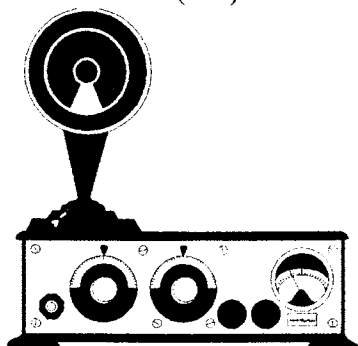
Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio show, and radio sales which are advertised in the *Call Letter* and are held in and around Portland.

Remembering James Mason

It was with great at last month's meeting sadness that we learned of the death of Jim Mason. Jim passed away on October 9, just a couple of days before the meeting.

Jim was one of our charter members, having joined the club shortly after its formation in late 1974. He is listed as a new member in the March, 1975, issue of the club newsletter, which had not yet been given a name, was elected treasurer for 1976, and elected president for 1979. In 1981, Jim began editing the *Call Letter*, holding that post through 1982.

Jim was born in Pendleton on June 19, 1914, and was raised in Ellensburg, Washington. He attended grade school and high school there, and attended University of Washington, from which he received a bachelor's degree in zoology. He later attended Washington State University, where he received his Master's degree in entomology.

Following school, Jim worked for the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, first in Spokane, then Honolulu, Hawaii, and finally in Portland, where he retired in 1965.

Jim took up collecting radios in 1974. In a 1981 newspaper interview, Jim described his entry into collecting this way:

"Christmas of 1974," said Mason, "I was visiting some good friends in Seattle. I was wondering around their garage and noticed an old battery radio that belonged to my friend's uncle. I was really interested in getting the thing to work, and my friend said "take it home and see what you can do.""

Mason's friend made him promise one thing after he took the radio home and fixed it.

"He told me to put the radio in my will for him if I kicked-off," laughed the gray-haired, gentle-mannered Mason.

One day Mason's neighbor, a worker at Tektronix, checked out the radio and told Mason of a speaker at Tek who's primary topic was vintage radios. The speaker, Harley Perkins, had taught electronics at OSU for several years.

It was that evening that Mason know this was his life, and decided he wanted to know everything there was to know about radios. He joined the Northwest Vintage Radio Club (sic), becoming a charter member in February, 1975.

He has been treasurer, president, and currently holds the editor's position for its newsletter.

Poring through the *Call Letter* archives, you discover that Jim was always an enthusiastic club member and collector. Jim's name appears frequently in the printed meeting minutes. He was making or seconding some motion, generally taking an active interest in the club's affairs. As was pointed out in the 1981 article about Jim, his house was overflowing with radios then. Those who have been charged with preparing his collection for auction can attest to its vast extent. One club member told me "Jim never met a radio he didn't like."

Jim was a gentle, unassuming, and genuinely nice man. As a collector, club member, and friend, we miss him.

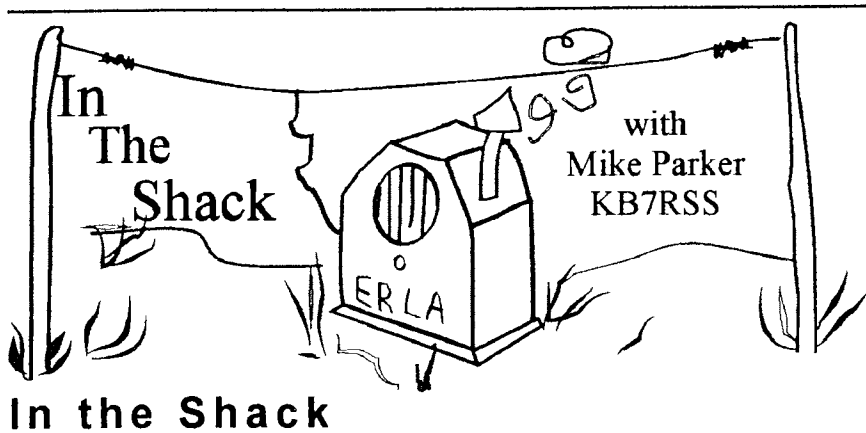

Crystal Mystery

Well, apparently I was not satisfied with the short list of 1920's crystal set trade names that I accounted for in last month's CALL LETTER, so I found about 87 more to report. I have tried to list them by the actual name given to each crystal set, but in many cases the manufacturer would not give their set a name, in fact some sets were made without any name or manufacturer identification visible at all. In those cases I have listed the manufacturer's name.



