IS BUSINESS CONFIDENCE RETURNING?

The American Federation of Labor Monthly Survey of Conditions in the United States Indicates a Revival Is in Progress

WITH this fall's industrial upturn, business has regained a greater measure of confidence than at any other time since depression began. This fact is of outstanding importance for, even though we have in the United States resources, equipment and man power enough to give every family a comfortable living, under our present system these resources will not be used, men and women will not be given a chance to work and earn income, until business men are confident that they can make profits.

Many evidences of growing business confidence have appeared during the past month. Greater optimism was shown at the annual conference of the American Bankers' Association than for many years. Such comments as these from reliable business observers also indicate a spirit of more assurance: "Opportunities for profitable capital venture have begun to assume reality." Although business may have a set-back next spring, "it probably will be no more than a temporary pause in the long-term upward trend." Another observer points out that, although we have had a series of upward movements in business since the bottom of depression, none of them "had the convincing quality" that characterizes the upturn this fall; the present feeling of growing confidence in business circles contrasts with previous periods of "tentative optimism." Such a definite upturn in sentiment is probably a forerunner of business expansion—increasing production, increasing employment, rising stock markets, growing profits.

There is good basis for business confidence. The upturn this fall has reached a higher level than anticipated. Standard Statistics' estimate of industrial production for November, first set at 74.6% of normal, has been revised upward to 77.1%; this is the highest November since 1929, 14% above November last year. Industrial production, retail trade, building construction have all advanced; farmers' incomes are higher. Business failures have been at unusually low levels for two years. These favorable factors are reflected in a rising stock market which has continued steadily upward since early October, carrying stock prices to new 1935 peaks. The market value of all stocks listed on the New York exchange increased by \$2,500,000,000 last month.

More businesses today are able to operate profitably than at any time in the last few years. Records for all corporations are not yet available for 1934 or 1935, but the records below, which cover somewhat more than 1900 corporations, indicate the general trend. These 1900 corporations received in 1933 more than half the entire profits made by all corporations in the United States, numbering 447,000. Thus their records are decidedly above the average, but they indicate what is happening generally. In 1934 their profits exceeded 1933 by 32%; Standard Statistics estimates that for the full year 1935 industrial profits will exceed 1934 by 35 to 40%.

Shortages have developed during depression in many kinds of goods. There are major shortages in "durable goods," such as houses, automobiles, machinery, railroad equipment. There are minor shortages in non-durable goods, such as food and clothing, but since these goods are so essential to life that even in depression we manage by some means to supply them, the shortages are less severe. Houses and automobiles may be made to last

longer and industrial machinery, steel rails and railroad cars are not replaced when industry and railroads are operating at half capacity. Thus it happens that today we need 9,000,000 automobiles, 5,000,000 new homes, and our total shortage of "durable goods" has been estimated at \$85,000,000,000. These shortages are seriously felt in our national living. They will be supplied when business can make a profit by providing us with them. Profit, not our need, is the controlling factor.

Replacement of automobiles is beginning. Increase in production from 2,870,000 cars and trucks in 1934 to a probable 3,900,000 or 4,000,000 this year has meant a 45% increase in profits; an 8.3% increase in employment and 18.5% in payrolls. Building is increasing and machine tool production is rising, with similar increases in profits, employment and payrolls. As business men feel confident of making profits, this process of replacement will gather speed; production will increase, lifting with it profits, employment and payrolls until throughout industry a boom is in process. Such a boom will probably develop within the next few years.

An industrial boom must create millions of jobs, add billions of dollars to payrolls in order to add billions to industry's profits. But can the boom create jobs for all the unemployed? In the five years since 1929, the average worker's producing power per hour in our factories has increased 25% and there have been corresponding increases in other industries. Unless hours are shortened and production of our industries greatly exceeds previous levels, we shall still have a standing army of unemployed, numbering in the millions, even when we reach the peak of the coming boom. To shorten hours sufficiently and increase production enough to put the unemployed to work we must have trade union organization throughout industry strong enough to set standards for hours and raise workers' buying power far above 1929.

