INTRODUCTION

BUSINESS EXECUTIVES in all fields, especially those who deal with sales or who desire to cultivate markets beyond their own immediate areas, should study the function of the press and its place in the economy of our local and national life.

Through the columns of the press of the United States and Canada the people of these countries gain useful and instructive information which fits into, and influences, their daily lives and habits. For an understanding of the significance of the printed word and its influence in commerce, industry, agriculture, education, religion, labor and politics, the information contained in this book is fundamental and vital. Probably to a greater degree than has been reached in any other country, the dissemination of news and of general and technical information has become an essential part of our lives. Into almost every home, office, mill, plant and factory goes the newspaper, or the trade or technical publication, which meets the needs, and is devoted to the interests of the busy folk who are the life-blood of the broad activities of these nations. This Directory is the text-book and the base on which may be built sound knowledge of the great publishing industry. It comprises more than 21,000 publications which circulate in the territories covered by these pages.

Our primary purpose is to provide in this Directory the basic facts about each publication for your use in the development of commercial and other interests, chiefly through advertising. Authoritative information is given concerning the States, Provinces, cities, towns and marketing areas in which each paper is published. These data have been secured from reliable sources and, while carefully verified, the publishers cannot hold themselves responsible for possible errors or omissions. Circulation figures are estimated only when authentic information has not been supplied by the publisher. Please read the next three pages for suggestions on how to use this volume effectively.

A GUIDE TO THE USE OF THE DIRECTORY

For the benefit of new subscribers and for a better understanding by all users of this book, a few paragraphs follow that will, it is believed, clarify the terms that must of necessity be abbreviated in so voluminous a work, make evident the method used in compiling it, and explain the absence of material that might well be included in its pages if space permitted. For ease in reference the material is grouped under self-explanatory alphabetized headings.

ALPHABETICAL ARRANGEMENT OF PUBLICATIONS.—In each city and town newspapers are listed in alphabetical order by their distinctive names. The word "The," if used, appears after the name. "Morning," "Evening," "Weekly," or other words indicating the period of issue, are ignored in the title, as is the name of the city or town in which the paper circulates. Thus, the "Boston Evening Transcript" is listed under Boston as "Transcript." When the title pertains to a state or county, however, the name of the section is included, examples being, "Wisconsin News" in Milwaukee; "Ventura County News" in Ventura, California. Occasionally, too, the name of a city is retained to distinguish a paper from another of similar title.

It is our intention to list newspapers in the town in which they circulate chiefly. For this reason the address following the publisher's name may in a few instances differ from the town in which the paper is listed.

BRACKETS.—When two or more papers in a town or city are under the same management or regularly sell space in combination, they are bracketed in the DIRECTORY. As examples, see the Age-Herald, the News and the News-Age-Herald in Birmingham, Alabama; the News and the Times in Cumberland, Maryland.

CIRCULATIONS.—All circulation statements obtained from the publishers are for the latest date possible, *i. e.*, they represent an average circulation for six months preceding the compilation of the DIRECTORY in which they appear.

By an average paid circulation is meant, as is clearly expressed on all forms used and all questionnaires sent out: *the average net paid circulation per issue (after deducting all left-over, unsold, returned, file, sample, exchange, or advertisers' copies, and special editions) for six preceding months.*

Circulations that are controlled or free are so indicated. These represent a six months' average, also, exclusive of left-over, unsold, file, sample, exchange and advertisers' copies.

In the list of daily newspapers in the back of the book, it is possible to include circulation figures that arrive too late for incorporation in the catalog pages. Reference to this fact is made in the catalog just preceding each state's list of towns and cities. Variation is also found between the catalog and other of the classified lists because of the later printing of the latter which allows inclusion in them of last minute changes.

Circulations given in this DIRECTORY are divided into eight classes: A.B.C. Audits; A.B.C. Statements; P. O. Statements; C.C.A. Audits; State Press Association Audits; Sworn Statements; Publishers' Statements; Estimated figures. Under the following italicized headings brief explanations are given.

A.B.C. Statements and Audits.—Members of the Audit Bureau of Circulations are so designated by symbols preceding their circulation figures. Their Audits are indicated by (●); September 30 Statements by (★★), March 31 and June 30 Statements by (★). These are in bold face type, as that is our method in all cases of indicating sworn statements. Only the total net paid circulation figures are

given. A few of these statements cover only a three-month period; the majority, however, are for a six-month period ending with the date indicated.

Members of the Audit Bureau of Circulations are sometimes not designated as such in the DIRECTORY. This occurs only when a consolidation has taken place, invalidating the latest available statement, or when no up-to-date statement is made available by the Audit Bureau of Circulations.

P. O. Statements.—Circulation figures given in the statement of ownership, management and circulation made by daily newspapers on October 1 of each year to the Post Office Department of the Federal Government are listed in the DIRECTORY in bold face type. They are called Post Office Statements and are accompanied by the symbol (§).

C.C.A. Audits.—Circulation figures from Controlled Circulation Audits are preceded by (>) and are given in bold face type, showing that they are sworn statements, made for the Controlled Circulation Audit, Inc.

State Press Association Audits.—Circulation figures from audit reports made by the various state press associations are preceded by the symbol (▲). As these are sworn statements, the figures are listed in bold face type.

Sworn and Publishers' Statements; Estimated Circulation Figures.—Figures listed on our own questionnaires fall into three classifications. First, those that are supported by affidavit are listed in bold face type as sworn statements. Secondly, those unsupported by affidavit are preceded by a double dagger (‡) and are called publishers' statements. Thirdly, those given on questionnaires lacking a signature are listed as estimated. In addition, those publications that have failed to respond to the questionnaire are given estimated figures for one year, based on the statement for the preceding year. Estimated figures are accompanied by no symbol and are printed in light face type.

No ADVERTISING.—Publications which are believed to decline general advertising are indicated in the DIRECTORY by the abbreviated form, "No adv."

OMISSION OF CIRCULATIONS.—In some cases it becomes necessary to omit circulation figures. Cases in point are: when the information received is indefinite, contradictory, or otherwise unsatisfactory; when experience or reliable information creates a doubt as to the accuracy of the figures sent us; when more recent information indicates that statements made earlier in the year do not represent conditions at the time the DIRECTORY is issued; and when publishers themselves have requested the omission.

PUBLICATIONS EXCLUDED.—In accordance with our usual custom, a number of publications which have no apparent value to the general advertiser or to the public have been omitted from the 1939 DIRECTORY. Among these periodicals are high school papers, local church papers, papers issued by business houses primarily for the exploitation of their own goods (those generally known as House Organs), and publications issued by institutions, unless these have influence outside the particular institution by which they are published. A few publications established during the year 1938 are also omitted. Information concerning them may be obtained by writing to the editorial department of the DIRECTORY.

SUB-EDITIONS.—As far as possible, the endeavor is made to distinguish between independent publications and those which are simply reprints of some other paper, usually with little or no alteration beyond the name. Papers so issued are entered in the catalog under the name of the leading paper, and under the place of apparent publication the name of the edition is given, with reference to the paper or house issuing it, followed in many instances by the name of the town to which mail should be addressed.

SUBSCRIPTION PRICES.—The many variations in the subscription prices of daily papers in the larger cities make it impossible, in the space available, to give such prices accurately. The subscription rates requested of all papers are those paid by local subscribers. Dailies are requested to give the rate when delivered by carrier. Differences must be expected between these prices and those in zones other than the one in which the paper is published.

In the case of newspaper members of the Audit Bureau of Circulations, many of the subscription prices listed are computed from the monthly or weekly carrier price given in the respective A.B.C. statements.

TOWN HEADINGS.—Due to the condensation necessary in this work, headings for towns and cities under 25,000 contain reference to banking facilities only when these are not available in the town being described. For the same reason there is also no mention made in these headings of airports or highways.

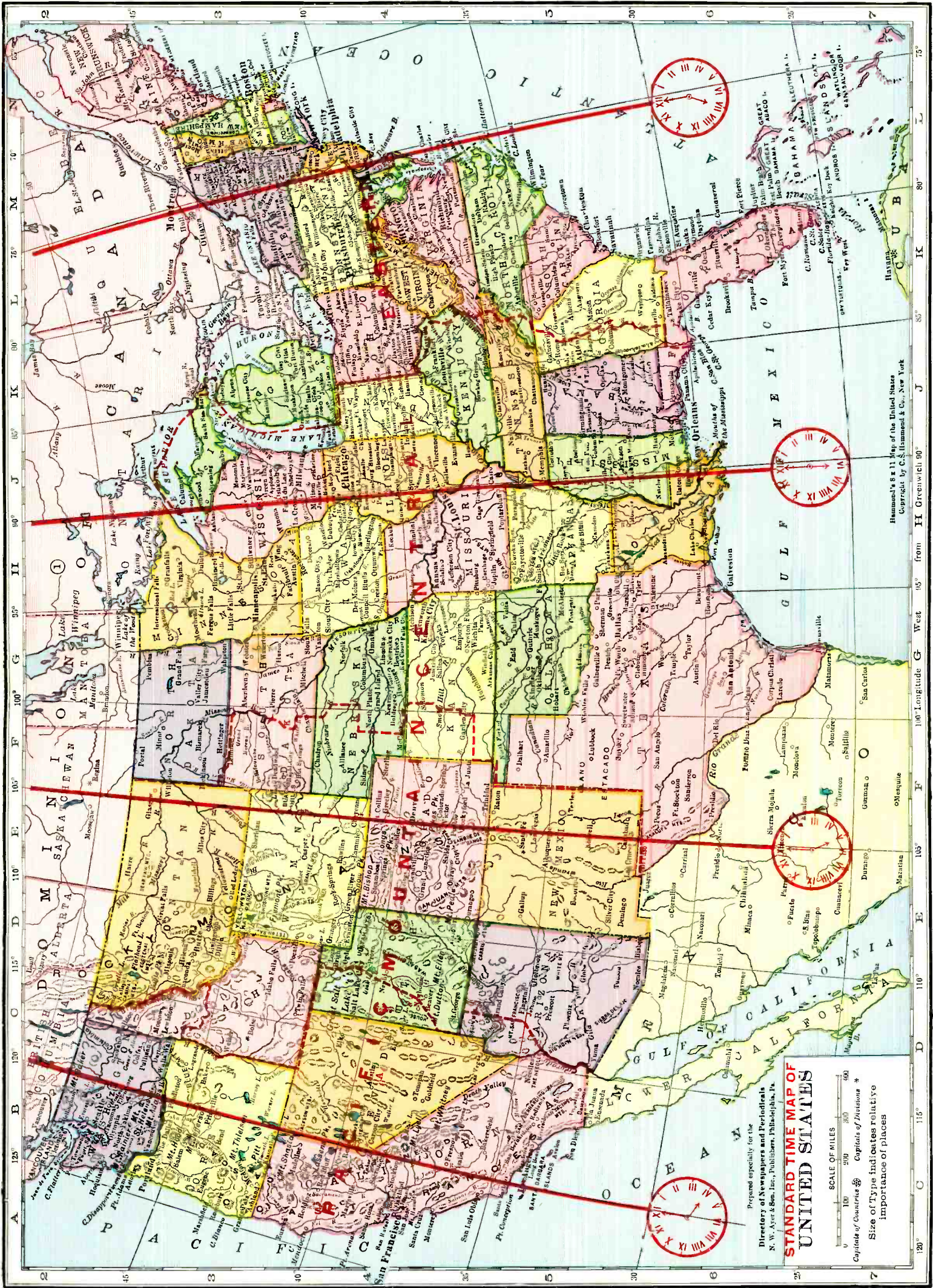

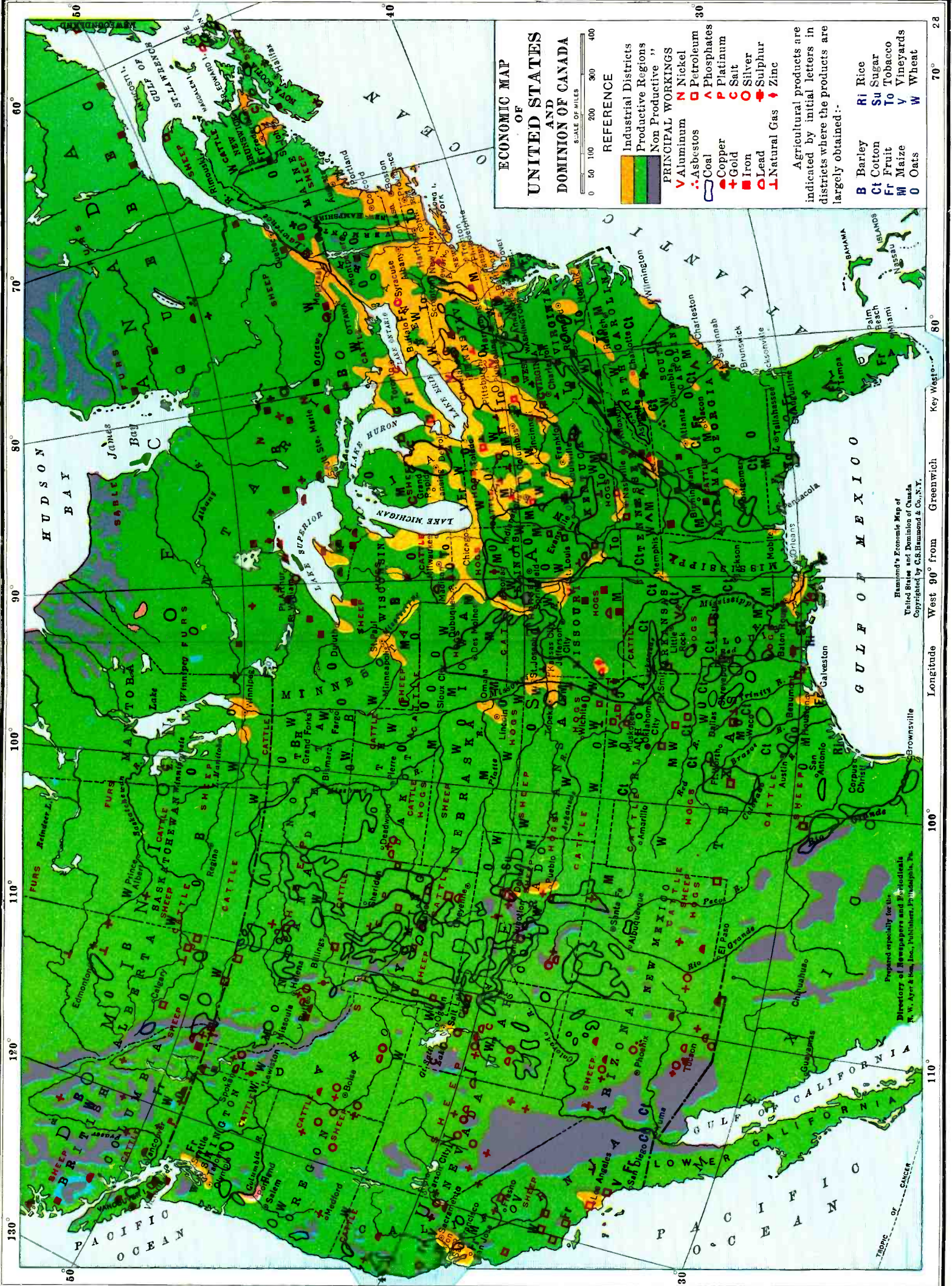

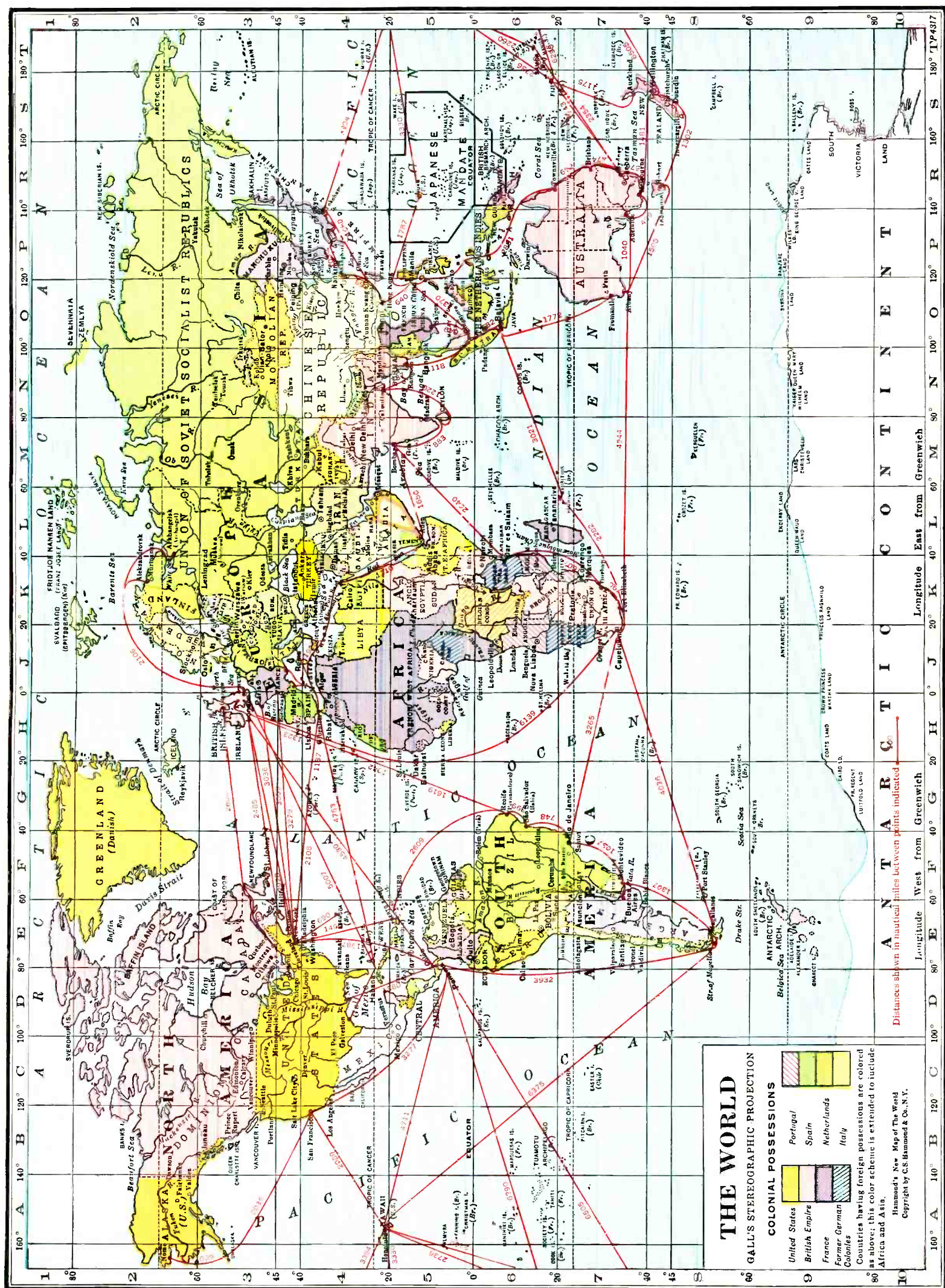

ALABAMA

Population 2,834,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, MONTGOMERY

Alabama is bounded on the north by Tennessee, east by Georgia and Florida, south by Florida and the Gulf of Mexico, and west by Mississippi. Its extreme length, north to south, is 336 miles; its breadth varies from 150 to 200 miles. The total land area is 51,279 square miles; its rank in area, twenty-eighth.

The Allegheny range enters the state at the northeast and extends toward the center, finally losing itself in mere hills; then follows a tract of rolling prairies interspersed with pine barrens and rich alluvial bottom lands. These bottom lands include the cane brake region, one of the richest cotton-producing districts in the world. From this region to the Florida border and the Gulf the land is gently undulating and is covered with forests.

The mountain districts and the valley of the Tennessee are covered with fine forests of hardwood timber. The mineral region occupies the northeastern part, while the northwest is a good agricultural and stock raising country. The climate is temperate and fairly uniform. The Weather Bureau at Montgomery gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 65.5; highest degree on record, 107; lowest —5. Total annual precipitation is 51.9 inches.

Practically all of the state's foreign commerce passes through Mobile, exports from which port were valued in 1936 at \$32,807,000. Birmingham, "the Pittsburgh of the South," is in the center of the mining industry. The largest institution of higher education in the state is the University of Alabama, located at University (Tuscaloosa).

Rank among the states, seventeenth. Rural residents (1930), 71.9%. Of the 1,700,775 white persons, 15,710 were foreign born: 3,336 from the British Isles; Germans, 2,114; Italians, 2,140.

Poultry and eggs (1937): chickens, \$1,437,000, rank, thirty-second; eggs, \$2,941,000, rank, thirty-second.

Dairy products (1936): creamery butter, 1,477,000 lbs.; American cheese, 1,609,000 lbs.; condensed and evaporated and dried milk, 7,793,000 lbs.; ice cream, 1,457,000 gallons; milk (1937), \$7,574,000.

FISHERIES

Total catch (1936), \$355,459. Principal fish: mullet, shrimp, red snappers, oysters. Total catch (Mississippi River and tributaries, 1931), \$33,000. Principal fish: mussel shells, catfish and bullheads, sheepshead.

FORESTS

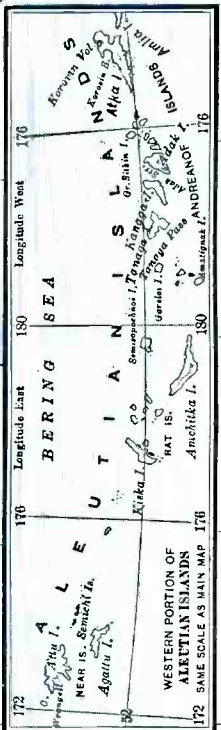
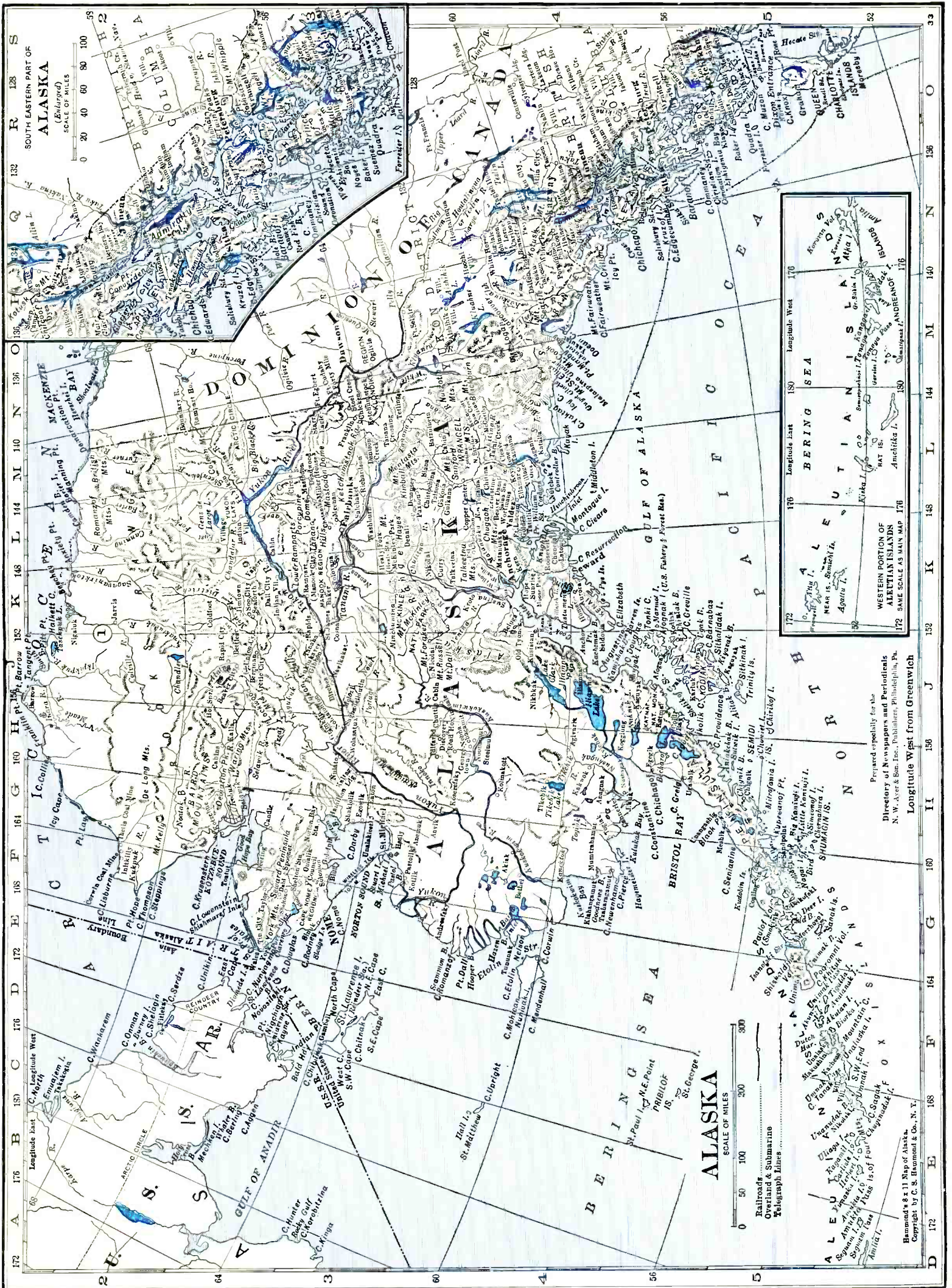

ALASKA

Population 61,500 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

Territorial Capital, JUNEAU

Alaska is bounded on the north by the Arctic Ocean, east by the Yukon Territory and British Columbia, Canada, south by the Pacific Ocean, and west by Behring Sea and Strait and the Arctic Ocean. Including the Aleutian Islands, it has a total area of 586,000 square miles. Its greatest length from north to south is 1,200 miles; its greatest breadth over 800 miles.

