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Will They Ever Learn?

WE have all been going to school, to the big House down in Washington where the National Recovery Administration has been holding sessions. General Johnson has not exactly been our schoolmaster, though he talked like one quite often. He has been going to school, too. And he has been a pretty good boy, considering his raising.

It has been a sort of a seminar, where the teacher assigns subjects, and thinks he may learn something from what the scholars report. Meanwhile all members of the class have a chance to share in the joint researches.

Some of the big boys in the employers' end of the class have been taking a test recently down at Hot Springs, Va. They may not have thought of it that way. Neither did a lot of them make very good grades. Their little recitations of their inner convictions would lead one to believe that they have been skipping classes, and have not heard a lot of the stuff presented in the sessions. They seem to want the N R A class to continue its work, but they want to take charge of the proceedings.

The real contributions which labor men have made to the sum total of economic and industrial knowledge has been very considerable, and in their experiments under the formula of Section 7-A they have made some mighty convincing demonstrations of ideas formerly held rather theoretically. It would almost appear that President Roosevelt has missed some of the points in this part of the course, judging from his burst of enthusiasm over the alleged solution of the automobile disturbances.

In the days when confusion menaced the nation, the only American labor movement which was ready to assume responsibility and ready to make sacrifices for the sake of preserving the orderly processes of the national life was the American Federation of Labor, and its affiliated and related bodies of membership. Its responsible executives measured up well, alongside the executives of the employing class and the administrative officers. They were welcomed and recognized to some extent. Their part in the formulation of the codes has been no small part. And in this work there have been thrust upon them new responsibilities of a character which they have hitherto avoided. They have had to consider, to some extent, the problems of management, and to throw what light they could upon these problems—when they were permitted to do so.

Now there begins to rise from the big chiefs of the employers' group an increasing protest against the introduction and the unfolding of the meaning of Section 7-A of the National Industrial Recovery Act. These men do not realize, even yet, the gain to the stability of American industry, and the gain in security of American institutions gained by this charter of the right to organize the workers of the land. Old habits of thought and action now come back upon them, and though they are reaping the benefit of this new co-ordination of the capacities of labor, they are not willing to accept the method.

It may be too much to expect that these men will ever so far change their methods of thought that they can realize what has taken place, and what the outcome of this new development of the powers of the workers can be. It is an old saying, that the community always has to wait for some first-class funerals before it can go on. It has always been so. But events are moving at a different tempo now and we cannot guarantee the waiting period.

Constitution Not Barrier to Progress

THERE are some in both private and public life who allege that much of the emergency legislation, with its enlargement of executive power, as authorized by Congress, is unconstitutional. If that be true what legislative remedy can sovereign citizens apply to the ills of unemployment? It is inconceivable that the Constitution would stand as a barrier to human progress or serve as an impediment to those who sincerely seek to save the nation from chaos and collapse.

A constitution which would fail a nation in a grave emergency would be unsuited to our growing and progressive population. Our Constitution must never be a rigid, dead, immutable document, but instead it must be a vital, living instrumentality, all-embracing in its adaptability to the changing economic situations which inevitably take place. The fact is that the Constitution of the United States confers upon Congress broad powers sufficient in scope and authority to legislate in the public interest during periods of national stress and economic disorder. It has proven to be sufficiently flexible to meet the legislative needs of a small primitive agricultural population of 1780 as well as the needs of an industrial, city-strewn nation of 1934.

No shop should be patronized that does not display a Union Card.

John J. Manning, veteran trades unionist and for years secretary-treasurer of the Union Label Trades Department, American Federation of Labor, died early on July 17th at his residence, 4016 Twelfth Street, N. E., Washington, D. C. Mr. Manning was one of the best known trade union executives in the United States and had hosts of warm friends throughout the nation.

Labor Discipline in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO organized workers gave a fine demonstration of labor discipline and unity during the general strike. In the face of great provocation from hysterical newspapers and fire-eating anti-union employers, who would crush out all labor organizations if they had the power, the striking workers kept cool heads and assisted in maintaining the peace.

Contrary to some reports, they did not try to "starve out" San Francisco, which at no time was even in the remotest danger of starvation.

