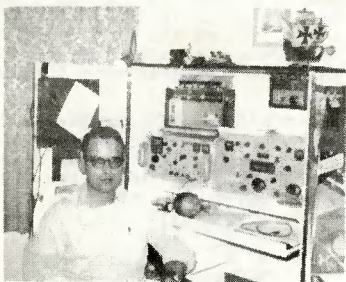

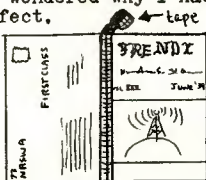
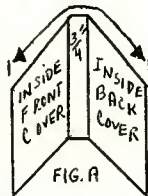
## BINDING BULLETINS IN A BOOK

FRENDX has been coming to us in neat hand size over two years. We once had the question asked, was there some way to bind FRENDXs in a notebook for easier storage? The thought of punching 3-ring holes along the narrow margin of my bulletins didn't appeal to me. It seems I had heard mention of a binder - very expensive mind you - which had removable spines in it which allowed mounting 6 FRENDX-size magazines at a time by folding one of the spines into the middle of each bulletin and fastening them all into a common binder. I was not very successful in locating such a binder - at least for the size I desired.

Then one day while watching dear spouse attempt to place a patch on my son's blue jeans it came to me.... I could attempt to bind my own bulletins. Having an old issue of FRENDX, a spare to play with, I examined the thickness of the bulletin when opened to the middle and eyed my wife's sewing machine. So, removing the staples from my FRENDX and squaring the sides straight, I inserted my FRENDX to the sewing machine, goosed the foot pedal, and guided the center line of the bulletin under the needle's foot. At the end I beamed with delight at the near perfect stitch I had put right in the middle of my bulletin. I marveled at the savings in cost of staples the club could realize. Somehow, though, I couldn't imagine Reta Ferguson pushing nearly 800 bulletins through her sewing machine every month and resolved that I would probably have to do my own.

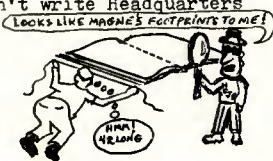
At least the process is simple. It should not be damaging to any good machine with a sharp needle and a running start. I nervously decided to go ahead with my personal copies in this binding method. At the end of six bulletins, January through June 1974, I wondered why I had not gone into the bookbinding business. They were all perfect.



The next step is not so difficult, requiring only that you choose some covers for the front and back of your "book" of six FRENDXes. I chose some stiff paper I had on hand which was about the rigidity of a laundry shirt board. Cutting it to size so that it would cover the front, bend across the edge of the book, and cover the back - taking care to make the cardpaper fold sharply. The finished and folded cardpaper should resemble figure A. Next step was also simple. Merely purchase, mix and evenly coat epoxy glue or other good glue to the approximately  $\frac{3}{4}$ " center where the folded edges of the bulletins are to be placed. Third step is not difficult, but requires some attention. One should carefully place the January bulletin face down on your left and February face up on the right. Touch the two fold ends together as in figure B, then apply a narrow strip of bookbinding tape, paper tape, or even Scotch magic mending tape. Proceed with each following month's securing back pages to next bulletin front pages, etc.

The final and easiest step is to thoroughly square the bulletins as best you can, coat with glue, insert into your paper cover. Make sure of a good glue contact, then let dry in a warm dry place. The paper cover may later be covered with cloth bookbinding tape, especially where the folds open and shut often. Artistic members might like to try their hands at decorations. Certainly, silver or gold inks look attractive for penning in the book title or contents on the outer edge as with any book.

The only other hints that I could suggest are that perhaps nylon threads may give better results, and maybe one of the new super glues would shorten the waiting period. In any case, please don't write Headquarters with requests for custom-stitched FRENDX orders.

THE AVOIDED 41 METER BAND

"Cursed is he that allocated 41M to both SWBC and to ARO's"

....or so I have always felt about the situation. The 41 meter SWBC band also means the 40 meter amateur band. It was the first band of frequencies allocated for amateur use in the western hemisphere, and for that reason mainly, we have no SWBC stations broadcasting from the western hemisphere in that band. However, nearly every other continent can be found there - in abundance!

To listeners in North America, the most frequently heard broadcasters on 41 meters (in seeming order of prominence) are: USSR, Albania, BBC and VOA, and perhaps RFE. These broadcasters tend to saturate the band more than all others combined. Other broadcasters with big signals but who are not so much a nuisance (from a DXing standpoint) include: Czechoslovakia, Israel, several Arabs, and an occasional Deutsche Welle from Malta or Rwanda.

The big thing about 41 meters is that just about every country is available on the band. And, because of the relatively higher frequency of the band, DXing has been accomplished during the entire day in mid-winter DX season.

There is a technique to learn about DXing 41 meters - the same as for any other band. It must be remembered that 41 meters is nominally used by broadcasters as a local home service daylight frequency, or it may be used for nearby regions if the station is considered international. The big-time broadcasters normally use 41 meters for short haul broadcasts into neighboring regions, but notable departures from nominal use include Radio Moscow, R. Peking, and R. Pyongyang's broadcasts into Latin America. These are truly long-haul distances.

VOA's transmitters in Tangier, Liberia and at Ascension Island are closer to west African, some Latin, and west European targets. The Woolferton and Kavala sites service Europe, the mid-east, east Africa, and the USSR. Rhode's tiny outlet covers the arab world and Turkey. Colombo transmitters cater to the sub-continent. And, the oriental far east is covered by Okinawa and the Philippine outlets. BBC, likewise, has relays on Cyprus, in Malaysia (soon to shut down), and in mid-Atlantic Ocean to get closer to intended target areas.

Admittedly, sharing the band with amateurs is an exasperating ordeal at times. Many have been the times a crucial DX moment was devastated by a ham blasting in with his quacking side band voice calling "CQ". But, the ordeal is often just as exasperating for him. After all, he was there first. The air waves are a public commodity, and the ARO has a right to be licensed to use it properly. Also, the number of amateurs grows, but the room to operate on the bands does not. What's more, the amateurs are separated by putting CW amateur radio (code) on the lower half and the phone talking amateurs on the upper half. It isn't really half, but nearly so. Anyway, the phone talkers are often in and among the international broadcasters to the chagrin of both. In this editor's opinion, some relief could be realized immediately by reversing these positions. CW amateur works seemingly would be far more tolerable to both amateur and foreign broadcaster alike if it were in the upper section of the band instead of the phone mode users. Most legitimate 41 meter commercial and international services are between 7100 and 7300 kHz.

