Now that the holidays are over, perhaps your editor will be able to resume his routine schedule in getting out this Bulletin. We hope that all of you had a grand and glorious time over the holidays and are now ready to 'get back into the swing of things' with some good DXing. But enough of this sort of gossip, it's time we turned our attention to the news on hand this week.

A letter from WATR 1190 kcs. Waterbury, Conn. advises us that beginning Monday morning, January 13 and continuing through Sunday morning, January 19, their station will present a DX program between 1:00 and 3:00 A.M., EST. They say that if the response is satisfactory to these broadcasts that they may make them a regular feature from their station. We also understand that our club is going to receive mention during the course of these broadcasts.

We certainly were sorry that we did not know about those South American tests which took place on Dec. 26 and Jan. 2, in time that we could have notified you through the medium of this Bulletin. You will all note however, that these tests took place on Thursday mornings, a week apart!!! This may mean that these tests will be continued each Thursday morning, and on the other hand they may be a monthly frequency check schedule for the first and last Thursday mornings of each month. Just as soon as we learn more about the intentions of these stations, we shall advise you immediately.

There seems to be quite a mix-up this month so far about the change in the Monitoring Schedule. During the first seven days, quite a few stations have been found on the air with their frequency checks, which as we advised you last week is no longer in effect, inasmuch as these tests are now heard the second seven days of each month. We believe that by next month, all the stations will have their schedule straightened out, so if you should happen to miss any of them this month, don't fail to be on the lookout for them in future months.

During the course of the program from WJBO 1420 kcs. Baton Rouge, La. on Sunday morning, ye editor heard them announce that owing to the change in the monitoring schedule, that their DXes would take place the first and fourth Sunday mornings of each month, instead of the second and fourth as had been their policy so far this season.

During the past week, we have found that there has been a general improvement in the reception of the Europeans once again. During Xmas week, reception from the Europeans dwindled quite a bit, due possibly to the severe storms which followed the Sunday after Xmas. However by the middle of this past week, reception had greatly improved and many of our members have reported the best reception from the Europeans that they have experienced thus far this season. Reception from these stations should last for another six weeks or so, therefore we urge you all to make the best of your opportunities and try your hand at hearing the Europeans.

A letter from Victor C. Diehm, Manager of Hazleton, Penna. to our CPCman, J. Warren Rutzahn advises him that their station will put on a DX program, a portion of which is to be dedicated to the members of our club, on Wednesday morning, February 19, between 3 and 4 A.M., EST. The call letters of this station are W7L and they operate on 1420 kcs.

We hope that Mr. Frommater will find his membership in our club very beneficial to his DXing activities.

Arthur H. Brackbill, our very excellent CPC Chairman, and who spent Sunday afternoon and evening, paying a visit to ye editor, advises us that in a letter received from N. E. Grover, of WKAR East Lansing, Mich. he states that their station will be on the air with a DX program on Sunday morning, January 12 between 2:30 and 4:30 A.M., EST. We understand that a portion of this broadcast will be for the members of our club, hence all members are urged to set their dials to 850 kcs. in an effort to hear this program and send in their report. Incidentally to our knowledge this will be the first DX that WKAR have presented on their new frequency and hence they should be very anxious to hear from each and every one of you.

John J. Barlow, our Berkeley, Calif. CPCer sends us some more good news. First that WFD, 1370 kcs., Wilmington, N. C., will dedicate a program to the members of our club on Sunday morning, January 26 between 4:00 and 4:30 A.M., EST. Also that KFJZ will dedicate their February frequency check to the members of our club. This program will take place, Wednesday morning, February 12 between 4:00 and 4:20 A.M., EST. Thanks for these two fine specials, John!!!!

It is rumored that Cherry & Webb, owners of WPRO and a department store in Providence, R.I., are buying WTIC, Hartford, Conn., and contemplate moving the station to Boston, or nearby, if sale is consummated.

A good friend of the DXing fraternity, manager "Al" McKee of WHBU, Anderson, Ind., has resigned after eight years of service with that station. "Al" has always been a good friend to DXers, and I know we will miss the hearty co-operation he gave radio clubs and their members. Good luck to you, OM.

Unless the FCC reverse their decision, the call KEHE (Combination of KTH-KELLY) will not be used. Hearst newspapers, owners of both stations, wanted to consolidate the two stations, but the FCC ruled that the surrounding area must be served by two stations.

