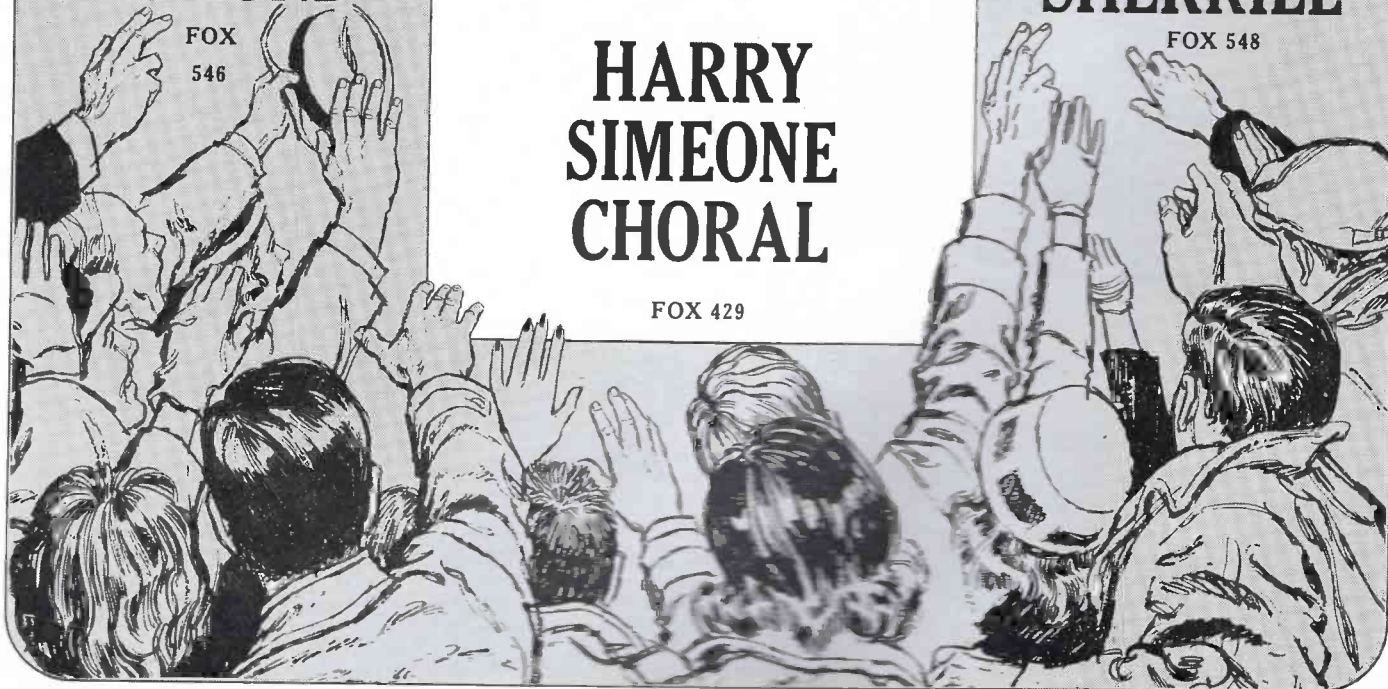

Rush, Rush, Rush

Capitol Records recorded "Ben Franklin In Paris" on Sunday November 1. By Tuesday evening (3), copies of the LP were in the hands of reviewers, and by Wednesday copies were being shipped out to Capitol distrib branches in the New York area. Such speed may have established a new record for the label. "Franklin" received mixed reviews but Capitol is banking on the Preston name to sell albums. And they could be right.

Bonanza of Stars

Big plans are shaping up for the pop-rock one-nighter scene next spring and summer at the William Morris Office. Music Division director, Jerry Brandt, announced last week the first of a projected series of packages would hit the road next April 16 for an 87-day cross-country run. It'll be tagged "Bonanza of Stars," and will feature between 12 and 18 acts.

Brandt confirmed that the package is being sent out in direct competition with Dick Clark's "Caravan of Stars," which starts its equally long tour at about the same time. Clark's packages were formerly handled through the Morris Office and former music division head, Rosalind Ross. Earlier this year, Miss Ross left Morris to go into partnership with Clark on the West Coast and Brandt replaced her at the Morris Agency.

Gene Pitney is expected to be one of the leading acts on the "Bonanza" tour along with at least two as yet undisclosed British acts. There was some speculation that these might be the Animals and the Searchers but there was no confirmation of this. Another

facet of the tour is a promotional tie-up with a national product advertiser.

Brandt also disclosed plans for a summer tour to be tagged "Bonanza of British Stars," to feature at least eight British attractions.

The Most For Most

It's not only the British acts who are doing well these days but also the British record producers. A case in point is 26 year old Mickey Most, who produced the hits by the Animals, the Nashville Teens and Herman's Hermits, and recently cut Brenda Lee in England ("Is It True").

