CLASS IV ACTIONS

As of 12/15/84 all but a few Class IV stations were given blanket approval to raise night powers to 1000 watts. As previously mentioned, a handful of stations that were directional or operating with less than 1000/250 had to make a formal application for power increase and several of these are listed above under Grants to Existing Facilities (WJTN and WTHU). Refer to back issues for further lists of US/Mexican border stations that cannot raise power yet. Other than these few exceptions, this change is now in effect.

POST SUNSET COMPROMISE

The Commission's recent announcement that all daytime stations were to revert back to their PSSA powers and schedules of last year brought about a demand for compromise from the Daytime Broadcasters Association. This compromise has been met by the FCC. As of December 10th all daytimers on REGIONAL channels can boost their PSSA powers to a minimum of 50 watts, many higher, and all daytimers on Class III frequencies will be allowed to operate the full two hours after their local sunset. Many of these will be required to make a series of "stepped power reductions" as darkness grows and skywave interference worsens. Although the authorization began December 10th, no station was permitted to initiate these PSSA operations until the powers have been published in the Federal Register. While the power minimum of 50 watts is only half of the promised 100 watt minimum that was authorized, then rescinded in April 1984, many more stations should be willing to begin PSSA operations. The previous level of authorized power for many stations was so low (under five watts) that they never used their PSSA privilege. All this should have taken effect by the time you read this.

Compromise For  
Post-Sunset Operation**

Daytime-only stations will soon be permitted for the first time to operate for two hours past local sunset. A compromise to that effect between daytimers and fulltimers on regional channels cleared the FCC this week. The rule changes occur December 10, and daytimers can boost power as soon as they've been published in the Federal Register.  
To minimize interference to fulltimers, the daytimers will have to make a series of "stepped power reductions" as darkness grows and skywave interference worsens. Class 3 daytimers will get a minimum of 50 watts.

The Daytime Broadcasters Association (DBA) sought the compromise to prevent the Association for Broadcast Engineering Standards tying up its post-sunset authority with a threatened federal court appeal. The Commission said, "Our review convinces us that both in policy terms and in engineering particulars, the parties have proposed a sound basis for resolving the conflicting considerations" of extending daytimer hours while not causing objectionable interference to regional fulltimers on the same channels.

#### Class 4s Get 1 kw Nights December 15

The nation's approximately 1000 Class 4 AM stations got some good news last week when the FCC announced that their previously-approved quadrupling of nighttime power, from 250 watts to 1 kw, will take effect December 15. The way was cleared for the power hike last week (11-29) when Mexico and the United States reached final agreement on the new level for the two nations, plus Canada.

To make the transition a smooth one, the FCC is issuing "show cause" orders that let most stations boost power without having to file applications. The only stations not covered by the blanket approval are Class 4s that operate directionally, those that have less than 1 kw during the day, and ten stations whose Mexican counterparts have yet to acquire 1 kw nighttime facilities.

## Taking the top of the dial higher

**Station near New York broadcasts on 1622 kHz of auxiliary band; legality of operation is unclear**

A Maine broadcaster may have slipped through a loophole in the FCC rules to put a new noncommercial AM station on the air in Yonkers, N.Y., just north of New York City.

According to Allan Weiner, who owns the Yonkers station as well as WOZV(AM) Monticello and WOZIFM) Presque Isle, both Maine, the new facility, which was turned on Nov. 7, operates on the auxiliary broadcast frequency of 1622 kHz with 100 watts of power, broadcasting primarily AOR programming to Yonkers and other communities north of Manhattan. The call sign: KP941.

Although the station's channel is outside the standard AM band which ends at 1600 kHz, Weiner said, most AM radios are capable of tuning in frequencies as high as 1650 kHz. "Some of them go up to 1700," he said.

The station's problem is not technical, but regulatory. Although Weiner maintains that the rules governing the auxiliary broadcast channels are "broad" and "vague" enough to permit using auxiliary channels for broad-

casting, others have radically different opinions.

Jim Durst, a communications analyst in the auxiliary services branch of the FCC's Mass Media Bureau, said 1622 kHz and other auxiliary broadcast channels are allocated for remote pickup applications by broadcasters. "No way is that [frequency] supposed to be used to go directly to the public," he said. "It's supposed to be used strictly to get programming material back to the station for re-broadcast."

