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## Federal Drive On Radio Interference

### Staff of 175 Men Tabulates Election Returns for Network

#### WMEX Has Direct Line for Reports

In its handling of announcing election returns on November 6, radio again proved its value as a medium for transmitting important news to the public rapidly and accurately.

In Massachusetts most frequent reports on the election were given over the Yankee Network and Station WMEX in Boston.

Covering the state for the Yankee Network News Service was a force of 175 men, stationed in such central cities as Springfield, Worcester, New Bedford, Lowell and Brockton.

Returns from towns and wards were tabulated at the YN headquarters in these cities and then telephoned to the main YN headquarters in Boston, where 40 workers were stationed.

Announcements were made every 15 minutes.

Station WMEX had a private wire to the Democratic headquarters in Boston and announced election results at intervals of from five to 10 minutes during the greater part of the evening.

Two Boston newspapers also reported results over Stations WBZ and WEEI during the evening — but less frequently than did the Yankee Network and WMEX.

### "Cross Talk" Of Stations Is Recorded

A far-flung drive to clear up interference or "cross talk" between broadcasting stations in the radio lanes has been launched by the broadcast division of the Federal Communications Commission.

Plans were under way to send 200,000 ballots to listeners in the Middle West.

They will be asked about their radio reception, to which stations they listen most, which stations have the clearest signals on their respective receiving sets and which stations interfere with each other.

Thirty-five spokesmen for radio stations are co-operating with D. A. RING, assistant engineer of the FCC broadcast division, in the drive.

"This is the most comprehensive survey of its kind ever conducted by the government," said Mr. Ring.

"It is not our purpose to find out what kind of programs the farmers or anyone else desire. We do want to know which station's signals are best received."

Portable trucks will roam the countryside, picking up signals as they proceed. Notes will be taken on stations that engage in "cross talk." The "weak sisters" as well as the "loud mouths" will be duly recorded.

The investigation was expected by the industry to be helpful in sifting out stations that clutter up the ether and have undesirable programs.

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## Royal Pair on the Air

A description of the wedding of Prince GEORGE of England and Princess MARINA of Greece will be relayed from London over the CBS-WABC network on Thursday, November 29, from 5.45 to 6.50 A. M.

HOWARD MARSHALL, British Broadcasting Corporation announcer, will be stationed outside Westminster Abbey and will describe the colorful wedding procession as it approaches the church.

A microphone inside the church will pick up the ceremony which will be conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Dean of Westminster and the Bishop of London.

Following the ceremony, MARSHALL will describe the departure of the royal wedding party.

Because of the early hour of the broadcast only CBS stations in New York City, Boston, Providence, Hartford and Washington will carry the program.

# FCC Purposes Probe of Telephone Line Charges to Broadcasters

## Bell System May Absorb Independents

By The MICROPHONE'S Special Washington Correspondent

Rates charged by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company for use of telephone wires by radio broadcasters will be investigated by the Federal Communications Commission, The MICROPHONE'S correspondent learned in official circles.

The rate investigation may not be held for several weeks, but the groundwork is being laid for such an inquiry.

Millions of dollars are paid annually to the telephone company by the radio industry. Those charges have much to do with the prosperity of the radio companies. They affect the salaries paid to radio employes.

First, the FCC probably will investigate proposals that independent telephone companies be absorbed by the Bell System. There are thousands of small, one-town telephone companies in the United States that have no connection with the A. T. and T., financially.

Then the Commission's telephone division will begin to explore the rate charges of the A. T. and T., not only to radio companies, but also to consumers generally.

"New Dealers" noted that while the Interstate Commerce Commission had jurisdiction over the telephone business for many years, it did nothing to have rates changed. The I. C. C. was absorbed in its railroad duties.

There is some dispute as to how far the FCC can go in regulating the telephone companies.

# Jacobson Attempts "Different" Ideas Regarding Dance Tunes

## The Old Style Was Too Blatant, He Says

WHEN ANDREW JACOBSON, popular Boston conductor frequently heard on the radio, organized his orchestra three years ago, he decided to try to make his versions of dance music "different."

He was convinced that the then current fashion of presenting dance tunes was too rushed and too blatant.

JACOBSON believed that such music should be taken at a light, swinging tempo against a "soft but vibrant" background.

"At first," Jacobson admitted in an interview with The Microphone, "this style of playing popular music was not the hit I had hoped it would be."