The northern half is low with great morasses along the streams, and is populated only by a few Indians. The southern half is mountainous and along the southeast coast are some of the highest peaks in North America. Near the center is Mt. McKinley (20,300 ft.), loftiest elevation on the entire continent. The southwesterly section comprises the peninsula of Alaska and the Aleutian Islands, the latter the center of the fur seal fisheries. This district is mountainous and actively volcanic. The coast from the southern boundary to Cape Spencer is lined with a chain of islands between which and the mainland are salt water channels, navigable for the largest steamships. The Yukon River has a length of 2,300 miles, of which 1,765 miles are in Alaska and 1,200 miles are navigable.

There are frequent steamboat connections between Alaska's south coast towns and the ports of Seattle, Portland and San Francisco; monthly steamers from those cities to the Behring Sea ports, and weekly steamers on the Yukon between St. Michael, Alaska, and Dawson in the Yukon Territory, Canada, when the river is open.

In the interior temperatures range from about 60° below zero in winter to 90° in summer; on the coast and the Aleutian Islands they range from zero to 80°.

POPULATION

In 1930, according to the census, the population was divided as follows: Indians, 29,983; white persons, 28,640, nearly a third of them foreign born.

AGRICULTURE

Fairbanks, with Tanana, is the centre of a growing agricultural region of a great inland plateau rolling gently north from the barrier of mountain ranges along the south coast. Experimentation in agriculture is carried on by the Government. The 1930 census listed 500 farms in the territory, of an average acreage of 249, about one-sixteenth of it improved. Live stock in the same year included: 712,500 reindeer; 37,516 working dogs; 19,667 chickens, ducks and geese; 11,948 sheep and lambs; 1,869 cattle; a few swine, goats, horses and mules.

FISHERIES AND FURS

The fisheries form Alaska's largest single industry. During 1935 they employed 30,383 persons; the catch was valued at \$13,891,000, and the value of products as prepared for market was \$50,455,272. More than 90% was salmon, followed in value by halibut, whale, crab and herring.

Alaska is famous as a big game country, and is protected by game commission laws. Since the seals were put under Government protection the herds have increased greatly. In 1936, the number of fur-seal skins taken at the Pribilof Islands was 52,446. There are about 275 blue fox ranches stocked with 36,000 foxes. There are also about 90 fur farmers raising foxes, mink and marten in pens. The value of furs and fur skins shipped to the United States during fiscal year ending June 30, 1937, was \$2,439,013.

FORESTS

Under the care of the Forest Service of the Government are 21,342,340 acres set apart as national forests. Total forest areas are estimated at 70,000,000 acres. Lumber production (1936): 19 mills producing 28,858 M feet b. m.; shingles, 2,598 squares. Principal woods: spruce, hemlock, cedar.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

During the year ending June 30, 1937, commerce between Alaska and United States increased \$20,522,819. Exports to United States amounted to \$76,448,062. Principal items were canned salmon, \$45,386,512; furs and fur skins, \$2,439,013. In the same period, imports from United States totaled, \$38,475,107.

MINERALS

In 1936, the production of all minerals greatly increased over 1935. A total of \$3,720,000 worth of copper was produced. Gold production was \$20,233,000. Silver production amounted to \$369,000. Other mine products were coal, \$573,700; platinum, \$241,900; tin, \$105,000, and lead \$99,500.

MISCELLANEOUS

Tourist travel in 1936-37 showed a decided increase, 37 vessels of the five steamship lines carrying 72,734 passengers during the period.

The Government is operating about 500 miles of railroad lines and there are in all nearly 1,000 miles. Number of passengers carried in the year 1936-1937 was 27,675; freight traffic amounted to 157,717 tons.

There are in excess of 250 miles of territorial roads and approximately 670 miles built and maintained jointly with the Alaska Road Commission. A total of 294 miles of highways have been constructed within the national forests.

Commercial airplanes carried 16,982 passengers in 1936, and 2,418,616 lbs. of mail and freight.

In 1937, there were 11 territorial banks and 4 national banks. Total deposits as of June 30, 1937, in territorial and national banks, \$14,774,663. Number of post offices (1937-37), 199; gross postal receipts, \$117,389,50.

Alaska has 15 high schools and 88 elementary schools. The Government provides day and industrial schools for native Indian children. At College is located the University of Alaska.

Population 386,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, PHOENIX

Arizona is bounded on the north by Utah and Nevada, south by Mexico, east by New Mexico and west by California and Nevada. Its length, north to south, is 390 miles; its breadth about 300 miles. The total land area is 113,810 square miles, its rank in area (1930), fifth.

The Colorado River flows through the northern part of the state, and forms nearly all the western boundary. Its Grand Canyon is one of the scenic wonders of the world. The state is generally picturesque and in addition to the Grand Canyon has such other outstanding items of interest as the Petrified Forest, Natural Bridge, Indian pueblos, ruins of cliff dwellers, and the great Roosevelt Dam, which supplies irrigating waters for the richest agricultural district, the Salt River Valley. From the latter and from other sources of irrigation, agriculture has received great stimulation. Boulder Dam in the Black Canyon harnesses the Colorado and is the greatest dam in the world.

Extending from Grand Canyon to the Mogollon Mountains are large forests of pine. In the center of the state is a richly mineralized belt. Hot springs are found in the southwest, and the arid, semi-tropical southeast affords relief to sufferers from pulmonary complaints. At Flagstaff is located the Lowell Observatory. The University of Arizona is at Tucson.

The Weather Bureau at Phoenix gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 69.7; highest degree on record, 118; lowest, 16; annual precipitation, 7.78 inches.

POPULATION

Rank among the states, forty-fifth. Rural residents in 1930, 63%. Of the 264,378 white persons, 15,591 are foreign born; 3,915 from the British Isles; Germans, 1,438. Mexicans number 1,086; Indians, 43,726; Negroes, 10,749.

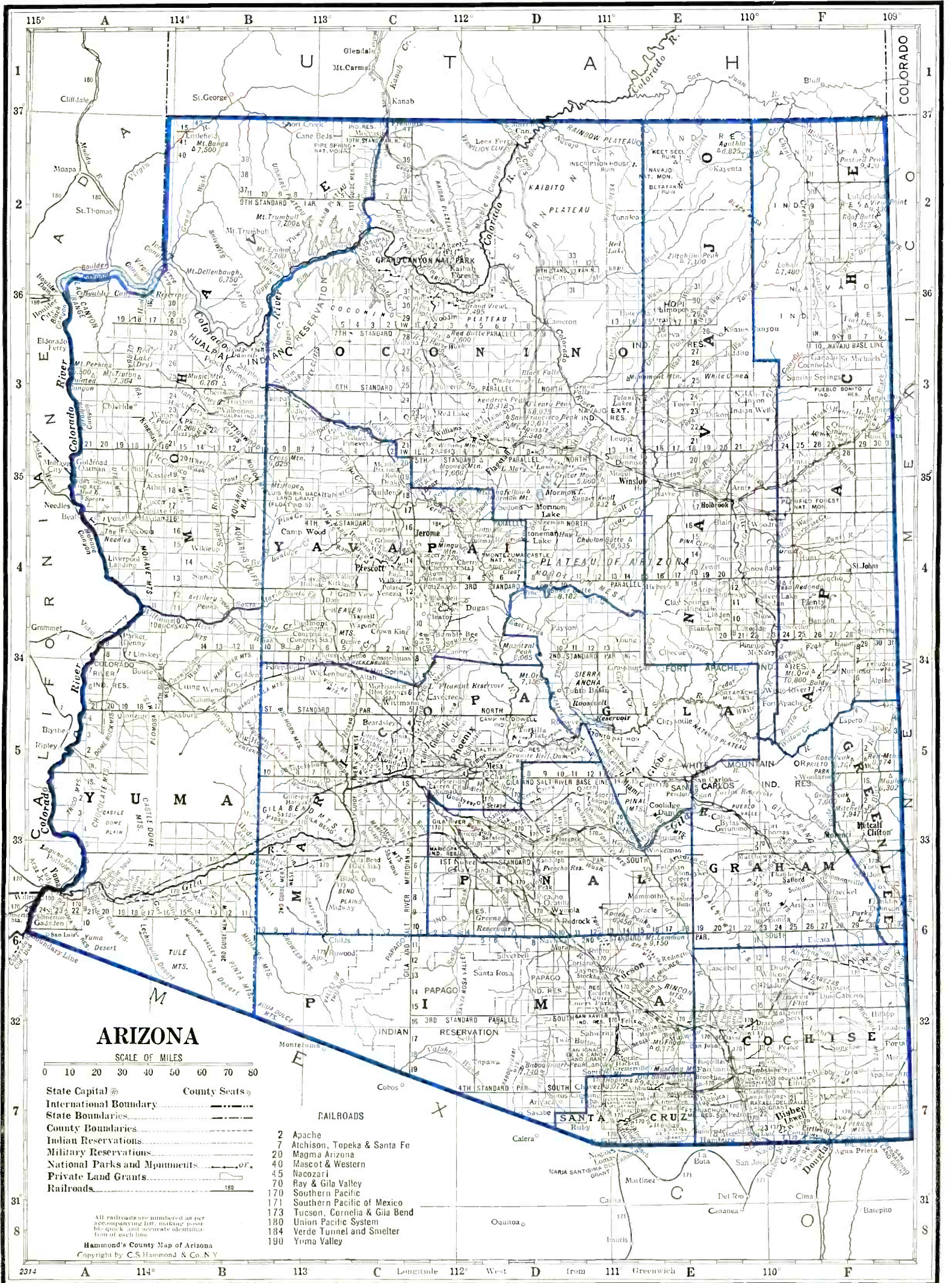

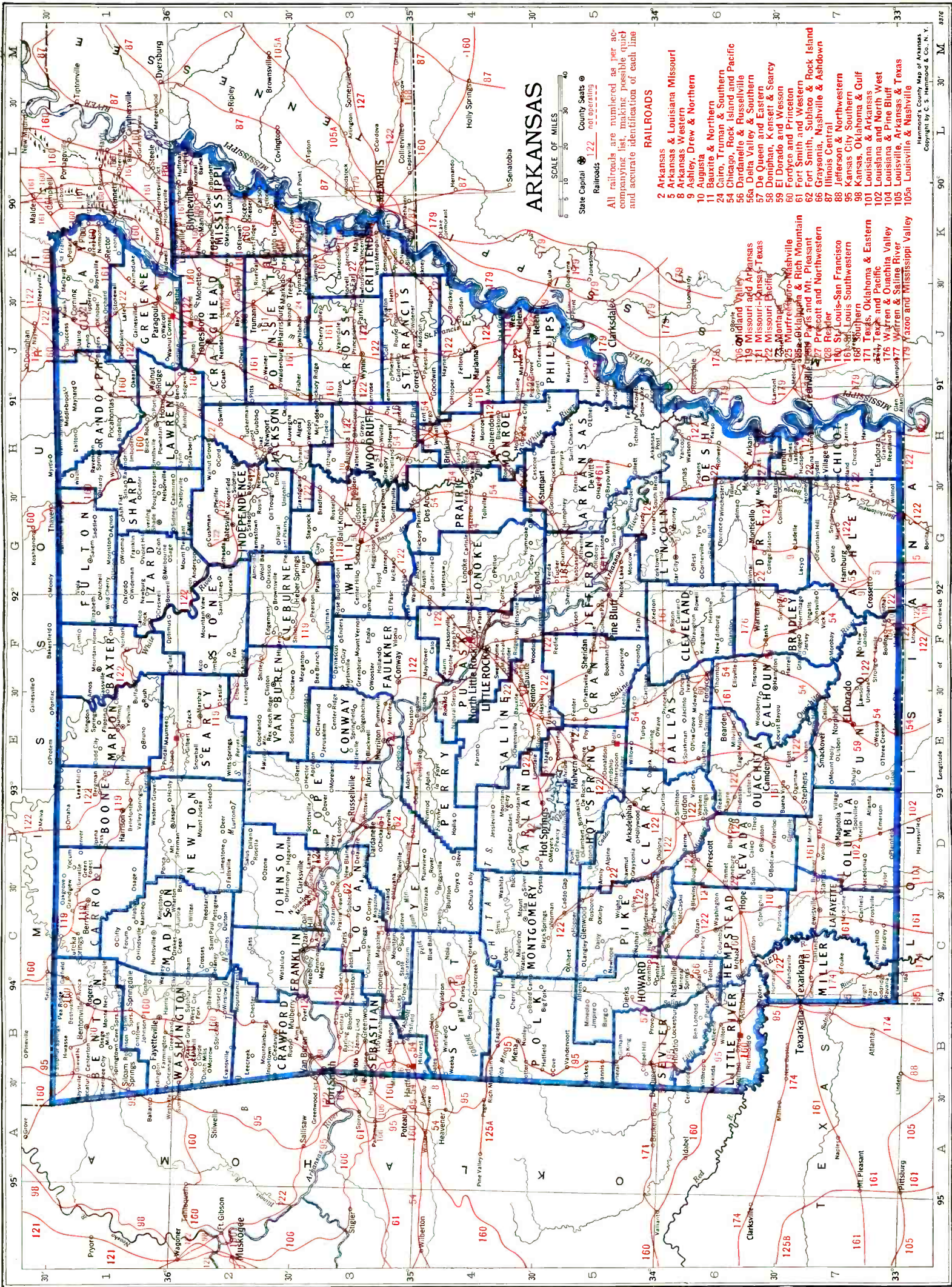

ARKANSAS

Population, 1,999,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, LITTLE ROCK

Arkansas is bounded on the north by Missouri, east by Missouri, Tennessee and Mississippi, south by Louisiana, southwest by Texas, and west by Oklahoma. Its greatest length, north to south, is 240 miles; its breadth varies from 170 to 250 miles. The total land area is 52,525 square miles, the area rank (1930), twenty-sixth.

Nearly the entire state lies in the drainage basin of the lower Mississippi, which stream flows along most of its eastern border. In the eastern and southeastern portion are the cotton and timber belts. Every sort of tree that grows in the temperate zone abounds. The valley of the Arkansas, from the Oklahoma line to the Mississippi, is unsurpassed as a cotton producing region. In the west are the Ozark Mountains and fruit and mineral-bearing lands. Arkansas produces 96% of the bauxite in the country. Near the center of the state are the famous Hot Springs and other mineral spring resorts, attractive to tourists and invalids. In the south are the largest of the state's oil fields.

The summer season is long, the winters usually short and mild. The Weather Bureau at Little Rock gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 62; highest temperature recorded as 108; lowest as —12; total annual precipitation as 48.38 inches.

The University of Arkansas is located at Fayetteville.

Population 5,639,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, SACRAMENTO

California is bounded on the north by Oregon, east by Nevada and Arizona, south by Lower California, west by the Pacific Ocean. Its length is approximately 770 miles; its breadth, 230 miles; land area, 155,652 square miles; rank in area (1930), second.

The state has a coast line of 1,000 miles indented by many bays, among them Humboldt, San Francisco, of Golden Gate fame, and San Diego. Crossing these waterways are the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge and the Golden Gate Bridge, both of which have attracted wide attention as feats of engineering. Two mountain ranges traverse it, the Sierra Nevada in the east and the Coast Range in the west. Between them lie the beautiful and fertile Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys. Peaks of the Coast Range rise to 8,000 feet; in the Sierras altitudes exceed 10,000 feet. Mt. Whitney is 14,501 feet above sea level and the highest point in the United States. And only 70 miles from it, in the same county, is the lowest point in the entire country, Death Valley, a depression that is 276 feet below sea level.

The northern part of the state is an elevated mountain region, noted for timber, minerals and fruits. The central and southern portions, except in the mountainous districts, have soils of unexcelled fertility. The southwestern part is valuable for minerals, contains some fertile valleys and also arid, barren deserts.

Like the topography, the climate is extremely varied, ranging from the temperatures of snow-capped mountains to those of the tropics. And its rainfall varies from 75 inches in the wet season in the north to about two inches in the desert regions. The Weather Bureau at Fresno gives the highest temperatures on record as 115 degrees; the lowest on record as 17. The annual monthly mean is 63; the total precipitation, 9.30 inches.

There are large forests in the state, especially on the North Coast Range. In several of the national parks, among them celebrated Yosemite, are to be seen the giant Sequoias. The University of California, one of the largest universities in the country, is located at Berkeley with a branch in Los Angeles. Two other noted universities are Leland Stanford at Palo Alto and University of Southern California at Los Angeles. Lick Observatory is located at Mt. Hamilton. Hollywood, a suburb of Los Angeles, is the center of the motion picture industry.

POPULATION

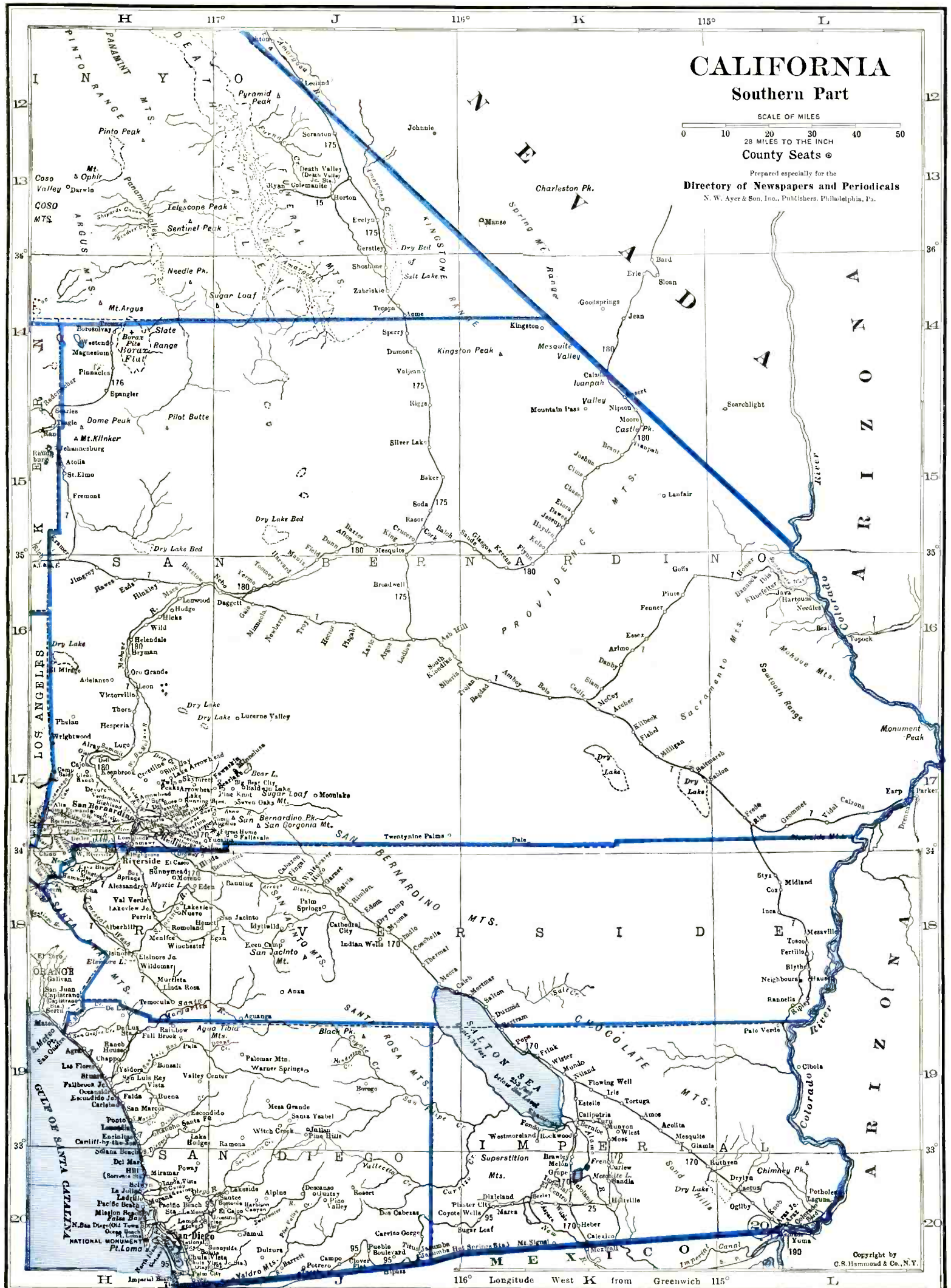

CANAL ZONE

Population 39,467 (U. S. Census 1930)

The Canal Zone is situated between 8° and 10° north latitude and 79° and 81° west longitude. It is a strip of territory extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific Oceans, includes five miles of land on each side of the Panama Canal, and is under perpetual lease to the United States. Its land area is 441½ square miles, its total area, 549 square miles.

The cities of Panama, at the Pacific or southeastern terminus of the canal, and Colon, at the Caribbean or northwestern end, are not included in the Canal Zone, but remain in the jurisdiction of the Republic of Panama. The Panama Railway on the eastern side of the canal runs between these two cities. Cristobal, formerly a part of Colon, is the Caribbean port of entrance to the Canal, and that at the Pacific entrance is Balboa. East of Panama is the residential town of Ancon, with a hotel and a hospital. From deep water off Colon to deep water off Panama, the canal is 43¾ miles in length.

All industrial activities within the Canal Zone are controlled by the Government, which holds the title to all land. With the exception of a small native population engaged in agricultural pursuits, only persons connected with the operation, maintenance and protection of the Canal are permitted to reside within the boundaries of the Zone. Census figures in 1930 showed 22,865 persons, chiefly employees of the Canal organization, located in towns and villages, 4,819 on farms, 10,470 in army posts, and 1,315 in navy reservations. The army maintains airports at France Field on the Caribbean side and at Albrook Field on Balboa Heights on the Pacific side. A part of the territory is adapted to stock raising, growing of tropical fruits and sugar cane.