After reviewing the relevant section of the FCC rules, Michael Rau, a staff engineer at the National Association of Broadcasters, concurred. "It's my opinion that they are not operating in compliance with the FCC's rules and regulations. Whether the FCC will bother to shut it down is another question."

"What will the FCC do? If someone complains to the field office or the FCC," said Durst, "we will have to investigate." (Weiner said the FCC's New York field office is already aware of the station and has given it tacit approval.)

If the FCC forces Weiner to close down the station, it will represent no great loss to him. The entire facility, built from used equipment, cost less than \$1,000, he said. The station's operational costs are also low, he said, because it's programmed by volunteers.

According to Weiner, the programming emanates from a "studio" in the apartment of Weiner's partner in the venture and the sta-

tion's manager, Joseph-paul Ferraro. It's linked by a high-grade telephone line to the transmitter ("a Smithsonian antique") in a garage three miles away. The transmission antenna is atop a 40-foot tower adjacent to the garage.

With just 100 watts, Weiner said, the station manages to lay down a pretty good signal, reaching as far north as Hastings-on-Hudson and as far east as New Rochelle during the day. Because the station is on a "clear channel," he said, the signal "really flies at night." The station has received phone calls from listeners as far away as Detroit.

Weiner and Ferraro are natives of Yonkers and they said they put the station on the air as a public service. "It's a way of giving something back," he said. "Yonkers has changed so much since I was a kid. My friend and I feel this would be something worthwhile for the community."

They have tried repeatedly over the years to give Yonkers its own broadcast service, Weiner said. "We tried low-power television, we tried AM, we tried FM, we tried educational FM," he said. "We even tried to get a translator down there in the hope that the FCC would allow them to locally originate."

The United States and other countries are considering a plan to expand the AM band above 1600 kHz. "We kind of jumped the gun," Weiner said, "and provided the first station for Yonkers." □

**Call Letters WGH return to Hampton Roads  
by Larry Bonko, Virginian Pilot-Ledger Star**

From out of the past it came this week. "AM 13....WGH Radio....."

It was a station break heard in this market for more than 50 years.

Those marvelous old call letters, that stood for World's Greatest Harbor, disappeared from the airwaves here in 1983 when WGH and WGH-FM were sold by the Daily Press Inc. of Newport News for \$3.2 million.

Now they are back. Lost treasure found.

The WGH call letters - highly prestigious because they tell the world that the station was among the first to be licensed in the United States - were returned to Hampton Roads by the FCC on Dec. 10th.

At midnight that day, announcers began letting us know that WGH had returned.

WNSY, formerly WGH Rock Radio, this week became WGH again.

"AM 13....Country WGH..." Nobody was happier about the change than Paul Katabian, the general manager.

Sixteen days after taking over as general manager last August, Katabian petitioned the FCC to return the WGH call letters to this market. It took time. It

took a mountain of paper work. It took persuasive attorneys.

The FCC no longer grants new three-letter call signs to broadcasters. The WGRs, WGNs and WSBs of the world make up an exclusive club.

Now WGH is back in, reassigned to the Peninsula after Katabian said to the FCC, "Pretty please."

Broadcasters here were stunned in 1983 when the station's new owners, Grandcor Corp. of Dayton, Ohio abandoned he WGH call letters soon after purchasing the properties. Formats were scrapped, too.

WGH-FM, the 24-hour-a-day classical music station, became adult-rock WNSY-FM.

The new management caught the dickens for it.

Looking to win back some old friends, Katabian moved to restore the call letters - to the AM side of the operation. He said this week that WNSY-FM will not be known again as WGH-FM, although the FCC has no objections to that.

WGH is back. But only for Katabian's AM station. Good enough.

"We are pleased. Very pleased." he said about the FCC's decision.

