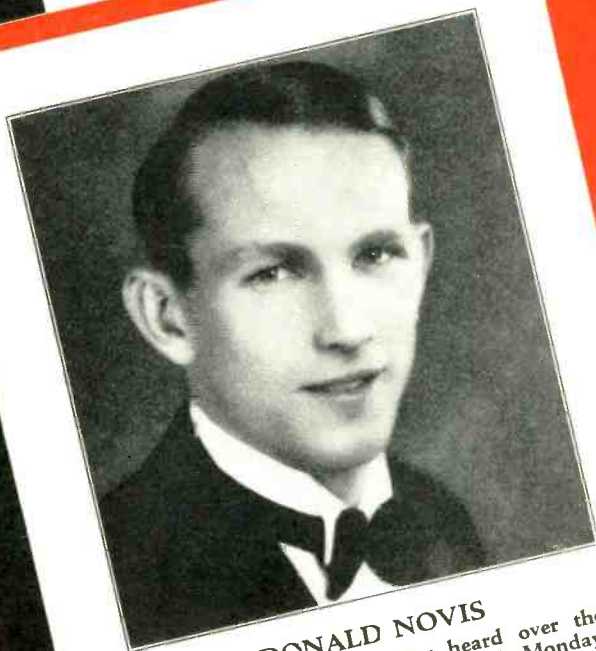

NO RADIO LEGISLATION THIS SESSION

WITH the exception of legislation merging the radio division of the Department of Commerce with the Federal Radio Commission, the session of Congress now drawing to a close has been devoid of radio law, although at its beginning it was anticipated that a number of broadcasting problems would be taken up for consideration.

Depression, with its attendant ills in the way of Federal economy, reduction of departmental appropriations, increased taxes, etc., has so fully occupied the time of Congress that it has been impossible to secure any action on the many bills dealing with radio which have been introduced.

The amalgamation of the radio division with the commission, given the approval of the Department of Commerce, has been sought for several years, and is purely a technical change, for the division now devotes most of its time to work for the commission.

In view of the fact that the next session of Congress, opening in December, will expire automatically on March 4, next, there is little probability of any changes in existing law before 1934.

A number of measures were introduced early in the session for amendment of the radio law with a view to straightening out some of the difficulties which have arisen

under the existing act, chiefly with respect to procedure of the radio commission. Other bills to amend the law provided for the setting aside of 15 per cent of all facilities for the use of educational agencies and institutions or called for a more equitable distribution among the states of broadcasting facilities.

Legislation was also introduced providing for the compulsory licensing of unused patents, so that inventions which might revolutionize the industry could not be suppressed for the financial benefit of their owners, and to authorize the President to keep confidential the details of radio and other patents of military value.

Other bills introduced called upon the radio commission to take action to protect free speech over the air, for an investigation into the use of radio facilities for commercial advertising and education, prohibiting the use of patents for monopolistic purposes, and prohibiting commercial radio advertising on Sunday.

With the exception of bills revising the procedure of the radio commission and dealing with the patent situation, none of the measures introduced during the session were of great importance, and few of them would have received serious consideration even if there had been time for the enactment of radio legislation.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Musical programs originating in the studios of KHQ, Spokane, are under the direction of Ralph Bovee. Mr. Bovee is a Minnesotan, but his musical career has taken him away from his home state most of the time. In 1918, he served as leader of the Hippodrome Theatre orchestra in Spokane. During the past ten years Mr. Bovee has been in and near New York City as featured violinist and conductor of orchestras in Loew, Fox and RKO Theatres.

• • • Another of filmland's notables has joined the ranks of KNX's radio performers. This time it is beautiful Myrna Kennedy, popular motion picture actress. Born in Chicago, her parents brought her to California when she was a girl. When still a youngster, she felt the urge to go on the stage and become an actress. Several years later she realized this ambition, trouping all over the country on the Orpheum and Pantages circuits. Then one day the hope which every ambitious actress entertains was realized. Her big chance came. Charlie Chaplin, then a controlling figure in pictures, saw her and wanted her for his picture, "The Circus." Following her debut in pictures with Chaplin, she was signed by Universal. She never got the chance in pictures to do the things she wanted to do. Always cast in straight rôles, she was never given the opportunity to play dramatic parts. It is in radio that she expects to fulfill this great desire. Miss Kennedy is appearing with Lew Cody in a skit called "The Adventures of Anthony," heard over KNX every night except Sunday.

