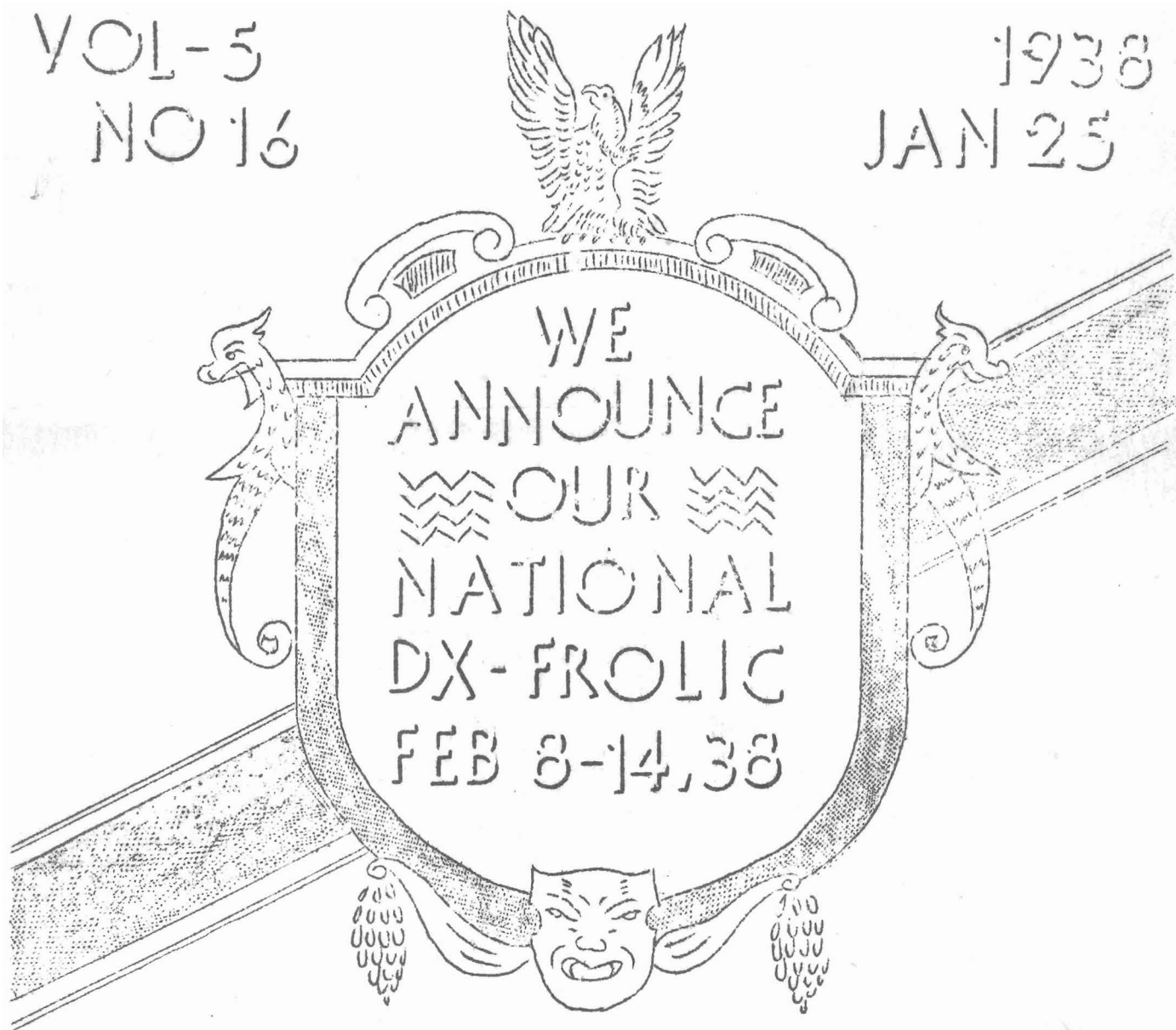



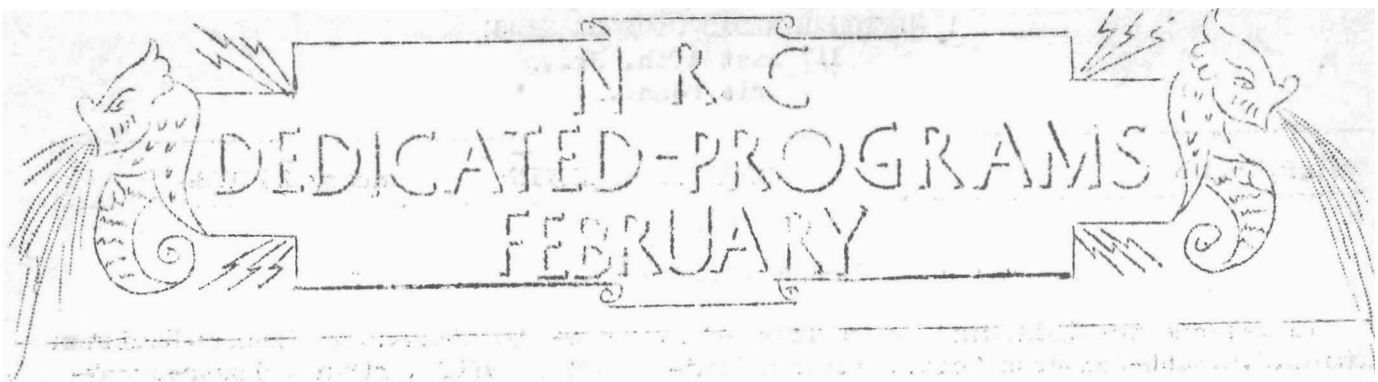

Algiers on the Short Wave:

The 10 Kilowatt Government station, located at Algiers - Eucalyptus, (No-Africa) has been carrying out further tests on 12.12 Mgc. (24.75 m.) with the relay of Algiers medium-wave broadcasts. They have been well heard in both Europe and United States, reporting good reception .

Call Sign Alteration:

It has been decided to withdraw the call sign 3LR allotted to the National Short Wave Transmitter established at Lyndhurst, Victoria, and allot in lieu thereof the call- sign VLR. The object is to give effect to the desire that the station in question should use a call by which it would be readily indentified by overseas listeners as an Australian station .

More Broadcasts from Argentina:

Nightly, at G.M.T. 21.00 (4 pm E.S.T.) the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Republic, at Buenos Aires, broadcasts a short propaganda talk, followed by a musical programme, simultaneously through two short wave stations, namely LRX - on 9.66 mgc, (31.06 m.) and LSY, Monte Grande, 18.115 mgc, (16.56,.) The later is a commercial station used for regular telephone service with Europe and the United States.

CORONATION:

By common consent the transmission of the Coronation ceremonies was acknowledged to be the most important and impressive broadcast ever attempted. Thanks to

the Post Office and other broadcasting organizations for their co-operation.

The OHIO FLOODS:

If the Coronation provided the most grandest and impressive broadcasts of the year, the disastrous floods in OHIO furnished the greatest human story in the history of broadcasting. Radio was instrumental in saving hundreds of thousands of lives, by appealing for boats, food, and medical supplies, by giving warnings, spreading information, and in many other countless ways. The relatively small casualty list a few out of a potential million victims -- was in a large measure due to the magnificent work of broadcasting stations great and small. AMATEUR transmitters in the flooded areas also rendered the most conspicuous service.

The Microphone in War:

