





FTC Would End 'Unfair' Club Plan

eral Trade Commission proposed a rule last week to outlaw as "inherently unfair" the sales plan used by many disk and book clubs.

The FTC action was aimed at all sales techniques that require subscribers to say in advance that they do not want a specific selection. Otherwise they are billed for it.

The FTC said that such schemes exploited such common human traits as "procrastination or forgetfulness in order to put liability upon subscribers for merchandise they may not want."

The FTC suggested that such schemes enabled sellers to take advantage of the uncertainties of postal service, computer errors and centralized methods of credit administration and debt collection "to extract payments from subscribers on whom financial liability been unfairly imposed."

It said subscribers have sometimes been denied sufficient time to reject merchandise, and in some cases such clubs failed to terminate a membership after a subscriber had sent in a proper cancellation notice.

CBS Answers FTC on Club

The CBS Direct Marketing Services Division has made the following comment on the Federal Trade Commission's notice of rulemaking proceeding relating to negative option plans:

"The CBS Direct Marketing Services Division will oppose the rule proposed by the Federal Trade Commission, which, in effect, would ban negative option and continuity selling. The Division, which operates the Columbia Record Club and mail-order businesses other takes pride in its standards of operations, which go far beyond the ordinary guidelines for consumer protection.

"We question whether the specific problems described by the Commission exist to any meaningful extent. Before the Commission formulates new rules eliminating a practice that has obviously appealed to millions of Americans for more than forty years, an intensive study of those problems and an assessment of all possible solutions should be made. The division will make every effort to cooperate with the Commission in such a study."


Lane Prophesy Sales Director



WB Sets Biggest Campaign For Peter, Paul, Mary's 10th

BURBANK, CALIF. - Warner Brothers Records has devised the biggest artist promotion campaign in its history to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the teaming of Peter, Paul and Mary, starting the third week in May.

"Ten Years Together" is the theme of the program, which is built around a special anniversary album shipped in mid-May by the diskery. Titled "The Best of Peter, Paul and Mary/Ten Years Together," the LP comprises 13 of their hits.

Among the titles on the album are "Don't Think Twice,"
"Blowin' in the Wind," "Day is Done," "Puff (The Magic Dragon,") "Leaving, On a Jet Plane," "I Dig Rock and Roll Music," "Lemon Tree," "If I Had A Hammer," "Too Much of Nothing," "For Loving Me," "Early Morning Rain" and "500 Miles."

The promotional campaign, which will cost approximately \$75,000 to launch and runs from the third week in May through the last week in July, has a number of individual features devised by the Warner Executive team:

Specially designed tape display units to be shipped to outlets across the country.

An extensive consumer and trade press campaign running throughout the period. stressing the entire Peter, Paul and Mary catalogue of albums on Warner Brothers and tied in, whenever possible, with appearances during their current concert tour.

The most ambitious group of AM and FM radio spot buys heralding the anniversary for the United States and Canada. The anniversary promotion will be staged on a world-wide basis following the end of the domestic program.

A dj and press mailing of special press kits.

Distribution of advertising kits to the Company's dealers, rack jobbers and promotion men, who have all met in regional get-togethers on the campaign.

Special billboards and posters which have been printed for distribution to outlets around the country and in Canada.

Advanced sales for the album and tapes are 250,000 units. Cumulative sales of Peter, Paul and Mary product account for almost 15 million albums and tapes.

In connection with the trio's current concert tour, two special engagements will be the focus of regional junkets and promotions by WB: two concerts at Carnegie Hall June 8 and 9, and a Chicago Opera House concert June 24.

Hits Keep Fallin' On Hal David

By DAVE FINKLE

NEW YORK — Hal David arrived at Record World last week for his first interview at a trade magazine and remarked, "It never occurred to me that there would be music playing. Don't you find that distracting when you try to work?"

And suddenly you realize there's no one more distracted by background music when he's working than a lyricist trying to set words to a melody or dream up a new rhyme scheme or meter. You realize that Hal David probably does most of his prolific and successful work in silence. An obvious irony.

David, who has won Oscars and Grammies this year for his work, cleared up some of the "which-comes-first" questions about his collaboration with Burt Bacharach. "It works many ways," he said. "Sometimes the words come first. Sometimes the music. Sometimes we just get in a room and work it out together. When we do that, however, we always come to a work session with some ideas prepared. We just don't stare at the four walls I get ideas all the time and I write them down in books I keep at home. I never carry them with me. I suppose I've lost some good ideas by not writing them down, but since I've forgotten them I can't remember whether they were good or bad.