Not only big time stations are on 41 meters. Real DX abounds!! The majority of Africans thrive there. Typical 41 meter hours of operation in west Africa are 0700-1700 GMT, and many 41 meter frequencies are 24 hours. East African use of 41 meters is not as stable, though. The African Moslem world from Egypt to Madagascar may sign on as early as 0400; others not until 0900.

Good European DX includes several smaller German transmitters; Sicily; a few western Soviet republics; a difficult Norwegian; and Polish Pathfinders if you're lucky.

41 meter Asia is the happy hunting ground for my DXing, though. The usual stations of Malaysia, India, Pakistan, and VOA/BBC/Moscow outlets are fine, but now we can add Thailand, Vietnam (both north and south versions), Nepal, Indonesia, and on and on and on.

The trick is to learn when the concerned stations are broadcasting, and the more darkness between you and the broadcaster the better are your chances. Right now, with winter nights as long as they ever will be this year is the best time to rack up those countries you missed before.

You will be amazed to learn that there are currently 97 countries by NASWA Country List available on five continents - six, if you want to count CHU Canada of North America as a broadcast station (and, it is by NASWA definition.) Good luck and good DX!!

As a parting tip: Try 7175 and 7245 around 1100 GMT or later. Can you hear oriental talk and music? Perhaps you have heard VTVN Saigon.

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THE KARELO-FINNISH SSR

Petrozavodsk, Karelia's capital, a city of 145,000, is located on the western shore of Lake Onega. Located near iron mines, it has ironworks which are serviced by the Leningrad to Murmansk Railroad which runs through the city.

The Karelians, one of the chief divisions of the Finns, first appeared in history in the 9th century. In the middle ages, they formed a strong, independent state which, sometime prior to 1478, was absorbed by the Republic of Novgorod. In that year, Novgorod itself was conquered by Muscovy (Moscow). Muscovy ceded Karelia to Sweden in 1608 in return for aid against Poland. In 1721 Russia took Karlia from Sweden. Under the Soviets, Karelia became an autonomous republic in 1923. As a result of the Soviet-Finnish War of 1939-40, Karelia gained about 13,500 square mi. at Finland's expense. The Karelo-Finnish Soviet Socialist Republic was established 31 March 1940 and became the 16th Union or Constituent Republic of the Soviet Union. Karelia was occupied in part by the Germans and Finns from 1941 to 1943. The Karelo-Finnish SSR was abolished in 1956 and its territory was absorbed by the Russian Republic. (\*See ed note) The area was then organized as the Karelian ASSR, its present status.

Petrozavodsk operates on the shortwave broadcast frequencies of 4,780 and 5,065 kHz, reported by several North American DXers. Evening winter hours or wee dark hours are recommended times to listen.

(\*Ed note: It may be well to point out that Russia is only one of the many republics comprising the USSR - albeit it is the largest and most well known, which probably the reason Russia and USSR and Soviet Union are often used interchangeably for the same thing.)

The Karelians and their close relatives the Finns, both Finno-Ugrian peoples, make up 75% of the area's 651,000 population. Russians constitute the other 25%. But the Karelians have retained their own language and culture even after centuries of Soviet control.

Located in northwest Russia in the USSR, Karelia has an area of 68,000 square miles with the cold White Sea on its eastern side. There are not important rivers, but there are numerous lakes, marshes and streams. The terrain is mostly low hills, and marshy country side. Hunting and fishing are the main occupations.

CHRISTIAN RADIO VOICES

## Foreword

The subject treated in this article should not be construed by the NASWA membership as any attempt to promote any one theological dogma over another. The subject is, rather, one which appears to have no counterpart in other established major religions, e.g. there are no known transmitters owned, operated, financed, or sponsored by or for Buddhism, Islam, etc. (SWC Editor)

A few years ago around 1200 GMT I heard a musical selection in the 19 meter band that was quite familiar to me. It was "The Old Rugged Cross." I had found the station I was listening for, SEARV, a project of the National Council of Churches of Philippines. That was not the first time - nor the last time - for me to hear one of the Christian radio stations on shortwave. In fact, the first station that I heard when I bought a short wave radio in 1960 was a missionary station.

This aspect of short wave broadcasting all started close to thirty years before on 25 December 1931 when a 250 watt station started transmitting religious messages in Spanish from high in the Andea Mountains. That station, one familiar to us all today was HCJB, La Voz de los Andes

## "THE VOICE OF THE ANDES"

Factors affecting other types of short wave stations have not left the Christian voices untouched - growth, for example, in terms of increased power and multi-band broadcasting. Some of the religious oriented stations are now among the most powerful of international broadcasts. HCJB no longer operates at 250 watts. In fact, most of them do not. The Far East Broadcasting Company has a number of 50 kilowatt transmitters in the Philippines as well as a 250 kilowatt one for KGEI, its Latin American voice.

ETLF in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia uses a 100 kilowatt transmitter in its broadcasts from Africa. Trans-World Radio has a 260 kilowatt voice in the Netherlands Antilles.

Like other stations, more so government than the commercial ones, a number of the Christian broadcasters now use more than one frequency. This is especially true of the more powerful stations, such as TWR, ETLF, FEBC, and HCJB, but it is also true of some of the less powerful ones. TGNA in Guatemala, to illustrate, uses frequencies in the 31, 49, and 90 meter bands. A station with even less power, TIFE, San Jose, Costa Rica, operates in both the 49 and 31 MB.

The number of Christian stations is also increasing. Soon, Trans-World Radio will be broadcasting from Swaziland, and they have plans for a transmitter on the island of Guam in the far west Pacific Ocean.

With the lifting by the FCC of its ban on licenses for private shortwave stations, the number on United States' soil is more feasible today than it was in the past, because with the powerful transmitters which are now available stations can reach audiences which formerly could be reached only by nearby broadcasting stations.

There still is another reason for broadcasting from within the territorial jurisdiction of the United States - to avoid what has already happened in some countries or the property of foreigners. Some missionary projects, such as hospitals and schools, have been nationalized by the foreign host governments, but so far no Christian station has suffered such a fate. The stations, though, have been affected by the nationalistic feeling prevalent now in countries at one time dominated by outsiders. A number of stations are hiring nationals for positions once held primarily by Americans. One, TIFC, has been turned over completely to the local inhabitants, and the Latin American Mission, which once had direct responsibility for the operation of the station, no longer has an office in Central America.

