

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1988 Grammy Awards: Pointing Out No Trends Whatsoever

NEW YORK – The 1988 Grammy Awards made one thing clear: nothing is clear. The expected windfall for U2 was not quite a windfall, though Album of the Year and Best Rock Performance by a Duo or Group with vocal are nothing to sneeze at. Record of the year went to "Graceland," of all things, Paul Simon's non-blockbuster single from his blockbuster album (and '87 Grammy album winner) of the same name; passing up U2's "I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For" and Suzanne Vega's "Luka." Song of the year was another shocker, as "Luka" and "I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For" (not to mention "La Bamba" and "Didn't We Almost Have It All") gave way to "Somewhere Out There," the Mann & Weill opus from *An American Tail*.

In other not-quite surprises, Columbia's highly-touted (though chart-unproven) Terence Trent D'Arby didn't win Best New Artist; the popular Jody Watley wrapped that one up (nixing Cutting Crew, Swing Out Sister and the Breakfast Club in the process). And *Bad* got burned, despite Michael Jackson's riveting Grammy performance and his front-row presence as each painful award was announced. The album, released late in the Grammy eligibility period, didn't have the benefit of the current Michael Jackson momentum. Similarly, the *Tunnel Of Love Express* was just a glimmer in Bruce Springsteen's eye when that album was released, though the

disc did garner Best Rock Vocal Performance, Solo for its rock vocal performing Boss, beating out individual tracks by Tina Turner, Richard Marx, Bob Seger, Joe Cocker (an obvious problem with the NARAS balloting—a single Joe Cocker single up against an entire Bruce Springsteen album).

Other surprises were the pick of Sting's *Bring On The Night* (released domestically only as a compact disc, and only reluctantly) for Best Pop Vocal Performance, Male (edging a veteran line-up of Al Jarreau, Elton John, Bruce Springsteen and Michael Jackson); and Smokey Robinson's notching of the Best R&B Vocal Performance, Male award for "Just To See Her" (over Stevie Wonder, Michael Jackson, Wilson Pickett and Jonathan Butler). Whitney Houston's mantle will groan under the weight of another Grammy, Best Pop Vocal Performance, Female, for "I Wanna Dance with Somebody (Who Loves Me)," and Aretha Franklin will have two Grammys shipped to Detroit: one for Best R&B Vocal Performance, Female for *Aretha* and one for her duet with George Michael, "I Knew You Were Waiting" (Best R&B Performance By a Duo or Group with Vocal).

In another leg up for the veteran's committee, ex-Righteous Brother Bill Medley and Jennifer Warnes copped the Best Pop Performance By a Duo or Group with Vocal for "(I've Had) The Time of My Life," from the soundtrack to *Dirty Dancing*.

RCA Records Wraps-Up Best Record Six Months

NEW YORK – The RCA Records label reported gross revenues of \$100 million for the last six months of 1987, making it the label's most successful six months since the same period in 1977, when there was a run on Elvis Presley records following

the singer's death. Topping the list of sales-leaders for the label was the soundtrack to *Dirty Dancing*, with popular albums from Jonathan Butler, Starship, Restless Heart, Eurythmics, Mr. Mister and, of course, Elvis Presley helping out.

ASCAP Metes Out \$93,750 In Supplemental Awards

NEW YORK – ASCAP distributed \$93,750 more in supplemental cash grants for 1987-88; bringing the total 1987-88 amount to \$1,117,700, representing monies over and above royalties paid for performances of works in ASCAP's sample survey. Awards are granted to writers whose works have unique prestige value or

which are performed substantially in media not surveyed by ASCAP.

Commenting on the awards, ASCAP president Morton Gould said, "Our grants program provides two of the most important elements needed by composers and lyricists to continue their work: recognition and financial encouragements.

Grammys '88: Apples And Oranges

NEW YORK – "I don't think there can be a 'best' song," said Cythia Weil shortly after she, husband Barry Mann, and James Horner had won the Song Of The Year Grammy for their composition "Somewhere Out There." "I love the U2 song," she continued, referring to "I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For," which her song had just beat out. "You can't compare them. It's like apples and oranges."

That's the way it was for the 30th Annual Grammy Awards. The categories were a massively confused reflection of the diversity of the music industry. The winners were an often surprising reflection of the tastes of the NARAS voters. And the show itself a tasteful, New York orientated production that took people's minds off how confused and surprised they were.

Little Richard stole the show when, possessed by the holy spirit of self-promotion, he declared himself Best New Artist before finally presenting the award to Jody Watley. Asked later if he was bitter he never got a Grammy, Richard replied, "I'm not bitter, but it *would* be nice to have one. I'd like to just look at one sitting beside my bed."

Of the performances, the clear standout was the medley of New York artists. Lou Reed turned in a quiet "Walk On The Wild Side" with support from Fernando Saunders. It was followed by the world premiere of Run-D.M.C.'s metalized rap "Tougher Than Leather." Later, Michael Jackson's performance was as spectacular as imagined, and his James Brown slides, glides, stutter-steps, and stomps in the midst of "The Man In The Mirror" gave the gospel ballad a rhythmic charge no

one had ever dreamed of.

Host Billy Crystal scored big in his opening monologue with some inside digs at Mike Love. Crystal also provided one of the show's low points when, following Los Lobos' performance, he cracked, "Was it my imagination, or was that General Noriega on lead vocals?" But Crystal's implication that all Latin-American men look alike wasn't the evening's absolute nadir. That came when comedian Jackie Mason, a ready bombing, tried to elicit a response from a stone-faced Quincy Jones. Mason's irony-laced jibes backfired and the *schtick* took on a confrontational air.

The production, though, was smooth, on the whole tasteful, and certainly a coup for the City Of New York. It was good public relations for the city and it generated plenty of revenue. While no one could confirm if the awards ceremony would rotate from New York to LA year to year, producer Ken Ehrlich did say, "I'd love to come back here."

Asked if in the future NARAS would establish categories for rap and heavy metal, two thriving forms of music ignored by this year's Grammy Awards, NARAS Chairman of the Board Alfred W. Schlesinger said, "We will definitely take it up." He commented that NARAS tries to be an innovator in the recognition of new musics, adding that they did have new age and video categories.

Joseph "Run" Simmons of Run-D.M.C. later remarked that he didn't think rap needed a separate category. "Rap is just music," he said, and should compete with music in other categories.

"Spread Love" and "Gold Mine" are the album's most accessible tracks, but don't miss "David And Goliath" and "If We Ever." A must!