"I never remember where I got a song title. It just happens. About a year after I wrote 'Do You Know the Way to San Jose,' I remembered that I had spent time in San Jose when I was in the Army and that it was a place where I'd enjoyed myself. But I had completely forgotten it until that time. The song sums up what I feel about L.A."

"The length of time it takes us to write a song varies, too," he went on. "Sometimes a week, sometimes a year. It took me a long time to complete 'What the World Needs Now,' for instance. I wrote the chorus in one sitting, one straight thought, I think. But the verses wouldn't come. I didn't know what I wanted to say. No. I knew what I wanted to say, but not how I wanted to say it.

"When Burt and I sit down to write a song, we don't think

about whether it is a hit song. but whether it is a good song. We let the hits take care of themselves. And sometimes we write specifically for Dionne Warwick and sometimes not. It just seems that Dionne sounds better on the songs than anyone ever does. I think the three of us are on the same wavelength. And Dionne has a marvelous knack of knowing what's right for her. For instance, we didn't think of 'Message for Michael' as a song for Dionne, but she did, and she was right.

Dionne Astute

"Dionne is very astute, and although we essentially know what we're going to do with a song by the time we go in to record, we frequently change according to Dionne's suggestions. I love recording. The music business today is recording. It gives us the chance to present a song exactly the way we want it to sound. Of course, we're not always right. Sometimes I hear a recording of one of our songs done not at all like I thought of it, and it's so right. One I can think of is the Sergio Mendes 'Look of Love.' "

Although it doesn't seem as if there was a time when Bacharach and David songs didn't exist, there was. The team met at Famous Music in the late '50s and started to write, but before that David had spent much of his civilian career as a reporter. He graduated from the New York University School of Journalism, spent time on the staff of the New York Post and then went into the Army, where he was put in Special Forces and asked to write sketches, songs and voila.

Now, of course, the world has opened up for Bacharach and David. They've got their hit show, "Promises, Promises." "I loved doing the show," David reported, "and I'd love to do another, if we could find the right property. Writing the show was different from any work we'd done, more challenging. With a show, you are writing more than a group of songs. You're writing to support a story, character songs. I loved every minute of doing the show. I even loved the road. Some say it's a drudge, but I found it exhilarating. We wrote 'I'll Never Fall in Love Again' on the road. We put it in the last performFilm Review

If You Like Beatles, You'll 'Let It Be'

If you love the Beatles (or loved them), you will love their new film/concert, "Let It Be." If you like(d) them, you will like the film. If you don't like the Beatles, you wouldn't want to go to the movie anyway so there's no problem.

"Let It Be," a United Artist release, is the simple story of how four simple musicians get it together musically. Personality clashes are non-existent although there is a bit of introspective group discussion.

Highlights of the film include Mrs. Paul McCartney's daughter spooking Ringo; Paul singing "Besame Mucho"; the group rocking out "Lawdy Miss Clawdy" and "Shake Rattle and Roll"; George and Ringo working out "Octopus' Garden" at the piano.

The plot (?) takes us to the roof of Apple headquarters where John, George, Paul and Ringo (who is still the greatest) give a concert for the benefit of the masses huddled several stories below and, one supposes, the camera.

"Let It Be" is not a deep film, but it is a unique exposition of musical talent and provides a few glimpses of four surprisingly amiable personalities. Besides, the Beatles are in it. —Bob Moore Merlis.

And the movies love David and Bacharach. Four Oscar nominations in as many years—"What's New Pussycat?," "Alfie," "The Look of Love," "Raindrops Keep Fallin' on My Head." And the winner is . . .

"I was thrilled to win the Oscar. I'm glad I'm not so blase that I can't get excited about something like this."


David and Bacharach will probably be doing a movie this year, although the contracts aren't signed yet, so David isn't giving details. "Someday I'd like to do a movie musical where the songs are a more integral part of the movie."

Right now David, however, is merely — merely? — writing songs for the next Dionne Warwick session. He and partner

Burt Bacharach will also be doing some more producing for B. J. Thomas, who did so well with "Raindrops." In the past few months David has also done a few lyrics for tunes not written by Burt Bacharach—songs for "On Her Majesty's Secret Service" with music by John Barry. But he doesn't particularly want to discuss this assignment more than to say he only took it because Burt was tied up elsewhere. He will talk about one other spot where he appeared without Bacharach (who frequently appears without David)—between covers in a compilation of his lyrics published a few years ago by Simon and Schuster under the title What the World Needs Now.'