A few years ago 4VEH in Haiti avoided entanglement in local politics by refusing to meet the broadcast demands of rebels who landed on the Haitian coast near Cape Haitien. More recently, political problems in Burundi forced Radio Cordac off the air for a period time. (Now returned)

The Christian broadcasters today do not limit themselves to one language as HCJB did during its first six years of existence. HCJB became a bilingual station in 1937 with the addition of English language programming. Fifteen other languages may also be tun-

ed on that station today. Some international broadcasters use close to twice as many languages and dialects as HCJB, as ETLF and FEBIC. A number of Latin American stations transmit not only in Spanish, but in the languages of the Indians in their broadcast regions.

The programs on the Christian radio voices are not, as some might think, all religious in nature. In addition to the religious programs, some of which are entirely music, stations broadcast news, classical music, and DX information. Some of them operate radio schools through pre-tuned receivers located at various places in their reception areas. Radio Chortis in Guatemala and Escuelas Radiofonicas Populares in Ecuador do this in an attempt to reduce the illiteracy rate among their adult listeners. La Vox de Nahuuala carries on another activity, a rather unusual one, through its radio schools. It is called the "Seed Project." Through its classes, adults receive instruction in how and when to plant certain garden seeds, which they obtain from the station. In addition, the women are taught different ways of preparing the vegetables they have grown. Probably, the most well known station, and also one of the oldest, with radio schools, is Radio Sutatenza in Bogota, Colombia. It has been estimated that its broadcasts reach 12 million of that country's inhabitants plus residents of the adjoining countries.

DXers are constantly reminded to send return postage when requesting a verification from a station, for courtesy if for no other reason. For the religious oriented station there is a far more important reason, and it's all tied up in the financial support of the station. With the exception of one, Vatican Radio, none receives monetary support from a government.

Most of their incomes are in the form of individual contributions that reach the station through various channels. It may be that individuals contribute to their church and that money is then forwarded to the station. Or, individuals may make their contributions directly to the headquarters of the missionary group operating the station. Most of the headquarters, for the larger and powerful transmitters, are located in the U.S.A. TWR, FEBIC, HCJB, 4VEH, HRVC, TGNA, ELWA, and WYFR all fall into this category.

Occasionally the stations spell out their needs in the literature they send to DXers and others on their mailing lists. It may be that the station needs money to repair a transmitter, or money to buy a new one or to pay for increased operating costs. On one occasion, two DXers responded to the need of ELWA by buying a tape recorder and sending it to Monrovia. One other source of income for the religious oriented station is the religious organizations sponsoring programs on the station, such as the Pacific Garden Mission, the Billy Graham Evangelistic Assn, and the Good News Broadcasting Association to mention but a few.

Some financial support has also come from commercial advertisers. Most of these have been on Catholic oriented stations, but at least one or two protestant stations have accepted such commercial advertisement; Radio del Pacifico in Lima, Peru does, and the Red Lion station, WINB, of Reverends John Norris and Carl McIntire fame have advertised H-L-H (H.L. Hunt) Food Products, if not at present, then in the past.

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CHRISTIAN RADIO VOICES - Conclusion

For me, DXing the Christian radio voices has been one of the more rewarding aspects of the hobby. It has been in part because it has brought into my home visits from station personnel (HCJB and ELWA); it has brought me into contact with them through my church (visits from TWR and ELWA); and it has brought me into contact with them at work,.... one hot, muggy day in late August a few years ago I was pleased to have a visit from the program director of HRVC. On furlough from his position in Tegucigalpa, Honduras, he and his wife and children were on their way to Iowa with a U-haul trailer behind their car. They would live there for one year before returning to Central America. Reminders of that occasion are on the walls of my living room and study - a large pennant and two pieces of Mayan art work.

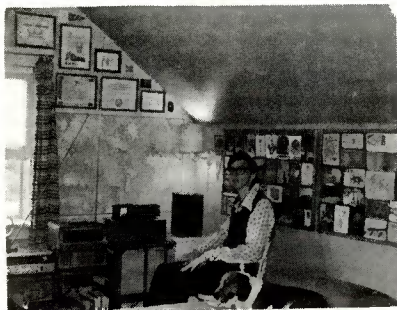

DO WE NEED A NAME?

Are you a SWL? A DXer? A SWBC enthusiast? A high frequency radio reception hobbyist? Despite varying shades of connotation, all these terms essentially are synonymous. And all are imprecise, non-descriptive and cumbersome.

Consider, for example, the overlapping inadequacy of "SWL" and "DXer". After hearing a program from one of the well-known stations, the so-called SWL often tunes casually across a high frequency band seeking other broadcast entertainment. Encountering signals from weaker, more distant stations, he may pause to learn their identity and listen to what they offer. In so doing, the SWL becomes a DXer of sorts.

And the DXer who interrupts the search for additional countries to hear a BBC program becomes a SWL of sorts. Obviously, the terms used presently to identify each listener overlap in fuzzy fashion. And, as is true of other labels applied to SW radio reception and those engaged in it, such terms are neither wholly accurate nor descriptive.

Even "shortwave" has become a semantic volley ball. Once it was two words meaning any wavelength below 200 meters. Later it became a single word applying to the frequency range between 3,000 and 30,000 kHz. But, Webster dictionary has for years defined it as any "radio wave of 60-meter wavelength or less."

Compounding the confusion is insistence by some that everything above 1,600 kHz is shortwave. Others maintain that the term applies only from 2,300 kHz up. And scientific and technological publications now often refer to the centimeter wavelengths used by radio astronomers as "short waves." So we have come full circle back to two words and more confusion.

Another shortcoming inherent in all terms associated with high frequency broadcast reception and those engaging in it is lack of emphasis on the international nature of the hobby. "SWBC reception" doesn't bridge this gap. Nor do "SWLing", "DXing," or any of the others. A puzzling aspect of our hobby is that it never acquired a fitting, descriptive name. In all the years since pre-broadcast days when we oldtimers constructed crude receivers and listened avidly for the sheet-ripping sounds of early spark transmitters, neither we nor our modern counterparts have at any time shared a descriptive identifying name for our hobby.

