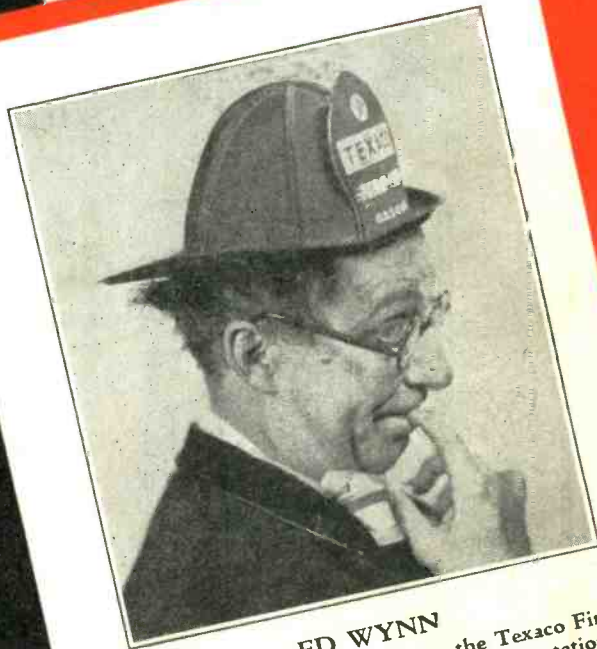

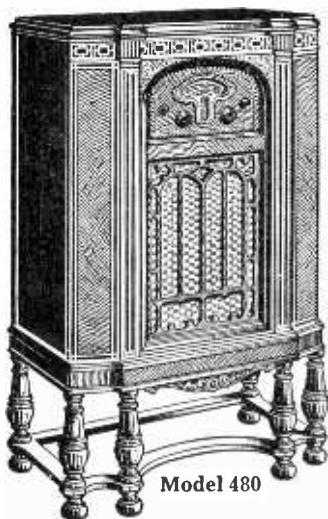

THE SPIRIT OF CHRISTMAS

Is it possible that one-eighth of all the citizens in a country maintaining the highest standards of living the world has ever known, should or will long tolerate treatment which even its live stock would not be expected to endure? In every human body there is a soul, and except as a weapon of vengeance the body is of little use if the soul is left to die.

The new radios are greatly improved over those purchased a year or more ago, prices are low, and you will have little difficulty in meeting the small monthly payments. Why not *get* a new radio and give the old set to some unfortunate for Christmas. Somewhere a soul is starving for that music, that contact with the sublime, that ladder to hope. Perhaps an invalid whose empty hours know no surcease from pain. Perhaps a luckless human with sightless eyes whose only happiness can come through hearing. Perhaps some destitute family to whom time is only prolonged waiting and misery and bitter thoughts broken by the wail of a hungry little one. This Christmas *give*. Give *much*. And in the giving forget not food for the soul as well as the stomach. Give the eternal gift of music and in its most versatile, most inspiring form—radio. "*As Ye have done it unto the least of these, My brethren, so have Ye done it unto Me.*"

ETHER GLEANINGS

IF THERE is going to be any bouquet slinging please permit us to toss a huge one to the ladies and gentlemen of "Memory Lane" which broke a few radio records when it went off the NBC's air recently after five years and eight months of "carrying on."

Along with a sizeable portion of Western radiodom we're going to miss the familiar and lovable characters of Goshen Center who were the brain children of H. C. Connette, ether author.

General Petroleum, who were the sponsors of the popular radio play, decided, when their contract ran out, that they wanted a change and have substituted the "News Keel of the Air." The NBC chieftains decided, too, that they wouldn't retain "Memory Lane" as a sustaining program and so off it went.

One of the principals in the Goshen Center play has grown from a child to quite a young man in that space of time. I refer to Billy Page, who as Billy Smithers was known to all followers of the skit. He was just nine then. He's nearly fifteen now.

To Eileen Piggott (Ma Smithers) goes a record of long time performance. She never missed one of the 290 odd performances, even when the Grim Reaper visited her household.

"Memory Lane" went on the air as a musical program a few weeks after the Pacific division of the NBC was organized back in April 1927. Arthur Garbett created it. In November, about Thanksgiving time, he handed over the job to H. C. Connette. The latter tried his hand at injecting bits of drama into the program until finally it became an all-dramatic broadcast by popular demand of the air audience.