He just signed two lucrative producing deals, one with CBS Records, to produce record to be issued in the U.S. and Canada (on the Epic label) and one with EMI for records to be issued in the United Kingdom.

His CBS contract is for \$250,000 over three years, and his EMI deal is for the largest amount ever guaranteed by a British company. Neither of the arrangements covers records made by him with the Animals, the Nashville Teens or Herman's Hermits, since these were previously set with other local British labels. Most will continue to record these acts outside the CBS or EMI contracts.

Churchill's Speeches

A collection of Sir Winston Churchill's private recordings definitive speeches, and historic addresses in the House Of Commons made in secret sessions is being made available on record by London. A press luncheon marking the release of the 12 LP set will be held on Thursday, November 12, at New York's Overseas Press Club. A 60 page book on Churchill is included with the records. The set will retail at \$100, and will be issued on Sir Winston's 90th birthday, November 30.

Erroll Garner Tour

Erroll Garner has started a month of concert and TV dates in Europe after a highly successful tour of Great Britain. November 7 (Saturday) Garner recorded a live concert in Amsterdam, which was recorded by Garner's Octave label and will be issued on Philips Records abroad. (U. S. label has not yet been set.) Garner will cover Copenhagen, Stockholm, Helsinki, Malmo, Basel, Geneva, and Lausanne. Dates in Spain, France, Italy and Belgium are pending for early December.

On January 22 Garner starts his annual U. S.-Canada tour with an engagement in Toronto. After that there is a good chance he will tour Australia.

Peter & Gordon Back

Peter and Gordon will return to the U.S. for another tour starting November 15, when they will appear on the Ed Sullivan TV show. The boys landed in the States on Sunday (8) after a flight from London, and are spending this week in New York giving press interviews and doing record promotion. About 10 dates have been set so far for their four week tour.

Judy & Liza "Live"

Judy Garland and Liza Minnelli are giving two concerts at the London Palladium instead of one. The first, which took place Sunday, November 8, created such a demand for tickets that the promoters scheduled a second concert for Mid-night Monday, November 9. The mother daughter duo has also okayed taping a special to be presented on BBC-TV this fall. It is hoped by Garland-Minnelli fans that EMI will tape the concerts and obtain the tapes of the BBC-TV show for records.

The U.S. group scene: part 1—male

American groups have found they can co-exist with the British as long as they have a sound of their own

Yanks hot too. The overwhelming success of the British vocal groups during the year 1964, has tended to obscure the fact that a number of American male vocal groups also had great success during the same year. Two of these groups, the Four Seasons and the Beach Boys, both had million selling records during the year of the British invasion.

Another indication that the American vocal group sound can and does co-exist along with the sound of the groups from Liverpool, Birmingham and London, is the half-dozen or so new U.S. male groups who have recently come up with hits their first time out on records. They include the Hondells, Ronny and The Day-

tonas, the Newbeats, the Chartbusters, and the Four Tops.

Stand nine feet tall. The four American groups who stand about nine feet tall and look down at a veritable sea of one and two shot male groups are the aforementioned Beach Boys and Four Seasons, and Jan and Dean and the Drifters.

The success of these groups is unquestioned. The Beach Boys so far this year have been hot on Capitol with "Fun, Fun, Fun," "I Get Around," (their million seller) "When I Grow Up To Be A Man," "Wendy" and "Dance, Dance, Dance." They were pretty hot the year before as well. The Four Seasons have had one of the greatest years in their four year history, with smashes on both Philips and

VeeJay with "Dawn," "Stay," "Ronnie," "Rag Doll" (their million seller) "Save It For Me" and their current "Big Man In Town."

Jan and Dean blazing. The year 1964 has been a big, big one for Jan and Dean on Liberty. The duo, in and outers until this year, have rattled off a solid string of clicks, including "Dead Man's Curve," "New Girl In School," "Little Old Lady from Pasadena," "Anaheim, Azusa, and Cucamonga Sewing Circle, Book Review and Timing Association," and the current clicks, "Ride The Wild Surf," and "Sidewalk Surfing. As for the Drifters, they have had a good, good year, with their big selling "Under The Boardwalk," (about

900,000), on Atlantic and their present smash "I've Got Sand In My Shoes."

Sound is the key. The key to the success of these groups is their sound. In each of these four cases the groups have a sound that instantly identifies them. They are as distinct and as different from the British group sound as Liverpool is from Los Angeles. Two of these groups, the Beach Boys and Jan and Dean, have become identified with the West Coast sound, a sound that instantly brings to mind hot rods and surf boards. In the case of both the Beach Boys and Jan and Dean there is a strong harmony flavor in vocalizing and a distinct instrumental sound, with focus on guitars and drums.

The Seasons, on the other hand, have a distinct quality all of their own, that has no relation to the West Coast style. It highlights a stomping, almost martial beat, and a high falsetto lead voice that weaves its way in and out of the group's harmonies.

