

Robertson Can Take It

DICK ROBERTSON is a person who can take it. Bad luck, accidents, misfortunes, have come his way at some time or another. So it is pleasant to record that now he is gaining a measure of fame, singing with the "Music by Gershwin" program heard over a WABC-Columbia network Sundays at 6 P. M., making phonograph records, and in between leading the life he likes best amid the rugged beauties of the Catskill Mountains where he has a six-room log cabin.

A few years ago Dick's savings, amounting to several thousand dollars, were wiped out by bank failures and the stock market crash.

His favorite dog died. One of his horses had to be shot. His home in the Catskills was destroyed by fire. While out hunting, a bullet ricocheted from a rock, breaking his leg.

That meant ten days in the hospital. But while there Dick had the consolation of saving another human's life.

Robertson refused to be put in a private room, insisting that he go in a ward. When the pain in his leg subsided he used to brighten the moments of his fellow sufferers by singing and making jokes.

One day the doctor told him: "You saved the life of (mentioning the name of a patient). That boy had to have his leg amputated. We could not get him to eat; said he had nothing to live for. Your songs and stories made him laugh. He took an interest in life again."

Although he pretends to be a "tough guy," hardened by his long series of misfortunes, Dick goes out of his way to make life happier for others. When he was singing over the radio during a Christmas period, he asked listeners who sent in requests for special numbers to send a toy, too.

Three carloads of dolls and games and other articles for children came in with the song requests.

Dick probably got more of a kick out of distributing them to orphan asylums than the youngsters did who received the gifts.

The vocalist, son of a Brooklyn builder, started to follow his father's vocation. He became a foreman.

One Winter when his parents left on their annual trip South while construction work was stopped, Dick bought

himself a cab and decided to become a taxi driver. He became acquainted with most of the citizens in his neighborhood and one night a group of boys who had formed an orchestra asked Dick to sing with them over a radio station. They'd heard him vocalizing the latest tunes, sometimes varying them with a Jewish or German or Southern accent (he's of Scotch and Irish descent) and knew he was the boy who could put over a number. Always ready for anything new, Dick consented to do a chorus with the boys. The morning after

his initial broadcast, cab-driving Dick received a call from a publishing house that wanted him to join its staff of song-pluggers.

He sold his taxi and gave up ideas of becoming a builder. When the Robertson family returned in the Spring they found their son dashing about from one radio station to another.

Then came a trip to Europe and Dick's stage debut at the Coliseum Theatre in London. Returning to America he went on a vaudeville tour with the late Fatty Arbuckle.

Four years ago Robertson was chosen to sing in a commercial program over the Columbia chain. Between engagements he made phonograph records.

Last year he built a fire-proof log cabin at Barryville, N. Y., on the site of his first house. He was made a deputy sheriff. A few months ago Dick was invited to a party

where George Gershwin also was a guest. Some one asked him to sing. He prefers ballads, but has a special flair for character songs and can imitate any dialect, although he speaks no foreign languages and never had a singing lesson.

Gershwin was so impressed with Dick's solos that he asked Robertson to be chief vocalist on his present Columbia program. Dick had been contemplating a vaudeville tour, but the possibility of appearing with the celebrated pianist and composer, and the chance of being near his mountain home, was too interesting to refuse.

He does one or two numbers for the broadcast and after the curtain has gone down on the Playhouse stage-studio, Dick comes out with Gershwin and entertains the audience with a couple of extra performances.

Music Takes 80 Percent of Time On Air

A single broadcasting station on the average plays more than 500 musical titles in one day of operation.

The American Society of Authors, Composers and Publishers so declared in a brief asking dismissal of the government's suit against the Society charging it with being a monopoly.

The Society also was accused of charging broadcasters extortionate royalties.

The 500 musical titles played over a single radio station in a day include the entire gamut of modern, old time, domestic, foreign, popular and classical pieces, the Society said.

From 21 to 26 separate songs of different authorship, nationality, taste, fancy and appeal, are sung from a single station in a day, the Society continued.

Eighty per cent of all time on the radio is devoted to music, as distinguished from speech, it was calculated.

All of which means the radio is a glutton for music and that it must be charged a "reasonable" fee because it soon "wears out" the popularity of a piece, the brief of the composers and publishers concluded.