Miss Piggott was with the company from the very beginning. She was the soprano on the musical programs.

It wasn't so long ago that "Memory Lane" "went commercial." An announcement was given wing over the air that the program might be yanked. And what a storm of protest from irate loudspeaker eavesdroppers! Ten thousand letters rained on the NBC from all sides. Don Gilman, chief network "exec" here, wrapped 'em up in a nice bundle, skooted south and convinced General Petroleum that "Memory Lane" was an audience getter. They bought it.

While we're passing out tributes, let's not forget the other players, who did their share in making "Memory Lane" one of the most popular broadcast programs hereabouts—Ted Maxwell, Wilda Wilson Church, Olive West, Bobbe Deane, Bernice Berwin, Benny Walker and Charles McAlister.

Three hips and a couple of hoorays for California's crop of young singers. They've scored again. A boy and a girl from our sunny state will be in blasé New York December 11 to participate in the national finals of the Atwater Kent Audition for young singers. By the way, the NBC-KGO network will broadcast it from 7:15 to 8:15 p. m. on that date. The lucky contestants who were chosen to represent the West in the finals are Laura Lodema, mezzo soprano of San Francisco who was number 14 in the semi-finals and William F. Knight, tenor, of Los Angeles, who was number 20. Awards totaling \$15,000 will be presented the winners.

"Yahbut" on the Blue Monday Jamboree, is Jennison Parker, successful radio author, who writes those musical comedies for the NBC Road Show, the Elmer Blurt skit, and the act in which he appears. He, too, was the author of those popular Deep Dramatic Stock Company plays that evoked so many laughs during the Jamboree some months back.

Morey Amsterdam, Shirley Mitchell and Frank McCormick (juvenile) are three of the latest additions to KFRC's list of contributing artists.

KTAB and KNX are now operating on a definite schedule for those rebroadcasts by the former of the latter's programs. Have you heard 'em?

Jess Stafford, ex-Palace Hotel baton wielder, ex-Paramount Theater director, is now stick-waving for dancers at Sweet's Ballroom in Oakland and KTAB listeners.

Joziena Van der Ende, whose professional name is Helen Stone, was up renewing old acquaintances around the NBC program factory the other day.

Incidentally, she was one of the very first to appear over NBC when the western di-

vision was organized. She was telling the gang about her odd experiences when another radio artist also named Helen Stone, was killed when accidentally hit with a golf club.

"Naturally all of my friends thought that it was I," she said. "I tuned in on KHJ, Los Angeles while they were holding a silent period in respect to my memory. And mother received all kinds of flowers and letters and telegrams of condolence."

But Jozenia is very much alive and has been active before the mikes of both the radio studio and Hollywood movie lots.

Down the other end of the hallway was Meredith Willson and his orchestra, and a big company of vocalists and comedians, whipping the NBC Road Show into shape. Meanwhile the smaller studios were accommodating other artists who were keeping the entertainment ball a'rollin'.

