## FIVE MINUTE PROGRAMS

AT the present moment, Radio faces one of the most serious menaces it has encountered since its early day struggles.

Certain ambitious advertisers observing the remarkable resultfulness of radio broadcasting have conceived the brilliant idea of reaping its manifold benefits without incurring its consequent cost. To accomplish this they propose to change the present system. Begrudging the expenditure necessary to produce even a fifteen minute program, the minimum period possible under existing regulations, they seek to abrogate such limitations, and for the audience patronage and loyalty they cherish so dearly demonstrate their appreciation not with fifteen, nor ten, but *five* minutes of broadcasting, including, of course, the precious portion of that period given over to lavish praise and aggressive exploitation of their own product.

To be sure, the proposal is adroitly put and ably defended so that its real import is not at once apparent. Its proponents aver they do not propose to spend less money in aggregate, but merely to divide the program into smaller units repeated more often, which it is alleged will increase their advertising benefits without penalizing the audience. Paradoxically, the plea is also made that permitting five-minute broadcasts will attract many smaller advertisers, thereby swelling the amount available for broadcasting and raising program standards.

But, however sincere these and other numerous arguments for the proposal, its adop-

tion would result in radio chaos. As well might the home-seeking inspiration and entertainment turn to its old-fashioned phonograph as dial a different radio program every five minutes. Sustained enjoyment would be impossible. The listener would no more than be settled comfortably in his easy chair before the program would have ceased. Schedules would become veritable jumbles and jig saw puzzles. An audience decimated by disgust and confusion would no longer justify the large cost of elaborate feature programs, and they would gradually disappear from the air.

The proposal, furthermore, is unfair to the many sponsors who have contributed so much and so willingly to elevate program standards and prolong periods of enjoyment. It originated neither with them nor with the broadcasting companies who have invested millions of dollars in modern equipment that the audience might better be served. Both are entitled to audience co-operation in warding off this blow which threatens mutual disaster.

Forewarned is forearmed. Such is the situation. Yours is the final decision. Let your voice be heard both in your letters to BROADCAST WEEKLY and to stations or sponsors. And let advertisers remember that in radio, as in no other medium, results are in ratio not to the eloquence of argumentative exhortations or the vividness of multiplied superlatives, but to the sheer pleasure produced for the audience, and the gratitude and sense of obligation thereby engendered.

MAY I have another place in the Open Circuit?

On the other hand, radio listeners missed a real treat if they did not tune in to KGO Saturday night at 10:30. In checking the scheduled programs listed in BROADCAST WEEKLY, I noticed a new one, with an alluring title: “Blue Moonlight.” Curious, and with anticipation, I tuned in just in time to hear the last part of the opening announcement.

But it did not take long to recognize Paul Carson's inimitable organ music, though I do confess that he and Alvino Rey had me thinking that there were at least three instruments, all playing at once, composing the ensemble. I continued to think this until the end of the program, when the announcer named just two performers. It was a very lovely program.

Some of the disappointments have been in the change in the early morning organ concerts.

But if those who like to experiment in changes just leave the most beautiful pro-

gram in all radioland, Paul Carson's “Bridge to Dreamland,” on Sunday nights where it is, and as it is, and will give, on other nights of the week, solo organ concerts by the same organist, I will not complain very much.

I am not sure that there are many who, like me, only get to enjoy our radios in the morning and evening, and then we are extremely disappointed when our favorite artist or artists have been assigned to mid-day programs only.

I, too, like the new program set-up in the BROADCAST WEEKLY. It makes it easy to locate our favorite programs and to trace them when they are transferred to another station, or hour.

“One Man's Family” is my favorite drama. The only one that I never miss.

Carlton E. Morse is getting into pretty deep water, but judging by the way he adjusted the strained relations between Claudia and her father, he is a pilot equal to the occasion.

Each member of that family has become a real personality to me. The character of Paul Barbour, as played by Michael Raffetto, is a masterpiece.

