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RADIO Formats Glossary

by Dan Kening

Adult Contemporary (AC):

Top 40 for baby boomers. A.k.a. adult rock or lite rock. Similar to CHR (see below) format. Includes artists like Elton John. Gloria Estefan, Chicago.

Adult Standards/Big Band:

Mixes non-rock oldies, easy listening, nostalgia and big band music from the '40s through '70s. For example, Tommy Dorsey, The Andrews Sisters, Frank Sinatra, Barbra Streisand, Anne Murray.

Album Oriented Rock (AOR):

Format emphasizes lengthy sets of rock music rather than DJ personality. Some stations stick to mainstream artists (Rolling Stones, Tom Petty, Aerosmith), while others include alternative acts (Big Audio Dynamite, Sugarcubes, Depeche Mode).

Black Adult Contemporary:

New hybrid format blends current urban contemporary hits with R&B/soul oldies from the 60s-80s.

Classic Rock:

AOR spinoff for rock fans over 18. Familiar songs from the '60s-'80s by core bands like the Stones, the Who, Led Zeppelin, Genesis and Pink Floyd.

Contemporary Hit Radio (CHR):

Top 40 under a new name, Aimed at teens and young adults. Includes cross-section of music from AOR and urban formats. Everything from Paula Abdul to Bon Jovi.

Easy Listening:

A.k.a. easy contemporary. Once known as beautiful music, the kind played in elevators and offices.

New Adult Contemporary:

Combines new age, light jazz and adult contemporary music. Emphasis on contemporary jazz fusion instrumentals by Larry Carlton, Montreaux, Jean Luc Ponty. Some vocals by Basia, Al Jarreau, Anita Baker.

Nostalgia:

Big band and other non-rock oldies from the '40s-'50s. Also variety programs from radio's Golden Age (Jack Benny, Green Hornet).

Oldies:

Rock and pop hits, golden oldies, from the late '50s to early '70s.

Talk:

Mostly nonmusical, personality-oriented stations that air calls from listeners. Formats range from serious to silly to full-service (news, weather, traffic, sports).

Urban Contemporary:

Top 40 geared for younger black listeners. CHR format plays crossover urban/dance artists like Janet Jackson, Bobby Brown.

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



Talk Radio's KING

Larry King reigns as radio's foremost host

The "Muhammad Ali of the broadcast interview" chats about his award-winning career of 30 years. He's interviewed everyone from Eleanor Roosevelt to Frank Sinatra, but the king hasn't lost his human touch.



eing a guest on the Larry King program is like meeting an old friend over lunch. You both say hello, he asks you a question, you start answering. Very comfortable.

"I have a wild curiosity about a lot of things," says the man who Russell Baker once called "the Muhammad Ali of the broadcast interview - which is to say the Greatest." "The less I know about something, the more interested in it I am. The less I know about the person, the better interviewer Lam."

He purposely doesn't prepare for his Mutual radio network program, which originates in Arlington, Va. but is heard in Chicagoland on two stations, WLUP-AM and WMRO-AM. Unlike some talk show hosts, who claim to have read every book of every author who appears on their programs, King says he's much happier asking the questions an ordinary person would ask if he hadn't read the book.

'Wednesday night I've got (Vice President) Dan Quayle on. They'll give me a list of the things he did when he was in the Senate, but basically I take a cursory look at that. At five after 11, when the guest is on at six after 11, I have no idea what I'm going to ask.'

"That's comfortable for me," King remarked.

Ouavle found out just how comfortable. In answer to one of King's questions he warned against "getting caught up in the magnetic personality of Chairman Gorbachey," The show aired just a few days after the Malta summit. The remark caused headlines nationwide and consternation in the White House.

Larry King has been interviewing people for almost 30 years, ever since his first radio talk show, a man-off-the-street interview program originating from Pumpernik's Restaurant for WIOD, Miami Beach. His engaging and conversational style has become his trademark.

Along with the three-hour long radio program, King has a one-hour nightly program on Cable News Network and writes

a weekly column in USA Today. He has interviewed just about every major figure of the past 30 years, from presidents to show business legends. Has he ever felt in awe of any of the people he's interviewed?

"The first time I interviewed Sinatra." King remembers. "He's like a folk hero of mine and now I've gotten very used to him. Also, when I interviewed Adlai Stevenson because he was the first person I ever voted for, and Eleanor Roosevelt."

"By the way, I respect a great many people, but awe? No," he says. "If you're in awe, you're fawning and I never fawn. I'm really curious and I have a great respect for an enormous amount of people.

The Larry King show has aired nationwide and in Canada on the Mutual Network since January 1978. It has won the prestigious Peabody Award, the National Association of Broadcasters' 1985 Radio Award, and the Jack Anderson Investigative Reporting Award. In 1986, the readers of the Washington Journalism Review named him "Best Radio Talk Show Host," and he has been inducted into the Emerson Radio Hall of Fame.

But the human touch never goes away. King asks simple one- or two-sentence questions of his guests and gets the answers he needs, without reverting to the "confrontational" styles of some wellknown talk show hosts on radio and television.

"To me, that's gimmicky," King says. "If you invite a guest to your place and then you're rude to that guest, that is just not my cup of tea. My job is to find out everything I can about that guest's thinking and then you make up your own mind."

"Yes, there are some people who annov you," King admits. "I like Lisa Sliwa (head of the Guardian Angels). She just drives me up a wall. I like her personally, but her opinions just gnaw at me. William Rusher (former publisher of the *National Review*) just drove me crazy. He just was wild. He just rang my bell the wrong way."

King remembers a time when he blew up at author Kitty Kelly, who had just written an "exposé" biography of Frank Sinatra, King says he "lost control" which. he adds, is the worst thing a talk show host can do.

"I have two roles. My job is to inform and to entertain the audience. If I lose myself, I'm going to take away from that. I'm a professional, so I don't let it get in the way, but sometimes it does. I'm a human being.

"I absolutely regret (when I lose control). It hasn't happened a lot but when you hear me screaming, it means I've lost control and I don't like shows like that. Two people yelling at each other after awhile gets a little hackneyed, at least for my taste.

For Larry King, it never gets dull. Even when he has interviewed somebody ten times before, he always has something else he wants to ask.

Fascinating people always have new facets. I mean, I've done fifty hours with Jackie Gleason alone and had something different to ask him in the 49th hour than in the first hour. So sometimes the more fascinating the people, the more you want to interview them. I've interviewed (New York Governor Mario) Cuomo a lot, but I haven't interviewed him about East Germany.'

Those who have read King's column and listened to his program know of the man's love for sports. He did color commentary for the NFL's Miami Dolphins, but his first love has always been baseball.

I'd like to take a year off. Just one year of my life and do baseball play-by-play."

"Stan Musial was the best I ever saw. But I was there when Jackie Robinson broke in; I was in the ball park when he played his first major league game. I interviewed him six weeks before he died. That was a special thrill.

RETRO RADIO

focuses on Chicago's radio performers of vesterday.