• • • B. F. Schlesinger and Sons of Oakland, California, one of the leading department stores of the East Bay cities, recently placed an order for over seventy radio programs. Frank Wright and associates of Oakland were the agents. This should be good news to the broadcasters who have been trying to convince department stores of the value of radio advertising.

• • • Harvey Hays, beloved "Old Timer" of Empire Builder fame, known to thousands of radio fans from coast to coast,

is confined to the Illinois Masonic Hospital in Chicago for observation and treatment, following his collapse in the Chicago NBC studios just before he went on the air for a program Saturday, May 28. Hays was stricken just before he went on the air in the Saturday Matinee, a program heard in the West over the NBC-KPO network. His place was taken by C. L. Menser. Hays has been in ill health for some time.

• • • Ted White, NBC tenor, recently was presented with a beautiful Persian cat which he promptly named Mehitabel, for Don Marquis' famous cat.

• • • Eleanor Allen, KFRC's staff organist, was one of the East's most prominent theatre organists before coming to the Don Lee San Francisco station. For more than four years she was organ soloist at Loew's State Theatre in New York City, at that time one of the world's largest motion picture palaces.

• • • Sylvia Froos' mother explained after one of her daughter's broadcasts how the 17-year-old star got her early start on the vaudeville stage. Just ten years ago, Sylvia was picked out of three hundred fellow pupils to represent her school at a song pageant. One of Mrs. Froos' friends heard the performance and suggested taking her to Irving Berlin's office. The song writer immediately got her placed in a vaudeville act with some other children. After two weeks her work was so outstanding that she was given an act by herself.

• • • One of the most auspicious debuts recently over KFI was that of Rodolfo Hoyos, Mexican baritone. Hoyos, whose career in opera and concert is well known in Europe and South America as well as Los Angeles.

• • • Lou Raderman, who has been first violinist for Nat Shilkret for twelve years and is now serving in that capacity in the "Music that Satisfies" orchestra, started playing the violin when one of his father's friends happened to leave his instrument at

his house. Lou made such headway without any instruction that he was soon encouraged to decide upon music as a career. During a vacation several years ago he was in London and was asked to organize an orchestra. With this unit he was the first American conductor to broadcast over an English station.

• • • Virginia Arnold, WABC staff pianist, has been inundated with requests for information about the "play piano" heard in her solo broadcasts. The instrument, she reveals, is a celeste, a small keyboard instrument with the hammer action of the piano, but with steel strips over resonance boxes instead of strings. She places the celeste at right angles to the grand piano, playing one with her right hand and the other with her left.

• • • Vaughn de Leath reveals that, in addition to her singing and song writing ability, she is a poetess. She is so timid about her poetic work, however, that she has had her poems bound privately and refuses to show them. When but 13 years old, she wrote her first piece of poetry, a patriotic piece entitled "Old Glory."

• • • George Putnam, husband of Amelia Earhart, was a frequent visitor at the Columbia building during the first two days after his wife's successful flight to Europe. He telephoned her from the studios after she had landed at Londonderry and then broadcast a summary of their talk. He was probably the most attentive listener when, the next day, she talked over Columbia from London.

• • • A unique custom obtains in the household of Dr. Laurance L. Cross, NBC speaker. Each of his children is permitted to appear in the program he pilots—Crosscuts from the Log o' the Day—on his or her birthday. Little Barbara Cross celebrated her tenth birthday in this manner not long ago, and her younger brother, Gilbert, will have his birthday on the air shortly.

• • • Recently several musicians were discussing drummers they had known and what had become of them. Announcer David Ross, passing by, suggested over his shoulder: "They all go back to the sticks, of course."

• • • Although Knute Rockne tried to discourage Walter O'Keefe, new pilot of the Lucky Strike Magic Carpet, from going on the stage—and almost succeeded—O'Keefe got his big chance to write lyrics that eventually landed him in the theatre as a result of infantile paralysis. While in bed he wrote several songs that led to a rôle behind the footlights. He is now being heard over NBC networks from New York on the Lucky Strike Hour.

• • • Though Bob and Jimmy Palmer, KTM's Utah Trail Boys, wrote "The Utah Trail," their best known tune, they have composed nearly 200 songs. These include "Pals," "From the Heart of the West to You," "Where the Golden Poppies Grow," "Cross the Great Divide," and others.