Toto

TOTO

LOS ANGELES—On the cover of Toto's new Columbia LP *The Seventh One* is an emblem similar to the one that appeared on their successful first record nearly ten years ago - a sword. It is the same sword that graced their landmark, Grammy-Award winning fourth album, which included the smash hits "Rosanna" and "Africa". Clearly, Toto means business this time around. If there is any irony here it is that on *The Seventh One* the pen is mightier than the sword. The album displays a real depth to their songwriting, songs that call for justice and social awareness. Combine this with a rocking, raw energy and their patented pop sensibility and you get a dynamic record with a wide demographic appeal. David Paich founder and principle writer for the band spoke to *Cash Box* from Frankfurt, West Germany, where the group is kicking off their world-wide 1988 tour.

"This is our best album to date," says Paich. "It's a formidable example of what Toto really is... it rock and rolls while still being able to do a sensitive ballad. We do a lot of all around jamming and having a good time. You can hear our distinct musical personalities more on this record."

Musical personalities indeed. Toto was formed from a nucleus of young, outstanding session players from the late seventies, including Paich, a renowned writer, arranger and keyboard session man; Steve Porcaro, synthesist/writer extraordinaire; brother Jeff, drummer (later Mike Porcaro would join on bass); singer Bobby Kimball; bassist David Hungate; and the incredible lead guitarist Steve Lukather. It was Paich and the band's work on the Boz Scaggs LP *Silk Degrees* that solidified the idea of forming the band, along with the encouragement of CBS Records. They would go on to record six albums, *Toto IV* being their greatest commercial success to date. Over the years the personnel would change slightly, but never the commitment to hit-songwriting, stellar playing and high-tech production values.

The current line-up is Paich, Lukather, Jeff and Mike Porcaro, and Joseph Williams singing lead. The addition of Joseph Williams (his father is composer John Williams) has been a major asset to the band both as a singer and a songwriter.

"Joseph can do R&B, as well as high-note rock and roll, he has a good scope on

all kinds of singing. Also, I've never had a singer that really sparked with me as a writer. For example on the song "Pamela" (the first single), I was driving in my car and heard this song in my head which was the chorus on "Pamela". I later found out that Joe had also written a song called "Pamela" - it was a totally different kind of song, a techno-rock song. We worked some of the music and merged the two together. There is a Pamela actually out there, an ex-girlfriend of Joseph's, which after he told me the whole story, inspired the lyric."

Toto fans may notice another change, keyboardist/synthesist/writer Steve Porcaro is not in the band portrait on the album sleeve, although he played on the album and is touring with the band. It is apparently a legal agreement that frees him to do more outside work. "He's still in the band," says Paich, "but not legally... he's the Chester Thompson of Toto."

The record shows considerable ensemble effort. Steve Lukather not only contributes his usual jaw-dropping guitar work but writes tunes, including two with outside songwriter Randy Goodrum (a team that yielded the hit "I'll Be Over You" on the *Fahrenheit* album). Jeff Porcaro's drumming is as solid as ever and Mike Porcaro keeps it all grooving on bass. On *The Seventh One*, all this virtuosity is used to best advantage with a lot more live studio playing than on almost any other Toto LP.

"We rehearsed a lot for this record," says Paich. "There is some overdubbing, but, for example on "Pamela" and "Stay Away" we were on a sound stage jamming, all the little things you hear are

TALENT ON STAGE

Michael Jackson

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, N.Y.C. - You've heard about it, right? Michael Jackson is barnstorming the country, finally - finally! - doing his first solo tour, some five-and-a-half years and seventy zillion albums after the release of *Thriller*. No half-assed, do-the-brothers-a-solid *Victory* tour this, just Michael himself, in front of his own band and dancers, doing his own thing, supporting his *Bad* album.

Are there any encomiums left? Any superlatives not used up by, say, the *New York Times* (which reviewed

the show three times in ten days: two pop critics and one dance critic (!) *kvelling*). The show, which wheeled into the Garden for three nights, was a phantasmagoria of singing and dancing, costume changes, video creations, even a bit of cheezy magic. Lights flashed, mirrors mirrored, lasers lased, a giant scoreboard came and went. Two solid hours of pop perfection, a state-of-the-art bit of contemporary show biz; a lickety-split, clean-as-a-whistle buzz through one of the more extraordinary careers of the Rock Era.

Throughout the show, names kept flashing into mind, places from where this funny-looking wizard sprouted. And, oddly, the names were not the names of soul singers, they were the names of entertainers

NEW YORK — Before he hooked up with four like minded guys to form a band and play funk-ed-up-rock (or rocked-up-funk) in Portland, Oregon, before even he played in a "Cheap Trick-ish" rock band, before even he'd graduated from high school, Dan Reed lived on a farm in South Dakota. "I was kind of bored, 'cause I'd lived in Portland, Oregon, which was city enough for a little kid, 'til fourth grade. Then I moved to South Dakota." He was an only child. On a farm. In South Dakota. Believe him when he says there was a lot of time for daydreaming.

"For a long time I wanted to be Bruce Lee. Bruce Lee was my big hero thing. And then I started getting into Elvis, and all that junk, and the Doobie Brothers, and Sam Cooke; started listening to a lot of music. And then a foreign exchange student came to South Dakota from Japan and lived with us for a year. He taught me how to play the acoustic guitar. And that's when it hit me. I was fourteen. I'd just started high school, and I was going, 'I guess this what I'm going to do.'"

Kid from the Pacific Northwest moves to South Dakota and learns acoustic guitar from a Japanese exchange student. Sound a little wierd? It is pretty mixed up. That's probably how Dan Reed learned to mix things up. The Dan Reed Network is an integrated band that plays integrated music, a raw combination of mid-70s funk and mid-80s arena rock. They've been playing together for five years now, building their club draw in Portland and Seattle venues until they could make a living off of their music. In 1986 they recorded a five-song EP that got PolyGram's attention. They were signed in February of '87. Now, a year later, their debut LP, *Dan Reed Network*, is out on Mercury. It was produced by Bruce Fairbairn, who's worked with Bon Jovi and Aerosmith.

"We're a live band. So we went with the rock-man: Bruce," says Reed. The record sounds rough in all the right places, and the songs are the natural merging of Stevie Wonder keyboard vamps and rock power chords. "I liked funk a lot," Reed explains, "But I didn't like it being kinda really clean and, you know, so sterile. So I really wanted to keep the rock 'n' roll side of the thing to it."

Right now the band has a video on MTV for their single, "Ritual," and they're talking about doing a national tour. They're not sure if they want to go coast to coast playing arenas as an opening act or drive their own van and headline smaller clubs. "That's the one thing about our band, all five of us," says Dan. "We're always amazed that people pay to see us. It's like, 'Wow, you people are here. Thanks.' That vibe is what it's about; I want to extend that energy back out. I want to say, 'Here, here's all of it back. I can't give you your money back, that's how we payed for these lights and stuff, but this is US.' So we definitely do that; I don't look at my feet when I sing. I'm going to try and stay true to that original idea we had in the basement five years ago. It was great then, and it's worked 'til now."

