

Goings

TELEVISION, growing like Topsy, is having its most pronounced development in the New York metropolitan area. Whereas just a year ago there were only 17,000 sets in the United States, today there are approximately 300,000—and half of that total are in use in the New York area.

As the center of all sports, entertainment and news, New York is obviously the hub of television's activities. Five TV stations are now supplying residents of this area with the best available programs; the newest station, WPIX, coming to you this very week for the first time.

In August we are promised another station, WJZ-TV, and perhaps before the year is over Mutual Broadcasting will have its station ready and in operation. That will give us a total of seven metropolitan stations, all in competent hands, producing programs which will become richer in entertainment values as time goes on.

Development of this industry has been so breath-taking we can sympathize with the old codger who, when told about a recent telecast that brought a current political candidate into the living rooms of several of his neighbors, refused to believe it. "We had to travel miles to hear a presidential candidate when I was a young feller," he protested. "Even then it was a rarity to actually see a man who was running for President of the United States.

"Any way," he concluded, "I'm glad I'm around to see such goings-on!"

YEXT WEEK when the G.O.P. convention holds the interest of the nation, selecting the man they hope will be our next President, the goingson will be historic. Radio got on its feet at the 1924 conventions and we oldtimers remember the "twenty-four votes for Underwood" cast by Alabama to the amazement and delight of millions of Americans who tuned in on the big event. Next week, unless something goes wrong, we'll also sit at our front-room ringsides and watch two Joes, Louis and Walcott, swap rights and lefts. In a week two championships will be at stake - the Republican and the fistic heavyweights.

This WEEK will bring us a local milestone in the debut of WPIX, owned and operated by the New York

Daily News. The News' station will swing into action with between thirty and thirty-five hours each week of entertainment and news, all selected to bring you the best in fun and relaxation. Klieg lights will blaze in the lobby of the newspaper's building on East 42nd Street this Tuesday night when Jimmy Jemail, The Inquiring Fotographer, interviews the notables as they arrive. And that in a way will be the keynote to a long life of smart programming by this enterprising station.

One of our favorites from the movies, Gloria Swanson, will be a star of The News' station, we are told. Gloria always was an eyeful and we're glad to be able to show her as she is today on the first cover of *Television Guide*. Billed as "the most glamorous hour on television," the Swanson program will cover fashion, food, beauty and interior decorating. What more could a happy housewife want at 4:05 P.M. on Wednesdays! And if Papa's dinner is a little late in coming that night he should be a little understanding. He has his ball games to watch.

B IGGEST SCOOP OF WPIX is the series of quality pictures to be shown every Tuesday night, starting June 22. Twenty-four of the best movies produced by Sir Alexander Korda will be shown and the first will be our all-time Korda favorite, "Private Life of Henry VIII." We're not too sure Alma Kitchell or Mrs. Dione Lucas would approve of Charles Laughton's table manners in that famous scene where he



throws the chicken bones over his shoulder.

ONE OF Brooklyn's more famous characters, Sadie Hertz, is making a new reputation for herself. A professional quizgoer on radio, Sadie has moved over to the television studios and is now a regular M.C.'s assistant on WABD's School Days. "I'm cute," she explains with gap-toothed grin. And, according to TIME, she is. "Short (4 ft. 10 in.) and pear-shaped, Sadie looks rather like a good-natured witch."

NEW YORK'S NEW STATION

WPIX, brand new station of the New York Daily News, will be in operation this week on Channel 11 despite an 11-day construction delay caused by bad weather.

Starting June 15 the station will begin its operations with one of the most ambitious schedules of any new-comer in the television field. Between 30 and 35 hours of programming has been set for its 7-day schedule.

Emphasizing that WPIX will bring the best-possible news coverage mainly because it is a newspaper-owned station, Harvey Marlowe, program manager, promises a wide variety of inspirational and entertaining features which will cover the fields of religion, politics, sports and women's interests.

"Exploring the UN" will be a half-hour public service program produced in cooperation with the United Nations. "Television Chapel," to be heard Sundays will bring together leaders of all religious groups for discussion of dogma, ritual and other phases of religious education.



GET SET FOR CONVENTION

Television broadcasters are putting aside any and all rivalries to pool their resources and \$250,000 or more in cash to cover the G.O.P, convention in Philadelphia next week.