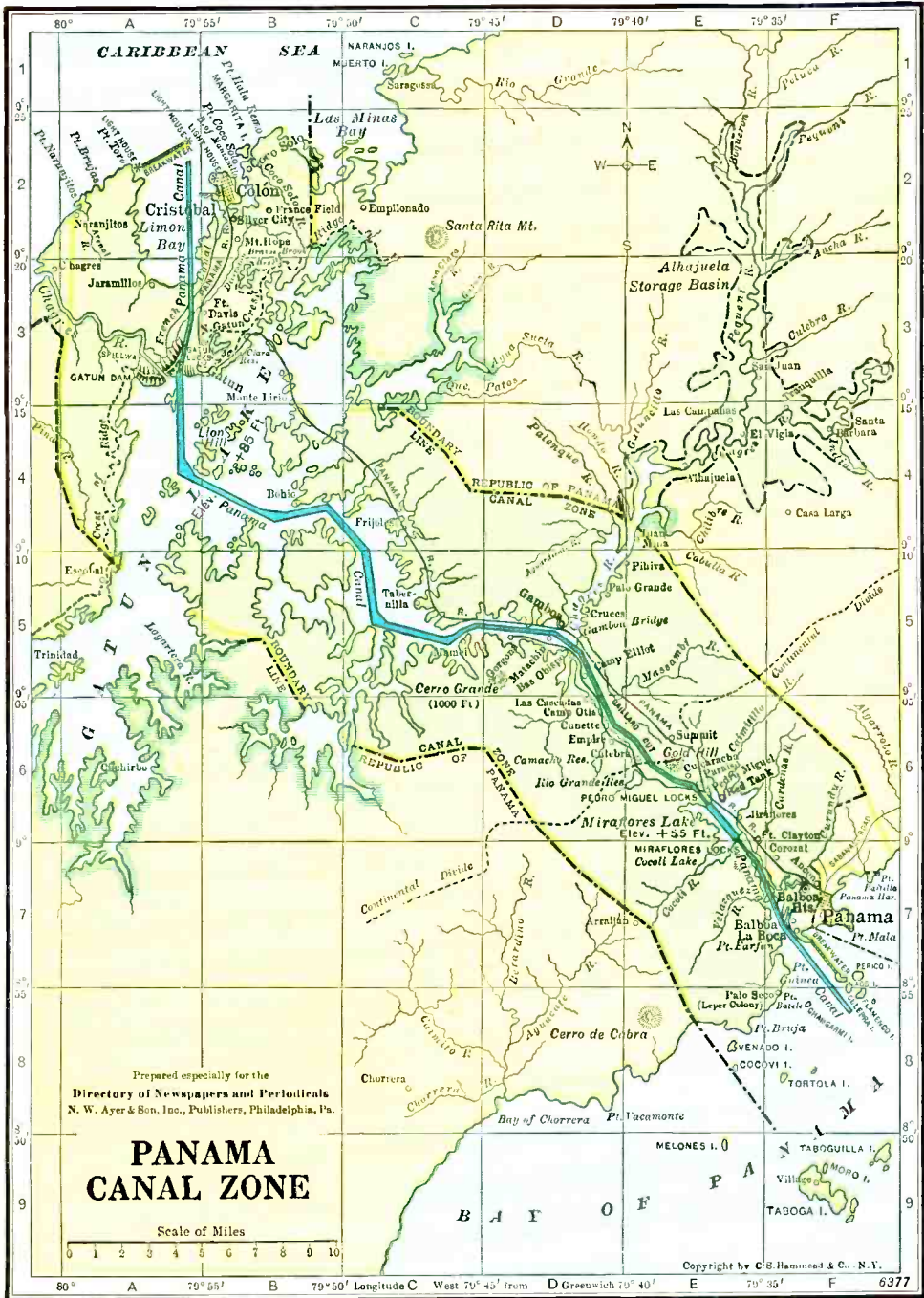

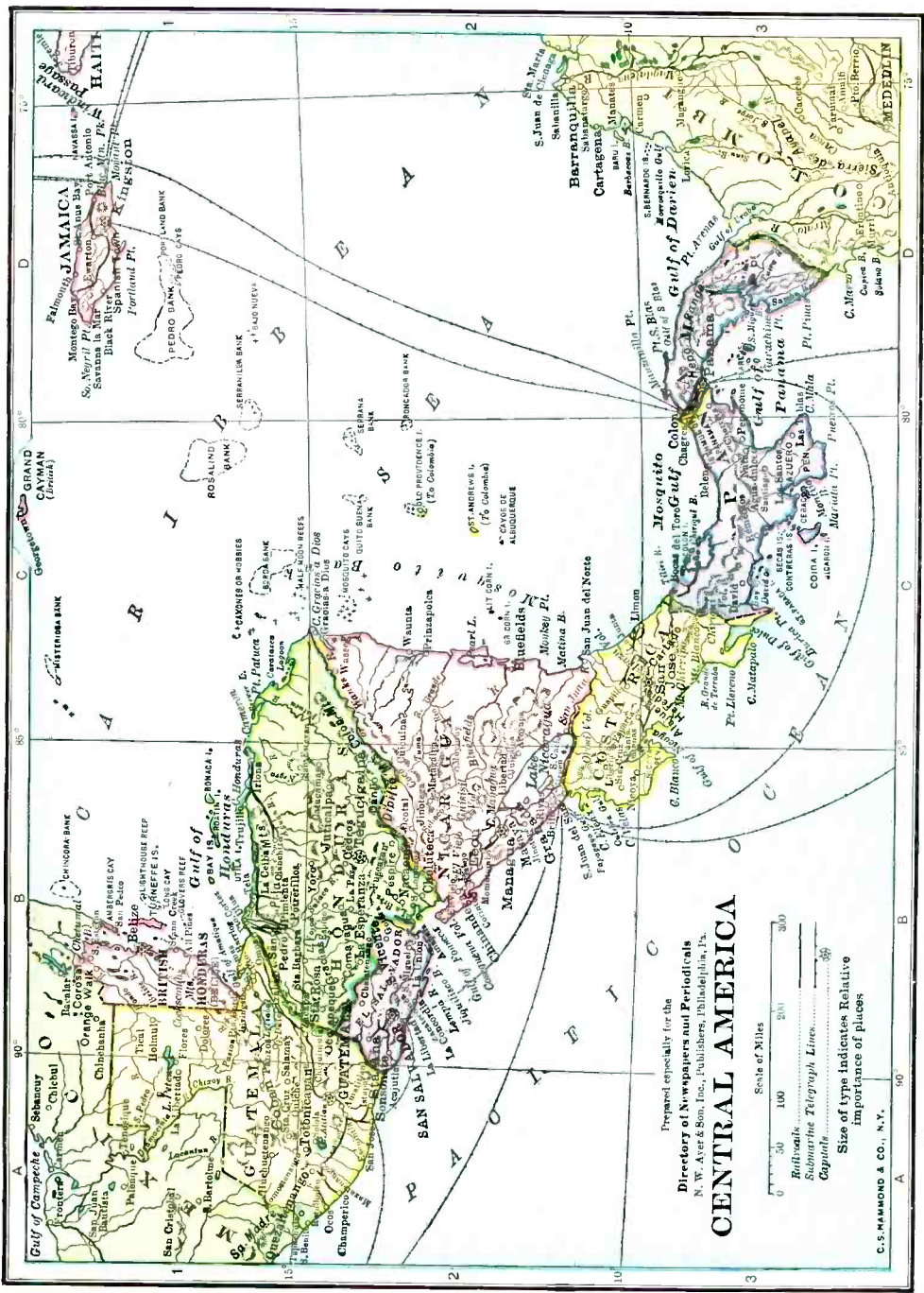

COLORADO

Population 1,062,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, DENVER

Colorado is bounded on the north by Nebraska and Wyoming, east by Nebraska and Kansas, south by Oklahoma and New Mexico, and west by Utah. Its length, from east to west, is 380 miles; breadth, 280 miles. The total land area is 103,658 square miles; rank in area (1930), seventh.

The state, justly famous for its scenery, is intersected near the center by the main range of the Rocky Mountains, known as the "Continental Divide," and includes its highest points, among them: Pike's, Long's, Mts. Torrey, Lincoln, Gray, Yale, Harvard and the Spanish Peaks. The mountains enclose wonderful valleys or basins known as parks, many of which are small; several nearly 2,000 square miles in area. These parks are well timbered, and abound with beautiful scenery, being diversified with low hills and ridges. All the great rivers which rise in the state have their sources in these hills. The average altitude of this state is over 6,800 feet above sea level, and the lowest altitude, along the Arkansas River, in Browsers county, is 3,350 feet. There are 120 peaks of over 13,500 feet altitude and forty towering to an altitude of 14,000 feet. In crossing the mountains the height reached by railroad is 10,856 feet. While in the European Alps but little arboreal growth is found at over 6,000 feet, and the line of perpetual snow is found between 9,000 and 10,000 feet, timber is found in many places in Colorado at a height of 11,000 feet, and the snow line in summer is about 14,000 feet. Wheat and oats have attained maturity at 7,000 to 8,000 feet, barley at over 10,000 feet and apples, pears, plums, cherries and small fruits between 7,000 and 8,000 feet. There are many mineral springs, some reputed to have medicinal value. Everywhere are unusual conformation and coloration. The eastern part of Colorado is an immense plain which was for many years devoted to cattle raising, but is now being rapidly developed into one of the finest agricultural districts in the country. The climate is warm in summer and cold in winter, but dry and healthful. It is especially attractive to persons desiring relief from tuberculosis. The Weather Bureau at Denver gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) at 50.0; highest on record, 105; lowest on record, —29. Total annual precipitation is 14.05 inches.

The state is amply supplied with railway facilities, and freight tonnage and tourist travel are heavy. The Moffat railroad tunnel, 32,150 feet long, under James Peak, completed in 1928, opened up an important territory west of the Continental Divide. The Dotsero cut-off, opened in 1934, shortens the Rio Grande line from Denver to Salt Lake City by 176 miles. The University of Colorado is located at Boulder, the Colorado School of Mines at Golden.

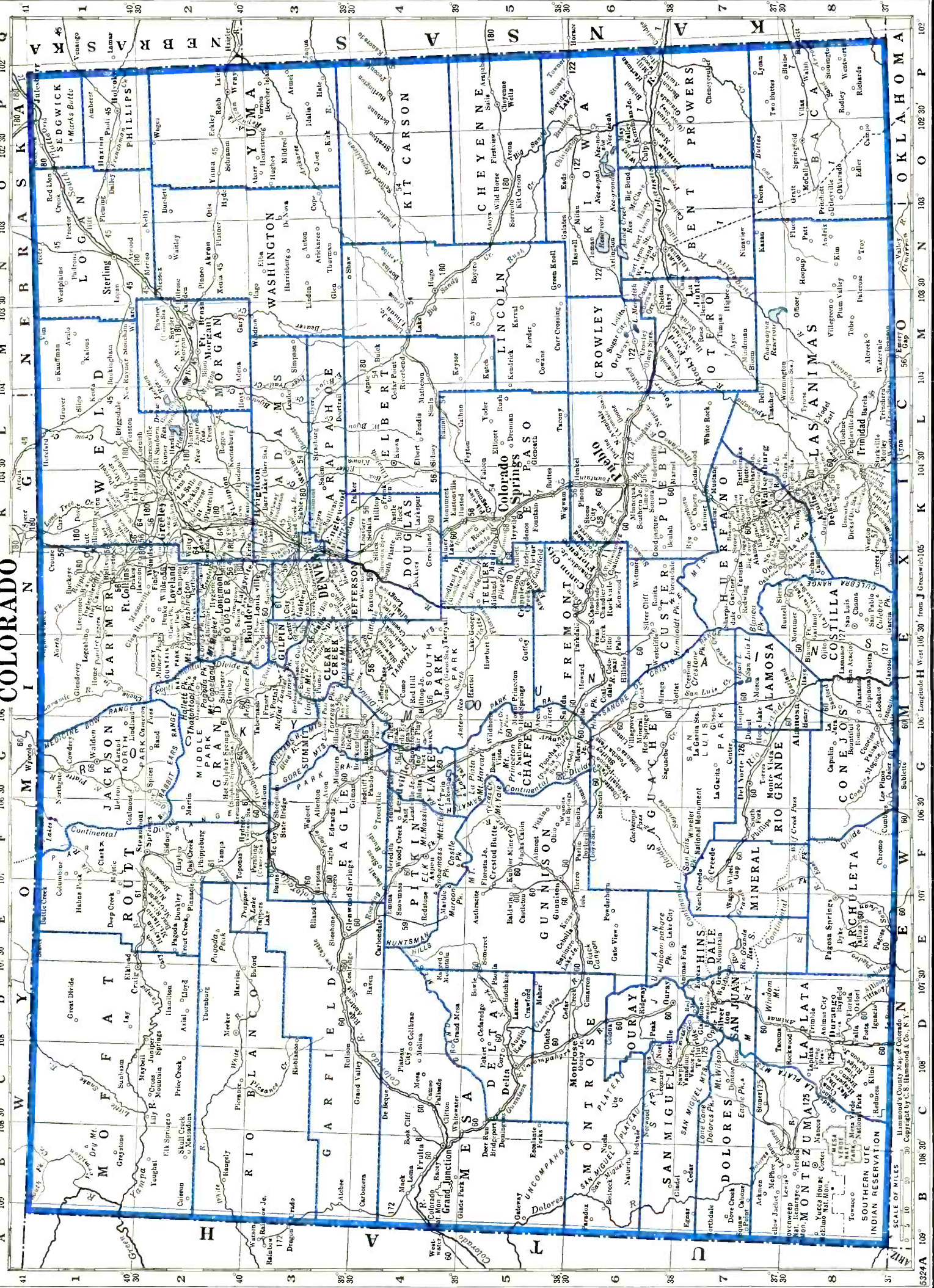

Population 1,717,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, HARTFORD

Connecticut is bounded on the north by Massachusetts, east by Rhode Island, south by Long Island Sound and west by New York. The average length from east to west is 86 miles; average breadth, 55 miles. The total land area is 4,820 square miles; rank in area (1930), forty-sixth.

The eastern part of the state has many ridges of low hills with fertile valleys. The Connecticut River valley, at a distance from the Sound, is very fertile. In the south the land is broken and the soil sandy, but when well fertilized yields good crops. The valleys of the Connecticut and Housatonic Rivers are immensely productive. In the west the surface is rough and the hills are abrupt, rising to an altitude of nearly 2,000 feet. The state has an unusual water supply for industrial uses. The climate is temperate but subject to sudden changes, yet the extremes of heat and cold are less than in the other New England States. The Weather Bureau at Hartford gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 49.7; highest on record, 101; lowest on record, -18. Total annual precipitation, 44.90 inches.

The State of Connecticut, and especially its capital city, Hartford, is noted for the extent and solidity of its insurance interests. There are hundreds of beautiful country homes of New York and other city people in the state, especially in the western part. The state has many fine educational institutions, including Yale University at New Haven, founded in 1701. The Connecticut River is open to navigation from its mouth to Hartford. The Thames River is likewise navigable by Sound steamers as far as its formation by the Yantic and Shetucket Rivers in Norwich City, and steamers ply regularly between that city and New York and in the summer season to the shore resorts. Shipping, except for coastwise water-borne traffic, is today relatively negligible.

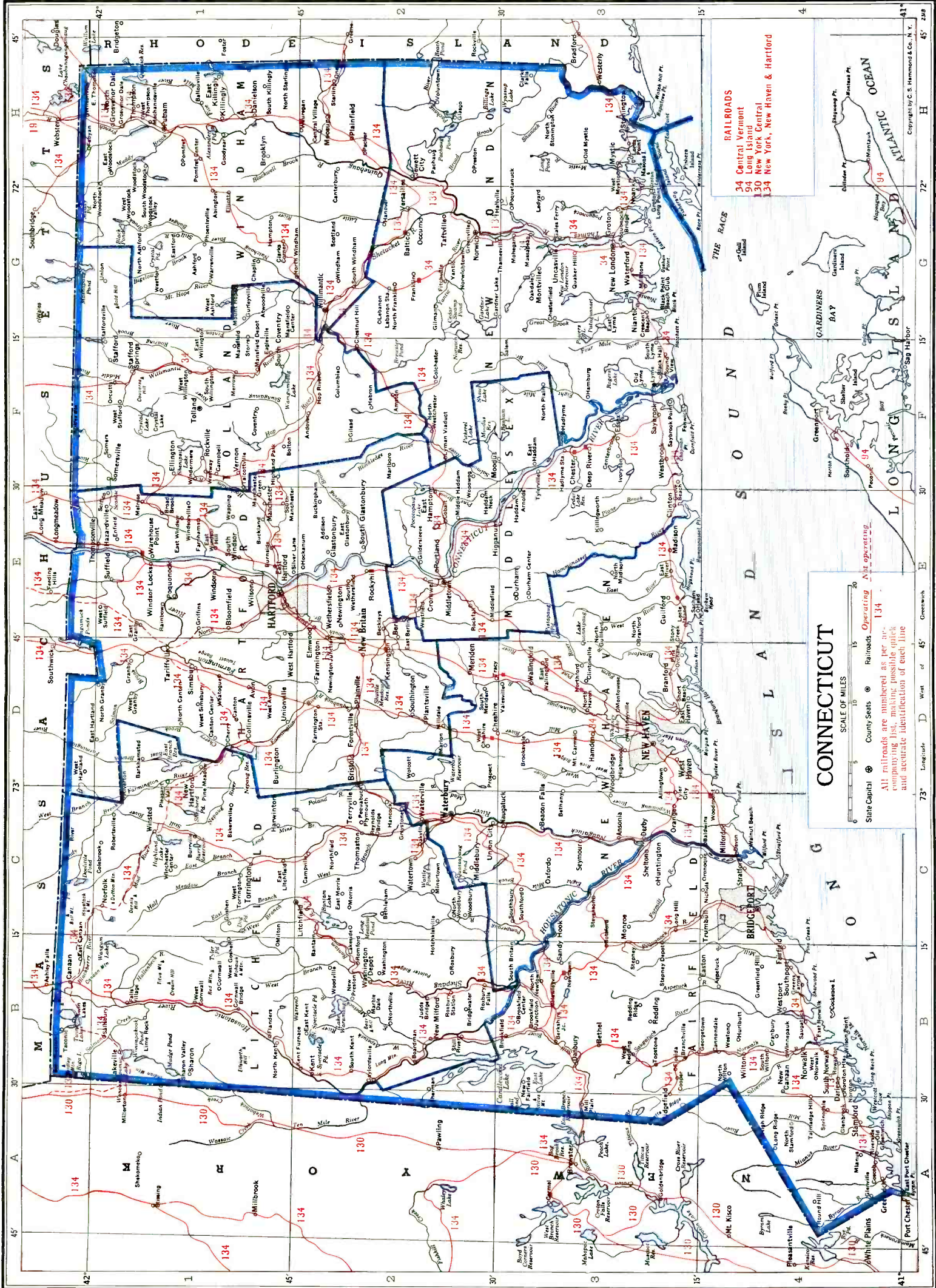

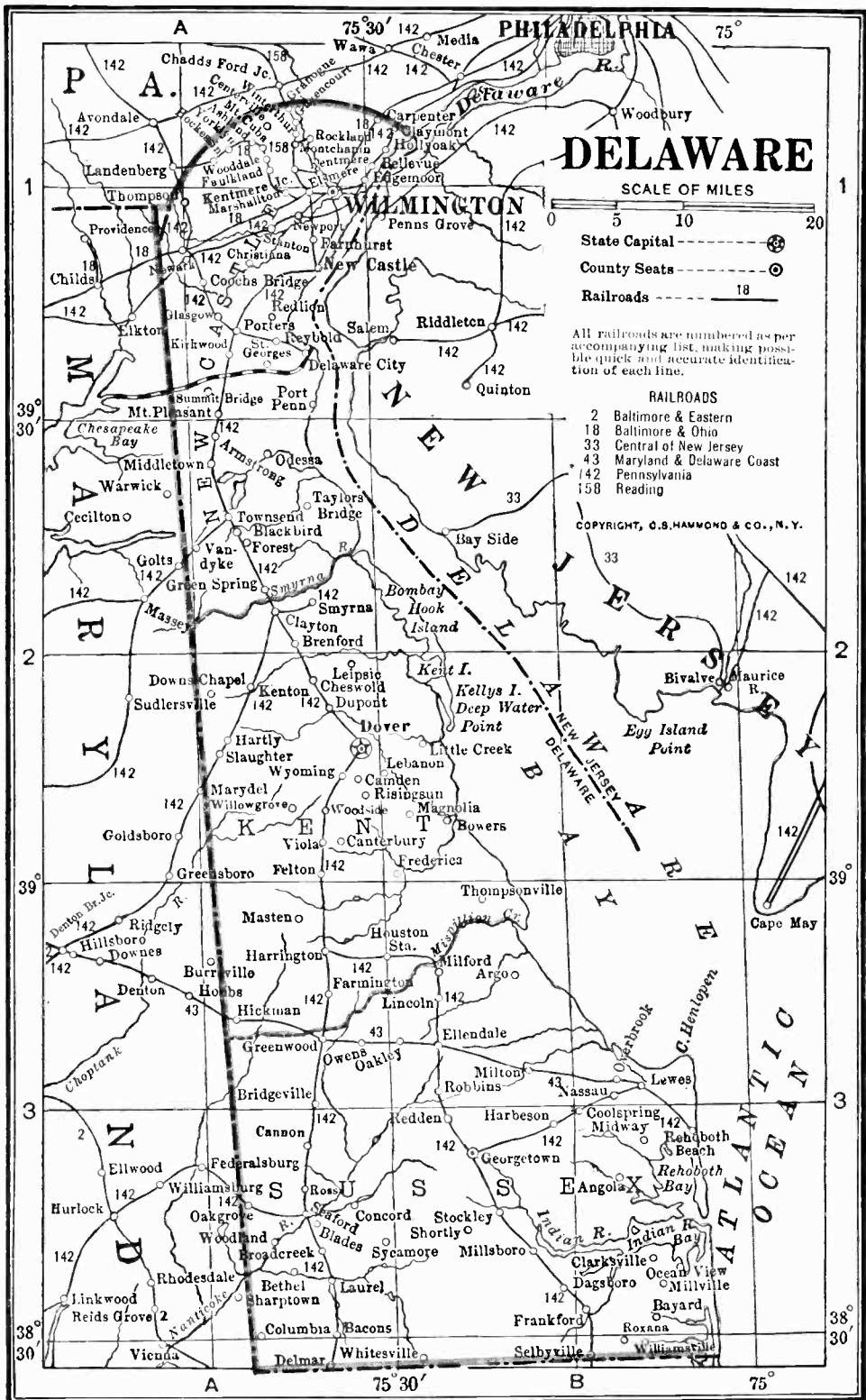

State Capital, DOVER

Delaware is bounded on the north by Pennsylvania, east by the Delaware River and Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, south by Maryland, and west by Maryland and Pennsylvania. Its length from north to south is 110 miles; its breadth varies from about 9 miles to 36 miles. The total land area is 1,965 square miles; rank in area (1930), forty-seventh.

The surface in the north is somewhat hilly, and southward the land is rolling, with fringes of marshes and swamp tracts along the indentations of Delaware Bay. The southern portion is a sandy region, but by skillful farming has been made highly productive. The soil of the interior is light and easily cultivated. The Weather Bureau at Wilmington gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) at 54.3; highest on record, 107; lowest, —12; total annual precipitation, 43.83 inches.

The manufacturing center of the state is Wilmington, a port on the Delaware River. It is close to the Delaware and Chesapeake Canal, a waterway which crosses the state and connects the two bays of the same names, greatly facilitating shipping between Philadelphia and Baltimore and other ports in Maryland and Virginia. Other harbors are Lewes and New Castle. The University of Delaware is located at Newark.

The District of Columbia, which is co-terminus with the city of Washington, is enclosed by the state of Maryland and is bounded on the west by the Potomac River, which separates it from the state of Virginia. Its land area is 62 square miles.

It is the seat of the Federal Government of the United States and most of its activities center around the departments of the Government. These divisions are housed in spacious and attractive buildings that give the city distinction, invite the inspection of an enormous number of visitors, and add to the beauty of a place which abounds in trees, flowers and natural scenery as well as charm of layout. Across the Potomac there are additional sights that draw the attention of those who visit the District: Arlington, the National Cemetery, and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, Mt. Vernon, and Alexandria, all rich in national and historical interest. Industrial activity is output for local consumption.

The Potomac, which flows into Chesapeake Bay, is navigable and wide and deep enough to accommodate large vessels. Washington is the chief railway stopping point en route between North and South. The Weather Bureau gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) of the city as 55.0; highest on record as 106; lowest, —15; total annual precipitation as 42.16 inches.

POPULATION

Rank, among the states, thirty-ninth. Of the 353,914 white persons listed in 1930, 29,932 were foreign born: 7,354 from the British Isles; Russians, 4,914; Italians, 4,330; Germans, 3,411. The Negro population was about 27.1%.

AGRICULTURE

The city of Washington, with Georgetown, covers about one-seventh of the area of the District. The remainder of the territory is occupied by suburbs, gardens and farms. In 1935 the census reported 89 farms averaging 31.5 acres. Owners operated 51 of these; colored farmers, 12. Attention was devoted chiefly to floriculture, truck growing and dairying.

