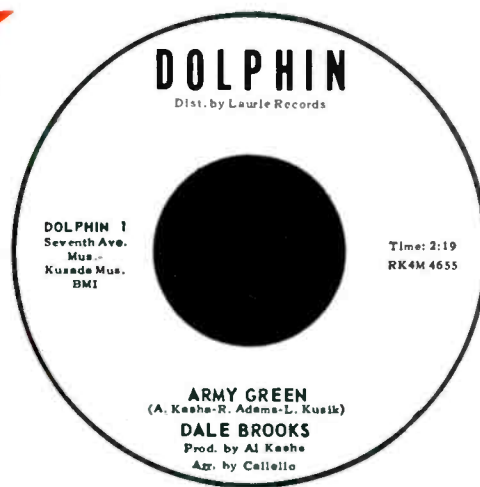
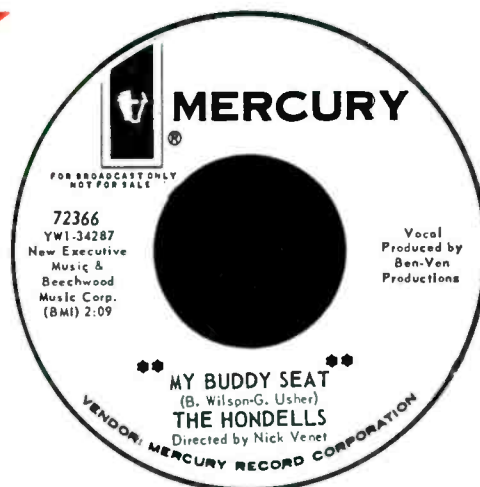

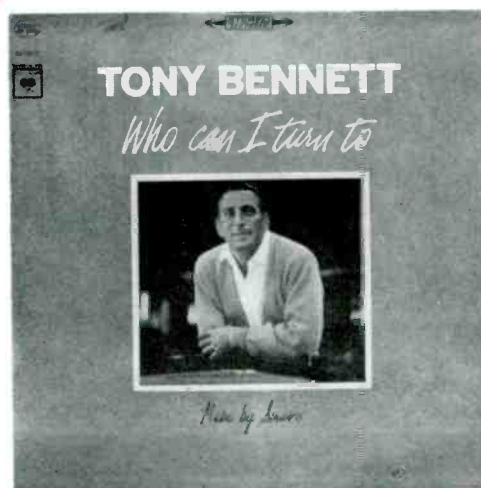
SINGLE PICK OF THE WEEK

from the motion picture "Lilies of the Field." And this single is the one destined to become the classic. Amen. #45-865

