We were also the first, when we introduced the Gold Leaf Awards, which allowed companies to certify their outstanding record sellers with uniform figures, thereby eliminating the need for awards based on any figure the companies thought was an outstanding seller.

RPM was the first in designing and making available, to the industry, the MAPL system for identifying Canadian content.

We published the first Canadian Music Industry Directory in 1965.

We were the first to coin the expression Cancon, now internationally accepted as identifying Canadian content product.

Several years ago, RPM was the first to instigate a series of Communication meetings which gave the industry an opportunity to look at itself. The industry found both negatives and positives, some solutions but, above all, a common cause. We were the first to report that fact.

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#### CANADIAN MUSIC RULING .....

#### Excerpt

#### Radio (AM) Broadcasting Regulations - June 24th, 1970

12(1) At least 30% of the musical compositions broadcast by a station or network operator between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 12 midnight shall be by a Canadian and shall be scheduled in a reasonable manner throughout such period.

(2) From January 18, 1971 to January 17, 1972, a musical composition shall be deemed to be by a Canadian if it fullfils at least one of the conditions set out in subsection (5).

(3) After January 18, 1972, a musical composition shall be deemed to be by a Canadian if it fullfils at least two of the conditions set out in subsection (5).

(4) After January 18, 1973, at least 5 percent of the musical compositions broadcast by a station or network operator between 6:00 a.m. and 12 midnight shall fullfil the conditions set out in either (b) or (c) of subsection (5).

(5) The following are the conditons referred to in subsection (2), (3) and (4):

(a) the instrumentation or lyrics were principally performed by a Canadian;

(b) the music was composed by a Canadian:

(c) the lyrics were written by a Canadian; and

(d) the live performance was wholly recorded in Canada.

(6) A mechanical reproduction of a musical composition that is deemed at any time to be by a Canadian continues to be so deemed thereafter.

(7) If a station operator is able to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Commission that the application of this section would result in a significant reduction in the quality and diversity of program service within the area normally served by his station, the Commission may vary the application of this section.

(8) For the purpose of this section, a person shall be deemed to be a Canadian if:

(a) he is a Canadian citizen;


(b) he is a landed immigrant as defined in the Immigration Act; or

(c) his ordinary place of residence was in Canada during the six months, immediately preceding his contribution to the musical composition in question.

#### THE RPM MAPL LOGO

With the advent of the 30% Canadian content ruling through the efforts of the Canadian Radio-Television Commission (CRTC), RPM commissioned Stan Klees, of Stan Klees Ltd., to design a symbol that would easily identify records having Canadian content. This logo was to be used exclusively in RPM Weekly.

#### KEY TO THE USE OF RPM'S MAPL LOGOS



Blacked-in areas indicate:

M - Music composed by a Canadian;

A - Artist featured is a Canadian; P - Production was wholly recorded

in Canada; and

L - Lyrics were written by a Canadian.

The RPM MAPL logo was so successful that many record companies requested permission to use the logo on record labels. Their organization, The Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA), requested and received blanket permission for use of the logo on all members' labels. Programmers also found the logo invaluable for cataloguing Canadian singles and albums.

We respectfully request that the MAPL logo can only be used in conjunction with a record title at all

It is our desire to promote Canadian artists and Canadian music to Canadians - throughout the world.

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
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
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
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
J. DAVID EVANS - Vice-Chairman and Chief Operating Officer, Capitol Records-EMI of Canada joined Capitol in 1969 as Ontario Sales Manager. The appointment of Mr. Evans, from outside the industry, was a bold new step to offering a completely different outlook on sales and marketing to the industry from without. So successful was the move that other areas, again from outside the industry, were tapped and a streamlining of marketing and sales for Capitol was evidenced. Mr. Evans was promoted in 1970 to the position of National Sales Manager and the following year to the post of Director of Sales and Promotion. The year 1972 saw Mr. Evans elevated to the executive position of Director of Marketing and in 1976 he was named Vice-president, Marketing, and finally as Vice-Chairman and Chief Operating Officer in 1977. Capitol's strength in sales and marketing has been a major factor in the overall growth of the company which can be credited to Mr. Evans' expertise in these fields. The heart of the record company is the marketing division where success can be measured by the monthly ability to construct and reach high sales goals and quotas.



