RYBAK TO KZZP

"Look what's coming down the chimney! It's **Stef Rybak**,"said the new PD of KZZP-Phoenix of his move.

Starting December 1, Rybak will hold the position left vacant when **Bob Case** left for **KUBE**-Seattle last month. He leaves **KC101 (WCKI)**-New Haven, Conn. after nine successful years, the last five as Program Director. "I started as Assistant Waterboy," Rybak told the Gavin Report.

"I'm thrilled to be getting in such a well respected and stable organization with so many talented people," he continued. "I would not be leaving my tremendous situation at KC101 if I didn't believe we'd be successful."

Said Nationwide Group Manager/KZZP General Manager Dale Weber: "I'm delighted Stef is joining us. He's considered a bright, up-and-coming program director. We want him on our team!"

There's no word on who'll replace Rybak at KC101, although he told the Gavin Report he's given station MD **Tom Poleman** his vote of confidence.

Midcontinent Signs On LITTLE OPENS CONSULTANCY

After 20 years in the business, two-timeGavin Award winning Top 40 programmer Jonathan Little has decided to leave Midcontinent Media to form Jonathan Little Consulting.

Although Little leaves Midcontinent after bringing its Madison station Z104 (WZEE) up into the 20-share strata, he will remain associated with the 10-station chain since they have signed on as his first clients.

"Although we are disap-

pointed to see Jonathan leave, we are excited to have him continue his association with the stations,"

said Dave Martin, company Vice President, Radio Division. "Jonathan's programming expertise has been and will

continue to be an integral part of our success."

Pilatus, Morvan Return Grammy

Who cares about lip synching? Looks like NARAS does. The long suspected revelation that original Milli Vanilli members Rob Pilatus and Fab Morvan didn't sing on the universal mega-selling album *Girl You Know Its True* irked the Grammy folks so much that they're forcing the pair to return the statues they received in January. Pilatus and Morvan have indicated that the Grammy should go to Charles Shaw, Johnny Davis and Brad Howell, said to be the *actual* singers on *Girl...*

Although producer Frank Farian engineered the hoax, Rob and Fab are taking the bulk of the heat. And MV's label, Arista, hotly denies any knowledge of the dynamic duo's suspected lack of vocal power.

"Arista Records and their executives did not know Rob Pilatus and Fab Morvan did not sing on the Milli Vanilli album, and any assertions to the contrary are false and libelous," said a representative of the label. The company also supports NARAS' rescinding of MV's awards, saying the action will preserve the integrity of the awards procedures.

The incident has spawned a series of side issues, including the predictable consumer lawsuits and the question of a booking agreement signed with the Famous Artists Agency. Already scheduled is an appearance at next month's Rock In Rio, but with Rob and Fab out it's not clear who'll be playing Milli Vanilli.

The aritsts (?) themselves, who started the brouhaha by asking to sing on the next Milli Vanilli album, held a press conference on Tuesday, November 20, and played a demo tape cut over the weekend. So far, reviews are mixed.

Known as mainly a Top 40 programmer, Little has developed what he calls "Thirtysomething," a blend of what he says are the strongest elements of Top 40, Adult Contemporary and Album Radio. "There are thirty-plus contemporary music fans who still like to rock, but not necessarily to a heavy metal hair band," Little explains. Another CONT. ON PAGE 4



Negative press about the inner workings of the music industry sure hasn't been in short supply in 1990. Earlier this year, we had the uproar about artists lip synching in concert, followed by the book Hit Men, excerpts of which made the pages of Vanity Fair-and now the Milli Vanilli scandal. Print and broadcast journalists had and are having a field day with the story. In less time than it takes to scream "phony baloney," stations were organizing record burnings, taking listener polls on whether or not to continue playing the duo's music or running satirical contests and bits about the hoax. As if the insults weren't enough, the mother of a fourteen-year-old boy is taking legal action, filing a class action suit claiming, "The entire Milli Vanilli success story is a fake foisted upon unsuspecting consumers by the defendants in this action who bilked untold numbers of consumers, many of them children, out of tens of millions of dollars." Though few would defend the actions of Rob Pilatus and Fab Morvan or Producer Frank Farian, there is a case to be made for the entertainment value of the music. Farian's winning formula resulted in the sale of a reported seven million albumsseven million! A lot of people obviously enjoyed the string of hits that received heavy airplay over the past two years, something that shouldn't be diminished by the fact that someone other than Rob and Fab were actually singin' and rappin'. It's unfortunate that producer Farian chose to market the music the way he did, but aren't the songs the bottom line? The appeal of these Pop melodies, not the visual images of Milli Vanilli, turned these tunes into Top Five chart winners. Their "look" may have enhanced their appeal, but good looks and slick videos can't make up for weak music. If anyone should feel badly, it's the National Academy Of Recording Arts And Sciences, who awarded a Grammy to the pair as "Best New Artist." But when it comes to the Grammy's track record of choosing new artists, I agree with L.A. Times' critic Robert Hilburn who pointed out, "What names come quickly to mind when you think of the most acclaimed Pop artists of the last two decades? Prince, Bruce Springsteen, U2, Elton John, Sinead O'Connor, David Bowie? None won a Grammy for "Best New Artist." Instead, the Academy voters have honored the likes of America, the Starland Vocal Band, Christopher Cross, A Taste Of Honey and Debby Boone." While virtually all singers and musicians perform their music in studios and on tour, the Milli Vanilli affair is hardly the first instance where "production license" was stretched to the limit. How often have you gone to a show where someone will in-


variably comment, "Boy, they sure don't sound like they do on record." If music is meant to entertain, is the music of Milli Vanilli any less entertaining now that these new facts have been revealed? Hopefully, from now on, all credit will go to those who really deserve it.