• • • C. B. Juneau, KTM production manager, spends summer week ends at the yacht club; Gladys Johnson, 'cellist, in her penthouse apartment; Helen Bennett, violinist, in her backyard; Bartley Sims, organist, on the street car; Edmund Lytton, chief announcer, in the mountains, and Dave Carlyle, tenor, visiting the girl friend's parents.

• • • William Hard, NBC political observer and reporter, stated on his recent return from Geneva that European statesmen were astounded when told that it was not necessary for them to submit their speeches in advance of trans-Atlantic broadcasts. "They couldn't understand," Hard said, "how the NBC would let them speak freely when their own governments demanded a preview of all radio talks."

• • • According to a Chinese law which is still in effect, all radio equipment is rated as "munitions of war," according to Monroe Upton, "Lord Bilgewater" to NBC fans, who built Station ECO in Shanghai in 1923. He was obliged to smuggle most of the equipment into the city or else try to explain to the Chinese custom men that the tubes and wires he required were not instruments of battle, and not knowing Chinese, he chose the easiest way.

• • • Dorothy Chase, fashion commentator on the Charis program starring Ann Leaf and Ben Alley, began her radio career without premeditation. While working in the advertising department of a San Francisco

store, she was asked to write the libretto for an employees' musical comedy. The owners liked it so well that when the store purchased a local broadcasting station she was made program director.

• • • Graham Harris, who conducts those Mary and Bob, Sherlock Holmes and Mounted Police programs, saves violins as a hobby, but not as a collector of fine fiddles. When he can pick up a violin for less than \$5, he adds it to the collection in his den. To date the collection totals 108.

• • • Billy Page, NBC juvenile star, is a busy young man these days, who goes about with his pockets bulging with estimates, plans, Bunsen burners and other mysterious items. The cause of it all is the laboratory into which Billy is having his old playroom at home transformed. Chemistry is the newest hobby of the fourteen-year-old microphone actor, who is a high school student now, and who has been saving for a long while to finance the alteration in his room. When completed under Billy's watchful supervision, it will be thoroughly modern in its equipment, with running water, full equipment, cabinets and everything.

• • • Emilio Staine (pronounced Syeneh), the well known Neapolitan tenor, made his debut to Southern California radio audiences over KFI. Sig. Staine has sung opera in Europe and South America, and was for some time featured artist with NBC. His repertoire includes not only the standard operas, but a formidable list of little known popular songs of Italy.

• • • Madame Sylvia, NBC beauty authority, worked in Hollywood for two years at \$20 a week, and then gained fame and wealth over night when the film colony learned about her method of keeping them fit.

• • • B. A. Rolfe, whose ivory baton waves over the ether waves twice weekly, makes a pronouncement dissecting the value of a dance tune which may shock many radio listeners. For the rotund maestro has what he calls an iron-clad test for tunes he selects for his programs. And he only insists that melody as such rates 20 per cent! He grades a perfect tune for his program 25 per cent for rhythm and the remaining 55 per cent is

given either to memory or sparkle. An old tune that radio listeners will recall with fond memories hits the needed figure for memory. A new tune hits the same mark for what Rolfe calls "sparkle." And when a dance piece has the percentages Rolfe looks for, he considers programming it. Asked why melody was given such a low rating, Rolfe replied, "To be published at all a piece must have a certain amount of basic melody. Smart arrangers can then do what they like with the melody if it retains its rhythm and other necessary qualities."

• • • Richard LeGrand, of KYA, is something of a flyer, you know. As his most thrilling experience, he tells this one. It was while he was preparing for his first solo flight. A bolt sheared off the water pedestal of a cylinder and the resulting shower of hot, rusty water seeped behind Dick's goggles into his eyes. Unable to see, he signalled to his instructor to take the stick. Receiving what he assumed to be an answering signal, he supposed that the other had taken the controls. He decided to "follow through" however, and the ship made a perfect landing. When the ship failed to taxi back, the instructor turned to find Le Grand removing rust and water from his eyes. Le Grand thanked him for his prompt response to the distress signal, and was shocked to learn that his signal had not been interpreted correctly and that, though temporarily blinded, Dick had landed the plane himself. He says he still turns cold when he recalls the incident.

