THERE ARE few operas indeed that hold so warm a place in the affections of operagoers as PUCCHINI'S "La Boheme," which will be broadcast from the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House in New York City on the afternoon of March 14, over both NBC networks.

Reasons for the opera's tenacious popularity come readily to hand. The work is filled with melody, persuasive charm, unashamed sentimentality and good humor.

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Radio Reactions In Prison, As Described By An Inmate

Coaxial Cable Is Authorized; Television Possibilities Great

All May Use Conduit For Experiments

Action of the Federal Communications Commission in authorizing the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to lay a coaxial cable from New York to Philadelphia has electrified the radio world because of television possibilities in the new cable.

Construction of the cable, believed capable of transmitting or "piping" television for broadcast purposes, along with hundreds of telephone conversations was ordered begun by July 1.

At the outset, under the FCC order, the A. T. and T. must confine its coaxial activities to experiment, giving all producers of television projecting and receiving sets an opportunity to test over the revolutionary conduit.

If and when the telephone company decides to use the cable for commercial purposes, it must apply for a new permit from the FCC.

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Morley Names Muse

Suggests Decibel as Patroness of Radio

CHATTING with CHRISTOPHER MORLEY is much like reading one of his novels or essays.

In his conversation this well-known essayist, novelist, columnist, former radio commentator and an editor of *The Saturday Review of Literature* displays the delightful friendliness, the wide-ranging intellectual curiosity, the contagious enthusiasm and humor that he does in such books of his as "Shandygaff," "Where the Blue Begins," and "Human Being."

I encountered Mr. MORLEY just as he was finishing his luncheon in the grill room of a Boston hotel. The introductions over, Mr. MORLEY, his eyes twinkling pleasantly behind his tortoise shell spectacles, remarked:

"I probably know less about radio than almost anyone in America. I overhear

Who I am is not important. Where I was imprisoned should make little difference to those who read this.

Suffice it to say that I was once a respected member of society, until one evening I lost control of the automobile I was driving, which resulted in the death of a pedestrian.

A year later I was found guilty of involuntary manslaughter and received an indeterminate sentence of one to 14 years in one of the largest and most up-to-date penitentiaries in the country.

This is not an autobiography, but rather the reactions of Inmate 999 to the blessings, and at times the curses, of the radio in a penitentiary.

Twelve years ago, when I left college, the radio was still to be fully developed; the home was rare that owned one. Today it has become a permanent fixture in almost every dwelling, so much so

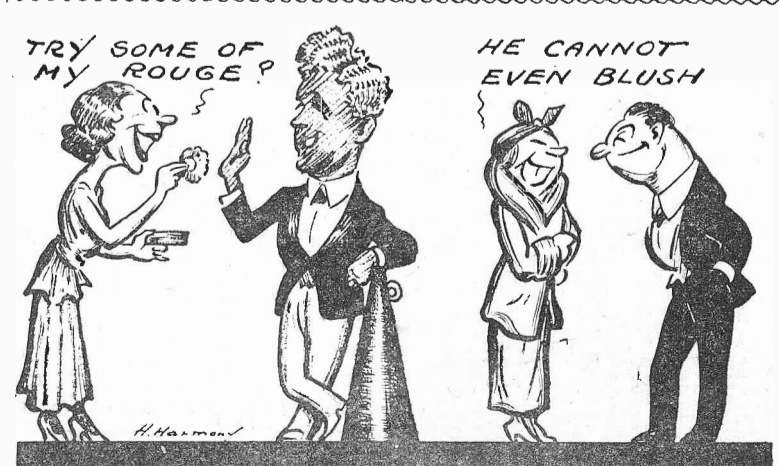

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'Down Melody Lane' Is Just An 'Old Radio Friend' To Listeners

Rochester Singers are Featured

"An old radio friend," is the manner in which many WHAM listeners refer to the Rochester Telephone Corporation's "Down Melody Lane" program, heard each Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock. This Sunday feature is the oldest commercial program originating in Rochester, being now in its ninth consecutive year.

During that time many of Rochester's best-known musicians and conductors have contributed their artistry to the program. Among those under whose stick the musicians have performed are GUY FRASER HARRISON, PAUL WHITE, CHARLES SIVERSON, SHERMAN A. CLUTE, IRVING SPECTOR and NORBERT KLEM, who is the present maestro.

During the past seven months, the program has become more popular in nature. About two years ago, the Rochester Telephone Corporation decided to change this Sunday afternoon feature from a straight orchestral presentation by adding a soloist each Sunday.

It was felt by the sponsors that there were not enough commercial programs in Rochester to give Rochester's many capable and deserving singers an opportunity to be heard.

As a result of this policy, not only have many of Rochester's better-known singers been heard at regular intervals, but many newcomers have been given an opportunity for professional appearances which have resulted in permanent engagements, both in Rochester and New York.

Among this latter group are numbered ROMOLO DESPIRITO, the brilliant young Italian-American tenor who recently has been engaged by the Metropolitan Opera Company for appearances at Chautauqua this Summer; LAURA CASTELLANO, who now is being coached for Metropolitan Opera appearances; ANGELA DEMARCO, who made her debut in "AIDA" last Fall in Italv. and EDWARD JARDAN, the popular Boston tenor, who now is heard twice weekly on a WHAM commercial.

