SPECIAL NOTICE TO ALL LOCAL UNIONS

Modification and Clarification of the Ten Per Cent Law as Applied to

Orchestras Playing Local Outside Engagements

Since this tax became effective, many misinterpretations and misunderstandings developed among some Locals concerning its correct application, therefore the attention of all Locals is called to the following:

The 10 per cent traveling orchestra tax as passed by the 1934 Convention remains in full force and effect.

Beginning March 15, 1935, orchestras which play what is commonly known as local out-of-town engagements also become subject to a 10 per cent tax.

This tax applies to all dance engagements played by orchestras outside of the jurisdiction of their Local in Public Dance Halls, Auditoriums or Halls connected with an institution or amusement resort and on all engagements of whatever kind played in Hotels, Restaurants, Cafes, Clubs or Inns.

NOTE: The rule, which became effective on March 15th covering orchestras playing out-of-town engagements, exempted from the tax private functions held in hotels or inns. This exemption does no longer exist and for all such engagements the tax must also be charged.

The 10 per cent tax must always be charged and added to the price of the engagement maintained by the Local in whose jurisdiction the engagement is played, and none other. Every engagement is governed by one of the following four examples:

1. An orchestra, playing in the jurisdiction of a Local which maintains a higher price than their own Local, must charge the price of the Local wherein playing, plus 10 per cent.
2. An orchestra, playing in the jurisdiction of a Local which maintains a **LOWER** price than their own Local, **MUST CHARGE** the price of their own Local, plus 10 per cent of the price of the Local wherein playing.
3. An orchestra, playing in the jurisdiction of a Local which maintains the **SAME** price as their own Local, **MUST CHARGE**

the price of the Local wherein playing, plus 10 per cent.

4. An orchestra, playing in its own jurisdiction is not subject to any Federation tax.

Locals must collect the tax and forward it to the International Treasurer each week, who shall make the following disbursement:

4 per cent to the Local in whose jurisdiction the engagement is played.

3 per cent to the members who played the engagement.

3 per cent to the Federation.

A Local failing to collect the tax does not relieve the orchestra of paying such tax, but they must themselves send it to the International Treasurer.

All penalties which apply to traveling orchestras for failure to receive and forward such 10 per cent tax also apply to orchestras playing local outside engagements.

The following rule applies to neutral territory:

On all engagements in neutral territory, wherein the Federation stipulates a **WEEKLY** wage, 6 per cent must be charged and sent to the International Treasurer; 3 per cent is to be returned to the orchestra at close of engagement.

For single engagements in neutral territory the Federation does not stipulate any wage, therefore there is no Federation tax.

Engagements played in neutral territory for which the Federation does not maintain a price may be governed by Locals whose members play same.

This notice supercedes the notice published in the 1935 March issue of the International Musician and all circular letters sent to Locals in March.

NOTE: Traveling cards must be carried by all members who remain on the road for a week or longer.

IMPORTANT!

As many local unions had cause to complain against competition of juvenile bands, locals should make efforts to have their child labor laws of the respective States, if possible, apply to such cases. That at times such policy is successful has been recently shown in the City of Middletown, N. Y., where a proprietor of a hotel was found guilty of violation of a labor law restriction against employment after 6:00 P. M. of child musicians less than 16 years of age.

It is best if such violations are called to the attention of the State Labor Department, together with the insistence that the Department investigate such cases, the evidence, of course, to be furnished by the local union.

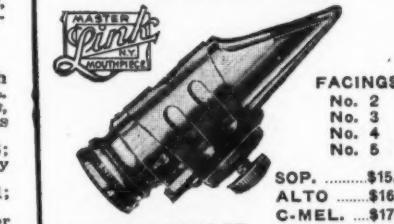

Holding Company Propaganda

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S message to Congress urging the enactment of legislation curbing public utility holding companies and criticizing propaganda organized by company executives to defeat the legislation was regarded so favorably by Congress that 50,000 copies of the message were ordered printed in order that Senators and Representatives might send it to their constituents. The President said:

"I have been watching with great interest the fight being waged against public utility holding company legislation. I have watched the use of investors' money to make the investor believe that the efforts of the Government to protect him are designed to defraud him. I have seen much of the propaganda prepared against such legislation—even down to mimeograph sheets of instructions for propaganda to exploit the most far-fetched and fallacious fears."