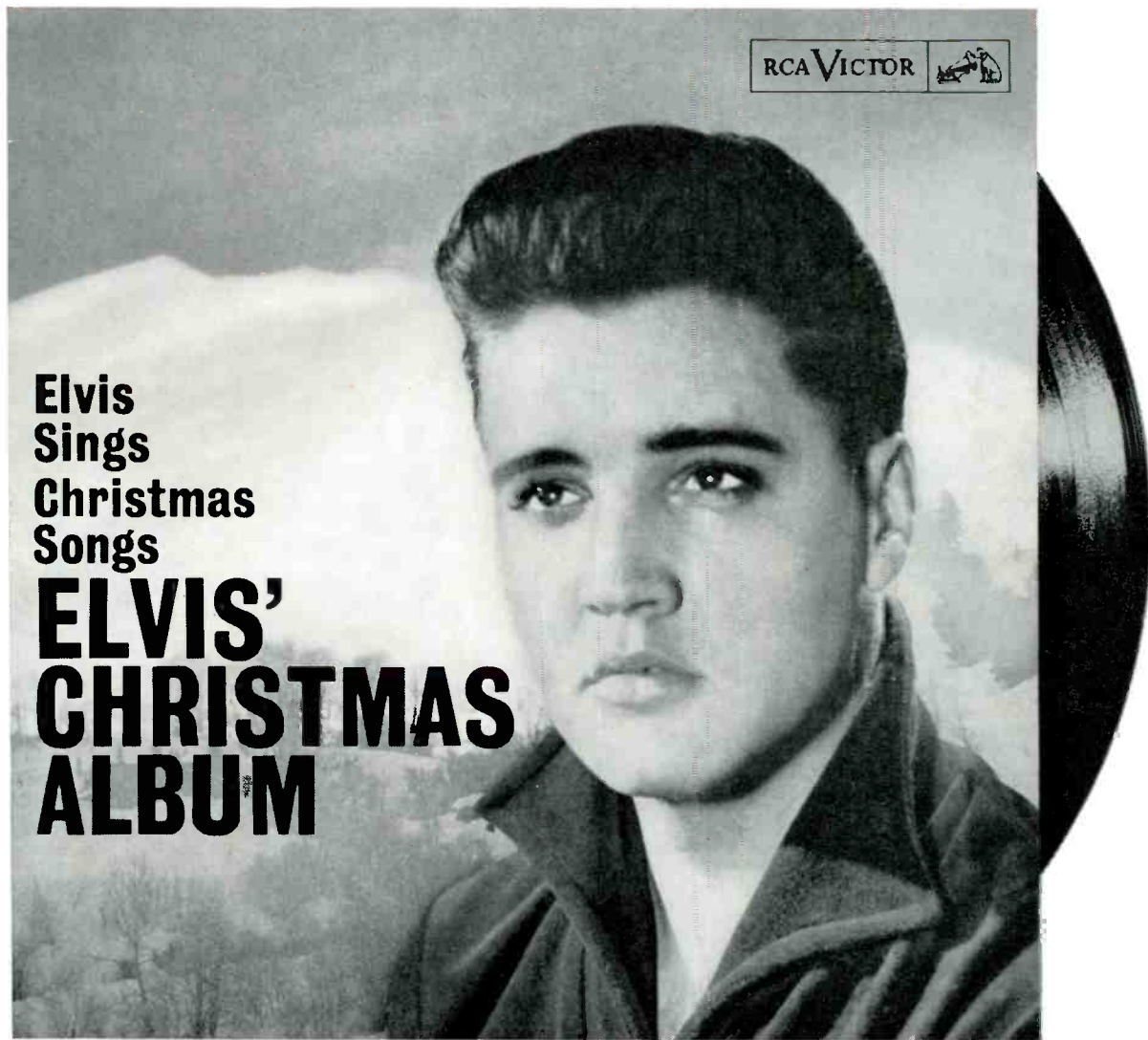

Mercury Focuses on R&B Via New Blue Rock Label

CHICAGO—In a move designed to put increasing emphasis on the r & b field, Mercury Records President I. B. Green has announced the formation of the Blue Rock label, to specialize in "music with the beat."

The decision to launch the specialty label was made, Green said, on the basis of the increased r & b sales action shown overall in the industry; specific sales action in Mercury's other divisions; as well as personal observations of music trends made by Green during his extensive European travels.

"R & b and the beat are getting greater emphasis on the international scene," Green pointed out, "no doubt due to the rapidly expanding teen age consumer market."

Green added, "Even in England, the American r & b influence is being incorporated more and more into the beat. And what the English are doing to it is revitalizing r & b in our industry in America."

"The English have been taking our r & b sound, adding

their own Yorkshire pudding concept to it and sending it right back to us stronger than ever before."

Green added that r & b is king in France, too, with the country's top singer, Johnny Hallyday, being strongly r & b.

Bruce Heads Label

Heading up the new Blue Rock label will be product manager Dick Bruce, who has been with Mercury for several years in sales managerial capacities. National promotion manager will be Carl Proctor, formerly with Summit Dist. in Chicago, and who has had a broad background in the r & b field.

Blue Rock will have its own roster of talent, with A & R duties being handled by Luichi de Jesus in New York; Leroy Lovett in the Philadelphia office; and Nick Venet on the West Coast. In addition, Green stressed, Blue Rock will be aggressive in seeking out and purchasing masters.

Distribution will be through independent distributors with established marketing knowledge in the r & b area.

Miss Brown, who now lives in New York, is best remembered for her co-starring role as "Nancy" in the original-Broadway production of "Oliver." Plans call for an album to be recorded in Capitol's New York studios under A&R producer Si Rady.

RCA Victor Records has launched a massive Christmas season advertising, promotion and merchandising campaign which is designed to inform some 100,000,000 reading Americans about new product, catalogue best sellers and new and standard Christmas packages.

George Parkhill, RCA Victor Record Division Manager of Advertising and Promotion, said the campaign is built around the RCA Victor trade mark, "Give the Gift That Keeps on Giving," and has been geared to reach the widest possible consumer audience and number of record dealers in the peak Christmas buying season.

The campaign includes trade, consumer magazine and newspaper, radio and television advertising, point-of-sale materials, counter displays, window displays, mounted album covers, full-color consumer supplements, new release bulletins and special publicity.