BERNIE FINKELSTEIN - President True North Records and the Finkelstein Fiedler management firm, has proven himself to be Canada's most respected personal manager. He took top honours in this category, two years running in the RPM Music Industry Awards – a reader's poll. Mr. Finkelstein will shortly expand his activities with a base of operations in Los Angeles to better look after the growing demand for his growing stable of Canadian recording artists on the international market. Mr. Finkelstein was one of Canada's original managers. back in the early sixties, discovering and guiding the careers of the Paupers, Kensington Market and finally Bruce Cockburn and Murray McLauchlan, His greatest success has been with Dan Hill who is now breaking nicely in the U.S. and is almost a household word in Canadian music circles. He is also deeply involved in business management for Ronney Abramson who is also becoming a recognized talent across Canada.



ARNOLD GOSEWICH - Chairman, CBS Records Canada Ltd., and Vice-President CBS Records International was formerly associated with Capitol Records-EMI Canada where he held the executive positions of President and Chief Operating Officer, an association he enjoyed for seven years. Mr. Gosewich became involved in the music industry in his hometown of Ottawa and his activities since have encompassed marketing, manufacturing retailing, rack jobbing and music publishing. Among his many credits are a Juno Award (1971) for his accomplishments in creating an image for the recording industry and in particular for organizing the Maple Music Junket, Regarded as a mayerick in the record industry, it was during Mr. Gosewich's first tenure as President of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA) that this organization became an important voice in the industry. He laid the foundation for CRIA to become more involved in the day-to-day problems facing the industry including fighting tape pirates, and gaining a closer communication with governments, provincial and federal. He also chaired the Organizing Committee that launched the successful Canadian Recording Industry Pavilion at the 1977 Canadian National Exhibition.



TIM HARROLD - President Polydor Ltd. (Canada) took over the Canadian operation in 1975. An Englishman, Mr. Harrold distinguished himself with Polydor's U.K. and U.S. companies. The latter which gave him the necessary insight to operating a major recording firm in a geographically-difficult country such as Canada. Mr. Harrold has streamlined the operation of Polydor in Canada, continuing with their central warehousing policy that was first introduced in 1971 by his predecessor, Evert Garretsen. Not wanting to be a part of the ivory tower set, Mr. Harrold has maintained a constant rapport with programmers, the daily press and special press (trade). Since taking over the Canadian operation, Mr. Harrold has extended an open door policy for independent record producers which has resulted in Polydor being the banner for many recording units over the past few years.



FRASER JAMIESON- President London Records of Canada Ltd. is one of the veterans of the recording industry, in spite of his maintaining a low key profile. Many changes that have occurred in the industry over the years came about as a direct result of policy settings by Mr. Jamieson within his own company. He introduced the buy/sell arrangement for independent Canadian labels which returned to them a larger profit and which has since been adopted throughout the industry. Very picky about the quality of his record and tape product, it was only a matter of time before he became involved in the manufacturing end of the business, unveiling his Montreal-based pressing plant in 1976. The London team of Jamieson and his wife Alice Koury, two very devoted record people, have established the label as one of trust for many of Quebec's independent record producers. As President of The International Federation of Producers of Phonograms and Videograms (IFPI), Mr. Jamieson was instrumental in having this powerful group of international record people meet in Canada to discuss ways of protecting copyrights throughout the world.