I think that the radio audience owes a vote of thanks to Carlton E. Morse for creating such a character, and to Michael Raffetto for such a perfect interpretation.

I prefer to hear actors and musicians right from the studio and not months or years after a transcription has been made, though if we were not told we could seldom detect the difference.

But I like to visualize the man or woman in my mind as I listen. Knowing that they are doing that particular thing at that particular moment makes them altogether real.

This is too long a letter, but when such alarming changes take place it makes us want to rise up and say please, or please keep hands off of this one that means so much to our daily or weekly enjoyment and happiness.

As was said in the last BROADCAST WEEKLY, the sponsors do not know how much certain programs mean to us if we do not express our preference.

# ETHER GLEANINGS

**I**f it's foreign radio programs that appeal to you, don't hurry the death of your tubes by turning on your volume full blast and then fishing in the ether for the unknown; or you don't even have to wait for those international broadcasts over the big chains.

For right here in our own Golden State there are broadcast programs presented in at least nine different nationalities, in which both native music and the native tongue is heard.

And the San Francisco Bay area, after New York the most metropolitan area in the United States, lends an attentive and receptive ear to these program bits flavored with the music and tongue of other lands.

KROW is probably the most linguistic station hereabouts, with KQW in San Jose running a close second.

The Oakland station transmits regularly the following foreign programs: Portuguese, Spanish, Italian, Greek, French, Polish, Armenian and Japanese. While KQW has Italian, Portuguese, Mexican and Spanish programs. KTAB broadcasts a weekly Italian program.

Monroe Upton, alias "Lord Bilgewater," alias "Simpv Fitts," like the feline who couldn't be shaken, is back with that old "gang of his"—Al Pearce and his Gang.

Upton, who enjoys a wide following all over the West for his impersonations of the dumb English Lord and the nit-wit "Simpv Fitts," bled himself off to Los Angeles recently after he had been made a nice proposition by Al Pearce, head man of the troupe of mikesters that has enjoyed tremendous popularity for the past four or five years.

The comedian resigned from the NBC here in San Francisco in order to join up with Pearce, who, although heard over the same network, is working as a private enterprise, presents his programs over the network. "Bilgy's" new job will also include many personal appearances while with the Gang.

From underground, overhead and in-between sources, we understand that Al and his troupers will be up in San Francisco in June in order that they may make personal appearances in the towns in the Northern California section.

An important shift in personnel at KTAB was announced by Bob Roberts, manager. Merle Matthews, for several years production chief at KFRC and before that continuity writer and producer on the now defunct ABC radio chain, has been named program direc-

tor. She is occupying Glenhall Taylor's desk, who is specializing in specialty sales and production for the station. Taylor gradually had been working into the sales side of the broadcasting business. At the present time he is acting in and producing two sponsored programs over the station. Merle Matthews is considered one of the most capable and conscientious radio program builders on the coast. She assumed her new duties May 15.

W. A. Miller, for the past several years manager of KROW, Oakland station, resigned because of differences of opinion as to the station's policies with the directors of the organization that controls the broadcaster. His successor had not been named at this writing.

Bob Dunm is KTAB's newest announcer. He is the son of the president of Associated Broadcasters, Inc., who operate KTAB.

Please don't accuse us of rushing the Christmas season, which seemingly just blew over and for which we're still paying—but, the Lionel Train Company, which makes miniature choo-choos, has already placed its order for time to advertise its wares on the NBC wireup starting next November. Nothing like getting ready for your Christmas advertising early.

Doris McMahon, a bewitching red-haired beauty from Hollywood, Ziegfeld's Follies and way points, is the owner of the captivating voice you hear singing with Anson Weeks' Mark Hopkins band these nights. She stepped into the job left open by Harriet Lee who joined up with Paul Whiteman's orchestra recently. Miss McMahon has done work in several Hollywood speakies.

The Arion Trio, one of the oldest groups on the air hereabouts, consisting of Frances Wiener, violinist; Margaret Avery, 'cellist, and Joyce Barthelson, pianist, heretofore a daytime feature, is being spotted on night programs at the NBC now.

