# Call letters 'WIBG' transplanted to shore

OCEAN CITY, N.J. - Radio station WIBG, a Philadelphia institution for years, has found a new home on the shore of the Atlantic Ocean in year from a community over 50 this family resort of 12,000 permanent residents.

# The Great N.R.C. LOG Bogdown

The NRC Log Editor finds his face red.

I had made an estimate to HQ last January that the log could be completed as far as the manuscript is concerned by mid to late May ... and ready for delivery by mid to late June. There were several factors that led to the defeat of this overoptimistic miscalculation.

Bear in mind that the NRC Log is typed by hand, and it takes about 25 minutes per page (considering mistakes that are made and the liquid paper drying time factor.) The IBM Executive typewriter is in the News Room at WMIX, and not at home ... but it would make little difference if it were at home because Mrs. Log Editor objects to overtime spent on the project!

A one-man news department's job is not a 40-hour per week thing -- it's more like 60 to 70 hours -- and it has to be fun or there wouldn't be so many one-man news departments. It also is something that isn't absolutely scheduled, so time that is set aside for log-typing sometimes gets used up in news preparation instead.

Then, there have been some unique elements that have occurred this time around. During the typing process, the "M" key on this typewriter started "flying", and we started haveing things that looked like "WMIX" and "Cameron TX.!" It took much longer than it should have to correct the problem! While the typewriter was out of commission, the Log Editor received the latest SRDS and BYB, and started checking address information. Despite several thousand changes that had crossed the log in the updaters since the last issue, there were several hundred more, just in spot checks.

So time has been spent checking the previously typed manuscript against other available sources because the log editor doesn't like to send out copy he suspects is innaccurate -- and correctible.

Photocopies of each of the first 76 pages of the log (through 1220 khz) have been sent to three NRC'ers, who have proof-read those pages and come up with some errors that need to be corrected. Those corrections have been made and in today's (May 19th) mail, those first 76 pages have gone to Russ Edmunds.

That means the log typing is about 40% completed.

It will go faster now that the typewriter is fixed and the sources are being checked, but it won't be as soon as promised, and there aren't going to be any more promises about timetable. I know there have already been many advance orders, and everyone wants his new log as soon as possible. I have not received any static from anyone, and I am grateful for that. I trust that patience will prevail.

If you do get upset about the lateness of your log, don't blame Louisville ... don't blame Russ Edmunds ... blame me (but don't let me know about it!)

# HQ-180 SERIES RECEIVERS

DALLAS S. LANKFORD

INTRODUCTION The Hammarlund HQ180 series receivers are sophisticated, tube-type, general coverage communications receivers. Not only are they very popular receivers among BCB DX-ers, but they also account for much of the foreign BCB DX that is heard in the continental USA. Moreover, the NRC rates them as the best compromize between price and performance on the new and used receiver market today (1).

Reviews of the HQ180 are in (2,3,4), and advertisements which summarize the circuitry and operating features of the HQ180 occur in many issues of  $\underline{CQ}$  and  $\underline{QST}$  between November 1959 and June 1963, and for the HQ180A between July 1963 and January 1970. A brief discussion of the HQ180, HQ180A, and X models is also found in the NRC Receiver Reference Manual (5).

DESCRIPTION OF THE \*180 The primary differences between the HQ180 and HQ180A are (i) B+ rectification is done with a 5U4G tube in the HQ180 and with two silicon diodes in the HQ180A, (ii) the HQ180 does not have provisions for 230 volt 60 hz operation, while the HQ180A does, (iii) the HQ180A has a separate filament transformer for the high frequency first oscillator and first mixer which is permanently on as long as the receiver is plugged in (which, according to Hammarlund advertisements, drastically reduces warm-up time), (iv) the HQ180A has a 500 ohm audio output (both have a 3.2 ohm output), (v) the HQ180A detector selection switch has three positions -- AM, SSB (product detector with BFC fixed tuned to 60 khz), and CW (product detector with BFC variable tuned to 60 ± 2 khz) -- while the HQ180 provides only the first and third detector options, (vi) the HQ180A has an accessory socket and a system socket for use with external converters and transmitters, and (vii) the HQ180A is newer (1963 - 1970) than the HQ180 (1959 - 1963).