STAN KULIN - President, United Artists Records (Canada) has been associated with the record business since 1953, working part time to put himself through Montreal's Sir George Williams University where he graduated with a Bachelor of Commerce. Moving into the record business on a full time basis it wasn't long before he distinguished himself and reaped the rewards of promotion from control clerk, buyer and product manager to Manager, International Relations for the Pacific region and Canada with offices in New York City. He left RCA and his position of General Manager, Commercial Operations in 1971 to set up United Artists as an independent label in Canada, opening the doors in January of 1972 as President as well as heading up the firm's publishing operations for Canada. Maintaining a strong promotion team who work closely with their distributor (RCA), United Artists has, this year, seen one of their better years since becoming totally independent. Mr. Kulin is currently President of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA).



GERRY LACOURSIERE - President, A&M Records Of Canada, has accomplished much in his years as head of this aggressive independent. He brought A&M into Canada as an independent in 1969 and one of his goals was to do better than any independent and to do better, per capita, then his parent company. He has done both. This past year the Canadian operation revealed that comparative sales percentages between themselves and the U.S. operation range from 10% to 185%, Grooming his sales and promotion staff after his own experiences in the business has paid off. A&M took top honours in these categories in the Canadian Music Industry Awards for 1976 and 1977. Mr. Lacoursiere was one of the first to introduce a press relations department to the industry and strengthened his company just recently by consolidating his Canadian operation, head office, publishing, warehouse, A&R and press under one roof on company-owned property in Scarborough, a suburb of Toronto.



TERRY LYND - President, CBS Records Canada, has acquired a wide and varied knowledge of the entertainment business encompassing the film and record industries. A University of Toronto graduate with a Bachelor of Commerce and C.A., Mr. Lynd took his first look at the record business in 1961 when he joined Columbia Records of Canada (now CBS) as Financial Vice-President. His next rung up the executive ladder was his appointment as Executive Vice-President during which time he guided the company's program of expansion into rackjobbing and retail. He left Columbia to take over the duties of Vice-President, Finance with Famous Players but was back in the more familiar territory of Columbia after only two years. This time however, it was as Columbia's Chief Executive Officer and its first Canadian-born President. He was instrumental in setting up a Cancon policy, funnelling huge sums of money into the domestic market in an effort to beef up the Canadian star system.



ALEXANDER MAIR - President Attic Records and the Attic Publishing Group has brought his label into international prominence as well as national respect on the domestic level. Attic, two years running, took top honours at the Canadian Music Industry Awards as Most Aggressive Canadian Independent and No. 1 Manufacturer and Distributor of Canadian product. A native of Toronto, Mr. Mair became associated with the recording industry when he joined Capitol Records back in 1961 moving quickly up into the ranks of promotion with Capitol, followed by Compo (MCA) and then as manager of Gordon Lightfoot and the setting up of Early Morning Productions. He founded Attic, with his Vice-President Tom Williams, in 1974 concentrating on domestic talent to begin with, Hagood Hardy, Patsy Gallant and others and finally moving into the international scene. Both Gallant and Hardy attribute their skyrocketing careers to the ability of Mr. Mair to be at the right place at the right time and having the knowledge to make fact that which many believed was fantasy.



ELIZABETH McKIM - President. Phonodisc Ltd., has reshaped the company and strengthened its national image as Canada's leading wholly Canadian independent. No stranger to the record business. Mrs. McKim first joined Phonodisc as Secretary-Treasurer when the company was formed twenty-one years ago. Mrs. McKim's greatest obstacle to overcome was her acceptance in the industry as the first lady to take executive control of a Canadian recording entity. She soon discovered there was really no obstacle and she was welcomed into the ranks of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA) where she is now regarded as a valuable member. Keenly interested in the industry and eager to become involved in every aspect of the operation, she has maintained an executive posture befitting her presidency and relies on her tight-knit sales and promotion team to build the necessary sales and promotion image for Phonodisc. Although heavily involved in the record and tape industry, Phonodisc is the leader in accessories and continues a happy relationship with the Le-Bo line of accessories, an association that has lasted for almost twenty years