Parkhill said RCA Victor's

distributors have been offered a program for conducting a nation-wide dealer window display contest, with winners to receive three Hicks Gourmet Food Baskets, one at Christmas, one at St. Valentine's Day, and the third at Easter, and all dealers participating to receive smaller Hicks Gourmet packages, all this through special arrangement with Hicks, one of the nation's most famous fancy food packagers.

RCA Victor's new Christmas albums this year are "The John Gary Christmas Album" (sales of which already indicate it will be RCA Victor's biggest new Christmas album in several years); "Hark! the Herald Angels," with George Beverly Shea; "Let's Ring the Bells All Around the Christmas Tree," with John Klein; "Christmas with the Norman Luboff Choir"; the Robert Shaw Chorale in "A Ceremony of Carols"; and a new stereophonic recording of Menotti's famed Christmas opera, "Amahl and the Night Visitors."

In addition, special best sellers will be included in the campaign.

There will be a three-dimensional window display featuring the year's slogan and picturing 20 albums; there will be a counter display, an adaptation of the window display; there will be mounted album covers of the six Christmas music push albums; and there will be varying length radio spots and dealer-distributor bulletins.

Philips, Holland, Markets VJ

HOLLYWOOD — Taking another big step in its rapid growth and expansion, Vee-Jay Records, Inc. has concluded a world-wide deal with Philips, the Holland-based international firm for the selling and merchandising of Vee-Jay product and that of subsidiary labels Tollie, Fame, Melic and Nola.

Under terms of the new three-year agreement, Philips will market and promote the Vee-Jay records, both singles and albums, throughout the world, excepting only Japan and Hong Kong. Vee-Jay artists will also make recordings in Europe under Philips auspices in the languages of various countries in which Philips will distribute their records.

Actual signing of the contracts took place in London last week, with Vee-Jay President Randy Wood signing for the U.S. company, and Tony Van De Haar representing Philips, with Philips sales rep and European newsmen in attendance.

It is to be noted, in connection with the new world expansion for Vee-Jay, that the Hollywood-based firm was already the first U.S. company to set up its own promotional and sales representatives in Europe. Ron Kass, who has his offices in Lugano, Switzerland, continues as Vee-Jay's European rep and will now act as a coordinator between Vee-Jay and Philips in the sales and merchandising of Vee-Jay product in Europe.

Both companies, according to Vee-Jay Exec Vice-President Jay Lasker, will mark their new association with extensive trade press ads in England and U. S.