It's amazing to discover that some of these manufacturers, having made a mere crystal set went on to bigger and better things to produce! I see that Killark is listed. This company went on to be a large producer of electrical panels and switchgear but never made a tube radio that I know of. Briggs & Stratton — of course we have all seen their motors and perhaps mowed the lawn with one! Many major radio manufacturers appear to have made at least one crystal set, mostly during the peak sales years of 1923 and '24. Names are here such as AC Dayton, Amrad, A-K, Audiola, de Forest, Gilfillan, Kilbourne & Clark (Seattle), Kodel, Magnus and RCA. Of course, a few years later, none of them made a crystal set, as radios became bigger and better, with AC plugs on them.

The crystal set became more and more regarded as a toy or a novelty for home radio builders and boy experimenters, a status in which a few specialty manufacturers such as Philmore, enjoyed success. Some are listed by a set name and manufactured by famous companies such as the Leroy by Radio Shop, and the Harko by Crosley. And notice the other Harco, made by a company capitalizing on the name with a different spelling of the famous Harko! The Pasco is worth noting having been

made by the Pacific Screw Co. here in Portland, who also made an Acme. RCA, as near as I could ascertain, first made an RCA Concert crystal set and then marketed it as a Radiola Concert when that name became standard for their products. I cannot determine whether they are two different sets or the same renamed. Another item of interest is the fact that back then, you could walk into a local radio shop and chances are, they had their own version of a crystal set for sale, made in their shop to be purchased over the counter or put in the mail. Some of these qualify for this list and one that I noted, cost a whole 60 cents! So here goes.

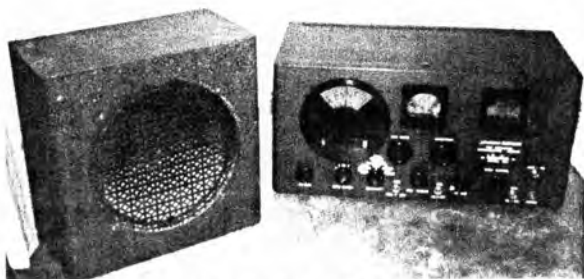

Officer's Roles

The President

The Secretary

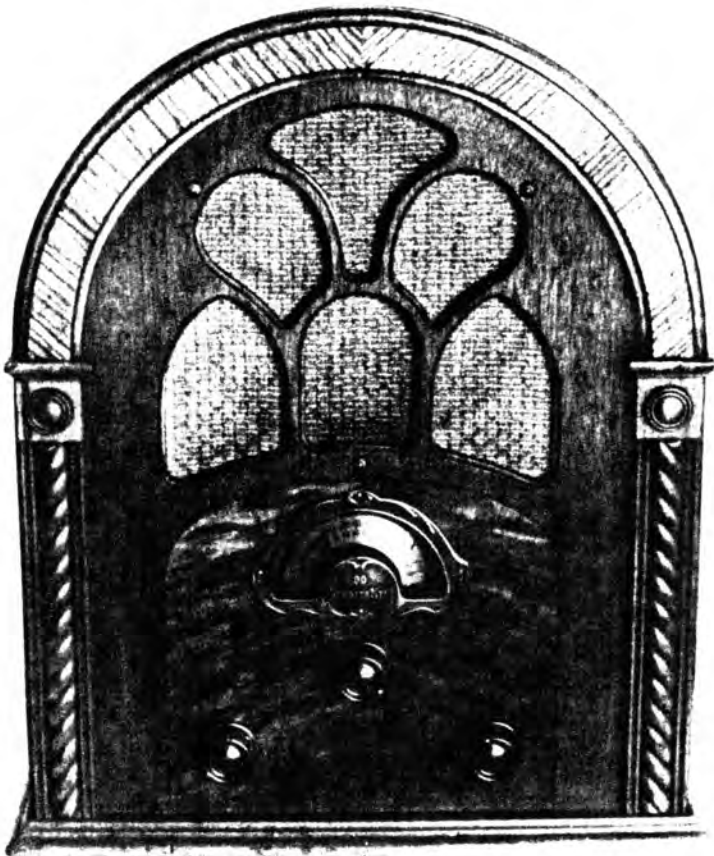
The Secretary shall be responsible for recording the minutes of every business meeting and for receiving and preparing all of the society's correspondence.

The Treasurer shall prepare a list of members in good standing for distribution at the next regular meeting following the annual meeting of the society.

The Board of Directors

The Board of Directors shall consist of the current elected officers of the society plus the immediate past president of the society. The Board of Directors shall direct the care and expenditure of the funds of the society. The Board shall determine a suitable time and place for regular society business meetings.