Drifters' r. & b. roots. The Drifters feature another style that is also distinctive, one with strong r. & b. links, characterized by an emotional, overpowering type of lead performance, and almost always featuring a particularly powerful piece of song material. The Drifters have had three different lead singers over the past decade and in spite of the changes they always manage to come up with hits.

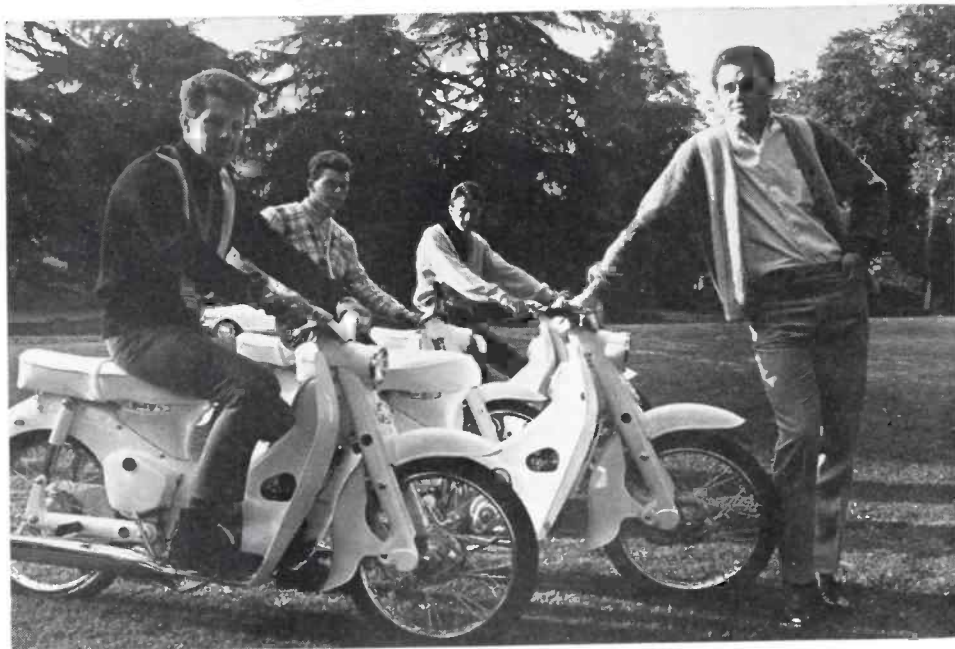
Three of America's currently hot vocal groups, Jay and The Americans, Little Anthony and the Imperials, and the Everly Bros., are enjoying revivals after a dry spell. Jay and the Americans first broke into the hit ranks with "She Cried" about two years ago, and had another biggie with "Only In America" last year. Now, after a slow period, they have come back with a big hit in "Come A Little Bit Closer." This hit dates from their association with the new, but swinging, Kama Sutra record production firm, which produces their discs for United Artists Records.

Happening again. Little Anthony and the Imperials were constant chart-makers a few years ago and then seemed to disappear from the hit ranks. Recently they started to happen again with a record called "I'm On the Outside Looking In," which radio station WINS in New York helped break open by exposing it at neighborhood street dance parties. Their

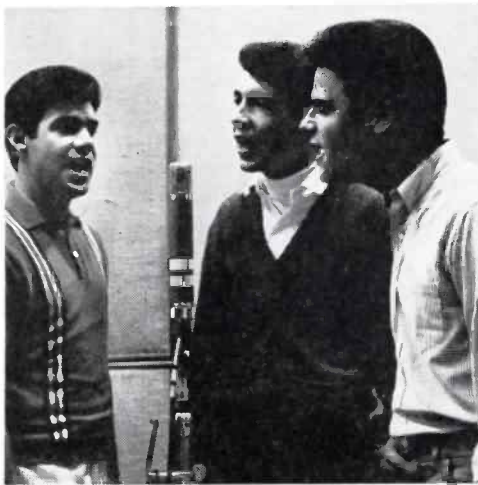

current smash is "Going Out of My Head." Both of these groups have a sound that is all their own, a sound which has undoubtedly—when tied in with a good commercial song—help bring them back. The Everly Brothers, after a very weak period, have a sizeable hit with "Gone, Gone, Gone," on Warner Brothers.

Worthy of note in the current American hit pop scene are the Temptations and the Miracles both with the Talma-Motown label and both featuring that label's Detroit sound, a sound that is different and groovy. Two other groups that have been consistently up there are the Tams and the Impressions, both of whom happen to be on ABC-Paramount, and both of whom have a down home r. & b. oriented sound.

New and hot. Two new, and perhaps as yet untried entries in the American male vocal group picture are The Hondells and Ronny and the Daytonas. Both have had big hits: "Little Honda" for the Hondells on Mercury, "G.T.O." by Ronny and the Daytonas on Mala.