Tallulah Bankhead On WJZ Network

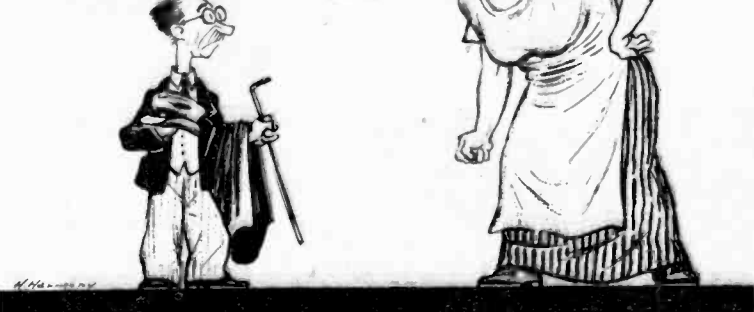

Tuesday's program begins at 7.30 and includes news, Community Chorus, a dramatization of the "closet scene" from "Hamlet" and a debate by members of Harvard University on "Problems of Today."

Thursday's program includes Italian music by an orchestra from the New England Conservatory of Music, a travelogue by H. H. POWERS of the Bureau of University Travel, book reviews by Professor ROBERT E. ROGERS of M. J. T. and talks on aeronautics and radio.

High-Fidelity Station Opened

One of the first new stations to be opened operating on the new 1500 to 1600 metre wave bands is W1XBS at Waterbury, Conn.

The new station is owned by the Waterbury American and Republican and is a member of the American Broadcasting System.

A new technical wrinkle has been incorporated in the new station under the name "high-fidelity." This permits the transmission of the finer and lower tones in sound that are now lost in most broadcasting.

upon the best in radio, and through broad educational activities, to stimulate public interest in the many fine things that are on the air today. Such stimulation, we believe, will increase the demand for the good things.

"Our one aim, in short, is to cultivate the great good that lies in radio."

SAYRE M. RAMSDALL, Vice-President of the Phitco Radio and Television Corporation, who introduced Mr. SANBORN, spoke of the way in which the theories of the organization will be carried out.

"We believe that the most effective way to achieve this advance in radio programs is by stimulating the public interest in the best that already exists," said Mr. RAMSDALL.

"Such activities tend to raise the general level of appreciation. Quicken public interest in worthwhile things and you instantly raise the quality of public demand. Popular demand determines the nature of supply."

Professor P. W. DYKEMA, professor of music education, Teachers College, Columbia University, talked about music on the air for children. He believes that any

education in music for children on the air today is handled inadequately by incompetent people. There is good music for children and a way it can be presented to them. But it is not done.

Professor G. S. DICKINSON, chairman of the Music Department of Vassar College, said that there teners, who, through radio, are becoming "cultivated amateurs." These people can talk music with critics who have spent their lives in its study and appear to know just as much about the subject. And radio has done this for them.

WERNER JANSSEN, American conductor, spoke of the great social service that radio was rendering the world.

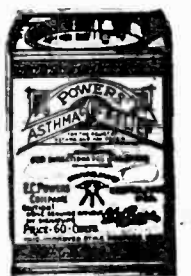

refer, even though briefly, to "Pardon My Accent." It's a book with a thousand laughs, loaded to the muzzle with well told stories and with more than a little of the text committed to radio events drawn from the author's experiences as a news-radio man.

We asked him about the title. It seems that it was one of a thousand, surviving a lengthy whittling process. When a popular song hit took almost the same title, he pondered momentarily but decided to stand fast on "Pardon My Accent," a title that fits the book perfectly. Studio folk who have read the volume identify as highlights the chapters "Twittering Birds and Prize Fight Fans" and "Perfumed Notes to a Thick-headed Fool."

A chapter is devoted to Mr. Cullinan's first news broadcast in which he confessed that he must have looked like "a newly licensed driver venturing into city traffic for the first time."

The book has received a fine public reception as might generally be expected. In eight years Howell Cullinan had become part and parcel of every home in which a radio was installed.

WEEI reaches out a ready hand in congratulation to the author. It is a really worthwhile contribution to the world of literature and a "first book" that bodes well for what its readers may justifiably expect from the same pen in the future.

Mills, Hotels and Theatres "Prep" Lord for WEEI Job

Edward James Lord. Another journey into the background of a WEEI announcing man. His good microphone manners and diction have been exposed on the Edison station wavelength a year come April. The public appreciates his art. Station folk speak good words of him without solicitation. And his is a credible story—fraught with reverses but always ringing with the smack of progress without Horatio Alger heroics.