Asserting that he was as "unimpressed" by this propaganda as he was by "similar effort to stir up the country against the securities exchange bill last spring," the President claimed the chain letter, circular and verbal pressure on members of Congress so thoroughly misrepresented the purpose of the proposed law that the people should "understand once and for all the actual facts of the case." He continued:

"Such a measure will not destroy legitimate business or wholesome and productive investment. It will not destroy a penny of actual value of those operating properties which holding companies now control and which holding company securities represent insofar as they have any value. On the contrary, it will surround the necessary reorganization of the holding company with safeguards which will in fact protect the investor."

The President charged that the devices inaugurated by many utility executives "have given tyrannical power and exclusive opportunity to a favored few" and made "once traditionally independent owners of their own businesses helplessly dependent for their daily bread upon the favor of a very few, who through devices such as holding companies have taken for themselves unwarranted economic power." He declared that the holding company legislation was in the interest of the real investor as well as of the rate payer.

Observers predict that the message will greatly facilitate the speedy enactment of the law, which the Administration claims is designed to remove recognized evils of holding company organizations.

Mr. Dawes Predicts End of Depression

CHARLES G. DAWES, known in Chicago as the man who borrowed \$90,000,000 of public money from the R F C, says that the depression will be over in two months.

That sounds like a large order. There were on Federal relief in January 4,533,840. Counting four persons to a family, this means 18,135,360 people dependent on the national government for a living.

Does Mr. Dawes mean to say that the millions of these destitute who are still employable can be put to work and those who cannot be given tasks at the industrial machine can be assured of decent security—all in two months? The labors of Hercules, rolled together and multiplied fifty fold, would not be a start at such a task.

Probably, however, Mr. Dawes does not mean any such thing. When he says that the depression will be over in two months, he means the depression as it affects his business and the business of his friends and associates in the financial game. They, evidently, count on flying high within the next thirty days.

For that matter, the depression as it affected Charles G. Dawes ended a good while ago. It came when, after serving as first chairman of the R F C, he resigned with a flourish, and came back to borrow \$90,000,000 of public money for private use—the use of the Dawes bank. Something like half that huge sum has not been paid back.

Depression almost over? In the sense that factory hands and farmers and small merchants and professional workers use the word, Mr. Dawes and his ilk never had a depression; and so far as lessened profits and more difficulty in paying debts is concerned, Mr. Dawes cast those burdens on the R F C more than two years ago.

Organized Labor Only Bulwark Against Communism.

ORGANIZED labor is the chief bulwark in the United States against communism, Lloyd K. Garrison, chairman of the former National Labor Board, said in testimony before the Senate Education and Labor Committee.

Garrison endorsed the Wagner labor relations bill. "I think those employers who are out to strangle organized labor are simply playing into the hands of extremists," he said.

"This will put a stop to the destructive anti-union tactics which have long flourished in this country, particularly in the large industries.

"It is absolutely essential that the level of wages should be increased if the mass of consumers are to have the necessary purchasing power to keep industry going.

"Legislation can fix bare minimums for wages, but over and above that it is essential to have collective bargaining between organized labor and organized management.

"In no other way will the wage structure be maintained at the proper level.

"The economic power of the employers, particularly in the large industries, completely overshadows the economic power of the workers unless the latter are organized."

Garrison said he considered it desirable to legislate all company unions out of existence, whether or not they were organized and dominated by employers. He declared section 7-A of the NIRA "cannot now be enforced except in a handful of cases.

"Unless this bill can be passed," he said, "I doubt if 7-A should be retained at all.

"It is worse to have a law holding out false hopes than no law at all."

Labor Queries

Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Toilers.

Q.—Where will the next convention of the American Federation of Labor be held?

A.—In Atlantic City, N. J., beginning October 7. Atlantic City was selected by the American Federation of Labor Executive Council at its recent Washington meeting. Selection of a convention city was left to the council by the San Francisco convention of the Federation.

Q.—Who is Edward A. Filene?

A.—Boston department store owner, who has vigorously advocated high wages in addresses throughout the nation.

Q.—Did the American Federation of Labor support the movement for direct election of United States Senators?

A.—Yes.

Q.—What is the oldest labor organization in the garment trades?

A.—The Journeymen Tailors' Union of America, organized in 1883.

Q.—Does organized labor favor equal pay for women doing the same work as men?

A.—Emphatically yes. "Women should receive the same pay as men for equal work performed," the American Federation of Labor has declared.

Q.—Who were the "ladies of Lowell" in labor history?

A.—Women and girl textile workers of Lowell, Mass., who went on strike at the signal of a waved poke bonnet, in 1834. In a statement justifying their walkout, the strikers referred to themselves as "the ladies who were lately employed in the factories of Lowell."