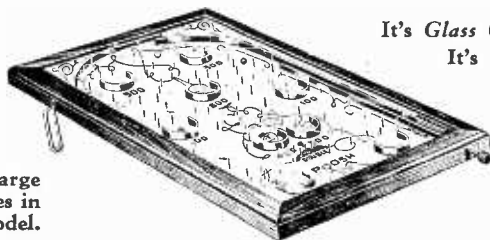

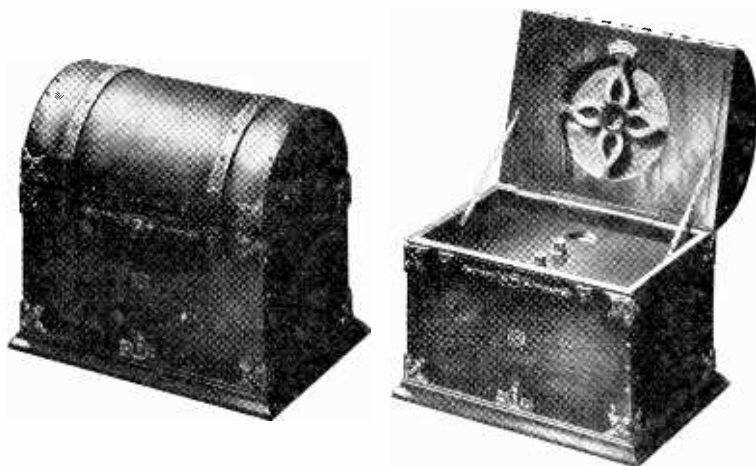

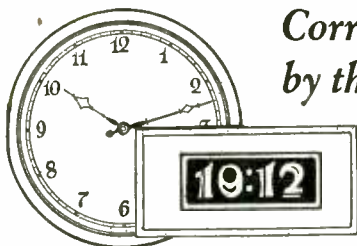

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Newell McMahan, known to listeners as the News Voice of KTAB, is one of the fastest talking reporters on the air. He's had a wealth of newspaper experience, but had to forget it all and learn to write copy for broadcasting. He's 29, single, happy, and has a yen for all sports.

• • • At peaks of concert and operatic popularity that few American singers have ever approached, Lawrence Tibbett and Richard Crooks, leading baritone and tenor of the Metropolitan Opera, will bring the finest in music to the home, in the "Voice of Firestone" series heard Monday nights over NBC. It is the first time two leading stars from the Metropolitan have been contracted for a sustained series, and the appeal which the singing of these artists has for hearers in all localities and walks of life makes the announcement of major importance to the music world and to radio.

• • • Lindsay MacHarrie, already known to radio audiences in the West as actor and master of ceremonies, has the part of Hassan in "The Story of Omar Khayyam." Hassan is the arch-villain, a student-days' friend of Omar, who afterward becomes head of the dread "assassins." Lindsay MacHarrie also has played prominent parts in pictures. He will be remembered for his work in "Tomorrow and Tomorrow" with Ruth Chatterton, and "Two Kinds of Women," and in the recent Paramount picture, "The Phantom President," with George M. Cohan and Jimmie Durante.

• • • One of the largest audiences which has ever attended a Crosscut from the

Log o' the Day program appeared "in person" to witness the wedding of Eugene Anderson, Southern Harmony Four singer, and Theresa Teems, whom Dr. Laurance L. Cross, Crosscuts director, married before the microphone recently. The studio was crowded with more than 200 spectators.

• • • Few listeners have probably guessed that the people behind some of the voices in Georgia Fifield's Saturday night playlets over KNX, are some of the brightest stars of the Hollywood film firmament. Were the casts billed over the air, the famous names of Lionel Belmore, Mae Busch, Jimmy Gleason, Jetta Goudal, Ralph Forbes, Doris Loyd and others would be recognized by motion picture patrons.

• • • Honors multiply for the Damerel family. Mother "Myrt" receives word from Los Angeles that George, Jr., "Marge's" 14-year-old brothers, is regularly holding down the left half-back position on the junior squad at Urban Military School, despite the fact that the youngster had started the season with a wrist injured in a fall from his horse. One of his team-mates is Wolfgang Lert, son of Vicki Baum-Lert.

• • • Jane Snyder, recently engaged as a regular member of the KFOX staff and heard in a number of continuity programs, outstanding of which is "The Boy Detective" in which she plays the rôle of Lucy Yellow-Hair, daughter of an Indian Chieftain of the Columbia River Salmon district, is the daughter of Capt. C. P. Snyder, U. S. N., Commander of the Battleforce of the Pacific Fleet and formerly Commandant of the Navy Academy at Annapolis, M. D. Jane

has a remarkable dramatic talent and prefers the creative work of radio to any of the many fields that she is in a position to take advantage of.

• • • The creators of Si and Elmer, amateur detective serial now on its eighth month over KNX, Hollywood, are both products of the professional stage. Will Reynolds, portrayer of Elmer, did comedy rôles in a number of New York productions, notably "Relations," a Jewish-American family play that scored as a hit several seasons ago. He also proudly admits being one of the original Keystone Kops, famous pioneer group of silent days in Hollywood.

Perry Crandall, who writes continuity and plays Si and minor characters, was leading man with a number of eastern stock companies from 1923 to 1929, when he entered radio in Chicago. Si and Elmer is released nightly except Sunday over KNX, 6:30 to 6:45.