Throughout our industrial history, prosperity has always been followed by depression. From 1790 to the present day, we have paid for every year and a half of prosperity by one year of depression. These "business cycles" are inherent in our present industrial system when it operates without control. As we look ahead to prosperity, we know that it must be followed by depression. The present depression is the longest and most severe in our history; it has been more destructive than the four previous long depressions combined. The next depression may be still more serious.

As we stand at the threshold of the coming industrial boom workers should keep a few essential facts clearly in mind:

1. In every industrial boom, profits increase faster than wages. The Cleveland Trust Co. notes in our present recovery, that the "increase in business profits appears to be considerably greater than the advance in volumes of output and of trade and transportation" and that business men have used the depression period to make economies and increase efficiency so that they can now use relatively small increases in production to create much more than corresponding gains in profits. Wages

today are not even keeping pace with production. In the first three quarters of 1935, production has exceeded last year by 8.7%, workers buying power by less than 1%.

In the boom which ended in 1929, wages increased 20% while profits increased 40% (1923 to 1929). While workers' buying power was not sufficient to keep our industrial plant busy to capacity nor to provide an adequate living for all, surplus funds which could not be used for production increased from 8 to 9 billion dollars in 1923-24 to as much as 15 or 16 billion in 1928-29. They were used for speculation and brought on the stock crash of 1929. A similar development awaits us today unless wage increases greatly exceed any we have previously known.

2. The boom cannot last more than a few years. Industry will hasten to make up present shortages while operations are profitable; when this has been accomplished, operations must be reduced, workers laid off, payrolls cut. Unless workers' returns from their work increase more rapidly than ever in the past, their income cannot be sufficient to supply everyone with the homes, automobiles, clothing they need and industry cannot be held at high productive levels.

3. The danger of another great stock market boom and collapse is serious. Our Federal Reserve banks today have stocks of gold twice as great as in 1929. These gold stocks will support a credit expansion twice that of 1929. Although recent legislation has established new controls, we cannot be sure these controls will be adequate.

Since workers bear the brunt of depression, they are concerned more than any other group with the business developments of the next few years: No group can escape depression; business men, as well as workers, have seen their income and savings swept away; lawyers, doctors, even bankers, have been found in breadlines.

A recent study by competent engineers shows that in America today no one need be unemployed or in poverty. Proper use of our industrial resources, equipment and man power, can produce enough to give every family an income of at least \$4,370 a year. This means that it is possible for every family to have a comfortable home, plenty of food, clothing and other essentials, an automobile and radio, opportunities for education and culture, adequate medical care and provision for old age. With modern industrial techniques, plenty is within our grasp, not for the favored few alone, but for every man, woman and child in America. In the world of today, it is sheer stupidity to condemn millions of men and women to idleness, poverty and dependence while we run our industrial plant at half capacity and plow under the cotton we need for clothes.

We know that when industry operates without control, depression must follow prosperity as surely as night follows day. Periods of prosperity bring large fortunes for the few, but never any period of prosperity lifted living standards for the masses to the levels modern industry makes possible. In our year of greatest prosperity, one-sixth of our population were living below the minimum necessary for health, when all might have had a comfortable living standard.

Under proper control, our industries could supply a steady stream of goods year after year sufficient for our needs. Our living standards (Continued on Page Two)

could be raised progressively, in proportion with improving industrial techniques; we need not throw millions out of work every few years to create a shortage of goods so as to make profits.

The American people are beginning to realize that if we would shift from control to make profits over to control to make higher standards of living we must have the machinery for social planning. Any satisfactory measures for control for human welfare must grow out of the thought and experience of business and labor leaders and of experts who know industry and agriculture, and know how to make them serve our needs.

Make It a Merry "Union Label" Christmas

IN what better way could the members of Labor Unions and their friends help the cause of organized labor than by buying only those Christmas presents which bear the Union Label? Many practical gifts are made under union conditions and they can be purchased at just as reasonable prices as the products of unfair and foreign industries. By patronizing only the firms which display the union label, shop card or button, labor unionists and their sympathizers can make this Christmas a merrier one for themselves, their children and all the nation's citizens.

The women of the labor unionist's home have a combined purchasing power of over six billions of dollars annually. If this vast sum were spent for only union-made goods and union services, it would be the greatest stimulus to organizing non-union concerns that the American Federation of Labor has witnessed in years. It would also be a great encouragement to fair employers in industries that are unionized.