KEN MIDDLETON - President, WEA Music of Canada, initially set up Warner Bros Records of Canada in 1967. Prior to joining Warner Bros, Mr. Middleton was associated with RCA in managerial and marketing positions in his hometown of Montreal. Soon after joining Warner Bros he was appointed President of Warner Bros Canada (which became the flagship of the WEA International fleet), and moved the base of the Canadian operation to Toronto. The company has seen phenomenal growth patterns almost from the beginning necessitating in one major expansion after another to the point that the company's large Scarborough (Toronto) location has almost become an asphalt jungle with very little greenery left. WEA continues to command the singles and albums charts in Canada and have much success with touring groups and artists. His tightly-knit network of promotion people have been kept busy looking after innovative promotional campaigns as well as donning party hats for the industry when the company's many supergroups and artists swing through the country on a concert tour.



JOHN MILLS, O.C. - General Manager of the Composers, Authors and Publishers Association of Canada (CAPAC) wears his Canadian identity on his vest. His was the first voice raised for government support (legislated radio) of Canadian music, back in 1961 and he continued his fight to preserve the Canadian identity at the broadcast level. Called to the bar in 1953, Mr. Mills was created a Queen's Counsel in 1963. He joined CAPAC in 1957 as Executive Assistant and General Counsel and was appointed General Manager in 1968. John Mills has been literally heard around the world supporting the claim of Canadian songwriters and publishers to be recognized. Mr. Mills' activity in the international field gained him recognition from Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, The Award of Arts and Science First Class "in recognition of the international distinction he (Mr. Mills) has received in the field of music and copyright protection and in particular of his gracious help to Egypt at an international Convention in Cairo". The Award was presented to Mr. Mills May 28, 1975. He was also honoured with an RPM Canadian Music Industry Hall Of Fame Award, that same year.

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**BOB MORTEN** - President of the Canadian Independent Record Producer's Association is also Manager, Thunder Sound Studios and has obviously proved himself to his peers as an outspoken critic of the Canadian recording industry. Perhaps Mr. Morten's greatest achievement was the Canadian Recording Industry Association sponsored recording studio at this year's Canadian National Exhibition, the first time such a giant venture has been attempted. Members of his association manned the recording studio during the 21 days of the CNE, cutting master tapes out of which came major and independent record deals as well as airing of several acts on CHUM-FM. CIRPA's future activities will depend on strong leadership and Mr. Morten has certainly indicated this continuing strength through his tenure as their President. He was also heavily involved in scouting talent and for in-house productions for Quality Records and has been part of the team bringing national acclaim to Sweet Blindness.



**RON NEWMAN** - Managing Director, Motown Records of Canada, tries vainly to maintain a low profile in the industry. His product and his personality won't allow it however. One of the original disk-hustlers, Mr. Newman is credited with the phenomenal success of Motown in the early days of the label's formation. It was in the late fifties when Ron Newman helped establish Phonodisc, then distributor for Motown, as the leading independent in Canada. His rewards came in 1965 when Motown asked him to join their company in Detroit as National Sales Manager. He returned to Canada in 1968 to head up the newly-organized tape company, Stereodyne Ltd., and was elevated to the executive position of President in 1971. His real love however, was with Motown and the music he was most familiar with. So in 1973 he brought Motown back into Canada as an independent operation. The never-ending merry-go-round of the record business has seen somewhat of a dim-out for Motown on the international scene but not in Canada where Mr. Newman and Motown enjoy a highly respectable niche in today's music. Mr. Newman organized Motown Weekends with major and secondary radio stations from coast to coast in Canada and continues this type of promotion in maintaining the image of the company.