Known principally as a television personality, LEE PHILLIP worked on radio for WBBM, where, with Norman Ross, Jr., she co-hosted Lyric Opera's opening night broadcasts. She also appeared with Paul Gibson on WBBM's The Lady and the Tiger during the 1960s. The discussion show contrasted Phillip's gracious demeanor with Gibson's more outspoken personality. "Paul took his tiger role quite seriously, and we had significant disagreements on the air, particularly over his strong anti-religious views. Eventually, I felt myself compelled to leave the show and let him go on by himself." Phillip found radio "fun but

harder than TV because people listen more carefully. I make a lot of mistakes but smile my way through it; you can't do that on radio." Phillip is married to Bill Bell. who writes daytime soaps for television. Four years ago, the couple moved to Los Angeles where she serves as co-executive producer of The Bold and the Beautiful with her husband, who is also the executive producer of *The Young and the Restless*, which the couple co-created. Ms. Phillip grew up in Riverside just outside Chicago and says, "I'm finally getting used to the West Coast but still miss Chicago a great deal." Mr. and Mrs. Bell returned here recently for their daughter's debut at the Passavant Cotillion in December. VINCE LLOYD

Continuing a radio career that has spanned almost 60 years, actor JIM ANDELIN today lives in Chicago with his wife and continues to perform on radio and TV commercials "when they call me." Recalls Andelin, "I started at WBBM in 1931 when I was 12 years old. At first I played juveniles, including a variety of roles on Jack Armstrong, Orphan Annie, Sky King, Tom Mix and other kids' shows; then I moved into older roles - romantic leads, comedy, character parts, the menace - you name it." Andelin appeared regularly on Lights Out, a mystery drama, and in other shows he shared the microphone with actors such as Don Ameche, Orson Welles, Ethyl Barrymore, Bea Lillie and Raymond Massey. Andelin's entry into radio took place purely by chance; he'd accompanied his older brother to an audition, was himself asked to read and wound up winning his first part in Skippy, a role that lasted seven years. Andelin performed on radio as recently as last September in Unshackled, an ongoing dramatic show produced at the Pacific Garden Mission. "I guess I'm what you call semiretired; that means I don't make calls, but they keep calling me." Andelin's voice can currently be heard on radio and TV spots for Illinois Bell, Bob Evans Sausage, Village Inn and other sponsors. His home includes a small recording studio where their demo tapes.





as a staff announcer at WBBM in Chicago until 1968. After 23 years at Armed Forces Radio in Los Angeles, Zainrib retired four years ago to Birmingham, where he now enjoys the South's mild winters.

"I started working at the age of 12 in a local stock company in Minneapolis. I guess I thought that was what everybody did when they grew up," says actress BEV-ERLY YOUNGER, who entered the Chicago radio scene during the Thirties, working on daytime serials such as Houseboat Hannah, Kitty Keane and Ma Perkins, in which she performed as a comic-heavy. She also alternated the lead in Curtain Time, a weekly drama, and performed various roles in The Whistler mystery series. "I didn't really like radio," she says. "I kept losing my place in the script because I kept looking at the other actors." Her performances

in the radio show Vic and Sade led to a TV role in 1949 on Stud's Place with Studs Terkel. Now 74, Younger and actor Les Podewell, her husband of 50 years, live in Evanston, where Ms. Younger is recovering from recent knee surgery.

JOHN WEIGEL began his radio career in Chicago in 1935 when he was hired as a staff announcer by WBBM. After 18 months, Weigel went freelance and subsequently worked for WGN, CBS and the Mutual Network, among others. "Chicago boiled with activity and excitement in those days. This city was the hub of broadcasting, with two NBC networks, plus other national networks. We had wall-to-wall programming, with studios in the Merchandise Mart, the Wrigley Building and the Tribune Tower, and programs just seemed to fly out of Chicago all across the country.

Yvonne Daniels comes full circle

After nearly three decades on the Windy City's airwaves, this female pioneer gears up for her new role as WNUA's star attraction.

I like nothing better than a challenge," declares the dean of lady disc jockeys, just two days before her debut as the morning personality for smooth jazz station WNUA (FM 95.5). "That's probably why I've lasted in radio for so long."

After leaving her seven-year position at urban contemporary giant WGC1 (FM 107.5), Daniels admits she's got butterflies. "I'm nervous, but it's a good nervous. I feel very enthusiastic," says Daniels, in anticipation of her first day at the new job. (She started Monday, November 20.)

Why the stage fright from such a seasoned pro? "Well, this is a job I took from the heart. It was an emotional decision;

I decided overnight. I had other offers, but I just felt most comfortable about coming here," explains the precise Virgo.

It's easy to see why. She and 'NUA evening host Danae Alexander are "very good friends" who worked together at WSDM-FM, "the station with the girls," in the '70s. WNUA's Vice President/General Manager John Gehron is Daniels' former boss from her groundbreaking days as WLS-AM's first full-time female deejay. In fact, all three used to work together at WLS. "I was on the AM and Danae was on the FM," Daniels recalls.

The veteran jock's move to the jazz fusion format also represents a return to her roots. A native of Jacksonville, Fla.,

she is the daughter of jazz singer/dancer Billy Daniels. And she used to sing jazz in nightclubs herself.

"It was John who really talked me into coming to 'NUA," she admits. "I read an interview with him last year where he referred to me as 'the consummate professional.' And I was so flattered that my ex-boss said that. We had our differences at WLS, but mostly we really liked and respected each other." Not to mention that Gehron offered her the prime spot as morning host, quite an improvement over Daniels' graveyard shift at WGCI.

"I guess she missed the daytime audience too much, so she moved onto bigger

and better things," says WGCl General Manager Marv Dyson. "She is a legend in the market and we were lucky enough to have her here, and hopefully we added to that legend," he praises, adding, "She's sorely missed by all. I miss her very much. She was the most talented air personality I ever worked with."

In recent years, the ratings battle for Chicago's Number One station has been a hot contest between longtime winner WGN-AM and challenger WGCI-FM. At 'GCI since 1982, Daniels played a major role in the black station's rise to the top. "I'm very proud of what I did there. I worked the 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. slot. And no station had ever gone to Number One in that slot, except for WGN and FM 100. But I was always either Number One or Number Two, in my time slot at 'GCI since 1984. And you just don't take a jock like that and put her in the overnight shift," Daniels declared.

But 'GCl did just that and Daniels still wonders why. In retrospect, she chalks it up to a case of ratings paranoia. "We were Number One at 'GCl. We were the Superbowl team. Then some new competition came into the market. And in my opinion, 'GCl didn't respond to other stations nibbling at our audience. So our ratings went back to Number Two. And paranoia set in, the program director was fired and we were without one for months. We had no direction," Daniels relates.

Finally, a new program director from Dallas, Jimmy Smith, came in and shook things up. "He gradually started firing people, bringing in his own people from Dallas, changing the entire staff," she recalls. And last July, he changed Daniels' popular mid-day shift to the lowly 2 a.m.

to 5 a.m. slot.

"It was kind of a test," explains Dyson.
"We wanted to increase our early morning drive-time numbers and our program director felt she was most suited to do that with her late-night experience at WLS and WSDM. And she did increase our numbers in that time slot."

Within a month of satin-voiced Daniels doing overnights, *Chicago Sun-Times* readers voted her as the city's Number Two favorite late-shift jock. Meanwhile, her afternoon fans "raised hell," Daniels says. "The phones were hot! People were calling the station and cussing them out, writing nasty letters and threatening to picket.

Enter John Gehron. After returning from Boston to head WNUA in August, he succeeded in hiring the charismatic DJ by keeping after her with offers. "After all the strangeness at 'GCI, it was nice to deal with a straight shooter like Gehron," she notes.

Gehron and WNUA are counting on Yvonne Daniels to give the station a muchneeded ratings boost from its underdog position as Number 18.

"I believe I can do it. I can do it," Daniels declares. "I'm going to kick butt with a big fluffy slipper!"

After working in radio all her adult life, the first lady of Chicago's airwaves knows how to appeal to all types of listeners. Her family background has allowed her to "ease in and out of any format with comfort."

"My grandmother was a music teacher. Aunt Gwen was a singer. My father was a singer/dancer and so was my mother. And my uncle would sit me on his knee as a toddler and teach me scat singing, like Ella Fitzgerald," Daniels fondly recalls.

"I sang with a gospel quartet as a kid and I sang jazz in nightclubs. So I had no choice, I had to be involved in music somehow. And I discovered I loved radio the most."

Daniels' radio days began in Jacksonville, when a local jock put her on the air during

the last half-hour of his show as a curiosity. "I was paid taxi fare to and from the station. And that was it."

Station management and listeners alike found young Daniels to be a natural with her "unusual voice." Soon she was promoted to host a Sunday gospel show and once a mid-day slot opened-up, Daniels started playing R&B and soul hits full-time.

Later, she was transferred to St. Louis to work at a station owned by her boss in Jacksonville. Some Windy City radio execs heard Daniels there and hired her to work at WYNR-AM in Chicago. "That was shortlived because the station changed to allnews after I got there," she says.