Singing Club Is Turned Into A Top-Notch Radio Program

Roy L. Harlow Of WNAC Is The Director

ON APRIL 15 at 8 o'clock in the evening an audience at Jordan Hall, in Boston, will hear the opening notes sung by an unusual musical organization, the Metropolitan Chorus.

As ROY L. HARLOW, director of the chorus, and assistant to the President of the Yankee Network, says:

"I don't know of another such singing group in the country."

The chorus is Mr. HARLOW's pet, his hobby, his consuming interest. He beams when he talks of it and disclaims all credit for organizing it.

"Why is it there is so much interest in it among the members? Why do all these men faithfully attend rehearsals?" I asked him.

But I ought to tell you about the organization before telling you the whys of it.

The Metropolitan Chorus is composed of 121 men, all middle-aged, the oldest over 70, the youngest over 30. A year ago the chorus was 10 men stronger, but these have dropped out and Mr. HARLOW didn't want to take in any more because it would make the organization too large. There are plenty of applicants.

And these singers get together and sing for the fun of it, giving a concert once a year in Jordan Hall. This year the Hall is already sold out, mostly to friends of the singers and their families.

But to get back to the questions.

"The men in the chorus apparently sing for relaxation," said Mr. HARLOW. "It is a sort of singing club which they attend in the same way as anyone goes to a club—for the fun of it. Rehearsals are the mainstay of the organiza-

tion in that they get the members out once a week."

The proceeds of all concerts and radio programs given by the group go to children's charities.

But who buys the music? Who pays for the halls in which concerts are given?

"The members buy music themselves and pay all expenses. We generally get rehearsal room free," said Mr. HARLOW.

The chorus gave 15 concerts over the radio last Winter, the proceeds going to charity. And their entrance into the radio field as told by Mr. HARLOW is amusing.

Mr. HARLOW was at his desk when the 'phone rang and an advertising agency wanted a program, ready made, which it would be able to sell to a sponsor.

Said the agency:

"We want something big and something cheap."

"Well," said Mr. HARLOW, "I've got probably the biggest and the cheapest radio program in the world. But I'll have to ask the possible participants in the program about it."

An Informal Chorus Sings Just For Fun Of It

Mr. HARLOW asked the members of his Chorus if they wanted to go on the air. They didn't know. They might try it. The agency people heard them and were enthusiastic. The sponsor heard them and was enthusiastic.

And so the Metropolitan Chorus tried it for five times. They got "fan" mail, they sold their sponsor's goods. They were popular and, after much persuasion the group stayed on the air for 15 consecutive weeks.

"Then," said Mr. HARLOW, "they decided that that was enough. Rehearsal for the radio program took three hours each week. They got to the studio at 7.30 and rehearsed until the program began at 10.30 in the evening.

"It was interesting to me to note that on one of our most wintery evenings, no less than 75 of the chorus came to the studios for rehearsal. They didn't have to come. The only rule in the whole organization is that if a member doesn't show up for three consecutive times he is automatically dropped."

Inasmuch as this group of singers is made up of business and professional men, people to whom singing in the chorus is just a hobby, it shows the force of the love of music.

"Our chorus is unique also in that there are really no outstanding singers in it," Mr. HARLOW added. "But what they lack in technique, they make up in enthusiasm. They choose their own songs. They sing what they want to sing, from 'Love in Bloom' to operatic choruses.

"We have had instances where employer and employe have sat side by side singing at the top of their voices. Almost all denominations of religion are represented in our chorus. And the voices vary widely. Some time ago we had one tenor and all the rest were baritones. Now we have eight tenors.

"This is truly a metropolitan chorus," he concluded, with a smile.

DX Signals Are Easier To Tune In

Somebody is always writing that something or other is "better and better" than ever before, whether it really be better or worse or just standing still. It helps to attract attention. And although I do not like to add to this fraternity of scribblers, it does seem difficult to recall when foreign radio stations were easier to tune in than during the present month.

Easier to tune in and so much easier to listen to, I wish to say. Where once they were shaky and blurred, entirely new waves are found, and whether they're a local or a foreigner astray, only the call letters tell.

Responsible for the turnover in oversea waves is the season itself and the wave changes it has demanded. Not forgetting the fact that European stations have been building and improving upon their air voices all along so as to really put something "on" the waves that they wing around the world.

Best benefits from the new megacycle renovations are derived by listening in between the approximate hours of 4 P. M. and 11 or midnight, with the emphasis, of course, on those pet hours that border local sunset. If it's not good then, you might as well throw out your set.

Favorite of the European radiations is the British GSD, operating on 25-meters, 11.75-megacycles. It comes on at 12.15 P. M., but don't hit it too soon. Wait until at least 3 P. M. or maybe 4, and then you will not be disappointed. By that time, London is figuratively within your living room and will remain so through the mediums of GSD until well towards 8 P. M., when Trans-mission Five from the BBC tucks away for the night.

The 11.75-meg. GSD is a Spring and Summer wave and it has just been put into service during the evening hours. That began the "local" reception from London, and chances are it will stay this way until the leaves drop away in the Fall.

With the longer daylight periods increasing steadily, France, lost on 25-meters all through the Winter, is another that has come back and now the "Radio Coloniales" outside of Paris are coming through nearly as well as GSD itself.