\* \* \*

That "Cowboy Tom" series sponsored by Remington-Rand on KFRC, has changed its broadcast time to Mondays and Thursdays at 5 to 5:15 o'clock.

\* \* \*

KTAB is now rebroadcasting the KNX accounts of the boxing matches staged at the Hollywood American Legion Stadium on Friday nights from 9:45 to 10:45 o'clock.

Once again the Broadway "Knows-all; sees-all"—Walter Winchell—says au revoir to his tune-inners on May 28. For that will be his final broadcast for the Andrew-Jergens Company, which has sponsored him for these past few months. Those "in the know" about the NBC camp predict the return of both the columnist and the sponsor to the air at a not far distant date.

The "Ne'er Do Well," a personality of the air who has succeeded over a period of years in hiding his identity, is back before the microphone again after quite a lengthy absence. He may be dialed on KYA Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 7:30 to 7:45 o'clock. The "Ne'er Do Well" is a pianologist who injects a lot of good philosophy into his presentations. He had a wide following when on the air before.

There's a new blues moaner up the NBC way. She's Kay Kendall, who had been entertaining the folks over KYA for six months. She succeeds Mona Lowe, who stepped into matrimony and left the San Francisco studios flat some weeks ago.

\* \* \*

When tough breaks were handed out Joseph Henry Jackson, the book critic and NBC literary commentator, received a handful all at once. He had the rare privilege of being an invited guest at the Pulitzer prize banquet in New York and started out for Gotham by plane. Jackson got as far as Los Angeles when he suffered severe pains in his leg. On examination by doctors it was found that he had blood poisoning which resulted from a boil. He was given treatment and rushed to San Francisco. And it was all off with the New York trip, the trip Jackson had dreamed about for weeks. He is convalescing now.

Westinghouse has replaced those Octavus Roy Cohen murder mystery series on the NBC with a musical program featuring Al Mitchell's orchestra and Everett Marshall, baritone.

\* \* \*

The Monarch Mystery tenor makes his final NBC appearance on May 28.

\* \* \*

Sherlock Holmes and his bosom friend, Dr. Watson, will bid adios to their radio followers on May 31, when their series of programs expires. Their coffee sponsor is expected to bring them back on the air in the fall.

\* \* \*

Glenhall Taylor and Frank Galvin of KTAB have teamed up for a nutty script act monickered "Bughouse Theater," in which

they burlesque everything and anything from "Daniel in the Lion's Den" to "The Strange Interlude." Oh yeh! It's a quarter hour event and takes the ether domain on Mondays and Wednesdays at 8:30 p.m.

☞The Standard School of the Air steps off the ether lanes at the close of the present school term, returning at the reopening of the classrooms.

\* \* \*

Robert Olsen's program, "Painting Pretty Pictures," is on regularly now on KTAB Tuesday night from 8:30 to 9 o'clock. Elbert Lachelle is doing the organ accompaniments.

\* \* \*

Have you heard the new one the General Tire and Rubber Company is offering the nation's dialers? It's being NBC'd coast to coast on Tuesdays (7 to 7:30 p. m. Pacific Coast time). "Lives at Stake" is the title, and it's a dramatization of the lives of famous heroes of history.

Elbert Lachelle has returned to KTAB as staff organist.

\* \* \*

Sid Goodwin, NBC mickeman, is boasting of the finest collection of autographs of radio celebrities. He was one of those that purchased the book, "Stars of the Radio," published by BROADCAST WEEKLY last summer. After getting the signatures of all the San Francisco members of the broadcasting fraternity, he shipped his picture book to New York and had the "big shots" of the ether world affix their monickers to their respective photographs in the volume. # SILHOUETTES

HE was christened Rudolph Pierce—but he's "Rudy" to everybody in the NBC San Francisco studios from the vice-president down. The gift of friendliness was showered upon Rudy in his cradle, along with music, and as NBC orchestra contractor he needs both. It is his job to keep the NBC orchestras—which comprise about eighty men and women—working in harmony, and if you have ever tried to keep that many musicians, with all their varying temperaments and tastes, in accord with their work and union regulations and each other, you know what the NBC orchestra contractor does. Rudy, however, enjoys his work, and insists that radio musicians, as a class, are less temperamental than the world realizes. He thinks it is because radio keeps them so busy that they haven't time, meeting all its stern requirements, to go arty.