SHORT WAVE DEPARTMENT

The Honolulu Advertiser still looks forward to favorable decision from the Federal Communications Commission which will grant the Hawaiian journal permission to construct their first official short-wave broadcast station. The Advertiser's station KGU is logged regularly on the broadcast band by many DX fans in the United States and Canada, but reception of this transmitter is confined to the early hours of the morning or late evening as it may be on the West Coast. The short wave station will provide daily programs for American listeners. There are fourteen licensed short wave transmitters in Hawaii at the present time, used largely for communication.

Little thought was given to the Ethiopian stations till the actual hostilities had actually commenced. Perhaps you are not aware of the fact that way over in Iceland there are seventeen calls issued to stations in twelve different towns. Many of these have outfits using only 'four' watts power.

Station 2RO was pushing a most consistent signal into New Canaan, Conn. last Saturday evening at 7:15 P.M., EST. YV6RV was heard near the 40 meter amateur band with a studio musical program. A powerful signal was heard in the 49 meter section from some station in Havana. As it was close to 50 meters, it is possible that the station was COCD. No identification was heard.

Can any of our readers give any light on station CZA 1560 kcs, 1920 meters using a power of 4,000 watts? The short wave DX hound may be interested in trying for station YDB6 191 meters, or 1570 kc, which is located in Malang, Netherland India. YDB6 uses 100 watts power and has a daily schedule as follows: 5:30 - 11:00 A.M. 5:45 - 6:45 P.M. 10:30 - 1:30 A.M. EST. NK2Z has been reported on the hi-side of the 20 meter band. Stop, look, and listen at 3:30 P.M., EST. 73s Ed.

We have so much information on hand this week, that we have decided to make this week's Bulletin an Eight Page affair. We hope that you will all approve of these two additional pages this week!!!!

A last minute notice advises us that WKAR may not be able to DX on their new frequency after all on Jan. 12, so, if you don't hear them on their new frequency, be sure to try for them on their old.

We want to take off our hat to a great piece of work that has been done by Bill Applegate, one of the NNRC CPCers who is responsible for the Canadian Frolic for NNRC this coming Sunday morning, the schedule of which appears in the DX Calendar. It is possible that CKIC, 1010 kcs., Wolfville, N. S., will open the frolic at 2 A.M., for 20 minutes and that CHICK, 1310 kcs., Charlottetown, P.E.I., will be on from 2:20 to 2:40 A.M. Another fine piece of work on the part of Bill is his having lined up CFFR, 580 kcs., Prince Rupert, B. C. for a DX program on Wednesday morning, January 15 between 3:00 and 4:00 A.M., EST. This will be the first program of this type to originate from CFFR, inasmuch as this is one of the newest stations to take the air in Canada.

Ted Grosvenor of Wichita, Kansas advises us that KLRA have cancelled all DX programs which had been scheduled from that station. Ted also offers to act in the capacity of "Technical Advisor" for our club. Any of you members who may have questions pertaining to radio, be sure to get in touch with Ted. His address is 247 S. He will attempt to answer some of the questions through our weekly Bulletins, however those of you that might prefer a letter in answer to your query, are asked to enclosed 3¢ to cover return postage. Thanks for your kind offer Ted, we take great pleasure in appointing you as our "Technical Advisor."

John E. Ott our Sanborn, Iowa member who has just recently become a member of our club, has consented to be our NPO for his state, he is hereby officially appointed as such, he will be known as NPO #16.

Ralph Metzger, Jr. B. M. I., Bordentown, N. J. wants help in identifying a station that he heard on the morning of January 1st, at 4:25 A.M., on 720 kcs.; it was a Spanish Speaking station and was about R7. Can anyone identify this one for Ralph? If you can, drop him a line at the above address, we know he'll appreciate it a lot.

A letter from our Canadian CPCer, Bill Stone advises us that CKCR, 1510 kcs., Waterloo, Ont., will be on the air with a DX program for the members of our club on Saturday morning, January 25th, beginning at 12:30 A.M., EST. Just how long this program will last we do not know but presume it will last for at least a half hour.

Bob Rawstron, 16 Marconi Road, Worcester, Mass. also sends in an SOS. He asks what station was operating between 962-965 kcs., on the evening of Jan. 1st. between 9:32 and 9:58 P.M. Says he believes they signed off at 9:58 P.M. There was a man and woman alternating the singing of several songs. Bob says that this was a Spanish speaking station too. He'll appreciate hearing from anyone who has any information regarding the identity of this station.

A card received from Eric Butcher our Cokeville, Wyoming member, to of some of his fine catches on SWS again. He says his latest verifs are from YV10ASC, HI2K, W10LPH, CO9JQ. He also asks whether any of our members have verifs from YV10ASC besides himself?