MANUFACTURES

Exclusive of the extensive activities of the government offices there were in the District in 1935: 493 manufacturing establishments employing 8,917. Value of products, \$74,010,498. Leading industries: bread and other bakery products, \$5,160,086; printing and publishing (news-paper and periodical), \$3,930,608; sausage, meat puddings, etc., not made in meat-packing establishments, \$2,413,479; ice cream, \$1,538,170; printing and publishing (book, music, and job), \$1,371,543; concrete products, \$1,284,690.

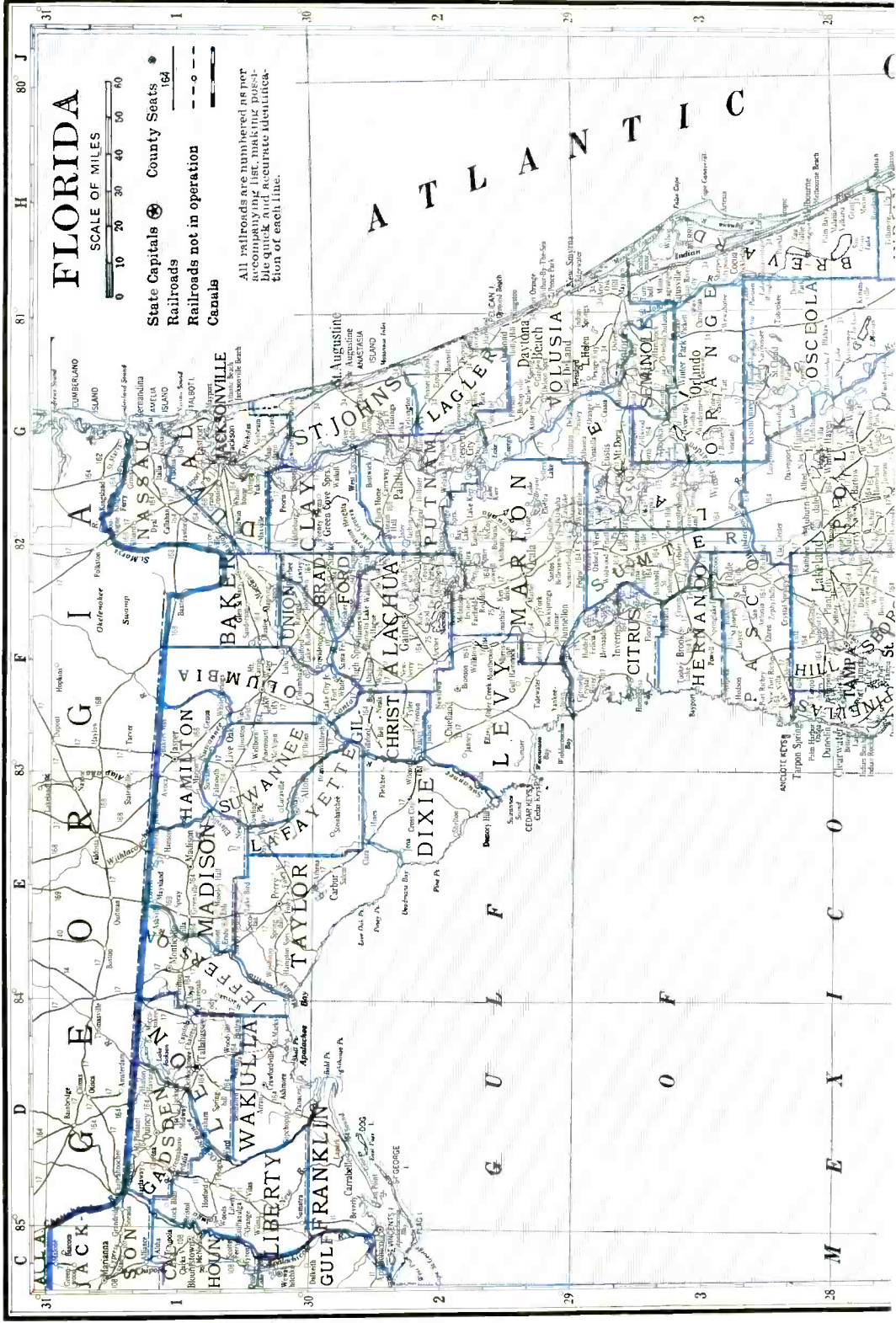

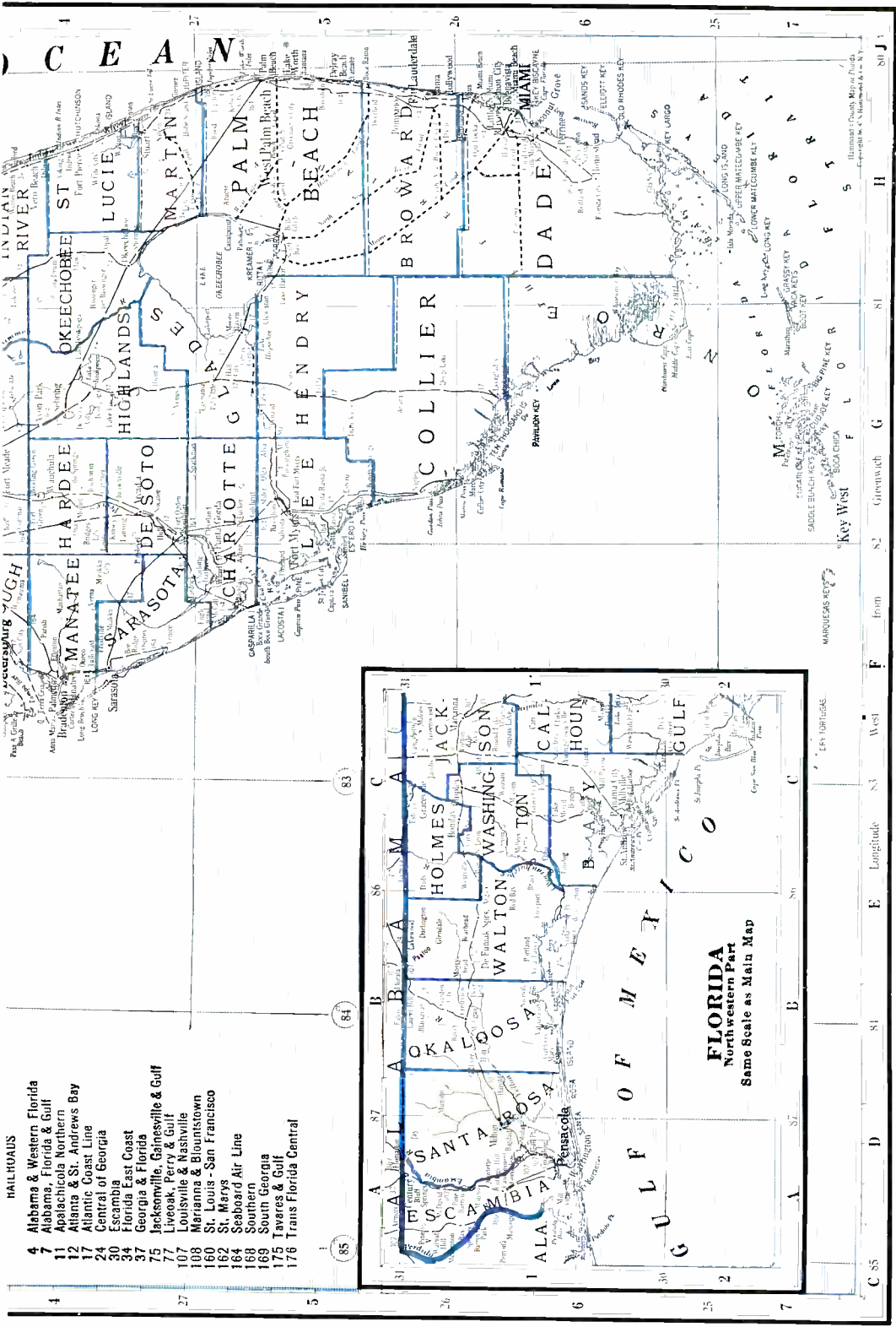

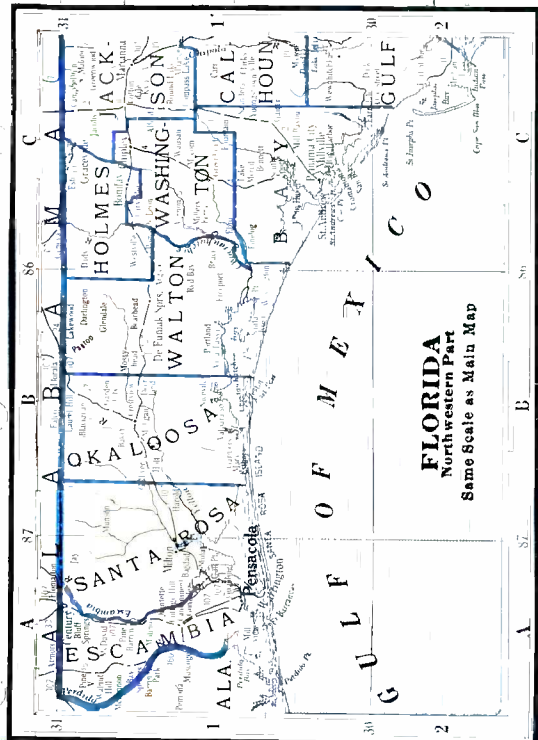

FLORIDA

Population 1,614,000 (U. S. Estimate, 1935)

State Capital, TALLAHASSEE

Florida is bounded on the north by Alabama and Georgia, east by the Atlantic Ocean, south and west by the Gulf of Mexico and Alabama. The peninsular portion of the state is about 375 miles long and has an average breadth of 90 miles. The upper portion is about 360 miles from east to west and 30 to 90 miles from north to south. The state's total land area is 54,861 square miles; its rank in area (1930), twenty-first. Its coast line is 3,751 miles.

The state is of coral formation and the surface is diversified with thousands of lakes, the largest, Lake Okeechobee, being about 40 miles long and 30 miles wide. The larger portion of that part of the peninsula south of Lake Okeechobee is occupied by the Everglades, an evergreen marsh or swamp about 55 miles wide and 150 miles long, that is covered with a dense growth of "saw grass" 8 to 10 feet high and so thick as to be practically impenetrable, except where it is intersected by winding channels. The state is draining the Everglades in which in 1934 the Federal Government established a tropical National Park. The district contains about 4,000,000 acres, a vast potential agricultural region, which will be of great value when it is made tillable. Pine lands cover an even vaster portion of the state's area, large forests of original and second growth pines that are studded at intervals with stretches of fertile soil called "hummocks." The interior offers a sandy region where citrus fruits have been developed highly.

There are no high elevations in the state, Iron Mountain being the highest point and only about 325 feet above the level of the sea. The Coast Line Canal connects Miami with Jacksonville and is 370 miles long. Several rivers flow through the state, chief of them the St. John.

Millions of tourists are attracted to Florida in winter and the revenue they bring the state is very large. It is estimated that in the 1934-35 season there were 1,750,000 visitors within its borders and that they spent about \$650,000,000. The climate, which attracts them, is semi-tropical but has temperatures that do not reach the extremes attained in some of the other states. The Weather Bureau at Miami gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 75.2; the highest degree on record as 96; the lowest, 27. The total annual precipitation is 55.66 inches.

The University of Florida is located at Gainesville. Saint Augustine, founded in 1565, is the oldest city of European origin in the United States.

Rank among the states, thirty-first. Urban population (1930), 51.7%. Of the 1,035,205 white persons, 59,057 are foreign born: 11,013 from the British Isles; Italians, 5,262; Germans, 5,464. The Negro population is 29.4%.

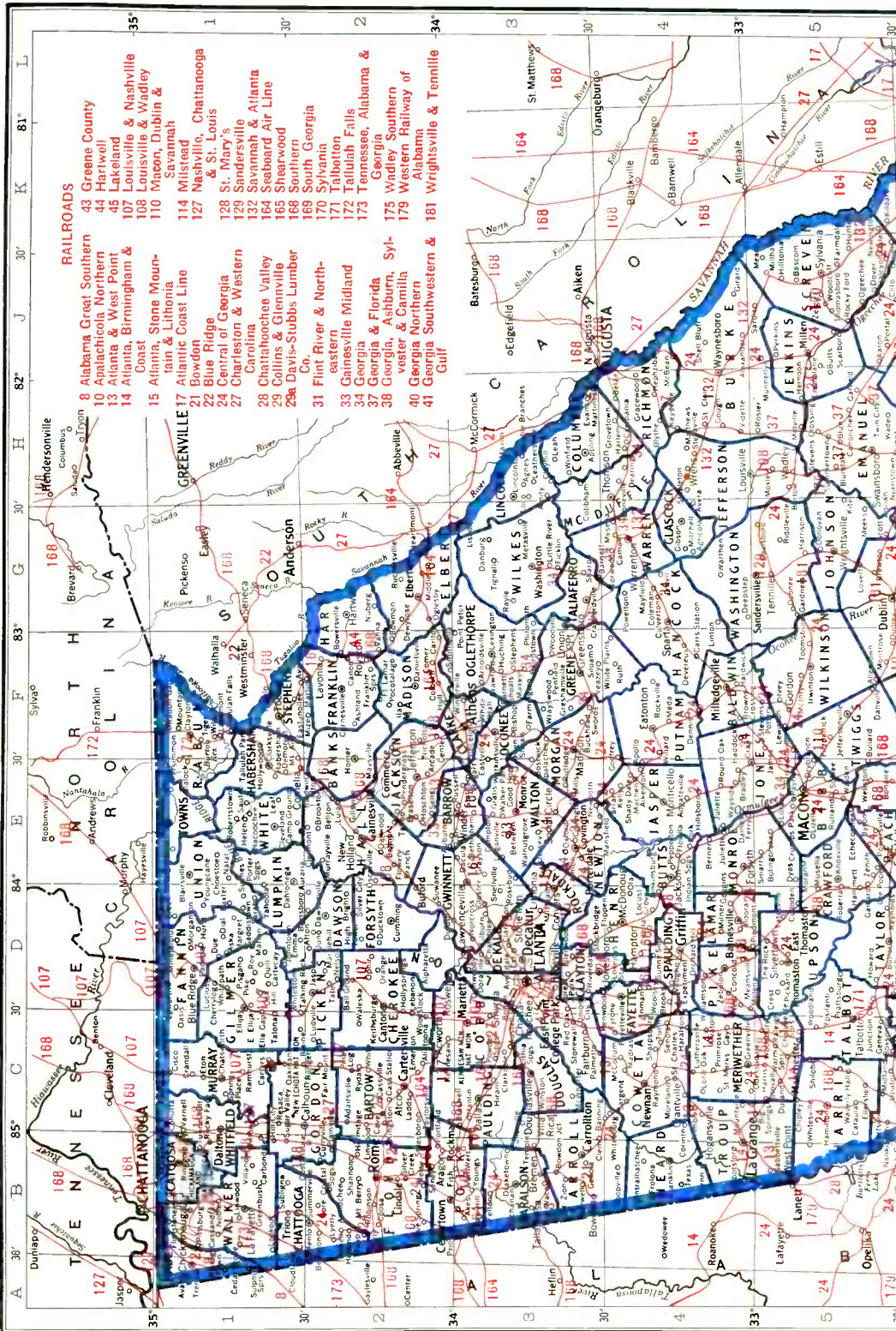

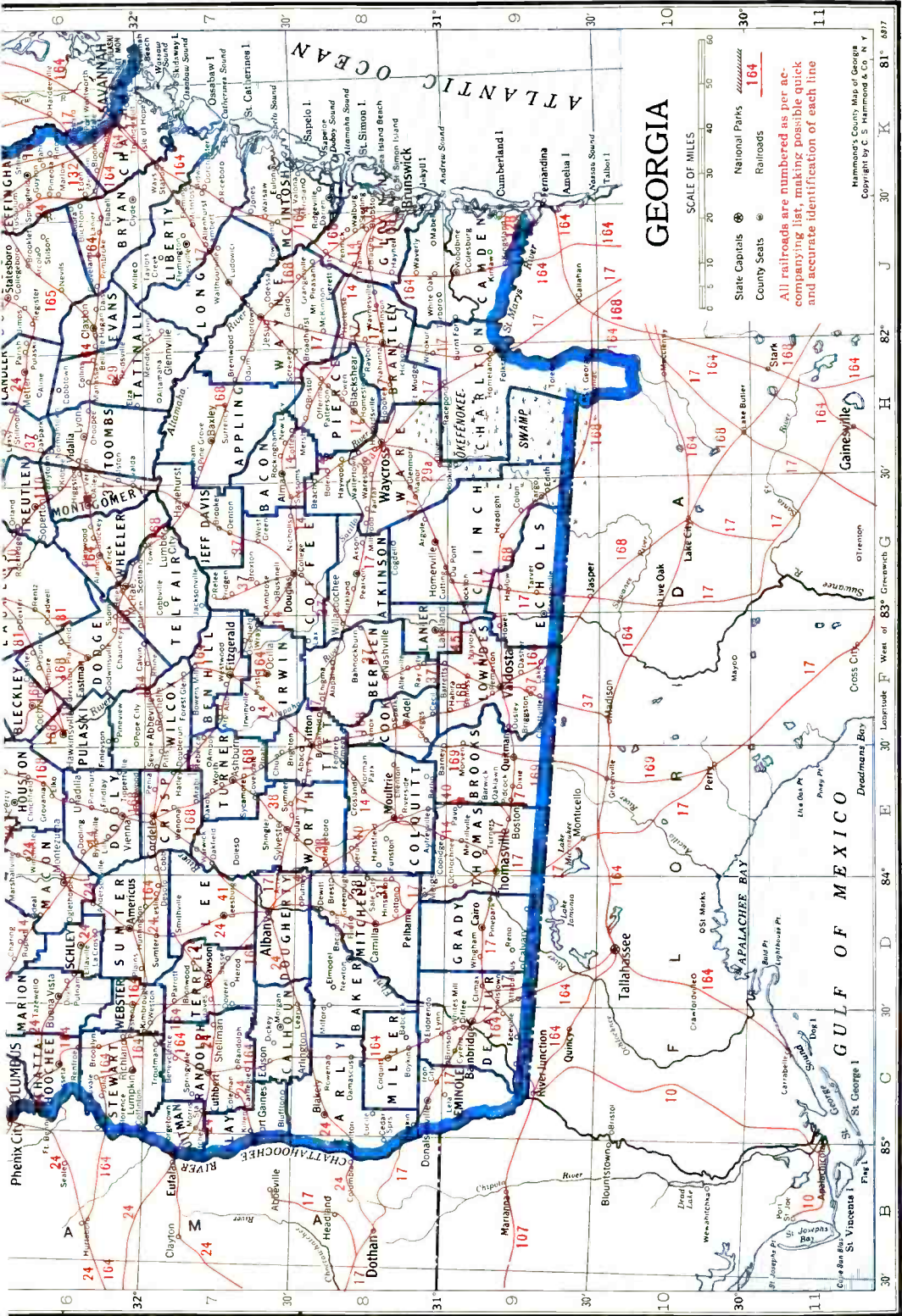

GEORGIA

Population 3,345,000 (U. S. Estimate, 1935)

State Capital, ATLANTA

Georgia is bounded on the north by Tennessee and North Carolina, northeast by South Carolina, southeast by the Atlantic Ocean, south by Florida, and west by Alabama. Extreme length from north to south is 320 miles, extreme breadth, 254 miles. Total land area is 58,725 square miles; rank in area (1930), twentieth.

The surface is varied. Along the coast it is intersected by numerous rivers and sounds; and the country for miles inland is a succession of ridges of pines and live oaks and swamps of cypress. The great Okefinokee swamp is in the southeast. Back from the coast is a stretch of sandy land, mostly pine barrens yielding quantities of timber and naval stores. A series of terraces bring the region in the middle of the state to about 575 feet above tidewater, from which elevation it rises toward the north more rapidly, until it becomes mountainous, being there crossed by spurs of the Appalachians. The Weather Bureau at Atlanta gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 61.2; highest on record, 103; lowest on record, —8. The total annual precipitation is 48.27 inches.

Savannah is one of the chief south Atlantic seaports and has an important foreign and domestic commerce. In 1935 the value of exports shipped from Savannah and Brunswick amounted to \$27,503,195. Atlanta is accounted one of the progressive cities of the South and nationally rates high in banking strength. There are numerous mineral springs in Georgia, of which the Indian Spring in Butts county and the Bowden Lithia, or Salt Spring, in Douglas county are among the best known. At Warm Springs there is a sanitarium for the treatment of sufferers from infantile paralysis. The University of Georgia, located at Athens, and the Georgia School of Technology, at Atlanta, are the largest institutions of higher education in the state.

POPULATION

Rank among the states, thirteenth. Rural population (1930), 69.2%. Of the 1,836,974 white persons, 13,917 are foreign born; 2,638 from the British Isles; Russians, 2,200; Germans, 1,682. The Negro population is about 37%.

Dairy products (1936): creamery butter, 1,914,000 lbs.; ice cream, 1,888,000 gallons; milk (1937), \$10,058,000.

HAWAII

Population 384,437 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

Territorial Capital, HONOLULU

The Hawaiian Islands are situated between 18° and 20° north latitude and 154° west longitude, in the North Pacific Ocean, 2,100 nautical miles from San Francisco. They are 20 in number, and nine of them are inhabited. Hawaii is the largest with an area of 4,015 square miles; the others vary in size from 728 to 2.7 square miles.

The Islands are mountainous and volcanic in origin. Mauna Kea (13,823 ft.), the highest peak, is dormant; Mauna Loa and Kilauea on Hawaii, the largest island, are both active. Covering the mountains are forests.

An abundant rainfall and the prevailing northeast trade winds make a climate, mild, equable and free from extremes. The Islands' beaches are popular and attract many tourists, as do the coral gardens, extinct volcanic craters and other items of scenic interest.

Honolulu, the capital, is located on the Island of Oahu. It is the chief city commercially and has a splendid harbor. The total number of overseas vessels arriving in Hawaii during 1936 was 1,227 with a gross tonnage of 10,623,529.

The Government maintains its largest army post with quarters for 30,000 men in Hawaii. The Navy has a large base at Pearl Harbor.

POPULATION

By islands the population in 1936 (estimated) was as follows: Oahu, 216,861; Hawaii, 77,833; Maui, 60,081; Kauai, 37,985; in 1930, Molokai, 5,032; Lanai, 2,356; Niihau, 136; Midway, 36. These figures do not include United States Army and Navy forces. The native population is gradually decreasing through intermarriage with other races. Besides Hawaiians there are: Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Portuguese, Spanish, Puerto Rican, American, Korean. American citizens over 21 numbered about 130,411.

AGRICULTURE

Luxuriant tropical vegetation clothes these Islands. The soil is very fertile, and all tropical fruits and vegetables are grown. In 1930, farms numbered 5,955, valued at \$11,780,432; contained 2,815,026 acres of which 440,579 were improved and 747,636 in woodland. White farmers numbered 663; Hawaiian, 510; Japanese, 4,191; Chinese, 335; all other races, about 250.

The chief agricultural products are sugar, pineapples, rice, coffee and vegetables. Sugar production is the chief industry of the Islands, 1,088,114 tons having been exported in the 1936 season with a valuation of \$76,155,268. The crop takes about 18 months to mature and only a part of it can be harvested each season.

The second largest industry is the growing and canning of pineapples, one of the canneries being the largest fruit preserving plant in the world. The 1936 outturn of 10,000,000 cases of pineapple and 3,500,000 cases of juice amounted to \$31,063,000.

The "tourist" industry takes third place. Vacation visitors numbered 22,199 in 1936 and their business netted nearly \$11,000,000.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

Almost all of the trade of Hawaii is with the United States. Imports in 1936 from the United States totaled \$85,000,000; while exports to the United States totaled \$112,000,000.

Imports from the United States in 1936 were principally: vegetable food products and beverages (grain and preparations, rice, beverages and fruit juices, fodders and feeds, vegetables and fruits, nuts), \$14,484,347; non-metallic minerals (petroleum products, gasoline, gas and fuel oil, glass and clay products, etc.), \$10,025,374; iron and steel manufactures, \$11,178,459; machinery and vehicles, \$11,739,729; animal and animal products (meat products, butter and cheese, canned milk, fish, boots and shoes, eggs, etc.), \$8,486,760; chemicals and related products (fertilizers, soap, paints, medicines, etc.), \$5,253,276; textiles, \$6,076,728; wood and paper manufactures, \$6,149,154; inedible vegetable products (tobacco products, rubber manufactures), \$4,819,196; books and printed matter, household and personal effects, musical instruments, athletic and sporting goods, motion picture films, toys, \$5,226,932.