Italy, on 31-meters, 9.63-megs.,

SUCCESSFUL operators of broadcasting stations are apt to be plain, blunt men, long since disillusioned, abrupt in speech if kindly by nature, and clear in thought. Such a man is Charles W. Burton, Director of Broadcasting for WEEI, Boston, this week's guest editorial writer for The MICROPHONE.

Mr. Burton's subject is: "Must They Cry When Saying It?" The unanimous answer, of course, is "NO!" But let Mr. Burton tell the story in his own words:

"You cannot listen to radio very long without being urged by some announcer to 'try' this or 'try' that. That is all very well, but why does the guy have to cry about it?"

"When some birds implore you to 'try Schultzenheimer's Wash Rags' or something, the mental picture you get is of a big sap down on his knees in an Al Jolson-Mammy attitude, his hands outstretched in your direction, and great big salty tears welling up in his eyes. 'Try Schultzenheimer's Wash Rags,' he squeaks, implying by his tone that if you don't he'll lose his job and his wife, kids and sweetheart will all starve immediately.

"It makes you sick. It makes practically everybody sick except the sponsor, who thinks it's just dandy. But he gets sick later when sales reports indicate that the great wide world hasn't stampeded to the nearest wash rag store.

"This cantankerous old grouch who sits in at WEEI's auditions for announcers insists that candidates speak the word 'try' naturally. If they give the impression that if you don't 'try Schultzenheimer's Wash Rags' they'll bust right out bellowing, they get no job. Is he right?"

In one word: "Yes!"

"Mr. Paley Had Last Word," Says Listener

WILLIAM S. PALEY, President of the Columbia Broadcasting System, apparently has intrigued the interest of the British Broadcasting Corporation.

The Listener, official organ of the British Broadcasting Corporation, says editorially in its latest issue to reach Boston, under the caption: "Political Broadcasts In The U. S. A.":

"The system of financing radio by sponsored programmes does not apparently solve the problem of controversial broadcasts. The Columbia Broadcasting System in America has recently had a brush with the Republican National Committee.

"Mr. ROOSEVELT had announced his intention of delivering his Congressional address at 9 P.M., and dragging Congressmen from their various dinner parties in order that the rest of the nation might hear him by their own firesides. The Republican Committee asked to buy on some closely following day the same amount of time

on the same stations at the same hour, in order to reply to what they assumed would be the first move in Mr. ROOSEVELT's campaign for re-election next year.

"Columbia refused to sell them this time. They explained that it was their policy not to sell time at all for political propaganda, but to allot it impartially and free of charge when they considered circumstances were suitable. Only when the Presidential campaign was at its height were they willing to accept payment for political broadcasts.

"The correspondence between Mr. PALEY of Columbia and Mr. FLETCHER of the Republican Committee has now been published.

"Some of Mr. PALEY's sentences are worth quoting: 'We have an absolute conviction that the air would be misused, were . . . discussion confined to those causes or advocates of causes who were able to pay, and we would

very quickly build up an undemocratic and un-American situation in which the air belonged to those with money.'

"Broadcasting should be a flexible and swiftly responsive medium and this means that programs of talk and discussions should be put on as news develops and as public interest and attention shifts from one subject or situation to another.'

"Mr. FLETCHER remained dissatisfied, but Mr. PALEY had the last word."

that perhaps many of us take it for granted.

This was the case with me when I arrived at the diagnostic depot of the state prison.

No Radios In Cells

For the first two weeks I was shut up in my cell and allowed out only to take physical and mental examinations. We didn't get out even for meals.

There were no radios in our cells, which was a great disappointment, as I had been informed that a loudspeaker system had been installed in every institution in the state.

I soon found out that this was true only in the case of the permanent prisons, for most of us were only transients at the diagnostic depot.

Two weeks finally dragged by, and I found myself transferred to the newest and largest prison in the state, where all first offenders (excepting the criminally insane) are sent. This was nicknamed the "University," and those of us who were fortunate in being sent there were greatly impressed with the size of the buildings and grounds, after the small and crowded quarters of the diagnostic depot.

The pleasantest surprise came when upon climbing up to the seventh tier, I found a radio loudspeaker in my new cell. The man with whom I had been assigned to live told me that the radio was run from the administration building, and that every cell in the institution was equipped with a speaker.

Our cell-house was the largest of five, and contained 600 amplifiers, all in one cell-block.

My cellmate informed me that the radio always was on from 7 o'clock in the evening until 9:30, or half an hour after the lights were turned out. I asked him if the radio was run by the officials of the prison, and learned that two of the inmates who had been radio engineers in the outside world, not only installed and serviced all the equipment, but also selected the daily programs.

Apparently the former was considerably easier than the latter, as you can well imagine how difficult it would be to please all 4,000 inmates.

Inmates Bore Cost

The radio equipment for the entire institution was paid for, indirectly, by the inmates themselves. I say indirectly because the money was taken from the inmates' amusement fund and this fund is made possible by the profits accruing from the inmates' commissary.

Everyone is allowed to spend \$3 a week on such varied articles as milk, oranges, pies, cigarettes, shaving soap and toothpaste. Whether there is a depression or not, every article shows a good profit, which in this case benefits the inmate with radio entertainment.

My first reactions to hearing the radio again, after the lapse of two weeks, were both pleasant and exciting. The first broadcast I heard was the 7 o'clock news flashes, which proved particularly interesting, due to the fact that in the first weeks of incarceration I

had not seen a newspaper. I had been completely shut off from the outside world.