To begin. He first saw daylight in old Roxbury. The family soon upped to Milford. Came school days and his first urge for spare time employment when fond parents rewarded his success with his piano lessons by presenting him with a bicycle. He promptly took up the never ending pursuit of delivering "specials" for the local post office. Piano progress continued and he won himself the coveted afternoon job during high school days at Reynolds Music store.

All good things like school days must end. He did the inevitable, taking a job in one of the town's loom factories. One Winter of industrial confinement sufficed to bring him to the realization that his finger tips were capable of richer tunes than the music of looms. He promptly covered the north country with letters and landed himself at Sunapee Park Lodge's grand piano surrounded by three other lads.

The Summer season over and the now well organized orchestra shipped intact to Kenilworth Lodge in Sebering—the geographical center of Florida. Back to Sunapee for another Summer

and again back to Sebering where Mr. Lord's musical soul responded to Florida's inflationist atmosphere. He was going to branch out and did in no small way.

The bungalow headquarters of the orchestra was ornamented with a huge shingle—"The Sebering School of Music." For a fee the lads would give instruction on any musical instrument the natives would bring to their door. A subsidiary of the "School" was the "Lord Music Company" identified by a supplementary shingle and established to sell musical instruments, victrola records or sheet music to the then prosperous Floridians. The school soon folded somewhat like the gasping whinner of an accordion but the Lord Music Company was salvaged from the wreckage and pumped

up with branches in every drug store throughout the county. It prospered.

Mr. Lord became organist and choir director at the Methodist Church, chairman of the music committee for the Rotary Club, and musical director for five nearby hotels. He refers with wistful happiness to the 45-piece boys' band he organized for Rotary. It won first prize for two years in state-wide competitions. Then the boom broke wide open.

Liquidation found him with a none too sound automobile and \$125 in cash. He pointed North to head in at the del Castillo Theatre Organ School, once again pupil instead of maestro. He did occasional pinch-hitting for "Del" on Boston air programs then jumped to the new State theatre in Milford as musical director. It was a fine post but radio was lurking in his imagination. He jumped into an open audition at a Boston station and clicked as an announcer.

The trail then leads to WBZ, WORC-Worcester and thence to WEEI with time out for a nationwide tour of theatres as NBC route man for the famous Grace Hayes.

Yes, Ed's been around and at the tender age of thirty is ready to admit that being "settled down" is a grand life. You see Ed was married two years ago and a little six-months old girl named Nancy is always waiting for her pipe smoking father to get home to Waltham. And Mrs. Lord tells us the baby doesn't nap until the big WEEI voice man is heard telling something or other to the Yankees. There's true appreciation.

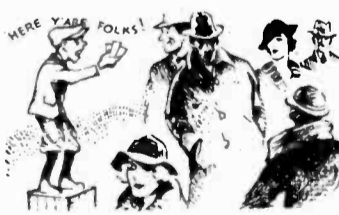

Irene Wicker, NBC Children's Director, Is Air's Busiest Lady

She Sings And Acts With Greatest Of Ease

IREENE WICKER is the young lady who is responsible for all the children's programs that are broadcast over the National Broadcasting networks. And IREENE was a juvenile star herself.

The minister had to carry her out when she made her stage debut at a Sunday School gathering.

That was Miss WICKER's first appearance before an audience—when she was four years old. She was to recite a poem. And in the poem a little girl was supposed to cry. But as IREENE delved deeper and deeper into the sad rhymes of the poem, her artificial tears suddenly became tragically real. And she broke into violent sobs.

But 10 minutes later, with true stage spirit, she recited the whole poem without hesitating.

Miss WICKER's love for the stage began then. She practiced all the time and now she can portray many different characters in a short time. She is a good singer, also. And in her position as head of the NBC juvenile department she both acts and sings.

Once she leaped into a cab after singing on a children's program and went to another station just in time to take the leading part in radio versions of three plays—all inside of 20 minutes.

To Identify Children by Use Of Tags

The Radio Orphan ANNIE Identification Bureau, which has its headquarters in Chicago, is distributing metal tags and bracelets to children all over the country.

The idea is that each disc has on it a number. In the central office of the Bureau and kept the names and addresses of children who have the tags.

The identification tags are like those used in the World War by the Army. If any child is lost police can find out where he or she lives by looking at the tag the child is wearing and then calling the Orphan ANNIE Identification Bureau.