"Many people, in fact, asked me why I did not play music the way other orchestra leaders were doing it. My answer was that I didn't enjoy doing it that way and that when people became accustomed to my orchestra's style they would like it."

"I was right, because it wasn't long before I was flooded with invitations to play at night clubs, on the stage and over the radio."

In his present radio programs, broadcast over the Yankee Network on Saturday evenings from 10 to 10.30, JACOBSON is testing out another cherished idea.

## Conductor Can Play Several Musical Instruments

In these programs he plays semi-classical music in his own liting arrangements.

He hopes in this way to make those of the radio audience who ordinarily don't care for it familiar with and fond of good music.

JACOBSON plays six musical instruments—piano, saxophone, clarinet, cornet, bassoon and oboe.

He has travelled through the United States and Canada as a member of JOHN PHILIP SOUSA'S band; and he has played in orchestras directed by JACQUES RENARD and LEO REISMAN.

JACOBSON still doesn't understand how he came to be a musician. His father was a sea captain and not musical; neither was his mother musical.

The first musician in the family was his brother, who played the trumpet.

They tried teaching young ANDREW the trumpet, but progress was declared "unsatisfactory," so the clarinet was substituted.

Among other speakers to be heard later are Dr. GLENN FRANK, president of the University of Wisconsin, and J. DAVID STERN, publisher of the Philadelphia Record.

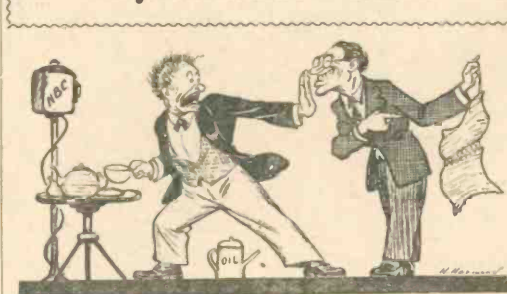

# Broadcasts from Russia Outstanding

Moscow is shining brightly on short wave dials these Sunday mornings.

It wasn't so long ago that any wireless programs emanating from the Russian city for re-broadcast here or in other countries of the world had to be relayed via the facilities of Great Britain or Germany.

But Soviet land is independent now. She casts forth her own ether signals by means of high-powered short wave transmitters that have little trouble in scoping through to the proverbial ends of the globe.

Moskva, as STALIN calls the great city of his Empire, broadcasts special short wave programs to America every Sunday morning between the hours of 6 and 7 A. M., EST.

During the Summer months these signals weren't much for a Red to brag about; but they've hit their peak now.

Starting at the end of October, the 25-meter (12.00 megacycles) RNE, really began to reach American shores with its now really remarkable volume.

For the past few weeks listeners throughout the country have been fascinated by that clear, well-modulated ether wave that brings the far-flung U. S. S. R. to our fingertips.

"Hello! Hello! This is Moscow calling you on a wavelength of 25 meters, 12,000 kilocycles!" is the opening English announcement that has been booming across 5,000 miles of land and sea each Sunday forenoon. Ten A. M. is usually the best time to tune in. The earlier session, due to propagation conditions at that time of day, isn't received here as well as the latter.

On a wavelength of 50 meters (6.00 megs.), Moscow broadcasts daily short wave programs via the 20-kilowatt outlet RV59.

Some time in the early Fall we mentioned that the 50-meter voice was becoming audible in the early part of the evenings, but it has yet to build up to the level where its programs can be enjoyed or even fully understood by local fans.

Indications are that RV59 will become a much better station as the days grow shorter, but due to its high frequency it can never hope to be as popular in America as RNE now is.

The primary purpose of RV59, officials admit, is to cover Europe really well, which it easily does on its 50-meter channel. It is important to Moscow that Europe is covered, for Moscow desires to be heard.

The 25-meter programs radiated Sundays for the United States generally consist of concert music and numerous talks. "New Soviet Films," "Railwaymen in the U. S. S. R.," "Democracy in the

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## Just A Suggestion

MANY SUBSCRIBERS to The MICROPHONE are puzzled by the never-ending controversy over the American vs. the British system of broadcasting. Few persons inquire too closely into the merits of either system; they take, without digesting the facts, the flat position that the American system is the better or that the British system is the better, and let it go at that.

The editors of The MICROPHONE maintain open minds. They are unprejudiced, but were they to show prejudice, being patriotic American citizens, it would be in favor of the American system.

There are many differences between American and British broadcasting, and but one great difference. The British do not permit broadcasting of advertising, and the Americans not only permit it but encourage it, ad nauseam.