Wage-earners would do well to take with several grains of salt sensational reports coming out of San Francisco. The workers there were not stampeded into striking by "red" agitators, as some newspaper correspondents would have the nation believe. They took the action that they thought best in the circumstances, after full consideration in the light of American traditions of liberty and democracy. They acted within their rights as American citizens, a fact that many of their critics forget.

Patronize manufacturers using the union label and keep trade unionists employed.

Labor Queries

Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Toilers.

Q.—What great international labor organization has recently moved its headquarters to Washington, D. C.?

A.—The United Mine Workers of America.

Q.—Who said: "The problem of the labor movement is to protect those who work against those who desire to exploit and to give them constantly better opportunities for life and work?"

A.—Samuel Gompers.

Q.—When were factory inspectors first appointed in the United States?

A.—In 1867, in Massachusetts, which passed a law generally regarded as the first factory legislation in this country.

Q.—Is the San Francisco strike the first general strike in the United States?

A.—No. There was a general strike in Seattle in 1919.

Q.—When did the longshoremen's walkout on the Pacific Coast begin?

A.—On May 9.

Q.—What is the meaning of the term, "laissez faire," often used in discussions of labor subjects?

A.—This is French for "let us alone." It expresses the principle of allowing things to look after themselves, especially the policy of non-interference by the government in commerce and industry.

Out Beyond the Surf

Where thought, un-hastened by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth. Here, where the shallow throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

What a hullabaloo there is about the movies!

All good people are raising the very dickens about the naughty pictures—and, of course, there have been plenty of naughty pictures.

There once was an emperor who used to put on a good show every time the populace began to get restless and think seriously about matters concerning the ways of life. The good show made the populace think about the show and not about their troubles.

So it paid the emperor to take the mind of the populace off its troubles.

From the emperor's point of view it was much better that the people laugh at clowns than that they plan to make their own lives better.

It seems somewhat possible that right now is a good time to get people all mad about something like the movies instead of giving them a chance to get mad about such things as the attitude of the Steel Trust.

Of course, the good people who are righteously sore about dirty movies are not knowingly playing any such game as that, but the chances are a lot better than 50-50 that, once started, the wrath about movies has been stirred along by certain folks who would much rather have the multitude looking the other way just at this time.

But there is another side to the question. The whole point to the drive to "clean up" the movies is that there shall be some power somewhere to censor the movies—to tell the movies what they must not talk about.

Censorship, though established for a good purpose, is never a good thing to have around. Americans as a rule resent censorship.

The whole principle of freedom of speech and of the press has been that for breaches of law there is punishment by law. Other abuses take care of themselves, and it is better to preserve freedom, with some abuse of it, than to abolish freedom and have nothing but abuse.

Carry the matter a step further: If there is censorship of movies the next—and very short—step is censorship of the press.

Today there is no free press in Germany, in Russia or in Italy. Americans, who have a free press, know more about what is going on in Germany than the German people know; they know more about Italy than the Italian people, and if they want to they can know more about Russia than the Russians know.

If we stifle movies we can stifle the press and—well with that we can get ready to join European peoples in submitting to despotism and in being kept in ignorance of what is happening.

When we had "prohibition" we had bootlegging. And there are and have been bootlegged movies. Censorship would increase their number.

The long and short of it is that there is no group good enough or intelligent enough to serve as censor of free expression.

The outburst of today does well to express itself in a declaration to stay away from bad movies. Plenty of folks have done that for a long time. But it goes to the extreme of autocracy when it proposes to create compulsory censorship.

A free people will survive bad taste much better than they will survive censorship.

Labor's greatest weapon is the Union Label. Remember that when spending union earned money.

All Nations May Bar Women Miners

WOMEN miners in the United States provide no problem, as they are virtually non-existent. When a woman miner comes to notice once in a great while she is an object of public attention. A few months ago it was revealed that a woman had worked in an Ohio mine for years and she was much photographed and interviewed. Establishment of the bituminous coal code put an end to her career as a miner.

Mining by women is a problem in some countries, however, and the question of prohibiting their employment underground in mines of all kinds came before the International Labor Conference at Geneva. A number of Asiatic countries still permit such work, though with restrictions.

The report prepared by the International Labor Office for this year's conference proposes that Governments should be consulted, with a view to the total abolition of female labor on underground work in every sort of mine.