Originally these tags were to be given out on request for only a week, but so many people wanted them that the time has been extended.

Police chiefs all over the country have been told about the plan, to which they give their support.

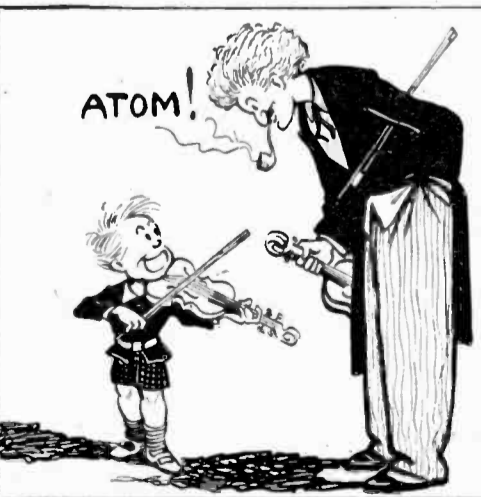
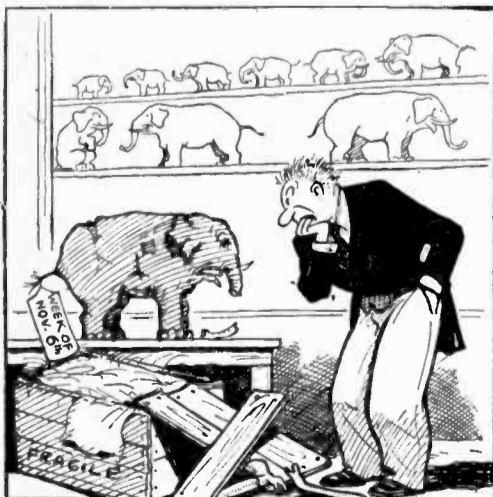

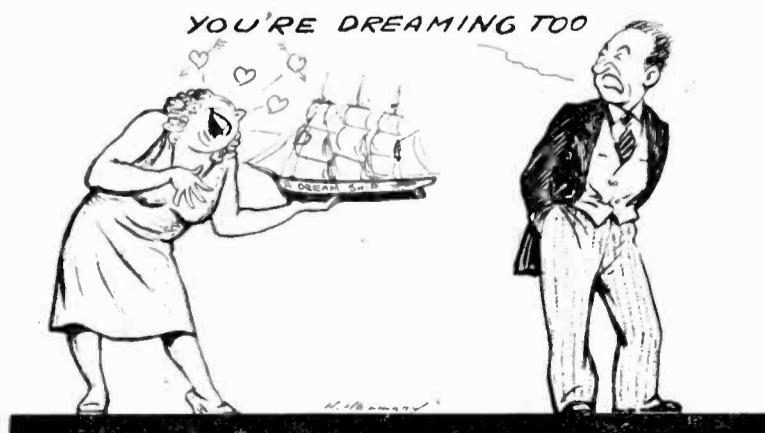

A man and his wife are sitting in front of their old style battery set.

Four years of depression have taken their toll. The husband is out of work and ill. His wife, in a dress repeatedly and expertly patched, sits waiting for the one tiny bit of pleasure in her drab, hard life.

They have no money—and have to hoard skillfully the little bit of "juice" remaining in their radio batteries.

It is a question of painfully deciding what one program from all the hundreds presented during the week will give them the greatest pleasure.

Their decision has been made. With anticipation they are sitting before that precious loud-speaker waiting for "One Man's Family" to come on the air.

Cynics would laugh at that stroy and brand it with the familiar jeer of "hokum."

To the Parents

But it's not hokum — anyone who has ever listened to "One Man's Family," radio's most life-like dramatic serial, can understand its truth.

The story is dedicated to the mothers and fathers of America's younger generation—that younger generation which has found itself in a bewildering state of perplexity in this modern day and age.

HENRY BARBOUR, the father, is any successful middle-aged business man.

constant target of the newspaper boys desiring him to confirm or relate other strange and captivating tales, rumors of which have spread to the mainlands. They have been heard discussing amusingly such reports on the short wave lanes of KNRA.

During the past few weeks, the schooner's signals have been picked up direct by short wave fans, with very little trouble.

Monday usually is the best day to tune in, as at this time they relay a special program to NBC. The hour is around 8 P.M.; Frequency 33, 94 meters, 8.84 megacycles.

Heading for no place in particular, except in the general direction of the Antipodes, the ship and its crew aren't particular about making time.

