New Releases to Watch is calculated by counting all indicated New Additions and weighing them according to heavy or moderate play. All calculations are first done regionally then combined to form the national totals. national totals.

NEW RELEASES

Below is a catalogue of new releases. They are divided into categories designed to give you an idea of their relative musical worth. These first impressions are not meant to relate in anyway to past, present or future sales, nor should they be taken as the word of God.

SPECIAL MENTION ALBUMS
(These recordings which, in our opinion, deserve special mention because they come closest to perfecting their musical genre regardless of progressive radio application.)

Terry Garthwaite/TERRY/Arista AL 4055 (David Rubinson is a master of hot rhythm production - Herbie Hancock, Tower of Power - and of stylized jazz - The Pointers. Terry bene-fits from his experience while applying her own considerable

experience while applying her own considerable talents. Solid material, chosen and original, guarantees it.)

Oregon/IN CONCERT/Vanguard VSD-79358 (Masters of a lovely East/West union, Oregon music weaves a spell. Though sophisticated this live recording is not as self-consciously esoteric as their studio Lps have tended to be. Outstanding is a good description) is a good description.)

STRONGLY MERITORIOUS
(The following Lps are Merit Albums which we feel have an extra edge.)

Jimi Hendrix/MIDNIGHT LIGHTNING/Reprise MS 2229
(Jimi might be horrified by the legacy of half developed screaming guitars which followed him. One forgets just how articulate Hendrix was in his immovations both instrumentally and vocally. Beautifully produced to simulate a living artist.)

Kinks/SCHOOLBOYS IN DISGRACE/RCA LPL1-5102

(This may be the cleanest production done by these naughty rock & roll boys. Davies again finds a theme which harmonizes perfectly with the band's image. A few great songs elevate an already laudable effort.)

Kraftwerk/RADIO-ACTIVITY/Capitol ST-11457 (Kraftwerk harnesses electronic music bringing it in from outer space. Theirs is a major musical contribution functioning as a bridge to and from the avant garde.)

Kris Kristofferson/WHO'S TO BLESS.../Monument PZ 33379 (Kris hasn't recorded a bad song in three full albums. His melodies are always organically rounded and his lyrics speak meaningfully. He treats his audience with respect for their intelligence.)

Michael Murphey/SWANS AGAINST THE SUN/Epic PE 33351 (Going into the studio with all of the right people and a batch of solid Murphey songs is an insurance policy against failure. The result is evenly distributed quality music throughout.)

Ann Peebles/TELLIN' IT/Hi SHL 32091 (Willie Mitchell's fundamental rock and rock instincts may be narrowly drawn but, they provide the perfect foundation for at least two artists - Al Green and Ann Peebles. Organic songs make Ann's performance and Willie's production worthwhile.)

STRONGLY MERITORIOUS CONTINUED

Roxy Music/SIREN/Atco SD 36-127 (The Roxy Music sound is still locked in by the rhythm and Bryan's vocal quality but, they are not hitting it as hard as before. After five Lps they don't have to be as obvious. Ferry's writing remains ulti-

don't have to be as obvious. Ferry's writing remains ultimately musical.)

Steeleye Span/ALL AROUND MY HAT/Chrysalis CHR 1091
(A powerful rhythm track drives Steeleye's traditionizing. Their songs continue to be uniformly strong as is their performance. They play it carefully but, not safely.)

Lenny White/VENUSIAN SUMMER/Nemperor NE 435
(One of the best orchestrated spin-off trips in memory yields another album by a member of Return to Forever. After a scary first track in which Lenny puts himself in that melodiless percussion trap his Lp settles into a smooth groove. In fact, parts of side one reach superior.)

MERIT ALBUMS

(Our recommendations for serious progressive radio consideration, recognizing that not all Merit Albums are suitable for all stations.)

Bobby Bare/COWBOYS & DADDYS/RCA APL1-1222 (Bobby Bare is yet another product of the Texas country explosion. His writing is important - "Up Against the Wall Redneck Mother." And his melodies are round. He is a man of the

Mother." And his melodies are round. He is a man of the earth and his uncredited back-up band plays basic music.)