ED PRESTON - Vice-President and General Manager, RCA Ltd (Record Division), is a programmer who made good. An accomplished drummer who travelled the circuit in and around his hometown of Hamilton, Mr. Preston got into radio in 1947 at the age of 18 joining CHML Hamilton where he soon headed up the library and did an on-air stint as host of Club 900. Mr. Preston remained at CHML until 1967 when he joined RCA as promotion and sales rep for Ontario. His talents were soon recognized and he was upped to Regional Branch Manager for Ontario and became National Promotion Manager in 1971. He took on the duties of Operations Manager for the Central and Western Regions which included responsibility for sales, promotion A&R and RCA's studio. Mr. Preston admits that one of his greatest industry teachers was Mr. Robert Cook, who Mr. Preston succeeded as Vice-President and General Manager of the giant RCA Record Division in 1976. Constantly scouting the domestic scene for Canadian content, Mr. Preston has maintained Cancon as top priority, his greatest success being Carroll Baker, Canada's first country artist to attain gold status.



**ROSS REYNOLDS** - President, GRT of Canada, brings his company into much prominence this year with masterful planning that will see a tremendous growth pattern for 1977. New signings and a heavy concentration on those Cancon artists having top potential has paid off in good sales returns as well as image building. Mr. Reynolds, a graduate of Yale where he obtained his Bachelor of Science in Industrial Administration and later received his Master in Business Administration from Stanford University, became involved with the entertainment field as consultant for GRT. moving into the company as Eastern Finance Manager, based in New York. When GRT expanded into Canada in 1969 Mr. Reynolds took over the Canadian operation which was primarily known as a tape duplicating company. He gradually changed the image of the company to one encompassing both records and tapes and concentrated on the domestic scene resulting in GRT becoming a highly respected and nationally accepted recording complex. Regarded as one of the best record men in the business, Mr. Reynolds has successfully negotiated Canadian and international deals which are now bringing GRT home.




SCOTT RICHARDS - Vice-President. Marketing, MCA Records (Canada) is the story of the local musician who made the right move at the right time. Montreal-born, Mr. Richards travelled the world at the expense of the Canadian government. His father was a member of the Air Force, Fortunately the footloose Richards found an early roost in Toronto where he completed his formal education which didn't do him much good. Immediately leaving high school he joined a local group known as The Shays. A couple of years down the road they picked up David Clayton Thomas and the group became the most popular pop-soul group of the day, in the Ontario market. Mr. Richards was impressed with the promotional aspects of the record business and shelved his music endeavours to join Apex Records, a division of The Compo Company (now MCA). After a three year stint at promotion he joined RCA to head up their Ontario Promotion Department, a position he enjoyed for four years. He joined MCA as National Promotion Manager and moved into the top spot last year, assuming all aspects of the operation in Canada including marketing, sales and promotion. Mr. Richards is deeply involved in Cancon projects, coming up with unique marketing promotions and the breaking of new groups. This year he celebrates his fifth anniversary with MCA.



#### S. CAMPBELL RITCHIE - General

Manager Performing Rights Organization of Canada (PRO-Can) witnessed and was a part of the important moulding of autonomy of this giant performing rights organization from its parent U.S. company (BMI Inc.) Autonomy in operation was followed by a name change to PRO-Can which gave the organization a totally Canadian identity. Cam, as he is best known, has contributed significantly to the status of Canadian songwriters and publishers and continues to maintain his organization's involvement in promoting PRO-Can members through seminars, workshops and the once-avear Awards Dinner. PRO-Can weaves itself in and out of the music writing community, offering advice and comfort to its many thousands of members striving to become recognized through their works. Major changes have come to PRO-Can since its name change with much more involvement now in the international scene plus more activity and recognition of the burgeoning Canadian country music industry.