Sporadic, often desultory, attempts to correct this peculiar condition have been unsuccessful; no name proposal of past years gained general acceptance. Many were as non-descriptive as the fragmented nomenclature their proponents sought to replace. Some were too cumbersome for convenient usage; a few were ludicrous. Clearly, this unsolved old problem demands imaginative new thinking. Is there any valid reason why NASWA should not become the first radio-listener organization to develop and introduce a descriptive, generally-acceptable name for the hobby we share with others throughout the world?

By way of sparking other ideas and stimulating discussion, I'm tossing a nomination into the ring. It is: International Radio Monitoring (IRM).

The term denotes interest in radio at the international level; the word "monitoring" indicates the nature of this interest; and those engaged in the hobby would be referred to as International Radio Monitors. (IRMs) Despite the needed identifying words, the name is broad enough to encompass all forms of international broadcast reception interest, whether low, medium, or high frequencies. SWL/DXers could at last share a universal identity, one that not only describes the hobby and their roles in it but also one that would eliminate the inadequate terminology used today.

The word "international" has long needed stressing in identifying our hobby. As few other avocations do, it cuts across national and regional boundaries, thereby offering participants better understanding of the world, its peoples, and their historical and cultural heritages. But, this understanding- the hobby's greatest asset- is not apparent, either directly or by suggestion, in any identifying term presently in use. We need to do something about this. And, we can if we will. Give it some thought.

NASWA is willing to hear your opinions and has asked that I correlate responses. Please send your comments and suggestions to me at the address to the left. While I may not be able to answer all inquiries immediately, it is appreciated if return postage is included when a reply is desired. I would like to have your responses not later than 15 January 1975 in order that I may prepare a notice of results for February's FRENEX.

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## Interview With James Keogh, Director, United States Information Agency

The following excerpts are taken from a copyrighted interview in U.S. News and World Report. The excerpts chosen were the choice of the Short Wave Center editor for the widest possible appeal throughout the membership, and are printed with permission.

**Q** Mr. Keogh, what reaction has there been overseas to the abrupt change of Presidents in the U. S.?

**A** What we are seeing and hearing about the transition is rather remarkable. In many countries, I would say in general, the reaction is favorable toward the United States in a very thorough degree—favorable about how the institutions of the United States work.

**Q** What role did USIA—Voice of America—play in informing the rest of the world what was going on—especially the Communist countries?

**A** In the Communist countries—the closed societies—there was not much understanding of what was happening. There was an element of surprise. In the developed societies, such as in Western Europe, there was not a great deal of surprise.

We at USIA tried over a long period of time to explain what was happening. Our explanation went this way: Charges have been made against people highly placed in the Federal Government. These charges have been brought out largely by the free press. The charges are being investigated by the legislative branch of our Government, and by the judicial branch. All of this is being done very much in the open. Whatever remedial steps are necessary will be taken. While all of this process is going on, the Government of the United States goes on. And when the process is completed, the Government and society move forward.

**Q** Is the Voice of America, USIA, trying to assure people that there will be continuity?

**A** That's correct. The approach basically is the one that I was outlining before: We are making the point that we have a constitutional process, that this process works.

**Q** Just how do you get this story across to people abroad?

**A** In two principal ways:

The first is the Voice of America, which broadcasts in 36 languages around the world.

The second is what we call our wireless file. We send out five days a week to 127 U. S. diplomatic posts around the world a file that contains such matters as full texts of statements by the President, by the Secretary of State, by important public figures. Our posts are constantly delivering these full texts to government officials, journalists and other leaders in the communities.

**Q** Do you have any way of measuring the impact that USIA and the Voice of America have?

**A** We are constantly seeking ways to find out what impact we have. But we must admit that in this kind of mission it's almost impossible to really make a firm determination.

We can get surveys of how much listenership we have on the Voice of America, so we know in the main how many people in a given country are listening.

**Q** What did you people tell the Greeks and the Cypriots about U. S. inability to come galloping to the rescue?

**A** We simply relied on the statements made by the President and the Secretary of State and by other officials involved. We couldn't very well go beyond those positions.

**Q** What connection do you have with Radio Free Europe and other broadcasting groups that did have some CIA ties?

**A** We do not have any connection with Radio Free Europe or Radio Liberty. They are separate entities, and they are both still jammed.

**Q** Does the Soviet Government try to discourage listening to VOA?

**A** Every indication we have is that there is no effort made to discourage listening—that the people do listen now, and listen quite openly.

**Q** Why do you think they jam Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty and not Voice of America?

**A** Because Radio Liberty, which is the one that is particularly targeted toward the Soviet Union, has a different mission than the Voice of America.

The Voice of America essentially seeks to tell the rest of the world about the United States. Radio Liberty, on the other hand, seeks to serve as a substitute for a free press within the Soviet Union, so its mission is to broadcast to the Soviet Union about the Soviet Union. I believe that it's the difference in those two approaches that has caused them to continue jamming Radio Liberty while they stopped jamming Voice of America.

**Q** Mr. Keogh, very few Americans have actually heard a Voice of America broadcast. Do you use entertainment and music, or is it all news and analysis?

**A** We have news and analysis and commentary and discussion and entertainment. Our whole thrust on the Voice—as in everything we do in USIA—is to try to present to the rest of the world a fundamental picture of American society. So, on the Voice of America we will have programs of American jazz and of country music. We'll have interview shows; we have a program called "New York, N. Y.," in which people are interviewed in New York—conversation about what's happening in the city.

**Q** Why don't we hear the Voice of America in the U. S.?

**A** We are legally prohibited from distributing any of our products in the United States.

I wish that we could distribute more of what we do in the United States, because I believe then that there would be a better understanding of what we do.

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### NHK speeds up prospect of satellite-to-home

Japanese engineers have developed a TV receiving system that they say could bring about satellite-to-home transmission within five years.

The NHK Technical Research Laboratories, a government-funded research organization, plans to put the system in limited use some time in 1977. NHK, in conjunction with General Electric Corp., is now constructing an experimental 12 ghz broadcast satellite designed to send signals to the home terminals.

Technically, the satellite-to-receiver signal would be transmitted within the FM band. An AM-FM converter attached to a standard receiver would transform the image into a standard television signal. A four-and-one-half-foot receiving antenna would complete the home system.