As a matter of fact, I had felt that the less I heard or thought of life outside the walls, the easier it would be to adjust myself to my new surroundings.

But I soon discovered that I craved news, not only of my family and friends, but of the world in general, as I realized I was in danger of becoming too introspective.

I later found out how much the radio stimulated my interest in all the activities of the outside world, though it left me with a feeling of frustration and futility when I realized I was no longer a part of it all.

Generally speaking, the large majority of the inmates were more interested in hearing the broadcast of sporting events than any other type of entertainment, and of all sports professional baseball was probably the most popular.

During the major league season there was a game broadcast every afternoon in addition to the regular evening program. In my business travels, I have visited every city in both the National and American Leagues, but in none of them were the fans as rabid and as well-posted as were the inmates of the state penitentiary.

During the World Series, the prison was in a fever pitch of excitement and a great many cigarettes (legal tender for the gambler) changed hands.

During the football season, the Sunday professional games were popular. But the main interest in football was in the institution's own team, which played every Saturday afternoon from the first week in October up to the middle of December. We played most of the leading teams in the state and other professional teams from adjoining states.

The radio also played a part in these games, as a play-by-play de-

scription of each game was sent to the radio station of the nearby city from which our "University" took its name.

For 15 minutes every Saturday evening, the players would have the thrill of hearing their names and prowess extolled from the outside world. Incidentally, we were victorious nine times out of 10.

Prizefights also were popular. When LOUIS knocked out MAX BAER, there was some fear of a race riot, as we had a large colored population. However, the fight was soon forgotten.

Surreptitious gambling on horse racing was hard to stop in a place as large as the "University," so that the race results that were given every evening were attentively listened to by many.

Outside of sporting events, the most popular regular feature on the air was "AMOS 'n' ANDY." Although I had seldom listened to that program when I was a free

man, I found myself becoming intensely interested in the daily problems of the two comedians and found them to have an appealing and homely philosophy of life. The continuity of plot also was something to look forward to each evening.

Of all the other programs, JACK BENNY's hour on Sundays easily would have received the most votes. It so happened that he always had been a favorite of mine and I could easily visualize being home again with my family and laughing with them to the strains of "Love In Bloom" and MARY LIVINGSTONE's mad poetry.

It is interesting to note the reaction of the "long-termer" and "lifer" to radio humor. They generally dampen your enthusiasm. They will sit in silence and make you feel as if they were saying to themselves: "I dare you to make me laugh!"—and they very seldom do.

Radical and Fatalist

However, you often find that the man who has served much time is more interested in political and serious broadcasts. This man is generally a radical and apt to be a fatalist as well. HUEY LONG and Father COUGHLIN both were popular with this type. These broadcasts often ended in violent discussions between such extremes as the embezzling bank president and the strong-arm "hoodlum."

The one broadcast that I never will forget was the night that WILL ROGERS died, when men and women from every walk of life paid tribute to his memory. We all felt that even the forgotten and dishonored men also had lost a friend.

I had a particularly hard-boiled cellmate at that time, who never was moved by anything.

He was only 29, but he had been in prison for seven years and had three more to go. He didn't want to listen to the radio that night, but before the ROGERS hour was over he was in tears. He felt ashamed of himself for losing control of his emotions, but I know he felt a better man for having shed those tears.

At the beginning of this article I made the statement that radio was both a blessing and a curse. So far I have discussed its blessings.

The only real curse of the radio in a penitentiary is that there are times when your nerves are so on edge that all you crave is peace and quiet and then the radio will start blaring forth, and it is impossible to shut it off. Also, being a lover of good music, I often would look forward to hearing the FORD symphony hour and find instead I had to listen to some hill-billy band.

However, all things considered, the radio is distinctly a blessing to all shut-ins of our penitentiaries — mainly because it makes you feel that you haven't lost touch with the outside world, and that some day you will return as a respected member of society.

"Seriously, radio has made and is making phenomenal progress, far more rapid progress than the movies, for example.

"I enjoyed the radio broadcasting I did last Summer and if the opportunity arises for me to do more, I most certainly will accept."

Mr. MORLEY confessed that he was fascinated by the gadgets in the control room off the studio from which he

broadcast. Particularly did the decibels attract his fancy.

"Decibel," Mr. MORLEY said, "is a beautiful word. I think that there should be a Muse of Radio and her name should be DECIBEL. At least, a radio announcer or technician should name a daughter DECIBEL. It's quite as nice a name as ISABEL.

"You know what a decibel is?" Mr. MORLEY asked his luncheon companion sitting across the table from him.

"It's a unit of sound and the smallest decibel unit is the sound of a pin dropped on the floor."

Mr. MORLEY is not particularly sanguine about the so-called educational radio program in America.

"The American radio audience, which gets its radio programs free, wants entertainment, not education. The educational program must be slightly sugar-coated to be acceptable."