Rudy, who plays trombone in the orchestra, was born in Placerville, California, of an old pioneer family. He studied piano, trombone, harmony and composition from childhood, but tried a number of other occupations, including the operation of an automobile paint shop and interior decorating, before he decided that music, his real love, might as well be his life work. He studied trombone in New York with Simone Mantia, noted teacher, for several years, and played with a number of well-known orchestras in the East before he returned to California. He joined the NBC staff over five years ago.

RUPERT HUGHES' "little boy Rush" works with words, just as his father has done for many years. He weaves them in a pattern as swift and colorful as the tapestries his father creates in type—but Rush Hughes uses the ether as his medium, and directs his message to the ears of NBC listeners instead of to their eyes.

The good-looking, dark young chap who grew up in the glamorous atmosphere of his father's fame as a novelist, chose to make his own career completely independent of his family, and he has succeeded. Not yet thirty, he has been actively engaged in radio for the last five years, and his present vehicle, the Langendorf Pictorial, is one of the most unique features among western offerings. Sponsored by the Langendorf Baking Company and heard every weekday afternoon over an NBC-KGO network, it presents

Rush in the character of an aerial photographer of news events, swooping over the globe and recounting news of the day while it is still hot.

Born in Jamaica, Long Island, Rush was educated at St. John's Manlius Military Academy, Mercersburg Academy and Princeton. His mother, the beautiful Adelaide Hughes, was a well-known actress and Rush inherited his interest in the theatre from her. He was just sixteen when Blanche Bates persuaded his parents to let him play in "Getting Together" with her and its cast of world-famed stars, and between school terms the young man continued in both stage and screen work, with excursions into short story writing. Then radio engaged his attention, and he made his microphone debut in 1927 in San Francisco by announcing an Anson Weeks' orchestra program in place of an announcer who had been taken ill.

The dynamic young Pictorial reporter keeps a staff of assistants busy collecting material for his daily broadcasts, which necessarily must be plastic in form in order to include late news flashes as well as a large quantity of features, compactly presented. When the Los Angeles earthquake occurred, Hughes moved his Pictorial to NBC station KFI and was one of the first on the air with descriptions of the disaster.

The spontaneity which charms listeners of his news broadcasts isn't as informal as it appears over the microphone. Every program presented is written, then re-written, with the assistance of his secretary, who spends hours of research in libraries sometimes, for a fact which takes but a second or so to relate. When Rush has his program in what he hopes will be its final form, he makes a record of it, then checks the result as his own most critical listener.

Young Hughes probably is the only radio entertainer on record who wants to find a voice as much like his own as possible. He is interviewing applicants with the hope of discovering an understudy who can pinch-hit for him should an emergency prevent his appearing before the microphone.

Outside of his radio work, the Pictorial reporter finds his greatest enjoyment in active sports, such as tennis and golf. He has hiked over most of the Pacific Coast and a large portion of the United States; has visited every state in the union and every large city and "hopes to do some traveling" when he retires.

# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Kay Kyser and his nationally famous band are being brought to San Francisco by Bal Tabarin. They open Sunday, May 21, at the local cafe as the first of a series of brilliant guest bands to substitute for Tom Gerun while he and his Bal Tabarin orchestra represent the West at the World's Fair.

Gerun's orchestra was selected as one of the four most popular bands in America and engaged by Pabst Blue Ribbon to share honors with Ben Bernie, Guy Lombardo, and Buddy Rogers in the colossal entertainment programs it is sponsoring at the Fair.