• • • Richard Gordon, who plays the role of Sherlock Holmes in the NBC broadcasts, is probably the first radio personality to earn the distinction of being proposed for the 1932 Roll of Honor of the Town Hall Club of New York. Gordon, being exceptionally modest, declined the honor of having his name added to the list of stage, literary, legal, and other professional personages.

• • • G. Donald Gray and Sydney Dixon hold the lead cup at KYA for fish stories. They stoutly stick to an unusual story of a fishing trip from which they returned with a duck and a hunting trip which netted a salmon trout. The pair claim they fished half a day without a bite, and just as they were about to draw in the line they snared a duck. Since game seemed more in their line, they

decided to devote the remainder of the day to hunting. Disregarding their fish lines for guns they tramped all afternoon looking for small game. Discouraged by continued lack of success, they finally turned back toward camp. As they crossed a low bridge, G. Donald spied a huge salmon trout, raised his gun and fired. He did not miss—the success of the hunting trip was saved.

• • • Though Andy Patridge, of the KTM orchestra, plays the tuba, 'cello and bass viol, he is focusing instruction for his five-year-old daughter on the violin.

• • • Those Mills brothers are now six when they travel in vaudeville with their motor caravan, but only four of them are Mills brothers. Bob Stevens, their Number One stooge and director, goes along and now they carry a piano player. The piano player's job is to run over new tunes as rapidly as they come off the press so that the Mills brothers can listen to them to determine if they want to learn them. There must be a unanimous vote that they learn a song or it gets the casual turn down, "not for us." At present they decide on one out of 300 songs as being adaptable for their type of vocalizing.

• • • Glen Goff, KYA organist, has taken the post of organist at Glide Memorial Church. He will also direct the choir. G. Donald Gray, KYA baritone, has been engaged as soloist.

• • • Harold Dana, NBC baritone, always surprises persons who meet him for the first time. Because he sings sea chanteys and vigorous old-time ballads with so much energy, listeners expect to see a bearded, oldish chap instead of the quiet, youthful-looking Dana of reality.

• • • Billy Small KYA violinist and musical director, went fishing and he has lived to regret it. Mishap followed him from the moment of his departure. Since childhood, Billy Says, he has had a faculty of putting his best foot forward—in the wrong place. This unhappy faculty led him into many difficulties. On two separate occasions during the day, Billy slipped from the log by which he was crossing the stream and fell in. Once he wandered too far from the rest of the party and was located only after

several hours of search. He returned from the trip with face scratched, clothes torn and—worst of all—no fish.

• • • Scouting for little-known or out of print musical compositions is part of his daily job to Russell McNeill, of NBC's Music Library, and he comes upon many a curious antique while doing so. He found one of the first printed examples of "Mary's Little Lamb" in an old book store not long ago . . . a quaint little child's book one hundred and fifty years old.

• • • Henry Starr's nightly game of "musical chairs" is one of KYA's choicest jokes. Henry is a tall man and an enthusiastic pianist—he moves about a good deal as he plays. And he prefers a chair to the piano bench. The result is that each night before his program, Henry carefully tries each chair in the studio so that he will select one that will not squeak while he broadcasts.

• • • Many people marvel when they learn that the Sisters of the Skillet put on their broadcasts without using any scripts. The reason the lefty comedians never use a script is that they can't keep the dog-goned thing on the piano if they wanted to. The first three important auditions they gave in their lives were almost ruined by the script dropping off the piano in the middle of the act, so they had to chatter ad lib. Now they never think of using a script.

• • • G. Donald Gray, KYA baritone and Sunshine Hour conductor, was born in Yorkshire, North England, and in true English form he maintains that steeplechasing and fox hunting are the most fascinating of sports. He followed the hounds when only a small boy—on a Shetland pony—and the call of the chase has always thrilled him.

• • • Harry Stanton, NBC baritone, was a vaudeville singer before he turned to radio, and he says he knows how fire-horses feel when they pass an engine-house, every time he goes by a stage-door without stopping.

• • • Anne Sutherland and T. Daniel Frawley, two NBC dramatic actors, are both natives of Washington, D. C. John White, NBC's Lonesome cowboy also is a native of the capital.



SILHOUETTES

NATHAN STEWART, NBC baritone, has been singing since he was twelve years old—in choirs, in world war encampments, on the open road, with a tramp as his partner in a duet, in opera, in concerts, and on the air.