WCFL was next. Daniels co-hosted the overnight jazz show with Sid McCoy for the 50,000 watt, clear channel station, and her voice was heard cross-country. From there she landed her own show at WSDM, the all-female jazz-rock channel. Daniels was given the freedom to program her own music, and her show quickly shot to Number One. "That's when

WLS said, 'she's killing us' and hired me to work there," she laughs.

Once again Daniels found herself the overnight host with a nationwide signal. "I had a dozen phone lines and they were hot all night. It was awesome." she recalls.


Daniels' fondest memory is the time her WLS show "gave birth". "A woman called and said: 'My husband is on the road. He's listening to you and I've gone into labor.' So I kept him posted through the night. And when she had the baby, I sent flowers and she sent a picture."

Daniels has always shared a special rapport with her listeners. "I had a really good relationship with the audience at 'GCL We loved each other."

Daniels' fans, it seems, were ready to follow her to 'NUA before she even got there. "I'm so flattered. I received six fan letters before I ever went on the air," she says.

'NUA boss Gehron had a close encounter with a Daniels fan days before she started. Daniels relates: "John got in a taxi, and asked the driver what station he had on. The driver said 'WNUA, 95.5.' After a block, the driver turned around and said 'You know, Yvonne Daniels is going to start over there Monday morning. You should listen to her.' He had no idea he was telling this to my boss!"

The cab driver, no doubt, got a big tip.



ANDRES

Classical 97's Mostly Human Host

The morning man at WNIB/WNIZ (FM 97.1), mixes Mozart with marches, show tunes and small talk. Listeners love his casual style, mistakes and all. After 48 years in radio Andres knows what clicks.

spin of the dial on any weekday morning in Chicago will introduce you to a cast of characters ranging from the screaming Top 40 "zoo jock" to the smartaleck talk radio host. Then there's Jay Andres, A 48-year veteran radio personality. Andres has hosted WNIB's Morning Song show for four years. "And if I can toot my own horn, the ratings have soared," boasts Classical 97's most popular host.

Both Andres' show and personality are radical departures from typical classical radio fare. Mixed with Moussorgsky and Mozart are marches, show tunes and classic movie music. The man with the rich baritone voice makes small talk about listeners like they're old friends and family. "And this one goes out to my soul sister Marian," Andres dedicates. He reads their letters on the air, plays requests and takes calls while the music plays. "Now, here's Tchaikovsky's 'The Firebird Suite' for Tom's birthday," enthuses the friendly host.

Every weekday morning between 6 a.m. and 9 a.m., Andres has a free hand to detour from the WNIB/WNIZ (FM 97.1) monthly program guide, and play whatever he and his listeners want. Once Morning Song ends, Andres continues to twirl the knobs and play classical music until noon, following the station's program listings. A one-man show, he also does news. weather, traffic, and live commercials, along with all the engineering work.

A typical morning includes at least two marches, perhaps Sousa or Verdi, played daily at 7 a.m. and 8 a.m. and sometimes in between. Tributes to the late Vladimir Horowitz and Bette Davis (theme music from "Now Voyager") are aired, along with music from "Showboat" and "The Fantastics." Andres even places Chopin or Pachelbel alongside real oldies like "Wait Til the Sun Shines, Nellie' or "I Don't Care." Sometimes he sings the show tune's intro.

Occasionally, a classical purist calls to complain about Andres' populist programming, but they are in the minority. "I just heard from a lady," Andres announces on the air. "She said, 'This is a classical station. You just played a show tune. I want to hear Mahler in the morning!' Well, I'll play Mahler, but come on! Good music comes from all sources. I like to mix it up. Some people don't like it. But I don't think I'll change, do you?" he declares to listeners.

Each morning, Andres injects humor, warmth and wit into a traditionally droll format. "So many people in the classical field have an attitude about the music," Andres opines. "They think that when you're talking about classical music you have to speak from on high. And that's wrong! Music is for everybody. It's like a

painting. You don't have to know all about art to like what you see. It's the same thing with music."

Andres' immense popularity and high Arbitron ratings prove his point. "I'm human, I make mistakes on the air and I admit them," says the announcer who sometimes stumbles in the studio as much as his listeners fumble about at home in the morning. "Some guys act superhuman, like they're doing you a favor by playing this music. But people say they like my style because it's human and not abrasive," Andres adds.

After working in radio since 1941, Andres should know what clicks with audiences. "I think I've been in radio longer than anybody in the world," jests the man whose real name is Joseph. "I had to shorten it to Jay when I started out in Wisconsin because a co-worker didn't like my name," he says.


Originally from Milwaukee, Andres worked in Wisconsin radio before moving to Chicago in 1949. For 15½ years, Andres hosted WBBM's overnight classical show. His next move was to WGN radio, where he also worked the late shift playing a mixture of show tunes, classical, jazz and folk music for 15 years.

'I'm probably the dean of all-night disc jockeys," he notes. Today, listeners call WNIB to say they fondly remember him from when they were kids. In fact, Andres' smooth voice sounds familiar to several generations. When not working at WNIB, the classical host does voiceover work on TV and radio ads for clients like Jay's Potato Chips and the Standard Bank. Sometimes he hosts community concerts. But mostly the robust, silver-haired husband spends his free time with wife Virginia, their seven children and eight grandchildren. "You probably wonder how I found the time to produce that big a family!" he kids.

Andres left WGN in 1983 to travel the country in a motor home with Virginia, visiting friends and relatives. After 15 years at WGN, Andres was cut back to weekends when a new program director was hired. "I could see the format changing from music to talk. I knew they were going to hire Ed Schwartz away from WIND," he recalls. So. Andres figured it was time to hit the road before he was let go. "I wasn't really retiring, though. We settled in San Francisco and I worked at a station there part-time. But it was tough financially," he recalls.

The couple returned to Chicago and Jay was hired by WNIB's program director. Ron Ray in 1985. "I'd never met Ron before, but he knew me from way back in Milwaukee radio. He figured I'd be good for the station. And I was, I am, I still am!" he chuckles.

The key to his success at WNIB? "I think if you know what you're doing, and you really like it, and you take a chance and do something a little different, then people will appreciate it," he concludes.

full moon loomed over the Chicago Stadium and inside the fans howled. The Chicago Blackhawks were warming up for their 21st hockey game of the season against the Hartford Whalers. Even though it was an early-season, nondivision game, the atmosphere recalled the frenzy of the Stanley Cup playoffs.

"They're rabid," says Pat Foley, Pat describing the Blackhawks' fans. "They're really obviously into their team, and they're lucky enough to have a facility here that's second to none in the NHL for atmosphere—the stacked decks one on top of another, the resonating sound and the fact that they're an excitable bunch to start with—it's great! It makes for a great atmosphere, it makes for a great broadcast. There's nothing like a screaming crowd behind your call of an exciting play."

Partner Dale Tallon agrees, from a different perspective. As Vancouver's number one draft choice in 1970 and a Blackhawk for five years in the '70s, Dale had the opportunity to play in the rowdy arena. "It was pretty exciting," he recalls. "It was a unique situation. The Stadium is the best

place to play of all the places in the league. I liked playing in Chicago. I always wanted to stay here. I didn't want to leave. (He was traded to Pittsburgh, where he retired following the 1979-'80 season.) I really loved playing for the Blackhawks, and it's kind of funny that I ended up back here."

For Pat, becoming the Blackhawks' broadcaster was the fulfillment of a dream he had as a boy growing up in Glenview, listening to the legendary Lloyd Pettit calling the games for WGN. His father, a Buick dealer in Wilmette, arranged to take young Pat into the Chicago Cubs' broadcast booth for a game, providing Pat with his first glimpse of life on the other side of the microphone. "That was when I got to meet Jack Quinlan and Lou Boudreau and Vince Lloyd," he remembers. "That's what tweaked my interest at the age of twelve."