The Hondells got their hit by jumping on the Beach Boys album side "Little Honda," which was penned by the Beach Boys own leader Brian Wilson. They and Ronny and the Daytonas could be called West Coast sound groups, pointing up their own individual styles meshed with a distinctive sound.

Other newcomers. Other new male American groups with one hit apiece under their belts are The Chartbusters on Mutual, the Newbeats on Hickory, and the Four Tops on Motown, Don Covay and the Goodtimers on Rosemart finally have a big hit with "Mercy, Mercy." Their hits are all solid and they all have an individual sound and style. If they can retain that individuality on future records they too can stay in the hit ranks for a long time to come.

There is no gainsaying that fact that the British male vocal groups continue to play a very important role in the American record picture and will probably do so all during 1965. However, there is no doubt that a number of our own American male groups are stronger now than they were before the Britons took America, and many new Yank vocal combos are making a real dent in the group scene.

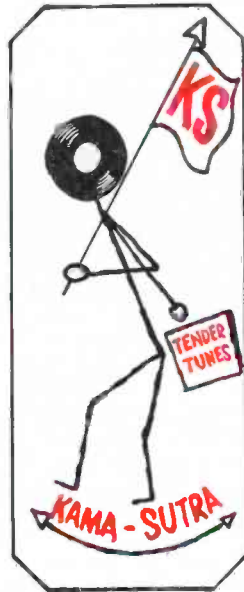

"Your Cheatin' Heart"

The story of the great Hank Williams

Died at 29. Hank Williams died eleven years ago, on December 31, 1953. He was then just 29 years old. In his brief life span he composed over 200 songs, many of which became all-time hits ("Your Cheatin' Heart," "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry," "Cold, Cold Heart," "Hey Good Lookin'," "Ramblin' Man," and many many more) and he himself became a top singing and recording star, both as Hank Williams and Luke the Drifter. His tragically short, trouble-filled life had enough triumphs and tragedy for many a novel or a movie.

Now, eleven years after his death, Hollywood, in the person of Sam Katzman and MGM Pictures, has turned out a film about Hank Williams, called "Your Cheatin' Heart." It stars George Hamilton as Hank, and Susan Oliver as Audrey Williams, Red Buttons, Arthur O'Connell, Chris Crosby (Bob's son), Shary Marshall and Rex Ingrahm. Sam Katzman is the producer and Gene Nelson the director of the MGM picture.

Eleven songs. Eleven of Hank Williams' songs are contained in the movie. They are all sung by Hank Williams, Jr., who is now a vocal and recording star in his own right, and who records for the

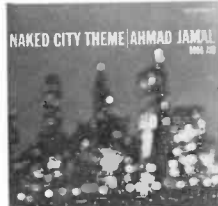

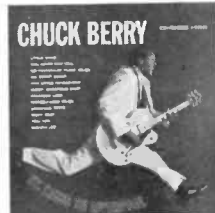

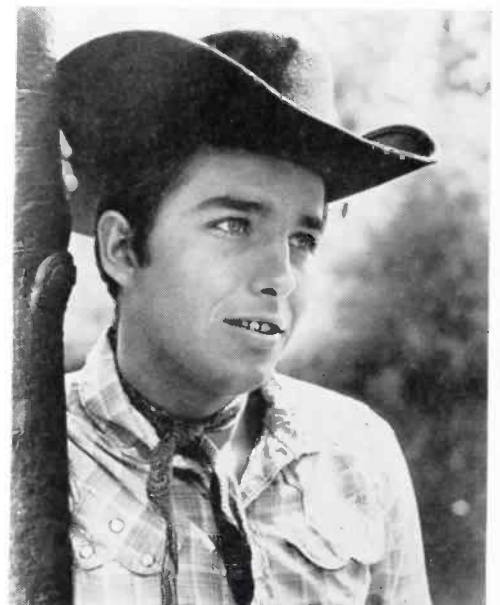

The Newbeats



A shrill, high-pitched screaming falsetto is the trademark which first established the Newbeats on disc. Their first record on Hickory, the unusual sounding "Bread and Butter" became an absolute smash just a few weeks ago, and was quickly followed up with their present winner "Everything's Alright," which has broken out all over the country.

The Newbeats are a male trio comprising brothers Mark (22) and Dean (25), (who, for some strange reason, as yet haven't revealed their second name). The threesome is completed by Larry Henley, a 23 year old blond Texan.

Born in Georgia

Georgia-born Mark and Dean were taught to play guitar by their mother while still young, and later they graduated to mastering most other musical instruments. They played in their high school band, and on completion of their education decided to take up singing as a career.

The brothers landed a contract with Chess, and had a musical break when they recorded "Tell Him No," which became a national hit. This resulted in the usual

swing across the country on one nighters with Alan Freed, and a series of television and promotion dates.