"I was delighted when they asked to publish my lyrics. On the whole I think lyrics have great literary quality. Actually

Mann Has 'Feelings' For Film Music

NEW YORK—According to Barry Mann, his latest release (as an artist), "Feelings," is the follow-up to "Who Put the Bomp in the Bomp Bomp Bomp." Known as a formidable writing talent (usually with Cynthia Weil, his wife), Mann has chosen to step out as a performer once more.

He cut a demo of "Feelings" which he wrote with his wife about a year ago. It recently came to the attention of Scepter exec Steve Tyrell who was excited about what he heard and rush-released the record. "Feelings" is a part of "Getting Straight," the new film starring Elliott Gould and Candice Bergen, although Mann and Weil did not write it specifically for the movie.

Mann characterizes himself as "a songwriter who also sings." In the case of "Feelings," he most definitely had himself in mind inasmuch as he has a specific "arrangement in my head."

Mann. who wrote "You've Lost That Loving Feeling," among literally hundreds upon hundreds of hits for other artists, comes out sounding quite a bit like Simon and Garfunkel on the record. He realizes this and says that he didn't mean for the sound to be so much like S & G's. He greatly admires Paul Simon's writing but the similarity with "Feelings" was "strictly unintentional."

He has just scored the film "I Never Sang for My Father" with Al Gorgoni and wrote the

title song with Cynthia Weil. Roy Clark performs the song. Additionally, he and Gorgoni have started a production company, Gorgoni-Mann, Ltd. First product from the team will be a record by Steve Karliski for Bell. He and his wife have been writing for the upcoming "Partridge Family" TV series, which will also appear on Bell.

On still another front, he and his wife are working on a Broadway show which is based on a "movie which came out about 10 years ago."

Since he doesn't like to limit himself he shuns questions about the direction he's taking. He states, "I'm going wherever it's going to take me." Right now he's writing songs mostly for himself, and a Scepter album of Barry Mann singing Barry Mann is planned.

Secondly, he writes and produces albums and singles for big-voiced singers on the label such as Sergio Franchi. And, for a third threat, he supervises most of the soundtrack albums that the company releases





RCA Records has announced that Nat LaPatin has been appointed to the post of New York Field Promotion Representative.



Roger Williams Endorses Piano Instruction by Computer

NEW YORK—Kapp's Roger Miller, who told Record World last week that he's always being asked to endorse good piano teachers and teaching methods, has finally endorsed a piano and organ teaching method—the Decker Computer Console.

Created by Thomas Decker, the Decker Computer console, an audio-visual aid, will be the featured teacher in a series of 200 music centers that will open across the country within the next year.

Williams has not affiliated with any piano manufacturer.

The first music center opened last week in Greenville, S.C., with a crowd of 10,000 in attendance.

The Cycle is Complete

The Buffalo Springfield cycle is complete.

Dewey Martin, the group's drummer, now has his own group together, with an album scheduled for June and a nationwide tour to follow.

And he's brought along Bruce Palmer, the group's original (and mysterious) bassist.

Martin's new group, called Medicine Ball ("Because our music hits you in the gut, like the medicine balls in gyms"), unlike other Springfield alumni groups (Paco; Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young) will not initially base itself in country rock. Nor will it perform strictly original material. Material on its debut album, which presumably will reflect its live repertoire, includes the Beatles "Yesterday" and Buddy Holly's "Maybe Baby."



Palmer, in addition to performing on the Medicine Ball album, has recently signed a solo contract with MGM and is presently recording a debut album.

But Palmer isn't the only one cutting a solo album. The whole crowd from Crosby, Stills, Nash, Young, Reeves & Taylor are actively involved in projects apart from group recording. Steve Stills' debut album as a solo artist (with an all-star, super-star backing) is completed, to be released in early summer. Rumor has it that Stills, additionally has cut some material with Jimi Hendrix . . . perhaps as a duo. David Crosby and Graham Nash have been recording for the

last three weeks on the West Coast for a joint effort; either as a duo or as two solo albums (with each helping the other). And Greg Reeves, the ex-Motown Bassist, is currently cutting a solo album. Dallas Taylor is busy playing on various big-name sessions and Neil Young, with the recent demise of his Crazy Horse group, is currently pondering his fate. Meanwhile, the whole group, CSNYT & R, hope to have their next album cut before July, when they initiate a massive national tour.