So are the listeners. The WGH

KSAC - KEXT - KKSU

As early as 1901, inquisitive, imaginative members of the Kansas State physics department, located in a classroom building on the institution's Manhattan, Kansas, campus were tinkering with rudimentary radio components. They were dreaming about a concept which had not yet begun to be understood by the general population at the advent of the 20th Century. Through the years work progressed, and elated physics department instructors went on the air with an operational 100 watt transmitter in 1912. Although primitive, Station 9YV, broadcasting only weather information was a reality! (YV was the only radio station west of the Mississippi River. Interest in radio continued to grow, and, following World War I, expert Eric Lyon joined the physics staff. Although Lyon was an academic, his business sense gave him the responsibility to develop radio as an ongoing venture, as a business for the school. The cost of full time operation was prohibitive, so Lyon and two colleagues decided to approach the owner of KFKB, standing for "Kansas First, Kansas Best", the state's first commercial radio station, in Milford. KFKB was owned by the notorious "Doc" Brinkley, and its 500 watts covered the nation. Doc Brinkley, in addition to perating KFKB, had concocted and marketed a formula based on secretions from goat glands, which would cure impotence in males. This product went the way of snake oil, quashed untold numbers of male aspirations, and Brinkley unsuccessfully ran for Governor of Kansas.

Lyon developed the idea of using KFKB for college broadcasts by using long distance phone lines to send programs to the studio. The aspiring broadcasters chipped in \$150.00 to make the deposit necessary to guarantee the first toll calls to put KSAC on the air over Brinkley's facility. The KFKB broadcasts proved to be so successful that Kansas State built its own radio station. December 1, 1924 was the air date for KSAC, the school's own 500 watt station, on 880KHz. KSAC was heard coast to coast that night.

In 1928, KSAC received authorization from the FCC to move to 580 KHz. Additionally, in that year, an agreement was reached with Iowa University to share 580 with its station WSUL. The shared time agreement continued until 1929, when Capper Publications asked to have a part of the frequency for their commercial station, WIBW. This arrangement is one of the few shared time agreements left in the US today. On January 31, 1947, KSAC increased its power to 5000 watts.

Acts of God have wreaked havoc with KSAC over the years. In 1966, a tornado flattened the station's tower. And disaster struck on Friday, December 13, 1968, when fire razed Nichols Gymnasium, in which the KSAC studios were located. As station manager Jack Burke recalled, his station had just completed broadcasting a KSU basketball game - he received a call from the station at the Ramada Inn where he was staying, telling him that the guy was on fire...and the line went dead. The entire staff, including Burke and Del Stabb, who has served as KSAC's Chief Engineer since 1968, labored around the clock to build a temporary studio, and went on the air, on schedule, on Monday, without missing any allocated air time on the shared arrangement.

Jack Burke played a significant, active part in Congress' passing of the Public Broadcasting Act. He, and other National Educational Radio directors spent days lobbying in Washington, in a successful campaign to get radio included in the act which originally provided government funding only for television. The act established the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, which was instrumental in creating National Public Radio, public radio's first nation-wide network, in 1970.

As part of its 60th year of broadcasting, KSAC applied for, and was granted a change in call to KKSU - to coincide with the name change of the college to Kansas State University, in 1957. KKSU was the second call change for KSAC in a week!! The original application requested a change to KEXT - for "Extension", because KSAC-KEXT-KKSU has been operated by the Kansas State University Cooperative Extension Service since its inception. The last use of the call KSAC was at sign off at 5:30PM, on July 25, 1984. For less than two broadcast days, on July 26, and until 4:55pm on July 27th, the KEXT call was used. At that time, the station received notification that it had been granted the call KKSU, so for that time on, that ID was used, ending a three day saga in which 580 KHz in Manhattan, Kansas was ID'ed by three sets of call letters!

KSAC became one of the first stations in the US to tape record programs. In 1948, the station purchased two giant Presto tape recorders... "as portable as a grand piano!" as one staff wit noted....for the capability to tape anywhere. From that time, an extensive library of over 20,000 taped programs has been amassed, for distribution to the K-State Radio Network (of which KKSU is the flagship station) and other area stations.

Today, KKSU broadcasts from modern studios in McCain Auditorium, on the KSU Campus. Its broadcast schedule is from 12:30PM to 5:30PM, Monday through Friday only, as arrangement with WIBW, since the beginning of WIBW. Each station is a separate corporate entity, and WIBW broadcasts through the night from Topeka. KKSU, as the voice of the KSU Extension Service, states its mission as to "Take the University to the People".