On their release from Chess, Dean and Mark signed with Hickory as a twosome, but made no records for the label until they teamed up with Larry Henley. The latter first met Dean and Mark in Shreveport, Louisiana. The two boys were making a personal appearance with their combo, when Larry stepped out of the audience and joined them in a number. This was his first attempt at singing, although he comes from a musical background.

Joined the Group

The event led to Larry joining the group on a resident basis. He also became great friends with the brothers, but despite his association with them, originally recorded for Hickory as a single performer.

The boys all had individual contracts with Hickory, but it took a demo tape they made as a combo for Wesley Rose, Hickory Records chief, to decide to record them as a trio and call them The Newbeats. The song they recorded was their hit "Bread and Butter." JUNE HARRIS

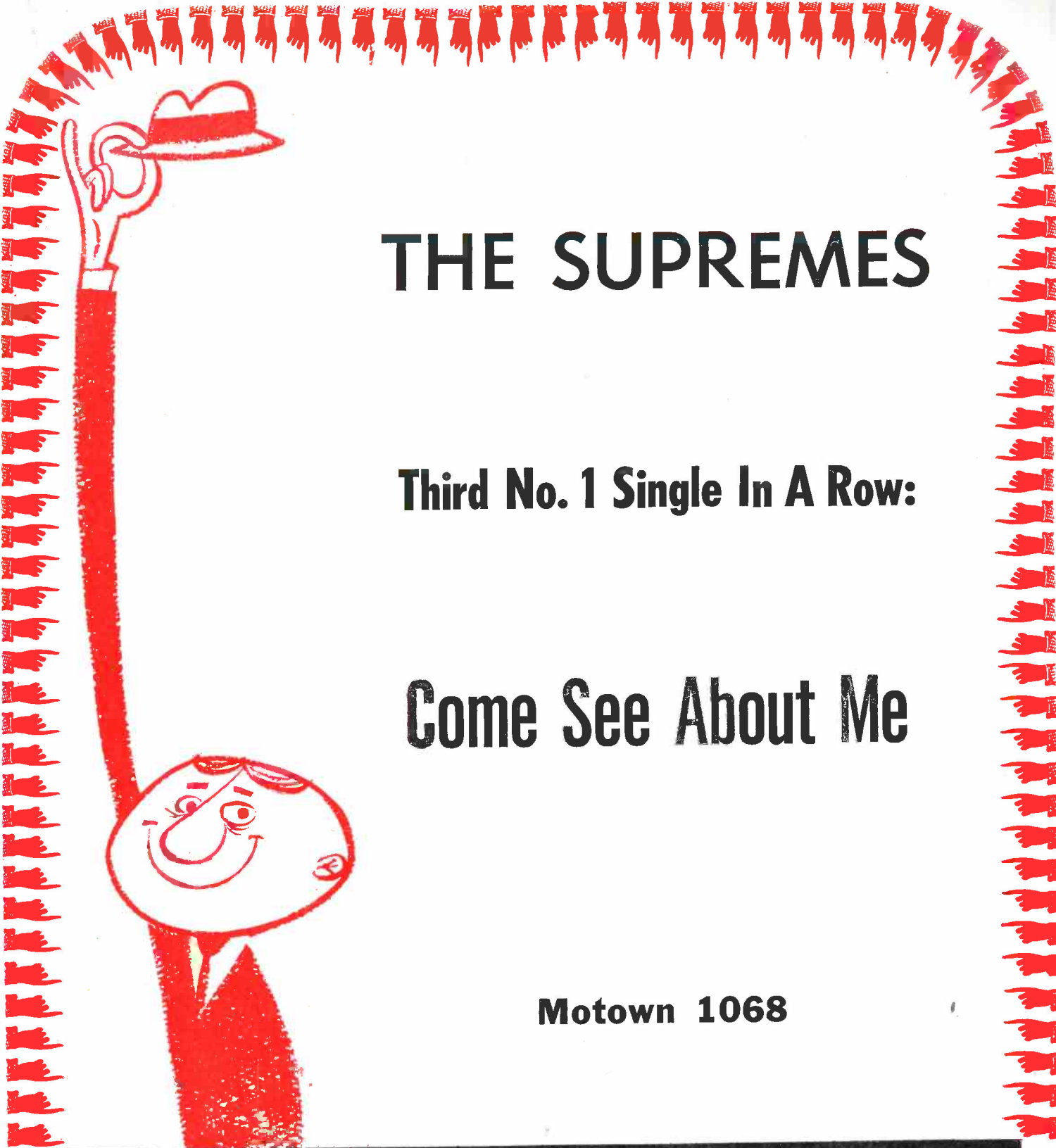

We Get Letters

(The following letter is printed in its entirety from the October 30 issue of *The Tempo* Newsletter.)