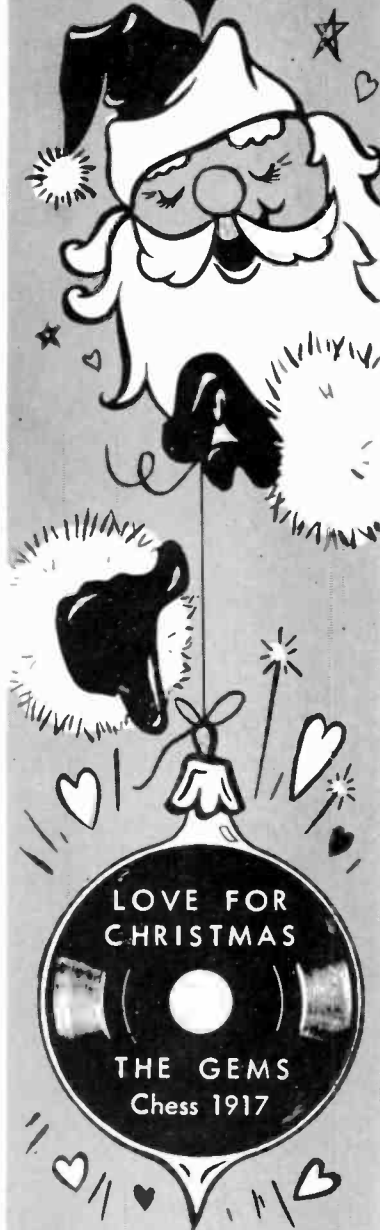
New MGMDistrib Metro NY Feted

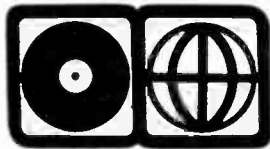

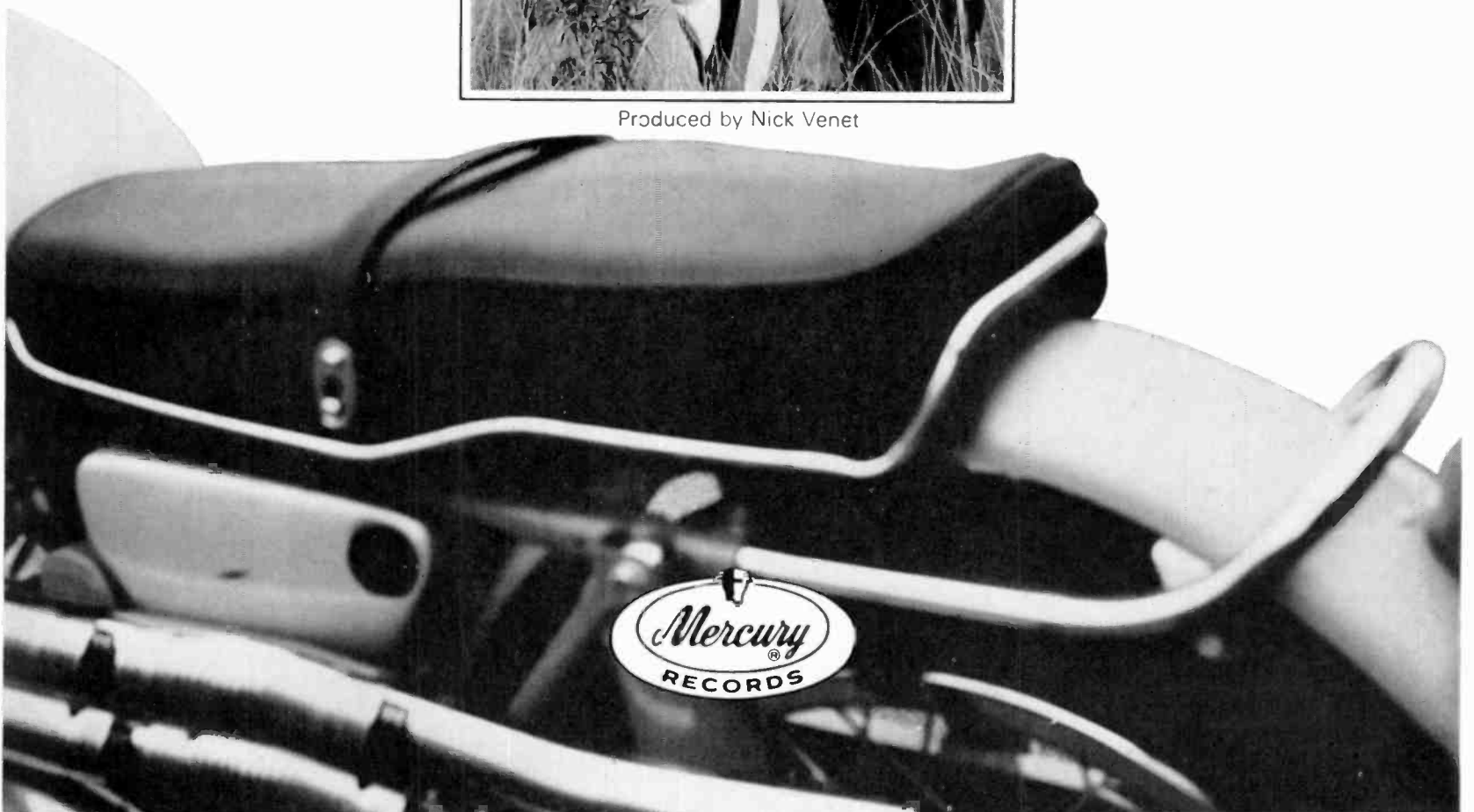

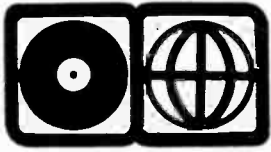

PICK HITS

THE BEATLES' STORY

NARRATIVE, MUSIC—
Capitol (S)TBO 2222.

This two-disk set will get attention from The Beatles' fans who want to own everything by and about the boys. Some music and direct quotes from the idols.



SOFTLY, AS I LEAVE YOU

There are many who adhere to the theory that perfection can be boring. Sinatra disproves the rule—or, at least, he's the exception to it. Here's another gem of a package. He gives gorgeous readings of "Talk to Me, Baby," "Softly, As I Leave You" and "Dear Heart." He also gives a magnetically bombastic delivery of a spritely new Coleman-Leigh song, "Pass Me By."

20th Century Fox TFM 3165; TFS 4165.