When I first heard that the Monkees didn't play their own instruments (or so the rumor went), I remember that twinge of embarrassment. I should a bought that Yardbirds album. Since that day, I could never relate to the Monkee phenom, especially the big revival of the late eighties.

Milli Vanilli. Who's to bless and who's to blame? While it's hard to feel sorry for the posers Robert Pilatus and Fabrice Morvan, who can ignore the humiliation they must have felt during every performance? According to the Washington Post, two weeks into a ten week European tour "they were literally in tears" over the hoax in which they openly participated. How about the record company? An easy target, but since the

Milli Vanilli project (and that's precisely what it is, a project rather than music) began as an obscure German production, probably an aquisition, it's hard to finger point at Arista because what resulted was viable disposible pop that any keen A&R ears would have signed. If anyone is directly to blame for the hoax, it's the producer who knowingly foisted the project onto unknowing legions of young consumers. And we've let the role of producer get out of hand from bullying young signings to turning a lot of rock n roll into formula drivel.

Forget the six thousand Grammy voters and their frigging awards. I see a bigger issue.

Milli Vanilli isn't really anything new. No-talents have been propped up by anonymous sidemen since recording began. Who can forget those awful taped

ELO concerts? Yet it's only during the last decade that technology has entered the picture in a frightening way.

Picture an empty couch in the recording studio.

The first person relegated to the couch was the drummer. As drum machines became more sophisticated, it became harder to tell man from machine. Sampling replaced the individual sound of a classic snare. With the introduction of sequencing, here comes the bass player, our next studio couch potato. As individual sounds and notes are arranged, there goes the unique phrasing that distinguishes each different bassist. Next, synthesizers were able to ape the voltage and imprecision of guitar playing. Guitarists have found themselves increasingly out of demand on Top Forty records. It was always the

imprecise synchronisation between the left and right hands, the varied voltage coming from a guitar pick-up that gave guitarists a false sense of security. Move over, guys. One more to the couch.

The couch begins to fill up. In fact, we need one of those nine footers. Here comes the string section and sampled horns. Here comes the background singers. Since one phrase can be looped onto a chip they needn't record each and every verse. Finally, with Milli Vanilli in the studio and Madonna, Janet Jackson, the New Kids and Paula Abdul onstage, here come the vocalists.

Hey, we could start a whole band with the people just sitting on this couch.

A couple of points I'd like to argue with those in favor of the overuse of studio and live tech-

nology. I've heard folks defend the live lip synching that goes on by saying that the audience loves the dance steps, that it's too much to expect both singing and strenuous dancing from a performer. Tell that to James Brown. Tell that to about ten thousand singers and dancers in New York City alone who make their living on the theater stage. New York Times writer Jon Parales noted that when leaving some of these lip synch shows, the audience doesn't quite seem satisfied or fulfilled. Sure, just one person's

observation. Yet maybe it's a matter of upgrading the level of talent when it comes to staging a live rock and dance show. Anything less than James Brown, take a hike. Maybe a warning on a twenty-five dollar ticket isn't such a ridiculous idea after all.

know you can't fight technology. Nobody on God's earth can. I run my writing through a computerized spell and grammar

checker. Technology can be a wonderful thing, a beautiful time saver. Yet when lines are crossed, there has to be some sense of artistic morality when it comes to defining the role of producer. Nobody stood up when they came for the drummer. The bass player was taken away without notice. Ditto the rest of the sidepersons. Now they've yanked the lead singer on seven million unsuspecting record buyers.

Every profession has its black eye symbolizing an industry's foible. The stock market has insider traders. The computer business has copyright infringement and espionage. Congress has lobbyists. Farming has pesticides. Automakers, pollution.

ON MANAGEMENT

THE TOUGHEST DECISION YOU'LL PROBABLY MAKE

hink about this: A company called Promeon manufactures components for pacemakers. It used to require 112 people to make 80,000 units in 30 working days. Now, it takes 23 people to make 105,000 units in one hour. No, these 232 people are not bionic. They're not slaves, either. On the contrary, they are well-trained folks who have been supplied with modern tools and technology and have been given the authority to get the job done without a lot of supervisorcops and suffocating management layers inhibiting them.

Fewer managers, fewer supervisors, fewer workers: Better business. In contrast to conventional wisdom, the best-run organizations usually have fewer rather than more people (managers and nonmanagers) on the payroll. Poorly run departments or firms are usually staffed by managers who constantly demand more people and bigger staffs. The best run shops are those with fewer bodies, but ones who are working smarter and have better tools (equipment, software, etc.).

In fact, most organizations I've seen are overstaffed, sometimes by several hundred percent. Too many cooks spoil the broth. Any manager who is interested in making a major transformation in his or her organization will ultimately have to wrestle with the most painful career decision he or she will have to make: that of possible layoffs.

Layoffs are gutwrenching human tragedies, yet they are sometimes unavoidable. If you've simply got too many people in corporate staff, or too many layers of middle managers passing paper to each other, or if you're faced with people at any level or function who are consistently resistant to the kinds of changes you are trying to implement, or if you've got people who are simply incapable of meeting your new business priorities—you may not have much choice but to consider layoffs.