All that is necessary is just to ask for the union label. The merchant or other business place will carry union-labeled goods if the demand is great enough. He will pass the word on to the manufacturer that his customers are demanding the union label and the manufacturer, in turn, will be compelled to recognize the standard labor unions if he desires to continue in business.

There is no better period in which to test the value of buying union-made goods than during the shopping season before Christmas. Let's make it a Merry "Union Label" Christmas.

Labor Conditions Are Public Concern

WHEN Major Berry, Co-ordinator for Industrial Co-operation, asked industry for information on wages and hours, he was "prying" into something private, some business men think.

And when he turns to labor unions for data as to hours and wages, to be used as factual data in the approaching labor industry conference next month, business men call it "snooping."

Well, you can't blame some of them for being ashamed of themselves, and not wanting the world to know too much about what they have been doing—"just to make a dollar."

These gentlemen ought to be thankful that these things are to be dragged out into the open. It is a lot safer so, than to have the discussions carried on in private, under cover, around the hobo fires, and in the trade union meetings—and in the company union meetings.

Meanwhile there is still the eleven millions of the people for whom this great country can find no honest work to do. That is quite an army. And now many are being forced out on the march again.

The transient camps are being closed up for the winter. The Works "Progress" Administration is not doing so well at getting the idle back on any old job. Unemployment insurance is just one of those things still in the future. Old age insurance is something you are out of, unless you were able to stay in one place, somehow.

And when anybody tries to dig out the reasons for present conditions, and suggests that maybe there is some way to put all the unemployed at honest work making the things they need—in order to keep on living—why, that is "snooping!"

Prison Goods Law Must Be Enforced

INDUSTRY and labor groups which have been fighting unfair competition of prison-made goods have protested the propriety of the Attorney General's instructions to United States district attorneys that no further investigations of violations of the Sumner-Ashurst Prison Industries Act be made until the constitutionality of the Federal act is definitely determined. While it is since reported that the instructions have been withdrawn, the principle needs stressing that it is the business of the executive departments to enforce the laws made by Congress until they are held invalid. A sharp reprimand from Congress is entirely in order if the Department of Justice lies down on its job at the first signs of objection to a law, especially from prison contractors.

To balance the account it should be entered on the record that considerable credit for the success of United States Attorney Donnelly in obtaining an indictment against the Minerva Manufacturing Company of New York is due to the G-men of the Department of Justice. State prosecutions of prison industry law violation have produced indifferent results. Donnelly adopted a new procedure. Although operating from Grand Rapids, Michigan, he called in the G-men to get facts; through them he got at the books of the concern in New York; state lines were eliminated; evasions, legal and otherwise, were stopped. But one such victory is not enough. After having once slowed down enforcement of the act, Attorney General Cummings needs to do more than adopt a do-nothing policy in order to show his good faith. Unless he does take a more aggressive position toward these lawbreakers, somebody may charge that his heart is not in the job of enforcing the act and that he may be sympathetic toward the system operating in his own State of Connecticut, which ships large quantities of prison-made goods into other States in ruinous competition with free industry and with disastrous effect upon labor standards.

State enforcement is not easy. Contracts for 25,000 wood tables from the Ionia and 10,000 metal bridge tables and 40,000 metal chairs from Jackson (Mich.) prisons were allegedly made after passage of the Michigan act prohibiting sale of prison-made goods in Michigan in competition with those manufactured by private enterprise.

Labor wants Federal prosecution and G-men co-operation continued as already stated. Labor is anxious to obtain enforcement of the Sumner-Ashurst and Hawes-Cooper Acts and does not want to have progress delayed by either New Deal or regular government agencies, some of which seem to be working at cross purposes and playing into the hands of prison contractors. Industry, too, is watching closely the moves of the Prison Industries Reorganization Administration, which has funds for surveying the field. Is that to be just another boondoggle? Or is it to be suspected as another deal to delay enforcement of the laws for which labor, industry and the public fought for so many years?

Now is the time to put an embargo on unfair and foreign goods and make America safe for Americans.

Labor Queries

Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Toilers.

Q.—Is the Boilermakers' Union an old organization?