• • • Walter O'Keefe, who is the pilot of the Magic Carpet, was known as a song writer before he achieved the headline fame as an entertainer. He wrote the lyrics for the musical comedy hit, "Just a Minute" and his first big hit was "Little by Little." He then wrote "I Love Love." And despite his ability to write modern songs, his greatest fame as a singer came when he sang a song almost fifty years old, "The Man on the Flying Trapeze."

• • • Connie, Vet and Martha Boswell swear that this is true so it is herewith offered to readers. While the girls were appearing in vaudeville recently in New York City, their musical director, who was leading the musicians in the orchestra, felt something

stinging him in the neck. He turned to find a small boy in the front row, shooting at him with a bean blower. The leader motioned to the boy's mother who shrugged her shoulders. Then the boy spoke. Said he, "Quit waving that stick—I can't see the show!"

• • • Two young men liked Al Jolson's mammy songs so much they went to jail for the sake of some of his records. They found the back door of Jolson's home in Scarsdale unlocked and made off with 55 phonograph records in albums. Nothing else was taken.

• • • Frank Black, the famous musical director, is the first man in radio to classify a musical library according to radio values. He has more than 37,000 selections in his files and they are not double-indexed as most musical libraries are, but are triple-indexed—marked as to title, author and "effect on listeners." With this system Maestro Black is able to build programs with ease and yet keep them from containing the usual things that are heard over and over again.

• • • Most meticulous of all the production men is John Loesch, who arranges the studio for Ruth Etting's broadcasts on "Music That Satisfies." He has a chart of the broadcasting studio and knows exactly where every musician's seat is to be placed. He carries a yardstick when arranging Ruth's microphone so that it is always at the same height. She likes to have the open face slanting upwards at an angle of 30 degrees so that the top is at the exact level of her chin.

• • • Ben Bernie is telling one on himself these days. It happened at Lincoln Fields race track recently when the Ol' Maestro was doing a bit of relaxing. Ben was standing in his box rooting home a winner . . . a pony named

Flora M. was flying down the stretch. Suddenly people in the grandstand around him started shouting "Bernie, Bernie! Yea! Bernie." The Maestro turned around, smiled broadly and waved an acknowledgment. One of the grandstanders yelled "Hey, sit down, ya big so and so." Yes, a chap named Bernie was riding the winner.

• • • Michael Raffetto, NBC actor, spends as much time writing for the microphone as he does acting before it.

• • • Fannie Hurst, noted American authoress, wrote a scenario for Kate Smith's feature motion picture without ever having seen or met Columbia's "Songbird of the South." Miss Hurst recently declared that despite not having made the personal contact she felt she knew Kate's personality and was able to weave it into her story.

• • • The Three Cheers, recent initiates to "The Royal Order of Optimistic Donuts" (KNX) are radio stars of long standing on the Pacific Coast. Los Angeles boys all, they had to go to San Francisco and cause a sensation before they got a tumble from the home town. After two months over the air from the Bay city, they were hurriedly called home, and have been in wide demand ever since. Travis Hale, Ernest Derry and Phil Hanna are the names.

• • • Hall Johnson, leader of the Hall Johnson singers on "Captain Henry's Show Boat" over NBC, got his first break in New York when he played in the orchestra of "Runnin' Wild." A male quartet singing negro spirituals in the show brought down the house every night. Johnson saw the possibilities, and immediately formed his own chorus. His most recent success was in training the singers in "The Green Pastures," Pulitzer Prize play.

• • • When those three harmonizing Boswell Sisters are on the air, each has a distinct assignment in addition to the blending her voice with those of the others. Martha plays the piano, Connie gives manual cues to the guitarist, trumpeter, and bass fiddler who supply the obligatos, and Vet stands up to turn the music.

• • • Preparing orchestrations for America's headline vocal stars of radio has become just another item in the day's labor for Wilbur Hatch, musical director of KNX, Hollywood. Last spring he conducted the orchestra on Bing Crosby's series of broadcasts from the Hollywood studio. He organized and rehearsed the augmented orchestra currently being heard with Kate Smith over KNX and a national hook-up. Who's next, please?