As mentioned before, layoffs may be the toughest decision you'll have to make as a manager. The way to reduce some of the negative impact is to be honest and open with your people. Tell them why layoffs might be likely, when and how. Don't hide the possibility. Don't spring it on people. Keep them posted. Circumvent the pernicious rumor mill by being open with your people and establishing options to layoffs (like learning new skills, or taking new positions—perhaps in different locales—or taking reductions in pay). Establish outplacement services and counseling for those who are laid off. Tell the survivors why the layoffs have occurred, and what will now happen to the survivors. Don't drag out the layoffs. Don't keep the possibility of further layoffs dangling over peoples' heads like a guillotine. Do it quickly and then get on with it—develop and build your remaining workforce to be a truly competitive one. And of course, keep on reassuring them, training them, involving them, empowering them and always keep them up to date about what you're thinking. Remember, they're rightfully nervous and looking at you with a crooked eye.

Even if you don't know whether layoffs will be necessary, but have not ruled out the possibility, let people know. I recently came across this memo that a CEO of a large firm distributed throughout the organization. The firm was beginning a major transformation in its strategy and structure which was called OI (Operations Improvement). He wrote as follows:

"The most frequently asked question as we begin this process is: 'Will there be staff reductions?' While not enough data is yet available to know the extent of possible workforce reductions, I do acknowledge that position elimination and staff reductions are possible outcomes of the OI process. Sixty percent of our operating expense is labor—so any significant measures to reduce expenses must include examining how we use our human resources. Doing OI now, when we are not in crisis, allows us to take a careful and planned approach to any labor reductions. We are committed to handling this in a professional manner—our option of first choice for staff reductions will be attrition."

An honest straight memo on a very difficult subject—a true rarity.

The worst thing you can do as a manager is to allow a crisis mentality to overtake the firm, which you then respond to by kneejerk layoffs to improve the short-term quarterlies, with little thought as to who's being let go or why. That sort of approach will not only destroy morale among survivors, but it is a truly dumb way of dealing with your business because almost invariably you are helping sever organizational muscle as well as fat. It's like saying you need to lose 30 pounds quickly in order to enter a footrace and do so by cutting off your right leg. Only with a non-panicked non-crisis mindset can you control the process-"thoughtfully, carefully, sensitively," to quote the above CEO again.

It's a tough call. I've seen it happen, and it took me a long time to recuperate even though I was just an observer. But sometimes the tough call is the right call. It should be a last resort, but if it comes to that, remember that you're hurting everyone in the business if you fail to act.

P.D. NOTEBOOK

n my twelve years of writing this column, that is unquestionably the most cosmic headline I've ever written! It expresses well the remaining portion of the keynote address from the 1972 Gavin Radio Programming Confer-

ence in San Francisco, which I have been rethe complexity of the design, (it may) be necessary to have biological life on this planet possibly to support, finally, the development of the human, with his unique capability of mind, not (found) in the other creatures."

He noted that all creatures on earth except man (but including early man) "have beautifully programmed drives, so that they will

> inadvertantly do the right thing." We are now realizing, he said, that we don't *have* to follow nature's programming and act short-sightedly, but can take the longer view.

Addressing the conference again as a group of radio broadcasters, Dr. Fuller went on, "You have the opportunity to really enlighten and clarify ... I think there's a possibility that man may really make it on our planet, and I'm quite confident about what his function in the universe is: A universe that is regenerative will have some very complex local problems; there must be somewhere you

thing there is to know, becoming "comprehensivists"—by discovering, learning and applying the principles of the universe!

This week's column concludes those remarks with Fuller's moving on to an even more sweeping and fundamental question a question particularly relevant to this Thanksgiving week, as it turns out: "I would like to see if we can gain any clues to what Man is doing here in the universe! Why is he here?" He went on, "I certainly don't find it logical to assume, as Shakespeare speaks, (that) all the world's a stage, and (we are) all players on it, and that we are here (simply) to be amused or displeased."

Some would say that what Fuller had to say in answer is somewhat mystical. Certainly that one of the leading minds of the 20th century—a scientist and mathematician, as well as a philosopher, inventor, architect and teacher—came up with this does lend uncommon force to it.

The purpose must somehow have to do with our extraordinary brains, he said. "It's logical to assume, in a universe where eternal regeneration (of the cosmos) is involved, that there must be some important local problem (to solve)—when you think about

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need a little access to the 'big rules' (or 'principles of the universe'), and we (human beings) have that. I think we're very powerful *monitors*, in the universe, of local events." He noted we will need both love and courage to accomplish this function, however.

I imagine that view of the human race and its place in the universe was not incompatible with the views of most religions this Thanksgiving.

This, from Dr. R. Buckminster Fuller, over 18 years ago, before the attendees of the 1972 Gavin Radio Programming Conference. I remind you again that in 1991, at the next Gavin Seminar For Media Professionals, the keynote speaker will be Vladimir Pozner, prominent Soviet broadcaster in the English Language Service of Radio Moscow, and recently a published author on the social revolution now well underway in his country. That too should be a very interesting talk. I'll be in San Francisco for it next February 14-16, and I hope you will be too.

Next week, back to more mundane subjects directly relevant to radio programming and radio broadcasting in the 1990s refreshed I hope, form this three week side trip into philosophy, and the destiny of humanity.



Congratulations to WILSON PHILLIPS for having accomplished a rare feat—they've now topped the Gavin A/C chart with all three of their singles from their very first album. The ladies do it with style and an awesome 202 HEAVY reports in just eight weeks of exposure. Can you say GRAMMY? ELTON JOHN's five-week stat profile says "A Future Number One." In a little more than a month, his new single, You Gotta Love Somebody, is at number four with 215 stations and an 84% HIT FACTOR. Can't see competitive advantage in NOT playing this winner.