Chief of the exports in 1936 with their valuations were: sugar, \$66,623,592; pineapples (fresh, canned, sirup, juice), \$42,156,803; coffee, \$638,760.

FISHERIES

The commercial catch of fishermen during the year 1933-34 was 13,605,765 pounds, valued at \$860,000.

FORESTS

The total area of lands in all the forest reserves on the five largest islands is 1,027,299 acres, and the total area of public lands (1935) is 1,588,430 acres. On 2,628 acres of Government land, 1,175,328 trees have been planted.

MISCELLANEOUS

Hawaii has 1,479 miles of good roads, those in Honolulu being of concrete surface. Automobile registrations totaled 50,070 in 1935. In 1935 the new highway to the summit of Haleakala on the island of Maui was dedicated. It provides a fine road to this 10,000-foot elevation which formerly could be reached only by horseback over a difficult trail. There are 374 miles of steam railroad. Transportation between the islands is carried on by a fleet of planes maintaining daily schedules. Regular air mail service is in operation between the United States, Japan, China and the Philippines. Number of post offices (1936-37), 93; gross postal receipts, \$1,158,050.43. Thirty-one commercial banks and trust companies with aggregate deposits of \$94,907,844 were operating in 1936. The University of Hawaii is located at Honolulu. There are 187 public schools with 2,814 teachers and 85,969 pupils. Private schools number 86 with an enrollment of 14,441. Number of telephones (1936), 19,137.

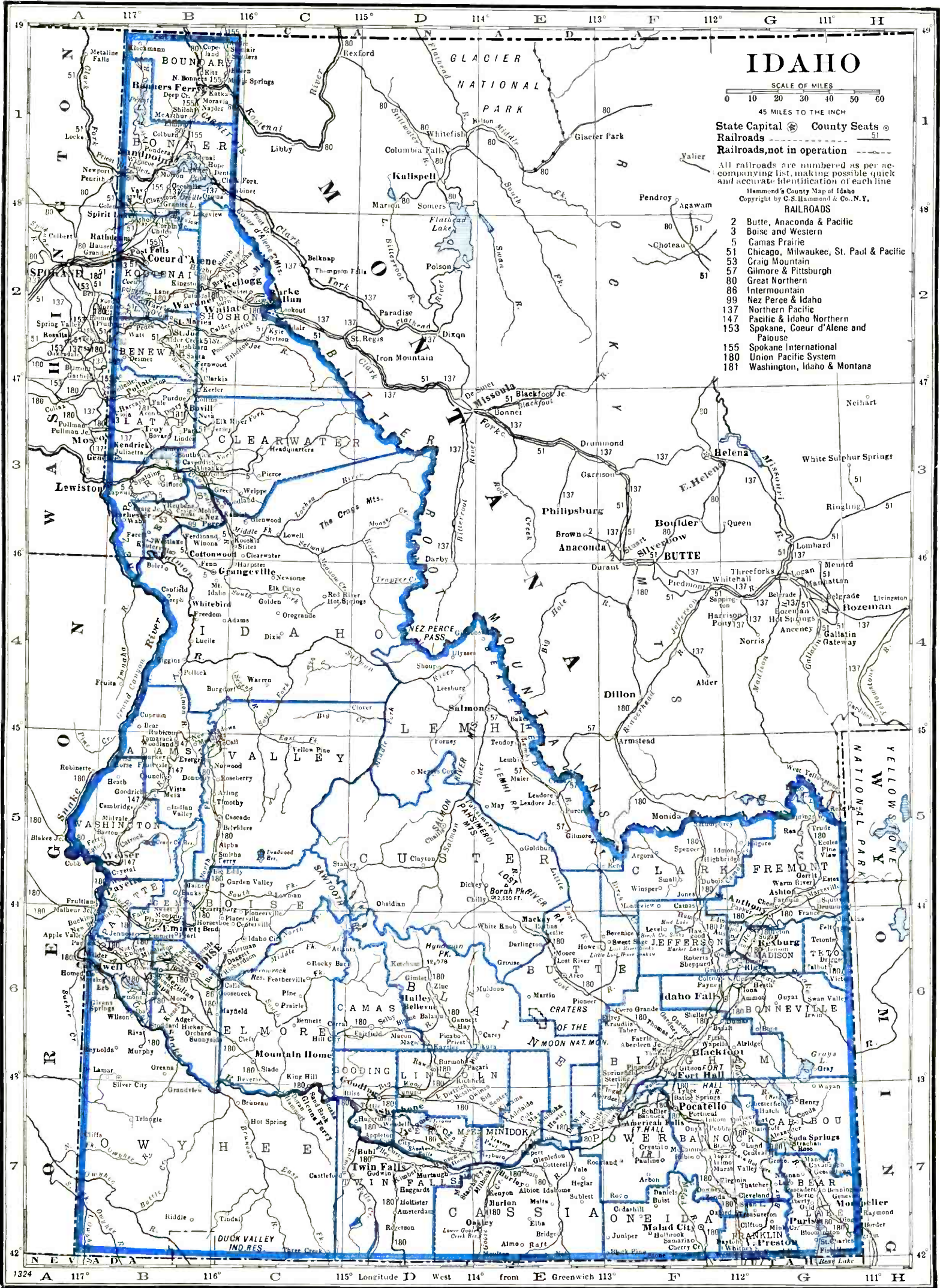

IDAHO

Population 479,000 (U. S. Estimate, 1935)

State Capital, BOISE

Idaho is bounded on the north by British Columbia, Canada, east by Montana and Wyoming, south by Utah and Nevada, and west by Oregon and Washington. Its length from north to south is about 480 miles, its width varies from 44 to 325 miles. The total land area is 83,888 square miles, and includes 47 square miles of Yellowstone Park; rank in area (1930), twelfth.

The state's surface is diversified, being mountainous in the northern and central portions and having arid plains in the south. Mt. Hyndman, 12,078 feet, in the Sawtooth Range, is the highest point in the state. In the southeast there is a volcanic region, abounding in geysers and saline springs. The Snake River, which abounds in falls, forms part of the state's western boundary and flows through the southern part. The Salmon River, a tributary, flows through a lengthy canyon that is filled with game. The state has large mineral resources, still largely undeveloped, and most of the plains lands yet to be reclaimed by irrigation. The climate is dry and healthful, warm in summer and cold in winter. The Weather Bureau at Boise gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 50.9; highest on record 121; lowest on record —28. Total annual precipitation is 13.10 inches.

The University of Idaho is located at Moscow. The volcanic field, 150 miles southwest of Yellowstone Park, called "Craters of the Moon," was set aside in 1924 as a national monument.

POPULATION

Rank among the states, forty-third. Rural population (1930), 70.9%. Of the 437,562 white persons, 30,454 are foreign born: 5,532 from the British Isles; Scandinavians, 8,015; Germans, 3,427. Indians number 3,638.

AGRICULTURE

Number of farms (1935), 45,113. An increase of 3,439 since 1930. Average acreage per farm, 220.6. Average value per farm, \$6,814. Value of land and buildings, \$307,395,329. Number of farms: 260 to 499 acres, 4,898; 175 to 259 acres, 3,289; 100 to 174 acres, 8,908; 50 to 99 acres, 9,703; 20 to 49 acres, 8,353; owner-operated farms, 31,858. Colored farmers, 770 farms.

Gross receipts from sale of crops (1937), \$52,475,000; live stock and live stock products, \$54,425,000.

Cash income from chief crops (1937): all wheat, \$16,800,000 rank, twelfth; potatoes, \$14,800,000, rank, fourth; dry beans, \$4,675,000, rank, third; sugar beets and beet sugar, \$3,675,000, rank, sixth; all hay, \$2,950,000, rank, eleventh; apples, \$2,675,000, rank, eleventh; clover seed, \$2,025,000, rank, second; alfalfa seed, \$1,375,000, rank, first. Other important crops are barley, all corn.

Farm animals (on farms, 1937): all cattle and calves, \$25,573,000, rank, twenty-eighth; sheep and lambs, \$14,922,000, rank, seventh; horses and colts, \$12,904,000, rank, twenty-third; swine and pigs, \$3,274,000, rank, twenty-seventh.

Poultry and eggs (1937): chickens, \$960,000, rank, thirty-ninth; eggs, \$2,008,000, rank, thirty-eighth.

Dairy products (1936): creamery butter, 29,491,000 lbs.; American cheese, 7,666,000 lbs.; other cheeses, 2,705,000 lbs.; condensed and evaporated and dried milk, 28,021,000 lbs.; milk (1937), \$13,036,000.

FORESTS

Total commercial forest area (1930), 17,464,000 acres. Lumber production (1936): 191 mills producing 723,804 M feet b. m.; lath, 53,919,000; shingles, 25,009 squares. Principal woods: white pine, ponderosa pine, Douglas fir. (For value see lumber and timber products under Manufactures.)

ILLINOIS

Population 7,817,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, SPRINGFIELD

Illinois is bounded on the north by Wisconsin, northeast by Lake Michigan, east by Indiana, southeast and south by Kentucky, and west by Missouri and Iowa. Its extreme length north to south is 385 miles; extreme breadth 218 miles. Its total land area is 56,043 square miles; rank in area (1930), twenty-third.

The surface is mostly level table-land, inclining gently toward the south, with bluffs along the principal rivers. A small tract in the northwest, around Galena, is somewhat broken, and a low mountain ridge extends across the southern end from Grand Tower, on the Mississippi River, to Shawneetown, on the Ohio, about 850 feet above sea level. The prairies are sometimes level, but generally undulating. With the exception of Iowa, no other state has so large a portion of land susceptible to cultivation. There are over 275 streams in the state grouped into two river systems, one having the Mississippi as outlet, the other tributary to the Ohio River. The most important river is the Illinois which crosses the north central and western parts of the state draining 24,726 square miles. The Chicago Drainage Canal is an important and unique artificial waterway supplying drainage and transportation. The climate is noted for its extremes of heat and cold. The Weather Bureau at Chicago gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 49.1; highest on record, 103; lowest on record, —23. Total annual precipitation is 32.86 inches.

Chicago, the country's second largest city in population, is the leading grain center of the country. Its total receipts of corn, oats, rye and barley are greater than any other city. It is the center of immense business activity in live stock, slaughtering and meat packing, printing and publishing, steel works and rolling-mill products, and a prodigious number of industries, and is the greatest railroad center in the world. Illinois is remarkably well supplied with transportation facilities by rail, river and lake, and is one of the leading states in export trade. Of its many institutions of higher education, the largest are the University of Chicago, the University of Illinois, located at Urbana, and Northwestern University, at Evanston.

POPULATION

Rank among the states, third. Urban population (1930), 73.9%. Of the 7,266,361 white persons, 1,218,158 are foreign born: 146,063 from the British Isles; Germans, 190,605; Polish, 173,007; Scandinavians, 160,217; Russians, 87,026. The Negro population is 4.3%.

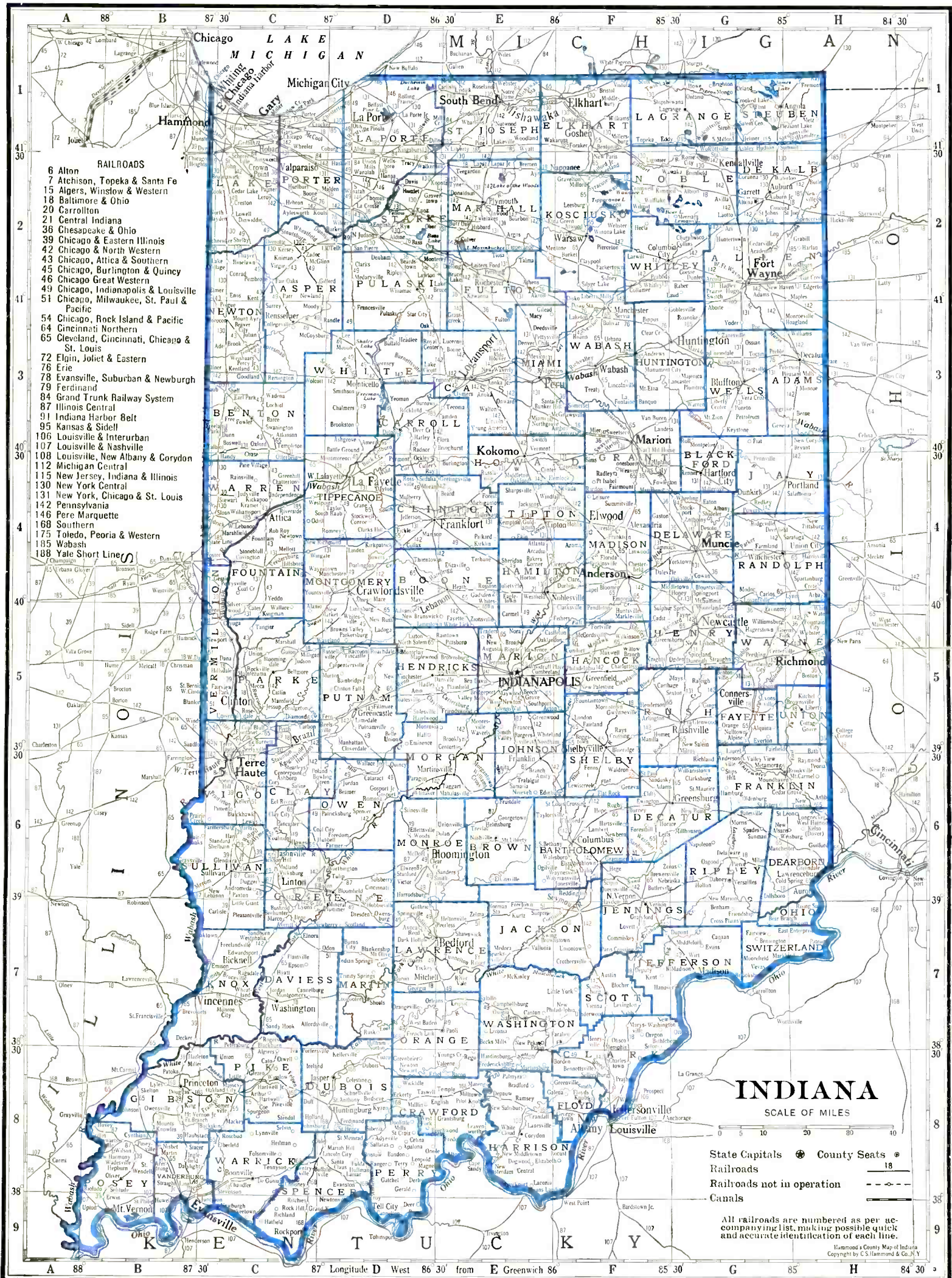

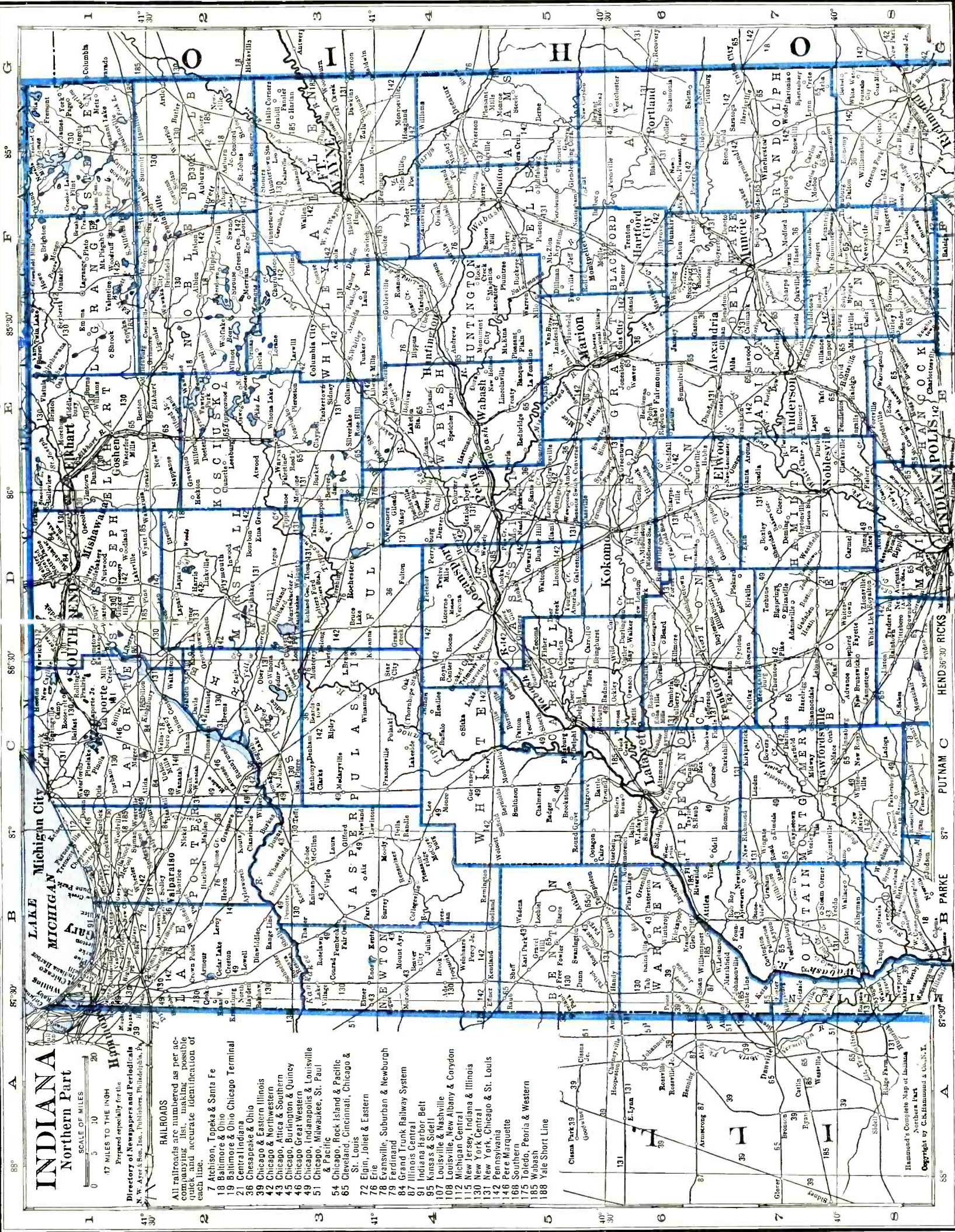

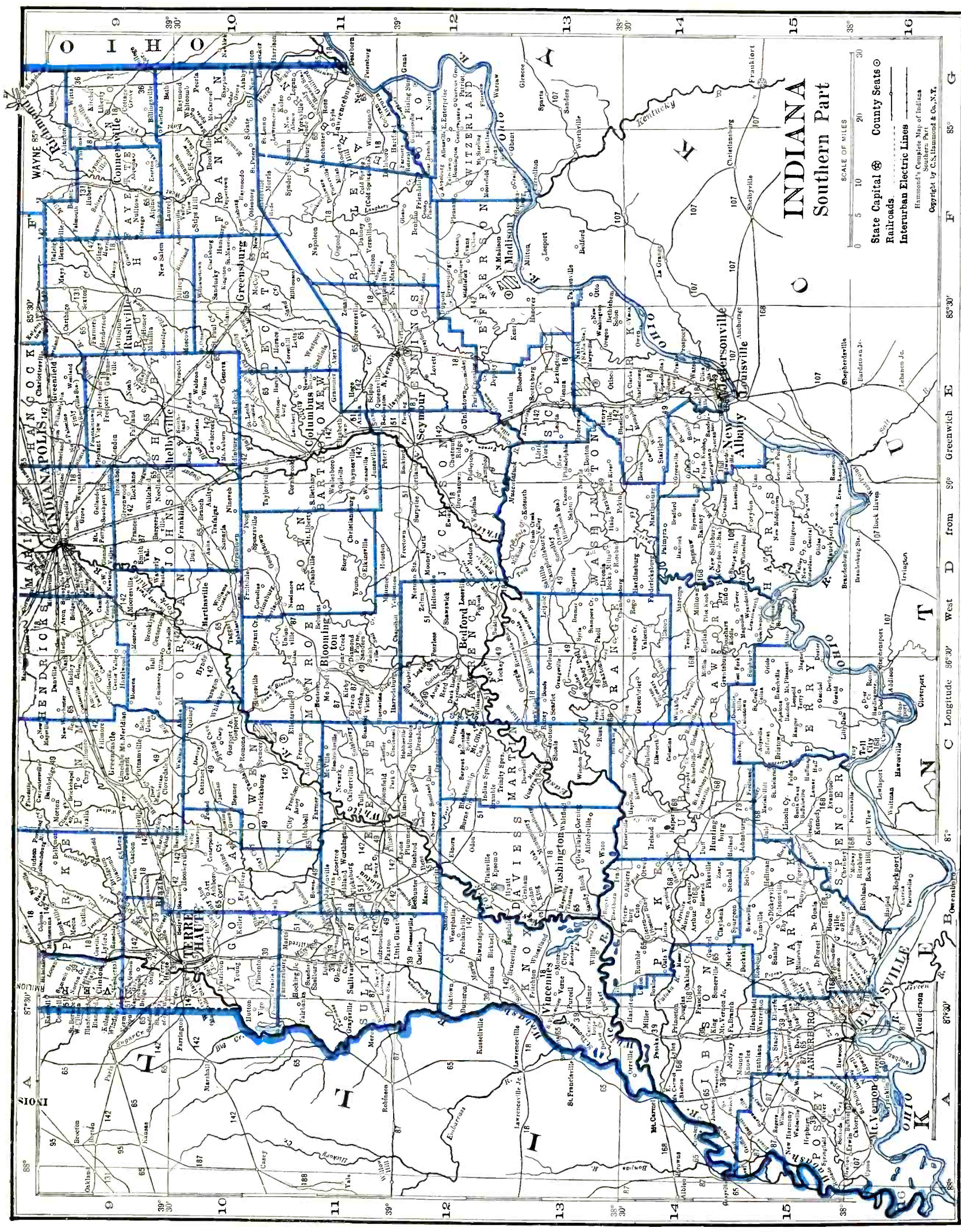

State Capital, INDIANAPOLIS

Indiana is bounded on the north by Michigan and Lake Michigan, east by Ohio, south by Kentucky, from which it is separated by the Ohio River, and west by Illinois. Its extreme length north and south is 276 miles; its average breadth 140 miles. The total land area is 36,045 square miles; the rank in area (1930), thirty-seventh.

The greater part of the surface is undulating prairie land, with sand-hills in the north, and picturesque rocky hills, some 500 feet high, in the south along the Ohio River. In the northern part of the state are numerous lakes, and in the limestone regions of the south are many caves. Mineral springs are found throughout the south and south central parts. The Ohio and White Water River valleys are of sandstone and limestone formation. The soil for the greater part of the state is a loose calcareous loam of considerable depth. The Weather Bureau at Indianapolis gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 52.7; highest on record 106; lowest on record —25. Total annual precipitation is 39.90 inches.

Indiana is exceedingly well supplied with transportation facilities, for it lies directly in the path of almost all of the great railway trunk lines, which have branches extending into all parts of the State; and fully half of its borders, or about 600 miles, are on navigable waters. Enormous tonnage enters and leaves the Lake Michigan ports also. Electric interurban transportation is the heaviest in the country. Evansville, on the Ohio River, is a large hardwood market; Indianapolis the largest city. The University of Indiana, located at Bloomington; Purdue University, at Lafayette; Notre Dame, at South Bend; De Pauw University, at Greencastle, are notable among the state's institutions of higher education.