BRIAN ROBERTSON - President of the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences, is also Executive Secretary of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA). Mr. Robertson immigrated to Canada from England after having chalked up 20 years in the music and allied fields encompassing the concert, record and advertising business. It was while he was with McLaren Advertising when he first became involved in the Canadian music industry as a consultant for CRIA or as it was known then The Canadian Recording Manufacturing Association. He joined CRIA in 1973 as Executive Secretary, Mr. Robertson founded his own company Marketplace Communications, and in addition to administering CRIA business, still functions in advertising and public relations. Mr. Robertson was heavily involved in putting together the CRIA album and single charts which is now being published every two weeks. Mr. Robertson has also been involved in the production end of the Juno Awards, acting as a liason between CBC-TV and CARAS committees. His crowning effort however. was his guiding this year's CRIA Pavilion activities making it one of the success stories of the year for the record industry generally.




**RON SCRIBNER** - President Music Shoppe International, is one of the dynamic forces in Canadian management. A veteran of the booking business, Mr. Scribner became involved in booking back in the early sixties when he formed the Ron Scribner Agency, Canada's first booking agency to concentrate on rock attractions. At a time when there was very little of a domestic recording industry. Mr. Scribner brought much attention to local non-recording and recording groups, introducing them to eager audiences in high schools and colleges. Bowing out of the business for a short term of time during which he researched the European and U.S., markets and managed several groups, Mr. Scribner returned to take over Music Shoppe International which is now the country's largest agency booking contemporary talent. Music Shoppe International now grosses well in excess of \$4 million a year. Choosing the right personnel has always been top priority for Mr. Scribner's agencies and has obviously paid off. Music Shoppe International won top honours, two years in a row, as Most Aggressive Booking Agency, in the RPM Music Industry Awards.



**ELEANOR SNIDERMAN** - President, Aquitaine Records, Canada's only domestic-oriented classical label, is heavily involved in the pursuit of Canadian classical purity. Ms. Sniderman is, indeed, a very unique figure in the Canadian recording industry. As well as duties of President, negotiating label and publishing deals, she is also harnessed with the chores of A&R and the final recording sessions as producer. She was responsible for the initial success of the Canadian Brass who released on the Boot Concert Master Series. She also channeled her energies into the production and promotion of Liona Boyd, a very rare Canadian classical guitarist who has gone on to enjoy international fame. It was the Eleanor Sniderman produced Anton Kuerti's Beethoven Vol 1-2-3 album that took top honours in this year's (1977) Juno Awards as Best Classical Recording. Ms. Sniderman's most recent accomplishments have been her productions of Lotte Lehman In Recital and the revival of The Dumbells, on disc, a musical stage revue born out of World War One.

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# **INDUSTRY VIPs**





**SAM SNIDERMAN** - Canada's leading record retailer is perhaps enjoying his greatest days as the guru of Canadian music. The Canadian government paid a tribute to Mr. Sniderman honouring him with a Canadian Medal (Order of Canada) for his contribution to the Canadian music industry. He has been instrumental in bringing much change in the music industry, primarily the attitudes of Canadian broadcasters and multi-national recording companies to Cancon. He has opened the door to many young recording artists in Canada through his major downtown Toronto Sam The Record Man store as well as his forty franchise stores situated throughout Canada. It was Mr. Sniderman who sparked the Canadian Recording Industry Association's (CRIA) enthusiasm for a giant tribute to the One Hundreth Year Of Recorded Sound - the CRIA Pavilion at this year's Canadian National Exhibition (1977) that was viewed by more than four million fans and observers of the Canadian recording scene who must have come away with a totally new concept of the Canadian recording scene. Mr. Sniderman has become a powerhouse within the Canadian record community, much of his power coming from his ability to work with and/or outmanoeuver the moguls of the recording industry.