Both the HQ180 and HQ180A also come in X models, which have an additional 6C4 oscillator that provides up to 12 crystal controlled reception frequencies. Except for the differencies we have mentioned, the different models of the HQ180 series are virtually the same receiver, so we will often refer to them as the 180.

The \*180 is housed in a grey-finished aluminum mesh case with a lift-up lid in the top, and a grey-finished die-cast front panel. A clock/timer is optional in the HQ180 and HQ180A, and when not present, a white plate with a clear plastic cover occupies the clock mounting hole in the top left corner of the front panel. The \*180 tunes 0.54 - 30 mhz in 6 bands: (i) 0.54 - 1.05, (ii) 1.05 - 2.05, (iii) 2.05 - 4.04, (iv) 4.0 - 7.85, (v) 7.85 - 15.35, (vi) 15.35 - 30. Double conversion, 455 & 60 khz, is used on bands (i) - (iv), while triple conversion, 3035, 455, & 60 khz, is used on bands (v) & (vi). Bandspread tuning is inoperative on bands (i) & (ii), and is calibrated for the 80, 40, 20, 15, and 10 meter amateur bands and also includes a 100 - 0 logging scale The main and bandspread tuning shafts are flywheel weighted and edge-drive circular dials which in turn drive the tuning capacitors through reduction gears. This arrangement spreads the dial markings over about 320 degrees on both dials, and gives a tuning reduction of approximately 23:1. The circular dials are equivalent to at least 7" of linear dial on band (i) up to 14" on band (vi). Bands (i) & (ii) are divided into 10 khz intervals, band (iii) into 20 khz intervals, band (iv) into 50 khz intervals, and bands (v) & (vi) into 100 khz intervals. Sensitivity is rated as 1.5 microvolt for a 10:1 signal to noise ratio on AM, and 0.7 microvolt for SSB/CM. Maximum audio output is one watt into 3.2 ohms. Power consumption is 120 watts. The '180 is 102" H, 19" W, & 13 " D and weighs 38 lbs. The serial number is located on the chassis rear, just above the S-meter zero and sensitivity controls.

Antenna input options on the chassis rear include balanced and unbalanced binding terminal arrangements, and an unbalanced coaxial socket. Antenna input impedance is rated as 50 - 600 chms. A 100 khz crystal calibrator gives markers on all bands. The front end is a conventional tube RF amp, mixer, and variable high frequency oscillator, except that the antenna trimmer tunes the first RF tuned circuit. From the first mixer, a signal follows one of two paths, through a 455 khz gate on bands (i) - (iv), or through a 3035 khz crystal filter and a crystal controlled converter on bands (v) & (vi). The two paths join at a 455 khz IF amp and continue through a

bifillar T trap notch (slot) filter. The slot is tuned by an 8:1 vernier control. and provides up to 60 dB attenuation over a range of ±5 khz from the 455 khz IF center. After passing through the notch filter, a signal is converted to 60 khz. The 395 khz third conversion oscillator is tuned by an 8:1 vernier ±3 khz and provides fine tuning. Selectivity is obtained by tuned circuits in the 60 khz IF strip, and is controlled by two switches, one three position switch that selects upper, lower, or both sidebands, and one four position switch that selects bandwidths of 0.5, 1, 2, & 3 khz at 6 dB down, with a 60:6 dB shape factor of 3:1. These two switches act together to give bandwidths of 0.5, 1, 2, 3, 4, & 6 khz. Two detectors, a diode for AM, and a product detector for SSB, CW, are selectable. There are four AVC positions -- off, slow, medium, and fast. when on, delayed AVC voltage is applied to the RF amp, and AVC voltage is applied to the 455 khz IF amp, the third converter, and the first two 60 khz IF amps. Manual gain is applied to the RF amp and the 455 khz IF amp in all AVC positions. The noise limiter is a diode type with adjustable threshold, and may be turned off. The audio section includes Hammarlund's well-known auto-response circuit (6) which automatically narrows the audio bandpass as audio gain is increased. The headphone output is designed for high impedance headphones. Auiio output may also be taken from binding terminals on the chassis rear. In the HQ180A, accessory and system sockets on the chassis rear provide B+ and filament voltages, audio output, and other features.