Other solo albums on the way include the long-awaited Eric Clapton record. People who've heard snatches from it say that his voice has molded itself almost perfectly to Delaney Bramlett's. The Stevie Winwood album has been shelved by Winwood in favor of recording the new album by the reformed Traffic. (Actually both would have been near-identical entities, since Winwood was using Traffic members Chris Wood and Jim Capaldi as backup on his planned solo record).

And Rick Grech, the ex-bassist for Blind Faith and now with Ginger Baker's Airforce, has a completed solo album ready and pending release.

Pop music's own version of the Grammy Awards will soon be televised to theaters across the nation in an elaborate closedcircuit venture.

Live from London

The presentation spotlights the annual Ivor Novello Awards and originates in Britain, live from London's Talk of the Town nightclub. The awards are presented each year to the composers of the year's best in pop music in more than a dozen categories for first, second and third place finishers in each grouping. The awards were initiated in 1955 in memory of Novello, one of Britain's best known earlier musical comedy writers.

The mass-market attraction of the awards lies in the calibre of talent who'll act as presenters and recipients of the honors. Talent secured thus far includes Paul McCartney, the Rolling Stones, the Who, Led Zeppelin, Ginger Baker's Airforce and Dusty Springfield.

Concert Review

Garden Show the 'Most'

NEW YORK — Madison Square Garden recently witnessed one of the most balanced, professional, fun programs of contemporary music ever seen in New York. The show, headlined by Fantasy's Creedence Clearwater Revival, included Stax' Booker T. and the M.G.'s and Wilbert Harrison who records for Sue.

Creedence proved itself to be just about the most dynamic rock and roll band in history. Their music was direct and effective as they played hit after hit after hit. John Fogarty, lead guitarist, singer and composer, seemed to be having a great time as the crowd broke through police lines in a goodnatured near-riot. The group never sounded better as they whipped through "Proud Mary" ("big wheel keep on boinin'");
"Keep On Chooglin'" ("you got to ball an' have a good time"); "Born on a Bayou" ("rollin" with some Cajun queen"); "Commotion" ("toin my head around"); "The Night Time Is The Right Time" ("wah do day"); and "Fortunate Son" ("I ain't no . . . "), among many others.

Many have noticed that Creedence sounds quite a bit like their records when they perform live. More correctly, their records sound just like they do and when you think about it, that's quite a great way to sound.

Booker T. & the M.G.'s, one of the most unique groups of our time, delighted with their inventive musicianship. Booker T. Jones was as tasteful as ever, but the spotlight fell more than once to guitarist Steve Cropper whose style has been often imitated but never duplicated. Al Jackson, Jr., on drums stood up and played and laughed through much of the set and set a happy tone. After some initial equipment trouble which was soon cleared up, "Duck" Dunn showed why he's one of the most respected bassists in the business.

Opening Act Did Impossible

The opening act, Wilbert Harrison, did the impossible by becoming the first one-man band in history to hold the attention of over 12,000 rock fans at the beginning of a major concert. He opened with "Let's Work Together" and had the audience on his side from the beginning. He performed a number of R&B standards including his own Kansas City and was called back for an encore.

The show presented three diverse groups (Harrison being a one-man group), each of which made a unique and delightful contribution to the fantastic success of the evening.







Kapp, the Ford Foundation; Curtis Davis, Director of Cultural Programs, National Educational Television; Alan Rich, New York Magazine; Archie Jones, University of Missouri, Kansas City; and Harris Danziger, Director, Third Street Music School Settlement.

Items on the agenda include such topics as "The Economics of Music," "The Role of Popular Music in the Schools," "The Effects of Music on the Advent of Audio-Visual Recordings and Other Techniques," "The Economics of Recorded Music" and "Obsoleting the Concert Hall."

The National Music Council is a non-profit membership corporation composed of representatives of musical associations of national scope and activity in the United States. Peter Mennin, President of the Juilliard School, serves as President of the Council, and James Browning is Executive Secretary.

Musico Changes Distribution

NEW YORK — Peter Fabri's Musico label, the new economy line of pre-recorded tapes and albums based in Chicago, has undergone a change in their U.S. distribution.

Effective immediately, Musico will be handled by independent sales reps in key markets: J. & B. Associates, Miami; Andy Danizco, New York; Multi-Reps, Cleveland; and Lou Worth, Los Angeles.

Three new packages will be released shortly: "Airport Love Theme" by Hugo Winterhalter and Orchestra; "Together" with Gene Pitney singing the songs of Burt Bacharach and Hal David; and "Soul Explosion," highlighting 16 different stars.