Kyser comes to Bal Tabarin direct from a successful season at the Hotel New Yorker, New York City; Lotus Gardens, Cleveland, Starett - Netherlands, Cincinnati; and Congress Hotel, Chicago. His opening at Bal Tabarin will be celebrated with a spectacular entertainment program. The eastern band has a wide following over eastern networks, and will broadcast its Bal Tabarin programs over NBC every night except Mondays.

• • • When Raine Bennett, who is heard over KNX every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday night at 7:30, writes the material that he uses on the air, he starts to write at midnight, promptly, and doesn't stop writing until the stroke of five.

• • • Gilson VanderVeer Willitts, well known San Francisco newspaper man, has been engaged by Station KFWI to give a series of talks on the story of progress.

• • • Bert Lahr, who headlines that coffee program Sundays at 4 p. m. over NBC has advanced step by step through every phase of pub-

lic entertaining. Starting in burlesque, he has been in vaudeville, musical comedy, pictures and radio. And when he was a boy they wanted him to become a concert singer. Bert is the only radio comic who actively takes part in the writing of his own material. He sits in, rather than sitting by until his material is handed to him for his inspection. And he writes quite a bit of it.

• • • George Kruger, concert pianist who recently signed with KTAB, studied music at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Berlin. His teacher was Leschetizky, who taught the famous Paderwiski, and other well-known concert artists.

• • • James Melton, the tenor, has lifted a page from big business by purchasing a dictaphone such as executives use to dictate letters. Before he goes on the air, Melton sings his songs into the machine and plays them back to correct any errors he might have made during rehearsal. He highly recommends the idea.

• • • Gordon Brown, formerly of KQW, San Jose, is heard announcing the Owl programs from KJBS.

• • • KMTR has added the name of Helga Erickson, the celebrated Scandinavian soprano, to its growing list of staff artists. Miss Erickson is well known for her brilliant concert and radio work in the East and in Europe, as well as on the Coast.

• • • As soon as beer was made legal, four local breweries rushed cases of their products to Jack Pearl, the Thursday night Baron Munchausen on the Magic Carpet. And of course they asked him

to relate his experiences as a brewmaster on the air. It is being arranged and will be broadcast soon without hiccoughs.

• • • The Gay Caballeros, dispensers of hill-billy entertainment on KLLX for the past two or more years, have discontinued their broadcasts during the summer months.

• • • KTAB now brings the main event of the boxing shows held every Friday night in the Hollywood American Legion Stadium through a rebroadcast from KNX.

The bouts are broadcast direct from the ringside with the main event usually coming on the air at 9:45.

Occasionally, Hollywood screen celebrities who attend these weekly ring shows are brought to the microphone to say a few words.

• • • Ever since Jack Barbour, whom Billy Page, 15-year-old NBC actor portrays in "One Man's Family," obtained a tuxedo in the Christmas episode of the serial, his real life prototype has been wistfully looking into tailors' windows. But now Billy is happy. His family have capitulated at last, the youthful star knocked 'em dead in the studio on a recent Wednesday night when he appeared for the One Man's Family broadcast, resplendent in his very first dinner clothes, and then accompanied a group of NBC artists on a dancing party at the Hotel Mark Hopkins, following the program.

• • • KFWB recently welcomed home several local boys who made good on the network. Bing Crosby, who was first heard over this station with Gus Arnheim's orchestra, returned to KFWB for his first local program



since dropping affiliations with CBS. Cliff Arquette, alias "Aunt Addy," and "Red" Corcoran of the "Three Public Enemies," also returned to Hollywood last week, following an engagement with NBC in New York. June Purcell is scheduled to arrive soon. Other well known radio celebs who were first heard over KFWB are "The Boswell Sisters," Donald Novis, and Leon Belasco.

• • • Claire Mellonino, concert pianist heard over KNX, has a pet Boston bull terrier, named "Jewel." Wherever Claire Mellonino goes, there Jewel goes also, and they are absolutely inseparable. And while Claire plays the piano little Jewel waits on one of the chairs in the front office.

