1000 EUROPE AT WAR, SEPTEMBER, 1939

The swift, momentous events of the first week in September were reported completely and immediately for the CBS audience—at all hours of the da and night and from all the significant world capitals-by Columbia's sta of radio reporters in Europe and America. The rapid deepening of the crisi-Germany's lightning thrust into Poland, the crucial sessions of Parliamer and the Chamber of Deputies, and finally word that the European war had begun were brought directly and dispassionately to America (thence by short wave to every corner of the world) in what has been heralded as the greates news coverage in history. During those keenly trying days—and in the equall grave days which have followed—CBS presented history, hour-by-hour and minute-by-minute, not only through dispatches and analyses but through broadcasts by the men who are actually making events. On September 3, per haps the most eventful day in modern history, CBS broadcast Prime Ministe Chamberlain's austere declaration that England was at war, King George message to the Empire, Premier Daladier's address rallying France to the conflict, and President Roosevelt's assurance that there would be no "blackou of peace" in the United States—all in addition to a singularly full news program of European broadcasts, summaries, and analyses. In the three weeks following announcement of the Russo-German pact (late August and early September). CBS brought its listeners the unparalleled total of 726 special broadcasts from 11 world centers. Now CBS covers the war and all other world news according to a schedule of 64 news programs weekly (see page 34) and is ready to throw the entire network open for reports of major unexpected events as they happen. when they happen.

EPTEMBER 19: Chancellor Adolf Hitler's victory" speech in Danzig was carried in ts entirety over the CBS network and was a nstantaneously short-waved to Europe and o South America on Columbia's two international stations. An address by Albert Forster. Danzig National Socialist leader, preceded Hitler's defiant speech, and a reachant summary by Columbia's commentator, H. V. Kaltenborn, concluded the proadcast, 12–1:35 p.m.

EPTEMBER 20: Walter W. Van Kirk, director of the National Peace Conference, outined a program for peace in a broadcast wer the Columbia network, 10:45-11 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 21: President Roosevelt's appeal to the special session of Congress for revision of the present Neutrality Act was broadcast over the entire CBS network. The President. speaking before the members of both houses of Congress, urged repeal of the mandatory arms embargo, 2:45–4 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 21: A group of Southern agriculturalists and Eastern manufacturers joined in a round-table discussion at Alabama Polytechnic Institute and considered their common economic problems. Harwood Hull, agricultural director of Columbia's station in Birmingham, WAPl, led the discussion. 4:30–4:45 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 22: Secretary of State Cordell Hull spoke in Pan-American Day ceremonies at the Federal Building esplanade at the New York World's Fair. Before his address. Hull was presented with a medal for his work in promoting inter-American understanding and friendship, 3:30—4 p.m.

Martin (R) of Massachusetts, minority leader of the House of Representatives, and Senator Rush D. Holt (D) of West Virginia were heard in addresses from New York World's Fair Court of Peace on Independent Small Business Man's Day, 3:45-4 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 26: Representative Hamilton Fish, Jr., (R) of New York presented his views on "The European War and American Neutrality" over the Columbia network, 10:45-11 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 27: Mrs. Ida B. Wise Smith, president of the National Women's Christian

Temperance Union, was heard in an address from the Union's annual convention in Rochester, 4:45-5 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 27: Dr. Charles Callan Tansill, professor of American political and diplomatic history at Fordham University, discussed "Problems of American Neutrality" in a special CBS broadcast, 10:45-11 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 30: Senator Sherman Minton (D) of Indiana, Democratic whip of the Senate, and Senator Gerald P. Nye (R) of North Dakota explained their positions on the proposed arms embargo repeal in a round-table discussion from Washington. Others participating in the discussion were Representatives James E. Van Zandt (R) of Pennsylvania, former national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars; Raymond Clapper, Robert Allen, Paul Mallon, Ray Tucker, and Jay Franklin, five of the country's foremost Washington columnists, 8–8:30 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 30: Senator Edward R. Burke (D) of Nebraska. who is supporting the President in the drive for Neutrality Act revision, presented his position on the neutrality question over the Columbia network, 10:30-10:45 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 30: Senator H. Styles Bridges (R) of New Hampshire explained what he means by "The Real Neutrality" in one of a series of talks by prominent political and business leaders which CBS is scheduling to present contrasting opinions on neutrality legislation, 10:45-11 p.m.

SPECIAL EVENTS

SEPTEMBER 17 AND 24: The open polo championship matches at Wesbury, Long Island, were graphically described for the Columbia audience by Ted Husing, assisted by Jimmy Dolan. After presenting an eye-witness account of the semi-finals on September 17 (4:30-5 p.m.). Husing covered the final between Greentree and Bostwick Field, 4:30-5 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 21. 23 AND 28: Three stake races at Belmont Park were brought to the Columbia sports audience, as they were run, by Bryan Field. CBS turf expert. The races were the Mont d'or Handicap, the Manhattan Handicap, and the Sixty-Ninth Ladies Handicap, 4:15–4:45 p.m.



Illinois, to describe the Northwestern-Oklahoma tussle (2:45–5:30 p.m.); on October 21, he was in Knoxville, describing the Tennessee-Alabama encounter (2:45–5:30 p.m.); and on October 28, he concluded his schedule for the month with an eye-witness account of the crucial Ohio State-Cornell battle in Columbus (1:45–4:30 p.m.).

OCTOBER 11: General Hugh S. Johnson, noted columnist, delivered an address com-

memorating the fiftieth anniversary of the Y.M.C.A. World Service. His topic was "Youth in a Warring World," 4:45-5 p.m.