A.—Yes. A conference of nine independent unions formed a national organization at Chicago in 1880. A few years later another national organization was formed at Atlanta, Ga. In 1893 the two national organizations consolidated under the present name of International Brotherhood of Boilermakers, Iron Ship Builders and Helpers of America.

Q.—When did a woman preside over an American Federation of Labor convention?

A.—During the 1907 convention at Norfolk, Va., when President Gompers called upon Agnes Nestor, Chicago trade unionist, to take the chair.

Q.—How did coal miners first organize in the United States?

A.—Earliest unions were as assemblies of the Knights of Labor. The National Federation of Miners and Mine Laborers was formed in 1885, and this was followed in 1889 by the National Progressive Union. In 1890 all the coal miners' organizations consolidated as the United Mine Workers of America.

Q.—What union was the last of the craft divisions to leave the International Typographical Union?

A.—The International Photo-Engravers Union of North America, which was founded in 1900 and which was recognized by the International Typographical Union three years later. The International Typographical Union was originally an industrial union composed of the various crafts in the printing industry.

Out Beyond the Surf

Where thought, un-
hastened by necessity or
trepidation, sometimes
penetrates to truth.

Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

"I lift my hand, and send a shudder to the stars," said a great preacher.

This little world of affairs is getting almost as sensitive as the universal ether was thought to be by that preacher.

Boundaries get lost, down in Ethiopia, where desert winds bury the line markers; a European dictator decides to move the lines around some more; the Negus Negast of all the Ethiopians makes polite objections; and the whole world goes to war over it.

Yes, we are in it.

If we ship cotton to either country we are in it.

Refusing to ship cotton to Italy or Ethiopia will also get us in.

Withholding petroleum from Italy makes us a party to Ethiopia's cause.

There will be that much less cotton grown on Abyssinian highland plateaus if we help keep Italy out of them.

Blood is thicker than water; and we have a little English blood, too.

There's nothing sporting about the fight, as it stands. Nobody pretends that Haile Selassie has a cat's chance in a bonfire, against Mussolini.

But the Italian armies have their traditional honor to maintain. The general of their northern forces in Abyssinia is said to have licked the natives in Lybia once upon a time. But it is a far cry to the honor of the old Roman legions. They used to win battles against wilder people without any tanks. They had the old Roman Senate to boss the job then.

But the deep water is not really around the Ethiopian mountains.

The soundings made by League of Nations experts shows much more dangerous channels north of the European Alps. There, another dictator folds his arms, in Napoleonic poses, and ponders the speed of his cannon factories. A weakened Italy may make Hitler's road easier into Austria, and beyond, down the valley of the Danube.

There is a high plateau in South Africa, from the edge of which you may see the weather approaching for the next three weeks.

Britain stands on some such political horizon, and studies the storms of the coming two years. One storm center is in Germany. Another in Russia has focussed the eyes of the world for a decade. Between these two cauldrons lie Poland, and the Balkans. Germany offers Poland a part of the Russian Ukrainian grain fields, if and when—they take them.

Germany represents a new urge for world-power, a cult of paganism.

Russia represents a program of world-propaganda, calling to the workers of the world.

Either one stands for the downfall of the present English and European patterns of life.

Beyond Russia is the flaring banner of Nippon, outstretching over all of Asia—and then—? Japan threatens, and menaces, India, with all the islands of the Pacific.

France still fears the German armies, coming back for revenge. Against them she will favor Russia. But England sees in Russia a menace also to her imperial domains of India.

England and France agree as against Germany. But after that—outside of that—? It will depend upon the pattern which the kaleidoscope of history presents at any given moment. For England has other frontiers than the Rhine. England's perspective is always a world view.

And the world is always changing.

Deep waters here—with rocks in every channel.

And America is a part of the picture, like it or not!

To keep out of it all—to keep our sons from battle—

And to save our property from the waste of war!

We are for peace—unless war knocks at the door!

What a powerful weapon it would be if the American Federation of Labor could declare to the industrial world: "Every Union member buys ONLY Union articles."

"No," said the Union man to the company "union" stool pigeon, "I haven't anything up my sleeve, but I have a Union Label in my pocket."

Workers' wives can do their bit in establishing better conditions for labor by joining the Union Label-buying army.