Amendments and Additions to the Laws

Enacted at the Cleveland Convention, to Become Effective Sept. 15, 1934

The following amendments and additions to the laws were enacted at the Thirty-ninth Annual Convention held in Cleveland, Ohio, June 18th to 23rd, 1934, and at the sessions of the International Executive Board directly thereafter, to become effective September 15th, 1934:

Article III, Section 11, referring to traveling musicians on the road, was amended to read as follows:

Traveling members will be withdrawn from rendering services for traveling theatrical companies if such companies, either during the same season or in continued seasons, repeat their bookings in theatres which are held as unfair to the American Federation of Musicians.

The musicians withdrawn from such a company are entitled to strike benefits for the time that the company remains on the road, but in no instance for a longer period than fifteen weeks. Such companies, after the withdrawal of members from their service, shall then be published in the *International Musician* so as to guard members from accepting engagements with them until such time as engagements with such companies are again declared open to members of the Federation.

A member who violates any provision of this section thereby resigns from the American Federation of Musicians, and the Local or Locals to which he belongs must strike his name from its or their membership lists.

Article IX, Section 9, referring to eligibility to membership, shall read as follows:

As the inhabitants of Porto Rico are citizens of the United States, musicians hailing from said Island are entitled to membership in the American Federation of Musicians and hence local unions are free to enroll them as members under the following conditions:

A. A member hailing from Porto Rico who applies for membership in a local union of the Federation, or for conditional membership, must submit his birth certificate that he was born in Porto Rico or give other conclusive proof that such is the case.

B. Immigrants to Porto Rico who acquire their first citizenship papers in Porto Rico do not thereby become eligible to membership in the Federation.

In the matter of tax, Article IX, Section 39, shall read as follows:

Sec. 39. Local unions may at their own option assess a tax upon their members on all engagements played by them, the tax to be figured upon the local price of the engagement and shall in no case exceed 4%.

All members other than those traveling with theatrical companies or filling traveling engagements governed by Sections 9 and 10 of Article XIII, who fill engagements in the jurisdiction of a Local other than that to which they belong, shall be subject to the payment of such tax, provided that the Local also enforces same upon its own members. In such cases the home Local of the members cannot impose a tax upon them.

However, if the Local in whose jurisdiction the engagement is played does not tax its members, but the home Local to which the members playing the engagement belong does so, then the latter may collect a tax from its members even though the engagement is not played in its own jurisdiction.

In all cases where a Local maintains an engagement tax, same also applies to its members if they play in neutral territory, except if they play traveling engagements, for which see Sections 9 and 10 of Article XIII.

On engagements (traveling) of a week or longer played outside the jurisdiction of a Local, the Local or Locals to which the members belong has and have no claim for tax on the engagement, as in such cases the tax law of the American Federation of Musicians applying to traveling engagements governs same.

A Local which exacts a local engagement tax from members of other Locals who render services in the jurisdiction of said Local, but does not impose such a tax upon its own members on engagements played at home, shall be fined whatever amount the International Executive Board may determine.

Article X, Section 37, is changed to read:

Any member who solicits from or signifies his intention to accept an engagement with an organization, booking agents or individuals who are held as unfair by the American Federation of Musicians may be fined by the Local in whose jurisdiction he committed the offense or by the International Executive Board a sum not exceeding \$100.00, or be expelled by the Federation, or both.

Article X, Section 38, shall read:

All territory in the United States and Canada which is not covered by the jurisdiction of the Locals is deemed to be, and is hereby declared to be, under direct jurisdiction of the American Federation of Musicians, and, therefore, members playing engagements outside of the jurisdiction of any Local are amenable to the laws of the Federation or orders and decisions emanating from the Federation concerning such engagements.

The following addition to Article X, to be known as Section 51, is made:

A member of a Local accepting an engagement with a symphony orchestra in another Local, where his salary is \$40.00 or more per week, is prohibited from

playing other single or steady engagements that are not of a symphonic or Grand Opera nature, without the permission of the Board of Directors of said Local, and at the expiration of his contract may not become a member of said Local without the consent of the Local.