Diana Ross:

Future Unlimited

It was a calculated gamble on the part of Motown, but it worked. After all, how often do you take a hit group, the star attraction and say, "Okay, baby, you're on your own."

That's what happened to Diana Ross. She's on her own, all the way on her own. The sensational recording, night club and television personality has turned the tables on the scoffers with a blazing series of successes since she parted with the Supremes late last year.

Her latest single on the Motown label, "Reach Out and Touch," has leaped into the top 20 on the Top 100 chart, while Motown's farewell album of Diana with the Supremes titled, naturally, "Farewell," is bulleted for a certain hit.

Doing SRO

Diana, who recently bowled them over at the Frontier Hotel in Las Vegas with an act that had even hard-nosed gambling city folk reeling, is being touted as one of these rare individuals who can take their place alongside a Billie Holliday, or a Judy Garland, or a Barbra Streisand. Now doing SRO business every night in Nevada, the critics have unanimously choraled that Diana is "the best new night club act we've seen in 10 years."

But Diana Ross doesn't happen overnight. It takes years of grooming—years of working as a part of the Supremes, of establishing a reputation as a hard-working, professional creative unit.

As Diana emerged as the unique member of the Supremes, the executives at Motown began careful discussions relative to springing her as a solo. There were pros and cons. Why break up a good thing? Why take the chance?

But if the gamble paid off, the company had a brand new star on its hands. And, the Supremes, naturally, would go on and be developed as a star attraction on their own.

\$60,000 Invested

So it came to pass. More than \$60,000 was invested in Diana's act. Some of television's top comedy writers fashioned her patter and designers Ray Aghayan and Bob Mackie, who did Lauren Bacall's costumes for the hit Broadway mu-

sical "Applause," designed her wardrobe. She makes at least a dozen costume changes in the act.

Her opening line is: "Welcome to the Can-Diana Rossmake it-on-her-own show?"

And then for the next 50 minutes, she proved overwhelmingly that she can. One critic said that Diana comes across as a "young Lena Horne." Another said "her blues singing is pure Bessie Smith." And yet another said "she has the best chance in the world to capture the Barbra Streisand audience."

Now Movies?

Reports from Detroit, headquarters for Motown, report a big motion picture deal for Diana. In addition, don't be surprised if the thrush finds her way to the Broadway stage. She's already been offered three musical scripts.

With Las Vegas behind her, can Broadway be just around the corner?



Columbia Expands Coast Operation to San Francisco

Columbia Records, which has tripled its size in Los Angeles in the past few years, is now moving full force into San Francisco.

As part of Columbia's continuing expansion on the West Coast, it has been announced that Roy Halee, one of Columbia's top engineer-producers, is being stationed in San Francisco. Halee has been very instrumental in the recording success of Laura Nyro, Simon & Garfunkel and Blood, Sweat & Tears.

Columbia was leasing just one studio in San Francisco, but has plans to expand its capacity two or three times. And now that Columbia has tripled its recording space in the Bay Area, a number of big artists are moving there to live as well as record. Simon & Garfunkel, Blood, Sweat & Tears and Jerry Vale are all planning this move shortly.

This new expansion in the San Francisco area is indicative of Columbia's overall growth attitude on the West Coast. Since Jack Gold, Vice-President Columbia Records' Artist and Repertoire, came to the West Coast three years ago, Columbia has rapidly become one of the leaders there. In fact. Columbia is the only Eastern based record company with a Vice-President in charge of A & R based on the West Coast. Additionally, Ed Mathews, Jack's assistant, moved to Los Angeles less than a year ago in order to assist Jack in handling Columbia's rapid West Coast expansion.

Built Up Talent Roster

In addition to tripling its staff and its recording space, Columbia has built up an impressive artist roster with such West Coast talent as Michael Bloomfield, the Byrds, the Chambers Brothers, Chicago, Ray Conniff, Mac Davis, Percy Faith, the Firesign Theatre, Nick Gravenites, the Illinois Speed Press. It's a Beautiful Day, Janis Joplin, Mark Lindsay, Johnny Mathis, Jim Nabors, Pacific Gas & Electric, the Raiders, Santana, Spiral Starecase, Taj Mahal, Jerry Naylor, O. C. Smith, Gary Puckett & the Union Gap and Andy Williams. And new talent is being signed constantly.