• • • KFWI's new programs include the Mississippi Roustabouts and their offerings of old time songs on KFWI every Sunday afternoon from 2:45 to 3 o'clock. They embark on the old freighter, City of Natchez, entertaining the deck passengers on the hurricane deck. The program is conducted by old pap, the driver.

• • • Carlton E. Morse, NBC playwright, lives on a daylight saving schedule of his own planning, winter or summer. He is at his desk in the NBC studios every morning at 7 o'clock, finding that he can get in two hours of clear thinking and easy writing before the rest of the staff arrives. Some of his best scenes in "One Man's Family" have been done in the gray dawn of even earlier hours.

• • • Lou Kosloff, violinist and well known master of ceremonies, is now staff artist with Jack Joy's orchestra at KFWB. Lou may be remembered as musical director of the Roxie Theater in New York, the Oriental Theater in Chicago, and numerous Fox West Coast houses throughout the nation.

• • • Bobb Nichols, NBC announcer, is building a country home—by degrees. On an estate he has purchased in Marin County, across the Golden Gate from San Francisco, he has erected a garage with living quarters attached in which he expects to live for the next two years while his house, which will be built of natural logs, is under construction. Bobb is going to do most of the work on the house himself in his spare moments, hence the two years it will take.

• • • The pet hobby of Drury Lane, popular young KNX tenor, is cigar smoking. Drury likes to smoke nice long, but "blunt shaped" Havana cigars, that look good and smell good, and they seem to add something to the lovable disposition of this pleasant singer heard on "Golden Memories."

• • • "The King's Men," popular male quartet and staff artists of KFWB, are four of the busiest young men in Hollywood. The boys recently completed a series of broadcasts with the four Marx brothers, heard throughout the East. "Rad" Robinson, baritone, is working with Bing Crosby in his new film, "College Humor." Three days a week they may be found at the Paramount Studios harmonizing on the famous Looney Tunes. Ken Darby, bass, is the arranger. "Buddy" Lynn, first tenor, and Jon Dodson, second tenor.

• • • Dollo Sargent, petite red-haired organist of NBC, received her most unique fan letter the other day—a missive from Honolulu whose envelope was adorned with a dollar sign and sergeant's stripe—"Care National Broadcasting Company." Inside was a fervently admiring message from an army fan who evidently thought Dollo was a member of his own sex, and who signed himself "Another Sarge."

• • • Jack Kapp, recording company executive, has presented the Boswell Sisters with a gold record of their famous good luck song, "The Heebie Jeebies."

On tour, the Boswell Sisters are taking movies. They asked a doctor friend to drop some films off to be developed. When they got them back they were blank. They suspected a joke, but the M. D. had a tube of radium in his briefcase which accounted for the ruined films.

• • • A race horse owner likes the broadcasts of Johnnie Marvin, so when he discovered that three colts had been born at his stables, he called them "Johnny Marvin," "Lonesome Singer," and "Radio Pal."

• • • Realism in radio drama hit a new high when Guy Bates Post, cast and dressed as General U. S. Grant in Columbia's "Roses and Drums" series, appeared at the studios in authentic uniform, Civil War sidearms, and whiskers which required three and a half hours for reproduction from old photographs.

• • • There are writers', writers and actors' actors, but Johnny O'Brien, NBC harmonica player probably is the only one on record to attain a similar place among other performers on the modern equivalent of the Pipes o' Pan. A fan letter, written not to Johnny but to a radio editor, comes from James Hartley, known as "Harmonica Jim" on the stage for many years, and now a harmonica expert who goes about the country teaching youngsters how to play his favorite instrument, in the interests of one of the largest harmonica companies in the country. "Your Johnny O'Brien is one of the greatest in America," Hartley declares. "He can do everything any other harmonica player can do as well or better than most of the high scorers. Between programs, Johnny teaches a score or so of young pupils who want to learn to play "just like Johnny."