When man comes to a perfect hearing and a clear understanding the cry of individual hunger will be lost in the chorus of plenty. The cry of the unclothed will terminate with the sufficiency of raiment to wear. The cry of the sick will not be in vain, for all hospital doors will be opened unto them. Then the music of the spheres will envelop all the earth—in that good time coming!

It will soon be time to commence our annual reading of Whittier's "Snow-bound."

"Tobacco Road" has been judicially declared too rough for Chicago. We have felt for some time that several Chicago streets were badly in need of paving.

Another thriving organization of Federation musicians which we are glad to mention is the Wisconsin State Musicians' Association, which held a meeting November 3rd, at Green Bay, as the guests of Local 205. President William Grohndorf extended the welcome. Twenty locals were represented. The discussion represented a wide range of topics, which is always a healthy sign. Of course, taxation and tax refunds had a prominent place.

Officers elected were: Harry A. Thompson of Local 59, Kenosha, president; Walter Smith, Local No. 46, Oshkosh, vice-president; A. F. Vandenberg, Green Bay, treasurer; Clem Hotz, Local No. 337 of Appleton.

The next session of the association will be held at Wisconsin Rapids, Sunday, April 5, 1936.

While the WPA crooners are painting glorious pictures of the way in which workers are being taken care of—musicians included, we reproduce a graphic pen portrait from the news gallery of the current Local 802 Monthly Journal of New York and which reads as follows:

Nearly one thousand musicians, several hundred of whom are employed on the WPA project, paraded from the headquarters of the Local to the Port Authority Building, headquarters of the local WPA music project, on Friday, October 25th, and set up a mass picket line in protest against the new WPA regulations. The pickets carried placards reading, "Aid Unemployed Musicians, Not Services to the WPA," "Union Symphony Scale \$90. WPA Scale \$23.70. Why Increase Services from Six to Nine?" "WPA, Should Aid, Not Break Union Standards."

The line of pickets was so long that it completely encircled the block between Eighth and Ninth avenues, 15th and 16th streets, occupied by the building.

Members of the delegation who presented the protest of the Local were Edward Canavan, President of Local 802; David Freed, Secretary of the Relief Committee; William Alex Conaway and Robert Sieme, members of the Executive Board, and M. Friedman, Secretary of the WPA Musicians' Committee.

Dr. Sokoloff refused to promise any change in the new WPA regulations, but expressed a willingness to permit conductors to occasionally excuse men a half hour earlier from rehearsals if they behaved themselves and performed well. The committee was not overwhelmed by Dr. Sokoloff's generosity, however, and the Executive Committee will refer its recommendations to the membership regarding further action to be taken against the new policies.

These policies include not only an increase in services, but also broadcasting of WPA concerts over commercial stations and the charging of admissions.

In making this parade to give expression to their justifiable indignation, we trust the New York musicians were not arrested and fined for violating the provisions of that new anti-noise ordinance recently imposed upon Gothamites and which has been so widely featured in the daily press. We hope, furthermore, that the powerful Local No. 802 will be able to galvanize enough fresh idealism into a newness of life which will bring more tangible and satisfying results than have been thus far seen.

This is the year you were going to

buy your Christmas presents early, but didn't.

The Lockport, N. Y., Local No. 97 Bulletin calls the attention of its members to the fact that the federal government has appropriated \$17,000,000 for unemployed musicians and points out that Lockport is entitled to a share of this money "if we can show we have musicians who are eligible to relief." Undoubtedly that expression of sentiment reflects the standpoint of very many locals. Bridging the gap between intention and fulfillment is an undertaking often marked by much of procrastination. This is notoriously true of government—no matter what partisan group dominates the administration at Washington. It is becoming plainer every day that the federal authorities bit off a large chunk when they started out to invade all the ramifications of employment and industry and to finance jobs. These may be spasmodic illustrations of a fairly successful working of the plan, but to our mind there is too much of artificiality about it all to impart any degree of permanence to the project or to insure anything more than an ephemeral amount of success. The inexorable laws of supply and demand have farther and deeper soundings than are reflected in these hurried and hesitant proposals which are one week encouraging and the next disappointing to those immediately concerned.