The transfer laws (Article XII) were amended in the following manner:

Section 2. A member who has his transfer on deposit in a Local is not entitled, without the consent of the Local, to solicit, accept or play any permanent engagement during a period of three months after the date of deposit, but otherwise is entitled to all privileges of the Local, including voice, but not to vote nor hold office.

Section 4. A member cannot deposit a card on speculation, leave the jurisdiction in which he deposited the card, and while outside of same compete with members of the Local in which he has his card on deposit, returning to such Local's jurisdiction whenever he has secured an engagement. A member who is guilty of such conduct may have his transfer card cancelled by the Local.

Section 10. Members of the Federation entering a jurisdiction for the purpose of joining or playing with any traveling musical unit or residing in a jurisdiction during lay-off periods of such units, shall immediately identify themselves as members of the A. F. of M. by submitting their membership cards to the Local for inspection, and also furnish the Local at all times with their correct addresses and residences in the jurisdiction in question.

Section 15, referring to Conditional Membership, is changed to read: A musician who is a resident in a locality where there are not sufficient musicians to form a Local may acquire restricted membership from the nearest Local, if that Local desires to accept him. Such restricted membership will permit him to play with members of such Local and none others. However, at the time such musician applies for restricted membership he must sign an agreement that if a Local of the Federation is subsequently organized in his locality that he will join it, and if such Local is organized, he must join it. In the event that such musician does not desire to join the nearest Local or such Local does not desire to accept him, he may apply for a Conditional Membership Card to the Secretary of the Federation, who shall determine the method of examination or endorsement necessary to qualify the applicant for membership.

The preamble to Article XIII, referring to the 10 per cent charge, shall contain the following provisions:

ARTICLE XIII.

TRAVELING ORCHESTRAS AND MEMBERS. TRAVELING CARDS AND TAX.

Orchestras Playing Traveling Engagements in Hotels, Cafes, Inns, Restaurants and Dance Halls of Any Kind Are Subject to the Following Rules:

A—Members of traveling orchestras must secure traveling cards from the International Treasurer, which shall be charged for at the rate of \$2.00 per month each. The cards shall expire on dates stipulated by the International Treasurer, and may be for monthly, quarterly, or semi-annual periods.

B—A traveling card entitles a member to play in any jurisdiction or neutral territory such engagements as are designated as traveling engagements under the laws of the American Federation of Musicians and for which, in addition to the Local price, ten per cent (10%) must be charged. He shall at all times be in possession of and on demand produce a paid-up card from the Local in which he holds membership, and in addition thereto carry a Federation traveling card.

C—If members of a traveling orchestra appear in the jurisdiction of a Local without traveling cards, the Local shall immediately collect from each one of them \$2.00 for each month that they were on tour without cards, as well as \$2.00 for the current month.

A member who plays traveling engagements and fails to secure a traveling card and fails to pay his assessments shall be considered as having resigned from the Federation, and the Local to which he belongs is obliged to strike his name from its membership list. If he be a conditional member, the Federation shall revoke his conditional card. To become reinstated as a member of the Federation, such resigned member must pay all arrearages due for traveling card or assessments or both, and in addition thereto pay a National Initiation Fee of \$50.00, or in lieu thereof must meet such conditions as the International Executive Board at its option may determine.

D—Every Local will be obliged to report to the International Treasurer every traveling orchestra playing in its jurisdiction, also whether the members thereof carry traveling cards and if their assessments are paid up to date. A Local is responsible for its officers to investigate traveling orchestras, and in the event it fails to have the stipulations of this law carried out, it shall be fined Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) in each individual case.

E—In the event that members holding traveling cards are called on strike, either by the President or the Executive Board of the American Federation of

Musicians, they shall be paid a weekly strike benefit of \$50.00 for a period of five weeks. However, if the contract for the engagement which they played is less than five weeks, then they shall be entitled to strike benefits for the unexpired term of their contract only.

F—In all cases in which members of traveling orchestras authorize the International Treasurer to deduct the amount of assessment due from the 10% of the price of the engagement on deposit with him, the Treasurer shall have authority at his own option to do so or insist that the assessment be sent him when due.

G—All amounts collected under this law must be immediately forwarded by the Local to the International Treasurer.