A pooled broadcast will be available throughout the confab to the eighteen stations connected by the Bell System's East Coast television network. A pooled film of convention highlights will be available to those stations and to others not connected with the network for showing a few hours later.

Next week's *Television Guide* will be devoted mainly to the big meeting of our Republican leaders. Complete coverage of the convention program will be included in this second issue and anybody with a set will find this magazine a great convenience in following political history as it is made in Philadelphia.

ED SULLIVAN TO EMCEE AND PRODUCE NEW REVUE SERIES





WJZ (the new station to start' functioning in August) has big plans for operatic programs this Fall. "Metropolitan Auditions of the Air" as well as actual telecasts from the stage of the Met will be featured.

"TRY AND DO IT," a show that will test the studio audience's capacity for punishment. Setting will be a picnic grounds (with schmaltz brass band) and a newcomer to television, Jack Bright, assigning "consequences" to everybody in sight. Thomas Lender Jones will lead the band. WNBT, starting July 4th, every Sunday at 8:30 P.M.

DESIGNERS and manufacturers of children's clothes will be participating sponsors of a program "Tots, Tweens 'N

Teens" to begin on WABD August 18th. Agnes Phillips, former fashion editor of Child Life magazine, originated the program idea and will work on its production. Macy's will serve as program host for the first seven weeks with children's clothing from that store catching the spotlight.

RUDY VALLEE may be one of TV's biggest producers before long. At present he is creating a college series to be followed by a fashion and comedy group of films made especially for television.

HARRY EINSTEIN, known as Parkyakarkus, will place his "Meet Me at Parky's" before the camera for TV.

EYE FILLING Florida Keys, vocalist with the Louis Prima band who is equally at home on the high diving board, and Powers model Robin Dunnell Burgess, who recently rescued 5 people from the Miami surf will share the television screen Tuesday evening at 9:00 P.M. on We, The People, channel 2.

SMITH & DALE of the famous Avon Comedy Four will soon make their television bow in a new series. Watch for Smith & Dale Sketchbook.



One reason video fans know all about "syzygy" (certain phases of the moon's position), is the WNBT program called "The Nature of Things" conducted by Dr. Roy K. Marshall, University of Pennsylvania astronomer. Seen via channel 4 at 8:15 P.M. on Thursday evenings, in a six city network, Dr. Marshall has already established himself as television's John Kiernan.

On these programs he describes, with the aid of props ranging from pianos to basketballs, the rotation of the earth, operation of the calendar system, the expanding universe, atomic energy, and other fascinating scientific phenomena.

Dr. Marshall, sensing that science can be deadly dull to the uninitiated, makes his telecasts entertaining as well as informative. He injects the humor of a wrestling match, the suspense of a detective thriller into, for instance, a discussion of Archimedes' principle.





ASKED MOST OFTEN

TELEVISION being such an extraordinary infant, so big for its age and getting bigger all the time, that questions about its way of life are on the tips of everybody's tongues.

William W. Cone, merchandise manager of Krich-Radisco, Inc., Newark, N. J., lists a few of the questions most frequently asked. He also gives the answers.

O: Does television use much electricity?

A: The ordinary table set takes from an eighth to a half as much power as an electric iron or an electric heater. The table model uses from about 150 to 360 watts of power. With combination receivers containing a radio or phonograph it is customary that television turn off automatically when the radio or phonograph is being played. Then the set draws from 50 to 150 watts.

Q: How far does the television signal travel?

A: The television signal travels from the transmitter antenna to a few miles beyond the horizon. It does not penetrate obstructions such as hills or buildings. Sometimes satisfactory reception can be obtained behind those obstructions by positioning the antenna to receive a reflected signal, making a special installation lifting the antenna above the obstruction or other devices.

WATY TEST PATTERN

In order to aid servicemen in reorienting antennas for better reception of WATV, the station is telecasting its test pattern from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00

P.M. at which time regularly scheduled programs begin. On Mondays and Tuesdays when no programs are scheduled, the WATV test pattern is transmitted from 10:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. In addition, WATV's engineering staff is currently making field tests to obtain data which may prove helpful to set-owners and installation men in making necessary set or antenna adjustments.

WATV's 50,000 watt transmitter and antenna are located in West Orange.