KKSU's 5000 watt non-directional signal (500 watts after local sunset) covers virtually all of Kansas, as well as portions of Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, and Oklahoma,

and can claim a batter of dedicated listeners throughout the "Breadbasket of America". A monthly program listing, accompanied by feature stories about the station's programs on staff, is mailed to a large group of subscribers, and others interested in the station.

KSAC-KKSU has had only five managers in its 60 years. The present manager, Jack Burke, joined the station in 1958 as acting manager, and was formally appointed to the post a year later. His staff consists of several broadcasting veterans, and many proven professionals. Chief Engineer Del Straab joined the station at age 30, in 1968, and Ralph Titus has been on the staff since 1962. Ralph hosts the "Ralph Radio Program", a magazine-type show, and "Music From the Masters", a popular classical music show. KKSU programs music ranging from the New York Philharmonic to jazz. Many programs on different topics are produced for the University by the station's staff. Every night, "News at Five", a news magazine ends the broadcast day. "News at Five", offers in depth world and state news stories, as well as sports, business, weather, health, and other features. For the farm-oriented state, "Agriculture Today", begins the afternoon - and is very much relied upon by the state's farmers and agriculturalists. This show has its roots in 1924, when the old agricultural school presented feaures over the fledgling radio station for the residents of the Kansas plains. Another popular program is NPR's "All Things Considered", broadcast from Washington. A variety of other NPR and university-produced programs round out the broadcast schedule.

A memorial has been erected on the KSU campus by the Kansas Association of Broadcasters to appropriately commemorate KSAC's and Kansas State University's contribution to early radio in Kansas. As was the original intent of the station's pioneers, KKSU's objective today indeed is to "Take the University to the People".

The National Radio Club congratulates and salutes KKSU on reaching its 60th year of Broadcasting Service, offering creative, stimulating programming, and wishes the station many more decades of success. In addition, hearty thanks are due to NRC member Jim Watson, of Manhattan, Kansas, for supplying the information on KSAC-KEXT-KKSU for this station profile.

switchboard has been pouring out thanks to the station's management this week. "A positive feeling," Katabian calls it.

It is about time.

When the station's new owners in 1983 changed the FM side to adult rock, the community of highbrows here rose up in protest. The backlash has lasted until this day.

Ratings for WNSY-FM (a 2.1 share of the audience) are lower than when it was WGH-FM. It is the 14th-ranked station here.

And ratings for WNSY - the AM operation - fell to 1.7. It is No. 15th.

Soon after taking over, Katabian did some fine tuning with the format on the FM station. You hear more hits now. Last month, the AM format was changed from golden oldies to satellite-fed country and western music.

The current ratings period ended on Wednesday.

Following the change of format in AM operations, program director Phil Beckman left the station. So did John Seid, an on-the-air personality. Disc Jockey Tom Scott moved from the AM station to the all-night shift on WNSY-FM.

Katabian conceded that the change in formats and call letters caused some grief among the listeners. "Hard feelings," he called it. "The stations and the call letters have had a very strong, very loyal following for years."

At last, the new owners have kissed and made up with the AM audience here.

Everyone from listeners, to the stations' former general manager, Ambert Dail, considered the change of call letters a mistake. "A miscalculation," said Dail in an interview last summer. "Overnight, the new operators wiped away years of history and nostalgia. The area had a great deal invested in those call letters."

Elsewhere in radio, WTAR has promoted Georgeann Herbert to news director. She succeeds Dale Gauding, who resigned to become assignment editor at WTKR-TV. Herbert has reported news for WTAR since 1981.

## Religious radio station may air in Twin Cities

LEWISTON — The Lewiston-Auburn area may get a religious radio station by early this spring. Richard D. Gleason, the owner of Christian radio station WOXO-AM and of country radio station WOXO-FM in Norway plans to buy WRKV-AM, the defunct Auburn radio station, pending Federal Communications Commission approval.