Somewhere between the two extremes in policy, the editors of The MICROPHONE believe, there is a norm that would be far more appealing to the majority of intelligent Americans than the present system of liberty without restraint, which, liberally translated, means license.

Suppose the American commercial sponsor were permitted to say, at the introduction and again at the conclusion of his program:

"This program is paid for by (for example) the Glutz Garter Company."

Not, you will note, "by courtesy of" or any other hypocritical utterance, but "paid for by." That pleases those who insist that the United States must remain a nation of "rugged individualists," who put pocketbook above pride, and at the same time makes radio possible for those who like it straight, without leavening of advertising yeast.

If this suggestion cannot be adopted, the editors of The MICROPHONE will insist, with Perfidious Albion, that the air belongs to the public and not to the abuses of private enterprise.

## Radio Has Its Own Checking System

THESE IS, in radio, a checking system known as the "CROSBY report." All radio stars regard it in awe, as do many of the advertising agency gentlemen who build the programs for radio listeners. Some of them do not let it bother them—but for the most part, the CROSBY report is some punkins in radio.

For many moons there has been a radio program on the air called "One Man's Family." Written as it is by CARLTON MORSE, it is probably among the best cast and best written of all the exclusively radio presentations on the air.

MORSE has had the good sense to deal with people who are simple and sincere; people who have the same strengths and weaknesses we all have and with whom you can laugh and cry.

More than that, he knows how to do what few radio dramatists have ever learned

—to write with great economy of phrase and without wasting a word, "milking" a situation or shedding a crocodile tear. In short, it is a palatable drink concocted of the milk of human kindness.

As Maestro FRANK BLACK says, the public picks its own hits, and that is why "One Man's Family" will have a sponsor starting November 21 on NBC.

For a glance at this famed CROSBY report showed an executive that the program he liked when he heard it on the air had a rating of 60 on the Pacific Coast. Now, once upon a time, a banjo-eyed comedian had a rating of 63—today Mister CANTOR, just back to the airwaves, is around 33. Of course, 100 is top and Showboat and RUDY VALLEE's program are well up there.

A show with a rating of 6 is considered poor; one with a rating of 10 or better is regarded as a successful show—and "One Man's Family" in the rest of the country is

around 12. And that's without any build-up whatever. So when that wise executive saw the figures 60 and 12 plus, he was willing to believe his own ears.

The wisdom of this sponsorship can be seen in the fact that the advertiser gets at once a well-established production, one with a following. It was for this reason that ARTHUR BRISBANE and WILL ROGERS were first pulled to radio.

# Studiosity

On top of this comes the saner and more readily-believable information that Mrs. BENNY (MARY LIVINGSTON) is likewise an omnivorous reader. She is particularly fond of mystery and detective stories.

We could go on about the reading tastes of others in radio, but you get the idea and see why we cannot.

Then they tell a story about RICHARD HIMBER, NBC orchestra leader, who claims that when JOEY NASH, his vocalist, sang "Let's Take a Walk Around the Block" on a recent program, 20 'phone calls came in for NASH from girls eager to accept his invitation.

Comes a new bit of research into sound effects. JOHNNY RUSHWORTH is the man responsible for these up at WEEI in Boston. Recently, a script called for the flapping of pigeons' wings. Shuffling a pack of cards didn't give the right effect, neither did the snapping of a bootblack's polishing cloth. The solution was reached when JOHNNY slapped his hands on his thighs. There it was! Wing-flapping to perfection.

Supposing you want the sound of water lapping about a pier. Simply take a hot water bottle and joggle it about. A wind storm is easily produced by rubbing a stick against a piece of heavy canvas. When you want door-crashing, just crumple up a strawberry box.

Furthermore, now that cellophane is used for about everything, one can turn to this for sound effects. If you wrinkle it in your hands it sounds like the crackle of a fire. Drop birdseed upon it and you have rain.

But the crowning achievement we heard about was the record which vividly portrays in sound the wrecking of a piano with an axe. This causes me no end of wonder as to how they made the record and what it was used for in radio plays.

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# Program From Byrd Expedition Observes Its First Anniversary

## Four Wave Channels For Series

The weekly two-way BYRD Antarctic broadcast was a year old on Wednesday, November 14, at which time an anniversary program was broadcast to and from Little America and over the WABC-Columbia network at 10 P. M. This series of program has marked a new milestone in the history of both radio broadcasting and polar exploration.

