Roy Hillar - 857 South 128 Street - Seattle 88, Washington I'm probably the greenest member of the NRC gang, but there's a little news here that I thought might be of interest to you, so pardon a quick break into your list of reporters! First off, re letter from C. M. Stanbury re KTW operating on both 1230 and 1250 kc/s. Called it a novel arrangement. Sounded very much so, so I called the operator and quizzed him regarding this. First, KTW shares 1250 with KWSC; furthermore KXRN on 1230 has agreed to be quiet when KTW is on, Inasmuch as they might well cause interference to KTW on such a close frequency; however, the operator informed me that KTW does not operate on 1230! Noting in FCC actions the call letter assignment of KTRW, 1400, Tacoma, Wash. I herewith quote from verification letter from KTNT-AM, logged testing on 1400 kc/s, with 250 watts, to-wit: "The call KTRW is a temporary affair for file purposes. We will always be KTNT when the final grant comes through in a few weeks." Most probably are aware of Seattle's two "owl" stations - KING, 1090, on till 5:00 EST except Hondyay A.M. and KRSC, 1150, on 24 hours except Honday AM when it signs off at 3:30 AM, sometimes 4:00. Incidentally, KRSC has been heard recently to announced a power increase to 5 kw. soon. My summer BC log now stands at 257 stations. Best DX (approx. 2,000 miles and over) have been 250 watt WLOX; 1 kw. KEQR; 5kw. KPOA KGMB KHON WRDW CHAL XIMC WAKR WRID & several 10 kw. and over, including KULA and WBAL. No dice on KVMC Convention special for NRC as CKNM was all-nighting it on 1320 as usual. AM of Labor Day fruitful though, as I logged KIPA on f/c, thanks to f/c list, for my best 1 kw. catch yet. Also heard WHIS on f/c for my first W. Va. KRDO was heard on what appeared to be a special "allnighter." One other new one logged on f/c, KONA. All for this trip. 73s. (Welcome to NAC and to our column Roy, and let's be sure to hear more as often as you care to write! -Ed.)

Stations to receive reports in August were 1st, WHLL 1600 RS 7:40-7:53 AM, heard with good signal while station VINX was off the air with transmitter troble. 4th- KWFC 1340 RS 1;25-1:40 with heavy QETP QRM. 6th- WRIC 1050 f/c 1:30-1:45. 8th- WSIX 980 ER 1:55-2:20. 12th- WVOP 1450 f/c 1:21-1:40; WAJR 1230 f/c 2:06-2:15. 22nd- WLFE 1480 RS 11:54-12:44 PM and WJEJ 1240 RS 1:02-1:25 PM through WCEM. Well, as you can see there was nothing particularly unusual up until this point. Pete Taylor - North British Hotel - Edinburgh, Scotland
"Radio Luxembourg" is the most home-like station on 1:39 kc/s. 150 km. It even has
the Alka-Seltzer Show on Sunday nights at 9:15 PM London Time. It also has revival
programs on every night from 11 to 11:30 except Sunday, ranging from "Voice of Prophesy" to the "Old-Fashioned Revival Hour". Monte Carlo (1466, 120 km/) also has some
English program. I have also heard propaganda on Moscow's 1385 kc/s. repeat station
(Mowne, 150 km.) and Simferofol (1214 - 150 km.)(as I recall) as well as Prague calling on 1286 kc/s. (100 km) (Melnik, Czechoslovakia). They all keep harping on germ
warfare, along with the Red Dean of Canterbury's approval of Red China. My Swissbought Dutch-made radio (Philips) has brought no U.S. station in yet - external anterma! Reports so far to Radio Luxembourg, Trieste AFN, Murnburg AFN, Hilversum I,
Sweden, Budapest

As for DKing, just got letter from AFN Nurnberg, but no verie. CE says WAFN does not send out verification cards to listeners." I also tried AFN Stuttgart, but haven't heard from them yet. Signer was Frak C. Mortensen, CE, AFN, Nurnburg. Also sent new list of AFN stations which FVV now has. Tried DKing 4:30 a.m. but foo much electrical QRN as usual. Some type present in every notel so far in Europe. Just be my radio! AFN uses U.S. stamps. Reception is pretty good from here. Paris III must be closest, as it is loudest. I (863) and II (1070) are next, in that order. BBC French Service (1340, Crowborough) 150 kw. good fere. Milan I (899 - 150 kw.) fair. High-powered stations about the same everywhere. Russians still jemming 719 - no sign here of RFE or Lisbon I. I hope to send off plenty of reports from Paris, as I am still 'O' in veries. I a, javing them all sent home, so I may have some after all.