We are in receipt of a very fine letter from H. A. Turner, our Bridg

eville, Penna. member in which he advises us that he has been successful in hearing Rennes R5-6 and Fecamp an R5 on the morning of Dec. 24th. From the way he speaks we believe that this is the first time that he has heard either of these stations, so we want to congratulate him upon having been successful in hearing the Europeans. Mr. Turner is one of several of our members who reports having heard KNET 1420 kcs., Palestine Texas on the air with a test program on Dec. 31. He also reports excellent reception of the South Americans last Thursday morning. However there is one note of regret in Mr. Turner's letter, he tells us that he has been having trouble with his appendix, we hope it will not be necessary to have an operation, and that everything will come around OK.

A letter from Francis Kline, our Quakertown, Penna. member advises us that on Dec. 25 he heard XEOX, Saltillo, Mexico operating on 640 kcs., from 10 to 10:30 P.M. Also that on Dec. 26 he heard W2KR operating on a frequency of 1550 kcs., from 7 to 8 P.M.

A letter from the Westinghouse Electric & Mfg. Co., Pittsburgh, Pa. advises us that after the New Year acknowledgement of short wave reception reports made to Westinghouse station W8KK, Pittsburgh and WLXK, Boston, will discontinued according to a decision made by the Company's radio executives.

We have had some very interesting correspondence from Frank Field, Jr. Johnson City, Tenn. recently, so we are accordingly passing it along to the rest of you. Frank reports R5-7 reception of LRL on January 2. He also reports that LS2 was heard coming through WOAI on Jan. 2 from 7:30 to 8:00 P.M. with a very clear announcement at 8 P.M. He also reports that on Jan. 5 he heard HIX on 800 kcs. and CJOC on 1230 kcs. which were different frequencies than we had advised you to watch in last week's Bulletin. We might say that we had been notified that these stations had planned to change their frequencies for these broadcasts.

Another card from Eric Butcher, with the information that he has heard several other catches which would bear a little watching on the behalf of the other members of our club. J. B. Reilly, NFO #4, Jamestown, N. Y. - Dec. 30 - snowing and quite heavy steady static. XEAQ, WPMO, WMBR, WJLA, WAIM all quite good. Dec. 31 - very very noisy. 7 P.M. on 970 kcs. a spanish speaking station QRM-ed WFL until about 9 P.M. Can anyone identify? DX very poor in the A.M. Jan. 1 - Radio fairly quiet, but due to all night programs on networks could do very little with DXing. CMJF heard at 3 A.M. and CMQ heard at 2:50 A.M. Jan 2nd - Reception good, very light static. LR4 at 2:08 A.M. QSA4, R6. LRL at 2:48 A.M. QSA4, R7. Almost perfect reception. LS2 at 3:28 A.M. QSA4, R7. Almost perfect. KMMJ testing at 2 A.M. Fecamp, Rennes and Bordeaux all came in about QSA4, R6, with Fecamp the best. Jan. 3 Very little static all night. Fecamp, KEX, XEAQ, WPFB, Rennes and Bordeaux all came in pretty good. Heard CFNB at sign off test at 4:17 A.M. Jan 4 - Fog and rain all night, but not much noise. Fecamp, Rennes, Bordeaux all came in good. P.P. came in QSA4, R7, actually better than Fecamp. CCKK, WGPC, XEAQ, and KKA all heard fairly good. Jan. 5 - had bad local interference most all night but managed to hear CJLS, Fecamp, Bordeaux, CFCO, WJOC, WVD, Rennes all good. HIX was on 800 kcs. QSA4, R6. but QSA5, R8 on 5980 kcs. Jan. 6. very heavy static - no Europeans heard WEFI heard very weak. (Continued)

A. W. Oppel, NPO #2, Irvington, N. J. - Reception December 31 at 6-8 PM on SW's FB. All the large foreign stations with local volume. Especially thrilling was the New Years' celebration of GSL, 6.11 megs., England at 7 P.M. Reception January 2 between 2 and 4:45 A.M. quite good, with LR5, 830 kcs., Buenos Aires, Arg., heard at 2:15 with a QSA-4, R-7 signal, announcing in English; LR4 ditto on 990 (while looking for XEBH); LR1 on 1070 kcs., ditto, while looking for XEAQ, and LS2 the same volume on 1190. All announced in English except LR1--which last mentioned was the only one of the four I haven't verified. All four of the stations had almost twice as much volume as KFI or KNX. LR1 announced that they were using 20 kw., altho they are listed as only having 500 watts. WDAH too weak to verify, KALB ditto, WMFN QRMED by WEDC and KIUJ also too weak. Reception January 4 quite good, from 1:30 to 3:30 A.M. Heard WFR, High Point, N. C., testing between 2 and 2:30, for a new catch, and also Rennes, France QSA-3, R-6. Strasbourg also heard, but too weakly to verify. Reception January 5 at 3:00 A.M., poor, CJOC on 950 kcs., not audible. Reception poor even on SW's. On January 6 at 2:15 AM reception noisy. Few TA's heard, but hard to identify, altho we have them verified. CMCO, Havana, heard exactly on 1200 kcs., with a DX program, instead of on their listed 1110.