Eric Carmen/Arista AL 4057 (Projected by a hot Jimmy Ienner production Eric recapitulates his musical roots. A firm sense of melody keeps his music listenable even if the strings on side one overstate the point.)

Crack The Sky/Lifesong LS 6000 (These Americans have internalized the weighty school of English rock so completely that both its good and bad qualities are included. John Palumbo's writing tends to be a series of joined melody fragments - a negative, while Terence Minogue's arranging is amazingly complex and detailed - a positive. Their presentation is extraordinary. Dense.)

Dixie Dregs/The Great Spectacular (The Dixie Dregs have heard and absorbed some rock and roll - that is self-evident. But, these Dregs have also listened to the fusionists. With fine Steve Morse melodies and a piano augmented quartet -

fine Steve Morse melodies and a piano augmented quartet drums, bass, guitar and violin - they need only some added

Dr. John/HOLLYWOOD BE THY NAME/United Artists

UA-LA 522-G (A raw, raunchy, mostly live recording to match a raw, raunchy, mostly live artist. Dr. John, with dangling roots exposed, will always be important because he is essence, not aftershock. Not the best recording quality possible.)

MERIT ALBUMS CONTINUED

Dave Edmunds/SUBTLE AS A FLYING MALLET/RCA LPL1-5003 (Steeped in old rock and roll - maybe trapped by it - Dave Edmunds remains relatively undiscovered as a talent. That talent is considerable as this Roy Wood-ish - did the whole thing himself - album atests.)

Sonny Fortune/AWAKENING/A&M SP-704 (As A&M moves into izzz it is interesting to note the place on the backen to

into jazz it is interesting to note the place on the be-bop to avant garde continuum upon which their music is set. Sonny's album, as with others, is at the threshold of the avant garde but, not across that invisible line. Ed Michel's clean production is not an afternoon wonder.)
Gabriel/THIS STAR ON EVERY HEEL/ABC ABCD 885

(As other bands seem to struggle to develop substantial material a group like Gabriel is gifted with abundance. Their easy flowing presentation is not very individualistic.)

Carlos Garnett/LET THIS MELODY RING ON/Muse MR 5079

(In general, jazz players who turn to writing songs have difficulty in integrating lyric and melody. Carlos' convincing songwriting successes end each side. His instrumental successes start each side. The middles soften.)

Hello People/BRICKS/ABC ABCD-882 (The best collection of songs ever assembled in one Hello People album and tasteful Todd Rundgren production make a solid recording. A few degrees of individual musical personality are missing.)

Dan Hill/20th Century T-500 (Matthew McCauley's arranging hurts Dan Hill's album. He used sweeteners in place of creative arranging and hardly varies the pace which tends to make the Lp play longer than it is. However, song for song Dan is a writer and singer of note. He overcomes. Side two is less affected.)

Ray Wylie Hubbard/THE COWBOY TWINKIES/Reprise MS 2231 (Hubbard's album is much less country than implied. That is due to the fairly choppy rhythm track which tends to make it funky instead of country smooth. A good start.)

The Hudson Bros. /BA-FA/Rocket PIG-2169 (This is the Hudson Bros. recording with which they should have started. The last few years have been a waist of time. Bernie Taupin's production doesn't attempt to counter their derivitiveness but, he gives them some needed athletic support. Place them in a class with the Bee Gees.)

Kayak/ROYAL BED BOUNCER/Janus JXS 7023 (The insistent Kayak rockin' will appeal to some while their melodious, guitar-wrapped tunes will draw others. Either way they satisfy.)

Danny Kirwan/SECOND CHAPTER/DJM DJLPS-454

(Previously reviewed as an import. Simple but, infectous tunes make Danny likeable from the start. Except for a couple of overly sweetened tracks the Lp spins natural en-

joyment.)
Eric Kloss/BODIES' WARMTH/Muse MR 5077 (Kloss records with Barry Miles and Silverlight, thus moving his recording career out of stagnation. He had earlier shown potential which has been unrealized in recent work. The major difference is the added intensity given his ideas by these players. Growth.)