Having already established that satellite-to-home transmissions are technically feasible, the engineers are now working

to bring the cost of the home unit down to a range within the means of the consumer. It is estimated that an experimental receiving system would cost \$5,000 as a single unit. Mass produced in quantities of 1,000, the total cost would decrease to \$3,000. But in quantities of more than 10,000, it is reported, the total cost of the converter and antenna would be less than \$1,000—and on the consumer market could be reduced to between \$300 and \$800.

The emerging experimental satellite is tentatively scheduled for launching in early 1977. Initially, cost factors are expected to cause the forthcoming satellite transmissions to be limited to local distribution, with direct-to-home service envisioned at a later date.

The NHK system has attracted worldwide interest, and was recently reported in detail in the journal of the International Telecommunications Union. Staffers at the Office of Telecommunications Policy are observing the project's developments closely.

## WHAT CAN I HEAR?

(Part 2 of a series)

Last month you learned how and when to hear -- and verify -- the two clandestine operations beamed to Spain -- Radio Independent Spain and Radio Euzkadi. This month we will present something more exotic to exercise your new Christmas gear with: the Asian Communist "Voice of Malayan Revolution".

As you probably already know from experience or other articles in FRENEX, reception of Asian stations in North America -- particularly the east coast -- is usually difficult and frustrating. If you run a string on top a globe from an Asian site to your QTH you will find it invariably passes near the North Pole. And any radio signal that has to pass through the polar zones winds up being unreliable, weak and fluttery.

Nevertheless, there are moments most days when you can do surprisingly well trying to log Asian DX catches. The most popular is in the local morning, such as about 1000-1200 GMT on the east coast, but there is another opening between roughly 2000-0100 to the east coast and beyond. The openings to the west coast are, of course, far longer and signal strength is better, to boot.

Another way to log rare Asian catches is to try for them just before a geomagnetic disturbance. Many DXers figure that since the Asian signals have to pass through the North Pole, they will be hit first by a magnetic "storm". This isn't always so. Sometimes the European signals will go first, leaving the bands clearer for Asian and other signals, which are often "enhanced" in strength just before getting wiped out themselves. This is an uncommon situation and of brief duration, but it results in both reduced QRM (interference) and stronger Asian signals.

Another advantage of listening to Asian signals is that they are not severely effected by jamming; the only serious attempts at jamming in Asia are by the Chinese (usually a white "hissing" sound) and the Soviets. The Chinese jamming, in particular, is usually substantially weaker than the target station, at least as received in North America.

## MALAYSIA

### Voice of Malayan Revolution

The Voice of Malayan Revolution's transmitters are located in Hengyang, Hunan Province, China, where they beam programs of the Malayan Communist Party to non-Communist Malaysia and Singapore. These programs, which are produced at the Party headquarters in Kunming, Yunnan Province, China, used to be shrill and dogmatic, but as of late (and as with Radio Peking) they have been delivered in a calmer and more effective manner.

Ever since the station came on the air on November 15, 1969, it has been widely heard throughout the world, thanks in large part to its use of powerful (likely 120 kw) transmitters. Indications are that it will continue to operate in the same manner after the establishment of diplomatic relations between Malaysia and China by the time you read this. Among other things, the Chinese deny aiding the MCP and the MCP stresses its independence from the Peking government, despite the MCP's Maoist brand of Marxist doctrine.

Because the Voice of Malayan Revolution is not all that difficult to hear, and because one of its program languages is standard Chinese (Mandarin), it may be of interest to students of Asian affairs. If nothing else, it can serve as a unique reference source for a term paper or thesis.

Although there have been indications the VoMR is deliberately jammed by the Malaysian government, such jamming, if still in effect, has never been even moderately effective outside Asia.

It's possible that along the west coast the station can be heard on either or both of its channels throughout nearly all its broadcast day. For the east coast listener, though, it's more difficult, but the best chances are underlined in the schedule below.

0430-0510 Malay, 0515-0545 Chinese, 0550-0630 Tamil on 11830, 15789 kHz  
 1030-1110 Malay, 1115-1145 Chinese, 1150-1230 Tamil on 11830, 15789 kHz  
 1245-1325 Malay, 1330-1400 Chinese, 1405-1445 Tamil on 11830, 15789 kHz  
 2200-2240 Malay, 2245-2315 Chinese, 2320-2400 Tamil on 7305, 15789 kHz

There are a number of ways to tell if you have the Voice of Malayan Revolution. First, there is nothing else operating on 15789 kHz. Second, there are five-minute Malayan orchestral musical interludes between language segments. Third, of course, you will ultimately know by the ID: in Malay it's "Ini-lah Suara Revolusi Malaya"; in Chinese "Malaya Geming Chih Sheng Kwangpo Tientai"; and in Tamil "Malaya Puratchi-kural Vanoli Nalayam". If these are a bit hard to digest on first hearing, try taping them so you can go back and listen again to make sure.

OK, who's going to give me my bamboo-bordered verification for this one, eh? Well, you'll have to tell us that, for no verifications are known to exist. DXers have tried Radio Peking, Prince Sihanouk (remember this telegram, published in last year's CB?), the MCP's headquarters, all to no avail. Although verification in the near future is unlikely, no matter what you try, the best chance probably includes some sort of face-saving way by which the MCP can make the verification appear as though it came from a "liberated zone" of Malaysia.

#### CLANDESTINE NEWS

##### Voice of the Thai People

In the October, 1974, issue of CB it was reported that, according to the Thai press, the Voice of the Thai People had been reactivated early August after being silent for roughly two years. This didn't quite jibe with our own recollection of events, nor, as it turned out, did it jibe with the logs of at least three Asia watchers.

Verbatim: "Thai cland off? Hell no, never! I check the BBC daily on 9410 and on the domestic set this powerful Thai is my marker and every morning at dawn that screaming revolutionary woman has greeted me!" (Victor Goonetilleke, Sri Lanka)

"Regarding the info on 'Voice of the Thai People' in the October CB, I doubt that the station was ever off the air. Heard them almost daily here last winter." (Ernie Behr, Manitoba)

"I was amazed to see the news of Voice of the Thai People's one-year absence (in the case of FRENDX two years). Though some newspapers and even some in the DX press have reported the absence, I'm quite sure that the news is incorrect, for I myself have been receiving the station since last year and even have tape recordings of the signal with its distinctive IS and ID. However, I can add that the station has been silent for some (not all!) local nights. So the station was on the air last year with a very short inactive period (one month at most). Hiroyuki Nagase of Tokyo agreed with me on that matter." (Isao Ugusa, Japan)

Of course, the Thai government and the Thai press knew all this, and more, so the question looms as to why they chose to misrepresent the period of inactivity of the station? I could be sloppy reporting...a very unlikely possibility. It could also be an exercise in the Thai government's trying to appear more powerful in Peking than it really is; however, most Thai citizens can readily hear this powerful station and thus establish the truth for themselves. What the real reason was is yet to be seen, but if your DX talents are good, you can hear the station for yourself. On the west coast it is often heard on both channels. Best bets for the east coast are underlined.