(1540) RS = 6:00-3:02 PM, bad QHM, WJMJ. 8/21, WGNY (1220) RS 5:07-5:10 PM. 8/22 -WATL (1380) PS on all night show @ 4:30; 3/25-WELP (1360) s/off at 7:15 PM, Easley, S.C.; WFBC (133C) RS 7:30-7:45 PM, easily topping WHAZ, Troy, N.Y. S.C. stations beaming in that night. Last but certainly not least was WHO (1040) RS @ 8:30-9 PM on 8/27. Veries: WLYN (1360), WNOW (1250), WCWR (930), WKDN (800), finally, WNBC (660), all letters, and a long card from CKOY (1310). Now to clear up the mess I made last issue. Bill Moser - 217 Connellsville Street - Uniontown, Penna. Things are coming back to life. There have been 2 DX sessions last month! 8/12 produced 4 new stations, all on f/c. They were WIRJ 740, WJMA 1340, WDXE 1370 and WKAP 1320. On 9/1 KV C failed to show, but WNAT-1340 and WTMV-1490 were heard on f/c. MEXICO-*-XEAR (1480) Monterrey, Nuevo Leon, had a f/c with tone and Spanish identification 0330-0400 on 9/1. This station had been on

BERMUDA-*-ZBR (1340) Pembroke, is due to open this month. Will be on Sundays only for now. They will be DXing for us later on. (EC SM) SM advises that they are likely to use 1335 or 1345 for DX. SM also advises that ZBM will be using 1235 Kcs. regularly now. SM advises that the veric cards for ZBM are now being printed and that we will all got them for last season's DX.

JAMAICA-*-To correct any wrong impressions the column has given about this country's BOB outlet, "Radio Jamaica" (ZQI) is now on 670 Kes. with 500 watts, due to go to 5 kW in a rew months. Two additional 250 w or 1000 w transmitters are to be built on the island during this winter, will probably be synchronized with the Cross Roads station on

We have a few changes in Australia passed on to us via the NZRDXL. 7ZR has moved from 940 to 1160 Kcs. 2KM (980) new using 300w. 1530 station in Bendigo is assigned the call 3BN with 200w.

on 8/1. Veric received signed by 8. 0'Cadhain, p.p. Director.

FRANCE-*-Paris IV (944) educational station is on air 2 hours on. Saturday and Sunday. Heard all right. No sign of synchronized group on 1594 Kcs.

GERMANY-*-SWF stations are on 827 Kcs., not 872 Kcs. Rheinsender is on 1016 Kes., not 1010 Ke. Saarorucken is on 1421 Kes. Incidentally there seems to be good evidence for counting Scarbrucken as a separate country from acrmany.

GREAT ERITAIN-*-Ottringham (1295) 150 Kw., jammod occasionally.

Nearly all BBC stations are well heard in Paris.

ITALY-*-Milan I (899) 150 Kw., on 24 hours daily during "Le Tour de France" bicycle race. Like local at night in Paris.

POLAND-*-Wroclaw (1097) 50 Kw., finally heard from Paris, PORTUGAL-*-Lisbon II (665) 15 Kw., and 2 Porto stations (755) 10 Kw., and (1169) 1 kw, both heard from Paris.

SWITZERLAND-*-Saviese is on 1367 with 500w not 1307 Kcs.

U. S. S. R.-*-Moscow or Odessa (548) 150 Kw., giving AFN Munich a pounding in Paris. Likewise Leningrad (800) 100 Kw. bothering Muhlacker, Germany. Odessa on 1241 Kcs. is 150 Kw., not 150w.

VATICAN CITY-*-HVLOC (1529) 100 KW., was heard fairly well from