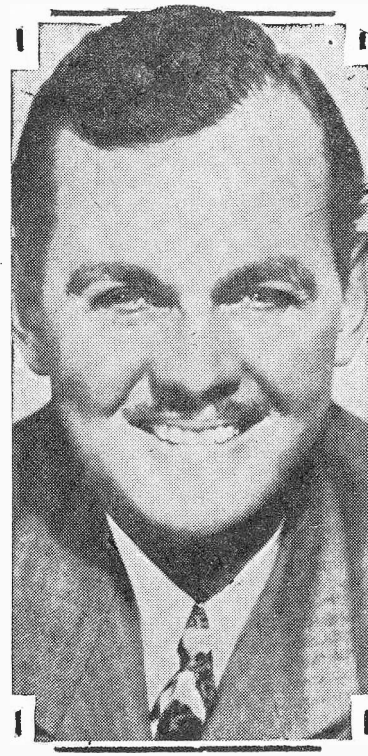

Four-Year-Old Script Shows Benny's Comedy Is Still The Same

His Brand Of Humor Does Last

JACK BENNY, the radio comedian, has one souvenir of his early days in radio, four years ago. It is a dog-eared bit of paper with part of his first program written on it. He says this marked the turning point in his career.

He was a guest star with ED SULLIVAN, Broadway columnist, early in 1932.

The script shows that time does not change radio comedians much. Here is part of this first script of Mr. BENNY'S:

"Ladies and Gentlemen, this is JACK BENNY talking. There will be a slight pause while you say, 'Who cares?'"

"I am going back into pictures in about 10 weeks. I'm going to be in a new film with GRETA GARBO. They sent me the story last week. When the picture opens, I'm found dead in the bathroom. It's a sort of mystery picture.

"I should have been in Miss GARBO'S last picture, but they gave the part to ROBERT MONTGOMERY. You know, studio politics. The funny part of it is that I'm really much younger than MONTGOMERY. That is, I'm younger than MONTGOMERY and WARD.

"You'd really like GARBO. She and I were great friends in Hollywood. She used to let me drive her car all around town. Of course, she paid me for it."

"News Of Youth" Program Is Junior March of Time on Air

Child Actors Make Drama Of The News

THE "News of Youth" program heard over the WABC-CBS network each Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday at 6 P.M., is presented by child actors under the direction of HIMAN BROWN, who has written many adult and children's programs for the Columbia network.

The program is a junior "March of Time," in that it presents dramatizations of the news which will interest children.

"The stories come direct from newspapers," says Mr. BROWN. "They aren't dressed up, but are told just as they happened. Stories about sports, human interest items and yarns about heroism and endurance are the favorites.

"The scripts are sent to Columbia's child psychologist, to its censor and to the client, before they are put on. They're not sugar-coated, but each one does something towards teaching a lesson."

Mr. BROWN spoke of his cast, which always was ready to be on hand for a program.

"To make it a little easier I have a nucleus of five or six young people who are more or less on call and can fill a variety of roles.

"JACKIE KELK plays boys of 8 to 13; LESTER JAY does boys up to 16, and ALFRED CORN continues from there to 21.

"ETHEL BLOOM plays girls from 8 to 16; JOYCE WALSH those below 8, while CHARLIE CANTOR and HANLEY STAFFORD handle the men, and ADELAIDE KLEIN portrays the women. Many other players are called in for special parts."

Mr. BROWN gives a 15-minute recess during rehearsal.

Immediately the studio becomes a madhouse. SEAMAN and PETER DONALD seat themselves at two pianos and begin a concert duet. They switch to the "Music Goes 'Round and 'Round." Then they begin a jazz version of one of FERDE GROFE'S tunes when ESTELLE LEVY discovers a xylophone parked in a maze of musical instruments against one wall.

"The News of Youth" begins ANDRE BARUCH and the program is on the air.

Tunes By A Mother For The Radio

On her program ALICE REMSEN, NBC Story Lady, over the NBC-WJZ network on Sunday, March 15, at 11.05 A.M., will feature "Tunes for Tiny Troubadours," musical pictures written by a bed-ridden mother for her six-year-old daughter.

The program includes sketches called "The Ostrich and the Funny Giraffe," "The Tired Old Freight Train," and "The Lonely Little Skunk."

The lyrics to these tunes were composed by RACHEL JANE WILLOUGHBY for her daughter, TAICHE, and sung to improvised tunes at her bedside.

When Mrs. WILLOUGHBY recovered she showed them to her brother, MORRIS W. HAMILTON, of the NBC music supervision staff, who set them to music.

The tunes and stories were published in book form and when Miss REMSEN saw them she sought and received permission to use them on her program.