H—The 10% of the Local price of the engagement which must be collected by the Local from traveling musicians and be sent by it to the Treasurer of the Federation, or which the members of the orchestra must directly send to the Treasurer in the event that the Local fails to act in accordance with this law, is to be divided as follows:

Four per cent shall be returned monthly by the Treasurer of the Federation to the local union as a local tax;

Three per cent shall be retained in the National Treasury as a Federation tax;

and the remaining three per cent shall be returned to the members from whom same was collected. (See Sections 9 and 10 of Article XIII.)

I—Members filling engagements in neutral territory must, if same are permanent, that is one week or longer, forward 6% of the price of their engagement to the National Treasurer, 3% to be retained as a tax of the Federation, and 3% to be returned to the members after the close of their engagement. (See Sections 9 and 10 of Article XIII.)

J—All laws of the Federation in contradiction to laws governing traveling cards cannot be applied to same.

Other changes in Article XIII include the following:

Musicians traveling with tabloid companies, changed from \$55.00 to \$45.00. Leaders, from \$65.00 to \$55.00.

In Hotel, Restaurant and Inn engagements, the former charge of 30 per cent is changed to 10 per cent.

The 10 per cent charge wherever made in accordance with the laws must be forwarded to the National Treasurer by the members if the Local in which the engagement takes place fails to collect same. Failure to do so will constitute resignations from membership.

The price for members playing State or County Fairs or Expositions has been changed from \$60.00 to \$50.00 per man, and from \$90.00 to \$75.00 for leader, unless the local scale is higher, in which event the local scale prevails.

Article XIII, Section 18, is changed to read as follows:

Any establishment, employer or prospective employer may be placed on the forbidden territory list at any time if the American Federation of Musicians has information that the owner or manager of such establishment, employer or prospective employer has caused, attempted to cause or intends to cause members of the Federation to accept or play engagements in such establishment or for them in violation of any rule of the American Federation of Musicians. Musicians for or on behalf of any establishment, employer or prospective employer, on such forbidden territory list can only be employed through the local union in whose jurisdiction their services are to be rendered. All such cases shall be disposed of under Section 1, Article 1, of A. F. of M. By-Laws.

In Article XIV, Traveling Bands, the scale for members has been changed from \$60.00 to \$50.00 for members of the band and from \$90.00 to \$75.00 for leader. This also applies to Chautauquas. For State and County Fairs, the Local price will prevail as heretofore, if higher.

Article XV, Vitaphone, Movietone and similar services, has been amended by adding:

C. All rehearsals are to be paid for at the rate of one-half of the recording price.

All hours over a double session the same day shall be paid at rate of \$10.00 per hour or fraction thereof.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Number 58

The Federation urges its Locals to use their political and economic strength to combat the encroachment of high school bands and orchestras.

Number 59

The International Executive Board shall design an official display card which shall be the official union shop card of the American Federation of Musicians and which shall be furnished to Locals at their expense by the office of the *International Musician*, to the end that there shall be but one official style of card showing that musicians employed are members of said A. F. of M., and that the public who patronize places of entertainment may familiarize themselves therewith.

OVER FEDERATION FIELD

(By CHAUNCEY A. WEAVER)

The Thirty-ninth Annual Convention has passed into Federation history. Each one has its own peculiar characteristics. The Cleveland gathering will be long remembered by those in attendance.

One of the themes provocative of animated debate during the Cleveland Convention was that pertaining to high school bands. Delegate William H. Stephens of Local No. 142, Wheeling, W. Va., was one of the sponsors of a resolution calling for some initiative looking to the regulation and control of an issue which is causing much concern in many localities.

We have always shared in the resentment which those who earn their living through the medium of music feel concerning those movements which are eternally bringing tax-supported functionaries into the competitive field. However, as a distinguished American once observed: "It is a condition and not a theory which confronts us." The high school band has come to occupy as popular a place in the public schools as the football team—and probably more so, as the latter has a limited season, while the former is in evidence throughout the school year.

The effort to obtain protection through the action of a State Legislature will be worth trying; but it must be remembered that the modern general assembly is composed of politicians rather than statesmen, and the politician is constantly on the lookout for vote conservation.