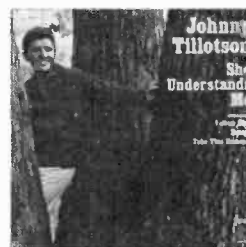

With this album, it's Tommy's turn. He gives a stylish performance worthy of much attention. He also shows that he's a master at picking material. Musical forms and terms, usually cliché, like the twist and the c-major chord, are given fresh shake-ups on this package of inventive jazz bands. The man behind all the recommended action is Tupper Saussy, who knows what music is about and discusses it intelligently on his piano.



GETZ AU GO GO

STAN GETZ, ASTRUD GILBERTO—
Verve V/V6-8600.

This duo, responsible for one of the best singles of 1964 ("Ipanema") teams up for sashays and sighs through some other songs well suited to them. Astrud singing "It Might As Well Be Spring" is marvelous and a perfect example of the right song sung by the right singer. Stan's work is, as usual, sensitive and hypnotizing.

Ertegun New NARAS Prexy; Grammy Awards Forms Out

It's double celebration time at NARAS these days. Nesuhi Ertegun has just been elected National President of NARAS by the Academy's 18 national trustees; and it's Grammy voting time again!

Currently the Vice-President of Atlantic Records, and formerly the President of the record Academy's New York Chapter, Ertegun takes over the reigns from out-going President John Scott Trotter.

The trustees also picked three new national officers and re-elected a fourth for one year terms. Francis Scott, III, of Capitol Records, was tabbed to continue as National Treasurer. Joel Friedman of Warner Brothers records was elected 1st Vice-President; RCA Victor recording star Chet Atkins, a member of the NARAS Board of Governors in Nashville, was picked as Second Vice-President, while William Traut, a veteran of the Chicago Chapter as well as a creative force for the Seeburg Corp., was voted in as new National Secretary.

Said newly-elected Ertegun: "Naturally I consider it an

honor to be elected to this very respected and responsible office. I also consider it a personal challenge, for we have already had three excellent National Presidents in Paul Weston, Bob Yorke and John Scott Trotter. It is my hope and my ambition to continue their fine work by continuing to lead NARAS in its already established direction of new vitality, responsibility and respect."

Record companies have just received their annual forms on which they are asked by NARAS to list those records which they would like to bring to the attention of NARAS voting members as possible recipients of the forthcoming Grammy Awards.

"Although the actual awards presentations are still many months away, intensive screening processes, plus several rounds of voting on the part of members, make an early start mandatory," stated Ertegun. Next week all active members will be supplied with their forms. Their selections, plus record companies listings, will comprise the initial eligibility list which, according to Ertegun, "may run well over 4,000 entries this year."

Eligible recordings will span a total of 47 categories, included among which are five new classifications suggested by the newly-formed Nashville chapter and recently approved by the National Trustees. "In addition," points out Ertegun, "we have re-defined several existing categories, eliminated one in the pop music field and added a much-needed one to the classical division. It is the Academy's aim to give as much representation as possible to all the creative facets of the recording field, while at the same time trying to keep the total number of awards within reasonable limits."

Academy execs this year are striving to condense the time period necessary for uncovering this year's Grammy winners, aiming for a mid-April, rather than the usual mid-May date for the awards presentations.

As for English language recording activities, Sylvie said she would sing primarily French songs *only* in English and an RCA spokesman appended that she would also project her image "as a French star."

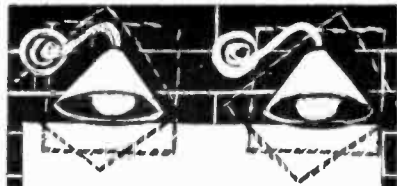

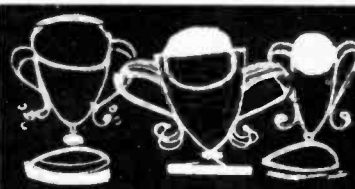

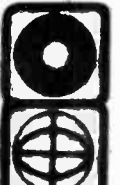

COAST CAPERS

Proper Balance

BY TED RANDAL

HOLLYWOOD—One of the biggest complaints of programmers and program directors always has been that management interferes too often. In many cases there is good reason for complaint, but there are two sides to the story and both should be discussed.

The side for programming is obvious. A station must have a competitive sound if it expects to acquire top ratings. One of the most effective ways to get good ratings is to play a lot of music while at the same time running very few commercials. The "more music" method has been so effective that many stations have actually refused several thousand dollars worth of advertising to make certain their ratings showed them in the dominant position, after which they expected to more than recoup their losses. Since all good programmers are aware that too many commercials make them vulnerable to their competition, they fight to keep the commercial load as light as possible.