Out Beyond the Surf

Where thought, un-
hastened by necessity or
trepidation, sometimes
penetrates to truth.
Here, where the shal-
lows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the
lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

There are two amazing men in high jobs in this administration. At least they hold those jobs as these lines are written.

If they are out of them by the time this reaches the readers' eyes, then three cheers.

One of these men is S. Clay Williams, cigarette king. The other is la Richberg.

They came at each other, so to speak, from opposite sides. And they fit together like twin loaves of bread, or like two matches.

S. Clay Williams never has cared anything about unions, except to keep them out of his plants.

Richberg has had big fees from the railroad unions. He has stood before the people as their champion. He got himself onto a high platform.

These two make a strange pair in this New Deal Administration.

* * *

Williams has lived a business life that stands out as a remarkable opposite to the New Deal philosophy. He heads one of the amazing "big four" non-union cigarette companies, one of which pays more in dividends in a year than ALL of them pay in wages.

It is an anachronism that a Clay Williams should be in a Roosevelt family. It would be funny, if not tragic, but since humor is half tragedy anyhow, maybe it is funny to find Williams in the line-up.

It was natural that Donald Richberg should get in. His past had been a progressive kind of a past, in the main.

But there are those who, when they get astride a high horse, forget what put them there. If Donald Richberg didn't get there because he was rated as a forward-looking man, how then did he get there?

But if he now looks forward it is merely by way of precaution to keep from running onto too many rocks.

* * *

Richberg is suave. He speaks with an engaging smile. And few in all Washington can say more words and mean less. It's a gift, it seems.

If Clay Williams and Donald Richberg remain, by some queer chance, in the machine until the next campaign comes around, they probably will be the biggest stones around the Administration's neck.

Of course, there are some other men in places of power to whom progress seems a forgotten word and to whom labor is something to shun and to oppose. One such is Leo Wolman, of automobile board fame. Leo Wolman's reputation as a progressive was won because of service to a union. He landed in Washington as a prize exhibit. Then came the revelation.

But Wolman is relatively small fish—not to rate with Williams and Richberg, the one a leading union-hating industrialist, the other a lawyer whose fame came largely because of the fact that unions employed him and that he made some good fights for them; these two now at peace in a common thought, in which labor seems to have no part.

* * *

Through the coming years there probably will be speculation about this strange pair who rose to positions on the great all-high Recovery Board.

The years will move on. Very rapidly, too. And the chances are that Williams and Richberg will not long remain where they are.

But the mystery of why they were put there and why they were kept there will continue, no doubt, for some time.

However, nobody will care much about that, if only they are removed from the places they now hold, or suddenly achieve for themselves a decision to betake themselves from the current scene.

History might be different had those two men not come to those two jobs. It certainly would have been a lot more pleasant.

OVER FEDERATION FIELD

(BY CHAUNCEY A. WEAVER)

The determination to do something about the everlasting and increasingly insistent encroachment by public school bands and orchestras upon the field legitimately belonging to the specially prepared and tax-paying musicians has resulted in endorsement by the New York State Locals, aided and abetted by the Empire State Federation of Labor of an act now before the General Assembly of the commonwealth, which it is hoped will at least blaze the trail to a better understanding.

In fact, four bills have been introduced bearing upon different phases of the same subject.

No. 1 is an Act providing that—"No civil service public officer or employe shall be detailed, ordered, authorized or permitted to perform or render services as a musician in connection with or as part of any band or orchestra at any time or place other than as part of and in connection with any official function of the department with which such officer or employe is so connected; the intent and purpose being to avoid and prevent the individuals hereinbefore enumerated from in any way competing or directly or indirectly interfering with, avoiding or making unnecessary the employment of private musicians on occasions when such employment would otherwise be possible."

No. 2 is an Act providing that—"No public school teacher, pupil, student or inmate shall be detailed, ordered, authorized or permitted to perform or render any services as a musician in connection with or as part of any band or orchestra at any time or place other than as part of and in connection with an official function of such school or institution with which such teacher, pupil, student or inmate is connected."

Bills Nos. 3 and 4 are of the same tenor and are aimed specifically at the College of the City of New York and Hunter College of the City of New York.

The campaign seems to be in charge of Leonard Campbell, Chairman, Local 66, 44 North street, Rochester, and George A. Keene, Secretary, Local 809, Middletown, of the New York and New Jersey State Conference—both of whom we are sure will be glad to answer letters of inquiry as to the progress being made in this timely crusade.

We acknowledged receipt of the Biennial Report of State Labor Inspector John H. Mackey of Florida—a 48-page volume reflecting a wide and intelligent range of activity—especially in observations anent the much-mooted subject of child labor. Brother Mackey now and then finds time to attend national conventions of the American Federation of Musicians. He will be able to discover a very direct road from Jacksonville to Asbury Park, if he can break away, and perhaps bring another delegate or two from Local 444 with him.