COMMENTS I purchased an HQ180A, serial no. 6652, with manual for \$350 in January 1977. Currently, a typical price range for HQ180A's is \$300 - \$380, and about \$100 less for HQ180's, although I have seen selling prices of \$200 - \$380 for both. There are a variety of potential ways to locate a \*180, such as, Buyers & Sellers (7), and for sale ads in CQ and CST. I found mine by placing a wanted ad in CST Ham Ads (8). Regardless of how you locate a \*180, be sure to give the receiver a careful personal inspection and use it for about an hour before you give any money. All \*180's are at least 7 years old, and many of those offered for sale have at least a few minor problems. In addition, personal bad experience and conversations with others have convinced me that some sellers intend to rip the buyer off, and the remainder see major problems as minor problems, and often don't see minor problems at all.

By all means, get a manual if you purchase a '180. The 74 page manual (9) abounds with data which will assist you or a competent repair person in almost any repair or maintainance. The manual includes operating instructions, front end and IF alignment procedures (an error on line 4, pp. 48 reads "... bottom slug of T2 and peak T1 ...", but should read "... bottom slug of T1 and peak T2 ..." (10)), chassis removal and replacement procedures, tube operating voltages and resistances, a parts list (inductances of coils and transformers, and capacitances of the main and bandspread tuning capacitors are not listed), clock installation, 230 volt wiring option (on the HQ180A), parts placement diagrams (tubes, coils, and transformers), and schematics. An addendum (10,11) describes changes and modifications made in late model H\_180A's. These modifications include removing the plastic dust covers on the main and bandspread tuning capacitors, and removing tube shields from the RF, 455 Khz IF, first two 60 khz IF's, and noise limiter tubes.

Superficially, the HQ18CA I bought was in very good condition, with no scratches, dents, or noticable signs of wear. It was in good electrical and mechanical condition, with some scritchiness in the antenna trimmer, RF, AF, and noise limiter controls. The scratchy antenna trimmer was fixed by an application of commercial contact cleaner (several brands are available at most electronics dealers), but the scratchiness in the other controls persisted. Disassembly and cleaning cured the AF control, but not the RF and noise limiter controls, and so far I have been unable to locate replacement parts. Presently, I have replaced the (linear) RF control with an audio (logarithmic) control. The scratchiness is gone, but gain control is now logarithmic rather than linear. This emphasizes that one can expect to encounter difficulties when one attempts to maintain or repair an older receiver.

The front end alignment of the HQ180A was good, almost perfect on the SW bands, and about 5 khz off on the BCB. Using the manual, I went through the front end and IF alignment procedures with little difficulty. Some frozen cores in the 455 khz IF strip were unfrozen by careful application of force, thanks to a helpful hint from Arthur Peterson (10). A slight amount of dial spreading is noticable at the edges of the dials, but calibration is still accurate throughout most of the bands.

Generally, I have been pleased with the condition and performance of my HQ180A, and agree that the '180 deserves its popularity among BCB DX-ers. However, the '180 has a few idiosyncrasies which BCB DX-ers should be aware of.

Because the antenna trimmer tunes the first tuned circuit, an antenna tuner is needed for best long wire performance. But the '180's antenna input options are ideal for loops and beverages, which are superior to long wire antennas for weak signal reception on the BCB.

In my opinion, the inoperative bandspread on bands (i) & (ii) is the most annoying feature. The slow main tuning is usually adequate for the BCB, and when it is not, the vernier fine tuning suffices. But estimating a split signal's frequency would be easier and more accurate with operative bandspread tuning. Also, those who would add exhalted carrier reception via a Q-multiplier might experience tricky tuning on the BCB.