With the rest of the members of his boyhood sports gang, Pat used to play tabletop rod hockey in the basement, where he discovered an ability which he would later turn into a career. "We all kind of mimicked Lloyd Pettit a little bit, I think, from time to time, but we were just as into playing as trying to call it.

"It really started when I was at Michigan State," Pat says, "when I first got the opportunity to do play-by-play of various sports, and that's the first time that I really had a chance to strap a microphone on and pretend to be a professional."

Three years with the Grand Rapids Owls of the International Hockey League prepared Pat for his big chance in the majors. After submitting a tape of his Owls work to Hawks vice president Michael Wirtz, the announcer found himself in the big leagues as a top draft pick. "I would not be the first round choice that year," Pat jokes. "I think we'd

better give that to Denis Savard. We'd better put Darryl Sutter second, he was a rookie that year, too. So I was actually a free agent acquired with very little compensation," laughs the 35-year-old bachelor.

Dale's trail to the booth was less clear as he was growing up in northern Canada. "I had no idea I was going to be a broadcaster," Dale says, shaking his head. "I had no thoughts of that whatever. I was always comfortable in front of a microphone being interviewed."

But Dale had other interests, specifically hockey and golf. "There wasn't that big of a separation as far as love was concerned," he explains. "I just always felt I could play hockey and go to golf. I couldn't do the opposite." He was getting ready to do just that when he retired from hockey after breaking his leg, but a friend of his owned the company that broadcasted the Toronto Maple Leafs games. So Dale put his golf career on hold. Then, the Hawks' general manager Bob Pulford called in the fall of '82.

"He said they were looking for an ex-Blackhawk to do color on SportsVision, the cable outlet that just started up," says the 38-year-old father of two. "I was on my way to go play golf, and I stopped in Chicago to audition for it and got the job. When they went to 'BBM they wanted the broadcasters to be the same (on SportsChannel and WBBM), so they asked me if I'd be interested in radio as well." That is when Pat first began to work with a partner on the air.

The difference between announcing for radio and commentating for television starts and ends with the picture, or lack of it. "I think it's easier to do television in my opinion," Dale offers. "I've always felt that radio was harder because, as a color guy, you had less time to be more descriptive, plus you have to talk about direction, et cetera. Television you can take more time. I'm becoming more comfortable with radio."

It didn't take Dale long to get used to working with Pat, however. "We just hit it off right off the bat," says Dale. "We get along great off the air, too. He's so damn good. I don't think there's a guy in hockey who's as good as Pat today. He's got a good voice, he's excited, he's knowledgeable."

"My job is to try to translate what's happening on the ice to the eyes and ears, and translate it in a way that's informative and hopefully a little bit entertaining and exciting," Pat describes. "And Dale's job is a little bit looser from the standpoint that he's more of the analyst, the giver of reasons why things are happening. And obviously he injects his personality into it, too, which makes for a fun time, hopefully. For me it's fun, and I hope it translates to those plugged in."

Chicago Blackhawks fans don't need an interpreter to tell them that.

"The Stadium is the best place to play in the league," says the former Blackhawk.





Carolyn Grisko is outrageous, outspoken and out to inform

As WBEZ's longtime news director, Grisko's goal was objectivity. Since moving One Flight Up, she's learned how to be informative and provocative.

he admits she's been called the "bad girl of Chicago public radio" but Carolyn Grisko, host of WBEZ's One Flight Up talk show, is just having fun.

"Carolyn certainly does relish getting herself into trouble from time to time and that's just fine with me," says colleague Ken Davis who hosts Studio A, the talk show that airs before hers.

"She makes no bones about expressing her opinions and that's good. If something's bothering her, she talks about it and that obviously leads to people calling and screaming that they disagree with her," Davis continues.

"I will get outrageous. I'll say what I feel," adds Grisko. "People need to be held accountable and answer questions."

Grisko has been exploring issues on WBEZ (FM 91.5) for the past ten years, starting first as a general assignment news reporter and then news director. Talk show hosting came with motherhood.

"Moving from news to hosting a talk show was difficult at first. As news director, I had always been concerned about objectivity," explains Grisko. "Suddenly I was allowed to go on the air and start blabbing."

Davis says when WBEZ decided to expand its public affairs and issues programming, Grisko was the logical choice. She's very good at what she does. She's provocative, knowledgeable and the listeners respond well to her," he says.

The program's name, One Flight Up, has two meanings. First, to get to the studio, you take the elevator to the

39th floor and then take the stairs one flight up. The host also hopes the name indicates that her program is a "cut above the rest."

"We provide news and information in a way that is not sensational. We keep up with the rife and cover all points of view. We don't have to exploit people," she explains.

She describes the program, which runs Monday through Friday from 10:30 a.m. to noon, as one that deals with everything-local and national political issues, lifestyle topics, public policy, the arts, cooking, education and more.

Past guests reflect the show's variety - Former Chief of Staff Don Regan, Kitty Dukakis, one-time presidential candidate Bruce Babbit, Newsweek's Jane Bryant Quinn, actor Ben

Kingsley, Mel Torme, the Reverend Jerry Falwell and all of Chicago's recent mayors, to name a few.

"We talk about whatever issue I'm grappling with," she explains. "When I was ready to send my four-year-old to preschool but didn't know which one, we did a program on choosing preschools."

Grisko's delivery and style is conversational, casual and unaffected. Her interest is sincere.

"Our program, the entire station, is for people who care about what's going on," she says. "It's for people who want to be plugged in politically, culturally and socially.

"As a whole, we want to be a resource. There's the Lyric Opera, the Library, the Federal Building, WBEZ that's our vision of how we want to be."

That vision allows Grisko and her

co-workers the flexibility they need to look at issues in-depth. The city police contract issue is a perfect example. Grisko and Davis combined both their shows to examine the issue for three hours.

Recent topics include a proposed third airport, Lech Walesa's visit, preserving the lakefront, and commercial vs. nonprofit theater.

"It seems we always touch a nerve, no matter what the program," Grisko notes.

"We're not easy listening. We're not trying to lull you into relaxation," adds Davis. "We're difficult listening. We want to challenge people to think and care."

To prepare for the show, Grisko reads both newspapers, watches the early and late TV news, and reads several books a week. She praises her staff for their excellent research work.

Life off the air is spent with her two children, Scott, 4, and Rene, 3. The busy mom also spends her time as a media consultant helping corporate executives improve their skills in dealing effectively with the media.

"I've interviewed thousands of people," says Grisko. "I've found many lack the sophistication necessary in handling reporters like myself."

There's also time for fun - theater, art galleries, restaurant openings and more.

"Every time I go to one of those things I can pick out two or three people I've had on the show." she says. "If I do this long enough everyone in Chicago will have cycled through the program."

The Morning Mom and Pop Talk Show

Warren Freiberg and Libby Collins brew controversy in the south suburbs

Their viewpoints are at opposite poles. He's conservative and she's liberal. Their guests are controversial. Their callers are a cast of characters, who sometimes call them names.





They're a husband and wife team, but that doesn't mean they work that way on the air. "We have found through the years that we can't work together," admits Libby Collins, part-time host of the Warren Freiberg-Libby Collins Show. The talk/call-in program is heard weekdays from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Crete's WIAS (FM 102.3) and simulcast from 6 a.m. to 8 a.m. on sister station WCGO (AM 1600) in Chicago Heights. "When we actually do the show together, we find we

get into disagreements. It's almost like a fight for control of the program; when to do commercials, when to terminate a call, when to take another call," she explains.

"We really should do an occasional show together—just to fight," chimes in Warren Freiberg, the other host of the program. The couple rotates on-air duties; he usually works three days and she takes two. Collins says she prefers that her spouse, whom she affectionately calls a "dinosaur," stay in the foreground. "Warren has a tremendous following," Collins says of her husband of 13 years. "There are a lot of imitators, but nobody is quite like Warren.'