• • • Every time James Melton sings "Shortnin' Bread"—and he does so often because of requests—many women from the South write in to tell him that they wish he was visiting them so they could make him some real honest-to-goodness shortnin' bread. What they don't know is that Jimmie can probably cook it better than anyone in the world—a stunt he learned as a boy in Florida from his old colored mammy.

• • • The stars which shine over Mount Hamilton, California, are apt to find themselves neglected for microphone luminaries, these Friday nights, according to a letter received from Lick Observatory. A group of astronomical students at the observatory turn from telescope to radio set at 9 o'clock every Friday night, to listen to NBC's "Killed in Action" series of real life dramas of the police department, narrated by Police Chief William J. Quinn and dramatized by Carlton E. Morse.

• • • Tommy Harris, NBC entertainer, likes to talk about his operation. It was for appendicitis, and kept two Chambers of Commerce busy, for illness struck him while he was singing in Port Arthur, Canada. He didn't know a soul in town, so the local Chamber of Commerce notified the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, and the two civic bodies exchanged a number of dignified letters about Tommy and his appendix and his gradual recovery while he was in the hospital.

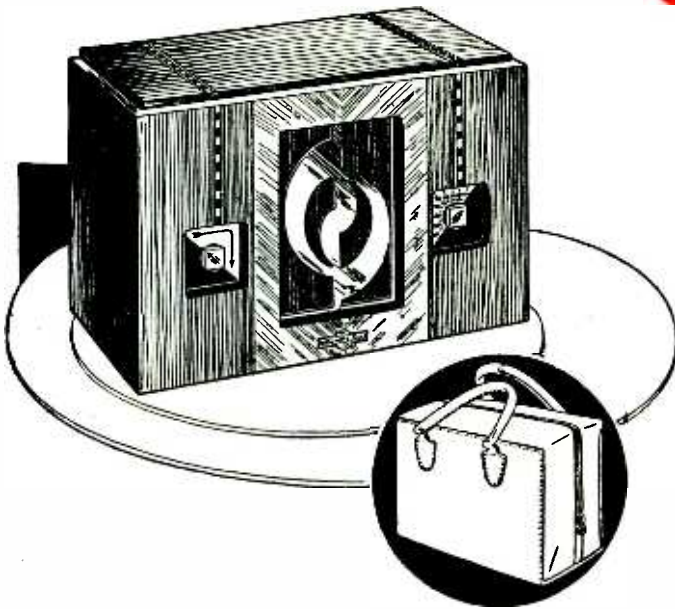

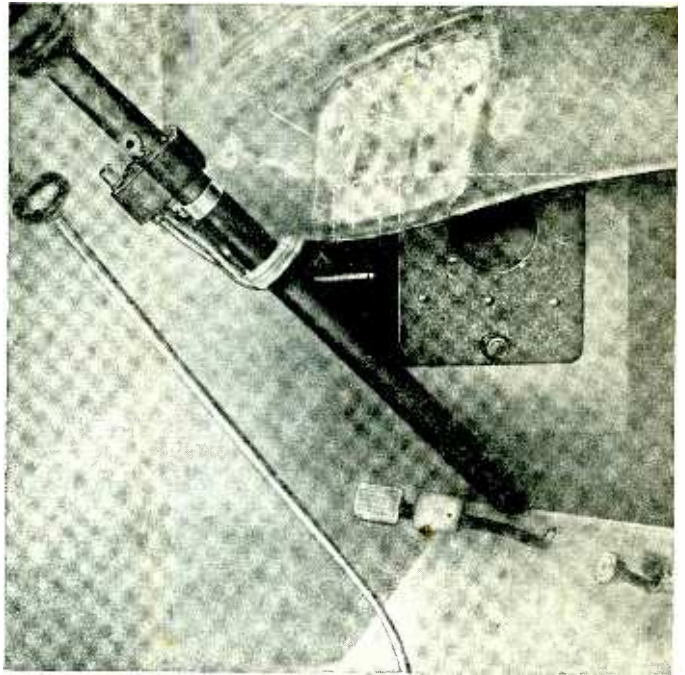
