McCoy Tyner's** "Time For Tyner," **Larry Young's** "Unity," "**Donald Byrd's** "At the Half Note Cafe Volume 1," **Sonny Rollins'** astonishing "A Night at the Village Vanguard Volume 1," **Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers** "At the Cafe Bohemia Volume 2," **Kenny Dorham's** "Round Midnight at the Cafe Bohemia Volume 1," **Kenny Burrell's** "On View at the Five Spot Cafe" (they did a lot of live recording back then, didn't they?), **Herbie Hancock's** "Takin' Off," **Lee Morgan's** "The Rumproller," and "Finger Poppin' with the **Horace Silver Quintet.**"

PolyGram, not to be outdone, has just minted a pair of twofer reissues: "20th Century Piano Genius," the phenomenal **Art Tatum** at his most relaxed and most astonishing; recorded live at a private party (formerly released, in butchered form, on 20th Century Fox); and "Lullaby of Birdland," the mellow sounds of the popular **George Shearing Quintets** of the late '40s and early '50s (formerly on MGM).

Other historic jazz recordings have just been issued: **Stash** has come up with "Birth of the Bebop — Bird on Tenor," some roughly-recorded, but awfully important, early **Charlie Parker**, along with a number of later sides. Musicraft has reissued two essential **Dizzy Gillespie** albums: "One Bass Hit," big band recordings; and "Groovin' High," sextet sides, all from '45 and '46. And **Giants of Jazz** has come out with "Birth of a Band," 1939 airchecks of the **Jack Teagarden Big Band** and Teagarden with **Benny Goodman's** band; and "Any Old Time," airchecks and V-discs from the great **Nat Cole Trio** of the mid-'40s.

And, to help sort all of this out, Da Capo has just reprinted two important pieces of jazz literature: **Andre Hodeir's** *Toward Jazz* (\$9.95), and **Leonard Feather's** *The Encyclopedia of Jazz in the '60s* (\$10.95). Feather's three encyclopedias — Da Capo has two of them in print now, with *The Encyclopedia of Jazz in the '70s* (written with **Ira Gitler**) due — are cornerstones of any jazz library; it's shocking that nobody has been willing to find *The Encyclopedia of Jazz in the '80s*.

BOPPING AROUND — **Thad Jones** has parted ways with the **Count Basie Orchestra**. The match, which seemed to be made in musical heaven, ended here on earth — Jones and Basie Enterprises couldn't agree on a contract renewal. . . . Berkeley, CA's **Teresa Records** has signed an exclusive three-year European distribution deal with **Bellaphon Records**. . . . *Jazz Greats/ Great Jazz* is the title of an NYU summer course that brings jazz into the classroom. **Arnold Jay Smith** teaches the course, and he promises appearances by **Max Gordon**, **Panama Francis**, **Dick Hyman**, **Paquito D'Rivera**, **Allison Steele** and **Margaret Whiting**. . . . **Maxine Sullivan** is going to turn 75 on May 13 and we wish her the very best. If you're in L.A., you can wish her the very best yourself — she'll be at the **Vine St. Bar and Grill** May 21 & 22. . . . The **Apollo Theatre's** smash Sunday afternoon jazz series has proven that you can bring jazz to Harlem. The **Studio Museum** — just a stone's throw from the **Apollo** — is following suit: they've scheduled **Cecil Taylor** (5/16), the **Henry Threadgill Wood String Ensemble** (6/20), and the **World Sax Quartet** (7/3). In the meantime, the **Apollo** shows continue: May 25 brings in **Phyllis Hyman**, **Lonnie Liston Smith**, **Tom Browne** and **Stanley Turrentine** and June 8 will feature **Roy Ayers**, **Jean Carne** and **Sherry Winston**. . . . The **Joe Zawinul** solo tour — the pre-Weather Update tour — hits its second leg next week, showing up in **Denver** (5/17), **Santa Fe** (5/18), **Phoenix** (5/20), **San Diego** (5/22), **Los Angeles** (5/23), **San Francisco** (5/24) and **Seattle** (5/28). . . . Philadelphia's **Mellon Jazz Festival** will rev into gear June 14-22. The fete, a **George Wein** production, will be dedicated to the late **Philly Joe Jones** and will feature numerous performances in and around the home of the **Liberty Bell**, including many free performances. A highlight should be the June 16 "Jam for Philly Joe," featuring a bevy of jazz artist associated with Philadelphia, including **John Blake**, **Al Grey**, **Mickey Roker**, **Jimmy Heath**, **Ted Curson**, **Red Rodney** and **Odean Pope**.