• • • Things don't always look as bad as they sound. Ask the Song-fellows, NBC quartet heard from the Chicago studios. George Howard, John Ravenscroft and Francis Bastow used to sing as a trio on a pleasure boat in Lake Manitou until the municipal council barred the cruises. The trio blamed it on Howard for having raised his voice too high when they were "only two miles from shore."

The silver lining was discovered when Ray McDermott also heard George's voice above the others and persuaded the trio to form a quartet. They had an audition and have been in radio ever since.

• • • Frank Hazzard, featured vocalist with Isham Jones' Orchestra, has been complimented of late for his excellent diction in German songs. The singer explained that all credit is due to Hans Dresler, a waiter in the Hollywood Restaurant where Jones' band broadcasts. Dresler, a graduate of the University of Vienna, has been coaching Frank for several weeks.

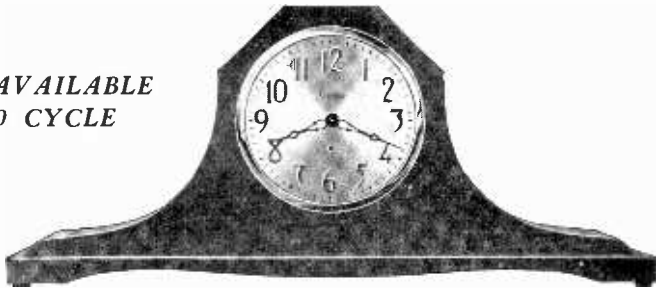


More Plays

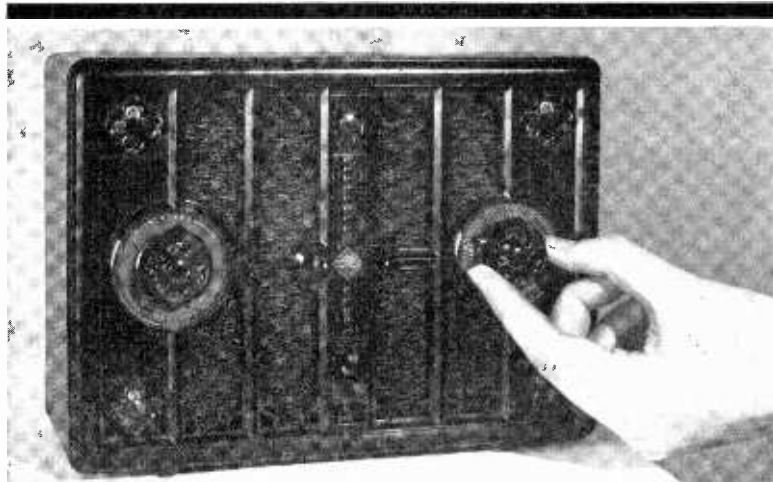

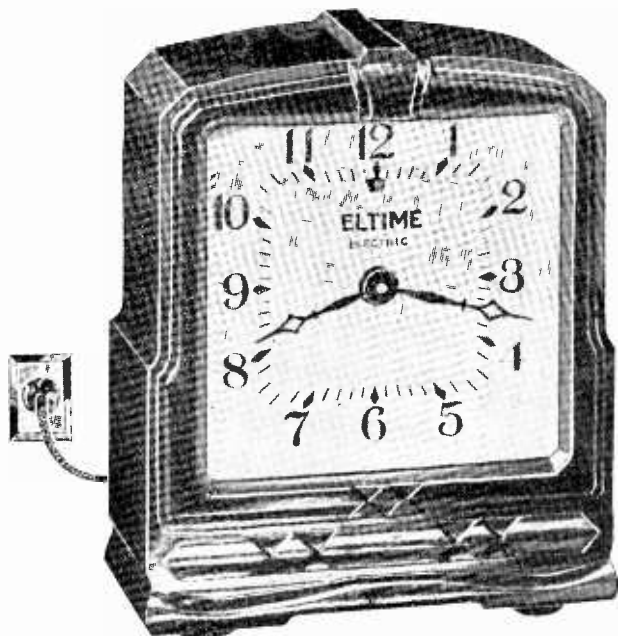

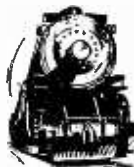

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.

The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.