For more than 22 centuries—since the Greek, PYTHIAS, first explored in the Arctic Circle in 32° B. B.—explorers of many races have been defying the bleak elements of the polar regions. The annals of their trials and tribulations are among the most amazing in history, and interpolated in the written records are untold stories of those who failed to return from their daring journeys. Trackless icy wastes and turbulent seas hold their secrets.

In past ages explorers were unable to communicate, while journeying in polar regions, with their homelands. But the advent of the scientific age has brought about a change.

It remained for Admiral RICHARD E. BYRD and his second Antarctic Expedition, in co-operation with other scientifically interested parties, to establish communication through the medium of radio broadcasting in their expedition, while exploring in Antarctica, and the civilized world.

### Pole No Longer Isolated

Through this series, the BYRD Antarctic Expedition has been enabled, though isolated from civilization by thousands of miles, to keep in touch with the multifarious activities of the world at large, and the American radio audience for the first time has been able to listen to the history of polar exploration in the making.

Many public figures have taken part in the programs, broadcasting to the expedition from the United States and other points, and members of the expedition frequently have conversed with their relatives in the United States.

The short wave signals between the expedition and points from which broadcasts intended for the expedition have originated, now have traveled a total distance of approximately 525,000 miles—a distance equivalent to 21 times the circumference of the globe at the equator.

### 20,000-Mile Circuit

Programs given in connection with the expedition, exclusive of the predominant number originating at the New York CBS studios, have originated in London, Honolulu, New Zealand, Buenos Aires, Chicago, and the northwestern portion of Alaska.

The program from Alaska, in which signals for the first time linked the top and the bottom of the earth, traveled over a circuit of approximately 20,000 miles. This was the most ambitious technical undertaking in the long

series, which itself is of an ambitious technical nature.

HUTCHINS, president of the University of Chicago; GILBERT GROSVENOR, president of the National Geographic Society, and Mayor HAMPTON MOORE, of Philadelphia.

### Entertainers by Byrd

### Small Sized Set Used

The size of the transmitter used in broadcasting from Little America, the base of the expedition, adds a touch of fantasy to the radio series. It has only 1,000 watts power, an equivalent of less than double the power of a household electric iron.

But JOHN N. DYER, engineer of the expedition, finds it entirely adequate. Three radio towers at

switch with amazing speed from one channel, if reception over that route is unfavorable, to another with hardly any perceptible interruption, so that any given program may be relayed over more than one channel.

### Spring at Little America

The Spring season is now in full swing in Antarctica, and the BYRD Expedition has heralded it with a burst of renewed activity. Five exploration parties already have taken to the icy Antarctic trails and are now heading for little explored interior regions. Each of these parties is able to keep in touch with the base at Little America through the use of portable transmitters and receiver; and the latest news from them will be featured in the weekly broad-casts.

The most dramatic phase of forthcoming programs, however will be in connection with the BYRD Antarctic Expedition's projected exploratory aviation flights. The twin-motored CURTISS-Condor biplane already has been taken on a test flight, marking its first time aloft since last March, and is being loaded preparatory to taking off on the first long distance flight over little-explored Antarctic regions.

The biplane is equipped with a 100-watt transmitter, installed by Columbia engineers.

This will enable the aviators to keep in constant touch with Little America, and it is hoped that the radio signals from the plane can be relayed through Little America and over one of the four channels to the Columbia network audience.

This feat, if accomplished, will be the most dramatic and difficult in the history of radio broadcasting.

## Clear Channels Under Inquiry

By The MICROPHONE'S Special Washington Correspondent

Policing the ether lanes, the broadcast division of the Federal Communications Commission is investigating the service given on the 40 clear channels.

A restatement of regulations governing these channels may be expected.

The broadcast division has decided to conduct a survey of the broadcast structure both as to results of allocation on clear channels and on channels to which more than one station is assigned, to operate simultaneously at night.

The FCC announcement said:

"This survey will be made for the purpose of determining the service available to the people of the United States and the type of stations that the listeners in rural areas are dependent upon for their service.

"The degree of interference or impairment of service caused by duplication of certain high-power stations is to be investigated, as well as the possibility of providing additional high-power stations without reducing the service to the listening public from existing stations."

MILTON CROSS' job is to maintain order aboard the bus.

## "Buck Rogers" Is Based On Science

JACK JOHNSTONE, author of the BUCK ROGERS dramas, writes a whole program in 45 minutes, but it often takes him days to complete one.