I LIKE MY MUSIC . . . PRIVATE — Ever since Windham Hill demonstrated to the record making establishment that baby boomers were, in fact, not dormant in the marketplace, a burgeoning group of entrepreneurs have scrambled into the "New Age" biz hoping to bite off a bit for themselves. To my thinking, the closer one patterns their company after Windham Hill, the further away are their chances of making an impact in the marketplace. The simple fact of the matter is, no one can do better what Windham Hill is doing. That's why I would put my money on a fairly new company out of New York called **Private Music**. Private Music is the brainchild of **Peter Baumann**, who you may remember was one of the founding members of seminal synth band **Tangerine Dream**. Baumann has managed to target the same audience (people older than 26) without duplicating the Windham Hill formula. "I felt that there is a large audience out there that really isn't being fairly handled by the music produced these days," stated Baumann. His goal was to produce music that people could enjoy at home, hence the name of the company. The music, according to design, was to be an extension of jazz, electronic and "new age." The label's roster is both eclectic and renowned. **Jerry Goodman**, a guitarist and violinist, was the founder of the early fusion band **The Flock**. The Flock exerted great influence on **John McLaughlin**, who eventually teamed up with Goodman in

The Mahavishnu Orchestra. Goodman's Private Music debut is "On The Future Of Aviation." Fairlight wizard **Sanford Ponder** has created a wild electronic land/mindscape in "Etosha-Private Music In The Land Of Dry Water." Former Missing Persons, Frank Zappa and Group 87 synthesist **Patrick O'Hearn** has applied himself to "Ancient Dreams," and the result is a moving, aural sweep that is pure magic. A sampler entitled "Piano One" has pieces contributed by **Eddie Jobson** (late of Roxy Music who has also contributed a brilliant solo LP), **Joachim Kuhn**, **Ryuichi Sakamoto** and **Eric Watson**. On the whole, the label tends slightly more toward the 'avante garde' than Windham Hill, which is Private Music's major divergence from Windham Hill. A good number of the roster have been closely associated with progressive movements in rock and jazz over the years, like Eddie Jobson and Jerry Goodman. According to Baumann, the label intends not to become a piano label. "I want to make sure that Private Music is not a keyboard label," said Baumann. "I want to keep it wide, acoustic and electric." Earlier this year, Private Music released Lucia Hwong's "House Of Sleeping Beauties" to that end. Hwong combines a variety of Chinese instruments to realize her music. Baumann commented, "We put a lot of emphasis on marketing and advertising." According to Baumann, that is the way to reach this audience in an era when playlists are so tight. His

audience is not expecting that the kind of music available on Private Music even exists. "We will spend a lot of time on video," he said, "to get the word out." For more info, call Doreen D'Agostino, 212-684-2533.

BLOWIN' IN THE WIND — A plethora of questions, some disarmingly old, some relatively new, were posed during a seminar on "The Future of Music Video" at the Music Business Symposium, held at the increasingly seedy Los Angeles Ambassador Hotel the weekend of May 2. Issues raised included everything from the very nature of music video — is it a promotional vehicle or has it evolved into an industry unto itself? (And why does this question sound so familiar?) to corporate sponsorship. These, and many other points were bandied about with sometimes pungent assertions by a panel that consisted of such video biz notables as Capitol Records' **Michelle Peacock**, MGM/UA's **Bob Emmer** (who served as moderator), **Celia Hirschman** of Vis-Ability, **Peter Facer** of *Video One*, video producer **Glen Goodwin**, **Roberta Perry** of Edwards Tech., **Jim Thompson** of The Thompson Network, **Bill Brummel** of *Night Tracks* and **Roberta Cruger** from MTV. The upshot of this hour and a half forum was that the commercial future of music video probably lies in longform (not to be confused with "compilation") home video, and that a hefty dose of creativity is what the doctor has ordered to insure the future of music in the home video market. And what about music video programming? Well, one goal was to draw clips from longform product, like a *Purple Rain*, for example, to further cross-promotion.