One thing that's lacking is a charge of sexual energy — there is none. No matter how many times he grabbed his crotch, he didn't display an iota of the raw sexuality — either in his persona or, more importantly, in his singing — of the likes of Jackie Wilson, Marvin Gaye or Al Green. Those guys were seducers, those guys were men. Michael Jackson, no matter what he's singing about, is a boy.

But that, of course, is what he's always been. The Jackson Five, after all, were the Vegas-y, show biz end of Motown — the slickest, sleekest act on the lot. They were boys then, of course, but Michael's image (and his singing) has only built on that; he's never shown any interest in shaking it.

LOTTI AND TOMMY — "This is the age of the writer/producer," says writer/producer Tommy Faragher. He should know. As half of a songwriting/production team with Lotti Golden he's written and produced tracks for Brenda K. Starr, the Jets, and Elisa Fiorillo. He's a busy man, and he knows his business.

Golden and Faragher are both seasoned professionals with extensive backgrounds in dance music. Lotti Golden produced two popular street records in 1982 for Warp 9 on Prism Records (now Cold Chillin'). She wrote "Hard Times For Lovers" for Jennifer Holiday the same year, and co-produced with Arthur Baker. She's had her songs recorded by Patti Austin and Diana Ross, worked on the *Sun City* project, and done re-mixing for EMI.

In 1986 she signed with MCA Music Publishing and moved out to LA for eleven months. "It was a very brave and bold move for me, because I didn't really believe anything could exist except New York City," she told me recently when I talked with her and Faragher last month at their Upper West Side apartment/studio. "But it worked out great, because I met Tommy. MCA brought us together."

This was July of 1986, and Tommy Faragher had just returned from England where he'd played keyboards for Robbie Nevil's album, which yielded the smash "C'est La Vie." He started in the late 70s in a blue-eyed soul family group, the Faragher Brothers. He went on to do studio work for Dusty Springfield, Ringo Starr, and Jeffrey Osborne, and to produce Vanity's *Skin On Skin* (Motown). As Golden says, "Our backgrounds were very, very similar, and we had heard each others work and admired it. It just clicked...We have a gold record, our first gold record together, for the Jets. Our first year working together. That's really exciting."

Faragher points out the current ascendance of the writer/producer is caused by, and responsible for, new technology: "People have such good systems to work with. You can sample the greatest drummer in the world. It's like the sound that was so hard to achieve before is at a push of a button. People are making great

demos, and they take them in the studio, and the producer doesn't know what went into that original demo. So in trying to recreate it, for convenience, they bring the writer in as a co-producer or associate producer."

Together Lotti and Tommy craft intricate, percolating rhythm tracks with hooky choruses. Check out the great "You Should Be Loving Me," on Brenda K Starr's recent MCA album, and "Lover's Prayer" on Elisa Fiorillo's *Chrysalis* debut. Their production work on their own material was so good they were invited in to produce tracks they didn't write for Brenda K. Starr and the Jets.

Since they write, produce, sing, and play, people are always asking when they'll release their own record. Right now they're talking about it, but are busy working on the new *Sister Sledge* album and another project with a major artist unnamed at presstime.

THERE'S NOTHING NEW about subcultures being sucked into the mainstream, but I doubt that's what Epic Records expects for their new bunch of trash/metal signings. If their recent *Slamming Watusis* record isn't the first skate-thrash major label release, it's one of the first. Now they've signed *Suicidal Tendencies*, and in May will put out the next LP by Canadian speed-thrash-metalists *Voivoid* through a distribution deal with Noise International. Hardcore and heavy metal fans are simultaneously the most dedicated and disenfranchised of cults. They don't even have the sort trade journal and club support that nurtures dance music. Epic may be looking to profit off the fanaticism of metal- and skin-head (and lend their music more than a little support). But it seems doubtful they expect these bands to be as big as *Poison*. So there's something new, odd, and exciting about Epic dipping into these insular subcultures. For a major label it's pretty weird. And pretty hip.







in an older, grander tradition. Judy Garland (the way Michael weeped real tears after "She's Out Of My Life," just like Judy did night after night singing "Over the Rainbow"). Marlene Dietrich (the pretty-boy dancers). Sammy Davis Jr. (the World's Greatest Entertainer, no?). Elvis Presley (late Elvis, Vegas Elvis). Fred Astaire (the perfect blend of singing and dancing). Marcel Marceau (even borrowing Marceau's famous boxed-in *shtick*).

The entire production, for all its wonders, is straight out of American show biz — it's a bit of roving, arena-sized musical theatre. Michel Jackson's piping voice was strong throughout the show — he sang the pants off of everything — but he's not by any means a great soul singer.

THE BEATLES
Past Masters • Volume One - Parlophone/Capitol (CDP 7 90043-2) - Producer: George Martin

Capitol has just issued the two long-awaited *Past Masters* discs - comprised of several non-album tracks up until now unavailable on CD. The previous Beatles' discs released were all issued in their original U.K. formation, thus many standard tracks were not included in the packages. Among the 18 tracks comprising *Volume One* are: "Love Me Do," "From Me To You," "She Loves You," "I Want To Hold Your Hand," "This Boy," "I Feel Fine" and "I'm Down." Also of interest are "Komm, Gib Mir Deine Hand" and "Sie Liebt Dich," the rare German readings of "I Want To Hold Your Hand" and "She Loves You," respectively. This disc spans the period of 1964-1965.

THE BEATLES
Past Masters • Volume Two - Parlophone/Capitol (CDP 7 90044-2) - Producer: George Martin

Spanning the years 1966-1970, *Past Masters • Volume Two* is comprised of non-album tracks, singles-only and B-sides. The crystal-clear disc contains 15 gems, among them: "Day Tripper," "We Can Work It Out," "Paperback Writer," "Lady Madonna," "Hey Jude," "Revolution," "The Ballad Of John And Yoko," "Let It Be," as well as "Get Back" and "Don't Let Me Down," the later two recorded with Billy Preston. *Volume Two*, like the first disc, features the songs in a chronological order, according to their release date.

Motown has just issued the compact disc for Georgio's smash *Sexappeal* release of last year. The fine sounding disc has the distinction of featuring the extended 12" mixes of "Sexappeal," "Lovers Lane," "Tina Cherry" and "Bedrock." *Sexappeal*, entirely "written, directed, produced and arranged" by Georgio, is truly a breakthrough in provocative dance pop. Although a delayed compact disc release, *Sexappeal* should prove highly successful at the retail level while rejuvenating interest in this artist.