Dear June,

First let me thank you for the many kind things you wrote about us and our business interests in the most recent issue of *Music Business*.

The headline, "Tom Donahue and Bob Mitchell—The Empire Builders" shook me up a little at first, I must admit. We have never exactly envisioned it as an "Empire". Actually it's more of a project to try to keep us off the streets. To tell the truth, we really haven't seen very much of the money from the various projects. This newsletter for instance, is a money loser but has been excellent therapy—I for instance haven't been bothered by my ulcer since I started writing editorials, and Bob hasn't used any dirty lines on the air 'cause he gets it out of his sys-

tem writing them for the sheet.

The article will also come in very handy for showing to our wives, who can't understand why we never come home. It won't make them any more understanding but at least they'll have the pictures.

There's quite a chunk of money still due us from our distributors though we haven't gotten pushy about it yet. I expect all that will work out, though we are not the type to go around the country suing everybody—we'll just make up a list and have them all killed.

One of the things we have learned about high finance, corporations, etc., is that most of the money seems to go to Lawyers and Accountants, and if there is any left over either Carole or Carl buys a new office machine. Do you know that *Tempo* is folded and stuffed into an envelope by a machine they bought? It's

about six feet long and very shiny and must be the only one in the world because at those prices they can't have built too many.

About the horses, June—we actually have nine of them right now. We finally sold Willing Toubo for \$500 but what the hell, he only cost us the original \$2000 and the small fortune we lost betting on him as he ran out of the money 10 consecutive times. We still have Young Man in the stable. He ran Saturday and then laid down in his stall and didn't get up till Tuesday. I don't know why in hell he was so tired seeing that he ran dead last, 30 lengths back of the winner and 15 lengths in back of the horse in front of him. About Fairest Of All, June—she has won \$27,000 but \$26,000 of it was won before we got her. She has blown both knees and an ankle and has been retired to an acre of grass (at \$100 per month board). We will breed her to New Policy in January and do a lot of praying.

I'm looking forward to sending a copy of the article to my Mother and Father. When I visited them this summer, I spent two days trying to ex-

plain what we were doing—even playing some of the records for them. On the third day, my Father took me aside and asked me when I was going to find a job. Mother was more understanding, pointing out that she and Dad would just like to see me "get into something serious".

Mitch is afraid that our respective In-laws will see the article and move out here, but I guess that's the chance you have to take if you're going to be an Empire Builder.

We're already getting a lot of mail on the article—most of it from creditors who didn't know where we'd moved and people who would like to borrow money. There was also an envelope that contained nothing but a picture of some triplets about five-years old that scared the hell out of both of us.

Bob and I have been on the air about 16 years apiece on both coasts and have, as you know, met a lot of Disc Jockeys we count as our friends. Do you know what's going to happen when they read that article? June, do you know what you have done to us? June—I think in one issue

And They Spell Mother . . .

Jazz really had its ups and downs a couple of weeks ago.

The Republicans almost made it a dirty word . . . again.

And a Brooklyn pastor brought it back into one of its sources: the House of God.

First, the Republicans. They patched a whole lot of illegal, immoral, and fattening things together on a film reel and made such a case for moral decay in our time that their Presidential candidate was disgusted with the whole thing and threw the film out.

To show how literature was going to the dogs, they flashed a dirty book cover on the screen. Or what passed for a dirty book cover. Or what was supposed to be a dirty book cover. You know. Anyway, the title of the book was "Jazz Me Baby."

A whole bunch of hard-working guys like Pee Wee Russell and Miles Davis and Bobby Brookmeyer and Kenny Burrell and Stan Kenton and Louis Armstrong and like that would have got a black eye on account of a verb out of the 1920s.

Over In Brooklyn

But in Brooklyn, Rev. William Bell Glensk had for Sunday service a "Liturgy of Jazz" in Spencer Memorial Church, Presbyterian. Music was supplied by the Southampton Dixie, Racing and Clambake Society Jazz Band. The band played songs and hymns, such as "Just a Closer Walk With Thee," "Oh Didn't He Ramble," and "Lonesome Road," among others, to highlight areas of the service.

Rev. Glensk, who has had such services, in the church before, has also appeared on ABC-TV with the band with a similar offering.

Rev. Glensk drew his sermon from a quotation by the late Charlie Parker: "Music is your own experi-

ence, your thoughts, your wisdom. If you don't live it, it won't come out of your horn." The Reverend spoke on "The Joy of Jazz," and noted that "The joy of jazz and the joy of God are the same; that which takes us out of ourselves and helps us to find God."

Dirty word, indeed!

Recent Jazz Releases

Here are a couple of records that ought to interest you:

NEW FANTASY, Lalo Schifrin (Verve) — An uninhibited set of both familiar and new music played by a large brass ensemble with fire and polish. Schifrin occasionally loses his head, but never his mind. High points are "Bachianas Brasilieras" and "El Salon Mexico." Very imaginative writing by Schifrin, and great sound by Verve. The title tune should flip the folks over at Metromedia and WNEW. It's the station's ID theme, and it roars!