When using an amplified loop on the BCB, the first three harmonics of the third conversion oscillator are audible. For example, if the oscillator is tuned exactly to 395 khz, then the first three harmonics are heard at 790, 1185, and 1580 khz. The exact frequencies of these harmonics depends on the alignment of the oscillator and the setting of the vernier fine tuning. Fortunately, the vernier fine tuning can be used to move these harmonics approximately  $\pm 6$ ,  $\pm 9$ , &  $\pm 12$  khz respectively, and thus harmlessly away from any weak DX signals. Interestingly, using these harmonics, both the 455 and 60 khz IF strips can be aligned with only a 455 khz signal: first zero beat the first or third harmonic to 790 of 1580 khz using a domestic BCB signal, and then use the 455 khz signal to align both IF strips.

The manual indicates that low impedance headphones can be used satisfactorily with the high impedance headphone jack, but I have found the arrangement disappointing because of resulting objectionable 60 hz hum. For low impedance phones, I use a 4 watt 1000 - 8 ohm audio transformer, installed in a metal case and connected to standard phone jacks.

CONCLUSIONS The '180 in good condition is indeed a prima donna BCB DX receiver. Through careful personal inspection, it is possible to locate and purchase a '180 with a few minor problems that you can either live with or repair. When last sold new, the HQ180A sold for about \$600, which, given the high rate of inflation during the early '70's, is equivalent to over \$1000 today. Compared with new narrow bandwidth receivers that start at about \$3000, a reasonably priced '180 represents a very good value. I estimate that about 10,000 '180's were manufactured, which means they should be available in reasonable numbers on the used receiver market for several years to come. However, don't expect to find one easily. Reasonably priced '180's in good condition sell very quickly.

STATIONS OF THE TRUST TERRITORY OF THE

### PACIFIC

#### MIKE HARDESTER

In the ten or so years I have been DXing, I have only occasionally seen mention of radio stations located in the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, and known only one DXer from that area: Bob Bundy of Truk (I wonder where Bob is at present?). I suppose my increased interest in that area of the world came from the closure of the FEBC station (JOFF-1020) here on Okinawa with plans to move to Saipan. It was with that interest I did a bit of reasearch and came up with the present information.

The Trust Territory Government owns and operates six AM stations: WSZO, 10 kw station located on Majuro, frequency of 1100 kHz; WSZD, 10 kw station located on Ponape Island and operating on 1450 kHz; KUSI, a 1 kw station on Kosrae Island operating on 1500 kHz; WSZC, a 5 kw station on Moen Island operating on 1300 kHz; WSZA, a 1 kw station, soon to be upgraded to a 10 kw output, located on Yap Island and operating on 1480 kHz; and WSZB on Koror which operates on 1500 kHz with 250 watts which will soon be increased to

There are three other AM stations on Saipan: KJQR, 1 kw station on 1350 kHz. This statation is owned and operated by the Government of the Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas. Another station is owned and operated by the Pacific Broadcasting Corporation; this is WSZE on 1050 kHz with 1 kw. The third station is owned by the Far East Broadcasting Company: KSAI, a 1 kw station on 940 kHz.

From FEBC on Saipan comes this word--The shortage of land makes it difficult to obtain a site on Saipan, and for this reason they chose to request the Government for 25 acres of land on the north end of Saipan. At present, the new site has been leased for the tower and the transmitter building but the environmental permits have to be approved before work can begin.

The Saipan Community Church has agreed to allow FEBC use of a section of their land for a studio, and construction of the studio has been completed. Also, permission was granted for temporary use of the area for a small transmitter and FEBC is presently on the air; having started with 5 hours of test programs. Their planned schedule was for KSAI to sign on at 6 AM local and sign off at 7 PM local (2000 to 0900 GMT). At the present, the major language will be English, and Chamorra, the local language, will be added as they are able to get the staff to provide it and a Christian to make the programs for them. The emphasis is more on public service with an element of Christian programming in order to attract listeners from the almost 100% Catholic community.