RAY CHARLES, who's been making great music longer than many A/C programmers have been alive, is making a strong chart move these days. His Warner debut, I'll Take Care Of You, leaps into the top twenty with with three-fourths of its 114 players in quality rotations. Of its 28 HEAVY rotation reports count WFBG, WRFC, KSAL, KSRF, KYMG/ FM and KORT.

HOTTEST record in the format at the moment is **CHER's** Shoop Shoop Song. It's a MOST ADDED once again with 38 new. It takes the second highest gain in HIT FACTOR (22%-47%), and has a two-week chart gain of 19 ranks to land at number 21.

<u>CONCERTO FOR SAXOPHONE -</u> <u>MICHAEL KAMEN (WARNER</u> <u>BROS.)</u>

Concerto For Saxophone is an ironic title, because the sax is not a welcome instrument in the symphony. Sax players have to transpose the clarinet part (or something to that effect) to compensate for the lack of written parts. Michael Kamen, keyboardist and score composer for major motion pictures, is a classically trained journeyman who, throughout his career, has woven in and out of rock. Kamen wants to step outside his usual duties and successfully fuse both rock and classical into one medium. It troubles Kamen that turn of the century classical has become too intellectual and technical, leaving behind the melody and emotion that other genres have picked up; it also troubles him that current musical technology has helped diminish the listener's attention span. That is an odd perspective for someone who has composed commissioned works for flash, crash, smash motion pictures like Lethal Weapon and Die Hard II: Die Harder. Check out the first three concertos and judge for yourself whether saxophones should continue their exile from the classical genre. Meanwhile, for programming, check out "Helen-Claire" for its more visceral sextet approach. "Sasha" features some fine tuned guitar solos by Pink Floyd's David Gilmour. David Sanborn's controlled playing is navigated by an exacting Kamen score.



CAROL CHAIKIN (GOLD CASTLE) Carol Chaikin claims inspiration from Bird and Coltrane on this release. Yet on most the tracks we hear more of the jagged stance of the last few Tom Scott releases. Tunes like "Wise Guys," "Manic Panic" and "Chase It" have that aggressive syntho ensemble kick that conjures up the comparisons. There is another mood here. Songs like a remorseful sounding ballad entitled "The Cooler" and the pensive closer "Storyteller" suggest an intentional emphasis on more traditional Jazz, fueled by the acoustic piano of Dave Kikoski.



BASSICALLY SPEAKING - BRIAN BROMBERG (NOVA)

By age nineteen bass prodigy Brian Bromberg was touring the globe, playing in Stan Getz's band. Most notably, Brian's signature bass lines are heard on the classic GRP movie soundtrack to The Fabulous Baker Boys. Some say he's the most gifted player since Jaco Pastorius stalked the stage with his confident smirk. Bassically Speaking solidifies Bromberg's proficiency. His compositions are top flight and his arrangements sparkle, judging from his highly unusual treatments of "Summertime" and "My Funny Valentine." Rather than spending all his time soloing on the upper frets, Bromberg moves over to a piccolo bass, whose strings are tune one octave higher. Like Jaco, Bromberg likes to make a bombastic, in-your-face presence. He also likes to run his instrument straight through the console for the ultimate clean attack. Track for track, Bromberg seeks to assert his virtuosity with every solo break and fancy, funkfilled riffs. Bassically, he's pulling the stops out on every cut. Check out the acoustically reinforced opening track entitled "You And I" for commercial Jazz or Alternative Adult textures.

<u>SKETCHES</u> - <u>CHRIS CHRISTIAN</u> (HOME SWEET HOME/A&M)

Like keyboardist Kim Pensyl, Chris Christian releases his latest Sketches straight to Adult Alternative. Also like Pensyl, Christian builds songs from synthesizer layering and computerized compositions. He prefers to work as a one man band trapped in a recording studio, with no probable access to the main performance area. Everything is pre-mixed and engineered by Christian himself. Songs like "Malibu Rain," "Santa Barbara" and the title track are tuneful, but seasoned with a pinch of melodrama for heartstring appeal. For more light funk, celebratory moments, try a few "Superbowl Highlights."

OH COME ALL YE FAITHFUL -MARCUS ROBERTS (NOVUS/ RCA)

Nobody can celebrate the Holiday season with more class and tradition than fine Jazz players like Marcus Roberts. His solo piano interpretations of three classic carols ring with the festive and introspective feeling that is (or should) be associated with Christmas. Whether it's the gaiety of "Let It Snow," the blues of "Silent Night" or the gospel majesty of "O Come All Ye Faithful," Marcus Roberts will deck the halls with plenty of that all-important Jazz ingredient—Swing.

PORTRAITS OF CHRISTMAS -WIND MACHINE (SILVER WAVE) Adult Alternative has learned its lesson well from the Nashville Country aggregation: Get those top artists into the studio early and make sure they get their Christmas sessions done. Wind Machine, the progressive pride of Colorado, storms out of the gate with the Season's most comprehensive collection of centuries old classics, plus some rather pretty originals. Steve Mesple changes his guitar strings for each take. Every track rings with chiming tintinnabulation. Trust Wind Machine to decorate your holiday airwaves

with splendid, jangling wooden arrangements. Any track will do, but originals like "Beyond The Horizon" and "Mary's Tune" deliver something special, and relieve Holiday burnout.