Rich experience has colored the voice whose height and variety of style has so puzzled critics that they have called him a dramatic baritone, a basso, a dramatic tenor and a lyric baritone. Stewart doesn't care.

"I just sing," says the whimsical-eyed, ruddy-faced NBC star, and that's that.

Stewart was a boy soprano in a choir in Seattle, Washington, when he first attracted notice as a vocalist. He continued to sing throughout his high school years, and was just about to enter college when the world war broke out. He enlisted in aviation and went overseas with the Two Hundred and Fifty-Sixth Air Squadron. He flew for thirteen months—mostly above darkened London, at night, as a member of one of the defense units rallied to protect the city against air raids. Daytimes he sang in English training camps and hospitals for wounded soldiers.

When Stewart returned to Washington after the war, it was difficult to settle down to vocal studies again. Restless, he took to the road, and for almost a year tramped all over the West, meeting all the varied types of tramps and hoboes on their own plane. Around "jungle" fires at night

he sang, and while he did so gathered a unique collection of real hobo songs, many of them never written on paper, but produced as spontaneously as negro spirituals.

Then, his wanderlust satisfied, the NBC singer went home to Seattle and renewed his studies under Clifford W. Kantner, and David F. Davies, who taught him theory and harmony.

In a competition to choose principals for the Seattle Civic

Opera Company, Stewart won—so overwhelmingly that fellow contestants gave him an ovation. He sang throughout the Northwest, then turned to the East, where he coached with Walter Golde, in New York, and filled concert, opera and radio engagements. He appeared with Mabel Garrison in the American premiere of Handel's "Apollo and Daphne" in opera form; also with

Ricardo Martin, Lucy Gates and Ernest David.

Back in the West he entered the annual artists' contest in Hollywood and won, following which he appeared as guest artist in the Hollywood Bowl, with Molinari conducting. In the two years which followed, Stewart has been kept busy with concert engagements, and was still on tour when the National Broadcasting Company signed him as a member of its artist staff in San Francisco.

A PRETTY, gray-eyed girl of twenty-three who sings blue songs with all the abandon of collegiate youth, but collects etchings and writes poetry in her spare time—this is Mona Lowe, NBC contralto, featured on programs broadcast from NBC's San Francisco studios.

The daughter of two well known singers, Mona inherited the talents of both her parents and she was just seventeen years old when she sang over the radio for the first time. Born in Windsor, Canada, where her mother sang in concerts and her father wrote light operas, Mona grew up in Detroit. Later the family moved to Glendale, and there, at seventeen, Mona was singing with Loyce Whiteman over KFI, in a sister act.

When her family decided to send her back to Detroit to attend a boarding school there, it didn't interfere with the young lady's ambitions a

bit. Soon after her matriculation she was singing over a Detroit station, with permission from the head-mistress to do so "as long as she sang lady-like songs."

"I didn't even whisper the word "blues," reflects Mona, now. "But I had so much fun singing while the rest of the girls had to be in class that I didn't mind what I sang."

When she returned to California, she continued to appear before the microphone, and so characteristic was her vocal manner that when she was scheduled to sing under another name, audiences recognized her immediately. In spite of all the hours Mona put in at the studio, her classes didn't suffer, and she was graduated with scholastic honors. Shortly afterward, she wrote U. S. C.'s 1931 extravaganza "Shipwrecked" and assisted in its production, one of the few feminine alumnae ever asked to officiate thus.

Mona plays tennis, hockey and basket ball, and is an enthusiastic deep-sea fisherman. Her collection of etchings is a discriminating one, and she writes graceful verse as easily as well as popular songs.

ADHESIVE PONTOON, the colored character comedian who has been keeping Blue Monday Jamboree listeners holding their sides during the past several months is, believe it or not, none other than Arnold Maguire, veteran Pacific Coast broadcast artist.

Maguire first went on the air in 1923 when the number of broadcasting stations in California could be counted on two hands. And, strange as it may seem, he started his radio

career as a singer and not as a comedian. However, it wasn't long before Harrison Holliday decided that, as a singer, Arnold would make a good comedian.

During his early days as a singer, he composed such songs as "Mickey Darlin'," "Kingdom of Dreams" and "When the Story Man Whispers 'Good Night,'" all of which were published.