If all goes as planned, Gleason said he hopes to be broadcasting religious programs by April of next year. WRKV has been off the air since Aug. 1.

## Stations fight for air rights

You won't find anything at 930 on your AM radio dial now, but two area stations owners are hoping the FCC will soon grant them the right to broadcast at that frequency.

The 930 frequency would be used either to expand the power of WKKD-AM in Aurora or for a new station in Sandwich.

Charles Filippi, president of Salter Broadcasting, which owns WKKD, said his firm applied for the frequency in 1977 so WKKD could better cover new areas of Aurora.

Larry and Pam Nelson, owners of WSPY-FM in Plano, also applied for the frequency to start another station in Sandwich, during the 30-day period of time set by the FCC to allow others to apply for a frequency.

The Nelsons have been given conditional approval to use the frequency, but a decision can and will be appealed, Filippi said. He has until Jan 3rd to file an appeal.

Filippi said hearings were under way in Washington on who should get the frequency, but were stopped when WKKD was dismissed from the application for other reasons.

"We were dismissed because a former engineer failed to inform us of a possible overlap we might have with WJPC (on 950 in Chicago)," Filippi said.

"We have hired an engineering consultant from Washington to make a new study for us and are now before the FCC review board with a request to submit new information.

"If the study shows there would be no overlap, we'll ask to be included back into the application. If there is an overlap, we'll drop out completely. But according to new data we have, there will be no overlap, so we're confident we'll be back on the petition. If so, it means the FCC hearing continues as to who should get the frequency."

Filippi said WKKD's present 1580 frequency causes interference with five other stations, which would be eliminated if it received the new frequency.

Nelson plans to begin broadcasting in June or July if he gets the frequency next month. The new station would be separate from WSPY, but no decision has been made on whether the two stations would share staffs. Collins Miller, general manager of WSPY, would be general manager of the new station as well, Nelson said.

No decision has been made on programming, but Nelson said he has considered an all-news station with some music, such as WPOK-AM in Pontiac, a station he and Miller own. The also own WJEZ-FM in Pontiac.

Nelson believes the area covered could support an all-news station.

If it is not all news, the station

would play a mixture of informational items, talk shows, news and a cross between middle of the road and modern country music, he said.

Filippi said WKKD's programming would change with the new frequency.

"We'd do more community affairs (programming) and things we can't do now such as go into the community for programming. We would have more talk shows, more local news, and go into the community where things are happening when they happen. We would become the WGN of Aurora," he said.

Pam Nelson said she is not surprised it has taken this long for the FCC to decide who should receive the frequency. "It takes time. It's just like any other government agency," she said.

If the Nelsons were to be granted the frequency, the new station would be the only AM station in Kendall County and the only 24-hour AM station in DeKalb and LaSalle counties, Larry Nelson said.

Filippi said WKKD is presently 250 watts with a directional signal on a frequency of 1580.

"When the station was started in 1960, it looked like the city was growing to the west, so our signal goes west. However, the growth has been to the east and we're now unable to serve about 30% of the city," he said.

"The 930 frequency would be all directional as well as being 500 watts, giving us the power to become a regional station. We would have a strong signal from Elgin to Joliet, and from the Tri-State Tollway area to DeKalb."

Filippi said he is most interested in serving the Aurora-Naperville audiences rather than going regional, he said the frequency could mean big money to whoever gets it because of the additional area and population the station could serve.

"We've spent into the six figures on legal fees fighting this," he said.

Filippi said the Nelsons could apply for other, less powerful frequencies.

The Nelsons' plans, if they are able to go ahead with them, are to cover Kendall and LaSalle counties and the southern portions of Kane and DeKalb counties. Although the station would have the power to expand into nearby Will County, Larry Nelson said he would not because that area is more oriented to Joliet.

Filippi and Bill Baker, president and general manager of WKKD-AM, are co-owners of stations in Rockton and South Beloit.

### Chiefs, network to part by mutual agreement

In all likelihood, the Chiefs will not be affiliated with the Mutual Broadcasting System following the end of the 1984 season, though their contract with the national radio network has one more season to run.