<u>ACOUSTIC_CHRISTMAS__VARI-</u> OUS ARTISTS (COLUMBIA)

This has to be the hippest collection by far. Our pal T Bone Burnett opens up this savvy collection with a slide dobro/ acoustic guitar version of "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen." Mark O'Connor kicks in with violin. Folkie Shawn Colvin puts down her guitar long enough to turn in a torch ballad version of "Have Yourself A Merry Little Christmas" with gospel piano accompaniment from Richard Tee. Those stations who can drop their guard during the Holiday may want to consider Rosanne Cash's "It Came Upon A Midnight Clear" or Laura Nyro's oldies-tinged medley, "Let It Be Me/ Chestnuts Roasting On An Open Fire." If that's not enough, for the most fearless egg nog smitten programmers, how about a wacky Hawaiian/New Orleans Christmas tribute from Poi Dog Pondering with The Dirty Dozen Brass Band? That's not even half of this set clearly the boldest yet!

THAT HOLIDAY FEELING - JOE WILLIAMS (VERVE/POLYGRAM) With tasty Jazz offerings like this, it gets easier and easier to handle the Holiday blues. Joe Williams enlists some powerful support from Kenny Burrell, Bobby Watson, Frank Wess, Clark Terry and more. Williams' honey roasted vocals are bluesy and resonant. The band is simmering and Terry, Watson and Wess lead a rousing yet sweet horn section. When Williams teams up with just pianist Ellis Larkins for a few tunes, That Holiday Feeling becomes more like Christmas At Closing Time. Check out our favorite of the three, "What Are You Doing New Years Eve?" It's beautiful, sentimental and a tiny bit haunting—something to challenge the serenity of the Holiday spirit.





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
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REPLACING HIMSELF

PAUL WESTERBERG Ponders Potential

"John Updike is my end all be all. Once I lost my trail, I didn't know where I was going with my songwriting, so I tried imitating short story writers, Updike in particular."

"Can never make the decision to keep it pure when something doesn't quite fit or if it's disjointed. So you go back and refine it or take the best line and write around that. But sometimes it's best to use that initial gush. It comes like murder. Those are always the ones where people ask, 'What does "Merry Go Round" mean?' I don't really know. It kinda flew out and I didn't go back and change anything. What you hear is the first instinct."

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Paul Westerberg is neither pining nor complaining. He's a leveler. If you ask him about his band the Replacements he tells you straight up. It's no easy life. But, again, he's not complaining.

"I've been on this promotional tour or whatever it is. I spent six hours in a car punching the radio and eating a candy bar. I'm not complaining or working in the street, but it's not glamorous. They take you to a place where you shake hands with a bunch of suits that don't know you from Nanci Griffith. Yet I find that makes me feel like a normal person. Somebody comes up to you and says, 'Oh, you're my hero.' Whaddya mean? I just fucking sat in a car all day, 1 have to take a leak really bad and the deejay won't let me go to the bathroom because he's on the air."

So after we find him a bathroom, he comes into the conference room, we hand him a Coca-Cola, position the ash tray strategically around the mics and he's a happy camper—especially when Paul The Writer (as opposed to Paul The Replacement) is discussing the latest album All Shook Down. Before the album's release there were the usual rumors regarding the future of the band, solo projects, whether Westerberg was indeed the trapped songwriter. He pulls no punches.

"A year ago I would have said, yes, I'm a writer trapped inside a band, but I broke free with All Shook Down. Now there can be a band, though I can't go back to the band way of doing things. They can play although they're not on a lot of the new songs. I don't see it as a problem if they don't. And if they do, I'll . . ." Westerberg pauses and adds ominously, "replace them or move on."

To stay a Replacement/to go solo, those were the options. In lots of ways All Shook Down solved many problems. It's The Great Compromise and it resulted in what amounts to a solo album released under the Replacements' banner.

"I love some of these reviews like in Rolling Stone where they're talking about Chris' great drumming and Slim's hot lead, and it was me and a drum machine.

"It sucks because we don't communicate and we never have. The only way we talk is through humor and sarcasm. It got to the point where that was leading us nowhere, to the point where you couldn't say anything serious. I told all three of them individually, 'Guys, I think I really want to do one on my own next time.' This was the summer of 1989, and it was 'Okay, okay.' Then come the fall it's, dinga-ling-a-ling, 'Hey Paul, when do we start making a record?' They were hoping I'd changed my mind."

The results are Westerberg's most personal songs yet. Left to his devices his lyric work is beautiful and layered with images of confusion and lost dreams.

****A** mail order ring

wrapped tight around a Singapore Sling," is a line coming from a highlight, "One Wink At A Time," a sojourn about mysterious women and airline travel. Westerberg gives a tip of the hat to some of the masters, burying himself in the song while maintaining a fictitious objectivity with his remaining characters.

""One Wink At A Time' is very visual, it unfolds," Westerberg states. "The style comes from something I read about Dylan. You can visualize his songs. You can see the characters. She stood against a wall, she stood against a blue wall."

"Baggage claim is this way, so watch her walk down that way in a hurry."

"That is me. You get off the plane. Baggage claim is this way. Should we get our bags or should we go to the bar? We're going left (to the bar). The rest is about the fantasy woman, something about traveling. There is that excitement about—ooh, who is she and where is she going?"

Much of the spirit of All Shook Down owes a lot to the soul searching Westerberg has done in assembling a new direction in life and redefining his band's democratic existence. Unpretentious, dressed in a tattered sweater and jeans, his look is not one of an Alternative Radio saviour, nor is it the costume of a rock star.

"You know, I'm a rocker, but so what!" He scowls emphatically. "I want great music or good songs, but I also want fun and entertainment. I do want some things that rock bands have done, but when that is all you love a band for, what's to stop you from going out, getting the clothes and copping your own attitude? You don't need music for that."