Plans exist for a small station to be placed in each of the other districts with Ponape and Truk Islands already having plans on the board; seach for land is under way. The shortwave site on Saipan is still held up pending the acquisition of about 12 acres of land. With the facilities in Manila and Korea still able to operate unmolested, the urgency at this stage is not particularily great.







### 12 VOLT CONVERTER

### ERIC ROSSITER

DXing in the boondocks with a decent portable such as the Realistic TRF can be rewarding, but, in the case of some receivers, expensive due to their voracious appetite for dry cells. Your auto battery, however, will be pleased to freely donate some surplus amperes, albeit at 12 volts.

The following circuit will reduce the voltage to a well-regulated 6V, up to 1A, exactly to the taste of many radios and recorders.

Construction is simple and flexible but the IC regulator must be heat sunk. If a metal case is used it can serve by bolting the component to it, preferably with a thin layer of heat sink compound between the regulator copper plate and the bare metal of the case.

Connect the output via alligator clips or wired-in binding posts to the battery holder in the set and the input to the cigarette lighter socket through an adaptor.



### Shots fired at cable put radio station off air

PITTSBURGH (AP) - A series of shots fired at a WAMO-FM radio transmission cable 90 minutes after a controversial talk show caused an estimated \$30,000 damage and knocked the station off the air, station officials said.

The shooting at a Reserve Township transmitter tower temporarily knocked WAMO's sister station. WYJZ-AM, off the air as well for about an hour Saturday.

Chief Engineer Dana Puopolo estimated it would be several weeks before full power is restored to WAMO. which operates on 72,000 watts.

The shooting occurred shortly after a public affairs talk show during which host Bev Smith criticized prison officials for their treatment of black inmates.

"It was a very controversial program," Puopolo said. "They got a lot of calls. A lot of people were really upset."

He said the station was expected to resume broadcasting on limited power late Sunday using a temporary transmission system airlifted to Pittsburgh from Indiana.

The incident is under investigation by the FBI. Puopolo said. He said several shots were fired into a 270-foot cable. The AM station does not use the same transmission

# THEIR IMPACT ON TA DX'ING

### Mark Connelly

We shall soon be embarking upon a new era in international medium-wave DXing. This should occur in November when the new frequency allocation scheme takes effect. As a trans-Atlantic DXer of some experience, I feel that I may have a few ideas to assist the TA hunter next winter.

The first step in judging what will be heard is to analyse existing reception patterns governing the ease of hearing different areas of Europe and Africa along the "northeast corridor" from Virginia to Maritime Canada. The two major criteria to specify reception paths are the bearing (degrees east of north) and the distance. From the standpoint of ease of reception, empirical data culled from years of listening points to the fact that stations whose bearing is farthest south (minimising the effects of auroral disruptions) and those whose distance is the shortest are those most consistently heard.

Conditions have been analysed in terms of the probability of hearing TA's; receiving conditions have been broken down into four categories: minimal, marginal, good (normal winter), and excellent. These are defined as follows:

Minimal night: The worst auroral conditions. Domestics are weakened and Latin American stations dominate. Only TA's are weak carriers from Senegal and Guinea.

Marginal night (normal spring): Short/medium skip domestics prevail. TA's in Africa from Mauritania southward. Algeria, Morocco, Portugal occasionally in. Spotty (fluttery) reception of high-powered Germans at European dawn on the high end of the band.

Good night (normal winter): Local sunset - wide open to Spain, Portugal, Morocco, Algeria, Andorra, France, Monaco, Italy, Albania and British Isles. Low band stations are favored over high-banders. European sunrise - most of those countries audible at local sunset plus other countries on a more northerly bearing such as Holland, Luxembourg, Germany, Switzerland, Austria and Czechoslovakia, will show. This time the higher frequency stations "win out".

Excellent night: Band wide open to Europe from an hour before local sunset to an hour after western European sunrise. Southern Scandinavia (Stavanger, Norway and Hörby, Sweden) and eastern Europe (Poland, Romania, Bulgaria) audible. High-powered Middle East stations may show. The possibility of logging numerous low-powered British locals becomes viable for DXers in New England and Atlantic Canada. Africans tend to be pushed into the background by the stronger and more numerous Europeans.