Parental pride in those whom they send to school is strong. If son or daughter shows musical talent parents will aid and abet with unrestrained enthusiasm any program which tends to give that talent exploitation. That pride will invariably turn to wrath over any program which seems to circumvent the ambitions of their sons and daughters along musical lines. They will promptly proclaim that they are taxpayers and that their offspring have an unqualified right to enjoy the benefits of all expenditures of tax money which the Board of Education may see fit to authorize. With that sentiment dominant in a school district we would like to see the photograph of a legislative politician who could be induced to run counter thereto.

The musician has had many obstacles thrown in his path. First it was the phonograph; then it was the radio; and now it is the high school band and orchestra.

We recently had a first-hand picture of what magnitude the high school band has reached. During the month of June Des Moines was the scene of the national high school band contest of 1934. Fifty-one bands assembled here—coming from as far east as Massachusetts, as far north as Montana, as far west as Colorado, and as far south as Louisiana. The aggregate number of players was five thousand. E. Franko Goldman of New York came here to act as a judge—which responsibility was shared by Karl King of Fort Dodge and John T. Beeston of Des Moines. It was marvelous to note what these bands could play and the manner of their playing it.

It looks as though the high school band has come to stay. The silver lining to the cloud rests in the fact that many of these organizations may prove a recruiting station from which the American Federation of Musicians may strengthen its ranks in future years.

Meanwhile, all hail to the heroic souls who seek to accomplish something among the solons who occupy our halls of state.

Since returning from the Cleveland Convention, and after the foregoing was

dictated, we are in receipt of a copy of the official proceedings of the recent second annual meeting of the New York and New Jersey Conference of Musicians, held at Kingston, N. Y., a feature of which was the adoption of very earnest resolutions pertaining to high school bands and kindred organizations. In view of the widespread and deepening interest which the subject matter is creating we are going to append the Kingston resolutions for the inspection of all *International Musician* readers who may care to peruse them. They are as follows:

The committee recommends that the Conference inaugurate and enter upon a campaign, through legislative action and otherwise, to curb the competition of school and juvenile bands and orchestras which have become and are an ever increasing menace to the adult musicians' success in earning a livelihood, a condition which has been exceptionally aggravating during the last few years.

The committee recommends that a representative committee be selected whose duty it shall be to solicit the aid of the New York State Federation of Labor and its legislative committee and executive officers in the preparation of bills to be presented to the next Legislature to curb the activities of school and juvenile bands in competing with adult musicians. The committee recommends that the conference strongly urge all Locals that can possibly do so to affiliate with the New York State Federation of Labor whose help we must have to win this fight and that each Local that has the means to finance it, send delegate or delegates to the annual convention of the New York State Federation of Labor.

The committee recommends that all Locals be requested and urged to stand ready to use their influence with the Assembly representatives and State Senators from their respective districts to secure their support for our bills in the Legislature when notified by our Legislative Committee that the bills are about to be presented and to secure the support of all Central Labor Unions, Trades and Labor Assemblies and all Local Labor Unions in bringing influence to bear on the members of the Legislature.

The committee further recommends that all Locals be requested to at once get in contact with their local Boards of Education and get them to curb school band and orchestra competition, thus securing as much immediate protection as possible during the period of time that must elapse before the final adoption and passage of a law by the Legislature can be consummated.

The Kingston Conference was well attended, and much enthusiasm manifested. President Joseph N. Weber and his assistant, Fred W. Birnbach, gave addresses. New Jersey representation was admitted and henceforth the two commonwealths will be united in this particular method of promoting the interests of the musicians in the localities named.

While the President is on the ocean wide it remains to be seen whether the boys at home will attempt to rock the ship of state.

An eastern musician has been jailed for playing a saxophone at midnight. It would seem as though any poet might extract a moral from a tragedy like this. For example:

I played on my sax at midnight,
The clock was just striking the hour;
I first tried a soft *lagato*,
But some of the notes turned quite sour.

And then came the cops up the stairway;
They found me with countenance pale;
Expostulation was useless—
They marched me away to the jail.

But now I have learned my lesson;
I think I will learn now to croon;
And, should I still cause disturbance,
I will then learn to play a bassoon.