Michael Nesmith/THE PRISON/Pacific Arts PAC-101 (An awesome graphic package combines a beautifully done book and an album both by Mike. The album is musically solid in that characteristic Neamith quietude. His songs come from inside. We would quarrel with a mix which is too subtle, not taking full advantage of potential accentuations.

too subtle, not taking full advantage of potential accentuations. The package suggests larger programming possibilities for those who have the time.)

Rufus featuring Chaka Khan/ABC ABCD 909 (Funky rhythm and a pretty lady are not a substitute for songs. The opening tracks of side one prove that as they strain audibly. Things pick up near the end spreading into a good second side.)

Rick Ruskin/MICROPHONE FEVER/Takoma C-1044 (All that is required to put over genuinely good material is a basic approach to both arranging and production. Fancy stuff simply isn't necessary. That fundamental truth becomes a proven reality with this Rick Ruskin album. More with less.)

Patti Smith/HORSES/Arista AL 4066 (Partly due to her character exuding vocal style Patti generates unusual intensity. Though she doesn't possess a great voice it is a combination of that style, crowded lyric lines and rhythm which does it. Patti ain't easy but, she is a new sound to contemplate.) contemplate.)

Stevens/A&M (It doesn't sound as though Paul Samwell-Smith or Jerry Conway were near any of the sessions which contribute to the lack of normal Cat Stevens snapiness. His

tunes are nicely smooth, less punchy.)

Styx/EQUINOX/A&M SP-4559 (Some production elbow room must be a contributing factor in Styx development. New sophistication helps to deliver their exhuberance. Their ferocious rock and roll might now carry beyond the Midwest.)

Supertramp/CRISIS? WHAT CRISIS?/A&M SP 4560

Supertramp/CRISIS? WHAT CRISIS?/A&M SP 4560
(Production and performance exactness is synonymous with Supertramp. Their songs are good but, not on a level with the mechanics. "Easy Does It" is the ideal melodically.)
Trace/BIRDS/Sire SASD-7514 (Wisely Rick van der Linden doesn't get too snotty about his classicism. Trace is therefore free to swing the music rather than plod through it as the pompous school prefers. Side two is easier.)
Pete Wingfield/BREAKFAST SPECIAL/Island ILPS 9333
(White R&B increasingly drifts across the sea. Pete tries several different styles, all are done with studied exactness. When the material is right, he is. "Eighteen With A Bullet" sounds like a Robert Klein improvisation.)
Neil Young with Crazy Horse/ZUMA/Reprise MS 2242
(Neil sings with his heart more than with his throat, he has to. Still, his sound is distinctive enough that several bands are making a living by imitating it. He is best when vocally supported.)

SATISFACTORY ALBUMS
(Albums of acceptable quality which, of themselves, require only secondary progressive radio consideration.)

City Lights/SILENT DANCING/Sire SASD-7512 (Limp play all around lets several good songs escape unimpressively.

It's unfortunate because City Lights needs only to be whipped into shape. Something distinctive has to be built into their

sound.)
Rory Gallagher/AGAINST THE GRAIN/Chrysalis CHR 1098
(Rory's singing always goes against the grain. But, on this album there are pockets of tasteful playing and a few good tunes. The bass frequently becomes inarticulately boomy.)
Street Corner Symphony/HARMONY GRITS/Bang BLP-406
(A poor man's Persuasions. Pre-production conceptual problems cause an album which works to every possible R&B school satisfying none. Their presentation is solid in each genre, so it is the missing focus which clouds the impression.)

FRINGE ALBUMS

(Good albums which are not progressive, yet hold some interest for progressive audiences.)

The Ruby Braff - George Barnes Quartet/PLAYS GERSHWIN/
Concord Jazz CJ-5 (Pleasant but, innocuous music which
demonstrates again the axium which says that yesterday's
avant garde is today's elevator music. Concord Jazz, Box
845, Concord, Calif. 94522.)