They have been in the region of the Galapagos for several weeks now, giving fans an opportunity to hear voices from a strange portion of the world that owns no broadcasting station.

KNRA will be heard well throughout the coming Winter. No matter how far towards the far side of the globe they may sail. Short wave communication between here and the far South-

west always has been favorable on the 31-to-35 meter spectrums.

That other isolated station with the romantic environment, KFZ, with Admiral BYRD at Little America, also is reaching local areas direct now.

Wednesday is the best time to tune for the Antarctic waves; the place to set the dial, 25.36 meters, 11.83 megs.

Beginning on Wednesdays at approximately 9.30 P. M., EST, one may first tune to LSX, Buenos Aires, which operates as contact point between New York and KFZ.

The Argentine, which transmits on 28.98 meters, 10.35 megs., will be heard in conversation with both terminals.

The possibilities of a direct pick-up from Little America, of course, rest entirely with existing weather conditions, but it can be clearly audible on the average home receiver when the prevailing weather gives the 10,000-mile radiations a chance to come in.

At times, KFZ is forced to change from its 25-meter frequency, due to polar magnetic disturbances. At this season the other alternative usually is 22.68 meters, 13.23 megs., for evening broadcasts.

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Ignorance Speaks

IN THE semi-monthly trade publication known as "Broadcasting" an article by Howard J. London begins:

"Radio program listings to most people are found only in newspapers. There are other media, however, such as fan magazines, weeklies and throwaways, but their coverage, reliability and usefulness are doubtful and the combined circulation of the daily newspapers far overshadows such media."

Here speaks ignorance, in an article described as "based on a comprehensive survey of newspapers . . . made for advertising agencies and networks."

A comprehensive survey should be, of course, a comprehensive survey. Apparently The MICROPHONE, the Original United States Radio Newspaper, has been ignored in this "survey," because there is no doubt of its coverage, reliability and usefulness. And of course The MICROPHONE is neither a fan magazine nor a throwaway.

According to his article, Mr. London has studied 588 newspapers, of which number 95 carried no radio programs. And yet there are seven full pages of carefully compiled radio programs in each issue of The MICROPHONE.

England has a strong radio press because the newspapers there failed in their duty to the public, which is to furnish the information the public demands. For the same reason, the United States today is building a strong radio press, in answer to growing popular demand.

"Advertising agencies and networks" may be convinced by such a silly "survey" that the general public depends upon incomplete radio listings carried by some daily newspapers as advertising bait, but the general public, which reads The MICROPHONE in ever-increasing thousands and gets the facts about radio, knows better.

Radio Goes In For Some Good Acting

AT LAST there has come to radio a production handled by people with nerve and money—enough to get first-rate stage actors for their dramatic productions. It is the Radio Theatre, and I do not mean the featured stars such as RUTH CHATTERTON, ETHEL BARRYMORE and WALTER HUSTON—those stars are chosen for their name and appeal value—but I mean the supporting cast.

On these programs the supporting cast consists almost 100 per cent of actors and actresses who have learned their business on Broadway, in stock companies and in one-night stands. They are actors who understand what most radio actors never will learn—pace.

And pace in radio is everything. They used to tell you that a high voice was "out"—but there is SAM HEARN, who stooges with JACK BENNY and plays the part of MARY's deaf pa. SAM HEARN knows pace and he adds to BENNY's comedy program.

The actor who has trained

on the stage doesn't "read" his lines. He "gives" them. He has an unconscious feeling for tempo and pace, and his delivery is that of a man accustomed to being heard and to being understood.

The sad commentary on most radio-trained actors is that they rattle right along with only the clock in mind, with no real understanding of what they are saying. A few do get this feeling, but only a few.

After all, transplanting the drama from the stage to radio is only one step. It is listening to the production with the curtain down instead of up. That is all.

If you can understand what is going on with the curtain down, the actor is pacing his lines well, he is creating the necessary illusion.

Not unlike the Chinese theatre is radio. In China at a play you are told that a bridge is supposed to be here, a fortress there. It is up to the actor to make you see that bridge, envision that fortress.

In China they wouldn't expect a pretty girl with college training in elocution to be a

star. In radio they have done this. But the Radio Theatre has struck a body blow at poor dramatic productions.

They have gone to the theatre and gotten the best men and women in the theatre in addition to the stars. They pace their lines. They create illusions.