Freiberg's first interest in radio can be traced to his playing with Tinkertoys at age five. He recalls piecing together the wooden rounds and sticks into a microphone and imitating the network radio shows of the

time. He has been in the talk radio business for some 30 years and says he wants to die with a microphone in his hands. His association with the format stems back to the early 1960s and talk pioneer WWCA

Slightly embarrassed, Collins admits listening to her future husband as a young girl in Indiana. After completing her education and some public television work. she found herself in Gary at WLTH where Freiberg was then Vice President and General Manager. He hired Collins as a receptionist. Later, she started doing commercials. Her first on-air show was "Radio Bingo." (She called the numbers.)

The two combined talents in 1973 for a 12-year run at WLNR (FM 106.3) in Lansing, Illinois. In 1976, they took the plunge and got married. But that didn't change their volatile working relationship. Collins recalls how she used to work as Freiberg's engineer and how he used to throw things at the glass partition that separated them. He wasn't angry at her liberal opinions; just at her engineering skills, she explains.

In 1985, the couple left 'LNR to set up shop in Chicago Heights at sister stations WTAS-FM and WCGO-AM. While their lis-

tenership has changed over the years, the Freiberg-Collins format has remained the same. Collins, of course, has moved to the other side of the console to become an onair personality.

There is life outside of their morning radio venture, however, For fun, Collins manages two retail businesses in Indiana. Freiberg, meanwhile, keeps busy writing a psychic column for a nationally-distributed tabloid magazine. He also hosts a onehour psychic radio program every Friday morning, by phone, for Springfield's WMAY. Freiberg takes calls and gives listeners individual readings on the air.

"Warren, on the average day, is at least 90 percent accurate," says WMAY's "morning zoo" host, One-Eyed Jack. "Some days, he's closer to 99 percent accurate with his predictions," he adds.

Talk radio is something Collins and Freiberg do agree on and both thoroughly enjoy. Their goal each morning is to motivate the audience to participate, which they accomplish by espousing personal opinions on hot topics - from interracial marriage, to gun control, to abortion. "All the things you don't get at dinner," says Collins. "Religion, sex, politics; the things people really want to talk about."

"If you're going to do a talk program, you've got to give your honest opinion,' explains Freiberg. "You've gotta say, look, this is the way I really feel about this issue - no matter what it is." He closes each show with the words, "My pledge to you is the truth."

'Neither of us has ever said something just for dramatic effect," assures Collins.

"Not that we're unaware of showmanship," adds Freiberg, as the two begin to overlap each other's words.

"You've got to make it interesting," she

If the truth raises controversy, so be it. The hosts try to keep the show lively and accomplish this in several ways. Their own viewpoints are at opposite poles, with Freiberg the conservative and Collins the liberal. Their guests often spark controversy. Regulars include Gary activist Steve Morris, archeonservative Bill Grutzmacher and Eugene Sawyer's former aide Steve Cokely. The couple acknowledges that listeners may not like what their guests have to say (or what the hosts have to say, for that matter), but they become "like family" to the extent that listeners get to know them as human beings.

Members of their audience are unique. Sometimes they just tell stories. Other times, they're bold and brash - not afraid to call the hosts names, like "fascist" (Freiberg) and "man hater" (Collins). Freiberg recently had a heart attack, which left him in the hospital for two weeks and has limited his air time to three days a week; some listeners have accused Collins of being the trigger for it. The show has, as Freiberg describes, an "interesting stable of characters" who call in, including The Wimp, Deep Throat (a black gentleman on welfare) and The Snake (who freely expounds on his reasons for hating Freiberg when he calls).

Not all of their talk is controversial.

Regular callers include Deep Throat, The Wimp and The Snake.

He closes each show with the words, "My pledge to you is the truth.


Many of their topics are purely informational, such as home education or heart attacks. And they aren't afraid to talk about their personal lives on the air. "People know everything about us," says Collins, who sports glasses lately instead of the usual contact lenses. "The dog ate my contact lens. How can you not come in and talk about that?" Listeners are also familiar with the couple's 5-year-old son, Christopher. His taped cherubic shout of "God Bless America!" is often heard in between segments of discussion.

Sandwiched between the patter are the commercials, which the duo takes great care in creating. "Part of our real forte is the personal delivery of commercials," comments Freiberg. He and Collins write, produce and sell their own spots, which are often ad-libbed and aren't confined to a 30-second rule. This approach, though seldom used by other stations, has paid off for them. Their show boasts 10- and 15-year clients; some sponsors seek them out.

When it comes to their show, there's not much Freiberg and Collins don't do. "We're a mom and pop radio show," explains Collins. "We do the show. We arrange for the guests. We sell the advertising."

"But that way you also have complete control over it," Freiberg adds. "You have complete responsibility for it. If it falls flat on its face, we are the ones at fault."

And they wouldn't have it any other way.

hil, a faceless and irate voice from the North Side, is mouthing off. "She got her crying self pregnant. She's probably divorced, had a coupla affairs and decided to murder it."

The caller shuts up for a minute.

"That's a pretty big assumption," says WLS (AM 890) talk host Stacy Taylor. "This woman didn't sound so bad to me. Sounds like she shaves under her arms."

Phil is really worked up now. He blathers on. On and on. "These women who are prochoice are not only baby murderers," he rants. "They are tramps. Tramp murderers."

"You don't mince words, do you?" Taylor cuts in.

He does not mince words. either. Since leaving the balm of San Diego, Calif. to come to Chicago last October, this Number One-rated talk host serves as referee, sounding board and man-in-the-middle.

Transformed in August to an all-talk station, WLS hired Taylor to anchor the 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. slot, giving the Phils of the world a chance to voice their crying beefs.

Since such a job can get so messy, why bother?

"I tend to think of talk radio like government-in-exile," says Taylor who is slouching in a WLS production office chair and smoking a cigarette after this morning's gab festival is over. "We have people who are unsatisfied with bureaucracy. In some way they have adopted the radio as their government. It is their voice.

"Power in numbers," he says. "When 1,000 people call in, someone in the right place can't help but listen."

One thing Taylor does well is to really listen to his callers. It is not his style, however, to be overpowering. The smooth talk host balks at the mention of Morton Downey, Jr.'s attack methods. Taylor recalls the time he spent a week filling in at a Boston station, as a combat-style host. "It was an eye-opening experience. One day, we paraded out the typical combat guests."

Neo-Nazis, at your service.

"We went back and forth while people who had been in concentration camps are calling in, wailing and weeping. I did a lot of thinking about that so-called style of radio."

a platform? You have to remember that real people out there are affected."

At WLS, Taylor does not play offense or defense. He opts to play the field. "I'm not standing in my office before going on the air, whipping myself up into a mindless, illogical frenzy of emotion," he says. "I'm not pacing around the office, smoking ten cigarettes and drinking gallons of coffee to get mad enough to do every show.

Which is not to say that he spends all his time straddling the proverbial fence. "I give my opinion, although I do refuse to be pegged as a liberal or conservative," he says.

"I will argue strongly on an issue or point of view. It's my claim to right and wrong. I hold it sincerely which is all that really matters."

He does what he does after mulling over the morning's topic - which might mean everything or nothing, depending on the tide of callers. And the tide often shifts. "The topic is the hub of the wheel because we often end up talking about the spokes."

Case in point: A skeptic of psychic phenomenon guested on the show recently, expecting to get calls from wackos about close encounters. "After starting out with vampires and UFOs, we ended up with an interesting twist," reports Taylor. "We ended up discussing

the basis of faith. Why do people have faith? Why do we believe?"

Other recent Taylor topics include: why men fake orgasm, the rift between the black power elite and Mayor Daley's office, gays in politics, foreign aid, taxes and sex addicts. Just when the weight of the world settles across the nine phone lines in the booth, something like Zsa Zsa's police woes comes along to provide comic relief.

Taylor has been knee-deep in all of the above since he was a science journalism major at the University of Florida, After graduation in 1971, he logged several years as a rock or country jock at stations including WGLN-FM in Toledo, Ohio, WKLM-AM and WGNI-AM in Wilmington, N.C. He flipped off the music in 1980 and stirred up talk at WPLP-AM in Tampa, Fla., WAAM-AM at Ann Arbor, Mich., WING-AM in Dayton, Ohio, KING-AM in Seattle, Wash, and KSDO-AM in San Diego where his Arbitrons soared (a consistent Number (Ine or Two).