2300-2345 Thai; 0000-0045 White Meo (W/F/Su); 0300-0345 Thai; 0400-0445 Laotian;  
 0500-0545 Thai; 1000-1045 Thai; 1100-1145 White Meo (Tu/Th/Sa); 1200-1245 Lao-  
tian; 1300-1345 Thai; 1430-1515 Laotian; 1530-1615 Thai, all on 6035 & 9423 kHz.

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The station, which is operated by the Maoist "Thai Communist Party", has been on the air since March 1, 1962, with revolutionary programs beamed to Thailand from transmitter sites in either the Kunming area of Yunnan Province, China, and/or northeast Laos. Although the programs over the two transmitters are the same, they are not always in phase, suggesting separate transmitter locations. Jamming has been noted in the past.

You can tell the station by its distinctive IS, as Isao Ugusa pointed out. It's a 13-note tune played on soft chimes, very pleasant. The ID's are, in the various languages: Thai, "Thini, Sathani Withayu Sieng Prachachon Haeng Prathet Thai"; Laotian, "Thini, Stani Withayu Sieng Prachachon Haeng Prathet Thai"; and White Meo, "Da-na, Fatan tiao Fatu com Prethet Thai". That last one sounds as though it were read by Minnie and Mickey Mouse!

As with the other widely-heard Chinese-based clandestine, the Voice of Malayan Revolution, there are no known verifications, and none are likely forthcoming.

#### "Radio Free Portugal" Quits Airwaves

In its broadcast at 2320 on 25th October, Radio Free Portugal, the Portuguese-language, pro-communist clandestine radio, announced that its programs were to be suspended with immediate effect and that the station would close down.

The station said its mission had been accomplished; due to the new conditions in Portugal there was freedom of the press and information now reached the popular masses by other means. In a review of its work the station said that it went on the air on 12th March 1962 and had broadcast without interruption since that time.

The "final" broadcast was repeated at each transmission period until 2320 on 27th October, inclusive.

Radio Free Portugal broadcast three times a day -- from 0700-0800, 1800-1955 and 2320-0020 -- with an additional transmission, from 1200-1230, on Sundays. It employed four shortwave transmitters, believed to be located in Bucharest, which operated outside the official broadcasting bands. (BBC Monitoring Service, reproduced by permission)

This may be a welcome political development, but it also eliminates one of the most easily-heard clandestines from the airwaves and renders moot the question of whether there was a second site for these transmissions in Rumania. Although a couple of claims have been made indicating this or that DXer had obtained a verification from RFP, it appears that, in fact, no verifications were issued during the life of the station. It still may be possible, if you have written in your logbook a recent and sufficiently-detailed logging of this station, to try for a verification through the legal offices of the Portuguese Communist Party in Lisbon. If you are diplomatic, accurate, and write in Portuguese, you just may get an 11th-hour QSL yet...perhaps the only one.

#### Soviet-Based Fake "Radio Peking" Noted Again

As reported in earlier editions of CB, the Soviet Union has operated a station which is in parallel with Radio Peking's Chinese Home Service (or, variously, other domestic radio outlets), but for a brief portion of commentary actually originating from the Soviet Union. This ultra-black propaganda station was noted from May 1 to May 10, 1974, on 7520 kHz with programs of from 7-23 minutes length at 1100, 1130, 1230, 1330 and 1430, complete with a s/on anthem of "The East Is Red" (Radio Peking HS version) and s/off anthem of the "Internationale" (again, Radio Peking HS version).

Now, Isao Ugusa tells us that two well-known Japanese DXers, Hiroyuki Nagase and Hideharu Torii, have unearthed this station again on 6005 kHz between 1200-1220 and 1300-1320 on October 6, 1974. According to Isao, his later checks on that channel were unsuccessful, and he opines that the station is either once again inactive or that it operates with considerable irregularity so as to fool Chinese jamming efforts.

#### "Radio Pathet Lao" Alters Schedule

According to Victor Gometilleke, the 7055v kHz channel of the Radio Pathet Lao's "Second Network" in Laotian, formerly 1157-1458 on 4538, 7055v and 8660 (irr.) kHz, has vanished, thus putting the status of the Second Network into doubt. About the same time Isao Ugusa reports a new channel for the "First Network": 6213v kHz //6200v at al. He finds the new channel stronger than the nearby 6200v parallel, which suggests it may be audible some mornings on the NA east coast. Although the exact schedule may be changed from that in our files, it should not be far off:

2227-0230, 0255-0710 and 0855-1600 on any or all of the following: 4660v, 6200v, 6213v, 7310v (still active, or is 6213v ex-7310v?), and 7480 kHz

The station is located mainly in North Vietnam (at least one of these transmitters is located in the Voice of Vietnam field near Hanoi), but Western press sources that have traveled to Sam Neua insist that at least part of the technical facilities are located there. This may account for the programs, which are otherwise the same, being slightly out of phase on one transmitter. Regardless of the site (except possibly for the 6213v transmitter, which has not yet been evaluated), each transmitter is unlikely to have an RF output exceeding 20 kw. The Pathet Lao claim each transmitter is 10 kw.

The ID's are: French, "Ici la Voix de Pathet Lao" (French 0100-0115 & 1500-1515 only); Laotian, "Thi ni witayu kachai siang fai Pathet Lao"; Vietnamese, "Day la dai Pathet Lao". The IS is an Asian xylophone and strings. It signs on and off with an Asian anthem, but not the Laotian National Anthem.

Verifications are very rare, especially now, but have traditionally been by letter from Mr. Sisana Sisan, Director, Radio Pathet Lao, 40 Quang Trung Street, Hanoi, Democratic Republic of Viet Nam; write a diplomatic report in French for best results.

#### Unidentified Asian Clandestines Heard in Japan

Isao Ugusa reports that the Cambodian clandestine formerly heard, then believed off, on 6990v kHz is once again active from very roughly 1000-1700.