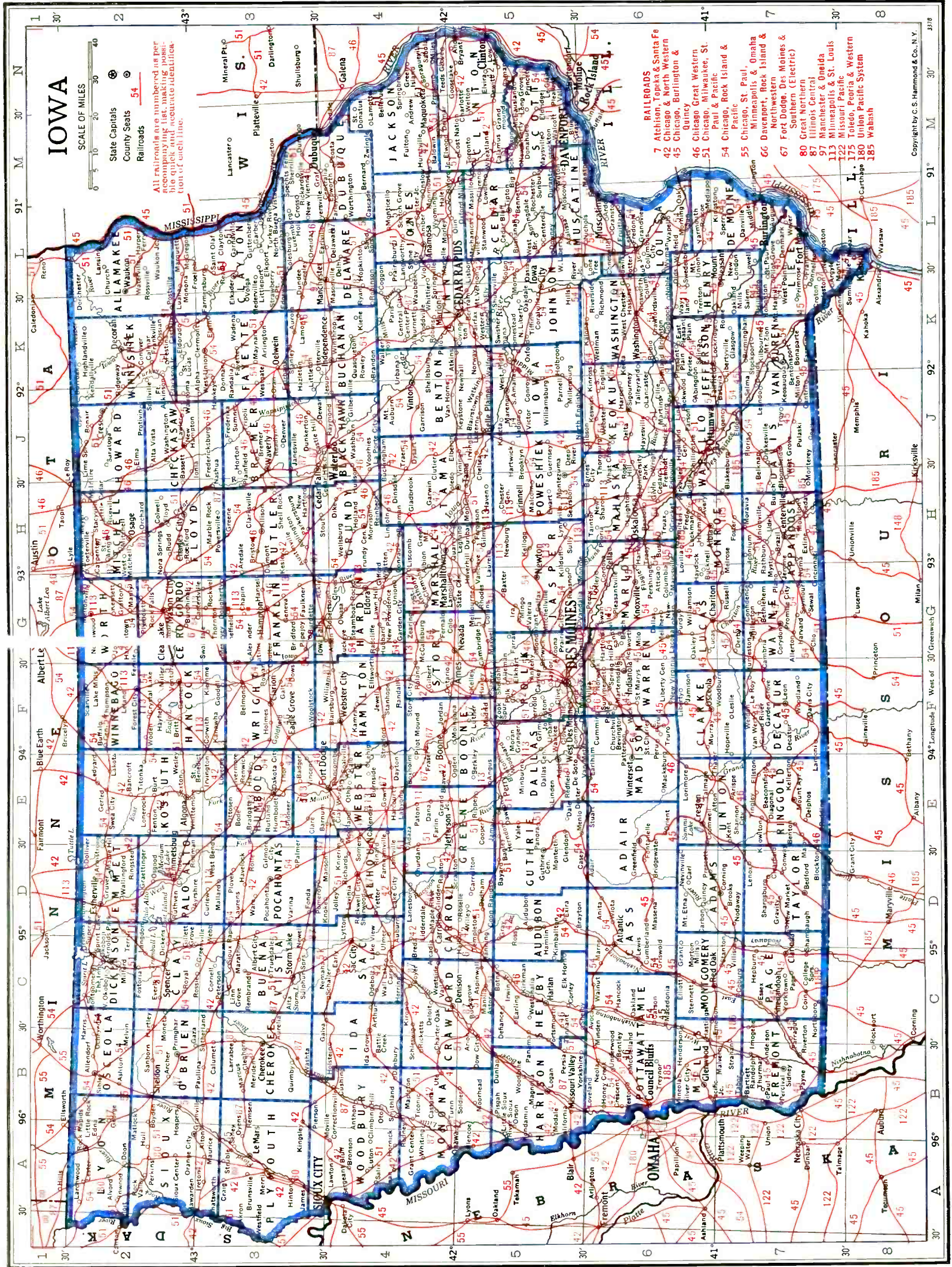

Population 2,534,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, DES MOINES

Iowa is bounded on the north by Minnesota, east by the Mississippi River which separates it from Wisconsin and Illinois, south by Missouri and west by the Missouri and Little Sioux Rivers which separate it from Nebraska and South Dakota. Its extreme length from east to west is 300 miles; its breadth 208 miles; total land area 55,586 square miles; rank in area (1930), twenty-fourth.

The distinguishing feature of Iowa is its fertile prairies. Nearly all parts of the state are gently rolling, without mountains or very high hills, but with frequent bluffs along the streams. In richness of soil and in the percentage of land subject to cultivation it is probably unsurpassed by any other state. The valleys of the Red Cedar, Iowa and Des Moines Rivers are particularly productive. Transportation is highly developed with numerous railways and a large volume of traffic on the Mississippi and Missouri. The climate is one of extremes of heat and cold, and of dry winters and wet summers. The Weather Bureau at Des Moines gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) at 49.5; highest degree on record 110; lowest —30; total annual precipitation, 32.04 inches.

Along educational lines Iowa is one of the country's leading states. Some of its many colleges are: The University of Iowa, located at Iowa City; Iowa State Teachers' College, at Cedar Falls. The College of Agriculture at Ames is noted in its field, being recognized especially for its scientific investigation and original research.

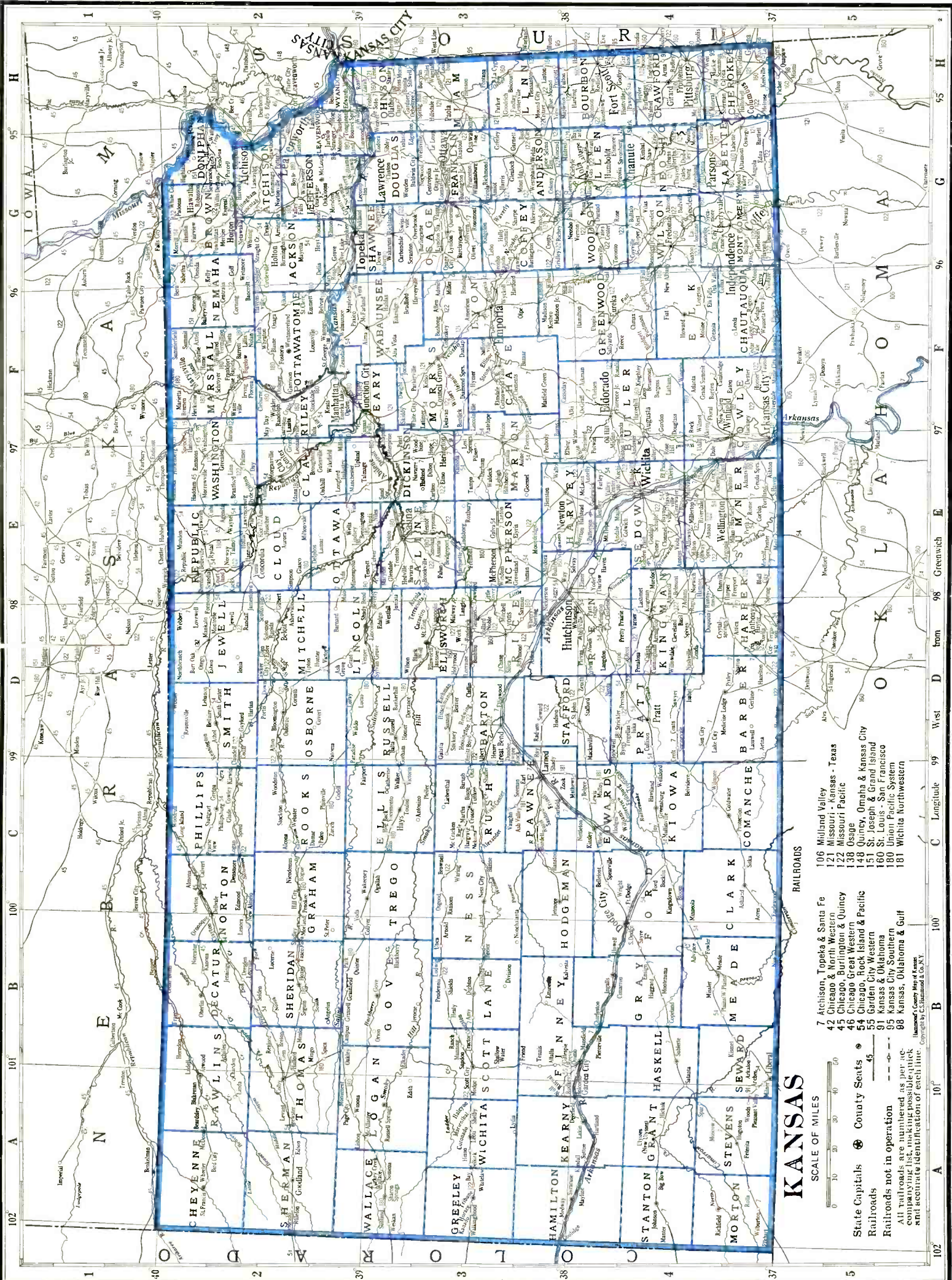

KANSAS

Population 1,848,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, TOPEKA

Kansas is bounded on the north by Nebraska, east by Missouri, south by Oklahoma, and west by Colorado and is in almost the exact geographical center of the United States. Its length from east to west is 410 miles, and from north to south, 207 miles. Its total area is 82,158 square miles; rank in area (1930), thirteenth.

The surface is chiefly undulating in the east, while the western part has a rolling and varied surface. Until recently this was considered fit only for stock raising, but irrigation in some districts has made possible the cultivation of several thousands of acres. There are no mountains, very few lakes, and those small and shallow; no marshes, but salt marshes, and these are valuable. The bottom and table-lands are chiefly a rich black loam, and highly productive. When the state was settled, only five per cent of the area was forest, and this was distributed mainly along streams and in occasional groves and small tracts; but it is estimated that the area of forest trees has since doubled by voluntary growth, transplanting, and by seed. Much hardwood and black walnut is obtainable. The climate is warm in summer and severe in winter. The extremes are constantly modified by the winds. The Weather Bureau at Dodge City gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 54.3; highest on record, 108; lowest on record, -26. Total annual precipitation is 20.51 inches.

The live stock market, and meat-packing industry, at Kansas City, Kansas, is the second largest in the world, being exceeded only by that of Chicago, Illinois. In normal times, Kansas is one of the greatest cattle producing states in the Union, and nearly half the cattle received at its stockyards come from the state. There are four large colleges, besides numerous smaller ones. The University of Kansas is located at Lawrence; the State College of Agriculture at Manhattan.

State Capital, FRANKFORT

Kentucky is bounded on the north by Ohio and Indiana, northwest by Illinois, east by West Virginia and Virginia, south by Tennessee and west by Missouri. Its greatest length from east to west is 350 miles; greatest breadth, 178 miles; land area, 40,181 square miles; rank in area (1930), thirty-sixth.

The Appalachian Mountains cross the eastern end of the state and many hills dot the rich and fertile tablelands. Northwest of this section, and in the center of the state, is the famous and productive blue grass region, with a gently undulating upland surface and deep valleys at the rivers. Between the Green and Cumberland Rivers the surface is level and known as the "Barrens," from the scarcity of heavy timber. The western part is generally level, with slight undulations. The soil of the whole state is remarkably fertile; that part between Lexington and the Ohio River is known as the "Garden of Kentucky." More than 800 miles of Kentucky soil borders on the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers, and there are other navigable rivers in the state. The Weather Bureau at Louisville gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 57.0; highest on record, 107; lowest on record, —20. Total annual precipitation is 43.26 inches.

Kentucky has long been famed for its horses, its thoroughbreds being excelled nowhere. It is especially noted, too, for its underground passages and caves. Most celebrated of these is Mammoth Cave, which has about 150 miles of connecting passages. Through state appropriation and private subscription, it is now to be a National Park.

The largest of the state's many institutions of higher education is The University of Kentucky. It is located at Lexington.

SCALE OF MILES

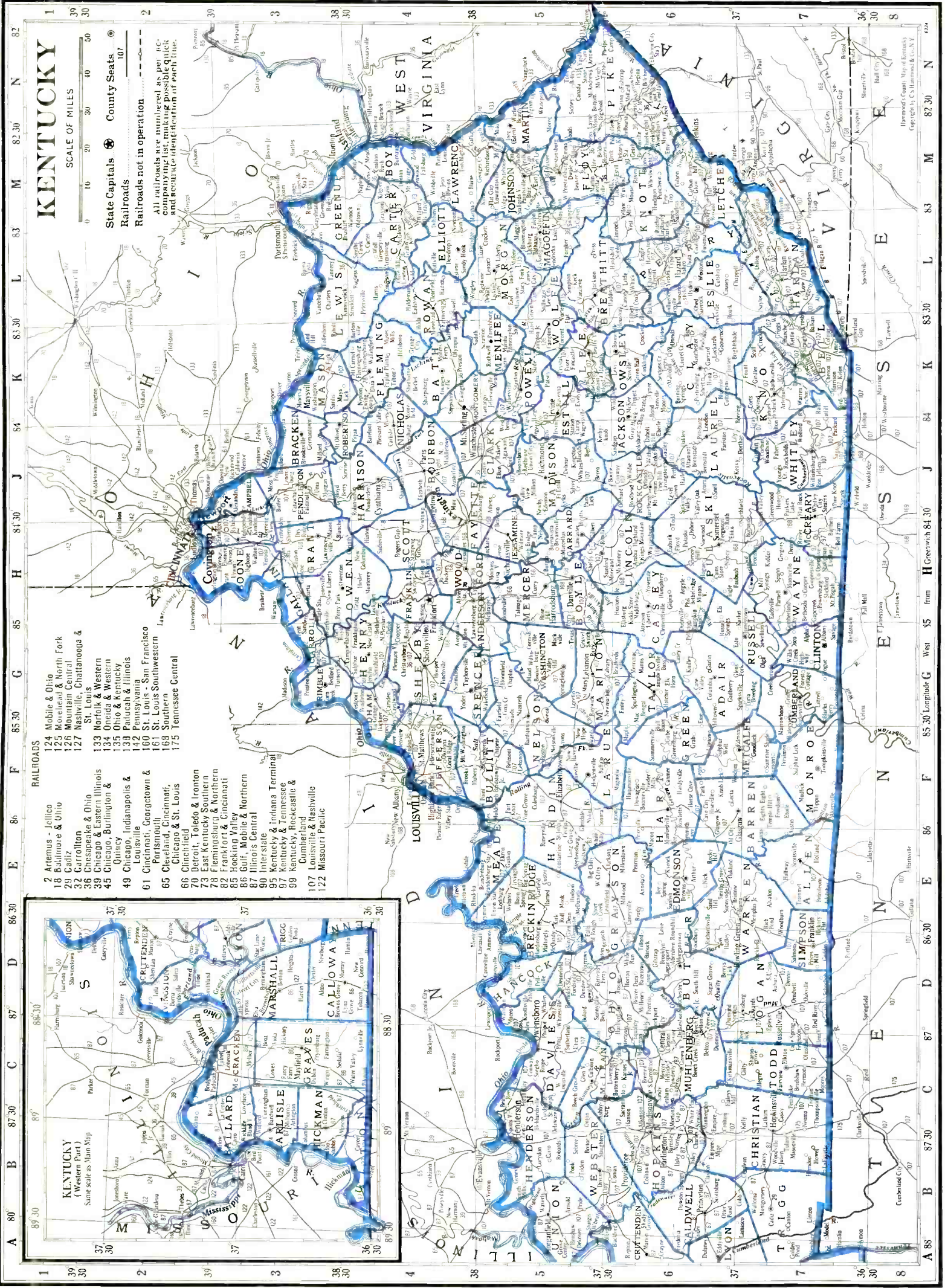
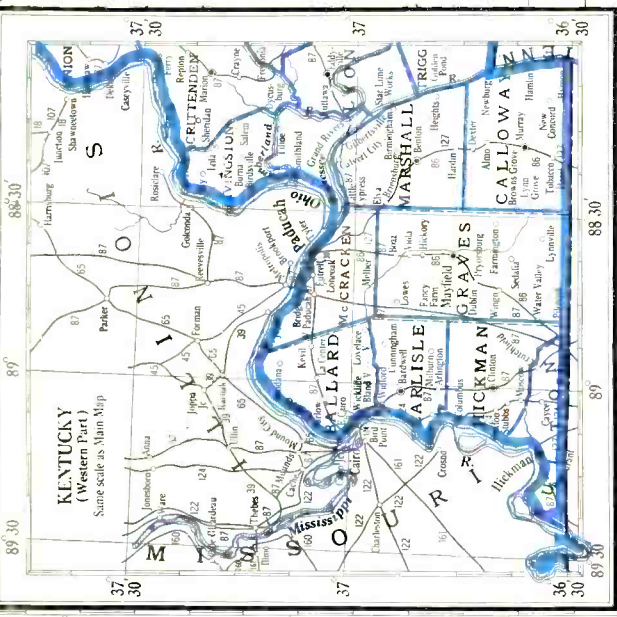

State Capital, BATON ROUGE

Louisiana is bounded on the north by Arkansas and Mississippi, east by Mississippi and the Gulf of Mexico, south by the Gulf of Mexico, and west by Texas. Its extreme length from east to west is about 300 miles; breadth, 240 miles; total land area, 45,409 square miles; rank in area (1930), thirtieth.

The surface is generally low and level. There are low hills in the north and northwest, from which the land slopes gradually to the Mississippi and the Gulf. Much of the land along the river is below the water level during the spring freshets, and is protected from overflow by levees, which are built on both banks below Baton Rouge, and on the west bank, throughout the state. Many of the principal rivers and bayous are protected in like manner so that but a small portion of the land is subject to overflow. The soil of the river bottoms is exceedingly fertile and is almost entirely silt brought down by the Mississippi River. It yields large crops of cotton, sugar cane and rice. The prairies are productive and afford good pasture in places. The hilly section yields good cotton crops, but about half is covered with pine barrens. The climate is semi-tropical, very warm and moist in summer with little cold weather in winter. The Weather Bureau at New Orleans gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 69.3; highest on record, 102; lowest on record, 7. Total annual precipitation is 57.46 inches.

On account of the great extent of navigable waters, of which the state has 4,800 miles, and the network of railroads penetrating every part of the state, the products of Louisiana's fields, mines, factories and fisheries are readily and rapidly moved, and none of the state's resources need be neglected for lack of transportation facilities. New Orleans is the leading city and an important port. This city is famous as a winter resort and has many historical attractions as well as picturesqueness. Largest of the state's institutions of higher education is Tulane University, located at New Orleans. Louisiana State University is located at Baton Rouge, the Capital.

POPULATION

Rank among the states, twenty-second. Rural population (1930), 60.3%. Of the 1,318,160 white persons, 34,910 are foreign born: 3,217 from the British Isles; Italians, 13,526; Germans, 3,616. Much of the population retains the original French blood, and considerable numbers retain the mixture of French and Spanish which produced the Creoles. Negro population is about 37%.

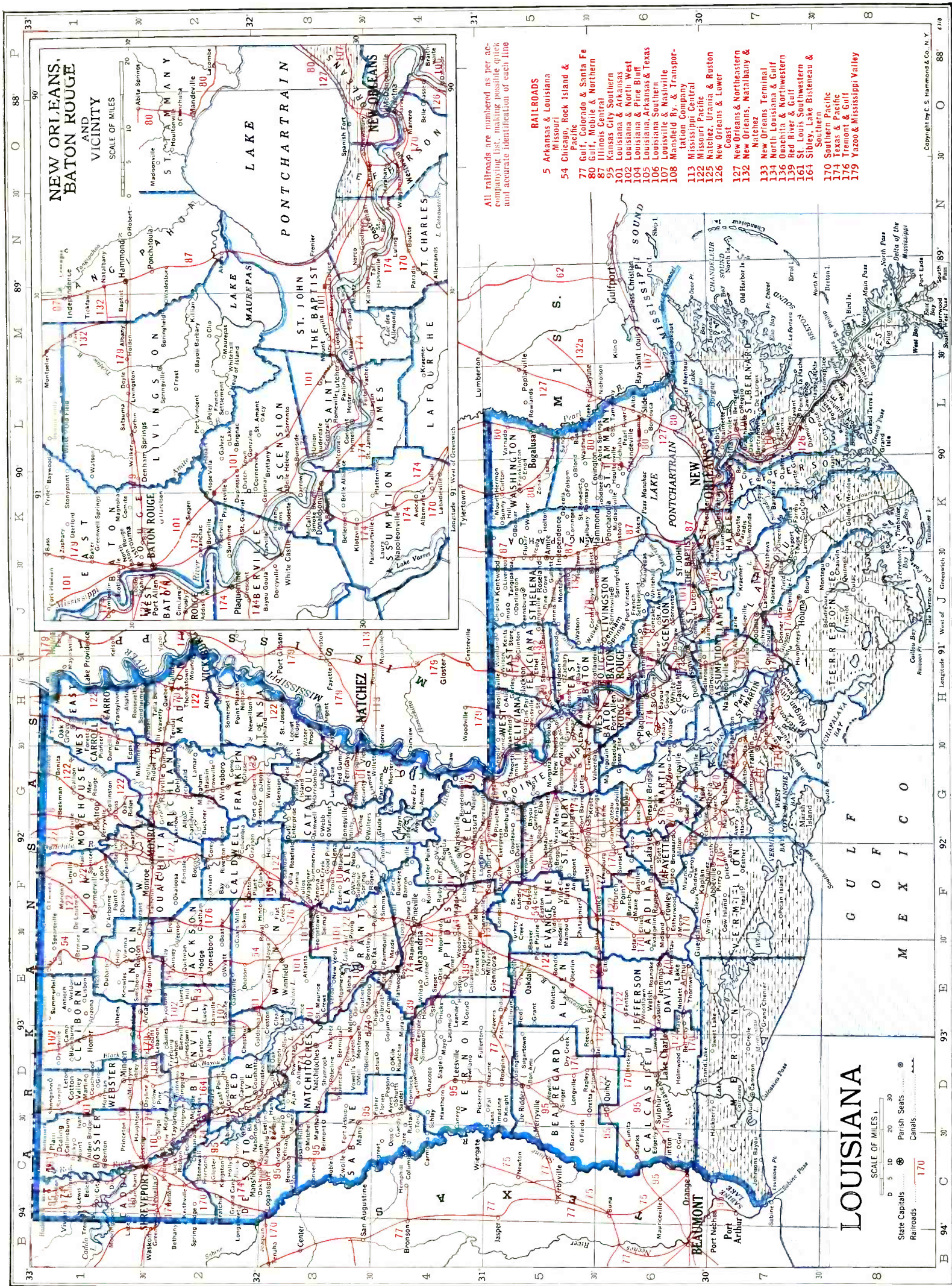

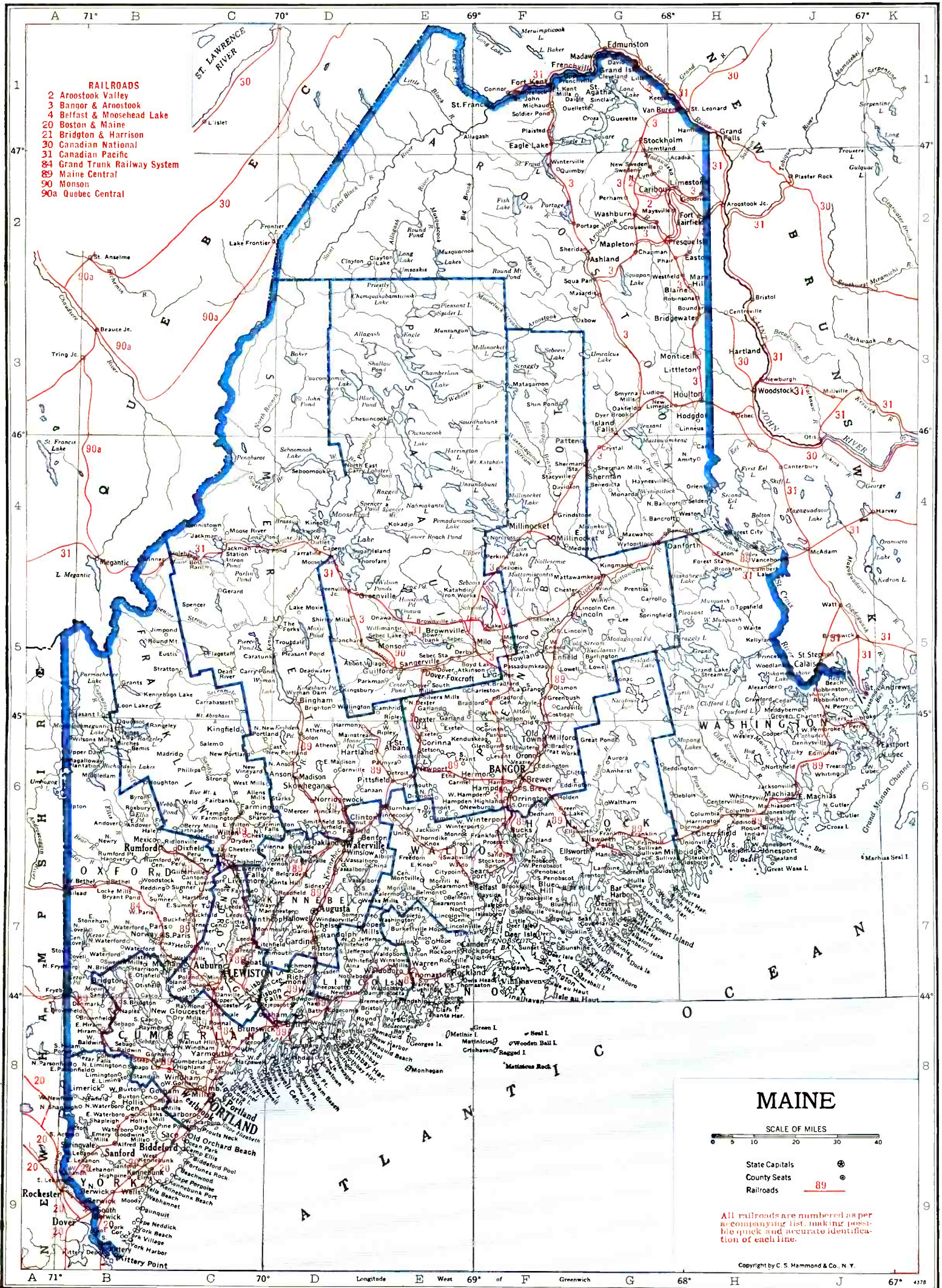

Population 845,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, AUGUSTA

Maine, the most northeasterly state in the Union, is bounded on the north by Quebec and New Brunswick, Canada, east by New Brunswick, south by the Atlantic Ocean, and west by New Hampshire and Quebec. Its extreme length is 301 miles; its width varies greatly because of the many shore indentations. The total land area is 29,895 square miles; rank in area (1930), thirty-eighth.