In 1985, Taylor decided to turn his life into a virtual movie by exposing a police scandal on his Dayton show. Ten indictments of high-ranking officials were the punchline. "We're talking petty shakedowns by police, informants and cops who were disappearing for days, payoffs, illegal wire taps. The local newspaper decided not to do the story since all the libel and slander suits were at stake. They dropped the ball, so I gave two officers who wanted to set the record straight a way to go out on a limb."

Meanwhile, I'm told to start carrying

a gun. The local mayor referred to me in a speech as a 'ruthless vagabond who would not rest until every good police officer was under indictment.' I'm using a different entrance to my house."

Before someone casts Dennis Quaid in the film version, Taylor wants to add some Chicago chapters. "There are so many up-andcoming issues," he says, dredging up the mental list. "Politics, gay rights, racial issues. The Spanish population has yet to be heard from. There is the growing Asian


community which is not playing out its political card. At least not yet. There is so much to be resolved."

And if some murky corruption issue comes down the pike? "My new house has five entrances," Taylor offers.

"CAPT, MIDNIGHT" Cast—1942




Did you ever *Meet The Missus?* Millions of American radio listeners did in the '50s, at the urging of announcer and host

lett began his radio career at age 13 in his home town of Milwaukee and came to Chicago four years later, "After I'd been at WBBM for a month, working as a staff announcer, they found out how young I was and wanted to fire me." he says. However, a sponsor chose Bartlett for Meet The Missus, an audience participation show, and, at age 18, he was well on his way to becoming Chicago's leading radio personality. After nine years of emceeing Missus, Bartlett switched to a spinoff called Missus Goes To Market, which he describes as the first audience-participation show. Bartlett then became the personality behind a phenomenally successful show called Welcome Travelers which later moved to television. A life-long bachelor, Bartlett originated his Ski, Sky and Stage Show in 1953 as insurance against possible unemployment in broadcasting, and it has since made his name even better known than in his radio days. He continues to emcee the annual Calgary Stampede and also served as the announcer for the Canadian Winter Olympics gold-medal award ceremony. He says, "I'm 75, an age at which most people would retire. But I produce and direct the Ski, Sky and Stage Show because it's still really exciting."

Does Spike O'Dell, a former tractor factory worker from East Moline, hold the key to WGN's future in his thirtysomething hand?



hen Spike O'Dell walks through the WGN Radio offices, people five him. He gets high fives, low fives, back fives, even the nearly extinct regular five. A few here and there might just grab his hand or pat him on the back. But mostly Spike O'Dell gets fived.

He's a popular guy around AM 720, and WGN is thinking he'll be a popular guy around Chicago. In fact, they're betting on it.

When WGN brought him here in the spring of 1987, one could reasonably say that Spike O'Dell represented a youth movement for the station. With Wally Phillips, Roy Leonard and Bob Collins, the station's demographics were collectively creeping past a large and desirable market: the baby boomers. Not to take anything away from this potent trifecta which continues to deliver the best and most consistent ratings in Chicago radio but at 35, Spike O'Dell is WGN's future.

"When I first came here, I couldn't believe it," says O'Dell. "I couldn't believe they wanted me to do radio, and not just in this city, but on this station. My background wasn't talk radio, especially not the kind of talk radio they do here. I came from a rock 'n' roll background...less lip, more hits. I never thought of myself as someone they'd want here."

But he is exactly what they'd want there, and for several reasons. Foremost is his track record. In ten years on the radio, high ratings have followed him wherever he's been. From his first stint in his native Ouad Cities area, to a brief interlude in Charlotte, N.C., and a return to the Cities, he has managed to breathe new ratings life into each station he's been with, usually leading them right to the top. In the two-and-a-half years since he's been hosting afternoons at 'GN, O'Dell's show has consistently ranked in either the Number One or Number Two slot, usually neck-and-neck with WGC1-FM's Tom Joyner.

"We're crazy about him," enthuses Cynthia Sutton, WGN's promotion assistant. "He's got that down-home personality, real friendly. He's never too busy to go out to the reception area and chat with listeners who drop by the station."

The popular O'Dell is genuinely warm, earthy and unpretentious qualities he conveys naturally and effectively when he's on the air. And for a station that has always appealed to middle America, demographically as well as geographically, these are precisely the ingredients needed to maintain a successful formula.

"They've basically given me free reign with my show," O'Dell says of station management. "They've told me that I can play a lot of music if I want, that I can talk about whatever I want. Then, if there's some-

thing they take issue with in my show, they'll tell me about it, but it's always constructive, it always helps. It's a great working atmosphere. You couldn't ask for a better iob."

O'Dell certainly wouldn't. A native of East Moline, Ill., he spent seven years plying a blue collar existence, working at an International Harvester factory in the Quad Cities area before taking a shot at radio. "Radio sounded fun, it sounded easy. I thought I wanted to do that." So he enrolled in a six-month broadcasting course, then worked at stations in Moline and Davenport while he held on to his Harvester job. Before



long, however, radio presented him with a much better and more lucrative career path, one he's been coursing down ever since.

O'Dell's show at WGN is more closely akin to the station's conventional talk format than it is to the post-modern version practiced by his counterparts at WLUP-AM. He doesn't possess the Lettermanstyle, hipper-than-thou character of his rivals up the dial, though he's not working in an environment that would be likely to tolerate their particular brand of caustic wit and

ferocious comedy either. Still, O'Dell doesn't give the impression he'd run his show that way even if he could

If Spike O'Dell wasn't working mid-days, more people might have an opportunity to find out exactly what his style is. Though he's been moved around in various time slots since his arrival here, his present 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. shift doesn't offer him an especially high-profile forum. And it's even more restrictive in the summer, when the Cubs are broadcasting their day games on WGN. Presumably the station plans to spread him more into the popular afternoon drive period; indeed, in November the station expanded him a half-hour past his former 4:30 p.m. sign-off. What Spike really needs, though, and what he'd most like to have, is a morning drive slot.

Presently, however, that slot is filled by the immensely popular and successful Bob Collins, who has become a morning fixture at WGN since Wally Phillips went into semiretirement. O'Dell has no illusions of replacing Collins, certainly not any time soon, but he is very familiar with the inherent prestige and opportunity that morning drive offers. At the same time, he is grateful for the chance to work with a seasoned veteran like Collins. The two share a similar style.

"I look around here, and I feel very lucky to be working with these people and learning from them," he says. "Bob Collins is the consummate professional, incredibly good at what he does. He is the nicest guy to know and to work with. And I think Roy Leonard conducts the absolute best interviews. bar none. If I can be half as good at listening and talking to others, I'll be happy."

He's happy to be part of that middle-American demographic swatch that WGN appeals to.

Spike O'Dell is basically a happy guy anyway. He's happy with his wife, Karen, and his children, Michael, 11, and Caroline, 6. He's happy to be the coach of his son's little league team. He's happy with his home in Naperville, and he's excited about the new house he's building there. He's happy to be a part of that middle-American demographic swatch that WGN appeals to, and he knows that therein lies the promise for his future at the station.

"I'm just like the people who listen to me," he says. "I have the same concerns, the same interests as they do. Chances are, if a topic interests me, it's going to interest the listeners. If I find something funny, they do too, and vice versa."

And, odd as it may sound, if Spike O'Dell decides to put Cream, Lynyrd Skynyrd or Led Zeppelin on a WGN turntable, chances are good the listeners are going to like that too. And that is one of the principal reasons O'Dell fits into WGN's plans. The listeners that are going to like it are exactly the listeners WGN needs to bring to the station.

"I'm having the time of my life," O'Dell says. "It's a dream job."

And if O'Dell can deliver a younger audience to WGN, it will be a dream job for the station too.