1539 West Germany may occasionaly make it through the usually-invincible 1540 slop.

1548 Vinnitza, Ukraine the only likely listed possibility. (British locals not listed).

1557 France and Malta will likely be the contenders. India an enticing possibility for pre-sunset beverage reception.

1575 East Germany o/Italy.

1584 British and other locals may show under the best possible conditions.

1593 Langenberg, West Germany should dominate withits usual excellent sig-

1602 Unlikely to yield any receptions with 1 kW. the maximum power and the likes of WWRL and WUNR with which to contend.

The list above should clearly demonstrate that some countries will become easier for us to hear, such as Malta and Liechtenstein. Others, chiefly those presently on channels ending in 9 who will be moving to channels ending in O, will get more difficult to hear. Vatican, Luxembourg and Mauritania fall into this latter category.

Time for another Muse so here goes. The biggest DX news around here will be the changing of call letters by WWJ-TV-4 in Detroit to WDIV-TV some time in June, possibly about the time this sees print. The change results because Detroit's Evening News Association is swapping their TV station with WTOP-TV in Washington owned by Post-Newsweek. Likely WTOP-TV will also switch calls too. These two companies sought the sale by the FCC to avoid the wrath of the media dupl city rule. I sure hate to see an old three-letter call get changed but at least WWJ will still exist on radio. If I had to guess I'd say the D in WDIV will stand for Detroit and the IV for Roman numeral 4. Does anyone think I might be right on this? Probably the brickbat of the decade award goes to WRR-1310 in Dallas for being so absolutely foolish for wanting to change that old three-letter W call West of the Mississippi. Instead of switching to KAAM they should have requested KDUM because that is what they are! That's just my opinion folks but I put this change somewhere below the changes made by KOL & KTW in Seattle. Being equally fair the bouquet goes to KRE-1400 for reacquiring that call by giving up KPAT on their 50th anniversary. Sometimes I wonder what the broadcasting corporation heads use for brains. I guess only DXers realize the history and rarity associated with the three letter call. Changing those call signs is like melting down a 1913 Liberty mickel and restriking it to a 1978 date. KORL MAY NOT BE YOUR BEST BET FOR HAWATI BILL HARANG - 811 Nevada Avenue - San Jose, California - 95125

Although KORL-650 is the most widely heard Hawaiian station by DXers, I wouldn't say that they're always the first station every DXer hears. True, San Jose is different from much of the West Coast because of the Santa Cruz Mountains, but I've never heard KORL with what I'd personally consider an excellent or good signal. Their signal either seems to be fair or poor. Frankly, I feel KORL is a disappointing station for the type of wattage and frequency they have. Therefore, I feel that many DXers wanting to hear Hawaii shouldn't get their hopes too high on hearing KORL and have been disappointed time after time. In my personal experience, the first Hawaiian I heard was KPOI when they were on 1380. This was a shock to the San Jose group of DXers, since none of them heard it before. They all tried a few weeks later themselves and found this station to be a regular almost every MM ever since when they heard it themselves. Of course, later on, KEEN-1370 went NSP wrecking the 1380 frequency (at least) in this town by its slop. Now that KPOI switched frequencies, DXers may want to try on WHO's SP. The second Hawaiian station I heard was the Lihue station on 1350 before they switched their call letters to KIVM. This station came in with a very good signal regularly. Their signal came in so strong here that I feel KORL hasn't even come close enough to compare to it. I've heard KDU-760 & KIKI-830 and also agree that over here that I've heard them stronger than KORL when I've heard them. KGMB has been heard by DXers in this area, but this one is a toughie. Also local yokel WBAL-1090, only 37 mi/60km away, came in weakly while WBT-1110, 350 mi/560 km away, bombed in. This is all a matter of nighttime radiation patterns made necessary to protect other clears on the same frequency from QRM. While aboard the late British liner Canberra en route to the Canary Islands and Senegal to observe a six-minute total solar eclipse in mid-1973. I heard two DCarea stations, WTOP & WPRW-1460 (Manassas, Va.) while 350 mi/560 km SW of the Azomres (Radio Luxembourg on 1439 was heard in the same hour). I didn't expect to hear WPRW but there it was, plain as day. I later found out that the radiation pattern pointed E toward Europe & Africa. I was ausing a pocket transistor set on the ship's hurricane (poop) deck with some metal line as an antenna. 49 (hexadecimal), 111 (octal), 73 (decimal) & good DX. FCC FIELD ENGINEER SAYS CODE ID'S ARE LEGAL