The northern part is mainly a wilderness of forest land with coniferous trees and mountainous elevation, thinly peopled, except in the fertile tracts of Aroostook county. In the northeast, on the St. John River, are several French Canadian settlements. The southern part is varied, the surface seldom much broken. It has tracts of great fertility, and others, especially in the south-east, that are only moderately productive. The climate is cold in winter; mild in summer. The Weather Bureau at Portland gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 45.5; highest degree on record, 103; lowest, —21. Total annual precipitation is 41.94 inches.

Maine is a fishing, hunting and summer resort of great popularity. Luxurious hotels accommodate its many visitors, as do private lodges and summer homes. Portland, the chief port, has a large steamer tourist traffic in addition to its extensive trade in freight. The state has about 1,300 wooded islands. On one of them, Mt. Desert, are Acadia National Park, and a notable summer colony. The University of Maine, the largest institution of higher education in the state, is located at Orono.

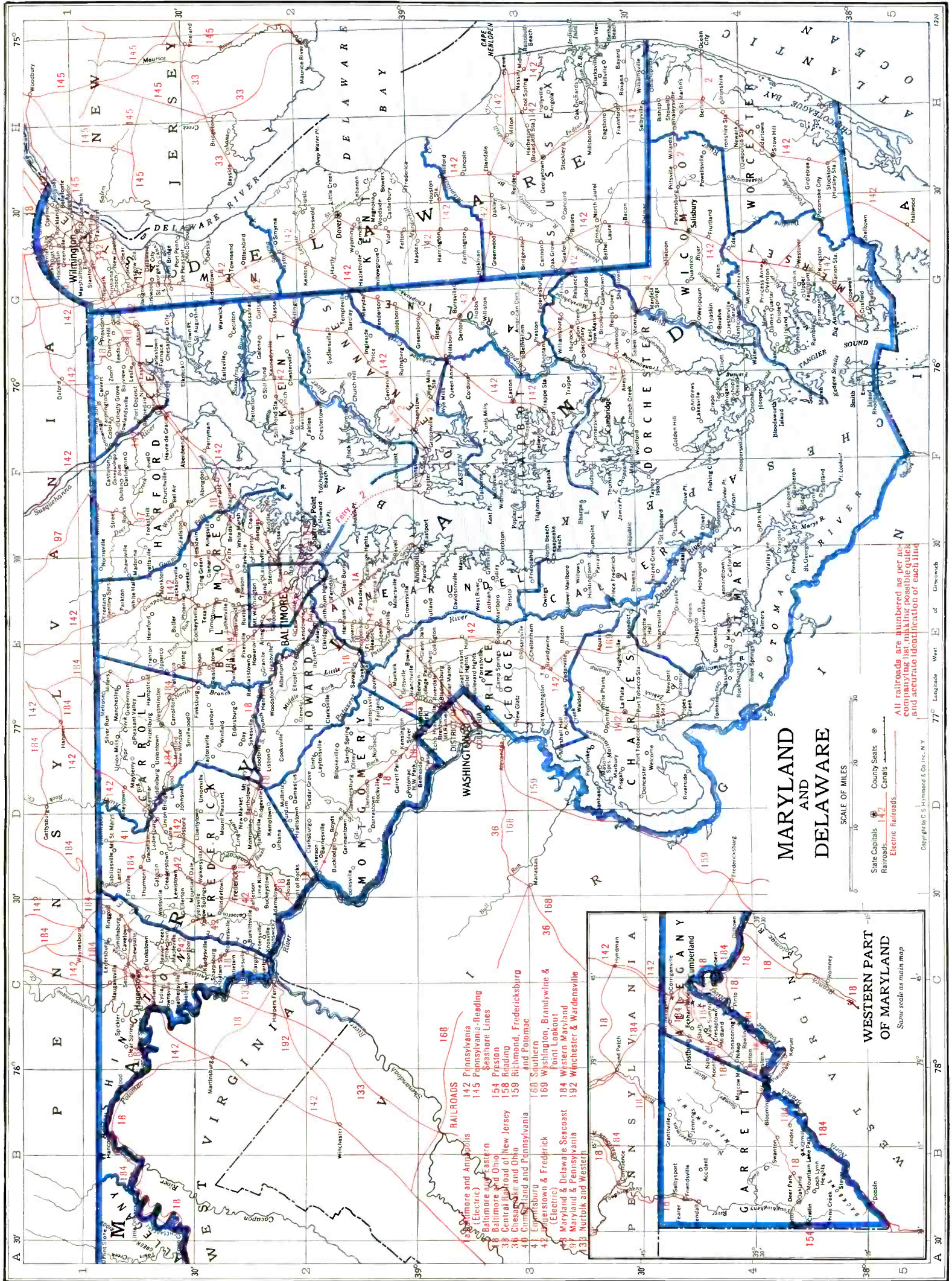

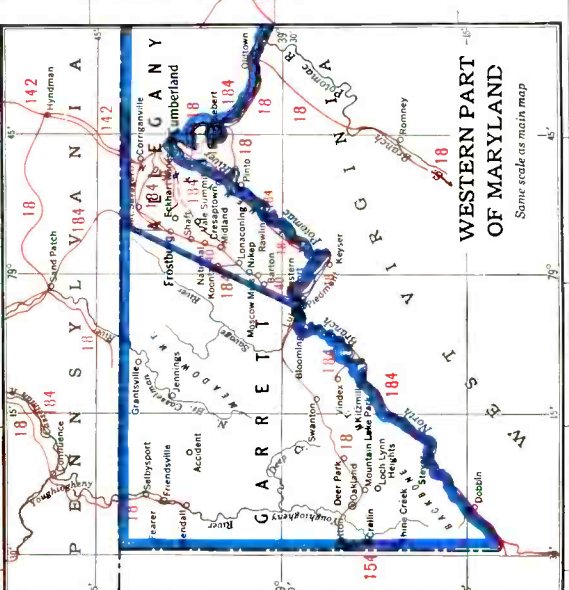

MARYLAND

Population 1,669,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, ANNAPOLIS

Maryland is bounded on the north by Pennsylvania, east and southeast by Delaware and the Atlantic Ocean, west by West Virginia, and south and southwest by Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia. The Chesapeake Bay divides the greater portion of it into two unequal parts, known as the Eastern and Western Shores. Its extreme length from east to west on its northern border is 198 miles, and its width, following the course of the Potomac River, varies from 3 or 4 miles to about 129 miles. Its land area is 9,941 square miles; rank in area (1930), forty-first.

The surface of the Eastern Shore is mostly level, in parts low and swampy, but towards the north, rocky and broken. The Western Shore, between the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay, presents mainly the same general features. The northwest is very mountainous; five or six ridges of the Alleghenies, principally the Blue and Laurel, traversing it. In the extreme west are the beautiful elevated valleys, or "glades." The mountain slopes are thickly wooded. The soil of the Eastern Shore and Southern Maryland is alluvial, classed as silt and sandy loam, while the soils of the central and northern parts are made up for the most part of loams and silt loams. The Weather Bureau at Baltimore gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 55.4; highest on record, 105; lowest on record,—7. Total annual precipitation is 42.56 inches.

Water and rail transportation are highly developed. Maryland's commerce is confined chiefly to Baltimore, one of the principal ports of the country, and one whose trade is extremely heavy. The Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay are navigable for large vessels, and many smaller rivers and bays are accessible for vessels of light draft. The United States Naval Academy is located at Annapolis; the University of Maryland at Baltimore. Johns Hopkins University, also at Baltimore, is internationally famous, and its hospital receives patients from all over the world.

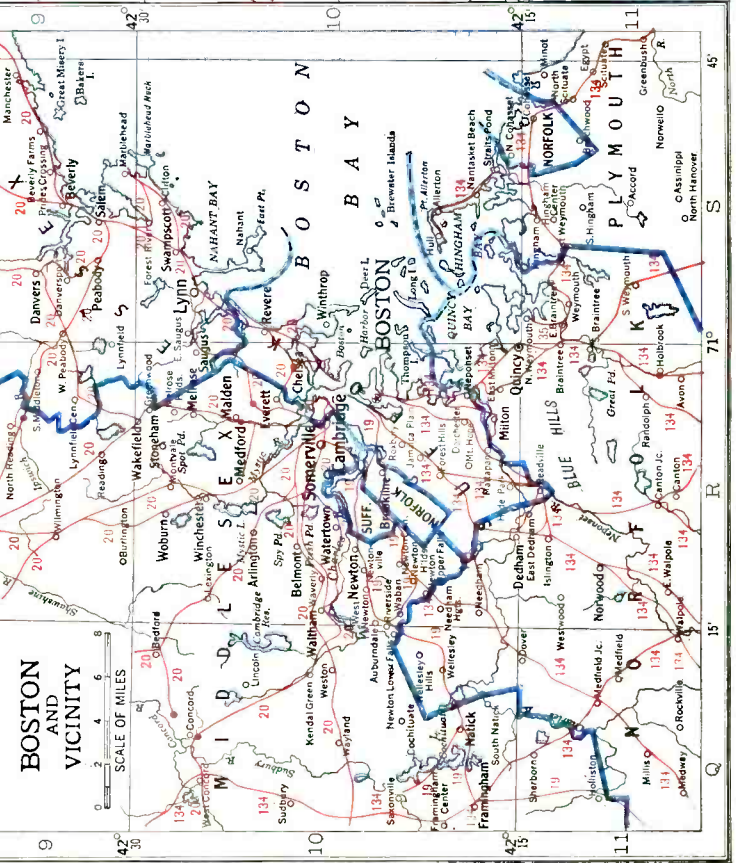
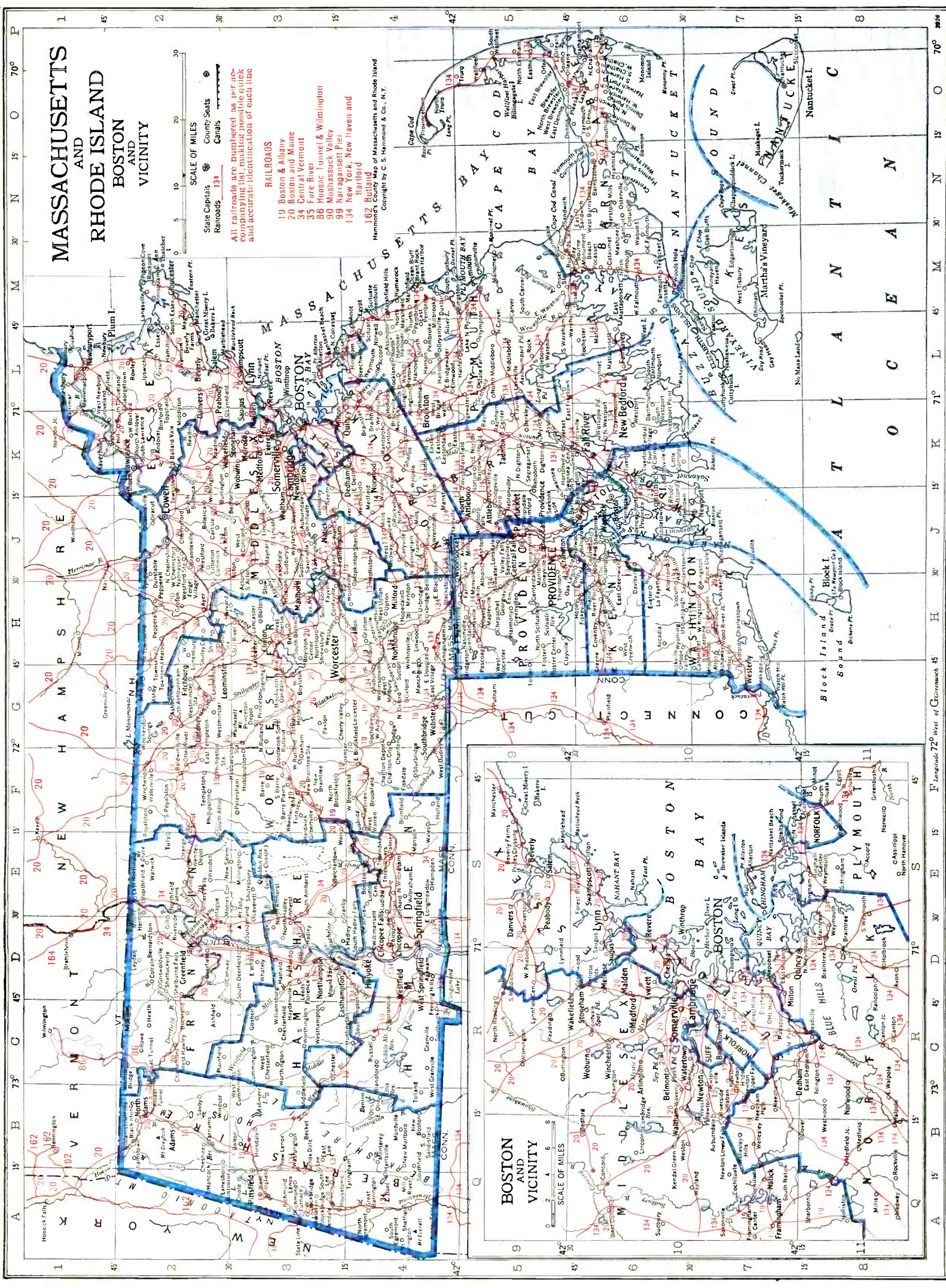

Massachusetts is bounded on the north by Vermont and New Hampshire, east by the Atlantic Ocean, south by the Atlantic Ocean and by Rhode Island and Connecticut and west by New York. Its extreme length is 160 miles, its breadth from 47 to about 90 miles; land area, 8,039 square miles; rank in area (1930), forty-fourth.

The surface is greatly diversified: mountainous in the extreme west, hilly and broken in the east and northeast, and in the southeast mainly low and sandy. Toward the west is the fertile valley of the Connecticut River. The mountains are the Taconic and the Hoosac (continuations of the Green Mountain ranges of Vermont) with detached members of the White Mountains. The Weather Bureau at Boston gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 49.6; highest on record, 104; lowest on record, —14. Total annual precipitation is 40.14 inches.

The state has abundant rail and coastwise shipping facilities. The Cape Cod Canal, an eight-mile cut, 25 feet deep, between Buzzards Bay and Sandwich, enables coasting vessels to avoid the long trip around Cape Cod peninsula and shortens the distance between Boston and New York by over 70 miles. The North Shore above Boston, Cape Cod and the "hill towns" west of the Connecticut River are popular summer resorts, the valley of the Housatonic, in Berkshire county, having hundreds of summer residences belonging to wealthy citizens of New York, Boston and other large cities. Massachusetts is the second densest populated state in the Union, having 514.6 persons to the square mile. It is the leading center of the American cotton, shoe, leather, wool and paper trades. Fall River, Lowell, New Bedford and Lawrence are the greatest cotton manufacturing centers; Boston, Quincy, Newburyport, and Salem lead in shipbuilding interests. Boston is the greatest fishing port in the country.

There is a large number of colleges in the state, including some of the country's most famous, for both men and women. Harvard University, the oldest in the country, is located at Cambridge, as is the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Nearly all of Massachusetts is rich in historical interest. At Provincetown, in 1620, the Mayflower made the first landing, going from there to Plymouth.

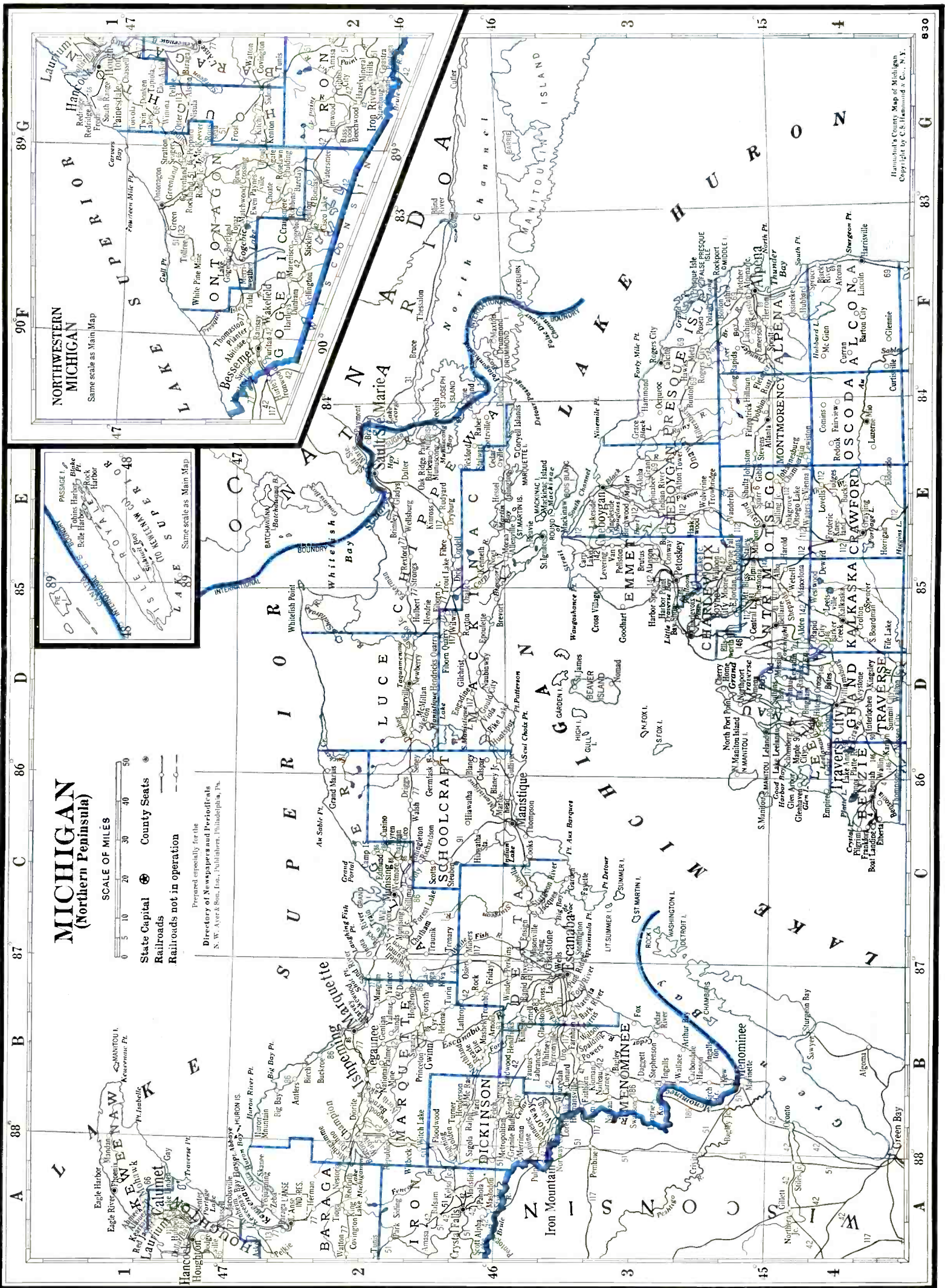
MICHIGAN (Northern Peninsula)

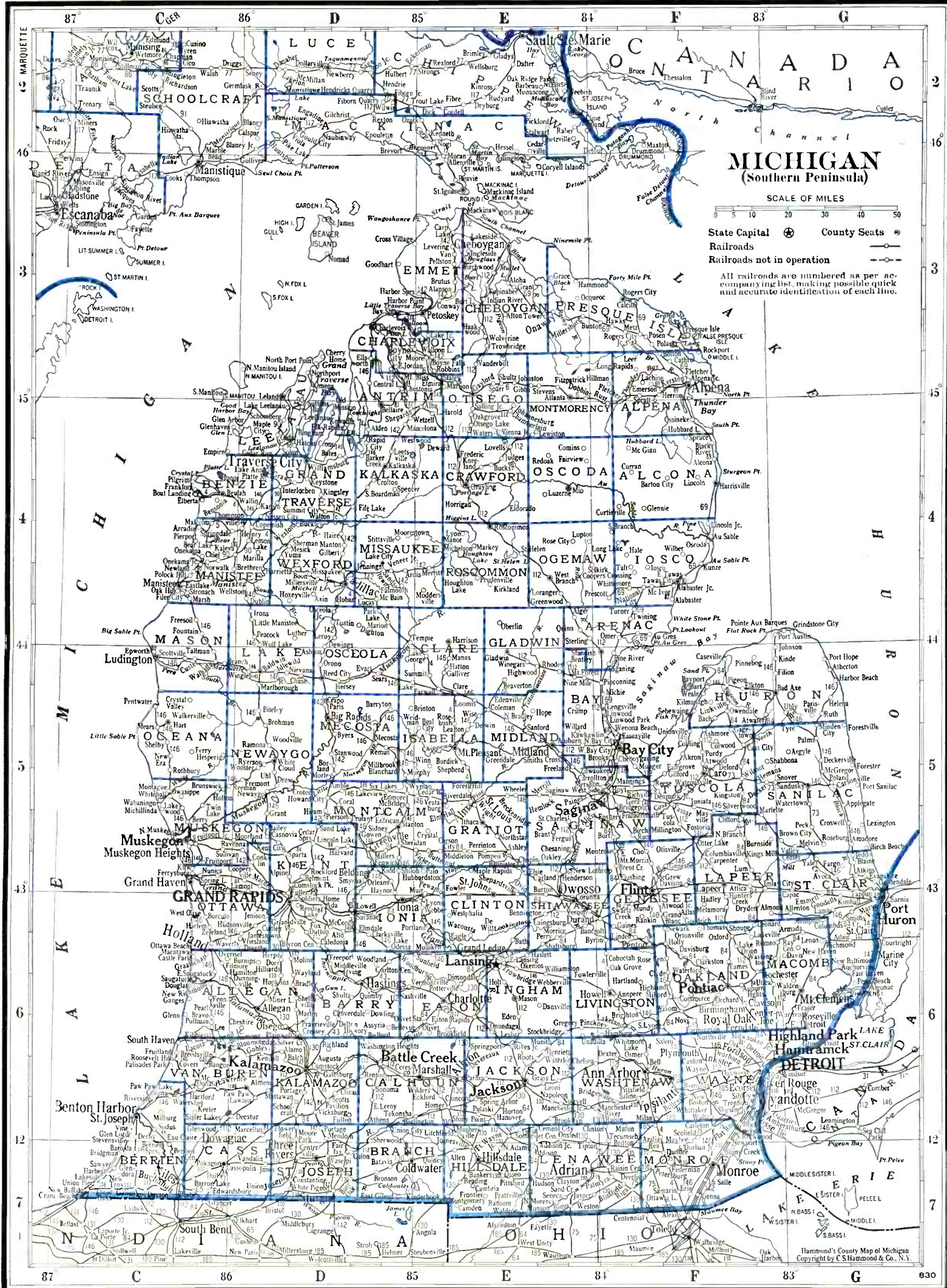

MICHIGAN

Population 4,661,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, LANSING

Michigan is bounded on the north by Lake Superior, east by Lakes Huron, St. Clair and Erie and their connecting rivers, south by Ohio and Indiana, and west by Wisconsin and Lake Michigan. Its land area is 57,480 square miles; rank in area (1930), twenty-second.