### Mr. Rideout Talks About The Weather

The denouement of a chat with E. B. Rideout, WEEI meteorologist, hints strongly of the necessity for getting one's radio into first class condition for the coming Winter season. Morning and evening he relates day by day weather forecasts for New England folk but here he rolls up his sleeves for "The Microphone" to haul off with a long range forecast on what to expect in the way of weather from November to April.

Of necessity, it is generalized somewhat because the famous WEEI weather-bard has an impressive list of clients for his detailed scientific findings. That, by the way, is just what they are instead of random guesses based on what certain fur bearing animals are going to wear—the quantity of pistachios the squirrels are hoarding or the condition of the Widow Jones' scitica. Nor are they based on the experience or averages of 50 or 100 years.

This is purely scientific formula, applicable in the manner flood and neap tides are determined although admittedly not to such a minute degree of accuracy.

The coming New England Winter will, on the whole, be colder than normal, particularly within the period from the last week in January to the middle of March. While the extreme low temperatures of last Winter will not prevail, the average temperature will be substantially below normal. (How are your radio tubes?)

From mid-December through the run of the Winter season, Rideout looks for a blanket of snow over New England with

a substantial downfall as late as March 20th. Thus he sees no evidence of an early Spring depressive indications of an abbreviated warm spell in early April.

November month being of immediate interest, it is with pleasure we expose his data sheets as indices of moderate weather with normal temperature averages for the balance of the month. Comes Christmas month—slightly colder—below normal temperatures.

All together it looks like an exceptionally good Winter for radio, with the hearth and fire-side attractive bait beyond the entertainment appeal and general attractiveness of the late Fall and Winter program features scheduled through WEEI and the NBC Network.

Thanks Mr. Rideout. We'll plan accordingly.

## Audition Yourself Some Time-Announcing Easy?

### Arthur Edes Concocts WEEI Test

Q. "Are you a grandstand quarterback at football games?"

A. "No." Q. (Less eagerly) "Maybe you could guess the baseball manager from the tieachers?" A. "No." Q. (Slightly this time) "Then you probably never chuckle when a radio announcer splits an infinitive or pronounces "aspirant" like aspirin with a "t" added?" A. "Some announcers are O. K."

The last reply was all that was needed to release the pent up fury of the inquisitor who had recently listened to a substantial quota of aspiring announcers run the gamut of a fiendishly prepared script. It probed inflections, respiration, sales-appeal, knowledge of English, pronunciation, knowledge of musical terminology, and, yea, brother, courage. Aside from that it proved in a rather convincing manner that probably "All announcers are O. K." Undoubtedly some are better than that but the point is, once the nod of approval is given after the present day examination, it's a safe wagering proposition that the professional word weaver has something besides good vocal plumbing.

So much by way of back-scratching the announcing man. It's perhaps too seldom he gets encomium. And now, because back-slapping doesn't make a story, we're taking you into a reverse flip back to that foremen-

tioned examination. Conceived by program director Arthur F. Edes at WEEI, it gives us all (with privacy we all may subsequently be grateful for) the opportunity to test our skill with the words and problems run-of-the-mine announcing men toy with and seldom mull.

The test begins. For realism it should be recited to a microphone. For perfection of setting, a group of critics with loving-cup ears should be listening at some remote point. You will start to read please:

"The demands of an announcer are many. He must be able to read advertising copy in such a way that the client is well satisfied with his investment in radio advertising. In addition to being a vocal salesman, the announcer must also be an actor, in that he must be able to interpret his continuity appropriately in the style that it is written. The ability to read news items, baseball scores, and descriptive musical notes is also necessary. The purpose of this audition is to illustrate how capable this aspirant is for the work. Pronunciation is important. Take, for example the following words—bade, program, address, comparable, solace, jocund, Caribbean, gala, strata, inquiry and illustrate." Read three news items.

Read advertising continuity. First—lengthy commercial announcement.

Then "spot" announcement.

"The final test of the audition, and perhaps the one that an announcer fears the most, is the continuity which will display his knowledge of musical terminology. Rather than read an announcement of this nature, I'll just read a list of names and compositions which might be found on the program of a classical show. Composers frequently heard on the air are Mendelssohn, Liszt, Puccini, Wagner, Beethoven, Mozart, Bach, Sibelius, Tschaiakowsky, Ippolitov-Ivanoff, Rimsky-Korsakoff and Bizet. For musicians we often hear the names of Jascha Heifetz, Gabilovitch, Jehudi Menuhin, Fritz Kreisler, Jose Iturbi, and Sergei Rachmaninoff. A list of artists representing the musical world would include Rosa Ponselle, Martinelli, Galli-Curci, Serge Koussovitzky, Leopold Stokowski, Walter Damrosch and Piatigorsky, the cellist. For the terminology of music we frequently find such words as concerto, sonata, cantabile, molto vivace, andante con moto, allegro, capriccio and cantata.