SO DANCO SAMBA, Clare Fischer (World Pacific) — Fischer at piano and organ with rhythm in a program of works by Antonio Carlos Jobim, with a couple of his own originals thrown in. Mostly clean and simple, which is as it should be with Jobim's music. But, unfortunately, it pales beside Jobim's Verve set of much of the same material.

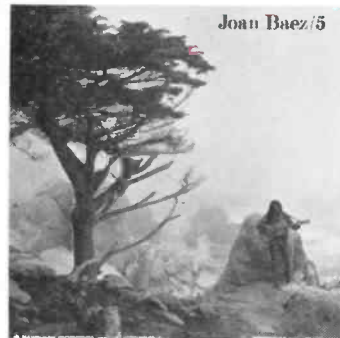

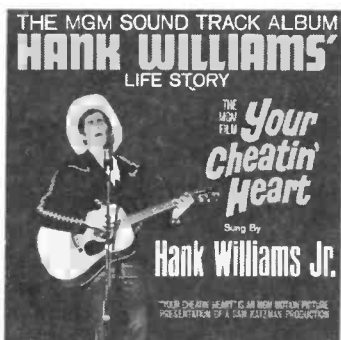

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IN THE TRADE

Camden Is Booming

With the heaviest recording period of the year yet to come, RCA Camden pointed proudly last week to some impressive statistics: it has already equalled the total sales figure for 1963 (the biggest year since its inception twelve years ago), running 31% ahead of the same sales period last year. Present product planning indicates that 1965 will be an even bigger year for this budget division of RCA Victor.

A major contributing factor to Camden's growth is attributed to an increase in stereo sales over monaural. "The customer has slowly come to learn that most of Camden's releases today are newly recorded product, recorded in stereo, not reprocessed," said Ray Clark, manager of product planning for the label. Another sales booster has been the "living" series (Living Strings, Living Voices) which has been successful not only at the retail level, but in air play.

With the assistance of Ethel Gabriel, sole a. and r. producer for Camden, and ad and promotion manager James Ringo, Clark manages some forty album releases per year. When Victor re-vitalized the Victrola line eighteen months ago, Camden discontinued the release of classics. It has, however, expanded in other areas which have accounted for its present sales boon. The label has signed two new artists; singer Malcolm Dodd and Bob Ralston (organist on the Lawrence Welk TV show). It has also resurrected Victor's Blue Bird childrens' series, adding new product to catalog items by Dr. Seuss and Shari Lewis.

It is interesting, though, that with a versatile catalog of 227 LP's, Camden's strongest line in sales is its country and sacred music section, with such big names as Eddie Arnold, Hank Snow, Jim Reeves, Hawkshaw Hawkins, the Carter Family, The Blackwood Brothers and George Beverly Shea. A Jim Reeves track "I Won't Forget You," originally recorded for a Camden LP, has just been released as a single on Victor due to consumer demand.

Camden's latest promotional step was taken in October with three album service plans for radio stations, which operates

on a similar pattern with Victor's popular album services. The service will be handled through normal distribution channels.

Newton On Move

By the end of last week the word was out. Larry Newton would take over as President of ABC Paramount Records when the label's current chief, Sam Clark, moved up to the post of Chairman of the Board of the record label. For the genial, loquacious Newton it would mark the apex of a dazzling career that in the past decade has seen him move from the head of his own indie label, Derby, to the head of one of the top ten labels in the U.S.

Newton's career has encompassed all areas of the record business, from the wholesale end to the creative. He has worked for distributors, sold to retail stores, master-minded his own label as sales, merchandising and recording chief, and has shared in the growth of ABC Paramount Records from a small label in the 1950's to a young giant today.

During the last five or six years, many firms have tried to lure Newton away from ABC-Paramount, three movie firm subsidiaries specifically. But Newton wouldn't budge, and his upcoming promotion indicates he knew whereof his future lay. Just when the move of Clark upstairs and Newton to the presidency will happen no one was yet prepared to say—but the word was soon.

Sam Clark gets the credit for building ABC-Paramount to its current stature. Newton's job will be to carry on Clark's work, and no one doubts Larry's ability to do it.

ITA To GAC

International Talent Associates has been taken over by the General Artists Corporation. ITA was originally founded four years ago by ex-Associated Booking Corp. executives Bert Bloch and Larry Bennett, who now become GAC vice presidents. Talent involved includes Peter, Paul and Mary, the Brothers Four, Woody Allen and Peter Nero, among others. ITA will operate out of its present quarters for the time being with focus on folk, rock, classical and other attractions.