They "sell" the story, even a farce like "The Nervous Wreck." Other sponsors have got to follow the trail this program has blazed.

And other sponsors must realize that in getting actors the best is the cheapest.

Mr. SIMMONS, to while away the time, turned on the radio and was listening to LAWRENCE TIBBETT. Suddenly the Scotchman burst out, as if he had been considering doing so for some time: "Dinna waste the radio on one voice. Get a quartet."

Which reminds us, in the way that an after-dinner speaker is reminded of the story of PAT and MIKE, about the middle-aged lady who stopped DAVID MENDOZA, the orchestra leader, and asked if he would give her an old baton.

"Are you a band leader?" asked DAVID.

"No," said the woman, "but I want a baton with which to poke my husband when he falls asleep at a concert."

Dr. Caldwell Gives His Five-Point Plan For The Radio Listeners

Golden Rule Best Aid To Reception

By The MICROPHONE'S Special Washington Correspondent

Radio listeners were admonished to abide by the Golden Rule by Dr. ORESTES H. CALDWELL, former Federal Radio Commissioner, in opening the national conference on radio interference at Rochester, N. Y.

Caldwell's five-point plan for radio listeners follows:

1. Do unto others (in eliminating interference causes) as you would have others do unto you.
2. Get your antenna for broadcasting reception as high and as far away from house electric apparatus as possible.
3. In purchasing electrical appliances, automotive devices, etc., specify that they are to be the types that produce no radio interference.
4. See that your radio tubes are new and in good condition.
5. Have a competent radio or electric man shield or equip with choke coils or condensers any apparatus which may be causing radio interference for yourself or others.

Hollow Wires in Police Antenna

Hollow wires which carry electricity without leaking like water-pipes are used as an antenna by the Newark, N. J., police department.

The wire is strung from the tip of a 100-foot flagpole. The Newark police have installed a new radio transmitter on top of the highest building in the city from which calls are sent to 40 squad cars on the ultra-short wave of 30,100 kilocycles, around 10 meters.

It is one of the first stations to avail itself of the ultra-high frequencies recently reserved by the Federal Communications Commission for police services.

WMEX joins the network at 7 P. M., but does not necessarily carry the complete ABS evening schedule.

WHDH is the Boston daytime outlet for the ABS network.

Fewer Dance Bands Because The Pace Kills, Says Dorsey

The Same Musicians Play in Many Orchestras

SECOND in numbers only to the hordes of radio hillbillies are the new dance bands which crowd the radio.

This is the result, apparently, of the demands of a new generation of listeners which likes its bands both sweet and hot, listeners to whom pre-radio reputations mean little or nothing.

Several of the new maestri have become important radio figures in a comparatively short time, and their success has encouraged others.

The more interesting of the new bands, however, are those organized by the youthful musicians who have served their time in the orchestras of the established maestri, for they depend upon musical distinction rather than personalities or reputations in other fields.

The DORSEY Brothers, JOE VENUTI and LENNIE HAYTON are alumni of the WHITEMAN organization. BENNY GOODMAN came from BEN POLLACK's Orchestra.

On the Coast, JIMMIE GRIER was an arranger for ABE LYMAN and GUS ARNHEIM. DICK STABILE, proficient saxophonist of BEN BERNIE's crew, now is organizing his own orchestra.

The DORSEY Brothers, TOMMY and JIMMY, who are heard over NBC, suggest another reason for the influx of new orchestras. These two instrumental virtuosos are among the group of musicians who nearly monopolized radio work by virtue of their proficiency, playing nightly on the networks under the batons of several different leaders.

"We made a lot of money," says Tommy Dorsey, "but we earned it. Playing a trombone for six or eight hours a day, counting rehearsals, recordings and broadcasts, is hard on your lips. And it was getting so bad that sometimes when we finished a broadcast several musicians would dash

down the hall and take their places in another orchestra beginning the next program on the same network.

"You may have noticed that the men in dance bands are young men. That isn't because the leader wants them young and good-looking. Now that I'm a band leader I don't want anyone in my orchestra younger or better-looking than I am — and that keeps practically everybody out of it.

"No, they're young men because the pace is killing. When they get older they become either band leaders or insurance salesmen.

"My brother and myself knew that if we continued to work as we had, our lips would eventually go, and that would be the end of the radio merry-go-round for us. We'd tried selling insurance once and didn't care for it, so we became band leaders."