POLITICKING — In June, Key Video offers the controversial documentary Marilyn: Say Goodbye to the President, an investigative look at the movie actress' supposed liaison with JFK.

An obvious problem with longform product is its availability to home tapers through cable and broadcast outlets, however, and it was suggested that the market be limited. Clips would then act as come-ons to longform product available only (we assume) in stores. There is a lyric of **Stephen Sondheim's** that says, "If you know where you're going, you've gone," so maybe it's just as well that few actual answers emerged from this Sunday afternoon meeting. No discussion of music video would be complete without deference to MTV, and Cruger's explanation of the channel's current ratings investigation elicited support from at least one panel member, who said that none of us should sit back and cheer over MTV's troubles, the press in particular. A point well taken. Whatever MTV's wheelings and dealings, the channel helped build a foundation for a burgeoning industry, and as goes MTV, so goes . . . well, you get the idea.

JULIE & JULIEN — Cult video goddess **Julie Brown**, whose *Homecoming Queen's Got A Gun* clip caused a stir in video parlors from Syracuse to Seattle last year, has come up with a screenplay derived from one of the cuts off her independently produced debut LP, "Goddess In Progress." She will star in a movie of it, directed by none-other-than **Julien Temple**, the music video mavin late of *Absolute Beginners* fame. The Warner Bros. film, *Earth Girls Are Easy*, will be shot later this summer. Brown's also got a new album slated for a fall release on Sire/WB.

HOME VIDEO REVIEW: *Deja View* — **Karl Lorimar Home Video** — \$29.95 Hit pop singles tend to become frozen in time, especially 10 years or more down the line, and so the concept of matching those tunes with contemporary video is a risky endeavor at best, especially to purists. When it comes to quality, Karl Lorimar's *Deja View* has no lack of expensive-looking production accoutrements, but the videos themselves are vapid. Somehow, Teri Garr in a magic act doesn't do much for the Zombies classic "She's Not There." There are 10 songs in this package, featuring various directors, most of them from the film arena. Several of the clips do include original artists, such as Don McLean doing "American Pie" and Brian Wilson in "Don't Worry Baby," which helps elevate those videos above the program's inherent silliness.

Film Music Under Scrutiny At MBS

LOS ANGELES — If you spent May 3 in the Sunset Room of the Ambassador Hotel, you probably came away with few, if any, significant revelations about the current state of film music. Yet while the ASCAP-sponsored seminars on the subject held during the Music Business Symposium yielded few surprises, they *did* offer anyone interested the unique opportunity to hear about both the film and music industries from many of the key executives and composers most integrally involved with them.

In the two seminars sampled, "Talking The Filmmaker's Language" and "Making The Music Work With The Film," several noteworthy issues were discussed. Most importantly, the general consensus among the various panelists was that the 'poptrack' could become an endangered species unless directors and producers finally learn not to misuse the genre for blatantly commercial purposes. Secondly, they all agreed the business of film music has become annoyingly complex, as more and more unqualified people are attempting to force their way into the decision making process. Finally, those present also touched upon the increasingly prominent role of synthesizers in today's scores, and how that represents a decidedly mixed blessing.

Only time will tell what the future of film music holds. At present, there are indications that the youth-oriented pictures most likely to produce 'poptracks' aren't faring as well as they once did at the box office. The question remains whether this will have any effect on the release of youth-oriented soundtracks (and whether or not the public has grown tired of such albums in any case). While those negatives weren't excluded from last week's discussions, there was, at the same time, unanimous agreement as to just how vital film music still is right now, from a promotional, marketing and creative point of view. Here, then, are some choice comments from the experts on hand:

Stan Milander (of Bart Milander, a top L.A.-based agency oriented toward handling film composers): "We're serving two businesses now; we're serving the film industry musically and we're also serving the record business, which has made things much more complicated. But I think we can see from what's happened in the industry, this has been a plus factor from a marketing standpoint and creatively, since a lot of composers who normally aren't involved with writing tunes (now have the chance) to work with songwriters out of the record business."