Every individual belonging to a union certainly knows the significance of the union label. Do all unionists adhere to the lesson it would teach? We are afraid not. The subject is frequently exploited in prose, but N. B. Maxwell has invoked the poetic muse in the San Francisco Musical News as follows:

You're a Union man, I take it,
For you pay your Union dues,
But, my friends, is there a Label
Of a Union in your shoes?

Do you see the Union Label
On tobacco that you buy?
Or upon your daily paper?
You can get one if you try.

Is a Label in the pocket
Of the suit upon your back?
A Label on your collar—
Or a chinese spider track?

Do you find the Union Label
In the sweatband of your hat?
Look and see if you can find it—
Did you ever think of that?

How about the Union Label

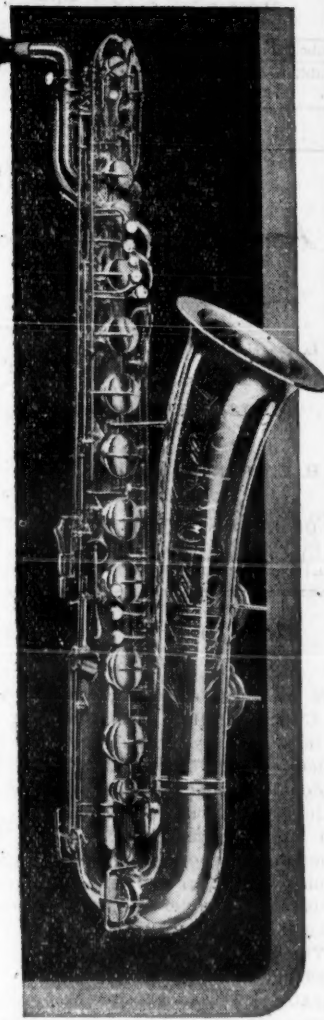
The Canadian quints are heading for the stage. The toe dancing they are doing just now will doubtless augment their qualifications.

The Cherry Tree

Where with our Little Hatchet we tell the truth about many things, sometimes profoundly, sometimes flippantly, sometimes recklessly

So many things go to the making up of this sad and merry world that a chronicle of a week's doings sounds like nothing so much as an exhibit of the contrariness of all things, including mankind. There are contradictions in nature and in most of the things we humans do.

Thus, there are several things to discuss this week—things that bear no relation to each other whatever.

League of Nations members start their boycott of Italy.

One press association says there are 52 nations in the boycott. Another says there are 51. This column hasn't counted them.

Mr. Mussolini is being punished—plenty rightly—for defying all decency.

But meanwhile Japan walks over into China and coolly detaches five provinces with a population of some 55 million people and there has been thus far no talk of a boycott for that gorgeous piece of down-right aggression.

Sir Samuel Hoare, speaking for Britain, has said that those who suggest his country acted in the Italian case out of self-interest were all wet. He hasn't said much yet about Japan which, having taken Manchuria to make a Japanese Manchukuo, takes another territorial gobble to serve the same purpose for which Mussolini says he must have Ethiopia.

Anyone can take a look at that set of circumstances and see what it resembles.

Incidentally, the device called sanctions is the newest and probably the most potent thing in the world today—unless some nation takes a run-out. It's a trick learned from labor—strike and boycott.

Again comes the President's Birthday Ball. It is a great joining of effort to beat infantile paralysis.

This is the third, piling up the sinews of war against one of humanity's worst enemies. As a result America probably will be the first nation to find the answer to the challenge of infantile paralysis.

Labor has played and will again play a proud part in this great humanitarian effort. It is one thing in which men of all creeds, faiths, races, political parties and occupations can join.

Death has just struck where it was least expected and men and women throughout organized labor are saddened.

The wife of Dr. Isador Lubin, chief of the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, is no longer at the side of the man whom labor men have learned to admire and respect to an unusual degree.

Between these two there was, after many years, a continuing devotion, an unflagging romance, a tenderness of af-

fection that was evident when either spoke of the other.

Inexpressible sympathy goes to Isador Lubin, man of courage and of deep understanding.

Man of vision is E. V. Sewell of Miami, member of the City Commission. He proposes a permanent Pan-American Exposition in Miami, where South American will meet North American and exchange goods and ideas. He is trying to interest Washington. Maybe he will win, maybe not. But anyway he has his vision and it finds friendship among labor men who often know more about commerce and about international friendship than the politicians dream of.