One of the chief beauties of April is that it succeeds March.

After eighteen years of faithful service as President of Local 140 of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., John MacLuskie has retired. This relinquishment of office was made the occasion of a home city recognition of Brother MacLuskie's official tenure which was notable in the completeness of arrangement and the cordiality of the civic spirit displayed. A testimonial dinner was tendered John which brought out a magnificent attendance. Local celebrities delivered appreciative addresses; Fred W. Birnbach brought the message of felicitation from President Joseph N. Weber's office; over-seas war comrades had a part in the program, and as a token of good-will the guest of honor was presented with a handsome and well-made traveling bag. If a suggestion from this quarter will not be out of place, it would be that "Mac" dedicate the traveling bag with a trip to Asbury Park in the coming June. Brother MacLuskie was sheriff for two terms of his home county after returning from war service in France and Belgium. He has been a delegate to many national conventions of the American Federation of Musicians. We offer our congratulations and earnestly hope that no new change of business relationship will result of any severing of the close ties which have bound him to the musi-

cal cause with which he has been so long identified.

The national convention is two months away. The Locals with affirmative or negative suggestions should prepare to express their views. The convention is their congress.

As the jazz age has not exterminated trombone players, we are sure that many of them will be interested in an article contributed to the Boston Traveler by Brother Henry Woelber, of Local 9, who, we have discovered, knows a good many things about places and people—especially those having some musical connection. This article reads as follows:

The death last week of Carl Hampe, the noted trombonist, recalls a musical stunt unparalleled in the history of brass instrument playing. Hampe, who had just passed 73, retired from the Boston Symphony orchestra in 1926. He joined that famous organization in 1886, during the first term of William Gericke, whose idea of the proper balance and tonal quality of a large symphony has been adopted all over the world. When Beethoven, Schubert, and Schumann wrote their renowned symphonies, an orchestra of forty pieces was of considerable size. With that end in view in writing for the trombone section consisting of the E-flat alto trombone, the somewhat larger B-flat tenor trombone, and the still larger B-flat bass trombone, they had in mind the timbre of the trombones in connection with the other wind instruments against the main body of the orchestra comprising a small army of stringed instruments. But Gericke began enlarging his Boston Symphony Orchestra from sixty-five men to 100, the roster of today. When playing the great symphonies Gericke began to make faces at the small E-flat alto trombonist. His tone was too thin, too rasping and penetrating. He made all the three trombone players use a large heavy German B-flat trombone. This is where a musical stunt started. In order to do this Hampe was obliged to play a high E-flat trombone part on this larger B-flat trombone. This meant a fourth higher. Every note he played was four tones higher. Gradually he developed an embouchure (lip) all his own; something not in the instrument books. His success in doing this was to give the trombone section the proper quality which Gericke demanded. All those years Hampe played only that part and only that style of playing. His upper scale was all his own, and time only will tell if the first trombonist in all our other fourteen great symphony orchestras will last as long. Hampe played that unnatural high part so many years that his middle register on this large trombone was very mediocre, while his lower register was quite impossible. High C is the ordinary normal high note of the B-flat trombone, but so many years on this high part enabled Hampe to develop a high F, which stamps him among brass players as not only a genius, but an iron man as well.

Lyman is rounding out his twentieth year of service and Felix has been treasurer since 1916. A fine banquet was an evening feature. Springfield supports an unusually well-trained symphony orchestra under the direction of Arthur Turner. Brother Collins had charge of the installation.

More interest has been shown this season in State band tax propositions than ever before known. We have frequent requests for copies of the Iowa State band tax law and will be glad to continue to furnish the same to all who are interested. By this time, however, the average legislature will have adjourned. Those who have been dilatory, and who are at all interested, should prepare to bestir themselves next time.

One who was in his prime a dominant personality in the musical scene and who recently passed away was Theodore Bendix, who breathed his last in Bay Shore Hospital, New York, at the age of 73 years. He was a native of Detroit. Violin and piano were his instruments. From theatre orchestra leader he speedily developed into a conductor of fine capabilities and in due time was added to the Henry W. Savage directorship staff. He was identified with such attractions as "The Belle of New York," "Beauty and the Beast" and the "Spring Maid." As a composer he displayed originality and as an arranger was distinguished for his effectiveness. He belonged to the substantial and worthwhile school of a former day and hundreds of musicians throughout the country will learn with regret of his passing.