Blow Up Your Video - Atlantic (81828-2) - Producers: Harry Vanda-George Young

Blow Up Your Video, AC/DC's 13th release continues in band's winning tradition of providing quality rough-edged rock 'n' roll. The project, although an analog recording, was both mixed and mastered utilizing digital technology - revealing a top-notch compact disc. In addition to the lead-off single "Heatseeker," *Blow Up Your Video* features a bevy of powerful rock tracks, including "That's The Way I Wanna Rock N Roll," "Some Sin For Nuthin'," "Kissin' Dynamite," "This Means War" and "Nick Of Time." Dennis Quaid stars as hell-raising fighter pilot who mans a special craft that is miniaturized for a top-secret journey into a laboratory rabbit, but a disruption by corporate pirates results in his accidental injection into Safeway checking clerk Martin Short. He proceeds to occupy Short's mind and body, and the ensuing adventure/romance is brilliantly paced combination of madcap romp and psychological study. The film will be available March 30th in VHS and Beta, with a suggested retail of \$89.95. *Innerspace* will premiere on closed-captioned, digitally-processed hi-fi stereo videocassette and, later in the Spring, CX Stereo laserdisc. A Spanish subtitled version will also be available.

AND ANOTHER BLOCK-BUSTER FROM WARNER HOME VIDEO - *The Witches of Eastwick* features Jack Nicholson typecast as himself (the devil) who seduces a trio of lovely New Englanders - Cher, Susan Sarandon and Michelle Pfeiffer until they revolt against his evil philandering. Except for Nicholson, this is a rather dull attempt at evoking the supernatural, although a supporting role by Veronica Cartwright as the possessed town woman is brilliant. Nicholson here is in his vintage self-parody mode, and if the character isn't too believable you excuse it because he's so much fun to watch. Available April 27th for \$89.95.

PARAMOUNT HAS ONE TOO - The smashes keep on coming - *The Untouchables* will

be released on videocassette on April 20th with VHS priced at \$89.95 and Beta at 29.95 (Laser-Disc \$34.95). A Brian De Palma film written by playwright David Mamet, it stars Kevin Costner as Fed Eliot Ness, Robert De Niro as Al Capone and Sean Connery in an Academy Award nominated role as Malone. The film is occasionally brilliant, with De Palma's Hitchcock-esque styling especially evident in the baby carriage-stairway shootout scene in the train depot. Unfortunately Costner is nowhere near as interesting as De Niro's Capone. One almost would prefer to see Robert Stack's rather icy, sneering depiction to the contemporary civil-servant that Costner portrays. Stack was always at least as interesting as the bad guys he faced on the TV series, a robot who faced the mob with a more believable disdain. Connery's part as the aging beat cop is great, and the scene with Capone and the baseball bat is worth the price of rental.

AEROSMITH'S "ANGEL" VIDEO - Hollywood's Peter Conn of Homer And Associates and Cream Cheese Productions is responsible for producing the unique music video clip for Aerosmith's ballad "Angel" featuring an other-worldly cherub hovering in Steven Tyler's bedroom. Another great "how'd they do it" is a scene zoomed out from inside the pupil of Tyler's eye. Inside the eye is Tyler in a miniature landscape. The video is on heavy rotation on MTV.

SONY VIDEO SOFTWARE - In Sony's continued drive to enter all aspects of the home video marketplace, they have announced the release of a new specialty cassette *Fitness And The Athletic Experience* featuring Dr. George Sheehan, a cardiologist, columnist and author of two best sellers. He focuses on motivational techniques to keep on track with one's personal fitness program. The video costs \$19.95 and runs 52 minutes.

LEGENDARY VOICES - When David Ruffin & Eddie Kendrick teamed up to participate in the Hall & Oates television special at Harlem's famed Apollo Theatre, they both knew what the next move had to be, their own tour and album. Hence, their debut RCA Records LP, Ruffin & Kendrick marks yet another milestone in the lives of two of rock 'n roll's most legendary performers and distinctive vocalists.

The Ruffin & Kendrick project includes such illustrious musicians and producers as John Oates, Arthur Baker, Ron Harris, John McFadden and Club Nouveau (who produced a cover of Sly Stone's, It's A Family Affair.) Although it's been nearly two decades since Ruffin and Kendrick shared the spotlight as lead singers of the famous Temptations, the magic of their natural collaboration is more apparent than ever. Eddie's famous tenor continues to soar and scintillate, as David's deep, solid tenor unerringly provides that raw, basic inimitable sound.



As teenagers in Detroit, they sang together in a group called The Primes. Then came their famous association as lead singers of The Temptations, which spurred such songs as My Girl, Get Ready and Ain't Too Proud To Beg.

In the late '60's, both singers branched out to pursue solo careers. In retrospect, they concur, "we have the same root in common and we can always look back and smile. But we've always looked ahead and explored new grounds. Although they look like the same grounds sometimes, it's a different attitude and a different age. Musically, we are basically interested in love songs, good songs with good lyrics that we picked for this particular album."

Prior to their recording reunion, David and Eddie toured Europe and the United States as solo performers "when ever we felt like working!" A short time before the Hall and Oates engagement, both had discussed the possibility of working on the road as a team. "And then one night, Kendrick recalls, I was appearing at the Premier Theatre in Detroit and David got up and started singing with me." "From that point on, adds Ruffin, "we've been a team and have toured the country with Mary Wells, Martha Reeves and Mary Wilson and The Supremes. It's just like the old days except that we're older, wiser and know how to stay out of each other's way! It's really a family affair."

BLACK TALENT DIRECTORY - The Beverly Hills/Hollywood NAACP recently hosted a press conference at the historic Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel to introduce the new National Black Talent Directory. This directory will list black professionals in every phase of the entertainment industry in a format that will include headshots, agent/manager information and union affiliation.

Although the idea of a directory for Black professionals first met with some skepticism, Jay Jay says, "I understand the tendency for people to wonder how something, which has never been, could ever be. But for those who looked to the past and doubted, I recall the words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., tomorrow is today"

The National Black Talent Directory will be distributed at no cost, to studios, independent production companies, casting and advertising agencies across the country, and will provide a convenient reference source for the vast pool of black talent that is available.

Who can be listed in the directory? Anyone who performs in front of the scenes athletes, singers, models, commentators, etc., and anyone who works behind the scenes. That means every black professional in the performing arts can and should be apart of this historic publication.

Delos International celebrates its Fifteenth Anniversary Year with a plethora of varied activity. A move to Chatsworth California has been recently been completed. The new facility is equipped with state of the art editing and mastering equipment including the Sony PCM 1630 digital mastering system. Last August Delos introduced its "Pocket Classic" line, the first commercially available 3 inch CD holding up to 20 minutes of music. Delos has released a sampler entitled "2001: A Sonic Odyssey" D/CD 2001 to mark the occasion. Upcoming full length releases for Spring 1988 include Wagner orchestral excerpts from *Lohengrin*, *Parsifal*, and the overture to *The Flying Dutchman*, D/CD 3053; Stravinsky's *Petrouchka* and Rimsky-Korsakov's *Russian*

Easter Overture, D/CD 3054 (The Seattle Symphony with Gerard Schwarz conducting both of the previously mentioned); Rachmaninoff's *Symphony No. 2* and other selections (James DePreist and The Oregon Symphony), D/CD 3071; The Yale Cellos "Play Favorites" D/CD 3042, and "French Organ Music" D/CD 3049.