All Shook Down is significant in that it seems to be the final stop for Westerberg the band member. The Replacements are now a vehicle for his songs amid a crumbling concept of band democracy. To bury the band as kaputsky (as was recently done by Spin magazine) represents premature interment. What seems to be happening is the band is going through a reorganization of policyauite an evolution from a young Twin Cities slash and bash band.

"At first we were clever, and I knew that if we stopped or turned down long enough, the audience is would realize we're crap. If we entertained people, it made our playing seem better. As I learned a little more about writing, the hijinx side of rock n roll got tiresome, eventually overshadowing the songs. The people I was attracting as a screw-up, a mean, spiteful, hateful person aren't the kind of people I like to hang out with. I had to get in touch with what was really deep, deep down."

Exactly what's "deep, deep down" is buried toward the end of the album, and "Happy Town" is the key. It





THE PIGS - ICEWATER POCK-ETS (PORCELINE RECORDS -PO BOX 95725, ATLANTA, GA., 30347)


I have to admit this isn't what I expected from a band called The Pigs—I'm pleasantly surprised. A closer inspection of the liner notes reveal two very familiar names producing this albumMitch Easter and Don Dixon, which should give you a clue to the sound. Ringing guitars and incredible harmonies dominate these way-tight pop songs. It sounds as though The Pigs have more in common with The Raspberries and The Shoes than they do with R.E.M. or any other band from Georgia. Get your hands on this one if you can! Tracks to check out include "This Cure," "Make Believe," "It's Okay," "Spinnin'," "Lonely Town" and my favorite "Glamour Boys"not the Living Colour song, but do I hear a little "Dream Police" in there? C.J. CHENIER AND THE RED HOT LOUISIANA BAND (SLASH)

Yeeeah! This is one excellent party record! CJ and company specialize in Louisiana zydeco. Putting plenty of emphasis on le bon temps, The Red Hot Louisiana



Band rollicks its way through a dozen tunes, seemingly written for the express purpose of making you groove. It's like a reflex action, you know? And while I don't hear this next to the Depeche Mode's of the format, it fits in rather nicely with, say Paul Simon (on whose Rhythm And Saints album CJ plays Accordion) or The Hothouse Flowers. Give it a listen and be prepared to move! Suggested cuts: "I Feel Alright," "It's A Shame," "Got My Eyes On You" "Zydeco Express" and the bluesy "Time To Cry." LR





DR. JANET - "TEN YEARS GONE" (Ringers Lactate, PO BOX 5012, Long Island City, NY 11105)

What makes four different guys from different bands decide to play and record together? Well, you could ask John Wetton (King Crimson, Roxy Music, Uriah Heep) Carl Palmer (ELP), Geoff Downes (Buggles) and Steve Howe (Yes), but you might have better luck tracking down Gary Lee Connor (Screaming Trees) Lyle Hysen (Das Damen), Ira Kaplan (Yo La Tengo), or Matt Sweeney (Skunk). They've got a new group project, Dr. Janet, and they've just released a single that is, incidentally, also the first vinyl from new-labelon-the block Ringers Lactate. The two tracks here aren't exactly what I expected, so it's fun to speculate how these alternative icons may have influenced each other. "Ten Years Gone" (not the Led Zep song) is a Gary Lee Connor composition that, like a lot of Screaming Trees material, boasts an insidious melody—but (unlike the Trees) it's not swimming in noise or distortion. Instead, for the most part, "Ten" is fuzzy and warm, at least until the band's instincts take over and it then becomes a cat-spit, wah-wah, chaotic guitar war between Connor and Sweeney (sort of the Geoff Downes here, don't you think?). Feedback king Ira Kaplan (on bass for this track) must have given lessons. The flip, "Starry Eyes," a Records' cover, was not—as you might suspect-chosen by Kaplan but by the band's namesake. This rendition remains true to the legacy of power pop (although it's a tad too lengthly), and Connor's vocals are appropriately Sweet. And to satisfy your curiosity: Dr.

COFFIN BREAK - "LIES" (Sup Pop, PO BOX 20645, Seattle, WA, 98102) BIG CHIEF - "TIME, DIRT, MONEY" (Pigboy,231PortobelloRd., London W11 1LT) SEAWEED - "DEERTRAP" (K Records, BOX 7154, Olympia, WA 98501)

For those fans of the hard and heavy who continue to search for the perfect three minutes of short, sweet, simplicity, these three releases (the first of which is available on collectible colored vinyl), come damn close to being ideal. Coffin Break's new one, which follows on the heels of their relatively recent Rupture LP on C/ZRecords, powerfully blends noise and melody in a way that Chris Cornell can only dream about. "Lies" hooks into a tenacious groove while the flip, "Pray," reveals this trio's more introspective side-at least lyrically. Big Chief hails from Ann Arbor, MI, and features former Necros frontman Barry Hensler. While "Time, Dirt, Money" is the band's fourth 7" in little over a year, the A-side is actually a re-recorded version of "Blowout Kit," which showed up on a Sub Pop single released this past Spring. Whatever you call it, Big Chief takes all the speed and power of Necros and funks it up a bit. The result is a riff-laden groove-jam that'll have you getting up every four minutes to play it again. The B-side, "Brake Torque" (also a reissue) appeared on the band's very first 7". Both tracks are brilliant, and all of Big Chief's earlier singles are nearly impossible to find, so make the effort to track this one down. Seaweed, a young five-piece from Tacoma, WA who have previously issued two 7"s on the Leopard Gecko label prior to the emergence of this one on K, boast a fresh-but-heavy sound that matures with each new release. "Carousel," this single's flip, is the most interesting track here, and it serves as a good showcase for the blending of Aaron Stauffer's smooth vocals with the raucous cacophony of the band's dual guitar attack. A tasty treat. DR. JANET