Robin Garb, vice president of music, Disney Studios: "The ideal situation is to

be able to see the musical contributions to a film when the script is being written, so that music can be more of a pre-conceived notion, rather than a post-productive service. Generally, that doesn't happen . . . Nowadays, because we're serving two mediums, there's more of a tribunal which makes decisions about the music in a film. Sometimes, that tribunal is able only to come up with a common denominator of opinion, which doesn't necessarily create the best answers or ideas . . . The first problem is to try and pick up on what's best for the film, and then what will create the best soundtrack, if that's appropriate . . . In some cases, a film will come out and look like its purely a marketing tool for a record . . . but sometimes a film will come out with a soundtrack that's not only successful, but a great commemorative to the film. That's our general goal."

Michael Peyser, film producer (*Desperately Seeking Susan*): "Music is a marketing tool. As a producer, part of what you're after with a soundtrack is cross-plugs . . . and the support of music. (But) that's a burden on scores frequently, because people end up shoe-horning songs into these films . . . and studios are becoming more and more involved these days."

Alan Silvestri, film composer (*Back to The Future*): "(Writing music for films) is a constant 'dance' now, I find, between various members of the creative community. The 'dance' never stops until the project is finished. The time frame now has gotten such that we're all finding we have to make tremendous compromises due to the fact that (the marketing of films and soundtracks) has become so complex."

Gary LeMel, senior vice president, music, Columbia Pictures: "The intent is always to use songs properly, and the best example is *The Big Chill*, where the music worked perfectly in the film and ultimately sold three million albums . . . Film music is now more open to people for whom the doors were closed 10 years ago . . . There's pressure being put on us over pictures that don't warrant songs, with people saying, 'we've got to have a title song and it's got to be a hit.' These are the kinds of pressures we're living under right now, and it's incumbent upon us in many cases to hold that pressure off. That's becoming more and more difficult. We've in effect created this monster, by being so successful (with soundtracks) in the *right* instances. (Unfortunately) some producers and directors haven't looked at those successes and understood *why* they worked, so they've applied that (approach toward music) to *every* film. That's the bind we're in right now."

FILMUSIC

LABEL CHECK — No matter when you're reading this, chances are dozens of harried, ulcer-ridden film directors and record executives are scrambling around like carrots in a Cuisinart to put together what they hope will be this summer's breakout poptracks. Artists are being lured, songs are being written and deals are being made at a dizzying pace to take advantage of all those easily bored little kiddies ready to invade movie theatres and record stores. As of now, the poptrack releases seem very promising, and the labels will certainly be adding even more to the list over the next few weeks. In any case, here are the albums currently slated for imminent shipping: **A&M** will have *Ferris Bueller's Day Off* late in June, and though the exact artists haven't as yet been announced, it's likely this soundtrack will be prominent among the summer releases, since **John Hughes** (*The Breakfast Club*) is the film's director (and we all know what a proven 'track' record he has) . . . Later this month, **Epic** will have a hard-to-beat lineup of artists featured on the *Ruthless People* soundtrack. The album will contain cuts by **Mick Jagger, Billy Joel, Dan Hartman, Kool & The Gang, Paul Young and Bruce Springsteen**. In addition **Luther Vandross** has written and recorded a song called "Give Me The Reason" for the picture (which stars **Bette Midler, Danny DeVito and Judge Rein-**