I'm well now & can get out & enjoy this great (well, almost great) WX. I sincraly hope mone of you gets hepatitis, for those who know of it, it's a rotten disease. Anyway. DX has picked up slightly with the following heard during June: 6/12- MLBZ-620 3 12:08 mixing w/WHEN w/ads, promo. I should have tried for this long ago. WJRO-1590 heard well @ 1:15 w/MoR. Very unusual why I couldn't hear this one at SSS or SRS. 6/19- At 12:26 WIDB-1380 w/RT & the KUOA TEST was heard. It was very weak but ID made it & 1:10, report sent. At 1:19 WLBG-860 conducting PoP, with excellent signals. That's about it. I am spending a lot of my free time writing or calling stations for CPC TESTs. The four in this issue came by quite pleasantly. WMMW-1470 was conducting an ET so I called them to let them know they were coming in with block-busting signals. The CE & I got to talking & I popped the question of a TEST or any other tests in the future. He told me he is the CE of FOUR stations in Connecticut. Anyway, for those who don't know the situation, here it is: It is illegal, if a station, while testing, IDs with Morse Code only if it is the ONLY form of identification. CIDs are perfectly legal if the station first VIDs, either at the beginning of the TEST, on the hour, or at the conclusion of the test. Then, it can ID in code at any other time. EDDIE RYAN asked a local FCC field Engineer in Seattle, Wash. about it and the preceding is exactly what he told him. This was verified by all the other employees in the local FCC office there. So, we can now ask stations to ID in code, only if they ID in Voice first. I'm glad because we all know how well code breaks through interference so much better than just a simple VID. Veries received recently were KNWS-TEST w/v/1 & WTNK-1390 Meridian, Miss. for their f/c of 1/12/78, also v/1. Have a safe Summer, don't forget that Minter isn't long off, and DX will improve greatly.

RECEPTION OF U.S.A. STATIONS NOT SO GOOD IN ITALY.

I have seen instead noted quite a few Europeans from East Coast in U.S., may be proof the reception is better from East to West than from West to East? During more active sunspot period? On Sunday night, when New York's T-40 stations go to public service programs, CKLW-800 was my best bet for T-40 from R.I. to N.Y. 73's.

MOTHBALL MEMORIES CHAPTER LXXXIV - BOB SELLECK TELLS OF HIS SEJINATING IN THE DX HOBBY.

I have long enjoyed this section and would not like to see it discontinued, so I'd like to offer my own humble reminiscences should no other articles be submitted. I got into DXing in the early 60's through the influence of my neighbor, childhood chum and still active NRCer, CHRIS LUCAS. My first intro to the DX was in Chris' cellar where he'd DX on an old 40's type cathedral RX while we played ping-pong. He caught the stations while I caught the points (hi). I finally joined the NRC in 1963 and the first and strongest impression was made on me by the Musings of the all-time great DXer, HANK TYNDALL. More than his reported 'milestones', especially his 'century' states (over 100 veries each), I recall his affection to both the hobby and its enthusiasts, and his marvelous anecdotes and perceptive insights on subjects which are still topical (i.e., poor reports, NSPers, non-verifiers, pirates, 'valid' loggings, etc.) Inspired by both a friend and an idol, the early to mid-60's were retrospectively my personal heyday, especially the '64-'65 season when you could often tell whom you were Diing just by looking at the clock. After 3am EST, anything still on was very often a West Coaster and my favorite veries, KTYM Cal. & KRKO Wash., were acquired under such CX. My greatest dilemma was deciding which DX TESTs I'd have time for. since finding cooperative stations via the CPC was much easter and a half dozen TESTs per MM was not uncommon. Today, the bulk of my DX is reliant upon CPC TESTs and I'd like to conclude with a salute to the silver-tongued devils who, considering the virtually exclusive 'business only' attitude of most stations, persuade and conmive with the interlocutory skills