KMFDM - NAIVE (Wax Trax! 1659 N. Damen Ave., Chicago, IL 60647)

Album by album, KMFDM have been building a reputation as Depeche Mode's antithesis (as their name is rumored to suggest). This release continues to screech, bleep, and bang out the message of be-bop belittlement. There is definitely pleasure to be found in the band's extremity of technological abuse. This record is industrial sabotage at its finest, so enjoy the decay. Swoon to the "Virus Dub." Scream with "Naive." Play "Go To Hell" and pretend you're actually there. A few German titles show up here, but not knowing exactly what on earth KMFDM is going on about makes it even easier to succumb to the sickness. Overall a pleasant listening ordeal. BRETT D. AFRICAN HEAD CHARGE - SONGS OF PRAISE (On-U Sound, P.O. Box 1460, London N102 DQ England)

It's been almost five years since African Head Charge's last release, and after two years in the making, *Songs Of Praise* is the intelligent and skillful result. This album is missing the usual discomforting or disturbing edge, yet there's always something unsettling about this group of "heads." At times there's a delicateness that is beyond comprehension making this their most accessible album. Circuitous rhythms or percus-

sion are used in such a way that they take the form of another "voice." Therefore, you not only have the religious chants from all over the world, but also the percussion creating tonal visuals. Percussionist Bonjo Iyabinghi Noah and drum master L.V. Scott are the culprits. Crocodile and Junior Moses play bass, Skip McDonald wreaks havoc with guitar, and keyboards and effects are by Prisoner. The welcoming "Ethiopian Praises" goes right into "My God," which has a Negro spiritual element. Other tracks to get you going: "Orderliness, Godliness, Discipline and Dignity," "Gospel Train," "God Is Great," "Dervish Chant" and "Hold Some More." You'll probably have to buy this one, but it's well worth the investment. Adrian Sherwood mans the depth "charge" with another "attempt at production." African Head Charge help make reality a little easier to cope with. ROBERT BARONE



VARIOUS ARTISTS - FROM ACROSS THIS GRAY LAND NO. 2 (Projekt, P.O. Box 1591, Garden Grove, CA 92642)

Nine bands from various parts of the globe perform 14 works. Some of the more standard include Attrition, Area (who have just released a new album) and Skinner Box. Lycia opens this "collection of introspective soundscapes" with a mellowness that might discourage you, but guitar, bass and drum kick in and later vocals emerge. Germany's Popol Vuh is one of the more obscure bands on this collection, and their contribution of two tracks is sheer beauty. Vicki Richards' piece is anything but the usual fare, yet fits perfectly. The piece by Slap starts out with a sound that is perfect for a rainy, stay-at-home day.

Black Tape For A Blue Girl is an excellent example of the merging of ambience and noise, and Steve Roach closes the album with a superb slice of orchestrated environment. *From Across This Gray Land No.2* straddles the fine line between ambience and noise. Certainly worth checking out. RB

BORIS MIKULIC - HERESY (Caroline, 114 West 26th Street, New York, NY 10001)

Mikulic's early life is shrouded in mystery and abuse, but he releases music that is creative and innovative. Mikulic's first release was a collaboration with Ilya Dimitrijevic, and they released two singles under the name In Sotto Voce. On this debut/solo album, Mikulic combines several of his musical influences and comes up with tracks that will attract your ears, mind and / or your body. Noise



and distortion are incorporated with a dance oriented beat, Gregorian chant and electronics. The most powerful instrument is Mikulic's brillant guitar. BLOWN AWAY—THE ROLLING STONES AND THE DEATH OF THE SIXTIES

A Murder Theory and the Demise of the Peace and Love Era

Part II: Who Or What Killed Brian Jones?

Blown Away's most marketable tidbit is the theory that Brian Jones, found dead at the bottom of his swimming pool on July 2, 1969, did not die of a drug overdose or asthma, but was murdered.

"That was the coroner's verdict. accidental death from overdose. But Keith Richards said soon afterwards that something fishy must have gone on. 'I'd been swimming with him and he was a great swimmer in heavy sea. Even drunk he could outswim me. I can't believe he would drop dead in his swimming pool.' " The author dug deeper into the public records.


"I went out to see the coroner. Maybe there was some interesting details, I didn't think at that point that I would fall into a real challenge to the accepted verdict. There was a new coroner and he gave me the file. It was against the rules, but nobody had ever asked for the file. I thought that was incredible, with all these books that had been written. One book misspelled the coroner's name and said witnesses appeared at the inquest. There were no witnesses at the inquest. I have the whole transcript of what took place.

"Look at the medical report. There's a very detailed autopsy report from three different pathologists. If you read it carefully, you see no significant alcohol in the blood. There's some tiny traces of amphetamine, but no drug presence. Didn't die of asthma. Didn't die of a heart attack. Didn't die of anything medical. So I took this file to a forensic guy and he said I was right. There was nothing there to show any death other than drowning.

"There are three statements in that file by three people who were there. The primary one was Frank Thorogood, the contractor. His statement under oath to the police was that he was swimming with Brian and two women (on the scene) go into the house. He gets out and says, 'Hey Brian, I'm going to go in and light my cigarette.' I had been there. The house was twenty feet away from the pool. So he walks in, lights the cigarette, walks back out and Brian is dead on the bottom of the pool.