This month alone, there will be initial recording releases on the Jerry Hahn Brotherhood, Southern Comfort, Canyon, Truk, Prairie Madness, Sweet Apple, Brooks Hunnicutt, Jancey Lee Tyler, and Compton & Batteau. In order to present all these new talents properly, Columbia has built up a roster of producers that is as impressive as its artist roster.

Jack Gold, who produces Ray Conniff and Johnny Mathis, has helped both of these artists in expanding their popularity to new peaks. Jerry Fuller, who has already been responsible for the success of the Union Gap, O. C. Smith and Mac Davis, is now producing himself. And Sonny Knight, who helped break the Starecase and Jerry Naylor, is currently finishing albums by Truk and Robert Goulet. Irving Townsend, who is Vice-President of West Coast Operations for CBS Records, and President of NARAS, is producing Mahalia Jackson and Percy Faith.

Associate Producer Program

Seeing all this growth, Gold realized the need for even more producers and has, therefore, rcently initiated an associate producer program. Under his direction, talented young people in the music industry are afforded the opportunity to receive training in not only studio techniques, but also have a free hand in finding, developing and signing new artists. The two new associate producers who have just been added by Gold and Marc Foreman and George Daley.

This associate producer program is only one of the ways that Columbia initiates new ways to grow. Columbia, adjusting to its rapid growth, has just completed the remodeling of its studios in Los Angeles. This is already the second time that this kind of expansion was necessary. Although they now have seven studios, Columbia still has to eliminate outside use of studio time in order to take care of their own artists.

So, if Columbia's growth in Los Angeles is any indication, this new move into San Francisco will soon make Columbia the leader there also.

Elliot to Europe

Wizdom's Dan Elliot, whose new "Dance of Life" elpee is just out, is off to Europe for three months to do promotion.

He'll spend time in England, France, Germany, Spain and Morocco. Album includes his recent single, "The Rainbow Sign."

CBS Inks Abbott Deal



Versatile Donna Theodore: 'It's Singing First Now'

NEW YORK—George Scheck, who managed Connie Francis for so long, can sure pick 'em: his new protégée, Jubilee Records' Donna Theodore, is not only a singer but a looker.

Acts, too.

Raised in northern California in a non-show biz family, Donna told Record World last week that "although I've been singing and dancing since I was a child, there was a time when I was convinced I was an actress. Last year, for instance, I was living and studying dramatics in L.A. and took very few singing jobs.

"Then I came to New York and auditioned for the Broadway musical 'La Strada,' in the second feminine lead. I was with the show for four weeks of rehearsal, but the part just wasn't working, and I left. You can't just stick a part in a musical to get a couple of songs sung. Later on, they took the whole role out and that's how it opened on Broadway. The show failed."

"I had heard all about the competition and back-stabbing that was supposed to exist on Broadway," she continued, "but when I left the show I got calls from so many people in the company telling me not to be discouraged, that I had talent and to stay on in New York. Which I did."

She added, however, that she had never really wanted to be an actress. "That was something I got hooked on at dramatic school. After 'La Strada' I decided to concentrate on my singing. Now, it's singing before anything else, and that's how it's going to stay. I'm a good actress, especially in comedy. But I'm not an Anne Bancroft, not a great actress, and for me, to be good is really to be mediocre. I won't be that. I want to play in my ball park. I'm not going to walk on a stage or set where I feel the other people are superior to me. That doesn't happen when I sing. So now it's singing first."

Prefers Films, TV

She would prefer film and TV work to the theater, as a matter of fact. "I did 'Pajama Game' in stock not long ago with John Raitt, and the stage wasn't nearly as fulfilling an experience as I had expected."

Right now, Donna — whose latest single record is "Why Can't I Touch You?" — is get-

ting plenty of fulfillment in clubs. She plays the El San Juan in Puerto Rico starting July 15, the Copa Habana in Oklahoma City early in August for two weeks and then goes directly into New York's Copa as headliner. The best thing that's happened to her to date, though, is going with manager George Scheck, she avers. "He not only knows his business, but is a dedicated man."

Part I: Electrola's Jung On German Record Scene

By PAUL SIEGEL

BERLIN — Wilfried Jung, Managing Director of Germany's powerhouse giant record company, Electrola, linked with the world-wide and world-wise EMI organization, herewith gives us an inside view of his organization.

Siegel: How do you see the future of the German market for tape?

Jung: The German market continues to offer excellent chances to records, musicasettes and-in the near futurecartridges as well. Sales are still somewhat behind other countries, and in this we see Electrola's chance to increase sales of all types of repertoire in the future as well. I am quite sure that certain alterations and improvements can be realized in the marketing section as well. In this regard we have a fine example each in the American and English markets. Rack jobbing will go on to be developed in this market just as the "music for pleasure" operations are to be introduced in the continental countries. It is my firm belief that the record business will receive new impetus with each new activity.