It was during one of his musical programs in the old KFRC studios in the Whitcomb Hotel that Holliday persuaded Maguire to forget his singing and go in seriously for comedy. The suggestion was followed and shortly afterwards the blackface team of "Lem and Lafe" made its bow to the radio audiences of the West. Those of you who remember the early days of the KPO Variety Hour and the Blue Monday Jamboree will recall this popular pair. The other member of the team was Tommy Monroe.

Shortly after came a season of vaudeville in which the boys toured the circuits as Monroe and Arnold, "The Del Monte Boys." It was a black and white act and enjoyed a great success. But the lure of the microphone eventually overshadowed the call of the footlights and the boys came back to their first love.

During his career as a broadcast artist Maguire has portrayed the characters of "Lafe" of "Lem and Lafe," KPO and KFRC; "Rummy" of "Rummy and Dummy," NBC; "Dicey" of "Ed and Dicey," KFRC Shell Happytime; and his present characterization of "Adhesive Pontoon." In addition to his other broadcasting duties he finds time to do straight announcing at KTAB and recordings for electrical transcriptions.

Maguire is 32 years old, 5 feet 9 inches tall, weighs 150 and has brown hair and eyes. In 1925 he married Evelyn Draper, who was then a specialty dancer with the Paul Ash Company at the Granada Theatre in San Francisco. They have one daughter, Susan Eloise.

for several months he packed his band off to Sacramento to play at the hotel bearing the capital city's name and then the Oakland Hotel patrons across the bay became acquainted with his music. In 1917 he joined the Navy. The war ended, he again played at the Oakland, moved to Sacramento later and went into the brokerage business (grain and beans) with music a side line. Finally he gave up orchestra work entirely, but in 1921 the firm employing him failed, so he studied arranging and composition, organized a five-piece combination and once more invaded Sacramento. He played at the Senator Hotel for a number of years, fulfilled an engagement at Lake Tahoe and opened at the Mark Hopkins, where he has been since 1927. There are fifteen men in his present aggregation, four of whom were members of the original band.

programs of such quality as to be worthy of mention in your magazine.

I do not wish to seem partial to Portland stations, but as the summer months approach, we listeners living here are forced to depend on local stations for our entertainment. You can see that your magazine is not of much value to us as a program guide, if only one Portland station is listed.

... RADIO NEWS ...

STUDIES which officials declare may affect the whole future of radio in America have been undertaken by engineers of the Federal Radio Commission, in cooperation with other interests, in the field of long-wave broadcasting.

The investigation was undertaken in order that the American delegation to the international radiotelegraph conference in Madrid this fall might have sufficient data to enable it to discuss intelligently the proposal which is to be offered by some of the European delegations to extend the long-wave broadcasting band from 160 to 285 kilocycles. This will be part of a suggestion to use the frequencies from 370 to 460 kilocycles to broadcasting, to which maritime and aviation interests in the United States and other countries will not agree, and to drop the present broadcasting band limit of 550 kilocycles to 540 kilocycles, to which there will be little objection.

The 160-285 kilocycle band is used in this country for point-to-point service by the War, Navy and Commerce Departments and for aviation radio beacons. If these frequencies are adopted for broadcasting it will, of course, be necessary to place those services on other channels.

The use of long waves gives a materially increased service area, but there is a much greater noise-to-signal ratio on these frequencies than in the regular broadcasting band, it is said. Further, it is declared, there is a possibility that in some parts of the United States long waves would be of little or no value in summer, although it is admitted that they might be used throughout the year in certain of the northern areas.

Up to the present time, little data has been available concerning the relative value of long and medium waves for broadcasting in this country, it is explained by officials of the radio commission. In order to secure this information an intensive study has been inaugurated, on the basis of which recommendations will be made concerning the use of long waves for broadcasting. The results of the study, it is said, will be of great importance to the broadcasting industry and may materially affect the whole future of radio.

AN ENTIRELY new scheme of broadcasting control, which would eliminate private operation and place all frequencies under control of art and civic organizations, has been suggested to Congress by the American Radio Audience League, a recently formed Chicago organization.

Apparently stimulated by the high rates charged advertisers by broadcasters in the large cities, the league proposes that licenses for the more important broadcasting channels should be held by "agencies of the audience, or trustees for the radio public" and by them be rented out "for whatever price they would bring."