The world was cursed with two major wars during the year, and in this unwelcome sphere radio played an important part. In Spain some stations which formerly pursued their normal functions have been used by one side or the other for military purposes. In spite of this the programmes from the Madrid station have been rarely interrupted. The Barcelona station has been active on behalf of the Government, while General Franco has command of the Salamanca and Seville stations among others, and has made abundant use of them. In the Sino-Japanese conflict radio has played an important part, although, of course, Japan is better equipped in the respect. In Shanghai and other centres of the British influence the news bulletins from Daventry have been eagerly awaited and, in numerous instances, have been the centre of the days interest.

In peace as Well:

Broadcasting authorities have tried in other ways to further international good will, The B.B.C. has had an unprecedented number of relays from the United States, and also from Europe. The U.S. stations, as well as the continental ones have returned the compliment. There is no need to stress the importance of Short Wave broadcasting. All the big powers have turned their attention to this, as the best way of telling the world. Three new 50 KW transmitters have been installed at Daventry, which has become the greatest Short-wave centre. Germany, Italy, France, Japan, and Russia have intensified their short-wave activities, and in the United States, work in this field is once more going on on a large scale.

Tribute to MARCONI:

The world of Radio has suffered an irreparable loss in the death of Marchese Marconi, in July last. Without the labours of this great man, broadcasting would not have been possible.

Italy : was heard on an announced frequency of 9.83 mcs, over station IRF, with the American Hour, simultaneously with 2RO-3. They have plenty of volume but sound overmodulated, it is rather hard to intercept the call letters at first,

TIANRH, Heredes, Costa Rica is on the air with a new 500 watt transmitter, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 9.00 to 10.00 pm. E.S.T. and Sundays 7.00 am E.S.T. - Senor Cespedes the owner of the station is asking for report preferable by air-mail, all letters will be answered and also acknowledged over the air. Reception of this friendly station is very good coming in R9 Q5.

A Costa Rican Station was heard on about 12.80 Mgc, this might be a harmonic of TIFG, reception was very poor so call letters could not be indentified.

General receiving conditions are poor and very erratic at present.