Siegel: How many record artists do you have under contract currently, and how you feel about unknown, new artists for your company?

Jung: I am sorry but I cannot say how many artists we have under contract for the time being—I only know that we still do not have enough artists—or rather, not enough "top" artists. Thus we are steadily trying hard to contract new artists, and last but not least, to continue our policy of backing young talents, like Heino, Christian Anders, Erik Silvester, Howard Carpendale and Ray Miller.

Siegel: What is your aim at Electrola?

Jung: Up to now, Electrola has been a classical company. The only thing that we at Electrola really want is to become the top record organization in Germany, just as our parent company, EMI, Ltd., is worldwide. It is in this aim that I see our top task and challenge.

Siegel: What are the chances of American, French and other foreign artists singing in German to sell records in the German market?

Jung: I feel this question is very difficult to answer. There are some foreign artists very successful recording in German -such as Adamo, Gilbert Becaud from France and Graham Bonney or Cliff Richard from England. I will not quote the negative examples, but I feel everything depends on whether the German record consumer is interested in the words of a song or merely in the music. In the case of "Delilah," the German public wanted to know what the lyric had to tell them; but in the case of "Honey," nobody here was interested. On the other hand, any foreign artists recording in German should at least know what he is singing; that is to say, he ought to have a minimum command of German, and not phonetically just voice the lyric, The story must be sincere when interpreted.

Siegel: How do you feel about the radio airplay of records situation which currently exists in Germany?

Jung: We in Germany are very happy to have an excellent network of broadcasting stations, and if we include Radio Luxembourg, AFN, (USA Armed Forces Radio) and BFBS (British Forces Broadcasting), all of which are heard in Germany, I think we have rather ideal airplay conditions. The only point which still leaves some recording companies hopeful is to find the right balance between international recordings. I feel these items ought to be left to AFN and BFBS. This would be a

way to help German pop music find its way out of its "splendid isolation."

Siegel: Do you feel there is an overflow of single releases? What advice do you have for the American record industry to make money here with records they produce?

'Still a Lot of Rubbish Produced'

Jung: No, I do not think there is an overflow. Unfortunately, there is still a lot of rubbish produced which often handicaps the promotion and development of more promising record songs. This applies above all to the big companies, as they are in a financial and organizational position to launch any record item with full promotional force. I would also recommend American label managers not request German partners take over any recording of theirs which was released on the U.S. market. It would be wiser to concentrate on recordings which have a good chance on the local Euronean market

Fifty-six songs are participating this year. Twenty-four are chosen as finalists by two kinds of jury. One jury is formed by the Promotion Service of RAI and the other by the public who can send their votes on special cards offered by Rai. The votes of the public do not really influence the choice of the 24 songs because the votes of RAI are more important. In fact, the votes of the public have only a value of 10% against the 90% of the votes of the Promotion Service of RAI.

In response to the various stories concerning the status of the Beatles and the Beatles' Apple group of companies, Klein referred to the following statement issued last month by Apple Corps, Ltd.: "Apple Corps, Ltd., is a majority partner in the Beatles and Co. Partnership consisting of the individual Beatles and Apple Corps Ltd. Under the Partnership Agreement entered into on 19th April 1967, which is for a period of 10 years, the Partnership, except as to the areas of cinematograph, film and songwriting and composing (which were the subjects of other Agreements) is entitled to services of the Beatles as a Group of performers under the name 'The Beatles' throughout the world in respect to all branches of the entertainment industry, and that any individual Beatle cannot offer his services, ap-

pear alone, or with any other person in any branch of the entertainment in dustry as to which the Partnership has such rights, without consent of Apple Corps Ltd. and other Beatles. It is re-iterated that no person, firm or corporation can act or negotiate for the Beatles or for the Apple group of Companies other than ABKCO Industries, Inc., 1700 Broadway, New York City."

Legal actions were recently commenced by Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, Inc. (MGM), against the company and various of its subsidiaries and Allen Klein alleging claims aggregating approximately \$2,200,000. It is the opinion of management that the claims asserted by MGM will be successfully defended and that the final resolution of these claims will not adversely affect the company's consolidated financial position.