The Chiefs signed a five-year deal with Mutual beginning in the 1981 season for a total package estimated at \$1.5 million. But because of Mutual's desire to get out of regional broadcast packages with National Football League teams, the Chiefs have agreed to open the bidding and move to an affiliation with a local station if they can negotiate a contract that will at least equal the financial terms of the final year of the Mutual contract.

"We first started talking about it last May," Chiefs President Jack Steadman said of his negotiations with Mutual. "At that time it was not practical for us to make a change. They (Mutual) have told us all the way that they will honor the contract to the end, but if there is interest locally they would bow out and let us negotiate a new contract."

"As things are developing now, a local station will buy our rights and Mutual will terminate."

Steadman said he had been in contact with most local radio stations, had discussions with four stations and had three stations which he thought were interested in bidding for the rights fees.

"I was very pleased, given our won-loss record," Steadman said.

Steadman said he had not been in serious negotiation with any local stations. He has set a target date of Jan. 15, 1985, for awarding the new contract, but he emphasized that nothing would be done before the end of the current season.

"I don't want to do anything at this point to interfere with the balance of the season," Steadman said. "But we want to give the local station as much time as possible to be able to plan."

The Chiefs' flagship station is KCMO radio, and it has to be considered the front-runner in the negotiations. The Chiefs have been affiliated with KCMO since their first season in Kansas City.

"We have every intention, regardless of what Mutual does, that we will continue to carry the Chiefs' games," said Dennis Linsin, vice president and general manager of KCMO. "It is an integral part of our sports package, though there is little doubt in my mind that there are some other stations in the area who would like to have the Chiefs' broadcasts."

One is KMBZ (960 AM), which lost the Royals' radio broadcasts to KCMO two years ago. KMBZ had rights to Royals games in the Kansas City area, but did not originate the broadcast. KMBZ changed that Stauffer Communications, a Topeka-based company that originated the Royals broadcasts, had infringed on their exclusivity clause by

allowing a station whose signal penetrated the Kansas City metropolitan area on its network.

Throughout the football season KMBZ has sent small gifts of flowers and fruits to Chiefs officials. A plane with a banner has flown over the stadium on game days wishing the team good luck, and advertisements have appeared in papers in cities where the Chiefs have played wishing them good luck. All in an apparent effort to make KMBZ's interest more apparent to the Chiefs.

"We would like to add some sports programming to KMBZ to attract some more listeners," said Paul Leonard, station manager at KMBZ. "We are viewing the Chiefs as an option. We have had what I would call highly informal discussions with them—things along the line of someone bumping into each other at a luncheon or social function."

"But if they were to come available—if any sports franchise were to come available, the Chiefs, Royals, the Kings, they don't move to Sacramento (Calif.) and the Bombers, we would be interested."

KMBZ recently has changed to a news-talk format, and Leonard said there had not been discussion of adding sports programming until recently.

"Only since I got off the plane, which was September," Leonard said. "The first few months of the KMBZ switch in format, you tend to be rushing off in every direction and not do anything well. We did that to a small extent. Now we have established ourselves more in news and talk and think we are doing a better job and can expand to another area."

The rights fees for the final year of the Mutual contract are approximately \$600,000, and a new contract in nearly any other city in the NFL would be significantly higher. The escalation of rights fees in the last couple of years were what ultimately forced Mutual out of bidding for regional broadcast fees. The network needed to obtain the rights to broadcast games of a team in at least one of the top 10 markets in the country to attract national advertisers. Those fees have skyrocketed to the point that the rights fee for San Diego Chargers' games recently went in the \$800,000 range, and the Denver Broncos recently negotiated \$1 million per year for rights to their games.

"We weren't able to get any kind of a deal on the East Coast or West Coast," said Luke Griffin, director of Mutual Broadcasting System Inc. "The rights fees that some teams got recently were just prohibitive from our standpoint. Where we couldn't get a franchise on the coast or a top 10 market we found it was difficult to make what we had a national buy for sponsors. Until rights fees come down, which I think sooner or later they are going to, we probably won't be in the regional football business."

But there appears to be plenty of locals interested.