In addition, Delos marks its 15th anniversary with the release of the specially priced "Symphonic Sound Stage" (D/CD 3052). Selections include excerpts from Stravinsky's *Firebird*, Prokofiev's *Romeo & Juliet*, and Haydn's Cello and Piano Concerti. Recording director John Eargle discusses at length, in the disc's liner notes, the challenges he and his recording team encountered, and the solutions arrived at in achieving the impressive results.

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



These two new releases of the Mozart Piano Trios represent the current approaches in performance practice of music of the late 1700's. The Borodin Trio performs on modern instruments and their performance of the Trios reflects a thoroughly modern reading and interpretation. Their sound is warm and sumptuous, and the low registers of the piano and cello come through with a deep resonance. The use of rubato, especially in the middle movements of the later works, gives these readings a decidedly "romantic" feeling. The Borodin Trio play with great emotion and fire, and, because the performance is on modern instruments, the listener is allowed to experience a full range of

musical emotion. While the music is definitely Mozart, we are given a glimpse ahead to the future that chamber was to take.

The performance of the London Fortepiano Trio is, on the other hand, a window to the past. The ensemble performs on period instruments; we hear the works as the composer himself heard them. A comparison of these two discs reveals some significant distinctions regarding performance practice. The London Fortepiano Trio observes all the repeat markings (the timings of the opening movements are markedly longer on the Hyperion disc), and the ensemble tunes flat to modern pitch, as was the practice in the Eighteenth Century.

The "fortepiano" possesses a truly delicate sound; in concert with the eighteenth-century violin and cello, the trios display a transparency and lightness that brings out the crucial balance between piano and strings. In K.496 (a relatively early work) Mozart charts new territory by allowing all three instruments to co-exist as equals, rather than as piano solo and string accompaniment, and the resulting textural contrast and instrumental interplay comes through with clarity and definition. The deep resonance and sonority of the Borodin Trio is replaced by an acuity of attack, and an overall delicate precision pervades the entire album. This performance on original instruments is the essence of "le bon gout" or Classical good taste.

spontaneous."

In fact, on "Stay Away", a driving Stones-type rocker, the spontaneity even extends to a spur of the moment background singing performance from Linda Ronstadt. Says Paich, "She was producing David Lindley down the hall at the Complex Studios (in West Los Angeles) and mentioned that she'd like to sing on our album. She hadn't put out any rock and roll in about eight years... everyone said she wouldn't do it, she just doesn't sing rock anymore. She came in and in about ten minutes carved 'Stay Away' and just blew us all away." Also appearing on the album is Jon Anderson of Yes contributing to "Stop Loving You" (Paich calls his work "far-east scatting"), David Lindley, Patti Austin, Tom Scott and legendary songwriter Jimmy Webb (who co-wrote "Home of The Brave").

On this album Paich reaffirms his commitment to greater lyrical substance, including songs called "Mushanga" about a poor Haitian girl named after an African princess, "Only The Children," a plea for compassion for kids, "A Thousand Years," a beautiful warning for environmentally ravaged earth, and "Home Of The Brave," a tune about getting back to the original concepts of America's forefathers. Says Paich "As we're starting to have wives and families, our focus is changing from girlfriends to more important issues in the world."

Toto's standards for production haven't diminished a bit on this LP, and George Massenburg and Bill Payne were brought in to add an extra dimension. "Massenburg is a very accomplished technical engineer, familiar with digital," says Paich. "Plus we wanted someone who could produce a variety of sounds. He has 20 years experience working with everybody from Earth Wind and Fire to Phil Collins. He's has a good ear for feel, and knows when to push us. Billy Payne is his right hand man in the booth, and he pushed us to strive for looser performances - he pushed Steve Lukather to do things he'd never done on record. These two producers were an elite team that could push a band like Toto that's used to producing themselves."

Paich feels that *The Seventh One* is a definite progression for Toto, while at the same time retaining the basic elements that have contributed to their success. "What you're hearing now is what Toto was meant to be...giving people a good beat to dance to, with some lyrical substance, a good melody and rocking guitars, layered with the kind of orchestral synthesizing we do. In 1978 we were one of the few groups to use all these elements. Now with more bands adopting this sound, it's a challenge for us to try to find new ways to use synths and production. Mostly we've tried to improve our songwriting from a qualitative standpoint, including the never ending search to write better and better lyrics. We want to outdo ourselves while staying open to the music around us."

If the fresh direction of *The Seventh One* is any indication of the future, Toto may decide that to live by the sword is to thrive by the sword. *Touché* guys.

So there were things missing at the Garden. The audience (on this night, ranging from little kids with their moms to Leonard Bernstein) was polite, like they were in a Broadway theatre. They didn't scream, didn't stand and dance, didn't rush the

stage. Michael, for all his efforts, never really communicated with the 20,000 in the way that, say, Bruce Springsteen does. He was there, singing and dancing like crazy, but he was something to watch, not the focus of an intense, communal rock 'n' roll experience.

And the whole show seemed a little facile, a little too perfectly-plotted. Not only was "Thriller" sung, but the video was re-created (complete with wolf mask). Same with "Beat It" and "The Way You Make Me Feel" (similar clothes as in the videos, similar dance steps). Show biz. Broadway. Vegas.

What was phenomenal, however, what out-smoked the flashpots and out-shined the lasers was, purely and simply, Michael Jackson singing and dancing. Forget the *chotchkas* and the special effects, the guy truly is a once-in-a-generation show business talent. "Billie Jean," the best number of the evening - and the best song on either *Thriller* or *Bad* - exemplified everything that is wonderful about the man. With a slouch hat over one eye, and a bright, white spotlight directly over his head, Michael Jackson sang the lyric with an angry, frustrated yelp as he unleashed a jaw-dropping series of dance steps. Gliding, floating, flitting across the stage like magic. He's here, he's there, I-know-I-saw-him-do-it-but-I-don't-believe-he-did-it kind of dancing. Unbelievable. In fact, the whole show was a two-hour terpsichorean display the likes of which haven't been since M-G-M folded up its backlot. Which is, of course, why it took the videos to really put *Thriller* across. Michael Jackson isn't a singer, he's an entire show business creature. Hearing him is one thing - if he's got a great song, he's got a great record - but seeing the whole shootin'-match is the only way to appreciate the man's talent. Vaudeville is dead, and the idea of Michael Jackson going on Broadway for a couple of years is absurd. Videos were the answer, and Michael Jackson was canny enough to know that right from the start. But they're nothing compared to seeing him live.