With BOB CROSBY, BING's younger brother, as their featured vocalist, the DORSEY Brothers are now on NBC. Their three broadcasts weekly, after several years of 30 a week, are a lark, and their dance spot a rest-cure. And by organizing their triumvi-

rate with BOB CROSBY, TOMMY DORSEY asserts, they have limited the number of new bands on the air.

"Think of the congestion," he says, "if instead of the Dorsey Brothers Orchestra with Bob Crosby you had Bob Crosby and his orchestra, Jimmy Dorsey and his orchestra and Tommy Dorsey and his orchestra."

One of the characteristics of the orchestra is the effect of apparent abandon the musicians achieve in their work. The band sounds at times as though it is extemporizing, even improvising, yet each note is a part of a carefully rehearsed arrangement.

Seth Parker Sails About Galapagos

The Galapagos are that desolate group of islands that figured so prominently in that news story played up by the papers last week.

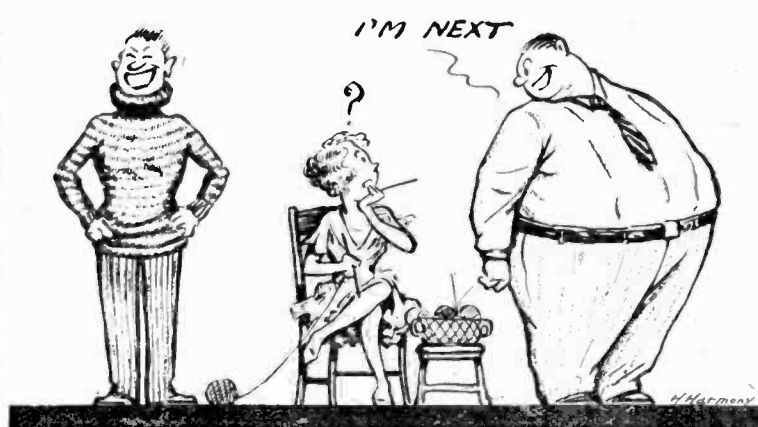
"Death on the Island Eden," and other trick titles, you remember they called it.

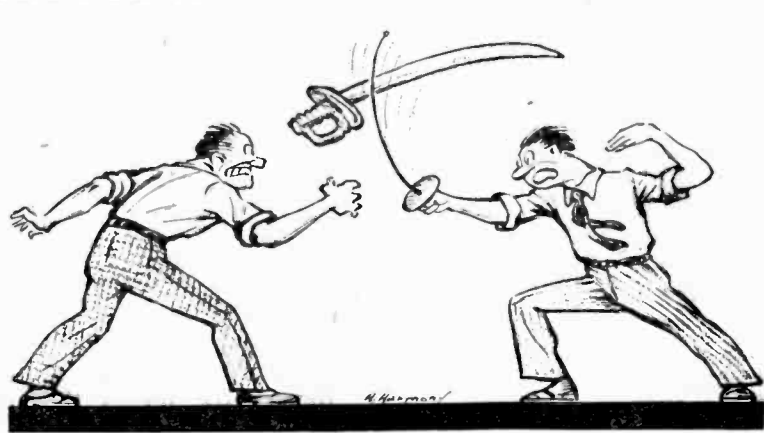

Thrown in for seasonal good measure is the Christmas Day broadcast of the troupe's performance of "HANSEL and GRETEL."

Replacing JOHN B. KENNEDY, who last year held forth at intermission-time with greater enthusiasm than accuracy, will be the

Air Route to Be Equipped With Devices

Blind landings at airports by aid of radio are here.

The Army Air Corps has given its okay to experiments conducted at Langley Field, Va. A transcontinental air route is to be equipped with the new devices.

Capt. ALBERT HEGENBERGER, famous Army Air Corps pilot, helped devise the system at Wright field, Dayton, Ohio.

Completely hooded, he made a test flight for a blind landing and it worked out satisfactorily.

The Bureau of Air Commerce has endorsed the system. It means that eventually the Army and Navy will be equipped with the necessary contrivances to make blind landings and that will mean much to aviation advancement.

Fog has been a major obstacle to advancement of aviation.

The KREUSI radio loop compass is a large factor in effecting blind landings. Two small auto trucks are used on the ground, each carrying a tiny broadcasting outfit.

Altimeters, directional gyros and other instruments aboard the airplane are brought into play as the ground trucks pass along signals.

"Soft" landings have been the rule.