Tom Farmerie - 62 Sunrise Ave. - Grafton, MA 01519 (pm 12-7; rec'd 12-10)

The concept of DF'ing (Direction Finding) with loop antennas is nothing new, of course, and it is of use when there are a limited number known possible sources of a signal, especially in DX'ing splits. However, if more than one signal source lies on or near the measured great circle bearing path, DF'ing only reduces the number of likely sources for a signal. Two individuals, DX'ing at sites a couple hundred or so miles from each other can triangulate an exact point from their separately-measured DF bearings. I am embarking on an experiment to try to get enough statistical DF's of "Top End ???'s" to maybe guess at their locations. The higher in frequency one goes, the more one finds deviation from GCB in arrival paths, until one gets to SWBC freqs, where DF'ing can be totally unreliable (this is perhaps the main reason for radio beacons being on long wave). Soooo ... I would like for someone out there at least 200 miles from my QTH, who has a loop with bearing indicator to join me on this endeavor. Part of the experiment would be triangulating known domestic BCB signals to see how accurate we can get. On a different topic, I noted an article on a certain deceased former member in a nationally distributed periodical. This person operated a notorious BCB pirate station. Gentlemen, that article was only the tip of the iceberg; the unnamed club that did him in was NRC, and the real story exists as part of the club's oral history, one of many topics that were too hot to include in "The Book". Suffice it to say, however, that he was censured in *DX News* by Ray Edge, and for the last thirty years or so was allowed to be a non-contributing member. In those years he managed to squeeze in at least two items: one, an alleged verie from Ascension Island on 1600 kHz when it was 50 watts; another was an alleged logging of Longyearbyen, Spitsbergen on 1484 kHz. He refused to show his veries to anyone, claiming many like Tchad-1548 during an eclipse, when the shadow path was nowhere near the GCB, and Rangoon, Burma on 750 kHz with 20 watts ... all from Ohio. Draw your own conclusions.

Morris Sorensen - 111 Town Line - Milton, ON L9T 2X1 Canada (pm 12-3; rec'd 12-12)

As I have just rejoined the NRC after a 2 1/2-year absence, I guess that a re-introduction is in order. I am in my mid-30's and have about 20 years experience as a DX'er. Medium wave has always been my favorite but I do listen on TV-FM and other bands from time to time. At present I am serving on the Board of Directors of the Canadian International DX Club (CIDX). I began DX'ing seriously in 1964 when I joined the now-defunct Canadian DX Club (CDXC). In 1966 I joined NRC. At that time I was living with my parents in the tiny north-central ON hamlet of Bnsdale. My best catches in my early days of DX'ing included KOUR-1220 on a test (a 250-w. la daytimer), a 40-watt Mattagami, Quebec LPRT on 1140, 4VEC Haiti-890 with 1 kw (also on a test), and 2FBI Bermuda-960. My first receiver was an old Echophone EC-1 (similar to the Hallcrafters S-41) later augmented by a Canadian Marconi R-1155A. In 1971 I moved to Northern Manitoba. TA conditions were great there, with loggings from Czechoslovakia, Austria, Albania, the USSR, and many other European countries. I also heard Greenland, Alaska, and 3 stns from the NWT. My main receiver at that time was a Hammarlund HQ-150. I moved back to Ontario in 1981 to attend Seneca College and dropped out of the NRC in 1982 because of financial considerations and



lack of time. I now live in Milton (between Toronto and Hamilton) where I am surrounded by locals, but I'm doing my best with my Realistic DX-302 receiver and McKay-Dymek DA-9 ferrite loop antenna. I also have a TRF 12-655. Recently I acquired a RACAL RA-17 which I hope to have operational soon. My other interests besides DX'ing include nature, photography, hiking, sports, and history. I work as the education officer at a local museum. While not a technician, I enjoy working on old tube-type radios and have a small collection. I also collect books and magazines pertaining to the history of radio and DX'ing. If anyone has a spare copy of the NRC's 50th Anniversary publication I'd be interested in purchasing same. 73.