hold). Around the same time, Epic will also offer *Cobra*, a soundtrack featuring **John Cafferty and Robert Tepper**, among others. This **Sylvester Stallone** vehicle is expected to be explosive at the box office and that's going to help the soundtrack substantially, you can be sure . . . **Chrysalis** will handle a single by a new group called **Wild Blue**, which has recorded the theme song for *Fire With Fire* . . . **Columbia** will ship the *Top Gun* soundtrack next week, and it, too, has the makings of a top seller. The album will feature 10 new songs, including the first single, "Danger Zone," performed by **Kenny Loggins**. The song was produced by two-time Oscar winner **Giorgio Moroder** (*Midnight Express, Flashdance*), who co-wrote it with **Tom Whitlock**. Also featured on *Top Gun* will be another cut by Loggins (one he co-wrote with **Peter and Ina Wolf**), and songs by **Loverboy, Berlin, Miami Sound Machine, Teena Marie, Cheap Trick, newcomer Marietta and Harold Faltermeyer**. *Top Gun* stars **Tom Cruise and Kelly McGillis** . . . In June, **EMI America** will once again offer **David Bowie** film music (he's on the label's current soundtrack from *Absolute Beginners*) with the release of *Labyrinth*. And in July, they'll have the soundtrack to *About Last Night* (the exact artists haven't been chosen as of now . . . **Enigma**, an increasingly visible label in the world of soundtracks, has (through **Capitol**) several noteworthy releases. This month's *Dangerously Close* features the label's newly signed band, **The Smithereens**, in a song called "Blood & Roses," which is being released as a single and aired as a video. Also featured on the soundtrack are **TSOL, Green On Red, Black Uhuru and The Lords Of The New Church**. Other forthcoming Enigma soundtracks are *Creepers, Hollywood Vice Squad and Stranger Than Paradise* . . . **Island** will offer *Good To Go* this summer, a poptrack featuring **Trouble Funk**, among other groups . . . **MCA**, always active in the film music market, now has *Legend* on release, which features a **Tangerine Dream** score (it replaced a complete **Jerry Goldsmith** score, amid a modicum of controversy) and songs by **Bryan Ferry and Jon Anderson**. **Bob Dylan's** title song to *Band Of The Hand* is also out now. On June 16, MCA will ship the soundtrack to *Running Scared*, a film which stars **Billy Crystal and Gregory Hines**. The album will be comprised of new songs recorded for the movie by **Klymaxx, Patti LaBelle, Michael McDonald, New Edition, Ready For The World, Fee Waybill and Kim Wilde**. MCA will also continue to supply soundtrack enthusiasts with remastered reissues indefinitely . . . **Varese Sarabande**, another soundtrack-conscious independent label, will be offering *Ginger and Fred; Return to Eden; The Final Conflict; The Right Stuff; The Ghost and Mrs. Muir; Star Trek, Volume II; The Red Pony; and The Manhattan Project*.

THE MAIN MANN — Producer **Michael Mann** (of *Miami Vice* fame) scored something of a coup by getting **Bob Dylan** to write and record (with **Tom Petty** producing) the title song for his just-released feature, *Band Of The Hand*. Here's what Mann had to say on the subject when I spoke to him recently: "I simply showed (Bob) and Tom the movie, and they both saw the underlying content in it which attracted me to the project. I love what they recorded. It was actually done under extreme logistical hardships, since they rehearsed it in L.A., recorded it in Australia and were in Tokyo when it was time for background vocals. The lyrics Bob wrote and Tom's production are fantastic . . . I love music when it works in a dramatic context in a film. If you get that happening, it becomes almost transcendental, and that's always very rewarding for filmmakers."

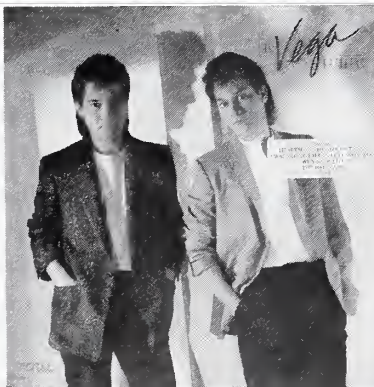
THE GIRLS NEXT DOOR — Girls Next Door — MTM ST-71053 — Producer: Tommy West

Dolly Parton Opens Theme Park

NASHVILLE — Dolly Parton opened her multi-million dollar Dollywood amusement park in Pigeon Forge, TN with much "hoopla" during the May grand opening weekend.

Parton was there to welcome guests, releasing 1,986 balloons, doing a special concert, talking to the press troops from all over the country and touring the park throughout the day.

Parton has often told the story of the dream she has kept alive when "gazing up at the Hollywood sign in Los Angeles and dreaming of replacing the 'H' with a 'D.'" That's where the idea for such a park originated, she says.