"So I asked the forensic specialist, 'Is that possible?' He told me it was impossible physically in that length of time for a body to ingest enough water that it could be stone dead on the bottom of the swimming pool. There were all these discrepancies between these three people. The

"I got lucky and did locate a guy who had been an apprentice there. He put the cap on it by saying that a lot of these guys were construction workers with their girls and their wives. They had been stealing Brian's booze



statements were taken an hour after the event. Plus the fact that Brian died at 10:30 pm or so, and an hour and a half passes until they call the police. Everything caused my skepticism at that point. and Brian was complaining about it. I think they were pissed at Brian. He was rich, famous, foppish and had a gorgeous Swedish girl living with him and a Rolls Royce in the driveway. They resented it.

"I think what these construction guys were doing was giving Brian a hard time in the water, holding him down and stomping him. I think the idea was to get him to the point of being almost waterlogged and then beaching him. Obviously they went too far. One of the guys said they were putting him down on the bottom of the pool and standing on him.

"Nobody gave a shit. When a rock star goes down, that's it. The coroner didn't even take testimony."

"In terms of the sixties, the disappointment is that for all of its bright promise of loving one another, you got a lot of belligerence together with a lot of destructiveness by the drugs. Even Keith Richards admitted that it's wrong to think that there was anything more here than the music. They're just a rock n roll band. 'Were not there to change the world. We had the power, but it wasn't up to us to be leaders.' Nobody had anything to replace it with.

They tore it down, then in a panic saw that there was nothing in its place and so they pushed the sand back over it. You get people from the sixties going into the seventies and the eighties, voting in very conservative governments like Margaret Thatcher and Ronald Reagan. Jerry Rubin wears a threepiece suit. The conclusion is rather disillusioning.″●

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begins with simulated garage band chords crossfading directly into the present, a woeful Westerberg sweeping the garage of his Minneapolis middle class mansion. Something out of Ray Davies' image book?

"Lyrically, that is the best song. Very Replacementsy, summarizing the feeling you have when you start at age twenty. What are your goals? You wind up ten years later with a house, some kids, you're comfortable and you're happy. Wait a minute. Is this it? Is this what I wanted? A few years before we wanted megastardom. Wear leather and have chicks follow you always. Well that's a dream and that's a fake," he rules out.

"So is this it? That's the question of the whole record. I don't have the answer.

"Sweeping the garage for the neighbors to see. I guess I gotta play this role. When I was twenty I played an angry young punk. Now I'm playing the role of househusband, the neighborhood guy who doesn't say much. I still have that anger and uncertainty of ten years ago, but I still don't know why. It still isn't channeled. I can't go back to what I was but why haven't certain things changed? In twenty years, will I be some rich fat cat with a billion dollar estate, an ivory palace, wanting to go out and kick some ass? These goals, these monetary things are not what I'm looking for."

Westerberg stubs out his fourth and final Marlboro, and in an uncharacteristically low voice turns the tables, revealing his "ordinary" side—a serious, maybe even morose side. He lets out a breath, partially out of fatigue, partly out of frustration for his situation. If a split is spiritually inevitable, when, then, is it time to face up?

"You're the first one to allow me to relax. I've been

doing these interviews for two and a half weeks and all people are telling me is to keep the band together. You get it. Other people don't. 'What's wrong Paul?' Hey, I gave the band many opportunities to step forward and give me room to do this. They didn't give me that opportunity, so if I decide to make the break, I'm gonna have to be big bad guy again. I don't know when I'm prepared to do that.

"The record company is cool. They're slowing getting it. They're going to stick with me and let me do what I think is best. Perhaps it was best having the band on this time. They put it to me very bluntly. My name is not going to sell any records and the Replacements will."

That bite of reality sandwich was not a tasty one. Still, it bought a little time, prolonging the band concept knows me. We play gigs, someone comes back stage, your biggest fan in the world asks for an autograph. I sign Paul and they're disappointed. They think I'm Tommy (Stinson) or something. It's not what you always think. This record wasn't exactly a careerbuilding move for me. Maybe it will be, but it wasn't planned that way."

In the midst of an enviable situation (though who really knows when they're in an "enviable position?"), Westerberg possibly lacks the objectivity to realize his accomplishments. Songs like "Sadly Beautiful" ("I wanted three different people to think it was about them. It was written for Marianne Faithful") and "The Last" ("That's supposed to be a Laura Nyro show tune") point toward the awakening of a craftsperson.

"I force myself to come

up with new goals and, frankly, they're dull. They're not rock n roll, but I want to write classic, great songs and I want other artists to cover them. I don't know if that will make me happy, but that's a good goal. You can't go wrong. At least trying is gonna make me and the band better off."

The prospect of other artists cutting his stuff lifts the Westerberg spirit. Suddenly the future is a brighter contemplation. Now he's hopeful.

"If this record was scooped up by other artists and went thirteen different ways, that would be really exciting. Then I would be free to reinvent the band and go out and play in our underwear and just have a helluva time. I would be free to lead a dual life. That would be great! Then I could say exactly what I wanted."


Now what happens when some of your interview comments boomerang back to the band?

"I haven't really said anything bad. In fact, I'll say some good things. They're the best band in the world when they want to be. It would be nice if we all wanted to be all the time."

Currently the band is rehearsing for an upcoming tour. Depending on Westerberg's mood, the results guarantee to be volatile. Will anger or animosity hover or will it be channeled back into the music? One certainty. Replacement fans beware. If you're expecting the same old zany hijinx, be forewarned. Paul Westerbera's is now a confirmed minimalist ("up front and dry") and he's had a taste of doing things his way.