The side for management is not so easily seen but often more important. Almost everyone agrees that in modern radio a station must have ratings to make money, but management's first interest is, and always has been, money. They argue that if there is not sufficient income there will be fewer jobs and lower income; and they are right. So, management frequently makes programming suffer by selling as many commercials as possible.

The question is: which comes first, the commercials or the programming? The answer is: neither, but rather a proper balance between the two. A station can maintain top ratings in a highly competitive situation and still carry as many as 20 spots per hour. *But there should be a limit*, and when that limit is reached management automatically should raise their rates. The raising of rates increases income without increasing spot load; therefore, management is happy and programming is happy. Next question please.

One of the biggest boons to artists and record manufacturers on the West Coast has been the "Shindig" show. It has given more name artists a reason to come to Los Angeles, and while here many of them make personal appearances and do other shows. In the past two weeks Billy J. Kramer and The Dakotas and Gerry and The Pacemakers were here: Bobby Vinton, whose "Mr. Lonely" single is #2 in Los Angeles is due to appear on the show Dec. 2 along with Freddie Cannon, The Righteous Brothers, Bobby Sherman, Donna Loren and Aretha Franklin. This week, the Manfred Mann group arrives having been preceded not too long ago by the Dave Clark Five. A lot of hats out here go off to producer Jack Good.

I had a long talk the other day with Al Martino (who's a pretty great guy, by the way) who has been very busy cutting all kinds of things for Capitol. He was in Hollywood for about four days, and then back to New York. Al still remembers the 10 lean years he had after his first hit, so he probably works harder and more sincere-

ly than almost anyone in the business.

Lou Adler, just back from England, has been very busy with his Dunhill Productions. They've set Jan & Dean for a Dec. 14 starting date on their new Paramount picture . . . they've finished several important new records, including Sheridan Hollenbeck's version of "Tokyo Melody" on Interphon . . . and they've set Terry Black to go on the Dick Clark Caravan for 10 days starting Dec. 24.

James Brown, "Mr. Dynamite," couldn't have been more impressive in his movie bow, "T-A-M-I." I understand eight minutes of standing ovation from the kids had to be scrapped. The Brown troupe plays Long Beach Dec. 25, Oakland a day later and the Shrine in L.A. New Year's Eve . . . When asked if he would M.C. two Christmas parties for the Foundation for the Junior Blind on Dec. 18 and 19, a very busy Ray Walston said "Yes" immediately. He's a pretty charitable and selfless individual, and he couldn't be appearing before a nicer bunch of young people.

On The A Go Go

Hot Imperial Songster Starts, Spreads Coast Club Craze

NEW YORK — "Little kids were always coming up to me on my tour and asking, 'What's the Whiskey à Go Go like? I'd sure like to go there.'"

Imperial Records' hot Johnny Rivers speaking, and while what he's saying may or may not be the best sign sociologically, it's a good indication of how important the à Go Go in general and Johnny in particular have become on the music scene. The à Go Go has certainly played a major role in Johnny Rivers' go going career, ending 1964 at its highest level.

"That's where it all started," Johnny said recently while stopping here at the windup of a 33-city cross-country tour. "The Whiskey à Go Go on Hollywood's Sunset Strip. Everybody drops in — Natalie Wood, Jayne Mansfield, Mamie Van Doren, Tuesday Weld. Steve McQueen is there a lot — he'll host my 'welcome back' opening there Dec. 8." Steve's a big booster of Johnny's, it was learned. He recently took Johnny's records to a European discothèque, had them played and then took them back when he left the place, it was noted by Lou Adler, head of Dunhill Productions and Johnny's record producer, who was also visting New York and sitting in on the interview.

Memphis Tour Highlight

Johnny's earlier recording of "Memphis" brought him a parade and the key to that city from the mayor during his recent travels, perhaps the high-

light of the tour for the slight entertainer looming large in show business.

Just what is the à Go Go sound? (Johnny's songs have all been recorded before, but he's given them life.)

"Well, it's hard to say if there is an à Go Go sound per se," Johnny explained. "Most of my records, like 'Memphis' and 'Maybelline' and the albums, 'At the Whiskey à Go Go' and 'Here We à Go Go Again,' are done live at the Whiskey à Go Go, although the new one, 'Mountain of Love,' was cut in a studio, with three girls plus my regular backing, bass player Mickey Jones and drummer Joe Osborne (I play guitar).

"My music has been compared to the Detroit Sound, although I'm told I have a somewhat happier sound."

At which point Adler said: "Johnny has brought the young feeling of dancing—the watusi, the frug, etc. — to adults in clubs. They can relate to him musically. He's blues-oriented, and adults have always been

CHICAGO—Not too far from the site of Chicago's famous fire of 1871, there burns a new inferno. Unlike the historical blaze, this musical fire is being fanned and encouraged by Chicago's music men.