Our file notes, derived from Messrs. Nagase, Ugusa, Hosono and Goonetilleke, show this to possibly be the black propaganda operation of the Phnom-Penh government and beamed to the soldiers of the pro-Sihanouk "National United Front of Kampuchea". To that extent it is reminiscent of the CIA-run "Radio Pakse" operation of a few years back, which was exposed by a Western newsmen.

Isao Ugusa also notes the unidentified Korean on 4490v kHz is now a regular from 1200-1400. It has been traced since at least July 26, 1974, with Korean-language talks lauding "General Kim Il-Sung".

The pro-Kim Il-Sung orientation suggests it emanates from North Korea; however, the North Korean propaganda organs traditionally refer to him as anything but the heavy-sounding rubric, "General". For example, he is the "Leader", "Great Leader", "Fatherly Leader", and so on, plus, of course, "Comrade", and the unusual term "General" may suggest the operation is black and actually based in South Korea. The South Korean CIA is known, and privately has admitted in recent years, to have run stations of this type beamed primarily to North Korea.

The Far Eastern Economic Review, via Lars Rydén, indicates in its October 4 issue that a clandestine radio station has been operating out of Hué, broadcasting accusations against President Thieu made by Catholic priest Father Tran Huu Thanh. No further data is given, but it is certainly unrelated to the Hué-based "Radio Mother of Vietnam", a pro-Thieu operation.

#### Bolivian Rebels Capture Stations in Santa Cruz

According to reports by AP and UPI, via Myron Reamy, a number of radio broadcasting stations in Santa Cruz were captured November 7. The rebels, who reportedly were put down in short order, appear to have been nationalistically-oriented rightists concerned with poor administration, rather than leftists or Marxists.

The WRTH lists a number of stations in Santa Cruz.

ECUATORIAL GUINEA - RIO MUNI Rio Muni is located in West Africa. The Cameroen's border it to the north and Gabon wraps around the southern and eastern fringes. The Atlantic Ocean washes Rio Muni's shores to the west. Spanish is spoken in Rio Muni, unlike it French speaking neighbors. Timber for furniture and chocolate are the major exports of the country. It is interesting to note that some of the world's few white apes are found here. Off the coast are many volcanic islands - including Fernando Poo. Radio - Ecuatorial, in Bata, La Vez del Rio Muni is the radio voice of this tiny African nation. It was believed for some time that RE-LVRM had closed down its transmitters but Dan Henderson heard them on the familiar 4926 KHZ outlet at the NASWA Convention this year. They are scheduled to s/en at 0430-2000 on weekdays; 0700-2200 on Sundays. Also look for them running as late as 2300 sign off. Reception on ECNA is often at a fair level. Marginal copy is reported fm the Mid West areas. When listening for RE-LVRM, watch out for the nearby Latin American stations - they are easy to mix up.

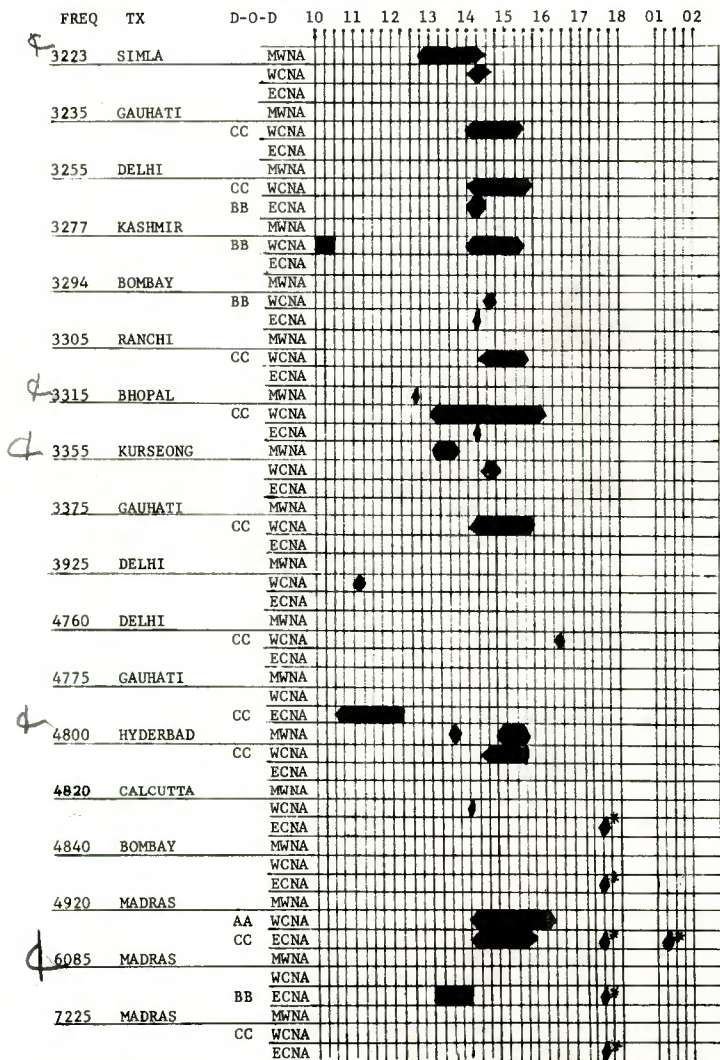

LN SPECIAL PROJECT — ALL INDIA RADIO'S REGIONAL STATIONS

Compiling an India Chart was the task of Listener's Notebook's second Special Project. The India Chart is a collection of all the regional All India Radio (AIR) stations heard in the US in the past one year. This survey will NOT include the External or General Overseas services of AIR - only the regional stations. It was not our intention to graphically list all regional AIR frequencies and corresponding sign-on and sign-off times. We instead included in the graph below average tune-in and tune-out times as well as sign-on and sign-off times which were actually observed either from year old loggings and observations or from loggings of the current period. Each frequency has three graphs, one for ECNA, one for MWNA, and one for WCNA. The objective of the India Charts is to give NASWA members an overview into the India picture as to what stations are



generally available, on what frequencies, and at what times, also combined with an "index figure" for rating the degree of difficulty (D-O-D) of reception into the listener's shack. Maybe we could refer to the D-O-D as "tunability" of the station. How hard of a catch is this station? Is it