CARL FORESTIERI, NPO #6, NEW YORK CITY - Week of general poor reception, with heavy local QRN. Dec. 30th. Bad static, local noise terrible due to snow. WFMD test again, only novelty on the dials outside of the regular 24 hour stations. Dec. 31st. Bad static, 2 to 3:30 A.M. heard: CMCF, WFMD, HBQ, COL, KNET test and WORL, who failed to make any announcements in 45 minutes; although verify proves that it was their station which was heard. Jan. 1st - no DXing due to the late programs on local stations. Jan. 2nd: General reception very poor and heavy local QRN. Jan. 3rd-Fecamp at 2:10 A.M. was only TA heard. WIL test and signed off 2:15 A.M. Jan. 4th - WFMD test off at 2 A.M. to resume regular schedule at 6:30 A.M. Strasbourg QRMED XEMO, Fecamp R4, XEAQ R6, WFR test at 2:15 A.M. and WJBC test for FCC at same old time. Other stations also heard on their regular old time schedule of monitoring were: KMLC, WCAP, WJAY, KGCA, WNBC, WTNJ. Jan. 5th - 5:30 to 6 A.M. WNAD, WHEF, WOI, CFCC, and HIX were heard. Have had a lot of bad local QRN from 950 to 1500 kcs., lately.

WALTER C. BIRCH, NPO #3, East Lynn, Mass. - IDA reports that CE-90 are now using 10 KW. That being the case we may hear them without much difficulty. Dec. 26 - heard LR4, LR5, LS2. P.P., and Athlone were testing for the U.S. Bureau of Standards at Washington. Athlone R9 most of the time. Europeans have been fine in the AM reception all last week. New additions to the log were, Torun, Poland, 986 kcs., 24 kw good after WBZ left the air with an R8 signal until Genoa threw his carrier on. Jan. 3 and 4. Another new one was Radio Cite, 1068 kcs., 2 kw. Paris, the former station; Radio LL. Jan. 3-4 on at 2 A.M., EST. Algiers, Algeria, now have their 100 kw xmtr in action. They come on at 1:50 A.M. with a P.T.T. program, usually the same as Rennes and Bordeaux. Other stations heard Jan 3-4 - Stuttgart, Firenze, Bruxells #1, Parha, Lyon Ptt, Koln, Paris PTT, Rome, Munchen, Leipzig, Lwow, Milan, Berlin, Strasbourg, London Regional--testing Jan. 3. Hamburg, Brno, Bruxelles #2, Algiers, Bre lau, FF, Torun, Genoa, Hilversum, Konigsberg, Rennes, Bari, Radio Cite, Bordeaux, Madona, Moravask-Ostrava, Fecamp, Turin, Copenhagen, Frankfurt, Lille, Trieste, Gleiwitz, Nurnberg, Linz, Flensberg and Pecs. Jan. 5 - West Regional heard with a true R9 signal at 3:30 P.M. All other BDC stations received the best of the seasons. SA's were fine evening of Dec. 31st. CK14, CK16, CX28, LR1, LR3, LR5, LR6, LR9, LS2, LS4, PNF4, PNB9, FRG3, YVLRG and HJH; who by the way is the Spanish speaking mystery on 695 kcs. These stations were best received between 8 and 10 P.M. CMCO heard Jan. 6 on new frequency 1200 kcs.

Dec. 28 - WNBC, CX26. 29th - WIS. Dec. 30th WFMD, WAIM. Dec. 31st. WFMD, WORL. On the 28, 29 and 30th, Cubans and Mexicans were received here just like American stations. On Jan. 1st-Lyons-La-Doua and Paris PTT came through with exceptional volume. Program was being relayed to the Columbia Broadcasting System.

HERE and THERE

The Australian government amended their recent ruling allowing owners and operators of class "B" commercial stations a maximum of five stations under one ownership. New ruling allows a maximum of eight stations.

WJCA, 570 kcs., New York, is the latest station in the metropolitan area to start broadcasting twenty-four hours per day. However, at this writing only one day per week is scheduled. Oh me, oh my!

FRIDAY MORNING, JANUARY 10.