Eventually, the dream became reality for Parton back in Sevierville County where she was born and raised. The attraction, formerly the 400-acre Silver Dollar City amusement park, was enjoying healthy attendance figures but Parton

hopes to go one step better, expanding the park with \$5 million worth of added attractions.

Officials say the expansion plans at Dollywood will enable the park to employ 800 more people by July. The new attractions include The Dolly Parton Story — a 2,200-sq.-foot museum telling the story of the singer's life; Craftsman Valley, a landscaped area where Appalachian craftsmen demonstrate quilting, wood-carving, blacksmithing and other interests; Silver Dollar Jamboree, a new outdoor theatre and Rivertown Junction, a nine acre section of the park that includes the Apple Jack Eatery and the Smokey Mountain Rampage Water Ride. There are several other rides to enjoy as well as an array of music talents. Dolly says she will perform at the park at least once a month as a surprise visitor. Members of her family will also be on the entertainment bill on a regular basis.

"Amazing Grace" gets a unique treatment (opening with Driscoll singing a cappella) while other favorites include "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," "I Exalt Thee," "America the Beautiful" and the contemporary "Covenant Children."

SENSATIONAL NIGHTINGALES GREATEST HITS — (Malaco MAL 4414)

Fans will love this collection of the Sensational Nightingales' Greatest Hits. The Spiritual styled group, anchored in traditional gospel roots, puts their own special touches on every song in this collection. "I Surrender All" contains their own arrangement, "Don't Put Off Today" and "He Just Hung There" are well done and thought-provoking.

Koinonia has several meanings: fellowship, communion and communication, and this group conveys these things through music in a classical way. "Greatest Love" is especially beautiful, and "Easy Morning" was just what this reviewer needed this morning.

More Tape Levy Controversy In The U.K.

LONDON — The Government White Paper proposal to impose a 10 percent levy on blank audio tape in return for legalizing home taping has produced a predictable delight among the record companies and rights societies and horror among the tape manufacturers.

Consumer organizations and tape manufacturers are condemning the proposal as another form of taxation and an injustice to legitimate users of blank tape who do not record copyrighted material. BPI director general John Deacon is delighted that a laborious campaign has finally borne fruit. "At long last the record industry will derive a small benefit from the massive level of home taping. The proposal marks an acceptance that copyright owners will be remunerated for the use of their material while fully recognizing the need to balance the interests of copyright owners with those of the public at large," he said.

The tape manufacturers group obviously took an opposite stance. Said TMG spokesman David Lloyd, "It's illogical, confused and counterproductive. A levy is another form of taxation on the public and not expected from a government who recently pledged to reduce taxation."

Lloyd claims that the vast majority of home taping does not damage the interests of copyright owners because it involves the copying of material on which a copyright fee has already been paid. He also feels victimized by the fact that blank video tape is not being penalized and has no form of levy imposed.

"In effect the public will be forced to pay twice, because at present, through the license fee, they are paying to listen to the BBC and, in the case of independent local radio, they're paying through the price of goods advertised on the stations," he noted.

Lloyd also predicts the cost of administering a collection scheme for the levy will virtually cancel out the money to be collected. He urges the government to look at the levy collection operating in West Germany for the last six months. Apart from its costs, he alleges it has resulted in massive smuggling of blank tapes into the country, evading the levy and swamping the local market, thus severely damaging the business of legitimate tape manufacturers. He expects these problems will be repeated in the UK, but on a grander scale.

The Consumers Association regards the levy as grossly unfair because the tax will fall on the young, the blind and other disabled groups.

United Kingdom

LONDON — PolyGram, for the first time in years, heads the company market share for albums for the first quarter. PolyGram achieved a 17.7 percent market share according to Gallup. Its successes included Dire Straits' platinum selling "Brothers In Arms," Bryan Ferry's "Boys and Girls" and Tears For Fears' "Songs From The Big Chair." CBS, the usual title holder, was forced to second place with 14.5 percent. CBS was beaten once again in the singles race when EMI snatched top singles company, having achieved 13.8 percent of the market to CBS' 13.1 percent.