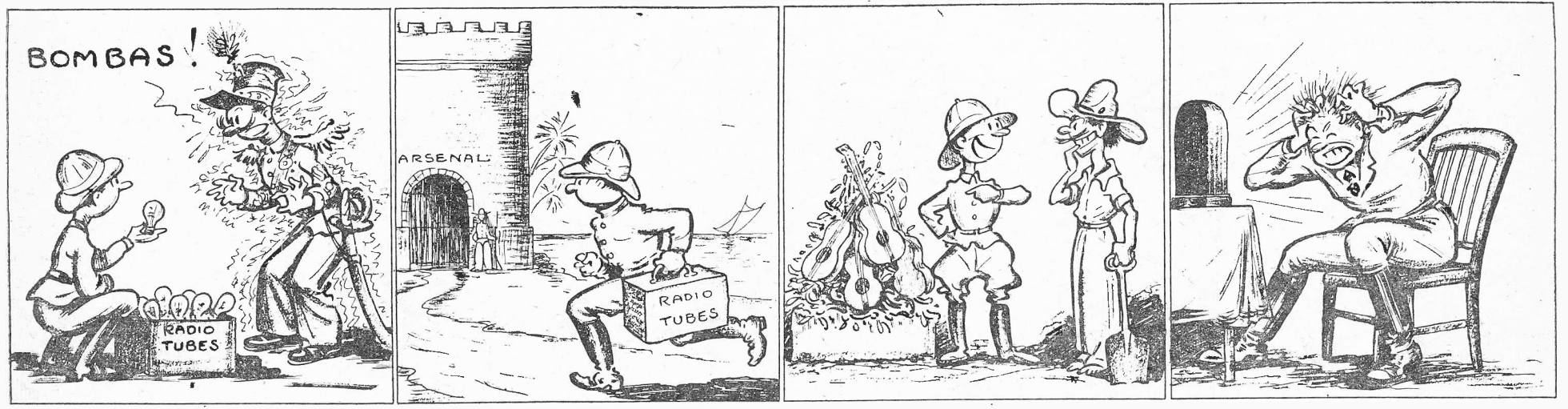

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Trials of A Radio Engineer In Central America Amuse Mr. Harmony



SOME YEARS ago I. R. Weir, engineer for a radio company, arrived at the Panama Canal on his way to set up a radio transmitter in Honduras. He carried boxes with metal tubes in them. The customs officials stopped him. He finally found out that they thought the metal tubes were bombs and that Mr. Weir was going to blow up the Panama Canal.

AFTER MUCH argument and explanation, the officials remained firm in the belief that Mr. Weir's boxes contained dynamite bombs. And the only way these officials allowed him to stay with his cargo in the Canal Zone was on the stipulation that he put his radio tubes in the arsenal where powder, shells and other dangerous materials were stored.

MR. WEIR had difficulty in getting his native laborers to understand the technical names of the equipment he was using with which to build the radio station. He created a new language. Apparatus was labeled by the name suggested to the men by the shape of objects. So he built a radio or "sugar mill" with guitars mounted on sawsages wound round with copper wire.

MR. WEIR'S most difficult time in building the transmitter was when 5,000 natives stormed the city and cut all the telephone and power wires. They captured the city of Tegucigalpa, but finally things quieted down, the power was turned on and the transmitter again began to work in the proper way. It cost Mr. Weir no end of hair-tearing and worry.

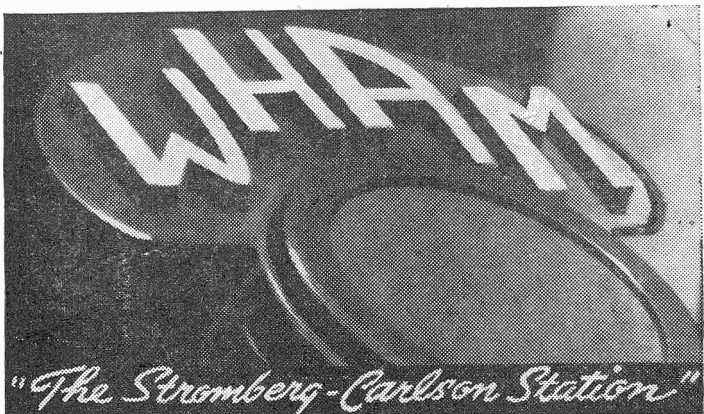

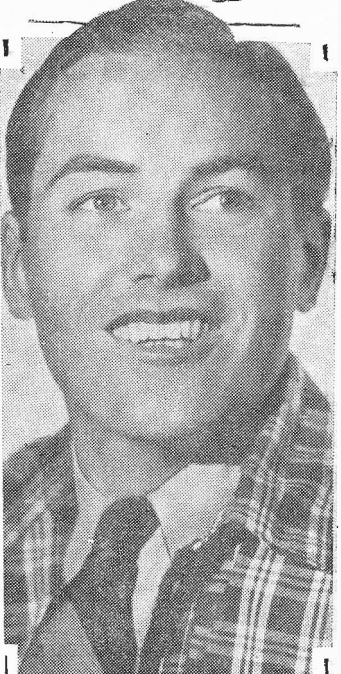

Backstage In Biggest 'Chance-Of-A-Lifetime' Show In The World

The Bowes Amateurs In Person

By G. CARLETON PEARL

Last week was Boston's second experience with members of what is growing to be one of the country's biggest businesses — Major BOWES' Amateur Units.

Rumors have been flying here and there. It's just a racket. They're all professional entertainers, anyway — former vaudeville stars who can't get a job any other way.

Some weeks ago a newspaperman said he uncovered in one of the units, which was playing in his town, a former vaudeville performer. But this is extremely rare.

I talked with six of the amateur performers who were in Unit Number Four. However professional their air may be on the stage, and however set up their routine may seem to the audience, they all are obviously new at show business and enjoying every bit of it.

Most of them are young, in their 'teens or early twenties, and they seem still to be amazed that they really are stage people after all. They have the venerated naïveté of a freshman who has been on the campus long enough to learn the names of the buildings and the nicknames of the professors.

Basking in comparative wealth for people so young and so new at a business (they get anywhere from \$50 to \$150 a week) they are not yet used to the difficult one-night-stand life of a touring vaudeville troupe.