Thing is, though, it ain't rock 'n' roll. It's American musical theatre taken to a completely new level. The Michael Jackson Show is an M-G-M all-singing, all-dancing spectacle for the '80s. The *Times* should've sent along their Broadway critic, too.

DAVID SLATER - Exchange Of Hearts - Capitol, C1-48307

David Slater's vocals never seem to be strained, even though he's accomplished at vocal emphasis. This Capitol album features Slater's comfortable vocals in the midst of some great production and arrangement sounds. Also, the studio musicians did themselves proud on this product. 


joyable mood moves. Excellent product for, and by, David Slater.

What a wonderful, wonderful record! The dulcimer is the accompaniment for Dolly's soft and beautiful vocal on the first verse. Add harmony highlights in the chorus, and a bass beginning the second verse. Now, you have the deceptively simple sound of this production. It's a beautiful little story painted with bright lyrics and a happy melody. It's a perfect combination of folk and country



sounds. Dolly does some carefree vocal rambling to fade. Watch this one capture the nation!!

FEATURE PICKS

ROSANNE CASH (Columbia, 38-07746) *If You Change Your Mind* (4:00) (Chelcalt-BMI; Alamo, Little Nemo-ASCAP) (R. Cash, H. De Vito) (Producer: R. Crowell)

Rosanne is back on track with this release. She really impresses us with her honest and relaxed vocals. This product also features a strong beat and outstanding production. When one thinks about the lonely lyrics, they become a positive statement. The short phrasing combines with the melody to create a smoothly flowing song and sound.

THE DESERT ROSE BAND (MCA/Curb, 53274) *He's Back And I'm Blue* (3:05) (Termite-affiliate unlisted) (M. Woody, R. Anderson) (Producer: P. Worley)

This super group, with outstanding harmony, surely has a winner here! If they never get out of *this* groove, we'll still be happy. Steel guitar slides and fills combine with fine pickin' and provide an attraction for the listener in addition to the harmony. This song is no less than great. It takes us back to some Beatles-sound memories. Great!

BILLY JOE ROYAL (Atlantic America, 7-99364) *Out Of Sight And On My Mind* (3:49) (Ensign-BMI; Jack and Jill, Rebel Heart-ASCAP) (B. Burch, R. Peoples) (Producer: N. Larkin)

There's no mistaking the singer on this release. The whole product result is one, big "feel" tailored for Billy Joe Royal. Nelson Larkin knows Billy Joe, and what his production needs, so well. The song has a good hook, and is equally well-written. Royal is a master at vocal emphasis. There's an overall 50's sound to the arrangement. We loved it!

Southern Reign...
"Keeping The Dream Alive!"

"Competing is tough! When you watch the charts, week after week, and see all the talented acts who are competing for numbers, it's *very* tough. But, we keep struggling and working hard...keeping the dream alive!"

When Southern Reign stopped by our Cash Box offices, they were in town to put the finishing touches on their new album. Recording at Oak Valley Studio, with Kevin McManus engineering and Ray Pennington and Jesse Shoffner producing, they seemed very pleased with their project to date.

Those are the words on the back of Southern Reign's bus... "Keeping The Dream Alive!". And, Southern Reign is managing to do pretty well at keeping their dream going. Jeff Crocker, of San Antonio, Texas, and Patsy McKeehan, of Sweetwater, Tennessee, are the talented singing duo of the group known as Southern Reign, and we were pleased to have them drop by our Nashville offices recently.

Since July of 1987, Southern Reign has been signed to one of the most sales-productive labels in Nashville...Step One Records. Their first single on Step One's label was titled "Cheap Motels," and it climbed right up the charts for them being, in fact, on top of the Indie Chart for two weeks. But, the road has been a tough one to travel according to Jeff and Patsy, whose comments were reinforced by their manager Randy Cudd.

Randy was instrumental in bringing the two talented singers together. Patsy has her nursing cap and had practiced that profession until she began singing with Jeff, and Southern Reign was formed. In fact, Patsy was nursing her ill mother in Corpus Christi, Texas, when the three (including Randy) put the act together.

Jeff remarked, "We're doing what we want to do. Other people may not understand because they have never had the opportunity to perform." Patsy added, "We have our ups and downs, but we manage to reinforce one another and just go back after it."

Southern Reign performs a mixture of contemporary and traditional country music, which personifies today's country scene. Jeff remarked, "We don't have a preference. What ever comes along (songs) and smacks us between the eyes...that's what we like." Patsy continued the conversation with, "I used to tell people that I could only sing 'country,' but country covers a lot of ground right now!"

Southern Reign's rise to national prominence has certainly been well earned. As Jeff said, "There have been a lot of people in the trade who have helped us. But, we have never had a major backer. One thing, which has really been tough, is our road schedule. We played 315 dates in '87. Since we don't have a great deal of money behind us, we must be out there generating income. We really wish we could spend more time in Nashville, and in the studio."

So, if you're driving down the highway someday, and you are behind a bus with the slogan "Keeping The Dream Alive" painted on the rear end, you will be following Southern Reign. But, remember this...Southern Reign is a hard act to follow. If you pass the bus, give Jeff Crocker and Patsy McKeehan the "thumbs up" sign. They're doing a great job through talent and hard work.

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

Merit produces a vast amount of song demos for their writers and, through singing some of those, Bernie has had a couple of major labels show more than casual interest in him as an artist. Bernie admitted, "I guess, eventually, that is where I would like to be."

"I've been in Nashville nearly four years. I've had some marginal success and I'm still having a good time. I believe, if you're writing good material, and... if you stick with it, success will come in time." When one looks at the songs he has recorded by such artists as The Whites, John Anderson, Russell Smith, Dana McVicker, and Canadian songstress Carol Baker, one must admit Bernie's time is close if it isn't already here.

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AROUND THE ROUTE

During the course of our calls this past week we've heard nothing but praise for the current crop of equipment, which is a credit to the manufacturers. Normally, this should make for a healthy situation, except for the frustration some distributors are experiencing as orders pile up and cannot be filled because the machines are not coming in fast enough. A main culprit is the chip shortage. As Atlas Dist. prexy Jerry Marcus summed it up, there's plenty of good equipment to sell but at the same time there's a shortage of product on hand to satisfy customer demand. So what you have is an abundance of quality - but a lack of quantity. Better this than the reverse? Who knows!

Chicago area ops are certainly getting more than their share of grief these days. First, the ordinance they thought had been shelved has not only resurfaced, but was passed on February 26 (details elsewhere in this issue) - meaning no one under 17 can play games **anywhere** between 8 am and 3 pm on school days. Added to this is the swipe at poker games by Channel 2 news (CBS-tv), which aired consecutive segments focusing on machines located in the Cicero community and claiming that sizeable sums of money are being exchanged even though the machines are being operated "for amusement only." This is not the kind of publicity the trade needs. It's unfortunate that a few bad apples always have to make it tough for the good guys. Makes you kind of wonder how these things gets started and why they invariably seem to come up just when the industry is lookin' good.