**Gerry Thomas** - POB 2036 - Pensacola, FL 32513 (pm 12-11; rec'd 12-14)

Not much happening here the last two weeks, DX-wise. I was called to an emergency meeting on chemical/biological warfare at Camp Lejeune, NC a couple of weeks ago so there's been a 14-day gap in radio pursuits. Since my return, I've been playing around with the R70 and have discovered a couple of things that might be of interest. Until recently the R70 has been a little bit of a disappointment for MW DX'ing (for me, anyway). For example, there have been several instances where the S100 Sony 6500 has provided more readable signals on MW than the highly-rated ICOM. I finally discovered the reason. My R70's AGC circuit tends to lock up a little early with the result being a desensitization on channels where signals of moderate strength exist (like most of the MW band at night). That is, running the RF gain wide open (with the pre-amp on sometimes) is definitely counterproductive to eking out the weaker signals that exist under the general din. What was necessary for me to do was to turn off the AGC circuit and cut the RF gain control back to a minimum level necessary to produce the desired results. This is the way I use the R390A at work and other rx's I've had but I had it in my mind that this wouldn't be necessary given the R70's reported dynamic range ... I was wrong. Much better results for me are attained by judicious control of the RF level and manual gain control. For example, last night nothing much was really readable on 1360 with the AGC on and RF full blast; with the AGC off and the RF reduced, W1XZ, a 1 kw'er out of McKeesport, PA came in nicely (but weakly). When I flipped the AGC back on and rotated the RF knob, it just disappeared. A lot of things seem to improve (e. g., selectivity, audio, etc.) when RF is placed under manual control; give it a try. Oh, yeah, have any of you R70 owners done any tinkering with the detector? That's my next area of concern, and any leads would be appreciated. Finally, those who ordered the Vernitron filters: please bear with me. They promised delivery date of 11-9 had come and gone, and after \$35 of phone calls Vernitron finally tells me they are to be shipped 12-7. 73's-GT.

**Marshall Cubitt** - 5 Strathcona St. - Smiths Falls, ON K7A 1V6 Canada (pm 12-7; rec'd

12-15) Hello, all. DX'ing has been really good so far this fall since Oct. 25, 56 new loggings. So you see BCB has been super the past few weeks. On Oct. 3 my first station in Maine, WYNY-970, and WRSC, Ahaske, NC. Sunrise loggings Sept. 17: CKNS-930 Espanola, ON; Sept. 27: KDNS-1530 Dennison, IA; WLAC-1510 Nashville, TN. Aug. 4: WXXI-1370 Rochester, NY. This was the first time that I had logged a station after a call sign change, WTKK-WXXI. Two other stations that I have logged under new calls this fall: WPTX-1260 from Rochester, NY, and WQRA-850 Penn Yan NY (was WOZO). Nov. 9: CHRM-1480 Cuba, R. Cadena Agramonte Florida, Dec. 4. CHMD-1280 Cuba, R. Reloj, Sta. Ciana, bringing me up to 3 international loggings. Now just a short rundown on my most active frequencies: 8 loggings, on 1600, W1XY, WAAM, WURL, WANN, CHNR, WELP, WMCK, WAYC; 8 loggings on 1480: WADR, CRAN, WABC, WSAR, WCNS, WWNG, CHAD, CHRM (Cuba). 7 loggings on 980: CHEX, CKGM, WTRC, CPPL, WENC, WSIX, WILL; 1270 WBBG, WXYZ, WSPR, CBGA, CJTN, WMBD. 7 loggings on 1590: WAKR, WQQW, KIRT, WABU, WPTH, WCBG, WNTS. Something else to look at in cities; by far the most active is New York, with 11 stations heard: WNBC-660, WOK-710, WABC-770, WNYC-830, WCBS-880, WINS-1010, WEN-1050, WNEA-1130, WNYH-1330, WQXR-1560, WURL-1600, 6 not heard. Major cities complete: Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, Rochester, Syracuse. TDH: 290; TDT: 0; TDV: 0 SH: 25; STV: 0; PH: 3; PTV: 0. I had something odd happen last week one night right at sunset time; I heard WFIP-1500 Milford, CT come in on 870. This is the first I ever had a DX station come in on an image frequency. It is normal to pick CJET-630 up on 1260, its first harmonic; sometimes CJSB-540 on 720, and some other places. Why would you get a DX station showing up like that? I understand a 50 kw station close by doing this. 73.