Perhaps the best illustration of their attitude toward the whole business is a remark which one made to another.

Said the first: "Boy, I did a job at the ROXY last week. You haven't played there yet, have you?"

There was just a suspicion of superiority.

Said the second: "No; but I'll get there pretty soon, all right."

She Sings In Spanish

EVA ORTEGA, a pretty, dark-eyed girl, who wears a white dress and sings songs in Spanish, French and German, graduated from a teaching course at Hunter College in New York City last June. She might be 20 years old, maybe less.

"How did you happen to get into this business?" I asked.

"On a dare," she said. "Lots of show people use that as a publicity story," I said.

"Oh, but that's true in my case," she continued. "I started out to teach school. Then a few friends who had heard me sing said 'Why don't you try to get on Major BOWES' program?' But I thought the amateur program was just a gag. What was the use of my trying to get on the program?"

"Then one day I took my courage in my hand and wrote a letter to the Major. It was four pages long and, I thought, largely nonsense. But, lo and behold, they sent for me, and here I am." I saw her performance later.

The Result Of A Dare

With an eye to business, the Major always tries to have as many local people as possible in a unit when it plays a certain city. MAE ELIZABETH MCPHEE of Needham, tap dancer, has just been added to the show.

MICHAEL BALLERO is one of these, too. He was born in South Boston and he does good imitations. He is 19 years old.

"Do you think I'd better leave out the BARRYMORE?" he was asking a publicity man when I came into his room.

"You see," he said, as he saw me, "they've just cut my routine a bit and I've got to decide which people I'll do this afternoon."

"Can you pick and choose just like that?" I asked.

"Oh, sure," was the reply. "I can do about 25 imitations. They're easy."

I don't agree. I've tried it.

He Looks the Part

The interesting thing is that this boy, who appears naturally as a bright young chap with a nice smile and regular features, actually looks like the celebrity he is imitating, whether it be GEORGE ARLISS or WALLACE BEERY.

I asked him the same question I asked Miss ORTEGA.

"How did I come to get on the amateur hour?" he answered. "It was a serious business with me. I saw that it was a good way to break into show business. If I could swing it, I'd get where

I wanted to get and do it more quickly than any other way.

"I used to be a theatre porter, among other things. I found out that I could do imitations. I worked like the dickens. Practiced in front of a mirror set up in the coal bin of my cellar until I got tired of looking at myself. But look what it got me."

I asked him about rehearsals for the BOWES' program.

"Yes, we go over the lines beforehand. I don't think a radio program could be put on without some rehearsal. It would be jumbled and not fair to listeners."

One of the out-of-towners with the unit playing in Boston is JACK O'BRIEN, whose home is in Sheraton, Wyoming. Here is no "Bronx hill-billy."

The Modern Cowboy

He is the modern cowboy. He came East to Mt. Kisco, New York, as shepherd to 50 ponies. Before he joined the amateur group he spent his time in Wyoming on the Teepee Lodge, a dude ranch, teaching city folks how to stay on a horse.

He has a much-prized guitar, which he took to New York with him for a tryout for the amateur program. That was last Fall.

"I went back to the ranch after that. Pretty soon I got a letter from Major BOWES asking me if I wanted to join one of his tourin' companies. I asked my boss and he said 'O.K.,' so I came East. I imagine I'll go back home, perhaps next Summer.

DX Signals Show Strength

another reasonable channel, is reached more effectively than ever before and Germany soon will add to the array by dropping from DJC (6.02) down to 25-meter spectrums. As it is, Berlin's Central American transmitter (DJN, 9.54) and experimental DJI, on 9.68-megs. (5 to 7 P. M.) are flashing across well. Even our Japanese broadcaster, fast becoming popular 10.74-megacycle JVM, is displaying by its increased signal strength the soothing touches of Spring weather. Mon-

days and Thursdays JVM's 4 to 5 P. M. transmission is heard here better, while it is much more regular on the daily morning run from 4 to 7.40.

Morning signals from Europe on 15.2-megs. (19-meters) and the noon radiations have been the last to show improvement. Midday foreign programs still are rather rare. But Australia in the mornings is right there on 31-meters with volume that really can be enjoyed. And they're only 10,000 miles away.

Mr. FRECHETTE plays the piano. He comes from North Cambridge, Mass., where he was a music student. He does imitations, also.

But they are imitations of popular pianists. Ten minutes later this sleepy boy appeared on the stage and, very wide awake, played without a flaw after the manner of EDDIE DUCHIN, FATS WALLER and his own arrangement of "Good Night, Sweetheart."

JOHN JEWELL is a banjoist, a bit older and more serious than the rest of the group playing in Boston.

"When I told them in New York that I was better than EDDIE PEABODY, they didn't believe me. I guess they still don't," he concluded, wearily.

Tap Dancer

The MICROPHONE'S Fashion Observer

SHOES FOR many seasons required little thought and little chronicling on the part of the fashion writer. One wore pumps or one strap models or oxfords for most daytime occasions and sandals for dancing.

Except for evening, one's choice was whether black, brown or blue harmonized best with one's costume. Heels were only a matter of height.

ALL THIS has been gradually changing, until now, in the Spring of Nineteen Thirty Six, the ways in which we may cover our feet seem extraordinarily varied.