Dateline Addison, IL, home of Seeburg, where they just finished doubling their previous office space and announced the March 1 release of the first Seeburg Hot Hits compact disc, which contains thirteen of the Top 40 songs for programming on the Laser Music System boxes. Also coming up is an All Occasion c.d. with twenty-three individual tunes ranging from Auld Lang Syne to Happy Birthday, with various ethnic specialties in between. Executive veepee Joe Pankus (who was on his way to Iowa to conduct a 4-hour workshop on music and jukeboxes at the state convention on March 5) advised that the factory's c.d. juke is doing well now that "ops are becoming believers in the fact that the system not only works but has the capability for bringing in double to quadruple earnings!" A number of changes have been incorporated into the Laser Music System including more computer power and internal access cash box, which increased the size of the cash box by 30% - to name a couple. In addition, Seeburg is now offering an "outstanding lease/purchase plan which does not compromise cash flow," said Joe.

Party time. Received word from Banner Specialty in Pittsburg that everything's all set for their Open House - Spring Showcase, slated for

Sunday, March 20 between the hours of 1 pm and 4 pm. There'll be an open bar plus hors d'oeuvres and all sorts of goodies. The theme is "Banner Brings 'Reno' To Pittsburg", so you'll know what to expect in the showroom! And by the way, the invitation reads Adults Only.

Dateline Union City, NJ, where the phones are buzzin' and all hands at American Shuffleboard Co. are involved in keeping pace with the tremendous worldwide demand for shuffleboards. While the game has always enjoyed popularity in the states, and continues to do so, there's been a growing surge of interest in the European market (particularly Spain and England) and in Japan. Leagues and tournaments are forming all over the place. As a matter of fact, within the next month or so "The Best of Texas" competition will be held, pitting Dallas players against their counterparts in Houston - and thus far there will be about 64 teams, possibly more, participating in the tournament. Our good buddies Sol Lipkin and Dick Delfino were getting ready for their trip to Reno when we called. They planned to attend ACME '88 and also to meet with some of their customers from Japan. In Sol's case, he'll also get to spend some time with his son, Gene, who is now based in Maryland, heading up a firm that will be expanding into the coin-op amusement industry.

Growing, growing. The Cleveland Coin branch in Michigan is moving, this month, into a more spacious, new 10,000 sq. ft. facility in Livonia which, we understand, is a knock-out in terms of showroom accommodations and everything else. Prexy Ron Gold tells us an open house celebration is being planned for mid-April. As to current business, the Cleveland Coin network is doing beautifully. "We had an unprecedented February," said Ron, "which I feel is attributable to the quality of equipment which operators are definitely responding to, and this applies to both kits and dedicated games," he added. The latest CC newsletter, by the way, is headlined "February - National Conversion Kit Month" and Ron hastened to point out that this house organ is geared to "inform" more than anything else, and to keep ops posted on new equipment and what's happening in the market. As we spoke Ron commented, "It's nice to be able to look at our industry and feel good about it. In this business, you have to keep moving and making adjustments to stay in tune with the times. What we have been experiencing is a rebuilding process that began in 1983 and is now being completed," he continued. "At Cleveland Coin, over the past five years, we've been adding to our staff and bringing in younger people who are providing a new energy level which is definitely a plus factor for our industry."

'Assurances' Granted In Red Baron Vs. AAMA/Taito Case

CHICAGO - Bill Beckham, chairman of American Operators for Equal Treatment, announced the result of a hearing in Federal Court on Red Baron's Alexandria, VA antitrust and copyright suit against AAMA and Taito (Cash Box, 3/12/88). Beckham's Red Baron video game arcade companies had sued AAMA and Taito for conspiring to impose a "tie-in" on U.S. operators of video games, and for refusing to sell various top ranking video games on a kit basis here in the U.S. when these games are available as kits elsewhere in the world.

Red Baron asked the court for a temporary restraining order whereby the AAMA (American Amusement Machine Assn.) and Taito should not, during the interim of the suit, "raid" Red Baron's arcades, instigate any F.B.I. or customs raids on them, or sue Red Baron for copyright infringement, or "harass" them in any way. "Basically my concern was that because of my public stance against the AAMA position, I felt it was only a matter of time before they carried out one of their famous 'raids' on one of my establishments," stated Bill Beckham.

Beckham advised that the court asked AAMA and Taito whether they could give the court two assurances. The first assurance is that they had no plans at present to sue Red Baron's arcades or instigate a raid against them. The second assurance is the AAMA and Taito would in fact not

sue or raid Red Baron without giving advance notice to Beckham's attorneys and to the Alexandria Court, so that it could pass on the matter.

Beckham noted that "when AAMA and Taito assured the court on these two points, Red Baron's attorneys agreed that these assurance served the purpose that led to Red Baron's request for interim protection against raids and suits." Therefore, he added, no temporary restraining order was issued.

"The most important thing is that the preliminary hearing is over and I feel comfortable I will not get harassed or intimidated while this issue is being settled by the court," said Beckham. "I was glad to hear the judge state that this matter would be heard in the near future because I think all American operators would like to get this matter settled once and for all, and go back to working with the manufacturers again to make the American coin-op industry one that works together for the betterment of all."

When Cash Box contacted Vernon Lloyd, general counsel for Taito America, for his reaction to the hearing, he did not comment on the assurances, but did state that Red Baron's "requests for a temporary restraining order and a preliminary injunction were denied."

Donald Barnes, counsel to AAMA, said "The temporary restraining order and preliminary injunction

(Ed Note: In response to the highly publicized suit filed by Red Baron Amusements against AAMA and Taito, the Amusement and Music Operators Association issued the following letter to the members of the AAMA board of directors, which Cash Box is reproducing here in its entirety. The letter was signed by William W. Carpenter, executive vice president of AMOA.)

Gentlemen:

It has been reported to me that during the hearing before the court on February 19, 1988, in the case brought against AAMA, Taito Corp. and Taito America Corp. by Red Baron-Franklin Park Inc. and Fun factories of Ohio Inc. counsel for AAMA and Taito America Corp. represented to the court that while the case is pending, neither Taito America Corp. nor AAMA would carry out any investigation of the plaintiffs or bring any copyright infringement proceeding against them without first advising the court of their intention to do so. I understand that these representations were made in the context of Judge Hilton's observation that since the issues presented by the case would be decided rather quickly, it would be inappropriate for the defendants to take such action.