Actual results of Federal Emergency Relief Administration, so far as providing employment for musicians in concerned, is so spotted and the concrete evidences are so remote from each other, that we are disposed to give quite fully an interview in the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch*, and which is based on a review of the local situation between a reporter and President Samuel P. Meyers, of Local No. 2. The article in question says:

Funds allotted by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration are fur-

nishing a livelihood for 150 St. Louis musicians, most of them old-timers. Each musician receives \$40 a month.

Divided into large and small units, ranging from 10-piece orchestras to a 45-piece outfit, the players are giving regular concerts at city institutions, in playgrounds and parks. Units were organized last month, when the \$6,000 monthly allotment became available and programs now are in full swing.

"The Federal relief money came in just in the nick of time," Samuel P. Meyers, president of the Musicians' Mutual Benefit Association, said today "because our relief fund was nearing exhaustion. We were doling out the last few dollars of a fund of about \$16,500."

Most of the musicians afforded work through Federal aid, Meyers said, consist of men who were in their heyday thirty years or more ago. They were finding it difficult to get work even before the depression, as younger musicians and jazz orchestras entered the field.

"Some of the men playing again now are working for the first time in several years," Meyer said, "and it's a treat to see how happy they are. All of them had been on relief rolls and were selected by relief authorities."

Meyers said that 130 white musicians so employed are from a union membership of 1,200, while the other twenty, Negroes, are part of a union membership of seventy. The entertainment units include two 31-piece bands.

Musicians who play at the city institutions vary their programs to suit the patients. The 10-piece orchestra which visits City Sanitarium, for example, is called upon to render old-time jigs and melodies popular in the days when horse cars were no novelty.

Patients sometimes are permitted to augment the orchestra. Some of the listeners evince a new interest in life as the musicians strike up and sometimes they call for tunes that even the oldest players can't remember.

Just why certain cities should be favored and others ignored cannot be readily explained—except possibly along the line that "political pull" is a very powerful factor in this country. Some Congressmen are new on the job—some Congressmen always will be more or less new. But if relief of this character is to be rendered—under Federal auspices—it should be applied without the startling discrimination now in evidence.

Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Jahns of Local No. 67, Moline, Ill., world travelers and many times convention attendants, did not fail the Cleveland gathering and were both cordially greeted by their many friends.

If the present crusade for Hollywood reformation continues and accomplishes anything a few dressmaking establishments in that town ought to do a thriving business after a while.

Do you remember how long the cold weather seemed to continue last winter? Indications are that the heated term will seem fully as long.

Even the Salvation Army Band in Cleveland played well.

An interesting visitor to the Cleveland Convention appeared in the person of Brother Emil Rinkendorf of Canton, Ohio. For many years he held the position of musical director of the Grand Army Band of Canton—one of the notable bands of that section of the country. For a long period it was in big demand on great occasions and traveled from coast to coast. This brother also lead the Grand Opera House orchestra for many years. Brother Rinkendorf is known to Canton people as "Rinky." As a testimonial of appreciation for his long continued and efficient public service in matters musical Canton last year staged a fine concert which was known as "Rinky's Golden Jubilee Concert," celebrating his fifty years as band leader. The auditorium was crowded and Franko Goldman appeared as guest conductor. It is positively cheering to note the fact when a community shows willingness to recognize its faithful musical benefactors.

President George D. Moyer of Local No. 727, of Bloomsburg, Pa., and who was also delegate to the Cleveland Convention, hands us a "Symphony Program" played

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by the musicians of that community which is one more impressive illustration of what the small cities and towns are accomplishing in the way of maintaining meritorious standards of musical composition. The program contains such names as those of Verdi, Rachmaninoff, Liszt and Gluck and certainly reflects high credit upon the promoters of the enterprise. We wish all concerned an increasing enthusiasm in the public service which they are rendering.