FOR DAYTIME our classic three are still with us. But frequently in unexpected materials and in colors, in real colors like red, or blue or green. All the reptiles appear in these colors as well as in their natural hues. Colored patent is effective. Real Moroccan leather or soft suede is used to make snug, moulded shoes that cover the instep almost to the ankle. These have rather low (but not flat) heels and are the last word from abroad. The same last is used for evening, developed in satin, gold or silver kid, precious brocade or thin suede embroidered with metal thread, or adorned with cut-out designs of gold or silver leather.

DANCERS still prefer sandals for evening. But here, too, there is greater variety than before. Straps are reduced to a minimum. In fact, the smartest sandals consist of a sole attached to the foot by one or two slender straps. Heels are quite frequently square, sometimes octagonal, sometimes with brilliants.

SPORTS SHOES have changed less than any other kind of footwear. Although they too are blossoming forth in color and their lines are tending to come higher up on the instep. Colored laces will bring your ghillies up to date. While fringed tongues may be bought in different colors to enliven your brogues. JUNE, JOAN and JERI have discovered this. They wear sturdy brogues of reversed calf and change the tongues to match their sweaters.

vide some of the best comedy of the opera.

The first two acts of "La Boheme" are for me the most delightful. Act One contains a boisterous song for the artists and the meeting of MIMI and RUDOLFO which has a tender pathos. In the second act, which takes place in a Montparnasse cafe, PUCINI has written music which is hardly Parisian, is gay and lively and fetching.

The two final acts are more tragic. MIMI has quarreled with RUDOLFO and in a quietly emotional aria bids him farewell. The final act, which occurs some months later, again is set in the artists' studio. There is a highly amusing scene between the impoverished artists, a scene that is interrupted by MUSETTA's sudden appearance with the news that MIMI is downstairs dying. The heroine is brought into the room, and put to bed. With RUDOLFO she recalls their first meeting and other happier scenes, then dies.

SIGMUND ROMBERG left for California after eight porters had carried his four trunks of music and clothing down 21 flights of stairs.

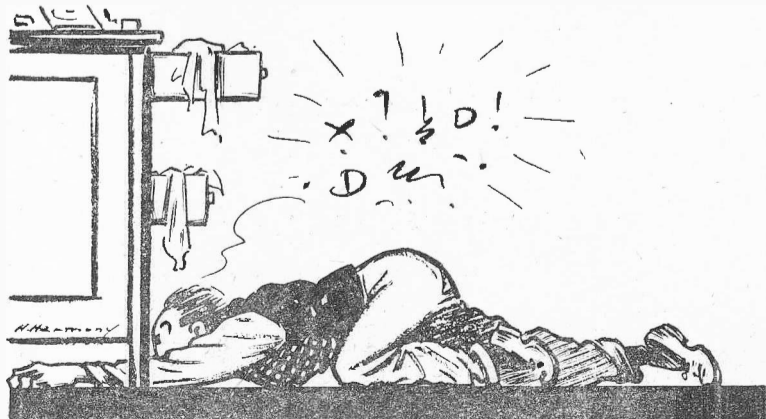
LEO REISMAN, the orchestra leader, insists that the eight flights he has had to go up and down have been good exercise.

A. There is a ruling by the Federal Communications Commission making it compulsory for stations to announce transcriptions. Sometimes the same program is given over a number of stations at the same time by means of records. The time variation is due to the records being started at different times, say a few seconds apart.

The program will be broadcast over the NBC-WJZ network from 8 to 9 P.M.

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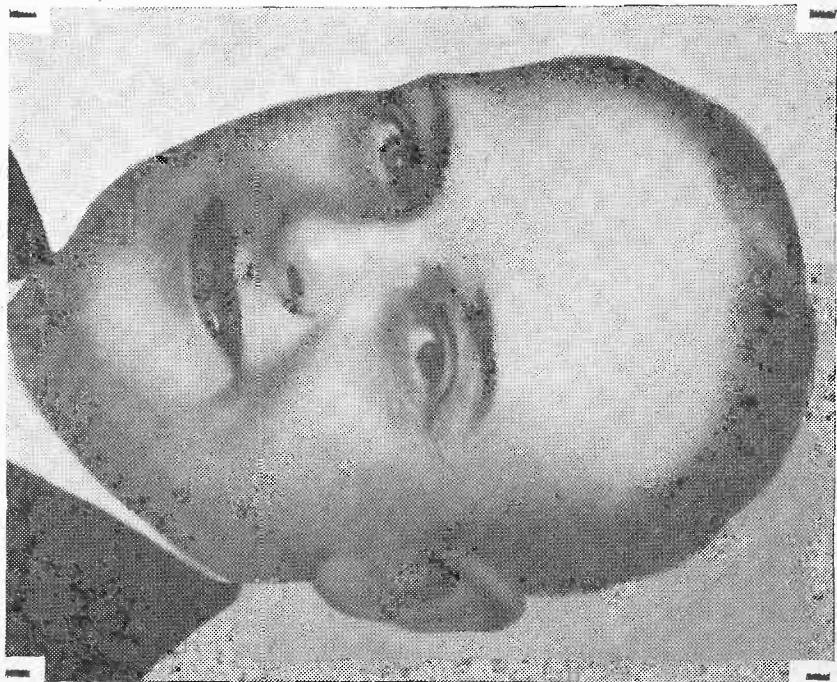
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