TALK RADIO:

A Look At The Many Faces of Talk Radio

Forum for free expression? Source of disinformation? Platform for demagogues? Gossip mill? A look at the many faces of the radio format that's sweeping the country.



Everyone likes to talk. Most folks, too, like listening to the radio. Put these two desires together and you get the potent, always entertaining mix of talk radio: part eavesdropping, part challenging of long-held ideas. Talk radio offers us a cheap, painless adrenalin rush to cash in on the near-universal fantasy of actually being on the radio. Recently, a friend commented that just calling up a station and requesting a song, and then hearing it played on the radio, gives her a feeling of power.

But of all radio formats, talk radio is like a blob of mercury, it's hard to pin down exactly what it is. There are many mixes of talk radio: shows that do nothing but take calls from listeners about personal problems, programs that feature controversial hosts or guests who take antagonistic calls, and "litetalk" shows that use calls from listeners as only one part of their blend, in between comedy bits and the latest hit single from Madonna or Springsteen.

Nationwide, its growing importance as a phenomenon was spotlighted in February 1989 during the radio talk show uproar over proposed pay raises for members of Congress. At that time, an informal network of talk show hosts all over the country banded together and urged their listeners to send tea bags by the millions in protest to Washington. The overwhelming grass-roots response forced the politicians to defeat the projected raise, for the time being.

In some way, this social and political use of talk radio might be seen as the modern-day electronic equivalent of the old-fashioned small-town meeting. In a starry-eyed sense, you might even argue that, by exerting this kind of power, talk show hosts take the pulse of our democracy; that talk radio expresses the peoples' true voice.

Another view would say it gives cynical demagogues an undeserved platform to create controversy; that some hosts are self-promoting sensationalists only interested in boosting their ratings. Actor Eric Bogosian in the movie *Talk Radio* portrayed just such an instigator of "shock radio." Or, these self-appointed spokesmen can be merely rabble-rousers.

On the other hand, some might say that talk shows hosts, no matter what their political ideology, whether liberal or conservative,

really do give a largely apathetic public — the "little people" — a unique opportunity to raise their voices in protest. As levels of voter registration attest, we live in a time when there is widespread feeling that the individual's voice has become so ineffective as to be nearly invisible.

Radio programming, as the cliché goes, is not brain surgery, which is probably why there is so much talk radio on the air. For station program directors, talk radio is an easy type of program to format. In its worst form, talk radio requires little more than a smart-aleck host who is willing to go on the air and say outrageous things, a bank of phones, and a tape delay machine. (Of course, the host has got to be able to, at least, speak coherently.)

In a more service-oriented format, talk radio can also act as an electronic community bulletin board, especially since Fax machines have thoroughly invaded the medium. For example, a woman called WGN's Spike O'Dell to ask about a haunted house to take her kids to during Halloween. Another listener faxed haunted house information to WGN in response.

Rumors are another fact of life with talk radio. The format can feed hearsay simply by giving a rumor public airing. People will say things on the air that may or may not be true, as witnessed by the recent, infamous case in Chicago concerning an alleged dispute between a local celebrity and her fiancé.

Serious news media won't touch speculative stories with no facts to back them up. (There *are* laws against libel and slander.) Should talk radio be held to the same standards of responsibility and integrity as other media? Or are the "shock radio" shows the equivalent of grocery store scandal rags?

The safe anonymity of talk radio can serve as a public forum or confessional, as happened on the Jobo and Eddy V. show on B-96 when a woman called the day before Thanksgiving and, confessing she was having an affair with her brother-in-law, asked the wise-cracking hosts how to arrange seating for the turkey dinner.

Why do we call talk shows? Eliazer Margolis, a doctoral candidate in clinical psychology, offered an explanation: "I think because of the anonymity of modern life, talk radio



lets people break out of their skins. We find it more facile to talk to a stranger because there are no consequences, no responsibilities, no attachments. It also has to do with our 1980s American celebrity cult. Being on the radio for a few minutes is gaining celebrity, even if it means revealing your intimate sexual problems. By having 600,000 people listening, you feel that you're connecting. It's exhibitionistic, rather than making you feel healed. Talk radio is suited to this need because you don't see or hear your audience."

In the world of talk radio, it is axiomatic that only a fraction of the people who are listening to a show will ever actually pick up their phones and try to call the station. Further, from the small pool that does try to call, only a few will get through. So usually, the calls we hear on the air are a highly-selected slice that really don't represent anything more than dialers lucky enough to beat the

to beat the long-shot odds.

Talk radio was the topic of a panel discussion at the 20th Annual Loyola University Radio Conference recently. Kevin Matthews (WLUP), Dave Baum (WBBM-AM), Beth Albright (from Milwaukee's WISN), and Drew Hayes (program director of WLS) provided four very different approaches to the subject. For Dave Baum, the key to a successful talk radio show is "satisfying the audience. I look on it as preparing a menu. If I don't prepare a new one every day, my listeners will take a pass. So I take time to prepare the best menu I can." Beth Albright said, "A good host has to represent his or her audience. Are we here to inform and educate? Not primarily. Talk radio is an entertainment medium. We have to make them feel something." Drew Hayes added, "Just asking questions is not talk radio. The host must be fearless and take chances."

Here in the Chicago market, a listener twirling the radio dial can hear a steady stream of talk, but in very different forms and styles. What follows is a brief, highly-opinionated rundown of the major talk radio stations and personalities:

WGN (AM 720)

The station, top-rated in this market, is really the granddaddy of the talk format. It features personalities such as Bob Collins who has a folksy "How's by you, darling" approach. Now the highest-rated morning show host, Collins took over the time slot of the avuncular Wally

Phillips (who still does one show a week on WGN). Phillips was one of talk radio's most famous practitioners. Spike O'Dell also dominates afternoon ratings with a similar laidback style. And during the late night hours, "Chicago" Ed Schwartz, the other stalwart of WGN's talk lineup, rules the airwaves. All of these personalities tend to stay off controversial topics.

WGN also features the cerebral, and often esoteric, Milt Rosenberg. His 9 p.m.-11 p.m. show, *Extension 720*, discusses a wide variety of topics including local, national and international political issues. Authors of timely and controversial books often appear.

WLUP (AM 1000)

If WGN defines itself as a friendly, homey station, WLUP is its antithesis. The Loop is a raucous, occasionally crude, but very funny station. Adult rock is also a big part of its mix of talk. The star of the Loop (simulcast from WLUP FM 97.9) in the morning is Jonathon Brandmeier. He is, of course, a top local concert draw with his band The Leisure Suits, and the star of Budweiser TV spots. Devoted fans who call in to his "showgram" have performed outrageous stunts in public to win tickets to his concerts.

TALK RADIO SAMPLER

A summary of Chicago's top talk stations and call-in jocks

Johnny B. is followed mid-day by the extraordinarily talented Kevin Matthews whose voice impersonations include a growly throated Jim Shorts, WMAQ-TV weatherman John Coleman ("I'm so wasted, Carol and Ron, back to you"), Barney Fife, Raymond Burr, and "Eddie," a twin of WGN's Schwartz. Matthews, a one-man Sybil, creatively spews his characters into ridiculous imaginary situations. His interactions with his "Kev-head" callers might bring forth Raymond Burr one minute and John Coleman the next.

On the strongly personalityoriented program of Steve Dahl and
Garry Meier, 2:30 p.m.-7 p.m. they
regularly take calls on the air. Dahl and
Meier do not suffer fools gladly and frequently tease, browbeat, ridicule or cut
off their callers. But callers accept such
treatment as part of the risk and thrill
of being "in the air" with Steve and Garry.
This notorious duo can be self-referential,
but they are always witty, irreverent and
(for my money) hilarious. (The FCC did
not find them so hilarious, however and
fined the station for allegedly indecent
remarks made on their show—Editor).

The Loop also has a sports talk show with Chet Coppock from 7 p.m.-10 p.m. And the nationally syndicated king of talk radio, Larry King, is heard on AM 1000 from 10 p.m.-1 a.m.