As Quincy Jones remarks in his liner notes, "Ray got to groovin' so good on 'Booty-Butt' that he couldn't resist sneakin' in a little soulful hum, and that got so good he had to go back and over dub it a few times more. And if you think Ray Charles sounds good by himself, just imagine four of him singing together.'

The flute seems more than the pipes of Pan when Jeremy Steig toots it. Probably because there is something free and close to nature about his sounds. He helped out with the smithing of the tunes and obviously enjoyed the work.

COME ON DOWN!

EDDIE HARRIS-Atlantic SD 1554.

Eddie has managed to move into the jazz-rock age, something many jazz musicians are doing awkwardly, with fluidity and finesse. He maintains his musical integrity and yet keeps right up to the minute. All new pieces-six of them.









Johnny Hodges Dead at 63

NEW YORK - Johnny Hodges, the trend-setting alto saxophonist, died here last week. He was 63.

Hodges, who spent most of his career as a soloist with Duke Ellington's band, finished his most recent album less than a month ago. It will be released shortly on Flying Dutchman.

Hodges, 10 times a winner of the Downbeat poll as best alto saxophonist, joined Ellington in 1928, and with the exception of a few years in the early '50s with his own group, he created endless memorable musical contributions for Ellington.

His most important teacher, when he was a youth, was Sidnev Rechet

Hodges is survived by his widow, Ethel (Cue) Hodges, and a son and daughter.

Last Hodges LP Coming

Flying Dutchman Records will bring out in two weeks the late Johnny Hodges' last album, recorded on March 17 and 19, titled "Three Shades of Blue," reveals Bob Thiele, label chief.

The orchestra was conducted by Oliver Nelson, who also did the arrangements. In addition to the instrumentals, the LP contains three vocals by Leon Thomas.

Peripatetic Pete

NASHVILLE - Pedal steel guitar wizard Pete Drake picked up his intercom and asked his secretary who was on the line.

"It's George Harrison on long distance."

"George who? Where's he calling from?"

"From London." "Who's he with?" "The Beatles, Pete." "Oh."

Pete had slipped by his Nashville office between sessions to sign payroll checks for his 14 employees, when George Harrison's transoceanic call came through. "He wanted me to play steel on his new album. He said he didn't want country stuff; he wanted the same kind of things I did on Dylan's album. He said he'd pay me for all the sessions I'd have to cancel and for all the ones I thought I'd miss. I'm going to have to wait a couple of weeks because my passport isn't in order," Drake told Record World.

Pete Drake moved to Nashville from Atlanta in 1959 where he had been working with a country-flavored group consisting of Roger Miller on fiddle, Joe South on lead guitar, Jerry Reed on rhythm guitar, Jack Green on drums and occasionally Doug Kershaw on

Pete's first years in Nashville were sent on the road with Wilma Lee and Stoney Cooper, Don Gibson and Marty Robbins. Pete credits Roy Drusky and guitarist Hank Garland for helping him break the ice as a session musician. After working his first session, Pete was hired for 24 more during his first month as a session steel picker. For the last eight years, Drake says he has averaged 15 sessions a week and most as leader.

Active Business Ventures

Not only does he do studio work for others, but Drake has some very active business ventures he oversees like his own country - orientated Stop Records; Window Publishing Co.; a group of artists he produces independently for other labels and his own traveling band which covers the southeast via bus on weekends playing personal appearances. Pete says he keeps working the road because his band's bus is the only place he can get some serious sleeping done. "And it's my only contact with audiences. You can't know what's happening if you're in the studio all the time."

Drake owns four "Sho-Bud" pedal steel guitars, and although his instrument and his background are country, Pete has worked sessions with Elvis Presley, Bob Dylan, Joan Baez, Mother Earth, the McCoys, the Monkees, Perry Como and Ian & Sylvia.

"My biggest thrill," Pete said as he flipped through Record World's country charts, "was to look at last week's charts. I played on 59 of the week's top 75 records."

Pepper told Record World that the promotion was conceived to get more country product into retail stores.





Warren, provided Denny with the information that the Library has acquired 6,271 items which include records, tapes, sheet music, manuscripts and similar

The Library is continuing to work toward a more comprehensive taping of the greats in Country Music.

Most of the major record companies have begun to deposit records in the Library. Since space has become available all companies have been asked to send all country releases to the depository. The last country record companies were requested to send their records last month.

Tapes of the Southern Baptist radio show "Country Crossroads" are regularly received. The Air Force sends copies of their country music recruiting radio shows to add to their donated file copies already in the Library.

Dr. Warren reports that there is continuous work in transcribing the many 78 rpm disks.