Thanks to the beneficent enterprise of two great corporations, Chicago World Fair visitors are afforded opportunities to hear some great music this year. The Ford Motor Company of Detroit presents the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and Swift & Co. the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. These great organizations are scheduled for periods of ten weeks each and play two concerts a day. What an opportunity for World Fair music lovers! In addition to the foregoing the Ford Company has contracted to furnish the Woman's Symphony Orchestra of Chicago—seventy players—for a limited engagement. Give these corporations the credit which is their due for doing something substantial for living musicians. That these musicians should be employed instead of a resort to mechanical musical devices, President James C. Petrillo of Local No. 10 makes the following appeal through the *Chicago Intermezzo*:

For these reasons musicians everywhere should patronize and support these two great enterprises. Swift & Co. are marketing a varied line of food products. Their goods can be purchased in any meat shop, grocery, delicatessen or department store. Musicians and their families when purchasing articles of the nature put out by this great firm of meat packers should buy the goods made and sold by Swift & Co. In the face of what Swift & Co. are spending for the services of living musicians at the Fair this summer, organized musicians everywhere—but particularly those living in Chicago—should give them their patronage. The same argument applies to the Ford Motor Company. Patronize the firms that employ living musicians and when you buy their goods tell the salesman who waits on you why you are doing it. Help those who help you—that is true reciprocity—and reciprocity is the one and only key to industrial recovery.

"It pays to advertise," is a slogan whose merits are widely recognized. With this doctrine in mind Delegate George A. Keene, Local No. 809, Middletown, N. Y., introduced Resolution No. 35, which had the approval of the Good and Welfare Committee and subsequent endorsement of the Convention. The resolution provides that "The National Executive Board be and is hereby instructed to design and furnish a suitable union display card which shall be the official shop card of the American Federation of Musicians," and which may be used for posting in beer gardens, dance halls and places of amusement—giving public admonishment that only union musicians are there employed. The idea is certainly a good one and its earnest adoption should prove profitable.

Recommendations of the President: Add to Article X on page 80 the following, to be known as Section 51:

The price named in all contracts must be at least that of the Local or the Federation, as the case may be, regardless of any provisions in the contract that if the price named is less than the Local Scale or that of the Federation, that then the Local or Federation scale shall govern the contract

A favorable report of the Committee is concurred in by the Convention.

I suggest that to Article XV the following be added:

C: All rehearsals are to be paid for at the rate of one-half of the recording price.

All hours over a double session the same day shall be paid at the rate of \$10.00 per hour or fraction thereof.

A favorable report is made by the Committee.

The Convention concurs.

I suggest that from Section 37, Article X, pages 75-76, beginning with the sixth word on the first line of said section, the following two words be stricken:

"or accepts . . ."

and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"or signifies his intention to accept"

Then Section 37, Article X, pages 75-76 of the By-Laws will only apply to members soliciting engagements, or who signify their intention to accept same, and sub-section "D" of Section 6, Article X, pages 61-62, will apply to such members which accept and play engagements prohibited by the latter law.

A favorable report of the Committee is concurred in by the Convention.

Change Article XIII, Section 18, to read:

Any establishment, employer or prospective employer may be placed on the Forbidden Territory List at any time if the American Federation of Musicians has information that the owner or manager of such establishment, employer or prospective employer has caused, attempted to cause or intends to cause members of the Federation to accept or play engagements in such establishment or for them in violation of any rule of the American Federation of Musicians. Musicians for or on behalf of any establishment, employer or prospective employer, on such forbidden territory list can only be employed through the local union in whose jurisdiction their services are to be rendered. All such cases shall be disposed of under Section 1, Article I, of A. F. of M. By-Laws.

The Committee submits a favorable report.

The Convention agrees in the favorable report.

The Committee reports on the following propositions submitted by the delegates:

RESOLUTION No. 4

Whereas, Many of the leading industrial organizations are resorting to the use of Electrical Transcriptions for Broadcasting purposes, and

Whereas, These Electrical Transcriptions are being made by members of the American Federation of Musicians, and

Whereas, Non-union Radio Stations may take advantage and profit by these electrical transcriptions to the detriment of and in an effort to defeat the purpose of the American Federation of Musicians; therefore be it

Resolved, That before any member of the American Federation of Musicians be allowed to render service for the making of any electrical transcription for broadcasting purposes, a clause shall be inserted in all contracts stating that this electrical transcription will not be used by or sold to any radio station that is on the unfair list of the American Federation of Musicians.

The carrying out of this resolution shall be left to the Executive Board to see that same is complied with, along with the necessary penalties that will make it effective.

F. of M. in 1935 to be acted upon so that it will be possible to put into effect the election of these officers by all its members through their respective locals not later than 1936.