there all of the time, some of the time, or not very often? Establishing the "index figure" required our monitors to make a value judgement. We could not rely on S-meter readings on the same signal copied on the same antenna, etc. Therefore our D-O-D "index figures" are: AA... easy copy, noted most of the time, may be termed as a benchmark station. BB... moderate reception, noted some of the time. CC... occasional reception noted, may be heard only on good Indian days, a gen-u-ine tuffie, first class DX. The index figures will not apply for everyone throughout the listed geographical area but should give you a good idea of what you are up against. Times listed in the charts will not be accurate for the entire DX season. Again, our times listed will provide you with a basis for comparison to see when others in your area have been hearing station "X". Don Jensen reasoned in the Indonesian Special Project, equally applicable in the Indian Charts, "fade in times, etc. would vary considerably over the season ... they would tie closely to the sunrise period ((in the listener's area)). That is, for say location "Y", optimum time would center on about 1200 early in Oct., about 1230 early in Nov., after 1300 in Dec., around 1330 in Jan. ((in a certain area))." Of particular interest though are the freakish 1730 GMT leggings on 60, 49, and 41 meter band AIR stations made on the East Coast recently. It just goes to prove that anything is possible! ... the ionosphere is the limit! Our expert monitors for this Special Project were Bill Davis, CA; Dave Williams OR; Jim Young, CA; and Dan Henderson, WCNA/MD representing WCNA. MWNA was represented by Gerry Dexter of WI. The ECNA rep's were Al Sizer, CT; Dan Henderson, MD/WCNA, Mike Ross, NY; and Dan Jamison, VA. Symbols used in the graph are ~~◀~~ which equals tune in time; ~~▶~~ which equals tune out time; ~~■~~ which equals sign on time; and ~~□~~ which equals sign off time. ATTENTION ATTENTION; RESPONSE FROM RADIO MOSCOW concerning the prohibiting of DX'ing and prosecutions of DX'ers in the USSR has been received fm Tom Gavaras, MI. The following is a quotation of the entire script received of Radio Moscow's "DX Program" aired on October 10, 1974:  
 "Hello, DX-ers! Just a few days ago I received two almost identical letters. They were sent in by William Oliver, of Levittown, Pa., and Mitch Rudman, of Cherry Hill, New Jersey. They reported the following. "FRENEX", the monthly publication of the North American Shortwave Association reprinted an article from the September issue of "Sweden Calling - DX'ers". The article said that one of the Russian DX-ers had been in trouble with the authorities after his name was mentioned in "Sweden - Calling DX'ers". The article went on to allege that DX-ing would be prohibited here and in the future DX-ers would be persecuted. That was the gist of the letters. The only difference between them was that while William Oliver wrote the above comment was impossible to believe because such things are usually printed without any basis, Mitch Rudman swallowed the bait. He even chose not to extend his 73's to us. Well, first of all I am not aware of the reason why the name of that poor DX-er was not mentioned. Most probably, because anonymity is very conducive to making sweeping generalizations. And then I was very surprised that such a nonsense like alleged prohibition of DX-ing here, could be published at all. If it doesn't blow credibility of these publications, then it certainly puts their good taste and judgment up for scrutiny. Many Soviet DX-ers are known to have pen-pals abroad. They not only correspond with their counterparts, but quite often their names appear in DX programs and publications. But why this fuss this time? There is only one way I can figure it out. In the Soviet Union, as elsewhere, there exist certain regulations that are aimed at combatting loose behavior by hams. They also apply to DX-ers, especially those who possess powerful SW receivers. You know that high power, badly tuned antennas and blaring receivers create inconveniences to public: they interfere with TV reception or give plain headaches to neighbors. And of course, they forbid any activity to these who operate illegally, that is without a license. According to these regulations, first-time offenders usually get away with a reprimand or a small fine. But if they persist in their wrong doing, their equipment can be confiscated. So, I think that it was one of these "radio heiligans", as we refer to them here, who passed a letter to "Sweden - Calling DX-ers". It can't be otherwise because, I repeat, our radio operators and DX-ers do correspond with people abroad. There is a lot of talk in the West about preserving the spirit of 1973 - the year of DX friendship - this year too. Publication of dubious letters, unchecked complaints and sheer concoctions about the state of affairs here goes against that spirit. Well, and that's all for today. Tune in to our DX program next Thursday at the same hour. Good-bye and good listening."

LN's editor's comment: (To get in on the ground floor on this issue, please refer to page LN-4 of the September 1974 edition of FRENDX, the last article on that page.) "Sweden Calling DX'ers" has, in the past - and I am positive that it will continue to be, a reliable and credible source of information for the DX and SWL fraternity of the world. Much useful and interesting data from SCDX has been used in LN before in an effort to present material to the readers of FRENDX so that they may form a basis for their style of listening. The controversial article which first appeared in SCDX, then later in LN, was supplemental in nature when it came out in LN ... it was "good to know" information about a fellow DX'er. The SCDX article, was not one of these "this is the way it was" articles. The discreet editor of SCDX did express, in my opinion, unbelievability in the initial report when he said that "...Well, if this is true...". I do hope that SCDX was victim of a "radio heeigan", as Radio Moscow refers to them. There is, though, a glaring fallacy, in my opinion, in the Radio Moscow stated reason for regulation of the shortwave listening hobby in the Soviet Union. The fallacy is putting the ham and the SW DX'er on the same scale for measurement ... in this case, on an equal basis for regulation - according to the reasons stated in the script of Radio Moscow's DX Program. I am not very technically minded in the electronics field, but it seems like Radio Moscow is inferring that the receiver is a source of high powered RF energy. That sounds like a transmitter to me. Also, I have never heard of many badly tuned receiving antennas being the source of interference for TV reception. I think that it would be very interesting to read an article which might appear in "Short Wave Center" of FRENDX prepared by Radio Moscow on the subject of SWL'ing and DX'ing in the Soviet Union. What do you think Radio Moscow? (LN editor)

The solar activity peaked moderately at 101 Nov. 4-5. Quiet geomagnetic conditions prevailed until Nov. 8. Minor disturbances occurred between Nov. 8 and 14 with several good DX catches noted here. I am missing some data this month, but the period was 24 days, so we appear to be having another rise in solar activity about Nov. 25. There may be good DX conditions developing by Thanksgiving weekend. Another peak will be due just before Christmas, with geomagnetic storms possible shortly thereafter.