GEORGE STRUTH - president, Ouality Records, joined the label in 1959 as Manager of Production Coordination and took on the heavy duties involving inventory control and traffic liason, an important link between sales and production. He moved into the ivory tower a short time later as Assistant to the Managing Director where he was involved in the overall administration of the company. Part of his duties also centred around product acquisition which, of course, included A&R. The latter was a fairly new activity in Canada and Struth laid the ground work for Quality becoming rooted in the early stages of Canada's domestic music scene. Out of this era came the Beau Marks, Myrna Lorrie and The Guess Who. Working under and with his predecessor, George Keene, Mr. Struth became highly knowledgeable of the industry, particularly with the international scene which gained him his appointment as Vice-President. On the retirement of Mr. Keene it was obvious the reins of the company could be turned over to only one man, George Struth. The company has since undergone many changes, the most important being that it is now wholly Canadian-owned by Selkirk Holdings Limited.



DONALD TARLTON - President Donald K. Donald Enterprises of Montreal is Canada's best known promoter. A self-starter, Mr. Tarlton began his conquest of the entertainment business at the age of 16 when he hosted record hops at his Montreal suburban high school. He became one of the youngest authorities on the record business in the Montreal area which served him well for his next step, that of booking groups for high school dances. Before he reached his 20th birthday, Don Tarlton was considered "very heavy" in the entertainment scene of Quebec province. booking most of Montreal's clubs. He opened his own club in downtown Montreal where he experimented with local groups before booking them on his circuit of the province. Many groups, showcased through Mr. Tarlton, went on to greater heights contributing significantly to the growth of the Quebec music industry. Mr. Tarlton's greatest coup was to secure a working arrangement with the Montreal Forum and, because of his expertise in booking entertainment with a far reaching appeal, he has registered one success after the other for the famous hockey palace. He has also scored much success with booking Canadian acts across Canada and in particular, April Wine and The Stampeders, both registering record breaking dollar tours.

### **CANCON BEAVER**

To celebrate 100 years of recorded sound, RPM introduces Cancon Beaver, the symbol of Canada's domestic record production industry. In 1970, RPM coined the word Cancon, which has now become a universally accepted synonym for Canadian content. Now, Cancon Beaver, will become the friend and mascot of the growing Canadian industry. He will make personal appearances at the Canadian Recording Industry Pavilion during this year's Canadian National Exhibition. Watch for him!

### MAPL LOGO

Designed for RPM by Stan Klees and made available to the industry free of charge by RPM, the MAPL logo qualifies what is Canadian content on records: (M) music (A) artist (P) production (L) lyrics. You will see the MAPL logo displayed on singles and albums.

### **JUNO AWARDS**

It was in 1964 when RPM first polled the music industry. This poll eventually became the Juno Awards. The Juno Awards are now administered by the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences and are presented each year as a television special.

### **BIG COUNTRY AWARDS**

Big Country is a yearly communication meeting which culminates in an Awards' banquet. These Awards honour Canada's top country stars, as nominated and voted by the Academy of Country Music Entertainment.

### CANADIAN MUSIC INDUSTRY DIRECTORY

RPM published the first source book of the music industry in Canada. The first edition was published in 1964. The Directory lists important information pertaining to the record, music and broadcasting industries in Canada.

### **COMMUNICATION MEETINGS**

RPM initiated a series of meetings, held in major centres across Canada, designed to bring the radio and record industry together on common ground. Speakers and forums, dealing with both industries, are featured with institutional and social events.

### **CANADIAN MUSIC INDUSTRY WHO'S WHO**

The Who's Who features biographies of the important Canadians in the music industry. As well, this deluxe edition gives Canadian artists an opportunity to list themselves and their achievements. This Directory is circulated throughout the world and serves to promote the Canadian music industry.

### GOLD LEAF AWARDS

RPM launched the first bonifide certification of outstanding sales of singles and albums in Canada and launched the now famous, solid walnut engraved Gold and Platinum awards that were distinctly Canadian.

### **TALENT & ENTERTAINMENT CONFERENCE**

THE RPM Talent Buyers Conference is an annual entertainment and talent conference that brings the industry together to discuss ways and means of improving the business and to view talent. Launched for the first time in 1976, this conference is now a yearly event attended by buyers of talent from universities, colleges and high schools.

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
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