### THE 1978 NRC ATLANTA CONVENTION

The 1978 National Radio Club Convention will be held September 1-4 at the Northlake Hilton on LaVista Road at I-285 in surburban DeKalb County. The motel is situated within view of the expressway, in a modern commercial and office-park development. Within walking distance are a variety of eating establishments, as well as a major shopping center, Northlake Mall. The Northlake Hilton itself is only several years old and is one of the finest suburban inns in the area.

#### HOW TO GET TO ATLANTA

BY AUTO: Atlanta is crisscrossed by three major interstate routes; east-west by I-20, northeast-southwest by I-85 and northwest-southeast by I-75. Completely encircling the city, and intersecting all of the above, is the perimeter highway, I-285.

If you are driving, and plan to be arriving in the Atlanta area in the mid-to-late afternoon, we recommend you use the perimeter highway to avoid much of the traffic and delays that occur on the thru-town routes. Also, at present, I-285 is undergoing construction which is expected to continue during convention time, so keep this in mind when traveling on I-285.



Here are some recommended routes to take:

### From points NORTH

I-75--Exit to I-285 East@Exit 105E I-85--Exit to I-285 South@Exit 35A

### From points SOUTH

I-75--Exit to I-285 East@Exit 81A I-85--Exit to I-285 (either way)

#### From points EAST

I-20--Exit to I-285 North@Exit 35B

#### From points WEST

I-20--Exit to I-285 North@Exit 15B

### LaVista Road is Exit No. 28

(Circled numbers on the map are approximate mileage between interchanges)

BY AIR: Atlanta's Hartsfield International Airport is served by most domestic carriers, including American, Braniff, Delta, Eastern, Northwest Orient, Pan Am, TWA and United. Regional carriers for the southeast are Piedmont and Southern. Delta and Eastern offer the most flights into Atlanta from most areas.

If you are flying to the convention, please make note on the registration form so we can arrange transportation to and from the airport. The motel has no limosine service, and a taxi ride from the airport (south of the city) is VERY expensive!! Let us know your arrival/departure times as soon as possible, and we'll take care of the rest.

BY BUS: Both Greyhound and Trailways operate to and from Atlanta to their separate terminals downtown. Again, let us know if this is your mode of transportation, so that we can get you to the convention site.

BY RAIL: Only one passenger train operates into Atlanta; the Southern Rail-way/AMTRAK "Crescent" which originates in the New York-Washington area. By the time of convention there may be a second train available, the "Floridian" originating in Chicago.

### ACTIVITIES AT THE CONVENTION

Mode of transportation

THE TOUR: As fate would have it, and despite our best efforts, the FCC will not permit us to tour the monitoring station on Saturday because of the noliday. So, there is the possibility of a limited tour if enough interest exists for late Friday morning. If anyone plans on arriving early, say Thursday or early Friday morning, and would be interested, please let us know. FCC will allow only a group of a dozen or so through.

The tour will include the following stops on SATURDAY:

- \* A visit to the WTCG (Channel 17) TV satellite earth station
- \* A tour through WSB-AM-FM-TV's "White Columns" studio-home
- \* A look at WSB's modern automated transmitter site, located almost across the street from the convention site!
- \* A stop at famed Stone Mountain, close to the Hilton.

BANQUET: A buffet-style banquet will be held Saturday night at the motel; the menu to be announced later.

AUCTION: The annual auction, after the banquet, will happen at the motel, so bring your items with you, or send them post-paid to Karl Jeter, 2816 Frontier Trail NE, Atlanta, GA 30341.

BEVERAGE: Yes, on Monday morning, beginning at midnight or so, a beverage session! So bring your receiver, and try out IDXD editor Chuck Hutton's phased beverage.