Decca's Nov. Release

Decca and Coral Records are tying in a flock of new releases to their current big-scale ad campaign for the month of November. The two labels are issuing a total of 14 new albums, and are including 47 best-selling, and heavily advertised catalog items under the terms of a fall-winter incentive program.

Decca's new releases include sets by Rick Nelson, Lloyd Thaxton, Sammy Kaye, Bill Anderson, Lenny Dee, and Ella Fitzgerald. Coral's new LP's include sets by Pete Fountain and Big Tiny Little.

Jazz at the Fair

The World's Fair of Jazz, a four-day Jazz Festival, will be staged over the weekend of next July 4th at the New York World's Fair. Promoter of the event is Sid Bernstein, more recently identified with the staging of New York rock shows featuring the Rolling Stones and the Dave Clark Five.

Bernstein said he has already signed his first act for the affair, the Swingle Singers. Beyond this, Bernstein added, he hopes to work with Newport Jazz Festival promoter, George Wein, in effecting a carefully planned schedule so that the top jazz artists will be able to make appearances at both festivals during the same weekend.

Albert Recovering

George Albert, vice president of Cash Box, is recovering from injuries suffered in an auto accident last month. The Cash Box Executive was hospitalized for 10 days and then returned home. He is expected to return to his duties at the magazine either late this week or early next week.

Carlton Label Ends

Joe Carlton's Carlton label came to the end of the road last week when a bankruptcy petition was filed in New York Federal Court. Petition listed \$121,130 in liabilities and \$29,052 in assets. Carlton started his label about six years ago, after he exited RCA Victor where he had been pop recording chief.

Levy Buys Branston

Branston Music Inc., British-based firm which handles a number of the tunes written by Dave Clark by himself and with other authors, has been acquired in a stock purchase deal by Big Seven Music Inc. Big Seven is the overall firm which includes all of the publishing interests of Roulette Records.

Deal was made by Big Seven president, Morris Levy, and Harold Davison, British promoter and booker and manager of the Dave Clark Five. Big Seven will have worldwide control of the copyrights with the exception of the United Kingdom and Eire. Among the tunes included are the current Dave Clark release, "Any Way You Want It."

Weiser's New Duties

Norm Weiser, manager of Four Corners Records, the Kapp subsidiary, is adding to his managerial duties by taking over the Congress label, another Kapp firm. Weiser succeeds Neil Galligan as manager of Congress. With Weiser in charge of both labels, they will work more closely together and in close association with the parent firm. They will retain their separate identities and separate distributor setups. Moe Preskell will be marketing director for both labels and Dennis Ganim will handle promotion and sales for Four Corners and Congress.

Hot Film Scores

United Artists Music is having its most active period in some time due to the scores of the flicks "Topkapi" and "Goldfinger." There are already about a dozen recordings of the "Goldfinger" theme in the works, both instrumental and vocal discings. "Topkapi" themes have been recorded by at least six labels plus the film soundtrack. United Artists has assigned lyricist Noel Sherman to supply words for the song, in the hopes of getting a vocal hit with the tune. It was penned by Manos Hadjidakis, who had the big hit "Never On Sunday."

NARM Meets

The first NARM board meeting since the mid-year meetings in July, was held Saturday and Sunday (7 and 8) in Las Vegas, which is also the site selected for the annual NARM national convention next March.

Executive director, Jules Malamud, said a key topic was to be the formulation of an educational program directed at compliance with the new FTC trade practice rules for the industry. During the meeting, the board planned to look over the Dunes Hotel's new self-contained high-rise building which will house the membership during the convention. Forums and business meetings for the confab were also to be blueprinted.

Arthur Klein Dies

Arthur Klein, theater manager and producer of musical revues for the past half-century, died Sunday (1) in New York. He was 79.

In the great era of vaudeville up to World War I, and in the 1920's, he was the manager of stars like Will Rogers, Al Jolson, Phil Baker, Douglas Fairbanks, Sr., and Eva Tanguay. Klein had much to do with Al Jolson's career. As a booking manager for the Percy Williams circuit he saw Jolson with Lew Dockstader's Minstrels. He convinced Jolson to go out as a single and started him on his way to fame.

Klein was chief booking agent for the B. F. Keith vaudeville circuit from 1915 to 1922. He left to start a rival circuit for the Brothers Shubert, but the Shubert circuit folded a few years after. Klein produced the revues "Tidbits of 1946," "Tickets Please," and "Anna Russell's Little Show," in 1953. He leaves a son, William Kendall, a daughter Eleanor Kelly, and two grandchildren.

Warner Bros. Release

A new Allan Sherman album kicks off the Warner Bros. LP releases for November. It is called "For Swingin' Livers Only!" Other sets feature the Italian teen singer Piccola Pupa, the sound track to the film "Sex and the Single Girl" a new set by Jim Coyle and Mal Sharpe, and a Joanie Sommers-Laurindo Almeida bossa nova LP.