These agencies, it is declared, "invested, by Federal license, with control of a city's valuable radio channels, and working closely with each other, could be fairly expected to devote their efforts to providing the public with plenty of broadcasts, conveniently laid out on the dial and on the clock" to fill all needs.

At the present time, the brief to Congress infers, "transmissionists," as the league terms broadcast licenses, are in the business of broadcasting for what they can make. On the other hand, although it is suggested that the proposed public ownership would result in reduced advertising rates, since there would be no profits and all income would be devoted to the operation of stations and employment of talent, it is pointed out that it would be possible for all "audience-agency licensees in the locality to pool and limit their commercially offered time so as to get maximum prices for it."

The main objective of the league, so far as can be gleaned from its intricate brief to Congress, is to control programs so that it would no longer be possible peremptorily to cut off a symphonic program to give place to a jazz or baseball broadcast, as, it is complained, now frequently happens.

Operation of the plan would be simple, it is explained, since the audience agencies given control of frequencies would have only to hire the use of the transmitters of the broadcasters whom they would eliminate—and pay for them "with funds to be obtained from channel rentals."

Why, Congress is asked, "should a broadcaster near New York City be enabled, by any Federal 'license,' to collect from advertisers, for his own profit, a price per hour up to thirteen times as high as is charged for transmission near a small city which is no less powerful and presumably no less costly?"

Why, the league questions, "must it continue to appear, irrespective of injury alike to listeners and to advertisers, that the channels of broadcast communication are merely a free hunting preserve for the radio transmission trade, wherein the possibilities of better and cheaper advertising coverage, as well as of a less interrupted listener service more intelligently disposed upon the home radio dial, must all continue to be sacrificed to the end of protecting a single favored industry from the consequences of its excess of productive capacity, while nearly all other industries have been suffering from the same affliction but without hope of Government bounties to relieve them?"

PRESENT methods of synchronizing two or more high-powered broadcasting stations on the same frequency to transmit the same program have not proved successful, and the Federal Radio Commission has called a halt to the experimental work which has been going on along this line until new ways of accomplishing synchronization are developed.

The commission's decision will confine experimental work in synchronization to low-powered stations, a number of which are attempting to work it out, but brings to an end the experimental linking of stations WTIC, Hartford, Conn., and WBAL, Baltimore, with WEAJ and WJZ, New York. The Hartford and Baltimore stations share the same frequency and had worked out with the New York stations a plan whereby the station which was "off the air" would adopt the same frequency and rebroadcast the program of one of the New York stations, thus giving Hartford and Baltimore full-time operation.

Following several months' experimental operation under this plan, the commission found, synchronization continues to result in impairment and reduction of a substantial portion of the good broadcasting service otherwise received in densely populated areas surrounding the synchronizing stations.

"Synchronous operation of broadcast stations is in a preliminary stage," the commission held, "and it appears that experiments seeking its successful conclusion could be conducted with advantage over lower-powered stations with more flexible installations and so located as to result in a minimum of inconvenience to radio listeners."

The commission's action was taken despite the plea of the stations for an opportunity to install new equipment which it was felt would eliminate interference, the commission holding that "serious and objectionable interference will still exist even though the proposed equipment were to function perfectly, since the solution of several of the causes for the interference arising from the synchronous operation of these stations has neither been found nor contemplated."

CHARGES by educators that commercial broadcasters are "grabbing" all the facilities and that educational institutions are unable to secure licenses are shown by the records of the Government to be without foundation.

At the present time, the records show, there are forty-four stations classed as educational by the Office of Education of the Interior Department, one of which operates on 20,000 watts power, another on 10,000 watts, and four on 5,000 watts. In the past five years, ninety-five educational stations have been licensed, but fifty-one of them have ceased operation, only one of which has been ordered off the air by the Federal Radio Commission, the other fifty discontinuing voluntarily or disposing of their facilities to commercial stations.

But in addition to the stations which are classed as educational, a survey of programs by the commission has disclosed that the average time devoted to what is considered educational matter is 12½ per cent of the total. This includes, in addition to local straight educational matter, such programs as the Music Appreciation Hour, the American School of the Air, and certain other network and local programs which tend to raise the cultural level of the country.

"The United States broadcasts more hours of educational programs than any other nation in the world, the total broadcasting hours of each considered," it is contended by Radio Commissioner Harold A. Lafount.