PolyGram offshoot EG Records has just spent £1 million on a campaign to launch "Street Life," a Bryan Ferry/Roxy Music double compilation album. PolyGram companies throughout Europe are supporting the release of "Street Life" in what is said to be one of the industry's biggest campaigns ever. Each territory has its own impressive budget. Germany has spent \$145,000 on radio advertising alone. The CD version of "Street Life" is also said to be one of the longest playing CDs ever

issued with over 70 minutes of playing time.

Polydor's UK marketing director Tim Read commented, "All of us at Polydor are proud to be associated with EG and Bryan Ferry, whose personal involvement on the project has produced a definitive compilation and campaign."

Despite the international superstar status of Patti LaBelle, she has not played in Britain for 10 years. After headlining the Montreux Festival on May 7 she will play a one-off gig at London's Hammersmith Odeon on May 11. She was recently voted "Best Live Act" by the British press for her performance in Live Aid.

Demon Records is continuing to delve into the vaults of psychedelia and are releasing The Electric Prunes' "Long Day's Flight" an 18-track compilation which includes such well known songs as: "I Had Too Much To Dream Last Night," which was a big US hit in 1966. They also release a Bonzo Dog Band album, "Tadpoles," which was first released in 1969 and comes complete with the original sleeve.

Italy

WEA has made a major new signing of a band called Krew. Four of the six members are the backing group for Nik Kershaw. A chance meeting of songwriters Gary Miller and Steve Lee led to the formation of the new band. The results of a one-off session were so good, it convinced the six and WEA that the liaison should continue. Said Miller, "They all wanted to be more than just a backing band. They are all very creative and they felt very frustrated because Nik Kershaw only employed them, and does everything himself."

Miller and Lee have been writing songs for 10 years and have a huge bank of material, while the other four members — extremely competent musicians — have perfected their skills with the Nik Kershaw world tours. The combining of their talents has produced the first single, "Paper Heroes," which was released in the UK last month.

Music videos are used in an increasing number of TV shows and are, at the moment, being supplied free by the record companies. Payment for the use of music videos on television is standard practice in most countries in Europe, so it seems perhaps that Britain, one of the most respected and successful sources of music video programming, is out of step.

the outdoor music. One tent is devoted to traditional jazz and one tent is devoted to more modern jazz, with a gospel music tent and a children's tent being the only other specific stages.

The best things I heard at the festival were (in no special order): Mason Ruffner & The Blues Rockers, hard-punching blues/rock from a local lad made good (he's opening for the Firm at the moment); Bobby Cure & The Summertime Blues with Aaron Neville (there are four Neville brothers who work as the Neville Brothers, but they all are involved in different bands as well); Lil Jeff Boutte & His Zydeco Band, spirited zydeco from a red-hot teenage accordionist — he's the Dwight Gooden of zydeco; Cousin Joe, old-fashioned blues piano playing and singing; Cyril Neville & the Uptown All-Stars, reggae/r&b from another Neville Brother; The Teddy Riley Jazz Band, mostly traditional Jazz from a Sweet-toned trumpet veteran; the Golden Star Hunters, funky Mardi Gras Indians (you know — the guys who wear feathers and march in the streets on Mardi Gras); the aforementioned hip-shaking soul music of K-Doe, Frogman and Adams; Alvin "Red" Tyler, big-toned post-bop tenor saxophone; Sady Courville & Dennis McGhee, absolutely uplifting traditional Cajun music by two fiddle pioneers (Courville is 80, McGhee is 93); the Rev. F.C. Barnes & The Rev. Janice Brown, breathtaking gospel and, easily, the best singing of the Festival; Bois Sec Ardoin & Canray Fontenot, the point where Cajun music

(with its roots in 17th Century French music) and zydeco (with its roots in French music and the blues) meet, again from a pair of pioneers; Delfeayo Marsalis, the trombone playing, and very impressive, younger brother of Wynton and Branford, with yet another brother — 11-year-old Jason — on drums; Allen Toussaint, whose "and-then-I-wrote" set was supported by a rip-snorting band and three fine-tuned vocalists' Queen Ida & The Bon Temps Zydeco Band, elegant and swinging zydeco; and Ramblin' Jack Elliott, still ramblin', still babblin' and still singing classic American folk music after all these years.