The state consists of two peninsulas, of which the southern is the principal seat of wealth and population, its length, north to south, being about 300 miles; width, about 200. Here manufacturing has grown to chief importance. This part of the state is a very level region, abounding in lakes and streams, with extensive forests of pine and other timber in the north, oak openings or natural parks in the south and prairies in the southwest. There are over 6,000 lakes, large and small, which are popular resorts of anglers and summer visitors. The northern peninsula is more rugged in surface and its chief industries are copper and iron mining and lumbering. The Weather Bureau at Detroit gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 48.5; highest on record, 104; lowest on record, —24; total annual precipitation is 32.05 inches.

The great extent of its water boundary line, about 1,000 miles, gives Michigan a commanding position in lake commerce. The ship canal between Lake Huron and Lake Superior at Sault Ste. Marie handles more traffic than the Suez or Panama Canal or any similar thoroughfare in the world. Detroit, noted throughout the world as the greatest center of automobile manufacture, is the fourth city in population in the country, and a great commercial center. A very large tonnage of freight traffic passes through the Detroit River. Grand Rapids is famous for its furniture manufactories. There are many institutions of higher education in the state, chief of them being the University of Michigan, located at Ann Arbor.

POPULATION

Rank among the states, seventh. Urban population (1930), 68.2%. Of the 4,650,171 white persons, 840,268 are foreign born: 117,742 from the British Isles; Canadians, 173,177; French Canadians, 28,539; Poles, 119,228; Scandinavians, 38,316. The Negro population is 2%.

Dairy products (1936): creamery butter, 82,162,000 lbs.; American cheese, 12,524,000 lbs.; other cheeses, 11,226,000 lbs.; condensed and evaporated and dried milk, 133,827,000 lbs.; ice cream, 14,063,000 gallons; milk (1937), \$71,427,000.

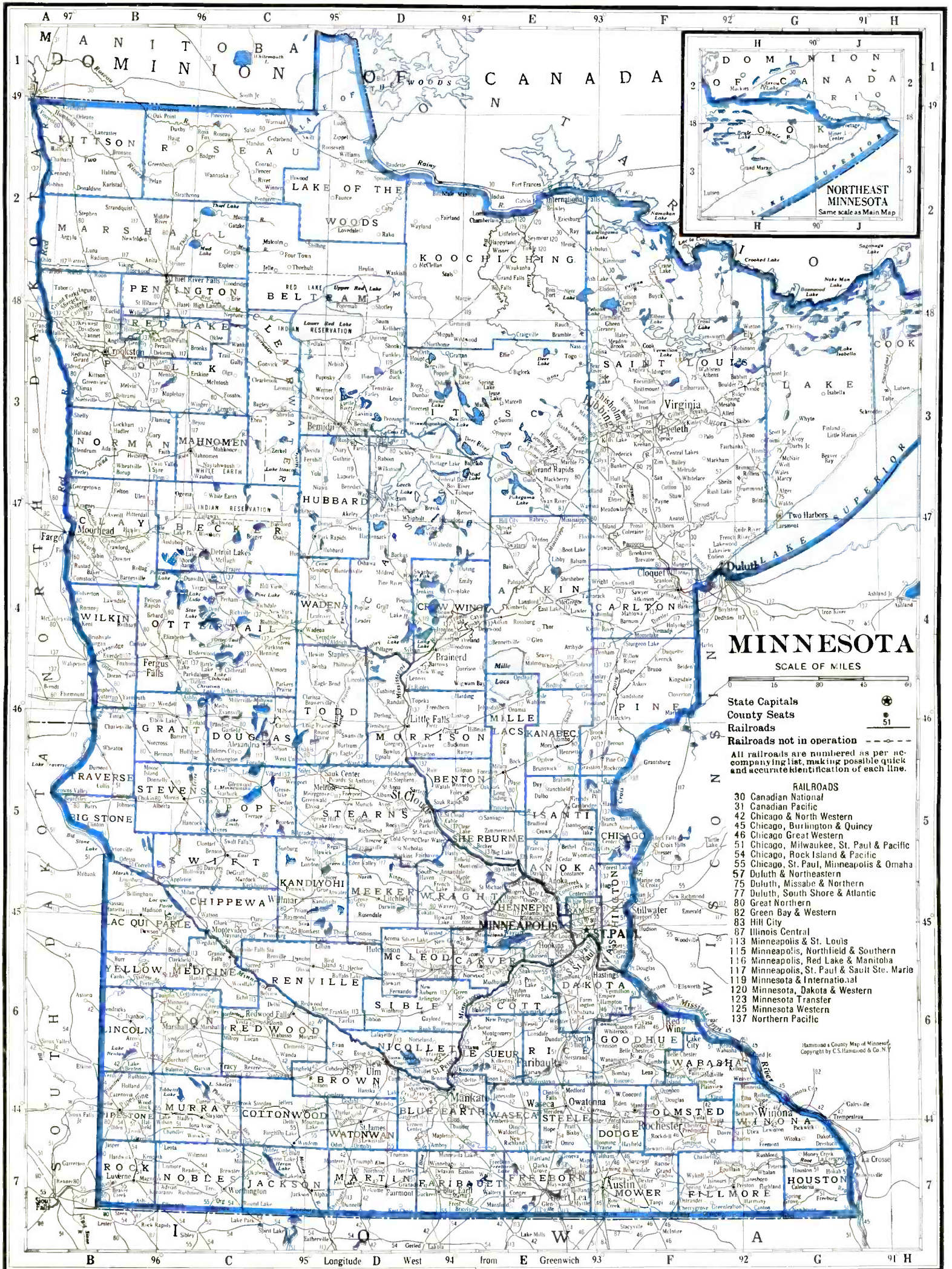

MINNESOTA

Population 2,627,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, ST. PAUL

Minnesota is bounded on the north by Ontario and Manitoba, Canada, east by Wisconsin and Lake Superior, south by Iowa, and west by North and South Dakota. Its extreme length from north to south is 380 miles, its breadth varies from 183 miles, in the center, to 262 on the south and 330 on the north borders. Its land area is 80,858 square miles; rank in area (1930), eleventh. It is a state of widely varied natural resources and rapidly developing wealth.

The surface is generally undulating and diversified with plains, timber belts and extensive prairies dotted with lakes and groves. The northeast is generally hilly, has great deposits of iron ore, and was formerly entirely covered with immense forests. Much of the salable pine has been cut, but there is a vast quantity of valuable timber, both pine and hardwood, still standing. This region also contains innumerable lakes, abounding in fish and affording popular summer resorts. In the southeast there is a beautiful rolling prairie region, and from it the surface rises gradually to the Hauteur des Terres or Heights of Land in the northwest. The climate is particularly healthful, and extremely favorable to the growth of vegetation, especially grain crops. The Weather Bureau at St. Paul gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 44.2; highest degree on record as 104; lowest, —41. Total annual precipitation is 27.24 inches.

The state's shipping, both by water and rail, is immense. The Great Lakes, with Duluth as an advantageously located port, provide an excellent waterway to the Atlantic, and railroads branch in every direction. The grain trade control in Minneapolis is second only to that of the Chicago Board of Trade. There is in operation a very efficient school system. The University of Minnesota, with more than 13,000 students registered in 1934, is one of the great universities of the country. It is located at Minneapolis.

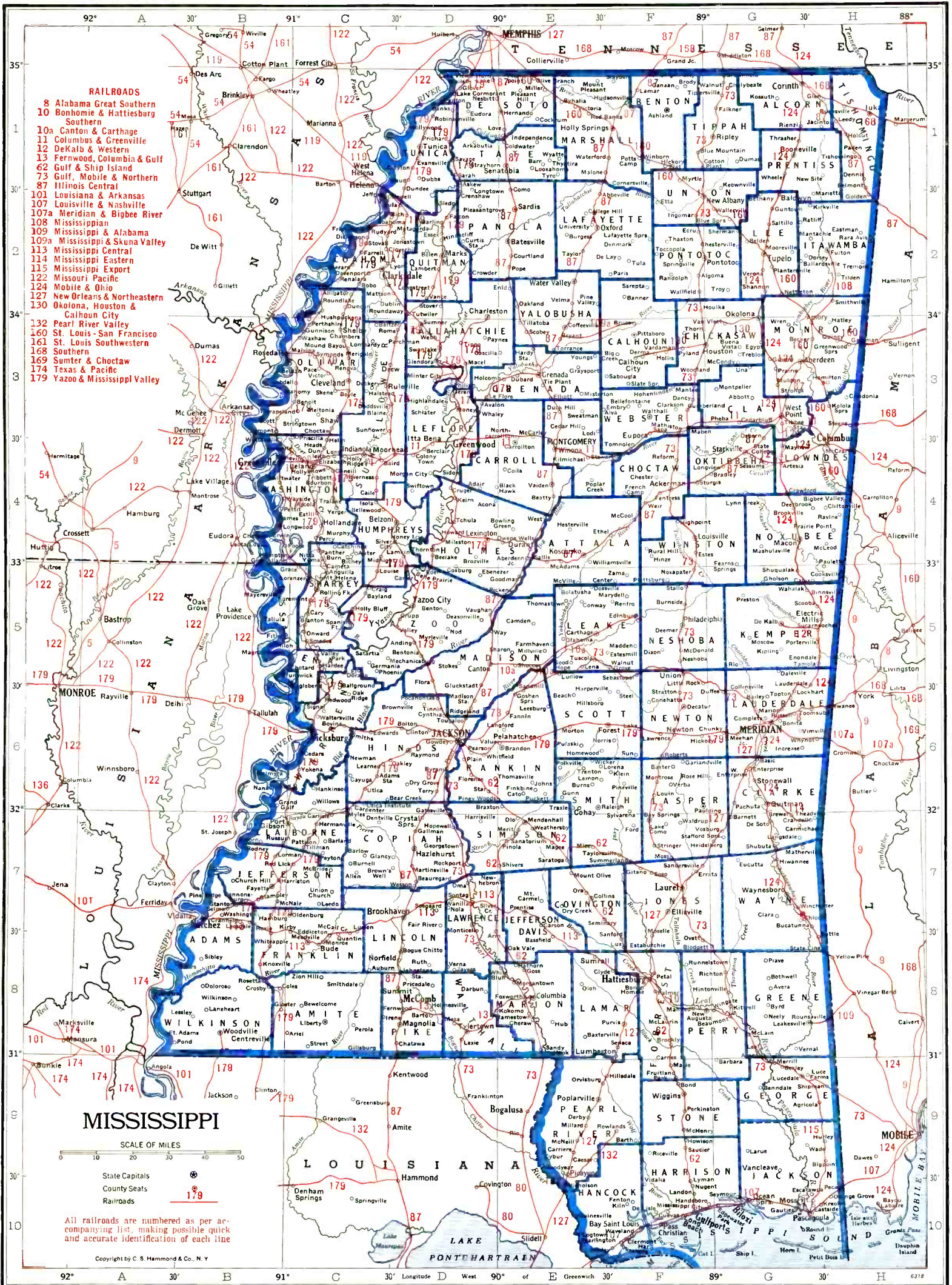

MISSISSIPPI

Population 1,961,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, JACKSON

Mississippi is bounded on the north by Tennessee, east by Alabama, south by the Gulf of Mexico and Louisiana and west by the Mississippi River, which separates it from Louisiana and Arkansas. Its extreme length from north to south is 332 miles; average breadth, 142 miles. Its land area is 46,362 square miles; rank in area (1930), thirty-first.

The surface is generally hilly except in the Mississippi bottom, from Vicksburg to the Tennessee line and between the Mississippi and Yazoo Rivers, where it is low and swampy, subject to inundation and covered with a dense growth of timber. Below Vicksburg the surface for some miles inland is hilly and known as the "cane hills" or "bluffs" and has a generally productive soil. There is a particularly fertile prairie region in the northeast where one of the chief products, alfalfa, produces from three to five heavy crops each year. The southern part is chiefly a level pine region and furnishes good pasturage and quantities of timber, tar and turpentine. The soil of this tract, although sandy, is with fertilization, particularly adapted to truck farming. The forest wealth of the state is extensive and it ranks second among the states as a producer of cotton. The climate and production are sub-tropical. The Weather Bureau at Vicksburg gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 65.6; highest degree on record, 104; lowest, —1. Total annual precipitation, 51.93 inches.

Plantation life, reminiscent of the past, still prevails in this primarily agricultural state. Transportation is supplied by rail lines and the Mississippi River. The University of Mississippi, the largest institution of higher education in the State, is located at University (Oxford).

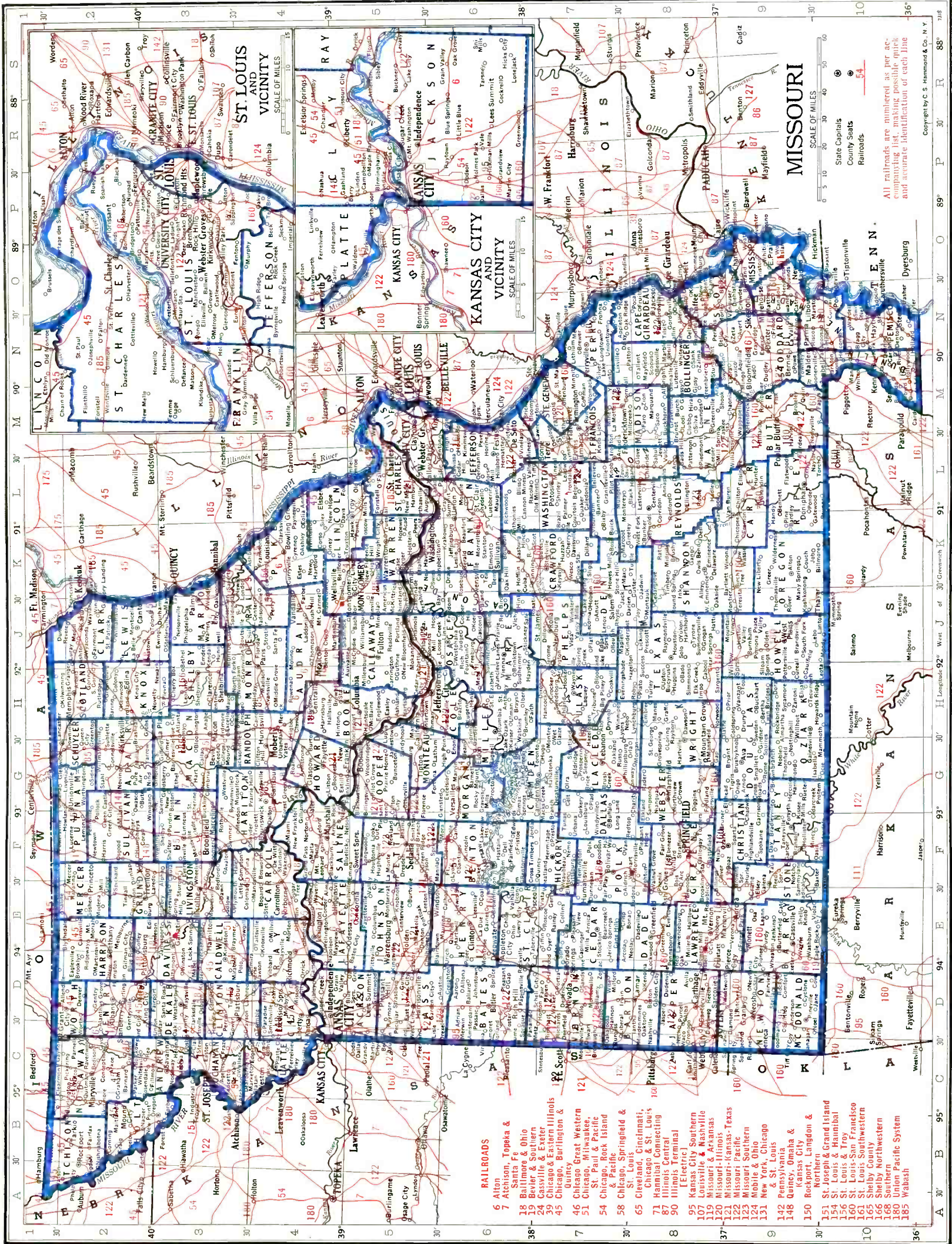

MISSOURI

Population 3,913,000 (U. S. Estimate 1935)

State Capital, JEFFERSON CITY

Missouri is bounded on the north by Iowa, east by Illinois, Kentucky and Tennessee, south by Arkansas, west by Oklahoma, Kansas and Nebraska. Its length, north to south, is 277 miles; its average breadth about 244 miles, ranging from 208 miles in the north to 312 miles in the south. Its land area is 68,727 square miles; rank in area (1930), eighteenth.

The Missouri River flows across the state from west to east just north of the center. The surface north of the river is generally level, while that south of it is undulating, becoming rougher as it approaches the Ozark Mountains. There are also open, treeless plains, an extension of those in Kansas; and in the southeast, bordering on the Mississippi River, there is an extensive marshy tract called the "Sunk Country," the result of the earthquake of 1811-12. Plans have been made to reclaim the lands along the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers and their tributaries by levees along the great rivers and by drainage canals in the valleys of the smaller ones. The climate varies from north temperate to sub-tropical.

With about 500 miles of waterfront on the Mississippi and with the Missouri traversing it from west to east, the state has fully 1,000 miles of navigable waterways. St. Louis is a center for travel and for extensive freight traffic carried on both by rail and by river, the famous bridge across the Mississippi accommodating more freight cars than any other span in the world. Twenty-one trunk lines afford rail transportation. The city is the gateway for north and south tourist travel as well as freight traffic. The stock yards and meat-packing plants at Kansas City have gained world-wide fame. The Bagnell Dam across the Osage River in the Ozarks forms one of the largest artificial lakes in the world and floods about 60,000 acres. It is part of an enormous hydro-electrical development designed to supply power to St. Louis, Kansas City and elsewhere.

Educationally the state ranks exceedingly high. In addition to the University of Missouri, at Columbia, it has fourteen colleges and universities, besides many professional and technological schools and teachers' colleges.

State Capital, HELENA

Montana is bounded north by Saskatchewan and Alberta, Canada, east by North and South Dakota, south by Wyoming and Idaho and west by Idaho. Its length, east to west, is about 540 miles; breadth, about 280 miles; land area, 146,131 square miles, including 240 square miles of Yellowstone National Park, rank in area (1930), third.

The Rocky Mountains occupy the western two-fifths of the state's area; east of them the country forms part of the "Great Plains." The Missouri River is navigable for steamboats as far as Fort Benton. The Yellowstone River is navigable during high water. The lowest altitude is 1,800 feet above sea level, while Granite Peak in Carbon county reaches a height of 12,350 feet. The climate is dry, healthful and invigorating. The Weather Bureau at Helena gives the temperature (annual monthly mean) as 43.3; highest on record, 103; lowest on record, —42; total annual precipitation as 13.63 inches. Irrigation has been highly developed, and immense reservoirs on the Madison and Missouri Rivers are sources of water supply. As a result, standard fruits of the Temperate Zone have been produced in large quantities.

Montana, with its vast expanse of mountain country, its 500 lakes and fishing streams, its thousands of miles of winding mountain roads, its national forests, dude ranches, mountain hotels and tourist camp resorts, affords unequalled recreational advantages. The state is fast improving its national highways. Glacier National Park, extending to the Canadian border line, is one of the most wonderful public parks in the world. Among the State's major educational institutions are The University of Montana, at Missoula, three colleges, professional and technological schools and normals.

POPULATION

Rank among the states, fortieth. Rural population (1930), 66.3%. Of the 517,327 white persons, 72,961 are foreign born: 14,366 from the British Isles; Scandinavians, 17,187; Canadians, 8,787; French Canadians, 1,966. Chinese number 486; Indians, 14,798; Mexicans, 2,571. There are two important Indian reservations.

Dairy products (1936): creamery butter, 11,586,000 lbs.; American cheese, 1,648,000 lbs.; ice cream, 1,187,000 gallons; milk (1937), \$8,924,000.

FORESTS

Total commercial forest area (1930), 14,865,000 acres. Lumber production (1936): 126 mills producing 295,233 M feet b. m.; lath, 13,481,000; shingles, 4170 squares. Principal woods: ponderosa pine, larch, Douglas fir. (For value see lumber and timber products under Manufactures.)

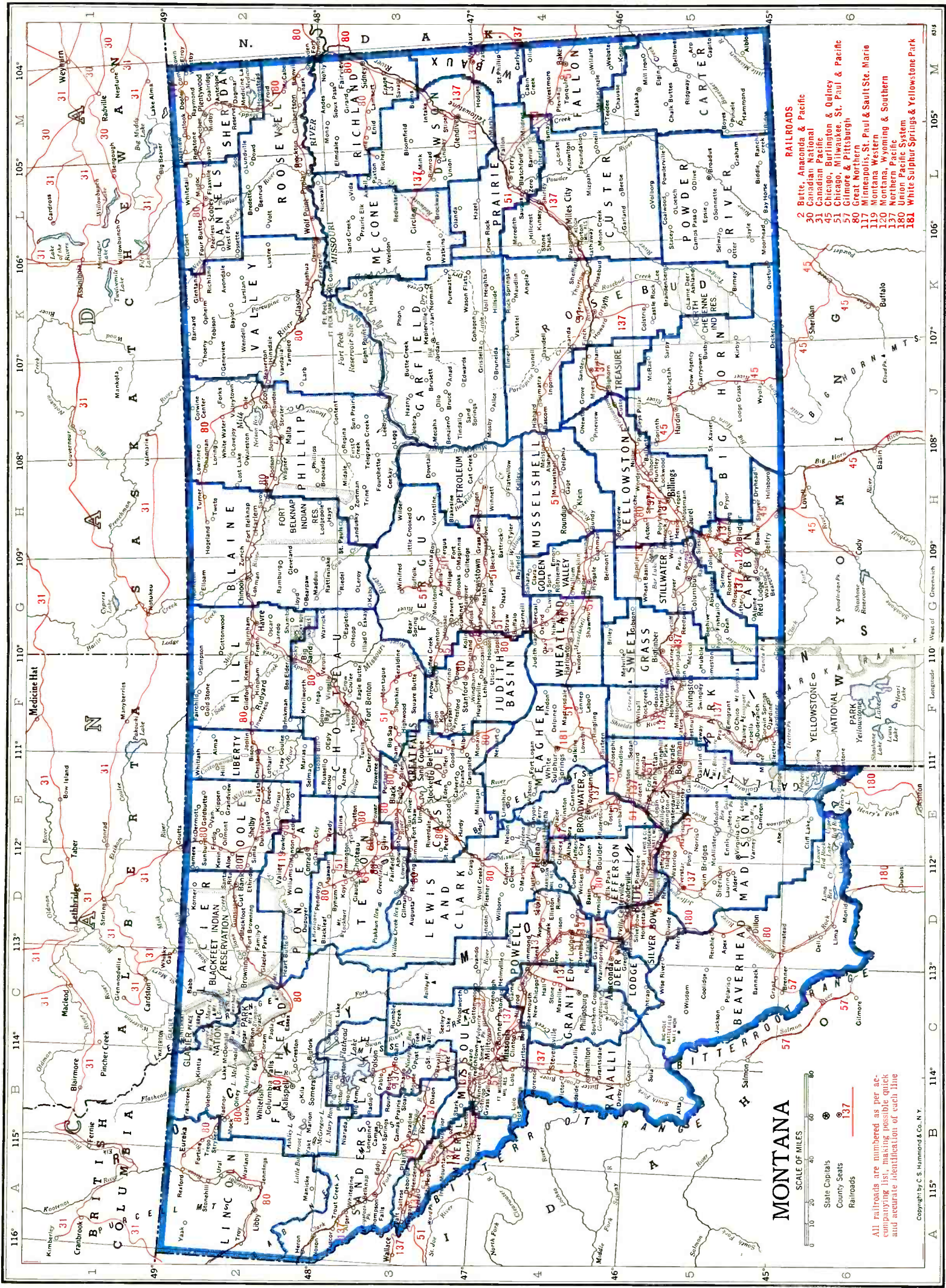