CONCEPTS

Re-thinking Live Radio Concerts

After several years of doing live radio concerts it is time to re-think their effectiveness. As a program seem to have lost some of their romance. As a programming element they

Two reasons for this feeling present themselves. First, is the proliferation of radio concerts - too much of a good thing - which diminishes their specialness particularly as the level of acts used dips into the second level. Resisting record company pressure to use new or second line acts has become essential. When a station presents a live radio concert it should be an event. A station sacrifices credibility everytime its audience falsely into thinking an event will take it hypes its audience falsely into thinking an event will take

Exceptions should be made for less established artists about whom it is reasonably certain the larger audience will respond.

They are getting an hour of air time. Obvious examples would be getting Springsteen on-the-air on the West coast and The Tubes in the East. In both cases you could be reasonably programming idea what too many hit assured that activity would follow the performance. Yet world Radio history Momentary glories fade fast. Exceptions should be made for less established artists about

another exception might be a prestigious artist who isn't a giant like Leonard Cohen.

A second problem with live radio concerts is the liveness itself which too often makes for programming sloppiness. How many live concerts have been promoted to begin at 8:30 p. m. which didn't get on-the-air until 9:00 p. m.? How many concerts start with a poor mix which doesn't get resolved for several songs? As these things - and a myriad of other problems - occur the station loses more and more control of its air sound.

Tape of course is the answer because it offers that control. After a solid artist agrees to do a radio concert, taping it for replay the same night at an hour which the station sets leaves time for the miscues while enabling your promotion of the event to work. And it captures that sought after liveness.

Over doing a good thing or slopping it up will do to a strong programming idea what too many hit singles can do to an

Now, a few (?) words about KVAN. First, we'd like to thank G. M. for finally recognizing that KVAN is worthy of reporting more than the 25 records allowed to an Associate Contributor. For several years now, we've been reading Walrus and feeling frustrated by playlists from unlimited contributors who call themselves "progressive" and saying "Shit, man, compared to KVAN these lists look like Top-40." We're not trying to put anyone down, just making the point that this space is important to us, it's well-deserved, and long overdue.

Reviewer's Reaction: Such a concert is a rare experience for the reviewer. Here is a band that is certain to be nationally known within a reasonably finite number of months, yet at this point in time it is still possible to see them in comfortable, low-budget ("local") circumstances.

This kind of show makes a great memory to recall at some future date, which creates a feeling not unlike that felt while listening to the obscure early album of a now popular group. It is always exhilarating to hear truly original music, and to see a fledgling so close to the frontier; this kind of material reassures us that the term "progressive" is still deserved. Substantively, Happy the Man's music is difficult to describe, short of relating it to its most obvious Anglo roots, such as Hatfield & The North, Genesis, Gong, and the like. But more stimulating is their striking originality, highlighted by a truly massive percussion array and intense instrumental virtuosity. Audience Reaction:

The D.C. area got its first taste of genuine live reggae music when Jimmy Cliff came to G.W.U.'s Lisner Auditorium (Bob Marley & The Wailers had been scheduled to appear in D.C. twice, but had to cancel both times). The opening act was Garland Jeffreys, whose songs proved to be a little too introspective for some of the audience. Garland challenged the rowdies with good music, dry wit, and excellent backing from his guitarist Alan Freedman, which eventually won over most of the audience. Then came the Jimmy Cliff Experience, Jimmy's back-up band. They warmed the crowd up with a couple of numbers, including "Johnny Too Bad" featuring drummer Joe Higgs on the vocals. Next, Jimmy was introduced and swung into "Fundamental Reggae." From that point on, in spite of a communication problem, the audience was up clapping, dancing and singing along. The band was extremely tight and Jimmy moved and sang with the professional authority of a true R & B master, a la Otis Redding, Wilson Pickett or James Brown. At the same time Jimmy's manner retained enough innocence and sincerity to reach those in the crowd that don't respond to a commercially slick production. Overall, it was one of the best concerts to hit D.C. in a long while.