The best things I ate at the festival were (in no special order): crawfish Monica, soft-shell crab po-boys, cochon de lait (Cajun roast pig), sweet potato pone, crabmeat artichoke Rita, the aforementioned fried chicken, shrimp jambalaya, stuffed mirliton (sort of a squash), peach cobbler, crawfish pie, stewed rabbit, Cajun boudin (like a Cajun stuffed derma), and creole stuffed crabs.

For the record, some of the other performers during the daytime portion of the festival were Joan Baez, the Temptations, B.B. King, Dr. John, Pete Fountain, Chief Commander Ebenezer Obay, Rita Coolidge, the David Murray Octet, Clifton Chenier, Rockin' Sidney and Alvin Batiste; with Miles Davis, Steps Ahead, Al DiMeola, and Jerry Lee Lewis among the non-Fairgrounds participants. For the record, some of the other food out there was file gumbo, red beans & rice, turtle sauce piquant, hoghead cheese po-boys and Nachitoches meat pies.

I have been to numerous jazz festivals — I've covered them on four continents — and none of them approaches the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival in terms of feeling. It's the most festive festival in the world, though not the one to come to if you're just looking to hear jazz — Europe's North Sea, Nice, and Umbria Festivals and New York's JVC Festival, have the jazz. And definitely — definitely — not the one to come to if, like Yvette Brunet, you don't want to listen to music and eat. You'll just be bored to tears.

mittee, BMI agreed, as part of a subsequent overall settlement, that the payment of interim retroactive fees could be deferred to January 31, 1986. BMI and the Committee jointly informed the stations of the time extension and asked them to report the data to BMI which would facilitate computation of retroactive payments.

After several additional notices to stations to pay the fees, BMI applied to Judge Gagliardi and presented three exhibits: one consisting of stations which have failed to report the necessary data, and which have not paid fees; another consisting of stations which have reported, but which have not paid fees, and a third consisting of stations which have only recently submitted data and for

which invoices are being prepared.

Cramer said of Judge Gagliardi's decision: "The vast majority of stations have lived up to their agreements. The decision is fair to these stations and to our writers and publishers who have waited long enough to get what is rightfully due them. Hopefully, we will be able to make a distribution to them in the near future."

NAMA Continues Its Opposition To Vending Cigarettes Ban

CHICAGO — The National Automatic Merchandising Assn. has obtained a copy of the proposal to ban the sale of cigarettes through vending machines, which has been drafted by the American Medical Association.

The proposal, in strong language, takes issue with cigarette vending machines, the contention being that most Americans become addicted to nicotine as adolescents and have access to cigarettes (in vending machines)

when they are under the legal age. Its aim is to prohibit vending machine sales of cigarettes under penalty of fine or imprisonment for persons or firms who install or maintain these machines.

NAMA counsel Richard Funk, in a letter of rebuttal, informed the AMA that "only approximately seven percent of cigarettes sold in America are dispensed through vending

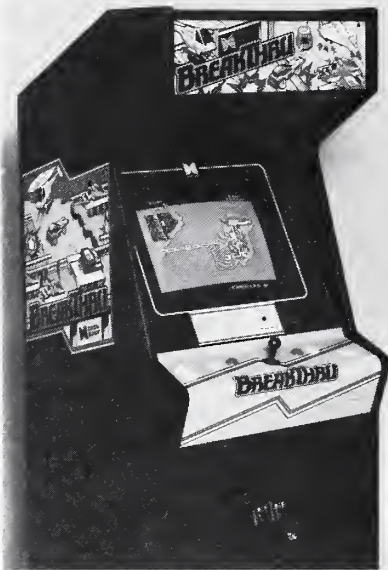

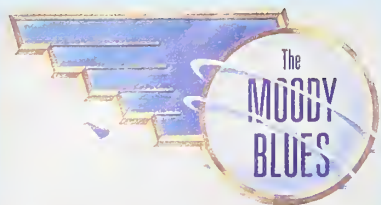