WLS (AM 890)

This station is the new kid on the block, having only recently undergone the transformation into an all talk format. The brains behind it is program director Drew Hayes who says, "Five years ago people thought talk radio was for old people, but we're out to show that it can be a true mass appeal format. Talk is no longer a four letter word."

"We are the *only* talk radio station, others are doing some variation on the format. We're the station that's growing

that's growing as the baby boomers age, and it's perfect here because in the 1960s kids grew up listening to WLS. It was the ultimate personality station, the home of the Silver Dollar Survey, but now our listeners care more about where their tax dollars are being spent. We're not just plugging into the switchboard and taking whatever calls come down the pike, but we're talking about issues - things people care about. Everyone else will have to follow our lead, we're the most aggressive talk station in America. We expect to give everybody a run for their money." Hayes has even given flamboyant former alderman Ed Vrdolyak a talk show, but it remains to be seen how successful WLS will become.



B-96 is a music-oriented Top 40 station. Mornings feature the antics of Jobo and Eddie V. (Joe Bohannon and Ed Volkman). On "Confession Wednesday" the zany duo prods callers to reveal embarrassing secrets.

WBBM (FM 96.3)

WKQX (Q 101).

The high profile Robert Murphy has been on the air since 1983 and was an early protagonist of the type of personality/comedy radio that others have copied. His features include "Dial-a-Date", Most Embarrassing Moments", "Fleeting Meetings with Fame", "Murphy Money Song."

WVON (AM 1450)

In late October, WVON-AM fired five of its air personalities in response to criticism that the black-oriented talk station was agitating community tension by its coverage of allegations of policy brutality. Weekend hosts Chinta Strausberg and the Reverend Henry Hardee were among those let go. The station programs an often inflammatory and controversial type of talk radio. WVON also suffered criticism in the wake of the Steve Cokely affair.

WBBM (AM 780)

Although primarily a news station, WBBM does feature Dave Baum from 9

p.m. until midnight. Baum is a seasoned talk show veteran; he has been a host for twenty years. Always thoughtful and well-prepared, you may not agree with him, but his position on the issues he discusses is clear.

WJJD (AM 1160)

This nostaglic music station features Clark Weber, who has enjoyed one of the longest-running careers in Chicago radio. Heard from 5:30 p.m. to 10 a.m. weekdays, Weber knows the city like few others and delivers a dependable show mixing interesting guests with calls.

WBEZ (FM 91.5)

The local outlet of National Public Radio programs a number of issue-oriented talk radio shows, including *Studio A* with Ken Davis, *One Flight Up* with Carolyn Grisko, and *Midday* with Sondra Gair. All of these well-informed hosts take calls from listeners and expect them to have something meaningful to add to the discussion, whether the topic is ecology, family issues or an international political situation.

WCGO (AM 1600)


This Chicago Heights-based station airs The Warren Freiberg-Libby Collins Show from 6 a.m. to 8 a.m. weekdays. Crete's WTAS (FM 102.3) simulcasts the show from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. A pioneer of the format, Freiberg's talk show roots date back to the early '60s. The outspoken conservative alternates days with his liberal wife Libby Collins, as they fight too much when they work together. Unlike most talk hosts, this couple does not employ a tape delay machine, which can make for some very interesting dialogue.

On the air since the '40s, Sig has interviewed 1,800 stars and countless "local celebrities."

Sigmund Stanislaus Sakowicz. No one ever told him he had a name for show business, but he got into it anyway, "through the back door; the hard way," he says. Since his start with WAIT-AM (now WCEZ) in the 1940s, he's interviewed approximately 1,800 celebrities and a countless number of "everymen," people from all walks of life who are just as important to Sig as the "biggies" "You know, we all put our pants on one leg at a time," he often says. Sig should know, he lived in Las Vegas for 13 years and covered the Academy Awards for 25 years.

Nowadays, Sig is heard every morning, Monday through Friday, from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. on Highland Park's WVVX, FM-103.1. He plays everything from 1940s big band hits to the mellow '70s sounds of artists like Olivia Newton-John. In between discs, he announces births, deaths, and anniversaries and chats with "local celebrities" from around the country.

Each day, Sakowicz fulfills Andy Warhol's 15 minutes of fame prediction. "I prove that everybody can be a celebrity on my show! Even if there's only one tidbit of interest in a 10-minute interview. that's OK. because people learn from that. That's broadcasting's responsibility." One morning it could be the manager of a hotel; the next, a man in Colorado who cuts custom-sized logs for fireplaces; or, it could be one of the women in his Sig Sakowicz Fan Club (also known as S.S.F.C., Inc.).

That's right, this "poor-man's Iry Kupcinet" doesn't have a bridge named after him, but he does have a fan club of more than 500 members. Women over 21 only need inquire. Lillian May of Chicago is the president of S.S.F.C., Inc. She was Sig's secretary at WTAQ for ten years, and she also worked for him during his tenure as president of The Polish Alma Mater.

"I guess there's only women (in the club) because we started as a mothers' club in the 1960s," May explains. "We've asked ladies about it (including men), but they say, Oh, I want to get away from my husband." The ladies meet every Saturday from 10:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. at The Copernicus Center on Lawrence at Milwaukee. Sig is present at every meeting. There is also a speaker or entertainer at every meeting. "But besides all the fun - going to see Bobbie Vinton or Tony Orlando, free movie screenings — or the trips, like to Poland — we also do work for charity, too."

Charity is how it all began for Sig. He's proud that his family never took any. "My parents were born in Poland. They both passed away without being able to speak English fluently, but they made it — by hard work only." He is quick to talk about the days when he'd bug other announcers to talk about charitable organizations. "Before l ever got a show, I 'guested' on over 150 radio and TV shows,

promoting charitable events, and then the bug bit me. I thought, 'Hey! This business looks pretty good — let me do this for a living.'"

Of the 1,800 celebrity interviewees listed in his press kit, Sig says he can't name one particular favorite. After all, his list includes an entire page of celebs named Allen — everyone from Woody to Steve to Alda. "Most of the people. 95-97 percent of them, have been super people. There are only one or two people a year that have forgotten their humble beginnings."

The direction that radio is taking is of great concern to Sig. He's happy about the rebirth of AM and the talk format, but "I don't think a lot of talk show hosts know what they're talking about. They re con artists. They use four-letter words and get by through shocking the audience. Many of the guys have forgotten that they have a responsibility to the audience for good broadcasting.

A message to the folks at WLUP-AM? "No, no," claims Sig. "I saw (Jonathon) Brandmeier at the Emmys, backstage. I shook his hand firmly, and I said, Jon, you appreciate what you have, what the good Lord gave you.' And he shook my hand even harder and said, Sig, I really do. I thank the Lord every night and also my mother reminds me of it ... you wanna babysit for me?" Sig laughs at the anecdote.

Despite his criticism of talk radio, he won't name any names. "I don't rap anybody. Doesn't do any good. Sometimes I've said things to people's faces, but talking behind their backs is a waste of time." He won't elaborate on the negatives, but time permitting, he can and will speak volumes on how nice someone was, how nice they looked, or what they do for a specific charity.

He'll also tell you about his "wonderful wife," Gina. "If it werent for my wife... gosh, I don't know... we've been married 21 years. She's a super lady who has been working with me day and night, seven days a week. I'm lucky to have a lady like that.'

His show is far from hip, shocking or avant-garde, but it does adhere to Sig's own definition of broadcasting. "Broadcasting is to inform, educate, assist, and finally, to entertain. Making money should be fifth, or so, near the bottom. The trouble is — too many people put it at number one. It shouldn't be like that!"

To those just starting out in radio, Sig digs deep into his treasure trove of wisdom and experience and encourages them to learn everything about show business "... even how to sweep the floor. Too many people don't know how to do that. They start right in and they raise an incredible amount of dust. You don't do that! You go to the faucet, you sprinkle some water on the floor first - you settle the dust before you start."

Sig fulfills Andy Warhol's prediction every day. "I prove that everybody can be a celebrity on my show!"