Last week, 25 of Chicago's pace-setting music men met for the first time to organize the new commercial trade association, Midwestern Music Men's Association. The organization is the brain child of Ewart Abner, Constellation Records President and Paul Wyatt, Columbia's Studio Sales Manager. The four-hour meeting was a stormy and thought-provoking discussion of profit, potential and direction of the Midwestern Music Market.

The first meeting was key-noted by Paul Wyatt. His address was a strong, honest appraisal of Chicago's standing in the music industry. Wyatt pointed out the facts regarding the past histories of musical success achieved in and by Chicagoans, and the lack of present-day organization within Chicago's industry. Wyatt proposed the organization of all music men in the Midwest to more effectively direct its future. Without exception, each

tradesman made his contribution to the discussion that followed: A motion was made to formally organize and select a Guidance Committee, and the next meeting was set for Dec. 1. The meeting will be held at the Avenue Motel's Red Room at 1 P.M.

In the interim, the Guidance Committee will meet to propose and determine policy; nominate officers for a vote to be held at its next meeting. The committee members are a representative group selected from the total music picture in Chicago. They are: Ewart Abner, Constellation Record Company; Esmond Edwards, Chess Records; Bob Kidder, Engineer at Universal; Carl Procter, Independent Promotion Man; Ralph Bass, Independent Producer; and Carl Davis, Okeh and Epic Records.

The awesome phrase "Chicago Fire" describes to the industry what is taking place in Chicago—and, to any writers, publishers, record companies artists or musicians—the brand of enthusiasm they will encounter in Chicago.

Johnny also believes the British groups will be popular for quite a while yet. "Too many are making it now," he felt, "and it'll come down to The Beatles, the best groups, the best material." His convictions in this area are not influenced by the fact that Brian Epstein (called the fifth Beatle by some, the first by others) handles Johnny's European engagements.

Johnny, 23, has been recording since he was 15 and now makes his home in California. According to Adler, "Johnny's finally found his own style and sound. Recording live at the Whiskey à Go Go with just a trio turned the trick, I think. Instead of his complementing the band as he'd been doing for years, they're complementing him. . . ."

The Hollywood Whiskey à Go Go will get some more publicity when Johnny (along with other cast members) does scenes for his first movie à la maison. "I've had some offers for pictures before, but I held out for a really important property. This looks like it. Right now it's called 'Community Property,' and the stars are Frank Sinatra, Deborah Kerr, Dean Martin and Ann-Margret. It starts shooting in February, with many of the scenes to be located at the Whiskey à Go Go, and I'll have a speaking part plus three or four numbers in it. It's basically a comedy—the title may be changed to 'Divorce—American Style.'"

(One of the films offered Johnny was Sam Katzman's "Watusi à Go Go," which, perhaps when they couldn't get Johnny, was changed to "The Swingin' Set" and now has become "Get Yourself a College Girl.")

Johnny has also appeared on TV's "Shindig," on Red Skelton's show (in a skit about the "Skelton à Go Go") and in a documentary Jack Paar filmed on the craze for à Go Gos around our country (and, presumably, in France, the actual birthplace of the name if not the nuance).

"The Whiskey à Go Go people on the Coast are looking for a spot in New York to open a new à Go Go," Johnny confided.

Which would make Christmas merrier for "little kids" hereabouts; and, of course, for the countless watusi wacky adults who relate to Johnny's à Go Go, man, go rhythms and sounds.

Another Christmas gift ouch: Johnny Rivers dolls—you wind them up, and, as Lawrence Welk would say, they ah, go, go, go.

Classical Corner:

Price Back From Europe, Records 1st With Boston

Soprano Leontyne Price returned to the United States from a season of performing and recording in Europe last week, and after a brief vacation with her family in Laurel, Miss., flies to Boston to perform and record two operatic works with the Boston Symphony Orchestra directed by Erich Leinsdorf.

The performances of two Strauss works, the last scene from "Salome," and "The Egyptian Helen," will be in Symphony Hall Dec. 11 and 12, and the recordings, Miss Price's first with the Boston Symphony, will follow immediately thereafter.

Miss Price returned from a series of triumphant performances including appearances with La Scala in Russia, to find her recently released RCA Victor recording of "Carmen" is the best selling opera on the industry's best selling classical LP charts, and one of the fastest selling operas in RCA Victor's history.