This concludes my audition gentlemen and I trust it has impressed you favorably."

P. S. "Graham, I'll stick to my horse."

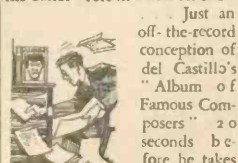

The conductor for last Sunday's and this coming Sunday's concerts is the young American, WERNER JANSEN. Quite naturally the moderns, particularly the modern Americans, are entrusted to MA. JANSEN'S ministrations.

He has directed the rarely heard MacDOWELL Piano Concerto; this Sunday he is to do JOHN ALDEN CARPENTER'S "Sea Drift." The latter he surrounds with first American performances of "Georgia," by the young Bavarian, WERNER EGK; and "Buffalmacco" (whatever that may be), by ALBERTO GASCO, Italian music critic.

JANSEN concludes the concert with JAN SIBELIUS' Fifth Symphony, for the interpretation of whose music he has been highly commended by the composer himself.

To the two remaining conductors—BRUNO WALTER and the inevitable ARTURO TOSCANINI—are left WAGNER and the BEETHOVEN of the Missa Solemnis.

Such a policy has value as entertainment and as variety.

I doubt if it does the orchestra the most good or if it redeems to the credit of its chief conductor, who will not by himself present sufficiently liberal programs.

## Newspapers In Rush For New Stations

Newspaper publishers are going in for purchase of radio broadcasting stations in a big way.

The current drive of the publishers has aroused some mystery as to purpose. Some believe the publishers are squaring away for combat with others who might be interested in using the radio to compete with the written word.

More than 100 of the 600 broadcasting stations in the United States now are owned by newspaper publishers in whole or in part. A dozen stations were acquired in the last 12 months.

One of the recent publisher's stations to go the air was W1XBS, Waterbury, Conn., operating with 1,000 watts on 1,530 kilocycles. The Waterbury Republican and American owns the station.

WILLIAM RANDOLPH HEARST owns several stations, chiefly in big cities. The McClatchy newspaper chain in California has picked up several radio stations and individual papers, which turned thumbs down on radio a few years ago, now are avidly seeking stations.

The first concert occurred on Thursday, November 15, and was directed by GUY FRASER HARRISON.

The second concert will be given December 13, WERNER JANSEN conducting. The other three occur on January 10, Sir HAMILTON HARTY directing; January 24, Dr. HOWARD HANSON conducting; and January 31, with Sir HAMILTON HARTY and Dr. HOWARD HANSON sharing conductorial honors.

Each concert will be broadcast from 3.15 to 4 P. M.

## Demand For All-Wave Set Is Increasing

Demand for all-wave radio receiving sets is on the increase.

Radio authorities forecast that in time the all-wave sets will have supplanted the old-timers now in use.

Interest is being directed toward the kind of programs that may be expected in the higher broadcasting channels.

Two experimental broadcasting stations are operating regularly in the recently widened band of 1,500-1,600, under authority of the old Radio Commission.

Good reception was reported by both stations on old-radios whose field was formerly thought to be confined to 550-1,500 kilocycles.

The latest of the two stations is W1XBS, operated by the Waterbury (Connecticut) Republican and American and using 1,000 watts on 1,530 kilocycles.

Several months ago W2XR, New York, operated with 1,000 watts on 1,550 kilocycles, got under way. JOHN V. L. HOGAN, who invented single dial tuning, runs that station.

These stations are experimenting with high-fidelity transmission. High hopes are entertained that the experiment will open new vistas for more naturalness in radio reception.

But you know she's over thirty—for she has a married son, and a debutante daughter about to graduate from the Spence School in New York.

She should be included in Mr. Ripley's "Believe It or Not" subjects.

Yet Margaret Brainard is not a "miracle woman." What she has found for herself, and what she achieves all-in-a-working-day for other women, has been accomplished by the persistent application of sensible treatments.

"Nothing is accomplished quickly," Miss Brainard says, sitting in her consulting office in a New York hotel. "If women think they can work wonders overnight with special creams, etc.—regardless of how expensive they are—they are crazy."