AMOA believes that Judge Hilton's comments are well taken. Complex antitrust and copyright law questions are presented by the Red Baron litigation and it would be inappropriate for AAMA or any of its members to proceed against the plaintiffs with regard to matters raised by the complaint until those questions have been decided. The same thing would be true of efforts by AAMA or its members to proceed against other video game operators with regard to parallel imports. AMOA requests, therefore, that AAMA agree to suspend its enforcement actions against AMOA video game operators with regard to parallel imports until there has been a judicial resolution of the Red Baron litigation. The agreement by AAMA which we request would be consistent with the views expressed by Judge Hilton and equitable to the many parties which are concerned with the questions presented by the Red Baron case.

AMOA Endorses Berne Convention Implementation Act; Calls For Improvement In Jukebox Licensing System

CHICAGO - The Amusement & Music Operators Association has endorsed pending changes in U.S. copyright law which would permit the United States to join the Berne Convention while preserving the compulsory jukebox license.

Walter G. Bohrer, Jr., president of AMOA, testified on February 9 before the U.S. House Subcommittee on Courts, Civil Liberties and the Administration of Justice on the Berne Convention. He endorsed the Berne Convention Implementation Act of 1988, co-sponsored by Rep. Robert Kastenmeier (D.-Wisconsin) and Rep. Carlos Moorhead (R.-California) which includes preservation of the existing compulsory jukebox license. He also called for an improvement in the U.S. jukebox licensing system.

Bohrer told the subcommittee that the legislation (H.R. 1623) is, "a carefully worded bill... (which) preserves the option that copyright owners and jukebox operators may reach voluntary agreements; preserves the compulsory license as the fall back to voluntary agreements until something better is put in its place; and leaves open the options of this committee to review the compulsory license, the fees paid under it, and the means of enforcement in the future."

AMOA reported that spokespersons for Broadcast Music Inc. (BMI) and the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) also endorsed the Berne Convention implementation legislation including reluctant agreement with the inclusion of a compulsory license provision.

All three groups reportedly agreed that the Berne convention is not "self-executing" - meaning adherence to the Convention will not change any U.S. law. The Berne Convention is intended to standardize international copyright treatment of literary, musical, and other artistic works performed in a country other than the country where they were created. A consensus has emerged among most U.S. copyright owners that adherence will lead to greater international protection of U.S. copyrights, increasing payments for sales and performance of U.S. books and music overseas.

"Because the Berne Convention is not self-executing," Bohrer said, "the President and U.S. Congress must decide what, if any, changes in U.S. law are needed to make our laws compatible with Berne. U.S. adherence to the Berne convention will not automatically result in U.S. law being changed to accord to Berne's position," he continued.

"AMOA urges that Congress make its intention to that effect indisputably clear," Bohrer added.

Rep. Kastenmeier, subcommittee chairman, drew agreement from Gloria Messenger, ASCAP managing director, and Robin Ahrold, BMI vice president of corporate relations, that the treaty is not self-executing.

On compulsory licensing, ASCAP's prepared statement claimed that the three implementing bills (H.R. 1623, H.R. 2962 and S. 1301) "all treat the jukebox compulsory license the same way; the compulsory license contained in 17 U.S.C. section 116 is abolished." Messenger did not repeat this statement in her oral presentation, which is directly contradictory to the interpretation of H.R. 1623 given by its principal author, Rep. Kastenmeier, according to AMOA.

ASCAP also said that, "in a more perfect world, we would strongly advocate complete abolition of 17 U.S.C. section 116. But we also recognize that political realities may dictate the type of treatment set forth in the proposed legislation."

BMI also seemed to go along reluctantly with the compulsory licensing provision, with Ahrold noting that, "although BMI would prefer no compulsory licensing at all... Section 8 of this bill faces the practical and political realities."

Rep. Kastenmeier has previously made clear the need for compulsory licensing for the present. In House testimony he has said that although the pending Berne Convention Implementation Act would subordinate compulsory licensing to negotiations, "if, after a year, negotiations are terminated at some future date, then a compulsory license... is 'standing by' to ensure that jukebox music will always be available to the public."

In his testimony, Bohrer, while emphasizing the present need for the compulsory licensing system, maintained that the "system is also susceptible to abuse."

Bohrer said that "under pressure from the performing rights societies the rates for 1983 were sharply increased. This short-sighted action spurred a new decline in the number of jukeboxes, particularly operator-owned jukeboxes."

Contending that the new fees "are out of line with those for background music and the requirement that a multi-site operator has to pay for his registration fees for all of his jukeboxes all at once in the first month of the year is a severe financial hardship," Bohrer maintained that "jukebox operators had no choice but

to walk away from newly unprofitable locations."

Noting that AMOA had been able to negotiate a voluntary agreement with performing rights societies to provide rebates, Bohrer said, however, that the targets set in the agreement for rebates in 1987 have been missed and warned that unless the agreement is revised, "future targets will be missed."

"We have a reverse chicken-and-egg situation: as fees go up, individual locations, which are less likely to register, have an economic disadvantage over larger operators. Ownership of jukeboxes, therefore, shifts to individual locations," Bohrer said. "Registrations decline still further and the burden falls all the more heavily on responsible firms which comply."

which Red Baron was seeking, was denied. As far as AAMA is concerned the only statement we made to the court was that we will continue to

follow our well publicized, existing procedure which is to contact an operator, or his counsel, to initially attempt to informally resolve any problems we may have with his operation."

City Ordinance Hits Chicago Ops

CHICAGO - Operators in the Chicago area are currently faced with an ordinance that was passed by the City Council on February 26, 1988, prohibiting anyone under the age of 17 from operating (playing) any automatic amusement device between the hours of 8 am and 3 pm on days when the city's public schools are in session. The ordinance has far reaching effects since it applies to all locations rather than just those that are within the boundaries of schools. Also, as in many cities, there are schools that might hold special classes or activities on Saturdays.

A further part of the ordinance states that no person, firm, corporation, organization or other legal entity shall permit persons under the age of 17 from playing games on the premises of retail establishments that

sell alcoholic beverages. This could have a tremendous economic impact on restaurants, bowling alleys and the like which young people are permitted to patronize so long as they do not purchase liquor.

The Chicago Metropolitan Music and Amusement Association, which is the local operators' organization, has already set the wheels in motion to address the situation and, hopefully, resolve it. A Chicago Amusement Legal Defense Fund has been established, according to the association's executive vice president Art Seeds, among its purposes being to implement immediate contacts with representatives in the City Council in the hopes of setting aside the ordinance through political contacts or, if necessary, by legal action.

15 YEARS AGO IN CASH BOX

MOA board members are gearing up for the annual mid-year board of directors meeting, scheduled for March 22-24 at the Americana Hotel in Miami Beach, Florida where plans will be finalized for this year's 25th anniversary Expo. As noted by the association's executive veepee Fred Granger - "Expo '72 was the most successful in the association's history" and MOA anticipates that the '73 event will be even bigger...