Although her Boston recording dates are her first with the orchestra, she has recorded a number of operas under the baton of Erich Leinsdorf. Among these was "Madama Butterfly," which last spring won the NARAS Grammy Award as best opera recording of the year.

While in Europe, Miss Price recorded Verdi's "La Forza del Destino" for RCA Victor, with Thomas Schippers as the conductor.

She appeared at the Vienna Staatsoper in productions of "Il Trovatore," "Aida" and "Tosca," and with the Berlin Opera in "Il Trovatore." She was the only American singer to be invited to accompany La Scala Opera on its visit to Russia. In Moscow, she sang in the Verdi Requiem and received an ovation of unprecedented length. She also sang in a Bach Cantata in the Berlin Festival.

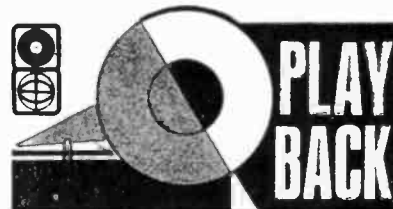

Charting Success

The subject delicately poised in my rather delicate mind at this particular delicate moment is . . . a chart! What is a chart? Well, there's a blood pressure chart, a temperature chart, a no-calorie chart, a high calorie chart, a weather forecast chart, a navigation chart. Lionel Chart . . . oh no, that's Bart, isn't it? However, if you have the ability to decipher the translations found in Cassell's Concise English Dictionary of the English language (and I'm one who hasn't), you'll find that alongside the word chart is a translation

that reads:—(Gr. charte, a sheet of papyrus; n. A map, esp, of some part of the sea or coast; a statement in tabular form or as a graphic curve.) They do go on, don't they? But I get the impression that people go to a lot of trouble to compile these charts so that when you board a ship to travel to Honolulu, you won't by some misguided direction finish up in Bombay.

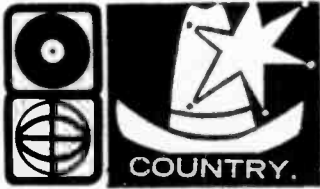
Now, throughout the world, there is what is known as a popular Hit Parade—that is, a chart for each country participating in the medium of pop music—and this particular chart perhaps comes under the translation:—A sheet of papyrus or a statement in tabular form. You agree? No? Good, let's continue! Now I don't want to beat around the graphic curve, but I do want to say that every week when I pick up my statements in tabular form (you notice I use the plural this time), I have a feeling of great uncertainty, because whereas a blood pressure chart tells you with great accuracy that you're up or down, several pop music charts find it enormously difficult to tell you whether you're up, down or even there at all!

Stones Listings Vary

For Instance, over here this week four different charts give the new Rolling Stones "Little Red Rooster" as No. 1 . . . No. 24 . . . No. 21 and No. 15. I've noticed in your American charts, too, that various charts differ, and I've often wondered why? Our pop industry grows every day, and if it's good enough for people to buy records, and in many cases support their favorite artist or artists, then I feel it's good enough for the powers that be to make quite certain they're able to read an authoritative chart from week to week that lets them know EXACTLY where their favorite is positioned. I guess a further tremendous amount of work would be needed, but wouldn't it be worth it? So there, I've said it!

Guess what? I was waiting at London Airport the other day to fly to Manchester for BBC's "Top of The Pops" telly show, and, first of all, in raced Gene Pitney full of the joys of new-found chart success with "I'm Gonna Be Strong" . . . Then Petula Clark appeared—she'd just arrived from Paris and was flying on to the show to add her new hit "Down Town" . . . Then Val Doonican arrived—he's going great guns with "Walk Tall" . . . and last but not least, The Pretty Things turned up. They're in the charts with "Don't Bring Me Down." I thought of all that talent as we flew towards Manchester—what if anything happened before we got there? I mean, I could sing Pet Clark or Gene Pitney's song for them alright, but there are five Pretty Things, and I just couldn't play all those guitars and drums and mouth organs all at once, and my hair's too short anyway. However, we made it, and what a gas of a show we had! When Gene took that final note, I thought to myself, "What price Maria Callas?"

Anyway, I must away to start writing all those Christmas cards out again—I wrote 428 last year, and got 427 back. I wonder who crossed me off THEIR chart?

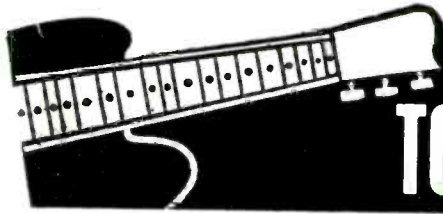
